**A GENERAL MEETING OF THE MEMBERS OF THE CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB** will be held in the Administration Building of the Canadian National Exhibition, Toronto, on Wednesday evening, September 9th, 1925, commencing at 8 o'clock. By courtesy of the Canadian National Exhibition Dog Show Committee, no judging will be done during the period of the meeting. The President and Board of Directors request a full attendance of all paid-up members at this meeting.

### NOTICES OF MOTION—IMPORTANT!

The following notices of motion have been filed with the Secretary of the Canadian Kennel Club according to the requirements of the Constitution and the requirements of the Dog Show Rules and Regulations, and they will be considered and voted on at the next General Meeting of the members, to be held in the Administration Building at the Canadian National Exhibition Grounds, Toronto, on Thursday evening, September 9th, at 8 o'clock.

The motions are as follows:—

"That, where a kennel or its, his or her agent or agents enters and shows a dog in a class recognized by the Canadian Kennel Club in which it is not eligible, such kennel or its, his or her agent or agents be debarred from competition at all shows held under Canadian Kennel Club sanction for a period of thirteen (13) months. FURTHER, that the Secretary of the Canadian Kennel Club notify the Secretary of each show or club applying for a show sanction, of the names of all kennels and persons so debarred. FURTHER, that this rule shall be made retroactive to the 1st September, 1925."

Moved by Emerson Robertson, Secretary Central Ontario Beagle Club.

"That the fees for membership be changed to read as follows: Initial membership, \$5.00; annual membership, \$3.00."

Moved by Emerson Robertson.

"That the earliest opportunity be taken for amending the Constitution of the Canadian Kennel Club to restore disciplinary powers to control offences prejudicial to the interests of the club."

Moved by Col. G. F. McFarland, 1st Vice-President, Canadian Kennel Club.

### COMPLETE MINUTES OF JUNE MEETING.

Owing to the overlooking of a complete galley, the minutes of our June meeting as they appeared in our July issue were incomplete. The complete minutes follow.—Ed.

### MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB.

THE regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club was held at the club's offices, 25 Melinda Street, Toronto, on Thursday evening, June 18th, 1925, Col. G. F. McFarland, first vice-president, in the chair, in the absence of the president, Mr. Joseph Russell, who could not attend through illness. The following directors were present: Gen. C. M. Nelles and Messrs. M. Gracey, N. K. Swire and H. Clayton.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read, and the secretary was instructed to take out the words "for the present" and to substitute therefor the words "for the balance of the year." This correction is in connection with the directors holding office in provinces where no election of directors had taken place. (Our members will kindly make this correction in their June *Kennel and Bench*.)

On motion the corrected minutes were declared adopted.

Col. G. F. McFarland submitted the following report (on behalf of himself and Gen. C. M. Nelles) on the secretary's request for various committees:



"To the Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club:

"Your committee appointed at the meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Incorporated, held on the 21st day of May, 1925, for the purpose of reporting on the suggestions of the secretary-treasurer as to the appointment of various committees, etc., submit the following report:

**"1. Committee on Kennel and Bench.**

"This committee was appointed at the meeting of directors above mentioned, and no further action is, therefore, necessary.

**"2. Committee on Complaints and Protests.**

"It is recommended that a sub-committee of the Board of Directors be appointed to investigate complaints and protests emanating from the Province of Ontario. Complaints and protests from other provinces will be dealt with by provincial committees, as hereinafter provided. This sub-committee of the Board of Directors is to report to the board. It is recommended that the sub-committee be composed of the following:

"Brig.-Gen. C. M. Nelles.

"Col. G. F. McFarland.

"Mr. Harry Clayton.

**"3. Committee to Receive Provincial Board Reports.**

"We consider that this committee is unnecessary and that these reports should come direct to the Board of Directors.

**"4. General Welfare Committee.**

"We consider that this committee is unnecessary, as the Board of Directors has always functioned as a general welfare committee.

**"5. Provincial Committees.**

"We recommend that provincial committees be formed for the purpose of investigating and reporting on to the Board of Directors all complaints, protests and other matters referred to them by the board. We suggest that these provincial committees should meet whenever called together by the chairman, at a place and time to be named by him, and we strongly recommend that the actual expenses of the members of the committee in connection with attendance on these meetings be paid by the Canadian Kennel Club, Incorporated, after submission of proper vouchers.

"As to the personnel of these committees, we recommend that each committee should consist of the five candidates for provincial directors receiving the greatest number of votes at the annual election. We further recommend that the one candidate receiving

the greatest number of votes shall be the chairman of the committee.

"In this connection it is pointed out that an amendment to the constitution is not strictly necessary, as by section 6, sub-section 5, the Board of Directors has power to appoint sub-committees for all purposes, and it is submitted that these proposed provincial board would be more amenable to the control of the Board of Directors if they were appointed under the provisions of section 6, sub-section 5, than they would be if the constitution was specially amended to provide for their election.

"For the period up to the time when the next election is held your committee recommends that the provincial committees be composed of the following:

"**Maritimes**—W. W. Laskey, chairman, Fredericton; R. H. Murray, K.C., Halifax; C. C. Sullivan, G. W. Gray, L. McC. Ritchie, St. John.

"**Quebec**—J. F. Strachan, chairman, Montreal, second vice-president Canadian Kennel Club, R. A. Ross, W. R. Aitken, W. O. Roy, Montreal; Harry Doyle, Quebec.

"**Manitoba**—George Kynoch, chairman; Major H. W. Niven, Alex. McKidd, J. M. Alldritt, R. P. Biller, Winnipeg.

"**Saskatchewan** — C. S. Keating, chairman; Norman MacKenzie, Regina; Dr. J. T. Cooper, L. W. Berry, Saskatoon; J. A. Newman, Regina.

"**Alberta**—L. H. Cooper, chairman, Calgary; H. A. Kidney, Edmonton; E. D. Adams, W. H. Pymm, J. M. Miller, Calgary.

"**British Columbia** — Dr. T. E. Sleeth, chairman, Vancouver; Bert Pritchett, Victoria; N. McConnell, North Vancouver; Fred. Wilds, Vancouver; P. R. M. Wallis, Victoria."

It was moved, seconded and carried "that the report and recommendations as submitted by the committee be adopted."

The secretary submitted the following revision of advertising rates for the official organ, Kennel and Bench:

After discussion, it was agreed to

change the charge of \$2 per columnar inch to \$1.50 per column wide inch. It was also agreed that a classified department be opened, the rate to be 3 cents per word, and that no advertisement be accepted for less than \$1.

It was moved, seconded and carried "that the revised schedule of advertising rates, as amended, be adopted, and that the increased revenue be used in improving the official organ, 'Kennel and Bench.'"

A letter was read from the Central Ontario Beagle Club, intimating that it was the intention of that club to hold a field trial for Beagles on Hare, and pointing out the necessity of the adoption of rules covering the trials, and setting forth the differences between Hare Trials as compared with Cotton-tail Trials, and submitting a set of rules which had been prepared. The letter further intimated that it was the club's desire to have the bench show enlarged to include Beagles and Foxhounds. It was pointed out that several championship points could be obtained at the larger all-breed dog shows, where only a few dogs were benched, and that only one championship point was procurable at a Specialty Show where less than fifty dogs were benched. The secretary was instructed to advise the Central Ontario Beagle Club that they prepare an amendment to the Dog Show Rules covering their requirements.

A letter from Mr. C. L. Hackett, Montreal, was read, which, in part, asked for rulings on the following matters:

1. Whether, by removing my two dogs, under the above mentioned circumstances, I have incurred any penalty under the rules of the Canadian Kennel Club, and, if so, under which rule?

2. Whether the employees of the Montreal Kennel Association are warranted by any rules, of any association or club, in committing actual assault, in that they not only forcibly laid hands on my dogs when held in leash by my wife and self but also laid hands on my wife's person in their endeavors to prevent her egress from the building.

The secretary was instructed to advise Mr. C. L. Hackett as follows:

"Query 1. It was agreed that no notice could be taken of the ticket privileges for the purchased ticket. That there should have been no restrictions imposed on the exhibitors' pass, it being a season ticket for the show. It was further agreed that you were in error in endeavoring to take your dogs out of the building, but that no penalty was being incurred for the reason that no complaint had been lodged against you for so doing.



"Your query No. 2. It was agreed that this matter did not come within our jurisdiction. Therefore, we take no action regarding it."

The secretary reported that he had advised Mr. James Cassina regarding the pleasure of the Board of Directors as expressed at the May meeting by letter dated May 23, 1925, and again by registered letter dated June 12, 1925, and for which an acknowledgment of receiving was held, but that he had not heard from Mr. Cassina in reply.

And it was regularly moved, seconded "that Mr. James Cassina be notified that unless he makes reply in accordance with the letters sent to him dated May 23, 1925, and June 12, 1925, on or before July 15, 1925, that he will be liable to suspension at that meeting."

# NOTES FROM THE AMERICAN SIDE

By Charles G. Hopton.

THE remarkable consistency of the wins made by the popular Sand Spring Farm Cockers, owned by that enthusiastic fancier, Mrs. S. Y. L'Hommideu, Jr., of Morristown, New Jersey, recalls the fact that the forbears of many of America's famous Cocker Spaniels were bred around Woodstock, Ontario, which used to be the Mecca of all the knoing ones when looking for typical specimens, either for show, or for breeding purposes. This was in the days of dear old George Douglas, George Bell, "Pop" Dunn, and others who relied on the now much sought Obo blood to produce their Toronto and Westminster winners. These old time fanciers would have taken especial delight in the latest sensation, the famous black dog, Ch. My Own Desire, as he is a replica of the Obo type, with ideal neck, placed in perfect shoulders and the best moving quarters possible, in all an ideal Sport Cocker around 23 pounds with power enough at both ends to carry him all day afield. It is this sound, free-moving stamp of Cocker, one able to find and retrieve birds, that Mr. and Mrs. L'Hommideu have sought to form the foundation stock of their now popular Sand Spring Farm kennel, and the success of home-breds at recent shows prove that the blood lines and type of their dogs are quite the best extant. Recent shows have found three out of the four winners going to Sand Spring Farm with Ch. Lucknow Lothario, topping the parti-colors, then came the very impressive home-bred, Sand Spring Storm Cloud, best in bitches, with the black champion, My Own Desire winning for best of breed, and much fancied for the subsequent Unclassifieds. In view of the fact that the "Squire of Midkiff" unquestionably one of the most able authorities on the breed has placed My Own Desire best of breed and at the head of the Sporting variety group, one may know that the Specialty winner of 1924 is right in the very front rank and a much improved dog since the Waldorf show, where as an immature debutant he went right through his classes to best in show. It is much the same on the coast as one finds the free-moving Cocker invariably tops the lot, and on looking into the breeding, the Ontario Obo-breds are the foundation stock, hence the oft re-

peated remark, if you want the right type of Sporting cocker you must get the Canadian-bred stock.

"To be or not to be," is the question uppermost in many of the Shepherd Dog fanciers nowadays, as the remarks alleged to have been made by the noted German expert, Mr. Otto Kaempfe, when judging at the recent Specialty show of the German Shepherd Dog Club, leads one to believe that unless exhibitors on this side of the Atlantic follow more closely the methods used by the German breeders our home-breds will not stand a chance with the imported dogs.

"SHEPHERD DOG NOT A KENNEL DOG," this famous authority from Germany is said to have remarked and then went on to say: "The faults that we have eliminated for the im-

ported trained Shepherds then one feels like taking more than the average "pinch" of salt with the statement that there are no Shepherd Dog kennels in Germany, that the dogs are treated as one of the family. It was the savage manners of the so-called "trained" dogs imported from Germany and the mode of judging by the noted German judges, imported to demonstrate how the breed should behave in the ring, that brought about the term "Wolf" dog, and the feeling of terror that overcame one when going down the Shepherd Dog aisle, the majority of dogs being wired in and jumping at passers by as though to tear them to pieces. One recalls quite clearly the vogue that followed the judging at the Specialty in New York by Dr. Roesbeck. No dog got a

prize under this much lauded authority unless it could stand the attack of the Doctor who wielded a heavy cane at the dog and cuffed it with his book, showing that the most paramount features in a Shepherd Dog were courage, aggressiveness and suspicion. This may be quite all right in Germany but on the American continent this sagacious dog is more appreciated as a real house pet and companion, one that will guard its master against intrusion but not be so suspicious and aggressive that a stranger may not approach it, or pass it by on the street without a snarl and manner that at once creates fear. Taken as a whole, the entry was not what was expected for such a great expert who kept to type,

provement of the breed in Germany exist here. The American breeder has not paid enough attention to developing the mentality of his dog, nor does he give him sufficient exercise to improve his construction and muscular condition. I judge this by the number of soft, flabby muscled dogs that were shown to me. The Shepherd Dog is not a kennel dog. In Germany we have no Shepherd Dog kennels. They are the house and home dog and are treated as one of the family. Until the American breeder adopts this method he cannot hope to compete successfully with the imported Shepherd."

There is more truth than poetry in what Mr. Kaempfe says about the soft condition of the dogs now being shown but if one is to judge by the suspicious, aggressive deportment of

accepting the modern angulation with its exaggerated "spring" of pasterns, and length of hocks so strongly apparent in the much boomed "Int. Ch. Cito Bergelust, Sch. H., etc., a much improved dog since his first win at New York when he was decidedly immature, and weak in pasterns and hocks, at Belmont Park he was in rare form and rightly best. It was no easy win, however, as the very impressive "Int. Grand Champion" Friedrichsruhe Aribert von Saarland, and the noted English winner Alf von Tollensettel, had many admirers. As a matter of fact many thought Aribert, a very sound and symmetrical son of the famous Grand champion, Erich von Grafenwerth, might have gone through to Best in Show, having the pull in shape and carriage of ears and bone. The pick in bitches, that is the regular



classes which must not be confused with the class for champions, went to the very typical home-bred, Zelberta of Joselle, not pleasing in color being more on the brindle, than tan markings. This stylish daughter of the great Ch. Dolf of Joselle, has much improved since the Baltimore show where she beat a smart lot. While decidedly on the "modern" type, with marked angulation she is sound with perfect shoulders and enough strength at pastern and in hocks to remove any question of sound action, her long, free stride reminds one very much of her noted sire. Best of the also-rans was Anka von Springeberg, the more pleasing in color, and possibly the heavier in bone but not quite so clean in skull or shoulders as the Joselle home-bred who was somewhat lucky to have been awarded the special for second best bitch. Here was a decided error in not bringing in for competition the noted Californian champion, Graustein Gilda von Doenerhof, who had made the going very interesting for her half-sister Irma von Doenerhof, in the Champion class, a keen struggle this with mighty little between them. However, the Hoheluft champion won the imposing rosette for best of her sex, for the subsequent special donated for second best bitch both the Winners bitch and second in the Champion class should have competed but by some regretted mistake this competition was drawn blank as only Elberta of Joselle was brought in. It was a veritable "field" day for the Hoheluft kennel owned by John Gans, Jr., as the title of "Grand Champion" went to Cito Bergeslust, also the Opposite Sex Challenge Trophy, awarded to Irma von Doenerhof, while the Puppy trophy was a clever win for the Cosalta kennel owned by Miss Marie Leary, whose striking home-bred Lio of Cosalta, by Ch. Iso von Doenerhof, was acclaimed best of the debutants. The trophy donated by Miss Anne Tracy, a most sincere Secretary and one to whom much credit is due for the popularity of the breed, for best dog or bitch bred by exhibitor went to the winning bitch, Joselle Zelberta of, then came a keen struggle for the Secretary's trophy for best dog or bitch having been placed at a recognized Field Trial, where at least two dogs have competed, the winner was Etzel am Lump, which was placed second in the big limit class to Brado von der Wesermunching, with a very impressive home-bred son of Erich von Grafenwerth, Hamilton Hettle von Grafenwerth, a close third. In a very interesting show but one feels justifi-

fied in expressing the sincere wish the paramount features of this sagacious breed to be considered by judges will not be the muscular condition and aggressive manners, but a more pleasing disposition, one combining courage with marked soundness and docility, then the Shepherd Dog is apt to become one of the most popular companions and guards extant.

Another imported breed that is causing a deal of comment as to type and "modern" angulations is the sagacious Doberman Pinscher, a much improved dog since his early appearance when the Jaeger kennels at Rochester, N.Y. used to show a string of erratic black and tans that were decidedly on the so-called "TRAINED" order. To such an extent had this fulsome "training" been carried that they were suspicious even of their handler and would attack the judge or onlookers if the least excitement presented itself. However, thanks to such enthusiasts as Messrs. Fleitmann, Mohr, Earle, Staines, McLaughlin and others who have imported noted champions of the decidedly angular type with docility personified, the breed is now quite popular and asserting itself when it comes to the subsequent groups and specials, as it rightly should being a very impressive breed, not only for its splendid type, symmetrical lines and manners, but because it compares most favorably with any of the terrier breeds in soundness and beautiful conformation, then again, its distinctive color and markings, ranging from the blue with tan markings, rich brown with tan markings and the impressive Manchester colorings it immediately catches one's eye and is surely making its presence felt when in competition with other breeds.

For a time the more compact and somewhat heavy skull and shouldered type was popular, but with the appearance of the now famous "Königstad" strain, which had won international champion honors in Holland, Germany, Switzerland and Austria, later to top the lot in America and in Canada, thanks to the sincere efforts of the noted Westphalia kennels at Imbrook, N.Y., the modern type is rightly invincible. The remarkable wins for best of breed, best in the group, and later best of all the

Working breeds at New York, Boston, Hartford and other prominent shows on the circuit by the noted brown and tans, Ch. Westphalia Princessen Ilisia of Königstad, Prince Favorite von Königstad, the famous Ch. Claus von der Spree, alike as peas in a pod, and later the sensational wins of the splendid Detroit home-bred, A. Metzle of Pontchartrain, one of the best yet to be produced in America and a duplicate in type and color of the sire, Claus von der Spree, which so far has had an invincible career, impresses one that the Doberman Pinscher has come to stay and should run the much lauded Shepherd Dog a mighty close race as the Ideal Police Dog, or man tracker. While the type should not be too much on the greyhound order, the top line should be short, with decided angulations but they should cover lots of ground, with clean skull, lots of power before the eyes, with a long, clean neck placed on sloping shoulders and deep chest, while in loin, and quarters should be heavily muscled with that long, free stride so essential in a dog that must have speed and power personified. It is sincerely hoped that Mr. Glenn S. Staines will show his splendid Pontchartrain home-bred at the eastern shows.

#### THE SILENT WHITE BULL-DOGS.

Mr. Wm. A. Richards, proprietor of the "Silent White" prefix, is always active in the production of "Sour Mugs," and it is his intention to use the now famous sires Ch. Dauntless Dan, and Ch. Kingsway Man O' War, with a view to producing something to come out right on top of the lot at future shows. This is as it should be. Here in Canada we have Bulldogs that are capable of facing the very keenest competition that is being offered at the shows on this continent. So why not have their blood to blend with the best blood of the best bitches. Mr. Richards is a wise old fancier, who believes it to be a good plan "to have the eggs in different baskets," and so uses all the best stud forces available.

#### SOMETHING TO SHOOT AT.

When the Whippets meet now they will have the mark set up by Mr. John Matthews' speedy little dog, Foothill Sloe Eyes, which is eleven seconds flat for the usual 200 yards, and thus taking the former high record set up by the Canadian "long tail" Man O' War, down a peg. The timers were experienced motorcycle speed cops trained to make the most of the "seconds."

# HINTS FOR THE NOVICE

By Lillian C. Raymond-Mallock, England

THE dieting and care of young puppies is a matter which should be carefully considered by the novice, as a step in the wrong direction or a wrong method will take considerable time to eradicate, and much valuable time will be lost before a right start is made.

Experience is, of course, the best teacher, but it is sometimes very costly, as it was in my own case when I first took up the fascinating "hobby" of dog breeding.

The fundamental points should be acquired through careful study of well chosen literature, of which I am glad to say there is a fairly liberal supply at the moment, and the rest must come through experience. It is impossible to learn everything from books, no matter how deeply they are read, but a great deal of help, and many valuable hints can be and are obtained through them, and the aim of this little article is to help those who may not have been fortunate enough to have acquired their "first lessons" elsewhere.

There are three important factors to remember in rearing stock of any sort, and these are specially applicable to highly bred aristocrats of the canine race, viz., clean food, clean kennels, clean beds. If these three details are beyond approach, your puppies will have clean skins, clean habits and a clean bill of health. Neglect them and you are asking for trouble from the very start.

It is a mistake to think that Toy Puppies will thrive on any sort of food provided they get plenty of it. Never was there such a fallacy. Pekingese in particular require very careful dieting on account of their great bone and substance in comparison to their size and bone-forming. Food must be selected which will give plenty of nourishment without adding too much to their "bulk," if I may use such a term. Slops are injurious. They cause "pot bellies" and indigestion, and eventually, loss of condition. I am a great believer in meat as a staple food for dogs (mutton or beef for choice), minced very fine and mixed with stale brown bread or toast crumbs, or some well known puppy biscuit broken up and put through the mincer. I advise giving two meals a day of this mixture, to young puppies, and at least one meal a day of finely cut up raw beef. The best cuts of shin of beef will suffice for those who cannot afford steak, but it should be borne in mind, that one ounce of really good meat is better for the

puppies than two of an inferior cut. And this is where I think many people go wrong. They do not realize that it is quality, and not quantity which counts on these occasions. A Pekingese puppy's stomach is only about the size of a pigeon's egg, and to cram it full of food simply means that it will become distended and cause discomfort to the unfortunate infant which, in nine cases out of ten, will culminate in diarrhoea, indigestion or possibly cramp. Let me impress on the beginner that it is a mistaken kindness to give too big meals. Little and often is a very safe rule to begin with. The puppy which looks a shade thin may in reality be much more fit than those which have "pot bellies" and flabby condition. There is nothing like raw beef to build up the tissues and to put stamina into a delicate constitution. It is not heating to the blood. On the contrary, it is the food prescribed for dogs suffering from eczema and skin trouble. It does not cause unpleasant breath. The cooked meat may do so, and I think that the novice sometimes gets confused between the two. Well boiled sheep's paunch cut into small dice makes a capital meal and should be given at least twice a week to puppies for medicinal purposes, as it has rather a relaxing effect upon the bowels and is much safer to give to puppies than liver, which adult dogs enjoy so much and which helps to keep them regular in the same way. Sheep's paunch is absolutely non-heating, and is the lightest and most easily digested food known. It is one of the very best foods to give a dog recovering from gastritis or any stomach trouble. Tripe is merely dressed "paunch" and is the next best thing. Well boiled fish or rabbit and a milk pudding are good occasionally, as they make a change from the daily meat diet, but I do not care for too much milk in any form, and it should be used sparingly in cases of eczema. A hard-boiled egg chopped up very fine, is most nourishing and very binding, and should be given as well as scraped raw beef; gelatine and arrowroot biscuits to puppies suffering from diarrhoea; "Marie" Biscuits or Freeman's Rusks make an excellent "dry" meal, and also "Hard Tack" for the older puppies. A large round bone should, of course, be given to them occasionally. It amuses the puppies and helps to cut their teeth, but I think it best to separate them when giving bones to avoid a fight and any consequent damage to the eyes.

It is impossible to lay down any hard and fast rule with regard to the quantity of food which should be allowed to each puppy. They vary so enormously in size and temperament, that a good deal must be left to the common sense of their owner. However, as a rough guide, I should advise a dessertspoonful of the food mixture for two meals a day at six weeks' of age, and a teaspoonful of scraped raw beef for two more meals, varied occasionally with the other foods I have mentioned above, and only a small drink of milk. As the puppies grow older the quantity of food must be increased and the number of meals lessened, until at six months' of age, they will do well on two meals only.

Some puppies are "good doers" from the start, whilst others do not thrive at all. Such cases require great care, and a proper diagnosis of the cause.

This may prove too much for the novice, but he can at any rate, try his hand before calling in a vet. Worms or a bad digestion are usually the seat of such troubles. I am not fond of dosing young puppies for worms, and firmly believe that worm medicine has killed more puppies than it has ever cured. Still—there are times, when it must be given, and if so, the following is the safest and best I know:

## Worm Prescription

Santonine ..... 1 scruple  
Liquor Senna Dulc ..... 1 oz.  
Glycerine ..... ½ oz.  
Syrup Aniseed ..... 3½ oz.  
Shake the bottle well. Dose—15 drops at 5 weeks, and 30 drops at 6 weeks. Increase as the puppies grow older.

If the trouble is not worms, there probably is something wrong with the digestion, and for this I advise a small pinch of the following, twice or three times daily after food:

Bicarbonate of Soda ..... 1 part  
Bismuth ..... 2 parts

Mix and give either in milk or dry on the tongue. It is perfectly harmless and cannot hurt the youngest puppy. Half a grain citrate of soda tablet crushed and given twice daily after food is also good and is largely used for human babies. A course of Parrishes Chemical Food or the good old Benbow's Dog Mixture would be beneficial to follow on with. There is much more I might say on the subject of "Bad Doers," but I hope to devote a whole chapter to it shortly, so must not say any more now. It is a big question, and one which cannot be passed by lightly. In the beginning of this article I mentioned that clean food was necessary. By that I



mean immaculate feeding utensils, and absolutely fresh food, which should never be left lying about for the pup to finish up at his own convenience. If he does not eat his meal within a reasonable time, it should be removed, otherwise it may become sour or fly blown, and cause endless trouble. Feeding is a matter of habit, and puppies can be trained to eat their meals at stated intervals, just as they are trained to do anything else. The pup which is fed at any time, or those fed on slops will never look as "sleek" and well as those which have good wholesome meals at regular hours and always in the same place. Puppies, like babies, require method, and they thrive all the better for it. I have really overstepped my space, so will have to stop now, but will continue this topic next month.

#### PLACING THE SPECIAL?

This really happened. She was—and still is, of course, a very nice lady; almost an old lady but not quite. And she was extremely interested in Boston terriers, though just a novice in the breed. She owned a couple of puppies and she entered them in one of the late spring shows—or perhaps it was one of the summer shows, it doesn't matter which. Before the show she had been asked to donate a special prize—and like some ladies donated a prize so that one of her best friends, also a lady Boston fancier could win it. The prize read for best heavy-weight dog—and as her friend's dog had been winning the heavyweight classes at all the recent shows she thought for sure the prize would go to her.

But as she sat around the show ring and heard the "doggy" talk her confidence began to slacken a little. Perhaps her friend wouldn't win at all. From what she heard judges were pretty tricky fellows—and some of them weren't any too competent. There was that judge at one of the Western shows for instance, who excused himself for putting an Eastern winning Boston down because he said she had a front like a fox terrier—and here everyone in the east has been trying to breed Bostons with fronts like fox-terriers for years. That was just one of the things she heard—there were many other similar little things. Yes; she decided judges weren't to be altogether depended upon.

Sure enough at this show her friend's dog went second to a dog he had always beaten before—and the special prize went to the outsider.

Our heroine—she really was a heroine to do what she did—did a

little thinking. She had the prize right there with her, but before she handed it over she was going to do some judging of her own. So she postponed the presentation until some days after the show. Then she went to the home of the owner of the other dog, and told them she had come to give the prize, and before she gave it wanted to see the dog. They brought in the dog. The lady started in to judge it—she went over it, point by point she scored it in her own mind, using her own interpretation of the standard, no doubt. So far so good, but a little farther not so good, and farther on still very, very bad. The poor dog had no teeth, they were all torn away. "Aha!" she cried in the voice of a great discoverer. "No teeth!" But the judge's decision was final, she knew, so she handed over the prize, and this was her presentation speech: "The judge gave you this prize, but you didn't deserve it, but I have to hand it over to you anyhow, but I think it's disgraceful that my good special prize was won by a dog that wasn't 'all there.'" Oh me, oh my, wasn't she a heroine—and how glad we all should be that every donor of a special prize doesn't do that. But anyway, this lady—and she's a dear soul in spite of it all—satisfied herself that some judges really are "the bunk."

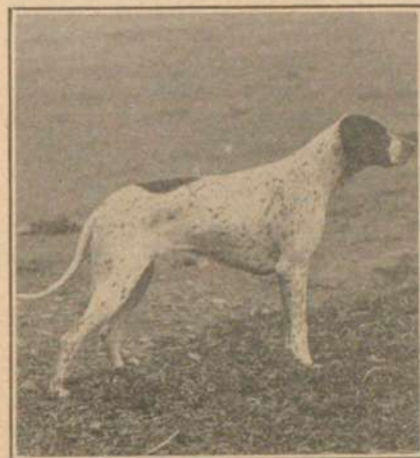

# History of the Boston Terrier Club of Canada

**M**ONDAY, January 2, 1922. The stage all set for the fourteenth annual show. All real annuals, too! No breaks. Just as sure and certain as New Year's Day comes around just so sure and certain there was a Boston terrier speciality show. The judge for the fourteenth annual was the old reliable John Dietschler, of Buffalo. What better judgment could anyone ask than that of Mr. Dietschler? Mr. Dietschler had been successfully breeding, showing and judging Boston terriers for just about the fourteen years that our club had been in existence. His years of experience had stamped him as competent. However, there is always a fly in the ointment, and this time it was a fly blister and several different kinds of ointment which, as per the doctor's orders, were applied to me. In fact, to speak plainly, I had contracted some infection in my leg, and at the time of the show was flat on my back in bed. So, for the first time, I was forced to miss the great annual show.

But there is a rift in every cloud. My home was only two blocks from the Labor Temple, where the show was held, and as I was in first-class trim other than being unable to walk, my enforced absence from the show was more than made up to me by the steady stream of visitors. When they found I was not on hand but not far away they came up immediately to see me, and it sure was a great pleasure to find I had so many real friends among the dog fanciers.

This show, like most of its predecessors, brought out some new ones which were destined to make Boston terrier history. The puppy class (male) was headed by L. L. Broley's O Pal King, with H. M. Jackson's Jackson's Teddy second and F. R. Elgie's Cherokee Chief third. Canadian bred was headed by Joyce's Major Buttons, owned by H. R. Joyce; Day & Cliffe (Hamilton), Oxonian Vamp, second, and A. E. Carter's Lloyd George third. The limit and open lightweights found R. A. W. Rastall's S. D. Gus on top, followed by Oxonian Vamp and John Schaefer's Periscope third.

Novice middleweight produced Our King Pin, a recent importation of Lewis & Brown; second was the same owners' Our Bob, and third was Major Buttons. The limit was a repeat, but the open saw W. L. McGill's Little Colonel move up to third place, with Major Buttons reserve.

The heavyweight class was headed by Mrs. W. C. Ingram's McLelland's Dandy. G. R. Clark's Woodland Arrow was next and W. A. Currie's Doidge's Pride third.

H. R. Joyce's Perfect Lady was first in puppy and novice lightweights, R. G. Long's Tony Lady running second and R. A. W. Rastall's S. D. Happy Girl third.

Open lightweight bitches went to Ingram's Lady Bird, owned by Mrs. W. C. Ingram. This beautiful little bitch also went to winners and afterwards made her championship.

Middleweight bitches novice went to William Anderson's Anderson's Daisy. R. A. W. Rastall's S. D. Flossy was second and Charles Holmes' Lassy Pride third. Limit and open middleweight were headed by A. Gascoyne's Lady of Honor, with the others as placed above.

The show over, it was up to me to get better. This I succeeded in doing. It took a little time, but what of it?

The show produced a little profit and everybody was cheerful. The club continued to gain new members and also to lose some of the old ones, as at this game there is always a number dropping out.

The dogs brought out at this show continued during the year 1922 to top their classes, in most cases. After the middle season (which includes the Canadian National Exhibition) was over the officers and members turned their thoughts to New Year's. The question, Will we hold a show? was never asked; that was a foregone conclusion.

The annual meeting took place in the last part of October, and the following officers were elected: Honorary president, F. E. Milburn; president, W. C. Ingram; vice-president, John Schaefer; secretary-treasurer, C. L. McQuillan. L. L. Broley was appointed as show secretary.

It took a lot of time and a lot of battling to decide on a suitable judge. However, the selection finally fell on Mrs. M. C. McGlone, of New York. This decision was a ten-strike, as Mrs. McGlone had come to be recognized as one of the foremost Boston terrier breeders and exhibitors in the world. The entry was a splendid one. The Labor Temple was again the scene of battle. So, on January 1, 1923 (New Year's Day), all was in readiness for the fifteenth annual Boston terrier speciality show given by the Boston Terrier Club of Canada.

## DOGS OF ALL NATIONS TO GATHER AT PHILADELPHIA

The American Kennel Club plans an international dog show as a part of the Sesqui-centennial, it was learned after a visit of a committee representing that association to Philadelphia.

The committee conferred with Mayor Kendrick and other officials of the Sesqui-centennial, particularly with Judge J. Willis Martin, chairman of the Committee on Athletics of the Sesqui-centennial. It is proposed to class this dog show as a part of the athletic and sport program of the Sesqui. Dr. George Orton, director of athletics for the Sesqui, who is assembling and co-ordinating the sport events programmed for the Sesqui, was also in conference with the kennel club committee.

The American Kennel Club plans to offer \$20,000 and more in prizes for the best dogs in the world. Every breed of dog known will be listed.

Judge Martin some time ago appointed a committee in charge of kennel events for the Sesqui, which is headed by J. Sergeant Price, the other members being Dr. Henry Jarrett, Russell H. Johnson and William Whitten.

The kennel club committee conferring here is headed by Dr. John E. DeMund, of New York, with Messrs. Price and Johnson as its other members. This committee will report to the executive committee of the American Kennel Club at its meeting on July 21, at 221 Fourth Avenue, New York City.

## SOME ALBERTA NOTES.

In a recent article our "Peg" friend, George Kynoch, made two statements, which in justice to our Calgary members require a little explanation. One was that the Alberta Kennel Club requires fresh blood. The other that the dog show building is too hot. We will deal with the latter first, George has said it. The only thing to cause surprise is the mildness of his words. Hoot! Any exhibitor who has attended the annual show for the past three years is fully acclimatized for whichever place he may be called upon to occupy in the next world.

In his first statement, I am sure our old friend does not intend to cast any reflections on the present supporters.

There are perhaps too few like Messrs James Cooper and Miller, W. G. Climo, Bert Payne, Jack Fletcher, etc., who are giving freely of their valuable time and money to further our dog's interests.

What seems lacking in Calgary is sufficient support and sympathy from the general public.

For instance: Quite recently there have been two suggestions before the City Council to prevent dogs running at large and to charge (\$10) ten dollars for a dog license.

Needless to say, there had been much discussion in the press, and it was delightful to see that the first champion in behalf of the dogs was a school girl of ten years. For the objection to dogs was started by a prominent local K.C., who complained that they made the school playgrounds their places of amusement, also that they were a danger and a nuisance to the pupils, and some thousands of them should be destroyed.

If this is really the case, what a reflection on Calgary citizens! After all, DOGS ARE WHAT WE MAKE THEM. Would it not be a good idea for a well-bred dog to be kept at every school, as a mascot? Shady individuals could not then molest infants leaving school, as was the case with a London, England, school a few years ago. A study of the various breeds and their uses might also be added to the curriculum with advantage. There is another side, too. A dog-sleigh race from Calgary to Banff during the latter's carnival has been proposed. The Sportsmen in Calgary immediately put up \$500 cash, thus making the race possible. It is to be run on February 3rd, and some good teams have already entered.

Have any of my readers who ski find using a couple of wolfhounds in conjunction? Hitch them single file with long traces for the wheeler; all you

need besides is your brake-pole. Next to broncho busting, it is the most exhilarating of sports and should become a feature at race meets. By the way, it was only as far back as 1903 that the writer introduced ski running to Toronto, having first acquired the sport in Norway. A sawmill owner on Adelaide St. W., kindly cut me a pair from an ash plank, possibly the first pair made in Canada. The following year there were almost as many around the city as there were dogs.

## WOLF, IN THE LIBRARY?

This is the day of the wolf. He was featured more or less in all Ontario newspapers this spring. Last fall we had a genuine specimen in harness with a husky team in Toronto. The new—to Canada—Shepherd Dog is known as the Wolfdog in England, and whilst these may all be honest-to-goodness Wolves in their own sphere, the Wolf that we write about now is the little fiery red-gold Collie that his master, Albert Payson Terhune, has crowned with the following garland: "My book is dedicated to the memory of Wolf, a gallant little collie—and my chum."

That's just like Mr. Terhune, and no doubt "Wolfie" was really and truly his master's chum. Terhune, in his usual masterly fashion, has given us a new book, made up of seven chapters, under the following captions: 1, His Off Day; 2, His Friends; 3, Trapped; 4, The Kidnappers; 5, Portia and a Bone; 6, The Mystery-Show; 7, The Last Adventure; and each of the sections could easily be considered complete in itself, and yet the book also reads like one grand, glorious story that any dog-lover would just like to devour time and again with—shall we say?—wolflike greediness.

Poor little heroic Wolf has his full share of doggie exploits, many of which—as described by the Terhune pen—are without comparison. Understood, misunderstood and vice versa came to him in a queer-looking mixture that to him was beyond comprehension, and still, like every other living being, his days came and went regularly, and between having and wanting he lived his life, a real dog. Everybody knows how Wolf's little life was ended. The newspapers of civilization told and retold the story; but perhaps we may be pardoned for repeating the details of his death. Having formed a deep canine attachment for Undine—who was not considered by breeding to be fit company for his austere person—who was the transferred property of a nearby farmer, it was Wolf's pleasure to cover the intervening miles between the Place and the tumble-down shack that was the home of his sweetheart, and, when there, he, with great collie cunning, wore down every human invention purposely created to foil against possible release of the bitch, and then the two would scamper back to the Place in high glee. These trips were many, but the last time was fatal. On the way home, Undine, feeling the torture of a flea-bitten ear, sat down in the middle of the railway tracks to remove the pests, if possible. The Stroudsburg Express came thundering along, but Undine had a greater concern to mind and was content to give it atten-

tion, and as the express bore down, the hero Collie rushed and grabbed her by the nape of the neck and threw her clear of the murderous wheels, and, with a lightning-like heave, almost cleared himself—we said almost cleared the train, yes, but almost is never quite, and the projecting cow-catcher glanced his temple with such terrific force that he was killed outright. The neighbors were witness to the attempted gallantry, and their testimony has placed what reads like fiction to the realm of absolute fact.

It is a grand story, though, and every dog-lover should have a copy of "Wolf" in his library if he really does love the dogs. The book sells at \$2, and may be obtained from the office of Kennel and Bench.

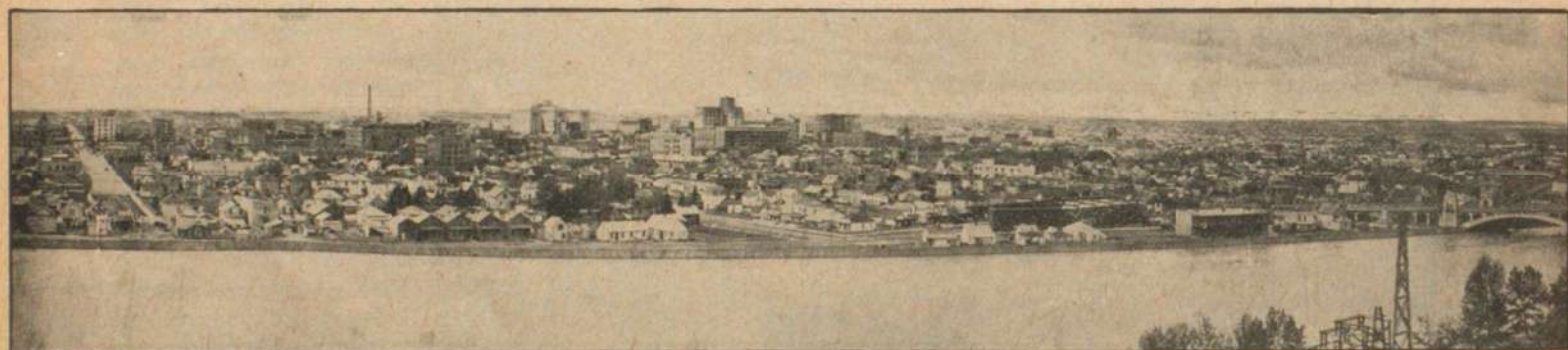
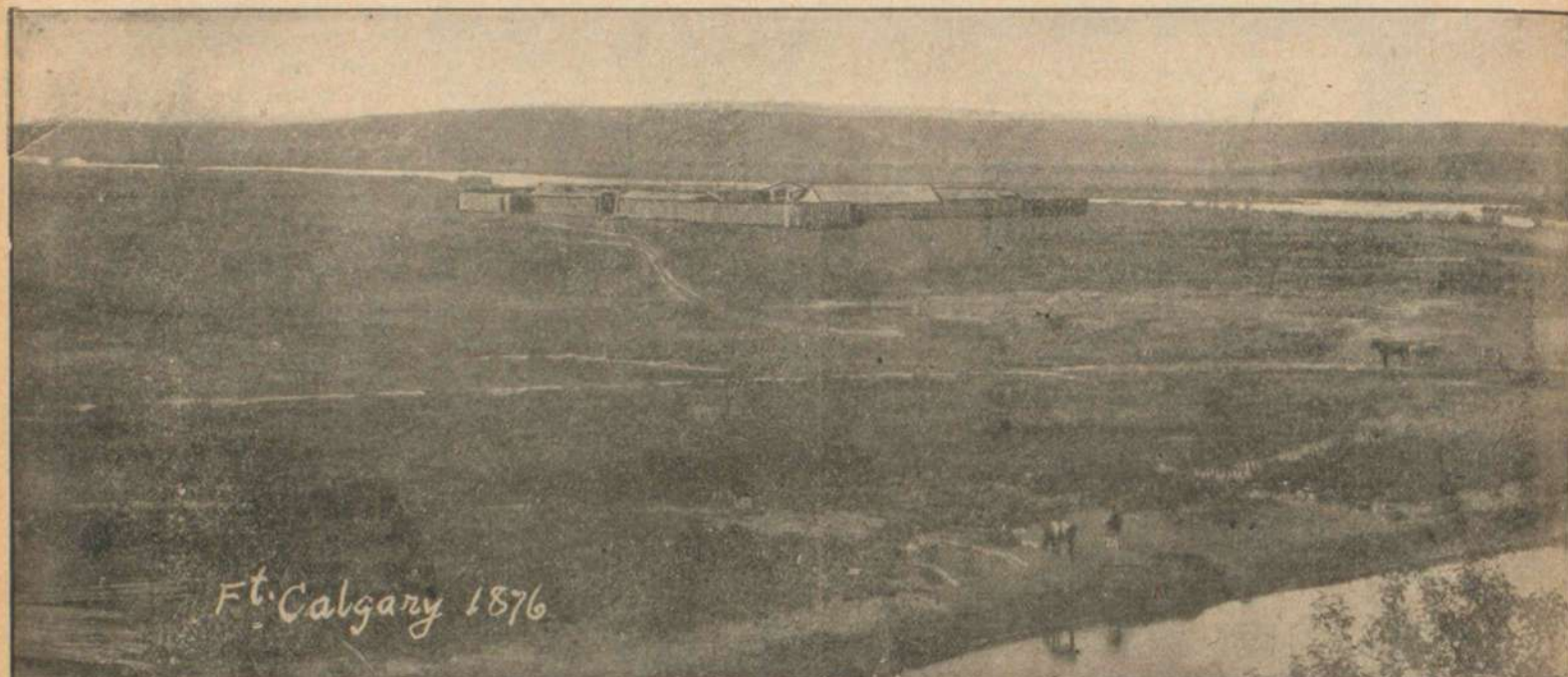

# FEEDING AND WORMS

An Interesting Article Written for the Novice and Experienced Breeder Alike.

**WORMS**—From early puppyhood to old age, dogs are subject to these pests and too much importance cannot be attached to their riddance. "Stonehenge" says: "Worms are a fertile source of disease amongst dogs, destroying more puppies than Distemper itself."

For the purpose of this article I propose to confine myself to the two kinds of worms found most frequently in the dog, viz.: the Common Round Worm (*Ascaris Marginata*), and the Tape Worm (*Toenia*).

As a general rule it is not a hard matter to expel these pests from the dog, but occasionally one comes across an obstinate case which necessitates several doses of a vermifuge before they are finally expelled. It may be well for the benefit of novices to mention the more common symptoms of round worms: Abdominal bloating, vomiting, emaciation, a dry husky cough, offensive breath, a harsh coat and diarrhoea. Round worms inhabit the small intestines and sometimes migrate into the stomach from which they are expelled by vomiting.

It is inadvisable to dose puppies until they are six weeks old and then they will suffer no inconvenience from the 12 hour fast, which is essential, as if they are dosed on a full stomach, it nullifies the action of the medicine.

The vermifuge should be given between the last meal at night and the first meal in the mornigg and to assist the action of the medicine, a small dose of castor oil, liquid paraffin or olive oil may be given six to eight hours before, also the meal preceding the fasting should be of a sloppy nature.

A matured dog can be safely fasted 24 hours but should have access to water during this period. Unfortunately the benefit a dog derives from a plentiful supply of fresh water is not appreciated by some owners.

Remedies containing Santonin in suitable doses are considered effective and safe and are certainly more beneficial in the majority of cases than the use of more powerful expellents. As the preparation of home made remedies entails experience, the novice is advised, however, to obtain a specific bearing the name of a reputable firm.

With regard to Tapeworms, the symptoms in this case are rather more indefinite, the animal may become tor-

pid, thin, have a staring coat or have the disposition to drink more than usual. If these pests are suspected, watch carefully the faeces for segments of the worm, and sometimes parts of them may be seen adhering to the coat around the region of the anus.

A safe treatment of this, again in graduated doses, according to the age and size of the dog, are vermifuges containing Areca Nut and Oil of Male Fern for adult dogs, and the same remark as to obtain a specific bearing the name of a reputable firm applies in this case also.

Now we come to the prevention of worms, and the keynote of this must be cleanliness, clean dogs, clean quarters and clean foods. Efforts should particularly be made to see that the bitch in whelp is free from worms—keep her coat clean, free from parasites and two or three days before whelping wash her stomach and teats with a weak solution of NON-POISONOUS DISINFECTANT and this can be repeated from time to time after the arrival of the puppies.

It is unwise to allow your dog to eat uncooked entrails, raw liver, decomposed meat, etc., for these are likely to contain the eggs of worms with the result that parasites are likely to develop.

Charcoal undoubtedly acts as a deterrent and can be fed in the form of biscuit.

After the necessary medicine has been given it is advisable to tone up the system again by giving a pinch of saccharated carbonate of iron in the food for a period.

There are other kinds of worms which infest the dog, but those mentioned are the most prevalent. If, however, suitable treatment is undertaken judiciously on the appearance of the symptoms there is no reason why a speedy cure should not be effected.

**FEEDING**—It would perhaps be well to commence by remarking that dogs properly fed and housed are fairly immune from disease and therefore seldom require medicine.

From my own observation, I have found that more ailments arise from improper feeding than from any other cause. Dogs fed from puppyhood on a sloppy diet have little resistance to the many troubles which come their way.

There is an old adage, "Soft feeding

makes soft dogs," and I am of opinion that a puppy should be brought up from the time he leaves the dam on easily digestible and suitable hard tack. It can be varied by pouring gravy or soup from boiled meat on to the biscuit food but not to the extent of rendering it a soft, sticky mass. With sloppy foods the puppy is not forced to masticate his food, does not have to use his teeth and his digestion is liable to be impaired. The fruits of this are pyorrhoea, indigestion, gastritis, etc. Regular and rational feeding are necessary in order to build up and repair the body, to keep it warm and supply the energy for the work it has to do. A dog must be done well to get the best out of him and it is a short-sighted policy to feed him on foods that may be cheaper in the first instance than more nourishing ones, as he requires more and does not extract the same benefit as from food properly selected and prepared. Cleanliness in the preparation and in the composition of foods is a *sine qua non*.

A dog requires a certain amount of bulk of food to enable the gastric fluids to act properly and a highly concentrated diet is not advisable.

Hard foods keep the teeth free from tartar and stimulate the secretion of saliva, added to which the dog is unable to bolt them to the same extent as soft foods.

I do not want it to be thought that I recommend the exclusion of meat from the diet, for this is not logical, as the dog is a carnivorous animal, but from my experience I find that good wholesome meat mixed with biscuit forms an ideal diet. Sufficient stress cannot be laid upon the necessity for variation in the feeding of dogs and we know from our own experience that we should rapidly tire of one particular form of food. Changes to an occasional feed of good raw, or lightly cooked, meat are welcome, but care should be taken to see that tainted or unwholesome meat is not fed to the dogs. I have seen it quoted on good authority that dogs fed on a mixed diet live longer than those fed largely on flesh.

I do not recommend that plain biscuits should be used without adding flesh to them, but long established firms who enjoy a reputation for their products can be relied upon to add

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# Dogs of Early Britain

By Canis Major.

If you had been an early Briton, clothed in sheepskin and wielding a spiked club, you would probably have been quite as fond of dogs as you are now. It is a great mistake to think that the love of dogs in this country is a recent and new-born phase, for there were dog-breeders here two thousand years ago. There may have been dog shows, but the chances are that there were more fights than shows, for those ancient British dogs were large and high-spirited animals.

The Romans brought us civilization, and in return we gave or sold them dogs. Perhaps our blue-painted ancestors sometimes "sold them a pup," but they must have been fairly honest on the whole, for their dogs are named by the old historians as being amongst the most important exports of Britain, and to gain such eminence in dog-dealing implies that the dealers were pretty honest. A great trade cannot be built up on swindling.

It is a pity that no one wrote the life of an early British dog. We might have obtained some valuable hints on their training with sheep, for sheep rearing was our ancestors' principal occupation. We might also have some interesting stories of the adventures of British dogs in the Eastern lands where they were taken by the Phoenicians and the Romans. But even without a written dog-story, we can imagine how proud a prince in far-off Palmyra would be when his first British dog came to his court and was petted and admired by all who saw him.

"That is a dog from Britain; the only one of its kind in Palmyra," we can hear him saying with much pride. "The finest dog in the world!"

Most of us think our dogs are the best and most lovable in the world, and a man who is not proud of his own dog is fortunately hard to find. A man understands his own dog better than anyone else does and his dog understands him. The owner knows where he likes to be taken for his daily walk or run; he knows where he likes his bed to be put, whether he prefers to have a warm bath when he is dirty, or, safer by far in cold weather, whether it is better to give him a good brushing with powdered borax and thus make his coat soft and glossy without running the risk of giving his dog a severe chill.

We do not know how the early Briton treated his dog in these re-

spects, but we can guess how he fed him. Probably the hunter's dog, like the hunter himself, was ravenously hungry most of the time, and his zeal and daring in the chase were greater because he knew that unless the wild boar or deer were caught, there would be no supper for him or his master. In those days food was the main object of pursuit, and, while to-day it is of great importance to men, there are other things to be sought after, and it may be that the desire to have something more than food makes life so strenuous for most of us. But, while our human wants have increased, the dog's needs do not seem to have changed very much. To him food is still the chief interest in his life, and, when we consider what a dog does for us, how he admires us and helps to cheer us up when we are downhearted, it does not seem unreasonable if we determine that he shall, at any rate, be given the food he likes and the food which is good for him.

The ancient Briton's dog could pick up a rabbit when there was nothing else to be had, but modern dogs are usually without means of adding to their menu. They rely upon us to find them their proper food, and in this respect at any rate a present-day dog with a good owner has the advantage over his primitive forbears. If Caractacus could pay a visit to a modern dog-biscuit factory he would be as much amazed as he must have been when he saw Rome for the first time. "All this for dogs?" he would exclaim in amazement. "Surely the dog of to-day is fortunate in his owners!"

If he went to a dog show he would see the result of the scientific breeding and feeding of dogs, and would be wonder struck at the magnificent animals to be seen there; he would marvel at the glossy coats, the glistening teeth, the alertness; the general appearance of well-being. His first question would be the natural one; he would go straight to the root of the matter with "What do you feed them on?" Then he would remember his visit to the biscuit works and cause and effect would be apparent to him. He would be "on to it" like a terrier on a rat. Scientifically prepared dog cakes, hound meal, terrier meal and biscuit products—plus common sense—would be a plain answer to the questions he would ask of those who keep good-looking dogs.

In his travels in the North of Scotland he was able to secure a nice typey Scottie bitch named Katie Bairdie, who, before shipping was bred to the well-known Dyce Peter, a son of Donbank Clunker, and she is now showing heavy in whelp. No wonder Andrew was wearing a buttonhole of the real white heather the last time we met him. Katie Bairdie was bought from Mr. Clark, Stationmaster of Cullen, in Banffshire. The best dogs—in Mr. Buchannan's opinion—that he looked at as he journeyed to and fro across his native heath were Romany Rambler, Taybank Hope and Taybank Elegant.

the necessary proportion of meat to their foods, so that the combination of bulk and the maximum of nutrition is attained.

As soft food makes soft dogs, I maintain that hard food makes hard dogs and it should be remembered that regularity in feeding is another factor which must not be lost sight of.

In conclusion, study the individual and suit the food to the dog and not vice versa.

To make a success of dog breeding, keep the best of its kind and keep it well. The old adage, "The feed is half the breed" is undoubtedly true.

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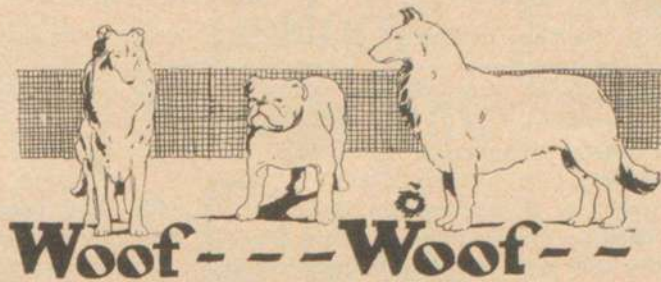

## The Judges Review Port Stanley Show

### MRS. J. W. WYLIE, TOYS.

In responding to the request of the Editor of "Kennel and Bench" to write something about the Toys at Port Stanley Summer Show, from the standpoint of judge, one could hardly allow the opportunity to pass without saying something of the Show itself, of the unfailing courtesy on the part of its officials and of the splendid initiative of this Club in this summer movement.

The officials in their studied consideration of judges and exhibitors have gone a long way in enlisting Eastern patronage, and whilst summer shows will always carry a handicap against long-haired dogs, the pleasure afforded by a day off in such congenial surroundings, not to mention congenial company, will be an inducement to those who have participated to go again.

Toys did not come up to the high water mark of Winter or Autumn Shows and this would apply to quality as well as quantity.

Mrs. J. W. Bruce, of the well-known Melbourne Kennels, was represented in the winners dogs, shown with the master hand of Tom Johnston, a past master in bringing out the best in ring manners.

However, let it be said that Mrs. Bruce has better specimens at home than her winners dog on present occasion, left there no doubt through lack of coat, or by reason of fact, they have already won their championships and therefore had no new worlds to conquer.

The Brown Dog, Melbourne Chip of Chiswick 2nd, is a dog of good proportions, very short in back and nice size. **Novice Dogs**, first to Joseph Greenwood's Melbourne Little Chipmunk, a nice colored orange, sweet head, but lacking in coat. **Second** to Jas. Marshall's "Shelly Bank Sunshine," a nice sable of true Marshall type, but like most of the others, denuded of coat. Would like to see him a little lighter in shadings. **Third**, to Mr. Louis Bricklin's "Kirsney Bobolinks," an orange shaded sable, good color, short, but not built on such refined type as those placed over him.

The winning bitch was "Glen Rose Dainty," a wolf sable of good type, but on to-day's showing was sorrowfully overdone in trimming. Reserve went to Bricklin's "Bebe," undoubtedly the best female in the Show, but handicapped herself in ring manners and lack of deportment.

In Pekingese, there was nothing to touch Mr. Geo. H. Eastham's "Chinky

Chog of China." He excelled in head properties and I understand finished for Championship honors at this Show.

"Shimern of Chinatown" was longer in body than "Chog."

In Bitches, Mrs. B. Foster won, with "Radio Princess Moy Moon" over Mrs. Fletcher Quinton's "Kelvinside Wei Shi." The latter female was better conditioned, carrying a good coat, and fell down to "Radio Princess" by deficiency of head properties.

Poodles were taken care of by Mr. J. C. Fitzgerald & Sons. Their "Don of Dreams" is of a good color, and typical in every respect.

### MR. F. E. BLAKELY, BOSTONS.

Dear Editor,—Just a few lines in regard to my first experience in judging dogs at a Canadian show. Mr. Charles G. Hopton of New York City invited me to judge several breeds at Port Stanley, July 1st and 2nd, where he acted as superintendent for the Western Ontario Kennel Association.

First, let me mention that I found Port Stanley one of the most pleasing places I have ever been at, with a wonderful park and the cleanest beach for bathers I have ever seen. The show was held under a commodious tent in the park, and the benching was all new and right up to the minute. I arrived on June 30th and was rather disappointed when I did not see any advertising for a dog show around; but after getting my reservation in a hotel I was advised the tent was all ready and was located at the park upon the hill, so I took a walk up to see what was doing, and I found Mr. Frank H. Westbury, the president of the club, there just about finished with all his work and arrangements for the opening. This was after dark, and what I would imagine must have been quite a task, as there seemed to be nothing left undone.

Well, I was informed I was to start to work at 7.30 p.m., July 1st, which I did, beginning with a small entry of Irish Terriers, and found nothing very fast amongst them. Then English Setters, only one male, and he was sadly out of condition, being too fat. The bitches were far the best; one was

a show type, the others of the field type. The show type bitch got best of the breed and was put down right; she would do some winning in good company. Now then came the Boston Terriers and I was very pleased to find there was a good entry with plenty of quality; in fact I don't remember ever seeing better quality in Bostons at any Canadian show which I have attended, and I have taken in shows at Toronto for many years, including Canadian National Exhibition and the specialty shows. Mrs. E. D. Daly, of Detroit, Mich., got Winners Dog with Jab King Tut, a bang-up good one. Mrs. E. J. Graves, also of Detroit, had the reserve winning dog, Bargold, another good one. These two ladies came well prepared for the fray, as they had—I believe—eight dogs entered. Mrs. E. J. Graves showed the Winners Bitch, Racket III., a very high-class bitch. Mrs. E. D. Daly had the reserve winning bitch, Branda Woods II., who is also a flyer.

Roselawn Kennels of Toronto showed a good bitch in Oglo's Bashful Betty, good type, color and markings, but should be trained; her ring manners since she would not let me handle her. D. R. McMillan, of Hamilton, had a very pleasing dog in Hello Bud, that will be heard from later, as he is a very classy young dog, but in pretty hot company at this show. Mr. H. J. O'Neil, of Hamilton, brought in a fast bitch puppy. She looks like she has a future. Then J. Oregon, also of Hamilton, has a bitch, Oregon's Peggy O., that was unlucky in not having a muzzle to match the rest of her, as her weak muzzle robs her of expression, and it is a shame. With the winners' bitch's head and muzzle—in my judgment—she would be one of the very best Boston bitches I have ever seen. I will have to close this now by saying that there was not a real out and out bad one brought into the ring.

I wish to thank a Mr. Harry Shortt for his assistance, and will say I was treated fine by all, and a Mr. J. D. Strachan, who, I believe, is an official of the Canadian Kennel Club, made me feel very welcome, and I will always be pleased to meet him again. I had a good laugh at myself at seeing Charles G. Hopton, the Beau Brummel of Dogdom, with his sleeves rolled up at all times working like a beaver and trying to keep everything in order, which he succeeded in doing. Dear Sir: In answer to your request asking me for some notes on my classes at Port Stanley, I regret that I cannot go into details as I lost my marked catalogue en route to Pittsburgh, but the following may be of interest to your readers.

The Port Stanley was one of the most beautifully situated shows I have ever seen. On a knoll overlooking Lake Erie, with new tents, new benching and rings well served, it certainly was most spectacular. There was one drawback, the small ring for Bulldogs, but this could not be helped, we used all the available space. At the demands of the exhibitors, that is, one in particular, the superintendent was compelled to make up an extra ring. The smallness, however, did not impede me any as I could try each dog for soundness and to make comparisons. The entry was exceptionally good, bringing together several of Canada's most prominent winners, but it was comparatively easy for Dauntless Dan to win in dogs. He was in the best of condition, as were all the Beach Park winners. The winner is not quite so cobby in body as Hefty Argo, but I like his better finish of face, squareness of muzzle, and his better expression, and as sound as a bell. Hefty Argo's eyes seemed to be sore, Dan also is better in roach, cut up of loin and gait. There was a very nice red puppy, Baldwin's Dominator, that gave Hefty Argo a close race for reserve. He did not have the matured body and massive front, but in expression and finish of face I liked him well.

It was a near thing in bitches between Mr. Cassina's Morning Glory and U-No-Me. Both excell in bone and body, the former had the pull in finish of face.

Russian Wolfhounds were a level lot, the special went to a very sound bitch with fawnish brindle markings, her soundness caught my eye, but there were several others very close up. In dogs, I might have changed them about had the handler of the brindle, Galaroff, posed his dog better. When he came in for the variety class I then saw him well shown and he won easily, and might have beaten Romanoff Peteroff in the regular classes.

Airedales were very good, a nice local dog, "Roddy," taking reserve. Winners going to Parkdale Chief, a classy terrier all round, an easy winner. A very sound dog with lots of bone was Happy Tiptop who would have gone a peg higher had he been in better coat.

Cocker Spaniels were a mixed lot, but the winners were good. A good

headed black bitch was Essex Mattie who was easily best of her color, as was Regal Gift in Reds. A very nice pair of black and whites, Dough Boy and Sunwick Country Girl, headed their classes, they were typical, but in poor coat.

In Wire-Haired Fox Terriers, there seemed to be some surprise in my placings as the winners were of a racy order, but the longer head and the keener expression of Wrose Tickler and Morningside Firefly, his daughter, stood them in good stead. Miss L. Short had several well conditioned dogs in that they had the heavier bone and were the shorter in back, but I did not like them so well in head and expression. Whiskaway has lots of quality but he was in poor coat. A very nice puppy was Forest Comedian, easily the best of the youngsters. A very cobby and sound coated white bitch, Vanity Fair, was reserve winner, with a longer head she would be hard to beat. Much on her type was the reserve winners dog, Chantry Caddy. Two sound brindles in Scottish terriers won quite easily. There was also a very sound typical Sealyham, Burlick Blinks. Springer Spaniels were a surprise as all were good and well shown. Best of them was a very sound blue and white roan dog, Inveresk Cadet. He beat the bitch, Limelight, for the special, having the better head and deeper chest.

Doberman Pinschers had two types, the old fashioned cobby sort with heavy skull and shoulders and the more racy stamp with long head, good neck, clean shoulders and covering lots of ground. I made the brown and tan puppy, A Metzie of Pontchartrain, the best of the breed, she beat Dyno Von Weisengrund in skull and front.

Last month on page 7 we introduced the Kerry Blue Terrier to our readers in Canada, and incidentally informed those of our readers across the border that Canada was now in the competitive field of this fearless intelligent breed. This month we are able to show our readers just what our Canadian Kerry Blues amount to, and to tell them where they come from.

To Mr. Charles S. Calhoun, Toronto, Ont., belongs the credit of importing from the Emerald Isle the first real pair of show type Kerry Blue Terriers, in the dog, Castletownroche Paulus, whose picture features the front page of this issue, and the bitch Hopeful Trixie, who, at the time of writing, is nursing seven typical little "Micks" of the Kerry Blue variety, that are a credit to their parents and to dear old Ireland. This handsome addition now makes 5 males and six females in Toronto—not too bad for a start that in time may develop into one of our strongest breeds, who can tell?

For the information of those fanciers who are unfamiliar with this breed, the Kerry Blue is one of the oldest breeds of dogs bred in Ireland, and may be called a first cousin to the better known "Red Irishman," the Irish Terrier. He embodies all the same game qualities, makes an ideal watch and working dog and is becoming very popular in England where he is very prominent at all the shows. The Americans have recently imported a number of good ones, and the breed is familiar to our American cousins.

Mr. Calhoun's dogs were purchased from Miss Annie Thomas, "Riverview," Castletownroche, Co. Cork, Ireland. Miss Thomas is very well-known in Blue Terrier circles, and is especially noted for owning that wonderful bitch, Ch. Castletown Rose, the only bitch which claims to be an unbeatable champion in England as she has won a certificate each time she was shown there, and has just recently cleaned up most impressively.

"Castletownroche Paulus" will be shown this fall throughout the Canadian circuit, including the Toronto Exhibition, Royal Winter Fair and other shows.

To the novice who may wish to get in on the ground floor and share the thrills of introducing a breed, the following advice may be of interest. Study the standard, then get a specimen that conforms to it, avoid light eyes, heavy ears, roached backs, and bad set on of tail. Look for a Kerry, compact with lots of substance, and looks like Castletownroche Paulus and you will be off to a good start.

# DISTEMPER!

By "Breeder."

That every dog must have distemper has been disproved, but that most dogs get it, is true. It has been held that the disease was first observed in the 18th century, when mention was made of it in a Manual of Veterinary Science. It was then supposed that the disease was imported to Europe from South America. The canine world is anticipating good results from the research work in connection with distemper that is now being carried on, and which was made possible by the fund initiated through the agency of "The Field," published in London. A great boon will be conferred on all dog lovers if success attends this work and if the mortality from this disease can be decreased.

That dogs kept under hygienic conditions and receiving proper care and attention are less susceptible than those run down and in indifferent health, is undoubtedly true. The reason of this is obvious, as we learn from our personal experience in the time of epidemics.

The exact nature of the fever is not known—it has been compared to measles, typhoid and typhus fever.

A popular idea was that every dog was attacked by distemper before he was a year old; of course this is not so, as some dogs are lucky enough to pass through life without suffering from it.

The disease does not originate spontaneously, but is so highly contagious that it is often difficult to trace the source from which it is contracted.

As the disease may be carried on one's hands or clothes, the indiscriminate handling of dogs by people other than their owners or attendants should be discouraged.

The period of incubation after exposure to contagion is from 4 to 14 days, and some are of opinion even longer.

The most common symptoms are dry husky cough, sneezing, a watery discharge from the eyes and nose, diarrhoea, vomiting, loss of appetite—one of the earliest is often a slimy brown desposit on the teeth, particularly the lower molars—any or all of these may be present.

Isolation of the suspected animal should be carried out at once, and in a rigid manner. The diet in the early stages must be light and of an easily digested kind, such as white bread, well-cooked rice, with

beef-tea, mutton broth, or milk. Fish boiled in milk is often enjoyed—keep off solids when fever is running. As it is often difficult to get a dog to eat, a frequent change of diet is advisable. In cases of necessity the patient should be spoon-fed at frequent intervals in order to maintain his strength. Without good nursing few dogs will recover and great care should be taken to keep the patient warm, comfortable and clean. Sponge the eyes and nostrils frequently and also the mouth. As a precautionary measure I always recommend that the patient be put in a pneumonia jacket which can easily be made by cutting two holes in a piece of flannel for the fore-legs bringing the ends together over the neck and back and sewing them securely. This will cover him in the same manner as an ordinary dog coat, with the exception that instead of fastening under the dog's stomach, it is fastened, allowing for an overlap, along the dog's back.

The temperature should be taken regularly (the normal temperature in the rectum is 101.4 Fah.), and any sudden rises will show that the patient is not progressing favorably. Watch the breathing carefully, and if the lungs are attacked (and it is very frequently they are), a slight crackling sound may be heard on applying the ear to the chest. In such a case the jacket should be removed, lined

with Thermogene wool and replaced or a stimulating liniment applied to sides and front of chest. At such times, 10 to 30 drops of brandy in a little water or milk three times a day will be useful, otherwise stimulants should not be pushed too much. Raw eggs may be given, beaten up in milk, the white only if bowel irritation is present.

At the outset an aperient should be given to clear the bowels, and quinine in combination with aspirin may be given to reduce the fever. Do not press the latter, however, too much.

Plenty of air without draughts should be allowed and a liberal supply of bedding given. Exercise should be discontinued, and, if lung trouble is present, the dog should be kept entirely indoors. Great care should be taken in feeding the convalescent and changes in diet made with caution.

Tonics and cod liver oil should be given during recovery to assist in toning up the system.

Do not overdo the patient with exercise or overtime him.

If veterinary advice is obtainable follow out the directions given punctiliously, and always remember that in addition to treatment good nursing will play a large part in restoring the dog to health.

Do not neglect to keep all feeding utensils scrupulously clean, in addition to the quarters allotted to the patient, by the use of proper disinfectants.

In conclusion, I would emphasize the necessity of thorough disinfection of the attendants before approaching other dogs or kennels and destruction of the bedding. Too great care cannot be taken in this. The quarters should be thoroughly fumigated and cleaned before being again brought into use.

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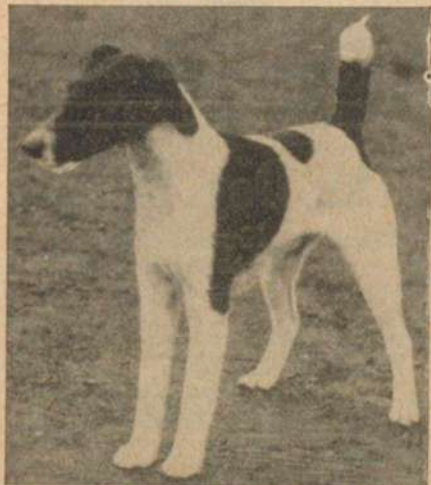

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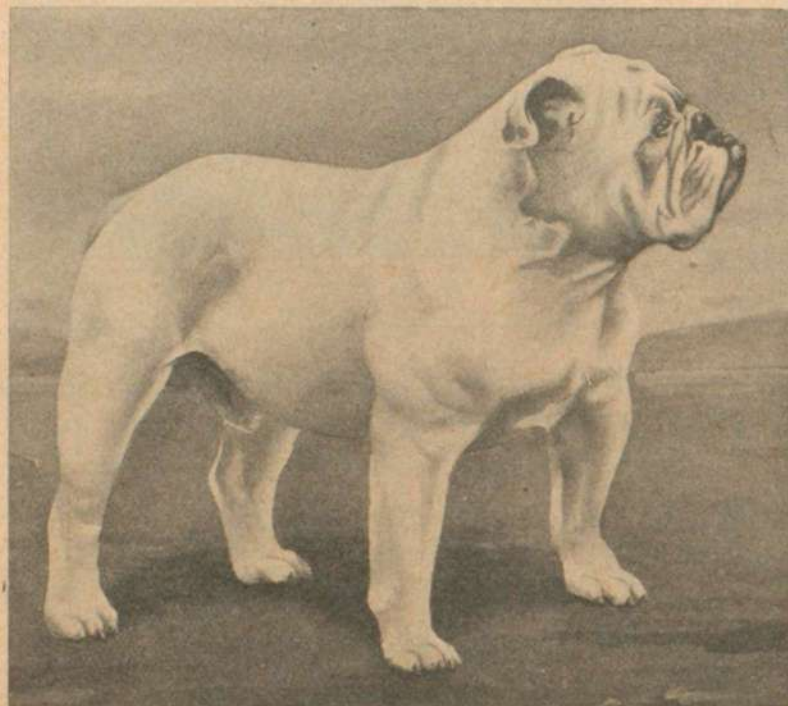
