## CANADIAN NATIONAL EXHIBITION

SOME IMPRESSIONS ON THE  
DOG SHOW.

The best, and biggest show ever held in Canada, are two of the many good things than can be recorded of the 33rd International Dog Show, held in conjunction with the above mentioned annual exhibition.

There were more dogs and better dogs, more visitors, and better management, more satisfaction and less kicking than heretofore. The judges appointed toed the line and commenced their task in the early afternoon of the first day, when the "old" building was packed to its utmost capacity. Superintendent and ring stewards worked hard and fast, and the dogs were brought into the rings with despatch. The whole proceedings, from start to finish, were run clean, and can be classed as one of Canada's leading sporting events. There were close on 800 dogs benched, making it an easy 5-point rating under the rules of the Canadian Kennel Club.

## Impressions on the Show.

Mr. "Bob" Ross, the all-rounder from Montreal, commenced with Mastiffs in the outside ring. There were seven dogs entered, all claiming that well known fancier, Charlie W. Dickinson, as their breeder. "Beowulf," owned by Mr. A. E. Ingle of Rochester, was easily the best; in fact it is questionable if there is one to equal him on this continent. The rest were good and very uniform in type.

St. Bernards had twelve, half of these being from Mrs. J. W. Mountain's "Clanmount" Kennels. A new bitch named "Beautiful of Parkdale," owned by Bert Swann, made a successful debut by capturing special for best of breed. J. R. Tennant showed a grand brace of his Bloodhounds, which did well, as they surely deserved. The nineteen Russian Wolfhounds were good and furnished keen competition, as did the Greyhounds and American Foxhounds. In the latter variety W. C. Baldwin of Ottawa carried off winners in both sexes. There was one of the choicest collections of Setters we have seen for a long time, the all-round quality being of a "top-notch" order.

Mr. G. S. Thomas, the Terrier expert, commenced in Ring No. 2 with Airedales. The entry, 45, could not be described as good as we have seen at this show. Jos. Russell's "Claycliffe Tip Top" went on top in dogs, and J. W. Bain's Ch. "Ellerslie Queen," in bitches, both specimens of rare quality.

In Bull Terriers, with 17 dogs entered, that old enthusiast, John Miles, brought out a youngster named "Inferno Caruso," that carried that well known prefix to victory. Fred Cole's good bitch, Ch. "Belle Mahone" once more showed her qualities by topping the lot in bitches.

W. T. Mayer of Albany captured both the winners prizes in Smooth Fox Terriers with Sabine Knockout and Coleridge Vernie. The "Wires" were better in both quality and quantity, over 40 dogs being benched, comprising many of the best known winners. J. F. Strachan's noted dog, Ch. "Homeless 'Ector," got winners with Jos. Russell's "Bytown Spice" in a close reserve. "Ormsby Lillias," also owned by Mr. Strachan, headed the bitches, with J. W. Bain's "Warrior Mischief" reserve. Irish mustered 19, Scotch 10, and W. W. Highlands 16. The remaining varieties were none too plentiful.

"Toys"—Mr. N. K. Swire of Toronto, who had nearly half the entire show to adjudicate, started in the upstairs ring on the first day with Toys, his first breed being Italian Greyhounds, with seven dogs present. He soon disposed of these as only a few stood out from the rest and won easily. Next came the Pomeranians. They were the largest collection ever brought together in Canada, 67 actual dogs being entered for competition. They were good in spots. We have never seen so many at this show, but we have seen better. The winners of both sexes had no difficulty; both are small and very typical of the breed and stood well out from the rest. J. T. Waggett's black dog, Ch. "Wee Bombing Plane," cleaned up in dogs, and J. McNaughton's well known, dainty little mite, Ch. "Pomeria Princella," in bitches; the latter also got the special for best of breed. From the ring side it appeared to us that a few were unlucky, but upon closer investigation we found that the trained eye of the judge had detected some unsoundness of physical defects, and had penalized them accordingly.

Toy Poodles were few, the two outstanding ones being Ch. "Miss Snookie" and Ch. "Snow Ball VIII.," both owned by that keen fancier, F. Simons of London, Ont.

F. Smith of Ottawa brought out a good team of Toy Spaniels that carried off all the honors.

Yorkshire Terriers were a mixed group, most of them being out of coat. The thirteen dogs shown com-

prised many of our very best specimens.

J. E. Dickert's "Vixen Hart" was easily the best of the Toy Black and Tans, his nearest rival being J. L. Tomlinson's Ch. "Trixie II."

Pekingese came next and were one of the sensations of the show, both for numbers and quality, and their showing would stand comparison with anything we have seen anywhere. Out of the 52 dogs entered, we saw very few poor ones and it was educative and interesting to watch the judge go over these dogs before placing his awards. The winning dog, "Chu Chin Chow of Alderbourne," owned by Miss C. J. LaViolette of Montreal, was put down in great form and won with Mrs. P. A. Margeson's "Ting Fung" of Meridale reserve. Both are exceptionally good and it was a neck and neck race for the purple rosette. The females of this variety were plentiful but not as uniform in type as the males. The winners and reserve winners were "Nowata Wi Chun" and "Patsee of Lakebourne," both owned by Mrs. R. S. Richardson. The winner was easily the best and has type and quality enough for better company. The special for best of breed was a battle royal between two kennel mates Ch. "Prince Cha of Alderbourne" and Ch. "Young Shi of Homestead." Both are wonderful specimens and very little separates them. The former won: it must have been his exquisite head properties and ring manners that gained him the verdict, as we consider "Young Shi" one of the best females we have seen on this continent. The brace class went to that well matched pair, Ch. "Walnut Manikin" and Ch. "Sunni of Somme," owned by Mrs. M. Redway. Of the three Maltese shown, Mrs. Card's "Emer de Malta" was in the best bloom and won over Ch. "Peasters Little Mehta," who was handicapped by length and texture of coat to the above. The variety classes were all well filled and provided keen contests.

The Boston Terriers were judged by Mr. A. G. Rohr in ring one on the first day, the usual large crowd gathering round the ringside to watch the 75 trappy little dogs parade before the judge. The quality was good and the classes large and many a good dog had to be left out of the awards. The youngsters showed a great improvement over anything we have seen at any of our past shows. A new one named "Highway Bob," shown cleverly by Benny Lewis, got the cov-



eted purple ribbon with H. J. O'Neill's "Little Mickey Ringmaster" reserve. Bitches were plentiful and of a top notch order. Mrs. W. C. Ingram made a great showing with her females, carrying off winners and reserve with her "Lady Bird" and "Sweet Marie."

The same ring was occupied in the evening with Collies. Dr. C. Y. Ford was the judge-elect and the excellent entry of 57 awaited his expert judgment. They were fair in quality, most of them at present showing a shortage of coat. J. D. Strachan, the popular secretary of the Canadian Kennel Club, carried off winners and reserve with "Coltness Chaerplane" and Ch. "Coltness Clinker." The first-named is a youngster showing any amount of promise and will do some winning later. J. Gray's "Alton Andeen," who is coming into great form, won the honor in bitches, with G. Bailey's "Bellefield Queen" reserve. The classes were extra large and the judge used every care in examining the dogs before arriving at a decision, which caused the final ribbon to be handed out at a late hour.

The second day saw the all-rounder, Mr. N. K. Swire, confronted with the hardest task of the lot, i.e., Bulldogs, of which breed there was the record entry of 77, and they were certainly a mixed lot, good, bad and indifferent specimens kept piling in the various classes which averaged about 14 per class. The conglomeration of sizes, shapes, colors, effects and defects was enough to turn any judge pale. Mr. Swires, however, got through them in fine style, picking for his winners dog the evenly balanced fawn and white "Challengers Cracker" from Montreal. Reserve went to another good specimen named "Hefty Monarch." There was no question as to which was the best bitch. "Roxton Mickey" stood out from the rest with the biggest of margins and finally landed special for best of breed. "Hefty Mickey Too" was reserve, with a few others close on her track for that honor.

Cocker Spaniels were plentiful, 59 being entered, with few absentees. Toronto's best were stacked up alongside those from the United States and all the other Canadian points, making a good showing. W. T. Payne of Pa., brought up a good string of his well known dogs, chief of them being his wonderful bitch, Ch. "Midkipp Seduction," who easily landed best of breed special. Joe Hill brought out a young black dog named "Baby Grand" that went to reserve winners and when he reaches maturity will go much further. He is without any doubt a "real one." Mr. Payne's "Midkipp Josephus" was

winners in black dogs. "Andy" Armstrong of Ottawa brought down a pair of the best parti-colors we have seen for many a day, and went back with winners and reserve winners to his credit. Mrs. B. F. Lewis did well with her good red bitch, "Webers Irish Rose." Brace and team class went to W. G. Mann, who showed some very evenly matched home-breds. There were several specimens shown that could no more perform the work they are intended for than a Clydesdale could win on a race track, and it was refreshing to see a judge who took all things into consideration before handing out the ribbons.

#### BIG LITTERS AT BRANTFORD.

"Queen Betty," a Ch. "Rebound Oorang" female (Airedale) belonging to Charles M. Smith, Brantford, Ont., recently whelped ten strong puppies and her last two litters were 11-12 or 23 puppies, in three litters. No wonder Charlie had to move to more commodious quarters when he gets his young stock in "unlimited" quantities.

#### YET ANOTHER PARTNERSHIP.

W. J. Lewis (of "Joyce's Prince" fame) and E. A. Brown, Toronto, have now at stud in their joint names a young Boston Terrier by "Dowd's Little Man," out of Ch. "Little Miss Mack," purchased from W. (Billy) B. Levack, Boston, Mass., late of Toronto. The new dog is wonderfully short-faced, nicely marked, and is already booked to capacity, and several likely matrons have been obliged to seek other suitors as a result.

More will be heard of this dog in the near future.

#### "BILLY" LASKEY LOSES A GOOD BULL BITCH.

W. W. Laskey, Fredericton, N.B., was quite content to have his "dark horse" win her own spurs, and awaited the forthcoming shows with more than ordinary interest. The dark horse being a bulldog puppy bitch eight months old, by Ch. "Censor" ex "Silent White Sally" and a dandy to boot. She was purchased from Wm. A. Richards of "Silent White" fame and was "real stuff" and it is a calamity to learn that it was run down recently by an automobile, and was rendered unfit for present competition, much to the disgust of the earnest W. W.

Now, Mr. Editor, I wish you would send Mr. Baldwin a copy of that Original Article he quibbles about, or, better still, republish it as it came from me "without the trimmings," and see if there is anything in it that justifies the words "destructive criticism?" No, Mr. Baldwin, you are all wrong, your eyes are not opened yet! You don't appear to have THE POWER to get this stuff right! "Knocking" is not my line, fact is, I don't have to! Facts are facts and all the clever twisting and attempted "SLURS" won't alter them! Montreal is "slipping backwards!" Look up previous catalogues, they tell the tale. There are "Grievances" and not purely imaginary ones, as you would lead the fancy at large to believe, but possibly you are ignorant regarding them, too. But we don't think so! May I suggest that you get around in your official capacity and find out First Hand what they are? I can assure you, there is plenty of hard work and "a cracking chance" here at the present moment for one of those "THINGS" you are pleased to call a statesman. Now let us see "YOU" play "that role, here's hoping you can. But I "hae ma doots." I can inform your further, there are more Dog Breeders than probably you

are aware of, outside "A CERTAIN CIRCLE," who would not only be a valuable asset to your Club, but they could and would help swell your entry at "C. K. C. Shows" if only their dogs were given decent treatment. (Note, this is a suggestion), and experience shows, we sure do need them all, that is, if progress is to be your watchword. There are plenty of fanciers right here in Montreal who know. I know what I am talking about when I make these statements and they are not the only ones, either, so what's the use of anyone "kidding" themselves?

Mr. Baldwin's Personal Stuff about me is poor and feeble. In fact, it is very thinly veiled and smacks somewhat of jealousy, or worse! Hence serves no purpose other than the value he chooses to place upon it as a purely Advertising Medium! What's more, I don't care what Mr. Baldwin's opinion of me is, or any of his ilk. He accuses me of giving him no help; who is he, anyway? How many of you know him other than as a name on paper? Again, mark you, he doesn't dare state that he ever asked for any help or suggestions. Bye-the-bye, does his letter read like the product of a man needing or seeking assistance in any way, shape or form? I'll say it don't!

Montreal is a dog centre, you betcha! But it doesn't look as large to the man who attends Outside Shows as it does to those who show only at Montreal, with their purely local "Ribbon Affairs" included. Why, man, look up Toronto and Ottawa catalogues for a few years back and compare them with "this year's" entries "of Montreal dogs" at these Shows alone, and if you don't call that "slipping backwards," what is it? Mr. Baldwin says, re dog centre, "who is the first at this time, if not Montreal, we should like to know?" Will some of your readers not enlighten the gentleman on this point? Or, better still, might I suggest that he be sent a catalogue or two and thus BE convinced.

I am surprised that a man of his professed autocratic super-knowledge and experience asking such a question. Why, Toronto, "Deah Boy," has us backed off the map, and then some! There are other places, too, making progress by leaps and bounds and don't you ever forget it. He also refers to my objections to the building: wonder where he got that from? Some kind friend, no doubt, but it sure wasn't from what "I wrote!" Re

being "A Pessimist," it matters little what you may think, Mr. Baldwin, on that score, so far as I personally am concerned. My opinion is, men of that type cannot be comforted, so why try? Again, would it be worth while? No, Mr. Man, I am not that sort, and to prove it, am optimistic enough to believe Montreal can again be a dog centre second to none, so why not you and your club try and swing it, especially when you admit you are looking for expansion? Sure, you have some of the most "energetic" dog men in the City (but there are also others you haven't got), and more power to them! They deserve every credit and get it, too. Some of them also see they get considerable free newspaper advertising thrown into the bargain for full measure; but that doesn't alter "The Fact," in spite of your Proud Boast about your Club membership and sound financial standing that your Club (and others, too, for that matter) are not supporting the less popular breeds as they should! A Dog Club is for encouraging dogs, dog breeding and Dog Shows, pure-bred dogs, of course, and if they are conducted on "any other lines" they are bound to "miss their mark." If a Club is run as a money maker or intended to be such, again I say "The Spirit" is all wrong:

Mr. Baldwin would like to see more "Commercialism" around Dog Show Managements, so they could be made profitable to "The Club." That's his view, he may be right at that. But who does the profits go to and when? Are any of them being used to foster the less popular breeds? If not, why not? But pshaw, what's the use? "Re Commercialism," when I used that Term I was not referring to any "Dog Dealer" or "Dealers," no apologies are necessary!

In conclusion would say, that the remarks about running "their," or maybe I should say, "our show," just exactly as "we" see fit! That's "the spirit." Again, we are "finding fault" with: That full, "Self-satisfied feeling," viz.: "Pat us on the back" stuff," or else "Sing dumb and if you don't we will proceed to try and "roast you" in the papers, but kindly note we don't intend to take that "kind of stuff" lying down! Bet your boots on that! Yours for the dogs, better dogs and more of them and a united local fancy; the whole without malice.

Dear Mr. Editor:

I read an account of the Terriers at the recent Montreal Kennel Association Show in a recent issue. The scribe was "Bob" Ross. His comment on the dogs themselves was as usual terse, pithy, and to the point, and shows that he missed very little. In addition to his comment on the placings he uses some good plain language on the show itself and the general entry. I for one am going to agree with him that the entry was not near as good as it should have been so now let us see if we can get at the reasons for it. First the prize money and specials seemed to be well up to previous shows with \$600 allocated in such a way that every dog of every breed could get a piece of it if he

was good enough. Judging talent was Chas. Fleurquin for Alsations and Belgian Shepherds (his entry was a record for the breeds for Canada). Chas. Trayford for Terriers and Bulldogs and the large Non-Sporting breeds, and Harry Silver of Montreal "All other breeds." Which was considered an improvement over shows where an "all rounder" does his best or his d—t depending on whether you got "yours" or not, so we can't blame the talent. Next the publicity given the show; there was undoubtedly a great deal of room for improvement here and no doubt the club got a lesson. Next the location, this was not central by any means. It may suit residents of the west end, but is a far cry from the north and east ends of Montreal. These omissions did not help the show but to my mind the great cause was too many clubs holding too many shows. And here is the proof: The M. K. Assn. show was practically a Terrier and Bulldog show with an average entry in Sporting dogs; Toys were "the missing ones" as in Poms for instance half the classes had no entries at all—the bitch section being especially bad as in 16 classes there were only 6 entries, and in Pekes there was not a well filled class in the lot. A few weeks later the Ladies Kennel Club of Canada held their show and the Terriers were the absentees, and a fair entry of Toys were present. To me this seems to show that Montreal fanciers support the shows of the club of which they are members, and that the city cannot support two kennel clubs besides two specialty clubs. In the old days with only one active club holding one Canadian Kennel Club show annually a deficit was the usual order. Today each club is nursing a bank roll but the shows suffer from a lack of competent workers and in plain language are "glorified speciality shows."

Many Montreal fanciers are aware of these facts and have a remedy for it too, but nobody has the courage to come right out and say what they think in public. I don't think grievances have anything to do with the state of affairs at all. The Montreal Kennel Ass'n today has a membership of nearly 200, this club was originally a Terrier club and today the majority of its members are Terrier fanciers. The Ladies Kennel Club of Canada is composed mostly of Toy fanciers, then we have the two English Bulldog Clubs. I am going to "Bell the Cat,"

seeing that nobody else offers to do so, and here goes for my remedy. An Annual Great Joint Show with the Montreal Kennel Ass'n handling the Terrier and large breed and Sporting dog end, the ladies, "God bless 'em," in charge of the Toy division and the local Bulldog clubs looking after their favorites. Would it be a 4 Pointer? I'll say so, and I think the financial end would more than satisfy all the clubs concerned as there would be one rental only to be paid for building, one premium list, one ribbon account, etc. And one other point: Each club is suffering from a dearth of workers and between them they would have enough good capable workers to ensure things being run right. Yours for 4-point shows in Montreal.

# ALL'S WELL THAT ENDS WELL

The Canadian Kennel Club has never been noted for actual drowsiness, but still there is always the danger that we may magnify our successes and forget our failures. Many of our fanciers seem to believe in, and practice the motto that forms the caption of this article, i.e., "All's well that ends well"—FOR US. Always optimistic—providing, of course, that it doesn't happen—TO THEM.

We, the rank and file of the Club, have accomplished great things within the last few years, what with a good purpose in view, and a masterly guidance by a President and Board of Directors who have only the "clean game" at heart, we have succeeded in recovering the old Canadian Kennel Club from the shoals which had threatened her very existence not so very long ago.

But—oh the "ifs" and the "buts." Are we all right? Are we all right? Let's look things straight in the eye with an honesty of purpose having an X Ray's strength, and for this purpose let's slip back to the commencement again and let us put it this way. Is all well for us—and them? And suppose for argument's sake that we admit that all is well for us, let us as sporting gentlemen consider the actual requirements of "them."

No doubt you are wondering where we are taking you to this trip. Well you may cease to wonder. We are right there. We have come to the very point. We are at the question of

## R-E-G-I-S-T-R-A-T-I-O-N.

"All's well with us" we chuckle with contentment. Every dog we own is registered, or, is eligible for registration. Why should we worry? We don't expect you to worry, but we do want you to be charitable with a sporting charity and consider "them."

Do you know that 50% of the dogs gracing the benches at all the dog shows held under Canadian Kennel Club Rules and Regulations are unregistered animals? Do you believe that that percentage is justified? No you don't. The fact that half the show specimens in Canada are unregistered is a crime against that half, and we must be generous enough to find out the reason why, and create the remedy at the earliest possible moment. What shall the remedy be? That is for you to dictate, but for goodness sake get started.

At the annual meeting held at Toronto on February 7, 1921, several amendments were proposed to the Constitution, some carried and others

miscarried, and those that carried have, in actual practice been found almost as effective as those that miscarried, and "them" or "they" just as you like—find themselves helplessly unprovided for, and the pity of it all is, that a portion of us feel quite contented about the vexatious situation. Many good people punctuated by the highest sense of integrity have dogs they wish placed on our Stud Books but because their dogs happen to be the progeny of unregistered Sire and Dam, their only consolation lies in the heartless phrase: "These dogs are ineligible for Registration."

This statement is an insult to an honest fancier's intelligence and must not be allowed to continue. The Canadian Kennel Club is not yet ready to observe a closed Stud Book and legislation must be forced that will have for its objective the re-opening of the Stud Books for a stated period, and an opportunity provided for the consideration of the claims of a known dog wishing placement on our Stud Book records. And, this legislation must be free from technicalities—absolutely. Our dog fanciers and our members are chiefly working men, and all our Constitutional requirements and working forms must clearly define in simple terms their every requirement.

Legislation was passed last February which had for its object the registration of dogs formerly recorded with the Dominion Kennel Club. This legislation passed through all necessary formalities, and on July 14, 1921, received Ministerial approval. The phraseology of the Amendment was simplicity itself, in fact it was evidently intentionally created to permit of no technicalities and read as follows:—

"That any dogs or dogs heretofore registered with the late Dominion Kennel Club shall be eligible for re-registration in the Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book, providing that satisfactory proof of ownership and registration is furnished, and that a fee of \$1.00 for each such re-registration shall accompany the application."

What could be simpler? What could be plainer? What should have followed naturally? Why every Western fancier owning a dog registered in his name with the Dominion Kennel Club, and holding their certificate, previous to the meeting where the legislation was enacted, and making application for re-registration with the Canadian Kennel Club, should have had such application for re-registration accepted, the necessary proof being in the possession of the

certificate showing the "ownership and registration." But what do we find? Technicalities in the shape of "When did the Amendment become operative? When did the "late" Dominion Kennel Club cease to exist and etc., and our Western fanciers wishes are again frustrated and their intelligence again insulted.

Come on lads, let us keep in step a little while longer. As an organization let us legislate for the good of "Us and Them" or, in other words, "For the common good," always having in view,

BUT IT IS THE "LIMIT" how many fanciers try to get extra wins in the Limit Class and we contend that when a fancier has a dog long enough to be entering it for the "extra" attempt he ought to be sufficiently acquainted with our Dog Show Rules and Regulations, and that any excuses he might offer should be at once discounted, and the "Extra" wins promptly cancelled. And they will be, too.

### THIS IS SPORTSMANSHIP ON OUR PART.

DON'T ENTER YOUR DOG in the Novice Class, after he has won a first prize at any Show held under the rules of the Canadian Kennel Club or the American Kennel Club (puppy and juvenile classes excepted).

DON'T ENTER YOUR DOG in the Limit Class after he has won four first prizes, nor after he has won his Championship. It isn't according to "Hoyle," AND YOU KNOW IT.

COMMENCING JANUARY, 1922, we will report in Kennel and Bench officially, all violations of Dog Show Rules, and will publish a complete list of all cancellations, and hope that in this way we will be able to purge our Shows of this manifest evil, and so protect the privileges of our fanciers.

WHEN ENTERING YOUR DOG, always refer to Dog Show Rule XVII, Sections 1-2-3-4-5-6-7-8, which you will find in the premium list. Their perusal will serve to keep you within the limit of your allowances.

There were plenty of Fox Terriers, but I was a little disappointed in their quality. I expected to see a better class of dogs, especially in the Wires. Bull Terriers were not numerous, but a very good youngster came out, and easily went to winners. Collies turned up well and Mr. McLaughlin must have been very happy to secure winners in both sexes. It was a great pleasure for me to look over the dogs, and also to meet so many good sports, the losers as well as the winners taking my decisions without a kick. I must also thank my old friends, Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Jackson for their kindness to me while in Vancouver, and also the very many good fanciers who made a special effort to make my stay a most pleasant one."

The doggy game in B.C., and particularly in Vancouver, is making great strides. The last show saw many new fanciers into the game, and there was a big increase in the number of dogs, so much so that more boarding kennels have become almost a necessity.

The high quality of the British Columbia dogs is at last receiving recognition from all parts of Canada, the States, and last but not least, Japan. Since the clean-up of several of the best dogs in Vancouver recently by George S. Thomas, the noted judge of Wire Haired Terriers, Airedales, Cockers and Bulldogs. Norman McConnel, the well-known breeder of Airedales, recently imported a grand Wire Haired Fox Terrier female that will be a decided addition to her breed, which is becoming very strong in British Columbia, but there is always room for another good one. The little matron comes from the States, and is a sister to Ch. "Short Cut," by Ch. "Prides Hill Tweak 'Em" by "Cellar Boy" by Ch. "Wire Boy of Paignton."

mit these defects to their progeny in most cases. To master the real meaning of General Conformation is to unlock the door with the Key of Success and the Key is hidden away underneath the store of unsoundness.

The wonder of the above standard is that although made when the Collie was in the embryo stage, and not long taken from the Rough Material it was. That it remains to-day as a work of art, after all the intervening years. Visualize to yourself a Collie fulfilling each and every detail of the standard and you see in your vision, a product so perfect as to be—as we breeders of a later period have found to be practically unattainable. The names of Tommy Stretch, Charlie Wheeler, Hugo Ainscough, the great international breeder, judge and writer; W. E. Mason, and others of the Old School, including Bobby Tait, the "Wishaw wizard," and the great Chapmans of Glenboig, will stand out for all time to come. Most of them are verging on the allotted span—three score and ten. What a benefit they, with their long experience, could leave to the Colliedom of the future, by their creating a standard value of defects. Whilst some Judges pass on a fault lightly, others penalize heavily. The fault doesn't vary but the opinions, which should place a similar value on the faults, are often widely apart.

In commenting on the puppy stage of the Collie, we all, at some time or

young. Could we prevent this, our Show Benches would be filled with a quality of such, a high standard as to be positively startling. It is harder to rear a Champion than to breed one, yet a Collie puppy needs more than food to eat and straw to lie upon. Champions don't grow out of puppies kept under unnatural conditions. Cleanliness of the kennel and feeding utensils should be the first consideration of the successful breeder, in the rearing of his puppies. Freedom and fresh air are as necessary as the food he consumes. In the rearing of a promising puppy, take him back to the nature he belonged to as near as you can. Give him good care whilst you have the chance. He is only a puppy once. During that period his is yours to make or mar. The result when he is full grown is as much to your credit as his grand pedigree behind him is to his. Let these words sink deep into your hearts and practice them assiduously in season and out of season. "You are building your Collie," build him right. The plans are in your keeping, not his.

#### DESCRIPTIVE TYPE OF COLLIE.

By Theo Marples F.Z.S., Editor of "Our Dogs," England.

The Skull should be flat, moderately wide between the ears, and gradually tapering towards the eyes. There should only be a slight depression at top. The width of skull necessarily depends upon the combined length of skull and muzzle, and the whole must be considered in connection with the size of the dog. The cheek should not be full or prominent.

The Muzzle should be of fair length, tapering to the nose, and must not show weakness or be snipy or lippy. Whatever the color of the dog may be, the nose must be black.

The Teeth should be of good size, sound and level; very slight unevenness is permissible.

The Jaws should be clean cut and powerful.

The Eyes are a very important feature, and give expression to the dog. They should be of medium size, set somewhat obliquely, of almond shape, and of brown color, except in the case of merles, when the eyes are frequently (one or both) blue and white, or china; expression full of intelligence, with a quick, alert look when listening.

The Ears should be small and moderately wide at the base, and placed not too close together on top of the skull nor too much to the side of the head. When in repose they should be usually carried thrown back, but when on the alert brought forward and carried semi-erect, with tips slightly drooping in attitude of listening.

Faults.—Length of head apparently out of proportion to the body and of the Borzoi type are to be strongly condemned. Weak, snipy muzzle, overshot mouth, heavy or gooseberry colored, also glassy or staring eyes are very objectionable. Domed skull, high peaked occiput, prominent cheek, dishfaced, or Roman-nosed.

The Neck should be muscular, powerful, and of fair length, and somewhat arched.

The Body should be rather long, with well-sprung ribs, chest deep, fairly broad behind the shoulders, which should be sloped, loins slightly arched and powerful. The legs should be straight in front.

Faults.—Flat-sided, short or cobby.

The Forelegs should be straight and muscular, neither in nor out at elbows, with a fair amount of bone; the forearm somewhat fleshy, with pasterns showing flexibility without weakness. Faults: Weak, long pas-

terns, out at elbows; corked forearms.

The Hind Legs should be muscular at the thighs, clean and sinewy below the hocks, with well-bent stifflers. Faults: Cow-hocks, straight hocks.

The Feet should be oval in shape, soles well padded, and the toes arched and close together. The hind feet less arched, the hocks well let down and powerful. Faults: Large, open, flat or bare feet; feet turned outwards or inwards.

The Brush should be moderately long, carried low when the dog is quiet, with a slight upward "swirl" at the end, and may be gaily carried when the dog is excited, and not over the back. Faults: Short tail, or tail carried over the back, or twisted to one side.

The Coat should be very dense, the outer coat harsh to the touch, the inner or under coat soft, furry, and very close, so close as to almost hide the skin. The mane and frill should be very abundant, the mask or face smooth, as also the ears at the tips, but they should carry more hair towards the base; the forelegs well feathered; the hind legs above the hocks profusely so, but below the hocks fairly smooth, although all heavily coated Collies are liable to grow a slight feathering. Hair on the brush very profuse. Faults: A soft, silky, or wavy coat, or insufficient under coat.

Color and Marking are immaterial, but other points being equal, a nice showily marked dog is preferred. All white or red Setter color is most objectionable.

General Character.—To enable the Collie to fulfil his natural bent for sheepdog work, he should be built on lines of strength, activity and grace, with a shapely body and sound legs and feet. He should be lithe and active in his movements, and entirely free from cloddiness and coarseness in any part of his conformation; and, lastly, he must be gifted with true expression. Expression is obtained by the perfect combination of head and muzzle, size, shape and color, and placement of eye, and correct position and carriage of ears, which give the dog that sweet dreamy, semi-cunning, yet alert outlook that makes the perfect Collie the most beautiful of the canine race.

Size and Weight.—Dogs, 22 in. to 24 in. at the shoulders; bitches, 20 in. to 22 in. Dogs, 45 lb. to 65 lb.; bitches, 40 lb. to 55 lb. The Smooth Collie only differs from the Rough in its coat, which should be hard, dense and quite smooth.

During this fixture Andy Armstrong bred one of his females to Lance Farewell's "Man O' War," who also mated one of his matrons to Andy's "Ottawa Fascinator."

W. J. Newton is quite pleased with his recent importation, the Smooth Fox Terrier "Salestra," which has done some good winning since coming out. Several matrons have visited this dog of late and he ought to be a decided acquisition to the Smooth Fox Terrier section.

We are pleased to note that A. V. Webley (the little man with the big dog), of Russian Wolfhound fame, who recently removed to Toronto, is again in our midst, and has decided to take up residence in Ottawa. "Web" reports the sale of thirty some odd dogs this year and that his kennels are now right down to his foundation stock, which he purposes keeping and amongst which are several most promising specimens being groomed along for New York, so we wish him the best of luck.

An exceptional honor was conferred upon the Fox Hound fanciers of Canada, and Ottawa in particular, when W. C. Baldwin, of this city, was asked to judge the Fox Hound field trials this year at Barre, Mass., and Lexington, Ky. Mr. Baldwin has just returned from Barre, where the trials were held by the Brunswick Fox Hound Club. These trials are the most important of any held in the North, and this year attracted an entry of 86 dogs. Thirty-four were started in the Derby, which is for dogs under 18 months, and 52 started in the all-age stake. Afterwards they were benched, with Mr. Baldwin the sole judge.

The Lexington trials are held at Crab Orchard, just out of the noted Kentucky city, and are the most important of the kind in America, and probably in the world. The dates this year have been fixed, Nov. 14 to 26. Over 300 entries have been made, which will bring together the finest of American Fox Hounds. The trials at Crab Orchard are in the nature of a futurity, as the contestants have to be nominated through their sires and dams, before they are whelped.

It is the first time in the history of American Fox Hound trials that a Canadian has been asked to judge the two important fixtures.

Mr. Baldwin is the owner of champion "Heffwin," the grandest specimen of American Fox Hound alive. This dog has won at the leading bench shows.

Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Armour have removed from Allandale to Ottawa again to reside and have brought with them their string of Bostons.

The writer quite recently had the pleasure of paying Fred Blake of Almonte, Ont., a visit to look over his kennels and its inmates. Fred was looking fine and fit after his vacation out in the Golden West, and was just full to overflowing with the description of the grandeur of some of the sights he saw in his many visitations through the Rockies and other points of interest; also as to the real good fellowship of the Westerners.

In looking over his stud dog, "Park-ton Kingfisher," we found him in A.1 condition, full of pep and as spry as a puppy, and in several litters by him, in the kennels, was much impressed with the good, long heads, dark eyes, short coupled bodies and coats of a good hard texture and color he was handing down to the puppies. At the time of the visit a matron was there from Truro, N.S., also E. Gromoll's "Almonte Movies" and would say in respect to this bitch that Mr. Gromoll was so well satisfied with the puppies of the first mating of these two dogs that he went back again. R. Biggs shipped to this stud his two females, "Brentwood Betty" and "Peggy Marsh" and Messrs. Bethune and Potts bred their "Billsden Blossom" to him.

### "TOWN TALK" AT BUFFALO.

Mr. H. M. Jackson, Toronto, was an exhibitor at the recent Specialty Show put on by the Boston Terrier Club of Buffalo, and brought home several good special prizes and many happy memories of the event. Three

dogs he took over were always in the money, or near enough to it, to make his entries look dangerous to the other fellow.

Jackson's "Teddy" captured 1st Juvenile, 2nd Novice, 2nd Green, and Special for best puppy owned by a member of the Boston Terrier Club of Buffalo.

Ch. Jackson's "Paddy Dee" was placed reserve, and was awarded the President's Cup for the Best Boston owned by a member of the Boston Terrier Club of Buffalo.

Ch. Jackson's "Dream Girl" also touched the reserve mark, and was awarded the Vice-President's Cup for best of opposite sex to the winner of the President's Cup.

But it was in the Brace class that Mr. Jackson found the greatest pleasure encountered at the fixture. Here his two Champions met (as a brace) seven other braces, conceded to be representative of America's and Canada's foremost Kennels, and after the smoke of battle had cleared the "Town Talk" Brace was found safe in second place. The Show was much enjoyed, and will be one of many to come that will be visited in the future by the owner of the "Town Talk" prefix.

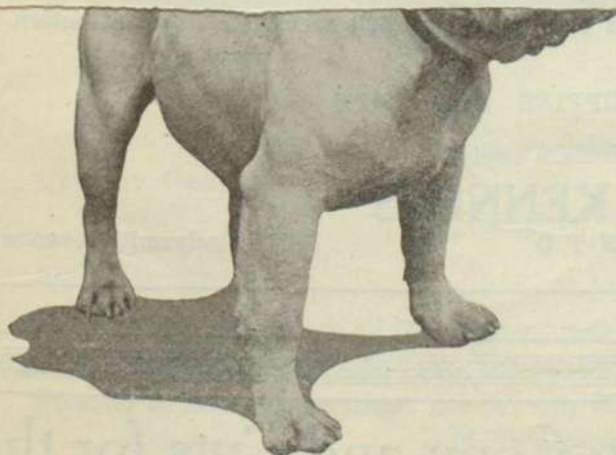

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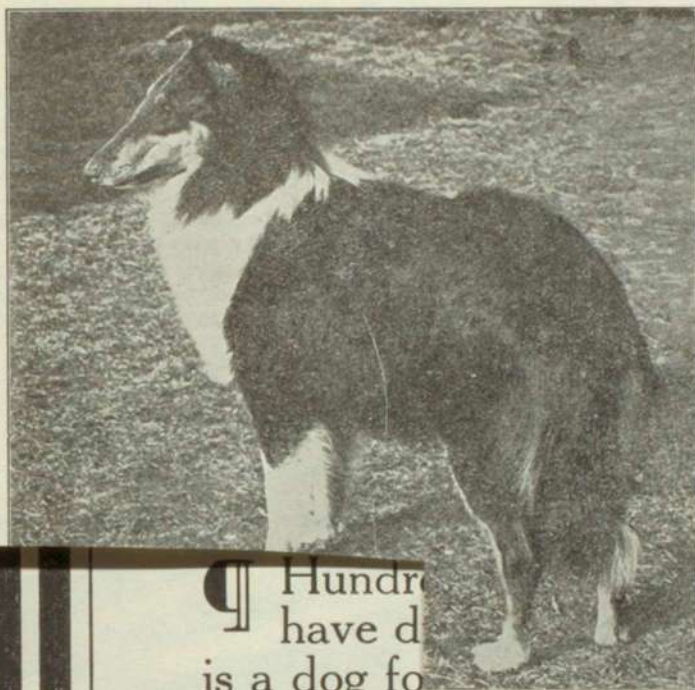

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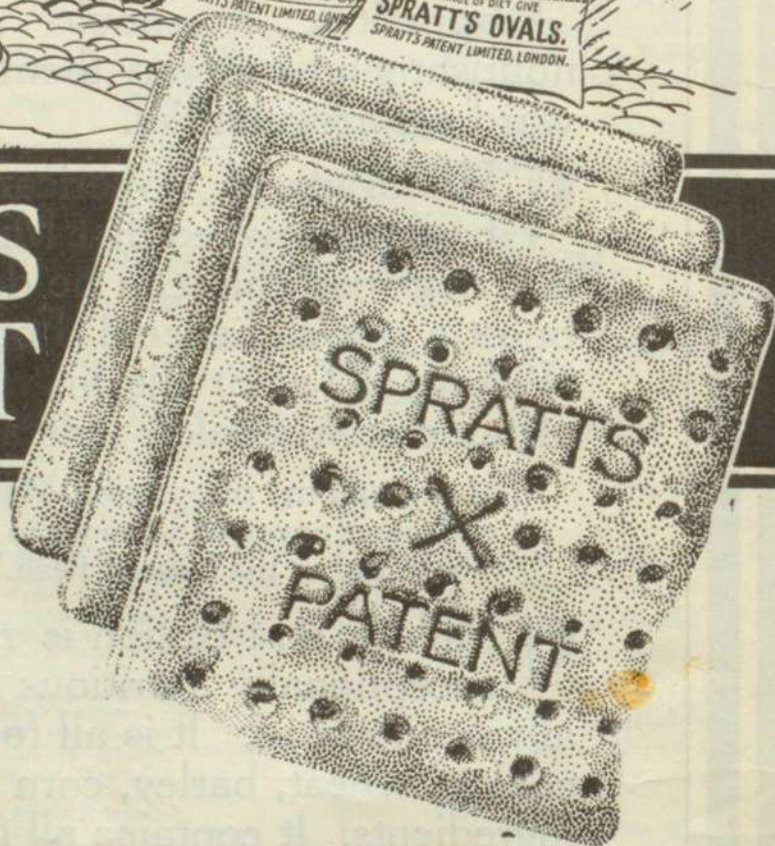
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
