GENERAL MEETING

of the Canadian Kennel Club, Sept. 4

The meeting was called to order at 8.30 p.m. in the Board Room of the Canadian National Exhibition. The president, Mr. Jos. Russell, in the chair.

The minutes of the last general meeting were read by the secretary, and it was moved by Mr. DeGeer, seconded by Mr. Strachan, that the minutes be approved as read.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Donovan, seconded by Mr. Thomas, that the chairman appoint a committee of five to revise, where necessary, the Constitution, By-laws and Regulations of the club, and that this committee report to the next general meeting.—Carried.

It was then moved that the meeting adjourn.—Carried.

The meeting was very well attended, the members showing by their presence that they were taking great interest in the doings of the club.

The president, Mr. Russell, was in the chair. Before calling the meeting to order he expressed his satisfaction with the good attendance of members both at the meeting and at the Dog Show. The different breeds of dogs showed improvement, both in number and quality. Our annual Exhibition was as good as the biggest American shows. He called on Mr. T. R. DeGeer, one of our representatives at the C. N. E., who reported his satisfaction at the record of entries at the show, and everybody seemed satisfied with all arrangements. There had been some improvements in the buildings and they were in a clean and sanitary condition. No more money could be spent while the war lasted, but a new building had been promised after the war. The additional prize money was a great encouragement to the exhibitors.

Mr. F. Jacobi, superintendent of the show, thanked one and all, especially the exhibitors, for their good support.

The Exhibition always tries to get the best judges and to get those who are not influenced in any way from outside, although there was no sign of a new building until after the war ends, we might get a different building next year.

Mr. Thomas, of Montreal, spoke in favor of having the general and specialty clubs registered or licensed by the C. K. C. This would avoid overlapping of clubs with identical purposes in the same city or district and would also stop the starting of many clubs by the dissatisfied or unwelcome members of other clubs, and at the same time the C. K. C. could keep better track and control of these clubs.

Mr. W. R. Aitken asked that all members be supplied free with rules and constitutions of the C. K. C. when they joined the club. Mr. Russell explained that this had not been done because it was the intention of the directors to have the constitution, by-laws and regulations altered in the near future, and it would entail too much expense if we got too much printing done, especially when there was so much other matter that had to be printed immediately, but when the changes were made it would be wise to send each member, as he joined, a copy free.

Mr. Russell explained that as the Board of Directors intended changing the constitution, rules and regulations in the near future, all these changes could be done then.

Mr. H. B. Donovan here presented a motion which was unanimously approved, that the chairman appoint a special committee to revise the constitution, by-laws and regulations of the C. K. C. and report at the next general meeting.

Any members having any suggestions to make could send them in writing to

the secretary, who would then turn them over to this special committee.

Mr. Russell also thought that it would be a good idea to adopt a breed rating for shows similar to the A. K. C., each breed to count its own points. This would be fair to all, would tend to interest the exhibitors of each breed to make as big an entry as possible, especially in breeds with small entries.

Mr. Lepine, Montreal, asked the chairman's help in reforming the Fox Terrier Club. He was promised the co-operation of the Directors in any way possible.

COMING EVENTS

The New Brunswick Kennel Club will hold its ninth annual Bench Show at St. John, N.B., October 10th, 11th and 12th, and all signs point to the best show ever held under the auspices of the club. Mr. Alf. Delmont has accepted the invitation of the club to officiate as judge. Mr. L. B. Wilson, for years one of the best known fanciers in this section, is Chairman of the Show Committee, with W. C. McKay as Secretary. Other good workers for success on the committee are: Charles Conway, George Gray, J. V. McLellan, J. McCaffrey, of Fredericton; Francis Kerr, Bliss A. Smith and Robert Magee.

The show will be held under the auspices and in co-operation with Loyalist Chapter, I.O.D.E., one of the "live wire" chapters in this vicinity, with the entire net proceeds to be given for patriotic purposes. A splendid building for show purposes has been secured, well lighted and ventilated, with all modern conveniences.

The Airedale Terrier Club of Canada were obliged to call off their show, advertised for Thanksgiving Day, owing to several circumstances, chief of which were the important show fixtures—London, Ottawa and Montreal. The early date for Thanksgiving and consequently too little time to advertise the show properly. However, the delay is only of a temporary nature, and dates, specials and name of judge will be almost immediately announced and the Airedale fraternity will be well advised to get their several charges licked into shape.

Canadian National Exhibition, Toronto

The annual dog show held in conjunction with the Canadian National Exhibition took place on Sept. 3rd to 6th, and turned out to be the biggest and best show ever held in Canada. More dogs with more quality and more people flocked into the old building than were ever seen before since the inauguration of the event twenty-nine years ago. Fanciers from all parts of Canada and the States were in evidence and it was pleasing to see the exhibitors from the West in friendly competition with those from the East. No fancier who can help it misses this show, it is the Mecca of enthusiasm. The management are to be congratulated on the excellent arrangements; neither time nor money had been spared in helping to bring about this record event. The result of the excellent classification and other inducements brought out the record entry of over 720 dogs, making it a 5-point show. Commencing with the breeds as they appear in catalogue order, we notice no less than 10 Mastiffs benched, which constitutes a record for this old variety and must be very gratifying to that

staunch supporter, Mr. C. W. Dickinson, to see the breed he has done so much for coming into prominence. Priam of Wingfield headed the dog section. He is a big, sound, well-balanced dog; a little more wrinkle would improve him. Another entry in this section worthy of special mention is Hector of Wingate, a son of the above mentioned dog, who shows every promise of being even better than his sire when matured. Parkgate Duchess once more accounted for winners bitches, closely followed by her kennel mate, Duchess of Wingfield.

St. Bernards, with an entry of 31, were not up to the quality usually seen at this show, and was responsible for a few upsets. Mountain Dew, a promising son of Ch. Alta the King, went right through his classes from novice to winners, defeating such dogs as Ch. Facsimile of Parkdale. A representative of the same kennel named Mountain Dew Nugget, also accounted for winners bitches over Lady Molly and Elkwood Queen of Hearts.

Bloodhounds were few in number, but brought together the best specimens ever seen in Canada. Umpire, the winning dog, was easily the best, scoring in bone, substance, conformation and movement, a little more wrinkle would improve him. Undine, a kennel mate to the above, had no difficulty in gaining winners bitches. Without doubt she is the best we have; her head is a study and her body properties leave nothing to be desired, moves well and was put down fit.

Only two Newfoundlands toed the line. The winner was just a moderate one and was lucky to catch Ch. Earl of Suffolk out of condition and coat.

Great Danes saw the noted Harliquin, Ch. Leonine, head the field. He is a big, fine, upstanding hound with few faults. His nearest rival being Donlands, another well-made, typical dog who loses to the winner in foreface and size. Raginvald Jarl commenced at junior and went through to winners. She must have been pressed closely by Zenda, who was reserve.

The Russian Wolfhounds had only 3 classes allotted to them and the entry averaged 12 per class, consequently many real good ones were amongst the "also-rans". The class for novices saw Countess Valeska on top. She is well-balanced, nice head, neck, legs and feet, shapely body and nice hindquarters.

The second dog, Prince of Kalmar, loses to winner in coat and condition. Countess Ellka accounted for 1st limit and open. She is full of quality, long, lean head, nice neck, set on the best of shoulders, deep brisket and nice loin. Second to her in both classes was Petrofski of Addlestone, a big, rangy dog with lots of quality and shows well.

Greyhounds were a small but select group. Once again the well-known Ch. Master Butcher headed the field. His quality and conformation, coupled with his beautiful outline, gained the day over Lansdowne Storm Cloud, who was put down fit and is a hard dog to fault. Winners bitches was an easy thing for Lansdowne Sunflower, a well-balanced one teeming with quality.

All the prizes in the class for English Foxhounds were carried off by the representatives from one kennel, which was quite a compliment to the owner. Their "cousins," the American Foxhounds, with 50 entries, showed an all-round improvement in type and quality, winners dogs falling to Pont, who ran through his classes from novice. We noticed several real good ones unplaced. The winners in the opposite sex fell to Ringlet, a real typey one that is hard to fault and was rightly placed.

Old English Sheep Dogs could only muster three. Warncliffe Mac, a big-boned, shapely dog, scored over his kennel mate, Warncliffe Lady, in substance and coat.

Dalmatians were another small group, but what was lacking in quantity was made up by quality. Prince of Louvain, 1st limit, open and winners is a good sound dog with lots of type, could do with more spots. Rockampton's Riva's many fine qualities gained the day in the opposite sex.

Criticisms of the remaining varieties, by experts, will be found in another part of this issue.

BULLDOGS.

By H. L. Thomas, of Montreal.

Bulldogs were judged by Dr. Geo. W. Clayton, of Chicago. There were mustered 52 Bulldogs of wonderful all-round quality, in fact, it was the best quality lot of dogs ever got together in one show in Canada.

Puppy dogs. Seven puppies, not a poor one among them. 1st, Mrs. Mary Briggs' Marcus Brutus, easily the best, good big skull, short back, a real promising sort. 2nd, R. K. Baker's Cleve-

lock Cheer O, another short-backed dog, loses to the winner in finish. 3rd, Mr. Herbert Thomas Gubb's Oakwood Tenacity, another good puppy with plenty of bone, wants time.

Novice dogs, 1st, Hornby & Rodgers' Jellicoe. This is a sound dog of fair average quality, he would be improved with wider placing of eyes, lacks that sour expression so much desired, lacks finish of foreface and depth of cushion, he has a nice brick-shaped skull. This dog went right through his classes to winners, where I certainly could not follow the judge. 2nd, Mr. E. Cobb's Devon Squire, a good type with lots of wrinkle and foreface, poor tail. 3rd, Mr. Gubb's Oakwood Tenacity.

Limit dogs. A big class of 16 dogs. 1st, Hornby & Rodgers' Jellicoe. 2nd, Preston & Johnston's Copper Hill King. This dog excels in shoulder, is not quite straight on his pasterns, is a little full in eye and fails entirely before the eye. 3rd, Mr. J. F. Lakin's Kersal King. This dog is a real smasher, has a big square skull, perfect placement of eye, with a wonderful finish in foreface, with a perfect sour expression, with bone like a Clyde, beautiful width and turn-up. This dog is an almost perfect study in head. His fault lies in a straight style, throwing the back too high and giving him a bad action behind. This dog should have won as he was a mile ahead of anything in the show. There were several other real good ones in this class that the judge did not see, such as Try Again William, a grand type of a heavyweight. This dog should have been in the money.

Open dogs (45 lbs. and over), 1st, Hornby & Rodgers' Jellicoe. 2nd, Preston & Johnston's Copper Hill King. 3rd, W. J. Mountain's Baron of Lambare.

Limit dogs (under 45 lbs.), 1st, Mr. R. Thompson's Mersey Pilot, a real good little dog, showing age, low and massive, the right sort. 2nd, Miss Bain's Birchcliffe Baron. This is a fairly good quality youngster all round, good bone, fair skull and fair foreface. 3rd, Mr. Wilson's Walnut Crib, a nice little dog, lacks cushion and finish.

Open dogs (under 45 lbs.), a repeat.

Junior dogs and bitches, 1st, Hornby & Rodgers' Jellicoe. 2nd, Mr. W. A. Richards' Silent Buff Princess, a good little one, short, cobby back, good cushion and finish of foreface, with a very

good expression. 3rd, J. F. Lakin's Kersal King.

Puppy bitches, 1st, C. E. Metcalf's Lady Cheetham, a nice, cobby little fawn, with good expression, will make up into a nice bitch. 2nd, Mr. H. T. Gubb's Oakwood Royal. This is a nice stamp of bitch, heavy bone, good body, with good stamp of foreface. 3rd, Mr. Giles' Gold Nugget.

Novice bitches, 1st, Mr. Richards' Silent Buff Princess, 2nd, Mr. Anderson's Vixen Lilly. This is a good bitch, good skull and heavy bone, her coat was out of condition, has a nice expression.

Limit bitches (40 lbs. and over), 1st, Mrs. R. A. Knott's Toll Bar Judy, a real good bitch, with a little more underjaw she would be a flyer. 2nd, Mr. Anderson's Vixen Lady. 3rd, Hornby & Rodgers' Astoria Molly. This bitch should have been higher, a real good one, good skull, good bone, with good depth of foreface.

Open bitches (40 lbs. and over), 1st, J. F. Lakin's Hefty Mischief, a real good bitch, good body and a real good foreface. 2nd, Mr. Anderson's Vixen Lily. 3rd, Hornby & Rodgers' Astoria Molly.

Limit bitches (under 40 lbs.), 1st, W. A. Richards' Silent Buff Princess. (3rd, J. F. Lakin's Hefty Blaze, a good sour-faced bitch, with grand turn-up, good shoulders, a real classy bitch.

Open bitches (under 40 lbs.), 1st, W. J. Mountain's Ch. Belgrave Lady of Lambare, a low, cloddy bitch, with big skull, very heavy bone and low to the ground, would like to see more turn-up to her underjaw, she has great width of underjaw. 2nd and 3rd, repeats.

Canadian-bred dogs, 1st, Hornby & Rodgers' Jellicoe. 2nd, Mr. Wilson's Coser's Diamond, well known. This is the only bit of consolation Mr. Wilson had. 3rd, Mr. Holgate's King Jack.

A. Currie's Dodge's Pride, a very smart dog, more finished than the winner, good color, markings and tail, and a splendid mover, not quite decided enough in stop as yet. 3rd, D. D. Elder's Duneldine Boy, nice

color and markings, lacks age and development.

Novice dogs (under 17 lbs.), a repeat of puppy class.

Limit (under 17 lbs.), 1st, G. A. Beaumont's Kid Raffles, very taking dark brindle, very clean in head, beautiful expression, a good true Boston of high quality. 2nd, H. E. C. Brennan's Derby Speed, a very cobby dog, good color, a trifle wide in face markings, very short and blocky in head, loses to winner in expression. 3rd, Dodge's Pride.

ment, a very useful stamp of terrier, nice head, with dark eye, shade uncertain in ear carriage, good front, short back, and a fair coat and color. 2nd, Morning Acceptance, a real typical one, nice size, excelling in body properties, coat and color, moves well and was put down fit. 3rd, Morning Commander. Novice dogs, with 12 entries, was a repeat. Limit dogs saw the well-known Morning Admiration on top. He still retains his wonderful type and conformation and was put down in tip-top condition. 2nd, previously reviewed. 3rd, Claycliffe Tenacity, a long-headed dog, with good coat and color, should like to see him with more substance.

Open dogs brought together nine of our best, and was headed by Ch. King Nobbler's Double, who carried off the blue, and also went to winners. Second to him was Morning Admiration, then followed the noted dog, Ch. Clipstone First Shot, who loses to winner in color and bone. This dog is full of terrier character and had many admirers round the ringside. Wallaton Preparedness is a much improved dog and was unlucky to be unplaced in the limit class.

Bitches made a fair show and furnished several surprises. The puppy class was won by Broomhill Betty, a nice compact bitch with good conformation and nice coat of the right texture; should like to see her stronger in foreface. 2nd, Claycliffe Maximum, a very promising youngster that should be heard of again. 3rd, Muniable Pearl, another quality one, lacking size and substance. Junior bitches brought out Vesper Bell, who went through her classes to winners, a decision we could not follow, as she is by no means a typical one. 2nd, Broomhill Betty. 3rd, Claycliffe Swell Lady, possesses a typical head, with well-placed eyes, shade large in ears, clean shoulders, nice legs and feet, good body, coat and color.

Limit bitches, 1st and 2nd a repeat, 3rd, Claycliffe Pride, nice type and conformation, good coat and color.

Limit bitches, 1st and 3rd, a repeat. 2nd, Rhosdhu Victory, easily the best and should have won, good head, with well-placed eyes and ears, nice neck, clean shoulders, shown a little short in coat. This bitch was placed 1st in the open class, followed by her kennel mate, Claycliffe Swell Lady. Next in order came Ch. Sunshine, which, of course, caused another surprise. The representatives of the enthusiastic fancier,

Mr. J. W. Bain, who, though placed among the "also rans" was by no means disgraced. The Rugged Kennel's nominee, Princess Oorang, lost her chances through being short of coat. This section was also robbed of a lot of interest through the absence of the Rockley dogs, as it would have been interesting to see them taking chances with our best.

IRISH SETTERS.

By Mrs. E. A. Sturdee.

I have been asked to write about the Irish Setters at the Canadian National this year, and I am very glad to do so; but not having done anything of the kind before I am afraid it will be rather crude.

First I want to say a word about the judge. I saw him judging English Setters and thought he did them rather well, although he did overlook a decided limp in one of the prize winning bitches' forefeet. Next came the Irishmen, which, I was sorry to find, so poorly exhibited at this our largest show. There were just twelve. I cannot honestly say that I think the judge knew this breed. Of course, it was badly represented and the quality was not up to much, but it was not so much his placing as the impression that he neither knew or appreciated the breed.

Now for the dogs themselves. Twelve as I have said. When I walked around the benches I was bitterly disappointed in the quality and quantity. It was three years since I won my championship in the Queen City with Corry Law, and I had been in England and out of things on this side until this year, when I showed my newly imported Irishman at New York and took reserve winners, and, oh, I was disappointed here. Where was Mr. Hanna, of Montreal, and his dogs, both of which were at New York and did well? Where were the youngsters of 1914? Only Judge Law greeted me, and he looked like a pariah. As usual, Ben Lewis' dogs were only benched in spots, and they were in spots, too, I think, as Red Storm's coat was decidedly thin in places; in fact, the condition of the Irish Setters at the Exhibition this year was rotten. No other word fits.

Puppy classes brought out three. I. Moroney's Dash Dally, 1st, a beautifully colored dog, with possibilities. He had a fair head, good eye, beautiful legs and feet, and good action, but long

in body and lacking in finish and feathering. 2nd, William Clarke's Betsy, just a fair one, nothing one way or the other, good type, as all of Mr. Moroney's are, but plain. 3rd, W. J. Wright's Kenmore Irish Rose, a really delightful puppy. If she was six months, she had just passed the border; but, oh! such promise. She was far too young to show, and her owner had taken no trouble to make her trust him, consequently she was a decided failure in the ring. What dog can be judged when being held on her foretoes by a large hand dragging up her muzzle and another hand holding up her hindquarters? It is a farce. When seen to advantage she was a beautifully built youngster, full of type, racy, with good bone, and should finish into a splendid bitch.

Junior dogs and bitches, a repeat.

Novice dogs, Dash Dalley, alone.

Limit dogs brought Bob White Kennels' Bob White Red Star, 1st, a fair colored dog of little substance and inclined to be snipey. 2nd, H. B. Johnston's Judge Law, a beautiful dog, full of the best Irish Setter type, but allowed to run to seed. Judge is a real Irishman, beautiful color, good head and eye, which has improved very much with maturity, good legs and feet, but, oh! so terribly out of condition. Thin as a lath, his coat staring and scratched, and so tired. Where had his owner been to allow a good dog to run to the dogs like that? Even so, Judge Law should have gone to winners, instead of Red Star, who did, for one had sheer quality shining out of his bad condition and the other had a good handler, good feathering, and a bit of a shine. 3rd, E. C. Howard's Tyrone Terry, a well-built dog, with a fair head. This dog has a very heavy coat, and the condition of it was bad, it being ragged and woolly, which made him lose much of his outline.

Open dogs, 1st, Bob White Kennels' Bob White Red Star. 2nd, George V. McDermott's Myles, a big dog of good color, bone and feet, but a coarse head and vivid yellow eye. He gives a good impression first as he moves smoothly and carries his tail well, but his head is not true to type, and the yellow eye ought to damn him. He had no right to 2nd place at all. 3rd, Judge Law. Reserve, Tyrone Terry.

Winners dogs, Red Star. Reserve, Myles.

Breeders dogs and bitches had only one face in the ring, J. Moroney's Brownie, a rather nice one, but bad behind.

Novice bitches, William Clarke's Betsey 1st, and W. J. Wright's Kenmore Irish Rose 2nd. Mr. Wright did not show Rose in this class; perhaps he was upset that his \$500 puppy did not fulfill the expectations set upon it, and she showed much better in the hands of the kennel man who had her.

Limit bitches, Mr. B. F. Lewis' Lansdowne Noreen, 1st, a nice bitch of good color and type. 2nd, E. C. Howard's Sonora Norma, a litter sister of Noreen's, and one who just missed being a really fine one. There is not much to choose between them. A miss is as good as a mile, and Norma is weaker in lines all over than Noreen. 3rd, J. Moroney's Brownie.

Open bitches, Bob White Kennels' Bob White Red Storm, 1st. This bitch is a champion, so why she was not given her title in this class I don't know. She was not in condition, looking shelly, but she is a nice one, although long in body, and I am not fond of her feet, a good mover and a good shower, with a typical head, very well shown, of course. 2nd, Mrs. B. F. Lewis' Lansdowne Noreen. 3rd, E. C. Howard's Sonora Norma. Reserve, J. Moroney's Brownie. H. B. Johnston's Ziekt was not looked at, being in bad condition, thin, out of coat, and in general poor health. Winners went to Red Storm, with Noreen reserve.

Before I close I want to say that if owners of good dogs would only realize what a little care means to a dog we would not see in our dog shows wrecks like Zieka and Judge, or Teddy bears like Tyrone Terry. Brush your dogs, owners, take pride in them, and don't let them run wild like mongrels, and a few days before the show bring them in and expect a brushing or two, or maybe a bath, will fix them. Five minutes every day and good food regularly will do more than hard work of hours' length in a few days, and condition means this in showing. The judge has moments at his command to choose the best dog and bitch. Which do you think stands the most chance, a dog under good control, in good condition and handled easily, or the dog who sits down if you touch him, with either coat on end and staring and harsh, or thin as a skeleton, or fat as a pig? Which?

I hope another year will see a better exhibit of one of the most beautiful, intelligent and faithful of breeds, the Irish Setter.

At the time of going to press we had not received all the reports on the various breeds, but hope to give them publicity in our next issue.

Our next number will contain the reports of the Ottawa, London and Montreal shows.

Owing to a regrettable clerical error in making the entry of Canada's premier female Rough Collie, Ch. Weston Billesley Bluh, she was not able to compete in the open class at Toronto Exhibition Dog Show, and as if to make it the more aggravating, her ladyship never in her career looked so pretty, excelling in coat and condition. And still another hard knock came when the judge declared it was "a most unfortunate mistake as far as the bitch was concerned." Poor Blush! Someone indeed owes you an apology.

WHIPPET RACES AT THE EXHIBITION GROUNDS, TORONTO.

What looked like the revival of this good old sport took place on the Exhibition track on Sept. 8th. Amongst the many sporting events which took place that day, few, if any, were more attractive or interesting than the races between the fleet-footed canines, and the enthusiasm displayed by one and all is ample proof that this form of sport is a popular one, and we hope to see more of it in the future. It was certainly an interesting sight to see these little animals bounding over the 200 yards to the winning post in something less than 13½ seconds. There was a large entry, which necessitated running it off in heats. The first of these was won by Pte. Lake's Chaufer, the second heat winner being Mr. A. Loewenstein's Prince Charming, and the third heat was won by Mr. Cole's Rosie. The placings in the final was as follows: 1st, Pte. Lake's Chaufer; 2nd, J. Laidlaw's Hearts of Oak; 3rd, J. Cole's Rosie.

As a means of reviving this sport regular meetings will be held, and it is hoped that owners and those interested will come forward and help to "do their bit" in lifting these interesting events on to the pedestal they belong.

SUCCESSFUL SHOW AT THOROLD, ONTARIO.

One of the chief attractions at the Thorold Agricultural Show was the dog section. This was the first attempt at staging a dog show in conjunction with this annual event, and if results count, we may expect bigger things in the future. Everything passed off nicely, and the management, although new at the game, deserve great credit for this their first attempt. A large tent with new benching and a spacious judging ring had been provided and the quality and quantity of the exhibits exceeded expectations. Airedales, Boston Terriers, Black and Tans and Russian Wolfhounds made the largest sections. Great interest was taken in the judging, and large crowds gathered round the ringside to watch their canine favorites pass in review before Mr. Fred Smith, the all-rounder from Toronto, who was the judge-elect and carried out his duties in a capable manner. The special for best bitch in show was won by a classy black Cocker, and that for the opposite sex went to a typical white Pom. The activities of this new organization are bound to bear fruit and we may expect to see larger things in the future.

Our front page illustration this month is no stranger to those interested in Airedales, his record as a show and stud dog have gained for him the title of being one of the pillars of the fancy.

Before leaving England he held a remarkable record, having to his credit over 100 firsts, seconds, etc., including challenge certificates at London, Manchester, Belfast and Alexandra Palace. As a proof of his abilities in transmitting his excellent qualities to his progeny, we need only mention a few, foremost, of course, being the sensational bitch, Ch. Cherrytree Queen, who has accounted for no less than eight championships; Chesmoor Cleo, a big winner in England and America; Rejected Kitty and Pottery Invader, the latter's success in England having taken the fancy by storm. Since the dog's arrival in Canada he has only

been shown on two occasions, each time having no difficulty in going to winners, while his efforts as a stock-getter are being watched with interest. We had the pleasure of seeing two of his get at the Walnut Kennels, and have no hesitation in predicting for them a great future. To describe the dog, we cannot do better than reproduce the criticism of the English expert, R. Blunt, Esq., who says of him. "Rebound Oorang, the winner, is a rare big dog, and one of the most symmetrical dogs possible, his head, outlook, length and strength of muzzle, short back, big rib, together with general contour make him a good winner."

SHORT BARKS

Mr. Norman MacKenzie, of Airedale fame, is a very busy man and finds it necessary to reduce his home responsibilities. With that end in view, Ch. Birchcliffe Oorang has left Regina and is housed with his owner's other celebrities at the Parkdale Kennels, and joins our stud list this month. Regina's loss is truly Ontario's gain.

The Cornet Kennels, Edmonton, report the death of their good Bull bitch, Saltown Star Turn. This typical specimen died through heart failure on Sept. 6th, and removes from us one of Canada's best Bulldogs.

Mr. Reid, of Toronto, reports a nice litter of Poms, by Winsome Sable Atom, out of Pansy. Also a litter of Yorkshire Terriers, out of Babs, by McIntyre's Star of Pellon. All are in good health and doing well.

The Western Collies at the C. N. E. were a tired quartette, the youngest, Imera Impression, being the brightest, and her age (6 months only) was a great handicap. She was a well-balanced little tot though, and will no doubt shine later.

Imera Why Zetta has sweet expression, but we were all surprised to see her so small all over. What was there about her that compelled us to visit her so often? Her beautiful little eyes, I guess.

Weston Sunbeam had the misfortune to bump into the three strongest classes, but at that he should have touched the money. He showed the Weston quality all over, but looked tired and a trifle thin.

Billesley Baron looked older than the four years credited to him, and never was a contender at this show.

A few days ago I met an old friend, a great lover of dogs and a great admirer of the English Setter. Naturally, the conversation at once turned on the, for us both, very interesting item; the "man's best friend"; many of our "souvenirs" were passed in review, and it would take too much space to give you here all of them, but I must mention two of them, I mean to say, two points on which my friend and I, after a prolonged discussion, agreed upon: the age of the dog and the English Setter.

The question as to how to tell the age of the dog has always been a very vexatious one. Works on veterinary science tell us: "As in the case of other domestic animals, it is especially by an examination of the teeth that one can tell the age of the canine species." Naturally, there must be a rule which would allow us to recognize the dog's age by its teeth, but this rule possesses numerous exceptions, and I think that it is often dangerous, very dangerous, to establish a dog's age by this method solely. If the dog had remained what he had been in ancient times, i.e., a carnivorous animal, if he lived as the savage animals, the wear and tear of the teeth would be regular, but the dog has become civilized, and omnivorous; he is subject to illnesses which do not touch the savage species, and the wear and tear of his teeth is not regular any more; this depends upon multiple causes.

Thus, Gayot was right in writing—about the year 1865: "Formerly the teeth were a better indicator of the age than nowadays, because there was then more regularity in the regime of the animals, less breeds." There was also precocious and backward breeds, and the veterinary science would, therefore, do wisely in establishing two periods for the canine species, as that science had done for the hog and ox species. It is necessary to warn lovers of dogs against mistakes which are not always without consequences and which may cause law suits.

Gayot is not the only one to have raised the alarm; A. Sanson, in his work of the "Economy of the Cattle," in studying the question of the teeth of the dog, has also said: "The breed and the kind of food influence much

the period and the rapidity of the wear and tear. It is, therefore, necessary to take these circumstances into consideration in order to avoid mistakes. With some dogs, for instance, where the two incisive arches do not exactly correspond to each other, the disposition of the fleur de lis takes place very late. Therefore, if one judges from this, one would consider these dogs younger than they are in reality. After the disappearance of this sign, the teeth cannot any more furnish precise indications."

After distemper leaves traces of its passage on the teeth of the dog, and a dog whose age is only one or two years may be taken for an old dog, if one considers his teeth only.

The daily regime is also a cause of an anticipated or retarded age. The dog fed on soft food, to masticate which is easy, preserves his teeth longer than the dog whose food contains bones. Generally, sporting dogs get old sooner than those whose life is more leisurely.

How, then, is it possible to recognize the age of a dog? This is a matter of habit, of great habit. Those who have seen and handled many dogs of different ages and different breeds can very easily determine a dog's age. The pedigree is a legal document; it is true that the pedigree can be "manufactured."

Last year a well-known reporter, describing certain field trials, said: "For reasons, which I shall no doubt never be able to discover, the best Setters were of white and orange color, with the exception of the little Soso Rex, which, after all, with his long ears, his wavy coat, his tuft on the head, his chestnut patches, his red-rimmed eyes, is very far from the type established by the club and, if necessary, could compete in a class for Spaniels." The reflections of this reporter seem to point out to the breeders that (1) the orange and white color in Setters is desirable, and (2) that the white and chestnut color belongs rather to the Spaniel and has nothing in common with the color of the English Setter. No breeder ignores that the question of color in English Setters had been very inauspicious for the breeding of these Setters, as well as for that of the Gordon Setter. We remember well the Setter

which flourished a few years ago, a Setter without any large patches, and there had been breeders who systematically destroyed all and sundry puppies in the litters which had the misfortune of possessing a black, an orange or a chestnut (yes, chestnut) patch! Those who, I will say unconsciously, had done this have given the breed a stroke which could have become a death-stroke if breeders had not reacted just in time. This reaction produced good results, and the poor dogs of the so-called objectionable color are now conserved, exhibited and win prizes if they merit the latter. I will admit that, lately, orange and white Setters have won well at field trials, especially in France, but this is surely the simple fact of selection or chance, and the successes of the dogs of this color should remind us of those of Sybarite Sam, Wild Frederick, Wild Rake, Mabel of Kippen, Earl of Moira, Cranfield Dora, Masquerader, Master Frederick, etc. Those were splendid Setters, but were they orange and white?

When I said "white and chestnut" I ought to have said "liver and white," of course. Speaking about the liver and white Setter, I must mention a name which might give a shock to those breeders who admit only the blue and white or lemon and white colors, always without large patches. I mean to mention Mr. Edward Laverack. He put at the disposal of his friend Rothwell his best Setters for breeding purposes. One day Rothwell wrote to Laverack that a litter contained a liver and white puppy! "This is natural," replied Laverack, "for this color is due to a crossing made thirty years ago with a strain coming from Edmund Castle (Cumberland)." In fact, Laverack, who was born in 1801, in Manchester, rented, in 1822, from the Earl of Carlisle, moors situated in the neighborhood of Gilsland. In 1823, i.e., two years before he had acquired his two famous Setters, Ponto and Old Moll, from the Rev. Harrison (of Carlisle) he bought from the Earl of Carlisle three liver and white Setters originating from the kennels of Naworth Castle. In 1829 Laverack had one of his bitches, a blue belton, served by a liver and white Setter, a most perfect worker, belonging to Mr. Graham, of

Edmund Castle, near Carlisle. In 1869 were born Pride of the Border, who was liver and white. What is surprising is that Laverack refused to admit any crossing with his first Setters, Old Moll and Ponto! I think that it is against nature to produce, in so short a time, so many good dogs which Laverack possessed in breeding between brothers and sisters as he had done with Dash and Belle, the first one liver and white and the second one orange and white, and I think that crossings had been made recourse to in order to obtain size and vigor in his puppies.

The liver and white Setters were considered amongst the best workers, and of that color were the strain of Naworth Castle of the Earl of Carlisle. The strain of Featherstone Castle of Lord Wallace, whose characteristic was a tuft on the top of the head. The strain of Edmund Castle and the Setters of Major Cowan of Blaydon Burn (Northumberland).

Among the others strains of liver and white those descending from "Baron Deveridge" seem to be the best.

I will return to this interesting question in my next letter.
