## Our Recent Shows

### THE BOSTON TERRIER CLUB OF CANADA.

The 10th annual specialty show of the Boston Terrier Club of Canada was held on New Year's Day. The venue was the best ever; all previous records were surpassed, there being 112 dogs entered, of which about 105 were present.

These were drawn from far and near, Hamilton, Buffalo, Ottawa, Guelph, Detroit, Peterboro, and last but not least, Hanover, oh, boy! that's where the winners dogs hailed from. The Buffalo platoon arrived late owing to poor transportation, consequently it was about 4 o'clock when the judging commenced.

The judge, Mr. John Deitschler, of Buffalo got to work as promptly as possible and succeeded in getting through the whole job about 10.30 p.m.

There was a grand array of special prizes, ranging from trophies and cups valued from \$3 to \$100, with \$10 cash for each of the six open classes, and \$7 cash for each of the six limit classes, and other cash specials distributed among the minor classes.

All the classes were well filled, there being as many as 27 dogs in the ring at one time. The writer would not attempt to follow the pudge's placings in most of the classes, so will only speak of the more prominent dogs.

The winners dogs, Captain Starlight, is a fine upstanding heavyweight and is a typical Boston all over, having a short square muzzle, flat skull, clean neck, well-formed shoulders, perfect front, legs and feet, well-formed body, hindquarters true and sound, and an ideal tail, correctly carried; rich dark brindle with ideal markings. His faults are, too much pink around the muzzle and a rather light eye, which mars his expression. He was bred by Mr. J. R. Phillips, of Toronto, and is owned by Mrs. F. X. Kormann, of Hanover, Ont., who purchased him as a 5-weeks-old puppy. His sire is the famous Ch. Clifton Star, and his dam is Meen's Gipsy, she by Happy Day. He was shown in New York as a puppy in 1915 and was awarded 2nd prize in a large class.

The reserve winners dogs, Dr. Ringmaster, came from the lightweight division. He is a nice dark brindle, well marked on head, short square muzzle, flat skull, nice neck and shoulders,

good front legs, but not too good in front feet, well formed in body, true and sound in hindquarters, but has a very unsightly tail. He is a consistent winners at the best shows in the United States and is owned by Eberhardt and Moschel, of Buffalo, N.Y. Bred by F. Whitecomb, and is sired by Patsy Ringmaster (who, by the way, is in turn sired by T. E. Milburn's Totem Boy).

The winners bitch, Eberhardt's Kiddo, is a very typical little Boston. She is well marked on head, nice dark brindle, short square muzzle, flat skull, nice dark eye, clean neck, was a little low at shoulder, but straight in front legs, with good feet, well-formed body, true and sound in hindquarters, and has a nice screw tail. She is owned by Eberhardt & Moschel, bred by Wm. Eberhardt, and is by Brennan's Mixture, out of Humbolt Pride. She was finally awarded the special for best in show.

The reserve winners bitch, Fashion Plate, was also a high-class offering, is a rich dark brindle, short square muzzle, slightly marked in eye (no doubt temporary, but sufficient to stop her from going to winners), nice flat skull, clean neck, good shoulders, front legs and feet, beautifully turned in body, true and sound in hindquarters, with good tail. She is owned by Mr. W. B. Levack, of Toronto, and was bred by Ch. Prince Rexworthy, out of Dolly Mae, she by Ingram's Oxonian's Rex. This bitch has also been shown successfully at the large shows in the United States, going as high as reserve winners at the New York specialty show in New York City in 1916.

#### ... BULLDOGS AT MONTREAL.

Bulldogs are once again coming into their own in Montreal at the evening show of the Montreal Kennel Association, held Dec. 13th and 14th. Over 40 Bulldogs were entered, members of the English Bulldog Club boosting up the entries with 35 dogs. Mr. Ed. Smet-hurst officiated as judge, and his placings were very well received by the ring-siders. Mr. Francis' St. Lambert Duke went to the top of the dogs, while Alban Nora, owned by Mr. Paul Malevitz, not only cleaned up all the bitches, but also carried off the judge's cup for the best Bulldog or bitch in show. Alban Nora is a very typical lightweight built on the right lines, very evenly balanced throughout. Local fanciers are speculating as to how she will fare when she runs up against the Toronto bitches, the general opinion being that she will give the best of them a run. Mr. Malevitz has imported one or two good Bulldogs since being in Montreal. Nora is the best to date, but it is rumored that he is after something still better, i.e., one of England's best stud dogs, and if he succeeds in landing him Bulldog breeding in Montreal would decidedly benefit. The next big event in Montreal Bulldog circles is the specialty show, under C.K.C. rules, to be held on Saturday, March 30th, 1918, by the English Bulldog Club. The profits of the show are to be handed over to the Khaki League. The list of specials even at this early date promises to be something of a record. Officials of the club are hoping to see over 50 dogs entered and are working with this end in view. The secretary, T. Rowley, 2078 Mance St., Montreal, will be only too pleased to supply any information about the club or show to any fancier interested in same. Mr. Rowley wished it pointed out that he is not secretary of the Bulldog Club of Canada, having resigned in July last, when the newer organization was formed.

## Toronto Kennel Club Evening Show

The above club held the first of their series of evening shows for this season in the Broadway Hall, Toronto, on Dec. 18th, and it proved to be the best evening show ever staged by this enterprising club.

The secretary and officials had made excellent arrangements and had everything ready for the rush of exhibitors, consequently the judges were able to complete their task at an earlier hour than usual. The two spacious judging rings were surrounded with an interested crowd of spectators. J. H. Kenyon was the judge-elect for all the large breeds, and Whippets; J. Meadows, Bulldogs; Mrs. W. C. Ingram, Boston Terriers; D. Wheeler, Collies, and N. K. Swire, Terriers and Toys. There was great interest taken in the judging of the exhibits and exhibitors and visitors alike went away with the satisfaction of knowing they had received a square deal at the hands of the above mentioned experts.

Pomeranians were the largest section, followed by Collies, Bulldogs and Boston Terriers. Amongst the large breeds we noticed Mr. C. Dickinson's good young Mastiff, Hector of Wingfield, an easy winner in his classes. There were a few nice Danes on hand, and a brace of good Russian Wolfhounds, owned by Mr. A. O. Beardmore. Both are very handsome and typical. Mr. John G. Kent's Greyhound, Kenmar Big Drive, accounted for best of his breed and afterwards captured Mr. Lowenstien's special for best sporting dog in show. A well-balanced Foxhound, Frank II, owned by Mr. S. Colburn, won his class and was much admired by the ring-siders. In the Collie section, Mr. R. Y. Wemyes brought out his young dog, Leith Hector, who captured quite a few blue ribbons, his nearest rivals being Mr. Roberts' tri-color, Buddy, and Mr. Reid's Bellfield Baronet. The special for best Collie was an easy thing for Mr. J. D. Strachan's Ch. Coltness Clincker. In bitches, Mr. Darbyshire's sensational youngster, Campbell Selection, ran right through her classes, followed in the puppy classes by Mr. Ashbee's Campbell Stylish. In the limit and open she met and defeated Mr. H. Hayball's Ormskirk Fleetfoot, and the Exhibition winner, Queenie.

The Bulldog entry was good, the dog section bringing together a nice even bunch, Mrs. Briggs' exhibits leading the way in the juvenile classes. Mr. R. S. Wilson's imported dog, Wittonia Prince, headed the limit and open, next in order came Mr. Gibbs' Regal Rascal and Mr. H. Holgate's King Moston. Wittonia Prince also annexed the special for best non-sporting dog or bitch in show. The most noticeable youngster in the opposite sex was Mr. C. Metcalf's Lady Cheetham, who came out on top in all her classes. Cicceley Rose, owned by Mr. R. Spence, being first in limit and open, followed by Mrs. Knott's Toll Barr Judy.

Boston Terriers were a nice even bunch. Mr. Shaw's promising young dog, Amalgamator, had quite a field day and only met defeat when he reached the open class, where Mr. C. L. McQuillan's Clifton Jack put him to rout. Bitches were plentiful and very uniform in type. Mr. A. Currie's Belle Mahone went to the top in the puppy class, Mr. Harris' Babe being second, and Mrs. Schafer's Whitby third. The outstanding figure in the classes was a trappy lightweight named Tiny Betty, owned by Mrs. Fielden. This attractive little specimen went through her classes with ease and was a contender when it came to special for best terrier in show. Amongst the others who figured in the prize list we noticed Mr. W. B. Levaack's Little Miss Mac and Mrs. Schaffer's Liberty Loan, the former winning the Canadian-bred class.

Cocker Spaniels made a small but select group. Mr. Griegg's Pat and Mr. Mitchell's imported Trey headed the dog section, the last named fancier also did well with his bitch, Lady Pennyann, who went from novice to open. Other good ones who accounted for firsts were Mr. F. Lewis' Joy and Mrs. Worthy's Benetta.

The competition in the Whippets was made more interesting through Mr. G. White offering a cup for the best, which was won by Mr. J. W. Marples' Oak Mistress. Second to her in the bitch classes came Mr. Lowenstien's Gypsy Queen, Mr. Laidlaw's Edith Cavill being third. The dog section was headed by Mr. Stretcher's Granite Province, followed by Mr. Lowenstien's Prince Charming and Mr. J. King's Royal Oak.



Airedales were plentiful and were responsible for the bringing out of Mr. N. MacKenzie's newly imported dog, Narrowdale Nimrod, who not only went to the top in his variety, but also accounted for the special for best Terrier in show. Second to him in the open class was that good Canadian-bred, Silver Birch Banker, owned by Mr. Ward. Mr. H. Clayton's Silver Birch Maxine led the way in all her classes. A. Blackwell's Silver Birch Nancy accomplishing a like result. Moreside Princess, owned by E. W. Billinger, being first in limit and open, followed by Mr. Dea's Harvey Briar.

The tit-bit in Fox Terriers was Mr. J. Russell's 7-months-old Wire puppy, Claycliffe Corker, who made his initial bow to the public and carried off the "blue" ribbons with ease, also capturing a win on the trophy offered by Mr. G. Tetart. Mr. Harlow showed a nice brace of Smooths in Admiral Ted and Violet, both going to top places in their respective classes.

In the Bull Terrier classes Mr. Fred Smith's good lightweight bitch, Sweet Blaine, was easily the best and was shown in tip-top condition. The best youngster by far was Mr. Blair's Inferno II.

The Toy section was well supported, Pomeranians being an easy first in both quantity and quality. The puppy classes contained many wee mites that will be heard of again, the pick of these being Wee Boy, owned by Mrs. Doherty, who just gained the verdict over Mr. Ward's Jumbo. Mrs. Foster's Fashion Plate is showing great promise and led the way in all her classes. ## REARING PUPPIES—C. J. Davies in "Our Dogs"

At about three weeks old puppies will be beginning to get upon their legs, and will be ready to take some light food.

Many people give puppies a little cow's milk or bread and milk at this stage; indeed, there are quite well-fanciers who are reputed to attempt to rear almost entirely upon this mixture. Needless to say they meet with no success, and have never come to the front as breeders. Cow's milk has been said by some to "give" puppies worms. This assertion is probably rather wide of the truth, though there is no doubt that milk-fed puppies are peculiarly liable to suffer severely from these pests. Cow's milk is of a totally different composition to bitch's milk. The latter is very rich, containing something like three times as much fat, six times as much casein, nearly five times as much albumen, and half as much milk sugar, as cow's milk. Ewe's milk is the richest in point of fat which it might be possible to get for puppies, and some specially selected goats give milk which is nearly equal to the average ewe's in this respect. There is no milk procurable, however, which even nearly approximates in composition to that of the bitch—hence the fact that puppies fail to thrive when milk enters largely into their dietary. Cow's milk no doubt sets in curds in the puppies' stomachs, gives them indigestion, and hence creates a favorable environment for the rapid propagation of worms. Round worms can only thrive and multiply in a suitable environment, and this environment is set up in an unhealthy alimentary canal. Worms will not flourish where food is being perfectly and quickly digested and passed on. The teeth are sharp and adapted for tearing and biting up flesh; the stomach is simple and comparatively small, and is lined throughout with a membrane which secretes gastric juice. Animals which are not meat feeders have only a portion of the stomach lined with gastric-secreting membrane. The fact that the entire stomach of the dog is so lined is an indication that the animal is adapted for the assimilation of a flesh diet and not for bulky and starchy foods, which this class of stomach is unable to deal with in any quantities.

Again, the intestines of the dog are

remarkable for their shortness. Grass-feeding animals have intestines of enormous length, to enable them to deal with and extract nourishment from the vast quantities of material they consume. Thus, a cow, which will eat a truss of hay in the twenty-four hours, has intestines which have been estimated to be in length 20 to 22 times the length of the body; the horse, on the other hand, which naturally eats much smaller quantities of a more concentrated class of food, has intestines of only about ten to twelve times the length of its body; while the dog, which naturally eats small quantities of highly nourishing (flesh) food, has intestines which are only from  $4\frac{1}{2}$  to  $5\frac{1}{2}$  times the length of its body. A too sudden change in early life on to cow's milk has, furthermore, been often known to cause the actual death of puppies, a post-mortem examination revealing inflammation of the mucous lining of the bowels, set up by the change of milk.

To state the matter again: The dog is naturally constructed to assimilate a mainly flesh diet, and his domestication has in no way altered his internal economy. Any other class of feeding is unnatural and unwholesome, and although a dog may become to some extent adapted to unnatural methods of feeding, he can never be expected to thrive so well as he does on foods more suited to his requirements. Furthermore, the younger an animal is the more it is believed to approximate to the primeval form; hence the puppy, even more than the fully grown dog, requires a natural dietary to enable it to reach the highest state of perfection in health and growth.

The wild bitch may feed her pups in two ways. She may carry home a portion of her kill and allow her offspring to assist in tearing up and devouring it; or she may exercise the (to us) disgusting habit of vomiting up for their benefit a portion of the meal she has recently swallowed. The practical result is almost the same, for in either case the puppies will get freshly killed flesh in some form. The writer is not much of a believer in tough ox flesh or horse flesh for young puppies, though these stuffs may be better than no meat at all. A dog would not naturally kill

so large an animal as a zebra or a wild ox. Its prey (except on those occasions when it hunts in packs) would be limited to small mammals and ground birds, of which it would eat the entrails as well as most of the bones and flesh. Therefore the early food of puppies should be of a comparatively delicate nature—and nothing can be better than tripe, brains, finely grated liver, or rabbit flesh. For the first few days tripe, boiled and chopped into small pieces, will be eagerly accepted by three-weeks-old puppies, which will crawl to the edge of their bench and snap up this dainty in a moment on the very first occasion on which it is offered to them. Two meals daily of this will help to relieve the bitch, and will bring the puppies on in an incredible manner. It is, of course, impossible to give any precise idea of quantity, as dogs vary so greatly in size and requirements. Suffice it to say that what must appear very little to a person accustomed to feed bloated bread-and-milk-fed pups is enough. For pups of 20 lbs. terrier breeds, a tablespoonful of chopped tripe twice daily is enough for the first few days. This will make no outward impression; but rotundity and a bloated appearance after meals are not indications of thriftiness. They are very much the reverse, and suggest that food too bulky and insufficiently nourishing has been supplied.

After the first few days, a third meal should be given at mid-day of liver, tender flesh, or any other part of an animal which suggests itself as suitable.

Puppies play after food if healthy; and it is a sure sign of incorrect feeding if an animal looks distended after meals, shivers, and creeps away into a corner.

In all but the hottest summer weather, liquid or starchy foods should be given warmed to blood heat, otherwise digestion does not start at once, and an environment favorable to worms is set up. A large meal of cold sloppy food invariably lowers for a time the whole temperature and vitality of a puppy's body, and during this period the animal ceases to thrive.

As a rule, unless the litter is a very large one and extra trouble has to be



taken to relieve the bitch, three meals daily are sufficient for the pups until they are weaned. These meals should be mainly of a meat character, but there is no harm, if the puppies are doing well, in giving dry (not sloppy) bread and milk (whole milk with bread soaked in it, not mainly water) for one meal occasionally, or some good patent puppy food, varying the diet as much as possible during the day.

A great mistake, and one most frequently made, is to wean the pups when they are only four, five or six weeks old. It is difficult to understand what breeders expect to gain by doing this, and why they are always in such a hurry to get this critical stage over. The bitch will not breed again immediately, so there is nothing to be gained in that respect. At a matter of fact it is all the other way, for a bitch is apt to run to undesirable fat as soon as the drain on her system is removed. Furthermore, at four or five weeks a bitch has a good deal of milk, which would be of every benefit to the pups, so why dry it up and deprive them of it?

The pups should be left so long with the bitch that the weaning is absolutely gradual and natural. The dogs will arrange it for themselves if left alone, for as the pups get more on to other food they will attempt to take less milk, and the less they draw the less will come. It will usually be found that by the time they are eight weeks old the whelps will be practically independent of their mother, and they will have reached this stage so gradually and imperceptibly that their systems will have received no check, and there will have been no drastic and digestive-upsetting changes in their diet. One precaution must be taken: Provide the bitch with a bench or resting place high up out of reach of the puppies, to which she can escape from their importunities. Remember that were she living a natural life she would be out a great deal hunting for her living, not cooped up for twenty-three hours out of the twenty-four with a noisy and worrying family; therefore, for the sake of peace and comfort, give her a refuge, and all will go well.

F. D. R., Galt:

Q. I imported a Boston bitch, three and a half years old, recently, and find she has had the Caesarian operation done on her. Can she have pups, and will it be necessary to operate again?

A. The Caesarian operation done properly will not prevent your bitch from breeding again, and she may whelp without any difficulty.

J. T. L., St. John:

Q. I have an Airedale Terrier bitch, 15 months old, that is just recovering from a mild but prolonged attack of distemper. I have noticed that there are irregular bare patches appearing on her back and sides. She does not scratch and is rather thin.

A. Some Airedales are apt to lose their hair the way you describe after a debilitating sickness. The coat will come in when the bitch gets built up again. Feed well, half meat diet, allow plenty of fresh air and exercise, and apply the following mixture:

6 parts cocoanut oil,  
1 part coal oil,

Rub lightly on the parts once a day.

Hank, West Toronto:

Q. I have a Foxhound aged five and a half that has a tape worm. He is fat and in good health, but is continually passing pieces of the worm. I cannot understand why he is in such good condition as he has had the worm for some time. What will get rid of it?

A. Many seasoned dogs seem to thrive when infested with a tapeworm and pass the allotted span of canine life. This, of course, depends on the number of worms contained in the bowels and the variety of tapeworm a dog harbors. There are about 6 or 7 different kinds.

A. Starve dog for 24 hours and give 2 grains of powdered areca nut to every pound of the dog's weight. This can be administered by mixing with lard or butter. One hour afterwards give one ounce of castor oil.

P. S., Winnipeg:

Q. By French Poodle female, over 8 years old, was lively and in good health until about two months ago she began panting unnecessarily and could not walk far, would sit down every few yards; has a changeable appetite and vomits occasionally.

A. This is something serious the matter with the bitch. Have a veterinary interested in dogs examine generative organs.

A. S. Burnaby:

A. This condition is not at all unusual. When the teats are full of milk give a large dose of some purgative and gently rub the breasts with camphorated oil, and do not feed so heavily. Nothing further can be done.

## DISTEMPER AND ITS MANY PHASES

By J. A. CAMPBELL, V.S.

(Continued).

Having provided suitable surroundings, and the sick dog made as comfortable as possible, the canine nurse should continually bear in mind that he is attending to a disease that is of a very contagious nature to other dogs, and ought to do his utmost to see that he is not the means of spreading the infection to other animals. He should wear a kennel coat, overalls, or a long apron, and a pair of gloves while administering to the wants of the sick; after using they should be hung up or placed on a shelf near the sick room. He must then wash his hands thoroughly with hot water and soap, and let them soak in some antiseptic solution such as bichloride of mercury—1 to 1,000 solution, or carbolic acid—5 per cent. solution. It is the safest plan not to allow the person caring for distemper cases to have anything to do with others unless they are seasoned and vigorous animals, and then only before attending the sick.

A dog suffering from distemper requires constant care and attention from an hygienic standpoint, not only is it necessary to have clean surroundings, bedding and dishes—but the dog itself must be kept clean and sanitary, otherwise some of the many disappointments that arise from distemper will be met with.

After a dog has been affected it will not be long (unless it is a very mild case) before its eyes become mattered, its nose choked with catarrhal discharges, its mouth and teeth coated. In some cases the regions around the anus become irritated, and in long-coated varieties the hair may become mattered with bowel evacuations. The skin along the under part of the body sometimes has numerous pustules appearing on the surface, and in complicated cases when the animal gets too weak to void its urine properly, the belly and the inside of the hind legs are apt to be scalded with urine. To do justice to a patient all these foregoing symptoms must be continually looked for, and promptly attended to twice daily at least, besides the very necessary grooming and brushing, also search for fleas and lice, which always thrive so well on the weak and sickly.

To clean up these conditions boracic acid solution is the best remedy for all of them, not only is it very effective, but it is harmless and cheap.

Breeds showing large prominent eyes, such as Pekingese, Toy Spaniels and Boston Terriers, are very prone to suffer severely from eye symptoms, a large percentage are left with traces in their eyes of having had distemper. Many of them are totally blind in one or both eyes, generally the result of neglecting to keep the parts clean. The routine for caring and treating distemper should commence with the eyes, when seen in the morning they are found to contain matter, often tightly closed. Having donned the kennel coat and gloves and got a cupful of warm boracic acid solution and several pieces of clean cotton wool, the eyes should be gently bathed until they are quite clean, and then the lids smeared with vaseline or boracic acid ointment. This treatment is sufficient in the ordinary cases of distemper, but with those breeds just mentioned it is well to place, at the outset if there is any matter present, two drops of a ten per cent. solution of argyrol in the eyes two to four times a day before smearing the lids. If the pus accumulates excessively under the eyelids, or a blue film is seen over the eyeballs, accompanied by what appears to be a small dent near the centre of the eyeball, a formation of an ulcer is likely in progress. To prevent this a small piece of yellow oxide of mercury ointment should be placed in between the eyelids morning and night, an hour or so before or after the argyrol solution. As long as the eyes discharge or appear to be sore it is necessary to keep up the boracic solution and ointment treatment.

The next to receive attention are the nostrils. These may become sooner or later filled with a yellow sticky discharge, which makes it difficult for the dog to breathe freely, and at the same time greatly diminishes its sense of smell. Many dogs get rid of this nasal discharge by sneezing and licking it, particularly at the beginning of the attack. Anyway, it is advisable to bathe the part and keep it well smeared with vaseline or ointment. Next

comes the mouth and teeth, which is very important. If they become foul, canker of the gums will in all probability set in, and will surely be followed by a greater loss of appetite, a very unfavorable symptom in distemper. With a fresh supply of boracic acid solution and absorbent cotton, the gums and teeth must be thoroughly cleaned morning and night. Not only does it prevent any disease developing in the mouth, but it tends to sharpen the appetite by stimulating the sense of taste.

The treatment of the sores appearing on the different parts of the body, due to eruption of pustules, or irritation from bowel and bladder discharges will all respond very readily if bathed with boracic acid solution, and in some inflamed areas powdered boracic should be dusted on. As improvement takes place and the dog becomes stronger, and the discharges dry up, grooming will be all that is required.

Many veterinarian authorities when asked how they treat their distemper cases reply, "Keep them eating," which sums up the situation very well indeed. All those fanciers that do not lose many dogs with distemper depend mainly on nourishment to pull their patients through.

Distemper is a microbial disease—the germs having invaded the body are creating as much depredation as possible, inside the system there is an army maintained, comprising of minute bodies in the blood stream which permeate into every nook and corner. Their duty is to protect the body from attacks of bacteria. These little bodies are being continually formed and will fight as long as there is life in the body, and in time will have the invading organism defeated or driven into some spot where they may remain localized, provided a dog's strength is supported until the body forces have had time to overcome the distemper germs and their allies. Recovery will take place, depending, of course, on the strength of the dog's power of resistance.

So it is very necessary to see that the dog eats food that is nourishing and easily digested, without putting too much tax on the system. The diets found most suitable are bread and milk,

well-boiled rice and milk, egg and milk, meat broths and boiled fish. If the patient eats the above, well and good—keep him to it, but as soon as he turns up his nose immediately try raw lean scraped meat, often the last food a dog will refuse.

But when stage of total loss of appetite arrives, and all tempting morsels are refused, resort must be made to those foods that contain the greatest amount of nutritious value with the least amount of indigestion, and also which may be administered to the unwilling and weak patients with as little resistance and effort as possible. The dog that has to be spoon-fed has been brought to the state of weakness either by pneumonia or diarrhoea, very often both; besides, it may have sore hips, gums, tongue and throat, and very sensitive stomach.

## Our London Letter

In my last letter I promised to gnish my "chat" on the Cocker. The standard of the Cocker published in the splendi work, "The Sporting Spaniel," by C. Phillips and Colonel Claude Cane, is almost identical to the one of the Spaniel-Club Belge (1906), and what we especially ought to retain from these descriptions and from the opinions of writers, ancient and modern, is that the Cocker must have the skull rather large and, esecially, rounded, the nose almost square and short (without exaggeration) and the head, on the whole, without great length.

According to the description of ancient writers, the head of the Cocker was formerly constituted thus, and if it has changed since, it was because elements foreign to its breed had been introduced, because the breeding had been, at a certain period, neglected, etc., and because this state of things, formerly, had been different, I, personally, do not grasp the reason that could be alleged for the modifications, unless this reason was due to a simple desire of a change. We must, therefore, abide by what has been said already and not forget it when we award prizes to dogs whose heads are completely distinct from those of the historical type. In acting thus we only give proof of great wisdom.

Why do not they, at continental shows, allot a small special prize to the male or to the female (in the open class) having the best heads? I do not think that there can be any serious impediment to that, and the above would be of great service to all breeders, amateurs and onlookers.

If the fixing of the head of the Cocker is of importance, the fixing of the type, of the model, of the dimensions are of still greater importance, and it was surprising to see that the two friendly clubs, the Belgian and the French, did not find it necessary to come to any mutual agreement in order to declare upon an identical action regarding the following paragraph. In fact, the Spaniel Club Belge says: "The body proportions of a Cocker must be proven de visu rather than by measure; however, good Cockers measure the same from the ground to the shoulder as from the point of the elbow to the root

of the tail. These proportions do not indicate a square dog, but a dog built for strength, very compact and very well poised."

In its turn the Spaniel Club Francais says: "A small dog, well built, combining, with strength, great elegance, extreme merriness and agility; built so as to be able to jump over a bush and to glide under it. The built is better when the length from the shoulder to the root of tail is nearly equal to the height at the shoulder."

I must add that these dimensions are the same as those which can be had in measuring Cockers on photographs.

In order to ascertain with certainty the good and bad dimensions of a Cocker it is necessary that the dog be photographed absolutely in profile and from its height (not in dipping).

The dog having ben photographed as above, put the point of a callipers on the withers, at the same height as the vertical extension of the front parts, place the othe point armed with a pencil or a nib on the spot where the feet touch the ground. Draw a circle around the pivot (withers). If the dog is well proportioned, the circle must pass on the root of the tail. If the circle passes outside, leaving the dog inside, this dog is too long. The same operation can be repeated in making the callipers gravitate on the point of the elbows, and it will be seen that the meeting of the two circles must take place at the top of the line of the back and at the root of the tail, if the dog is well proportioned, as mentioned above, but, I must add, that in order that this experiment be conclusive, it is absolutely necessary that the dog be photographed well in profile.

Personally, I have noticed that Cockers of the too short type do not possess the supple action, merry and undulated of the perfect Cocker. On the contrary, their action is jerky, oblique; they walk "beside themselves," if I may use this imaginary expression, and in the field they bounce rather than run. This type of Cockers has perhaps its raison d'etre on certain ground which is well covered, as, for instance, on heath-moors, but this is not a type to extol upon as being susceptible to be of service on any kind of ground.

The average rational type is met rather in dogs possessing the blood of the famous Braeside Bustle, which is not at all astonishing for those who are acquainted with the type of the above patriarch, and of his children or near relatives. Fanciers greatly value this blood, because it generally produces good Cockers, physically and morally, and especially because his genealogy offers the most serious guaranties, being very well connected, and seeming free of blood foreign to Cockers, for the pedigree can be ascended up to the 18th generation.

It is, therefore, high time to adopt once for all the type which enjoys the greatest favor, and to refuse prizes to Cockers which are too distinct of that type, to Cockers which are too short which are still to be met with frequently enough, and to Cockers which are too long and which become more and more rare.

We all desire the type of the Cocker to be definitely fixed, and we should not hesitate to use of the means which are offered us to that end, i.e., severity on the part of the judges, judicious mating, rigorous selection.

There is a continental saying: "If you wish that the village be clean, it is necessary that everybody sweeps before his or her house." As it is a question of the future of the breed, sportsmen, judges, exhibitors, breeders must meditate on the above saying and, especially, apply same.

The Cocker is well built, full of muscles, whose loins are powerful and hard, whose eyes are merry and bright as the sun, whose action is supple, courageous and fast, he is brave, and nimble, always ready to spur int othorny thickets or under the thick jungle of miry ground. He is straight on his legs and holds himself straight on his feet, adorned with fringes. Merry and bright, he is the d'Artagnan of the English breeds of dogs.

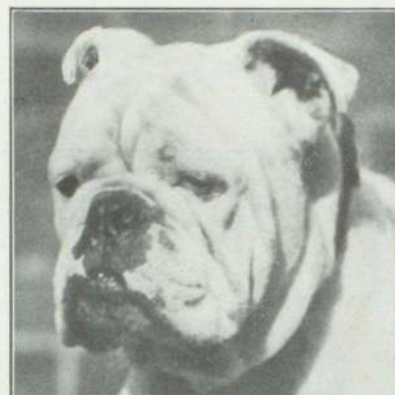

Out of the beaten path of the dog fancy in far Western Canada there is a Bulldog kennel that has won renown and made an everlasting name for themselves, as far as Bulldogs are known. I speak in reference to the Chinook Kennels, of Lethbridge, Alta. These kennels, the property of Mr. and Mrs. Tuson, have produced many winners and champions, and it is due to their untiring effort to improve the breed that they have been so successful in bringing out the good ones. They are among the largest importers of stock and frequently one of England's good ones becomes an inmate of the Chinook Kennels; but England's loss is Canada's gain, and the Chinook Kennels are to be highly commended for their excellent selection of imported stock.

I have not the space at my disposal to give a detailed description of all the inmates of this kennel, so will bear on a few of the principal ones—yet there are many which I will pass without comment that will rank with Canada's best.

The star of the kennel to-day is Ch. Chinook Tenacity, a heavyweight fawn bitch of Penfold strain, who has won her spurs in heavy competition, having defeated many of the best in Canada and the United States, her last out being "winners" at Boston, going over Ch. Covesea Lass and many of the cream of the breed of our "brothers across the line". In itself a wonderful performance. It is unnecessary to enumerate her wins, and let it suffice to say she has won in the past four years over seventy-five firsts and specials, several times special for best in show, any variety, and seventeen times championship winner—withal brought laurels to satisfy an entire kennel of dogs. She has a marvellous head, eyes and ears well placed, long flat skull, nice underjaw, good stop and furrow, and the work on her head is a study. Wonderful depth of brisket, with extra bone and rib. A proven brood matron. Two puppies from her, a brindle dog and a fawn bitch, retained by the Chinook Kennels, will surprise the fancy when they are brought out.

Quapaw Civilian, a worthy son of that noted sire, Ch. Centaur, is one of the winning stud dogs of the kennel. At his first Canadian show he went through his classes to winners, defeating many of our best, and the future holds much in store for him. He has proven himself the sire of the right kind. One of his get, Highland Sensation, has done a nice lot of winning in the United States for the past three years. A heavy-weight of nice quality and substance, he is most active and vigorous. For the benefit of the Eastern fancy he has been placed at stud with Mr. Sam Bamford, of the Walnut Kennels, Toronto, Ont., at a \$25.00 fee. And in my memorandum of "the stud dogs of to-day" Quapaw Civilian is placed high among them.

Woodend Taurus, a white youngster, rich in the blood of Wroxham Silent Prince and Heywood Marquis, is one of the recent importations. I have had many flattering reports from England about this one, but I was certainly surprised when I saw him. Unlike many of our present-day cripples, this one can get out and do ten miles with but little effort. Wonderful bone, muscle and general all-round Bulldog type and sound to the core. A massive all-white heavyweight, he has done quite a little winning, and is standing at stud with D. C. Sampson, Calgary, Alta., at a fee of \$15.00. I expect next year to write more in detail of the home-bred ones from Chinook, sired by their good stud dogs.

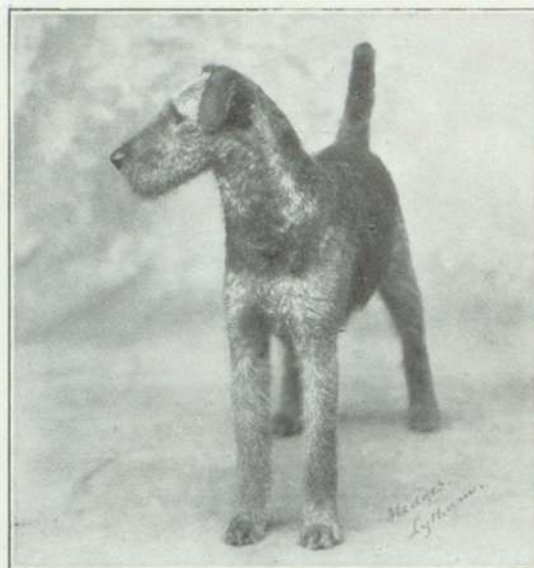

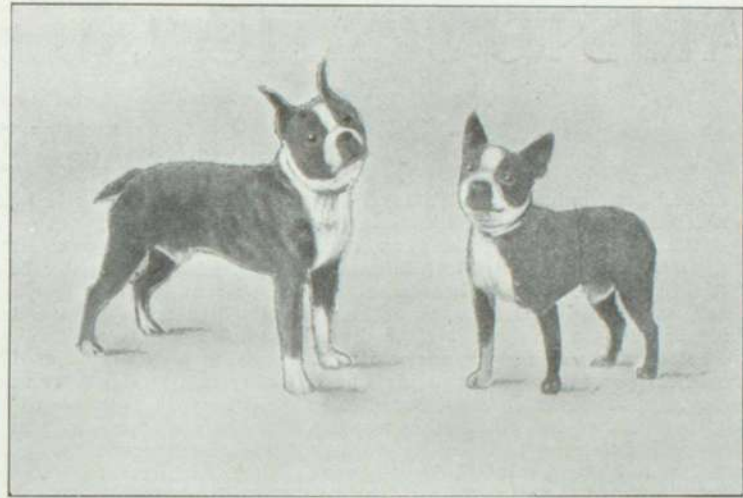

They are not merely a hobby or fancy with him, as he is probably the leading exponent of scientific line breeding in America to-day, and if Richards can't breed them right it will never be from lack of knowledge. A wonderful student of pedigrees and the strong traits of the various strains, he is never at a loss to know just what dog to breed to which will mick with his brood matrons to produce the thing we are all striving for—flyers. And at this point permit me to suggest to the breeders who in picking a stud dog for their matings, use one simply because he can win a few ribbons, and not because he has a firm foundation behind him of the leading strains of England which has produced the toppers in the breed, it would be well worth while to follow Mr. Richards' lead and breed to standard blood lines.

After an inspection of the kennels and going over the dogs thoroughly, we sat before the open fire, soon forgetting the chill of the Christmas night, and talked over dogs and dog men of other days, commending the good points of such grand old-timers as Heywood Marquis, Ch. Heywood Duchess, Adoration, Katerfelto, Rodney Stone, White Marquis, Prince Albert, and finally agreed on Ch. Roseville Blaze as the most typical representative dog or bitch that ever lived. An hour's doggy talk with Mr. Richards is indeed a treat, as he still remembers the old ones as though they

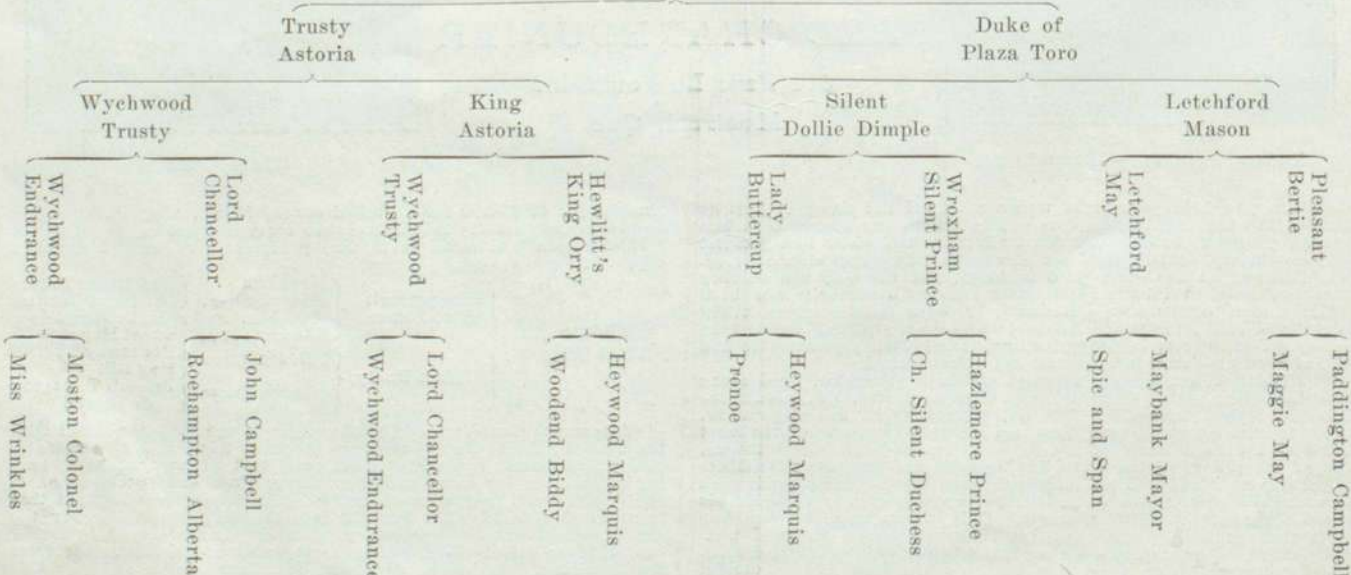
had just passed in front of him, and he is one man in America who can justly compare the dogs of to-day with those of twenty years ago. And now to the dogs.

**Silent Plaza Prince**, whose breeding is so excellent. In justice to the dog we must attach his pedigree. Sired by that wonderful lightweight, Duke of Plaza Toro, a dog whose early demise was a sad blow to the American fancy, as he had but small opportunity to leave many of his progeny with us. Prince is without doubt his best son, and a remarkably good "all over" dog he is. Fallow and white, weighing 48 lbs., he at 16 months is developing into one of our best heavyweights. My how she has improved since I last saw her at the Toronto Exhibition, at which time I made a note to watch her as she had all the qualities of developing into a real flyer. And I am well satisfied with my first estimate of her, as to-day she can make the best in Canada or United States "step", and there are few, if any, can top her. She is still but a youngster and coming every day, and when she finishes she should easily make her championship. A 38-lb. fawn, with a head that is a masterpiece, wonderful substance and work, excellent underjaw, and a most typical expression, with shortest of bodies, set on four

He is a dog that will make a name for himself and has already done some winning, his successes at the New York Show, coupled with his Canadian victories, being ample proof of his sterling qualities. He is a shade large, but has absolutely no trace of coarseness in his make-up. His size being the only obstacle that prevents him from going to the top in any company. Championship Rebound Oorang was one of the plucky purchases that Mr. Bamford is noted for, and his sudden death removes from our midst one of the pillars of the Aire-



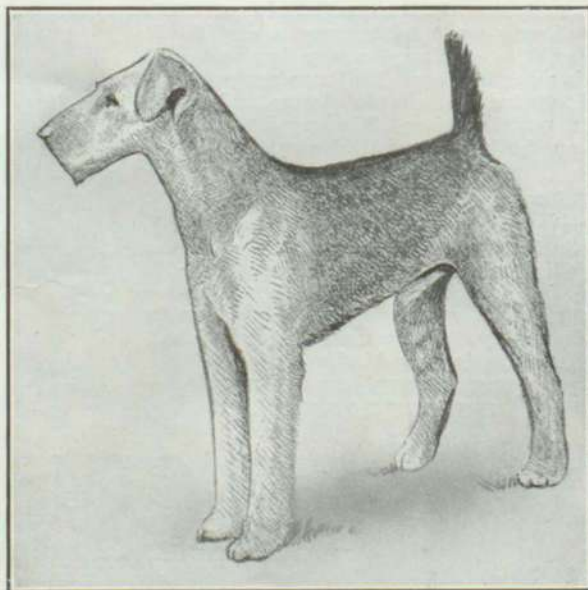

The Dalmatian is that quaint spotted dog that was seen and more highly appreciated before the autos became so popular. Since then he has lost somewhat of his popularity as a coach dog, but he still remains that real "man's best friend." He is most affectionate, and to own one once—why, you would never be without one again, especially if you enjoy a good long walk when the pleasure is not complete without the "spotted dog."

As a show dog he does not always get the credit due to him. When in the show ring for specials against other breeds, a judge will often overlook a real good one because some of the other breeds are more popular, and to please the crowd the judge ignores him, so the poor Dalmatian "gets the gate". He accepts this just as joyfully as when he entered, and the individual at the other end of the leash shrugs up his shoulders and takes his "medicine". When a real dog judge comes along and judges "dogs" a Dalmatian has a chance to show his qualities, and there is some encouragement to go ahead, and we realize there is some pleasure in the game.

A little incident cropped up at one of our fall shows that is worthy of note. A judge, when awarding the "ribbons" in the Dalmatian classes remarked of one: "This is what I call a real perfect Dalmation", but when it came to general specials the poor Dalmatian's qualities were overlooked and a more popular breed won.

The photo on this page is that of Prince of Loreden, owned by J. R. Constantineau, of Montreal, who has bred and owned such noted dogs as Ch. Lady Florine, Ch. Lady Beauty, Ch. Perfect Bond, Ch. Florrie, Int. Ch. Windholme Forester, and has won more firsts and specials with these dogs during the last fifteen years than all the rest of the Dalmatians in Canada.

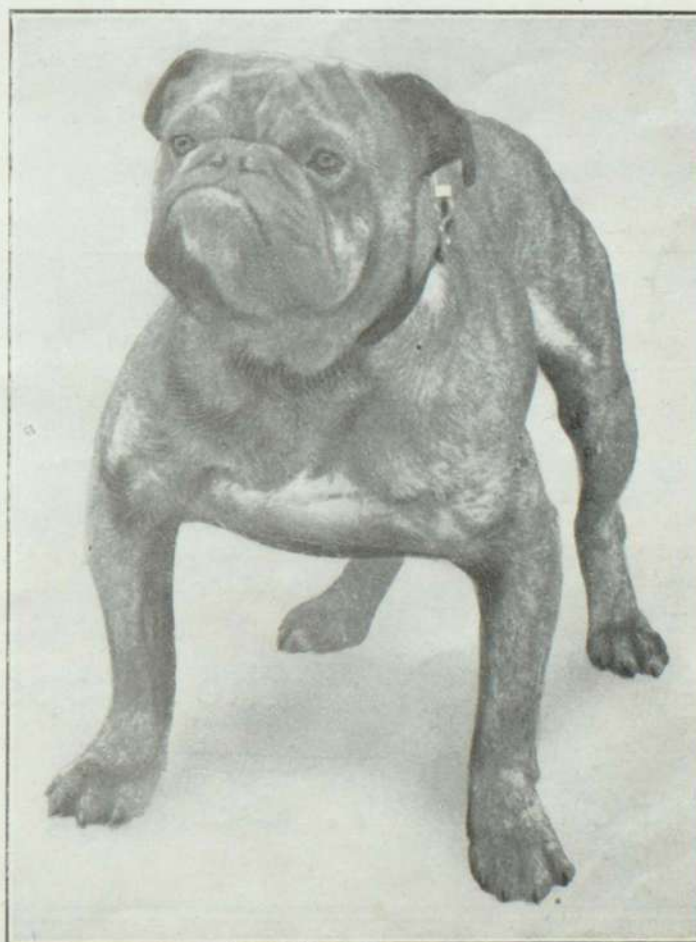

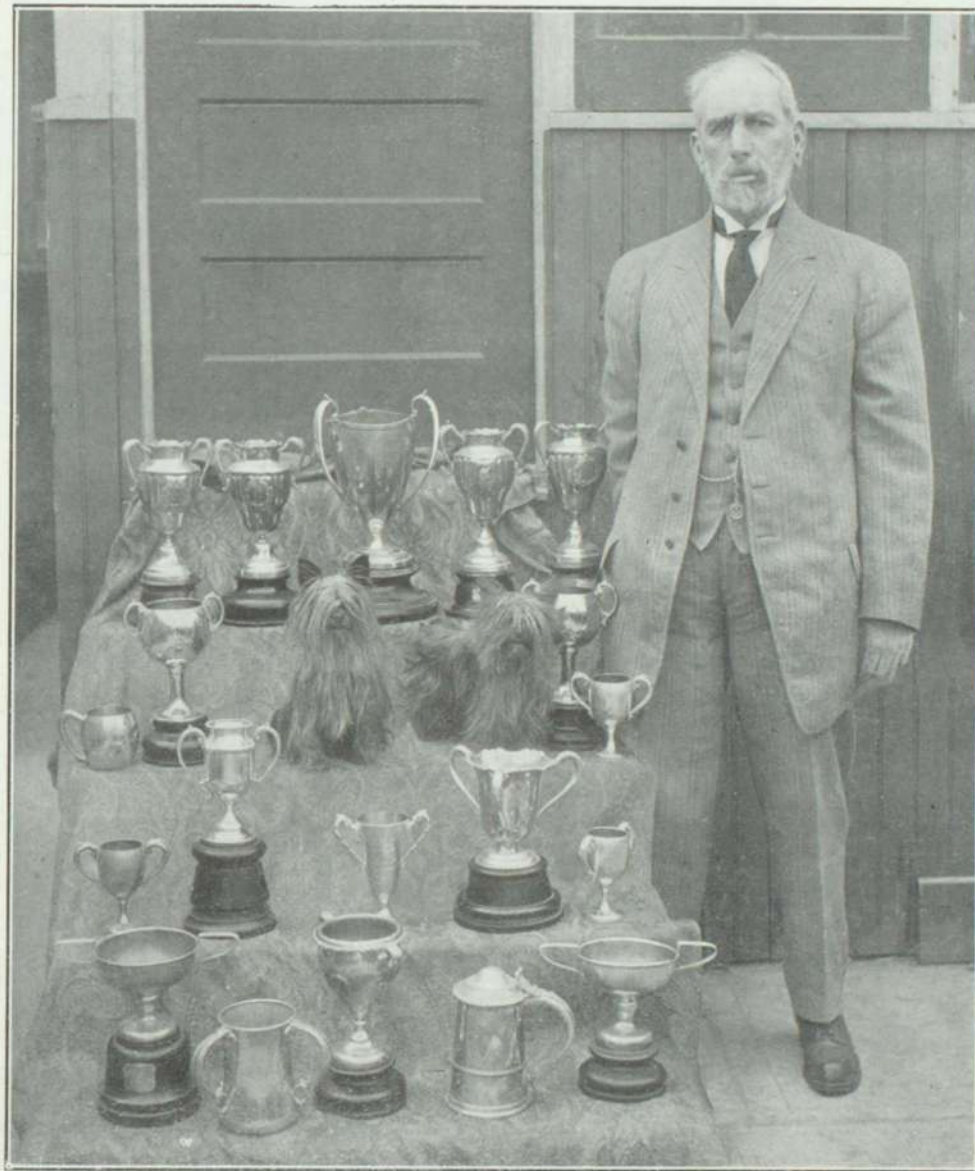

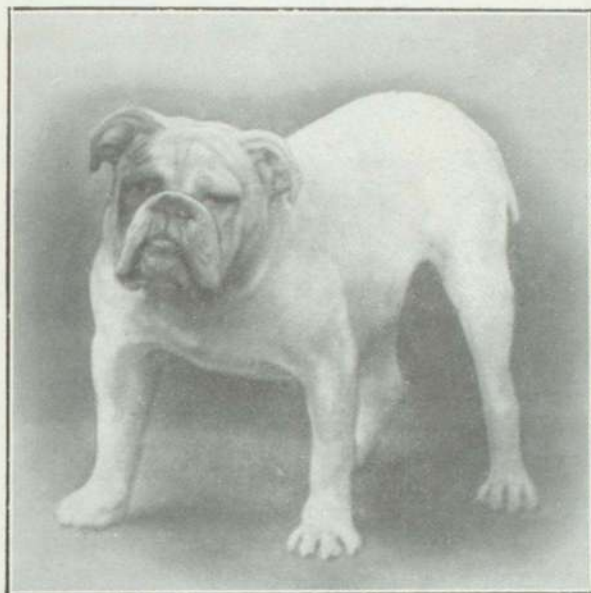

# Mr. H. T. Gubb and the Oakwood Bulldogs

933 Kingston Road, Toronto, Ont.

In my rambles I always make it a point to attend the Toronto National Exhibition, as without doubt for quality of Bulldog entry there is nothing can equal it on the American continent. Last September I came to the show and early in the morning went over each Bulldog and out of the hundred odd benched I picked a lightweight brindle as one of the two best there. By referring to my catalogue I found he was Regal Rascal, and as I had heard of a dog of this name who was making quite a reputation in England, I looked further, to find I was going over that same great son of Kilburn Regal. I spent an hour going over this fellow, and then looked up his owner, Mr. H. T. Gubb, and found that Rascal had arrived just a few days previous and was located at the Oakwood Kennels. I made him one of the most evenly balanced dogs I ever had the pleasure of reviewing. Not one outstanding feature, but so evenly balanced that in order to describe him I would have to merely copy the Bulldog standard in most of its essentials, and I then tried to figure out just how good this youngster would be when he finished off. I have had an opportunity of going over this fellow twice since then, which has confirmed my first impression of him. A head that is marvellous, worked over with fine wrinkle, perfect eye and skull, deep stop, pronounced furrow, excellent depth of foreface and nice underjaw. One of the prettiest natural turn of shoulders and a short compact body swung well between his legs, and perfect tail carriage. Nice bone and rib, and a beautiful mover. All in all he is a Bulldog you breeders can set up as a model to try and duplicate.

Even the most critical cannot fault this fellow, except to please their own fancy of what a Bulldog should be. And yet when I go back over his ancestors and remember his sire, Kilburn Regal, who to-day is one of the three greatest Bulldogs in England, his sire, Carlslake Rex, a pillar of the breed, and his sire, Heywood Marquis, the greatest stud

dog in the world of all time, it is small reason to wonder that Rascal is such a good one. And I was satisfied that he was capable of siring puppies of exceptional quality and before making my ideas concrete I visited several of his get, and I have seen a number of his youngsters, and what a bunch of good ones they were—and so I took my memorandum of “stud dogs of to-day” and turned over to the front page and among the first three I wrote “Regal Rascal”.

And now to pass on to the ladies, I met an old friend in Ch. Chestnut Ginger, probably one of the best known in England and the United States, which has but recently been imported to Canada, and I believe that I can write, “She is the best Bulldog bitch in Canada”, and no one will gainsay me. A big winner in England, she was exported to the United States at a tender age, where she made her championship at the leading shows, and to-day there are a number of her puppies who are in the top rank, and one an American champion. This little one has been described so frequently I will not go into detail, but simply write, she is a Bulldog of unusual quality, excelling in head and body properties, with bone to match, and wonderful all-round finish. The only time shown in Canada, at Oakville, she took first and winners. At the present time she is nursing a litter of puppies by Regal Rascal, that are far above the average, and it is only a matter of time until her progeny will be coming to the front in the land of her adoption.

Too much credit cannot be given Mr. H. T. Gubb for the foresight in securing two such grand specimens, his object being, with this foundation, to establish a strain of Bulldogs that will rebound to the credit of the Oakwood Kennels in generations to come. His plan is a very worthy one and one that can be accomplished by selective line breeding.

Go to it, Mr. Gubb, we are with you, and we know that in the face of the most serious reverses you will stick to your guns and come out on top.

A sad loss to the fancy and a hard blow to Mr. Gubb was the death of that good dog, Ch. Strathtay Knowle Marquis, which he recently purchased, and it will be difficult to replace him. He left one or two litters behind him in Canada, and may his progeny follow in the footsteps of their illustrious sire is the sincere wish of

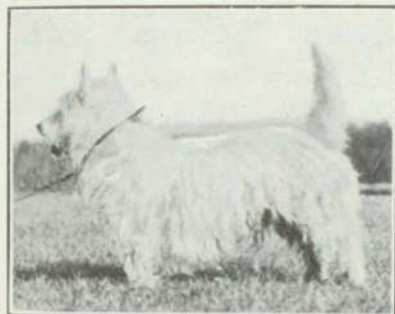
