ENGLISH KENNEL CLUB DOG SHOW AT OLYMPIA

Has Been Abandoned.

The English Kennel Gazette just received makes the announcement in its editorial columns that their intended Show, fixed to take place next December, has been abandoned. The following will explain why.

It is with very great regret that the Committee of the Kennel Club have to announce the abandonment of the Kennel Club Show, fixed to take place at Olympia in December next. The management of Olympia have applications for the use of the building on the date fixed for the Club's Show, and consequently, quite justly, in view of the Muzzling Orders of the Board of Agriculture, which are not calculated to speedily stamp out rabies, require the Kennel Club to decide whether the show will take place or not. In consequence of the uncertainty that exists as to the probability of the Muzzling Order being rescinded in time to allow for the completion of the arrangements and to hold the Show, the Committee have been placed in a grave dilemma, and, after very serious consideration have most regretfully deeided that they have no alternative course open to them but to abandon the Show for the present year.

What may be considered somewhat of a coincidence is the fact that Geo. Kynoch's good young Airedale Silver Illuminator, who did so well at Detroit and Chicago, also won well at this fixture.

LONDON NOTES.

Vincent G. Perry of London, Ont., reports that he recently purchased the very fine young Boston Terrier, Sweet William, from Mrs. W. C. Ingram, Ingomar Kennels, Toronto. Sweet William, still a puppy, is considered the best son of the famous Ch. Ingram's Little Man. At a recent Toronto show he won his puppy class.

Mrs. Ingram had planned to keep Sweet William as a kennel and ringmate for her Champion Sweet Clover, as they make an ideal pair, but a tempting offer from Mr. Perry resulted in the sale.

"Globe," Some Jane, the best daughter to date of Ch. Sweet Clover, sired by the noted Buffalo dog, Brennan's Mixture, and also bred by Mrs. Ingram, was added to Mr. Perry's kennels last winter. Already she has done some winning in Toronto and London.

A promising show future is looked for from this pair of fine young Bostons. Sweet William will be registered with the ''Globe'' prefix.

OUR LONDON LETTER.

It is our desire that every reader of "Kennel and Bench" who is interested in English and European dog affairs, will read our London letter this month.

While dog shows and, consequently, dog breeding in England . . . but, before I go on I must make mention of concessions granted to bitches visiting stud dogs in rabies-scheduled areas. When representatives of the Kennel Club of England had an interview with the President of the Board of Agriculture on the muzzling question brought about by the outbreak of rabies, they very strongly pointed out the hardships which the regulations of the above board inflicted upon the breeders of pedigree dogs in requiring that bitches from a non-scheduled area, visiting stud dogs of scheduled areas, should after the stud visit be consigned to a six months' quarantine. The Kennel Club's representatives, following the example of our very influential contemporary, "Our Dogs," pointed out the absurdity of the above quite unnecessary precaution in the case of bitches secured and consigned in dog boxes, both on the outward and return journey which, therefore, precluded all possibility of contact with the outside dogs. The Board of Agriculture has promised to consider this question.

According to "Our Dogs," always well and accurately informed, the above board have now made a concession in the matter, and will issue licenses for such movement of bitches on the following conditions.

1. The arrival of the bitch at the premises of the stud dog is at once notified to the board.

2. The bitch is detained at the premises of the stud dog, and is not there allowed to come into contact with any dog other than the stud dog which serves her, and 3, The owner of the stud dog makes and furnishes to the board a declaration to the above effect.

"Our Dogs" continues: "The concession of the Board of Agriculture, tardy though it is, will, we feel sure, be welcomed as a real one to a sorely tried kennel community. Had it come four months earlier, it would have been all the more valuable. Nothing appears to have been done in the case of bitches in a scheduled area returning from visits to dogs in a non-scheduled area, but possibly the concession cuts both ways."

But to return to the real purpose of this "Letter." While dog shows and, consequently, dog-breeding in England are suffering under the rabies, restrictions order, while our doggy communities and private doggy people are convening meetings to move the Board of Agriculture to the imposition of a general muzzling order, i.e., to the abolition of scheduled and non-scheduled areas, it appears that dog showing goes along merrily in several countries of the Continent of Europe, and last but not least in those which have been very sorely tried by the last great war.

There is no necessity for me to speak about Holland, for even during the war this country held dog shows. I believe that, during the terrible worldconflagration, they were importing good dogs from England, and therefore they must now possess some good material to "go on with.' The Dutch are clever business people, and fine connoisseurs of dogs. Their dog shows, which I frequently visited before the war, were always well organized, mostly on the example of the English dog shows, and for the English breeds they usually have English judges, which, of course, is as it ought to be.

Let us begin with Belgium. Everybody knows how terribly that country suffered during the war and during the German occupation. It will, therefore, be easily conceived with what delight our Belgian doggy friends betook themselves to the first great show after the war, which took place at Brussels, on the 8th and 9th of June last. Organized by the Societe Royale St. Hubert, the Kennel Club of Belgium, it was a great success. The only pity is that it had to take place at the Palais du Midi, a very small hall in comparison with the Palais du Cinquantenaire, which was always the venue of great dog shows before the war, in Brussels. There were about 300 dogs, but on account of the smallness of the hall, many more, about 200, entries had to be refused. I think, however, that it was not so much the show itself which was the chief attraction, but especially the possibility of meeting of old friends and doggy acquaintances, after about five years of cruel separation and inactivity. I understand that several more shows and field-trials are announced to take place in Belgium this year, and we, all of us, of course, heartily wish our friends every future success.

In August next France follows suit with a big dog show at Lille, the city which has so cruelly suffered during the German occupation. This will be an inter-allied dog show, and will take place at the Palais Rameau, which is full of joyful remembrances by all those who used to visit Lille's dog shows in pre-war days. Some fieldtrials have already taken place in France, and some more, as well as some dog shows are announced for this year. Our French friends are now working very earnestly towards the recuperation of dog breeding, and it is to be expected that the commercial doggy relations between France and England will take great extensions in the very near future.

The doggy fancy in Spain is going ahead very strongly, under the aegis of the Spanish Kennel Club, affiliated to our own Kennel Club. They had a great show in Madrid, from the 8th till the 19th of May last, with great success. To all those who grumble, even at three days' shows, it would no doubt appear strange how exhibitors and, especially their dogs, can stand the strain of an 11 days' show. But the matter is not as terrible as it would appear on the surface. It should be known that the shows in Madrid provide for the dogs to be benched and penned from five till halfpast seven every afternoon only. The shows take place in the most beautiful park of Madrid, which I know well, having visited the Spanish Kennel Club's first dog show, eight years ago. Our Spanish friends are excellent show managers, but the palm in this respect undoubtedly belongs to the chief members of the committee, Count de Lerida, Colonel Javier de Beranger, and Captain Cesar Martinez.

Italy is also forging ahead with regard to doggy matters. Quite recently they held successful field-trials and dog shows, and more of both are announced to take place this year. The best of the recent shows was the one of Genoa, on the 7th and 8th of June last, organized by the Club Sant' Uberto d'Italia, where about 300 dogs

met together. Our Italian contemporary, "I Cacciatore Italiano," does a great deal towards the development of the doggy sport in Italy.

As your readers no doubt know already, our Kennel Club had to abandon their great show, which was to take place at Olympia, London, on the 7th, 8th and 9th of December next. The reason is that the management of Olympia have applications for the use of the building on the date fixed for the Club's Show, and, on account of the uncertainty as to whether the rabies restriction orders would be rescinded in time, our Kennel Club could not, of course, give the above management any definite answer. And so, for the fifth time since the outbreak of the war, if I do not mistake, this, our most important dog show, had to be abandoned. We can, therefore, easily conceive with what feelings this announcement was made in the June issue of the "Kennel Gazette," so ably conducted by the very courteous Secretary of the Kennel Club, Mr. E. W. Jaquet.

AIREDALE SAVES MISTRESS' LIFE

Here is a story of an Airedale terrier that saved his mistress' life and killed a trained German police dog rather than share his quarters with him.

Two years ago Fred C. Havens of New Brunswick, N.J., sold a pair of Airedale terrier puppies to a Lieutenant in the U. S. Navy, who was later called to Washington for the duration of the war. He took one of the terriers to the Capital with him for a companion and gave the other to a superintendent of one of the large penitentiaries.

The "super's" family fell in love with the dog and the lady of the house was particularly fond of the terrier and he of her. Later she became ill and when in a convalescent stage the doctors said: "Plenty of out-door exercise, and particularly walking, would be the only things that would save her life."

She was gradually sinking day after day, but her husband and the physicians could not get her out of doors for the prescribed exercise and walks.

One day the Airedale disappeared from home, and after he had been gone several hours his mistress, although in an extremely weakened condition, went in search of him. She roamed the streets of the neighborhood until dark, without success.

Day after day she faithfully walked the streets of the large city where she lived in search of her pet. She came home each night tired out from her long tramps, but without getting any clue to the whereabouts of the Airedale. Three weeks passed and although she searched faithfully ,no trace was found of her dog, but she rapidly regained her health.

Her husband having proved to his own satisfaction that the doctors had prescribed the right treatment, could keep his secret no longer. He admitted to his wife that he had stolen the dog and taken him to the penitentiary. While an inmate of the prison, the dog was one of the most closely guarded prisoners, as a human life depended on his not being allowed to escape.

The Airedale slept in a cell while at the prison. One night when the place was unusualy crowded one of the German police dogs (Doberman Pinschers) several of which were kept on the grounds for guards, was put in the cell with the Airedale. Next morning his master found a proud Airedale and a dead German police dog.

There were 47 Airedales entered, and many a good one was asked to take a back seat to this new Canadian bitch. Mr. Joseph Perkins had the honor of piloting "Arlette" to her first American victory. Mr. Bain and family are summering at Port Carling, Ont., but will be in Toronto to see their new dog battle for further honors at the big Fair.

W. C. Macay, the live secretary of S. J. K. Club, don't say much, but keeps sawing wood, and there are whisperings of a few Airedale puppies at Mac's kennel that will be heard from soon. The same owner's stud dog, Rockley Laddie, is considered one of the best producers in the Atlantic Provinces.

Several of the members of the St. John Club intend to be in Toronto for the "big show" on Sept. 1st.

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

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
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


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
