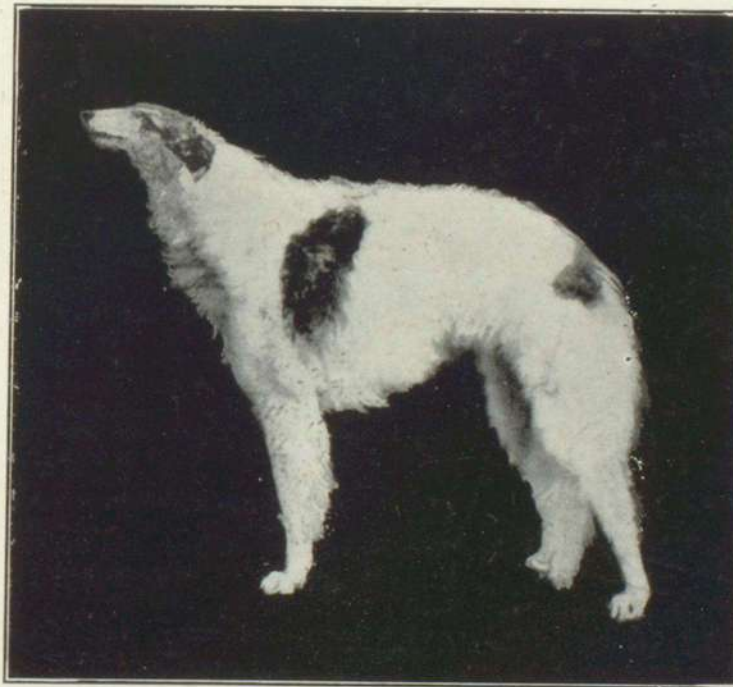

## Meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc.

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club was held at the club's offices, 25 Melinda Street, Toronto, on Thursday evening, May 12th, 1927, at 8 o'clock. The president, Lt.-Col. G. F. McFarland, presided.

Directors attending were: Brig.-Gen. C. M. Nelles, Lt.-Col. J. N. MacRae, Capt. W. Smith, R. L. Wainwright, N. K. Swire, R. P. Sparkes, V. G. Perry and H. Clayton.

A telegram was read from J. W. Bruce saying that he was in Montreal on business.

The minutes of the April meeting were read by the secretary, and, on motion regularly moved, seconded and carried, "The minutes were declared adopted as read."

The secretary read a letter from the Live Stock Records Office, which advised that Mrs. Kenney, Toronto, has been suspended until such time as she supplied certain vouchers of registration.

The secretary read a letter from the Live Stock Records Office, which advised that the University of British Columbia had requested to be supplied with a set of Canadian Kennel Club Stud Books, such set of books being required for the University Library. And it was regularly moved, seconded and carried, "That the University of British Columbia be supplied with a set of Canadian Kennel Club Stud Books, as far as it is found possible to supply them."

To further create an interest in B.C. for the Shepherd Dog, Mrs. Seed may undertake to demonstrate to thousands who will be found in the grandstands at the forthcoming Vancouver Exhibition what these dogs are capable of accomplishing. Two dogs will be used in the proposed demonstration and one of these will be Ajax, as he is a marvellously trained dog who has earned the distinction P.H., which is proudly attached to his name. Mrs. Seed says: "This I will do with the greatest pleasure." Undoubtedly there will be a demand in British Columbia for these dogs from that date onwards, as it is just this kind of feature advertising that "sells" a breed to discriminating fanciers. If Shepherd fanciers allow themselves to be guided by Mrs. Seed in their purchasing and breeding operations from the beginning they will be steered clear of the many pitfalls that so many well meaning novice breeders drop into with the resultant flock of dogs of uncertain temperament and weak nerves. It being all in the breeding and raising, Mrs. Seed will, from her known long association with the Alsatian be able, and no doubt willing, to advise on matters that are essential to better understood Shepherd Dogs.





# THE CANADIAN FANCY

I HAVE several times this year been called an optimist for holding the opinion that the Canadian Fancy was on the threshold of great prosperity; it is therefore very pleasing to me to be able to state that my mail during the last month has contained more news of sales than in any other previous month since I commenced writing for *Kennel and Bench*.

There is no gainsaying the fact that much of the credit for the increasing prosperity of the Canadian Fancy is due to our President and our Secretary, both having done much to bring the Fancy together, and one has only to peruse the business pages of *Kennel and Bench* to see what the journeys taken by our President, Col. G. F. McFarland, and our Secretary, James D. Strachan, have accomplished.

In my peregrinations throughout the Dominion I find everywhere that the Canadian business man means to make the most of the anticipated heavy traffic of visitors from across the border this year, and the thought has often come to me recently—is the Fancy preparing for the very large increase of business, like the business man? What do you do with your *Kennel and Bench* after it has been read? It would pay us all to take out an extra subscription and leave one copy at some place where our visitors are certain to call. Personally, I would like to see a copy on each of the trans-continental trains. In crossing the border as often as I do I have noticed literature for the golfer and the fisherman, and it has struck me that if each month a supply of *Kennel and Bench* was sent to the railway companies asking the manager of the library department to place a copy in each trans-continental train it would work out advantageous to the Fancy. Any way, I pass on the suggestion to our energetic Secretary.

The increasing popularity of the pure-bred dog is very apparent. When I first came to live in Belleville some six years ago it reminded me of my early days in the Fancy in England when it was not always advisable to mention to all my friends my interest in "man's best friend." Harry Hungerford and myself were about the only people living here actively interested in dogs, and we were thought to have a peculiar hobby, but to-day all this has changed, and we have enough fine people actively interested in dogs to be able to stage a fairly good show, if the entries only came from the city and outlying districts.

The interest in breeding pure-bred dogs is growing by leaps and bounds, and those good fanciers who have stuck to the Fancy in lean times are going to find that the demand for pure-bred dogs is going to be greater than the supply.

In writing of Belleville my thoughts are carried to the great fight Harry Hungerford has put up since he went to judge collies at the "Sesqui"—a very sick man before he started, and acting against his doctor's orders, he went there to fulfil a promise. Immediately after judging the collies he came straight back to Belleville, and since then, with the exception of a very few days, he has been confined to his room, and it is only his great pluck that has enabled him to battle against his serious illness so long,

and still be on the winning side. I have heard that some of the Mountaineer collies have been sold during his illness and that the purchasers are still waiting for transfers and registrations. I was talking over this the other day with Harry Hungerford's friend for many years, A. Harper, and if any purchasers will please write to him, c/o Bank of Montreal, Belleville, he and I will do our best to straighten matters out. Harry Hungerford himself is far too ill to do anything. I know I can count on the patience of the collie fanciers. The whole of the American Fancy will, I know, join me in the sincere wish that the "Mountaineer" may win the greatest fight he has ever had in his eventful life.

One hears so little of the Chesapeake dog in the East that I was greatly surprised to have an enquiry by phone the other morning asking for particulars of a Chesapeake stud dog. In following up this enquiry I had the pleasure of meeting W. Schwartz, who had recently come from the West to live in Belleville. We spent a most interesting morning going over photos and records in the possession of this well-known sportsman, who had so much to do with shooting dogs in the West, and particularly Chesapeakes. Amongst the many good ones of this variety he had owned and bred, probably the best known ones would be Champion Frank and Jeff II. In some future issue I hope to publish some of Mr. Schwartz's experiences with shooting dogs, and particularly the Chesapeakes, and also to reproduce some of the photographs in the possession of this old breeder.

Field trials are becoming so general whenever gun dogs are used that I am distinctly pleased to hear that that grand old sportsman, "Charlie" A. Stone, has at last had his wish fulfilled by the forming of a Bird Dog Club. C. A. Stone has for many years held the opinion that the best way to get Eastern Ontario shooting men interested in the breeding of pure-bred shooting dogs would be to hold Field Trials somewhere close to Toronto, and from the information to hand the club that has been formed has the backing of many of the best known Ontario sportsmen. At a meeting held at the Queen's Hotel, Toronto, the following officers were elected: Patrons, Robert Fox, G. T. Wolfe, H. Reeder, Allan Case, A. F. Schauer; Hon. President, H. B. Johnson; Hon. Vice-Presidents, Capt. W. Smith, A. D. Clarke, T. D. McGaw; President, C. Arnold Stone; First Vice-President, A. E. Godson; Second Vice-President, H. S. Routley; Secretary-Treasurer, W. E. Sampson. Committee—E. J. Marsh, R. G. Dudley, W. S. Price, F. J. Fox, W. J. Jeffries, F. W. Lewis, A. A. Tomlin, J. A. Caesar, W. Ballantyne, A. W. Snead, George W. Duncan. The object of the club is the breeding, exhibiting and holding of field trials for Pointers, Setters and Spaniels. The first field trial will, I understand, be held this November somewhere on the Niagara Peninsula, where an excellent supply of pheasants and partridges can always be found.

The interest in the Hamilton Kennel Club is increasing beyond the most ardent expectations of A. S. Lammond, the energetic secretary of this influential club. Arrange-



ments, I understand, are well on the way for the afternoon show, to be held on June 18th at Woodland Park. A strong judicial list and a splendid array of specials have been promised. The open show of the club will be held in September.

I notice from the last issue that my opinion—that holding tests regarding the temperament of Alsations in the judging ring is not in the best interests of the breed—is criticized, the writer of the letter stating that the German Club I quoted as having backed up my opinion were not recognized by the American Kennel Club. Surely the writer of the letter does not mean to infer that the A.K.C. would not recognize the German Club because they did not believe that these tests were in the best interests of the breed!

I agree that the number of nervous Alsations being exhibited is increasing, but fail to see how tests will decrease the number of nervous Alsations. In my opinion the reason that we see so many nervous specimens of the breed is directly due to these tests. Many of the most temperamental Alsations I have seen of recent years either came from Germany or were bred from dogs and bitches imported from that country. The breed, as I knew them in their early days of popularity, were as even in temper as other varieties, and my opinion to those interested in this beautiful variety is, if they do not want a recurrence of the regrettable scene at the late Chicago Show, omit the tests.

Whilst in Toronto a few days ago I had the pleasure of seeing Mrs. W. J. Bruce's latest importation from England, the black Pomeranian, Tresleigh Zobey. This charming little Pomeranian only weighs three and a half pounds, and on account of his breeding and sterling all-round properties I consider him the most valuable acquisition to the ranks of stud Pomeranians we have seen in Canada or on the American continent for many years. A prevailing fault very apparent of recent years in Pomeranians is a want of quality in head properties, and in this respect leaving his other sterling properties alone Tresleigh Zobey is invaluable. I anticipate a very bright future for Zobey in the show ring and at stud, and fail to see how it was that Charles Hopton missed him in selection for winners at the recent Toronto Show.

One of the most pleasant shows I have had the pleasure

of judging was the Pekin Palace Dog Association of Canada second annual specialty show, held at the Labor Temple, Toronto, on April 30th. Mrs. M. Walker, the secretary, and the following officials, Dr. and Mrs. C. C. Clemmer, Mesdames Foster, Watson and Dodds and Geo. Hatcher and J. Treleaven, are deserving of great praise for the excellence of their arrangement, and for the splendid entry of eighty dogs and bitches competing.

I was more than surprised at the all-round quality of the exhibits, and judging from the quality of the young stock it certainly looks as if Canada is going to breed as high quality Pekes as we are in other varieties.

Regarding the arrangements, an excellent ring was provided and I had the invaluable assistance of J. W. Bruce as ring steward. The dogs were brought promptly

into the ring, therefore in spite of the big entry I was able to hand out the last special in ample time to allow the exhibitors to catch their last train home. The attendance, I understand, was hardly as good as at the first show. Amongst those watching the judging was our secretary, J. D. Strachan, and Capt. A. D. Waters, the secretary of the National Kennel Club.

The winners dog was Mrs. Redway's Bumble Bee, of Badminton, reserve winners being awarded to Mrs. Whitehouse's Lo Kuan Sang, a marvellous headed dog, handicapped on the day by want of condition and coat. The Balcroft Kennels proved almost invincible in bitches, being awarded winners and reserve winners respectively, with Lola, of Balcroft, and Cha Ming, of Balcroft. Lola of Balcroft beat the dog when competing for the special for best Peke.

I noticed amongst the exhibits a number want-

ing in the flatness of skull between the ears to illustrate the correct skull I am asking the Editor to reproduce the photograph of Princess Toussonn, famous parti-color Champion Puck of Alderbourne. The photograph hardly does this famous English winner justice, but it certainly does show off to much advantage his wonderful skull, where so many of the Pekes on the American continent distinctly fail. Many judges apparently seem to forget that the round-domed skull required with toy spaniels is not the skull the standard of the Pekingese calls for. Usually with this round skull we also find a want of shortness of leg, and naturally with a long leg we get a straight leg.

Everyone was disappointed that Mrs. Mary G. Clarke, Buffalo, N.Y., did not put in an appearance at the Show. She had made several entries and I hear that the cause of her absence was due to the fact that two of her best puppies were seriously ill with pneumonia, and acting wisely under her V.S. instructions she did not send her dogs in case they carried some infection. If only the example of Mrs. Clarke was carried out by us all the mortality we have to contend with year after year with distemper would soon materially decrease. Mrs. Clarke, amongst her entries, has Tinker Toy, an exceptionally beautiful young bitch, who on her debut at Cleveland, gained the special for best puppy in show and was placed reserve winners. At her next outing at Buffalo she again won puppy and novice and the special for best local bitch—a most creditable start when one considers that Tinker Toy is only nine months old.

I was delighted to be informed by Capt. Waters, the secretary of the National Kennel Club, that he has the arrangements well in hand for the next show of this influential club, which will be held in connection with Toronto's most fashionable event, the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair.

The record annual show was held at the Labor Temple, corner of Church and Shuter, Toronto, on April 30th. Puppy dog, 1st open, Chu of China, a black and tan with a capital head, nice ears and placement of eyes, promising alike in body and front, just needs time to gain confidence in ring deportment; 2nd, Man-of-War, black and white, needing time yet to tighten up at elbows; promising body,

flat skull; time needed to get finish in face; 3rd, Ned, somewhat plain yet in face; capital body, shoulders and front; novice, 1st, Goldmine Pim Chinello, a most good all-round dog who just needs to grow coat. Sin Lung is somewhat wanting in quality, is straight in bone, capital coat and feather. Fu Chien Tai Ping fails in front; just fair head and body.

Canadian-bred—1st, Chuan Sang; beautiful skull, eyes and placement of ears, and exceptionally well finished in face. He has the desirable low shape in body and possesses capital bone and front, a dog who will play a prominent part in future prize lists when shown in better condition and coat. Lo Kuan Sang, placed 2nd, is a litter brother to the winner and an excellent specimen, very little behind the winner, but like him, wanting coat and feathering; 3rd, General Gordon, has excellent chin, eyes, front and coat, but is rather round in skull. Limit, 1st, Chuan Sang; 2nd, General Gordon; 3rd, Little Beau of Lonsdale. Nice flat skull, good chin and expression; wanting somewhat in shape of body. Open (under 8 pounds), 1st, Winners Bumble Bee, of Badminton; a very sound specimen; beautiful skull and eyes; wanting a little in finish of face; capital body and bone; nice class of coat and good in ear fringes and breeching; 2nd, Little Beau of Lonsdale, a neat little dog, typical and very shapely; 3rd, Prince Eng Cha, losing in finish to the leaders. The new face in open (over 8 lbs.) won the 3rd, Yu Toi, of Balcroft, a typical good all-round dog, not showing to the best advantage. Puppy bitches, Shensi Wanda, a shade better in bone and skull than 2nd, Fu Chien. Best Canadian, Cha

Ming, of Balcroft; flat skull, capital chin and eyes; pleasing alike in body and bone; 2nd, Goldmine Butterfly, broad skull, good eyes and excellent front; 3rd, Shensi Wanda, very fair head and body. Limit, Lola, of Balcroft, a really more beautiful bitch could not be desired; a Peke very difficult to fault. In (under 8 lbs. open) Wau, of Chinatown, a neat sound little bitch with pronounced chin and bold eyes. Ben Tee, of Balcroft, by the aid of her flat skull, good eyes and excellent bone, was enabled to easily head the open class as To To Nee Chi refused to show.

Parti-color dogs: 1st, a very good specimen, flat skull, nice chin, pleasing in body shape, with good front. Prince Wen Chu loses in finish of face; Man-of-War had the advantage in skull over Parte, of Tokio.

#### CANADIAN FANCY.

A very interesting case has just been tried by Magistrate Casement at Marmora. The plaintiff, Thomas E. Grey, of Belleville, brought a charge of stealing a pedigree and bill of sale against W. D. Donnelly, of Marmora. The defendant's case was that he loaned the pedigree to the plaintiff and that the papers had been given back, so that the dog could be registered.

Judgment has just been given by Magistrate Casement, of Madoc, dismissing a charge against W. D. Donnelly and refusing to commit him. R. D. Ponton appeared for Donnelly and B. C. Donnan for the Crown.

This case, in which much interest

was manifested, particularly to dog fanciers, came before Magistrate Casement in Marmora a week ago. W. D. Donnelly, of Marmora, was charged with stealing a dog pedigree and a bill of sale of a dog, the property of Thomas E. Grey. The accused at first elected to be tried by the magistrate, but subsequently his counsel withdrew his previous election and elected for trial before the County Judge. The magistrate then proceeded with the preliminary hearing. The evidence disclosed that Donnelly was a breeder of thoroughbred Boston terriers, and a puppy was sold to Grey. Months later a question arose as to the papers, and the accused alleges that he loaned the pedigree to Grey for the purpose of convincing others, to whom the puppy had been bred, that it was a thoroughbred. Grey alleged that the papers were returned to Donnelly for Donnelly to have the dog registered at Ottawa. The accused alleged that he was willing to have them registered upon payment by Grey of \$15 extra. At the conclusion of the Crown's case, committal was asked for. Counsel for the accused argued that the Crown had not made out a prima facie case on the ground that there was no evidence of theft disclosed.

The judges for the Canadian National Exhibition should be the means of drawing one of the pre-war entries to this show. I have only one suggestion to make and that is that this year a more suitable building should be set aside for a hobby that is fast falling into the footsteps of the Mother Land, where the exhibition and breeding of dogs has become a national industry. To-day is ripe for the proper housing of our dog shows and the Canadian National Exhibition can well afford to lead the way in this respect.

## HARRY HUNGERFORD IS DEAD

When I was writing my copy for this month's Kennel and Bench, I had no idea that before the close of the month Harry B. Hungerford would have passed the great divide. Early on the morning of May 28th, the great and plucky fight the dean of the Collie Fancy had put up, was finished, and one of the most outstanding fanciers on the American Continent has passed peacefully away in his sleep. Harry B. Hungerford has been a very sick man ever since that fateful trip he took to California early last year but I, like many of his most intimate friends, had little idea in the early days of his illness, how serious it really was. When we left together last September to fulfil our engagements at the American Kennel Club first show at Philadelphia, I knew that I would be travelling with a sick man, but I did not realize until some hours had been spent on the train, how seriously ill he was—in fact, I would not have been the least bit surprised to have seen the end on the train. It is impossible to form any idea of what the death of this great fancier means to the Canadian Fancy. He was from early boyhood days a lover of all kinds of animals and won, during his lifetime, hundreds of prizes, mostly firsts, with not only Collies but also with practically every kind of dog. He undoubtedly was one of the best judges of dogs the Dominion has ever produced. A big upstanding figure in the ring—reputations cut no ice with him—he was always out to judge dogs and dogs only.

Some four or five years ago—our friendship—started in the early days of the war—was renewed. I was staying at the hotel here, having just returned from a trip to Mexico and just as I left the dining-room Dr. C. Y. Ford and H. B. Hungerford came into the hotel for lunch. I did not recognize them, but Dr. Ford turned to H. B. Hungerford and said: That was Walter Reeves going into the elevator. Enquiries were made and soon the three of us were talking dogs.

I had practically given up my interests in dogs, but once a fancier always a fancier was certainly true in both instances. We used to meet practically every day and we found that our interest in dogs was still as keen as ever. The Mountaineer very soon had some of his old strain back again and started breeding collies as largely and successfully as he had been doing some ten or fifteen years ago. When the Mountaineer strain of Collies was acknowledged to be one of the best strains in the world—the remarkable come-back he staged two years ago at the Westminster Show, N.Y., will be familiar to all interested in the Collie. Many sound judges considered that the ten or twelve young collies he took to N.Y. were the best team ever put down by one breeder.

H. B. Hungerford was not a happy-go-please breeder. He bred on really scientific lines and was always out to get information as to the type and quality of the puppies produced by any new aspirant to stud fame. I, like many others, have lost a true pal and



know that I can bespeak the sympathy of the entire American Fancy for his sorrowing relatives. The funeral took place at Belleville, Monday, May 30th and among the many beautiful flowers I was glad to see that the Fancy had not let their friend be placed in his last resting place without some of his favorite flowers. Wreaths were sent by the President and Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Mrs. Ilch and her mother, Dr. H. Jarratt, James F. Strachan and Walter H. Reeves. The funeral service was held at St. Thomas Church, Belleville, the Rev. H. Lyons officiating. After the service a very large number of friends followed to the cemetery to pay their last respects to a man who was universally loved, the Canadian Kennel Club being represented by myself.

## Maritime Notes and News

ONE of the local amateur judges remarked in my hearing that "So-and-so"—referring to a reputable well-known Canadian kennel—needed new blood, naming one or two winning dogs the noted owner should use, believing those in the kennel named had had their day. There is a difference between in-breeding and line-breeding—so right here name two breeders whose prefixes are household names in the dog world that for many years kept to their own stock on line-breeding.

Walter Jeffries with his famous "Stone" bulldogs and "Tom" Steadman's typical English "Malwyd" setters. Both of these breeders produced excellent type and stamina that was consistent passing on the goods for several generations after their breeding activities ceased. Exhibitors to-day pride themselves having these prefixes in their pedigrees.

Breeding is no haphazard business or "take-a-chance" sort of thing, but careful building with select material where type predominates without exaggeration or a matter of color only. One of the faults of novice breeders is they don't keep in long enough with their own stock to know what they do or don't produce, so that before one prevailing fault is remedied others are added to—so infinitum:

This was quite noticeable in Terriers and Toys seen at our May shows at Saint John and Halifax.

Just here I wish to say that the Canadian Kennel Club should severely censure or penalize show-giving clubs who ignore the new and important ruling re bitches with puppies and all young dogs under six months old anywhere within the show building, and provincial directors should feel responsible about its enforcement—all members should!

The New Brunswick Kennel Club held its third Spring Show May 12 and 13 in Pythian Castle, Saint John, N.B. Having a delightful building, blessed with all necessary conveniences, also splendid new up-to-date metal benching—their own property—this N.B.K.C. show lacked being an up-to-date affair by having no catalogues, notice board or awards put up near the ring. Only the few on the inside or in close touch with the fanciers about town know whose who on the benches. The Eastern Townships K.C. of Sherbrooke had a catalogue last fall that for a similar number of entries benched in Saint John. A complete catalogue could be printed, 16 pages, for about \$40. Halifax had a larger entry and published a catalogue for about \$60, which included all necessary data for a new Spring Show. Several out-of-town fanciers and exhibitors attended the N.B.K.C. Show. "Witty" Warren, of Montreal, dropped in for a smile and I saw him a few days later showing well with some entries at the N.S.K.C. affair. Wm. W. Laskey, of Fredericton, N.B., was also a welcome spectator; J. E. St. Onge, of Campbellton, attended his first May show and done well in the Alsatian breed; he showed Bostons, too. Keltie Wilson, of Saint John, who judged, had quite a pleasing entry, and done a fair job with few "ifs."

Big breeds were shy in numbers, while Pointers, Irish

and Fox Terriers had the keenest competition. Theo. Rising's Ch. Native Rover, winners and best in Newfoundland, boasts excellent type, right for size, bone and coat. Second best and reserve, O. Trentowsky's Max, with less size and type of Rover.

Russian Wolfhounds, only two—no dogs—winners bitches, Messrs. Murray and Granan's Appreciation Mabel, a lemon and white Borzoi, is a big upstanding hound, well balanced and sound, more matured than Marlboro Zola Lyons, a very neat bitch, not in her best form. We missed its cheerful owner—M. B. "Dick" Zwicker.

About eight Pointers benched, not so many considering how prolific this breed is about Saint John, with N.B. Pointer Kennels benching half the entry. W. H. Higgins' Brownie, winners dog, barring his eyes, quite a good dog, reserve the well-known New Brunswick Boots, a flashy marked, sound dog in top form, pressed the winner hard. Winners bitches, Ridgeway Startler, owner J. A. Robertson, a well-made liver and white, moving good; reserve New Brunswick Dot, close up and in better form, an improved bitch over her previous showing at Halifax. Mr. Cox showed a coming young dog in N. B. Trump, first in puppy and novice classes.

Setters, English, a small but decent entry of eight, had most of them in right form. Edw. Britt's Y. May Fly went through her classes, puppy to winners, though in poor shape; type with size helped her on. Reserve bitches C. C. Sullivan's Thornehaven Glenfall. The same owner showed winners dog and best of breed with his home-bred Thornehaven Morris, a heavy marked blue Belton of excellent type, a smart mover who eventually went up for best sporting dog and best of breed, also Best in Show. Being Canadian-bred, was the first Maritime entry to get an early leg on his Excellency's the Governor-General's Lord Willingdon Trophy. Reserve English Setter dog, Bruce Lawson's Grove, who with his team mate won for best brace any variety; very attractive Setters.

Irish Setters, with three and no new face to revive this colorful Setter once so popular here. Incidentally the three entered represented three breeders who formerly benched three to five each. ## Montreal Clubs Hold a Double Header

MAY 27th and 28th marked the occasion when the two All-breed Clubs of Montreal came back in full strength to their annual summer activities and staged two dog shows which were considered to be rather more than successful by all concerned. Both fixtures were held in the commodious Coliseum on Guy Street. The attendance, which looked quite slim to the average eye, was indeed quite large, and if the same people had been seen in the average dog show building the spectacle would have indeed resembled a crowd.

The ring arrangement caught the eye as one entered the building, fenced in by a rustic looking fencing which must have cost the builder plenty of time and lots of material. This fencing was plentifully adorned with greenery and chrysanthemums of varied hue, and was indeed attractive and unique. The whole arrangement was noted and complimentary remarks were quite plentiful. Both rings were of equal size, and a rough estimate of their dimensions would be about 100 feet long and 45 feet wide each. A canvas strip the full length of each ring and about 3 feet wide was a splendid arrangement that gave the judges a first-class opportunity to study action, legs and feet. Particularly pleasing was this arrangement in the cases of Alsations, Sporting breeds and Toys. Benching went round the sides and ends of the building, and next year the benching will be made more uniform. It will be painted, making it more pleasing to look at. After that Montreal benching will be as attractive as any in Canada, excepting, perhaps, Ottawa and the Canadian National. Disinfectant was quite plentiful, and because of that lots of it was used, no chances were being taken by the clubs to prejudice their lights to repeat their shows in the eyes of the authorities who had sanctioned the fixtures. Dr. Moore and his associates declared themselves satisfied with the arrangements generally, and particularly with the separated exercising enclosure which had been provided for the exercising of out-of-town dogs.

"Ladies first," and so the Ladies' Kennel Club opened for business on Friday, May 27th, with Mrs. E. J. Enright and her associates in charge. If the "gentler sex" had accepted the onerous duties of ring stewards the only male of the organization would have been the tireless veterinarians, Drs. Ettiennie and Ettiene, and right

here we stop to remark that, if shortage of veterinary inspection is a subject for comment at many of our Canadian Kennel Club shows, the fact remains that Montreal shows always stand out like a sore thumb in the matter of their veterinaries being in continual attendance during the continuance of Montreal shows. At that, the Ladies' Show was surely a Ladies' Kennel Club Show, and from the most efficient President, Mrs. Enright, down to the latest recruit to the membership, each functioned 100 per cent., and deserved the success which crowned the show.

The judges were both well known individuals and shared the work between them in smart fashion, the breeds being apportioned in such a manner that the breeds were shared almost equally. Messrs. Frank Addyman and Bert Swann got started at the advertised hour, which was 10 o'clock a.m., and at 10 o'clock p.m. their labors were ended most satisfactorily, so much so that the only "squack" we heard sounded something like a "wheeze" from some person in the first stages of asthma; relief came when we heard that the sufferer was able to "Spitz." The judges officiating at this show know their breeds thoroughly and so do they know their Spitz. At the closing hour, when the Varieties and General Specials were being judged, the crowds around the ring were most interested, and because of their great numbers and noticeable enthusiasm we were reminded of the "good old days" of Montreal dogdom. The final of the first day found Joe Greenwood's smart little Pomeranian International Champion Glen Rose Flashaway the favorite of Judge Addyman, and was awarded several rich silver cups, amongst them the Canadian Kennel Trophy. The crowd showed their approval by an outburst of unstinted enthusiasm which signalled the end of a "perfect day."

Saturday dawned in a kindlier mood as a special favor to the Montreal Kennel Association, Ltd. Bright sunshine and a desirable warmth was welcomed by one and all as a pleasant change to the frigid atmosphere of the preceding day. Promptly at 10 o'clock the judging again began. The judges changed rings and breeds and the labors of the day commenced. Many were comparing the awards made with those made on the previous day, and declared that the old saying, "Great minds think alike," was not at all a dependable quotation.

Our award columns will show whatever of justification these critics had for offering their comment. President Allan C. A. Chisholm, resplendent in his knickerbockers, had his help functioning perfectly, with Secretary Camu co-operating in every good work. As the day wore on, attention was divided between the show rings and the lunch room operated by the ladies of the Ladies' Kennel Club, which was worthily and well patronized during the two show days. We trust that this lunch room idea was found to be justified through its profits, because it certainly was a comfortable and wonderful convenience that could be introduced at other shows and receive the plaudits of the fatigued and hungry dog show patrons.

The final judging of the M. K. A. Show found the Wire-Haired Fox Terrier, Ch. Annam Fox Trot, the best in show all breeds, ably handled by "Ted" Ward. The "Wire" never "batted an eye" until the best trophies were safely tucked up under "Ted's" arm, then he "cut up" and showed his own pleasure, putting out his little chest proudly, he seemed to say, "Thanks for the buggy ride, folks, but, didn't I tell you so!" The cheering of the crowd was quite as hearty as that offered on the night before, and this very plainly showed the soundness of the argument "other days and other judges." Undoubtedly both men judged their breeds as they knew them, and it was a pleasure to watch their careful and fearless selections as breed after breed came before them in judgment.

The writer enjoyed a visit to the new country home of his namesake, James F. Strachan, where a few dahlias with the "Coltness" prefix will compete with some of those of the "Ormsby" prefix this fall. On the return a visit was made to Madame Beland's "Pomona" Kennels, where we found a real dahlia enthusiast with over a hundred distinct and different varieties, some of which cost many dollars per tuber, and in this fairyland we hope to see a "Coltness" blossom this year, too. Through the enthusiastic generosity of Madame the writer brought back a dozen new varieties to Toronto. These have already been planted and irrespective of their catalogued names each one has been prefixed "Pomona" as an addition to their known distinctiveness. Visitors to the Canadian National Exhibition are invited to see for themselves just

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## DOGS OF THE EMPIRE



By FREEMAN LLOYD.

**T**HE men and women dog-breeders of the British Empire may justly boast that each and every dog of the acknowledged breeds, have some use—and are fitted for the occupations they have to fill, as the friends and aids to man in his everyday life. All of the sporting dogs are sporting dogs, and the several breeds are judged on the lines that are best fitted for the fulfilment of some one or other specific purpose in the life or constant desire of the sportsman. Thus we have the Stag, Fox, Otter and Hare hounds—each of which is employed for the chase, the breed of the dog being identified according to the animal he is best suited or able to hunt. All this is very interesting, as we shall see. Certain of the hound and gun-dog breeds are supposed to be only associated with the “higher stationed people”; the ordinary working man of, let us say, the British Isles, having no more idea of attaining the ownership of a work-trained hound, a pointer or a setter, than he would dream of possessing a white elephant.

Why is this?

Because the working man, not having the money to hunt with hounds, would be wasting his time on such breeds and a diversion that rightly or wrongly belongs to the so-called upper classes. It is true that the working man of the Dominions does own and hunt with a single, a couple or more foxhounds; but he is a generally lone hunter on shanks' pony, and follows the sport of fox hunting, mostly for the value of the very marketable skin that covers the red fox in Canada, Australia and other countries which fly the Union Jack. The common people may take their hunting walks abroad, while in the Old Country, they are often not allowed to look over a fence, much less to cross over it. So we will find that the old hunting desire and spirit that is in most men, will assert itself in the immigrant. The superior shooting and fishing to be had in “new” countries, is more than often the prime inducement for men to leave the homes of their fathers and resolve to eat, drink, be merry and have some hunting in climes beyond their own seas.

Pointers and Setters have been carefully bred, down through the centuries. But they have been in comparatively few hands on the other side. Both of these breeds (with their varieties) have no place in the kennels of the man who doesn't take out a license to shoot game. These dogs, of course, can be kept for the purpose of competition in the show rings, but, strictly speaking, the pointers and setters should have their homes in the kennels of shooting men. The spaniels may be classed as dogs suitable for the sporting tradesmen in England, who does not take out a game license, but is content with shooting rabbits, woodcock and wild fowl. The greyhound will now become more generally owned because of the introduction of greyhound racing; but, hitherto, the expenses attendant on public coursing have been too heavy for an ordinary person to enjoy. Thus coursing hares became more and more a sport for the classes. It was from the greyhound when crossed with a collie or sheepdog of a racy kind, there came the old-fashioned lurcher, a dog around which most Old Countrymen have a story to tell. But it was

and is not considered respectable-like to own a lurcher in Britain. For where the lurchers are the poachers have already foregathered.

And admirable picture of the lurcher is given to illustrate this article. P. Reinagle, R.A., presents to us a remarkable portrayal of the slouching but wary actions of the lurcher on his approach to some rabbits, already alert to the proximity of danger. The rodents will be too sharp for the poacher's dog, on this occasion; for, it is evident, they are not far away from the shelter of their burrows. A popular cross used to produce a lurcher was by mating a greyhound dog with a small deerhound bitch. From this union a coarse or broken coated dog would result; and if he were blue or grey in color, so much the better, for the reason that the lurcher would be more invisible than ever during the hours of the night, the harvest time for poachers. But the lurcher must not be bred too high in the leg. Here is the danger of introducing deerhound blood. When an all around coursing dog is too tall in front he cannot stoop to the lowness of an ordinary rabbit, over which he will tumble, if he try to kill her while running on a decline or downhill. Then a friendly hole will shelter the rabbit. The course proves a failure. The cross between a greyhound and a smooth-coated sheepdog or collie, is considered an excellent way to breed a lurcher, and it seems to me that very many of the overplusage of German shepherd dog bitches, could be put to greyhounds, deerhounds and Russian wolfhounds, for the purpose of producing speedy and hard-jawed dogs suitable for the purposes of the Canadian and American farmers who want to kill off coyotes, and of course, jack-rabbits.

The lurcher is a very old variety of dog. It would be against the traditions of kennel ethics to state that the lurcher is a distinct breed. But, perhaps, this assertion will be looked upon as snobbishness of the lurcher owner who sets no value on paper pedigrees, and, possibly never heard of a kennel club other than that of his fellowship of the tavern—poachers all, dog gypsies, their congeners and sympathizers. The lurcher has existed through the centuries, his scenting, speed, sight, silence, and retrieving powers having filled the cooking pots of thousands of half-starved families throughout the length and breadth of game-preserving lands. There have been field trials for most breeds of sporting dogs; but what would many of us give in great value for the opportunity of observing a field trial at which lurchers, handled by their owners, were the only competitors! There we would see the workings of a devil and his dog. I pray for such an adventure.

Probably more stories—and true ones—could be related regarding lurchers, than of any other breed or variety of breed of dog in existence. Although admittedly a cross-bred dog, the lurcher, perhaps, produces better to type than any other variety of mongrel. For in him the greyhound build must endure. His greatest fault is his non-respectability; and, in his case, the dog is blamed and cast out because of the nefarious methods of his master. So don't kick a poacher's dog; blame everything on its owner! A good headed, necked, boned, footed and



bodied dog is Reinagle's lurcher. He is greyhoundy over the back, and his thighs are long, though slight. His tail was shortened and it is evident he was not over-burdened with fat. He could catch, kill, and retrieve any hare or rabbit in a fair run. The poacher's dog is an eager participant in a crime, in the eyes of the law. The dog obeys his master and cares not what other men may do or think.

The English setter has not changed much in appearance since he became distinguishable from the larger land spaniels, probably hundreds of years ago. One can almost imagine that the breeders of a long-past-yesterday, picked out the leggier "spaniels", and, refusing to dock their tails, kept these dogs for working in the open spaces, to point the partridges either lying in the stubble or in the grass fields where the net could be drawn without the interference of bushes. This was before the days of shooting flying. There may still be seen the signs of the times in the closely cut grain fields, and the open fields on English estates where partridges are preserved, the bushes set at intervals over these spaces being purposely placed in position to thwart the efforts of the poachers who still draw and drop the nets o' nights over the sleeping partridges which only rest and nest on the ground. The setter was used by the bona fide hunter, to point the covey of birds while the net was drawn on and over the game; and it was from this dog's habit of setting or crouching while pointing game that he was called the setter. On the other hand, the spaniels were used for driving game out of covert, and from brush, so that trained hawks could be flown at the fleeing quarries. The very work in the brush or covert where thorns and rough bushes abound, would be troublesome to the quick and

wide-waving tails of bristling spaniels, which wag their tails more and more, according to the almost certain prospects of game finding; and that is the reason the tails of the smaller land spaniels were docked. Each breed of dog has its service; and in no way can this be better illustrated than in the case of setters and pointers for work in the open, and spaniels for the covert or rougher terrain.

Reinagle's "Setter", engraved by J. Scott, is an example of an English setter of a period approximately the year 1800. He is a good stamp of dog excepting in his hind quarters, and perhaps, the size of his forefeet are over large. But this artist was a rare stickler for well-knuckled and trim feet for his hounds, gun, and running dogs. The bone of this setter is enormous, and, very likely, is suited to the size of the dog's feet. But now we are splitting hairs, and it would be better to look out for and appreciate the good points of this old white gun dog of a long time past. He has a good, sensible and scenting head, notwithstanding the call for a long and somewhat narrow skull proclaimed as "correct" by some dog fanciers, who do not stop to think or enquire into the head requisites or properties of a hunting dog. No one wishes to argue in favor of the very heavy-headed dogs, for the reason that gun dogs furnished in that way are proverbially slow in their movements. But, for scenting powers, the wide-headed dog has been considered the better; although I have seen long and narrow-headed dogs of the cross-bred deerhound kind, wind prairie chickens at a distance of approximately two hundred yards.

Why should the broad-headed gun dog have a better nose or scenting power than a narrow-headed dog of the same breed? We will consult the scientist and reduce

his language to the common tongue. It means this: In dogs with broad heads, the sieve bone is much larger than in narrow-headed dogs; the sieve itself is therefore, more capacious, and contains more openings; so that the olfactory nerves which pass through it are divided more minutely, and thus that exquisite acuteness of smell is produced, which must always be found to obtain in dogs with large heads. The olfactory nerves resemble a bunch of small white cords, one end of which is connected with the brain, while the other, descending the head, spreads into numerous ramifications, reaching to the end of the lips, as well as to the extremity of the nose. In the case of the lips and their formation in the hound family, here may be the reason for their superior scenting powers, the hanging lips, so to speak, assisting the nose of the keenest of all the notably cold and ground-scent, or line-hunting dogs.

There can be no disputing the purity of Reinagle's English setter. He was an embodiment of the shooting dog, a century before the commencement of field trials. The elegance of the white English dog was abundantly in evidence in this dog, one of the breed which was assuredly to become the progenitor of the excellent gun dogs of this variety known and owned in all quarters of the world, and, particularly so, in British Columbia and the West of Canada, according to the highest encomiums passed on certain of those setter dogs recently bred and appreciated on or near the Pacific Coast.

As in 1800, so to-day may a pheasant be found in the standing root crop, while the sportsman is ready with his gun. The style or carriage of the setter's tail is faith-

fully portrayed, while the expression on the dog's face demonstrates the presence or working of a faculty—a sense that the human does not possess. The long, flat and silky coat of the well-bred setter is also apparent; indeed, we must allow that this dog was a "gentleman" and belonged to a man who appreciated such an animal.

The Pointer, as depicted by Reinagle, lived in the earlier part of the last century. To all intents and purposes, we can put him down as a hundred-years-ago dog. The picture of this dog would be as faithful as those of the men, the moor, hills and grouse; and as the artist made the dog to be his chief subject and object for concentration, we must take it for granted that we have a living likeness of a very real dog. So let us discuss him and in the light of our present-day pointers.

Reinagle's Pointer (the engraving is by J. Scott) was evidently a white-and-orange colored dog—a pointer we would look upon as a model show pointer of to-day, were it not for the lightness and tapering of the foreface towards the muzzle. But what a nose and nostrils that dog possessed! There, indeed, would be plenty of room for the olfactory nerves. This dog is absorbing the effluvium of the welcomed scent from the air. In Reinagle's Pointer we find a broad-between-the-ears dog. The capacity of his brain box is apparent; there is room for brains—the brains that are being called into instant action. And that's the ticket! This dog's eyes are light and luminous in color, especially so at this moment of intense, eager, expectant excitement. They shine like liquid, yellow gold, a coloring following the orange shade of the patches that mark his cheeks, his ears, his ribs, his buttocks, his half of tail. A pretty pic-

ture assuredly of a gun dog standing high hock-deep in heather, and stiff and stark on the ready-to-flush bird. A memorable scene this; and such experiences are ever the happy memories of the sportsman in adversity as well as in affluence.

So we will deepen the foreface and narrow down the skull of Reinagle's Pointer, and make of him a show pointer of our times! But, we must be sure to leave undisturbed and unharmed the other features or "points" of this dog. Mark well his lovely length and shape of neck; his body, bone, placement of shoulders, width of hind quarters, set on and carriage of tail. To alter those proportions would set forth our own ignorance as to what is required in a pointer both from the angle of competence, and an embodiment of beauty.

The English Pointers were originally produced from the heavier Spanish Pointers, the latter dogs being crossed with Foxhounds and, some say, Greyhounds or dogs with Greyhound blood in them. Thus was speed added to the

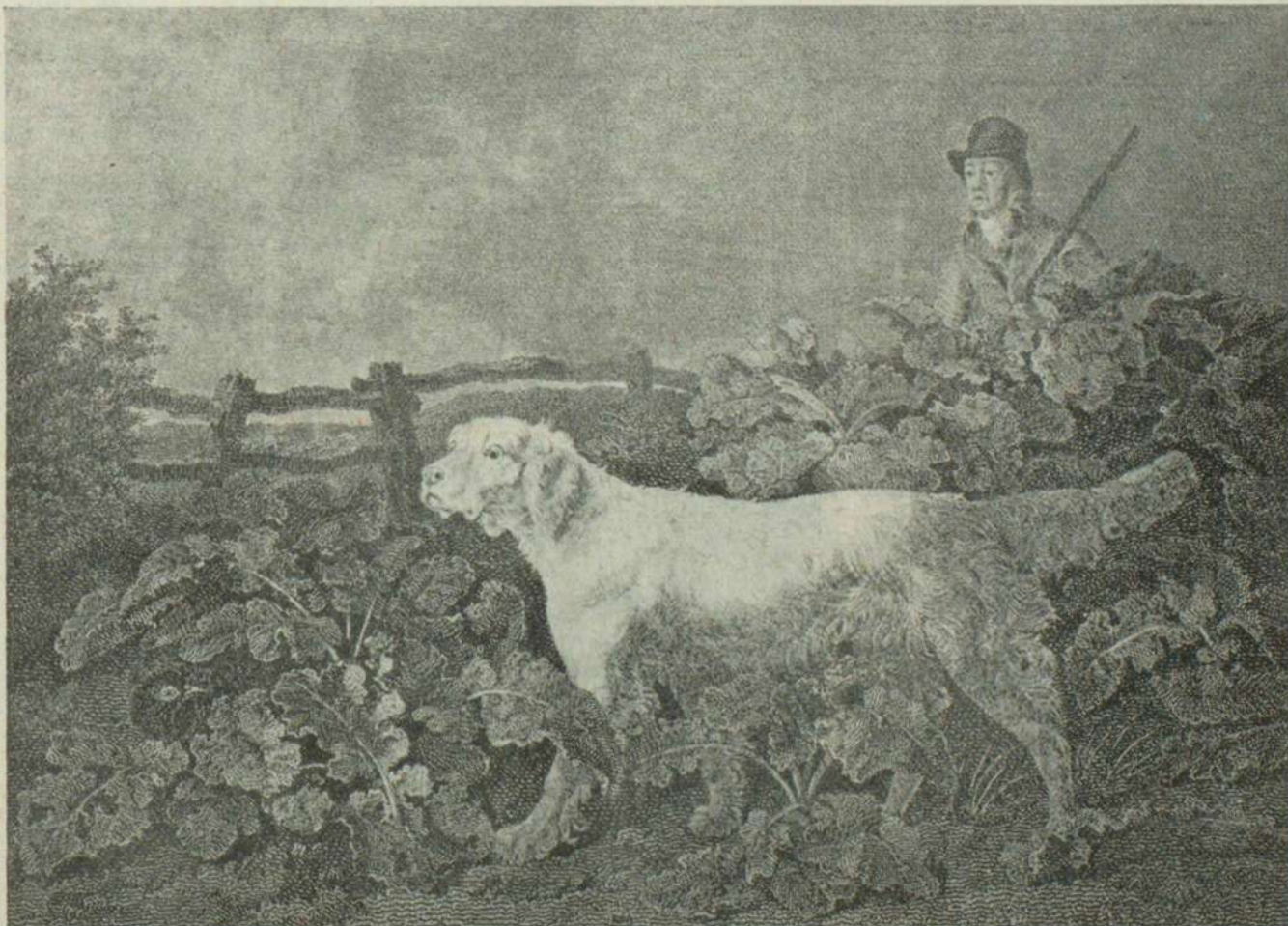
somewhat slow, clumsy, but splendidly-nosed Spanish Pointer stock. The several varieties of Pointers to be seen in Continental Europe are descended from the Spanish Pointer, Hounds, and English Pointers.

It was about 1800 that the famous Col. Thornton of Foxhunters' Hall, Yorkshire, England, was declared to have greatly improved the breed of Pointers by introducing the Foxhound cross. The Devonshire strain of Pointers, several of which came to America, were said to have some Foxhound blood in them. This blood was not of recent date. A dog of cross-bred breeding was Dash, the famous Pointer owned by Col. Thornton. From a portrait of this dog, published in 1801, I gather that the foreface of Dash was more pointed than that of Reinagle's Pointer. Dash was made up of Spanish Pointer and English Foxhound blood, and he showed the old-fashioned, sharp-faced English Hound in his head; and the underbrush of the Hound's tail in Dash's

stern was Hound-like. That Dash was a remarkable dog on game there can be no doubt. His sale to Sir Richard Symons was a much discussed item among sportsmen of that day. The exchange the somewhat eccentric Col. Thornton accepted for his pointer dog was: one hundred and sixty pounds (\$800) worth of Champagne and Burgundy wine, which had been bought at the French Ambassador's sale in London; a hoghead of claret, an excellent gun, and a Pointer.

Here was a deal between sportsmen in the mansion on the hill, while, probably, in the village nearby, there was much haggling over a bid made for some promising lurcher or rat-killing Terrier. The exchange offered in the tavern might have been the time-honored one of "a bob and a pot"—a silver shilling in the coin of the realm and a quart of foaming nut brown ale!

And many good dogs have changed hands at the last mentioned price.

# Telephone City Kennel Club Show

Brantford Club, like the Montreal Clubs, was operating this year after missing its 1926 fixture and indeed it was with joy that we wended our way to the city that made the telephone one of the conveniences of the century and of the world, to look the Brantford Show over. Phrases like "The best show we ever attended;" "Another successful fixture," etc., are in danger of becoming threadbare and worn, and yet, just as we never tire of saying: "Happy New Year" or "Merry Christmas," so it is that we never tire of saying that the "Telephone City Show was a pleasant fixture." And this year it was gratifying to find more and better dogs at Brantford than ever before. The benching was arranged by that tireless worker, Nolan, who had been given a free hand by Show Superintendent Lee Wainwright who, by the way, is one of our 1927 Canadian Kennel Club directors. Friend Nolan having ideas all his own, had the benching laid out in his own way and that was right along the four sides of the Alfred Street skating rink, an enormous area of space. The number of dogs benched, and the great number of exhibitors and attending public looked almost lost under the spacious roof of the rink. Secretary "Norm" Duckworth had his work well in hand and delays were noticeable only by their scarcity, which made the ring always the center of interest.

Bert Swann was judge and came through the onerous and usually thankless task with satisfaction to the Club, to the exhibitors and to himself and that is saying quite a lot in these days of dissatisfaction and distrust. Complaints, if there were any, were left unexpressed. A generous allowance of freedom to exhibitors had the effect of having many dogs at exercise, which at times made the benches look rather unoccupied.

On the evening of the first night the customary Telephone City Kennel Club banquet was held when about 75 fanciers sat down to a sumptuous dinner, served in splendid style by "Bill" Fraser in his elegant Belmont Hotel dining-room. President Alderman John Kerr presided and on his right he was supported by Alderman "Ernie" Campbell who was present representing the Mayor of Brantford who was out of town on business. Acting-Mayor Campbell expressed pleasure on being present and mentioned that the "City Fathers" had been glad to arrange for the City's

financial support to the Show, and in the name of the Mayor, extended the freedom of the City to all visiting fanciers. Other speeches were made by several fanciers. Dr. MacRae won the "purple ribbon" for his presentation of the story of the parson who was shot; space forbids the telling of the story here but when you see Colonel MacRae don't fail to have him tell it to you.

Alsations were a nice entry and the rivalry between the dogs of "Jimmie" Sullivan, E. F. Dulen, Condy and MacRae, Bill Warwick, Mrs. H. Bartley, made things quite interesting for a time for the Alsations.

One of Mr. Sullivan's charges was the Great Dane (Harlequin), whose picture is shown beneath, was soon picked out by the exhibitors as a likely contender for the higher honors of the Show, and that is exactly what happened. This beautiful animal was as sound as a dollar, was pretty as a picture and his owner, J. P. Wagner, Milwaukee, Wis., may justly be proud of his dog Ajax Von Der Klausenburg. It is Mr. Sullivan's intention to campaign some of the best dogs under his care as a professional handler at Canadian shows this Fall with a view to creating a greater interest in international exhibiting. He is impressed with the ever-increasing support given to American Shows by Canadian fanciers and he is willing to show reciprocation himself, and will bespeak it for others. It is "Jimmie's" opinion that the distinc-

tive mark of an International Championship is just beginning to take hold of the fanciers of both countries and the contestants in this field will be more noticeable at our Shows in future.

The Brantford Show was at times like a Canadian Kennel Club conference from the many C.K.C. representatives who were attending. The President, Lt.-Col. G. F. McFarland had also intended being present, having accepted an invitation to preside at the annual banquet and was only prevented from acting in that capacity by an important business engagement.

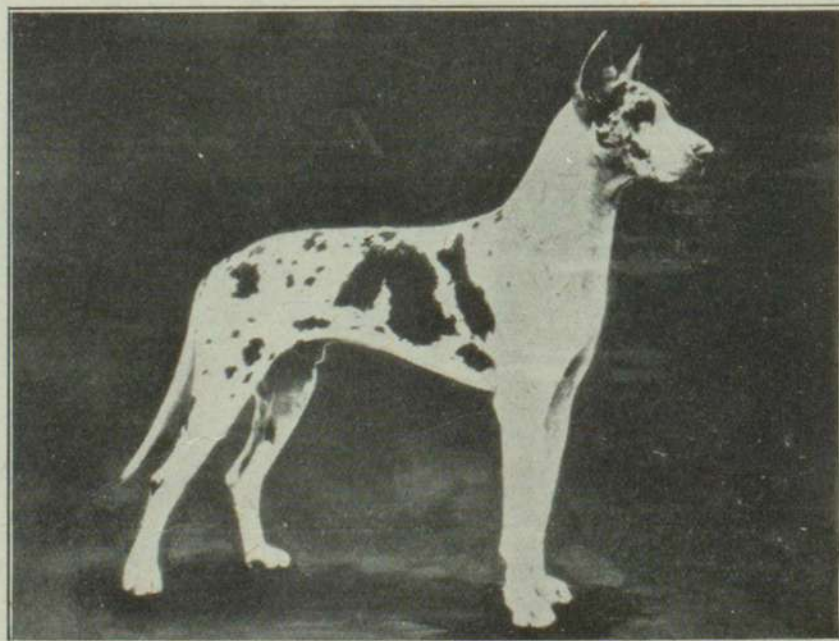

Anyway the world knows that "Tommy" Grisdale, with the pluck that has made the other "Tommies" of England famous throughout the world, decided to take "Prince of Wales" to the land of the bulldogs' fathers—and he did. Quarantine requirements gave Prince of Wales a six-months' enforced rest, during which time every day, week and month was checked off by the devoted Grisdale. At last the relentless clock ticked off the last second and Prince of Wales was at last at liberty, and in grand condition.

Lady of the Snows is a beautiful bitch and as breeder of her I feel justly proud of her and feel that she should get what credit she has earned. The mistake is peculiar to me because in my opinion she did not get all the credit she should have in Canada. Her performance in the U.S.A. would seem to verify my judgment of her, as since I sold her to Mr. Nicholls last fall she has been placed Reserve Winners at the Westminster Kennel Club Show, New York; Winners at the Waldorf-Astoria Show, New York, meeting and defeating two of Canada's most famous bull bitches, namely, "St. Roche Girl Guide" and "My Reverie." Thanking you, Mr. Editor, for this privilege.

It seems to me that your very interesting articles that have appeared in Kennel and Bench under the caption of "Sportsmanship" have been read by many who have inwardly digested and absorbed the object lesson that you forced home to them, but there still remains other territory to cover.

On my visit to Victoria to take in the recent show sponsored by the Victoria City Kennel Club, I found it impossible to find room for any improvement on the general management, and those who were responsible for this event are to be congratulated on their very efficient officials whose sometimes arduous duties were carried out with utmost courtesy and despatch.

A flagrant violation of dogdom's unwritten law did not escape my notice and clouded an otherwise clear sky. It may be attributed to a lady exhibitor's lack of artistic knowledge, but in any event a certain amount of unappreciativeness was shown to those who had worked hard to make the show a success.

I have seen disgruntled exhibitors refuse to take a ribbon from a judge, but I think that in most cases those who have acted in this hasty manner have rued showing their temper under stress of defeat, but for a party who has won the much coveted purple ribbon to refuse to accept a special prize that had been allotted to this particular class, giving her reason as "not being good enough," goes to show that the honor is only a secondary consideration for some dog owners. The special prize refused—a hand-painted plaque—was a work of art and would grace the home of the richest in the land. When a club is giving a show it is always hard to get in touch with sufficient generous people to supply the much-needed prizes, can you reasonably expect this particular donor to again accept the opportunity of having their feelings hurt by a repe-

tition of refusal of a gift that had taken some very considerable time and effort to produce, and given with the idea of promoting the exhibition of dogs?

Perhaps, Mr. Editor, you may add to these lines your own sentiments regarding such cases of a similar character coming to your notice.

be courteous enough to allow me to reply to the above mentioned article, and, incidentally to correct a few misapprehensions which appear to have arisen with regard to the status which this breed has attained in this country and the length of time it took to obtain recognition from the Kennel Club.

The Canadian and American Kennel Clubs are now in possession of the facts relating to Golden Retrievers, and, I am very glad to say, they are now recognized by at least one of these clubs, and I trust that recognition and classification in both countries is only a question of a very short time.

The extract you quote, taken from "The Field" of 1922, is not exact in every particular, viz., the breed had been held closely from about 1870 to 1908 by only the late Lord Tweedmouth's friends, including Lord Ilchester, Lord Shrewsbury, Lord Portsmouth, Lord Harcourt, and Colonel the Hon. de la Goes Trench. The latter was the only one to keep the original Russian strain. All other strains show signs of the bloodhound cross, instituted by Lord Tweedmouth.

Here I must differ from the writer

of the article in "The Field", for the Golden Retriever of to-day is undoubtedly the result, and a very excellent result, of the Bloodhound cross; and frequently shows signs of it in various ways. The cross may have spoilt the original Russian dog, but it undoubtedly laid the foundation of one of the finest breeds of gun dogs in existence.

In answer to your note at the end of the article in "Kennel and Bench" will you allow me to point out that in 1908 I bred from a bitch of mine and Lord Harcourt's Culham Brass, and exhibited a dog puppy of that mating which beat Culham Brass in the open class? This was my first attempt at showing. In 1911, 3 years after I bred my first litter, I was successful in obtaining permission from the English K.C. to register the Golden or Yellow Retriever as a separate breed.

I am sending out an illustrated article to Mr. Armstrong, of Winnipeg, which contains photographs from the original Russian Retriever down to those of Field Trial and Bench winners of to-day which may interest you.

Incidentally, Mr. Armstrong is now

the owner of a dog which I bred, "Noranby Eventide", who, during the short time he was competing in this country won several prizes at the leading shows, and 3rd prizes in the Herts, Beds and Bucks open Field Trials and a certificate of merit in one of the hottest Trials we have—against the best Labradors in the world! And this is his first season.

The International Gundog League Trials, 1926, were won by Double F. T. Champion Eredine Rufus; also the Kennel Club Trials, 1925. Out of four certificates of merit given at the International Gundog League Trials in 1925, three were awarded to Golden, only four of which breed were in the stake consisting of 20 dogs. In this same year, 1925, over 400 Retrievers of all breeds competed in field trials; 38 of these were Golden, which gained the following awards: Four firsts, one second, five third prizes, one reserve and 13 certificates of merit. I think I may submit that the case for the Golden as a shooting dog is proved. Of his outstanding qualities as a companion, with brains and pluck, combined with extreme gentleness, and his undeniable good looks, I need only ask you to come over to this country and see them at work

here with me, where I shall be charmed to welcome a new recruit to the Golden cause. May I conclude by pointing out that at the last English K. C. Show there were more Golden Retriever entries than there were English Springer Spaniels.

I have heard it said that the Golden Retriever is a "made up" breed. This, to a certain extent, is so, in that we know the Bloodhound cross was made, and in isolated cases, Black Flatcoats, I believe, were used once by Lord Ilchester, but his dogs have never been seen on the show bench; but, after all, both Black Pointers and Flatcoats have been admittedly used in the Labradors and they are not called a "made up" breed!

# LONDON CANINE ASSOCIATION SPRING SHOW

Quality, rather than quantity, was the rule at this fixture, and many of Ontario's best dogs were benched. International and national champions, with quite a few dogs aspiring to the higher honors, were noticed along the battleship grey painted benching.

There were no less than three judges on hand to take care of an entry that was slightly over 100 dogs, Alsations being judged by W. F. Condy of Port Nelson, and the appointment marked Mr. Condy's debut as a judge under Canadian Kennel Club rules; W. C. Ingram, Toronto, judged the Bostons; N. K. Swire was the all-rounder.

The show was a two-day affair and undoubtedly it dragged along quite slowly, a circumstance that robbed the show of most of its interest as far as the exhibitors were concerned. Fortunately the weather was beautifully fine and that was a comforting feature of the fixture. To the president of the club, C. S. Webber, of "Glenarden" fame, the show must have been quite discouraging, and the efforts of himself and his associates deserved a greater entry by at least 100 per cent. As it is, the London Canine Association will likely consider the advisability of continuing its spring show next year. Possibly an arrangement may be arrived at whereby the association will hold its annual show immediately before the opening of the Western Fair fixture, and possibly this arrangement will show sufficient of merit to justify the change. Be that as it may, no club can continue to sponsor shows unless support from the exhibiting and dog-loving public becomes more pronounced and generous.

The show was held in the dog show building at the Fair Grounds, and no doubt was too far removed from the city's centre to draw a gate of any consequence. Here again is the all-breed clubs' most serious problem, and unquestionably it is a problem all the clubs in Canada have to contend with, as a good gate is always helpful in furnishing the wherewithal to make ends meet.

Competition in several of the breeds was quite keen, and the interest that was shown in the judging of the Variety Classes and the General Specials was sustained until the last ribbon had been handed out. Looking over the quality that appeared for these choice prizes one was constrained to wait and see the last ribbon handed out. Toy Variety Class brought together the Balcroft

Kennels' splendid Peke Cha-Ming of Balcroft, and the Glenrose Kennels' International Champion Glenrose Flashaway, both Canadian bred. Judge Swire took his time and seemed to be impressed with the high quality of each animal. The Pom won his favor and the prize. This marvelously coated mite also won the points on the Governor-General's Trophy, and was later placed reserve for best in show all breeds. In the Sporting Variety, the Romanoff Kennels won the first prize with their recently acquired Russian Duke; reserve, we believe, going to old Jim Tennant's lovely headed Bloodhound, Princeton Teddy. Mr. Tennant is quite optimistic regarding his immediate aspirations, which are to bench a few of the kind he had on the circuit not so long ago, and which were the joy of all circuit judges, including some of our English "Ermine Wearers." Non-Sporting had four really classy contenders, Beach Park Kennels winning with the well-known circuit winner, Beach Park Dominator, with E. F. Dulen's Carlo von Taubenbrunnen, a splendid Alsatian, in the reserve place. Best Terrier was a win for Albert Handy's Airedale bitch, Norway Queen, with H. O. Dale's recent importation, Bakarian Irishman, a nice sized, good coated "Mick." Best in show all breeds was a fight between Mr. Greenwood's famous Pom, International Champion Glenrose Flashaway, and George Ward's Wire-haired Fox Terrier, International Champion Aman Fox Trot. Both dogs were right up on their toes and seemed to be conscious of the struggle in which they were engaged; both looked as fit as the proverbial fiddle, and both excelled in condition. It looked as if any one of the two was well worthy of the judge's favor. Mr. Swire decided that the nip and tuck decision belonged to the "Wire" and the excitement ended as the Fox Terrier "nipped" the Canadian Kennel Club Trophy and "tucked" it under his arm and called it a day. Bert Swann handled the wire to perfection and received the plaudits of the slim but enthusiastic ringside. Mr. Webber presented the trophy in a few choice words of congratulation.

## LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Toronto, Ont.,  
May 11th, 1927.

Editor, Kennel and Bench:

Dear Sir,—To-day I received Kennel and Bench for May, and on looking through its pages I fail to notice, except in Walter H. Reeves' "Canadian Notes," where any reply is made to Arthur S. Davis' letter re Championship Points, and as I consider Mr. Davis' letter exaggerated and misleading, the matter should not be allowed to pass.

Mr. Davis exaggerates when he says: "It is not a rare occurrence that street roaming Fidos and Togos and mutts are 'roped' in to help our good dogs on their way to a championship." When they are all "roped" in, they are so few that only on rare occasions do they make any difference to the rating.

Mr. Davis says: "If any of them resemble recognized breeds, they are entered in the regular classes provided for them. If they look like nothing at all, they are given some sort of name and stuck in the miscellaneous class." Rule 17, clause 7, says in part: "All dogs of recognized breeds." Therefore, if such dogs are entered, as Mr. Davis would have us believe, it is not the fault of the system but a case of someone breaking the rule, and I have yet to see one of these miscellaneous classes of any undue size, full of "mutts."

The object of the show committee is dollars and not points for, as most of us know, they have a hard task to make a show pay.

To cut out the point system, may eliminate a small evil, but in my opinion, create a greater, in which the show committees, the exhibitor and the Canadian Kennel Club would suffer, and at the same time, making very little difference to the quality of our champions.

Mr. Davis seems to think that a dog taking winners at a one point show should have an equal rating to one taking winners at a five point show. Personally, I do not see any fairness in that, for as I see it, quantity means competition and competition means quality, or, in other words, a dog to win at a five point show, has a harder task to win the "purple" than at a one point show, and the former is often the better dog, and if all dogs awarded winners were given equal number of points, there would still be "cheap" champions—in fact, "cheaper!"

As to a dog becoming a champion by winning at two shows is impos-

sible, for he must win ten points at least at three different shows under three different judges.

I will now give my opinion on our point system:

Owing to the great distances between shows, our sparse population, few shows, and the high quality of the dogs we breed, the system cannot be improved upon except in the less popular breeds.

The English system is out of the question, as Mr. Reeves points out in his May article.

The American system would lower the entries at our shows and perhaps reduce the number of shows.

The judge has the power to withhold any prize for want of merit—therefore, if the rule is obeyed, every dog should be worthy of his title.

# Train Your Own Shooting Dog

By MERVYN LLOYD (Continued).

ON looking over my last contribution under this heading it seems as though I have been giving too many definite instructions regarding a puppy's early upbringing.

I hope that no one who already has a young dog will come to the conclusion that dogs that are not brought up under those conditions are likely to be useless. I have only stated the way which I have found the easiest to handle them, but I fully realize that it is impossible for many sportsmen to be in any way careful with the pup's early education, and in many cases the pup has to spend his growing period as chief playmate for the children.

While the fore-mentioned conditions may give you a little more trouble to gain control over the dog when you take him to the field, he is a long way from hopeless. In fact, few, indeed, are the faults that cannot be corrected, but, at the same time, when you do take him in hand for a serious start with his training, undoubtedly it will be best to keep him as much as possible to yourself, and allow no one else to take him from his kennel yard.

I like to take a pup out when about six months old, if possible, and allow him to do as he likes, and at the same time watch him intently, and try to size up what treatment will be the most effective to make a useful dog out of him. I usually get out where there are good big open spaces and where I am not likely to be disturbed by men or horses. It is always desirable to avoid having your dog (irrespective of age) approach a herd of horses at pasture, particularly if they are bronchos, on the open range. It is very difficult for a dog to get out of their way, when they charge down upon him in orderly formation, and one tap with the fore foot is enough to settle the poor dog's career.

Once you turn your puppy loose, keep your eyes glued upon him. He may be timid for a while and unwilling to leave your heels, but do not try to force him out, just watch him in an unconcerned manner and he will soon begin to sniff around where birds have been and chase meadowlarks, robins and such small birds. Others are off with a bound as soon as they are released. Do not be afraid of losing them, they will invariably return to the place where you turned them loose, so stay where you are and make a mental note of the actions and directions of your pup's course, and what he does, if he happens to run on to some game birds, and notice what length of time has elapsed before he returns to you.

These first few rambles form a very interesting part of the dog's training to me. You have nothing to worry about. It doesn't matter what the puppy does, he is all right, as he doesn't know anything you are not expecting him to do anything properly, and he is not doing anything disobedient because you are not giving him any orders. In fact, you are being taught as to how you are going to teach him.

If it is hot weather and the pup is running very hard, I try to be somewhere near water so that he can get a drink or else I carry a little with me for him, for it is not unusual for them to get so heated up that it may put him down in a fit. But this is only in the case of very wild, excitable, highly strung dogs such as the present field trial types often prove to be. If he happens to be one of these, try to get hold of him when you think he is getting exhausted, catch him when he comes near you without

shouting too much. If you sit down or get out of his sight, behind a bush, they will usually come up to you, but it is almost useless to expect him to come to you when you call him. In all probability he is so excited that he will not be able to hear you when he is running fast. To realize this one has only to get astride of a moderately fast horse and let him into a smart gallop and then try to keep up a conversation with a companion riding alongside of you. You will find that you have to shout pretty loudly, and only to get your voice to carry a few feet even then.

So, wait your opportunity to catch the wild running pup and handle him kindly when you get him. You can wander along quietly with him for a while and find plenty to interest you while he is getting cooled off, particularly if you do not spend a great deal of your time in the country and are desirous of entering into any sort of nature study, which I shall take for granted that you are by the mere fact that you have started out to train a sporting dog.

No man who gets his sport with his gun—be it for game birds or big game, can be unobservant of the wonders of the countryside—of the birds, big and little, in their hundreds, and of the different ways and means they have of living their little lives and thereby assuming that there shall be successors to fill their places when they are gone.

It is interesting to notice what the intervention of man has to do with the different species of wild bird life, and how the plow, in some ways is beneficial and in others detrimental to its increase.

If you cast your eye above, now and then, you will always see hawks floating around. I often see as many as five or six at the same time. I do not know if they are always hunting or just sailing around for exercise. 'Tis not often you will see them swoop, but they rarely miss their game when they do. They inflict grievous losses to the sportsman's gun. Few days pass in August and September that I do not find the remains of game birds that have fallen prey to them—often flushing the bird off the carcass of a fresh victim. The duck hawk and the large owls are the greatest enemies to our western game birds.

I have, on many occasions, read of observers having examined the contents of the stomachs of these birds and finding that they lived almost exclusively on rodents and other vermin, but has anyone ever gone to the trouble to do so in Western Canada during the winter time, when the ground is covered with snow, and particularly in the times, as at present, when the periodical scarcity of the snow-shoe rabbit is at hand?

The damage done by the duck hawk (which stays here all winter) and the owls is appalling.

I have, during the winter just past, had many good, strong coveys of partridges under observation, and watched them gradually dwindle down to nothing. I blame the owls for getting most of them because the partridges being night feeders make an easy prey for them. Towards evening one can always see them running about on top of the snow, besides when you find the remains left on the top of a hummock or ant-hill in an open glade within the bush you can be sure as to who was the culprit. The chickens do not move around so much at night but rather stay in their snowy bed until morning arrives and then come out to sun themselves for a while before starting out to feed.

Why should the owls be protected by guardians of game? From dusk until dawn the whole country resounds with their hooting.

But, I fear I am wandering from the training of your pup and he will be getting anxious for another run. Let him try it again and you will soon find that he will start to watch you to find out which way you are heading, and then you will soon have him working in the direction you desire to hunt.

## Buying and Selling

No doubt there are many people who think that the matter of buying and selling dogs is practically the same, and that if they can buy a dog without any trouble, they should be able to sell one with as little expenditure of energy. I am afraid that this is a very grave mistake and reminds one of the old adage, "Buying is one thing and selling is another." Yet there are instances where people (especially women) have bought a dog and then felt aggrieved because when they had tired of their purchase, the former owner would not buy him back again except at a considerable reduction. The purchaser should, however, remember that if they want to get the same money they paid, not only must the dog be offered in the same excellent condition as when he was bought, but a buyer must be found, who wants that particular dog and who is willing to give the price asked. Selling dogs is greatly a matter of luck, or shall I say, of having the article which exactly fulfills your client's requirements. The chief success to the seller lies in possessing the right article at the precise moment it is required, and being able to put it down in the pink of condition. There is nothing which appeals so much to the buyer as conditions and manners. Therefore, it behoves those who have dogs to sell, to see that they are well groomed, well fed and neither shy nor afraid of strangers.

The average person who buys a pet dog pays far more attention to his manners and conditions than to his show points, and I have known very big prices given for small animals which had little else to commend them beyond a pretty face and figure and an attractive personality. Then there are buyers who go with a full purse insisting upon having the best which money can buy. Such people pay, and pay well, but it does not always follow that the great winner will do well in their hands. In fact, if they are novices the chances are much against it. When the amateur buys a well-known dog from an experienced breeder, he gets not only a first-class animal, but one in the perfection of show form, as it is termed. A big check can buy a good dog, but it does not and cannot keep him in tip-top show condition — hence the novice would be well advised to employ a capable person in his kennels, until by patience, close observation

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and quick wit he is himself qualified to undertake the work. If the novice has not the necessary time at his disposal or does not feel sure of his ability to learn and "carry on," it would be better for him to purchase a less valuable animal upon which to gain experience, thus minimizing the risk of loss or disappointment. The person who is really keen and blessed with a certain amount of common sense, is bound to succeed in the end and to work his way to honor and glory.

Buying and selling is a compact between two people. The one is anxious to buy and the other to sell. Business is almost certain to result when such is the case, but the price will depend upon the quality and condition of the animal. In order to be a successful buyer and to choose wisely, one should not be too eager to make a selection because some trifling feature pleases the eye. It will be better to take in the dog as a whole, noting both good and bad points, and considering them carefully. The buyer of moderate means should not be led into giving a higher price than the dog is worth, because the owner does not wish to sell. This pose is an artificial one. The price which tempts a reluctant owner to sell to an eager purchaser, will naturally differ considerably from the price which an eager seller would get from a reluctant purchaser. If, first of all, you are very keen to buy, and then equally keen to sell, you are sure to make a bad bargain on each occasion. Sound judgment and an equitable temperament are the great assets for successful dealing. I have always said that the best is the cheapest in the long run and I am sure that this applies to all branches of dog breeding. One good dog is worth a dozen poor ones. Mediocrity is dear at any price.

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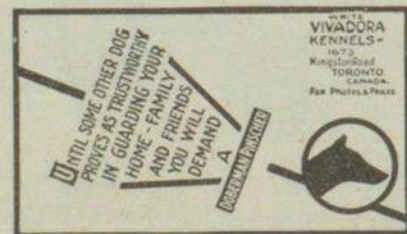
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
