


We were delighted to see so many fanciers, old and new, especially must we commend the Maryland Kennel Club in having two men who are always working for the Collie and the fancier interest, in T. W. Turner and M. Croughwell. I believe I can say Tom is the oldest Collie exhibitor in this country, and as a handler, he can't be beat. Running a close second is friend Milne Croughwell. He is the central figure around Collies in Baltimore. He is an organizer and a booster, and for all the years we have known him he has been in the front line, working for more and better Collies. His one weakness is leaving his best at home, so that his friends may

No two Collies were more admired than Mrs. Ilch's new importation, Ch. "Laund Logic," and Mr. Sam Sloan's homebred "Gleniffer Gladiator."

Well, we were soon the best of pals and I took as much interest in "Bill" as I did in my own dogs, and one nice bright morning when the waves had settled down to normal condition, there came smiling towards me and "Bill," Mr. Reg. Hewes, "Bill's" owner-I must not call him his masterfor I did not know enough about "Bill" to know he had a master, so you bet-Reg and me being dog men, we were soon pals. The first thing I asked, "What's the dog's name"? "Bill," came the reply. Oh, I said, we fanciers in the show game usually have a handle to our dog's name, so Reg asked me to suggest one for his "Bill." Well, I have had some hard tasks in my time, and always come through some way, so I soon came through this, and in mid-Atlantic we christened "Bill" by his now much admired name, "Daylight Saving Bill."

# Doggy Notes and News From the Old Country

By CAPTAIN R. J. DARTNELL, OF THE "DOG WORLD," ENGLAND.

Around the Shows.

Entries continued to be excellent and many old Dog Show Committees are reviving Shows that have not been held for years. Since my last notes two excellent Championship Shows have been held, Birmingham with 3,100 entries and the London and Provincial Pekingese Championship Show with a record entry of 540.

### BIRMINGHAM.

The 58th Annual Show was splendidly staged and everything went along splendidly. Taking the show right through I can honestly say of it that it was excellent.

Airedales were judged by Mr. R. Phillips. Here we saw a complete reversal of the Crufts' awards, the championship going to Mr. Tree's "Cragsman's Document," a grand dog with rare substance. The winner at Crufts' was placed third. In bitches, W. Mc-Bain's "Lygon Ecstacy," who on the day was showing very well and is always difficult to fault winning the bitch championship.

Pekingese. We as a whole had better quality than at Crufts'. Mrs. Ashton Cross took the dog championship with Crufts' winner, Ch. "Chuty Too of Alderbourne." whilst in bitches Mrs. Gordon Coakix's "Soo Shu," which had to be content with a fourth at Crufts, took premier honors, but Crufts' bitch was absent.

Alsatians were not up to Crufts' either in quantity or quality. Mr. Robbins, with "Matthias of Makesden," and "Mary Ellen" took both championships.

Irish Terriers. Many prominent owners were not showing, but I much admired the dog champion shown by Mrs. Chambers' "Wrose Bouncer," who will go a very long way and is of great promise.

Chows. Again a really excellent show was made by this breed, but the judging closely followed Crufts'.

Bulldogs. A wonderful collection appeared and I did not envy Mr. Woodiwiss his task. The champion dog was provided by Mr. J. B. Haley, with "Hardgate," a dark brindle with a well balanced head, grand underjaw, neat ears, sound in movement, short and shapely in back, neat tail, sound front and very fit. The bitch championship went to Mr. Muir's Carolina Duchess, a fawn smut, of very sound lines, her front, bone, legs, feet and shoulders were choice. She has a

Buil Terriers. Some excellent exhibits were staged, but again we missed many old exhibitors, and speaking to me I learn that in winter they do not like two day shows. Major Redhead provided the dog champion with Ch. "Young Cavalier," and Mr. J. Hink's "White Surprise," that in bitches. This latter was a stunner and ran right through her classes to the championship. She is a typical bitch that I cannot fault in any way and the win was a popular one.

Wires. Quality, and really excellent quality, was seen in this ring. Needless to say, Ch. "Daykin Surprise" followed up his previous successes and won the dog certificate. The bitch certificate went to Mr. Dunford's "Barrington Sparkle," a bitch of rare quality, excellent coat and full right through.

Shooting Dogs again come up well both in numbers and quality, and many battles were refought. Cocker Spaniels I thought were the best, but with so many difficult and well-filled classes of the very best this may be an injustice, for quality was topping.

Collies. The entry here was as good in roughs as at Crufts', but smooths were poor in numbers. Bitches were a repeat of Crufts' for championship honors, Seedley Victorious, benched by Mr. Lord, being dog champion.

I could continue, but must stop here, for space will not permit more, but I have again to say I have a few full reports for those who care to apply to me for them.

# London and Provincial Pekes.

A record was scored here for Peke shows, 540 entries, and good stuff, too. Mrs. Ashton Cross won the dog championship with the Birmingham winner, and Mrs. Clarke won the bitch championship with "Ashdell Shangetta," a lovely headed red, a topping bitch; her face is perfect, skull flat and wide muzzle, good in eye and strong in chin. ears well placed, body shape good, but I thought hardly so strong behind as she might be, nevertheless a real good bitch, and one who will do a lot of winning for her popular owner.

### Choosing a Puppy.

This query is one that is constantly being viewed by the Editors of all newspapers and I make no bones in recommending to your readers the advice of the late Walter Baxendale, on this subject, for of all experts whose opinion I valued, none I had a greater respect for—and here it is:

When the puppies are weaned and

be framed it requires more than a cursory examination to tell which of the family of any variety is likely to turn out the best. But there is one cardinal point which every man of experience I have had to deal with has always placed first, and that is in glancing over the young family of dogs which may have never seen a stranger before, the thing is to pay especial attention to the youngster which shows any sign of curiosity or concern in those who have come to see him,

Out of a litter of three or four there must be one puppy which is more forward—cheeky if you like—than the others. Single that one out, make certain that it really is the most cheeky of the family, pick it up, examine it, squeeze it, get it to growl if possible, and if all this is managed without the puppy expressing in a way they all have of disagreement with what is going on, you certainly have the best one of the litter.

### England's Loss.

That famous Wire, "Ch. Daykin Surprise," has been purchased by Mr. Edgar K. Smith for America, the price is stated to be £1,000, and he sails by the steamer Aquitania on March 11th next. "Surprise" is one of the best Wires in the country here at the present time and his arrival in the American show ring will be-I feel sure-a sensation. He won his full title under such judges of a Wire as Francis Redmond, Leeds, 1921; Walter Glynn, Bristol, 1921; and got his full honors and title under Parker Wagner at the National Terrier Show in 1922, whilst he took the championship honors at Crufts', 1922, under E. R. L. Hiskins, and at Birmingham, 1922, under C. Buller-so that we have the confirmed opinion of five of our best judges on the merits of this dog. I first saw "Surprise" at the National Terrier Show this year, and in any previous notes I dealt with him describing him then, as one of the very best. It is certainly a great loss to England to lose this young dog and it is America's gain, and I wish the new owner every success with him, and I predict that he is one of those dogs that will become a double champion, i.e., both English and American, for he will want a lot of stopping.

### A Record Puppy Sale.

Mr. W. H. Taylor, of Lestock, has sold a wonderful puppy, "Boltonia Bendigo," a grandson of "Ch. Bolton Bulwark," to South Africa, for a sum which is stated to be in excess of 300 guineas. This constitutes a record for an unshown Bulldog puppy. The destination of this dog is South Africa.

### Mr. Morris Kinney in England.

This well known American Fancier is over here. We learn that he has purchased an excellent Welsh Terrier pup of good quality. Other purchases are, I believe, likely, but no news has come through at the time of my sending of notes.

### A Nice Peke Exported.

A winning Peke, the property of Mr. A. M. Weir, "Wee Chi of Trafford," sailed on the steamer Celtic, having been sold to America—a useful one, too.

### Poms Good Sale.

Mrs. Thomson, of Lockyan prefix, has done well this year with exports. One to Mrs. Cardinald went for £95. Two good pupples have left for Denmark and two for America, and all fetched good prices. Two tempting offers for one of her noted Stud dogs, of £200, have been turned down, however.

# American Judge for England.

Mr. J. L. Batten, of Philadelphia, Pa., is to judge Greyhounds at the Ladies' Kennel Club. He will have a great welcome and it goes without saying, some classes.

### Sporting Dogs Boom.

# THE KERRY BLUE IRISH TERRIER ROUGH ON RATS.

The rat pit is quite a growing institution round and about New York. Recently, among the many side bets wagered on a single dog in one set of seven rats, there was a gamble of \$1,000. At a gathering of "real sports" the other day the wagering was fast and furious, the winning dog being an Irish-bred Kerry Blue Terrier-one of the old variety of terriers well known in Ireland before the red Irish terriers became the fashion through the means of bench shows. The Kerry Blue under notice, "Sherbourne Lady," a Dublin winner, beat all comers, including Airedales, fox and other terriers. She dispatched her three and a half brace of rodents in 162-5 seconds. The runner-up was a long way behind-a full 64 seconds being his time. At a recent show I was instructed to say that five Kerry Blues could be matched at not less than \$500 a side for a rat-killing affair, all breeds or mongrels accepted. It is believed that a team of five Scottish Terriers is to give the Blue Irish a run for a \$1,000 or \$2,000 stake. The smaller dog should be the handier in an ordinary pit.

The Kerry Blue Terrier is fast taking a hold in this country. No other man than the Rev. Father Daley, of the New York Cathedral, is considered a better local authority on the breed. The old strain was almost extinct, but thanks to some sportsmen it was preserved in the blue mountains of the "Kingdom of Kerry." This famous

Neck-Not too thick, moderately tong.

Legs—Straight in front, bone good, feet compact, not spread out, pads strong and rounded, black toe nails.

Back—Medium length, not long over loins.

Ribs-Moderately well sprung.

Thighs—Muscular, well developed, strong hocks, hind legs well set under the dog. Dew claws to be absent.

Tail-Medium in thickness and well carried and gaily.

Color—Blue of any shade from light blue to dark blue or blue and tan (i.e., tan on head and legs).

General Appearance—Active, hardy, and handsome.



The Kennel Press of Canada and the United States for April carried obituary notices for several noted dogs, and we are reluctantly obliged to add to their number this issue. First it was the noted Montreal cracks, "Irish Challenger" and "Ch. Sally of Montreal," then "Boltonia Bulwark," three very superior specimens of the Bulldog breed, whose proud owners had made famous at Stud. in the Kennel and on the Bench, and who now greatly deplore the death of their pets and companions and are joined by a wide circle of admirers who join them in their sorrow.



Toronto has been hit hard in recent days, through the death of three well-known Boston Terriers, and it is somewhat of a co-incidence that the owners of these animals were the ruling Presidents of the two Boston Terrier clubs. First, Mr. Ed. Milburn re-ported the death of "Count De Luxe," a good son of "Ch. Count Dee Cee" and a very promising Stud force that had many admirers. Poisoning was the cause; possibly of the ptomaine variety. Ed is always optimistic and is already looking for something good enough to fill the place of "Count De Luxe.



CH. JACKSON'S DREAM GIRL

Mr. H. M. Jackson lost within a few hours of each other his two famous champions, "Jackson's Paddy Dee and "Jackson's Dream Girl," a brace of Bostons which first saw the light of day in Massachusetts, and carrying in their bodies the best bloods known to Boston fancy. On the bench this brace brought forth much favorable comment, often benched together at the same show, and sometimes taking the winners prizes together, as at Montreal and Cornwall in 1919. Mr. Jackson feels this calamity very keenly, although he tries to disguise his sorrow, as becomes a good sportsman.

Another good fancier had a terrible set-back recently in the person of the versatile Cocker fancier, Joe Hill, Toronto. Joe's prime favorite "Baby Grand," a high-grade Black Cocker Spaniel that had been on Benny Lewis' string at Madison Gardens, Newark, Boston, New Haven, Hartford, and Baltimore, and had been greatly admired, winning the points in four of his starts, on his return from the circuit, died from distemper. Possibly in this black chapter-which we hate to compile-friend Hill is the hardest hit of all. Here he had a home-bred dog in which was embodied years of skillful breeding, and to Joe, a masterpiece, only his closest friends know how deeply he grieves over his great misfortune, but of such happenings comes the supreme test, and we look to Joe to still so pursue his hobby that at an early date we will see created "Baby Grand 2nd."

From the Coast comes the distressful information that Ch. "Kilmartin Poosie Nancy," the noted West Highland White Terrier female, owned by our British Columbia Director, Mr. Alex. McCloy, Victoria, had died.

It would appear from the information received that on Sunday, April 2nd, when Mr. McCloy and his family were visiting, their home was burglarized and \$300 worth of jewelry stolen. The faithful little terrier, realizing her responsibility to her owners, had made furious though futile

attempts to get at the housebreakers, and the effect was such that a week later she gave birth to three live puppies and two more were born dead, with the assistance of a veterinary, who gave it as his opinion that they had been dead for at least a week. Mr. McCloy deplores this happening very much. We trust that the owners of the dogs we have referred to will keep heart, and that we will see them bench other high-grade specimens at our shows in the near future.

# Good Friday With Toronto Specialty Clubs

Toronto fanciers were badly disappointed when they finally realized that there was no possibility of an allbreed show being held in their city on Good Friday this year, so accustomed had they become to the fixture of the Toronto Kennel Club at that time. However, dates were taken by the Boston Terrier Club of Toronto and the Bulldog Breeders Association to hold Specialty Shows, while the date was also claimed by the Pekin Palace Dog Association in conjunction with the Pomeranian Club of Canada to hold a show under group F, as pro-

vided for in our Dog Show Rules. All three reported successful results, which proved that Toronto looked on Good Friday as a landmark on their dog show calendar.

The Boston Terrier Club of Toronto just decided that the sky was the limit and laid their plans accordingly, and when they claimed the limit of championship points alloted to a specialty club show, they did so with an "I told you so" twinkle in their eye.

H. M. Jackson was at the show for fifteen hours on end, and had his members around him all the time, and the show was well managed as a result. The judge—a local man—Mr. Wm. Austin, had possession of the "rule," which he handled with exemplary precision and it is quite safe to say that no judge of any nationality ever gave more all-round satisfaction than Bill Austin gave to the Boston Terrier fanciers on Good Friday. Like the Bulldog judge, he found his best dog in a Montreal entry, and others from the Boston Terrier Club of Canada, thus dissipating any suspicion of favoritism either for individuals or associations, a circumstance that must

be refreshing to all conscientious exhibitors. Mr. S. A. Eling, the Show Secretary, was a new broom that swept clean.

The Bulldog Breeders' Association held forth at the Community Hall, on Carlaw Avenue, and had a nice, lively day all their own. The Show was very clean, with air coming into the building from every side and both ends. This hall is not big enough for an all-breed fixture, but it is a treat for a specialty affair. Here, as at the Boston Terrier Club Show, a Montreal dog took the winners prize, and the placing was received in good taste. Mr. A. C. A. Chisholm, of Montreal, was the ermine bearer and the occasion marked his first official appearance as a judge at a Canadian Kennel Club Show. Painstaking to a degree. nothing slipped his notice. In one class two exhibitors were overheard to remark that a certain dog would surely get past if a "wry" face could be hidden, but it was not long hidden from the astute Chisholm, who soon was on to the defect. Two points were earned here, and the President of the Club, Mr. Reg. Sparkes, and his executive, were well pleased with their Show.

The Pekin Palace Dog Association and the Pomeranian Club of Canada held their Show at the Labor Temple, Toronto. Dr. R. S. Richardson, of Mimico, Ont., judged the Pekes, 42 specimens being benched, several of which were for exhibition only, and included the noted "Ch. Prince Cha of Alderbourne," "Ch. Boltonia Tui Ti," and "Ch. Nowati Wi Chun," from the Lakebourne Kennels, also "Ch. Walnut Manniken" and "Ch. Sunni of Somme," from Mrs. M. Redway's Kennel. The winners of both sexes turned up in Mrs. M. Melville's "Pride of Pekin" and "Wee Wee," a brace that has followed all the shows for several years, and who were only nosed out on many occasions by the high-priced imported specimens. Both winners are Canadian bred and owned, and are the progeny of "Tsungan," imported son of "Sutherland Avenue Qui."

The Pomeranian section was in the judicial keeping of the popular Mr. Harry Hurst of Richmond Hill, Ont., and made a remarkable showing. Mrs. J. W. Bruce benched seven of her Melbourne dogs, and in a nearby section Mrs. Hussey had five nice specimens benched, the latter taking the winners' ribbon with her "Little Gold Fly."

The three shows were well attended, although the Boston Terrier Club pos-

sibly earned the biggest gate, their building being packed, and the crowd stayed to midnight, so enhanced were they with what was taking place.

# Regarding Dudley Nosed Bulldogs

Through the courtesy of Mr. Robt. Mills, Montreal, we are able to print a letter from the Hon. Secy. of the Bulldog Club, Inc. (England), giving a ruling that will be of much interest to the fanciers whose inclinations turn to the National breed.

The question of a Dudley nosed bulldog's standing is not, and never will be, established. There will always be influential supporters in his favor, from the fact that a Dudley has oftentimes a preponderance of bulldog character that is denied the rank and file with their orthodox noses, as, for instance, that super Bulldog, "Irish Challenger," the envy of two continents; every fancier liked "Irish Challenger, and Dudley nose, notwithstanding. And now that his stud force is lost to us through his untimely death, we will often refer back to him and mention his progeny with much pride.

The letter follows:

Dear Sir,-

I have pleasure in referring to correspondence with your good selves and particularly to your letters of November 28th and December 17th, which have been laid before my committee.

I am instructed to say my committee are very much interested to note that you are now printing bylaws, and particularly that you propose to follow the standard of the Bulldog Club, Incorporated. My committee have much pleasure in giving you permission to reprint for your bylaws our copyright, "The Standard of the Bulldog." I am sure your committee will appreciate that in reprinting this Standard it is important they should adhere faithfully to the wording without any alterations.

With regard to the other point upon which you ask our assistance, viz., the question—"Can a Dudley Nosed Bulldog and two of his get compete and be judged in a Stud Dog Class?" This is a question that has always given a certain amount of difficulty in this country. It really depends entirely upon the wording of your classification. The general principle adopted by Clubs is that any dog entered in a Stud Class is judged solely by his progeny exhibited at the same show, and the qualities of the dog himself

are not taken into consideration. It is usual, however, when drawing up the wording for the Stud Class, to impose some sort of restriction which enforces that the dog must also be entered in at least one of the other classes, and this generally implies that he is eligible to compete.

You will appreciate that a Dudley Nosed Bulldog is disqualified by the Standard and is therefore not eligible to compete in any ordinary class. At some shows, however, a provision is made that a dog may be entered in a class "Not for Competition," or sometimes a "Not for Competition" Class is specially provided. A Dudley Nosed Dog, therefore, cannot compete in any class with either his own progeny or any other dogs. At one time my committee always had a Stud Dog Class at their own Annual Shows, but this, for lack of support, has been dropped during recent years. At the last Show at which this Class was provided (i.e., 1915) the following wording was adopted:

### Stud Class

"A dog to compete in this Class must be entered and exhibited in its Proper Class (either for competition or not), as well as in this class. The merit of the Stud Dog himself as an exhibit will not be taken into consideration by the Judge, but the prize will be awarded on the merits of the dog's progeny in the Show."

You will appreciate that the wording would permit a Dudley Nosed Dog to be entered in the Open Class "Not for Competition," and he might subsequently be a prize winner in the Stud Class. My committee would like me to explain that while there may be some apparent anomaly in disqualifying a Dudley through the Standard and yet allowing him to compete in a Stud Class, yet the real point at issue is that a Dudley sire does not necessarily produce Dudley pups, and in this particular form of competition it is upon his merits as a sire only that he is judged.

# Thirty Years in Pomeranians

By PROFESSOR ELI WARD.

To the amateur contemplating going in for Poms I would say, if it is Blacks you want look out for a bitch from 6 to 8 lbs. in weight. When one is offered, examine her breeding well, and if you find a lot of grey hairs, don't have her. If she has a very long and heavy coat just turn her up and look if you can find a bare place between the forelegs or higher up on the chest. If you do, ask the vendor what that bare place is doing there. I have already stated, it is not the best colored dogs that have the best coats, but the opposite. When you have satisfied yourself the color is good, then look at the mouth, and if it is undershot, only the least bit, it is undershot; and if the six lower nippers are missing and the upper ones sound, don't have her, not even if they do swear they were kicked out. On the other hand, don't discard a bitch rather long coated as long as the other credentials are all right, and don't lay too much stress on tail carriage. This can be improved in pups by training. The same rule holds in choosing a Chocolate as a Black. Always beware of grey hairs in breechings and in choosing an Orange, get one as deep in color as you can and especially in breechings and breast. I have found crossing other colors with Orange will improve the latter color, but this must only be done with great care. Oranges should be crossed with Orange shaded sables. As it is much easier to get the tips too dark than otherwise. I bred "Musician," one of the best Orange shaded sables that ever lived, from "Orange Poundress," a blitch, rich orange color, by "Ch. Dragon Fly." mated to my old dog "Comedian," a black and the sire of "Ch. Young Comedian," a dog well known to many

I have often been asked at what age I breed them. I breed my bitches at first heat, generally 8 to 9 months, and have seen them in whelp, here in Toronto, under seven months. As to the age for using dogs, "Comedian" served his first bitch at 61/2 months of age, and he sired "Ch. Young Comedian" when in his eleventh year. When your bitch has been bred, if you keep more than one, keep her as much by herself as possible, and make her your constant companion; so feed and treat her that when the time comes for whelping, she will allow you to fix her bed and do other little things that may add to her comfort, and to the safety of her little ones

when they appear. As the puppies are born and cleared and breathing normally, place them to a teat; if they are not strong enough to find this themselves and so manipulate the same, until they have tasted their mother's milk; and when all seems settled, keep warm and perfectly quiet-and let no one see them until they open their eyes on or about the twelfth day. Feed the mother with sustaining yet sloppy food, and if the puppies have dew claws on their hind legs, remove same on the fifth or sixth day. If the mother is healthy you need not concern yourself about feeding the pups until they are five weeks old. Keep their bed clean, keep bitches' coat well attended to and your trouble about the future need not cause you to loose any sleep. If the pups turn out show specimens don't be in a hurry to show them; teach them well at home to get used to the lead, then take them on the street car, and get them well used to the street noises and to seeing fresh faces, then you may enter them at a show and if they don't show well in their first class don't be discouraged, but try and make them show better in the next class-as showing dogs is like boxing, you may do better in the second round than in the first-and if you have a judge with any backbone he will always give you all you deserve and will take no notice of the bad losers crying, "he has reversed his decisions again!"

It is not what a dog did in the last class, but the one he is now showing in. Judging to-day is not like what it was 45 years ago. Then, the judge was looked upon as the great I AM. To-day, many ringsiders know a dog much better than the judge and the judge often knows it, and it's his credit that is at stake, and he knows he must do his best. But let all exhibitors and onlookers remember the judge is only human, and Portia in the Merchant of Venice reminds us that to "err is human, but to forgive is divine," and if we are dog fanciers, we can none the less be at times a little divine. Let us all then by our own personal conduct make the dog fancy clean, healthy, and a game for true sports and fanciers. If we have not the dogs to win with ourselves, don't let that sour our minds against others. Don't let us try to find faults where there are none. The man or woman who seems to have no good word for anyone, keep them at arm's length. If they call down others to you to-day, they will call you down to

others to-morrow. I have said previously, real fanciers are real ladies and gentlemen. I have met them from England's Queen down to the laboring man. They carry with them a kind of magnetism that we call, "Hall fellow well met, and if a judge gives an extra look and half a point to any one it's to the good loser, and he deserves at, too.

### Questions and Answers.

At the close of the lecture a number of written questions were handed to the lecturer and were at once answered, without any hesitation, and as they were of general importance, we re-produce them in full:—

Q.—Will you tell us what points count most in the show ring, and what points are the most difficult to get?

A .- Shortness of back, fineness of bone, profusion of coat and good color.

Q.—How is it that the female pupples are always smaller than the male pupples?

A.—Nature has ordained the male should be the largest, and a very good thing for some of you men that it is so.

Q.—What makes a white Pom's nose change color?

A.—Not only do white Poms have their noses change their colors in winter, but oranges also. There are arctic animals who change their whole color in winter and the same laws operate in the Poms mentioned.

Q.—Do you not think that giving a large quantity of bones is not inclined to cause costiveness?

A.—I have not recommended a large quantity of bones. I recommend large bones being given to puppies to gnaw, as by so doing a natural flow of the gastric juice is caused, which helps to combat the attack of worms that most puppies are subject to.

Q.—Would it be advisable to breed a female 4½ lbs. to her grandsire • 4½ lbs. dog?

A.—Yes, and if you don't want her after doing so, sell her to me at a reasonable price.

Q.—What is the difference between Poms, Samoyedes and Spitz dogs?

A.—The Samoyedes and Spitz are larger dogs and whilst they are endowed with more bone on account of their usefulness in their own Northern countries, which also calls for a dense close fitting coat, and a well curled tail, the Pomeranian must be quite the opposite.

Q.—How would you balance a dog up? We cannot have conformation right through, i.e., that is height and length, head, skull, muzzle, tail carriage, etc. A.—Take in first their general appearance. A Pom should be short coupled, fine in bone, heavy in coat, small in ears, closely carried; then comes color. The hardest to get is a good Orange, then Black, followed by Chocolate, all of which are, the better in color and shorter in coat, the sables—Orange and Wolf come next, then it's a matter of choice between the Racoon and Biscuit, the latter often called (very wrongly) a pale orange. The standard says: cow hocked and undershot must not be.

Q.—How would you breed to get the black nose and eye-rims in whites?

A.—Cross with sound black and breed in as this end will not be gained, the first cross.

Q.—What is your opinion regarding a female dog who just previous to her whelping is found to give off at the breasts, a thickish greenish fluid, which is of the consistency of mucilage, and is evil smelling? Should this be drawn off artificially, or should it be allowed to remain and drawn off by the newly born puppies?

A.—Until the bowels of a puppy have been moved and urine passed, the life of a puppy is uncertain. Nature has, therefore, provided that fluid to be drawn from the mother's breast and passed into the stomach where it mingles with a fluid already there, and formed during the silent days of its embryonlic existence. It at once becomes a powerful and very active purgative, moving the bowels and bringing the urinary organs into activity and gives a possible and good chance of rearing the puppies.

J. D. Strachan, who was present at the invitation of the Club, dwelt at some length on the advantages of just such a talk from a well versed fancier, and pointed out that the answers to the questions, which were immediately forthcoming, was proof that the lecturer had stored away in him some where a vast source of knowledge from which he could draw liberally at will, and moved, "That the members proffer Mr. Eli Ward a hearty vote of thanks for his nicely balanced informative lecture." The motion was seconded by Mr. J. McNaughton and the response visibly pleased the veteran lecturer immensely.

# AVOID TROUBLE!

When Sending Your Dogs to the United States.

Fanciers shipping dogs to the United States for the purposes of breeding or exhibiting, should observe the following simple requirements, if they desire to eliminate all their past shipping troubles:

- "Export Entries in triplicate should accompany each shipment. Notation should be on triplicate copy of the Export Entry that it is to be returned to the shipper showing exportation from Canada, then, when the shipment is returned to this Country (Canada) free entry can be made upon the shipper producing his duly certified Export Entry showing the shipment as having been actually exported from Canada."
- 2. "For United States Customs an Invoice in triplicate is required. A Bond is filed with the United States Customs allowing the dogs to remain in the United States for a period of 6 months. This Bond is cancelled when the dogs are returned to Canada, and properly examined by the United States Customs before exportation."

# The Judge's Impressions at the Bulldog Show

(By A. C. A. Chisholm, Esq., Montreal.)

The recollections of my visit to Toronto and my impressions of the show held on Good Friday are both of the pleasantest kind, thanks to the President of the Canadian Kennel Club, to Mr. Sparkes and to yourself, Mr. Editor, I was enabled to spend as happy a week-end as I have done for "many moons," and I think I know now just what you mean by the phrase, "Toronto the Good," for it sure was good to me.

Judging Bulldogs (and all such cattle) is at all times a thankless job, for, as my late esteemed old fancier friend, Joe Stanford, said to me when I was trying to induce him to judge "Wires": "No d—d fear, Chisholm, I haven't an "L" of a lot of friends just now, but I would have a d—d sight less when I was finished." I am happy to say my experience was quite the reverse. The boys, without one single exception, were gentlemen, and took my placings like true sports.

As my fellow-countryman, the one and only "Harry," would say, "Man, it's a g-g-rann and a g-g-lorious feelin'" to know that the fanciers showing under you, although they may not agree with you on the points of a dog, at least give you the credit of being honest, and that is, has, and always will be my motto.

As for the dogs themselves, I am very sorry, Jimmie, but I really can not remember them well enough to do them justice by criticizing them individually. I started to do so, but gave it up, as I might be criticizing the wrong dog, and that would be manifestly unfair, both to the dog and his owner. You see, I only saw them while in the ring, of course I could not examine them before the judging, and when I was finished and had given out the prizes, they had nearly all left the building and I did not see a catalogue until next day. However, a few rambling remarks may be of interest to your readers. The show, as a whole, contained many really good specimens of the "Ugly Mugs," the majority of them being good, sound dogs, that their owners need not be ashamed to show anywhere. I found rather a tendency to heavy ears and pinched forefaces-on the other hand, they were mostly big skulled, heavy boned, big ribbed, good tailed, sound Bulldogs. I would humbly suggest to the Club that what they most want to mate to their bitches is a good eared, strong fore-faced, plenty substance before the eyes, well furnished and

finished face, sound type of dog. Some of the imported dogs, I confess, I was rather disappointed in, their blood lines are undoubtedly all right, and they may "sire the stuff," but I candidly do not think any of them can hold a candle to Salmon's young dog, "Drummond Top Notch." This young dog is, in my opinion, one of the best Canadian bred dogs we have seen (or are likely to see) for some time. A low, cloddy, short backed, big skulled, big boned dog, beautiful turn up, and lay back, lovely roach, as sound as a dollar, and put down in the pink and showed to perfection. I had quite a task deciding between him and "Ch. Roxton Mickey" for best specimen in show, and it was only after I had called in Dr. Campbell, who assured me that the bitch was not lame, that I settled down to my job (and it was some job). I had to resort to judging them by points before I could conscientiously give my verdict. "Mickey" I always liked-who wouldn't-and I don't think I ever saw her in better shape, or moving better, but we can't get away from the fact that she is straight in stifle and moves none too well sometimes. But, oh, what a head piece! Why, to a real, bred in the bone Bulldog man, it's worth going far to see and handle her. What a mug! What expression, what beautiful finish, all set on a perfect body. To me, bar her failings which I have enumerated, she is the super Bull bitch. I hope her owner, Mr. Stroud, was not vexed with me for calling in Dr. Campbell, but I wanted to give them both a fair show, and felt it was the proper thing to do. The winning dog puppy I liked very much, and his owner has a better pup than he imagines. "Nilambe Victorious" is a more than

useful dog with good deep foreface,

big, flat skull, extra good nose and nostrils (a point which most Bulldog men are forgetting)—he has heaps of bone, but is straight in back, which somewhat mars his general appearance


