## OH, SURE, SHE IS GOOD ENOUGH TO BREED FROM! BUT IS SHE?

On the scales of success careful study will always be found to outweigh every other item. Of the large number of females being bred from at the present time in Canada, each and every one come under the heading of brood bitch. If the bitch can only stand on her legs long enough to be mated she enters the matron class. How often do we hear fanciers remark "She is no good, only to be bred from"? and in this way do their little bit in upholding the standard of the Collie (and other breeds as well), much to the discredit of the Collie and the Collie standard, and the other standards as well.

The mating of these snipey little weaklings enables the fancier to place the progeny on the market after an explanation to the intending purchaser that they are sure to win prizes, and an invitation to inspect the very best pedigree obtainable anywhere. He makes a sale. Oh, yes, he delivers the goods—\$5 worth of dog and \$20 worth of paper from the live-stock records. It's fine business, as the Finklesteins would say; but by the shades of the glorious Collies of a decade ago, where is it getting us? Each year the show benches of our exhibitions tell their own tale. The market Collie is rapidly taking the place of the show Collie, because if you happen to possess a good line of talk you can get as much for a poor pup as you can for a good one. The standard is too much trouble, and it isn't necessary. All you need is the gift of the gab.

In Canada every female is a brood bitch, but in the home of the show Collie (England and Scotland) it is only those that come up to the requirements needed to improve the breed that come under this heading. Every effort is made, and no trouble is too much to secure the right kind of female. She must be big, sound as a bell, and of good type. Much thought is given to the stud dog proposition. They have an ideal, something to work up to. They get a good price for their stock, because, by giving careful study, they have found out that the real kind of brood bitch is a veritable gold mine.

A visit to the leading kennels of Britain would soon convince you that brood bitches are carefully selected; the difference being that they don't call a weak, undersized, thin-legged runt a Collie at all. If you want to

make good, sooner or later you will have to recognize that the pretty "Little Society Lady" kind get you nowhere; it is the big, healthy, typey kind, with plenty of room inside her, able to do two days' work in one, that is going to get you there with both feet. When you find her, if possible find out that her dam was as able-bodied and as sound as she is. Then when she is ready to breed, don't take her to Johnnie Jones's dog in the next street but one. It may be less trouble, but it hardly ever comes out satisfactory. If you possess the price of the stud fee and the travelling expenses for your bitch, then you are a shareholder in the best dogs that the Old Land fanciers have sent over, also the best that Canada and America has produced in home-breds.

Johnnie Jones's dog will get you a litter, but he won't make you a leading breeder. The best he will do for you probably is to give you half a dozen "Woolworth specials" like the "Little Society Lady" kind. He won't bring your customer out of the show ring with a handful of ribbons and a "Kewpie doll" smile, and make him drag his father-in-law and his friends over to your kennel the Sunday after in his "Tin Lizzie" to see if you have "any more like that to sell." When the right kind of brood bitch is recognized and acquired, then, and not till then, will the houndy type and the weaklings gradually be eliminated, and the Collie become what he should be—the "king of all breeds."

In conclusion, I will relate an incident of eighteen years ago in England. I got in conversation with a man who had a magnificent-looking Collie with him. I inquired what he was by. The owner told me he was bought from one of the leading kennels in Lancashire, but the breeder did not consider him to be just what he wanted, and would not give a pedigree with him. How different is their ideas to ours here, where the dog's papers are valued at 75 per cent. of the purchase price. No wonder a man sits down and thinks things over, and wishes that there was some dividing line where the public could distinguish between the dog breeder and the trafficker in pedigrees, who plays havoc with the standard in his quest for the almighty dollar, at \$25 a throw, and six throws to the litter. Soundness, type and quality is what every judge is looking for. This can

never be got from runts; the big, sound, roomy bitch is the reputation maker. This "Oh, she is good enough to breed from" stuff, when applied to little, snipey, unsound specimens, can only mean that the owner is not a success as a breeder, and never will be. Money does not make a successful breeder; careful study brings expert selection; expert selection means wonderful success. There is lots of room at the top when you get there; it only needs thinking about. The foundation of all success is the right kind of brood bitch—let that sink in deep. From her springs home-bred champions and international champions—if she isn't bred to Johnnie Jones's "Mutt" in the next street but one, to save time and trouble.

Harry Clayton, Toronto—who for more years than he cares to confess to—has been raising Airedale Terriers to stand in the very front rank at the most important Canadian and American shows, also to play a most important part in the pedigrees of past and present Airedales.

With a view to the continuance of this policy, we learn with pleasure that a litter of eight (4 and 4) has been born to the Silver Birch establishment, out of "Silver Birch Daisy," and sired by Int. Champion "Polam Maxim"; another litter (3 and 3), out of "Silver Birch Vamp," and by the same famous sire, will also add to the lustre of Harry's kennel. "Silver Birch My Girl" is nursing a litter of 3 dogs and 1 female, sired by the producing "Claycliff Banker"; the total showing 10 male and 8 female puppies, bred intelligently towards the purpose of "better Airedales than ever," to sport the prefix so well known amongst Airedales as "Silver Birch," whose proud owner has only one concern, and that, that Canadian Airedales may continue to hold their own in open competition anywhere.

M. S. Kilby, Montreal, has made another purchase in England, that will bring further prestige to the breed that he interests himself with, in Canada. This time it is the English winning Irish Terrier, "Brentmore Blinkmore," and son of the world renowned Ch. "Brentmore Blinker," and out of a "Rose Badger" bitch. As a sire he claims to his credit the winning "Waac Foresight" and the good Mick, "Music."

W. A. Pritchard has several little jobs for "Blinkmore" to attend to before shipping, and it will likely be around Christmas time before Santa Claus drops him down the Kilby chimney at 248 St. James street, but in good time for Westminster, Philadelphia and Boston, should it happen that he arrives here in "Top o' th' morn', Sor" style; and we wish him the best in the barn for a start.

Wm. ("Billy") Hanlon, St. John, N.B., is nothing at all if he is not a dyed-in-the-wool dog lover, here is synopsis of the canines who are kennelled at the "Fairville" establishment: Airedales, Bull Terriers, Cocker Spaniels, English Setters, Fox Terriers, Russian Wolfhounds, Scotch Terriers, St. Bernards—yes, and there is quality in them all.

John J. Jackson, Edmonds, B.C., reports not having all the breaks in the luck, that a man might naturally expect, who pays strict attention to business, like he does. After "Kingsway Squire" had been entered for the Coast circuit, including Vancouver, Nanaimo, Victoria and New Westminster, he was suddenly taken sick, and was only able to compete at the latter show, where he landed on top. "Coronet Queen" died whelping to "Kingsway Squire," everything being lost, while the last and worst happened to a bitch en route from England, supposed to be in whelp to the English crack Bulldog, "Kilburn Regal," died at Quebec. J. J. says: "It's a great life if a chap don't weaken." And we know his smile is with him yet.

E. Williams, Brandon, Man., renewing his subscription to Kennel and Bench (1920-21), has some generous praise to offer our publication, which modesty forbids us to publish; however, other messages of congratulation keep coming in, and furnish us with an incentive for still further effort and pride in the work.

Mr. Williams has a kennel of Airedales, housing fifteen of the "rough and ready" variety, the progeny of Ch. "Tintern Desire," Ch. "Tintern Tip Top," Ch. "Abbey King Nobbler," and a young stud dog "Vicker's Maxim," a grandson of Ch. "Rhodhu Royalist," ex "Rights," and who, in two litters gave 10 males and 5 females. The best of the young stock is being saved for the bench at the 1921 Shows.

"Major Oak Perfection," the "Ace" Cocker at the Exhibition, by going from novice to winners, bred by Jack Sutton, Winnipeg, and sold to Arthur Garrick, who judged the breed at the Ex., has again been sold for a searching cheque, to an American, who is said to be the foremost authority on the breed in America.

To Mr. Sutton, then, as the breeder, goes considerable credit on this remarkable little dog, "Major Oak Perfection."

W. R. Wardle, Winnipeg, has purchased "Shuniah Dormia," the good producing Collie bitch, from M. Cochran, Fort William, and will breed her to Ch. "Bradnor Chief" with a view to the improvement of collies in his locality, and to producing a winner for the Canadian National in 1921. Good luck to his ambitions.

Mrs. R. S. Richardson, Mimico Beach, Ont., continues to wax enthusiastic over her favorite breed, the quaint little Pekingese, which has brought her name into prominence all over the Dominion, and rightly so, as only the best specimens appeal to her very pronounced ideas and ambitions. No dog show is too far distant for her to consider a premium list. Bright as a dollar herself, it is not surprising that she has a host of friends in the game.

"Prince Cha of Alderbourne" had been recommended by a well-known authority on Pekes as the one best dog in America to suit some of Mrs. Richardson's matrons, which includes the sensational little bitch, Ch. "Young Shi of Homefield," and other good ones; so a pilgrimage, composed of Mrs. Richardson, Dr. R. S. Richardson, and a party of friends to New York, there to obtain at any cost the desired blood of "Prince Cha," a worthy scion of the "Alderbourne" strain, and after the transaction had been completed the question arose, "Could we buy the famous dog?" It was known that Mr. Jerry Snow, Jr., had paid Mrs. Ashton Cross \$1,800 for him only recently, and that he had done some brilliant winning at the best American shows. But could he be bought?

Well, we don't know how it was done, or the extent of the necessary cheque, nor will we hazard a guess, but the fact remains that the great "Prince Cha of Alderbourne" stands now at the head of Mrs. Richardson's kennel, and we prophesy a bright future for him, as he was conceded to be the most wonderful headed Peke in America. In order that all may take advantage of this importation a stud fee (which will enable every fancier to use him liberally) has been arranged, for the improvement of Pekingese generally, and is a great reduction on former fee. J. Harold Wood, Ottawa, has bought the Boston Terrier, "Little Count," C.K.C.S.B. 24765, to head his kennel there. "Little Count" has been in the running for the ribbons at the Boston Terrier Club of Toronto Specialty Show, Canadian National Exhibition and Central Canada Shows, always finishing in the money, and considering that he is only a little over a year old, and has the whole future in front of him, there is no saying as to what heights he may yet attain to both as a show dog and as a sire. Mr. Bert Swann was in charge of both dogs, and while we were not present to see the judging, we know that his charges made the most of themselves, and then some, while further laurels have been won for Canadian Airedaledom.

This latest win must be considered as bordering on the marvellous, and it should be very encouraging to Mr. MacKenzie to know that his good dog can still continue to take on all comers as he does internationally.

"Shantung of Wangza" has just been purchased by Mrs. C. Castle, of Ganges, B.C., and arrived in his new home none the worse for his long journey. Although just over one year old, "Shantung" has accounted for nine firsts, eight specials, two reserve winners, and one winners, won in Toronto, Ottawa and Montreal, all C.K.C. events. He has also sired some very good puppies, and should prove a secure investment for his Western home.

Dr. T. E. Sleeth advises us that as a result of his hurried recall from the East, where he judged the Bulldog Breeders' Specialty Show recently, he is able to report an additional member to his family, this time a "little girl."

H. C. Louttit, St. Catharines, Ont., has just secured the winning American-bred Collie, "Honeybrook Hector," a son of Ch. "Knocklayde King Hector" ("Weardale Lord"), out of the imported Alstead "Parbold Phebe." In 1916 this dog created a sensation on the American circuit by running to reserve winners at most of the shows visited, winning well, under such noted Collie celebrities as J. B. Cooper, Dr. Jarrett, Mrs. May McCurdy, Mrs. C. M. Lunt, and John Blackwood.

Dear Mr. Editor:

I hope that you will publish this letter in reply to Mr. J. McNaughton's letter in your last issue of "Kennel and Bench." Well, when I wrote my critique I least thought that our worthy Pomeranian Club President, Mr. McNaughton, would be the first to squeal. I still have the same opinion yet. She has, without a doubt, a faulty tail, not level in mouth, and is a bad color for an orange. I was both surprised and amused when I read: "Has a Pom got to have a straight tail?" This is a question we could have excused a novice asking, but Mr. McNaughton—supposed to be a judge of the breed—I am surprised at him asking such a silly question. If he will look up his points, of which he should have a typewritten copy, as I got them myself for the Pomeranian Club of Canada from Miss Ives, of England, and which is a copy of the North of England Pomeranian Club points, I would advise him to look them up. It says: "Note—The tail is one of the characteristics of the breed, and should be turned over the back and carried flat and straight, being profusely covered with long, harsh, spreading hair."

The trouble with Mr. McNaughton's bitch is—granted it is flat on her back—but the trouble is the end of the tail turns back to where it originated, and forms a tail a Pug would be proud of.

Next we come to her mouth, which is not level. It says in the points that the teeth should be level, and should on no account be undershot.

Next we come to her color. Put her beside such dogs as Mr. Wickham's "Gold Security," or Mr. Waggitt's little orange dog, why, there would be no comparison at all. Then you would see whether she is a good color or not. Aye, lad, she is a great way behind some on color.

Now with regards to Mr. Marshall's "Wee Sable Mite." When I wrote my critique she had her tail flat on her back, and I did not see her owner holding it there, and the judge tried her, and she got her ears up, and that satisfied me, and is all that is required.

Now as regards the "trash" and "supposed" critique Mr. McNaughton talks about; why, Sir, I was the person that got him his late Ch. "McNaughton's Defender" out from the Old Country. I was also the person that was asked to go with him to choose the puppy which turned out to be Ch. "Pomeria Perfection." He was

glad enough of my advice then, and which I gave freely.

To All Breeders:

Some months ago I wrote an open letter to the kennel press re what was due the owner of a bitch in the way of express valuations by the owner of the stud dog she was visiting. It so happens I am in our whelping kennel at four a.m., looking after sixteen carking bull puppies, sired by the good dog, "Censor" of Boston, and I was thinking of how the valuations actually came back on Ch. Silent White Duke's sisters and niece the same as we sent them. Also got a wire of their shipment back! Bully for Mrs. Boston Clark!

During the night a recent incident came to my mind that can be called to the attention of all owners of visiting bitches to their advantage, and the information is due the owner of the stud dog visited.

With many owners of brood matrons they make their arrangements, and later write that the bitch is coming in season, and they intend to ship—possibly some history of the bitch is given, etc.—but they omit the concrete facts which will enable the owner of the dog to operate intelligently. First, the exact date of her first showing color should be given, and also her kennel name. Some ship their bitches as soon as they start to enlarge, which, of course, is not fair to the owner of the proposed sire, unless some arrangement has been made for paying her board in addition to the

service fee. A week to ten days' visit should be enough for any dog owner to have to board a bitch free, and I have had them here three weeks. If the shipment is only a few hundred miles, three or four days after showing color is early enough to ship. (Insure well.) If that comes at the end of a week I prefer they ship earlier. But the exact date and name of the visitor should be given. She is a stranger in a strange land, and if she can be called by name as she walks out of her crate, how much happier she will be and how much better she will mind. As an owner of stud dogs, it is facts we want. If it is known that she is vicious, or usually has a long or short season, tell the owner of the stud. And remember this applies to all breeds equally the same.

#### SOME THOUGHTS

(Being the Musings of an Exhibition Visitor on his way home.)

No, Sir! and that's as sure as you're alive, The Exhibition Dog Show Committee made no error when they secured Len Brumby to judge Terriers at the Fair. He knows them and he placed them correctly, and the same can be said for their choice to judge the Toys. Seldom have the Toy breeders expressed themselves so frankly satisfied as they did this year, while the Show itself was your best yet. American Dogs were not as numerous as in some years, now in the bygone, but the quality of your dogs on the whole has, and is constantly improving—rapidly at that, every bench had an occupant, and I think I'm safe in saying that Canada, can now hold her own, at least, against nearly anything they can bring across the line, in the more popular breeds. And the home bred products (of various breeds) should make your staunch American friends realize more than ever that Canadians are breeders. What a pity it is that you allowed so many of your best Irish Setters and Cocker Spaniels to get away from you and I feel that you must realize your mistakes now when probably it is almost too late. True we still have the same old blood lines, and some good dogs too, of both these breeds but they are admittedly few and far between—go out today and try to buy a 'top notch' of either breed and see for yourself, just what a lot of looking and trying it will take. Pointers and English Setters went the same way, while American Foxhounds just seemed to peter out after the law was passed prohibiting or practically prohibiting the use of the hounds on deer.

These breeds are down and it will take a lot of caring for to bring them back to where you had them fifteen years ago. Quite true, you may have sold them at



your own price then, but now you are at your wits end for good breeding stock, but what's the use me preaching to you. You are doing the very same thing today with your Wire Haired Fox Terriers particularly and if you do not exercise great caution this breed will be a thing of the past, as far as Canadian bred specimens are concerned, ere long—steady up on the selling—and remember this: The foundation of a kennel and the success of any breed, largely depends on the class of breeding bitches you are breeding from, and you are very foolish if you expect the stud dog to both father and mother his get. It simply cannot be done, so there.

"Any old kind of a bitch," "She's beautifully bred" "Good useful sort," "Look at her blood lines," and similar phraseology are all very good in a way, but beware. I tell you beware. Great Britain did not make herself the envy of the civilized world, as high class stock breeders by sending out all their good ones. To my mind if you would only set about your task seriously, and instead of knocking—Oh, yes you do—and as I said before, instead of knocking each others dogs, you would boost them, I think you would draw a much larger share of the good money, sent across the "Pond" for dogs, ere long. Don't overlook, and don't forget that you have the market right at your front door.

It strikes me forcibly sometimes, that since you are a Department of Accepted National Live Stock, that the Government should help you with grants to popularize your Department of Dogs. They do help Poultrymen and others, but that's another matter that you can think about again.

The Canadian National just must do something at once about a Dog Show building. The exterior looks not so bad, but the interior is absolutely out of harmony with the other buildings on the spacious grounds. Then: consider the many promises that have been given by the Exhibition Directorate, from the General Manager down to the office boy. Consider the knocking of your exhibitors (real and imaginary) and still the fact remains that the building is altogether too small for entries such as you have enjoyed now for several years, and which you will observe, steadily grows apace. Another thing, it's sanitary condition. I know you have ever ready excuses for that, but, are you sure you're right. "Bob"

## Save this Page for Future Reference

### IMPORTERS' NOTICE.

This notice is printed in your interest. Cut it out and paste it on your desk.

On Dec. 27th, 1919, the regulations were changed in reference to the importation of animals free of duty for breeding purposes. The old regulation, by which dogs came in, were cancelled and now the conditions are the same as for other breeds coming in free.

### REGULATION.

Animals may be imported for the improvement of stock free of duty upon the furnishing of an import certificate, stating that the animal is recorded in a Canadian National Record, or in case there is no Canadian Record for the breed, in a foreign record, recognized as authentic by the Canadian National Record Committee.

### INSTRUCTION.

Import certificates required are those bearing the signature of the Accountant of the Canadian National Live Stock Records, for dogs. The fee for the import certificate is 50 cents.

The Collector of Customs shall not demand or accept any Certificate as to pedigree other than the one of the Import Certificate.

Import Certificates for Dogs may be procured from the Accountant, Canadian National Live Stock Records, Ottawa.

Get this right, observe the law faithfully, and your importing troubles are reduced to nil. And although a certificate will be issued by the National Live Stock Records, the dog itself must be recorded with the National Live Stock Records first. And in order to record a dog there, a certificate of registration in the Canadian importer's name, and showing his ownership. If from England, from the English Kennel Club, if from the United States, from the American Kennel Club.

Therefore, it will expedite matters quite considerably for intending importers to get their certificates of registration in good time, thereby justifying the issuing of the import certificate, in order to clear the Customs in Canada.

### BREEDERS' NOTICE.

Shipping Bitches into the United States for breeding purposes no longer a nightmare to breeders.

If the proper procedure is followed in shipping females to the United States to be bred no difficulty should be encountered getting them into that

country and having them returned to Canada.

In the first place they should be sent out of the country under Canadian Customs supervision, then, when they return in bond to destination, which they will, they can be properly identified as the animal that went out and be immediately released.

When entering the United States a bond must be provided, guaranteeing return to Canada within six months. This bond is for twice the estimated amount of duty and is forfeited if animals are not returned.

No more difficulty should be met shipping females in to be bred than shipping in for exhibition purposes. All that is necessary is to observe the existing regulations on both sides of the line.

Certificates of registration for "Phebe" (24312), and "Joan" (22418), belonging to Mrs. H. N. Simpson, Calgary, Alta., have been returned to the Canadian National Live Stock Record office, by the postal authorities. No street address was given and consequently Mrs. Simpson couldn't be located.

Will our Calgary members and readers kindly furnish us with the proper address, so that these certificates may again be sent to their owner.

### Important.

When you write to the Canadian National Live Stock Record office, or to the Canadian Kennel Club, and Kennel and Bench offices, be careful to state clearly the address that will find you, when we wish to use it.

Joe Hill was in charge of the Cocker entry, and it was very amusing to watch this old time authority, poke the exhibitor with the end of his pencil, which "poke" was the equivalent of "What's your number." As the judges have promised us reports of their work, we will refrain from further comment. Miss C. J. La Violette, Longueuil, Que., held the "woolsack" for the Pekingese department, and was the choice of the Pekingese Club. The mistress of the "Priorwood" prefix must have trod on someone's toes too hard, and at the very beginning, and there were rumours of protest. The aggrieved ex-

hibitor must have had a "second" thought somewhere, as he was later seen shaking hands and otherwise showing proof of his good sportsmanship. We understand this was Miss La Violette's first engagement as judge under Canadian Kennel Club Rules, and it is safe to assume that it will only be the first of many more to follow. "Tommy" Johnston had Pomeranians as his assignment, and was also making his debut as a judge under our Rules. This did not ruffle him any, and he handled his dogs like a man well accustomed to his job. Donald Wheeler was the choice of the Collie Club of Canada to look after their entry, and he returned full value for their confidence, as was to be expected. Champion Alstead Aeroplane went to top in dogs, closely followed all the way from puppy to reserve winners by "Alton Knecker," a good son of the winning dog, quality, backed by substance, seemed to be what were the stepping stones to success in this breed under Mr. Wheeler.

Harold Shaw again donned the "ermine" for the Boston Terriers, and was the recipient of more evidence of appreciation than any other judge working at the Show and carrying specialty club colors, and when Mrs. W. C. Ingram pulled down the winners ribbon for her sweet little bitch, "Ingram's Sweetheart," there was a regular demonstration of approval. John F. Lakin had 26 Bulldogs as his share of the entry, and no one can charge the elongated owner of the "Kersal" prefix for any tendency of inclination to rush things; in fact, his leisurely methods seemed to provoke some of the exhibitors, and grunts of dissatisfaction were audible; but it takes more than a "grunt" to worry J. F., and his "sang froid" was refreshing to behold. That he upset the previous performances of several notable Bulldogs did not even concern him; suffice for him he put them where they belonged, according to H—im. George Ward had the balance of the entry to handle, and he, too, gave a good account of his ability to get 'em right. Youthful like and pleasant always, he silently weeded out the corn from the chaff, and he spotted several "grains" of outstanding merit, chief of which was an Airedale puppy, ten months old, bred by Joseph Russell, Toronto, the genial president of the Canadian Kennel Club, and named "Man o' War." The youngster is sired by "Claycliff Colonel," and out of "Rhosddhu Vic-

tory," and is a stormer. When he took the "boards" with the grace of a hackney, every connoisseur of the breed conceded that a truly great dog was on exhibition, and held their breath. Fabulous prices were mentioned as likely values, and the owner beamed with the satisfied joy that comes only to the breeder who has achieved signal success with the product of his own kennel, from puppy to best Airedale, and on to best dog in show, this was the accomplishment of the great "Man o' War." Reserve to this wonderful dog was another Terrier, and a good one, "Flornell Rapid Fire," belonging to Briggs & Wilson, Toronto. Another "find" that Mr. Ward noticed was a Beagle named "Nolan's Mary," by "Afton Sportsman," ex "Haig's Flossie," and only eleven months old. This little bitch is as near Beagle perfection as one would wish to see anywhere, and Harry Nolan, Brantford, is a proud fancier as he surveys the outline of "Mary," the pride of his kennel. We learn that no expense will be spared in securing for her international fame on the show bench.

The Dog Show Building was big enough to house 700 dogs, and the 235 benched looked lost altogether. To the Show Superintendent, Mr. George Briggs, belongs the lion's share of the credit for the success of the show, and in its many appointments. George had his Thermos bottle and lunch basket on his desk, and was a veritable slave to his job for the duration of the show. Jack McNaughton ("Pomeria") was an able assistant, and also got in a full measure of hustling for the two days of the show. There were many disadvantages, but on the whole a very enjoyable dog show was the popular opinion.

Their are some fanciers who give their growing stock a teaspoonful of Cod Liver Oil in the morning and a similar doze of extract of malt in the evening, with the result that they seldom have any rickety or weak dogs in their kennels, whilst the development in the bones in the head and limbs is much pronounced. Owing to their lethargic disposition young bulldogs are liable to indigestion and during the period of puppyhood it is advisable to give them a teaspoonful of lime-water once or twice in their milk food. It must be remembered, however, that food is not the only thing to be considered in raising puppies, they should have lots of fresh air and liberty, otherwise they are sure to go wrong. Not only will their limbs assume all shapes as the results of rickets, but they will become poor in condition and suffer from all kinds of ailments. And it must be understood that there are different ways of giving puppies their liberty, some people imagine that all that is necessary is to put them in a garden

or pen, but that is not sufficient for they may have their liberty but they do not utilize it, for they usually lay about and do not get the necessary exercise to develop their limbs. What they want is something to attract their attention and make them move about and cheer them up. Better to make them your companions, take them out with you, anywhere and everywhere, get them used to people and the traffic on the streets and you will raise a dog fit for anything.

Many novices are in doubt as to the best time to breed from their Bull bitches seeing that estrum is present before she is fully developed, this generally occurs when she is about 9 months old. The writer's experience in Bulldogs is to breed from them the first time she comes in season, for a litter of puppies often improves her by causing her to drop, and this applies more to those who are inclined to be leggy. Nature has so arranged matters that a Bullbitch

is not firmly set in her bones until she reaches an age of from 12 to 18 months, consequently if she is bred from the first time she will have less difficulty in giving birth to future offsprings. It is a good plan to provide a foster-mother in readiness for the expected litter, especially in the case of the first litter when the qualification for nursing by the mother are unknown. There are so many books on the market that give practical information regarding breeding, exhibiting, etc., etc., that it is unnecessary to deal with the subject here, and various Specialty Clubs and Dog Shows throughout the country provide a medium for interchange of ideas and many novices have cause to thank the old fanciers they meet at such places for the casually dropped advice.

The following description of the pure bred English Bulldog has been compiled and adopted by the Bulldog Club (Incorporated) as the correct standard and type of excellence in the breed.

## THE STANDARD OF THE BULLDOG

(Reprinted by permission of The Bulldog Club Incorp.)

Standard description of the correct appearance and the several points in detail of a perfect Bulldog.

(Copyright.)

The following description of the Pure-bred Old English Bulldog has been compiled and adopted by The Bulldog Club (Incorporated) as the correct standard type of excellence in the breed, after carefully comparing all obtainable opinions.

In forming a judgment on any specimen of the breed the general appearance—which is the first impression the dog makes as a whole on the eye of the judge—should be first considered.

Secondly should be noticed its size, and make, or rather its proportions in the relation they bear to each other. (No point should be so much in excess of the others as to destroy the general symmetry, or make the dog appear deformed, or interfere with its powers of motion, etc.) Thirdly his style, carriage, gait, temper, and his several points should be considered separately in detail, as follows, due allowance being made for the bitch, which is not so grand or as well developed as the dog:

1. The general appearance of the Bulldog is that of a smooth-coated, thick-set dog, rather low in stature, but broad, powerful, and compact.

Its head strikingly massive and large in proportion to the dog's size. Its face extremely short. Its muzzle very broad, blunt, and inclined upwards. Its body short and well knit; the limbs stout and muscular. Its hind-quarters high and strong, but rather lightly made in comparison with its heavily made fore-parts. The dog should convey an impression of determination, strength, and activity, similar to that suggested by the appearance of a thick-set Ayrshire bull.

2. The skull should be very large—the larger the better—and in circumference should measure (round in front of the ears) at least the height of the dog at the shoulders. Viewed from the front, it should appear very high from the corner of the lower jaw to the apex of the skull, and also very broad and square. The cheeks should be well rounded and extend sideways beyond the eyes. Viewed at the side, the head should appear very high, and very short from its back to the point of the nose.

The forehead should be flat, neither prominent nor over-hanging the face; the skin upon it and about the head very loose and well wrinkled.

3. The projections of the frontal bones should be very prominent, broad, square, and high, causing a deep and wide indentation between the eyes, termed the "stop." From the "stop" a furrow both broad and

deep should extend up the middle of the skull, being traceable to the apex.

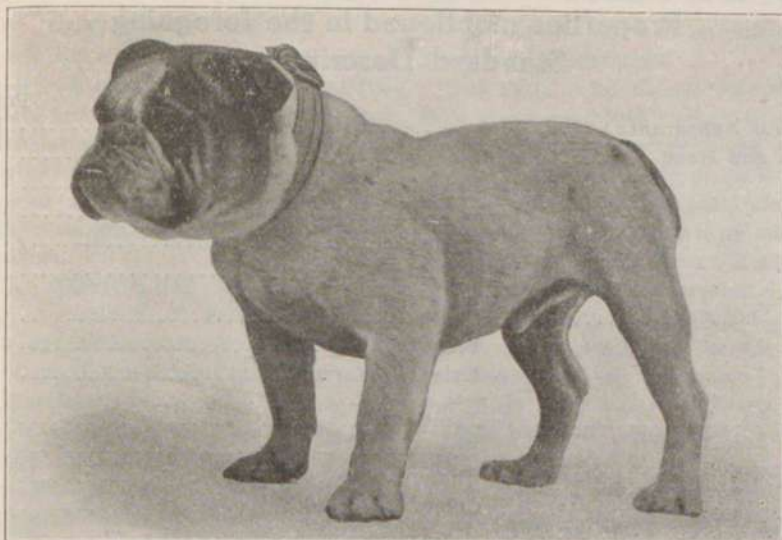
4. The eyes, seen from the front, should be situated low down in the skull, as far from the ears as possible. The eyes and "stop" should be in the same straight line, which should be at right angles to the furrow. They should be as wide apart as possible, provided their outer corners are within the outline of the cheeks. They should be quite round in shape, of moderate size, neither sunken nor prominent, and in colour should be very dark—almost, if not quite, black, showing no white when looking directly forward.

5. The ears should be set high on the head—i.e. the front inner edge of each ear should (as viewed from the front) join the outline of the skull at the top corner of such outline, so as to place them as wide apart, and as high and as far from the eyes, as possible. In size they should be small and thin. The shape termed "rose ear" is correct, and folds inward at its back, the upper or front edge curving over outwards and backwards, showing part of the inside of the burr.

6. The face, measured from the front of the cheek-bone to the nose, should be as short as possible, and its skin should be deeply and closely wrinkled.

The muzzle should be short, broad, turned upwards, and very deep from

the corner of the eye to the corner of the mouth.

The nose should be large, broad, and black; its top should be deeply set back almost between the eyes. The distance from the inner corner of the eye (or from the centre of the stop between the eyes) to the extreme tip of the nose should not exceed the length from the tip of the nose to the edge of the under lip.

The nostrils should be large, wide, and black, with a well-defined vertical straight line between them.

7. The flews, called the "chop" should be thick, broad, pendent, and very deep, hanging completely over the lower jaw at the sides (not in front). They should join the under lip in front and quite cover the teeth, which should not be seen when the mouth is closed.

8. The jaw should be broad, massive, and square, the canine teeth or tusks wide apart. The lower jaw should project considerably in front of the upper and turn up. It should be broad and square, and have the six small front teeth between the canines in an even row.

The teeth should be large and strong.

9. The neck should be moderate in length (rather short than long), very thick, deep and strong. It should be well arched at the back, with much loose, thick, and wrinkled skin about the throat, forming a dewlap on each side, from the lower jaw to the chest.

The chest should be very wide, laterally round, prominent, and deep, making the dog appear very broad and short-legged in front.

10. The shoulders should be broad, sloping, and deep, very powerful and muscular, and giving the appearance of having been "tacked on" to the body.

11. The brisket should be capacious, round, and very deep from the top of the shoulders to its lowest part where it joins the chest, and be well let down between the fore-legs. It should be large in diameter and rounded behind the fore-legs (not flat-sided, the ribs being well rounded). The body

should be well ribbed up behind, with the belly tucked up, and not pendulous.

12. The back should be very short and strong, very broad at the shoulders, and comparatively narrow at the loins. There should be a slight fall to the back close behind the shoulders (its lowest part), whence the spine should rise to the loins (the top of which should be higher than the top of the shoulders), thence curving again more suddenly to the tail, forming an arch—a distinctive characteristic of the breed—termed "roach back."

13. The fore-legs should be very stout and strong, set wide apart, thick, muscular, and straight, with well-developed forearms, presenting a rather bowed outline, but the bones of the legs should be large and straight, not bandy or curved. They should be rather short in proportion to the hind-legs, but not so short as to make the back appear long or detract from the dog's activity, and so cripple him.

The elbows should be low, and stand well away from the ribs.

The pasterns should be short, straight, and strong.

The fore-feet should be straight and turn very slightly outward, of medium size and moderately round.

The toes compact and thick, being well split-up, making the knuckles prominent and high.

14. The hind-legs should be large and muscular, and longer in proportion than the fore-legs, so as to elevate the loins.

The hocks should be slightly bent and well let down, so as to be long and muscular from the loins to the point of the hock.

The lower part of the leg should be short, straight, and strong.

The stifles should be round and turned slightly outwards away from the body. The hocks are thereby made to approach each other, and the hind-feet to turn outwards. The latter, like the fore-feet, should be round and compact, with the toes well split up and the knuckles prominent.

From its formation the dog has a peculiar heavy and constrained gait, appearing to walk with short, quick steps on the tip of its toes, its hind-feet not being lifted high, but appearing to skim the ground, and running with the right shoulder rather advanced, similar to the manner of a horse in cantering.

15. The most desirable size for the Bulldog is about 50 pounds.

16. The tail, termed the "stern," should be set on low, just out rather straight, then turned downwards. It should be round, smooth and devoid of fringe or coarse hair. It should be moderate in length—rather short than long—thick at the root and tapering quickly to a fine point. It should have a downward carriage (not having a decided upward curve at the end), and the dog should not be able to raise it over its back.

17. The color should be whole or smut (that is, a whole color with a black mask or muzzle).

The only colors (which should be brilliant and pure of their sort) are whole colors—viz., brindles, reds, with their varieties fawns, fallows, etc., white and also pied (i.e. a combination of white with any other of the foregoing colors).

The coat should be fine in texture, short, close, and smooth (hard only from the shortness and closeness, not wiry).

In pursuance with By-Law XX. of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc.,

I hereby give notice of motion that at the next General Annual Meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club I will move that any dog or dogs heretofore registered with the late Dominion Kennel Club shall be eligible for re-registration in the Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book, providing that satisfactory proof of ownership and registration is furnished, and that a fee of one dollar for each such re-registration shall accompany the application.

## NOTICE OF MOTION

(By N. K. Swire).

I beg to notify you that at the next Annual Meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club I will move that By-Law III., Sec. 1 and Sec. 2, be changed to read as follows:

Sec. 1. Those individual members resident in Canada, who pay an annual membership fee of \$4.00, this amount to include \$1.00 as subscription to "Kennel and Bench," the official organ of the Canadian Kennel Club.

Sec. 2. Those Kennels situated in Canada, registered with this Club, who pay an annual fee of \$4.00, this amount to include \$1.00 as subscription to "Kennel and Bench," the official organ of the Canadian Kennel Club.

By-Law XXVII. Fees, Sec. 1. Annual membership, \$4.00. This amount includes \$1.00 as subscription to "Kennel and Bench," the official organ of the Canadian Kennel Club. One free registration with first year of membership.

## NOTICE OF MOTION

(By N. R. Miller).

At the next Annual Meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club I will move the following:

Rule IV. Ownership—Be changed to read as follows:

Every dog when entered for a show must be solely and unconditionally the property of the person making its entry on the day of closing the en-

tries, and the right to exhibit a dog cannot be transferred.

The entry must clearly identify the dog to be exhibited by name, and, if known, its date of birth, name of sire and dam, and the name of its breeder. Should any of these particulars be unknown to the exhibitor it must be stated on the entry form. If the dog is registered in the Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book, its Stud Book number must be given, and the dog must be registered in the name of the exhibitor.

Rule VIII.—Be changed to read as follows:

Cancellation of wins must follow in all cases of violation of the rules, except for technical errors, where dogs, have been entered without being identified as directed in these rules, for which a fine of one dollar for each such error shall be imposed, unless fraud has been shown, in which case the wins shall be cancelled.

Any person who wilfully enters, or causes to be entered or shown, a dog at any recognized show, shall be suspended, and any prizes won by such dog forfeited. Exhibitors are responsible for their own errors in making out their entry forms, and must abide by the penalty for such offence.

Rule XVIII., Sec. 1.—That the Junior and Juvenile classes be omitted from the recognized classes.

## NOTICE OF MOTION

(By W. J. Archibald).

I hereby give notice of motion, that at the next General Annual Meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club, I will move that

Rule XVI. be changed to read as follows:

In any case where there is a weight limit the judge shall not make his awards until he is satisfied that each dog competing has been weighed before entering the ring and is eligible to compete. Any exhibitor or person in charge of a dog entered in such class or classes in the show may claim of the Secretary, Superintendent or Show Committee the right at any time after the opening, and up to and during the judging of such classes, to have a dog weighed and measured officially, and the recorded weight of the dog shall be registered and hold good during the judging at such show. A dog disqualified in one class for being under or over the limit of weight prescribed shall be automatically disqualified in all other classes of the same limit of weight.

The club giving show must provide standard scales, weights and measurements for the use of exhibitors.

Add to Rule XVII., Sec. 8.:

Only dogs which are registered in the Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book, or in any Kennel Club Book, as set forth in By-Law XXVI., Sec. 1 to M inclusive, and which have won a competitive first prize in any recognized class at the show, can compete for winners' points.

## NOTICE OF MOTION

(By V. G. Perry).

At the next Annual Meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club I will move that the Dog Show Rule XVII., Sec. 8, be amended to read as follows:

The Winners' Class, for which there will be no entry fee, shall be open only to winners of first prizes in the Juvenile, Puppy, Junior, Novice, Canadian-bred, Limit or Open Classes, recognized by the Canadian Kennel Club at that show, all of which shall constitute the regular classes. Winners' Class or Classes must be provided for in every breed recognized by the Canadian Kennel Club, for which a proper classification is being provided. The Winners' Class may be divided by sex, providing at least the Open Class is divided by sex.

No Champion of Canadian record shall be allowed to compete in the Winners' Class.

## NOTICE OF MOTION

(By N. R. Miller).

I will move that Regulation VI. be changed to read as follows:

Classification shall be confined to the recognized breeds hereinafter named, and may be divided by variety, color, weight or sex, and otherwise as provided for in these rules.

The following classes are recognized by the Canadian Kennel Club and must be arranged as follows:

Puppy, Novice, Canadian-bred, Limit, Open and Winners after which additional classes may be included in any breed. (Rule XVII. to be changed accordingly.) No change in classification will be permitted after final endorsement of the premium list by the Secretary of the Canadian Kennel Club.

Whereas much dissatisfaction has from time to time been expressed by exhibitors and patrons of dog shows, that some dogs having been allowed to remain in their boxes or cases when they should have been benched and in their stalls on exhibition, I



will also move that the following clause be added to Regulation VII., Sec. 2.:

All dogs entered for exhibition and passed into the show by the Veterinarian must, in order to compete, be duly benched in their respective stalls, except during the hours allowed for exercise or when being judged.

#### NOTICE OF MOTION

(By N. R. Miller.)

At the next Annual Meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club I will move that the following clause be added to Regulation XIII.:

Judges' books must be provided at all shows held under Canadian Kennel Club rules, and said books must be forwarded by registered mail to the Secretary of the Canadian Kennel Club within ten days from the close of the show. The penalty for non-compliance is one dollar per day. Any alteration made by a judge must be initialed by him in the judge's book.

#### NOTICE OF MOTION

(By Claud Faux.)

I, Claud Faux, being a member in good standing of the Canadian Kennel Club, hereby give notice that at the next Annual Meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club I will move the following amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws of the Club:

1. That the following clause be inserted as one of the objects of the Club:

"That all dog shows held in the Dominion of Canada under the rules of the Canadian Kennel Club may only be judged by judges who are first approved by the Canadian Kennel Club. Judging licenses will be issued for the current year by the Canadian Kennel Club, and the holder of such license shall be considered as having the approval of the Canadian Kennel Club. Any person not holding such a yearly license may only judge a dog show held under Canadian Kennel Club rules after he has been given a special permit issued by a regularly called meeting of the Directors of the Club."

2. That in Section 3 (Members), paragraph 9 be made to read:

"No member shall hold office or be entitled to vote at any meeting if his membership fees for the current or preceding year have been in arrears for more than three months, and no member shall be entitled to hold office or vote who was not a member of the Club at the time the notice was given calling the meeting. If request-

ed by any member at any meeting the Secretary shall give the names of all members then attending the meeting whose membership fees have been in arrears for more than three months."

3. That the following paragraph be added to Section 7 (Officers):

"No member, who shall after June 30, 1921, receive money or other consideration as payment for preparing or handling any dog for any competition held under any national Kennel Club rules, shall be eligible to become an officer of this Club."

4. That in Section 8 (Elections), the following be considered the interpretation of the meaning of a member in good standing:

"A member in good standing in respect to voting or holding office is a member whose membership fee has been not more than three months in arrears, as per Section 3, paragraph 9."

5. That in Section 9 (Secretary-Treasurer) the words:

"Countersigned by the President or his duly authorized representative," be made to read: "Countersigned by the President, or in his absence one of the Vice-Presidents, or in their absence by a Director of the Club."

6. That Section 12 (Auditor) be made to read:

"The Club shall at each general meeting, by a majority of those present and voting, appoint an Auditor and fix his remuneration (such Auditor must be a Chartered Accountant or a practising Public Accountant). His duties shall be to examine the books of the accounts of the Club, vouchers for all payments, and certify the usual statement of assets and liabilities and receipts and expenditures for the year."

7. That the following be added to Section 17 (Audit and Annual Report):

"A copy of the detailed statement of receipts and expenditures and assets and liabilities of the Club, shall be mailed postage prepaid to each member of the Club, at least fourteen days before the date fixed for the Annual Meeting."

8. That under Section 27 (Fees):

"The cost of listing a dog for each show be raised to 50 cents each show."

A. M. Naismith, Calgary, reports that his imported Airedale Terrier bitch, "Miss Perfection," went out for a swim in the river recently while it was still open in the centre, and was carried under the ice and drowned. "Miss Perfection" was by Ch. "Tintern Tip Top," out of "Caswell Duchess," she by Ch. "Abbey King Nobbler," and was considered an asset to Western Airedaledom.

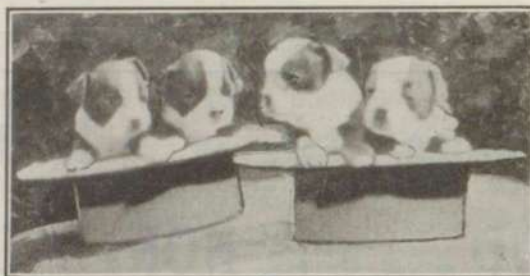

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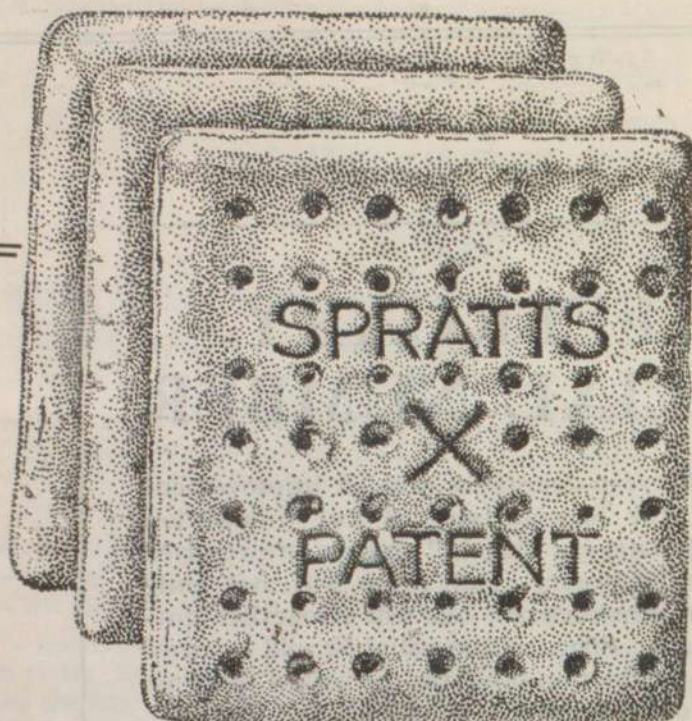
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
