

#### THE NEW CONSTITUTION.

We cannot too forcibly caution our members that it will be in their very best interest to carefully read the new Constitution as it appears in Stud Book 27, pages 5 to 17, as it is from such a perusal that they will become acquainted with whatever of new legislation became operative with January 1st, 1925. As for instance, Article 3, Sub-Section 7, which reads:—

"Any annual member who is in arrears on the thirty-first day of March of the year following the year for which he has paid his membership fee shall automatically cease to be a member, and any member whose membership is so terminated shall not again become a member unless he pays the

initial membership fee of five dollars."

Article 12, Section 1:—

"All fees shall be paid to the Accountant, Canadian National Live Stock Records, and shall forthwith be deposited by him to the credit of this club in a chartered bank selected by the Record Committee of the Canadian National Live Stock Record Board."

(Make sure that you send your membership fees to the Accountant, Canadian National Live Stock Records, Ottawa, Ont., as advised.)

Article 17, Section 6:-

"All dogs born after the first day of January, 1925, which are to be registered must be registered by the owner of the dog at the time it was born. Supplying the buyer with an applica-

tion for registration will not be sufficent within the meaning of this rule. The failure of a seller to supply a certificate of registration showing the purchaser's ownership shall be ground for his expulsion, if a member, from the club; if not a member further appliaction for litter registration, individual registration or transfer of ownership shall be refused."

See also Sections 9, 10, 11 and 12 of Article 17:—

(9) "In case a male or female is leased or loaned for breeding purposes the form of lease supplied by the Canadian National Live Stock Records must be filled in and signed by the leason and forwarded to the Canadian

## Meeting of The Board of Directors

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club was held at the Club's Offices, 774½ Yonge Street, Toronto, on Thursday evening, December 18th, 1924, at 8 o'clock, the President, Mr. Joseph Russell, presiding.

The directors in attendance included: Messrs. Wm. R. Aitken, (Montreal, P.Q.), M. Gracey, H. Clayton, N. K. Swire, (Toronto), Brig.-Gen. C. M. Nelles, (Niagara-on-the-Lake), and Col. G. F. McFarland (Toronto). The Secretary advised that the nomination hs received and tabulated in connection with the 1925 election, were on the table for the inspection of anyone interested.

The minutes of the previous meeting were ready by the Secretary, and on motion were declared "Adopted as read."

The Secretary read the following letter from the Minister of Agriculture's Office. "August 26th, 1924.

Dear Sir:-

Enclosed please find copy of the Constitution of the Canadian Kennel Club as amended at a General Meeting held May 28th, 1924, and which has been given Ministerial approval.

Yours faithfully, (Sgd.) H. S. ARKELL, Live Stock Commissioner."

The be-ribboned documents were on the table signed and sealed, as they had passed the Minister of Agriculture, and as they will be found incorporated in Stud Book—now in the operation of distribution to the members.

Mr. Wm. R. Aitken, mentioned that he had been advised that under the new dog show rules it was compulsory for show giving clubs to use the judging books of the Canadian Kennel Club, and made reference to the judging book prepared by Mr. P. E. Aird, Secretary of the Montreal Kennel Association Ltd., which was most convenient, and also fool-proof. The Secretary was instructed to secure copies of the Montreal Kennel Association, Ltd., judging book for the inspection of the Board.

A protest was filed by Mr. J. H. Marriott, Galt, Ont., and was laid on the table until next meeting, pending the Secretary securing entry forms from The Royal Winter Fair, and other necessary information.

The Secretary reported not having received full returns from the United Canine Association's Show held at Eglinton on May 9th, 1924, and read a letter that had been sent by the Association's Secretary to the member Clubs of the Association. After discussion it was seconded and carried:—

"That the United Canine Association

be given 30 days to make all necessary returns to the Canadian Kennel Club, failing which, the suspension of the Officers of the Association will be considered."

The Secretary advised that Mrs. E. Thompson, 536 Richmond Street, Toronto, had been given a signed application for registration of a Boston terrier bitch, also a signed transfer of ownership both of which had been presented to the Records Office by Mrs. Thompson and returned to her for the reason that the dam of her bitch had not been registered. This must have been known to Mr. F. Woodcock, 50 Sherwood Ave., Toronto, who had signed and issued the vouchers, which had been found of no value to Mrs. Thompson.

It was moved, seconded and carried:—
"That Mr. F. Woodcock, be given 30 days to make good his obligations in regard to the registration matters before the Board, or stand suspended until he has done so."

The Secretary reported that the monies left with him by Mr. L. L. Broley, and mentioned in the minutes of the Directors' meeting for June, 1924, had been accepted by the Boston Terrier Club of Toronto, and that both clubs had advised that they had agreed to close the matter as far as they were concerned. The Directors agreed to raise the suspension imposed on Mr. Broley at the Directors' meeting held on March 20th, 1924, and instructed the Secretary to advise Mr. Broley accordingly.



National Live Stock Records to be placed on record. The leasee will in all cases be considered the breeder of the progeny of leased or loaned females. The charge for the registration of a lease will be 50 ecnts."

- (10) "If a registered animal passes from one person to another by way of a gift on the understanding that the donor has a claim on future offspring the change of possession shall be considered to be the same as a change of ownership where a monetary consideration has passed and a transfer on the records shall be made in the usual way."
- (11) "If the sale of an animal takes place and a transfer of ownership is made on the records of the association and it is subsequently discovered that the animal sold is not the animal represented on the records, the Record Committee of the Canadian National Live Stock Records Board shall, on the discovery of the same, declare the transfer void, together with any entry or transfer of descendants of such animal and subsequent application for entry or transfer dependent on the signature of the person implicated shall be refused."
- (12) "Registration or transfer of ownership of an animal is made on the understanding that the particulars given on the form for application for registration is correct. If it is subsequently discovered that the particulars given were incorrect or fraudulent, the registration shall be suspended or cancelled by the Record Committee of the Canadian National Live Stock Record Board. Pedigrees recorded incorrectly may be cancelled and re-recorded by the owner or by the Record Committee of the Canadian National Live Stock Record Board at the expense of the original applicant for registration of the animal, but it is understood that the Canadian Kennel Club or the Record Committee of the Canadian National Live Stock Record Board shall not be held responsible for any loss or damage that may be sustained through suspension, cancellation or correction of any registration."

## Notes From The American Side

By Charles G. Hopton

IT was deeply regretted that Tyler Morse, owner of the famous "Beaverbrook" kennels which have housed many noted Bulldogs, Poodles and Old English Sheepdogs, did not meet his engagement at the Royal Winter Show in Toronto as many of the bulldog fanciers around New York were looking forward to the opportunity of interviewing Mr. Morse on his return and find out how the recent winners in the Dominion compare with our best here.

Much excitement has prevailed in New York City, as a matter of fact throughout the Bulldog fancy, as to who would judge at the coming Westminster show, the last to be held in the historical Madison Square Gardens. We have exhibited there ever since the Hempstead Farm Show, given by Messrs. Thos. Terry and James Mortimer, in the fall of 1893. It was at this show that the famous English champion, Bedgebury Lion, an all-white dog with the best cushion and most evenly balanced head of any of the early heavyweights, made his American debut, winning his classes comfortably but did not live long as he died the following year in the Munroe kennels at Morristown, owned by Thos. Holden. This was in the days of such noted imported champions as "His Lordship," "Salenia," "King Lud," "Bathos," "Wal Hampton," and others who had made their mark at the London Bulldog Club Show, held for many years

in the Royal Aquarium, at Westminster. It was at the Royal Aquarium show of 1900 that we judged the annual show and placed the then unknown "Portland" over all the English champions. One may get an idea what kind of competition prevailed here as Luke Crabtree's noted "Ch. Prince Albert," finished among the also-rans. It is pleasing to note that the judge-elect for Bulldogs at New York is our Montreal friend "Bob" Ross, who is apt to get a record entry as many of the best from the Dominion are sure to come down and the majority, if not all, of the Eastern fanciers, will support the show as the Rev. Robert is quite popular here. We all feel that a man of his varied experience will be able to sift the chaff from the wheat hence the good entry that has been promised Geo. Gall, who, as usual will take the helm.

Among the recent importations that will be seen at the Garden include a very good trio owned by Charles C. Richards, a very profound student of the breed who has kept the breed for many years in the West Indies, now located in New York City where he is quite a figure in the real estate world. At Englewood, the bitch, "Hefty Sweet Duchess," unquestionably one of the best of her sex here to-day, and

much like the well known "Ch. Oak Nana," with an improvement in bone, was best of the breed with same owner's very evenly balanced "Hefty Discovery." beating several noted importations in dogs, while at Westbury. "Hefty Brigadier," more than held his own. This trio were sent over by Mrs. Nichols. owner of the famous "Hefty" kennels in England as being the best at their age (they were still in their puppyhood) on the otherside. While lacking maturity they showed lots of promise and future shows have thoroughly demonstrated their remarkable type and soundness. "Hefty Discovery" is just out of his puppyhood but at Englewood, although handicapped by being too light in flesh he went right through to Winners and acclaimed a duplicate of the famous "Glorious Sobriquet," in type, color and markings. The accompanying picture was taken when he was fourteen months old.

The New England Bulldog Show, held at Boston had about fifty dogs, not what might have been as the judge was Daniel P. Ritchey, one of the leading lights of the Bulldog Club. Top honors went to the New York home-bred, "Sparrow Bush Sir Don," a very massive white with reddish brindle markings who has had quite a successful time at our local shows and is now a champion. He had little to spare, however, to beat the well known imported "Caulfield Billy," one of the very few available sons of the famous English champion, "Caulfield Monarch." Here is a very typical dark brindle, with a neat impressive head, well finished face, and cobby body, but his enthusiastic owner is so keen on posing the dog that both get somewhat nervous with the result that they do not make the most of their chances. However, when thoroughly fit and showing well, "Caulfield Billy" is a hard dog to beat.

We are promised a record entry in terriers at the Allied Terrier Specialty

Shows to be held the day before the Westminster, as a very good list of judges have been selected, including the well known English authorities, Mrs. "St. Margarets" Charter, who will have a remarkable entry in Sealyhams, Captain Wright of Manchester for Fox Terriers, and the ever popular Walter S. Glynn for the most important terriers including of course his old favorites, Welsh, Scottish and Airedales. We have known the Squire of "Brynhir" for over thirty years, and watched the many champions that have borne his famous prefix, including his Crufts winner of 1893, "Brynhir Bugler," down the line to the famous bitch, "Brynhir Ballad," possibly the best Welsh Terrier bitch ever benched, and have been impressed with their remarkable type and soundness. There was always a certain individuality about the Brynhirs that one could distinguish them from the others and were always in top form. While a stickler for type Mr. Glynn is keen on ring manners, and like all thorough horse and hound men knows the value of condition and soundness so any fulsome "jockeying" in the ring will not go for the Squire of Brynhir.

It is pleasing to note that Mrs. Cora Charters, who has been invited over, especially to judge the Sealyhams at the Specialty, will also adjudicate at the Westminster with such popular breeds as Griffon Bruxellois, Toy Spaniels and Kerry Blue Terriers among the breeds on her list. It should be interesting to watch her awards in the game Kerry Blues as very few of the American judges know what is wanted for no breed of terrier is so inconsistently judged as the Kerry product. At the recent Bronx show we had the pleasure of meeting a noted Irish authority, Father Daley, who pointed out that one of the most important features is the color of the gums, roof of mouth and pads, "which must be black." This carried us back to our very early days when we supposed that all terriers with a pink or spotted roof to the mouth were "half-breeds." We remarked to the reverend gentleman that much more importance to our way of thinking were type, size and small well placed ears, with a small eye which was more in keeping with "terrier" character than the large, light hazel eye so often seen in this breed.

We recall our first meeting of the Kerry Blue. It was at the Rotunda in Dublin in 1899. We were judging several breeds for the Ladies' Kennel Association and among them were Irish terriers. It was here than "Oxmanton Wonder" came out as a puppy and went right through to Winners. Our Steward was the famous expert on the Dare-devil, D. Y. Carr, who pointed out to us a big coarse dog weighing about forty pounds as a Kerry Blue, which was "excused." The owner informed us that his dog was "the gamest in the show and could eat any three of the light waisted beggars that had won." Sporting spaniel breeders in the Dominion, and they are legion, might be interested to hear that Walter Stoddard, of Mt. Kisco, N.Y. will do Cockers at the Garden. It may be recalled that Mr. Stoddard judged the American Spaniel Club show at the Waldorf two years back when the local-bred black bitch "Princess Marie" went right through to best of breed. He is a brother to Percy Stoddard, so well known in the Chow Chow and Irish Setter worlds, and quite famous in golfing circles.

Mentioning Chow Chows recalls certain letters from Los Angeles in connection with the awards made by Wm. T. Drew, in Chows at the recent Hollywood show. This was the first appearance of the "Drewstone" expert as an all-rounder and he made a name for himself in the "Celestial" breed as his award of best to a dog said to have a "spotted tongue" has disturbed a veritable hornet's nest,

and rightly so as the standard particularly says a "spotted tongue must be disqualified." It seems that a protest was lodged in the orthodox manner with a deposit of five dollars which was duly considered by the Show Committee, who, so it is said, "regretted that they could not reverse a judge's deicsion and that the one who lodged the protest must take it to the American Kennel Club." This we hear has been done and the Chow fancy at large await the rulings of the "Powers that Be." It is of much moment as far too many inconsistent awards have been made of late and if those who assume the role of All-rounder can, with impunity, disregard the standards then what is the use of showing? It behooves the A.K.C. to get down to brass tacks and emphasize the important fact that the various standards must be adhered to, whether it is the one breed specialist or the Allrounder that is officiating. We have often suggested to the Specialty Clubs to mail a copy of the standard to the judge-elect who is to award their specials. Surely no fair-minded judge would take offence at any Club mailing him a copy of the standard on which the following foot-note appears: All judges awarding the Club's specials will please adhere to the standard. He that is too old to learn should never judge. Within the last two months we have seen dogs awarded prizes, in one instance best of breed, who should have been disqualified.

One was a bulldog, the other a Toy black and tan, and one of the judges was a prominent official of the American Kennel Club. Surely such prominent folk should know that a cut tail calls for disqualification in the Bulldog and Black and Tan Terrier, hence our suggestion to the American Kennel Club. It behooves them to get down to brass tacks.

The latest news from Mr. Gall's office is that Theodore Offerman will do Airedales at New York, a very wise selection this as the "Squire of York" is one of the most experienced Airedale judges in America having kept them right from the first. Among his early champions were the famous "York Sceptre," best of all breeds at Philadelphia, 1902, "York Masterpiece," who as "Tone-Masterpiece" won hundreds of prizes in England for Mr. Elder, and many others, including the great "Prince of York," whose name appears in the pedigree of so many noted winners.

Pekingese will have Miss Janet Snow as the judge. Although the youngest judge, so far as age goes, Miss Snow, who owns the well-known "Rockholme" kennel, has had nearly ten years of experience with the "Royal Palace Dog of China," and in view of the fact that her father's world-famed Yankibourne kennel has housed more champions of international fame than any other kennel, including "Phantom of Ashcroft," "Chun Chang of Alderbourne," "Tim Yee Kung,"

"Daphnee of Ashcroft," "Moth of Alderbourne" and others too numerous to mention, her actual experience in Pekingese has been most thorough, she has always drawn good entries and proven she has the courage of her convictions. The month of January and February should be of much moment for the Pekingese as Mrs. F. Y. Mathis of "Greenwich" fame, is to do the annual show of the Pekingese Club of America, to be held at the Plaza Hotel, January 19th, when special classes will be made for Miniatures, of "Sleeve" specimens, under six pounds. It may be recalled that the "Lakebourne" kennels, owned by Dr. and Mrs. Richardson had several exceptionally good "sleeves" also the noted international champion, "Lo Hai Chi," now owned by Mrs. Murray Brooks of San Antonia. Rumour has it that several of the "Lakebourne" winners will meet at the Plaza and Westminster shows, and possibly at Newark, the popular show in New Jersey, which takes place the day following the Westminster. For this event Mrs. Sidney Franc, whose "Glen Iris" homebred have made such enviable records, is bound to attract a smart entry.

It is to be hoped that a thoroughly experienced judge will be selected for the Springer Spaniels as quite a few prominent kennels in the Dominion, even as far west as Winnipeg are anxious to compete at the Westminster. Rumour has it that the noted New York million-

#### RETROSPECTING 1924

BEFORE writing our views of the past year, we wish to extend to the Dominion Fancy, and all readers of the KENNEL AND BENCH, our sincerest wishes for Yuletide and the New Year, with the profound hope that 1925 will surpass all former years in good luck, that any home-breds will be enrolled on the list of champions and the majority of the winners at the next National Exhibition, and Royal Winter show in Toronto will be bred by Exhibitor; as a matter of fact it is our heartfelt wish that home-breds will hold their own at all the shows during the New Year, and be good enough to invade the United States and annex the coveted prize, Best in Show, where the competition is exceptionally keen.

One must not overlook the fact that the breeder is the mainstay of the Fancy and when a real good home-bred wins for best of all breeds the victory should be noted in large type, so here's hoping that Mr. Editor will have to get in an extra supply.

We have not a complete list of the shows held in the Dominion during the past year but feel positive that former records went by the board, not only in the number of shows but in the quality of the dogs. The National at Toronto was quite on a par with any of the American shows

with surprises galore as Canadian homebreds proved invincible, possibly the most gratifying win was that of the now famous Wire-haired Fox Terrier bitch, "Ch. Ormsby Lightning," who not only proved invincible throughout the Canadian circuit but has to her credit Winners at the Atlantic City show, where, under the well-known terrier expert, Mr. J. Hart of Rochester, she beat the famous English and American champion, "Chappaqua Wrangler's Peggy." Surely a great compliment to the Canadian fancy at large and a huge compliment to her enthusiastic owner and breeder, Mr. James J. Strachan, of Montreal, who we hear has several others in reserve for the coming shows by his noted international champion, "Ridgeway Dark Boy," whose record at both the American and Canadian shows, and remarkable success at stud, rates him as one of the best terriers ever imported. The fact that London, Ontario, was strong enough to hold two shows is particularly gratifying as one was given by the Ladies' Branch and right well did they manage their inaugural attempt. It is to be hoped that next May will see a repeat with an improvement in the weather and building, then all records may go by the board.

General rejoicing took place when the Government lifted the quarantine on imported dogs which should prove beneficial to the fancy at large, but fanciers

should be on their guard when buying "noted winners." All is not gold that glitters and one should not overlook the fact that many a dog has been imported on its reputation of having won over 100 firsts and specials. This is quite easy to do at the small afternoon and evening shows, but the clever advertiser on the other side does not enumerate or explain where the shows were held and what the noted winner beat. Far better perhaps if the dog had only won seconds and thirds, that is providing the shows at which it competed were of importance and one found that the dog in question had beaten some real good ones. We reiterate "all is not gold that glitters". When buying a dog from the other side do not be lead away by its scores of wins, find out in what company the wins were made, under whom, and what dogs were beaten. Then there will be less disappointments among the Canadian buyers.

The Allied Clubs of Toronto put up a remarkably good show last May with splendid competition in many breeds

As a matter of fact there were quite a few dogs who had made reputations at big American shows, finishing among the also-rans. The Pomeranian breeders must feel proud of the marked success of Canadian home-breds at New York and other prominent shows. On several occasions we have seen "Cairndhu" homebreds winning for best of breed and in the final line-up annexed the trophy for best of all Toys.

Canadian-bred Bulldogs have also been well up in the running at the leading American shows. There are quite a few home-breds north of the St. Lawrence that can hold their own with the best we have in America. As a matter of fact we question, very much, if there is a bulldog on either side of the Atlantic that can beat the Vancouver-bred "Kingsway Man O' War," and the beauty of Dr. Sleeth's remarkable dog is that he is home-bred for three generations, and his puppies show the same wonderful type and soundness. Another very impressive Canadian-bred that held his own on the American side was the well-known "Beach Park Dauntless Dan." Same owners recently purchased "St. Roche Girl Guide," who made her championship within three weeks and topped a smart entry at the Royal Winter Show is quite on a par with anything now being shown around New York. Then there are other "Hefty-Monarch" breds that can make the best of our circuit winners look to their laurels, but the greatest success has been in your Fox Terriers, Cocker Spaniels and Irish Setters. In the first named the wins of such noted Canadian kennels as the Ormsby, Bytown, and Warrior, not forgetting the Claycliffe are legion. As to the Cockers it has always been an admitted fact that Woodstockbreds, in all colors were about the best extant, though the Winnipeg-bred "Lucknow Lettery," an unknown found by the shrewd Geo. Kynoch, has made history, having won best of breed at the leading shows and several times has been acclaimed best of all breeds. Avandale-bred Springers have also asserted themselves, both on the bench and afield, which recalls the remarkable entry of Whippets we had the pleasure of judging at the Winnipeg show. It is seldom that a local home-bred Whippet is adjudged best of all breeds, but the win of Major Niven's superb black bitch, "R.A.F." was quite in order, especially so when one subsequently learned that the winner was just as good on the track as she had

proven to be in the ring. One could go on in this strain for pages, enumerating many noted Canadian home-bred winners, but the most pleasing feature of the Canadian Fancy to our mind, is the splendid co-operation prevailing from the Maritime Provinces right out to the Pacific, thanks to such profound organizations as the All-Terrier Club of Canada, and others of like calibre. Would that we had such sincere and well founded clubs in the States, then we might find "mutch moor" good fellowship at our shows. Taken all in all, the Canadian Fancy has lots to be thankful for. We will take one item, the KENNEL AND BENCH. What a remarkable improvement has taken place in this, the official organ of the Canadian Kennel Club, for which the Fancy at large should indeed feel very grateful.

# LETTERS TO THE EDITOR Toronto, Ont., Dec. 6th, 1924. Editor, Kennel and Bench,

Toronto, Ont.

Dear Sir,—As an old admirer and owner of Gordon Setters, one, if not the most beautiful of the breed of Setters, was pleased to read in the columns of Kennel and Bench that a Gordon Setter Club had been formed in Brooklyn, New York, with the object of reviving the fancy for that strain of dogs.

It may be interesting to many of your readers to hear something in regard to them. Gordon Setters are supposed to be of Scotch origin, though the fancy is not confined to Scotland alone. A large proportion of the breed are rather large, and might be considered somewhat coarse in comparison with the English Setter. The first importations were of that type. Along in the eighties, a Mr. Malcolm, living near New York, improved the breed very considerably, by breeding a strain of much lighter dogs, both in head, body, bone and with much more style and speed. They were known as the Malcolm strain of Gordons or Black and Tan

Though "Champion Blossom," im-

ported by Dr. Niven, of London, Ont., from Mr. Howard Mapplebeck of England, and whom I remember quite well was a light-built dog and on the same lines as the Malcolm standard, though none of his breeding or connection. "Champion Beaumont," whose picture I have before me, was somewhat of a heavier type. A gentleman living near New York, by the name of Dixon, if I recall the name correctly, had a grand lot, all about the same type. "Champion Becky Sharpe," owned by Mr. Lorne Campbell, of Simcoe, was a small and a very pretty bitch, and winner of many prizes.

"Forest Guy," owned by myself, was a very handsome dog, built on right lines, and was good in the field; while "Maud," another of mine, was a large and different type, being somewhat coarse, yet well bred.

To my idea the Gordon Setter or Black and Tan should not be too large, if anything built somewhat on the lines of the English, with the style of the Irish-Black and Tan; no white in color, the black the very deepest; the tan a rich mahogany. The black should not run into the tan or the tan into the black. The tan should show on lips, cheeks, throat, spot over the eyes, forelegs, nearly to the elbows, hind legs to the stifles and on the under side of the tail, but not into the long hair. Skull and head rounded on the dome, ears well let down, fairly long muzzle, lips full, good stop, eyes dark brown, clean-cut neck and shoulders, deep chest, legs, feet and bone similar to the English. but somewhat heavier coat, trifle coarse. Sincerely trust that the new Gordon Club will adopt, as they are much the handsomest, the Malcolm standard in preference to the old. heavier and coarser type.

Trusting that I have not taken too much of your valuable space with the above remarks.

## Kennel Names Forfeited

THE following list of Kennel Names have not been used by the parties in whose names they stand, in connection with registration, during the last five years, as required by Article 26, Section 3, of our Constitution, which reads:

"After the expiration of five years, a Kennel Name will be forfeited if it has not been used in a Stud Book registration by the registered owner."

We know that in some instances, a few of the Kennel Names cannot be used again, such as the celebrated Kennel Name, "Auchcairnie," which was the property of the late Mr. "Alick" Smith, and the late Mr. "Bob" S. Kellie. Both men-splendid fanciers-have gone to take their final awards from the Great Judge above. Other Kennel Names, such as "Garry," owned by Mr. A. P. Mutchmor, Winnipeg; "Brockley," owned by Mr. "Jack" C. Fletcher, Calgary, "Chesterfield," owned by Mr. Frank H. Westbury, London, etc., etc., may be considered still available, and whilst it is our intention to order the list cancelled, as it now appears, we will be loath to cancel any Kennel Name standing in anyone's name who may desire to continue under its protection. So we ask our members and readers to analyze the list, and if anyone is sufficiently interested to still hold their prefix as listed, they will so advise us at their earliest convenience, and in any case, prior to June 30th, 1924, after which date the remaining list will be cancelled, and the prefixes thus cancelled may be taken by any person desiring them at the usual rate for Kennel Names. this at New Year, as the much discussed question of type and size, with a demonstration of how to judge markings, will be the order of the day. In all, the list for the Westminster is an exceptionally good one, and in view of the fact that this is apt to be the very last dog show to be given in the historical "Garden," may we expect all sincere fanciers to attend and assist in the ceremonies, both "spiritual" and "doggerel," that may take place at the dinner of the "Old Guard," with memories of such past-masters, both as judges and superintendents, as Messrs. John Read, James Mortimer, E. M. Oldham, James Watson, Major Taylor, and others of that ilk. So let us all join hands in making the "passing on" of the old "Garden" one of much moment.

#### LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir:-

On page 69 of the December issue of the Kennel and Bench, you made a direct statement that affects every exhibitor at the recent show held by the National Kennel Club at the Royal Winter Fair.

The statement alluded to is the one regarding the English Bulldog "Prince of Wales." This dog was taken sick at the conclusion of the judging at the above named show, and the rumor immediately spread that the dog in question had been doped or poisoned. This was done by a lot of foolish people that know no better and as is always the case it did not take long for this rumor to grow in proportion.

Let me point ou that in a case of poisoning an antidote is immediately given the patient, but as the Prince of Wales was not poisoned, this was not done. What was the matter with him? That question is easily answered and Dr. J. A. Campbell, V.S., will substantiate the statement, when I say that the dog was suffering from gastritis. This is very prevalent among dogs, and is often noticeable at shows. Same can be caused by overfeeding or even giving unsuitable food. The reason you find same in a number of cases at shows is that the dogs are often overfed to get them to look their best, but is a mistake as it only upsets the stomach, and then the dogs often suffer from gastritis.

Dr. J. A. Campbell will bear me out in the statements I have herein made regarding the matter re Prince of Wales.

I trust that this letter will be placed in as conspicuous a place as possible in the January issue of Kennel and Bench, so that the cloud brought on by your unjust statement in December issue will be lifted and I fully trust that in future, that no rumors but only facts will be published in the official organ of the C.K.C.


## "Edward P" Visits the Americas


