Meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club was held at the Club Offices, 774½ Yonge Street, Toronto, on Thursday evening, December 20th, 1923. The Second Vice-President, Mr. F. W. Jacobi, was in the chair, in the unavoidable absence of the President and First Vice-President. The Directors in attendance were:—Gen. C. M. Nelles (Niagara-on-the-Lake), Dr. J. N. MacRae (Galt), Messrs. H. M. Jackson, and N. K. Swire.

Before the minutes were read, General Nelles asked to be allowed the privilege of making reference to a circular letter which had been sent out to the members, signed E. Robertson, and which had appeared to speak disparagingly of the work of the Board of Directors during the

year, and yet asking support for nomination of himself (General Nelles) and others at present on the Board, which seemed an inconsistent arrangement, and one to which he took exception. He (the speaker) knew nothing further regarding the letter, nor of the party responsible for it being issued. Mr. N. K. Swire and Dr. J. N. MacRae also advised that they had no knowledge of the letter referred to, further than their having received a copy.

The Secretary read the minutes of the previous meeting, and on motion "The minutes were declared adopted."

The Secretary reported not having heard from Mr. Wm. Stockdale regarding the delivery of the Bulldog, "Dauntless Dan" (C.K.C.S.B. 36858). Mr. F. W. Jacobi asked to be allowed to vacate the chair, which was granted. Dr. J. N. MacRae was asked to preside and took the chair.

Correspondence from Mr. Peter White, K.C. (acting for Mr. Wm. Stockdale), also a letter and a sworn declaration in favor of Mr. James Cassina's claim for the Bulldog "Dauntless Dan." The Directors agreed to hear all three documents. After discussion, "It was moved, seconded and carried,

"That the Secretary be instruced to write Mr. Wm. Stockdale requesting him to show cause why he should not be suspended from the Canadian Kennel Club, since he had failed to observe the instructions sent to him from the Board of Directors in their letter to Mr. Stockdale, dated November 17th, 1923."

The Secretary was instructed to advise both parties that a further opportunity will be given for the further hearing of the case.

The Secretary reported that the Central Canada Exhibition Dog Show Committee had referred back to the Board the protest of Mrs. W. F. Edmondson (Montreal), who protested the dogs entered by Mr. J. R. Constantineuau (Montreal) on the grounds of "late entry." It was agreed to leave the matter on the table pending hearing from the defendant.

The Ingram-Moteleski protest was reviewed, and further documentary and other evidence read by the Secretary, when it was agreed to give the defendant, Mr. George F. Meteleski, an opportunity to produce the animal protested, i.e., "Highway Bob," at the next meeting of the Board of Directors, to be held on Thursday, January 17th, 1924, for their official inspection.

The Secretary reported that he had received application for show dates from the Toronto Kennel Club, and also from the Boston Terrier Club of Toronto, the former calling for Thursday, Friday and Saturday, March 27, 28 and 29 (if those dates were Good Friday and the dates preceding the and following that holiday), the latter calling for Good Friday and Saturday, 1924, fees were on hand with both applications. It was agreed to grant the dates Good Friday and Saturday to the Boston Terrier Club of Toronto.

Correspondence was read from the Canadian National Live Stock Records Office which showed that Mr. C. Bowerbank had accepted a fee for registration of a dog from Mrs. Harry T. Bengel, Connellsville, Pa., U.S.A., and had not fulfilled his obgigations in getting the animal registered.

The Secretary advised that he had not received any communication from Mr. Bowerbank in reply to the letter sent to him dated October 23rd, 1923.

It was moved, seconded and carrier,

"That Mr. Charles Bowerbank be suspended from the Canadian Kennel Club for his failing to comply with the instructions of the Board of Directors."

A letter was read from the Belgium

Kennels, which sought the separation of Malinois and Groenendaels in competition, and it was agreed to advise Mr. Geo. Domus that the Board of Directors could not see their way clear to grant separate classification until the breed became more popular in Canada.

The Secretary reported on the trouble with the Western Collie Club, and presented an application for affiliation with the Canadian Kennel Club and it was agreed that such recognition be allowed, commencing from January 1st, 1924.

This being the business coming before the meeting, the meeting was declared adjourned.

All Terriers Club of Canada's First Dog Show

Critique Contributed to Kennel and Bench by "Terrier."

The All Terrier Club of Canada held their first bench show at Winnipeg on Saturday afternoon and evening, December 1st, 1923. The show was held under Canadian Kennel Club rules, and with 69 Terriers benched, which gave a total entry of 212, the show receives a one point rating. The venture was undertaken as an experiment, being confined to Terriers only, and the club is to be congratulated in having brought the show to such a successful issue. Winnipeg is, and always has been, very much handicapped in not having suitable quarters for holding shows. The management of the Industrial Bureau ask such an exhorbitant fee for rent that the location of their building will not return a gate that more that meets the rental. The building chosen for this show was by no means an ideal one, but being the only one that could be obtained, it was simply a question of making the best of what one could get. Messrs. Potts, Woodend and Kynoch worked like trojans in getting up the divisions, bench numbers and otherwise making the room look like a dog show, and it is most regrettable that they had not better quarters to work in. Mr. T. P. Murray acted as ring steward in his usual capable manner -this being a feature of the show that was well served.

The awards were made by Mr. Frank Walsh, and done in a most careful manner. It would not have been a successful dog show if we had not heard any adverse opinions of the judge's rulings, but the ringside remarks were confined solely to opinions, and this we think quite legitimate. The absence of kicks was noteworthy, and this showed the good sportsmanship of all who attended.

The first breed called was Airedales,

and "Juveile" Dogs brought in a class of five. Not much quality. 1st to Mrs. Watson's "Buccaneer," just turned six months, big enough for that age, a little shelly and needs filling out. Head and front fairly good for a puppy, but weak behind. 2nd to the O'Dell Kennels, "Denny O'Dell," a sound one, but heavy all over, not the type that we prefer. 3rd to P. G. Denison's "Maplewood," good head, front and body, but moving very badly behind. Puppy Dogs found the dogs of the

former class all in and four new faces, making a class of nine. This class looked like "the goods." 1st to J. C. Woodend's "Ambleside Dalesman," a good upstanding puppy, sound as a bell, moving well, good all over, but shown too fleshy. 2nd to Geo. Kynoch's "Silverdale Authority," very much the same type. 3rd to Thos. Love's "Winfield Boy," close up. The three of them litter brothers. and not much choice, but we think "Jimmie" kept the best of them. It was surely an Ambleside class. Junior Dogs, repeat. Canadian-bred Dogs brought out only two entries. 1st to D. C. MacLachlan's "Vetquoay Nobbler," lacking terrier action, and hardly fit. Inclined to silkiness on head and ears, and a little handling might improve. 2nd to Geo. C. Harrison's "Vickers Maxim," close up. Novice Dogs brought in one new face in J. C. Woodend's "Ambleside Cragsman," a half brother to the three winners in the puppy class, and a sound one. He beats "Dalesman" in having had that extra amount of time to shape up and get set. 2nd, "Ambleside Dalesman," close up, and with lots to spare over "Vetquoay Nobbler," 3rd. Limit Dogs, one new one in, O'Dell Kennels, "Cully O'Dell." We don't like them with so much lumber, and always objected to a stocky terrier. We consider "Cully O'Dell" as lucky in having caught the judge's eye when he was distributing second ribbons, and nosing out Geo. "Silverdale Authority." Kynoch's which we like better. With the calling of Open Dogs, we looked for action, but were very much disappointed. Geo. Kynoch's "Albany Authority" being the only new entry. Well known and very much discussed. Everyone seemed to have a different opinion, and none of them covers the dog from our viewpoint. A very catchy sort, all terrier, a perfect shower, on his toes all the time, but there is a something about him that is not Airedale. We heard one man remark that it was the foreign color on his face and ears that took away from him the Airedale expression. That may be, but he will always keep one guessing, and will either get the gate on the first flight or will go to the top. We think he has improved since we saw him at a former show. H was undoubtedly the most discussed dog at the show, and everybody seemed to have a different opinion. As p terrier he beats them all, but as an Airedale Terrier we would not class

him as being "a real one." He looked good to the judge in this class, and got the blue, with "Cully O'Dell (the very opposite in type) and "Vetquoay Nobbler" following. Provincial, Breeders', and Members' classes followed, but nothing new in. Winners Dogs goes to "Albany Authority," with "Ambleside Cragsman" Reserve. Brace and Team, both classes to Geo. Kynoch and J. C. Woodend respectively., the former using "Ch. Silver Cadet" and "Ch. Silverdale Dictatress" to make his team, Juvenile Bitches called out six, four of which are litter sisters. Ist to W. H. Chadderton's "Chatrick Leeward Maid," a little ring shy and hardly fit. Not down in good shape, badly dressed, but wins the class well in hand. 2nd to Thos. Love's "Durban Belle," failing to "Maid" all over. 3rd to H. Priestley's "Strathcona Lady," close up, and of the same type as "Belle." Puppy Bitches, one new face in, and by far the best yet, as she proved in the following classes. Another "Ambleside" one, and of the same litter as the three winning puppy dogs. She hardly hit her stride in this class, it being her first appearance in a show, and naturally timid. A nice size, good foreface, little full in eye, good front, would like her a triffe shorter in back, more bone (which she may put on now that she has her growth), lots of exercise will improve her feet, and with careful handling and attention she should mature into a good one. 1st to Jas. Aflen's "Ambleside Reflection," followed by the winners in the Juvenile class. Junior Bitches, eleven in, of which four were newcomers. 1st to "Ambleside Reflection; 2nd to Geo. Kynoch's "Beaverbrook Peggy": 3rd. "Chatrick Leeward Maid." Canadianbred Bitches: 1st, "Ambleside Reflection" (more accustomed to the crowd and showing better than in her first class. 2nd to P. G. Denison's "Mapleleaf," hardly fit., Novice Bitches; 1st and 2nd, repeat; 3rd, "Durban Belle." Limit Bitches, with "Ambleside Reflection" on the bench. Geo. Kynoch's "Beaverbrook Blossom" had an easy time in catching 1st place; 2nd to "Beaverbrook Peggy"; 3rd, "Ambleside Belle," unplaced in the former class. Open Bitches, with "Reflection" again on the bench; her dam, J. C. Woodend's "Dorothea Dictator," comes in for the first time. A good, sound, hard-bitten terrier, rather handicapped in having to against youth, but, if fitted, would

make the most of them step. She did not have to do anything in this class to make her name stand out as, being the dam of the three winning dog puppies, and the best bitch (which afterwards went to Reserve for best specimen in show), she had already earned sufficient honors, and condition was a large factor in her having to take 2nd place to "Beaverbrook Blossom," with "Beaverbrook Peggy" 3rd. Winners Bitches brought "Ambleside Reflection" again from the bench and, with "Beaverbrook Blossom," made the class. We were never in doubt as to the issue, and "Reflection" wins. "Blossom" has gone back since we last saw her. With Winners Dogs and Bitches both decided, it was now in order to have the Special for best Airedale placed. Keeping "Ambleside Reflection" in the ring, her sire, "Albany Authority." was called in. We have here something of the same condition that we pointed out with respect to "Dorothea Dictator" in Open Bitches. "Authority" is the sire of "Reflection" and the three winning dog puppies. A remarkable litter. "Reflection" was tiring with the number of classes and specials that she had been called for, but beats "Authority," and is proclaimed best Airedale in show. call this a most successful debut for a budding maiden, and we hope to keep an eye on her future career.

Boston Terriers.

In all, a good showing for this season of the year. The junior classes brought out entries from the Kerr Kennels and B. George, all of which are well known and have been many Open Dogs, 15 to 20 times shown. lbs., was the best class. S. Jackson's new purchase, "Our Ping Pin," well known east and west, was placed second to the Trapystock Kennels, "Highball Kid," also well known; Winners Dogs going the same way. The Kerr Kennels had it very much their own way in the bitch classes, getting Winners Bitches with "Kerr's Little Countess; Messrs. Fulljames and Billar Reserve, with "Wheatland Shop girl." Best Boston in show to S. Jackson's "Ch. Joyces Prince" (only in for Specials), well known, down fit, and well shown.

Smooth Fox Terriers.

A small entry. Open Dogs, 1st to Sutton Kennels, "Ch. Clapton Rapture's Legacy." A snappy one, but we would like to see a little more of him. He fails in bone and substance and before the eye or foreface to the 2nd dog, "Madison Master M.," the latter being handicapped by being on

the large side. "Master M." could be greatly improved by conditioning, his being shown in full coat rather increased his size. J. M. Alldritt's "Prairie Wildfire" proved the best in bitches, the some owner's "Prairie Gyp" getting special for best puppy.

Wire-haired Fox Terriers.

With the calling of this breed we usually make ourselves comfortable and prepare for action. We did not have to exert ourselves on this occasion, nor were we at any time overly excited or anxious as to results. Just an ordinary showing all through, with nothing standing out to write home about. Junior Dogs brought the first competition with D. C. McDonald's "Dunmore Boy" and Mrs. John Forlong's "Antrim Wire Boy." Very correctly placed that way. Although "Dunmore Boy" was the best wire shown, we cannot help but congratulate him on its being his lucky day and in his catching a show where he had little to head off. Limit Dogs brought a new one in, Geo. M. Pott's "Norfolk Wire Boy," and placed 3rd to the two in the former class. Shown with almost a full coat, he was badly handicapped, as it gave him a stocky appearance. He should improve with a little handling, as he is built to stand it. Novice Bitches brought the best of them together and decided the Winners Bitch. We do not look for this decision so early in the game, as we usually expect to see some "old timer" in the open class. 1st to Hugh H. Allen's "Antrim Leading Lady," rather a badly marked one, but showing the most quality; 2nd to Geo. Humphries, "Merton Mimosa," close up, and 3rd to Geo. M. Potts, "Tynesdale Vixen," lacking in substance and head proper-

Irish Terriers.

Only three shown, Miss M. E. Elmes's "Knockrea Peggy" proving the best of the lot and annexing all the Irish specials. A good, sound, useful bitch, with lots of quality and down in good form.

Scottish Terriers.

Only two in, of which Pete Ross's "Ch. Jock McGraw" (for specials only) was easily the best.

West Highland White,

Mr. R. T. Henderson's "Dannie Deever" was alone, and went to Winners.

Variety Classes, Any Variety of Terrier.

Puppy and Novice had about the same entries in each, the Airedale "Ambleside Reflection" winning both classes, with her little brother

"Silverdale Authority" 2nd in Puppy, and the wire "Merton Mimosa" 2nd in Novice. Limit, 1st to the Airedale "Beaverbrook Blossom"; 2nd to the wire "Norfolk Wire Boy"; while the Open fell to, 1st, the Boston, "Ch. Joyces Prince; 2nd, the Airedale, "Silverdale Dictatress; 3rd, the Airedale, "Cully O'Dell."

Specials.

Best Specimen in Show found a class made up of "Ch. Joyces Prince," "Ambleside Reflection," "Ch. Silverdale "Distatress," "Ch. ock McGraw," "Dunmore Boy" and "Knockrea Peggy." It was not long before we could see that the decision would be between the first three named, and the Boston looked like the winner to us. Down right condition, good and shown well, the dog does not look his age of seven years, and has truly proven a laster. The Boston gets the award, and it takes some time to place Reserve as between the two Airedales We have already expressed an opinion on "Reflection." We have seen "Ch. Silverdale Dictatress" look better, and at times when we think she would have beaten the other bitch, but on the day we can only agree with the judge in placing "Reflection" as reserve. With this special also went the All Terrier Club Cup for best any variety terrier in show.

The specials made a most attractive list, the Boston Terrier Club of Western Canada offering their club specials as well as a large number open.

In conversation with the Secretary of the All Terrier Club, we learned that the club propose giving another show in February next, and at which the First Division of the 1923 Produce Stakes will be decided. He also informs us that the club now have a membership of about fifty. We are indebted to the Secretary for the use of his typwritten list of entries for reference.

Letter to the Editor Re Canadian Russian Wolfhounds

To the Editor of Kennel and Bench.

Dear Sir,—While carefully reviewing the pages of the Christmas number of Kennel and Bench, I must confess I was greatly surprised to find on page 30 Mr. M. M. Palmer's uncomplimentary letter regarding Canadian Russian Wolfhounds. Such correspondence appearing with your glowing tribute to "Our Old Friends" should be very acceptable as a moral to this unjust critic.

At this point I felt like offering a compliment to the journal, but, unfortunately, this letter changed my decision. I was more or less nonplussed, wondering if I had read aright or my eyes were deceiving me. I re-read the letter, and there it stood out in clear relief—one of two motives—an insult to our good Canadian Russian Wolfhounds or the effusion of a man suffering from an hallucination, and of course I am charitably enough inclined to prefer to accept the latter to be the explanation.

Let Mr. Palmer be a sportsman and tell us how often he came to Canada, how long he was there, and where did he see our Russian Wolfhounds, also how many was he privileged to see. Mr. Palmer may have made several transcontinental trips and probably seen all the Russian Wolfhounds we have, but I very much doubt the possibility.

The elaboration of those highsounding names which were mentioned in his letter can be appreciated and are well worthy of mention, but must not be allowed to becloud this issue.

From sheer curiosity I wonder what breed of dogs Mr. Palmer was scrutinizing? May I have the pleasure to inform him that Canada has had in the last two years New York Winners and Reserve Winners (Canadian Breds), such as "Ch. Morvich of Tolstoi," "Ch. Czarina of Tolstoi" and "Zorka of Tolstoi," and I think further honors can be conferred upon these dogs considering it was their first appearance on the show bench. What higher laurels can a dog obtain or is there some special award of which Canadian fanciers have no knowledge? Not being spiritualists, we do not know.

The first two mentioned dogs are now the property of the Glenwild

Borzoi Kennels, Chicago, U.S.A., also 'Int. Ch. Neva Romanoff," who, unfortunately, died just recently. In Canada we have at present "Ch. Borloff," "Ch. Nazimova," "Zorka of Tolstoi," and proud to state some very remarkable puppies from these dogs: not mentioning many others of championship calibre (ALL CANA-DIAN BREDS), and very merrily I quote "we still retain the blood lines" of these wonderful specimens of Wolfhounds, and can avoid the introduction of Mr. Palmer's "ancient type" into Canada in comparison with our "Modern Winning Type."

Would "Palmerizing" our stock with his dogs be of any advantage or improve their winning abilities? Emphatically, "No, sir," and having a correct standard to follow for the interest of the Russian Wolfhound, I am proud to stand solid for that worthy organization, "The Russian Wolfhound Club of America."

I heartily endorse the co-operation and welcome a breeder from U.S.A. for the betterment of the breed, but when Mr. Palmer asserts and causes to be published a preposterous and ridiculous letter, such cannot be tolerated by Canadian Russian Wolfhound fanciers, and he must thoroughly understand our type of dog does not require "Palmerizing" at present, feeling confident that our dogs can compete with any in America.

It is my sincere and conscientious duty as a true sportsman that I reply to Mr. Palmer's insinuating and prejudiced letter, determining to uphold the integrity of Canada's Russian Wolfhounds, and may I offer a little reminder: "Never knock before you have the hammerhead on the handle."

Toy Dogs in Cold Weather

The land is full of rejoicing and of light and mertiment. This is the time of year when all our thoughts go towards those younger members of the family that have put their stamp upon this season. To those of us whose dogs are part of the family (and what dog lover would have it otherwise) this crisp weather brings us thought for our four-footed friends. It is easy enough when the sun shines and the out-of-doors is a safe and natural place for everyone, including the youngest puppies;

The land is full of rejoicing and of That is a different matter.

Most Toy's of the dong-haired varieties, excepting King Charles, Toy Poodles, Maltese, Japanese or Yorkshires, can stand dry cold very nicely. Pomeranians especially thrive in cold weather. But here is another thing, the weather may be cold, but must not be damp. Wet feet never did any delicate or even hardy Toy any good whatever. If they cannot be kept dry underfoot they ought to be kept indoors and whatever the temperature is it must be EVEN. Evenly warm or evenly cold, but never cold then warm, warm then cold. That is what brings us such a heavy crop of pneumonia.

I am sure that if they are sheltered, Poms and Pekes that are over a year old can be kept out of doors with a cover overhead and a floor underfoot most of the winter no matter how cold it is. They can be taken for long rambles in the snow and if they are dried off afterwards and not allowed to sit and shiver, they will radiate health and vigor. Youngsters cannot always stand it, however, and dogs under a year old are far more liable to catch cold.

I have found it an excellent plan for those latter to have a light knitted sweater on when they go out into the snow and rain. Pekes, especially, need this protection, as their chests are so low to the ground and a wet chest is one degree more dangerous than wet feet for a young dog. Plenty of exercise with the proper protection even in the snow and rain has always been my rule. But I never let a dog sit out in the rain or snow, but always keep them moving briskly.

No more common or dangerous fault of management exists than that of keeping dogs in warm kitchens and in front of fires and then letting them out into the cold. Hundreds

of poor little dogs die every year from just such floolish exposure. And how unnecessary it all is. How cruel. When just a little forethought will prevent it. If your little dogs must be kept in a warm room and must be let out to exercise, put a warm sweater on them which covers the chest snugly. This will not harm the coat if it is not left on for any length of time. And when the dog comes into the house again you will find it dry and toasty underneath. Wipe off its little paws and if the weather is very cold, dry before the fire or stove.

Of course the best place to exercise dogs in wet weather is on a cover porch or veranda, where they can romp happily and not get wet at all. This applies to the Toy varieties alone and not to the larger breeds, which can, no doubt, stand the wet with greater safety. Even so I should think it the height of foolishness to whisk them in and out of different temperatures.

The food for dogs in cold weather should contain a much larger percentage of heating foods, such as the fats and meats. The addition of bacon to the dietary of the longhaired Toys proves valuable in winter time. They nearly tall enjoy it very much. Eggs are also excellent, especially for their coat-building qualities. Cod liver oil is another remarkable coat grower and bone maker, and is a very good fuel for cold weather. Care must be taken not to use too much, especially at first, as it has a loosening effect upon the bowels. Starting with an egg spoonful once a day for a four-pound Toy, the dose can be gradually increased until the dog is getting a teaspoonful and a half daily. Continue for three weeks, stop for a week, and continue another month if the dog can stand it. The use of this valuable oil depends very largely upon the constitution of the dog. Some dogs cannot digest it at all, while others thrive on it. It is being used very largely by doctors for the treatment of rickety children in connection with fresh air and sun baths, a hint dog lovers should be quick to take. For Toys the best quality of Norwegian oil is the best. The noted Scott's Emulsion is also good, but in my experience no better than the best grade of plain oil. I have not found cod liver oil foods successful in the treatment of Toys. Only the best grades of medicine, such as are used for children are fit for delicate Toys.

There is no doubt that a larger

allowance of meat is necessary for all dogs in cold weather. The juicier it is the better. For this good round steak cannot be beaten. I used to roast the dog's dinner very often in winter time and give them plenty of gravy. Raw meat is also valuable. Barley is a fine addition to the meat and vegetables. Oatmeal crackers ground up fine make a nice change. I have found that the Italian pastes in any form are easily digested and are relished by most Toys. maccaroni should not be cooked too long or until it becomes slimy. Shredded wheat is one of my standbys, as it contains all of the nourishing wheat grain and can be depended upon never to loosen the bowels. Whole wheat and graham bread are also splendid. I never give fresh bread to dogs, but always dry it well in the oven and grind it in the food chopper. It is then mixed in the whole meal of meat and vegetables. The whole served warm (never hot), well mixed and moist, but never wet or sloppy. This is not only much more economical, but also forces the dogs to eat a mixed and well balanced ration, thus preventing them from picking out the best bits of meat and leaving the rest. It is also palatable, as the whole has a nice meat flavor.

A warm breakfast of milk, malted milk or warm custard is much relished by the dogs after their cold scamper in the morning and helps to keep them from catching cold. Indeed, a drink of hot milk and a few drops of whiskey or gin (accessible in your happier clime) has warded off many a chill.

It is a mistake to consider it possible for a long-haired Toy to go all winter without bathing, as Toys need frequent baths. But it is indeed impossible and, fortunately, unnecessary, to give them the many baths that hot weather makes imperative. But they must be bathed at least every two weeks and groomed every day to keep them fit. Great care must be taken not to let the dog catch cold after a bath. I always give mine a good long scamper just before popping them into the tub and keep them indoors as long as possible afterwards. Never leave the dog one minute out of your lap until absolutely dry and groom vigorously until each hair stands separately and dry upon its back. Special care must be taken to see that the chest is bone dry. If the dog seems cold a little hot milk, or gin and hot water are excellent preventatives. Encourage

the dog to romp and play after its bath until warm and panting. Be sure to rub it briskly with the crash towel. Make it a bed near the fire and keep it in an even temperature for the rest of the day and night.

Grooming is absolutely imperative for show dogs. All show dogs ought to be in condition all the time. Some good cleansing lotion is invaluable. Even plain water works, but the addition of some softener is good with alcohol for show purposes. Sponge the dog all over until his coat is well dampened on the top. Then take the dog on your lap or on the grooming table, whichever you prefer, and rub it briskly with a crash towel. This will take off the surface dirt. Then if you wish to use any tonic such as Eau de Quinine or Danderine, rub this well into the skin and massage the dog all over. Take a good stiff brush and brush the hair the wrong way up towards the head. If you hold the coat down with one hand and pull it up with an upward motion of the other hand, you reach the skin with each stroke and lift the hair as it should be lifted. The tails of most breeds should be parted in the middle and brushed straight on each side like an ostrich plume.

Bedding must be kept particularly clean and well aired in winter, as damp, uncomfortable beds can do a lot of harm. Dry beds are of great importance in the management of Toys. They should sleep secure from dampness or draught. No one ought to leave a dog's bed on the floor, as there is a draught running along the floor in even a warm room. So all beds should be a foot or more above floor. A shelf some three feet or more from the floor is an excellent place for sleeping boxes for Toys and several of such boxes can go in a small space. Warm folded blankets in winter take the place of linen or crash towelling in summer and small cushions of cedar bedding are very warm and sweet smelling. Covers ought to be changed as often as it is necessary for perfect cleanliness. If perfect cleanliness were observed in caring for dogs' beds, insects and skin troubles would be much common.

Make your pets happy and comfortable, feed them well, care for them conscientiously and you will reap the most wonderful harvest of affection from them. How proud one ought to be of a sturdy, healthy and beautiful Toy dog! How they repay one again and again for the care one gives them. In every way it pays to attend to the details. Puppies that develop their best double their value. Show dogs in full bloom go to the top. Give yourself a prosperous New Year by giving your dogs a happy winter.

Mr. Fraser was owner of the grand headed dog, "Carr's Tags," which dog had won the Special for the best headed dog or bitch at the Show.

Gordon Smith had shown "Agawan Juliene" with considerable success, and now started in to buy some more, his most important purchase being the splendid little lightweight dog, "Lord Bell Rock," purchased from R. J. Moran, of Malden, Mass. This latter dog was destined to play an important part in building up a high standard of Bostons in Canada. His direct get with one or two exceptions were not very good show specimens, but his descen-

When the summer arrived, the Club members began to itch for a Show, so the Club held a Matinee Show at Scarboro Beach Park in August, Geo. C. Peters of Buffalo, now of Rochester, was invited to act as judge, and did his work to perfection. At this Show, the results were very much the same as at the New Year's Show. The managers at the Beach were so pleased, that they asked us to make it an annual affair. We, however, decided later to confine our efforts to the Annual New Year's Show. So right after the Matinee Show we started to work to make the 2nd Annual Show a success. During the Autumn of 1909, there was quite a lot of breeding stock imported and one or two good show specimens, among them being "Lady Bell Rock 4th," imported by Gordon Smith, also from R. J. Moran. The Club membership had grown considerably during the year, and each member was looking forward to the New Year's Show. The last day in October was decided on for the Annual Meeting, and when the time came, T. E. Milburn was elected to the Presidency, a position which he filled with great crdit for a number of years. M. A. Smith was elected Vice-President, and W. A. Little accepted the office of Secretary. Everybody got busy to help along the coming Show. Geo. C. Peters had done so well at the Summer Show that we felt we could not get a better man for the 2nd Annua! Show. Accordingly, on the 31st of December, 1909, the stage setting was ready for the second annual Specialty Show of the Boston Terrier Club of Canada.

ALL ABOARD FOR WESTMINSTER KENNEL CLUB SHOW.

By Frank F. Dole.

To the Westminster Kennel Club will fall the honor of having the first big show under the new rules reviving the 'best in the show," and the variety classes. It will also have this year the four unclassified specials which the club is permitted to offer under the rule covering perpetual specials. When the rules changed, nearly two years ago, to prohibit the unclassified specials, trophies which were to remain in competition until a certain number of wins made them the property of some exhibitor were exempted from the ruling.

The Westminster Club has four such specials. They include the James Mortimer Memorial Trophy, for the best American-bred dog or bitch: the Vermilax Cup, for the best team of four dogs; the Win Sum Challenge Cup, for the best non-sporting dog and one of his get; and the Old Guard Trophy, for members only, to the best American-bred, bred and shown by the exhibitor. Through a misunderstanding of the intent of the revised rules these specials were not offered last year, but, with the approval of the A.K.C., will go on with their existence at the coming show.

In addition to these four unclassified specials there will be the variety classes provided for by the new rules. These will be given under the group plan as outlined in the rule, printed in the report of the rules committee in the last two issues of the Gazette. The new procedure calls for five groups—sporting dogs, working dogs, terriers, toys and miscellaneous breeds. The best of each of these groups will meet to decide the "best in the show."

The Westminster Club has virtually completed its list of judges. Those who will pass on Foxhounds, Harriers, Beagles, Wire-haired Pointing Griffons, Airedales, Fox Terriers and Irish Terriers remain to be chosen. The club also has not yet designated the judge or judges for the variety classes and the unclassified specials. It is expected that the complete list will be announced in a few days with the issuance of premium lists, for which application should be made to George Gall, 66 West Fortieth Street, New York City.

The selection of Mr. Wm. Humphries to judge the Springers upsets the dope to the effect there would be no judges from across the water at the coming show. It also is of great importance to the fanciers of a breed which is just beginning to come into its own in this country. Mr. Humphries has been a consistent supporter of both field trials and bench shows, devoting virtually all of his time to Spaniels. He has been a large breeder of working Spaniels, and was one of the prime movers in the organization of the English Springer Spaniel Club, which has done more than any other organization to popularize the breed.

The Springer has come forward so recently in this country that recognized Spaniel judges were loath to undertake the task of passing on this breed. The Westminster Club is performing a real service to Springer fanciers in obtaining a recignized expert to fix the type. Under the regulations which prohibit a man from passing judgment on dogs that have been in his hands within a year, some of the best imported dogs will probably be excluded from competition, but it will be a great day for the American-bred and for fanciers here in seeing how nearly they have come to the correct type in their breeding.

EXHIBITORS, PLEASE READ THIS

When entering for a dog show do not enter your dog in the Puppy Class, unless you give the date of birth and breeder.

Sire and Dam.—These are the first essentials to be considered when entering your younger dogs in the Puppy Class.

The Junior Class calls for particulars such as date of birth, breeder, sire and dam.

Novice Dogs.—None are eligible who have won first prizes at any show under American or Canadian Kennel Club Rules, nor which do not give the name and address of the breeder and place of birth of the dog.

This information is not offered to novices only, as there are well-known dog fanciers represented in the list of cancellations shown above, and of course they should know better, and there is no honor in winning a prize that will later be cancelled. When making your entries next time, please read our Dog Show Rule XVII.

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
