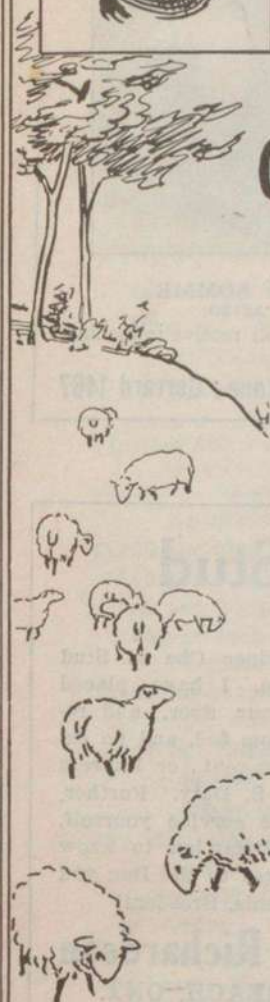

A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS of the Canadian Kennel Club will be held in the offices of the Club on Thursday, March 17th, 1921, commencing at 8 p.m.

ADJOURNED MEETING

An adjourned meeting of the Board of Directors was held at the Club offices, 774 Yonge street, Toronto, on Wednesday, January 26th, at 8 p.m., Mr. Joseph Russell in the chair. Directors in attendance were: Messrs. G. Briggs, H. Clayton, H. M. Jackson and N. R. Miller.

The President explained that the purpose of the adjournment was to enable the Directors to have an opportunity to go over all proposed changes and additions to the Dog Show Rules and Regulations and to the Constitution, and further to enable them to formulate and table their resolution arising from the instruction received from the General Meeting, held on Wednesday, Sept. 8th, 1920, viz.:

"That the President name a Committee to consider the whole question of registration generally, and report to the next annual meeting."

After considerable deliberation it was agreed that the following memo. of changes in the Constitution and By-laws of the Canadian Kennel Club:

1. That Clause "O" of Sub-section 1, Section 26, be amended to read as follows:

"O' Dogs bred in Canada, provided their sires and dams and grand sires and grand dams and great grand sires and great grand dams are animals of the same breed.

"And provided also that all applications for registration under this paragraph must be received within the period from April 1st, 1921, to April 1st, 1922, inclusive, and provided further that no application shall be made under this paragraph for the registration of dogs of recorded ancestry."

2. That Sub-section 5 of Section 26 be amended to read as follows:

"Except as hereinbefore provided, application for individual registration will not be accepted until litter registration is made, and shall state name of dog to be recorded, breed,

color, breeder, name of owner at time of birth, day and month of birth year, name and number of sire, name and number of dam. Applications shall be signed by the person owning the dam at the time of the birth, for which application for registration is being made. If the dog for which application for registration is being made has changed ownership since birth, a transfer of ownership shall be filed, for which the regular transfer fee will be charged."

Be submitted in the report to the members at the next Annual General Meeting assembled for their approval and, if approved, their submission to the Minister of Agriculture for his sanction.

It was moved and seconded that the meeting adjourn.—"Carried."

FINAL MEETING OF 1920 DIRECTORS

The last monthly meeting of the 1920 Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club was held at the Carls-Rite Hotel on Monday, February 7th, 1921, at 2 o'clock p.m.

The President having left for New York Shows, the Chair was taken by Mr. W. R. Aitken, Provincial Director for Quebec. Directors attending: Messrs. Geo. Briggs, D. Wheeler, N. R. Miller, H. M. Jackson, H. Clayton. The minutes of the previous meeting were read by the Secretary, and on motion were adopted.

The Secretary read a letter from Mrs. W. W. Brown, Montreal, with enclosures, but as there was nothing presented that was considered new evidence, and the matter was pending, the letter was ordered on the table.

The Secretary read a letter from Claude Faux, Toronto, which intimated the regrettable intelligence that the writer was confined to bed with rheumatic fever and consequently would be unable to attend the Annual Meeting to propose and speak to the notices of motion bearing his name, and it was agreed to leave it to the Sec-

etary to look after the interests of Mr. Faux in his unavoidable absence.

At this stage the meeting was favored with a visit from the Accountant of the National Live Stock Records, Mr. John Brant, and with him were Mr. Robert Miller, Stouffville, Ont., of the Record Committee, and Mr. Robert Arkell, Live Stock Commissioner. The report on registration as formulated by the President's Committee and authorized at the General Meeting held Sept. 8th, 1920, was discussed from every angle. The fact—so often overlooked—was emphasized that the Canadian Kennel Club had annually, for a period of five years, requested extensions of time in closing their Stud Book, which extensions had been granted, but quite evidently the privilege had only been utilized in part. And the exceedingly great dangers of again permitting its re-opening were made plain, which dangers were recognized and acknowledged, but the law of absolute necessity to care for several extraordinary situations, some of which had long existed, while others had but recently been created, was urged as essential causes, whereby the proposed amendments should be allowed the deep consideration of the Department of the Minister of Agriculture.

The distinguished visitors, while non-committant, seemed to be favorably impressed by the united and earnest solicitation of the Directors, having retired, it was moved and seconded that the meeting adjourn.—“Carried.”

ANNUAL MEETING

The annual meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club was held at the Carls-Rite Hotel, Toronto, on Monday, February 7, 1921, at eight o'clock p.m. In the unavoidable absence of the President, the First Vice-President, Mr. H. Clayton, was in the chair.

Ward, John Miles, George Getty, Alick Donaldson, Donald Wheeler, “Bill” Wickham, Jack McNaughton, W. J. Archibald, Jack Treleaven, Fred Lewis, Fred Shawley, Chas. Glover, A. J. Davis, T. Anderson, G. Graham, H. Shaw, G. Moore, J. F. Lakin, B. B.

Finnie, Peter Herd, Wm. Stockdale, and Fred W. Jacobi.

If any members were present whose names are not enumerated above, I regret it, and assure him or her the omission is not intentional. The meeting was an enthusiastic one.

The First Vice-President in declaring the meeting opened, welcomed the members and expressed his pleasure at their good attendance.

The Secretary read the minutes of the last annual meeting, also that part of the general meeting held on September 8, 1920.

And it was moved and seconded “that the minutes be held as ‘read.’”—“Carried.”

The proposed changes to the Constitution and By-laws of the Club, as recommended by the President's Committee, i.e.:

(1) That Clause “O,” of Sub-Section 1, Section 26, be amended to read as follows:

Clause “O”—“Dogs bred in Canada, provided their sires and dams and grand-sires and grand-dams and great-grand-sires and great-grand-dams are animals of the same breed.

“And provided also that all applications for registration under this Paragraph must be received within the period from April 1st, 1921 to April 1st, 1922, inclusive, and provided further that no applications shall be made under this Paragraph for the registration of dogs of recorded ancestry.”

(2) That Sub-Section 5 of Section 26 be amended to read as follows: “Except as hereinbefore provided application for individual registration will not be accepted until litter registration is made, and shall state name of dog to be recorded, breed, color, breeder, name and owner at time of birth, year of birth, name and number of sire, and name and number of dam. Applications shall be signed by the person owning the dam at the time of the birth of the dog for which application for registration is being made. If the dog for which application for registration is being made has changed ownership since birth, a transfer of ownership shall be filed for which the regular transfer fee will be charged.”

Were put to the house, duly moved and seconded, and the proposed changes were declared “Carried” unanimously and enthusiastically. A rider was found in the motion as proposed by Mr. N. R. Miller, and was added to the foregoing resolutions.

The Election Commissioner was asked for his report, which was

promptly submitted and the following officers were elected for the term of 1921:—

Ontario—Norman K. Swire, Toronto; Col. F. G. McFarland, Toronto; George C. Briggs, Toronto; R. S. Wilson, Oakville; Fred W. Jacobi, Toronto; John T. Waggitt, Toronto; Vincent G. Perry, London.

Manitoba—S. C. Taylor (acclamation) Norwood, Winnipeg.

Saskatchewan—John Newman (acclamation) Regina.

Alberta—Leonard H. Cooper (acclamation) Calgary.

British Columbia—G. E. Halliday (acclamation) Vancouver; J. J. Jackson (acclamation) Edmonds.

It was duly moved and seconded that the Election Commissioner's report be received and a vote of thanks enthusiastically carried was given to the Commissioner. Mr. Atkinson made suitable reply and declared his willingness to at all times do all in his power in the interest of the members of the Club.

It was moved and seconded “That Mr. Arthur Atkinson be appointed Election Commissioner for the current year.”—Carried.

The Secretary reported for his year as follows:—

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen:—

A year ago at this our Annual Meeting and when I met you for the first time as the Secretary of your organization, and as the Editor of your official organ, “Kennel and Bench,” I frankly admit that I met you on that occasion with a decided feeling of uncertainty. Your Club, or with your permission, our Club, had always seemed to be progressing but slowly, or at least not as rapidly as some of us would have desired. While the paper had always been more or less of a financial conundrum to the Club officials, and I recall now that, as I read my first year's report to you, with its very good showing over the previous year's business, that I resolved when I appeared before you in 1921, it would be with a report well

Election of representatives to various bodies:—

Canadian National Exhibition (two to be elected). The following gentlemen were nominated: Messrs. Geo. Briggs, C. Dickinson, Jos. Russell, H. Clayton, Ed. Milburn, N. K. Swire, and Geo. Ward. The ballot was taken and when declared showed the present representatives, Mr. Jos. Russell and Mr. H. Clayton, to be re-elected.

Royal Agricultural Winter Fair Association (three to be elected), including the President). It was moved and seconded, "That the next two showing highest on the previous ballot be allowed to act as the representatives."—Carried. It was found on reference to the ballot, that Mr. Clayton and Mr. Milburn were elected.

Central Canada Exhibition Association (three to be elected, including the President). It was moved and seconded, "That 'Andy' Armstrong, and Jack Ferguson represent the Club on that Board."—Carried.

Canadian National Live Stock Records. It was moved and seconded, "That Messrs. Humphrey, Elliott, Jack Milner (late of Winnipeg), and W. R. Delaney represent the Club on that Board."—Carried.

The notices of motion which had been received in constitutional order and which had appeared in the official organ, were declared to be before the house, and the President proceeded to read them to the meeting.

Notice of motion by N. R. Miller in pursuance with By-law XX. of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc.

I hereby give notice of motion that at the next General Annual Meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club I will move that any dog or dogs heretofore registered with the late Dominion Kennel Club shall be eligible for re-registration in the Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book, providing that satisfactory proof of ownership and registration is furnished, and that a fee of one dollar for each such registration shall accompany the application.

Mr. N. R. Miller presented the motion, which was put to the vote, and declared unanimously carried.

The notice standing in Mr. N. K. Swire's name and which reads:

That By-law III., Sec. 1 and Sec. 2, be changed to read as follows:—

Sec. 1. Those individual members resident in Canada, who pay an annual membership fee of \$4, this amount to include \$1 as subscription to "Kennel and Bench," the official organ of the Canadian Kennel Club.

Sec. 2. Those Kennels situated in Canada, registered with this Club, who pay an annual fee of \$4, this amount to include \$1 as subscription to "Kennel and Bench," the official organ of the Canadian Kennel Club. By-law XXVII. Fees, Sec. 1. Annual membership, \$4. This amount includes \$1 as subscription to "Kennel and Bench," the official organ of the Canadian Kennel Club. One free registration with first year of membership.

The Secretary, in the absence of the mover, explained the reasons underlying the proposed changes, and "It was moved and seconded, 'That the changes be made as outlined in the motion.'—Carried.

By-law XXVI., Sec. I. to M., inclusive, and which have won a competitive first prize in any recognized class at the show, can compete for winners' points."

When the proposed addition to Rule XVII., Sec. 8, was read, it was clearly discernible that the meeting was in no temper to consider the addition so it was not pressed.

Dog Show Rule XVII., Sec. 8, be amended to read as follows: The winners' class for which there will be no entry fee, shall be open only to winners of first prizes in the Juvenile, Puppy, Junior, Novice, Canadian-bred, limit or open classes, recognized by the Canadian Kennel Club at that show, all of which shall constitute the regular classes. Winners' classes or classes must be provided for in every breed recognized by the Canadian Kennel Club, for which a proper classification is being provided. The Winners' Class may be divided by sex, providing at least the open class is divided by sex.

No Champion of Canadian record shall be allowed to compete in the "Winners" Class.

The Secretary reported that the proposer of this amendment was a member from London, Ontario, and that he (the Secretary) proposed to exercise his privilege as a paid-up member and out of courtesy to the absent member, to propose his motion in his absence. This the meeting allowed and the proposed amendment was put to the house, and found support at zero.

Regulation VI. be changed to read as follows: Classification shall be confined to the recognized breeds hereinafter named, and may be divided by variety, color, weight or sex, and otherwise, as provided for in these rules.

The following classes are recogniz-

ed by the Canadian Kennel Club, and must be arranged as follows:—

Puppy, Novice, Canadian Bred, Limit, Open and Winners, after which additional classes may be included in any breed. Rule XVII. to be changed accordingly. No change in classification will be permitted after final endorsement of the premium list by the Secretary of the Canadian Kennel Club.

Whereas much dissatisfaction has from time to time been expressed by exhibitors and patrons of dog shows, that some dogs having been allowed to remain in their boxes or cases when they should have been benched and in their stalls on exhibition, I will also move that the following clause be added to Regulation VII., Sec. 2:—

All dogs entered for exhibition and passed into the Show by the Veterinarian, must, in order to compete, be duly benched in their respective stalls except during the hours allowed for exercise or when being judged.

It was moved and seconded, "That Regulation VI. and Regulation VII. remain as at present."—Carried.

Rule IV., Ownership. Be changed to read as follows: Every dog when entered for a show must be solely and unconditionally the property of the person making the entry on the day of closing the entries, and the right to exhibit a dog cannot be transferred. The entry must clearly identify the dog to be exhibited by name, and if known, its date of birth, name of sire and dam, and the name of its breeder. Should any of these particulars be unknown to the exhibitor it must be stated on the entry form. If the dog is registered in the Canadian Kennel Stud Book, its Stud Book number must be given, and the dog must be registered in the name of the exhibitor.

It was moved and seconded, "That the old rule remain as at present."—Carried.

Rule VIII. be changed to read as follows:—

Cancellation of wins must follow in all cases of violation of the rules except for technical errors, where dogs have been entered without being identified as directed in these rules, for which a fine of one dollar for each error shall be imposed, unless fraud has been shown, in which case the wins shall be cancelled.

Any person who wilfully enters, or causes to be entered or shown a dog at any recognized show, shall be suspended, and any prizes won by such dog forfeited. Exhibitors are responsible for their own errors in

making out their entry forms, and must abide by the penalty for such offence.

The change proposed to Rule 8 was read and it was found that the proposer was not prepared to press his motion.

Rule XVIII., Sec. 1. That the Junior and Juvenile classes be omitted from the recognized classes.

Change to Rule XVIII. was read and was not pressed.

Rule XVI. be changed to read as follows: In any case where there is a weight limit the judge shall not make his awards until he is satisfied that each dog competing has been weighed before entering the ring and is eligible to compete. Any exhibitor or person in charge of a dog entered in such class or classes in the show may claim of the Secretary, Superintendent or Show Committee, the right at any time after the opening, and up to and during the judging of such classes, to have a dog weighed and measured officially, and the recorded weight of the dog shall be registered and hold good during the judging at such show. A dog disqualified in one class for being under or over the limit of weight prescribed shall be automatically disqualified in all other classes of the same limit of weight.

The Club giving show must provide standard scales, weights and measurements for the use of exhibitors.

Rule XVI. was read and the proposer, Mr. W. J. Archibald, spoke to his motion in a very able way, giving as his reason for proposing the change incidents he had actually noticed at shows, where a decided rule would have been an advantage. This proposed change was not pressed.

Add to Rule XVII., Sec. 8: Only dogs which are registered in the Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book, or in any Kennel Club Book, as set forth in Regulation XIII.

Judges' Books must be provided at all shows held under Canadian Kennel Club rules, and said books must be forwarded by registered mail to the Secretary of the Canadian Kennel Club within ten days from the close of the show. The penalty for non-compliance is one dollar per day. Any alteration made by a Judge must be initialed by him in the judges' book.

When this proposed addition was read, the Secretary pointed out the unreliable virtues of the officially marked catalogue, which was the present system in vogue, and how utterly impossible it was to maintain an authentic record from that arrange-

ment, and gave it as his opinion that the only solution to a 100 per cent. efficient record of a show being kept would be by the recording direct from the judges' books and over his own signature.

It was moved and seconded, "That the proposed additional clause to Regulation XIII. be upheld."—Carried.

The several motions in Claude Faux's name were read by the Secretary who in introducing the matter advised the meeting that the proposer was laid aside with rheumatic fever and that he (the Secretary) would propose the amendments clause by clause, when the members would act upon them. The Secretary proceeded to submit the amendments, when they were promptly killed, as read, the members evidently being content to leave well enough alone.

This being the business before the house, it was moved and seconded, "That the meeting adjourn."—Carried.

REGULAR MONTHLY MEETING.

The regular monthly meeting of Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club was held at the Club offices, 774½ Yonge street, Toronto, on Thursday evening, February 17th, 1921. Mr. Joseph Russell, President, in the Chair, supported by the following Directors: Messrs. George C. Briggs, Harry Clayton, Fred W. Jacoby, Norman K. Swire and Jack Waggett (new Director).

The minutes of the previous meeting were read by the Secretary, and it was moved and seconded "That the minutes be adopted as read."—Carried.

Mr. Frank H. Walker, Windsor, Ont., the Secretary of the Canadian National Field Trial Club (Reg'd.), was reported as being in waiting, and it was agreed to receive the visitor before proceeding further with the agenda.

The Secretary introduced Mr. Walker to the Directors, after which Mr. Walker proceeded to seek official recognition for Field Trials at the hands of the Canadian Kennel Club, and produced some proposed rules for the control of same, and which were well received. The Board instructed the Secretary to study the solicitations of the Canadian Field Trial Club, and to report at the next meeting.

Mr. Walker after thanking the Board for their interest and courtesy withdrew.

The Secretary read further corre-

spondence in the Moore vs. Brown case, which had been left on the table from the meeting held on February 7th. There being nothing new proffered to justify reconsideration, it was moved and seconded:

"That Mrs. W. W. Brown not having complied with the former order of the Board of Directors, stand suspended from membership until the necessary vouchers are forthcoming."—Carried.

The Secretary read correspondence from H. C. Cartnell, Hamilton, Ont., who had entered complaint against a member of the Club for alleged non-fulfillment of a return service obligation. This matter had been referred to the proper officers and reported upon. The Secretary was instructed to notify the complainant that he had no legal claim against the defendant.

"Roxton Mickey" was spotted as a puppy as one calculated to go far up in the award columns of recognized shows, and this she has consistently done.

At Brantford and Oakville last year she kept right to the front as far as entered, and at the Bulldog Breeders' Specialty Show last Thanksgiving Day, the Western authority, Dr. T. E. Sleeth, put her on top of the heap, and to crown her properly she was returned the winner for her sex at Westminster Kennel Club Show, New York, making her modest owner famous overnight, and incidentally creating an enviable place for herself in American Bulldogdom. A reflection of the honor belongs to Jack Meadows, Oakville, who sponsored her so splendidly at the New York event.

It is predicted that she has only started on her show career, and that the possibilities that yet lie ahead can only be measured by her length of life, and Mr. W. Stroud, her owner, should be greatly rejoiced in the knowledge that he not only owns this specimen, but rather in the knowledge that he bred her.

We voice the feelings of the Bulldog fancy of Canada, in tendering sincere congratulations to Mr. Stroud.

"COILA" VERSUS "ALSTEAD."

Seldom are two celebrated prefixes seen so closely together as the two given above, but we believe that a working agreement has been closed, whereby these two kennels become amalgamated, and we may naturally expect to see some of America's leading Collies kennelled at the "Coila" establishment at Montreal, and shown at our Canadian shows. Whilst some of Canada's best will be housed at the Alstead headquarters and travel the American circuits.

The owners themselves, W. Ormiston Roy (Coila) and Mrs. C. M. Lunt (Alstead), are both well known Collie fanciers internationally and are tremendously enthusiastic, and their amalgamation will give a much needed impetus to the Collie cult of the Dominion.

COMBINED TERRIER CLUBS' SHOWS.

What was easily the greatest gathering of really high class Terriers ever seen under one roof was the combination benched at the Combined Terrier Clubs' Specialty Show, held at the 71st Regiment Building, New York City, on Wednesday, February 9th, when almost 70 Airedales, 75 Wire Haired Fox Terriers and almost 50 Irish Terriers were benched, and it was a strange coincidence that gave each of the three breeds mentioned, an almost equal percentage of entrants who had the distinctive word "Champion" to grace their respective cognomens.

Airedales were called for as soon as any, the judge, Mr. Wm. F. Patterson, evidently sensing the importance of the task that stood against his name. It would be rank negligence to proceed further without paying tribute to the officers of the Clubs chiefly interested. The arrangements were indeed of an exceptionally high order, and the building perfection, while the three rings were a treat to note, and to emulate on some future occasion. In fact, to be perfectly frank, the whole arrangements were an education in successful show management, and lucky was the individual seeking knowledge in this branch of the science.

In the first class of Airedales five were called, and it is indeed pleasant to chronicle that the first blue ribbon to be presented was awarded to the Toronto entry of Joseph Russell, "Claycliff Man o' War," second to "Dinna Care," unfortunate to meet such strong competition here, third to "Schuylkill Prince Jumbo." Novice Class brought seventeen to the ring, and some "rip snorters" to boot. Here Frederic C. Hood won with his "Boxwood Bristle," and another Canadian dog stood begging with all his might for consideration, and not in vain, either, Ern. Murby's Ch. "Harvie Warlock." Showing his best and ably handled by his ringmaster, Bert Swann.

In Limit Dogs (14 entries) "Harvie Warlock" won third placement.

Winners, Dogs, "Brookhaven Ladie."

Reserve (and really should have spelt reverse, rather), "Boxwood Beaconsfield."

Puppy Bitches (nine youngsters in the ring), first to "Yankee Notion," second to Joseph Russell's "Claycliff Vanity," and third to "Naeyonne Far-

merette. Novice Bitches, third to "Claycliff Vanity."

Winners Bitches, "Boxwood Bashful."

Reserve, Ch. "Doreda Warland Strategy."

Probably the greatest win possible on the day—for strictly young stock—was when Frederick C. Hood's elegant dog, "Boxwood Bristle," 19 months old, carried off the Novice Stake, and later also won the Bred by Exhibitor Stake, the purses when combined being for over \$300.

Who said the game wasn't worth the candle? Ask Mr. F. C. Hood about it.

Wire Haired Fox Terriers. There were 75 dogs entered for the breed and claimed by experts to be absolutely the greatest gathering of actually high class specimens ever seen in the country under one roof and an English authority who was present extended the area "to any other country and under one roof." Truly it was a magnificent sight and an outstanding tribute to the judge, Mr. W. P. Fraser, Toronto.

It was hinted that Mr. Fraser's "eye" might have lost some of its old-time power, but this was dispelled as soon as this authority on the breed commenced his duties. The classes were uniformly well filled and were continuously changing. This did not worry Mr. Fraser, who studiously and assiduously kept at his herculean task, until everyone was satisfied that they had at least got a "fair shake."

In the Puppy Class, and of the eleven entered, second went to James F. Strachan's (Canadian) "Ormsby Metagama" and fourth to his "Ormsby General," a tribute to Mr. Strachan of Montreal and to the Dominion of Canada.

Novice Dogs, first to Capt. O. A. Shaw McKean's "Pride's Hill Games-ter," and third to his "Pride's Hill Tickle 'Em Jock." (We look on this Kennel as if it were Canadian, owing to the fact that our old friend, Jack Steer, is the manager of the establishment).

It was in Limit Dogs that C. L. Gilliland introduced his "Frilford Felix," and with wondrous alacrity did Mr. Fraser catch the merits of this two-year-old son of "Brakesmere Benedict" who ultimately landed on top of the heap, with O. W. Lehman's "Whose Fox Trot" reserve.

The Open Class here will be long remembered and will form the chief item of conversation amongst Fox

Terrier fanciers for many years to come.

Open Bitches was also a wonderful class for quality, many of the entrants being of Ordinary, Best in Show variety. First to O. W. Lehman's "Chesney Correct," second to Gilliland's "Aberfoyle Trevelac Tit Bit," third to Mr. and Mrs. M. W. Newton's "Chappaqua Bristolic Belle," fourth to Capt. O. A. Shaw McKean's "Prides Hill Frantic."

Winners, "Chesney Correct."

Reserve Winners, "Aberfoyle Trevelac Tit Bit."

The features of the show were the large entries of Capt. O. A. Shaw McKean and James F. Strachan, who benched almost one-third of the Wire Haired entry between them.

We will leave Irish Terriers over to our next issue.

"OLD TIMER TALKS."

C. E. Living, Westboro, Ont., writing his acceptance of a Provincial Vice-Presidency voted to him by the Cocker Spaniel Club of Canada, says in part:—

I have "Paddy," "Queenie," and "Gipsy" all by Ch. "Ottawa Romeo," which if boiled down to Cocker size, would be hard to beat. I have three bitches by "Ottawa Warlock" that I think are as good as the best. I have also a good young dog by "Ottawa Warlock" out of "Carleton Fannie," and all four have done some good winning at Toronto and Ottawa.

All my dogs trace back through "Ottawa Dot" to a dog I sold "Andy" Armstrong more than twenty years ago, when he was starting in Cockers. "Warlock's" pedigree traces back on one line to the same dog, so very naturally I am very proud of this strain. It will be thirty-four years since I bought my first Cocker bitch, which I bred to "Obo Jr." and also to "Bob Obo," sons of "Farrows" old Ch. "Obo," and I often think there are very few of the Cocker fanciers of those days who are in the game now, or above the earth, for that matter.

WESTMINSTER KENNEL CLUB SHOW

For years we had yearned for an opportunity to visit New York Show. We had sent our dogs there, and had won there, yet the ideal was only realized in part. So, when the doors opened on the morning of Thursday, February 10th, 1921, there were but mighty few who could boast of being there before your scribe, and here is a note you can all mark down. The first dog to enter the Madison Gardens for this year's show, was none other than "Roxton Mickey" that elegant specimen of the English Bulldog, which adorns the front cover of *Kennel and Bench* this month, and the first dogman to enter was Jack Meadows of Oakville, Ont., the handler of the winning "Mickey," and illustrates in a forcible way the fact that Canada and Canadians are never very far behind at America's foremost Canine gatherings. Did the early birds get the worm? The award columns give the answer. Canadian fanciers were out in force, several taking the trip for the first time and later taking their oath, that it was the harbinger of many visits yet to come. Amongst the crowds we noticed our President, Mr. Joseph Russell, Mr. and Mrs. Bert Swann, Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Ingram, Messrs. A. Donaldson, Jack McNaughton, "Bill" Wickham, "Tolstoi" Webber, Josiah Wilson, Jack Meadows, Geo. W. Bailey, Humphrey Elliott, Fred Smith, all of Ontario; Dr. J. H. Villeneuve, Miss C. J. La Violette, Mrs. Van Camp, Miss McGill; Messrs. W. Ormiston Roy, A. Trudeau, James F. Strachan, the Armistead Brothers, Nap Parent, Alf Lepine, Bob Ross, the good partners Cornforth & Kay, all of Quebec; Miss Lena Shortt (late of London), we were glad to meet for Auld Lang Syne. And they were a clannish bunch at that, and justified what Bob Ross gave as an American's opinion of us, in a recent article of this paper, "That when you meet one, you meet them all, and they are all breeders too."

Nine rings were arranged, and in operation simultaneously. The honor of starting to judge first, seemed to fall to Dr. John De Mund, and who incidentally seemed to be the busiest man in the busy building. The building itself looked like a miniature New York City, with its many streets and avenues. Norman K. Swire, had as his allotment of breeds, Collies, Bloodhounds, Mastiffs, Poodles and Pomeranians, and because of the indifferent health of H. D. Cogan who was to have passed the rule over the Bull-

dogs, that breed was allocated to the judgment of Mr. Swire, and it is worthy of note that this young wisecracker found his winning dog in "Tams Result," who first saw the light of day in Montreal, and his winning female in "Roxton Mickey" born and raised in Toronto.

Speculation was ripe as to what would eventually be returned as the best dog in the Show, and an old English Sheepdog named, "Champion May Morn Weather," owned by Wm. A. Jamison, Holmdel, N.J., groomed to the last hair by that old Collie authority Fred S. Leighton, was a strong favorite, and there was money to back her chances, and some no doubt was actually wagered. The beautiful entry of "Bobtails" from the Holmdel Kennels was one of the feature sights of the Show, and Miss A. Combes, the able manageress was on hand at all times to see to her charges, whom she very evidently strongly admires. This bright lady imparted the information that "May Morn Weather" was only a few days in America, had been returned the "best dog in show" at three important English fixtures and had never yet been beaten by a dog of her own variety; an enviable record indeed. Other dogs named as possible "Bests in Show," were C. L. Gilliland's recent Wire Haired purchases "Frlford Felix" and his kennel mate "Tid Bit." "F. Felix" had won at the Crystal Palace as recently as December, 1920, while "Trevelac Tid Bit" also enjoyed an international reputation. "Frlford Felix" created a sensation at the Specialty Show earlier in the week, by winning for Best Wire Terrier, over an entry of 75, five of which were champions. At the Big Show he had to give way to the invincible smooth Ch. "Sabine Fernlike." To look over the Fox Terrier entry was an education in itself. James F. Strachan had eleven entered from Montreal and were a great tribute to this famous Canadian fancier. Capt. Q. Shaw McKean had about a dozen benched, everyone in the very pink, and in charge of Charlie Powlesland, the well known Montreal breeder and handler.

As the three days of rush and bustle succeeded each other in quick succession, the everlasting topic still turned itself to "Which will be the best?" and when the contenders actually were lined up for the "grand finale," the spectacle beggared description. In every stall in the immediate vicinity—and there were hundreds of them—

were perched as much humanity as could find a foothold. The passages on the aisles were solid with an excited, expectant, feverish crowd. The ring itself was sacred ground, nothing but officials on business, judges, stewards and exhibitors were allowed within the precincts. And there was the "cream of the show" lined up for final inspection. "Tam's Result," the Canadian bred Bulldog, "Phantom of Ashcroft" (Peke) the near hero of 1918, the Canadian Bull Terrier Ch. "Haymarket Faultless" the actual hero of the 1918 show, "Blarney Beckside Begorra" (Irish Terrier), Ch. "Warland Strategy" (Airedale), the wonderful Boston Terrier Puppy (10 months' old) "Buddie Blink," "Grosse Point Rags" (Cairn Terrier), "Auburn Beetle" (Scottish Terrier), "Lansdowne Sunflower" (Greyhound), "Midkiff Seductive" (Cocker), Joselle Kennels' Shepherd Dog "Dolf Von Dustembrook" (a great specimen), "Nikko II" (Russian Wolfhound), "Tobolsk" (Samoyede), etc., etc., a show in itself. Two "shake ups" have now taken place, and some good dogs and their owners or handlers have retired, excitement is expectant, the ring looks a roomy enclosure now, with only five dogs left in.

"Phantom of Ashcroft" looks good to us. He deserves to go far. "Tam's Result" (yes, this Canadian bred son of "Tam Hin" is still in the ring, and one of the chosen few). "Lansdowne Sunflower"—and last but not by any means, least—"Midkiff Seductive," the pride of the Midkiff establishment and ably handled by her breeder and owner the well known Billy Payne. "Faultless" is often looked at but it is conceded now that Mr. Hopton has decided on the Peke, and by argument and gesture betrays his anxiety to convince the quiet Canadian, that it is all over but the cheering. Every dog is doing just what is being asked of him. The little parti colored Cocker—up to this minute almost overshadowed—posing like an inanimate statue of marble, here is the embodiment of condition and conformation; every curve and line faultless, head chiseled out to defy the human power to imitate, markings very striking and a beautiful specimen of her breed. For a moment Charlie Hopton is quiet and undemonstrative, he is looking at a "real" dog, and a sporting specimen as well, and better still an American bred; then the argument again, but Mr. Swire has a mind of his own evidently, and is obdurate to the last de-

gree; so amid breathless, feverish quietness, only broken by the gasping, exultant, guttural cheers of the ring-siders as the judges scan the dogs. It is a deadlock and Dr. De Mund, the first to begin and the last to finish, assumes the role of referee, and after carefully going over the contenders gave his decision in favor of the Cocker Spaniel. That his decision was well received,—even if the winner was not conceded by the “wise Alick’s” to be in at the death,—goes without argument, and so ended one of the keenest contests for premier honors, ever witnessed at New York Dog Show, and the best dog had won.

The benching was in the capable hands of Spratts Patent, and stands a monument to their ability to do things quickly, a bare lot to-night and a dog city tomorrow, just about says it all; their stand just had a variety of “every known need” for a dog fancier. “Field and Fancy” were on hand and must have done considerable business, if their constantly besieged stall was any criterion of what was going on there. Mr. J. F. Skinner was on hand to meet old friends and to welcome the new. “Kennel and Bench” was on sale here, and a quantity thought to be sufficient for New York and Boston’s requirements, were all sold out quickly and a fresh supply ordered for the Boston fixture. Other stands also seemed to be doing a “roaring trade.”

“Like begets like” is a well known axiom, and if anyone wanted to find the Editor of these notes, his chances were favorable if he paraded towards the Collie entry. Here you could find the devotees of the older and younger schools worshipping alike at the shrine of his Majesty the Collie. Here we met “Pat” Tully as he watched his old “Wishaw Queen” romp home with the bacon, and we suddenly remember that “Wishaw” was our home town and so, we must be at least forty-second cousins to Queen. Mrs. C. M. Lunt, who so ably captured the hearts of Canadian collie-dom at Toronto last May. Watched her great Collie, “Alstead Supremacy” capture the coveted winner’s prize. While an eleven-months’ old puppy, sired by her Ch. “Laund Luminous” (now at Montreal) went from puppy to reserve winners, a wonderful trip for a Collie. Age and condition were probably the only factors that stopped him at the reserve mark, and here we must state that “Mike Kennedy” who handled the youngster, had him looking “prettier than a picture.” “Alton Knocker,” a son of another “Alstead” dog, bred

and owned by Alick Donaldson, Toronto, won 1st in Novice and 2nd in Puppy, Junior and bred by exhibitor. Was Alick tickled?—ask him.

Oh, it was some show I’ll say. Can you imagine 1,745 dogs under one roof? And over 600 classes, with nearly all of our Canadian entries in the actual money. It was enough to offset any handicap the prohibition measures of the country and that’s saying something, isn’t it?

ST. THOMAS, ONT., AIRS THE DOG TAX QUESTION.

The City Council of St. Thomas have been rudely awakened to a sense of their responsibility in the matter of collecting the tax for Towser. Hitherto the tax has been one very favorable to owners, i.e., males \$1, females \$2, which arrangement, however, is in discord with the Ontario Dog Tax and Sheep Protection Act, which states that the minimum tax for males shall be \$2 and for females \$4, which of course is admitted to be a fair assessment, but to jump from a reasonable tax of \$1 for a dog and \$2 for a female, and mention \$5 for a dog and \$15 for a female, is simply a jump from the sublime to the ridiculous, if not to the actually fantastic.

We have advised the Mayor of St. Thomas of our relationship with the City of Toronto, which is of the happiest nature, and trust they will accept our arrangement in detail for the City of St. Thomas.—Ed.

Mr. Sparkes, the enterprising owner, proposes forming a partnership with a former partner and which, when culminated, will necessitate the enlarging of the Kennels to their pre-war status.

WHAT THE CLUBS ARE DOING

The proposed circuit of Spring Shows between the Western Ontario canine associations has become a reality. At a meeting in Brantford on Feb. 11, delegates from London, Brantford, Guelph and Hamilton, unanimously favored the plans and dates for the London, Brantford and Guelph shows were definitely set.

London is to lead the circuit with a two-day show on April 28-29th, Brantford to follow later, Guelph to follow the Airedale Terrier Club show with a two-day show on May 25-26th.

Under the plan formulated two and three point shows will be possible for all of the clubs. Each club has pledged itself to send 40 or more dogs to the shows of the other clubs, or in default of this number to pay the entry for 40 dogs. The Hamilton delegate was not authorized to come in on the plan, but was asked to put the matter before his club, and probably with a guaranteed entry from the other clubs Hamilton will feel safe in launching out on a show venture to harmonize with the circuit.

Adding the local entry to the guaranteed entry from the other clubs, and the usual number of dogs from other cities, the Western Ontario shows will make a splendid showing this spring, it was felt. Delegates from the three clubs who have decided on the show, say, that the special prizes to be offered this year will exceed all the efforts of the past. It was the expressed feeling of the meeting that more care should be taken by the individual clubs in their choice of judges for the coming events. Members of the various clubs will be appointed to care for and handle the dogs from their cities that are sent to the out-of-town shows, another plan that will surely increase the entries.

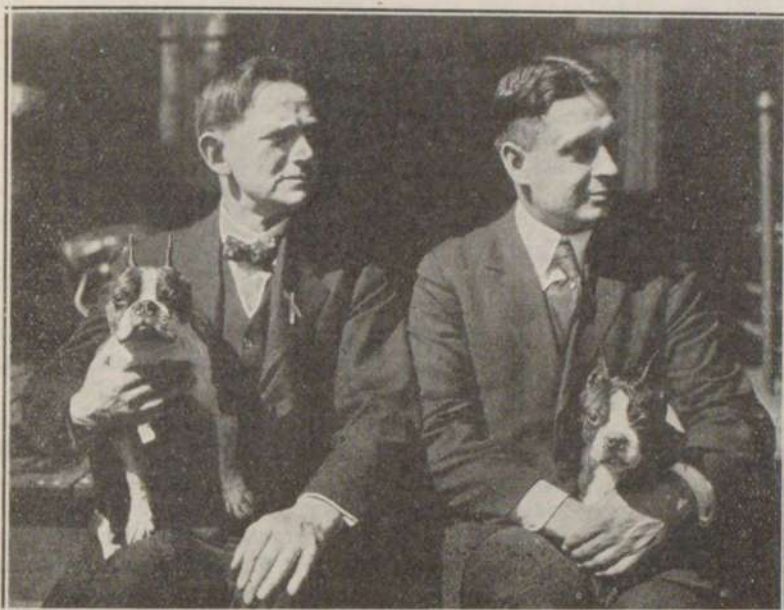

The following is a brief review of how some of our Canadian exhibits figured out at this event. The three entries in Mastiffs were all bred by that enthusiastic Canadian fancier, C. W. Dickinson, Toronto.

Russian Wolfhound—Mr. A. V. Webley of Toronto, made a good showing in this section, his good dog "Krilenko," capturing 2nd novice, 2nd American Bred and Reserve in one of the strongest open classes seen for years. The same owner's Ch. "Clontarfs Krassi," being third in Open Bitches, this grand pair also landed 2nd Brace. This accomplishment, the competition considered, just made our friend Webley the happiest man at the Gardens.

American Foxhounds—Our Ottawa expert on this variety once more piloted his good dog, "Baldwin's Hefwin," to 1st Open and Winners, a notable victory won on merit, and a tribute to Canadian breeding.

Pointers—"Lansdowne Canadian Rip Rap," a Canadian-bred dog, late of Montreal, went to Winners in this section.

Irish Setters—Ameda Trudeau piloted his well known bitch, Ch. "Sonora Nancy," to third place in the Open Class and it should be noted that the 1st and 2nd Dogs were both American champions. Mrs. E. Alban Sturdee (an old Canadian fancier), won 3rd American-Bred Bitches, with "Glencho Bridget Benwee."

Whippets—The Canadian entries in this popular sporting variety were from the well known fancier, Mr. A. Lowenstien. Unfortunately a delay in transit prevented them from arriving in time to be shown, an incident that was much regretted by Mr. Lowenstien's fellow competitors, a real bunch of sports.

Collies—(67 dogs entered)—Mr. Alex. Donaldson of Toronto made quite an impression with his home-bred son of Ch. "Alstead Aeroplane." This exceedingly promising youngster carried off 2nd Puppy, 1st Novice, 2nd Junior and 2nd Bred by Exhibitor, truly a wonderful performance for a nine-months-old puppy in this fast company, and a high honor to a deserving fancier.

Bulldogs—(70 dogs entered)—Our Canadian stock was well represented

won 3rd in a grand class of Open Heavyweights. The Winners dog was "Tam's Result," a Canadian-bred dog by "Tam Hin" and "Nonsuch Lady," also Canadian-bred. In bitches Mr. E. P. Tuson of Lethbridge won 1st in Novice and 2nd Open, with "Coronet Compassion." Mr. C. Smith's "Sally of Montreal" was fourth in Limit and Open. The Winners bitch was "Roxton Mickey," owned by W. Stroud of Toronto, an enthusiastic amateur breeder. She was put down and handled to the king's taste by that well known Bulldog expert, Jack Meadows, of Oakville. Mr. H. A. Wilson's good little bitch, "Lady Rhoda," was 1st Limit, 1st Open and Winners (Miniatures).

Airedale Terriers—(79 dogs entered)—In an extraordinarily strong class of Puppy Dogs, Mr. Jos. Russell's "Man of War" went to second place, Mr. E. A. Murby's Ch. "Harvie Warlock" carried off 3rd in the Novice, with 16 competitors, Mr. N. McKenzie's Ch. "Polam Maxim" was 2nd Open and Reserve Winners. Puppy Bitches totalled 10 entries, with Mr. Jos. Russell's "Claycliff Vanity" placed 2nd. This was the outstanding puppy of her class, but had the misfortune of getting her paw under the judge's "clodhopper," and as he looked 200 pounds, more or less, she must have suffered much pain.

Bull Terriers—(35 dogs entered)—That deservingly popular Ottawa fancier, R. H. Elliott, trotted out his home-bred Ch. "Haymarket Faultless" who again carried all before him in this variety and was considered a likely candidate for foremost honors, but when a judge is glaringly "agin the government" what can a respectable Bull Terrier like "Faultless" do?

Boston Terriers—(159 dogs entered)—In the class for Puppy Dogs, where 33 youngsters competed, Messrs. Lunan and Perry of London, Ont., exhibited "Globe League of Nations," and came out 2nd, also 2nd Novice (with 34 entries) and 1st in Limit and Open under 15 pounds, a marvellous record for a youngster. Mr. A. E. Carter's "Lloyd George" was V.H.C. in Novice. Messrs. Lunan and Perry's "Globe Sweet William" was 3rd in Limit Dogs over 20 pounds. In Bitches Mrs. W. C. Ingram's "Lady Bird" went to the top in Novice; Ingram's "Sweet Clover" 2nd Limit; Ch. "Sweet Clover," and the same owner won 1st hot Brace Class. These

results prove that our Canadian stock are more than holding their own with our cousins across the line and we frankly feel flattered with our showing in Bostons.

Fox Terriers, Wire-Haired—(113 dogs entered)—J. F. Strachan's "Ormsby Metagama," 2nd Novice and 2nd Debutante. Alf. Lepine's "Malden Dusky Polly," 3rd Puppy Bitches, 3rd Novice, 2nd Maiden and 2nd Debutante. The competition in this breed was the "White Hot" Kind, and the dogs to touch silk here, were real good stuff.

Irish Terriers—(48 dogs entered)—H. T. Armistead's "Westpark Cadet" 3rd in Novice and Limit Classes, and bears out Harry's good opinion of his dog.

West Highland White Terriers—J. D. Eagens "Lothian Judy," 1st Puppy in a class of six and 2nd Novice in a class of five good ones. Jack keeps on in the interest of the "White Highlanders," and deserves his honors here.

Pomeranians—(49 dogs entered)—Mr. W. S. Wickham's "Shaftesbury Decision," 2nd Limit Dogs. J. McNaughton's "Pomeria Priscilla," 1st Limit, 1st Open and Winners. "Priscilla" was a prime favorite and was favorably commented upon by all the authorities at the ringside. This win coming after the recent controversy, should mean something to both the dog and her owner.

English Toy Spaniels—Mr. A. Smith's "Celemo Ivanhoe," 1st American-Bred, 2nd Open and Reserve Winners, the same owner's "Lord Eric of Caton Hall," 1st American-Bred, 1st Open and Winners and now it is up to friend Smith to again popularize this pretty little breed.

Pekingese—Mrs. C. La Violette's "Chu Chin Chow of Alderbourne," 2nd Limit Dogs, in a hot class of seven. "Chow" had many admirers at his stall all the time.

Brussels Griffons—Mrs. Van Camp's "Robin of Montreal," 2nd Open and Reserve Winners, the same owner's "Freya of Montreal," 2nd Open and Reserve Winners also 1st Team and 2nd Brace.

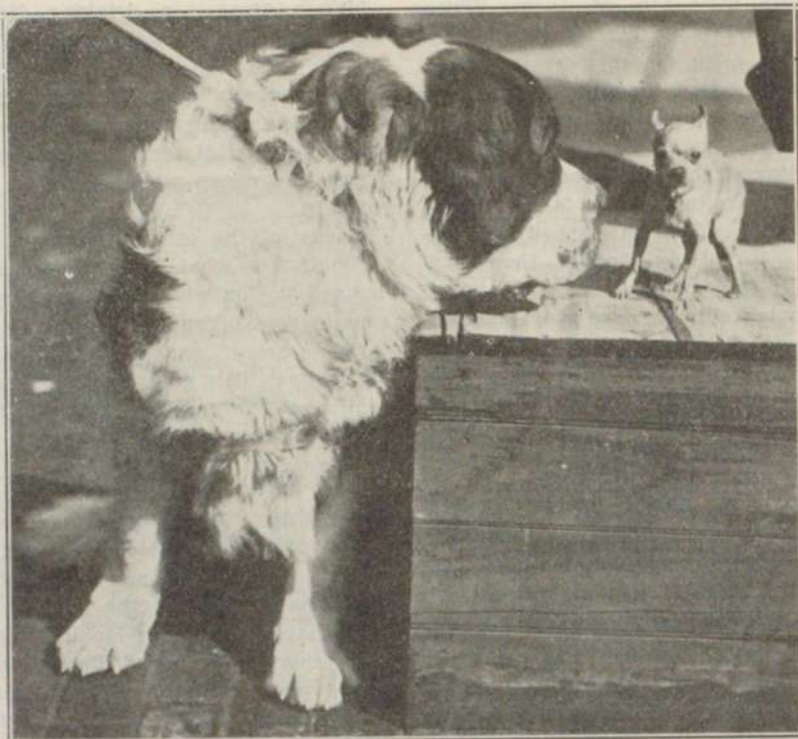
COUNTESS VISITS TORONTO.

SUCCESS IN THE DOG BUSINESS

By R. H. Falconer, Toronto, a Canadian Cocker Fancier

It is the intention in the following article to briefly consider the reasons why some men make a success of the business of selling dogs and others fail.

First—One of the important requisites to a successful dog business is to start your kennel right by securing first-class foundation stock. Not only must the foundation stock be pedigreed and eligible for registration, but it must consist of representative specimens of the particular dog you proposed breeding. If you are going to breed dogs, money paid for unpedigreed stock is worse than wasted. It costs more to start a kennel with high-class pedigreed stock than with "mutts," but the results obtained from the sale of the puppies are in direct proportions to the amount invested in foundation stock. Fully pedigreed puppies of any breed are always saleable at good prices. Unpedigreed stock is not only hard to sell, but do not command prices that make it worth while raising the puppies. Let us emphasize the importance of starting your kennels right by securing first-class pedigreed stock.

Second—It has been said a satisfied customer is the best advertisement. This applies with special emphasis to the dog business. Never allow a puppy to leave your premises unless in perfect health up to the minute it is crated. One of the most prolific causes of failure among dog men is that they are quite willing to sell puppies out of condition. A man who gets an "out of condition" puppy never buys another from the same kennels, and never recommends that kennel to an intending purchaser, and may be in a position to stand in the way of a good sale to someone else. It pays to sell stock that gives satisfaction. It is better to lose the sale than to put one over the purchaser, even if you never expect to sell him again. A little honesty in the dog business goes a long way in establishing a reputation for square dealing.

Third—The art of advertising is to let the public know who you are and what you have for sale. No large results in the dog business are obtained without intelligent advertising. If you would do "big business" you must keep your kennels constantly before the investing public—those wanting

stock for breeding purposes and those starting in the dog game. There is an economy in advertising, which means the use of the best medium, and the best medium is undoubtedly the magazine devoted to the interest of dogs. Advertising in newspapers may sell a few dogs at unremunerative prices to those wanting little house pets, but the place to advertise thorough-bred dogs is the dog journal, where it is seen by the dog fancier, who appreciates high-class stock and knows its value.

Fourth—If you wish to do a large business it is necessary that you have dogs fit to exhibit on the show bench, and that you should be known as an exhibitor and winner of prizes at dog shows. The kennels in the United States that do the largest business in the selling of dogs are also the most prominent exhibitors at dog shows.

Fifth—Whether you are going in for the breeding and selling of dogs in a small or large way in order to make it a paying proposition, you must apply the same principles as obtained in any other well-conducted business. Slovenly methods in the dog-selling business get you nowhere. Good stationery, printed letterheads, envelopes and stud-cards are of immense assistance in presenting your sale offers. A typewriter is also a valuable adjunct. Every up-to-date firm uses typewriters in their correspondence. Hand writing is out of date. First-class stationery and office appliances pay their cost many times over in the course of a year in increased sales.

When you sell a pup it is business-like to present your customer with all the papers, copy of pedigree, application to register, transfer of ownership, etc., properly filled in and certified correct over the name of the breeder. This means a little more trouble, but a dog business to be successful must be conducted on the same standard as any other properly conducted business. What would you think of a real estate office that failed to turn you over the titles to the land you purchased? A purchaser of a dog is just as much entitled to all the papers as the purchaser of a city lot. What is worth doing is worth doing well.

Sixth—Poor shipping and crating are responsible for a great many failures in the dog business. A dog not

properly crated cannot be expected to arrive at destination in good condition. Consult the railway time and get your shipment off with the best possible connection, so he will be delivered with the least possible delay. A dog delivered in good condition, provided he is worth the price paid, is more likely to please your customer than one shipped in a crate two sizes too small and which has been laying at the railway station hours before being forwarded.

Every year there are thousands of people starting in the kennel business all over the country. They stay in the game a few months, then drop out, saying: "there is nothing to be made out of dogs." The difficulty with 90 per cent. of these amateurs is they try to do business on the cheap, purchase poor foundation stock, and do not use ordinary business methods in advertising and offering their stock for sale.

Of course it costs a little more to start right, and it costs a little more to offer the stock in an attractive way, but it is the only method of making the dog-selling business a dividend-paying proposition. The breeding and selling of puppies is not a "quick-rich" business. No man can jump in and make money hand over fist right from the very start. Whether conducted as a side line or as a means of livelihood, it requires time to build up. Rome was not built in a day, and the biggest kennels in the United States have been breeding, exhibiting, importing, exporting and selling dogs for years.

To sum up, the factors that make for a successful dog business are:

Start with good specimens, put them down in healthy condition, take a little pains to understand exactly what your customer wants, never misrepresent a pup in order to put through a sale, tell your customer of the faults in the pup you are offering him, and also that there has never been bred in the world's history an absolutely perfect specimen of any breed of dog. Take pains in crating and shipping; do a little exhibiting; advertise your stock in a good dog journal, present your correspondence in a business-like way—these are the only roads that lead to a successful dog business. There are no short cuts.

To Mr. Lunan goes the credit of breeding "Globe League o' Nations," the young Canadian bred flyer who made a name for himself and the country he represents at the New York Show this year—and it was under Mr. Lunan's handling that the "League" sailed from puppy class to reserve winners at the New Year's Show of the Boston Terrier Club of Canada.

The report of the Stud Book Committee was read in regard to the Shepherd Dog Club Stud Book and it was decided that the requirements for the registration of all foreign dogs will be the same as that of an American-bred Dog. No imported dog shall be registered unless same shall have an authentic pedigree of three generations properly certified to and passed upon by our Stud Book Committee, the same to take effect at once.

A committee was appointed to draw up a proper resolution in appreciation of the services of our retiring president, Mr. Hollis H. Hunnewell.

Permission was granted to the Toy Dog Club of New England to change the name of that club to read, Middlesex County Kennel Club.

The resolutions received from the Erie County Society for the protection of birds, fish and game, in regard to the protection of thoroughbred dogs, was read and referred to the Law Committee with the request that they take action in regard to same.

The report of the Stud Book Committee recommending new regulations in regard to registration of dogs was read and adopted. The License Committee granted the application of the Eastern Dog Club for jurisdiction in the following territory surrounding Boston: Cambridge, Somerville, Charlestown, Everett, Malden, Chelsea, Quincy, Dorchester, Milton, Roxbury, Mattapan, Jamaica Plain, Hyde Park, Readville, Roslindale, West Roxbury, Dedham, Brookline, Chestnut Hill, Newton, Brighton, Watertown and Belmont.

The Middlesex County Kennel Club, formerly the Toy Dog Club of New England, having concurrent jurisdiction with the Eastern Dog Club in regard to Middlesex County only.

The Boston Terrier Clubs in and in the vicinity of Boston, wishing to hold a Sanction Boston Terrier Match, must obtain the approval of the Boston Terrier Club before same will be acted on by our License Committee.

OLD AGE.

It often happens that as the burden of years begins to make itself felt, a dog's disposition undergoes a change. This, of course, is only to be expected. Some dogs grow old earlier than others, but sooner or later they are bound to become more sedate. The restlessness of youth is a thing of the past, he appreciates the fireside more than of old—much as his owner does. To those who really care for their dog, all this does not mean that his companionship gives less pleasure. The knowledge that he is growing old must cause a pang—"What, even Fido"—yet there are compensations.

The puppy may be more amusing, the youngster a better companion for a long tramp, but the old dog, which has grown up with one, the dog which knows his master's ways and moods, which has become a very part of the owner's life, is the most precious of all.

And so it hurts when the careless critic declares that the old dog is "getting wicked." No charge is brought more recklessly, and none is more deadly. There are still plenty of people who view all dogs with distrust. An accidental scratch caused by a canine tooth in a game of play is exaggerated into a very dangerous wound.

Gracious, what a lot of dangers some of us have triumphed over! Even a slight puncture by the pearly

tooth of a puppy causes such people alarm, while the very thought of coming in contact with the yellow tooth of an old dog is almost too serious for words.

It is this that makes the charge of "getting wicked" so deadly. A "queer" tempered puppy is bad enough, an "uncertain" old dog is infinitely worse. There is no getting away from the fact that a bad tempered dog is not a desirable possession. No one has a right to keep a dog which is a danger to the public.

On the other hand, many an innocent dog is condemned upon flimsy evidence. It is not often that a dog's temper really suffers from age, but there is certainly one way in which age may cause something which may well be mistaken for vice, and that, odd as the statement may sound, is failing eyesight.

This is generally one of the first signs of encroaching years, though this fact too often entirely escapes notice. We often hear of dogs which have become, or are becoming, blind,

but seldom of those which are merely getting short-sighted. This disability is very common, and we have no doubt that it accounts for many cases of "getting wicked."

Without any apparent reason, a dog of hitherto unblemished character, suddenly causes surprise by "flying" at some one with whom he should be familiar. The wiseacres shake their heads, clearly the old dog is turning crusty, becoming uncertain in his temper. In the majority of instances he is doing nothing of the kind. His sight is falling him, and that is how he comes to mistake a friend for a stranger and act accordingly. It is very alarming for the victim, the more so because so totally unexpected.

It may be a reason why certain precautions should be taken, but it is certainly not a reason why the dog should be straightaway condemned as vicious.

SHIPPING DOGS BY EXPRESS

Nine hundred and ninety-nine dogs out of every thousand shipped by express go through safely when properly crated and properly marked.

Expressmen are human and are inclined to be humane—but do not expect them to display a greater interest in your dog than you do, as indicated by the kind of crate used and manner in which your dog is prepared for shipment.

Always remember that on a journey your dog may become frightened,

may get hungry,

may want exercise,

may want more air,

which will produce in him a mad desire to get out of the crate, and unless the crate or kennel is of strong construction he is going to get out in spite of all the express company can do to prevent it. Don't ship a hundred-dollar-dog in a ten-cent. soap box. Remember, your dog must travel in a car with a thousand other shipments, and the crate or kennel should be strong enough to stand the handling and so constructed as to afford ample ventilation on all sides.

Good Marking is Vitaly Important.

The express company knows your dog only by the way you mark it. Examine your kennel or crate closely—

always effectually erase or remove all old marks.

Old marks are responsible for about seventy-five per cent. of the astray shipments.

Address the shipment legibly and clearly. Use abbreviations sparingly. Place a mark directly on the shipment if practicable to do so, otherwise use good plain labels firmly affixed to some protected part of the crate or kennel, or, if tags are used, apply not less than two good strong tags to each crate or kennel shipped.

As an additional precaution, attach a tag securely to the collar on the dog, so that if he does escape and is found, the express company will know who he belongs to.

Food and Utensils.

Shipper must provide the food required by the dog en route, and shipper must also furnish the necessary cup or other utensil so that the dog may be given water as he requires it. Written instructions as to feeding should also be furnished. It is essential to the care and comfort of your dog that proper food and receptacles for water accompany each shipment.

When dogs are shipped by express in less than carload lots, the owner cannot accompany them, that is to say, there is no assurance that the

dogs will make the journey on the same train as the owner. A large percentage of express matter is forwarded on special express trains on which no passengers are allowed, and further, the express company reserves the right to route shipments over railroads and via such transfer points as are found to be most expeditious and convenient.

When shipping dogs to others, always notify the consignee by Government mail the date the dog is shipped and when to expect it to arrive at destination, so that the consignee will be prepared to receive shipment immediately on arrival.

Rates.

The charge for dogs in crates or kennels is one and one-half times the first-class rate per one hundred pounds actual gross weight.

When dogs are shipped not in crates or kennels but securely chained, they can be accepted at a minimum weight of one hundred pounds each and charged for at double first-class rates.

Contract for Shipments.

The ordinary express receipt does not cover shipments of live animals such as dogs. A special live-stock contract must be issued for each dog shipment.

Ordinarily, express vehiclemen do not have these live-stock contracts with them, and, therefore, arrangements for shipping dogs should be made with the express agent in advance of shipment, or dogs should be taken by shipper to the express office, where the necessary contracts can be properly prepared and executed. It is necessary to protect the shipper as well as the express company that a proper form of live-stock contract be carefully prepared and signed for each such shipment.

We are just as anxious as you are for your dog to have a pleasant and safe journey, and these suggestions are offered in a spirit of helpfulness to the inexperienced shipper.

Jones, Massena, a fine, big, upstanding nine-month-old puppy, splendid type and quality, having a grand head of correct type, strong in muzzle, good length, dark eye, great depth of bris- ket, nice tucked-up hindquarters, good legs and feet, in splendid coat; to sum up, a wonderfully well-balanced Wolfhound all over.

2nd—"Ch. Krilenko," owned by A. V. Webley, Toronto, a splendid Wolfhound, with type staring out all over him, and loses out to the winner in size only.

3rd—"Colchan of Tatiana," owned by Mrs. J. C. Hadley, Erie, Pa., a grand specimen, with lots of bone and sub-

stance, and a strong, well-balanced hound all through, but spoiled his chances of going higher through his actions in the ring by refusing to show properly.

police forces, and they have five at the penitentiary in training, and when their education is completed they will be watched with a great deal of interest in the province. Mr. Nicholson is to be congratulated on his venture and we wish him every success. A New York man once remarked: "There was no close season for criminals, and Bloodhounds in a wicked corner would keep one busy all the time."

The police in England are buying and training all the Bloodhounds they can get, and are using them with great success in some of the worst Sinn Fein districts in Ireland. Judging by the reports in the daily Press, there is work right here in Ontario for trained Bloodhounds, but, then, "like the tail of a horse, we are always behind." Here are a few extracts from a letter written by a breeder and trainer of Bloodhounds for criminal work: In the Southern States of America crime seems to be on the increase. I could be going all the time,

found the thief, and, fortunately, we left all good friends, but it might have ended otherwise. I was out all day Friday, Saturday and Sunday till three o'clock. The Friday's run was a murder case. An old mountaineer, aged 68, shot and killed another man of 72, blowing his head nearly off. I was called and arrived shortly after dark. The Hound soon got the scent and trailed him to a house quite a distance away. Knowing that was where he had stopped, we searched very carefully but could not find the man we wanted. I advised the arrest of the occupant of the house. He became alarmed and confessed that he had carried a man off on a mule just two hours before. We made this fellow go along with us and had no trouble in capturing the man we wanted. He is now in jail, having enjoyed his last day of liberty.

That same night there was a post office robbery. There were five in the plot. My Bloodhound got one, the

others went down the river in a boat, but we have one who had part of the loot and furnished us with the names of the others. They will be captured.

To-day a dusky black called me and said someone had entered his house and stole two fine hogs that were killed the day before. As good luck would have it, I got one man and one hog, the other hog was carried off by an accomplice. The negro refused to give us the name, but he will.

I had a good run at Belmont, Miss., after a man who had burned a house. The fellow caught a mule in a pasture, tied it up 300 yards from the house he intended to burn, then walked to the house, fired it, walked back, mounted the mule, rode 2½ miles, abandoned the mule and walked 3 miles home. The Bloodhound trailed him both on and off the mule. We got the incendiary and a full confession.

This man-trailing business is the greatest sport in the world to me, unless the trail is too long. I ran one Xmas day and must have covered 25 miles, looking for a lost child that had wandered away the previous morning. The people searched all day in vain and called me about 9 o'clock at night. The roads being very bad, I did not get there until four in the morning. Taking the scent from a coat the child had thrown off near its home, I saw-sawed back and forth through the forest and found the child soon after the noon hour. I consider it a marvelous performance, but there was nothing to interfere with the dog's work, as no one lived within a radius of several miles, and the people who hunted for the child went in another direction, where it was pretty thickly settled. We thought the child was dead when found, but after being wrapped up, showed signs of life, and was hurried home by a man on horse back, and is now none the worse for the experience. I always work my own Bloodhounds, as I find if some other person is trailing with them they are sure to make a poor job of it, and then report around the country that the dog is no good. For success, work your own, as they understand you best.

Here, shut out from the outer world, is the only heaven that concerns our friend of the Hudson Bay Kennels Regd. Where Airedales for hunting, sporting and general utility purposes are reared amid ideal conditions, and dyed-in-the-wool hunters and trappers are loud in their praises for the dogs bred and trained at this establishment. While those who were fortunate enough to meet Mr. Bates on his last visit to Toronto, can only marvel at the mystical allurements that hold him at this New Ontario point on the map. A man of exceptional intellect, whose fortune in the big city would be as certain as the morning following the night. 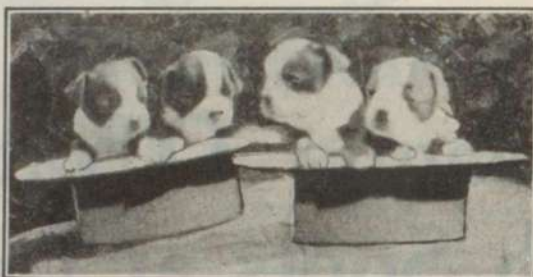

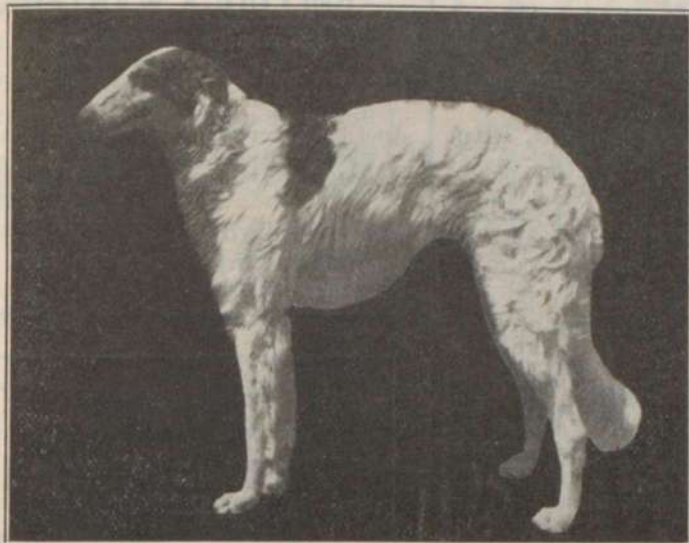

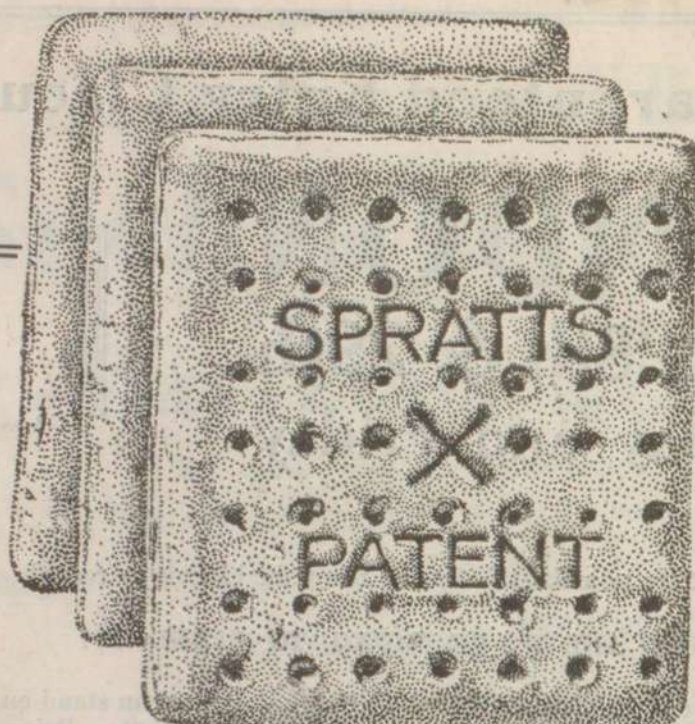
