

Meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club

The regular monthly meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club was held in the new office of the Club, 774½ Yonge Street, Toronto, on Thursday evening, August 19th, 1920, the President, Mr. Joseph Russell, in the chair.

The following members of the Board of Directors were in attendance: Messrs. Geo. C. Briggs, Harry Clayton, H. M. Jackson, N. K. Miller, Neil Renwick, N. K. Swire, Donald Wheeler and Geo. Ward.

The minutes of the previous meeting (June) were read, and on motion were declared approved.

The Secretary reported the developments in the Helman vs. Slattery case, and it was moved and seconded that all the evidence be sent on to the Canadian National Live Stock Record Board, inviting them to further handle the case, where it will be convenient to have the parties to the dispute brought together. "Carried."

The Secretary reported having all the data covering the protest sent in by Mr. G. H. Jeatt, Victoria, B.C., against the management of the most recent Show held by the Terminal City Kennel Club, and after careful consideration and full discussion it was moved and seconded "That the protest be not allowed on the ground of insufficient evidence. "Carried."

A protest was laid by Miss Camille J. LaViolette, Longueuil, accompanied by the customary fee, protesting the accuracy of certain advertised statements made by Mrs. W. W. Brown, Montreal, in *Montreal Daily Star*, Saturday, June 26th, 1920, and asking the Canadian Kennel Club to have Mrs. W. W. Brown prove her statements or retract same, in the same column in which they had appeared.

The defendant had on hand several samples of similar advertising which had been used by the plaintiff, all of which was considered undesirable advertising, and after discussion it was moved and seconded "That the protest be not sustained, and that the parties interested in the controversy be asked to discontinue their present system and advertising, which is considered undesirable, and which request, if not observed, will lead to further action being taken by the Board of Directors. "Carried."

"ANDY" ARMSTRONG WILL TAKE YOUR ENTRIES.

The dog show to be held this year in connection with the Central Canada Exhibition, Ottawa, gives every indication of being the best by long odds ever held in Ottawa.

An enthusiastic committee, under the chairmanship of Dr. George Hilton, has charge of the arrangements and it has received splendid support from the exhibition directors and from others. The directors have increased the prize list from \$1,500 to \$2,000, and in addition many cash and other special prizes have been donated by men and firms interested in the success of the show.

The exhibition directors have provided an excellent building for the show, so that the comfort and convenience of exhibitors and patrons are assured. For this year the building has been completely gone over and all necessary repairs and changes made. In addition it will be equipped throughout with Spratt's portable benching, which was purchased last year too late for the show.


Mr. J. J. Holgate, of Doncaster, England, whose standing is above question, will judge all breeds except American Foxhounds and Boston Terriers. This fact alone should ensure much satisfaction to exhibitors. Mr. William Austin, of Toronto, will judge the Bostons, and Mr. Humphrey Elliott, of Ottawa, will judge the American Foxhounds, two selections which will also doubtless find favor with all dog men.

Last year the number of dogs benched was well over the two point requirement, and this year the committee is determined to make the Ottawa bench show a three-point show. The prize list is now issued and may be had on application to J. K. Paisley, secretary and manager of the exhibition, City Hall, Ottawa. Entries close at noon, Sept. 11th.

An innovation this year will be a two-day cat show, which will be held in a building separate from the dog building. The Ottawa Cat Club is co-operating in this and it has assurance of cats being entered from Montreal, Toronto and other places. On the success of this cat show will depend the holding of subsequent shows.

The Ottawa Fair dates are Sept. 10 to 20; the dog show dates Sept. 14 to 17, and the cat show dates, Sept. 15 and 16. Every provision is made for the care of dogs and cats sent in from outside places without handlers, but special prizes for handlers are offered as inducements to have them come.

Regina Kennel Club Show

The above "Trio" are, and may be considered the "big barks" of this very live Western Canine organization, and to their gigantic efforts much of the success of the fifth annual Show of the Regina Kennel Club, held on July 27, 28, 29 and 30, in connection with the Provincial Exhibition for Saskatchewan. "Charlie" Watson meets the visitors and makes them all feel perfectly at home, just as an ideal President should do. "Johnnie" Newman takes the Superintendent's position and fills it admirably, and has ideas all his own, which at once are instructive and a boon to the exhibi-



tors and patrons. Take, for instance, the Directory, which gives you the location of any particular breed as quickly and as surely as getting a number from a public building directory. Then, the indicators, which read: "This way to the judging ring," etc., everything was fine, and Jack deserves heaps of credit and mountains of praise, but there, "They all love Jack." Charlie Keating, the Secretary—a public accountant in business—is a stickler for detail, and has his work practically finished before the judging commences. After the breed classes comes the breed specials, and there is no use anyone suggesting anything else. This is the Secretary's job, and this is his way, and it works out with perfect smoothness, while Charlie sits and smiles, "I told you so."

Then the "Brace" below are the "men behind the guns of Regina Kennel Club," Norman K. Mackenzie, K.C., is probably the best known fancier on the continent of America, and we were greatly impressed to notice this very, very busy man, coming to the Show every day and taking his seat with the fanciers in the gallery and watching the judging with the greatest possible interest. Regina Kennel Club is particularly fortunate in having Mr. Mackenzie as a patron.

"Herb" M. Clements, Vice-President, is the proud possessor of Regina Kennel Club's "million dollar smile," and a prince of good fellows. Mr. Clements kept his "MacLachlan" at the disposal of the visitors every hour of the twenty-four, and that he

Norman K. Swire was the Judge elected to pass judgment on all breeds (excepting Bird dogs), and had four whole days to perform his task, consequently there was neither rush nor worry. That he was master of his task was at all times noticeable, and his placings were made without fear or favor. To get to this Show



in time Mr. Swire had to do some tall hustling. From England to Regina, in an almost continuous trip, is quite a journey; yet this was the distance covered by this intrepid traveller; yet he arrived in Regina fit as the proverbial fiddle.

Mr. Swire never seeks to see either dogs or friends until he has finished his task of judging.

Evan E. Gravell had allocated to him the task of gleaning the "chaff from the wheat" in the Bird dogs, and while he was possibly showing signs of nervousness as he commenced his first professional task of canine judgment, we will say that he soon stead-

died up and taking full command of himself, gave a real creditable account of his great knowledge of Bird dogs, particularly the English Setter, of which breed he is no doubt complete master; his placings will be found on other pages of this issue. And we wish to say here, that we watched Mr. Garvell's work very carefully, and were delighted with the way he performed his arduous duties.

We may be pardoned for mentioning that Mr. Swire and Mr. Gravell seemed to form quite an attraction for each other, and seldom were they separated for long, and now we learn that they will soon be permitted to renew their acquaintance, as Mr. Swire has been selected to judge at New Westminster Exhibition, the latter days of September and the early days of October.

Bert Swann, Toronto's ablest and farthest travelled handler, had a string of Canada's best dogs at this Show, and drawn from all the most popular breeds; this must not be considered anything else than truth, because it was generally conceded that his string of dogs were exceptionally strong and found to be in the main invincible. To keep 16 dogs in fit condition, travelling sixteen hundred and sixty-five miles, in midsummer weather, to get to a dog show, is no small matter for concern; then to be four days benched, and a similar number of miles to be covered on the return trip, and landing with the charges ready for the next Show, is a feat which may be considered quite marvellous. This trip was a trying one, but every dog arrived back in Toronto ready for their next fixture. About a dozen winners' ribbons were won by Mr. Swann's string at this Show. We will not name any particular dog, as they will all be mentioned elsewhere in the award columns, but ask to be pardoned for seeking the exception in the case of the old warrior, Int. Ch. Polam Maxim, who was a general favorite with all Regina fanciers, and he was the centre of all observation when he entered the ring, as if he owned the Show, the judge, the handler and his critics. No doubt, so he did, when the coveted "purple" was again awarded to him amid enthusiasm.

James D. Strachan, editor of this journal, and your Secretary, had been invited as the guest of the Regina Kennel Club, as you have already been informed, and who in later issues of Kennel and Bench will endeavor to regale you with his own experiences and the experiences of those who accompanied him on his trip to the Capital City of the Province of Sas-

katchewan, the whole making quite a lengthy article and, we hope, instructive as well. It was his first trip to Western Canada, and everything was new to him on the trip. A host of new friends were made, and many old friendships renewed. When in Regina Mr. Strachan received some coaxing invitations to continue his trip to Vancouver, B.C., the invitations being in the joint names of the Terminal City Kennel Club and British Columbia fanciers generally, and sent to him by the Canadian Kennel Club's Directors for that Province. It was with sincere regret that the invitation could not be accepted at this time, but the very first opportunity presenting itself will be taken, and Mr. Strachan will quite willingly go to the Coast, there to meet the members and fanciers, many of whom he now calls by their first names.

All in all, then, the re-union at Regina was of the heart-to-heart kind, and, no doubt, will be found to have borne much fruit in the days to come in our Canadian Dogdom.

Following is a review of the breeds judged by Norman K. Swire, Toronto, Ont.:

The big breeds were badly represented, Madison Empress was easily the best St. Bernard; she was shown in tip-top form, and is one of the soundest bitches imaginable.

In Great Danes, Prince of Brunswick was the only one worthy of mention. He is a big, upstanding fawn, on the day he was a little out of condition.

Collies, with 49 entries, made a nice section. Sandy XXVII was Winners dog and best of breed. The reserve winner, Verdun Pilot, is very similar in type. Quarrybrae Sunstar, 1st Puppy and 3rd Open, is a promising youngster; his indifferent ring manners spoiled his chances. Melford Mountaineer, 3rd Limit, is a big, rangy dog, was shown short of coat and lacked the quality of the above mentioned dogs. There was little to separate the first three in Open Bitches. Ch. Weston Refinement, the winner, just gained the verdict over Scotia Sapphire, who had plowed her way from Puppy to Reserve Winners. She is a typical little bitch, with few faults. On the day she lost to Refinement in size, bone and coat. Mayflower Patricia, 3rd Open, is another useful one.

Bulldogs had 44 entries, no less than 20 of these came from the well known Chinook Kennels. In this section the dogs were far superior to the bitches. Southport Joffre, the Winners dog, was easily best of breed; he is an all-white dog with many out-

standing qualities and few faults. Reserve to him was Vesey Viceroy, a well-balanced little dog, but lacks the quality and make-up of the winner. Cactus Blighty was 1st in heavyweights; he is a sound dog, excelling in body properties. Bill Coronet, 2nd in heavyweights, is a youngster of exceptional promise and will do some winning when ready. Bitches were a mixed lot, the pick of these being the brindle Warleigh Molly. The winning puppy, Chinook Blaze, will need watching when matured.

Airedales, with over 86 entries, made the largest and best collection. Pride of place in this variety was an easy thing for Ch. Polam Maxim. He was put down in his usual fit condition, winners Vesey Viceroy; 3, Mr. and Mrs. A. P. Semple's Cactus Sile Blaze.

and won with the biggest of margins. His nearest rival was Claycliffe Tip Top, following in order came Pottery Invader and a promising youngster named Silver Cadet. There were several promising youngsters shown that will be heard from later.

Claycliffe Beauty, a terrier from stem to stern, went to Winners bitches. Birchcliffe Babs being Reserve winners; Maxim's Silver Spray and Vicking Blossom being close contenders.

Boston Terriers, with over 50 entries, made a good showing. Yankee Speed King headed this popular variety; he was put down in tip-top form and won with ease. Deeside King and Sensation Boy had quite a struggle for Reserve winners, the former scoring in head and hindquarter. A clean-cut and trappy little female named Lady Raffles, carried off Winners and several specials; next in order came a youngster named Reno's Jewel, a good one, but not quite ready.

Fox Terriers, Smooth. The class for Puppy dogs saw a battle royal between two brothers, Madison Matchmaker and Madison Marksman, both show exceptional promise, and were only defeated for Winners by Ch. Lavenger's Best, who won on maturity. The best of the opposite sex was Ch. Madison Atalanta, closely pressed by Airy Fairy Sutton.

Wires, produced a few new faces and a few old-timers, the sensation in this section was Flornell Rapid Fire, a stylish and typical Terrier teeming with quality. Winners and special for best of breed fell to his lot with ease. Ch. Mickey's Model and Ch. Admiral Don followed in the order named. Norfolk Rebound, the Limit winner, is a real useful one, nice size, typical and a good shower; his scarcity of coat prevented him from going higher. Nothing sensational turned out in bitches, Brockley Brilliant just gained the verdict over Can So.

Ch. Alcester Rose, a well balanced Whippet, was alone in her class. The same remark applies to Drumclaph Worri in Scotch Terriers. Princess Pat, a small and good-coated Yorkshire, carried all before her in that variety.

In Pomeranians, Waratah Torquill went to Winners. He is a rich orange carrying a good coat of the right texture, fine bone, and a nice head. The Reserve winner, Askern War Cloud, is another typical one and pressed the winner closely. Waratah Ebony is a youngster that will make a name for himself when matured. Lady Mayfair has many outstanding qualities and won over Waratah Queenie for best of opposite sex.

Pekingese saw Walnut Mannikin on top in the dog section, and Yuk San of Ecclesall best of opposite sex. Both are good specimens. The latter carries a good coat, but loses to Mannikin in head and body properties.

The remaining breeds call for no comment. All the Variety classes were filled and the competitions were of high order.

Following is a review of the breeds judged by Evan E. Gravell, Vancouver, B.C.:

English Setters. There was a nice entry of this beautiful breed of sporting dog, most of the classes being well filled with representative specimens, making their placement a pleasure. Puppy dogs, 1st to Miss Del Whitten's Coates Ranger; very pleasing head, nice neck, clean shoulders and sound front; needs time to make up body. Members' dogs, 1st to Miss Del Whitten's Verdoon Superfine; very shapely body, nice head and neck, good coat and feather but lacks size. Limit dogs, 1st to Herb Clement's Coates Yanto Boy, a beautifully marked blue Belton. Extra good body, coat and feather, with grand hindquarters; lacks refinement in head and needs time to tighten up in front. 2nd, Capt. G. Hemman's Sport; fair head, good body, and a very workman-like setter. Open dogs, 1st to D. C. Samson's Prince of Alberta, a lemon Belton, beautiful headed dog, with a well-finished foreface, low set ear and nice expression, clean shoulders, sound front and correct type, loses a trifle in hindquarters. Winners, Prince of Alberta; Reserve, Coates Yanto Boy. Puppy bitches, 1st again to Miss Del Whitten's entry, Verdoon Juliette, with a nice head and neck, and grand expression; a rare body, good front and hindquarters, and a splendid mover. Novice bitches, 1st Miss Del Whitten's Coates Lady Gravell, a sweet bitch this, scoring in skull, eye and length of neck; body and quarters good; just having left off maternal duties, was hardly looking her best. 2nd to Dr. I. Brown's Pat-a-Bell; fairly good in head and neck, with clean shoulders and sound front; quite long enough in body and could be better in her pasterns. Limit bitches, 1st to Herb Clement's Mallwyd Lillie, a rare quality lemon Belton with capital head and neck, good length and finish of foreface, ideal skull formation, with ears low set; sound in front; a good depth of brisket and A1 quarters; legs and feet of the very best, and a splendid mover. 2nd to Coates Lady Gravell, already reviewed. 3rd to Dr. I. Robb's Dream Girl, a sound setter of the field type.

Best Setter in show, to Herb Clement's grand dog, Ch. Mallwyd Rowland, looking very fit, a big dog with a wonderful headpiece on a splendid neck and shoulders; great depth of brisket and good strong quarters; ample bone, nice bend of stifle, and a vigorous mover. Chesapeake Bay dogs, Novice, 1st P. Douglas' Beaver Dons Duke, well put together but not very good in coat and too dark in color. Limit dogs, 1st to S. R. Atkinson's Jack, with a good front, powerful quarters and stifles; coat of color and texture. Winners, Jack. Reserve, Beaver Dons Duke. Retrievers (Curly) puppy dogs, 1st to W. G. Thomson's Rowdy Boy, a well-built dog, good brisket and set-on of tail, curls tight, good legs and feet, and handles splendidly. 2nd, A. Batchen's Tweedside Laddie, good type, but loses to winner in size and substance. Winners, Rowdy Boy. Reserve, Tweedside Laddie. Members' bitches, 1st to Miss E. Popham's Littlecote Belle, a very typical bitch with a grand head; very sound all over; curls tight and a rare mover. Winners, Littlecote Belle. Irish Setters, 1st to Charlie Watson's Saskatchewan Pat. She was one of the first of Ch. "Ormskirk Foxall's" progeny and was born on the train journey from England at North Bay. Although a consistent prize winner, she was on every occasion but one, outshone by her litter sister Ch. Weston Queen O' Quality, a rare specimen when in bloom. The full amount of success that came to the Corona Kennels was due to Corona Daisy. Her best puppy was later on known as Ch. "Corona Premier" who was presented to the readers of the Collie Folio by Donald Wheeler, the noted authority, late of Birmingham, England, as the ideal Collie. He was later described in "Kennel and Bench" as being the best dog of any breed ever bred in Canada. Several tempting offers was made for "Corona Daisy" but the kiddies dog was never for sale.

What the Judges Have to Say

"CHARLIE" HOPTON SAYS RE-
CENT LADIES' KENNEL CLUB
FIXTURE WAS A HUM
DINGER.

To the Editor of Kennel and Bench:

Thinking perhaps that a few remarks on the recent annual event of the Ladies' Kennel Club of Canada may be of some interest to the exhibitors, I am sending my humble notes on the Show, which was quite one of the best held in Montreal, that is, visited by me since the Ogilvie-Laurin Show, held on Mount Royal some fourteen years ago.

Since then we have, unfortunately, lost ground in Cocker Spaniels, Collies and St. Bernards, but the improvement seen in Canadian-bred Airedales, Fox Terriers, Irish and Scottish terriers, and several of the toy breeds, such as Pomeranians and Pekingese, have been most gratifying. Now that the Ladies' Kennel Club of Canada has become such a strong organization, with such sterling sportswomen at the helm, as was evidenced at the recent show, one feels justified in stating that a most successful future is in store for the Canadian fancy. In expressing the hopes that the near future may see a string of Canadian-breds, several from the kennels of members of the Ladies' Kennel Club of Canada, invincible at the Westminster and other prominent shows, I am but voicing my most heartfelt sentiments, and one feels justified in presuming that the very near future may see such an achievement, did not the local-bred Irish setter, "Sonora Fancy," beat everything in her classes at the recent Westminster, and had she been returned BEST of the breed, it would have been but her just reward, for she was undoubtedly the best all-round specimen of her breed at the show.

The Forum is a splendid place for a dog show, with ample space for rings, and good light, but show committees in the future must not overlook the importance of good ring stewards; at the third annual show I was somewhat handicapped by the lack of good ring service, and while one must sincerely congratulate the show committee, which comprised such ardent sportswomen as Mesdames Holton H. Learmont, a host in herself, Chas. E. Spragge, J. F. Sonne, H. Tredou, and the Misses C. J. La Violette, to whom much credit is due for the splendid progress the quaint Pekingese is mak-

ing in the Dominion; Eva Fournier, A. Sonne, that keen admirer of French Bulldogs; Julia Morrison, and the irrepressible honorary secretary, Vera H. Robson, who worked like Trojans until far into the night, one is almost tempted to say even to the "wee sma' hours," I am frank to admit that had it not been for the superhuman efforts of those sterling fanciers, Messrs J. McCorquodale, Charles Aitken, and W. Brown, not forgetting the appreciated assistance from my fellow judge, Helen Muskerry Talbot, I would not have been through by Sunday morning.

It is to be hoped that at future shows the Committee will insist that all badge-wearers will jump in and lend a much-needed helping hand in getting the dogs into the ring and personally see that the many details connected with the dog show are carried out in proper manner.

Irish Setters had lots of quality, all being sound and of the right type, truly "Irish," all of the winners being good enough to hold their own on the American circuit, as were the Russian Wolfhounds. Bull Terriers, however, were somewhat disappointing; one would have imagined a much more level entry when one recalls the early Canadian shows; the majority of the winners were too much on the English Terrier type, lacking muzzle and substance throughout. On the other hand, Wire-haired Fox Terriers were very good, and in awarding the trophy for best in show to the local dog, "Ridgeway Dark Boy," I felt that he was the better all-round terrier, compared with that marvellous Airedale, International Champion, "Polam Maxim," whose only fault, one is almost tempted to say, is that his worthy owner did not breed him. "Maxim" made the most of his chances, and is as good as ever in head, but he was not in good coat, and I made the Fox Terrier the better in feet, shoulders, and action. A right good bitch was "Raby's Model," aptly named, as she is a real model, which won easily from a nice class, several of which were quite good enough for our American shows. Then came the Irish Terriers, where I had quite a time dividing a real good trio, "Coast Natiye Hotspur," "Mendon Mike," and "Galtee More Barney," on type, that is real "daredevil" expression, and pose, I might have placed "Mendon Mike" top dog, but he was not in good coat, and none too good in front; all were good

enough for the blue. Scottish Terriers were also good, both the winning dog and bitch, "Athol Brag" and "Rantin Jean," being exceptionally good—I prefer the more medium size, and that was where they scored over several larger dogs that showed lots of true "Scottie" character. Bulldogs were rather mixed, the red brindle dog, "Who Goes There," easily able to hold his own in his classes, but was beaten for the special by "La Tosh," a very impressive heavyweight, which should come over to the American shows and convince some of our conceited American exhibitors that Canada has at least one bitch that can make the best look to their laurels. I had to "gate" one dog, which was woefully overdone both in underjaw, being very much wry, and malformed in his pastern; he also could have been improved in hind-quarters; one cannot expect the same soundness in Bulldogs as in Terriers, but one should bar dogs verging on the exaggerated type of the dog referred to. French Bulldogs rather disturbed me, as the one real good one, Henderson's "Jacques Fournier," that was good enough for the best of competition, was disqualified for being blind. I sincerely hope it is but a temporary trouble that can be cured, as he is far too good a dog to be permanently put aside. Among the winners were such typical specimens as "Vimy Ridge," "Poilu Beauteemps," and some very useful bitches. "La France Princesse" and "Princesse Manon," which, if mated right, should produce some good puppies.

Pomeranians, unfortunately, were judged between lights which made it somewhat difficult to compare color, practically all were good specimens, several very promising puppies, one a heavily coated sable, shown by that astute fancier, W. MacFadden, which won for best puppy with quite a bit to spare, the winning dog, "Lilly Hill Model," and "Cheeky Wee Victor," were in rare coat, the former scoring a bit in head, bone and action; then there was a real smart black, and a useful chocolate, that could have been improved with more coat; in all it was a very smart entry.

Then came Pekingese, where several very promising youngsters appeared, among them being "Ping of Holderness," "Sun of Wangza," and "Wing of Wangza," all showing the right type, and should mature in more than useful specimens. Canadian-breds went to a very impressive grey brindle,

"Shantung of Wangza," with a topping head, extra good nose, and sound, heavily boned front; he needs to finish in face and body, then he should make the best go. It was in body and shortness of face that I made "Tangerine of Huron" and "Yen Li" the better specimens, but with the two improvements suggested for "Shantung" he might have beaten the lot. A very sweet little bitch was "Nowata Tai Pey," a replica in type and shortness of face and body of her famous sire, Ch. "Chun Chang of Alderbourne," who is doing such great stud work in the Yankibourne Kennels. She won quite easily and might have beaten the dog for the special, as she had the better formation of face, but did not show when in for specials, as well as in the regular classes.

MY U. S. A. IMPRESSIONS.

By W. E. Alcock, England.

Complying with the request of the Editor of the "Dog World," I have much pleasure in giving my "Impressions" gained during my recent visit to America.

The breeds that struck me as being very strong indeed are: Wire-haired Fox Terriers, Bob-tailed Sheep Dogs and Chow Chows. Then come Smooth Fox Terriers, Airedale Terriers, Irish Terriers and Bull Dogs.

Dachshounds masquerade under the name of Badger Dogs, whilst the German Sheep Dog is known as the Shepherd Dog.

The Boston Terriers are indeed smart little chaps that greatly took my fancy, and if cropping were allowed in this country I should not be long before I owned some.

It was a treat for me to see such a level lot of little hounds as the Beagles proved to be at Convent Show, N.J., whilst the American Cocker at the same show, owned by Mrs. Haley Fiske and Mr. W. T. Payne, interested me greatly. The latter gentleman is to be congratulated upon owning such a wonderfully level and typical team as those he benched at Convent, more particularly so as he bred them all himself.

The Toys as a whole were a disappointment to me, as I certainly expected to see very much larger classes at the several shows I attended. Pekes predominated; Greyhounds and Whip-pets, too, were very disappointing.

I cannot speak too highly of the very great kindness and hospitality I received from every one I met. To individualize would be impossible, as

they were, one and all, kindness indeed.

There are one or two items in connection with shows in the States that strike me as absolutely wrong: (1) The *bad* habit exhibitors have of not benching their exhibits, but keeping them locked away in their travelling boxes or crates. Surely a visitor to a show is entitled to see the dogs on their benches after paying his admission fee. Otherwise, why go to the trouble or expense of having any benches at all? One show I attended had no benches, but only a few pens provided for the Toys; but these were empty all day.

(2) The entering of exhibits to compete for specials only, a practice I consider not only unsportsmanlike, but one that savors much of pot hunting, whilst the lack of competition makes the (in this country) coveted title of champion very easily obtainable and "cheap." Neither should dogs be allowed to compete for specials unless they compete in at least one class, and that should be a breed class, where such is provided. Another thing I could not quite understand, and that was, why so many owners "looked on" whilst their dogs were led into the ring and shown by the various handlers. Half the fun, to my way of thinking, is to handle your own dog in the ring, and surely it is not considered *infra dig.* to do so in the States.—The Dog World.

Miss M. E. Lewis, of Paignton, Devonshire, England, sailed from Montreal recently on the "Minnedosa." Miss Lewis recently judged the Fox Terrier Specialty Show at Morristown, N.Y., and spent a day in Montreal on her return journey looking over the Wires in this vicinity. At the Malden establishment she was struck by the bone and substance that the youngsters carried. She thought "Malden Dusky Reba" was just the size and had wonderful bone, legs and feet. A dog pup by "Malden Collarboy" ex "Malden Fatma" was the occasion of her remarking that if she owned him she would not part with him for any money. Ch. "Dusky Bounce" was not in show form, but Miss Lewis saw his quality under his ragged jacket. She informed Mrs. Lepine (who was doing the honors in the absence of "Alf") that she saw "Bounce" long before he landed here, and remembered judging his sire many times in England.

BULLDOG BARKS.

S. O. Cawthra, corresponding for the Bulldog Breeders' Association, says that all the business of their last meet-

ing was accompanied to the strains of an organization of Scottish extraction, who were presumably preparing in anticipation of the "Glorious Twelfth." Their attempts were awarded by the near raising of the roof of the building. Special awards were voted by the Bulldog Breeders to the parties who won the limit class on the bass drum and the open class on the double B., and between spasms our correspondent noticed there was an extraordinarily large turn-out of members to handle the question of their Specialty Show, to be held at Toronto on Thanksgiving Day. Enthusiasm was running at the peak and the prize money was generously guaranteed, the building has been secured and is the Veterinary College Building on University Avenue, near Dundas Street. 




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
