

A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS of the Canadian Kennel Club will be held in the offices of the Club on Thursday evening, March 16th, 1922, commencing at 8 o'clock.

LAST MEETING OF THE 1921 BOARD OF DIRECTORS

"good-bye" meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, as composed for the year 1921, was held at the Carls-Rite Hotel, Toronto, on Saturday afternoon, February 18th, 1922, at 2.30 o'clock, the President, Mr. Jos. Russell, in the chair. Other Directors present were: Messrs. Wm. R. Aitken (Quebec Province); Vincent G. Perry (London); Col. G. F. McFarland, J. Waggitt, N. K. Swire, and F. W. Jacobi. Mr. Sydney Harvey, representing the Canadian National Live Stock Record office, was also in attendance.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read by the Secretary and on motion were declared approved.

The Secretary reported that the Pomeranian in the Chadwick-Brownlie-MacPherson case had been registered through the offices of the Pedigree Committee. The Secretary reported that the wins made by the English Setter, "Dell's Lady," at the Guelph Kennel Club Show, on May 26-27, 1921, had been cancelled.

The Secretary reported that he had been in communication with the Health of Animals Branch of the Department of Agriculture, regarding the importation of dogs from the Continent of Europe, as requested by certain importers of Belgian Dogs, but that he had been unable to obtain any relief from the restrictions complained

Importation of dogs direct from Continental Europe is absolutely prohibited on account of many dangerous contagious diseases of cattle and sheep, and the only way importation is permitted is to have the dogs quarantined in England for a period of six months, and even after the quarantine regulations had been observed it would be necessary to secure a certificate from the office of the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries in Great Britain. Notice of this instruction has been sent to the fanciers seeking the relief mentioned.

General and unfinished business.

Elections-Election Commissioner. It was moved and seconded:

"That Donald Wheeler be Election Commissioner." Carried.

Election of two representatives to the Canadian National Exhibition Association. Seven were nominated. Messrs. Russell, Metcalfe, Milburn, Stockdale, Clayton, Wilson and Ward (Eli). When the ballot was counted Messrs, Russell and Stockdale were announced as the representatives, and both gentlemen thanked the members for the honor conferred.

Election of 1 representative to the Central Canada Exhibition Association. It was moved and seconded:

"That A. T. Armstrong, Ottawa, be re-elected." Carried.

Election of three representatives to the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair Association (one of which shall be the (President). Eight were nominated: Messrs. Wilson, Stockdale, Milburn, Dickinson, Jacobi, Sands, Faux, and Metcalfe. When the ballot was counted, Messrs. Stockdale and Metcalfe were announced as the representatives.

Election of four representatives to the Canadian National Live Stock Records. Five were nominated. Messrs. Russell, Jackson, Elliott, (Ottawa), Milburn, and Wilson. When the ballot was counted, Messrs. Russell, Jackson, Elliott, and Milburn were announced as the representatives.

Election of one member to the Pedigree Committee (as required by proposed amendments to the Constitution). Four members were nominated. Messrs. Wilson, Sands, Stockdale and Faux. When the ballot was counted Mr. Wm. Stockdale was announced as the members' choice to act on the Pedigree Committee.

On motion a vote of thanks was extended to the Election Board, after which they were dismissed.

The President announced that the meeting had now reached its most important function, i.e., the consideration of the proposed amendments to the Constitution, which he had sponsored personally, and was supported by Col. G. F. McFarland, the Club's Hon. Legal Adviser. The several amendments were prepared to relieve the tension that had been found interfering with the free functioning of the Club's affairs.

It was agreed to read the amendments and to vote on them in the order of their succession:

That: Article 3-Members. Page 4 of the Book of Constitution, Section 3, which reads: Application for membership shall be in writing on the form prescribed, and each applicant shall agree to be bound by the Constitution and Amendments and all rules of the Club, but the Club shall have the power to reject any application for membership.

Be amended to read:

Application for membership shall be in writing on the form prescribed, and each applicant shall agree to be bound by the Constitution and amendments and all rules of the Club, but the BOARD OF DIRECTORS SHALL have power to reject for CAUSE ANY APPLICATION FOR MEMBERSHIP, PROVIDED THAT THE APPLICANT SO REJECTED, SHALL HAVE THE RIGHT TO APPEAL AGAINST SUCH REJECTION, TO THE NEXT GEN-ERAL MEETING OF THE CLUB, WRITTEN NOTICE OF SUCH IN-TENTION TO APPEAL MUST BE GIVEN WITHIN 30 DAYS OF SUCH REJECTION.

It was moved and seconded:

"That the amendment be adopted as proposed."

An amendment to the amendment was duly moved and seconded which read:

"That, Application for membership shall be in writing on the form prescribed, and each applicant shall agree to be bound by the Constitution and amendments and all rules of the Club, but the BOARD OF DIRECTORS SHALL have power to reject for CAUSE ANY APPLICATION FOR MEMBERSHIP PROVIDED THAT THE APPLICANT SO REJECTED, SHALL HAVE THE RIGHT TO AP-PEAL AGAINST SUCH REJECTION, TO THE NEXT GENERAL MEETING OF THE CLUB, WRITTEN NOTICE OF SUCH INTENTION TO APPEAL WITHIN SHALL BE MADE MONTHS OF SUCH REJECTION.

After the members had voted the amendment to the amendment was declared "Carried."

That: Article 3-Members. Page 5 of the Book of Constitution, Section 5 which reads:

The liability of each member shall be limited to the amount of membership or other fees or dues which may owe to the Club.

Be amended to read:

The liability of each member shall be limited to the amount of membership or other fees, FINES, or dues which he may owe to the Club.

It was moved and seconded:

"That the amendment to Article 3, Section 2 be adopted." Carried.

That: Article 3-Members. Page 6 of the Book of Constitution, Section 10. which reads:

The Directors shall have power to suspend or expel any person whether a member of the Club or not, who fails to observe any rule, regulations or By-Laws of the Club, or whose conduct in their opinion is prejudicial to the interests of the Club, and the person so suspended or expelled shall have no claim against the Club or be allowed any of the privileges of the Club, including registration of pedigrees, or be allowed to enter into any competition held under the show rules of the Club. No person, however, shall be suspended or expelled until such person has first been notified of the alleged offence and has been given an opportunity to appear in person before the Board of Directors.

Such person shall have the right to appeal to the Club from the action of the Directors at an annual or general meeting, provided notice of appeal has been given in writing to the Directors, but reinstatement may only be made by the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members thereat.

Be amended to read:

The Directors shall have power to suspend, expel OR DISQUALIFY A MEMBER OF THE CLUB who fails to observe any rule, regulations or By-Laws of the Club, or whose conduct in their opinion is prejudicial to the interests of the Club, and the MEM-BER so suspended or expelled, OR DISQUALIFIED shall have no claim against the Club or be allowed any of the privileges of the Club, including registration of pedigree OR KENNEL NAME or be allowed to enter into any competition held under the show rules the Club. THE DIRECTORS of ALSO HAVE POWER TO SHALL DISQUALIFY ANY PERSON NOT A MEMBER OF THE CLUB WHOSE CONDUCT IN THEIR OPINION IS PREJUDICIAL TO THE CLUB, AND THE PERSON SO DISQUALIFIED SHALL NOT BE ALLOWED TO REGISTER PEDIGREES OR KEN-NEL NAMES, OR TO ENTER INTO ANY COMPETITION HELD UNDER THE DOG SHOW RULES OF THE CLUB.

No person, however, shall be suspended or expelled or DISQUALIFIED until such person has first been notified of the alleged offence and has been given an opportunity to appear in person before the Board of Direc-

It was noticed that the right of appeal had been inadvertently omitted from the amendment, and upon its

being added, it was moved and seconded:

"That the corrected amendment be adopted." Carried.

The corrected amendment now reads:

The Directors shall have power to suspend, expel OR DISQUALIFY a member of THE CLUB who fails to observe any rule, regulations or By-Laws of the Club, or whose conduct in their opinion is prejudicial to the interests of the Club, and the MEMBER so suspended or expelled, or DIS-QUALIFIED shall have no claim against the Club or be allowed any of the privileges of the Club, including registration of pedigree or KENNEL NAME, or be allowed to enter into any competition held under the show rules of the Club. THE DIRECTORS SHALL ALSO HAVE POWER TO DISQUALIFY ANY PERSON NOT A MEMBER OF THE CLUB, WHOSE CONDUCT IN THEIR OPINION IS PREJUDICIAL TO THE CLUB, AND THE PERSON SO DISQUALIFIED SHALL NOT BE ALLOWED TO REGISTER PEDIGREES OR KEN-NEL NAMES, OR TO ENTER INTO ANY COMPETITION HELD UNDER THE DOG SHOW RULES OF THE CLUB.

No person, however, shall be suspended or expelled or DISQUALIFIED until such person has first been notified of the alleged offence and has been given an opportunity to appear in person before the Board of Directors.

Such person shall have the right to appeal to the Club from the action of the Directors at an annual or general meeting, provided notice of appeal has been given in writing to the Directors, but reinstatement may only be made by the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members thereat.

It was moved and seconded:

"That the amendment to article 8, paragraph 6, be amended as proposed." Carried.

That: Article 8—Elections, page 12 of the Book of Constitution, latter part of paragraph 6, which reads:

If a member votes for more than the number of candidates to which he is entitled to vote, this shall spoil his ballot.

Be amended to read:

If a member votes for more than the number of candidates for which he is entitled to vote, his ballot SHALL BE CONSIDERED TO BE SPOILED IN SO FAR AS THAT PORTION OF IT IS CONCERNED IN WHICH HE HAS SO VOTED.

It was moved and seconded:

"That the amendment to article 8,

paragraph 7, be amended as proposed."

That: Article 8—Elections, page 12 of the Book of Constitution, paragraph 7, which reads:

The Election Commissioner shall forthwith after the last day for receiving ballot papers, open the same and proceed to count the votes, and he shall deliver to the President of the Club, his certificate sworn to before a notary public declaring the result of the election, which shall be final and conclusive. In the case of an equality of votes the Election Commissioner shall have a casting vote.

Be amended to read:

The Election Commissioner shall forthwith after the last day for receiving ballot papers, open the same and proceed to count the votes, and he shall deliver to the President of the Club, his certificate sworn to before a notary public, declaring the result of the election, which shall be final and conclusive. In the case of an equality of votes, the PRESIDENT OF THE CLUB shall have a casting vote

An amendment to the amendment was duly moved and seconded, which read:

"That The Election Commissioner shall forthwith after the last day for receiving ballot papers, open the same, and proceed to count the votes, and he shall deliver to the President of the Club, his certificate sworn to before a notary public, declaring the result of the election, which shall be final and conclusive. In the case of an equality of votes, one person shall be appointed by the President and one person shall be appointed by the Board of Directors. They to appoint a third party-if necessary-to break the tie." After the members had voted the amendment to the amendment was declared "Carried."

It was moved and seconded:

"That the amendment to article 11— Pedigrees, be amended as proposed." Carried.

That: Article 11—Pedigrees, page 15 of the Book of Constitution, which reads:

The President, the Secretary and the Registrar shall be a committee who shall have the power to adjudicate all questions of transfer of ownership and eligibility of Canadian-bred animals for registration. Their decision shall not be inconsistent with the rules of eligibility and if unanimous shall be final, otherwise the question shall be submitted to the Board of Directors for decision. Each decision of the committee shall be reported to the Directors at the next meeting thereafter.

Be amended to read:

The President and Secretary and one member to be elected by ballot at the annual meeting shall be a committee who shall have the power to adjudicate upon all questions of transfer of ownership and eligibility of all animals for registration.

Their decision if unanimous shall be final, otherwise the question shall be submitted to the Board of Directors for decision. Each decision of the committee shall be reported to the Board of Directors at the next meeting thereafter.

It was moved and seconded:

"That the amendment to Article 16, Sections 2-3-4 and 7 be amended as proposed."

That: Article 16—Meetings, page 17 of the Book of Constitution, Sections, 2-3-4 and 7, which reads:

- 2. Directors' meetings shall be held as follows: Immediately following the annual meeting and on the third Thursday in each month and at such other times as the President may decide.
- 3. Notice of meetings of Directors, other than those mentioned in the preceding section, shall be mailed postage prepaid, to each one of them, eighteen days at least, before the date of meeting, to his last known place of residence appearing on the books of the Club.
- 4. A meeting of the Directors may be held on shorter notice or without notice, provided all Directors have given their consent to the meeting being held. A minute of such consent shall be entered in the minutes.
- 7. Order of business at annual or general meeting: Reading minutes of previous meeting. Report of Directors. Report of Committees. Reports of Secretary-Treasurer. Reports of President (Annual). Reports of finance and general standing of the Club. General and unfinished business. Order of business at Directors' meetings: Roll Call. Reading minutes of previous meeting. Reports of Executive Committee. Reports (General). Reports of Secretary-Treasurer. Passing Election of members. accounts. General and unfinished business. The above may be replaced by any other order of business provided by the President.

Be amended to read:

- 2. Directors' meetings shall be held as follows: ON THE THIRD THURSDAY IN EACH MONTH AND AT SUCH OTHER TIMES AS THE PRESIDENT MAY DECIDE.
- 3. NOTICE OF THE MEETING OF THE DIRECTORS SHALL BE MAIL-ED POSTAGE PREPAID, TO EACH

ONE OF THEM, EIGHTEEN DAYS
AT LEAST BEFORE DATE OF
MEETINGS, TO HIS LAST KNOWN
PLACE OF RESIDENCE APPEARING ON THE BOOKS OF THE CLUB.

- 4. A meeting of the Directors may be held on shorter notice or without notice, provided THE MAJORITY OF THE DIRECTORS HAVE given their consent to the meeting being held. A minute of such consent shall be entered in the minutes.
- 7. Order of business at annual or general meetings; Reading minutes of previous meeting. REPORTS OF DIRECTORS. Reports of Committees. Reports of Secretary-Treasurer. Reports of President (Annual). Reports of finance and general standing of the Club. General and unfinished business.

Order of business at Directors' Meetings. Roll call. Reading minutes of previous meeting. REPORTS OF OFFICERS AND COMMITTEES. Reports (General). Reports of Secretary-Treasurer, Passing accounts. Election of members. General and unfinished business. The above may be replaced by any other order of business provided by the President.

Attention was drawn to Section 4 of Article 16, where these words appear:

"The majority of the Directors."

And it was agreed by motion to change the phrase to read: A meeting of the Directors may be held on shorter notice or without notice, provided THAT ALL THE DIRECTORS have given their consent to the meeting being held. A minute of such consent shall be entered in the minutes.

It was moved and seconded;

"That article 23—Pedigrees be amended as proposed." Carried.

That: Article 23—Registration of Pedigrees, page 21 of the Book of Constitution, which reads:

Any person suspended or expelled from membership shall not be allowed the privileges of recording pedigrees on the books of the Club.

Be amended to read;

Any person suspended, expelled, OR DISQUALIFIED SHALL NOT BE ALLOWED THE PRIVILEGES OF RECORDING PEDIGREES ON THE BOOKS OF THE CLUB.

It was moved and seconded;

"That article 26, sub-sections O and P, and sections 2-3 and 6 be amended as proposed." Carried.

That: Article 26, Rules of Entry, pages 23, 24, 25, 26 and 27, sub-sections O and P and sections 2, 3, and 6 of the Book of Constitution, which reads:

- O. Dogs bred in Canada, provided their sires and dams and grand sires and grand dams and great grand sires and great grand dams are animals of the same breed. This rule is to terminate January 1st, 1920, and shall not be applied for the registration of dogs from recorded ancestry.
- P. Dogs of a recognized breed for which no foreign record has been established in the country from which they come may be inspected and approved for registration by an examining committee provided for in Article
- 2. The Record Committee may at any time on the recommendation of the Board of Directors add additional breeds to the schedule hereto.
- 3. Application for registration of dogs from other Countries must be accompanied by certificates of registration showing that they are recorded in the name of the Canadian owner in the record of the Country from which they come.
- 6. Duplication of names for Canadian-bred dogs shall not be allowed, nor shall it be permissible to change the name of a dog after it has been recorded thirty days. Dogs from other countries shall be recorded with the same name they had in the country from which they come. Names for Canadian-bred dogs shall not contain more than twenty-four letter spaces. The word imported will follow the name of all imported dogs.

Be amended to read:

- O. Dogs bred in Canada, provided their sires and dams and grand sires and grand dams and great grand sires and great grand dams are animals of the same breed. This rule is to terminate twelve months after its having received the approval of the Minister of Agriculture, and shall not be applied for the registration of dogs from recorded ancestry.
- P. Dogs of a recognized breed for which no foreign record has been established in the country from which they come may be inspected and approved for registration by THE PEDIGREE COMMITTEE provided for in Article 11.
- 2. The Record Committee shall at any time on the recommendation of the Board of Directors add additional breeds to the schedule, hereto.
- 3. An application for registration of a dog from ANOTHER COUNTRY must be accompanied by A CERTIFI-CATE of registration showing THAT IT IS RECORDED IN THE RECORDS OF ONE OF THE COUNTRIES COM-PRISED IN THE LIST LETTERED A

TO M INCLUSIVE IN SECTION 1 OF THIS ARTICLE OF THE CONSTI-TUTION.

6. Duplication of names for Canadian-bred dogs shall not be allowed. THE NAME OF A DOG MAY BE CHANGED WITHOUT CHARGE WITHIN 30 DAYS AFTER IT HAS BEEN RECORDED. AFTER THE EXPIRATION OF 30 DAYS AND UP TO ONE YEAR FROM THE DATE RECORDING IT MAY CHANGED ON PAYMENT OF ONE DOLLAR. IT SHALL NOT BE PER-MISSIBLE TO CHANGE THE NAME OF A DOG AFTER IT HAS BEEN RECORDED FOR ONE YEAR, Dogs from other countries shall be recorded with the same names they had in the country from which they CAME. Names for Canadian-bred dogs shall not contain more than twenty-four letter spaces, exclusive of affix or prefix. The word imported will follow the name of all imported dogs.



Before I start to criticize the dogs at the Irish Terrier Specialty Show, held at the First Field Artillery Armory in New York on February 11th, I want to thank my ring Steward "Bob" Ross for the very efficient manner in which he got the dogs into the ring and also to thank the Show Committee of the Irish Terrier Club of America, and the members thereof, for the large entry they gave me to judge.

The puppy class for dogs brought out six. First to "Aroostock Huntsman," a very promising puppy shown in excellent condition, who won with a lot to spare. He has a very long, lean head of the correct type, good eyes, ears, very good front and body and showed like a veteran, his ears might have had just a little more lift to them, otherwise he was very nearly perfect on the day. Second to "Mendon Mixmore" who lost to first in coat and color. Third to "Mickey Begorra" a bit out of coat. Reserve to "B'arney Bonus," none too good in front and undeveloped.

Novice Dogs-9 in the class. A repeat for "Aroostock Huntsman" and "Mendon Mixmore," Third to "Ballyrush," a good bodied dog not in the best of coat, who lost to second in head, front, eye, and tail carriage. Reserve to "Blinker's Demon" a good dog in poor coat.

American Bred Dogs-8 in the class. First to "Double Shear Tormentor." a terrier a little on the big side with a tremendously long napper, good eyes, ears and expression, might be stronger in quarters. Second to "Ormsby Young Double Shear," a good sound dog, losing to first in head, third to "Holmehill Dick" an excellent type shown short of coat. Reserve to "Ballyrush" who lost to third in front.

Limit Dogs-7 in the class. First, "Shear Begorra," a sound dog with a typical head, very good coat and color, excellent body, legs and feet. His ears are a bit dead, which detracts from his general appearance, but he is a typical Mick well put down. Second to his litter brother "Blinkmore Begorra," who is straight behind. Third to "Ormsby Young Double Shear," who lost in front, and Reserve to "Brentmoor Blinkmore" who is bad in his action behind.

Open Dogs-3 in the class. First to "Shear Begorra." Second to the "Tattler," who loses behind. Third to "Harlem Master," a nice terrier but far too large.

Winners to "Aroostock Huntsman" who won on condition. Reserve winners to "Shear Begorra" who won over "Double Shear Tormentor" in size and condition.

Puppy Bitches-A class of 10. First to "Blarney Brightlight," a very typical and promising puppy, might have had more coat on her, but won over "Kincora Lady May," placed second in soundness of feet. Both these puppies showed well, but I figured that "Brightlights'" soundness, gave her a slight edge on "Kincora Lady May." Third to "Aroustock Lass," who won over "Lady Ellen," a very stylish puppy in maturity.

Novice Bitches-12 in the class. First to "Blarney Brightlight." Second to "Kincora Lady May." Third to "Over The Top," a nice stamp but full in eye. Reserve to "Harlem Dinah," a nice sort who would not show.

American Bred Bitches-4 in the class. An easy win for "Little One." an excellent bitch put down in extra good condition, a very attractive Irish Lady and a hard one in my opinion to fault. Second to "Harlem Dinah," who won over "Teta III" in coat and color. Reserve to "Irish Molly" who refused to show.

Limit Bitches-6 in the class. First to "Litt'e One." Second to "Mourne Model," a nice bitch who beats "Blarney Butterfly" placed third, in condition. Reserve to "Balleymooney Dora" shown short of coat. These were four good bitches.

Open Bitches-4 in the class. First to "Little One," after a very close brush with "Blarney Machree." She beats "Blarney Machree" in length of head and has a little more liberty in body. Both were in very good condition. Third to "Mourne Model," Reserve to "Balleymooney Dora."

Winners-To "Little One."

Reserve Winners-To Ch. "Blarney Machree."

Junior Dogs and Bitches-9 in the class. First to "Aroostock Huntsman" who won in substance, coat and color, over "Blarney Brightlight." Third to "Kincora Lady May." Reserve to "Mendon Mixmore," who lost to "Kincora Lady May" in color, body and style.

Bred by Exhibitor, dogs and bitches -12 in the class. First to "Aroostock Huntsman." Second to "Kincora Lady May." Third to "Mendon Spitfire," who beats "Bells V" placed Reserve in ear carriage and eye.

Maiden Dogs and Bitches-10 in the class. First to "Kincora Lady May." Second to "Mendon Mixmore." Third to "Ballyrush." Resere to "Ballyshannon," who lost to third in bone, style and body.

Veteran Dogs and Bitches-4 in the class. First to Champion "Brentmoor Blinker," who although quite grey, was in better condition than I have ever seen him. Second to Champion "Brentmoor Bullet," who lost to first in condition and equality.

Brace and Team classes had only Mr. Bate's entries.

Special for best Irish Terrier went to "Little One," with best of opposite sex to "Aroostock Huntsman."

In conclusion, I might add that the general quality of the Irish Terriers shown under me was far superior to what I have seen since before the war. From the interest which I saw in the Irish Terrier Club, I know there is, without doubt, a great future for the popularity of the Irish Terrier, and next year I hope to see still more dogs at the Specialty Show, which has already been heavily subscribed to, and many-more members in the Club.

RUSSIAN WOLFHOUNDS AT WESTMINSTER.

(Specially Reported).

The entry of 37 Russian Wolfhounds was the largest seen here in a number of years, a tribute to the Judge, and the competition was of the keenest. They were judged by the noted expert Mr. J. Balley Wilson, of Lansdowne, Pa. He went over each dog with expert precision, and his placings were greeted with much applause from the packed ringside. One of the features this year was the splendid showing of the Canadian entries, 4 Wolfhounds being shown and were superbly handled by their owner, A. V. Webley (Tolstoi Kennels), Toronto. He captured winners dogs, Reserve Winners Bitches and thirty-five special prizes. Blake Johnston, Toronto, got 2nd novice, with a Canadian-bred, "Borloff of Riverdale," sired by A. V. Webley's Champion "Krilenko." The outstanding dog-and centre of attraction, was the 9 months' old puppy, "Morvich of Tolstoi," bred and owned by Mr. Webley, and sired by his Champion "Krilenko," and it was quite a sensation, when this wonderful puppy went clear through from novice to winners and captured the President's Cup for best of the breed, congratulations. This is the first time a Canadian Bred Russian Wolfhound has gone to winners at this great show and his owner should be justly proud of him, and the win which was extremely popular and meritorious. This dog was pronounced by 12 of the leading judges at this show as being the greatest Wolfhound ever produced and his owner was congratulated on all sides on his great victory.

The Classes.

Novice Dogs-13 entries.

1st—Morvich of Tolstoi. Owner, A. V. Webley.

This dog stood out above all the others, a grand specimen, scoring heavily in all points. He has a tremendous length of head, narrow skull, with Roman nose and filled up in front of the eyes, jaws powerful and deep. nice dark eyes, splendid ear carriage, great depth of brisket, narrow and straight front, stands over 32 inches at the shoulders, well tucked up hind-quarters, immense bone, deep, and well developed pasterns, grand legs and feet and a great coat, splendid mover, and was splendidly handled by his owner.

2nd.—Borloff of Riverdale. Owner, Blake Johnston, Toronto.

A splendid specimen, sired by A, V. Webley's Champion "Krilenko" another splendid Canadian Bred, has splendid head of correct type, grand coat, legs and feet, but lacks the intense quality and bone of the winner.

3rd—Orloff of Tolstoi. Owner, . Blake Johnston, Toronto.

A very typical Wolfhound, nice head and coat, lacks size, weak hindquarters and a poor mover.

American Bred Class-12 entries.

1st.-Nicko H. Owner, E. A. Jones.

This dog was last year's New York Winner, and rightly won this class, but is lacking in condition, and did not seem to the writer to be in nearly as good shape as last year.

2nd.—Dogonay O' Valley Farm. Owner, Valley Farm Kennels.

A nice coated brindle Wolfhound, only fair in head, splendid in body, legs and feet, but failed in head and size to the winner.

3rd.—Champion Johnston's Krilenko. Owner, A. V. Webley.

A splendid specimen all quality, but lacks the size of the other winners.

Open Class, Dogs-12 entries.

This was the hottest class seen in years.

1st.-Marvich of Tolstoi.

This dog again stood out, beating two American Champions in this class.

2nd.—Almadin O' Valley Farm. Owner, Valley Farm Kennels.

Although here but a brief time, Mrs. Matthews is fast gaining a reputation for handling superstock.

WHIPPETS AT WESTMINSTER.

The entries of these little "Speed Artists" were made up of 16, which although not quite as plentiful as last year, did not lack any in the quality, type and symmetry of former years.

The judge, Mr. Bayard Tuckerman Jr., an authority on this particular breed, went carefully over each dog in every class and admitted the competition to be very close and with much hesitancy placed the winners of each class.

It was right in the novice class that he discovered a puppy which he had to place first and winners, this being the second time in Whippetdom on this side of the pond that such honors went to a youngster under 12 months old, and which, by the way, in both cases were Canadian-bred.

Classes.

Novice Dogs & Bitches—5 entries. 1st—Edwin D. Morgan's Margie Cameo.

2nd—E. Geo. Kerr's Baby Grand. 3rd.—A. Lowenstein's Master Mason.

The winner in this class, "Margie Cameo" bred by A. Lowenstein, (late of Toronto) the well known Canadian Whippeter and now owned by Edwin D. Morgan Jr. of Westbury, L.I., was sired by "Mischief ex Tight Fit," and represents a true type of its breed, with a good front, head, clean cut features, dark eyes, low brisket, long, body—built for speed, splendid running gears, and with the Judge an expert on the "racing line" he had no difficulty in making his choice.

The second, a real nice little bitch of a type that would appeal more to an English judge of whippets, and who looks for the ideal small dog, of lines and symmetry, than to the racing type.

Third came a dog puppy, six months old, not quite good enough yet to compete with older dogs but easily held his own, and certainly would have stood out in a puppy class, which, however, was not provided for.

Open Dogs-5 entries.

1st.—Felix Angus Leser's Ch. Freemanor G'encoe Supreme.

2nd.—Edwin D. Morgan's Maxim. 3rd.—Geo. Brown's Achilles.

In this class we must truly say the Ideal Whippet was not represented by a long way for such an important class.

Winners Dogs-F. A. Leser's Freemanor Glencoe Supreme.

Reserve Winners-Master Harry E. Damon's Galloping Dominoe.

American-bred Bitches—4 entries.

1st.—Rosemary Kennels' Freemanor
War of Rosemary.

2nd.—E. Geo. Kerr's Baby Grand.

3rd.—Felix Angus Leser's Blue
Blazes.

4th.—Geo. Brown's Maud of Stonebridge.

In this class Baby Grand should have been placed first as she scored more heavily in the essential points than the winner.

Open Bitches-7 entries.

1st.—Edwin D. Morgan's Margle Cameo.

2nd.—Geo. Brown's Nell of Oxon. 3rd.—A. Lowenstein's Resolute.

The above three made a dainty trio, and with much hesitancy the judge placed the winner.

Resolute could have fared better, but considering the showing and the condition of the puppy, Cameo's win was extremely popular.

Reserve Winners-Geo. Brown's Nell of Oxon.

CANADIAN JUDGES AT AMERICAN SHOWS

From advice notices received by courtesy of Geo. F. Foley, we learn that Lance Farewell will judge the sporting Spaniel entry at Pittsburgh, on April 14-15. No doubt this choice will bring out a "peak" entry for this show, for who is there alive amongst us to-day who has given the Sporting Spaniel as many years of practical study as Lance Farewell, of Toronto, has?

They say, "A prophet is without honor in his own country." Not so with Mr. Farewell in Canada; his opinion is eagerly sought and greedily assimilated, and the Spaniel people who are privileged to meet this dean of Cocker Spanieldom speak of him with a respect that really amounts to reverence, and the Pittsburg management has flattered itself in securing Lance Farewell's services on this occasion.

At Canton, Ohio, on March 14-15, Mr. Norman K. Swire will officiate as one of three judges selected to make the awards for the Canton Kennel Club Show. This, too, is a wise selection and there are going to be many satisfied exhibitors leave Canton at the close of the Show. Mr. Swire avoids all contact with interested parties and positively steers clear of all dogs likely to come before him while adorning the "Ermine." Catalogues, or "smart" stewards are taboo. What Mr. Swire asks for is, that the dogs be brought before him; he can, and does, place them where they belong as he sees them, and that is all the fancy should ever expect or look for.

The Pierce County Kennel Club, of Tacoma, Washington, will hold a Show on April 20-21-22, the first to be staged since 1912, when Geo. S. Thomas acted as judge. This year, Norman McConnell, the Airedale expert of North Vancouver, will judge the show, and the management feel pretty certain that his selection will prove a magnet for the largest entry ever benched in that part of the country.

It would be no surprise to find a strong following from Vancouver Island and the mainland at the Tacoma Show, thus adding to the optimistic beliefs of the newly-elected President of the Club, Mr. A. E. Grafton.

CANADIAN DOGS AT NEW YORK SHOW

There was one phase of interest that strongly appealed to the writer as he viewed the very extensive entry benched at the Westminster Kennel Club fixture, on February 11th and subsequent days, and that was the very large entry from Canada direct. and the many dogs that appeared prominently in several breeds that, though now owned in America, were really Canadian-bred. So fascinating was the discovery that we made several notes on some of the most striking instances, and to do so we were obliged to start at entry No. 2 and finish at entry 1704, always finding the Canadian dog, or the Canadianbred dog very prominent all the way through.

First were the Mastiffs, headed by that magnificent specimen—whose picture appeared in our last issue—"Beowulf," bred, as were the whole entry, by our Canadian Kennel Club Director, Charles W. Dickinson. "Beowulf" not only was one of the first dogs to come into the ring, but, as a matter of fact, he was one of the last to leave it, as he was very prominent in all his majesty of bearing right up to the moment that the prize for Best Dog in Show of All Breeds had been decided. "Cleopatra" won for her sex, and she also was a Canuck.

Entry No. 8 was the Canadian-bred St. Bernard, "Hercuveen Queen," by "The King's Son," ex "Nydia," and she went to Winners and Special for best St. Bernard, open to all. Great Danes did not show much for the Dominion, which was quite natural, considering that we have so few good Danes in this country, but in Russian Wolfhounds, with a 36 entry, Canada had a walk-away from the very first class, when A. V. Webley's sterling youngster, "Morvitch of Tolstoi," grabbed the Blue from Judge J. Bailey Wilson and never let up until he had the "Purple" safe in A. V.'s pocket, with a multitude of special prizes-30 in number, we were told-to keep that purple ribbon salted down. "Czarina of Tolstoi" won 1st Novice and Reserve Winners, then 2nd Team and Brace. Was Webley experiencing the gr-r-r-and and glor-r-r-ious feeling? When old "Master Butcher," our old, revered idol, was put through his paces, and showed his mechanical precision was yet very pronounced-of course he went to Winners.

American Foxhounds. W. C. Baldwin, the Ottawa ace, had handed over the noted son of "Prompter," ex "Liz-

zie," "Baldwin's Heffwin," to Benny Lewis, and in the ring looked 100 per cent. and won easily.

Pointers. Reserve Winners turned up in the old Montreal favorite, "Rip Rap," a beautiful specimen, but not yet showing a registration number, which is most regrettable for the fancy. Reserve in Bitches was won by the New Brunswick entry, "Jenny Lind," owned by Kiltie Wilson.

English Setters. What a beautiful breed is the English Setter. Here three Champions were benched, and 20 others that were surely eligible. Jack A. Newman, Regina, had his Ch. "Beau Bel Mona" benched, and she won 1st in Novice Bitches and Reserve in Limit amongst some red-hot stuff. "Mona" was in fine fettle and was splendidly handled and posed in the ring. "Count May Fly," another long distance entry, owned by Gerald McCarthy, New Brunswick, was early spotted for his outstanding quality and won for 1st Novice Dogs, 1st Limit, 1st Open, and Winners. Congratulations, Mr. McCarthy.

Irish Setters. 22 entries, almost half of them either Canadian-bred or sired by Canadian dogs, and some splendid stuff amongst them. Several, with or from the noted "Tyrone" strain. "Ruadh Michael," by "Corney," ex "Patricia," bred by Frank O'Donohue, Toronto, and owned by Master Jack Bain, son of James W. Bain, K.C., Toronto, was in elegant condition and soon caught the eye of the veteran Muss-Arnolt, a Bird dog specialist judge, and from Novice to Winners, with several special decorations, this Canadian-bred and owned Irish Setter was placed on top of the heap.

Cocker Spaniels. Three by Ch. "Durbar," and all in the money. "Baby Grand," Joe Hill's best bet, and in the capable hands of "Young" Bennie Lewis, and hob nobbing with 50 others, 1st Limit Dogs (black), and 3rd Open (black). Ch. "Lucknow Lottery" went to Winners. J. R. Beard's entry, Winnipeg born and bred by Ed. Sutton, with "Andy" Armstrong's (Ottawa) "Parti-Colored" holding his own with that variety.

Whippets. Wherever the "long-tails" have been featured in recent years, whether on the track or on the bench Canadian dogs have played a telling part; much of this credit was undoubtedly owing to the "pep" put into our Whippeting by Alf. Lowenstein, late of Toronto, and now at Hyde Kennels, Bennett Ave., Hemp-

stead, L.I., New York. Of course Alf. was there with bells on, and so were his good dogs "Reso'ute" and "Master Mason," who were both in the money, and it is worthy of notice that the winning bitch, "Margie Cameo," was the get of Alf's "Mischief," out of "Tight Fit," while "Margie's" kennel mate, "Maxim," won for second place in open dogs. Felix Lesser, of Baltimore, well known in Canada, was all the other works which were left.

Collies. Alex. Donaldson had two of his "Aeroplane's" get and handled them to advantage, and after the great English importations had taken their share of the spoils, the Canadian entries were not so far behind. Geo. Gaull's "Seedley Seraph" won for 2nd puppy bitches in a class of 8, then won for 2nd novice, 3rd limit. stead Chancy Lass," by W. O. Roys (Montreal), "Coila Pawkie Cheil" also won well. "Coltness Chaeroplane" won 2nd Novice, 3rd Limit, and 3rd Bred by Exhibitor, and a couple of Specials to boot. "Alstead Luminary." a son of "Alstead Asphodels," and bred by A. B. Armstrong (Morganston, Ont.), won very nicely in the puppy class of a dozen. George Getty had a nice 10-months'-old puppy in this class that was very highly commended, and was unfortunate to meet, not only a big class, but also a huge lot of quality. This youngster will bear watching.

Smooth Collies. Only two entries, one of which was absent, leaving "Arndale Controller" (bred by Jack Waggitt, Toronto), in full control.

Shepherd Dogs. The biggest entry at the Show, about 175, many of which were not for competition, and many for specials only or for exhibition only. and indeed they were truly an exhibition in themselves. Canada had not an entry here that we knew of, but the Star Kennels, of North Adams, Mass., one of our advertisers, had a splendid double sextette benched that were a centre of much attraction. In the Limit Dog class, with 20 entries, their "Alex Von Wolfsbusch" was awarded 3rd place. Dr. O. Elliott and Mr. A. Keith went to the Show for the purpose of bringing back a Shepherd dog to Toronto, and ere long there may be a bunch of them here, as a beautiful female was purchased from the Blue Blood Kennels and bred to one of the best dogs over there. So we expect to hear more about her later.

Old English Sheep Dogs. Canada had no representative in this breed either, but it will interest our readers to know that Ch. "International Weather," that splendid "Bobtail" that lent charm to the top right hand corner of page 48 of our Christmas number, and owned by Wm. A. Jamison, Holmdel, N.J., was returned as Winners and Best of Breed, and also a strong contender to the last for Best Dog in Show. The noted Mike Kennedy handled this elegant specimen to perfection. Winners Bitches was the Int. Ch. "May Morn Weather." whose picture appears at the left hand bottom corner of the page we have referred to. Miss A. Coombes had congratulations showered upon her from many quarters, from staunch admirers of the breed.

Bulldogs-entry, 46, many of which were stamped "Made in Canada." Albert Ramsden's good brace, by "Prince Albert," gave a good account of themse'ves, "Prince Raffles" winning 1st Novice Dogs and 3rd Limit. "Lady Betty II" won 3rd Open Bitches (under 40 lbs.). E. Libby and Bob Ross (Montreal) picked out 3rd position with their "Alston Belle" in Novice, and stuck to it through Limit, and Open (bred by exhibitor). Ch. "Duranside Captain" (Geo. C. Briggs. Winnipeg), won 2nd Limit and 2nd Open (45 lbs. and over) and looked trim enough to take on all comers. "Tam's Result," "Princess Edna, "Clevelock Mollie" (absent), "Fernbrook Vamp," "Conqueror Queenie," "Sir Douglas," all seemed to have a touch of Canuck in them somewhere.

Airedales-over 100 entries, a dozen of which were from Canada. The first to touch the coveted Blue Silk was Joseph Russell's "Claycliff mander," and the ring was full of Airedales, too (over 20 in the puppy class). The Claycliff entry had many admirers and won 1st Puppy, 2nd Maiden (Dogs and Novice, 2nd Bitches), 1st Junior, 2nd Debutante (Dogs and Bitches), and it should be noted that the dog that "Claycliff Commander" took second place to was none other than that brilliant Comet Boxwood Barkentine, who was later crowned King of Westminster Dog Show, whose owner, Mr. Frederic C. Hood, had many fine eulogies to offer the Toronto youngster. Another Claycliff Airedale to win was "Claycliff Debit," 2nd Novice, in a strong class, In puppy bitches, "Parkdale Rose," a Toronto-bred bitch by "Clayeliff Colonel," ex Matt Willerton's "Brian Rose," came out on top from a class 15 strong, and 3rd in same class was the Toronto-bred "Claycliff Chrystal."

This should serve to indicate the Canadians' strength in young Airedaledom on this continent. This good showing had the effect of bringing everything Canadian into prominence at this show, but that is another story. other Canadian entries were all high class animals, and it must be borne in mind that the best Airedales alive were competing at this show, where a master hand made the awards, and not even the losers had any criticism to offer, and Theodore Offerman intelligently and fearlessly gave the greatest demonstration of Airedale judging that has ever been witnessed in America, and in saying so, we only reiterate the opinions freely expressed by fanciers qualified to know whereof they spoke.

Bullterriers-entry 57, and all the good ones competing, and Vinton Breese, controlling the rule. Ch. "Haymarket Faultless" was not there himself, but sons and daughters of his managed to keep their illustrious father's name to the front. One-fifth of the entry-approximately, was sired by the great "Faultless." "Lionheart." the Toronto-bred son of "Brockley Topper," ex "Belle Mahone," was awarded Best of Breed, with all the glory that that comprehensive phrase implies. The breeder, Mr. Fred W. Coles, was present and if there was a happier or more contented person at the Gardens than Fred Coles was after "Lionheart" was judged, then we did not meet that individual, and we met everybody there.

Reserve Winners Bitch, was also Toronto-bred. Ch. "Charlwood Ariel." The one and only John Miles was present, and could be found near the White 'Uns all the time of the show. W. W. Rooney and Stanley Wisdom, Montreal, were other Canadian breeders, who will be gratified to know that their contribution to the competition was very much in evidence in the prize winners' list.

Boston Terriers—150, and what class, too. Judge Heinlan should be thankful that the weights keep these classes to reasonable limits, because, if they ever all came together, we hate to think what could happen. T. Joyce, Toronto, won 2nd Novice Dogs, with "Joyce's Atta Kid." J. R. Constantineau (Montreal), Vince Perry and Jack Lunan (London), were only able to touch the V.H.C. mark, but we go bond for the truth of the statement that even V.H.C. was a mark worth striving for in this hotbed of high-class Boston Terrier stock.

Fox Terriers (Smooth). Here was a real nice little department, with a lot of nice stuff benched. F. H. Far-

well judged and we will say that he certainly likes a Smooth Fox Terrier better than anything else standing on four legs. Several top-notch dogs competed, and we were obliged to give the credit of their breeding to England and America, but when it came to bitches it was quite different, as the sprightly "Clapton Miss Rapture" took the first blue for her sex, in the Maiden class (Dogs and Bitches), and kept on through Debutante, Puppie (Bitches), Novice and Limit, and then succumbed to the unbeatable Ch. "Sabine Fernlike" and Ch. "Sabine Fragrance." Dr. Jas. W. Spring, the owner of Miss Rapture, was certainly proud of his little bitch.

Wire Haired Fox Terriers-140, and what a galaxy of beautiful specimens; 29 were catalogued to appear in the Puppy class, and about 20 actually got there. After a lot of sorting out the wonder puppy of the Specialty Show Novice dogs was placed on top. brought Canada right up, when James F. Strachan's (Montireal), "Ormsby Snowball" touched the red ribbon. In Debutante Dogs, Alf. Lepine's "Malden Dusky Sergeant" won for fourth station. Open (Dogs and Bitches), Bred by Exhibitor, saw the Strachan entry, "Ormsby Wild Rose" and "Ormsby Snowball" 2nd and 3rd, as written. In Novice Bitches, "Ormsby Wild Rose" won 2nd. In Limit, 3rd prize, while in Open Bitches "Ormsby Lilias" was placed 3rd, 3rd Graduate went to "Ormsby Wild Rose." The Ormsby Team won for 2nd Team. In Open Bitches we were particularly interested in the Canadian stuff, which we trust was pardonable, and we watched with abated breath "Ormsby Lilias," "Epping Monaleen," and the wonderful "Shadow Hill Melody" (bred, and lately owned, by Kneen & Pearson, Nanaimo, B.C.), the winner at the Specialty Show, but great minds do not always think alike, and we were off-just a little. The quality of the Wires was scintillatingly brilliant.

Irish Terriers—64. Sinn Feiners, and almost "ivery wan in a red coat." Home Rule must have pacified them, because a better behaved and more "gintlemanly" bunch of Micks would be hard to find anywhere. Jack Thorn-dike gives his "whys" and "wherefores" in another part of this issue, and Jack knows them better than we do.

Kerry Blue Terriers—10. Here was the disappointment of the show—for us. Only one class was provided, and it was enough—for this start. "Limerick" and "Shelbourne Lady" were both there, and they were responsible for four more, while "Sinn Fein," "Kil-

kenny," "Balgownie Jess" and "Balgownie Mike" either could not, or would not, tell us what they were, who they were by, or when or where they were born. So we hoped, for the sake of dear ould Oireland, that the bastes were not Irish at all, at all.

Scotch Terriers—The only Scottie we met here, that we knew, was "Rosemere Sensation," an Oakville pup, who met a competition that was too strong for him to tackle—and beat.

Welsh Terriers—Here, indeed, was a pleasure, a score of neat and trim little Terriers, not unlike half-grown Airedales, and with heaps of quality to them, and we imagine they will become quite popular in America.

Pomeranians-A splendid entry of this attractive breed, and Harry Davis (Toronto), drew first blood for Canada, when his very pretty little black (under 7 lbs.) dog, "Wee Flyaway," flew off with 1st Limit and Reserve Winners. A good price was offered Harry for his dog and turned down, as being without sufficient attraction. McNaughton and Wickham won 3rd Limit Dogs (7 and under, sable), with "Pomeria Sunstar"; 2nd in this class was awarded to Mrs, W. Wylie's (Vineland, Ont.) "Cairndhu Goldshade." In Puppy Bitches, Canada had all the trump cards, and Mc-Naughton and Wickham's "Pomeria Montella" won 1st prize, and "Tommy" Johnston won 2nd prize with "Zetland Night Shade"; both puppies are Toronto bred. The Novice class gave 2nd to "Montella" and 3rd to Mrs. W. Wylie's "Cairndhu Tiny Mite." Limit Bitches (7 lbs. and under, Sable). Here "Jimmie" Marshall's (Toronto) "Wee Sable Mite" went to the top, and we believe that "Wee Sable Mite's" new address now reads U.S.A.

Pekingese had a beautiful showing and a large entry in Open Dogs (over 8 lbs.). The Toronto entry, Ch. "Lo Hai Chi" won for second place in extremely strong competition.

The Variety Classes were chock full of red hot competition, and the Canadian dog was able to hold his own even when it came to this trying test of quality.


