Importers.

This notice is printed in your interest. Cut it out and paste it on your desk.

On Dec. 27th, 1919, the regulations were changed in reference to the importation of animals free of duty for breeding purposes. The old regulation, by which dogs came in, were cancelled and now the conditions are the same as for other breeds coming in free.

REGULATION.

Animals may be imported for the improvement of stock free of duty upon the furnishing of an import certificate, stating that the animal is recorded in a Canadian National Record, or in case there is no Canadian Record for the breed, in a foreign record, recognized as authentic by the Canadian National Record Committee.

INSTRUCTION.

Import certificates required are those bearing the signature of the Accountant of the Canadian National Live Stock Records, for dogs. The fee for the import certificate is 50 cents.

The Collector of Customs shall not demand or accept any Certificate as to pedigree other than the one of the Import Certificate.

Import Certificates for Dogs may be procured from the Accountant, Canadian National Live Stock Records, Ottawa.

Get this right, observe the law faithfully, and your importing troubles are reduced to nil. And although a certificate will be issued by the National Live Stock Records, the dog itself must be recorded with the National Live Stock Records. And in order to record a dog there, a certificate of registration in the Canadian importer's name, showing his ownership. If from England, from the English Kennel Club, if from the United States, from the American Kennel Club.

Therefore, it will expedite matters quite considerably for importers to get their certificates of registration in good time, justifying the issuing of the import certificate, in order to clear the Customs in Canada.

Mrs. E. Brownlie, Toronto, reports a nice litter of Pomeranians by her own stud dog "Laudervale Shell Fire." They are showing good promise, and will be heard from later.

Breeders' Notice.

Shipping Bitches into the United States for breeding purposes no longer a nightmare to breeders.

If the proper procedure is followed in shipping females to the United States to be bred no difficulty should be encountered getting them into that country and having them returned to Canada.

In the first place they should be sent out of the country under Canadian Customs supervision, then, when they return in bond to destination, which they will, they can be properly identified as the animal that went out and be immediately released.

When entering the United States a bond must be provided guaranteeing return to Canada within six months'. This bond is for twice the estimated amount of duty and is forfeited if animals are not returned.

No more difficulty should be met shipping females in to be bred than shipping in for exhibition purposes. All that is necessary is to observe the existing regulations on both sides of the line.

Mr. Wm. Smith, Chairman of the Canadian National Live Stock Records Board replies to all criticisms at Annual Meeting, which we are pleased to reproduce for the benefit of our readers.

From certain quarters there has been criticisms of the cost of conducting the Record Office. An analysis shows that the cost of per transaction in certificates was as follows: 1915, 28.96 cents, 1916 26.7 cents, 1917 24.5 cents, 1918 30.5 cents, 1919 30.5 cents. You will note that during three years of the war that the cost per transaction actually decreased although the cost of conducting most all commercial businesses was actually increasing. The figures just quoted do not represent the actual cost to each association. The cost to them was much less as a certain amount was paid out of the money received from the department of agriculture in the way of a money grant. If we compare the cost of conducting the Canadian National Live Stock Records with the cost of conducting other record offices, as far as we can find out, the cost is less than that of conducting any other office in America. When we consider the advantage breeders have, such as free office, light, heat, equipment and stationery, the franking privilege on outgoing matter, free postage on incoming matter, we should consider we are fortunate in having organized our present system in 1905.

There is another matter about which questions have been asked and that is the cost of printing books of record. They have materially increased due to the increased cost of material and the increased cost of labor. The cost of paper such as is used in the herd and stud books used to cost the printers 4½ cents a pound, the cost of the same paper to-day is 14 cents a pound. The union scale of wages which all shops must pay has risen from \$18.50 a week in 1914 to \$32.00 a week. Other material than paper used in publishing books has increased as much as 500 per cent. Leather which used to cost 11 cents per square foot now costs 52 cents per square foot, and cloth has advanced in cost 200 per cent.

Fault has also been found by some as to the service the Record Office is giving. There are times when it is impossible to give prompt service. At no time has the work been 20 days behind. Considering our service with the service performed by offices doing similar work in the United States, the advantage is with us. Instead of days it is often months that offices in the United States are behind. Our office had occasion to forward an application to an office in the United States on October 27th last. The certificate has not yet been issued April 3rd, 1920. The service given by the record office depends to a great extent on the people to whom the service is given. Breeders at all times do not do their part but expect the record office to do it all for them which is impossible. Applications improperly made out, are sent in in many cases accompanied by insufficient fees. Everything has to be returned to the sender which entails an extra amount of work. In addition it is unfortunate that a large percentage of the breeders do not make their registrations at the proper time. They wait until after they sell the animal before applying for registration and oftentimes they cannot get the certificate quickly for shipping purposes and the record office gets the blame when they are really not to blame at all.

Our readers will remember the beautiful picture that "Short Cut" made when he adorned the front page of our Pictorial issue last February. The bitch classes were equally interesting with three magnificent specimens fighting all the way for first place. The finish showed that the winner "By Town White Lady," had travelled through all opposition from the puppy class, truly a remarkable achievement and worthy of note. Second place was secured by the well known kennel of Aitken & Silver, with their "Raby's Model," with Charlie Powesland's good home-bred "Vanguard Khaki" taking the third position.

Lowenstein to meet his Hasty Daisy on somewhat better terms than the penalty of two yards imposed by last week's win, S. Grimshaw, the owner of Hulla Maid, agreed to give an extra two yards to Hasty Daisy in a match race for \$100 a side, which was accepted and run off before the handicap for the Toronto Cup, yesterday afternoon. Hasty Daisy, a 23-pound female, was on scratch, and Hulla Maid, a 14-pound female, got eight yards, as agreed upon. There was a good start, and both dogs got away showing terrific speed, but Hasty soon drew up and made good its handicap in no time; then won easily by four yards.

Why I Like Dogs

And as soon as refugees learned the trick of sprinkling a little red pepper in their own tracks, they had nothing to fear from the bloodhound's pursuit. One sniff of that pepper in the sensitive nostrils of the dog, as he followed along the trail, put the poor brute out of the scenting business for some days to come, and robbed him of all interest in tracking down his quarry.

The so-called Boston terrier, like the Airedale, is a glorified mongrel. He was produced a few years ago by the crossing of several strains. Of these cross-breeding ancestors, one was unquestionably the pug. From no other breed could the Boston have inherited his round and bulging eyes. They are pug eyes, and they are almost the only traces now left of that once popular toy dog. The pug has practically vanished from the earth. He now lives only in the eye-and-tail traits he bequeathed his mixed-blood descendant, the Boston, and in the Boston's lovable gentleness.

Speaking of almost extinct species, there are the mastiff and the Newfoundland. Seldom, to-day, will you see a specimen of either. The mastiff was a giant, of sometimes surly temper and of no great brain or beauty. But the Newfoundland was a dog the world could not afford to lose. He was the staunchest, bravest, strongest, and most sagacious of them all. He was a life-saver, too; and a gentleman. If ever you can get hold of a pure-strain Newfoundland, sell something and buy him. But not unless you live in the country and unless you can appreciate a truly great dog.

There are fashions, you know, in dogs, as much as in clothes. For an unexplained reason some breed of dogs goes out of fashion. And presently it disappears from shows and from the haunts of men. Witness the pug, the mastiff, the Newfoundland. The last-named could not be spared. He should never have been allowed to go.

By dint of great restraint I have kept myself from talking about the collie, to any extent, thus far. But my resolve has cracked under the strain. So here goes.

Of all breeds, the collie seems to me to stand out supreme. From a purely esthetic standpoint, I know of no other dog with

collie's beauty. From personal experience with many breeds I know of none with his blending wisdom, loveliness and sense of humor.

I do not refer necessarily to the ultra-modern show type, where the head has been bred into the toothpick shape of a Russian wolfhound's, and the body to a greyhound slenderness, and where all the brilliant and human brain has been bred out through a snipy nose as long as a tapir's.

No, I am speaking of the true collie. Such a glorious collie as I try to describe in my book, "Lad: a Dog."

The collie has kept closer to the original wolf strain than has any other type of dog. He has lost the savage wolf heart, but he has kept the wolf brain, with all its resourcefulness and its uncanny wisdom and its sleepless alertness.

He will learn—rightly taught—with bewildering quickness. He will remember forever anything he has once been taught. He is a born humorist, is thrilledly and noisily excitable, and at the same time the most sympathetic and understanding dog in the world. As a pal, as a fearless guard, as a farm helper, as a house dog, he has no peer.

Also, he is the most sensitive animal on earth. A very brief course of ill-treatment in puppyhood will turn him into a worthless cur, either cringing, or mean, or an out-and-out rebel. That is the human element in him. He responds to right or wrong treatment as does a sensitive child.

A guest was walking with me through the woods, near Sunnybank, last autumn. My collies were with us. One of them put up a rabbit. All of them gave rapturous chase. One of the collies had cut his foot a few days earlier, and I did not want him to scratch it in a pell-mell rush through the undergrowth, so I called him back to me. I called him by name; I called but once. Almost in mid-air, the dog checked his head-long rush and cantered over to where I stood.

"He must have had a good many lickings," suggested my guest, "to hammer such instant obedience into him."

For answer, I picked up a stick and swung it threateningly over the dog's head. He pricked up his ears and stood ready to retrieve the stick

in case I should throw it. That was the only sign of interest he showed, even when I struck at him with it and brought the heavy club swishing down within three inches of his head. Next, I drew back my foot and kicked at him. Again the dog made no move.

He did not understand either gesture. He had never been struck. He had never been kicked. A swinging boot toe and brandished stick meant nothing to him. I had brought him up, from birth, to obey. I had done it by patience and by letting him understand from babyhood that obedience was a part of his life. Being a wise and sensitive puppy and with all a collie's amazing swiftness to learn, he had been trained, completely, before he was five months old.

There was no magic, no mystery, about it. Any half-wit who can keep his temper and his sense of proportions, can train a collie pup into a perfect dog.

On the first day that I became owner of my big prize-winning collie, Bruce—or Sunnybank Goldsmith—he started to follow me into the dining-room. Now, while old Lad lived, no other dog was allowed in that room, so I said quietly: "You can't come in here, Bruce. Back!"

The big dog halted on the threshold, and turned back. Nor, for the next three years, did he ever again set foot in the dining-room. Always he would follow me to the door and there would stop. Since Lad died, Bruce is promoted to be the "dining-room dog" at meal-times, and the other dogs know enough to keep out.

If there is anything more laugh-evoking and altogether jolly than a bunch of three-month-old collie pups on their twice-a-day exercise ramble, I never saw it. They are an animated windowful of Teddy bears with infinite capacity for getting into unbelievable mischief and trouble, and with spells of sudden affection which send them rushing back in a wildly scrambling throng to their master, to be patted, at intervals throughout the walk.

The words "Master" and "Owner," by the way, mean two wholly different things. Any man with the cash to buy a salable dog and become that dog's owner. But nobody can become a dog's master without the loving consent of the dog himself.

People often ask me: "Don't

find collies treacherous?" My invariable answer is: "If I did, I wouldn't keep them." How the silly theory of collie "treachery" began, I don't know. But it is not true. It is absolutely unfounded.

So much for collies. I am not going to try to recount all the myriad breeds of dogs, nor their advantages as pets or guards or chums. Nor am I going to touch, to any extent, on the so-called "toy" breeds, except to say that toys are the only dogs that should be kept in the city. To keep a big dog cooped up in a city flat, with only a sedate and short walk once or twice a day, is one of the most abominable forms of slow torture.

The Peke, like the Chow, comes from China, and neither has been here long enough to adapt himself to our Occidental ways. Perhaps that is why the Chow sometimes seems stupid. A friend of mine had a Chow with a real brain and with rare power of imitation. But as a rule, a Chow's master is the only man to say a good word for Chow intelligence.

The old English sheep dog is another dog that has not been in America many years. He is affectionate and quite clever. His general aspect is of a clown among dogs. His gait and his coat carry out the delusion. His coat is the hardest imaginable to keep in show shape and free from tangles and burs.

The bull terrier is obstinate and must be reasoned with from his own viewpoint, not from yours. But he is a gallant, dashing fellow, with all the nerve in the world. And he is true to his salt.

The St. Bernard has a noble and lofty maner and a look of infinite patience and sagacity. Therefore, on his face value, he has won a repute which I don't think he wholly deserves. He is magnificent, but I do not consider him very intelligent. Buy neither St. Bernard nor Great Dane unless you can get them young and unless you have plenty of room wherein to exercise them, and a purse that can stand the strain of their man's size meals.

For all of the good traits of a high-quality canine, the setter cannot be beaten. Whether Irish or Gordon or English, he is an ideal dog. For house or for hunting field, he is splendid. There is a strain of stubbornness in him, at times, of course. More so than in his fellow hunting expert, the pointer.

The latter lacks the setter's beauty of coat, but is apt to be more high-strung and even more sagacious. To keep either pointer or setter, except the country, is a crime that should

be punishable by jail. My own preference is for the pointer, over the setter, but that is altogether a matter of individual opinion. Get the best pointer or setter obtainable, and you have perhaps the best dog known to man.

Don't judge dogs by your glimpses of them at shows. In the first place, at a show a dog is out of his element. The nerve strain on him is terrific. The sight and the scent and sound of so many strange dogs affects him keenly. He is not himself. Moreover, many of the dogs you see at a show are "kennel raised." That means they have been born and brought up in kennels, under the guardianship of handlers and kennelmen, and have received no more education than has a prize pig. What can you expect, in the way of intelligence or of human understanding, from such a bringing-up?

A mongrel is the smartest—not wisest, but *smartest*—of all dogs. Nearly every trick dog is a mongrel. He has a gutter brightness which the thoroughbred lacks. Don't choose him on that account. But, for the same reason, don't be ashamed of him if you own one.

We got the habit, centuries ago, of speaking of every dog as "he," as though the female of the species was not worth our mention. And that was where we were mistaken. The female dog is cleverer, more affectionate, a better watchdog and less liable to be a runaway, than is the male. She is by far the better pet of the two. Here in America, we don't appreciate that. In England, dog owners are beginning to.

Up to the time of the Crusades, the female dog was held in much higher esteem than was the male. Then, Crusaders were taught by their Mohammedan foes that a dog is the lowest and most unclean of beasts. The Moslems looked on the female dog with abhorrence, as the mother of animals which their religion banned. Back to their homes came the Crusaders, convinced that the female dog was vile. And it has taken the world nearly ten centuries to get over the fool notion. That is why female dogs sell for so much less than do their brothers. And they are worth fifty per cent. more, as house dogs or as pet or watch dogs.

Did you ever read Maeterlinck's essay on the dog? Read it. In brief, it points out that man lives in a world of creatures that hate or fear or ignore him. His crops, if left to themselves, go back to their wild state and desert him. His horse can be ridden away by any stranger. His cattle care only for the feed he gives them. His cat will leave his hearth for a warmer

one. The jungle animals seek to kill him.

Thus, man stood alone in a hostile world until the dog leaped across the chasm of aloofness and made man his god. Of all the world's animals, the dog alone loves man and serves him to the death and even hunts down other four-footed animals in man's service. The dog alone has formed a deathless alliance with man and has made himself man's willing and worshipping slave.

Don't look on the dog as a mere pet or parasite. He is far more. He earns his way, if you give him half a chance. He earns it as a guard, as a herder of sheep and cattle, and in a dozen other ways. Look what he did in the war, for instance.

The British war office reports are bristling with authentic records of dogs who served magnificently as couriers, as searchers for the wounded, and in many another capacity. The human soldier was decorated, cheered, pensioned. The soldier dog had no reward. He did his duty. Being only a dog, he knew no better. Wounded or gassed, he was allowed to crawl away, forgotten, to die. Living and well, he was sent forth daily into fresh perils.

Here is one instance out of many thousand, culled from the British war office archives: At the Somme, in 1916, a collie was sent across two miles of shell-swept open ground to carry a dispatch from the colonel to an imperial regiment. It was the only way to get help for the regiment, which was cut off from its support. No human courier could hope to cross that stretch of death-scourged ground. So the appeal for help was tied to the collar of a courier collie.

The dog set off at a gallop. Shells were bursting all around him. The Hun sharpshooters began to take potshots at him. He kept steadily on. Presently a bullet shattered his jaw. In horrible pain, the collie drove straight ahead, never breaking his long wolflike stride. Except a greyhound no dog can outrun a collie.

Two more bullets tore through his body. He fell; rolled over, and staggered to his feet. Lurching and stumbling, the collie kept on, until he reached his destination.

Then, creeping to the feet of the general to whom he had been sent, he fell dead. His work was done. Until it was done he had had no time to die. Now that he had saved a whole regiment from destruction he could afford the luxury of succumbing to his wounds.

No dogs are parasites. They are doing nicely. Don't you?

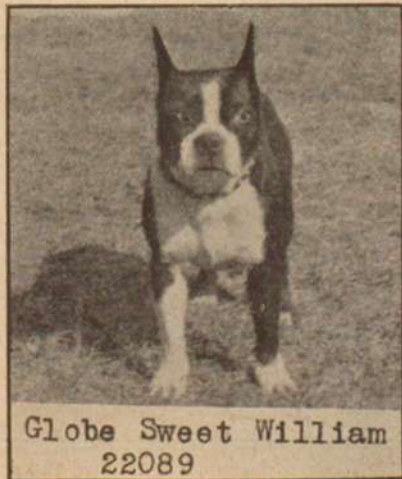

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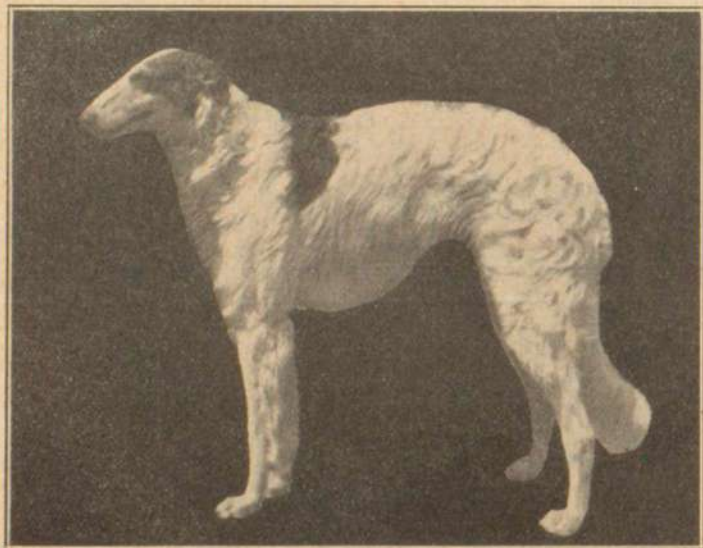
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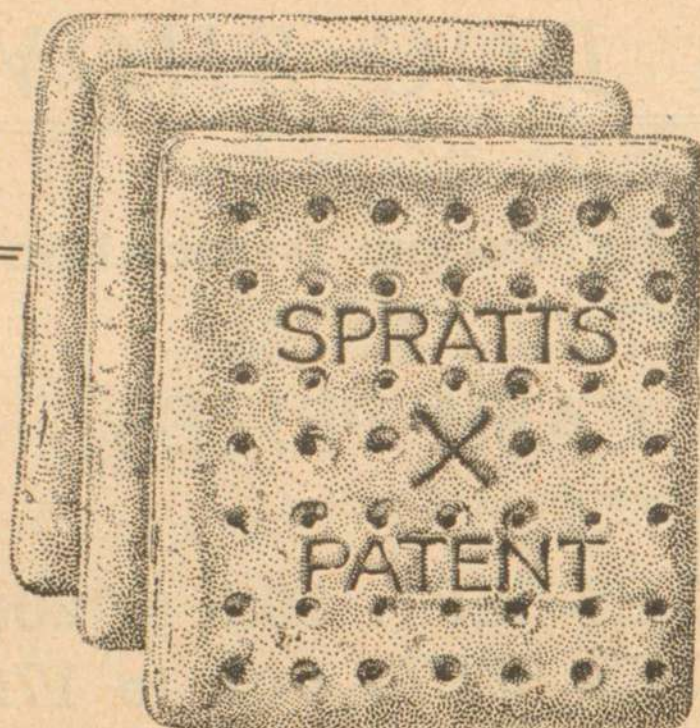
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
