Kennel Club will be held in the offices of the Club on Thursday
evening, November 6th, 1922, at 8 o'clock.

Meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club

The regular monthly meeting of the
Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel
Club was held in the club offices, 774
Yonge Street, Toronto, on Thursday
evening, October 29th, 1922, at 8 o'clock.
The President, Mr. Joseph Russell, was
in. He and the Directors in attendance
included Messrs. H. J. Clayton, W. W.
Jacobi, H. H. Wilson, J. McNaughton,
Chas. W. Dickinson, and Matt. O'Grady.

The Secretary read his report of the
previous meeting, which motion were
declared approved.

The Secretary advised that he had no
further correspondence on the application
for club registration from the Shepherd
Dog Club of Canada, and was instructed
to find out the latitude in using field clay.

The Secretary reported that a complaint
made by the Bulldog Breeders' Association
of Canada against Mr. Reg. P. Sparks,
had been temporarily withdrawn
and received instruction to have that
Association either press its complaint,
or withdraw it finally.

The Secretary reported having received
considerable correspondence and sworn
declarations from Mr. J. A. Newman,
Director for Saskatchewan, which was
read, and was advised to give the defence
of the party charged draw up a proper
form, and be prepared to proceed with
the case on November 6th.

The Secretary reported that he had
invited Messrs. J. J. Slattery, Geo.
Puncheon and Mr. Ward to attend his
meeting, but the first named were in
attendance in the ante-room and the
others received a letter from Mr. J. A. Ward,
which was read.

Messrs. Slattery and Puncheon were
called to the board room and the hair-
man advised him that he had been
called to personally give the party
Mr. J. A. Ward, Mary Holmes' declaration
described in Article 8, which reads:

"Early in July last, Mr. Puncheon
called at Mr. Ward's house and enquired
as to his whereabouts, and informed
the said Mr. Puncheon where Mr. Ward
was working. Shortly afterwards Mr.
Ward and Mr. Puncheon and Mr. Ward
returned and at each other's house. After
Mr. Puncheon had left Mr. Ward told

me that he and Punchen had some
negotiations about the exchange of the
Sable puppy for the following litter
on Oct. Queenie had a female, black
and white, female, and Ward said that
she would accept his position. Ward
said he would pay him better
at the time and that Mr. Puncheon
would give him a good puppy on the
condition that Ward would give him
on the exhibition Show here. Mr.
Ward was to act as judge. I told Mr.
Ward that this would not be right. Ward
told me that he would exert his efforts that
the show at Punchen would give him a
puppy. I vainly pleaded with my
brother-in-law, he said Ward to act
fairly and justly in placing the dogs
exhibited under him and get at the said
Exhibition Show and his only reply to
my suggestion was that "it was a very
man for himself these days, and that he
would get a good puppy from Punchen."

Mr. Puncheon emphatically declared
that he was not relying upon the being
party to such arrangement, and Mr.
Slattery conceded that he would not be
opposed to anything improper. Mr. Pun-
cheon was then thanked for his attendance
and retired.

The matter of the charge made by Mrs.
Annie Gladwin agains Mr. J. A. Ward.
Mr. Slattery recited Article 8, which
reads:

"Total cost by Mr. J. A. Ward to me the
Pomeranian female for \$75.00, the repre-
sentation being that the same animal cost
him \$150.00, but that he was the price he
had paid to Mr. Davis for the dog. It
was on his strong insistence representation
he had agreed to buy this female from Mr.
Ward. Ward was then asked if he impressed that
he could rely upon what he said. But he
replied "no". It was informed that Mr.
Ward had stated that he had given the
dog to me because of my being his friend.
This aroused my suspicion and my
purpose in going to Mr. Davis' house
was solely to investigate. I now find
the said female is the dog mentioned in the
alleged bill. Ward paid out \$20.00 and the
said female was sold to him fully kept

"I figure my transaction with Ward took place in April last."

Mr. Slattery advanced that the deception of his fellow kennelmen clearly established in this instance, and asked to have Mr. J. Ward severely dealt with at the annual meeting of the Directors.

The matter, after the investigation of certain statements alleged to have been circulated by Mr. J. Ward, and said to reflect the Canadian Kennel Club of Canada and its officers and members generally, was again reviewed, and Mr. J. Slattery thanking the Board for its courtesy to him retired.

After Mr. Slattery left the meeting, the Chairman placed the matter of the Gladwin complaint before the Directors, and it was moved, seconded and carried.

"That in view of the fact that Mr. J. Ward is endeavoring to issue a cheque for \$20.00, and that being the amount received by him on account of the purchase price of the C. M. dog 'Bessie' (now named 'Gladwin') and that he is agreeing to take her back, that the charge be dismissed."

The complainant standing by his name, the C. M. dog Club was then considered and it was moved, seconded and carried.

"That, therefore, being no protest from Mr. J. Ward regarding the entire question, no action will be taken."

The General complaint was then discussed and it was moved, seconded and carried.

"That after hearing the evidence in this case, the Directors are of the opinion that the charges are without foundation in fact, and that the case against Mr. J. Ward be dismissed, and that Mr. George Punchon, by then entirely exonerated, shall the matter."

A letter from the Canadian National Blue Stock Record Office accompanied by much correspondence, was read by the Secretary, and it was agreed to send same to Mr. Leonard H. Cooper, our Agent, Director for investigation and report.

A protest forward edited by Mr. J. W. Huskey, Director for the Maritime Provinces was read:

Gentlemen:

I desire to protest the awarding to the winners of class 11, 1st Building Bitches English Bull Dogs, in the categories "Bess," "No. 120, at the New Brunswick Kennel Club Dog Show, St. John, N.B., September 15, 16, 17, 1922, and held under Canadian Kennel Club rules, the bitch we're violated as follows, according to Rule XVII, Sec. 8, which states that the winners class shall be open to the winners of first prizes in the Juvenile, Puppy, Novice, Canadian-bred, Limited Open classes, and I understand this bitch "Bess," No. 120 is not the first, and was only

entered in two classes, Canadian-bred Dogs and Bitches, Any weight and Male Class, therefore he could not compete for the Winners Class, and consequently the Reserve Winners Bitch No. 111 should have been awarded to the winners. Your consideration, and ruling will be obliged.

The Secretary advising from the officially marked catalogues sent him by the New Brunswick Kennel Club advised that dog #39 appeared in class 118, Canadian-bred jews were all others unplaced to dogs 135, 138 and 38, and with the order, and her only other entry was to class 139 (local bitches).

It was moved, seconded and carried,

"That the dog #39 not being considered eligible for winners under our dog show rules, the win be cancelled and dog #39 given the reserve award."

I desire to protest the awarding of the Reserve Winners, Boston Terrier Dogs, at the New Brunswick Kennel Club Dog Show, St. John, N.B., September 15, 16, 17, 1922, held under C.R.C. rules, which were violated as follows:

Rule XVII, Sec. 8, Reserve Winners, before awarding reserve winners in the winners class, the dog or dogs, having been placed second to the winners in any of the classes recognized by the Canadian Kennel Club, must be brought before the judge for competition.

It was shown a Boston Terrier dog, a (alleged as) "Glow," "No. 161, and was second to the dog (a (alleged as) "First Chance," "No. 165,) where we made in competition, and first in classes where this dog," First Chance, "No. 165 did not compete, and the reserve winners was awarded without my being called into the ring. But the judge marked his awards from his judging book, I protested to the judge, Mr. Freeman Lloyd, but he said it was not necessary to bring the dog," Glow, "No. 161 into the ring. I trusting you will give it your consideration, I remain,

A Special Report of The Specialty Show Shepherd Dog Club of America, New York City, Oct. 17th, 18th, 19th, 1922

By Dr. J. N. MacRae, Galt, Ont.

The Specialty Show of the Shepherd Dog Club of America held at New York on October 17th, 18th and 19th, was an unequalled success. With two hundred and six dogs actually bunched, it almost doubled any previous attempt of this vigorous Club.

The Judge, Dr. Rosebeck, Health Commissioner of the City of Hanover, Germany, was brought over especially for this Show, being recognized as one of the best workers in judging the breed. His method of judging was somewhat different than that seen on this continent before. Every dog brought into the ring was given a signed rating card, showing whether he was first, every good, good, fair or worthless. The major type of the dog received cards all over than good. In addition, the method used in the European countries of testing dog as to his courage and disposition was also in all classes except the puppies.

The huge judging-ring, 20' x 30', gave ample room to allow the general dogs, and it is only natural even realizing that this, nonetheless, the characteristics of the breed can be demonstrated. The popularity of the breed was shown by the constantly crowded condition of the Armoury in which the Show was held, the hall around the ring being three or four deep throughout the judging hours.

One noticeable feature of the results of the judging was that, with the exception of the first in dog and the first puppy bitch, that the first prize winners were black and tan in color. In the Champion bitch classes, both dogs and bitches, first, second and third, were black and tan. Dr. Rosebeck, when asked about this, said that a color had no effect taken into consideration, but that he had found that the lighter the color the

dog, the more imperfections, such as splay feet, short bones of tails, etc., were to be found.

Varieties of Animal Foods From "Kennel Secrets" -- By "Ashmont"

In solving this problem, the dog in most of course is considered, also the amount of excretion when, for instance, in the first three months, puppies are often less active than they are during the time following. Consequently, however, are they able properly to digest large quantities of meat soon after the weaning. They must be given them, lest the blood and its systems be rendered impure thereby. But as they grow older and the reverse more, and by this means remove quickly excretion, they are freed from their bodies, the proportion of meat can safely increased. Although it is not necessary that one gradually, as in this case, it will be found that the increase of required quantity of meat will be very great.

It is absolutely impossible, therefore, to find a rule to govern the proportion of meat for puppies. Considering the small amount of milk that they generally take, and the number of times they have daily, it can easily be seen that the average four-month-old puppy has already intimated, that he is to be larger where they are fed the largest breeds, provided always that there is a sufficient reason for doing so. During the early months the puppy hood, and the well established habit, the proportion should be less for smaller breeds, many of which will thrive and be healthy and strong, even in diets in which meat only appears occasionally and in small quantities.

For excess in animal food, there are fixed proportions, and under some conditions of health, the more severe, than for those of excess in vegetable foods. With little attention it will produce constipation, while in itself it is very serious matter, as will no doubt tell, than a diet of sea-ses of fish, in, for example, scurvy, or the like disease, and lessens the greatly functional action of glands and stimulates the alimentary system.

These offices have relative to the feeding two-fold as follows. 




