MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB.

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors was held at the offices of the Club, 774½ Yonge Street, Toronto, on Thursday evening, November 20th.

The President, who has been under the weather for some considerable time, intended to be present, but at the last moment was obliged to telephone his inability to attend. On receipt of this message the Second Vice-President, Fred W. Jacobi, was called to the chair.

Before leaving Toronto, Mr. Bamford demonstrated that he could sell, as well as he could buy, and as quickly. His favorite Wire Fox Terrier, Ch. Micky's Model, was shipped to Harry Selby's Briarcliffe Kennels at Regina, and we have not by any means heard the last of "Micky's Model."

What with wars, muzzling orders, rabies epidemics, railway strikes, Board of Agriculture regulations, and more railway strikes, etc., "Charlie" is off. A WELL MERITED RECOGNITION OF THE ABILITIES OF OUR LEADING ALL-ROUND JUDGE, Mr. N. K. SWIRE OF TORONTO.

That old saying, "a prophet is not recognized in his own country," was exploded thoroughly when in the unfortunate absence of Alex. H. Stewart, of Chicago, the Toronto Kennel Club unanimously appointed N. K. S. to judge the whole show at the Exhibition Grounds, Nov. 11th to 13th. The Show passed off well; the discontented exhibitors, like the poor, are always with us; on this occasion they were reduced to a minimum.

However, this is not what we started out to say. Doubtless the report of the above Show will take care of all details. What we wish to emphasize as an item of news, is that the Pomeranian Club of America have selected Mr. Swire to judge their Annual Specialty Show in New York City on January 28th, 1920.

Following closely on this appointment, we hear that Mr. Swire will probably judge some of the breeds at the Westminster Kennel Club Show, Madison Square Gardens, N.Y. Both committees are to be congratulated on their choice. We have known Norman for many years as a breeder, exhibitor and judge, and we may be pardoned for saying the Shows in question will have no regrets.

The three qualifications necessary in a judge, to our mind, are: First, To know the breeds on which he passes the rule. Second, An ability to draw comparisons. Third, Honesty in the discharge of his duties. Norman K. Swire is one of the few with the three "Yes" answers to the above.

Toronto Kennel Club's First Annual Fall Show.

The first annual Fall Show of Toronto Kennel Club was held at the Dog Show Building, Exhibition Grounds, Toronto, Nov. 11, 12 and 13. The judges selected were Messrs. Alex. Stewart, Chicago, and Norman K. Swire, Toronto, and that old dog show, "Evergreen" Lance Farewell, Toronto. Mr. Stewart, owing to sickness at home, was unavoidably an absentee, and it fell to Mr. Swire to don the official "ermine" for all breeds except Spaniels, a task that he carried through admirably and in good time.

There were over 250 dogs entered, with very few absentees, leaving a comfortable margin for a 2-point rating.

The Show was honored by a visit from the Governor-General, who expressed himself greatly pleased with the extraordinary quality and variety of the dogs benched.

Montreal again showed their usual interest by sending all their representative dogs, and of course won a large share of the Show honors.

It is worthy of note that the largest entry of small dogs, particularly Pekingese and Pomeranians, ever benched in Canada, were entered at this fixture. The Show was considered a success, as Shows go, but it was clearly demonstrated that the Exhibition Dog Show Building is not suited to Canine Shows, when the temperature begins to show the low figures of the barometer. We have been promised an official critique of the breeds judged, by the judges themselves, which we hope to submit in our January issue.

Fort Garry Kennel Club Dog Show.

Dr. C. A. White, Chicago, was the judge selected, and it is generally conceded that he more than justified his selection.

Alex. MacKidd, the club and show secretary, obviously had everything in hand and on time, and deservedly shared largely in the praise—that commodity so seldom heard at a dog show—that was so generously spoken by winner and loser alike.

Two hundred and sixty-two dogs benched in a building offering every convenience and comfort was an inspiring sight, and the "audience" were on hand all the time, amongst them most of the old-timers of Western dogdom, and harmony was a strong factor in this fixture, a fact which has been often referred to by those privileged to attend. Seven hundred and four entries were made, which was above the average and showed that the members of the club had all been working for the good of the show.

Collies themselves made one hundred and twenty entries, a feat that proves the existence of the live specialty club recently organized in the interests of this aristocratic breed, and the tireless exertions of its secretary, Hugh Leslie.

W. R. Wardle's recent importation, Ch. Heatherbelle Bradnor Chief, was returned the best of his breed, also the best dog in the show. Both Leslie and Wardle have been "over there" and "done a good job," and no one doubts their ability to "carry on" here. Well done boys, say I.

Airedales, Bostons, Bulldogs (English) and Pomeranians were all big entries, while the entry of English Setters headed by the famous dogs belonging to Herb Clements of Regina, Ch. Mallwyd Rolland, Ch. Betty and Ch. Glenview Major, and reinforced with an entry of five made by George F. Ridge, made one of the attractions of the show and was considered worth going a long way to see.

The premium list came out a little

mite shy of attractions by way of specials, and probably kept the entries from overwhelming the management, but the catalogue would give one the impression that Winnipeg had been systematically combed by a "small tooth" comb and the result was plenty for everybody and some to spare.

Winnipeg can easily stand a spring show and a fall show, and we now await their next move with interest.—Ed.

OUR LONDON LETTER.

Judging from what I am able to pick up here and there, from the conversations with experienced breeders, it appears that a very strong movement is on foot in England to revive the great popularity which the Old English Mastiff, once, and not so very long ago, enjoyed in this country. Your readers are no doubt familiar with the majestic appearance of that breed, so that there is no need for me to go into its description. But what would undoubtedly interest them very much is a very fine notice that appeared in "Our Dogs" of the 31st October last. I will, therefore, quote this notice in extenso:

All breeders will agree that size in Mastiffs is an important quality, and it is one which has not been so apparent in Mastiffs of recent times as it was in specimens of the breed of former days. To suppose that it is the most important, and, in fact, the only point, as some seem to think, to be considered in the show ring is altogether a mistake. We have known an exhibitor being grievously disappointed because his dog, being the largest in the ring, but with few other good points, did not win, that he decided never again to show, and, as far as we are aware, he has adhered to his decision. To obtain size it is desirable that the parents of the expected litter should possess this quality, but this alone will not gain the object in view. Much depends upon how the puppies are reared, and especially so in the early days of their lives. If neglected at that period it will be difficult to make up for lost time later on. The puppy, as soon as weaned, should be fed several times during the course of the day on good, nourishing food, not too much at a time, and should be fed at regular intervals. The breeder will be well repaid for any trouble he may take in the early days of the puppy's life. It should not be allowed to get too heavy, in case the weight of the body may affect the puppy's legs. (Many years ago I advocated the same system in my articles on the rearing of Great Dane puppies, and I am glad to see that Mastiff breeders are of my opinion.—G.H.)

We have noticed that puppies of abnormal weights at from 9 to 12 months very frequently do not increase much in size or weight afterwards. A puppy

which is made up at that age does not as a rule grow into a large dog. We hold the opinion that the rage there was some years ago for short-faced Mastiffs had a deleterious effect on the size of Mastiffs from which they have not yet recovered. If short-headed dogs must be had, we must expect to find short bodies and legs.

We are having just now the full season of Retriever field-trials, which started with those of the Yorkshire Retriever Society, and finished with those of the Kennel Club, on the 11th of November. On the 28th of October, took place the trials of the Horsham and District Dog League, on the beautiful estate of the Arundel Castle, belonging to Her Grace, the Duchess of Norfolk. These horsham trials are absolutely of a local character, and are not admitted not only dogs that live outside the above district, but also those dogs which live inside the district, but which have gained notoriety at some public meetings. I think it was the late Mr. C. C. Eversfield, the founder of the Horsham League and one of our best-known Spanielmen, who had introduced such a "system," if I may call it thus, but he did out of self-abnegation surely, for never did he allow he Spaniels or Retrievers to run at the field trials organized by his above League.

As before the war, the principal winners at our Retriever trials are Labradors, and not Retrievers proper, and why? I think because the former are being bred solely for work, whereas the former are being bred for work and for show. Besides, many of the Retrievers are far too big, far too lumbering, so that their work is too slow. Labradors, on the contrary, are just the opposite.

Speaking about the local Retriever and Spaniel field trials, I think that the interest in them is ever on the increase, due no doubt to the fact that the Societies which further the interests of these trials do not like to draw entries of dogs from outside their localities, or, rather, districts. Thus, the visitors one sees at such local trials are mostly local people. As one of our finest connoisseurs of Gundogs once said:

"Local meetings draw the county people, and the open meetings attract the best dogs." And what does all this prove? Why, the first contention proves that the interest in local working dogs has been somewhat asleep up till now, and the second contention—that England possesses still some very good dogs in certain localities, which have not been enough admired by sportsmen.

Mr. Holland Buckley has at last been successful in having his Great Joint Terrier Show, on the 22nd October last, after same had been twice postponed: firstly, on account of the rabies restrictions order, and, secondly on account of our last great Railway strike. The show was a great, and well-deserved success, and all our congratulations are due to its organizer, Mr. Holland Buckley. I say "deserved," for one must not forget that the Board of Agriculture's restrictions included the muzzling of the dogs, the fencing of the front of the pens, and the despatch of every dog in the care of an official of the Show, etc. The best exhibits were the Wire Fox Terriers, followed closely by the Airedales, which is no surprising for our friend Buckley is an Airedale man par excellence. The judging of Bull-Terriers was rather a surprise, for the winner, Bing Boy, is a brindled Bull-Terrier, and "Our Dogs" is quite right in saying that "the incident of a brindled Bull-Terrier winning a championship in competition with whites is unique in the annals of the breed." Bing Boy is a typical Bull-Terrier, but too light in bone and too high on the leg. Irish Terriers were not very good, and the smooth Fox Terriers not so good as their wired cousins. The West Highland White Terriers and the Sealyhams were much better, especially the former.

Baltimore, Boston, Chicago, Cleveland, Columbus, Indianapolis, Islip, Philadelphia, Pittsburg, Plainsfield, Louisville, Ky., Toronto Exhibition and London. A glowing tribute to the consistent winning qualities of the dog. Afield he is a marvel, showing splendid speed, rare voice, and an exceptional nose, a combination so desirable in a "rabbit dog."

As a sire he produces his good qualities with a capital Q. His first litter of four producing the field Champions "Vanity's Bessy" "High Ace Luce" and "Shannon Vanity II". The second litter produced "Shannon Dexter" (now "Domino Dexter") and bred to Shannon Betty" he produced Ch. "Bandit" "Nipperts" Betty and etc. It is perfectly plain to the least observant that here then is a reliable Sire that can be depended upon to produce the stock required in kennel where Show and working Beagles are kept.

Fourteen inches in height, rich tan head, weavy black blanket. All in all a combination of all the good qualities possible to obtaining one dog. The importers are Doctors L. Gordon and J. Edwin Hagmeier of Kitchener, Ontario, and are well known in sporting circles, particularly so at Dog Shows and field trials. There can be no doubt but their recent importation Ch. "Shannon Bandit" will bring to their Kennel further fame and incidentally do

much good to the fancy generally. We wish them the best of luck.

TOYS AT OTTAWA.

(Specially reported by the Judge.)

Mrs. Wylie.

In forwarding my report of Toy Dog classes at Ottawa Show, held in connection with Central Canada Exhibition, it is perhaps pertinent to make a few general observations regarding the smooth working machinery which drives every department to the heights of efficiency. The courtesy extended to out-of-town exhibitors is characteristic of a system and not by any means a mere incident in a particular show, the cleanliness and order of its department are all factors which when found in such abundant profusion and combination must ensure for this kennel fixture a high place in the bench appointments of the year. The various classes in Toys were well filled and representative of the breeds.

Classes in Yorkshires were represented by those two superb specimens of Mr. John Kenyon's, in Champion Hashington Mons and Jack O' Boy, placed in order named. Miss Pearl Taylor's Queenie won 1st in Limit and Open Bitches; 2nd to E. S. Sherwood's Rags, both typical females, but not up to the quality of the Dogs.

Pomeranians, in quality, were probably the best collection from this point of view I have had the pleasure of judging at a Canadian fixture.

Either of the four dogs in the Open class could have won under ordinary competition.

The first prize went to Mrs. E. Brownlee's "Admiral Marco." Now we ought to say deceased. In my humble judgment he was a black mite of A1 quality, true to type, built on proportionate lines. His faults were few, and whilst I have heard him condemned because of an alleged unsoundness in legs, I have been unable to detect any unsoundness which would reasonably warrant such an assumption.

Second to "Bellevue Fortune," owned by Mr. G. Briggs (also since deceased, we regret to say). A truly typical Pomeranian, greatly improved since last I judged him. He excels in color and general conformation, and is perhaps built on stronger lines than number one.

"Storm Light of Dara" third, an orange-shaded sable, very short and cobby. He was unfortunate in meeting today so many good ones.

"Cheeky Wee Victor," Reserve, also

an orange-shaded sable of splendid type and coat. Not quite so free in action as those above him.

Bitches was won by Mr. R. Johnstone in his fine, well-known "Zetland Queen." She is probably the best black female we have on the bench to-day, and requires but a few points to win her championship.

Second went to W. L. Goodman's Pomono Baby Rose, at the moment completely out of coat.

Spaniel classes were supported by Alf. Smith with Ch. Celamo Ivanhoe and Ch. Queen Bess, and Miss M. L. Blais had a nice specimen of King Charles in "Totsie II."

Mrs. F. C. McLean won in Black and Tan Toy Terrier with "Ida B.," a nice type of Terrier.

Toy Poodles are numerically strong in the Capital City, and made a big entry.

CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB NOMINATION AND ELECTION.

SPECIAL NOTICE TO BREEDERS

We respectfully draw the attention of all breeders to the Rules of Entry to our Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book, especially to Rule I, Article O., which reads:

"Dogs bred in Canada provided their Sires and Dams, and Grand Sires and Grand Dams and Great Grand Sires and Great Grand Dams are animals of the same breed. This rule of Entry is to terminate, January 1st, 1920, and shall not be applied for the registration of dogs from recorded ancestry.

Register now and be in time.

Bloodhound Breeders' Association

Percy E. A. Bell, Regina, an enthusiastic fancier and breeder of Bloodhounds is extremely anxious that all interested in Bloodhounds should join the above named association, with a view to bringing this wonderful breed into popularity, and keeping its adherents together and interested.

Mr. Bell has allocated 25 acres of his farm to be used solely in raising Bloodhounds and is ready to exert his influence for the good of the breed. Following are the Constitution and By-laws; read them over carefully, then write to Mr. Bell for the particulars if necessary.

Constitution.

Article 1. This organization shall be known as the Canadian Bloodhound Breeders' Association.

Article 2. Its objects shall be the advancement in very legitimate way possible of the welfare of the pure-bred Bloodhounds; to guard the interests and owners of same; to provide for the dissemination of knowledge of every kind of Bloodhounds, and to conduct shows, field trials and thus give Bloodhounds a finer and larger opening in the Canadian Dog Shows.

Article 3. Those eligible to membership in this organization shall be breeders, ex-breeders and owners of Bloodhounds, be it so they are not alien enemies by birth.

Article 4. Sec. 2. The officers of this Association shall be President, Vice-President, and Secretary-Treasurer, who shall hold office for one year, or until their successors are elected.

Sec. 2. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Association and shall be Chairman, Ex-Officio, of all standing committees.

Sec. 3. The Secretary shall keep complete records of this Association and shall have full charge of the correspondence. On the election of a new member he shall send him a written notice of his election and shall furnish him with a printed copy of the constitution and by-laws of this Association, and request him to pay his annual fees. He shall keep a roll of members and addresses.

Sec. 4. The Treasurer shall collect and receive all moneys due or belonging to the Association and receipt therefor. He shall deposit the same in a chartered bank in the name of this

Association and notify the Secretary and President. His books shall be open at all times for inspection of the members of this Association. He shall render a written report of the Secretary every three months of all money received and expended during that term.

Article 5. The dues of this Association shall be \$3.00 per annum, payable every six months in \$1.50 instalments.

Notice shall be mailed to each member when his annual dues are payable and should such dues remain unpaid three months after notices have been mailed, he ceases to become a member of this Association, except in case of absence and financial difficulties incurred through illness.

Article 6. All resignations must be made in writing and addressed to the Secretary of this Association, and no member can resign while he is in debt to the club.

Article 7. Members against whom charges are preferred shall be given a hearing before a number of members of this Association, or writing to this effect, and the President shall inflict such penalty as is deemed advisable.

1. The name of this Association shall be the Bloodhound Breeders' Association.

2. Any British subject resident in the Dominion of Canada, or any Returned Soldier who has seen service Overseas, who is eligible under article 3 and not alien birth may become a member by paying his fees.

3. All dues of members shall be paid in advance.

4. No money or funds shall be expended and no indebtedness incurred unless an appropriation has been made therefore by vote of the members of the Association; or, in case of emergency, by an order signed by the President and Secretary.

5. All elections of officers shall be by ballot and candidates receiving the greatest number of votes shall be elected.

Puppies dogs—1st, G. H. Bolton's Leaside Master, fair size, good type, in good condition, showed well. 2nd, Donaldson & Gray's Bellefield Bucklyvie, nice ears, well placed, fair head, not just in show condition. 3rd, H. Villeneuve's Roker Prince, a moderate dog, not at present at his best.

Junior dogs—1st Geo. Ashbee's Campbell Style, nice ears, clean head, a good dog when in bloom that will take some stopping, to-day in indifferent coat and just a little overtrimmed. 2nd, Bellefield Bucklyvie. 3rd, C. Edmonds' Monarch, not on the bench.

Canadian-bred dogs—1st, Campbell style. 2nd, G. H. Whichell's Masterman Ready, good size, in good coat, whose worst fault is his tail. 3rd, Dugan & Smyth's Verdun Ballantyne, very plain, with no outstanding feature to recommend him, only his size.

Novice dogs—1st, Campbell Style. 2nd Leaside Master. 3rd, Bellefield Bucklyvie. All previously reviewed.

Limit dogs—1st, W. R. Wardle's Heatherbell Bradnor Chief, a big, sound, upstanding dog in good condition considering he had travelled from Scotland to Winnipeg and back to Toronto; this dog got best Collie in show, but was not quite up to the merit of some of the previous winners at the C. N. E. 2nd, Campbell Style. 3rd, Masterman Ready.

Open dogs—A repeat.

Limit dogs, A.O.C.—1st, Geo. Getty's Quarrybrae Altus, just a fair specimen, the expression giving a plain appearance, in good form otherwise. 2nd, Ed. Goff's Colonel Sterling, very good in coat, the head and eye nothing to consider. 3rd, Wm. Tomlinson's Tango Tip, in poor coat, body development fair, on this day should not have been shown.

Open dogs—A repeat.

Breeders' dogs—1st, Bellefield Bucklyvie. 2nd, Donald Soper's Seedley Armistice, just a fair puppy, without any outstanding feature, but why the Seedley prefix? It is misleading and unfair to use another man's kennel name, more so when its owner has earned a world-wide reputation. The Canadian and American Kennel Clubs could in courtesy to the big English breeders forbid the practice.

Winners dogs—Heatherbelle Bradnor Chief.

Puppy bitches—1st, Chas. H. Barrell's Courcellette Queen, a fine upstanding puppy, in good form, decent head, eye and ears, and well shown. 2nd, G. E.

Bailey's Bellefield Queen, a good show-er this, very nice ears, not just flat enough in skull and not quite big enough in my opinion. 3rd, Allen McClean's Glenariff Smile, not on the bench.

Junior bitches—1st Courcellette Queen. 2nd, Jas. Waddell's Queen Bess, a sable and white, in good condition and sound, head short and thick, but good body and coat. 3rd, Bellefield Queen.

Canadian-bred bitches—1st, Courcellette Queen. 2nd Mrs. F. Bell's Crescent Perfection, a tri-color with sable head, an indifferent specimen, round in eye and overshot considerably. 3rd, Tom Milner's Weston Attraction, good all-round specimen, expression real good, will do better under a breeder judge, was in full bloom.

Limit bitches—1st, Weston Attraction. 2nd, T. H. Webb's Mayflower Patricia, quite a nice bitch, in fair condition, not a flyer, but no glaring fault, evidently not her day out. 3rd, Donaldson & Gray's Bellefield Best, a real nice typical bitch, if considerably bigger all round she would make a name for herself, but her small size is against her getting very high in the awards.

Open bitches—1st, R. Y. Wemyss-Leith Kind, a big sound bitch, good body, legs and geet, nice head and ears, quite a nice specimen. 2nd, Mayflower Patricia. 3rd, Bellefield Best.

Limit bitches, A.O.C.—1st, Mrs. Jas. Waddell's Dark Rosaleen, a tri-color with sable head, in full bloom, sound, fair size, her worst faults was her head, eye and ears, these being pricked and placed on the side of her head, not a show specimen by any means, but got winners. 2nd, Crescent Perfection. 3rd, Geo. H. Whichello's Queenie Lass, good size, well off for bone and coat, but not quite the thing in ears and expression.

Note.—Collies were a hard class to judge, several decent specimens being out of coat, others being pig-jawed, very few having the real Collie expression. There is every opportunity for an earnest breeder to come to the front with a bang next year. 1919 can only be classed as a very poor year for Collies. The placings in Collie bitches were hardly what one would have expected from one so high in the fancy as Geo. S. Thomas. If he was right in his awards then I have yet to meet a Collie breeder in England, America or Canada who would share his views on this particular occasion.

It proved to be the most successful annual meeting ever held in the history of the Club, both in the enthusiasm shown by the large attendance of the members, and in the unanimity of opinion as expressed in the Election of the officers for the coming year. The reports of the various officers were read which shows an increase of membership, in the past year of over 50%, the auditors report also showed a substantial balance on hand, after the most successful season ever held. Prospects for the Club, are exceptionally bright and a bigger success, than the year just past has been, is looked for, as enthusiasm is running at high pitch, which augers well for the biggest and best season the Club has ever had.

IMPORTANT TO IMPORTERS AND BREEDERS.

When sending in applications for registration of dogs to the Canadian National Live Stock Records, it is well for breeders to remember the following points. By so doing, registration will be expedited because everything enumerated below is required and if not furnished, applications will be returned by the Record Office.

1. If an unregistered dog has been sold, fill in a transfer form and forward it with the application for registration. Transfer fee is charged in addition to the registration fee.

2. Applications for registration of litter should be forwarded within sixty days of birth; after that period, a penalty fee is charged.

3. When forwarding an application for an American bred dog, the American certificate must be sent in and must show the ownership of the importer and if the importer is not the owner applying for registration, transfers must be furnished on the regular transfer forms.

4. If a bitch is served by a dog registered in the American Kennel Club Stud Book and the dog is owned in Canada, his registration in the Canadian Kennel Club is required before any of his produce may be recorded.

5. If a dog is sold into the United States it should be transferred on the Canadian Records to the American purchaser. A transfer should be filled in and forwarded to Ottawa with the Canadian certificate and the transfer fee. The ownership will be endorsed on the Canadian certificate. If an export certificate is required for the United States customs purposes, it is necessary to ask for it and remit 50 cents extra.

6. Always fill in the registration number of the sire and dam if they are recorded.

7. Breeders should give particular attention in filling in the exact markings and colour of their dogs.

8. Membership fee is due and payable January first of each year and thus avoid the possibility of delayed registrations if applied for early in the year and membership is not paid.

9. New members only, are entitled to one free registration and it must be made during the first calendar year of membership.

10. Always give post office box or street address. It is surprising the number of communications received from breeders living in cities without the street address being given. Married women in writing or signing applications, sometimes use their husbands initials and sometimes their christian name. Do not do this. Use one name and stick to it. Record office officials do not or cannot know one-tenth of the people applying for registrations.

11. When a show is being held, do not leave applications for registration until the last minute.

12. When sending in a transfer of a registered dog, always forward the certificate of registration so that the new ownership may be endorsed and be sure the regular fee accompanies same.
