The minutes of the previous meeting were read by the Secretary and it was moved and seconded that they be confirmed. Carried.

The Secretary reported the formation of a new club to be known as "The Beagle and Field Trial Club," at the inaugural of which 22 new members were enrolled.

The Secretary reported that all claims for championship cups earned prior to the revised rules becoming effective July 4th, 1918, had been honored.

Moved and seconded that the secretary be instructed to forward to the Spanish Kennel Club as many of our Stud Books as were on hand and could be spared. Carried.

The resignation of Mr. Thos. DeGeer was submitted to the meeting, and it was moved and seconded that the secretary write to Mr. DeGeer and say, "That it was with the deepest regret that his resignation was accepted, and hoped that the pressure of business would soon be such as to permit him again to enter into the activities of local dogdom, so long associated with his name." Carried.

The resignation of Mr. Thos. DeGeer having caused a vacancy on the Board of Directors, it was moved and seconded that Mr. Donald Wheeler, Toronto, be appointed to the directorate. Carried.

It was moved and seconded that Mr. Leonard Cooper, Calgary, be appointed director for Alberta. Carried.

It was moved and seconded that Mr. Alexander Stewart, Winnipeg, be appointed director for Manitoba. Carried.

It was moved and seconded that it be an instruction to the Editor of "Kennel and Bench" to discontinue contra advertising. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the secretary be empowered to issue certificates of championship, on his satisfying himself that all requirements of the rules

and regulations had been complied with. Carried.

An application having been made to the National Live Stock Records, Ottawa, from Dan Thody, Detroit, Mich., requesting the change of name from Kitchener II. to Bobbie Burns, was sent to the Board of Directors for decision, and it was moved and seconded that the request could not be entertained. Carried.

A letter was read from A. V. Webley, Ottawa, expressing his desire to have championship cups to go with the championships earned by his Russian Wolfhounds, Sophia, 167770, and Petrofski of Addlestone, 17452, he declaring his willingness to pay for same, and it was moved and seconded. That members completing the championships of their dogs after July 4, 1918, that being the date when the revised rules became effective, be allowed and encouraged to have championship cups, instead of the championship certificate, on the member declaring his desire and willingness to pay the difference in price of same. Carried.

Mr. W. B. Levaack, not having governed himself according to the resolution passed at the Board of Directors meeting held Feb. 5th, 1919, was invited to attend this session, at his expressed desire. Mr. Levaack, however, could not attend in person, and was ably represented by Mr. H. T. Shaw, Toronto, who gave as his client's reason for non-compliance, "that there was no competition," and explained in detail Mr. Levaack's interpretation of the situation. After carefully considering the pros and cons from all angles, it was moved and seconded that Mr. Levaack be given 10 days to carry out his advertised agreement. Failure to comply with this order, automatic suspension from all privileges of the Canadian Kennel Club until compliance is observed. Carried.

The following protest was received from the provincial director for Regina:

Dear Sir,—At a general meeting of the Regina Kennel Club, held Monday, the 24th day of February last, the following resolution was passed: It was moved by Mr. Selby, seconded by Mr. McCusker, That this club make a protest to the Canadian Kennel Club, through Mr. Newman, their provincial director, against the passing of the proposed amendment, Rule No. 17, stating that this club considers it too early for such a change. Carried.

Mr. Fred. Charbonnier, Montreal, wrote, claiming reimbursement for the expense entailed by him in connection with Gubb vs. Charbonnier case, and it was moved and seconded, That, while the Board of Directors very much regretted the entailed expense, they failed to observe any liability in this case. Carried.

A letter having been received from Mr. W. McPherson, Toronto, retracting the statement which brought him under suspension, on Oct. 18th, 1918, and offering apologies for same, it was moved and seconded that the apologies be accepted and suspension raised. Carried.

The case of White vs. Darrell vs. Jackson, having been referred to the Board of Directors by the National Live Stock Records, Ottawa, was gone into, and, after being considered, it was moved and seconded, That the secretary write to Mr. J. J. Jackson, asking him to use his influence with Mr. White in order that the disagreement might be amicably adjusted. Carried.

The correspondence in the charge Crawley vs. Silver was read, and it was the finding of the board that the postcard written by Mr. Crawley to Mr. Silver on Oct. 27th absolved Mr. Silver from further responsibility. Carried.

The meeting then adjourned.

CORRECTIONS.

Our attention has been called to the award list of the Maple Leaf Kennel Club show, held January 2nd and 3rd, as reported in our February issue, where the Irish terrier Fiscal Venus appears placed 2nd in limit class. There is evidently something wrong somewhere, as the owner of Fiscal Venus has drawn our attention to the fact that Fiscal Venus was not in attendance at this show.

We respectfully draw the attention of our K. & B. readers to page 6 of our January issue, where, under the heading of "Amendments to Regulations Governing Clubs Holding Dog Shows Under C. K. C. Rules," and at Reg. IV., "Duration of Show." The duration of a show, etc. This proposed amendment, when submitted to the annual meeting, held February 5th, 1919, was unanimously accepted on vote. The amendment to read as follows:

"The duration of a show shall not exceed four days, and no license dates shall be granted to a show except on the understanding that all dogs are permitted to be removed after 6 o'clock p.m. on the fourth day."

Our readers will also notice that no mention is made of this amendment on page 7 of our March issue where the business before the annual meeting is reported.

The omission was an oversight, which we regret very much, but on the matter being brought to our attention we hasten to explain and rectify.

Toronto Kennel Club's 16th Annual Spring Show

APRIL 18 and 19

Every year brings a little improvement in the management of the above fixture. This year over 250 dogs were benched, making it a two-point show, the Horse Repository, in which the show was held, being just about large enough for the number of dogs benched. Everything had been well arranged, and no fault could be found with the management. The new secretary, Mr. A. Lowenstein, and a hard working committee are to be congratulated on their efforts. The ring stewards kept the judge busy, and deserve credit for the excellent manner in which they performed their duties.

The judge, Mr. "Ben" Lewis, of Pennsylvania, is no stranger amongst us, and went over the exhibits with care and dispatch before handing out the ribbons. The attendance of visitors was good, especially on the opening day, when it was almost impossible to get near the judging ring. All the old-time fanciers were there, along with the new recruits, who took a keen interest in the judging. We noticed many fanciers from outside points, who thoroughly enjoyed the event. In conversation with the judge after the show, he expressed his surprise at the quality of the dogs brought before him, and declared that many of the breeds were better than those seen at the American shows. The first day's judging saw a grand lot of Collies brought out, amongst them being several youngsters that showed exceptional promise. Bulldogs were numerous and provided keen competition. Mr. E. P. Tuson, of the Chinook Kennels, had journeyed down from Alberta with a useful team and carried off many prizes. Several of the exhibits in this section were allowed to leave the show in order to compete at the Specialty Show, which took place the following day.

Bull Terriers made a nice collection, but nothing new turned out.

Airedales proved a big attraction and furnished many surprises, most of the classes being well filled, and the competition was of an even nature. Mr. Joseph Russell exhibited a large string and carried off premier honors in dogs and bitches.

Cocker Spaniels were a disappointment as far as numbers were concern-

ed. The only outstanding ones was Mr. H. Moore's exhibit. We noticed a few real nice youngsters in this section that should do some winning later.

Fox Terriers showed an improvement on previous shows and are becoming very popular around Toronto. Keen interest was taken in the judging, which produced a few surprises for the railbirds.

There was a small but select group of Boston Terriers. The same report applies to several of the other varieties.

The Toys were comfortably staged in a large ante-room and produced a few new faces. Poms, as usual, made the biggest crowd. Pekes came next, and it was interesting to see how the new ones compared with the old-timers. The judging of the Variety Classes and General Specials was watched with interest, and brought to a close a very enjoyable and successful event.

SURPRISING ARRAY OF CHAMPIONS AT THE PINEHURST DOG SHOW.

Pinehurst's second annual Dog Show, the first to be held under A. K. C. rules, brought together a surprising array of well known champions, and was not only the most important dog show ever held in the South but also the best show ever held outside of New York City.

There were about 200 high-class entries, exclusive of dogs entered for exhibition only, the latter including Police Dog Champion Fels, Reserve Grand Champion Police Dog Bodo von Weissenstein, and a number of others equally well known.

The contest for best in show narrowed down, on the closing day, to Capt. Quincy Adams Shaw McKean's famous wire-haired fox terrier Champion Pride's Hill Tweak'em, and Mrs. B. F. Lewis, Jr.'s equally celebrated greyhound, Champion Lansdowne Sunflower. The decision was finally given in favor of Lansdowne Sunflower, and Tweak'em was adjudged best in opposite sex.

The Willowbrook Kennels' Willowbrook Rock, one of the best English Setters shown in recent years, won against a field that was as high in quality as any that has been exhibited in this country.

There was an exceptionally large entry for the Pointer class, as large if not larger than the entry at the last Madison Square show. This class brought out Applejack, an upstanding black and white pointer, who won straight through from Novice to Winners.

The class of the show is well illustrated by the fact that entries as well known as Norwood Johnson's French Griffon, Homere' Jack, and Miss Runyon's Yorkshire terrier, Peggy, had to content themselves with secondary honors in the Miscellaneous class.

E. B., Winnipeg:

Q. My English Setter, dog, three years old, is suffering with a bad attack of diarrhoea; has frequent liquid motions of mucous and blood and is constantly straining; he vomits frequently and has great thirst.

A. Your dog is evidently suffering with dysentery. Give at once a dose of castor oil and laudanum, tablespoonful of oil mixed with 10 drops of the latter. About 6 hours afterwards commence to give 10 grains of carbonate every 3 hours. Feed on milk thickened with arrowroot; also white of egg beaten up with barley water.

Officer, Alta.:

A. The temperature is best taken in the rectum, for here there is less danger of breaking the instrument. The normal temperature should be 101.4. Before taking the temperature the point of the thermometer should be greased and inserted into the bowel for an inch and a half. At least a minute and a half should be allowed when taking the temperature.

Mrs. W. T., Ontario:

Q. My Fox Terrier bitch, 11 years old, has a chronic cough, and often turns giddy and falls after a severe attack of coughing. In a few minutes she jumps up again, looking rather

vacant, but is soon herself again. What could I do to relieve her?

A. Your dog is suffering from chronic asthma, accompanied by a weak heart. Give a dose of purgative medicine, as the liver is often engorged with blood in cases of chronic asthma. Afterwards a course of the following mixture:—Tincture Nux Vomica, 1 drachm; Tincture of Digitals, 2 drachms, water to 6 ozs. Give one teaspoonful 3 times a day. Feed chiefly on raw meat.

Fancier, Toronto:

Q. What would you advise for a 5-year-old Cocker Spaniel dog that has bad breath?

A. This condition is generally the result of a diseased condition of the teeth, the accumulation of tartar or ulcers on the gums and cheeks. Bad breath may also arise from a disordered stomach. If it arises from the teeth remove the tartar and clean the teeth, at least once a day, with the following wash:—Salol, 1 drachm; Tr Myrrh, 2 drachms; Spirits of Wine, 10 drachms; Formalin, 1 drachm. Add half teaspoonful of the mixture to a cupful of tepid water.

Novice, Collie Puppy:

A. The puppy's death was caused by Goitre, which usually terminates fatally in young puppies. When the patient is young the disease is best treated with the Homoeopathic preparation of Iodide of Potassium, 3 X; give 3 grains 3 times a day. When the swellings are reduced give cod liver oil, teaspoonful after each meal.

Mystery, Hamilton:

A. The presence of milk in the teats towards the last week of pregnancy is not to be depended upon by itself as a sign of approaching parturition, as its secretions frequently takes place after copulation and at the period of what should have terminated pregnancy.

Canine Lover, S. T.:

Q. I have an Airedale Terrier bitch, 15 months old, that is just recovering from a mild but prolonged attack of distemper. I have noticed that there are irregular bare patches appearing on her back and sides. She does not scratch and is rather thin.

A. Some Airedales are apt to lose their hair the way you describe after a debilitating sickness. The coat will come in when the bitch gets built up again. Feed well, half meat diet, allow plenty of fresh air and exercise, and apply the following mixture:

6 parts cocoanut oil,
1 part coal oil.

Rub lightly on the parts once a day.

This stud dog is second to none for siring big litters of healthy, strong puppies, and should be a valuable addition to her kennels. We wish her the best of luck.

Carson, of Montreal, reports a litter of five beautiful (parti-color) Pekingese puppies from her newly imported bitch, "Walnut Girl," ex her grand dog "Walnut Wei," which was imported at the same time. They are beautifully marked and are real typical specimens. "Walnut Wei" is a son of "Ch. Lyneroft Chops" Ex "Ch. Broad-oak Beetle," Ex "Ch. Kin Wha," Ex "Ch. Pekin Pie" and others. Such blood as this cannot help but have a good effect on the breed. There are four other matrons in whelp to "Wei," and they are all looking very promising. He is a real typical Peke, and when down in the show ring in proper form will cause a sensation.

The subject of our front page illustration this month is the Airedale Terrier "Pottery Invader," recently imported by the well-known proprietor of the Chinook Kennels, of Lethbridge, Alta. Invader was purchased from Mr. J. H. Leeming of Blackpool, England, and comes out to this country with a wonderful reputation as a show dog and sire.

Amongst his wins include numerous first and specials, with a Championship Certificate to his credit, gained in the hottest of competition at the Royal Lancashire Show in 1917. This alone is enough to stamp him as a show dog of quality, and we may naturally expect to see him "invade" the shows in this country.

His many fine characteristics have often been commented upon by English critics; his long, lean cut head, faultless front, color, coat, substance and wonderful type have often been

SOLDIERS' DOGS FROM THE FRONT.

If you ever loved a faithful dog, you will respond quickly and generously to the R. S. P. C. A. Fund to bring home and quarantine Tommy's beloved dog, his faithful friend in trench and camp while winning victory for you. Read the following appeal:

Editor, "Kennel and Bench."

Dear Sir,—You will remember that the recent outbreak of rabies in England was attributed to the fact that a dog was smuggled into this country from abroad. Subsequently a Government order was issued that all dogs imported must be quarantined for a period of six months.

Now, though all dog-lovers are sure to appreciate the wisdom of this action—particularly as it is the only means of safeguarding the health of our valuable animals—it bears very hardly on many soldiers who cannot afford the necessary quarantine fees for their "mascot" of the war. Not many of these men can pay for six months' quarantine, and it is a strong temptation to them to import their pets by smuggling wherever possible. These men cannot be expected to part with equanimity from the animals which have proved such devoted comrades to them amid their many hardships and dangers.

In these circumstances the R. S. P. C. A. has come forward, at the request of the Army Council, with an offer to quarantine free of charge a large number of these faithful animals.

Surely every dog-owner will understand and sympathize with the attachment of the British soldier to his dog and will generously offer assistance in this scheme of the R. S. P. C. A. Every contribution sent to the fund is both a token of gratitude to the men who have fought and suffered for our sakes, and is an aid towards the preservation of the safety of our British dogs.

Betty was undoubtedly the best Canadian bred Wire female out in 1918, and had done considerable winning. She made her debut at the December show in Montreal in 1917 and went from puppy to winners; also winning special for best puppy in show all breeds. Her last outing in Montreal was in December, 1918, where she went to best bitch in show all breeds after winning her classes. Mr. Powlesland got a nice price for Betty, and still has her dam and is in hopes of getting another good one.

Mr. Nap. Paquette reports the arrival of seven pups by Fred. Charbonnier's Kersal White Gladiator, out of his winning bullbitch, Lady Violet. It is interesting to note that this was the first bitch served by that crack youngster.

Capt. W. R. Harton informs us that his English bullbitch, Miss Rags, reserve winners at Sherbrook, is showing heavy in whelp to Champion Kersal King's winning son, Kersal White Gladiator.

"Bob" Ross has bought Malden Corporal, and he is now owned by Mrs. J. H. Allan. Corporal dusted the jackets of all the Canadian bred Wires last Fall and put paid to the account of a lot of imported ones, too. His new owner is expecting to be well up in the running.

Mrs. H. M. Palmer, of Dunbar Pomeranian Kennels, Vancouver, has had a litter of three orange sable puppies, all males, from her small Pomeranian, Princess Vic, who weighs only 4 lbs. They were sired by Mrs. Palmer's little orange sable Billikin, who has been so successful in the local shows. The puppie are all exceedingly healthy and strong.

GEORGE W. QUINTARD DEAD.

Through an accidental fall down a flight of stairs at the New Amsterdam Theatre, Chicago, Mr. George W. Quintard received injuries from which he died a few hours later. Mr. Quintard will be remembered as the owner of the Ridgeway Kennels of Fox Terriers, and during the earlier days of this kennel his dogs were among the best to be obtained. The prefix of Ridgeway was a power, and his Baby Dazzler, Matford Vic and Ridgeway Boy made records that but a few have equalled in this country. At the outbreak of the war Mr. Quintard gave up his kennels and joined the artillery branch of the A. E. F. in France.

Mrs. Clarke's only regret is that she has not sufficient pups to fill the orders she received while in New York at the show.

THE DEATH OF CHAMPION "KERSAL KING."



"Kersal King," termed by fanciers "in the know" as the most perfect specimen of the breed where "ugliness is beauty," died at Chicago, Ill., April 6th, the day following the show at which he had been awarded winners, he also winning reserve best in show, the awarding of this special to Earlwood Warlock taking one hour and fifteen minutes, such noted dogs as Ch. Marbald Warsong, Ch. Sabine Fernlike and Ch. Silver Birch Banker being excused by the judges.

Imported in August, 1917, when eleven months of age, by J. F. Lakin, of Toronto, the dog was sold on April 1st, 1918, to Fred. Charbonnier, Montreal, who showed him fearlessly under whatever judge was appointed to officiate.

Ch. "Kersal King" knew the ups and downs of the show ring, the same judge putting him down at one show, afterwards awarding him best of all breeds at another show, he even being "forgotten" by Mr. Jack Meadows at the National Exhibition, 1918.

But since the much discussed little bulldog got over his troubles and improved beyond recognition and from then on, in proper condition and superb shape, "Kersal King" went to the fore for good, C. G. Hopton terming him the best bulldog on both sides of the Atlantic, and the New York Show, 1919, being the occasion for him to be crowned the "best stud dog in show with one of his get American-bred."

Used under conditions which proved adverse to him, "Kersal King" for quite a while had not been a success at stud, but of late he had proved his worth at breeding, the latest addition to his get, being a litter of six—three of each kind—out of Strathtay Supreme,

winners last Montreal show, she being the winner of a special offered by the owner of "Kersal King," Mr. Fred. Charbonnier, which was a free service to the dog, with the optional return service or the paying of \$25.00 to the owner of the bitch should the latter prove barren, this special being taken advantage of by Mr. Chisholm for the mating which resulted in the litter of six living pups. Previous to that Mr. Lakin had been presented with a litter of eight pups sired by "Kersal King."

Made all in a heap, "Kersal King," weighing 48 lbs. in condition, carried a head big enough for a 60-pounder, with a muzzle short to the point of a monstrosity, and he had bones to sell; his barrel was exceptional, his body so short as to deceive the average fancier as to the weight of the dog; from stem to stern he was a mass of bulldog, better than the others where they excelled and with some to spare where they failed.

"Kersal King" stood in the championship road of many good dogs and naturally made lots of enemies, but even his most ardent critic had to acknowledge his qualities, and his loss, we feel sure, will be mourned by the fancy at large.

Mr. Charbonnier is fortunate enough in owning a son of "Kersal King," Kersal White Gladiator, bred in Texas, which has already proved his worth both at stud and in the show ring, winning first and best junior bulldog at the last New York Show, he, by the way, being the "get" shown with "Kersal King" at New York to win the special for best stud dog.

"Kersal King" had travelled all over the continent, obtaining winners at London, Montreal, Shreveport, Regina, Sherbrooke, Toronto, Chicago; reserve best in show at Montreal and Chicago, best in show at Shreveport and Toronto, winning non-sporting or Canadian variety at London, Montreal, Dallas, Shreveport, Regina, Toronto, New York and Chicago, specials by the score and the title of champion, the claim for which has been completed since the dog's death.

"Kersal King" was to have been three years in July next.

Jack Steer, the "live wire" breeder, announces the arrival of a litter of three dogs and three females by Hasty Homage, out of his good bitch, Matford Vera.

OUR MAIL BAG

Editor Kennel and Bench:

Toronto, Ont.

Dear Sir,—My attention has been called to the fact that a report is being circulated both in Toronto and Montreal to the effect that the litter out of Mr. A. C. A. Chisholm's bitch, Strathtay Supreme, cannot safely be credited to the late Kersal King, and I think it is only fair to both the owner of the dog and the owner of the bitch that I should lay the cold facts before the public.

When the bitch was mated to Kersal King the first time I was handling the dog, Mr. Chisholm being present, and also six other witnesses, the bitch being removed immediately from my kennels by Mr. Chisholm himself. For the second service I also handled the dog, Mr. Chisholm again being present with five witnesses, and again this time the bitch being removed immediately by the owner.

A friend of Kersal King has been so good as to say that the bitch was allowed to play with another dog after the second service to Kersal King and intimated at the same time that this dog might be the sire of the litter credited to Kersal King.

May I be allowed to state that for the second service the bitch would not stand for the dog, that even there was no risk in turning her loose with other dogs, as she was fast "getting off." But, above all, and foremost to help judging the accuracy of the statement of this "lover of the dog," it will be sufficient to mention the "other" dog's age, barely 7 months at the time and the size of my foot.

If you have not got the proper forms, write to Ottawa.

When forwarding applications for individual registrations, always give the date of birth. In many cases breeders fill in "litter registered." As there may be four or five litters on record out of the one bitch it is an impossibility to tell to which litter the dog being recorded belongs, unless the date of birth is given.

If you have a street address, fill it in on the application.

We received a long newsy letter from Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Weldon of Galt who are now over in England. Under and by virtue of the authority conferred upon me by the provisions of the order-in-Council of November 30, 1909, containing regulations relating to Animals Quarantine, I do hereby order that:—

All dogs imported from the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland must be accompanied by a certificate of an official approved by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries stating that the dog has come from a non-infected area, and that it has not been exposed to rabies infection.

If not accompanied by this certificate, landing will be absolutely prohibited.
