

A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS of the Canadian Kennel Club will be held in the offices of the Club on July 15th, 1920, commencing at 8 p.m.

#### Meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors, of the Canadian Kennel Club was held on Thursday evening, June 17th, at the offices of the Club, 774½ Yonge Street, Toronto, the first vice-president, Mr. H. Clayton, presiding.

Directors in attendance: Messrs. W. R. Aitken (Quebec), N. W. Renwick, H. M. Jackson, G. O. Briggs, B. D. Wheeler (Messrs. Jos. Russell, president, was attending Fort Garry Kennel Club Show, N. K. Swire being in England, N. R. Miller having left for England and the Continent).

The secretary having read the minutes of the previous meeting, it was moved and seconded that the minutes be adopted as read. Carried.

The secretary reported that he had received no reply of any kind to the correspondence mailed to Mr. Edward T. Slattery, Ottawa, on June 1st, 1920, wherein the Board requested:

"At the meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, held at Toronto on Thursday, May 20th, it was an instruction to the writer to write you, saying:

"That in view of the overwhelming amount of sworn evidence adduced in the case of Helman vs. yourself, that I point out to you the extreme seriousness of this affair, and to ask you to produce the correct papers for the Boston Terrier bitch, 'Boston Lady,' with transfer, at once."

And the secretary was instructed to write Mr. Edward T. Slattery, under registered cover, saying:

"That the Board allowed him a period of 15 days to comply with their wishes as expressed in their letter sent, dated June 19th, 1920." Carried.

A protest was read which had been filed by Miss J. Morrison, Montreal, protesting the wins made at the Ladies' Kennel Club Show, held on May 22nd, by the French Bulldog "Henderson's Jacques Fournier," owned by Wainwright and Duckworth, Brantford, Ont., claiming that the dog in question was both deaf and blind.

The secretary reported that the pro-

test had been filed according to the requirements of the Dog Show Rules and Regulations, and came to him accompanied by the customary protest fee. Accompanying the protest was the examination report of the Show Veterinarian, F. W. Robinson, V.S., which read as follows:

"I hereby certify that I have this day, at the request of the officials of the Ladies' Kennel Club of Canada, examined a French Bulldog, marked in their official catalogue as (No. 94) off Wainwright and Duckworth. This animal I find to be, in my opinion, both blind and deaf, both being complete."

Further correspondence was read bearing on the grounds for protest from Miss J. Morrison and Miss A. Charlton.

Messrs. Wainwright and Duckworth, having signified their readiness to oppose the protest and having deposited the necessary fee, had been officially instructed to have the defence prepared, were represented by G. F. Mc-Farland, barrister; B. Swann, agent, and N. Duckworth, representing the kennel proper. After hearing the several parties, the following certificates of examination were read:

"I have to-day examined the French Bulldog "Henderson's Jacques Fournier" C.K.C. 22708, and in my opinion the said dog is not totally blind,

"A. V. CUTCLIFFE, V.S."

"This is to say that I have to-day (June 7, 1920) examined a dog, namely, 'Henderson's Jacques Fournier,' C.K.C. 22708) and find that he can see and hear

"C. N. SANDERSON, V.S."

"This is to certify that at the request of Mr. Swann, I this day, June 12th, examined the French Bulldog 'Henderson's Jacques Fournier," at his premises in Mimico. I found the same to be not totally blind or deaf.

"J. A. Campbell, V.S., B.V.Sc."

The several parties were invited to retire, and it was moved and seconded,

"That the winnings of the French Bulldog, 'Henderson's Jacques Fournier,' made at the Ladies' Kennel Club Show, be sustained." Carried.

#### Oakville Kennel Club

Oakville, with its full share of rain and a little sunshine, has again passed the reality stage and is now a memory of a nice little summer fixture. About 200 dogs were benched and 365 entries were made, quality being very ap-

The management was slack even for a "go as you please" event, late starts in judging being the order of the day and night sessions, the drawn-out ring operations, backed by almost continual showers, all tending to dampen the spirits of the most interested spectator.

Jack Meadows, Oakville's Dean of Dogdom, had the lion's share of the judging to care for.

F. C. Smith, of Guelph, was a new judge of sporting varieties.

C. L. McQuillan's hand on the lever assumed the safe destiny of the Boston Terriers.

Harry Hurst, with Poms, etc., was responsible for no complaints.

Mrs. W. C. Ingram, with Pekes and Toy Spaniels under her care, can be congratulated first of all for the record entry in the former breed, then again for her firmness in decision, her "sang froid" was refreshing, too.

"Joe" Kennedy, judge of Cockers, drew a nice entry. His was a drawnout operation, and we had few grumbles.

#### The Dogs Themselves.

Bloodhounds saw J. R. Tennant with two new faces, first, "Appolo," a great youngster. His stature gives one the impression that the trail would be irksome to him and he needs to develop in peak. After this a great dog, second, "Agrippa," a litter brother, not quite the quality of the winner.

Borlzoi's "Orloff of Tolstoi" has benefited by his change of home, a lovely type of too feminine a make-up. Lady Romanoff, a good bitch; this entry could be put down much smarter. Two promising puppies completed the entry.

Airedale Terriers were 14, with no new faces.

Harvie Warlock, Walnut Bandmaster and Parkton King Fisher were the order in dogs.

Parkton Orlette, Mona Lisa (this bitch was unlucky), Briarwood Blossom were one, two and three here, the first-named lifting the breed special.

Irish Terriers. The Kelly brace were the stars here and had no serious competition.

Scottish Terriers were a good turnout, Donald McKellar's Argyle Tulle-

bardine being the hero in dogs, with his Rothesay Crack in improved form. 2nd, W. T. Marlatt's Ch. Romany Bishop; 3rd, Rothesay Crack. Bitches: 1st, Argyle Polly, pressed by Ontario Sunshine.

Fox Terriers were quite an entry in numbers, the majority being in the "rough, and not ready," stage.

Flornell Rapid Fire came, saw, and conquered; we like this wire; he has, of course, an if or two, the most weighty being "if he were mine."grand head and ears, neck, shoulders, front absolute, topping coat, a born actor, not quite ready.

Wycollar Terror had the advantage in body properties, nothing much after this brace.

The smooth puppy with municipal aspiration is coming along all right, he may lead the breed with luck ere

Pekes were 19 and a nice lot indeed. Walnut Mannikin, the hero who eventually got best any breed in show, has got more coat than at any time of his career. Yen Li was 2nd on type alone, though best head of the lot, a shade long, which is accentuated by a too gay plume carriage.

Tangerine of Huron, quite a specimen. The judge was not satisfied with his conformation.

Yuk San of Eccesall was the heroine of the opposite sex, very nice looking in face and head, nice plum and carriage.

Nowata Fu Shi, an assertive kind of a lady, not strong in essentials.

#### Mrs. C. M. Lunt Reviews the Recent Specialty Show of the Collie Club of Canada

On May 24th, the Collie Club of Canada held its initial show under Canadian Club rules, and in point of numbers, anyway, it was a huge success, as 58 Collies were entered for my inspection and placing.

An evener collection of Collies, taking them all in all, I have seldom seen. In some classes, dogs not receiving a ribbon were deserving of a first prize, there was so little difference between first prize and fourth and fifth. The quality was so uniform throughout that I should like to review each dog individually, but I have had to omit many fine specimens because of incomplete notes and lack of space.

The ring was large and ably stewarded by Mr. Jack Waggett, Toronto, while W. Ormiston Roy, Montreal, was an efficient clerk of the blackboard. There was no delay in getting the dogs into the ring. The only difficulty I experienced was in the lighting. It wasn't very bright and I could not tell the color of the eyes—they all looked dark, so if errors were made in that respect, I trust I may be forgiven.

Winners Dogs went to "Baronmore Briton, a big, rangy, dark sable son of Ch. "Knocklayde King Hector" and "Laund Luluna. He is a fine, sound dog, heavily boned, nice, long, flat head, small, beautifully carried ears and a true Collie expression. A very close Reserve to the Winners Dog was Boyd's "Longbranch Perfecto" ("Coltness Commander-Bellefield Blossom"). This dog has long, clean skull, is sound, good bone, but seemed rather short on the leg, and did not get his ears up very well in the ring. He afterward won the Special for best coated dog in the show. First Puppy was T. Milne's "Quarrybrae Sun-star ("Eastwood Energy-Ch. "Quarrybrae Colleen). This is as nice a puppy as I have seen in a long time. He was terribly shy in the ring, but with proper training he will be heard from later; good size for his age, heavy bone, lovely head, with clean, flat skull and perfect ears. He is the best I have seen from "Energy," and "Energy's" owner should be well pleased with him, and he is a credit to his sire and his breeder.

A thoroughly typical Collie is Strachan's "Coltness Commander" ("Tazewell Tantalizer—Coltness Cymbeline). Rather small, but good boned, sound, and in perfect coat and condition. His head is flat and a perfect wedge shape. In the ring, he was

listless and absolutely refused to show his good points, and of course had to pay the penalty.

Another good one was Ashbee's "Campbell Style" ("Coltness Commander"—"Maitland Lady"). In the first two classes in which this dog competed, he stood badly in front and would not stand at attention. In the third class, he decided to alter his behavior, however, and stood perfectly, showing for all he was worth, so won over those previously placed over him. He is a big, heavy-coated dog, with a pleasing Collie outlook.

Another pleasing dog was Loutitt's "Tipperary King" ("Seedley Sultan" — "Tipperary Dahlia"). Rather small and lacking in substance, but very typical throughout, with nice head and ears.

In the Veteran Class, the Roughs and Smooths came together, when it was a close decision between the eight-year-old champion, "Canute Treasure" and that grand Rough, Champion "Coltness Clinker," six years old. Both dogs were in the pink of condition, and both showed perfectly. The Smooth finally won. The Rough lost a bit on skull and movement, although it was a very close thing between the two noted Collies.

Winners Bitches, Getty's Ch. "Quarrybrae Colleen" (Ch. "Wishaw Rival"-"Quarrybrae Mary"). I was told I missed a point in putting her at the top, because of her faulty shoulders. In the classes she stood perfectly. Afterward, when in the ring for Specials, she was shown rather carelessly and I noticed the fault mentioned, but not when she was competing. She is a big, dark sable, good bone, good coat, nicely rounded body. with a fine head topped with lovely ears. She moved well and posed beautifully. Reserve Winners Bitches, Milner's "Weston Dusky Charmer" (Eastwood Energy"-Ch. "Quarrybrae Colleen.") A litter sister of the excellent "Quarrybrae Sunstar." She is a fair sized tri-color with a heavy coat. No prominent faults; lost to the winner in length of head, and it was a bit strong for its length. In Canadianbred class, "Charmer" was followed by Milner's "Weston Attraction" (Weston Sunbeam" - "Weston Refinement.") Same type as winner in this class, though a sable and white, and somewhat smaller. Sound and in beautiful condition, with good skull, though rather short. The Novice winner,

Bailey's "Bellefield Queen" ("Coltness Commander"-"Bellefield Blossom.") A light sable, good coat, sound, with nice head of the proper type and sweet expression. Second in this class was Taylor's "Inverness Explicit" ("Seedley Sultan" - "Tipperary Dahlia.") Much on the type of the winner, though not so flat a skull, nor quite so much quality. A litter sister of "Inverness Implicit," "Tipperary Betty" had a most beautiful head, and was put down in lovely bloom, but her legs were very short and not straight. Another good one was Wellnitz' "Cymrose Glory." A good sized dark sable and white, but rather small in bone and large and round in eye. Put down in fine condition. I understand this good Collie went to Winners at the Western Collie Club Show and was unfortunate in meeting so many real quality bitches at this Eastern fixture. Barrell's "Courcelette Queen" ("Coltness Commander"-"Bellefield Blossom") is a fine specimen, too, but in the ring she would not show at all. She has fine, long head, with big bone, good coat. She would make an invaluable matron.

In the Smooths, a six months' puppy won, Waggitt's "Arndale Controller," with the old Champion, "Canute Artful," Reserve. He was beaten in skull and muzzle. With ordinary luck, the puppy will do a lot of winning when he reaches maturity. In bitches, nothing could touch Ch. "Canute Treasure."

I enjoyed my stay in Toronto, and wish to thank the Collie Club of Canada for their unfailing courtesy to me. I was exceedingly fortunate in being able to participate in their annual banquet. Such good times certainly tend to bring the fanciers together, and should strengthen the Club spirit amazingly. I was quite overwhelmed by the presentation of a beautiful gold Collie pin, which had been imported from England. Besides its beauty, it will serve to remind me for a long time of the famed hospitality of my friends, the Canadian Collieites.

## An Interesting Article on This Interesting Topic, by a Close Student of the Subject.

There are many less interesting studies than that of the canine language. Many people claim to know it who have not passed the first standard and are not likely to do so; others never cease trying to become more proficient. They are those who really love dogs, not just "like" them.

It is common knowledge that when pleased, and especially when anticipating pleasure, a dog wags his tail; that when angry he shows his teeth. The latter action is more easily explained than is the former. Dogs, again, are said to fawn upon those they serve, to bristle up, in order to look as large as possible when about to attack, to crouch when preparing to spring upon their prey.

Darwin's "Expressions of Emotion" has made such scraps of canine language public property. Fanciers, while agreeing that most dogs behave as stated, well know that many exceptions occur. They will recall instances of dogs which, from puppyhood, have shown their teeth when pleased, actually grinning with delight, of high spirited dogs which have not been given to "fawning," of fighters which, instead of announcing their intention by "getting their bristles up," have acquired habits of guile. When all has been said, however, such instances are but exceptions. We shall not know much about dog languages if our knowledge is confined to such elementary points as these. Ballantyne gives a better idea of it in his once popular story, "The Dog Crusoe." It is worth quoting.

If ever the language of the eyes was carried to perfection, it was exhibited in the person of Crusoe. But, indeed, it would be difficult to say which part of his expressive face expressed most. The cocked ears of expectation, the drooped ears of sorrow; the bright, full eye of joy; the half-closed eye of contentment; and the frowning eye of indignation, accompanied by a silght, a very slight, pucker of the nose and a gleam of dazzling ivory. Then, as to tail-the modulations of meaning in the varied wags of that expressible member! Mortal man cannot conceive of the delicate shades of sentiment expressible by a dog's tail unless he has studied the subject-the wag, the waggle, the cock, the droop, the slope, the wriggle.

There are few subjects upon which dog-loving writers have attempted de-

scription more often than this one, and seldom with success, indeed, as one reads, the conviction is forced upon one that the dog expresses himself more lucidly than his master is able to do. In one respect only is he far behind his master, and that is in the matter of deception. Human language, we all know, may be employed for concealing, as well as revealing, the truth. Canine language is no good for the former. The dog is the clumsiest of all liars, a regular bungler, but then, he has had so very little practice. As the musical comedy ditty has it, "There seems to be something about them, it's the look in their eves."
