the fact that several members of the Board of Directors were obliged to be out of town on Thursday evening, July 15th, a quorum was not on hand and no business was transacted.

Canadian Dogs Refused Permission to Attend U.S. Shows

For very many years there has been an ever growing tendency on behalf of Canadian doy fanciers to support dog shows held under the rules and regulations of the American Kennel Club, a tendency which seemed to be noticed, appreciated and reciprocated by our "Cousins" to the South of the International boundary, and no doubt really was. Any of our professional handlers on naming a show or circuit of shows (to be held in the United States) to his clients, could readily obtain their sanction to be represented at one or all of the stated fixtures. Following on the lines of precedent and custom, Bert Swann, Toronto's well known handler had a nice string of Canada's most representative dogs lined up for competition at Morriston, Mineola and other recent American fixtures. Detail is the forte of the "Sage of Parkdale" and nothing was forgotten that should have been remembered by him in making his arrangements, even to the obtaining of the American Consuls papers, and left Toronto with perfect equnimity on Saturday, June 5th, 1920, but on his arrival at the boundary an interpretation, 100% literal had been given to paragraph 398 of the Tariff Act of October, 1913, which reads as follows:

"Animals brought into the United States temporarily for a period not exceeding six months for the purpose of breeding, exhibition or competition for prizes offered by any Agricultural, Polo, or Racing Association, but a bond shall be given in accordance with regulations prescribed by the Secretary of the Treasury."

There was no other course loft over

onto, and to bring his charges back with him of course.

This is an obnoxious situation, and so we felt it to be, and at once got intouch with the "powers that be," in an effort to have the interpretation of the Collector of Customs at Buffalo upheld, as against the altogether too literal interpretation of the same officer at the New York Port, but all to no avail. Several letters were addressed to the Treasury Department at Washington in an endeavour to have the privelege retained of sending our dogs into the United States under a six months bond free of duty. The Canadian National Live Stock Department, Ottawa, also assisted us in our requests, but on July 5th we received the following letter which seemed to be the equivalent of an ultimatum:

July 3, 1920.

"Mr. James D. Strachan, Secretary-Treasurer, Canadian Kennel Club, 774½ Yonge Street, Toronto, Canada.

"Sir:

"The Department is in receipt of your letter of the 22nd ultime, further in regard to the construction of paragraph 398 of the tariff act of 1913, in regard to the entry of dogs for exhibition. You ask that the decision of the Department be changed so as to permit Canadian dogs to enter free of duty under six months' bond "for any dog show, under any auspices holding shows governed by the rules and regulations of the American Kennel Club."

"The provision in paragraph 398 of the Tariff Act authorizing the entry "for the purpose of breeding, exhibition or competition for prizes offered by any Agricultural, Polo, or Racing Association." As dogs imported for exhibition at dog shows held under rules and regulations of the American Kennel Club would not come within the provisions of said paragraph 398, not having been reported for exhibition or competition for prizes offered by an agricultural, polo, or racing association, the Department is without authority to grant your request. The Secretary of the Treasury has no discretionary power to permit free entry for importations unless such importations fall within some provisions of law exempting them from the payment of duty.

"The Department is constrained to refuse your request.

We have since written the American Kennel Club as follows:

July 5, 1920.

"Newton H. Day, Esq., Sec'y, American Kennel Club, "My Dear Mr. Day:

"Probably it has already been brought to your notice that our Canadian dogs are now barred from attending shows held under the rules and regulations of your Club, unless same are held under the auspices of an agricultural, polo, or racing association.

"The Canadian Kennel Club and the Canadian National Live Stock Records have taken the matter up with the Secretary of the Treasurer at Washington, and his replies give us no ground for believing that we will be conceded any relief, and we now appeal to your Club to take the matter in hand and see what can be accomplished.

"One of our Canadian handlers, Mr. Bert Swann, Humber Bay, Ontario, left Toronto with a large string of dogs for Minneola, Morristown, and other shows under your rules. He was armed with the customary Consul's papers and anticipated no trouble, but was stopped at the boundary, and was forced to return.

"Will you refer this matter to the proper Committee, and permit me to enclose correspondence with a view to your further information? We do not anticipate it being very much trouble, your Club's being able to have it made possible for Canadian dogs to attend shows held under your rules, under any and whatever auspices.

"I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of July 5th with enclosure, addressed to our Secretary, and in his absence am replying to same.

"Will refer the matter to our Board of Directors at their next meeting and will do everything possible to have it made possible for Canadian Dogs to attend Shows held under our Rules.

Other notable American fanciers have been approached, and have signified their assurance of co-operation in securing for Canadian fanciers reasonable facilities for attending American Shows, as heretofore enjoyed by them.

We deeply regret the necessity, at this time, of recording the death of several of our best-known bench and stud dogs owned by our members and advertisers.

On the return from Quebec Show, the well-known chestnut red Pekingest dog, "Yen Li," imported only last January by Sam Bamford, and sold to Mr. and Mrs. George Eastham, Toronto, in February, who showed the dog at Toronto Kennel Club, St. Catharines, Brantford, Montreal and Quebec, taking the highest place at the first show and reserve at the Ladies' Kennel Club. These facts show the kind of Peke "Yen Li" was, and what a great loss he must be to his owners. who have struggled for years to always have something really worth while in Pomeranians or Pekingese.

Everything was done to keep the dog alive, a rival stud owner having worked for several hours in a vain endeavor to save "Yen Li," which goes to prove that in time of trouble the real dog fancier is always ready to "dig in," and to stay at the job to the last. Pekingese fanciers, we know, deplore the passing of "Yen Li" and their sympathies are all with the owners, Mr. and Mrs. Eastham.

Champion "Henderson's Jacques Fournier," the celebrated winning French bulldog, owned by Wainright & Duckworth, Brantford, was also a casualty following Quebec, where he again went to winners. At Ottawa, on the return journey, Bert Swann, agent for the Wainright Kennel, looked to his charges and everything was o.k. then, but at Toronto Jack was found dead in his crate.

It will be remembered that this good

quite recently and was honorably acquitted by the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, whose findings on the case were said to be unanimous. Champion "Paramount Star," the trappy little brindle and white Boston Terrier imported from Philadelphia at the end of April this year by H. J. O'Neil, Hamilton, Ont., and shown against all comers at every opportunity, ever since, and without knowing defeat, was the victim of poisoning the other day, and Mr. and Mrs. O'Neil, who had become passionately fond of the dog, are both distracted with grief.

The services of "Star" were being eagerly sought after, and many who had reserved bookings will be badly dissapointed to learn the sad intelligence we now chronicle at London, Brantford and Toronto (Boston Terrier Club of Toronto). "Paramount Star" outshown all the other Satellites of the Boston Terrier sky. At the Toronto fixture "Bill" Austin was judge, and had the largest entry of Bostons seen for some time at any Toronto fixture. Amongst them the best specimens in Eastern Canada, and the honors fell to Mr. O'Neil's elegant little dog "Paramount Star."

The subject of our front page illustration is the hero of the late Fort Garry Kennel Club Show, held on June 17-18-19, 1920, when he touched the highest pinnacle on the award list. Known in the East as the "Best Dog in the Show," and in the West as the "Grand Champion of the Show."

This magnificent English setter is the property of the popular Herb M. Clements, of Regina, Sask, and is "Mallwyd" bred to the back bone.

Burton, Chicago, was on the "woolsack" and is credited with being careful and painstaking in his work, and succeeded in giving general satisfaction to the many exhibitors and visitors who were attending this show.

Joseph Russell ex-M.P.P., Toronto, President of the Canadian Kennel Club, made the journey, taking with him an entry of 5 dogs, which were returned big winners in their respective breed classes, also in the variety section. Mr. Russell was well received by this new Western Club, a special meeting having been convened in order that he could meet the members and discuss the problems of Manitoba dogdom, and it is to be hoped that satisfaction to all will be the ultimate outcome of the conference. The President was glad to meet the Western Sportsmen and the trip has been of great benefit to him in every

Herb. M. Clement's entry of English Setters was one of the Shows attractions, and it was generally conceded that it was from this elegant entry from Regina, that the "Grand Champion" would be found, and when this envied win went to the "beloved Herb," rejoicing was general. Regina exhibitors generally were credited with having a grand entry of really high class canines, and besides Mr. Clements, Mr. and Mrs. A. P. Semple of "Cactus" fame, L. T. McGiverin, "Harry Selby," Miss Del Whittem, etc. cut a wide swath in the prize lists.

Calgary was represented by Jack Fletcher who had a string of real quality dogs in his charge and as usual made his mark deep in the award list. "Bob" Hinds was in from Saskatoon and watched with interest the fight put up by his noted Airedale "Vickery Vesuvius" ably handled by Jack Fletcher, and was a real contender up to the time the ribbons were distributed.

Winnipeg herself at the last show held, was able to produce her own "Grand Champion," but on this occasion was content to take the reserve station with "Billy" Villages' grand smooth Fox Terrier bitch, Ch. Madison Atalanta, also a popular win.

Two hundred and fourteen dogs were benched which was slightly less than the former Show. Six hundred and twenty nine entries were made which was remarkably good. Three championship points were earned. Altogether a real good show.

Quebec Kennel Club Show

Never since the eventful day when Jacques Cartier, the first European to sail into the St. Lawrence River, in the year 1535, have the dog-loving people of old Quebec enjoyed themselves so well as they did on the occasion of their first annual Dog Show, held June 23-24, 1920, under Canadian Kennel Club rules, and managed by the indefatigable Dr. J. H. Villeneuve of Montreal, and it has been said there were no rough places observable to the most critical. Albert Mitchell, Chicago, was judge, and managed to satisfy the winners and to dissatisfy the losers, as have every mortal judge since Adam superintended the first show in the Ark. Some considerable time before we were interested in canines, the fact that several of Albert's friends were amongst the "kickers," would justify our belief that he placed the dogs at least honestly as he found them. Mrs. Mitchell accompanied her husband and enjoyed the show immensely.

English Bulldogs were the largest entry, 21 being entered and 1 absent. All the leading specimens were benched, one of their number, "Southport Joffre," having won the distinction of being the best Canadian-bred and best non-sporting dog in the show.

Pekingese were the "surprise packet" as far as entries went, 17 of the "Orientals" being benched, and included all the dignitaries of the breed in Eastern Canada, Mrs. Redway's "Walnut Mannikin" taking the top in dogs, while her "Yuk San of Ecclesal!" won in bitches, and went over "Mannikin" for best of breed prize.

G. E. Letourneau, a member of the Executive, won for himself golden encomiums; the plaudits of the gathering were lavishly bestowed upon nim. This good fancier, accompanied and assisted by his little son, actually got to the show in the early morning, exercised every dog on the lead, gave every dog a clean bed and a clean drink, swept out and disinfected the building, and when the show opened its freshness and cleanness was a pleasure to behold. It is said that friend Letourneau is the leading spirit of the Quebec Kennel Club, and we are not surprised to hear it, and wish the whirlwind Frenchman the best in the Add to this splendid achievement the fact that Mr. Letourneau nandled over 40 dogs without any fees, so that new beginners in the club would be encouraged to take a stronger grip in the fancy.

Bert Swann, famed far and wide for nis uncanny handling abilities, treated the crowds to some splendid handling feats; particularly pleasing was his efforts when "Int. Ch. Master Butcher" was the subject in hand. Again we must mention Mr. Letourneau, his little girl, 5 years old, gave a splendid account of herself by posing and handing, in very smart style, the well-known bulldog "Glencairn Duke."

NOTES ON QUEBEC SHOW. By "Onlooker."

To have pleasure "all its own" attaches itself to the privilege of introducing a brand new dog show to our readers, so here goes for the Quebec Kennel Club Show, held June 23 and 24. Without a doubt the fixture has come to stay. The officials to a man are workers in this connection. Comparisons are always lacking in completeness, but, oh! for a western crop of the "Letourneau" type, whether they be of the hot-house or even just common garden variety, they would be a boon to every show.

Dr. Villeneuve, V.S., of Montreal, was the man in charge of the whole works; this was responsible for the ribbons and catalogues being on hand before the opening hour. An intelligent order of judging, which "was carried out" to the letter. A welcome to the visitors of the kind only known in Quebec. A ring steward, well, we were going to give this item of news the usual line.

One line, or even two, cannot do justice to Mr. W. Ogden's services at a show. As a companion to a "dry Land-Lipton," W. Ogden is indispensable, a cough, sneeze or hesitation waltz on the part of a "Lady Henry" under his practical treatment is soon turned into a dream of travel, and again, as a ring steward, Mr. Ogden stands alone, master of his duties and a thorough student of human nature, those trying moments of expectancy followed by elation or disappointment, as the case may be, are equally met by this master of ceremonies, who strives to make the entrance and exit of exhibitors to the "charmed circle" equally pleasant for both winner and loser alike.

About 150 dogs were benched, with Montreal and Toronto sending quite a representation. The least said of some of the large breeds the better. Russian Wolfhounds were three, whilst Greyhounds saw the statuesque "Ch. Master Butcher" doing duty for John G. Kent. Irish Setters saw St. John, N.B. represented by "Barney II.," in wonderful bloom. He was an easy winner. Trudeau's "Ch. Sonora Nancy." in nice coat, had been too friendly with the cook. In English Setters (4),

there was one quality sort, "Drumclamph Lady," a typey liver ticked specimen. Airedales made a nice entry in both sexes. "Walnut Bandmaster," winners; "Harvie Warlock," reserve; "Briarwood Blossom," winners and best of breed; "Parkton Arlette," reserve.

Collies (5)—"Coltness Commander's" coat and maturity placed him ahead of "Quarrybrae Sunstar."

Airedales were a grand collection of the biggest and best Terriers, Jack Babb bringing along no less than six from his famous kennels in Washington. The competition was very keen, especially in open dogs, "El Commanche of Briarcrest," "Connaught Gassoon," and "Kingston Pat" fighting it out, and being placed in the order named. Bitches brought out some new ones with lots of quality, "Glenside Peggy," bred by Norman McLeod, going from puppy to winners.

Beston Terriers were not so numerous as at other shows, but what they lacked in quantity, they made up in quality. Best dog was "Chum's Duplicate," best bitch being "Rellim Wee Wee."

A nice collection of Bull Terriers faced the judge. The winning dog, Ch. "Richards Jeff," is a good specimen, sound as a dollar. Best bitch went to "Anzac White Countess," a bitch with lots of quality.

Bulldogs had a large entry. The judging of this breed attracting a large crowd at the ringside. Competition was keen, and the placing of "Futurity Real Lady," owned by Dr. Sleeth, as best of the breed, drew the applause of the ringsiders. Best opposite sex went to a real good one, "Kingsway Squire," owned by J. J. Jackson.

Scotch Collies had some grand specimens entered, and it seems appropriate that best of the breed should be owned by a Scotchman. Best dog was "Lochaber Loyal," owned by P. J. McLachlan, a real top-notcher, best bitch being "Lochaber Lorna," both winners being natives of New Westminster, the home of everything good in Scotch.

The real Derby of the show was the judging of Cocker Spaniels. "Princello," a grand black of correct type, owned by Frank Archer, going to winners dogs. Winners bitches and best of the breed, as well as best bitch in show all breeds went to Mr. Moore's Ch. "Moonshine."

A large class of Setters faced the judge. This class produced very keen competition. Best Setter was won by "Rowlands Credential," a real one, owned by Mr. Wilgress. This dog romped through everything, and even-

tually was placed best in show all breeds, the most popular best in show verdict ever rendered in Vancouver.

TOWSER ASSURED COURT PROTECTION.

Man Who Wantonly III-Treated Valuable Dog Described by Judge As a "Brute."

Towser and Fido are not without friends at court, as was demonstrated recently when Chief Justice Macdonald and his colleagues of the court of appeal uttered scathing denunciations of the conduct of George Ritchie of Northfield who brutally clubbed and maimed a valuable English setter belonging to W. R. Wilgress, of Vancouver. The animal lived in great pain for two weeks, but later had to be shot. Ritchie's plea of justification to a damage action brought by the owner, was that under the sheep protection act any dog at large in the district in question may be killed.

"Nobody questions that he may have had the right to kill the dog under certain circumstances," commented the chief justice, "but he simply beat the dog in a savage manner for no object connected with the protection of sheep, but just because he was a brute. This is a case of wanton cruelty and nothing else.

"This is one of the most painful cases heard in this court for a long time. It would be a pity if is should get abroad in this so-called sheep district that men may go out and abuse wantonly and in this brutal fashion any dog without a tag. It would be unfortunate if such a man could escape punishment. It is true, the criminal code provides punishment for such acts, but fortunately also the civil law has a remedy for persons sustaining loss through such conduct. The defendant is entitled to no sympathy whatever; a man who undertakes to kill a dog should show good faith. If this had been done under a sense of duty he would have come forward and pleaded to that effect, but he does not do so."

Mr. Justice Martin held that the sheep protection act could not be in-

voked by one who did not act in bona fide compliance with the intent of the act and that an act for the protection of sheep could not be construed to allow an act of brutality. Mr. Justice McPhillips said that the act was not meant to encourage the destruction of dogs and expressed the hope that he would never be called upon again to hear so painful a case.

Mr. Justice Gallagher expressed his complete agreement with the other judge's comments as to the wanton cruelty that the evidence disclosed, while judgment could not be based on such principles he held that it was the duty of the court to mention its attitude towards such things.

The facts upon which the judgment was based were adduced before Judge Barker at Nanaimo, Mr. Wilgress explained that the animal in question was the famous "Snowdon Lady Rowland," heroine of many bench shows where last season she several times won the cup for the best dog in the show of all breeds. She was sent from her kennel at Vancouver to Mr. Wilgress' brother at Northfields to have a litter and at the time she was beaten had a pup a month old. A little girl was the witness of the occurence and she saw the beautiful setter in the clutches of Ritchie as he beat it with a club. Then when the dog broke away with one leg broken and dangling the defendant hurled boulders at it. Mr. Wilgress valued the animal at \$250 and was awarded damages to that amount on the appeal.

In the course of argument that untagged dogs were allowed to be killed and hence that Ritchie was within his rights, F. S. Cunliffe, counsel for the defendant was interrupted by a member of the court who remarked:

"Does that mean that a man may become an irresponsible executioner and sit on his verandah and shoot every dog that goes by?"

Chief Justice Macdonald also commented:

"Are you serious in contending that a man could go out and break the legs of every dog in the district? For that is what this man did wantonly."

Victor B. Harrison conducted the appeal for the owner of the beaten dog.—(Vancouver Sun.)

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
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
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
