

The meeting then adjourned.


The Passing of a Great Airedale

International Champion King Nobblers Double. A great son of a great sire (Woodsworth Royalist, ex Miss Nobbler) has passed "West"

> "A Terrier from tip to tip was he, Still, a gentleman withal; Though an International Champion, He was a true and faithful pal."

International Champion King Nobblers Double is dead. He passed away in harness, winning 1st open winners, best pair, brace and trio at Montreal, May 24th. Swann was taking one of his long jumps to Louisville, Ky., to attend the Airedale Show there. Suspension Bridge, Buffalo, Cleveland and Cincinnati were stop-overs, where the handler saw to his charges and noted they were O.K. The last lap of the journey was the fatal one. Probably too tightly packed in the express car, and a lack of ventilation, as the post mortem examination held discloses suffocation.

This great Airedale was imported in January, 1915, and was Mr. Mackenzie's first important purchase.

His successes both sides of the line were phenomenal, and include winners and best Airedale, Canadian National Exhibition, 1915; best Airedale, 1916; winners, 1917; best pair and one of the winning team, 1918.

His owner could have sold the dog very many times. A syndicate of New York enthusiasts tried to purchase him so late as the spring of 1918, and less than two months ago Mr. Chas. Quetsehke, of Caswell Kennels, Toledo, Ohio, wrote for a price on the dog. But to all enquiries he was "not for sale,"

To the Airedale fancy particularly and the dog world in general the loss is almost an irreparable one. Apart from his show qualities, his success as a sire was phenomenal. Ch. Polam Maxim, Balloch Bellman, Narrowdale Nimrod being some of his progeny. In sympathizing with the owner we are reminded that the loss is not by any means a monetary one. Nobbler did not owe a cent eight months after purchase, and for more than a year his

earnings paid all show expenses, etc., of himself and his kennel mates.

But out Regina way there was only one Nobbler, and that was the wonderful King Nobbler's Double. A champion in Canada, a champion in America, a champion with all but one win short in England, and one of the pillars of Canadian dogdom which will be hard to replace.

In conclusion, Kennel and Bench readers will be pleased to learn that Mr. D. W. Wright has a litter by Ch. King Nobbler's Double, whilst Messrs. G. and G. E. Ward bred Ch. Rockley Paragon and her daughter both to him, and we understand they are both in whelp. Could it be possible that the Canadian Airedale fancy might see, arising from some of those matings, a replica of the great "King Nobblers Double."

MONTREAL KENNEL ASSOCIATION

The annual spring show of the Montreal Kennel Association, which took place in the Coliseum on May 23rd and 24th, proved to be a remarkable success.

There was an entry of nearly 400 dogs, which proves that this event has become one of Canada's popular fixtures, and the attendance of visitors was the largest ever seen at a Montreal show. A few of the reasons for the growing popularity of this event are "the dates," which come at a time when the weather is neither hot or cold; "the location," which is ideal, being spacious, well lighted and lots of air space; the clean and sanitary benching, the large judging rings, the popular judges, and a president at the head of affairs who has the confidence and respect of all.

The secretary, who is comparatively new to the mysteries of the game, received valuable assistance from a few of the old stand-by's and had things runnings fairly smoothly. Judging was delayed to such an extent that it was in the early hours of Sunday morning before the last special was handed out. The delay in supplying the judges with their books, the slackness in getting dogs into the rings and the system of using numbers, instead of names, in the catalogue are items, for future rectification.

Norman K. Swire judged Bulldogs, Collies, O. E. Sheepdogs and all Toys and Chas. H. Mason the remainder. Both these authorities are well known for their honesty in handing out awards without fear or favor, consequently their placing of the dogs are considered authentic.

The big breeds were none to plentiful. Fox Terriers were up to the usual high standard that this show is noted for; Airedales were plentiful and of good all-round quality; Bulldogs drew a large entry, and Boston Terriers turned out well. Pomeranians and Pekingese were extra good, both in numbers and quality.

Great interest was taken in the judging, especially when the general specials were being awarded. Hundreds of spectators crowded round the large ring to watch the judges arrive at their decisions. The handsome trophy for best dog or bitch in show was won by

the Wire Fox Terrier bitch, Ch. Lady Wireboy of Paignton. Reserve for that honor went to the Airedale, Int. Ch. Polam Maxim.

An entry of 38 dogs faced Mr. Mason, and there were only two absentees, and the average quality was well up to the best American shows. The open dog class of twelve was probably the best class of Wires that ever faced a judge in Canada. There was only one Canadian bred dog in this class, and it is worthy of note to comment on the fact that he drew a place. Mr. Mason did not please everybody with his placings, but he showed that he had his mind on a certain type and stuck to this type throughout, with but one exception, and the dogs that were placed were in most instances the real huntman's type of Terrier and looked able to follow a fox any place he could get. With the exception of the open bitch class winners, the bitches did not compare in quality with the dogs. Many of the leading home-bred bitches of 1918 have found new homes across the line, and the Montreal fanciers have not yet got as good in their places, and the classes suffered accordingly.

Mrs. Webster's well-known Ch. Lady Wireboy, of Paignton, went to the top in bitches and afterwards won for best in show, all breeds. Her owner also showed a very sweet daughter of Lady Wireboy's that gave her a close run for premier honors. This spicy lady is a little better in head than her dam, but has not yet got that wonderful body, but when she makes up in body we predict a career for her that will rival her dam's best success. Wiremaid of Malden, also well known, furnished the chief contention for premier honors. Sam Bamford's Walnut Enticement was second to Spicy Lady in the minor classes. She is a tan-headed hound-

stance would improve her. Vanguard Khaki, third junior and limit, is good in middle piece, but could be better at both ends. The rest of the bitches were just useful.

In open dogs, Sam Bamford's Ch. Micky's Model, shown in grand form. won with something to spare from Ridgway Dark Boy, a heavily marked son of Ch. Wireboy of Paignton, that has done considerable winning across the line, but was in poor shape and is rather mixed in coat. Malden Major HI, is a grand bodied little one with a rare coat, round front, extra good in ear and eye, and with a bit more face could trouble the best. Spicenut of Paignton, reserve open and second limit, also a rare coated one, rather plain in eye, and would not make the best of himself in the ring. Charlie Chaplin won junior dogs, and is a real good bodied dog, round front and extra good in legs and feet, a bit careless with his ears at times, good eye and expression, and a rare shower. Prides Hill Trenchman, second junior and third limit, has a rare head and neck, good eye and ears, sound jacket, but was evidently a bit over-sized for Mr. Mason, and is a little uncertain in his front. Abegweith Derby Bristles, first novice, third junior is a nice size, good ear and eye, good jacket, more than useful.

Nortrebor Zip, first puppy, a very nice little chap, and showed like a veteran: rather fine and could do with more substance throughout. Bordeaux Pat, second puppy, good coat but rather long east in body. Malden Cadet, third puppy, extra good in head, ear and eye, best legs and feet in the class, loses in hindquarters. Vickery Persimmon and Marvel Boy outclassed in open. The former has full light eye, long back, bad quarters. Marvel Boy no coat on the day. (Multum in Parvo.)

Class 2, Puppies, Dogs-Evergreen Marco, the winner, owns a splendid body, good bone and a tremendous skull. Would do with more substance and more width of underjaw. General Blake a pretty close second.

Class 4, Novice-King, the winner in this class, was a lucky dog, beating Overgreen Marco and General Blake,

Class 3, Junior Dogs-The winner, Lorne Leader, is a real nice type of dog, good bone, nice, short and low to ground, and exceptional in depth of brisket; good depth of foreface and width of underjaw; good big nose and nostrils. Might have been shown in better conditions; an easy winner over Overgreen Marco and General Blake.

Class 5, Open, Dogs under 45 lbs.-Two dogs only in this class. King, the winner in local novice, and the wellknown Alban Darkie. I could not quite follow the judge in placing King over Alban Darkie. Darkie is better bodied, boned, lower to ground, better movement and type throughout than the winner.

Class 11, Novice Bitches—Byrnhfryd Cinderella beating Lorne Lilly in shortness of body and lower to ground.

Class 12, Open Bitches under 40 lbs.

—Newington Patricia, the winner in this class, is a nice headed little bitch. I would prefer to see more bone to her. She was closely pressed in this class by Lowestoff Roxanna, a real nice bodied bitch, and shown in perfect condition. Brynhyfryd Cinderella III. would probably have been placed better if she had shown better.

Open Bitches, over 40 lbs.—The winner in this class, Strathtay Supreme, is a nice bitch all of an heap. Stamp Low and Cloddy, the best bodied bitch in the show; great depth of foreface and substance; given a little more width of underjaw and she would go some. Zaza Penfold, second, is longer in back and higher on the leg than the winner.

Classes 1 to 14, inclusive, confined to exhibitors residing within a radius of 25 miles of Montreal.

There are several dogs I would like to mention. Rockley Silent Witness, the winner in Canadian-bred dogs, is a massive type; could be improved in foreface. The Second Marquis of Ripon can make the best of them jump for type, but had an accident as a puppy, and carries one of his hind legs bad.

Failsworth White Kaffir is another useful type of lightweight, excelling in width and turnup of underjaw. Chinook Prince Albert is a little dog and liked very much. He seemed to be suffering from a cold or I believe he would have gone up better.

Tam Hin, winners' dogs, is a dog with a big, massive head, plenty of substance and cushion eyes well placed; big nose and good depth of foreface. Might have a little more bone, a little high on his legs, and a little too long; an easy winner.

In reviewing over the different dogs and bitches, Penfold Selected took my eye. Personally I think she was in hard luck. I thought she should have topped the lot in bitches.

Kersal White Gladiator was another dog with hard luck tacked over him. This dog was in one class only, and I thought his chances looked good. I could not follow the judge's opinion in this class.

Bulldog Specialty Show at Montreal.

Mrs. W. T. Drew, the first of American lady judges to appear at a specialty show in Canada, "came, saw and conquered." If any of the mere males had any idea of an effiminate milk and water decision, they very soon "went by the board." Mrs. Drew knows her Bulldog as few men know them, and whilst some of her decisions rankled a bit in the hearts of the "always wins," she made a point of telling any exhibitor who thought their dog was "hardly done by."

Just please wait till I'm finished judging and I'll tell you just why I did it. I admit I may be wrong, but, as the Yankee said about the Lord's prayer, which his old mother told him to hang above his bed and repeat every night, but which after a while got a bit monotonous, used to point to the prayer and say, Good Lord I'm too tired to go over the whole show tonight, but believe me good Lord. "Them's my sentiments." Such was Mrs. Drew. She had the courage of her convictions and was not afraid to show them, and she left us with a happy memory and a feeling of "I wish there were more like her." The gate was unfortunately spoiled by the worst day of rain we have had this year, but even that did not damp the spirits of the "boys of the Bulldog breed" and interest was maintained till the last special was awarded. S. Almon captured winners dogs with Tam Hin, and Tuson got opposite sex with Penfold Selected, two popular decisions, which were well received by the ringsiders. A. Chisholm cut a big swathe in the prize list with his exhibits, his young dog, Lorne Leader, winning everything he asked for, including specials. A lot of new faces and exhibits were to be seen around, and everything seems rosy for the success of the club. The officials worked like trojans, and the new benches were the subject of favorable comment from the "old uns." Superintendent Silver had everything in apple pie order, as per usual, and too much praise cannot be given to Ring Steward Andrews. It was his initial effort in that capacity, but believe us Montreal will not have far to look for a show pilot while he is around. He was here, there and everywhere, and the success of the show is largely due to his efforts.

BRANTFORD.

Again a Good Dog Town.

Brantford, an old Ontario city, that used to be a well-known landmark in the affairs of Canadian dogdom, having taken unto itself a new and vigorous lease of life, heralded the fact far and near through the medium of its newly reorganized kennel club, known and registered as the Telephone City Kennel Club, by holding a show for all breeds at the garage of the president, J. Minshall, when over 100 dogs were benched under ideal conditions. Judge for the day was "Bob" Scott Wilson, of Oakville, who had a hard day's work getting the dogs placed where they belonged. Specials were arranged, so that every breed was provided for.

The executive were a well organized, enthusiastic bunch of fellows whose only interest seemed to be in the satisfaction of the "other fellow." This may be better illustrated when we record here the fact that after the judging was over the entire membership repaired to the hotel, where plates were found to be set for one and all.

"Bob" Wilson had the chair of honor, and a real good "after-dinner" chairman Bob made, and entertained his auditors to Robert Service's "The Volunteer," which was received with great enthusiasm. We understand the Lieut.Col. has decided to have engraved on this trophy the celebrated international winner, Int. Ch. King Nobblers Double. This is encouraging the Airedale fancy in a practical way.

The English Bulldog Club of Montreal has climbed their membership ladder to the 63 rung and steadily getting higher. This is O.K. for a specialty

Norman K. Swires' Criticisms of the Breeds He Judged at Montreal.

Bulldogs.—Much interest surrounded the judging of this variety, as many of the exhibits had met at the Specialty Show the day before, and quite a few imported dogs were up for competition, along with the home-breds. On referring to my book I found an entry of 65. This number, coupled with the all-round quality of the exhibits, is ample proof of the popularity of the Bulldog in Montreal.

Commencing with puppy dogs, I placed a promising youngster named General Blake at the head of a large class. He possesses a big skull, with wellplaced eyes and ears, short body, good rib and nice bone; lacks a little in face finish. Second to him was Lord Darkie, an attractive, red-pied dog possessing many good qualities, but loses to winner in hindquarters and movement. Kersal White Gladiator, who headed the junior class, was the most typical of the juveniles, having a well finished head-piece, nice shoulder formation, and short, well-ribbed body, with the desired roach; could do with more bone, and should like to see him use his ears to better advantage Chinook Prince Albert headed the open lightweights. He is a white-pied dog with a wonderful well finished head, low to ground, and good bone for his size. On the day he failed a little in spring of rib. Second to him was Failsworth White Kaffir, a compact and well balanced white-pied dog, fails to winner in facfinish and lowness to ground. Next in order came Failsworth Dark Duke, a dark brindle. On the day he lost to the above-mentioned dogs in condition and movement. In Limit Heavyweights I picked out Tam Hin as being best. He is a flashy-marked pied dog, with a marvellous head, good width and depth of foreface, with underjaw to match, deep stop, excellent furrow, perfect eye and ear placement, and a big, flat skull, behind a good pair of should ers; he has a nice spring of rib; with better hindquarters and lower to ground he would be hard to fault. Second to him was Rockley Silent Witness, a massive, sound dog with few outstanding faults, but lacking in finish. In the open class, King Moston went over Tam Hin, being better balanced all over, lower to ground, shorter and better shaped body, and moved well. Winners dogs, King Maston. Reserve, Chinook Prince Albert. The winner of the local class was Marquis of Ripon, a dog with many outstanding qualities, an injury to his hindquarters being the only thing that prevents him going to the top.

The juvenile classes in the bitch section were also well filled. Toll Bar Peggy, the winner of the big novice class, is a nice, compact and sound little bitch; her litter sister, who is very similar in type, also carried off the blue ribbon in the junior class. Second to this pair in both classes was a very useful one named St. Lambert's White Duchess. The winner of the limit lightweights was Strathtay Supreme, a low, cloddy fawn with well finished headpiece and lots of bone. The open class provided keen competition. Penfold Selected went to the top She possesses a grand head with well-placed eyes and ears, good shoulder formation, well sprung ribs, deep brisket, lot of bone and sound. Ch. Hefty Mischief, who occupied second place, is a typical one, shorter in body than the winner, but loses in face finish, substance and soundness. Next in order came Strathtay Supreme. Winners, bitches, Penfold Selected. Reserve, Ch. Hefty Mis-

French Bulldogs turned out to the tune of 17 entries, amongst the contestants being a few very promising youngsters. Winners dogs went to Tango Tipperary, a cobby-built dog with a typical head, and shown in tip-top form. Reserve winners went to L'Anglemont Bijou, a good all-round specimen, but loses to winner in head and soundness. Bitches were not so plentiful nor of the quality of the dogs. The winner, Doucelli, has a good head with well carried ears, nice body, legs and feet. Reserve went to Paris Pride, a cobbybuilt, sound bitch, a little plain in face and faulty tail.

Collies were only a fair bunch. Sir Bruce, who headed the puppy and junior classes, is a sable and white with a long, lean head of good quality; needs time to fill out in body and improve in coat; will be heard from again

when ready. The best in the dog section was Verdun Ballantyne, who ran through from novice to winners. He is a well balanced dog, nice head, good legs and feet, shapely body, and is carrying a good coat. At times he is inclined to carry his tail a little gay. Second to him in the limit was Ormskisk Squire, a typical dog but loses to winner in size, bone and condition. Prince Rupert, the second in the open class, is a nice size with good coat and fair all-round quality. Winners dogs, Verdun Ballantyne. Reserve, Prince Rupert.

Bitches were poor, the only outstanding one being Quarrybrae Colleen, who went to winners with ease, her nearest rivals being Verdun Sally and Campbell Stylish.

One lone exhibit was the only representative in the O. E. Sheepdog section, Sonora Billy by name. He is a well-built, sound dog with good bone and a coat of the right color and texture; a nice mover and could hold his own in good company.

Toys.—Japanese Spaniels came first. One lone specimen was all this variety could muster. The quality of same did not warrant me handing out a winners' ribbon.

Toy Poodles were few in numbers. Buster Wiggins was put down fit, and easily accounted for winners. The best specimen in this variety was the winning bitch, Lady Chrysanthemum, a small, typical mite, and when in better coat will be hard to fault.

English Toy Spaniels.—The only exhibit in the dog section was Vernon Castle, a King Charles with nice coat and color, but not of sufficient merit to obtain a winners' ribbon. The winners bitch, Wangza Mignetta, is a real nice Blenheim, short face, good skull, with well placed eyes and ears, cobby body and well broken in color.

One moderate Toy Terrier was the only exhibit in that section.

Belgian Griffons.—There were a few nice specimens of this variety. Ki Ki Boy, the winners' dog, is a typical little fellow with nice conformation and a good coat of the right color and texture Queen Elizabeth headed the bitch classes. She has a fair head, nice body,

legs and feet, and possesses a good harsh coat of the right color. Second to her was Mirza, who scores over the winner in head, but her coat was short and inclined to be fluffy. Norine was third. Her indifferent ring manners spoiled her chances.

Pekingese had 35 entries and brought together a real nice collection. Several of the young "hopefuls" show great promise and will be heard from again. The limit and open classes in the dog section were particularly strong. A biscuit-colored one named San Toy of Louvain, headed the limit. He is nice size and carries a good coat, possesses a good head with flat skull and well placed eyes and ears; a correct front with nice bone and shapely body. Second to him was Walnut Wei, a good-headed dog with nice face finish and nicely balanced all over. He loses to winner in coat and front. Next came Osborne Admiral, who fails to the above in head and conformation. In the open class I placed Ch. Priorwood Pagan over the above-mentioned dog. He is a parti-colored dog with exceptional quality, deep, broad muzzle, big flat skull, and ears nicely placed, a slight blemish on one eye being the only drawback to me describing him as a perfect headed dog. His body, bone and coat being all that can be desired. In the Canadian-bred class the first and second were a repeat of the open. Third fell to Heathen Chinee, a nice colored dog with a good coat, but loses to winners in body and face finish. Winners, dogs, Ch Priorwood Pagan. Reserve, San Toy of Louvain.

The classes for females were just as well filled as the males, and the allround quality was very noticeable, San San being the choice of the youngsters, and will do some winning when matured. Limit class was an easy thing for Yum Yum. She is a beautiful balanced little thing, typical head, nice bone, shapely body, profuse coat with good feathering, and was put down in excellent condition. Next in order in the limit class came Priorwood Pansy, a wonderful headed bitch, deep square muzzle, large lustrous eyes, large flat skull and ears correctly placed. She is a shade long in body, and could be improved in coat and condition, the latter defects being due to recent maternity duties. The third in this class was plain in face and showing age. The only new face in the open class was Tito of Munday, a nice, useful one,

whom I placed second and reserve winners to Yum Yum,

Yorkshire Terriers were few in numbers, but the quality was there. Ch. Haslingden Mons being easily the best in the dog section, followed by his kennel-mate, Haslingden Jack O Boy. The former is a compact little terrier, full of type and sound. At present he is a little short of coat, but what he has is of the right color and texture. Jack O Boy, the reserve winner, carries a nice coat, but loses to winner in conformation and soundness. The winners bitch, Maise, is a typical little mite with nice head, short, level back, and a good coat; the color of same, however, left much to be desired.

Pomeranians-With over 80 entries. was easily the best section amongst the Toys, and showed a marked improvement over previous shows in all-round quality and quantity. The winners dog, Cheeky Wee Victor, was put down to perfection. He is a compact little fellow nicely balanced all over, carries a perfect coat which is pleasing in color and of the right texture. The reserve winner was Jumbo, a wolf-shaped sable of nice quality, losing to winner in head and coat. Stormlight of Dara, who lauded third open, is another typical shaded sable with nice coat. The classes for the opposite sex were all well filled and furnished keen competition. My choice for winners was a dainty little shaded sable named Somme Tiny. She has a fair head, fine bone and a short, compact body covered with abundance of coat. Reserve winners was a lititle black mite named Pomona Baby Rose. exceptionally small, with fine bone, short back and good color; with a little more coat she can do a lot of winning. There were several very promising youngsters in this section that I should like to have commented upon, but at the time of writing I cannot remember their names.

Vimy gave a good account of himself at the recent show in Vancouver, getting winners dogs and winning the challenge cup for best of the breed. The first, second and third puppy bitches in a class of eight were sired by Vimy, as were also the best novice bitch, second limit bitch and second open bitch. He is also the sire of Humberstone Cheer-up, the sensational wire owned by Mr. Acherman, of San Francisco.

A recent addition to the fancy in the West is Mr. and Mrs. Blackwell, late of Toronto. They have at the present time a nice kennel of Poms, but if Dame Rumor is to be believed, we shall see them interested in one of the larger breeds before long. Mr. Blackwell has just built some new up to date kennels and is well equipped to look after his canine pals. The outstanding dog in his kennels at the present is the well-known Pom., Ch. Charm of Beauty. He also received from the East last week a beautiful orange stud dog and a nice little black bitch.

We are sorry to hear of the death of a good wire-haired Fox Terrier puppy owned by Mrs. McConnell, proprietrix of the Madrona Kennels of Victoria. This puppy promised to surpass in excellence Madrona Record, a wire too well known to need comment. He met his death through falling over the cliffs.

If there is any better breeding than this we would like to hear of it. Mac absolutely refuses to part with one of them, although some tempting offers have been thrown at him. Here's hoping he will have more than one champion in the litter.

We expect to see another wirehaired Fox Terrier in the kennels of Mrs. Thornton Sharp next week. This isWatteau War Cry, litter brother of Watteau Warrior, the dog that is siring so many winners in England. This dog comes from Mr. Reay, of the Briergate Kennels, and should make competition still keener in one of the most popular breeds we have in B. C.

Another good one gone "west." Mr. Y. P. Milner, of the Point Grey Kennels, Kerrisdale, reports the death of his wire bitch, Lyncote Hindu. She was showing heavy in whelp to Vimy Ridge, and as this was the mating that produced the famous Humberstone Cheer-up, her litter was being looked forward to eagerly in the hope of another "Cheer-up."

J. J. Jackson, of Edmonds, B.C., reports business quite brisk. He recently sold four English Bull puppies by his dog Failsworth White Count. He also sold a nice Boston Terrier puppy by Ch. Chums Model, and a lovely wolf sable Pomeranian puppy bitch. Fails worth White Count has been in great demand at stud, having been recently mated to seven bitches. F. W. Count is the sire of Croppers Hill Duke, who has done so much winning in England, also Failsworth Dark Duke, who recently won special for best of the breed at the Bulldog Specialty Show held in Montreal. He is also sire of that sensational winning bitch, Burnaby White Countess, who went from puppy to winners and won seven special at seven and a half months of age, under Judge Geo. Ward, of Toronto, at the May show held in Vancouver.

We are glad to welcome a new Airedale stud dog to the coast. This is Connaught Gassoon, owned by the Connaught Kennels, of San Francisco. We understand that this dog will make a lengthy stay in B. C. Since coming here he has been bred to several bitches, some of these showing in whelp to him being Ch. Killarney Tittle Tattle, Killarney Pandora, and Miss Nancy. The judges list has been prepared and given to Kennel and Bench for the information of the fancy, and it is gratifying to notice that only the best men obtainable have been retained. With a view to ensuring comfort and complete satisfaction in judging, five have been selected, and the task balanced.

Several new features will be placed at the disposal of exhibitors, amongst them may be cited, the puppy, variety class for dogs and bitches of any breed; the stud dog, open to all breeds; for the best stud dog shown, with two of his get, which must be entered in their breed class, but not necessarily be the property of the owner of the stud dog. The brood bitch class, conditions similar to above.

The Canadian National Exhibition have donated a trophy for the best Canadian-bred dog or bitch. The competition for the special will no doubt prove itself one of the tid bits of the big show.

Sealyham Terriers and Chow Chows have been granted a classification in keeping with their ever-growing popularity.

Post Mortem Examinations-

Carcases for examination MUST be sent prepaid to Dr. J. A. Campbell, 8 Edward St., Toronto. A fee of \$2.00 MUST accompany the carcase in all cases, or else it will be destroyed without examination.

Questions must be brief. In every case breed, sex, age and conditions observed should be given; proper name and address must be given (not for publication), also nom de plume over which he wishes questions answered.

Lover of Dogs:

Answer—Your "Pom." evidently had a fit—due to the excessive heat and excitement. Applying cold water to the head will often relieve an attack.

Stratheare:

Q.—One of my collies, a dog just over four years, breaks out in sores on the top of the back. He has a very heavy coat and does a great deal of scratching. Last summer he was the same.

Answer.—Feed lightly; avoid meat. Brush coat every day, as he may have a lot of dead hair. Give half a teaspoon of Epsom salts in a wine glass of warm water in the morning for a week and dust boracic acid on the sore places. See that his kennel is kept cool.

Kitsalano:

Q.—I have an English Setter puppy five and a half months old which about four weeks ago injured its left hind leg. I do not know how it happened. It was in great pain and unable to use the leg. I came to the conclusion that the trouble was a bad sprain of the hip and have been rubbing it with a liniment. The leg is not so painful now, but it has wasted and he is afraid to put any weight on it. Is there any treatment, and will he be always lame.

Answer.—The injury was more serious than a sprain—it must have been a fracture or a dislocation. If it was the former, there is a good chance of the pup recovering the full use of the leg in the course of time—but a dislocation will have a certain amount of deformity and more or less lameness. No treatment is needed other than keeping the pup in good condition and allowing moderate exercise. If the lameness does not disappear in two or three months from the time the injury occurred, your pup will always have a limp.

Huntsman, Winnipeg:

Q.—My hound dog, five years old, is troubled with sore feet, the pads are constantly eracking and the feet are very tender, and causes the dog to walk lame.

A.—Rub well into the pads night and morning some borate of glycerine. The loose horn should be removed with scissors. Give the dog cooling medicine, from three to twenty grains of sulphate of magnesia, also from two to ten grains of bicarbonate of potash twice a day with the food. Exercise the dog for a time on grass.

G. D., Vancouver:

Q.—I have a Cocker Spaniel female whose skin and hair is getting very dry, and a lot of dandruff or scales seems to be mixed with the hair. Can you suggest anything to remedy this condition.

A.—As a rule a thorough wash once a week, using tar soap and putting a little borax in the rinsing water, with daily brushing of the coat, will effect a cure in mild cases; but in bad cases greasing the dog all over with some such preparation as the following is necessary:

Oil of Tar 1 drachm. Almond Oil ½ pint.

Mix.

To be thoroughly worked into the skin twice a week, and after a few days washed off, using the soap mentioned. A course of arsenic is useful. Give from one to eight drops in water twice a day for two or three weeks, but it must be discontinued if it causes sickness or diarrhoea.

Same owner's prize-winning bitch, "Preparedness" (dam of "Ch, Beau Bel Scrapper," will shortly be sent on a visit to Lt.-Col. Pellat's "Morning Commander," and calculations are expecting something exceptional to materialize from this mating. Mr. Underbakke is importing a bitch from Lower California. She comes from real hunting stock of the large type, some of her progenitors weighing from 70 to 100 lbs., and of the Elange Monarch strain. Business is good, having more orders than can be

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
