ADJOURNED MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS.

A meeting of the Board of Directors was held at the office, 774½ Yonge St., Sept. 17th, 1917. Mr. Jos. Russell was in the chair. The Directors present were Messrs. H. Clayton, J. E. Dowling, P. Herd, F. W. Jacobi, W. T. Marlatt, C. L. McQuillan, Jas. D. Strachan and N. K. Swire.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read by the Secretary, and it was moved and seconded that they be approved as read.—Carried.

A letter from Mr. J. McNaughton was read, in which he laid a complaint against Mr. T. Nightingale of making slanderous statements regarding his dog, McNaughton's Defender.

It was moved and seconded that Mr. Nightingale be invited to attend the next meeting.—Carried.

A letter from Mr. J. Waddell was read claiming that his listing fees paid at the Canadian National Exhibition be refunded to him as his dogs were then registered.

It was moved and seconded that if Mr. Waddell's dogs were registered before the closing of the entries of the C. N. E. his listing fees be refunded.—Carried.

A letter from the judges at the Vancouver Exhibition was read making a correction in the marked catalogue of said show.

It was moved and seconded that the Secretary be instructed to accept the correction to the marked catalogue of the Vancouver Exhibition.—Carried.

The meeting then adjourned until Monday, Sept. 24th, 1917.

In the case of Thorley vs. Fraser, the Secretary was instructed to arrange a meeting between Mr. Thorley and Mr. Fraser to see if it could be arranged to register the dogs in question to the satisfaction of all concerned.

Mr. Jas. D. Strachan was instructed to look for new quarters for offices of the C. K. C. and report to the President, Mr. Jos. Russell.

Moved and seconded that Smorth Collies be recognized as a separate breed.—Carried.

Moved and seconded that the Secretary be instructed to recognize the wins of the Rough Collies, as they are in the marked catalogue of the Regina Kennel Club at their show in July, 1917.—Carried.

Moved and seconded that a letter from Mr. T. McCullough, who judged the New Glasgow Show in 1916, be sufficient to recognize the wins of that show.—Carried.

Moved and seconded that Mr. Joseph Perkins' wins be recognized towards a championship for his Field Spaniel, Lord Bertie, from May 12th, 1916.—Carried.

Moved and seconded that Mr. C. W. Dickinson's wins for his dog, Priam of Wingfield, be recognized towards a championship from August, 1916.—Carried.

It was moved and seconded that the meeting adjourn until Wednesday, Oct. 3rd, 1917.—Carried.

ADJOURNED MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS.

Oct. 3rd, 1917.

At the adjourned meeting of the Board of Directors of the C. K. C. on Oct. 3rd, 1917, at the office, 774½ Yonge St., the Directors present were Messrs. A. Atkinson, H. Clayton, J. E. Dowling, P. Herd, F. W. Jacobi, J. Kenyon, W. T. Marlatt, C. J. McQuillan, Jas. D. Strachan and Jos. Russell in the chair.

Mr. T. Nightingale was present regarding the charges brought against him by Mr. J. McNaughton. In his statement to the Board he claimed he did not say the dog was dyed, but only said he was told the dog was dyed.

It was decided by the Board of Directors to ask Mr. McNaughton to produce proofs and witnesses of affidavits from the parties who heard Mr. Nightingale say that his dog, McNaughton's Defender, was dyed. Also proofs that his dog was not dyed.

It was moved by Mr. C. L. McQuillan, seconded by Mr. W. T. Marlatt, that the Record Committee of the National Live Stock Records be and is hereby authorized on behalf of the Canadian Kennel Club to enter into the annexed agreement between the said Committee and Rolla L. Crain, this association hereby satisfying and confirming whatever may be lawfully done under said agreement and hereby undertaking and agreeing to pay to the said Rolla L. Crain or the company referred to in the said agreement such sums of money as shall from time to time become payable thereunder for printing, binding or other work of this club.

That the President and Secretary are hereby empowered and required to affix herto their respective signatures, whereupon the said agreement shall in all respects be binding as if this association had been an original party thereto and had executed the same.—Carried.

Moved and seconded that the Quebec Advisory Board bills be paid.—Carried.

Moved and seconded that the Swann vs. Montreal Kennel Association case

be left over until the next meeting, Wednesday, Oct. 10th, 1917, to which date the meeting adjourned, and that it be brought up as our first business.—Carried.

At the adjourned meeting of the Board of Directors, held in the C. K. C. office, on Oct. 10th, at 8.30 p.m., the Directors present were Messrs. Joseph Russell in the chair, A. Atkinson, J. E. Dowling, H. Clayton, P. Herd, J. Kenyon, F. W. Jacobi, Jas. D. Strachan and N. K. Swire.

In the case of Swann vs. Montreal Kennel Association, after the case had been thoroughly discussed, it was decided that the Montreal Kennel Association at their show held in the city of Montreal on May 18th and 19th, 1917, violated Regulation VII. of the Canadian Kennel Club in paying prize money conditional with the number of entries, whereas all prizes in a given class shall be awarded regardless of the number of entries.

In the case of McNaughton vs. Nightingale, Mr. J. McNaughton appeared before the Board and brought with him several fanciers, they being Mrs. Bromley, Mr. T. Johnson and Mr. McPherson.

The Board of Directors after having heard the evidence on both sides, decided that Mr. Nightingale had made slanderous statements that Mr. McNaughton's McNaughton's Defender had been dyed and that Mr. T. Nightingale be suspended for twelve (12) months from October 10th, 1917.

It was moved and seconded that the meeting adjourn.—Carried.

Cash prizes to the tune of \$8 for firsts, \$5 for seconds, and \$2 for thirds are offered, and a carload of specials, including \$50 for best, \$20 for best of opposite sex; McKenzie Trophy, value \$150, for best Canadian-bred, and a host of others too numerous to mention. The officials are a real live bunch and visitors are assured of a real good time. We are looking forward to this being a record show in every respect.

The Eastern Dog Show Club will hold a one-day show this year. This will take place on New Year's Day, Jan. 1st, at Mechanics' Building, Boston, Mass. Our Recent Shows

LONDON, ONT.

The annual Dog Show held by the London Canine Association in connection with the Western Fair on Sept. 11th to 14th, proved to be the most successful and best-managed show ever staged by that progressive organization. The officers in charge deserve great credit for the excellent arrangements, a finer bunch of men you will never meet; they are fanciers of the true type and the courtesy that was extended by them to the exhibitors and visitors cannot be expressed in words. They were ever ready to assist and accommodate in any way possible, and if any exhibitor was neglected it was because his wants were not known. Superintendent Bowman was on the jump here, there and everywhere, to see that all the dogs were properly benched and cared for. Ring stewards were on the alert to see that there was no tardiness in the ring and assisted in getting the dogs in on schedule time.

The weather was ideal for such an event, consequently the building was packed with an interested crowd. The opening day saw no less than 3,500 people pass in and out of the building.

The cash prizes and tempting specials brought together an entry of over 250 dogs, making it a 2-point show. Mrs. W. Wylie, of Vineland, Ont., officiated as judge over the Toy section, and her placings were well received. Mr. "Bob" Ross, our all-rounder, from Montreal, judged all the remaining classes and gave entire satisfaction. There was no half-way decisions and less kicking than we hear at some of our shows, which speaks volumes for the judge, who has so many friends among the exhibitors. But "Bob" has no friends in the ring; they are merely exhibitors showing dogs, and no one is shown any favors. The best dog wins, and that is the kind of judging we like.

Boston Terriers, Fox Terriers and Cocker Spaniels were the three largest sections, many of the remaining varieties being well represented, while others fell a little short of last year's number. OTTAWA SHOW

Despite the fact that the Ottawa fanciers' annual event clashes with the London show, it reached the 2-point mark and proved a big success. Not only did the entry list compare favorably with anything heretofore attempted by this well-known club, but the quality of the dogs exhibited were far superior to anything ever seen at this annual event. The officers of the club from Chairman Geo. Hilton, V.S., down to the rank and file all helped to make this a red letter show in the history of the club, and to say that their ambitions were amply realized is putting it mildly. This event being held in conjunction with the Central Canada Exhibition affords a pleasant place for a dog show, and as the elements were on their best behavior the exhibitors and others interested in the show made a sort of vacation stunt.

The building in which the show was held is well adapted for the purpose, having lots of air space and natural light and ample room for the dogs. A spacious judging ring had been provided and the show was kept sweet and clean.

The judge-elect, Mr. W. E. Livesay, of Caldwell, N.J., made his initial bow as a judge at our Canadian shows, and carried out his duties in a very satisfactory manner, his work being characterized by honest, conscientious placings, and above all, an excellent knowledge of the various breeds he adjudicated. The victors and vanquished alike were highly satisfied with the awards and there was less quibbling and kicking than has been usual at our recent shows.

The first day's judging was delayed a little owing to an error in the printing of the catalogue and the absence of competent ring stewards, but after this difficulty had been overcome everything went off in clock-like order.

ST. BERNARDS were few in number. Mountain Dew duplicated his Toronto successes by going through his classes to winners, his kennel-mate, Mountain Dew Nugget, accomplishing the same performance in the opposite sex.

MASTIFFS were represented by one moderate specimen.

GREAT DANES—Laurier, a well-balanced dog, had no difficulty in going to the top of his breed.

BLOODHOUNDS brought out the C. N. E. winner, Umpire, a big typical dog teeming with quality and a good mover.

GREYHOUNDS—Lansdowne Lottie was an easy first in the "longtail" section.

AMERICAN FOXHOUNDS were a real classy bunch. Mr. Baldwin's Prompter met and conquered the Toronto winner, Pont. The former excels in type and all-round conformation and was in faultless condition; his kennel-mate, Ringlet, being an easy winner in bitches.

POINTERS were few in number but of good quality. Perdeau headed the dog section, followed by Bob White Rye, the winner scoring in type and substance. An inmate of the same kennel also won the blue ribbon in the bitch classes.

SETTERS—There was a nice collection of Setters, the English division was led by Blue Sue II, a real quality one, while the Irish contingent had to bow to Bob White Red Star in dogs, and Ch. Montrose Ruminantly Rhu in bitches.

COCKER SPANIELS made a record showing, both in quality and quantity, there being an entry of over 70, and all of uniform type. Andy Armstrong's entries carried off premier awards, his stock being well to the front in all their classes. Toe Robinhurst Kennels were also well represented. Mr. W. H. Mann also benched a typical brace that figured conspicuously in the prize list. The competition in all the classes was very keen and many of the Toronto winners had to take a back seat.

COLLIES were a mixed group and could only muster a few real good ones. Knocklayde Joe, the winning dog, is a big handsome one and carries a wealth of coat, but lacks the type and quality of the runner-up, Ch. Coltness Clinker, who was not in his best form. Winners bitches was an easy thing for Ch. Billesley Blush, who is now looking at his best.

DALMATIAN classes were well filled and brought together a bunch of the best. The winning dog, Prince of Loudon, is just about "it" for type and conformation, but is lacking in "spots."

BULLDOGS saw that grand dog, Ch. Strathtay Knowle Marquis, on top, followed by his kennel-mate, Regal Rascal; the coveted honor in the bitch sec-

tion being an easy thing for Hefty Mischief.

BULL TERRIERS—The pride of place in Bull Terriers fell to that wonderful young dog, Haymarket Faultless. Undoubtedly he is the best youngster seen for many a long day and won with ease. His kennel-mate, Haymarket Patricia, is a small classy one and carried off the winner's ribbon. Her nearest rivals were Haymarket Nora and Etonian Countess.

AIREDALES averaged 6 per class, the all-round quality being very noticeable. Silver Birch Banker sailed through his classes from puppy to reserve winners, his victor being that well-known dog, Morning Admiration, who was put down fit and is hard to fault. His son, Morning Acceptance, also gave a creditable account of himself, as did Wallaton Preparedness and Claycliffe Maxicum. The Claycliffe representatives made a clean-up in the bitch section, Rhosdhu Victory, the winner, was closely followed by Claycliffe Swell Lady, their nearest rival being Ch. Sunshine, who losses to the above in hindquarters and movements.

BOSTON TERRIERS were also well represented. Slattery's Flip, a trappy well-balanced little dog, won the lightweight classes, and was awarded winners, being closely followed by Gold Crest Valcartier. The latter's kennel-mate, Gold Crest Fire Fly IV, is a very typical one, her wonderful showing landed her on top in the bitch classes. This pair were afterwards awarded a handsome special for best brace. That grand dog, Ch. Peter Noodles II was entered for specials only and carried off the trophy for the best of his breed.

BEAGLES—The Beagle section was an easy thing for T. R. DeGeer's well-known dogs.

FOX TERRIERS, with 60 entries, were quite a feature at this show, besides being a good gathering of local talent, we noticed several of the celebrities from Montreal and the States, which made the competition very keen. The Smooths were an eye-opener. That good youngster, Clapton Dorie, had a successful session until he met Sabine Rapture, whose many fine qualities landed him winners. Dumbarton Jewel met with the same experience as the former in the bitch section. Sabine Fernlike, the winner, had to step lively to get past the two Clapton representatives, Faunus and Radiance. Their rough-coated brethren, the Wires, show-

ed up well, the most promising ones amongst the juveniles being Malden Lena and Danby Retreat, both these classic youngsters romped home in their classes until they reached the open classes, where the competition was certainly hot. That grand dog, Ch. Dusky Bounce, once more headed the field, followed by Spicenut of Paignton and Westpark Timekeeper. The bitch classes saw the classic Lady Wireboy of Paignton on top. This win completes her claim to the prefix of champion, a title she is very worthy of.

IRISH TERRIERS were not very plentiful, but contained a sprinkling of the best. The well-known Wrose Badger, who was put down fit, gained the day over Ch. Leeds Conjail Pat, the three best bitches being Judith, Leeds Kitty O'Day and Bolton Woods War-sprite.

SCOTTIES produced the largest and best collection ever seen at this show. Deancroft Pennant captured winners dogs, reserve to him being Avondale Adair; winners bitches falling to Leeds Jennie Lee.

MONTREAL SHOW

The Montreal Kennel Association held another successful show in the Coliseum Hall on Sept. 19th and 20th. This was the second show that the Montreal boys have staged this year for patriotic purposes. Both event met with a ready response from the fanciers who rallied round and helped to do their bit for the worthy cause. An excellent classification, with cash prizes and loads of specials, drew an entry of over 260 dogs, making it a two-point show. As usual, everything ran smoothly, the hard-working officials had done everything possible for the comfort and welfare of the dogs and the visitors. The appointed judges for this event were S. Perkins, Toronto, Airedales; A. F. Sullivan, V.S., Mass., Boston Terriers and Toys; C. F. Trudeau, Quebec, Sporting dogs, and C. G. Hopton, of New York, the remaining classes. All these fanciers are well-known authorities on the varieties allotted to them, consequently their awards met with the approval of the fanciers. The large breeds were none too plentiful, but what was lacking in quantity was made up by quality. The Bloodhound class brought out two of the finest specimens we have on this continent, the bitch Undine, not only won all her classes, but was awarded special for best exhibit in the show, a win she was justly entitled to. Airedales made one of the largest sections and brought together a nice uniform bunch. Silver Birch Banker had many admirers, and his many fine qualities landed him on top in all his classes from puppy to limit, his conqueror in the open class being the good dog, Ch. Rebound Oorang, who carried off the winners ribbon. Newbold Commander was also well to the front in his classes. One of the most noticeable features in this section was the success by the Claycliffe Kennels' representatives. In all they carried off no less than 25 prizes, including winners and reserve winners in the bitch section.

Cocker Spaniels were another nice collection, the Robinhurst Kennels being the most successful competitors.

Collies were a little below par. Knocklayde Joe and Ch. Billesley Blush duplicated their Ottawa successes. The entry of Bulldogs was above the average, both in numbers and quality, many of our best specimens, including several newly imported dogs, were up for competition, which made the placings all the more interesting. Fox Terriers are always a drawing card at this show, particularly the Wires, which proved to be one of the star attractions. The Malden Kennels led the way in the majority of the classes. Their noted dog, Ch. Dusky Bounce, headed the dog section, followed by Spicenut of Paignton and Westpark Timekeeper. The winning puppy, Ormsby Dark Boy, is showing great promise and should be heard from again. Bitches were responsible for the "bringing out" of Malden Lenna, a youngster teeming with quality, who carried off five firsts and was only defeated by that grand bitch, Lady Wireboy of Paignton and Wiremaid of Malden, these two being winners and reserve winners in the order named. open (middleweight); Mr. W. B. Levaack's Little Pete, 4th open; Brown & Phillips' The Spirit, 1st limit, 2nd open and one special (heavyweight); Mrs. W. C. Ingram's Ch. Ingram's Little Man competed for specials only and won; the same owner's Ingram's Sweet Clover came out with flying colors, winning 1st in puppy, novice, green class and breeders', 2nd in limit and open, and carried off no less than 24 specials; Mr. J. Schafer's Liberty Loan, 3rd green class, and one special; Mr. J. Dietschler's The Fascinator was awarded winners dogs.

EXHIBITION MEDALS.

BILLY OBO

The subject of our front page illustration this month is the king of Cockers, Billy Obo, who joined the great majority on Oct. 11th, 1917. By his death Canada has lost the most successful sire of the decade and will not only hit the owner, Mr. Lance Farewell, an exceptionally hard crack, but removes from us one of the pillars of the fancy. This great dog was generally conceded to be the best specimen of all times, and as a producer had no equal, having sired many of our leading winners, amongst them being such dogs as Pony Obo, who was sold recently for the

highest price ever paid for a Cocker; Honey Bow, Now or Never, Demonstrator, Baby C, Count Obo, and others too numerous to mention in the space at our disposal. Many tempting offers were refused for Billy in his younger days and he might easily have gained the title of champion had he been exhibited. For the past two years Mr. Farewell had nursed his old favorite with the greatest possible care, and we feel sure that all Cocker Spaniel devotees and fanciers in general will sympathize with him in his great loss for it makes a gap in the breed that may never be filled.

Q. I have a black Pomeranian puppy four and a half months old, that is continually scratching and biting itself. Bare spots are appearing round both eyes and on the sides of the body behind the forelegs, while along the belly and chest there are scabs.

A. Your puppy is suffering from sarcoptic mange. Clip the hair of the whole body and wash thoroughly with soap and water; next day rub well into the parts the ordinary sulphur ointment, particularly the under part of

the body and head. Wash off in three days and apply again.

R. J. B., St. Catharines:

Q. I have an English Bulldog puppy seven months, that has a red growth about the size of the end of a little finger in the inner corner of one eye. I have bathed it regularly for over a month with various lotions, but there has been no change.

A. There is no growth in your pup's eye, but the membrane, commonly called the haw, has become misplaced. Bathing or applying lotions will not reduce the trouble. It will have to be cut out, as there will always be irritation if allowed to remain. Have a veterinarian operate and remove it under the influence of a weak cocaine solution.

W. G. H., Fonthill, Ont.:

A. The influence of a previous sire will have no effect on future litters, no matter what breed or a dog the bitch is mated to. You will be quite safe in breeding the bitch without any fear of the pups being affected by the mongrel you speak of.

Breeders and exhibitors should get familiar with the Dog Show Rules before buying or exhibiting a dog see that he is transferred in your name and registered with the Canadian Kennel Club. A copy of the rules or any information regarding same may be obtained by writing to the office or direct to the Live Stock Record Department, Ottawa, Ont.

ENGLISH KENNEL CLUB STUD BOOK FOR 1917.

Mr. Edward William Jaquet, the very sympathetic editor of the K. C. S. B., and secretary of the English Kennel Club, has quite recently suffered a very great and cruel loss in the death of his wife, and we all join in expressing to him our deepest sympathy in his bereavement.

The volume 44th of the K. C. S. B. appeared very late this year, but I do not think that Mr. Jaquet owes us any excuse for this, if we take into consideration the present circumstances.

Except for the necessary omission of information regarding field trials and other meetings, which have been cancelled for the duration of the war, the Stud Book in question presents the features which have become familiar to all who have occasion to consult same. However, there was no lack in administrative work in 1916, although there were no field trials, and the number of shows during last year was only 429 as against 1,035 in 1913. The "Summary of Events", which is, as usual, well written, is as interesting as ever.

There is a very important alteration to be noted, viz., about the definition of the litter class, which now reads as follows: "A litter class is one for two or more puppies of one and the same litter, under three months of age on the first day of the show. Not more than one entry can be made from one litter in the same class."

The Kennel Club Stud Book is a real vade mecum for every fancier, breeder and exhibitor, and should figure in their libraries, and Mr. Jaquet is to be warmly congratulated upon its this year's production.

SCOTCH TERRIERS AND WHITE-WEST HIGHLAND TERRIERS AT C.N.E.

Scotch Terriers led off with puppy dogs. 1st, Argyle Fill Gap, a rare one, very short in back, well sprung ribs, a great shower, was afterwards sold for a large figure. 2nd, A. Delmont's Leeds Wee Robbie, a smart terrier, with good expression, but bad front. 3rd, Marlatt's Deancroft Pirate, a good matured puppy, barely did himself justice. Novice, 1st and 2nd, a repeat. 3rd, a new face in Ravendale Raider, a good stamp all over, but refused to show. Limit dogs, 1st, W. T. Marlatt's Romany Bishop, a rare balanced Scottie, no exaggerated points about him, very near perfect as to standard laid down, well balanced head, perfect front, short back, with perfect tail carriage, an easy winner, 2nd, Miss Wedd's Linden Liffey, a very fair dog, short coupled, but never does himself justice in the show ring. 3rd, Marlatt's Deancroft Penant, a good all-round dog, did not show too well. Open dogs, a repeat. Puppy bitches, 1st, Leeds Jennie Lee, extra well matured as a puppy, short back, good hard coat, typical all over, a little soft in ear carriage. 2nd, D. McKellar's Argyle Duchess, a sound little bitch, with bone and good front, hardly did herself justice. 3rd, Deancroft Petticoat, hardly ready, will do better later. Novice, a repeat. Limit bitches, 2nd, Argyle Jennie, a right good all-round bitch, might have won. Open, a repeat. Canadian-bred, a repeat.

White West Highland Terriers led off with novice dogs. 1st, Laird of Glenmere, very smart head, good light ears, short back, short of coat, hardly sound in front. 2nd, J. D. Eagan's Ardoch News, a useful dog, a bit plain in head and body, good texture of coat. 3rd, Armstrong's Donald, a very good dog, sound all over, hardly enough of him, otherwise might have won. Novice bitches, 1st, Eagan's Lothian Snowball, showed well, rather toyish all over. 2nd, Eagan's Lothian Snow White, good color and type, same fault as winner. Open, a repeat. 3rd, D. McKellar's Argyle Gill, rather long in back, a grand brood bitch, with lots of coat and bone.

OUR LONDON LETTER

In my last letter I promised to continue the chat on the English Setter.

Baron Doveridge, which was liver and white, belonged to Mr. Heywood-Lonsdale, and his breeder was Lord Waterpark. The following is a copy of his pedigree, which we often find in the pedigrees of the dogs which have had and are having much success at field trials:

Baron Doveridge — Sire, Fred V (7151), liver and white, by Blue Prince (by Pride of the Border, owner Laverack, liver and white (4274), and Nellie (15833), out of Dikins Belle, by Dash II (1331) and Mill II). Dam, Rue. Owner, Lord Waterpark. By Drake (1356), out of Rival, owner, Lord Waterpark. Thus Baron Doveridge's sire, Fred V, was liver and white, whose sire, Pride of the Border, was also liver and white, bred, do not let us forget this, by Loverack. This dog, by Dash II and Belle II, was sold to America in 1874 to Mr. Raymond, of Morris Plains, N.J. Rue, Baron Doveridge's dam, descended from dogs belonging to well-known private kennels. The liver and white color existed among those dogs, but it is well nigh impossible to speak more precisely about it. However, I must mention Ben, owner, Mr. Garth, a winner at field trials.

Readers will thus see that the liver and white color is not the appanage of certain Spaniels.

Among the direct products of Baron Doveridge I must mention: Tutsham Trip, liver and white, with ten patches, born on the 27th April, 1886; breeder, Dawille Lees; owner, F. Warde. This excellent Setter, whose dam was Wawille Lees' Mora, was a great winner at field trials. In England he was second (K. C. field trials, Derby States, 1887), and first (National field trials, Shrewsbury, 1887). In Belgium he was first at Lessines and second for the St. Hubert Stakes. He ran in France in 1888, but here he was less successful and obtained only a "commended" at Esclimont.

Peys Bo, sister of Tutsham Trip, was the dam of Ightfield Ranger (K.C.S.B. 26707), born on the 14th Feb., 1888, whose breeder-owner was Heywood-Lonsdale. Black, white and tan, she obtained the third prize at the field trials of the Irish Setter Club, Setter

puppies Derby Stakes. She was by Dick Winden (19414).

Pith Sing, sister of Trip and Peys Bo, which had won twice the International All-aged Stakes in Canada, and in 1890 she was placed second in the 4 hours' Stake Central in America. Served by Pilkington's Ross, she threw Ightfield Rosa, a liver and white. In the pedigree of Ross figure several dogs of Laverack's.

Among other direct descendants of Baron Doveridge we find Woodhill Bruce, brown and white (K. C. S. B. 19416), and Woodhill Beta (K. C. S. B. 19415). Tutsham Trip sired many excellent setters, as for instance, Trip of Kippen (F. Lowe), brown, white and tan. This dog gained many prizes at field trials in England, France and Belgium. He won the Derby in 1889, second prize at the Irish Setter Club's trials in 1891 in England. In 1889 he ran in France and Belgium and was 1st at Boran (Setter puppies), and 2nd in the Derby St. Hubert, at Vieresart. (2) Aldon Tam, black, white and tan, very nice-looking, which Lowe sold to Italy, after having won with him many prizes at shows. Tam was sire of the famous Mabel of Kippen (F. Lowe), liver, white and tan, and of Squire of Kippen, black, white and tan. The last one, exported to France, was the sire of Tarquin and Citron de la Brede, the two sensational Setters of Count de Richemont. An American had offered Mr. Lowe a very large cheque for Mabel of Kippen, but this was refused. She won many prizes at trials and some prizes at shows. In 1896, in France, she beat Tap, Mr. Arkwright's famous black Pointer, at the trials of "des Bordes".

I must here mention that the English Setter is passing through a very acute crisis, especially in France, and for several years already the breeders there have been looking for nice and good male Setters, but without finding "their heart's desire." I know this, because many enquiries have been and are still reaching me for English Setters from France. The fact is that, generally speaking, very few Setters combine working qualities with show points. However, what is beauty is a day? Gayot, who was a savant and a connoisseur of dogs and their breed-

ing, wrote: "Beauty in a domestic animal is simply the state which enables it to answer its destination satisfactorily. The beauty is essentially relative and variable in its character, because this distinction varies according to the kind of service which is being imposed upon every dog. Thus, the Bulldog possesses a beauty which would count for a deformity in a Spaniel or in a Greyhound, and vice versa."

I need not refer again to the history of the English Setter through the ages; some say that he is the product of a Newfoundland, others pretend that he contains a mixture of the Spaniel, the Foxhound and the Pointer. Is he not rather an "improved Spaniel?" Gayot wrote, in 1870: "The French Spaniels enjoyed a reputation 300 years ago. England borrowed them from us then. At that time little attention was paid to our breeds, and the latter were soon improved upon on the other side of the Channel." The crisis of the English Setter is due to many causes, of which some have been mentioned already, but I think there is one cause which escaped the general attention, viz., the bad or, rather, the inaccurate utilization of the dog. The type of the English Setter has been transformed in as far as that type has been directed, in the field, towards beating much ground ("grande kuere", in French), for which he was never destined. Of course, there may be some specimens who could do the above, but the majority of the breed are dogs for beating ground of ordinary length. Of course, I do not mean "beating the ground slowly." The English Setter, although possessing fine, elegant forms, and a fine, silky coat, is an animal near the ground. Many breeders of English Setters insisted on having Setters of very great speed. In selecting for these "recherchees" qualities, the harmony of forms has been naturally destroyed. As a proof, it can be mentioned that there exist certain English Setters which look simply horrible and do not at all, but not at all answer the requirements of the standard, which latter represents the ideal type of the breed.

This question of English Setters and the crisis they are passing through merit special attention and a complete

study, and it would, of course, be very interesting to hear the opinions of those breeders and fanciers in America and the British Colonies who have specialized in the English Setter.

I propose to continue my chat in my next letter.

At the Regina Kennel Club show, held in July, The Pedlar took 1st novice for Airedales and was awarded 1st for best novice of any breed in the show. He was not entered in any other class.

Mrs. J. A. Pitt, of the Osborne Kennels, is rejoicing over a litter of five extra good Pekingese puppies, three parti-colors and two reds, by Priorwood Pagan, out of her winning bitch, Tito of Munday. Another of Mrs. Pitt's bitches, Nita, a beautiful black, has just been mated to Priorwood Pagan and very good results are expected.

Miss Camille J. La Violette, owner of the Wangza Pekingese, has been very busy of late, owing to the increasing demand for her Pekes. Among the most recent sales are a lovely red, black masked, daughter of Priorwood Pagan, ex Chin Du Oh, who went to the French Consul's wife, Mrs. Boniri.
