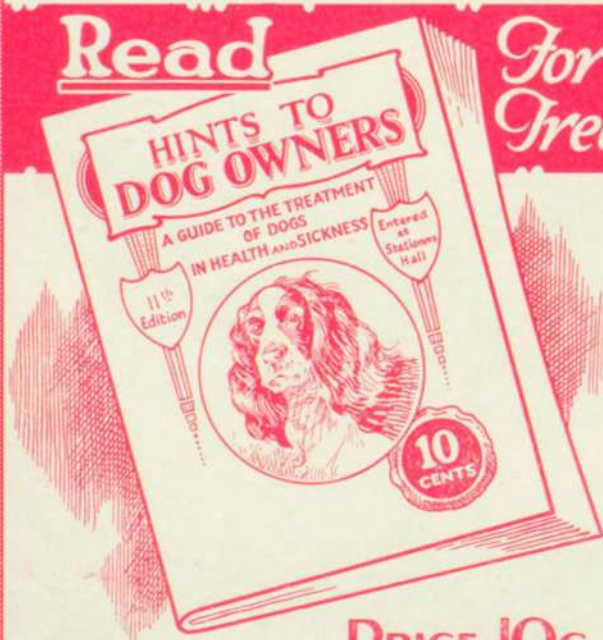

THE CANADIAN FANCY



By WALTER H. REEVES, Belleville, Ontario.

UST have been asked to decide a wager made by four men interested in Wire-haired Fox Terriers. All four have been interested in the breed covering a period of ten years or more, and two are of opinion that the present-day winners do not compare at all favorably with the bygone champions; whilst the other two take the opposite view. That our present champions are the equal of any of the past celebrities.

I feel complimented in being asked to decide the wager, and also to give my opinion and description of the Wire Fox Terriers prominent when I became interested in dog shows and the breeding of dogs. To decide a wager like this is by no means an easy task, for whenever men interested in dogs meet, one is almost sure to hear some old breeder express his opinion that the present-day winners would not be in the money if shown against some of the old-time champions.

I believe the reason for this oft-expressed opinion, is, that as we get older we get more critical, and everyone can recall the pleasure when we saw in our early days in the Fancy the great dog of our favorite breed and the lasting impression this dog left. In the days when we were looked upon as novices, we were not nearly as critical as we became when we came to be recognized by our fellow-fanciers as judges, good or bad, as the case may be.

To-day I have not the slightest hesitation in stating that, in my opinion, collectively, that all breeds have improved, and especially Wire-haired Fox Terriers. In some points, perhaps not, but in type, compactness and style I am of opinion that our present-day winners are ahead of the old celebrities. I believe that many old breeders will agree with me when I write that wire-haired coats are not as good as they were twenty years ago. The days when one had to show our wires natural, when to use a

knife or trimming comb meant that, if we were found out, it probably meant suspension by the Kennel Club, and we were only allowed to remove the long hairs with our finger and thumb. In those days a Wire-haired Fox Terrier with a soft or linty coat was practically useless as a show proposition. The introduction of the safety razor, knife and cutting comb has meant ruination to the real wire coats our Fox Terriers used to have. In fact, the fashion of the present day of exhibiting our wires with nanny goat beards and enough hair on the legs that

will enable the Terrier trimmer to make a crooked leg appear straight, means that a real wire coat is not wanted, for the reason that a Wire Fox Terrier with a real good coat will not grow the whiskers and leg feathering seen on our present-day winners.

* * *

In inspecting some of the photographs of our bygone celebrities, one gets the impression—or new fanciers do—that these bygone celebrities were of mediocre class. The impression is emphasized by the fact that the photographs were untouched, and that the coat was not trimmed or barbered. To-day the modern improvements that have been made with photography is so great, that no one except the neophyte would ever think of

buying a Wire Fox Terrier from a photograph. If living in England, all a fancier has to do if he wants a picture of an ideal Wire Fox Terrier, is to box a wire to one of the artists they have there in dog photography and in due time he will receive a photograph that resembles in markings but nowhere else, the terrier he sent.

Through my connection with the doggy press in England, I was able to see the old-time winners in their best attire at the shows, and also at home, and since coming to America in 1915 I have become even more interested in Wires, and although I know that many authorities will not agree, my opinion is that the all-round quality of our present day Wires is vastly superior to the days when terriers exhibited by the following: Messrs. William

Bred by Francis Redmond and later owned by Chris Houliker. This dog was considered to be one of the best in his day, but where would he fit in now? Let the "old timers" answer.

Carrick, Arthur Maxwell, Sir Humphrey de Trafford, J. A. Doyle, L. P. C. Astley, F. Hayward, Field, Enoch Welburn, Tom Wootten, A. Mutter, George Welch, C. Bartle, W. B. Brumby, C. J. Wharton, Sam Hill, J. J. Pine and J. H. Swinger, were in the hey-day of their fame as breeders and exhibitors of Wires. My earliest recollection of Wires were when C. J. Wharton of "Bushy" fame had such a grand team headed by Champion Bushy Broom, who was somewhat severely criticized for his want of substance. I happened to be present at the Kennel Club Show at Olympia, London, where Carrick's Carlisle Tyro, after winning the Fox Terrier Club's Fifty Guinea Cup, was objected to by the judge, Arthur Maxwell, for alleged tampering with the carriage of his ears. The protest was sustained by the Kennel Club and the Fancy certainly lost a real fancier in Carrick. I was too young at the time to venture an opinion myself on Tyro, but I have often heard the opinion expressed that Tyro was a great dog and that he could have given some of our present-day winners a close fight.

* * *

Some twenty-six years ago I became associated with The Illustrated Kennel News, and the following are a few of the prominent Wires that came to my notice up to 1915 when I came to America to take control of the Vickery Kennels, unquestionably, at the time, the best kennel of Wires in the world. Francis Redmond, in 1902, had "Don't Go Bang," a son of All Bristless. He was a neat-headed terrier with a real wire coat. James Cheadk had Champion Royston Remas, a compact little terrier, who probably to-day would be faulted by our present-day judges for lack of length and quality in head. Remas was the sire of Champion King Elb and that beautiful bitch, Champion Dusky Rheime. Eastbourne Tyrant, shown by Boyce of Eastbourne, was a fairly consistent winner, but he would have little chance of winning to-day. Pitt Pitts was exhibiting Echo Scout, a son of Ch. Burkby Ben. The Duchess of Newcastle had Champion Cackler of Notts, Commodore of Notts and Captain of Notts. Cackler will always be remembered as one of the greatest stud dogs of his time. George Mason had Meersbrook Ben, a long-headed terrier, somewhat long in back. Foxton Farmer, who did considerable winning around 1907, was criticized for his somewhat big ears and stilty action behind. Ch. Newmarket Cackler, shown by Felix Leach, was a very stylish terrier wanting somewhat in second thighs. Ch. Dusky Admiral, bred by Francis Redmond, had a troublesome coat for those days, but had a wonderful show career. When becoming the property of Chris Houlker, J. J. Holgate's Ch. Southboro Salex was a terrier I always admired. Ch. Tipton Slasher, who won many firsts for A. Mutter, was certainly on the leg and did not grow enough coat for the present day style. I have always heard that Ch. Meersbrook Bristles, a tan-marked terrier, and a pillar of strength at stud, had too many "Ifs" to turn the trick on any of our present winners. He had, I am informed, very ordinary ears, thin feet, and his action behind left a lot to be desired. Bristles was the sire of many great winners, including the late Geo. Roper's Champion Go Bang and Matchmaker, who was purchased by Frazer and Lindsay. Champion Matchmaker was a very impressive headed terrier but, like so many long-headed terriers, he was overdone in length of back. My old confrere, L. P. C. Astley, was much impressed by R. Mayhew's Hands Up, when he judged New York and induced Mayhew to send him to England, but he did not create a favorable impression on the other side. Miss Hatfield's brace, Dusky Siren and Morden Bull's Eye, were both

beautiful terriers, the bitch especially. Bull's Eye, to my way of thinking, was somewhat plain in skull. St. Anne's Primrose, a sensational winner of her time, was decidedly long in back. Champion Greenbank Selection, a classical headed terrier, with a beautiful body, was faulty in feet and staples, and so was his daughter, the beautiful headed Ch. Brockley Miss Circuit. Comedian of Notts, faulted by critics for his size, undoubtedly left his mark at stud. Ch. Short Circuit came out at Reading show under the name of Brockley Bruiser, and was purchased after Bristol show from his breeders, A. E. Way, by G. S. Thomas. At seven months he was a very classical terrier, getting his championship in quick time before attaining the age of one year. He was sold back to his breeder, the astute George finding that in his absence Short Circuit had "gone on growing." The "If" of his puppy days. Ch. Short Circuit eventually proved a great sire, amongst his get being the great Watford Vic, considered by many sound judges the best Wire bitch ever bred. Champion Wireboy of Paignton, bred by Miss Lewis, I bought for George S. Thomas for \$4,500 in 1915. He was a remarkable terrier, but even when I received Thomas' cable instructions to buy, I hesitated to pay the price, which at the time was a record for a terrier. The authorities in England evidently thought so, too, for my telegram telling Miss Lewis that I would buy was never delivered, and evidently it aroused some suspicion that spies were at work around that beautiful part of Devon—Paignton, where Miss Lewis had her kennel. Wireboy was sold by Thomas to Geo. Quintard and his son. Ch. Ridgeway Dark Boy proved even more successful at stud, amongst his progeny being James F. Strachan's wonderful bitch, Ch. Ormsby Lightning, who bears a striking resemblance to Matford Vic, but personally I consider her a better bitch.

Other great terriers about at this time were Ch. Fountain Crusader, Bristolic Bristles, Olcliffe Captain Collar of Notts, Crunky of Notts, Collarbone of Notts, Miss Springtime Newmarket Hard Nut, Cocatina of Notts, Ch. Fast Freight, Raby, Dazzler. Francis Redmond met with great success in crossing his bitches with the Clumber dogs, and Miss Hatfield also bred a number of high-class Wires and it was through Morden Blusterer that Comedian of Notts, one of the pillars of the stud book, was reproduced, but in tracing back it will be found that smooth blood was introduced by both Miss Hatfield and Francis Redmond. Emroy Patrol Leader, the sire of Shaw McKeen, Ch. Pride's Hill Tweek Em, was a plain-headed terrier and usually his progeny were overdone in ears. Round Up, a grand bodied little terrier, went a little coarse in skull, with age, and just before he sired Aman Marvel, he was put on price to me for a very few dollars. Round Up was a very excitable terrier, and after he had deteriorated as a show specimen he was found somewhat of a nuisance in a kennel until as, I say, he sired Aman Marvel. Brockley Gamester, the sire of Short Circuit, was an attractive terrier, with a rather indifferent coat. All these terriers came out when the all-round quality was by no means as level as it is to-day, and therefore a terrier that was at all outstanding looked so much better than a terrier of equal merit would to-day.

When I came to take charge of the Vickerys in 1915, I found the greatest collection of Wires ever owned by one kennel. Amongst them were Fast Freight, Bubbling Water Wire Result, Revoke, Estelle Gipsy Moth, Greenback Selection, Brockley Crasher, Brockley Miss Circuit, Coquette, Chalkline, Bubbles, Flash, Collarbone, Emroy Patrol Leader, Ida Circuit, Moonshine, Quicksand, Quick-

silver, Romance, Skirmish, Switchboard, Winnetka, Moth Millar, and many others. Some idea of the strength of the kennel will be understood when I mention that when the dates of the American Fox Terrier Club was announced soon after my arrival in America I went over the terriers with Eland Hadfield, my head man, and we picked out sixty Wires to be prepared for the show. Of all the collection I have always held the opinion that the pick of the kennel was Gipsy Moth. The show was postponed for two months and our Wires were all "blowy" and full in coat. When J. J. Holgate judged the shows Vickery Gamester was reserve winners and should have won. Vickery Wincanton Sylvia made her debut and gained winners' bitch and the special for best fox terrier.

Looking back only two terriers of the Vickery's would have a chance to-day with the present Wires and the kennel contained the pick of the English winners.

When I went back to England after the war the first show I judged Last O' Gamester and Deykin Surprise came out, the former with the exceptional of his peculiar tail carriage, was one of the soundest Wires I have ever handled. Surprise was weak at pasterns and his skull needed artistic treatment for, on handling it, one found the hollow skull found on some Irish Terriers.

Personally I not only believe that the all-round quality of our Wires is far superior to before the war, and that although naturally we are not breeding as many champions as English breeders, the all-round quality of American-bred Wire Fox Terriers compares most favorably with those produced across the pond. The fault on this side is, that we are fond of

taking chances, showing our terriers when they are out of coat, either full or short, and nothing tells so much to-day in the Wire Fox Terrier ring than a Wire shown in indifferent coat. The champions imported from England are shown fit as hands and the knife will make them, and this is the reason why the importations usually do so well on their debut on this side. To-day we are in a most fortunate position as regards reliable stud dogs, and therefore I believe that our Wires will continue to keep up their quality and maintain their well deserved popularity.

* * *

The photographs of Ch. Dusky Admiral, Ch. Gladiator and Ch. Wycombe Result show how the styles in preparation of Wires have changed. Note the absence of the abundant whiskers and leg feathering seen on our present-day Wires.

I am sorry to hear of the death of Mr. Chevrier's Springer Spaniel, Ch. Springbok of Ware. Almost the first dog I saw on going back to England after the war was Springbok. He was bred by Mr. Lloyd and being a war baby could not be shown—although generally admitted by English Springer men to be one, if not the best Springer dog out at that time—becoming the property of Mr. Chevrier, he very quickly gained the title of Champion and has proved indeed a pillar of strength at stud, having sired innumerable winners and over twenty champions.

I had a pleasant surprise on changing trains at Calgary, en route for Edmonton for I found a most congenial companion on the train in George Robertson, the well known Scottish Terrier breeder of Ottawa, who was visiting the West, going over the Government Poultry Farms and also judging poultry at a number of the Western shows, including Calgary, Edmonton, Saskatoon, Regina, etc. Naturally we did not talk chickens but dogs, and I gathered an item of news for my column—hearing a glowing account of a Scottish Terrier bitch—imported from ex Baillie, James Dalgleish of Galashiels, Scotland. The bitch, I heard was really a nice one, particularly good in head and eye, she is owned by Chief of Police Ritchie of Calgary and was very busily engaged rearing a litter, by R. Chapman's Champion Merlewood Aristocrat—who has had so many strong classes at shows in Scotland and England.

I shall always have very pleasant memories of the Edmonton Dog Fanciers Club Show held in conjunction with the Edmonton Exhibition on July 17th, 18th and 19th. I was met at the station by Secretary Jack Young and Bob Crandall and on arrival at the show found a most enthusiastic band of fanciers. The show was particularly well managed, Secretary Young carried out an educational programme by having gotten together photographs of every known breed of dog, which were tastefully arranged on cardboard boards and placed on the wall of the Dog Show building. Another innovation of Secretary Young was a chart of the benching with the name and bench of every exhibit.

I have heard a lot of the warm hospitality of the Edmonton fanciers many times from "Jimmy" and can now thoroughly endorse his opinion. In my travels I have never met a better lot of sportsmen, whether I gave a blue or a yellow it was accepted with a smile and one and all of the Club members were out to give me a warm Western welcome and I came away feeling confident that I had met and made a number of new friends. Harry Nash, whose hobby is Retrievers has been president of the club for sixteen years and is the right man for the job. He possesses the ability to get everyone in the club to give a hand. He was chief steward. George Kirkwood gave me invaluable assistance as ring steward. L. E. Wise, who is getting together a nice kennel

of Springers looked after the award board and J. Caswell and W. Quilley the local handlers, rendered real aid to the novices in helping them to bring their dogs into the ring. A really nice entry was obtained, the quality all through being far above my expectations. George Kynoch brought a real team from Winnipeg and carried away many specials including the two most important, best dog and best Canadian. These specials being won by Mr. Chevrier's Springer Spaniel, Ch. Marvel of Avondale. On the first evening of the show the usual dinner and dance was held, a real get together evening, which was thoroughly enjoyed by the seventy-five members and their friends who were present. My notes have been somewhat hurried but I will have more to say in next month's issue, of the show, but in the meantime I wish to extend my thanks to the Edmonton fanciers for the enjoyable time they extended me.

AT EDMONTON.

The Edmonton Dog Fanciers held their annual show under Canadian Kennel Club Rules in conjunction with the Exhibition on July 17th, 18th and 19th. Close to two hundred and fifty dogs being benched. The building, if the interest in dogs increases as it promises, will have to be enlarged. The dogs were comfortably benched. The judging ring being under cover and away from the main building. Russian Wolfhounds were a very nice group. Bashol of Athen, a well grown puppy with nice arch and low and well placed shoulders. Grand Duke of Athen has not the quality of the winner, but has size and very good legs and feet. Silvertip of Athen, a big hound, loose at elbows, and not the best of stiflers. In bitches, Zena Nellie Racine, a well made quality hound, could not be denied. Queenie of Athens is a puppy of much promise, well placed shoulders and very good arch and loin.

German Shepherds were a nice group, the winning dog puppy, Erich Von Minkovitz, a black and tan with fine gait and nice angulation, needs to fine down a little in head. Baltz of Dunrobin, very fair angulation, typical head but needing time yet in legs and feet. Dolf of Dunrobin, rather short in back and a little plain at present in head. Novice, Peter Alexis Von Kirk, a black and tan with nice angulation fair quality head and good gait. Fritz Von Minkovitz, not the best of pasterns, angulation fair. In Canadian bred dogs, Hanush

Von Kirk a very nice quality black and tan had a somewhat easy win, he is a nice size with typical head, good body and gait, perhaps wanting a little in substance. The limit winner, Derich of Cosalta is a shade plain in skull and needs time yet in stiflers and on the day was somewhat light in condition, a dog of distinct promise and just needs time. The open winner, Claus Von Kukfelds, a very impressive dog, with beautiful gait and body. The best of the bitches was Frea Del Romni who is somewhat on the small size but has fair type and quality.

Great Danes only a couple of fair puppies, too young to criticise. The Collies generally showed a want of quality in head, a bright exception being the winning dog, Glenhill Jerry, a very handsome, heavy coated black and tan with beautiful head, neat ears and capital body, legs and feet.

Airedale Terriers, Novice dog, Mascen Bromfield, is a shade strong in skull and could be shorter in back with advantage, nice bone, legs and feet, fair texture of coat, good color. The St. Bernards were generally lacking in type and similar remarks apply to the Newfoundland Greyhounds. Locarno, a big well made hound, capital quarters and depth of brisket. Warplanes Blue Girl is a blue with great power behind, well placed shoulders and very good neck. Bulldogs. Chincok Argo, the winning dog is sound and active, he owns a well furnished head, with nice cushion and turn up well placed shoulders and excellent bone, perhaps a little long in back, which would be improved with a more defined cut up of loin, a dog who should quickly gain his title. Edmonton White Lad, a great headed dog, not quite pleasing in expression, a sound, active dog, who could do with more depth in brisket. Wrex is a capital bodied little brindle, low and cloudy, fair length of skull, could do with more width in face. Silverdale Snowdrop, a really good bitch, not in the best of form, having just left puppies, great front and shoulders, sound and active. Patricia Rose shows promise, puppy with a really good head and body and well placed shoulders. Toy Terriers. Little Bits From Here and There

Canadian Kennel Club Stud Books do not show that the Schipperke has ever been a popular dog in Canada, and in fact most of our Stud Books have no entries for the breed at all, but we notice that there is a miniature measure of popularity springing up around the little "Schip" in the United States, and at Del Monte and Hollywood shows the Schipperke found itself competing in the Groups that lead to the higher places at Oakland Show, 19 of the little fellows were actually benched. Charlie Chaplin is said to have eight good ones himself. himself.

At the Canadian National Exhibition last year Mrs. G. E. Brown,cliffe, Toronto, caused a mild sensation of curiosity when she benched the English Champion, Roff O' the North, by Ch. Rolls O' the North, ex. Ch. Bluff O' the North, which had come to Toronto late in May 1927. Benched with the striking Ch. Roff O' the North was the beautiful black female—also an English champion—Ch. Mirth O' the North, and Mystery of Windsor (Imp.), a trio that made a lot of friends for themselves at the "Big Fair." And it is said that there will be no less than ten of these sharp little fellows shown at the Canadian National Exhibition this year, when, no doubt, many Old Country people who used to know the "Little Skipper" at home, will want to secure a specimen again.

It was not until 1887 that the breed first attracted attention in Great Britain, the well-known J. M. Barrie's "Flo" being credited with being the first to arrive. In the meantime, over 100 specimens have graced some of the English show benches.

His qualities as a house dog and watch it is impossible to over-rate. Smart and always on the alert, no sound seems to escape his ears. Prompt and persistent in his alarm, he is a great tactician, and gives the intruder no chance to land a kick or a blow. Fond of water, he is a splendid swimmer; he loves to work on the destruction of rats, and to hunt rabbits from bush or bramble is his especial sport. We hope to see "The Little Captain" catching on in Canada, and look to Mrs. Brown to make that possible.

Schipperke breeders would notice that no classification appeared in the Canadian National Exhibition premium list, and of course this was an oversight at time of preparing the

list, and we are officially advised that the following classification will be given to "The Little Skipper":—

Class 349.—Canadian-bred, Dogs and Bitches.

Class 350. — Limit, Dogs and Bitches.

Class, 351.—Open, Dogs. Winners, Bitches.

Class 352.—Open, Bitches. Winners, Bitches. Best of Breed.

There will be a good entry of Schipperkes this year, and we hope to have in competition several from the United States.

Central Canada Exhibition has also given a good classification for "Schipps."

Collie fanciers will regret to learn that Jack Munroe, the former mayor of Elk Lake, is dead. Jack fought in the South African War, and later in the World War. He was the man who owned the Collie "Bobbie Burns," the Collie hero of the benches. It was big-hearted Jack who took "Bobbie" from Canada to England, then to France, then to Belgium, where the little dark mahogany Sable and White was wounded. When the dog returned to Canada as the pride of Munroe's regiment—the Princess Pats—the Toronto Humane presented "Bobbie" with a special medal, and the writer recalls Mr. Munroe calling at the Old Crown Bank, on King Street, Toronto, and in the Engineers Room "talking Collie." when Bobbie Burns went through his paces uncanily for his big burly master.

The late Jack Munroe may be better remembered as the man who, in 1902, fought Jim Jeffries on December 19th for four rounds and had the distinction of flooring the mighty Jeffries in one of the rounds, and it is history that Jim did not knock Jack out. In 1903 Jack Munroe knocked out Peter Maher in the fourth round at Philadelphia, on November 7th, and in the same city on January 27th the following year, 1904, he was awarded the decision over Tom Sharkey. In 1905 Jack scored knock-outs over Doc Payne and Hank Pardello, met Jack Johnson in a six-round no-decision fight at Philadelphia, and won from Tom Murphy in a six-round bout at Sydney, Nova Scotia. We merely mention his boxing career, so that our readers may be the better able to appraise the type of battler of worldly affairs generally that our old friend Jack

really was. It will long remain a loving memory to recall the big tears running down Munroe's face as he described the battle scar that showed so plainly on the forearm of "Bobbie Burns," his Collie pal, and then to remember the same tearful eye follow to the empty sleeve on Jack's own coat.

A lover of adventure, the gold fields had always been an allurements to him, and we are not surprised that his body was found in his prospector's cabin near Rouyn.

Moose Jaw Kennel Club has solved the "Dog in the Crate" evil very satisfactorily by adopting as a general rule the following:

"Rule 18.—All dogs must be benched. No dogs will be allowed to remain in their crates during the show hours. The general public pay an admission fee to see the dogs and not empty benches.

"This rule will be enforced rigidly and a fine of \$5.00 will be imposed on any exhibitor for infraction of the rule."

At recent shows when the writer has casually asked show superintendents, "How many dogs have you in the show?" and the answer given was a certain number, the first query has been followed by, "Where are they?" And the answer has been, "They are all benched with the exception of those in their crates."

When 25 dogs or more are allowed to remain in their crates, it is quite probable that the cream of the entry is denied the admiration of the general public, that is quite a disadvantage, but apparently nothing compared to the advantage of coming out of the crate spic, span and eager at the moment that they are required in the ring, when the disadvantage of the benched dog is decidedly noticeable.

Here is a condition that must be eliminated for the general welfare of dog shows. If the Westminster Kennel Club, with an entry of over 2,000 dogs, can report every dog—less four—benched by noon on the opening day of their show, surely it is to the advantage of show-giving clubs to see all dogs are promptly and properly benched during the show hours. "The vicious dog" and "The bitch in season" bogeys can be taken care of by the veterinary in charge of the show, and his certificate only should be the only justification for absence from the bench.

JULY 2nd saw the advent of the newly formed Coast City Kennel Club's first show, held in the Dog Show Building of the Pacific Exhibition at Hastings Park, Vancouver, B.C.

Ideal weather prevailed for a fixture of this kind.

The attendance was good and everyone seemed to be enjoying themselves.

I am told the American entry was a record for B.C., dogs coming from Portland, Oregon, Illinois, Seattle, Wn., Bothell, Wn., Tacoma, Bellingham, Pendleton and Linton, Oregon, also a quality entry from Victoria and from New Westminster.

The officials of this club deserve a lot of credit for the way in which the show carried out.

Mr. Percy Johnston, the Superintendent had a band of good stewards and kept the ring well supplied.

Mr. R. Hatley proved he was an artist at the blackboard while the President, G. L. Stock and Mrs. Stock and Mrs. Hatley, in turn looked after the gate and assisted the obliging Secretary, Harry Lester.

The dog parade led off with Chihuahuas, a breed that is fast coming to the front, not being blessed with a long coat like the majority of Toys, is not hard to keep in condition.

"Empress Carlotta" was Best of Breed and was handled to perfection by her popular owner, Mrs. Ambos.

Patricia of Powell River had a walk over in Pugs.

Mr. and Mrs. Harrison's sweet little Orange Pom, "Sunny" was best of a quality collection of this breed. I noticed that his sire and dam carry the Melbourne prefix.

There was an entry of 12 Pekingese. Mrs. Marshall showed a promising Parti in "Ki Loo," one of her own breeding who had to give way in the next class to "Ho Jo," a very evenly balanced dog. "Pagan Lion" took open and winners, a very short faced dog, ample bone, low to ground, with "Ho Jo" Reserve.

Bitches were not the quality of the dogs. Mrs. G. H. Manning had the winner in "Fo Chue," a litter sister to "Ho Jo." Reserve bitch "Mousmee of Shantung," whom I have seen looking better.

"Ch. Chong Yung Shi," was Best of Breed (what an expression.)

"Captain Thomson" was the best Airedale.

Alec McCloy had Best of Breed in Scotch Terriers with "Eglinton Sweet Memory," who I also made Best Terrier in Show, a bitch with a wonderful expression, good eye, ears well placed, beautiful body set off with wonderful hind quarters and a short tail. Her son "Kirkhope Regal," owned by Alderman Archie Hogg of New Westminster, was Winners Dogs much on the order of his dam.

Both winners in Irish Terriers were owned by Mr. Acheson of Seattle, Washington.

International Ch. "Bubbling Over," was the only Bull Terrier, a bitch that is deserving of keen competition, give her a little more fire and she would be away up in the variety class. She has a nice filled in foreface and the best eye I have seen in a Bull Terrier for a long time.

Smooth Fox Terriers, "Inglewood Defiance" Winners Dogs and Best of Breed, a very evenly balanced dog. "Nottingham Victor" Reserve, had too much pep on the day and it was impossible to get his outline. "Nottingham Pierrette" Winners Bitches, with a very promising daughter, "Ch. Quakertown." "Quarterbacks" for Reserve. Winners Dogs, Winners and Reserve Winners bitch are all owned by H. W. Wilkinson.

Wire Fox Terrier puppy dogs had four entries, three answered the call, First and Reserve Winners, Mr. Geo. Lydiatt's "Redcliff Sunrise," a real little Terrier who is "asking for it" all the time; the same gentleman showed this dog's litter brother "Redcliff Starlight," who accounted for Second in Limit Dogs, he is a little larger than the winning puppy but for markings are almost identical. Age and handling will work wonders with this pair. Geo. Pearson had "Ace of Vanity" looking better than I ever saw him and took First in the Limit, he also is half brother to the former pups and they claim Barrington Bridegroom for their Grandsire.

"Hampton Hustler," a game showman, rather strong in head and could have been put down in better condition. "Right Away," Mr. G. G. Tyson's imported dog, First, Open and Winners, what an outlook this dog has, head and tail up all the time, short back and wonderful bone.

"Redcliff Frisky," won First Puppy, First Novice and Reserve Winners, big enough, lots of style, good length of head, nice eye. I made her better in front neck, head and eye than "Cordiller Live Wire," who was second in Open to "Defynog Desire" this bitch taking Winners and Best of Breed over "Right Away," her condition was not to be compared with the dog but she is a better topped one and I like her going and coming very much better. This bitch when put down right can go a long way in any company.

Ten Whippets gathered for the W. Clift Cup with "Comet Pale Face" the Winner, like she has been in many a race.

This is a good combination bitch, black body, white head and feet. Pete, the next time out not quite so much meat and fine her tail down.

"Ascot Blue Eagle" was Winners Dogs, this chap now lacks one point of his championship, a very sound dog, rather large.

The big American winner, "Inglehurst Banberry," took everything in Gordon Setters.

Miss R. Duke came over from Victoria with her imported Irish Setter bitch, "Sweet Anne," well named, what a color.

"Ace Wapato," was best Pointer.

English Setters were next, not a large entry but wonderful quality. Mrs. J. C. Hogg had a nice brace by Int. Ch. "McConnell's Nori," well handled by Miss Rogers, wonderful condition, age will work wonders with these twins.

Open dogs found "Lord O'Morn" First, a very even balanced Blue Belton with the Lemon Belton "Mallhawk Rackets Boy" Second, this dog has a wonderful head and an eye that a lot of the Blues would like to have. He was in very poor condition and moved bad. I gave this dog Best in Show, all Breeds at Gresham, Oregon, last year, but he was a different dog to-day. The great Int. Ch. "McConnell's Nori" was absent. Well, "Mac," the races were on, weren't they?

Bob Balshaw had "Selkirk Juliet" in the pink and Mrs. Balshaw handled her to perfection. This lady only gets excited when she handles St. Bernards.

Juliet was Best of Breed and Best Sporting.

Springer Spaniels had Mrs. S. B. Wyard's Ch. "Famous Lady Danna" Best of Breed, beautiful condition; she was the only female.

Woodland Victor, Winners Dog, is a big fellow, absolutely sound, wonderful spring of rib, good depth of muzzle—and what a mover! Just a little larger than I like.

Some very promising youngsters appeared in the Cocker division, look out for "Matlock Utopia II," and "Ma Cherie Ado." Billy Oates had the Winner and Reserve Winner in Black dogs. Mrs. Roman's "Pure Gold" was Winners bitch and Best Opposite Sex, any color. "Boneta of Golenstate," Reserve Winners in Black bitches, is a nice one. I made her a trifle longer than the Winner and also a dip behind the shoulders. Billy Oates had the best Red.

"Page's Princess Jack Spot" was Winners bitches parti color, a short coupled one, not so pleasing in head.

"Roman's Flame," Winners, parti color dogs and Best of Breed, wonderful condition—like all the Romans.

The Boston Terrier quality has been much better up this way lately.

Mrs. H. Bate's "Mushon Peter Blink," Winners dogs, a very stylish dog. "Playfair's Lorraine," Best of Breed on the same lines as the winner's dog, but a better mover. Mrs. Playfair can learn a lot of them how to handle a Boston.

In future that beautiful cream colored Russian Wolfhound will be known as International Champion. "Peter the Great V," I am told by his owner. I gave him his first ribbon and points in the States. Congratulations, Mrs. Haddock. One Old English Sheepdog, the best I have seen in Canada.

"Ch. Brunswick Bob" was Best Collie, this five year old dog has not thickened a particle and looks to be good for many a battle yet.

"Olympic O'Lindy," a perfect eye and good foreface, a trifle listless on the day, was best bitch.

Miss Leigh Spencer had the best French Bull I have ever seen her with and took everything.

A nice entry of Alsatis with "Gerrie of Ardwin," cleaning up well, handled by Mrs. Williams of Portland, Oregon, tighten him a little in shoulders, flatten his rib a trifle and then what more would you want. The dog that breeders of Alsatis will have to look out for shortly is "Con Dors Kuno Von Yongo" First in Limit. Just a little more substance to take away that feminine look. This dog's sire, "Yongo du Mahon" was Second Open and Reserve Winners. "Jealousy of Dundas" Third Open, has a wonderful length of body, good head, low at shoulder, could have better feet.

"Jane of Armourdale," once more took Winners and her condition was much better than when I saw her last.

"Trudy Von Mangoldstein," Reserve Winners, very poor condition.

"Conrad of Nordigg," was Best Puppy, a beautiful headed dog in nice

The followers of the Whip-pets are still a live organization and periodically pull off their local handicaps; two of such were run off of late, but details of the winners appear elsewhere in this issue.

THE SLED DOGS of th

The dog harness in northern Alberta seems just as unnecessarily heavy as the toboggans. It is too ornamented with metal studs and the leather forming the collars and traces heavy enough for a much larger animal than the dog. Doubtless these notes are not destined to alter methods in Alberta but dog racing may bring this about just as it is doing in Saskatchewan and Manitoba.

Obtaining suitable food for dogs, especially in summer, seems to be a problem in this wooded area. Some of the dog men favor rice. The writer does not agree with this at all, having experimented with the feeding of rice and its products to animals and now nutrition experts appear to be in agreement that certain kinds of rice cannot be eaten for long periods without causing trouble. If any cereal is to be used undoubtedly oatmeal is the best. But something must be added in the way of animal food, such as fish, meat and fat.

Very little fishing is done in summer for the dogs. It is during the latter part of the season that the fish are caught. They are strung along racks and not slit open or gutted. If the weather turns mild, the fish swell and decompose badly. It is suggested that the fish be caught earlier, that they be gutted and sliced along the back, then sun dried. As stated in another part of this article dogs thrive wonderfully on dried fish, and as the weight is reduced over two thirds, it is a method worthy of trial. After all, dogs cannot travel any farther than the food they are dragging will take with them, hence there is no argument over this question of fish. There is one other method the writer would like to see tried, and that is to slit open and slice the fish in cold weather and then hang them up in the racks. It is probable that after a month or two the fish would become very much lighter through evaporation. If such be the case the fish would be ideal as dog food and easy to transport.

From all accounts this heavy breed of dogs in Alberta does very good work indeed, though it is necessarily slower than that performed by less heavy dogs in a more open country, where the going is easier. Most of the dogs which were seen were clean built and strong but the types vary and their main characteristic is size.

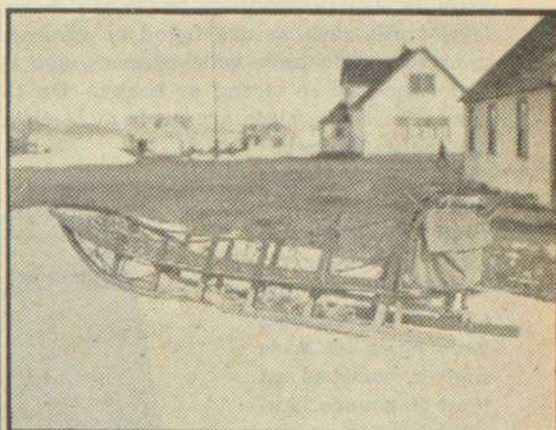
DRIVING

There are many misconceptions held by the public about dog driving. Some people think that it is even cruel to drive dogs! In answer to this the writer would like to

say that dogs enjoy work—when there are several together—even more than horses. The leader of a team could not be any prouder of his place nor feel the responsibility more if he tried. Another point worth telling about leaders, which shows the spirit of the dogs, is that when a leader has to be changed because he has become tired through battling against deep snow or other cause, the change is generally effected without any fuss or trouble. There appears to be no jealousy among the members of a team as regards leadership. Cruelty to dogs occurs at times, and in North America the Indian seems to be the worst offender. The Eskimo does not use a whip to the same extent. The only cruelty the writer saw in Alaska on the part of the Eskimo was due to under feeding. But the Eskimo himself is often short of food so he should hardly be blamed for this.

The constant whipping of dogs in a team does not pay. It is the same with a horse, the driver who keeps tapping and clucking to his horse has to keep doing it continually. The dogs, unless they are very tired, are just as keen to get to their destination as the driver. Many drivers encourage their dogs by singing or by talking to them about their supper. All this is good in moderation. The same thing may be applied to swearing and shouting as some drivers do. Whipping has its place, as with other animals, when a fight starts the sooner it is checked the better, for a wounded dog is a handicap to both the team and the driver. Sometimes it may be necessary to discipline a lazy dog. The result of this correction will be as though the whole team has been punished. The writer has always felt that if man would give a dog more credit for his intelligence than he does that he would get along very much better with him. Unfortunately, for some reason or other dogs are often regarded as low bred beasts and consequently are ill treated. Now, to say a word about the actual driving. In Alaska the average mail team of about 15 dogs hauls 700 pounds of mail, plus the sled and driver, from 25 to 30 miles a day, often for six days in the week. With such a team two men with their beds and camping outfit could easily cover a much greater mileage than this. It is usual in such a case to walk up the hills and rough places. If the weather is cold, the passengers jog alongside the team and when tired jump on and ride a little. In warm weather, if the going is good, the driver will sit on the sled a large part of the time. In case of deep snow, it is necessary to break trail

with snowshoes in front of the dogs. With a heavy load many drivers in Alaska use short skis. They affix a pole (gee pole) to the bow of the sled pointing upward and grasping this travel with one foot on either side of the tow line, steering the sled from the front. The gee pole idea seems to be unique for Alaska.

In Canada the dogs are mainly driven one in front of the other, not in pairs as in Alaska. The Eskimo still drives his dogs hitched to single lines, in a fan shaped manner. The length of the day in the north generally determines the distance to be covered. It is usual for dog men to get up before daylight, to get their breakfast, water the dogs and begin their journey as soon as it is light enough to see. This is a good rule to follow as it is when men are tired through attempting too much that they get into trouble. The "sourdoughs" of Alaska always warn newcomers from getting overheated by running and from over taxing their strength.

All horsemen are aware of the wonderful team play among a number of horses hitched together, how impulses travel from one to another, and it is even more marked in dogs. If one's team is in good condition and not over-tired—suddenly there is a runaway—without warning the sled gives a bounce and you are off! It may be only for a hundred yards or so, and then for no apparent reason, the team steadies down into a sober gait. These sudden bursts of speed often occur when you are nearing your destination, perhaps it is that the dogs smell a habitation, but the astonishing part about it is that the driver has absolutely no warning and the dogs start in perfect unison.

Along the Bering Sea it is the practice to tie the back of the sled to a post while the dogs are being hitched. They strain and jump at their collars until the rope is loosened by the driver, then they are off at a good pace for a quarter of a mile before they steady down. On the Yukon hitching up is a more sober affair, the sled is not even tied, and the dogs often lie down and wait for the driver to start them. The leader is always hooked up first to keep the tow line taut. A loose leader is sometimes used. It would seem likely that in training young dogs a loose leader might be very helpful.

The weather and the state of the trails must always be considered before starting out, such as deep snow, overflows on the rivers, sharp ice underfoot. All such obstacles must be expected.

The best time for travel in Alaska is when the days have lengthened from the end of February to the beginning of May. Towards the latter part of the season much of the travel is done at night, as during the day it is too hot for the dogs. It is especially at this time of year that drivers must be on the watch for sharp ice.

DOG HARNESS.

The majority of drivers believe in collars made after the fashion of a horse collar. The size of the collar may be determined roughly by slipping it over the dog's head, the collar being held sideways, and when it has reached the neck, it is given half a turn to put it in place. The collar should be small enough so that it touches a little as it is being pulled over the head, but not tight. In fitting a collar it must be remembered that a dog's neck is nearly horizontal. Hence, if the collar is too large it slips down onto the lower part of the neck and compresses the blood vessels. Soft collars are bad on this account. Another point to consider in dog harness is to keep the traces as much as possible from compressing the sides of the chest, hence a small wooden single tree is valuable. Singletrees are in general use for working dogs in Alaska; for the Siberians the harness is simpler. There is a collar and a belly band, the traces are pulled up over the back and units in a single piece of raw hide which is attached to the tow line. The tow line is made up of several sections. It is fastened to a bridle on the bow of the sled. The dogs are hitched in pairs with the aid of short lines and spring snaps, one to the singletree, and another to the ring in the collar.

The one objection to a single tow line is that all the dogs in the team, with the exception of the leader, are pulling a little sideways. This could be obviated easily enough if small wooden double trees were affixed to the tow line for each pair of dogs. Possibly most drivers would object to this on account of the danger of tangling of the harness, nevertheless, the writer would like to see this method tried out, as he believes that the dogs would pull more efficiently, especially in working teams. In the case of racing teams, where there is abundance of power, the fact that the dogs are pulling a little askew would not matter so much.

SLEDS.

Racing sleds should be as light as possible, depending on the kind of country which is to be driven over. Hickory

sleds are used in Alaska along the coast, where rough ice, rocks, or timber may be bumped into and round the bow of the sled is bent a piece of hard wood to form a sort of bumper. The distance between the runners is 24 inches. It must be remembered that runners far apart make for stability, but they also make the sled harder to turn. On level trails such as are found on rivers and lakes, it is unnecessary to have wide runners, nor is there need to make the sled so strong or heavy. On the Yukon River for instance the sleds are made of birch and the runners are only 20 inches apart. At the races in Prince Albert, the writer lifted the sled which had been pulled by the winning team. The runners were much too wide and it weighed at least 40 pounds. Another point worth considering is the question of friction. In cold weather metal sticks to snow, but wood slips easier, especially if it has been greased or waxed with paraffin. Wooden shoes made to fit the runners may be tied on in a few minutes if the weather turns cold. These points apply alike to working and race teams. Icing the runners is practiced by the Eskimos at the mouth of the McKenzie River, a mixture of peat and water is applied and the runners are built up as it freezes.

FEEDING SLED DOGS.

Dried salmon is the principal winter food for dogs in Alaska. The fish are caught in the summer time, they are cleaned, the head cut off, the back bone removed and then they are dried in the sun on racks. While salmon are too expensive to feed to dogs in Eastern America, white fish or other varieties might be substituted. In Labrador herrings are largely used. In Canada fresh frozen fish are commonly fed to dogs. This is an ideal food, but as it takes several pounds of fresh fish to satisfy a dog, it is too bulky and heavy to take on a long trip. Of the sun dried fish mentioned above, a dog will only eat about two pounds during 24 hours, so that the advantage of dried fish over the fresh is obvious. In the opinion of the writer, dried fish forms an ideal and complete food. The only addition to the diet required is a

little fat (two or three ounces) if the fish are not oily enough. Mail teams in Alaska working six days a week live exclusively on this diet during the winter. If fresh frozen fish are available they may be fed in small amounts at the noon halt when the dogs are given a few minutes rest.

There are many other meats which are given in place of fish, such as walrus, seal, white whale, or deer meat. When sun dried, these meats make good strong food. In more temperate climates horse meat is equally good, in

fact any red meat. The strong point in favor of sun drying the meat is that it loses but little of its food value and is easily stored and transported.

FOOD FOR RACING DOGS.

In the north during the races, the dogs have mostly been fed chopped beef, mutton, and eggs. It is certain that the dogs have shown wonderful endurance with this diet, however, the writer firmly believes that if the dogs were continued on their ordinary diet of dried fish, with a few additions such as raw liver and eggs, that they would work just as well or even better than after a sudden change onto a new diet. There is one thing sure that dogs will do an astonishing amount of work on dried fish and not get a distaste for it. Dog men all have their own ideas about feeding, and it is often difficult to change them. In the wooded parts of Western Canada, a mixture of corn meal and fat is often given to working dogs.

The writer would much prefer oatmeal to cornmeal if he had to feed the dogs on it, but he would not feed it raw and dry as he saw a man doing after a race the other day. This man thought he was doing well by his dogs because he broke one egg for each dog onto the top of the dry rolled oats he was giving them. What is one raw egg to a hard working, carnivorous dog? Mr. P. Souplet, who studied the needs of working dogs for the French ministry of war recommended 450 grammes of meat (about 1 lb.) and 2 lbs. of bread per day. The Belgians also feed a great deal of black bread to their dogs.

In the summer time cooked foods must necessarily take the place of the raw, at least to a large extent.

In Alaska the dogs are fed on the refuse of fish heads and intestines mixed and boiled with some sort of meal. Many dog fanciers believe in biscuits, and there is now a fad of greasing them with cod liver oil. This may be satisfactory food and give good results, but in large kennels surely the old fashioned boiler of horse meat mixed with meal and vegetables, or fish, when it can be procured, and occasionally some raw liver, will make a good all round diet. It is unfortunate but dogs do not like raw unfrozen fish, unless they are very hungry, so that in summer the fish has to be cooked. One advantage of fish is that it supplies phosphorous and lime. On the Alaskan mail trails after the snow has gone, one can see the white droppings of the dogs scattered along which shows that the fish diet contains plenty of lime. Lime in quantity is constipating and this is doubtless one of the reasons for the need of supplementing the fish diet with some sort of fat or oil. Fat of course also contains valuable essentials as well. Along some of the coast towns of Alaska and on the Yukon as well quite a large amount of what the packers call inedible fat is fed to dogs. It is imported in large tins from the United States. This covers most of the foods used in the north. One word more must be added in favor of a fish diet for dogs; this is in view of what is being said about sunlight and vitamins in the prevention of rickets, scurvy, etc. Certainly in the vicinity of the Arctic Circle, sunlight is lacking for a long period of the year so it seems clear from this that the vitamins in fish,

dried or raw, are sufficient to make up for this lack of sunshine in both man and beast.

WATERING DOGS.

Water is given about an hour to an hour and a half after feeding at night. The dogs are given all they will lap up. In the morning water is again given before the dogs are harnessed. They will not drink very much at this time, but it helps to keep them from "snow eating" along the trail. Snow eating will slow down a team materially.

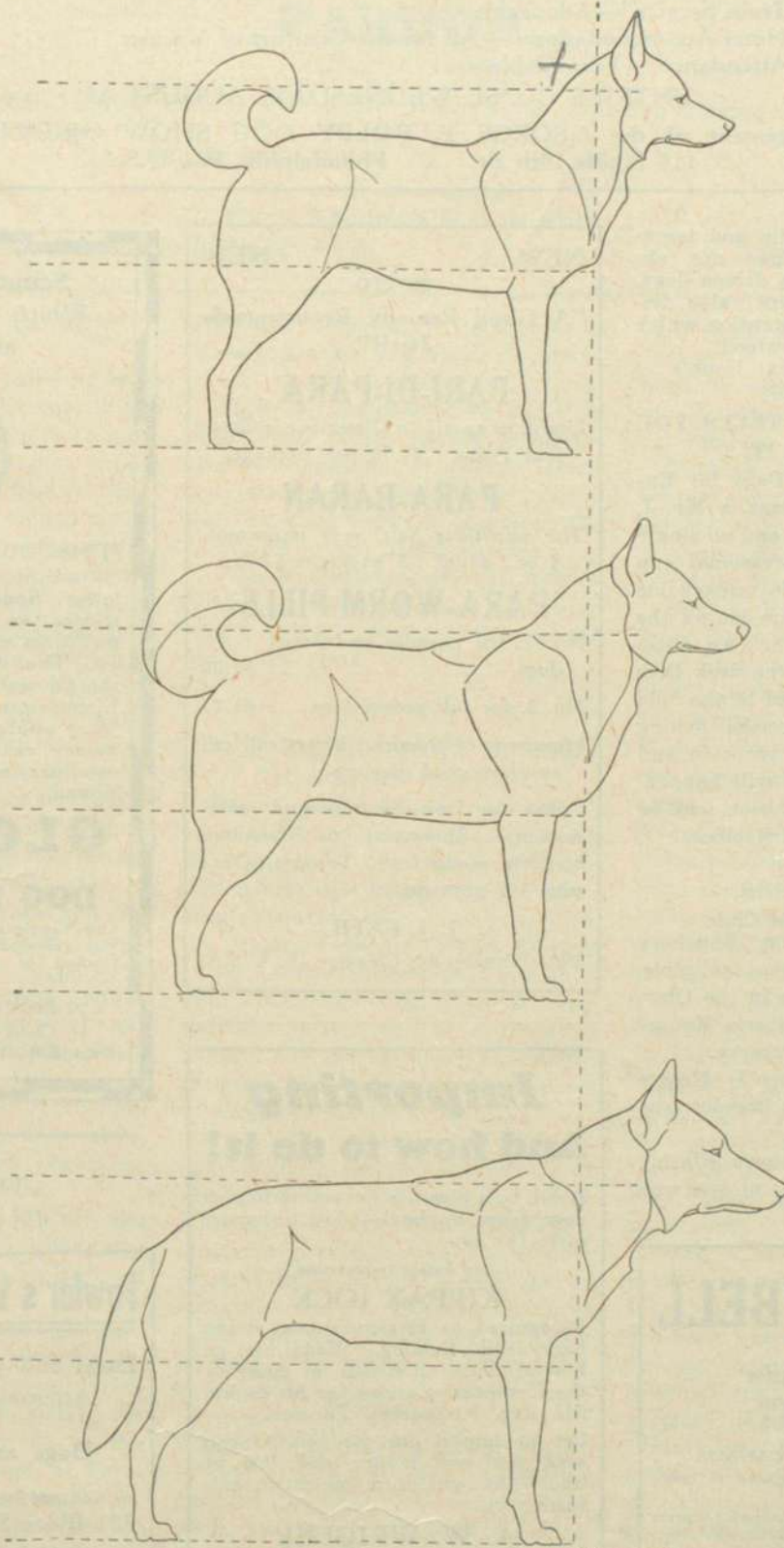
DOG HOUSES.

In all the coast towns and villages in Alaska dog barns are provided for travellers. The team may be driven full length into the barn and unhitched under cover. Each dog has a stall in which there is a chain and water pan. The barns are not usually warm places but they provide the dogs with a dry bed and he is protected from wind and snow. These conditions ensure a good rest for the dogs, and as they are all separate there is no fighting.

When one is obliged to camp out in the open, a wooded spot is chosen if possible, so that the dogs may be tied separately to trees, then if spruce boughs can be found, each dog is given a few branches to lie upon. A round hole is tramped in the snow and the branches put into it. The leading dog is given the privilege of sleeping on the sled, where he keeps guard over the provisions.

CASTRATION OF SLED DOGS.

The castration of sled dogs is often practiced for the following reasons—the dogs fight less among themselves and there therefore do not injure each other. They do not stop so often to urinate along the trail and

DOG SHOWS AND THE SHEPHERDS

WHEN YOU ENTER YOUR DOG FOR A SHOW

When you enter your dog for a show do you ever stop to consider just what you are doing? Or what has had to be done before you were given the opportunity to enter your dog? Do you stop to realize what your responsibility actually is before you make the entry? or your responsibility after the entry has been made? Appearances would indicate that there is but very little thought given to the matter, generally speaking. Of course we have a percentage of exhibitors who are conscientiously interested and very painstaking when making their entries, but unfortunately a great many exhibitors are not at all careful, nor do they even seem to be considerate, so a little chat on "Entries" may be quite seasonable at this particular time.

Before you can possibly make an entry for a dog show in Canada—where the labor of preparation is the labor of love for whosoever may care to undertake it—much midnight oil has already been burned. Some faithful workers have been canvassing all their friends and most of the business houses in their locality for subscriptions and for advertisements to make the premium list sufficiently attractive to command your attention. These subscriptions have been collected and allocated, and those who have experience in this work will tell you just how distasteful it is for them to do this kind of work year after year, and not only is the work distasteful, but very often it is criticized beyond all reason by people who seem to thrive at this contemptible occupation, and remarks such as "He took care of the Poms" and "She took care of the Police dogs," when possibly an allocation committee have been responsible for the placing of the prizes in question, and those responsible for their collection may have had nothing whatever to do with their allocation, but nevertheless it seems to be impossible to get away from the obnoxious criticisms.

The show-giving club has spent many hours compiling a mailing list of say, 1,000 names, and yours is on the list. A premium list has been printed and a copy has been mailed to you. So far the club is responsible for all this unselfish work and great expense. You have received your copy of the premium list. You received it on the first of the month, and it has advised you that the judges are Mr. So-and-So and Mr. So-and-So. It shows you how much money and

special prizes that you have a chance to win; it tells you that the entries close on the 23rd, and that the show will open on the 29th; all of which is necessary, and all of which has been made quite clear to you.

The Show Committee are now awaiting your response, and the Show Secretary is working at his "bread and butter" job through the day and at night he hurries home to see if you sent your entry, and perhaps you have disappointed him that day, and the next day, and the next after that again. The date for closing the entries draws nigh, and the entries have not come in, with the result that the men who have everything to lose and nothing to gain—only your pleasure—are greatly disappointed. Compilation of the entries commences so that the printer may be given a sporting chance to publish a catalogue worthy of the show, and intelligible and pleasing to you, and it is only now that you make up your mind to enter. In your own mind you are a good sport, but your late entry is responsible for the show giving club forming an altogether different opinion of you—and you can't blame them for that, and that ugly section of any catalogue, the annoying "Entries received too late for classification," with all its distractions, has to be added at the last moment. Your name appears in the list and it is not at all worthy of you; it stamps you as a "tardy entrant," and a person who is quite unwilling to give the Show Secretary a chance to do his best for the patrons of the show.

But there are even worse angles to your carelessness on record than even the lateness of your entries. When you have sent \$10 for entries to that extent, you likely have sent your cheque for \$10, and it is accepted in good faith by the show management, and when it has been presented for payment at the bank it has been given the "N.S.F." sign, and returned to the Show Secretary. Maybe the cheque has been quite O.K., but you have not allowed for the bank exchange, and the cheque is now only worth \$9.85. Perhaps you are a "big man" in the game and you sent your entries without any payment at all, and because you are Mr. So-and-So, your entries have been accepted. You go to the show, and the judge hurts your feelings somewhat when he fails to appraise the quality of your dog through your own spectacles. You feel disappointed and "make yourself

scarce" after the judging is over, you forget (?) paying for your entries altogether, and so the work of the tired out Show Secretary is again added to. He writes to you about the entry fees, and you know dog show rule No. 5, which reads: "Entry fees must be paid in cash, or by express or postal order, or by certified cheque, and must accompany the entry form. Bank and exchange charges must be paid by the exhibitor." So you take subterfuge behind that rule and say to yourself, "Let them try and collect," and in this way you hold the show giving club responsible for asking you to "kindly remit," for the reason that the club has infringed rule No. 5 by allowing you the freedom of action which was yours, and given to you in good faith, and so it goes until perhaps the time when the show comes around again the following year, and you feel it is time to repent and pay up, and in this way take the advantage of the show giving club still more. To you "It's all in the game," but to the show giving club it is disgusting business all the way through; and it is, and you should know it.

Without dog shows what would happen? Why not offer that measure of support that will justify shows being held wherever possible? Encourage the show giving clubs by your helpful and timely co-operation. We don't believe much in "Don'ts" and "Do's," but here are ten of each that—if practiced—will go a long way towards helping the game along.

1. DON'T try to "beat" the show giving club, by making late entries, or by withholding entry fees.

1. DO make your entry as soon as you get your premium list, and pay fully for it at the time you make it.

2. DON'T withhold your encouragement and support from a club.

2. DO your best to help make every show a success; to do so is good general practice.

3. DON'T criticize without justification. Such criticism hurts.

3. DO offer criticism intended for the betterment of the sport. Such criticism helps.

4. DON'T damn the show-giving club for the judges they may select.

4. DO yourself proud by winning or losing gracefully under such judges, since you entered to get an opinion of your dog from the judges named in the premium list when you made your entries.

5. DON'T keep your dog in his crate during the show. To do so is unsportsmanlike.

5. DO give the other exhibitors a chance to see the best you have to show them.

6. DON'T let your handler indulge in the sport (?) of keeping your dog crated during the show—he knows its advantages.

6. DO give him instructions that to hold your patronage he must bench your dogs for the opening of the show and in the interests of all concerned.

7. DON'T think you can fool the public all the time. They have paid to see your dog along with the others.

7. DO your share to give the public satisfaction at the show.

8. DON'T forget that the public are future customers for your surplus stock.

8. DO make friends for yourself and for dog breeders and exhibitors generally, by your all-round sportsmanship.

9. DON'T be everlastingly gouching about the rotten judging, and the still rottener (according to you) general management of the show. The judging and management are generally quite good.

9. DO take your wins with good grace and your losses like a true sportsman. To do so means so much to yourself.

10. DON'T make yourself a nuisance to show secretaries by sending your entries in late, or by giving trouble through your manner of paying for them, or by asking permission to leave the show as soon as the judging is over.

10. DO send your entries in in good time. DO send the proper fees with your entries, or, if you will simply practice the Golden Rule and "do unto others as you would have others do unto you," you will have done all that is required of you as a good sportsman, a good citizen, and a reliable gentleman.

DOGS OF THE EMPIRE

By FREEMAN LLOYD.

THE British Islands have ever proved good homes for good dogs—which is another way of saying that any breed of dog, providing it be useful or ornamental, is readily accepted from the foreigner whose scale of points of his dog, is given every consideration, and generally endorsed in the new land.

Certain breeds of foreign dogs have undoubtedly improved in the New Land and its Dominions, for the reason there have been more enthusiasm and shows in a country so noted for its every-day-in-the-year kennel assemblies.

Some of the foreign large breeds have become taller, and very likely, better built in their hind legs and quarters, since they have been bred by Britishers. The most notable improvements may be seen in St. Bernards, for which an English scale of points or type has been worked upon. In consequence of intelligent breeding and careful rearing, the English and the North American St. Bernards are the most imposing in appearance and massive dogs of their breed in the world.

Still the Swiss not only stick to their own type of St. Bernard dogs, but every now and then they express themselves as being sorry for their English and North American friends, who have failed to see the superiority of the Swiss St. Bernards, through the roseate-tinted glasses of the Continental breeders of these magnificent dogs.

However, it is not likely that the more popular British and American type will ever have to give way to the

smaller, less powerful, and perhaps, cobbler type of the show St. Bernards of Helvetia.

Britishers, without taking any unction into their souls, may state without much fear of being successfully contradicted, that they have taken in and cared for the specimens of any good and useful breed as it came along. Several of the German, French, Dutch, Russian and Scandinavian dogs have been "adopted" by the British; and it cannot be said that the pure-bred dogs of other nations have become less useful or less beautiful in the hands of the peoples of the Empire.

Some of us are old enough to recollect the time when Great Danes or German Boar hounds were almost as scarce as hens' teeth in Britain. Nowadays the breed is looked upon as a part and parcel of a land to which it was foreign, fifty or less years ago. But the boar hound had been a valued dog down through the centuries in the North Western and Central countries of the European Continent. When the Great Dane first came under the notice of the British, they classed this dog as the German Boar hound. There must be many who will think that the "boar hound" appellation would still be the better suited for this magnificent creature so noble, fleet and brave!

Boar hounds or Great Danes have made their marks in different parts of the world. This stamp of dog was used in the bad old slave days of Cuba and elsewhere. In later times they have been used as guards for white men in

a black man's country where it was unusual for the Caucasian to arm himself against a sudden uprising of the natives; or more particularly so, against the treachery of small bodies of blacks with their passions inflamed by the strong spirits distilled in the Portuguese territories of East Africa.

Great Danes which had been trained in Germany were seen at work in the Transvaal, in the old days of the South African Republic. They were the property and sole protection for the compound manager of a gold mine, on which quite four thousand raw and unsophisticated semi-savages were sheltered. Yet the late Robert Cochrane of the Ferreira, Johannesburg, enjoyed perfect ease, because of the ever-faithful presence of Juno and Bess, harlequin colored Danes which had been purchased from the Haggenbacks—the wild animal dealers.

Cochrane and this writer owed their lives to those imported boar hounds. We were attacked by six natives two of whom were killed in the affray. When I try to look back and visualize that awful scene, it is to be at once reminded of the activity and power of those dogs which grasped the naked thighs of the natives, and wrenched the drink-maddened Ethiopians to the veld, where they lay helpless.

They were the property and sole protection of the compound manager, who would have quite 4,000 raw and unsophisticated semi-savages under his care. The waiter and a friend enjoyed perfect safety because of the ever faithful presence of a brace of huge harlequin colored Danes, which had been purchased from the Haggenbacks—the wild animal dealers. The friend to whom I have already referred and myself owe our lives to our dogs. We were attacked by six natives, two of whom were killed in the affray.

To-day, as I look upon the print "Hunting the Wild Ox," after Ridinger the famous German painter, and the holding, dragging deviltry of the boar hounds, I see at least a part of the scene that was enacted on the then outskirts of the now raw gold metropolis of the world.

The Great Dane or German boar hound has ever been

a dog of high degree. He has been the companion of mighty monarchs and great potentates. I know for a fact that even a dusky African king or chieftain—no other than Lobengula of the Matabele—offered to fill up a long trading bullock-wagon with ivory in addition to many native women so sell as slaves, in trade or barter for a Great Dane named Satan which was eventually killed by a wounded lioness.

The trader's dog, Satan kept his head high while the king's curs barked at his heels! This dignity so impressed Lobengula at his kraal where now stands Buluwayo, the chief commercial city of Rhodesia, that human beings and ivory were as dross in comparison with the splendid nobility of the harlequin (white and black) colored Great Dane. But as Satan was the property of some German transport riders and traders, and had been only loaned to my English acquaintance of the Trader Horn type, Lobengula's valuable offer had to be refused. The ivory was worth a large sum of money.

It will be seen from the pictures now presented that boar hounds big and boar hounds little were called upon to work and tackle the large wild beasts of Europe, including the Auroch or wild-ox, the wild boar, and the wolf. The pictures were designed by strictly sporting artists—men who knew or were instructed by competent advisers, as to what a dog of a given breed was supposed to accomplish in the way of attacking and subduing savage and capable creatures.

Ridinger was one of the greatest delineators of his time, and his studies of wild life are accounted of the very highest order. We will see the ancestors of our present and harlequin colored boar hounds in the reproduction of his "Wild Ox" picture. It would appear that the activity of the Great Dane was at its height in the time of Johann Elias Ridinger who was born in Ulm in 1698, and died in 1767. This artist's setters, pointers, spaniels and hounds in appearance, are sometimes of the half-starved, ill-kept kind. However, his boar hounds are sleek and in capital condition.

There are many of us who like to look upon Canada

as a good hunting country. And that it will so remain, must be the prayer of every sportsman in the world. The woods and waters, the mountains and plains in the different parts of the Dominion will provide plenty of excitement and pleasure for the hunters and anglers of generations to come. And that is the reason good dogs will always be required. It is true that the modern rifle has superseded the dog, but the owners of Great Danes will be always proud to remember that the forbears of their dogs were fast and strong enough to halt the maddened aurochs, and pull him to his knees; that the ancestors of boar hounds were also used as bear dogs, while the great European wolf was likewise encompassed by the capabilities of a smaller strain or type of Dane.

Only the other day a letter was received from the sporting son and heir of one of America's best known multi-millionaires part of whose vast capital is now being employed in the huge developments of Northern Manitoba: "Are you aware there existed a smaller race of Great Danes than the ones we now possess?" wrote the youthful sportsman who was up at the Yale University. Yes: we possessed some knowledge regarding the smaller boar hounds which were used for hunting and killing the European wolf which might be classed as of the same kind and size as the larger and stronger timber wolf of North America.

According to the Howitt engraving published in 1797, these small Danes were speedy enough to keep up with a large wolf, not an easy performance by any means.

Hunters will recognise that the wolf can loup along at a fast pace; furthermore, that he can keep up that speed for a longer time than the ordinary hound.

There is little difference between the types of the boar hound heads at the tail end of the "Wild Ox" picture, and the type of heads of the smaller dogs in the "Wolf" engraving which was designed about a hundred years afterwards. The small German boar hound is not seen in our times. He might have deteriorated and come down to us in the form of the German Boxer dog which has the appearance of a crossbred boar hound—bulldog with

cropped ears. According to the highly interesting illustrations that accompany this contribution, it will be gathered that German boar hounds or Great Danes of one and two centuries ago had cropped and uncropped ears. It was also usual to place spiked collars and armour on these hunting dogs.

In the tapestries woven to commemorate the hunting exploits of the Emperor Maximilian, one or more of the boar hounds used for holding onto the wild boar, wore a sort of clothing made from layers of skins and woollen materials. This coat was used to fend off the deadly, ripping drives of the tusks of the boar. The designs of Bernard Van Orley, for the Emperor Maximilian I tapestries, are preserved in the Louvre, Paris.

It is really wonderful what we might "discover" if we take the pains to look carefully and methodically at these marvelous tapestries, one square yard of which meant a full year's labor for an expert weaver! There are twelve of these Van Orley tapestries, representing the sport the emperor enjoyed each month of the year. In December and under the sign of the constellation of Capricorn the ruler went boar hunting. We see the boar charge the exalted and mounted hunter while an "armored" long dog seizes the animal at the back of the head. There is a larger and stronger boar hound in the tablet; while yapping and snapping at the under parts of the boar, are two curly coated black or blue dogs with uncut tails. These smaller dogs are acting like terriers act. From their appearance, might have been the ancestors of some such dogs as the Irish Kerry terriers of our own time. The design for this tapestry was made after the death of Maximilian in 1519. Obviously there were "blue" rough and curly coated "terriers" in the 16th Century.

When we look upon interesting pictures like the two which embellish this article, it will be well to bear in mind that we are studying something that is worth while. The "Bear Hunt" is after the great painting by Franz Snyders (1579-1657). Snyders born at Antwerp was a

Maritime Notes and News

There is hardly a breed which has not new representatives arriving weekly, and in some cases almost daily, to the Maritime Provinces. A determined and most praiseworthy effort is evident on the part of nearly all fanciers to improve their stock, and everything points to the keenest of competition at the forthcoming shows of the Maritime circuit.

One of the most recent arrivals is a sable and white collie registered as "Mountaineer Merlin," bred by the late H. B. Hungerford, who did so much for the Collie in Canada, and is by "Laund Lero of Belhaven" ex "Mountaineer Minora 2nd," she by "Champion Alstead Aeroplane." Robert H. Taylor of Bridgewater purchased this dog as a mate for his bitch "Mossholme Bonnie." She was bred by John Moss of London, Ont., and is sired by "Wishaw Banker," Imp., ex "Sedley Sapphire," she by the imported "Alloway Settler," ex the imported "Sedley Strict," by the noted English winner "Champion Magnet."

While receiving fresh impetus from these newcomers, the local Collie fancy has sustained a severe loss in the untimely death of A. V. Martin's fine young stud dog, which was struck and killed by an automobile, while walking on the Bedford Road. This is but another instance of the despicable work of the particular kind of cad who "hits and runs."

John Fry, Sr., lost his promising young Irish Terrier dog "Be Gosh of Acadia," about five weeks ago, and although he has searched, and extensively advertised, he has been unable to find any trace of him since.

A wire haired fox terrier bitch recently arrived from Toronto at the Acadia Kennels whelped seven pups sired by the upper Canadian owned "By Town Black Tip," but unfortunately none survived; however, judging from some of the prospects now at these kennels, and from others still to come, consolation will be amply provided for this loss.

C. C. Blackader of Halifax has purchased a wire bitch of quality far above the average, and she is now being prepared for the fall shows, where she will no doubt give a very good account of herself indeed. She

is, we understand, of "Ch. Gang Warily" breeding.

A few months ago, Robert Lenox of Ingramport bought a Cairn bitch in whelp, but unfortunately before the negotiations were completed it was too late for the little lady to undertake so long a journey. Since then, however, he has accepted another one, a young red brindle bitch, "Laighill Speirag" whelped June 8th, 1927. She is sired by "Champion Cheek," he by "Champion Rosshire Warrior," ex "Dochfour Jemima." The sire of "Champion Rosshire Warrior" is "Rosshire Glenara," one of the most successful Cairn studs of the present day. The dam of "Laighill Speirag" claims almost as great distinction for her family, she being by "Champion Harviestoun Brigand" ex "Peggy O'Neil." The breeder, J. Lenox of Crief, Scotland, is shipping her in whelp. "Laighill Speirag" will be a valuable addition to the Cairn fanciers of Canada, because here bloodlines are eagerly sought wherever the Cairn holds sway.

In spite of summer, heat, and other trials, activities have abated not a whit at the Marlboro Kennels. Lieut.-Col. H. J. Stech of Halifax, recently purchased from there a borzoi pup, white with black markings, by "Champion Korol" ex "Zola Lyons," and registered as "Samanoff of Marlboro." This pup carries one of the best heads seen on a youngster of his age for some time. The real pride of place at this kennel is given at the present time to a lovely litter of six—three dogs and three bitches—whelped by "Nona of Shay," and sired by "Champion Korol." It may be recalled that "Nona" is the dam of the sensational English winner, "Korsakoff of Shay," winner of over ninety firsts, two challenge certificates, and twenty-one specials for best head and bone, also she is the mother of the well known bitch "Winalot of Shay."

E. E. Warren of Montreal recently spent a few days in the garrison town, and while here took the opportunity to visit many of the kennels. As a result he took back to Montreal with him two borzoi bitch pups from the Marlboro kennel. While passing through Moncton, "Witty," as he is more commonly known, saw an Eng-

lish bull bitch which took his eye, reminding him greatly of his old love, "Int. Champion St. Roch's Girl Guide." "Witty" immediately got busy, and with such effect, that before leaving Moncton the bitch had passed into his hands and returned to Montreal with him.

On all sides we hear of the arrival of puppies, and a fine time of the year it is for them too. Fred Fougere of this city bought in Toronto this spring a wire bitch registered as "Pelham's Frivolous," by "Champion Ormsby Rainbow" ex "Princess Patricia." Before being shipped she was bred to "By Town Black Tip," and on June fifth presented her owner with a fine litter of four.

H. H. Bauld's winning Scottie "Mickey," whelped a husky dog pup, sired by the same owner's stud, which he had the misfortune to lose through death some little time ago. It is to be hoped the pup will make up for the loss of his sire.

Much gratification is being expressed over the fact that Charles G. Hopton is to judge the annual fixture of the Nova Scotia Kennel Club. This will be, we believe, the first visit of Mr. Hopton to Halifax, at least in a judicial role, and keen interest is felt in the way he will place the dogs to come before him. Remember folks!—the dates of this show are August 25th, 26th, 27th and 28th, and the Provincial Exhibition will be running at the same time—the first one to be held here since the explosion. A large entry is looked for from upper Canada, and the other side of the border, so memorize the dates, and send your dogs along. "The more the merrier" has ever been the motto of this progressive club, and last, but by no means least, this is one of the few shows in Canada where five points may be obtained by the lucky "winners."

There is another movement on foot—the formation of a Ladies Kennel Club in Nova Scotia. This is tentative as yet, but it is felt that with a little effort one will come into existence, and already the support of the Nova Scotia Kennel Club has been sincerely pledged. MOOSE JAW KENNEL CLUB SHOW

The show held at Moose Jaw this year was the "Third Annual" and returns show that the success of the first show was repeated when 3 points were allowed to the 203 dogs benched. The popular judge Mr. George Kynoch of Winnipeg officiated. Shepherds, Springers, Collies, Bulldogs—Fox Terriers, Chesapeake, Bostons, Poms and Pekes were the breeds showing their popularity by the strength of their entries. And it was the Shepherd, Ch. Claus v Kuchfelds, owned by Mr. J. L. Sinykin, of Minneapolis, U.S.A. who was handled by Mr. Wm. Chadderton, Winnipeg, that was awarded the Seaborn Grand Challenge Shield—a magnificent affair—for best dog in show all breeds. Another of Mr. Chadderton's charges—in fact one of his own dogs—was the Airedale, Ch. Chatrick Winnitoba, was awarded the Canadian Kennel Club Trophy for the best Canadian-bred.

Other features were the childrens and members variety classes, with 26 entries in the former and 27 entries in the latter, and Eastern clubs might profitably introduce this members variety class in their sections. The members variety seems to have an appeal all its own and serves to show a club's membership in action with very beneficial results.

Mr. Phil Lillie, the club's president was backed by the usual Moose Jaw support, which is plenty, and so this year the popular "Phil" found time to act as Superintendent as well and remembering Mr. Lillie as a host during the writer's visit in 1926 we can readily imagine just how busy the hustling happy Phil was on July 2nd and 3rd this year.

Notes From Alberta

THE Alberta Kennel Club point show has come and gone, for the writer it will forever have pleasant memories

This is not only due to the success of his hounds, but to the real sportsmanlike attitude and good fellowship displayed by exhibitors and officials alike. In point of numbers it was a smaller show than some previously held, this was probably due to two reasons. In the first place our very old friend, George Kynock and his large number of circuit dogs, were conspicuous by their absence. In the second a large number of fanciers were deterred by the excessive heat from entering their dogs. In order that in future we may have the pleasure of having the latter with us, the following suggestions are being made:

We understand that the building is the property of the Exhibition authorities, but we have personally found them to be very considerate, and to give most kindly attention to any matters pertaining to the welfare of exhibits and exhibitors alike, so that if approached by the Kennel Club in the right spirit, the few necessary improvements will undoubtedly be carried out.

In the first place the four ventilators in the centre of the building should receive attention, so that they will work, the two electric fans in operation in 1926 should be again installed. Part of the double deck benching should be removed and more commodious benches installed for the larger breeds.

There are larger dogs than "Cossack Michael," yet when he stood up his back touched the top of the bench, and he could not lie down comfortably until he had chewed out the front, which he promptly did.

We were somewhat late in arriving, as the truck which was to convey us became stuck in a mudhole, and it was necessary to obtain a tractor to haul it out. Fortunately a friend going to the exhibition in his car picked us up, so that relieved matters considerably.

Mr. Raby, the Secretary, informed me that he had had practically no sleep for the four previous nights, and he certainly looked a tired man. Mr. Duncan, the show superintendent had done prodigious service and everything was ship shape so far as the benches were concerned.

Yet when the show started there was an atmosphere of some unpreparedness, this was due of the fact that everyone concerned, were more or less new to the game. A dog show is a complicated affair and experience is a most valuable asset, in connection with the running of one.

Judge Fletcher buckled to and not only judged in his usual able manner, but gave a considerable amount of assistance in getting everything running smoothly, he paid particular stress to TYPE and SOUNDNESS.

That very real sportsman, Len Cooper got going and with extensive experience was able to oil the machine up, so that Mr. Raby soon had everything going like clockwork. Judge Fletcher has kindly relieved me of giving a detailed description of the outstanding dogs and he will give his views and my readers can rest assured, they are authoritative. With the few improvements previously outlined and with the same officials and assistants, we predict a very much larger entry for the next show.

One other suggestion and that may be of service to every show in Canada, and that is to have some experienced person nominated to give a helping hand to any novice entering for the first time. Such a one could make the stranger feel at home, would let him know his effort was appreciated, even though his dog was defeated, he would feel the game was worth while. Our Director, Mr. Figg, of Edmonton was on hand and though his dogs did not have the best of luck, we appreciate the real sportsman and know he will come again. Mr. James Bell, of Limerick, Sask., was up with a lovely Labrador, "Ch. Missy of Harwood," who had just taken Best of Breed at Moose Jaw, etc.

Mrs. T. P. Murray, of Winnipeg, with her very famous Cocker, bred and owned by herself, "Ch. Goldstream Ambassador" was there and this grand little dog finally secured the C.K.C. Cup for best Canadian bred dog or bitch in show, the runner up being the writer's Russian Wolfhound, "Cossack Michael," described by the judge as a dog with size and quality, he was somewhat handicapped, not being in full coat. "Mike" is by Ch. Borloff, ex Roma Romanoff, whom Mrs. Paterson always considered the equal of Ch. Nazimova, the sensational Sesqui and New York winner, so "enuf said." Ch. Goldstream Ambassador was by Mr. Climos' Ch. Matlock Dunbar, out of Ch. Lady Betty, he is two and a half years old, a solid black. He was reserve to Ch. Marval of Avondale at Brandon, Grand Champion at Medicine Hat and at Selkirk, Man., and at Calgary last December. Reserve winners to "Ch. My Own Parade" at the Canadian National with sixty-nine entries, and beat "Ch. My Own Parade" for best headed Cocker under judge W. T. Payne, he has been best Cocker at Winnipeg, Brandon, Moose Jaw, Saskatoon, Regina, Selkirk, Brandon, Medicine Hat and Calgary.

Mrs. Chris. Stelty, of Spokane, Wash., who breeds Springers, Collies and Scotch Terriers was with us, and one of her dogs, "Ch. Princess of Craigie," we understand has completed her International Championship.

Boston Terrier breeders and exhibitors throughout the United States and Canada will regret to hear of the death of Sam Jackson's celebrated little show and stud dog, Ch. Joyce's Prince, who died from an attack of gastritis, last month. "Prince" had a remarkably successful career on the bench and at stud, his victories including 29 awards for Best Boston in Show, four times Best of all Breeds in Show, and several wins as Best Terrier in Show, and although between twelve and thirteen years old when he died, "Prince" maintained his health and vigour up to the last, and more than one litter of high-class Boston puppies, sired by him, have been born since his demise. Probably the best dog sired by him in recent years was Ch. Winchester Dazzler, whose dam was bred by George Duncan of Trapystock Kennels fame.

A new star has arisen to uphold the fame of the Winchester Kennels, in Winchester Aviator, by Ch. Be Jolly out of Miss Prosperity. This is the typical Boston puppy, which at the age of eight months accounted for all opposition in his classes at the recent Brandon show, where the judge, J. C. Fletcher, awarded him First Puppy, First Canadian-Bred, First Novice, First Limit, Open, Winners and Special for Best Boston in show. Quite a creditable showing for a youngster of any breed. "Aviator" is a well marked puppy of great quality, weighing just 14 lbs. In color, rich mahogany brindle, with white blaze, collar and forefeet, he is gifted with an excellent head, true Boston expression, nicely carried ears, and first-class front, with good straight forelegs. He has fine action, is sound all round, and a grand show dog. His pedigree shows his breeding to be from the best blood lines obtainable, his ancestry including such famous Bostons as Ch. Haggerty's King, Ch. Count De Cee, Ch. Sunny Punch, Ch. Dallen's Spider, Patsy Ringmaster and Betty Disturber. With ordinary luck, Winchester Aviator should have great future success in the show ring and at stud.

While looking over Mr. Jackson's kennels we noticed Peggy Old Girl, a famous brood bitch sired by Ch. Trapystock Highball Kid—and herself the dam of Ch. Winchester Dazzler and Winchester Atta Boy. Peggy Old Girl has been bred to Brilliant Prince of the Brilliant Kennels, and her owner anticipates a high-class litter from this mating.

Fred Dunstan, one of the leading and most successful Collie breeders in Winnipeg, has received high praise from J. G. Gerry of Brandon, for his handling, at Brandon show of the Collies owned by Mrs. E. W. Gerry, Brandon, and Miss A. Geere, Winnipeg. Mrs. Gerry's entry taking first limit bitches, any color; first open bitches, sable or sable and white; first Provincial and winners and Special,

any color. Miss A. Geere's Collie was awarded the same prizes in the dog classes, all the way through.

F. G. Dunstan was the breeder of both Collies, and generously declined to exhibit any of his own dogs against them. Referring to this matter in a letter to a Winnipeg daily paper, Mr. Gerry writes as follows:—"I am furnishing this information due to the sportsmanship shown by one of your Winnipeg breeders, F. G. Dunstan"—and after giving details, as mentioned above, he adds:—"This spirit is seldom found, and in the writer's estimation is worthy of comment. In fact, the sportsmanship displayed by owners and exhibitors of Winnipeg dogs was in a class by itself, and does a great deal to promote the interest of dog breeding in the Province."

It is some eleven years ago, since this popular judge officiated in Winnipeg, and many of his old friends in the city are looking forward to meeting him at the Headingly fixture.

The Headingly show grounds are situated fourteen miles due west of Winnipeg on the direct road to Portage La Prairie, and many people motor to the Fair there, from all points in Manitoba.

Fine weather is all that is required to ensure the success of the dog show, horse-racing, and other attractions which are offered for the entertainment of intending visitors to the Fair.

Here are some of the highlights at Brandon Show. The special for best dog in the show went to one of E. Chevrier's English Springer Spaniels, which only competed for specials. Mrs. T. P. Murray's Cocker Spaniel, Ch. Goldstream Ambassador was Reserve Champion, next in order of merit being the Alsatian, Claus Von Kuhnfelds, owned by J. L. Senykin, of St. Paul, Minn.

In English Bulldogs (45 lbs. and over) Geo. Kynoch was the most successful exhibitor, with Mrs. Scriver's entry next best. This year's show was the second annual fixture held under the auspices of the provincial exhibition, and has now established itself as a permanent feature of Brandon's Summer Fair. The exhibitors included many of the leading kennels from Winnipeg and other parts of the province, and the United States were also represented, lending to the competition for prizes, an international character.

friend of Rubens, whose brush, it is said, was often employed in adding details, such as human figures, or even outlining Snyder's designs, services which Synders returned by painting in the lions, tigers and other animals in Ruben's pictures. I have a colored print after Rubens, and it is quite easy to pick out Synders' dogs.

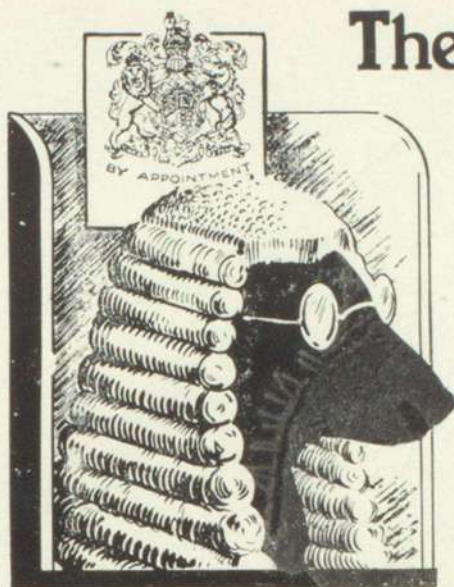
In the instance of Synders' "Bear Hunt," the boar hounds are distinctly fat and ungainly. These powerful but awkward Danes of 300 years ago had shorter heads than the modern dogs of this breed. Yet, they were powerful and possessed undeniable pluck. But it is quite evident, strong as they were, their backbones were as match wood in the wickedly clawed embrace of the bear, which to this day, is successfully hunted by dogs. When the boar hounds or other dogs of three centuries ago held up the hunted bear, the spear brought about the end of the quarry. To-day, the bullet rings down the curtain on the tragedy.

The bear—big and little—is a formidable animal, and dogs have little chance against him, save to hold him up until the armed hunter arrives. With a single paw the bear will pull a dog to its tearing and devouring mouth. The bear makes no great speed, so the aroused animal is mostly in sight of the hunting and running dogs. The bears stands not at bay as a boar, but runs wallowing. But if the hounds stick on, the bear will fight valiantly in its own defence. Sometimes the bear stands up straight on its hind feet. That is said to be a sign of fear and cowardice; the bear fights strongest and stoutest while on four legs. So say our mighty hunters. It would be interesting if we could understand what the wild ox, wolf and bear dogs of Ridinger, Howitt and Synders, thought about it all!

And it was from such dogs that our present high-couraged boar hounds are descended. They are among the more popular big dogs in the British Empire.
