Meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Incorporated

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club was held at the Club's offices, 25 Melinda Street, Toronto, on Thursday evening, June 20th, 1929, at 8 o'clock.

The President, Lt.-Col. G. F. McFarland, K.C., presided. Directors in attendance included Col. J. N. MacRae, M.C., Capt. H. Dudley Waters, M.C., and Messrs. Walter H. Reeves, Reg. P. Sparkes and Harry Clayton.

The minutes of the previous Directors' meeting were read, and on motion, regularly proposed, seconded and carried—

"The minutes were declared adopted, as read."

The Secretary reported that Major Ward Wright was unable to attend through sickness. That Brig.-Gen. C. M. Nelles had been unavoidably detained by important business. That J. W. Bruce was out of town on business, and that V. G. Perry was unable to attend through business reasons.

A letter was read from George H. Brookes, Etobicoke, Ont., who complained that a picture of Mrs. B. J. Walz's (England) Bulldog, "Ch. Pugilist," had appeared in an advertisement of Mr. Wilson's which featured Mr. Wilson's Bulldog, "Crewe So Favorite," in the premium list of the Borzoi Club of Canada. The complaint was further made that the word, "Fall," had been scratched on the cut.

When reviewing the complaint it was found that the proper picture of "Crewe So Favorite" had appeared in the catalogue of the Borzoi Club Show, and it was the unanimous finding of the Directors that Mr. Wilson had no control over the situation which led to the complaint being made.

The Secretary was instructed to write the Secretary of the Borzoi Club and also the printer of the premium list with a view to finding out the particulars of the cut having been scratched.

A complaint was read from the Eastern Collie Club of Canada, which complained that the Collies had not been benched at the Borzoi Club Show. After discussion, it was regularly moved, seconded and carried—

"That, in view of the public explanations and apologies appearing in the last issue of Kennel and Bench, that no further action be taken in the matter."

A letter from the Records Office was on the agenda for reading, but the Secretary advised that the matter

had already been satisfactorily disposed of.

A letter was read from Mrs. Edgar, Toronto, and it was ordered turned over to the President for explanation to Mrs. Edgar of the Club's position in the matter.

A letter was read from Director Jack Fry, who asked that his resignation as a Director be accepted. The letter explained that Mr. Fry had taken up residence in the United States. It was moved, seconded and carried—

"That, under the circumstances, Mr. Fry's resignation be accepted."

Owing to Mr. Fry's resignation, the Maritimes were without a Director, and it was agreed to offer the vacancy to Ex-Director C. C. Sullivan, of St. John, N.B.

The Chairman of the British Columbia Provincial Committee reported having received a complaint from Victoria, in regard to the date of birth of the English Setter, "Southboro Savannah," which was alleged to have appeared at certain named shows. It was found that the animal named had not appeared at the shows as stated, so it was assumed by the Committee that the complaint should have read "Savanna's Sensation" instead.

The evidence showed conclusively that the owner of "Savanna's Sensation," had used information supplied in error, which information had later been corrected. The Committee found that the correct date of birth of "Savanna's Sensation" was May 14th, 1928, and that the errors in date of birth appearing in certain catalogues was caused by mis-information supplied by the breeder and other causes deemed minor, and that the Committee was satisfied that the owner of "Savanna's Sensation" had acted in perfectly good faith throughout."

INTERNATIONAL CHAMPION SCOHTY O'TOOLE DEAD

Int. Ch. Scohty O'Toole, the Orange Sable Pomeranian bred by John Wolfe, Toronto, and campaigned in Canada and the United States by Mrs. A. R. Kittermaster, Toronto, to the highest honors in both countries, is no more, having died from a stroke caused by the heat on June 30th.

Always in tip top form, this son of Woodview Honeydew (Imp.) ex a daughter of Sherdon Star (Imp.) was a contender at every show that he

appeared at, and few Poms were able to take his measure in competition. Born on September 5th, 1919, he was brought out at the Montreal Joint Show as a Novice in May, 1922, and at the first asking secured his first quota of championship points, which the records show as having been three. 1923 and 1924 were big years for this spritely Pom, and at Brantford he earned his full championship.

Scarcely 10 years old, he was acting as if life was a pleasure with him, but the unexpected stroke wrote "finis" to his brilliant career as a showman of merit and as a producer of quality stock.

BOOSTING THE CANADIAN-BRED

It is noticed, with regret that show-giving clubs offering the C. A. Stone, the Glenrose Flashaway, and the Garden City Press Trophies are, apparently, not taking these splendid offerings seriously. To stimulate interest we show the latest offerings of generous donors, who are only interested to the extent that their donations will be considered beneficial to the sport of dog showing, and not from any selfish motive, or for cheap advertising as has been alleged.

"Charlie" Stone gave his trophy to stimulate interest in the breed known as the Irish Setter. "Joe" Greenwood gave his trophy to mark his great appreciation of his having won the Governor-General of Canada's Solid Silver Cup, and also to commemorate the untimely death of his great little Pom, Int. Ch. Glenrose Flashaway, surely a healthy sign of sportsmanship on Mr. Greenwood's part, nothing selfish about it, and no cheap advertising anticipated.

The Garden City Press Trophy was more of a personal

tribute to the writer in its original intent than for any other purpose, but I have had a good innings in the show game in my day, and am content to look over the "Spoils of the Chase" as they already are, and so The Garden City Press Trophy is up for competition this year. Nothing selfish there, and the Garden City Press pays plenty, and promptly for its advertising.

There is \$150.00 actual in these three cups, therefore they average \$50.00 apiece. All three are offered to stimulate breeding and exhibiting in Canada.

Who will the lucky winners be? We wonder!

But the writer will vouch for their worthiness in every respect. Look at the pictures, and make up your minds that you are going to win one of them at least. The Western breeders are strong for them, so Eastern fanciers better get busy.

We wonder if Oscar Pierson realized fully the importance of his wins at Brantford, when his Beagle, Ch. Model Swampy Queen, won for best in show all breeds. We have it on record that the high honor secured by Mr. Pierson's beautiful bitch entitled her to wins on the "Garden City Press Trophy," and the "Glenrose Flashaway Memorial Trophy." We recall that Mr. Pierson's dogs were contenders for the Governor General's Trophy in 1927.

At the Ladies' Kennel Club shows, Montreal, Mr. A. T. Keiller's Irish Setter, "Aintree Dunstar Lady Louise" had the distinction of winning on the C. A. Stone Trophy, with two of her get in "Mike of Kildona," and "Squire of Kildona," and it will interest Mr. Stone to know that the wins were quite worthy of his splendid gift to the breed.

DOGS OF THE EMPIRE

IT is thought that no bench show held beyond the far-flung borders of the British Empire is more enjoyed by Canadians and other strangers than the annual kennel event sponsored by Mr. and Mrs. Hartley Dodge, Giralda, Madison, N.J., U.S.A. It has always been the endeavor of the executive of the Morris and Essex K. C. (which is the flag that the Madison

affair sails under) to obtain from the Dominion two, three or more of Canada's leading, and consequently experienced, judges. This year Robert A. Ross of Montreal Mrs. Wilson Wylie of Vineland, Ontario, and Walter H. Reeves, Belleville, Ontario, were invited to look over the latest and best of the dogs owned in the east of the United States. These judges promptly got about their tasks and had finished their sections when some others were not acting with the same despatch. This delay caused the end of the show to drag a little. Indeed, it was not until 7.45 p.m. that the final best-in-show award was made.

The prizes offered in the competition for the absolute "best of the bests" consisted of a magnificent and solid silver loving cup presented as a trophy by Percy A. Rockefeller; another very valuable solid silver bowl was donated by Mr. Rockefeller's sister, Mrs. Hartley Dodge. There were other odds and ends of considerable worth. These special prizes fell to the lot of the shaded orange-colored Pomeranian dog, Champion Little Emir, the dog your Mrs. Wilson Wylie had previously placed at the head of his breed. And, let it be said, there were some extra-good Poms at Madison.

This was no uncommon victory for Mr. Vincent's little

Pomeranian to achieve. He is a very worthy American-bred product, and, as such, was awarded the \$50 special given by the A. K. C. for the best American-bred dog or bitch. So Mrs. Matta's personal cup was filled to overflowing in the way of bullion and specie. Little Emir is a lovely little dog, weighing between three and four pounds. He, perhaps, may be best described as a square little dog, his profuse and stand-off coat making him appear as broad as he is long. The head is nicely shaped, although, like the very great majority of his brethren, the skull is inclined towards the rounded formation that may be observed in very nearly all of the bantamized or toy dogs — dogs descended from ancient and much larger ancestors. However, Little Emir is a very beautiful Pomeranian, with small and well-carried ears. He moves like a large and perfectly sound dog; he's full of vim and consequence. The fore-end of his frill forms a saucer-like bib under his tiny chin; indeed, Emir is all the little gentleman. There were other corkingly good dogs in the ring, any one of which could have won without an unforgiveable error being made by even such an astute and practised judge as Theo. Offerman.

Having watched the judging of a few of these best-in-the show competitions during the last month or so, I am wondering if, after all, there is much good to be derived from these jamborees—save the delights enjoyed by the onlooker, who is enabled to see at a glance an aggregation of the best dogs at the show—according to the findings of the several judges. As a spectacular part of a bench show program, the best-in-show competition is to be admired. Otherwise these contests might mean anything. One day dog is on top; the next day the same dog is cast aside as unworthy of extra-special notice. The best-in-show at Aqueduct, N.Y., was left standing still in the sporting group at Mount Kisco, N.Y. Incidents of this sort are of frequent occurrence. What is one man's meat is another

man's poison, and probably that is the reason no two judges appear to be of the same opinion regarding one and perfectly good dog. A best-in-show trophy is worth possessing; but when we come down to brass tacks there seems to be more real honor attached to the winning of a best-in-the-breed certificate.

A good deal of innocent excitement might be aroused if money sweepstakes were promoted on the ringside during the judging of the five group sections and the best-in-show rally. That would be fine fun and help towards the gaiety of the multitudes. These competitions may be treated as lotteries—as they often are.

Madison was a gay show, with a night-before get-together supper and an on-with-the-dance party. The entertainment was of the most recherche order, and several Canadians were noticed among the guests. As may be imagined, the Giralda hospitality is so finished in every detail that one wonders who is the real and silent manager of that great dog show undertaking which is said to cost its donor not less than twenty-five thousand dollars each year. As for the show, it should pay for itself, although the benching, feeding, tenting and management fees must be large. The show is larger than the kind that is ordinarily profitable. If all the breeds were catered for at a Madison Show no one day's work could cover it in its entirety. The display of solid silver and massive articles offered by wealthy patrons for competition among the various breeds present was of the order one is wont to see displayed in the best silversmith's windows in the great cities of North America and Europe. That is the way everything is done at Giralda, where thousands of visitors are fed and regaled on the best that is going.

The Wire-haired Fox Terrier never appeared to better advantage than at the Madison, N.J., Show. Eventually, Burlesdon Banker, the imported and good terrier bred by F. Wooler and by Reliable out of Witchcraft, was declared

to be the best of the lot. Banker is owned by Franklin B. Lord, one of the affluent die-hards of the older American Fox Terrier fraternity. He has stuck to Wire-hairs and Welsh Terriers for considerably more than twenty years. Mr. Lord, at the time of writing, was travelling in Europe. He said he was bringing back more dogs.

There is always something new and noticeable about a Madison Show. The innovation this year took the form of small, square and individual platforms of miniature "blocks" arranged in the Terrier rings. Half a dozen or more Fox Terriers or other Terriers of the 16-20 pound varieties could be separately staged at the same time and in a line. Here of course, was an opportunity for the expert handler to make the most of his dog, as he coaxed and posed his charge to stand at its best. But the new method might have its shortcomings, especially as sensed by persons like myself, who prefer to see a dog standing on his own—in his natural pose—before placing any value on the forced stance a dog might hold for a few seconds of time. I believe that the custom of posing dogs in American and Canadian show rings is nothing short of a curse; and sooner or later, breeders of what ought to be high-class dogs will find out that posing is little less than a delusion and a snare.

Returning to the subject of the new and small show "blocks," as at Madison, I was greatly struck with an amusing remark that fell from the lips of Charles Trayford when asked what he thought of the new arrangements in the Fox Terrier judging ring:

"I don't like 'em; they're too much like bleedin' wax-works."

Here was the rough-and-ready-expressed opinion of one of the very best and internationally known Terrier men in Trayford—a Terrier admirer from childhood days, just as was his father and grandfather before him. Here was Charles Trayford, the man who had charge of all the great

Terriers that came out of Mrs. Roy Rainey's kennels at Huntington, L.I., and now superintendent of America's largest and best mixed kennels of sporting, non-sporting, Terriers and Bulldogs in the United States (Col. Robert Guggenheim's) declaring that posed show dogs were being made to appear like "bleedin' waxworks." And the best or worst of it is that Trayford was right.

Undoubtedly, this waxwork business can be done to death. A case in point: At a recent and important close to New York show, held under A. K. C. rules, while the sporting group was in the ring, it was noticed that an English Setter (a former best of its breed) possessed a tail stern or flag that would have been the real and correct adornment for a collie dog. The tail was sickle-shaped, some inches at the end of it being curved and carried upwards in the most approved manner for a collie. Of course, everyone knows that a first-class Setter fit enough for a best-of-the-breed dog should have a three-quarter tail carried out straight "like a sting" as the desired formation used to be styled. Round and round the ring the best of the sporting dogs were paraded, with the ultimate result that on the occasion of the last inspection on the block the knowing owner or handler pulled out at full length the stern of his Setter. The man stood well off and left alone the other end of the dog. The handler strictly attended to his dog's caudal appendage that was about as bad as a Setter's tail could be. And so the very ugly-tailed Setter passed muster and was awarded fourth prize when there seemed to be better dogs in the ring. The handler was not to be blamed.

Our rulers must surely be aware that posing is one of the parents of bad judging. Bench shows are for dogs—not "waxworks."

Now for something that is nearer and, perhaps, dearer to many hundreds of Canadians who are strictly worship-

pers of the dog, gun, hunting hound and coursing dog. For let it be borne in mind the Dominion is able to furnish, and does possess, the best hunting, shooting and fishing on this continent. Every season—hunting or fishing—more and more Americans are going into Canada. The splendid stories regarding their adventures interest their countrymen. These narratives make a great impression on their readers. Consequently, this season there will cross the border an enormous body of sportsmen, intent on the enjoyment of their fall and early winter sport.

The practically undestroyable Canadian sporting prospects must mean an ever-increasing and first-class market for shooting, hunting and coursing dogs—the breeds covered by Pointers, Setters, Retrievers, land and water Spaniels, Hounds, Beagles and two or three of the running dogs such as Deerhounds, Wolfhounds and Greyhounds. These dogs are required for the properly equipped and hunting or shooting outfit.

Perhaps in a year or so the coyote coursing will not be such an everyday sport or occupation on the prairies of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta. The cause of this falling off will be due to the high prices now obtainable in the wholesale fur markets for coyote and wolf skins, it is said. Once upon a time a provincial government was reported to have nearly ruined itself because of the vast bounties paid to the destroyers of the pests of the prairies. Still the night-howlers increased and multiplied. So coyote and wolf coursing may become a sport of the past unless hunting hounds are employed to drive the rascals out of the large bluffs where they often conceal themselves during the day time. The prairie wolf is now seeking cover. Welsh Foxhounds are being imported by my kinsmen, Albert and Merwyn Lloyd, who maintain a large kennel of wolf dogs and English Setters on their ranch at Greenlawn about thirty miles north of Islay, Alberta.

OUR FRONTISPIECE

Again we are privileged to show our readers a remarkable study in the smooth Fox Terrier, Dunsdaff, recently imported from England by a grand old supporter of the Canadian Kennel Club, and staunch sponsor of the Smooth Coated Fox Terrier. W. "Billy" M. Coats of Seattle, U.S.A., who, it will be remembered brought to the United States that other Sterling Smooth Quakertown Quarterback some years ago, or to be exact on December 27th, 1926, at that time we featured the little emigrant on our front cover, and later followed his brilliant winnings at Canadian shows held in British Columbia where he won his championship at his first four shows without knowing defeat. This smart son of Avon Rugger ex Cornuta died last February, and so it was naturally expedient that he had to be replaced, hence the importation of our feature dog of the Mouth Dunsdaff.

Taking Dunsdaffs show record for 1928 we are led to believe that he was the best youngster out in 1928 in England. At the Westminster National Fox Terrier Club Championship Show, London, Dunsdaff was shown for the first time and won the Puppy class. At Thames 1st puppy, at Bloomsbury 1st puppy 1st Junior, Crystal Palace 1st puppy, coming out

at Bloomsbury again he ran from puppy to open through his classes and at St. Abans, Bow, and Leeds he won the open classes. So that from his debut on June 30th, 1928, until the end of the year he had annexed 18 firsts and many special prizes. 1929 was just as pleasing as on January 17th, he won the open class at Bow and on February 26th he won first in his class and second any variety—open, and at Woodgreen on March 21st, he won 1st open Smooths and Wires, and on the following day he said goodbye to England and sailed for "Billy" Coats and Seattle. W. J. Nicholls, Rev. R. Bruce, Capt. Vernon C. T. Ince, T. Counell, A. J. Edwards, W. S. Glynn, C. Gentry, F. Butler, etc., are all judges who have stamped Dunsdaffs great quality with their approval, and the consensus of their comment may be summed up as follows: Rare corky coat, very tight and workman like. Excellent size, smart head, grand expression. Good body, legs and feet. Moves well and shows well. A real keen terrier heavily marked black."

Next year Mr. Coats hopes to visit London in conjunction with the Poultry Congress there, and at that time he hopes to be able to "look 'em all over," and to make some choice selections for friends on this side of the Atlantic, and of course for his good self.

London Canine Association Show

The "powers that be" at London decided that for the purposes of their 1929 Spring Show one day would be sufficient, and the arrangement made a hit with the exhibitors, many of whom were able to make a "From home to home—in one day" show of it, and cars and trucks containing fanciers and their dogs came by every highway, and several of these came from points in the United States comfortably.

The venue was the dog show building at the Fair Grounds, and of course that meant a slim gate, so the revenue was practically confined to the entry fees. Bert Swann, Newcastle, Ont., was the judge, and on the day gave plenty of solid satisfaction. Once in a while when a "good 'un" appeared that was being handicapped by poor handling, Mr. Swann would take the entry and set it up, as only he can do.

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GIVE ME WATER!

(A Timely Article by Robert Leighton in the "Dog World," (Eng.)

Dogs suffer, as do their owners, in very hot weather. There is not greater liability to ailment in summer than in winter; but a summer chill is always difficult to deal with, and disturbances of the canine digestion are troublesome in hot weather, as also are eczema and other skin affections. These are usually due to vitiated air, uncleanness, injudicious feeding and inattention to regular exercise. The exercise should be given in the morning and evening. Sunshine is health-giving, and young puppies cannot have too much of it if they are not allowed to exhaust themselves by their activity or by exposure to the direct rays of the mid-day sun. Exercise in itself is not harmful to the mature dog in the hottest weather.

It should be understood that a hanging tongue is not an indication of distress. On the contrary, it may usually be taken as a sign that the animal is in good condition, breathing freely and healthily. The dog does not perspire through the skin but through the tongue and the inside of the cheeks. In hot weather and during a vigorous run the tongue becomes overcharged and swollen with moisture and is stretched out to give relief to the throat in the process of breathing. The dog rarely wishes for a drink in this condition, but prefers to wait until it has cooled down, when a good drink of clean, fresh water is of immense benefit.

A constant supply of pure drinking water is of great importance in all weathers, but particularly in summer. People of mechanically regular habits who fill the dog's drinking dish in the morning only are apt to forget that water evaporates, that dogs are more thirsty in summer than in winter, and it not infrequently happens that the dish remains empty half the day. A thirsty dog does not discriminate, and will drink from any way-side puddle that may be filled with filth or teeming with the germs of disease. Pure drinking water is more necessary for the healthy dog even than food.

The humane tradespeople who place drinking troughs for dogs at the entrance to their establishments do a great service to our canine friends. If these dishes at shop doors are kept scrupulously clean and regularly replenished with cold, pure water, they are a welcome boon to the panting

dogs in search of a drink. But, unfortunately, they are too often placed in positions where the hot sun reaches them, and the water, when any is there, becomes tepid and nauseating. There is always the risk of these public drinking troughs becoming a positive danger instead of a benefit. Sick dogs are usually thirsty, and if the puppy who drinks at the shop-door has about him the germs of distemper, he is more than likely to leave a contribution of them in his saliva floating in the dish for other dogs to drink. Drinking water is not often suspected; but it is one of the most frequent sources of contagion among dogs.

If there is an inclination to skin trouble in summer time a pinch of Epsom Salts, flowers of sulphur, or carbonate of magnesia may with advantage be mixed in the morning dish of milk, or in the food. But eczema can usually be averted by attention to the diet and the digestion. I am of opinion that green vegetables provoke diarrhoea, and are of little value as an anti-scorbutic for dogs. They set up fermentation, and are the cause of many internal disturbances. The most suitable food is provided in the ordinary biscuit preparations of commerce, combined with a considerable proportion of meat. It is an error to suppose that meat is not good for a dog in summer. It is the proper and natural food. But it is important that it should be absolutely wholesome, and it had better be slightly cooked and given by preference in the evening, well mixed with hound meal or brown bread simply moistened with gravy and flavoured with a pinch of salt. Sloppy foods and all kinds of dainty confectionery should be rigidly avoided.

Dogs that go much in grass are apt to gather a harvest of ticks and other irritating insects which cause incessant scratching. The daily grooming should never be neglected in warm weather. The brushing not only keeps the hair elastic and free from tangle, but it invigorates the skin and obviates all need for washing. At the same time it must be recognized that an occasional swim is one of most refreshing exercises in which sporting dogs, including Terriers, should always been encouraged. In summer time any dog should be kept in prime condition if it is properly fed, if it lives as much as possible in fresh air, is kept clean and gets its sufficient amount of invigorating exercise.



THE CANADIAN FANCY

THE support I gave to our British Columbia director, W. H. Pym, when he brought up at the annual general meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club his proposed amendment, That the constitution and by-laws of the Canadian Kennel Club be amended by adding thereto under the heading Rules of Entry, the following:

"A dog born in Canada for which provision for registration has not previously been made, and that has won ten championship points under at least three different judges, at three different shows held under the rules of the Canadian Kennel Club and that is recognized as a champion by the Canadian Kennel Club, and supported by a complete three-generation pedigree, should be eligible for registration," has brought forth considerable criticism from all parts of the Dominion. Although I must say the majority are strongly in favor of the amendment being adopted by the Canadian Live Stock Records, but judging from the tone of a couple of the letters received, the writers are evidently under the impression, that I have a few unregistered champions in my kennel, and that my reasons for supporting the amendment were somewhat personal.

Before, therefore, giving my reasons for my support to this very important amendment, I would like to mention, that I have only one dog, a wire fox terrier, and furthermore, since I first became associated with a certain paper, devoted to dogs, a great many years ago, I have never shown, or kept a stud dog. Anyone who travels over our vast continent, visiting fanciers and shows, may have asked himself or herself the question, whether today we are producing as good dogs as formerly? As the answer must be in the negative, the reason we are not producing as many real good dogs as, we will say, before the late war! Naturally, Canada suffered through the war by losing a number of clever breeders, but personally I believe the real reason that we are not progressing as we should do, as breeders, is that we think too much of pedigrees instead of the individual dog or bitch. Think how often you have perused a sale advertisement offering a dog for twenty-five dollars with papers. To attain success as a breeder we must have pedigrees, but to my way of thinking, some breeders do not pay enough attention to individuals. They breed from any runt of a bitch providing she is registered at the Canadian Live Stock Records, and send her to be bred to a pedigree stud dog, not troubling to find out whether the stud dog is a descendant of a prepotent strain.

The late war did considerable harm to British breeders, food was very difficult to obtain. When I went back after the war I soon noticed that the quality was not nearly as level as in pre-war days. To-day, however, the British breeders are breeding as good dogs as they did before the war. The splendid recovery, however, was not made by just purchasing dogs and bitches with pedigrees, but by acquiring individuals, bitches that gave one the impression that they would be producers of high-class, typical puppies, and by using stud dogs that had proved themselves to be prepotent sires. There are pedigrees and pedigrees, the same as there are diamonds and diamonds. Some years ago I was taken over the great South Afri-

can Diamond Fields, and was shown a packet of diamonds, and asked to judge them, naturally, I made a poor selection. It is the same with the novice, he or she knows nothing of strains, and providing they can buy a dog with a pedigree they go away convinced that they have bought a bitch that is sure to produce a champion. Let's try and educate the novice that to attain success, that real dogs must be bought with worth-while pedigrees, which contain the names of progeny that are descendants of high-class strains, strains which have been made by breeders of repute.

As I said earlier in this article, I don't think some Canadian breeders are breeding with the same judgment as they did before the war, and the consequence is, that we are not producing the great Canadian dogs of pre-war days. If you disagree, take a look at the Cocker Spaniel entry at any important show. Granted you will see some real little Cockers, but you will always find many exhibits which show little resemblance to real Cocker type.

Where are our Smooth Fox Terriers? Are we producing "Wires" as good as James F. Strachan's Ormsby Lightning, or Mrs. Webster's charming white bitch, By-Town Bit O' White? Where are we to-day in Bulldogs? I remember during the war, judging a show at Winnipeg, and finding an entry of bulldogs good enough for New York Show. Where are our Airedales? It is a mistake to hide real facts, we are not making the headway we should, and I firmly believe it is through want of careful thought in choosing our brood bitches and sires.

Anyone who may be interested in Silver Foxes must have noticed the great strides that have been made with this industry. The vast strides have not been made by haphazard breeding methods, but by selection and grading. If by some way we could have our undesirable puppies graded, it would be the best thing possible, but I fear this is an impossibility. Some two years ago one of my readers wrote and asked me, whether I thought breeding wire fox terriers could be made a profitable hobby? My reply was yes, providing really good brood bitches were obtained, and care was given in the selection of the stud dog. I heard nothing for nearly twelve months, and then my correspondent wrote again complaining of bad luck, a general lack of success. Being interested, I made it my business to call when I happened to be in the locality and found out that instead of following my advice to buy real good brood bitches, very mediocre stock have been purchased, six bitches and a stud dog for one hundred and fifty dollars, and they were kept in a yard barely large enough to rear a couple of litters, much less six. My advice to get rid of the lot, and to buy one real good bitch, in whelp to a reputable sire was followed, and the first litter produced five puppies. One was killed in a kennel fight, but the four left all proved to be winners, and when sold realized fifteen hundred dollars.

Some fanciers to-day are of opinion that we are shy of real good brood bitches and sires—well, they may be right, but, what about our unregistered champions? These champions have gained their titles in real competition, and their titles are surely proof enough that we have a wealth of high-class dogs that are not being used for the good of the fancy. It is not always possible

to tell by a glance whether a bitch will prove successful in the breeding kennel. Although some breeders possess the gift of being able to pick them, I can recall three bitches without pedigrees which were the starting of great producing strains, one an Irish Terrier bitch was bought at the Dogs' Home, Battersea Park, for \$2.50. On her debut in the show ring, she won six firsts under Charles Barnett at Darlington, and proved equally successful in the breeding kennel, the other two were Beagles, their first litters produced the English Kennel Club championship show winners in ten-inch dogs and bitches, and also twelve-inch dogs and bitches, but, care was taken in the selection of the sires, the Irish bitch being bred to the late G. R. Krehl's Ch. Danell II, a son of Ch. Brickbat, and the Beagles to Ch. Reader, who was by Rosewood, a son of Ch. Ringwood. I am asking our Editor to insert the cut of the Shepherd bitch, Champion Teuthilde Von Hagenscheiss, who looks all over a typical brood bitch, for she has size, substance and quality, with a body capable of carrying a litter and a "breedy" head.

In choosing the Pointer Ch. Herewithem J. P. to illustrate an ideal stud dog I am not choosing him on account of his show record, but on account of the fact that two of his litter brothers are also great winners, proof that he is a descendant of a prepotent strain.

I am afraid that I am using a lot of my space this month in this chat on breeding, but I do so to try and impress on my readers that there is a real science in breeding, and I want to stress the fact, that to succeed, Canadian breeders must first possess bitches that look like being brood bitches. Don't ask for paper pedigrees, but ask, and get brood bitches, stud dogs that are descendants of strains that have proved productive, and don't let us forget the wealth which at present is productive in those unregistered Canadian champions. Maybe, in fact, it is certain that they all will not prove valuable for

breeding, but, as admittedly we are shy on brood bitches and sires let us give them a chance, it is certain that they will prove of more value than some of the mediocre stock that being bred from to-day.

In going over the many books that have been written and published on dogs, one of the most instructive articles on breeding I have read, appears in *British Dogs at Work*, written by that well-known authority, A. Croxton Smith. From it I cull the following: "The breeding of pedigree stock of any description, whether it be guinea pigs or race horses, casts an irresistible spell over the minds of men, who are continually straining after an unattainable ideal." The author goes on to say, "The man who determines to try his luck at breeding dogs will do well to make up his mind at once to learn all he can from those who have graduated in the school of experience. If you are of an observant mind you will soon pick up the salient features of the leading families of the variety that you are breeding, but one is forced reluctantly to the conclusion that there are breeders who can never learn. Time after time we see certain people turning out puppies by the hundred with a lamentably small percentage of dogs of the right type, while another man with not more than two or three brood bitches manages to bring out something above the average, with the regularity of clockwork. When you have once grasped this idea, you will probably arrive at the conclusion, that, successful dog-breeding is not merely a matter of chance, for surely luck would be on the side of the big battalions. "The Science of Breeding." 1, From the male parent is mainly derived the external structure configuration, and outward characteristics, also the locomotive system or development; 2, From the female parent is derived the internal structure, the vital organs, and in more proportion than the male, the constitution, temper and habits; 3, That the purer the race of the parent the more certainty

there is of its transmitting its qualities to the offspring. The parent of the purer descent will have the greater influence; 4, That apart from certain disturbing influences, the male, if of pure descent and descended from a stock of uniform color, will stamp his color upon his offspring." I am going to leave my little chat on breed-pedigrees, and unregistered champions, with the wealth of reason in Croxton Smith's article, and hope to continue it at some not very distant date. I have every confidence in our Canadian breeders, and hope that they will take what I have written, as constructive criticism. I feel confident that we have the breeders and also the brood bitches and sires, and that there is no earthly reason why we cannot produce stock as good here, as in other parts of the world.

"Monty" Wallace has quickly filled the vacant kennel of the late Champion Knight of Drumnod. Monty means having the best, and therefore sent to the famous Newfoundland breeder, Mrs. Wetwan of England, and induced her to part with one of the stars of her kennel, Shelton Cabin Boy. I understand that Boy arrived in capital condition after his long journey to Saskatoon, and made an excellent impression on his importer. Shelton Cabin Boy is a sire of note, and litter brother to Garmot Echo, the Manchester championship winner.

F. Dodsworth, the Secretary of the Victoria Kennel Club, writes me as follows:

Our recent show was the most successful in the history of the club, although we have no absolute proof. I have talked with many of the old-time members of the club and the nearest I can get to anything like a definite answer on the matter is from our old friend Jack Creighton of Cocker Spaniel fame, who informs me, we might find one to beat it, but we would have to search back more than twenty-five years. Unfortunately we cannot trace any records further back than recent years. I have asked the Canadian Kennel Club if they have any record of any show where more English Setters and Springer Spaniels were benched at an all-breed show. The English Setters were without a doubt the cream of the Country, as were the Springer Spaniels. While the Best of Breed in the former went to the

U.S.A., yet the bitch that did it was bred in Vancouver. Our old friend W. C. C. Burns, late of Edmonton, who is now residing just outside Victoria, and whose prefix is "Burnside" had the pleasure of seeing a Springer bitch bred by him, go Best Opposite. The English Pug seems to be coming again into favor in this part, and you will see we had quite a nice entry of these. The Springer that went Best of Breed, is owned by a man in Victoria who keeps him for a pet, and was only induced to show him at the last moment. NOTES FROM SCOTLAND

Exhibitors are more than interested on learning that the State of New York has followed the example of Massachusetts in passing a bill for the abolition of cropping in all canine breeds.

A breed that is slowly but surely growing in popularity in England is the Afghan Hound and the entry and

the quality at the L.K.A. was a source of pleasure and satisfaction to the pioneers of this attractive breed.

That really good Pointer Kades Sheiba who is mated to Malloyd Mick, is destined to leave these shores for Japan.

Another slur has been cast at the Alsatian by the action of the Australian Government, acting on the advice of graziers' associations, has prohibited the importations of Alsatian dogs for 5 years. The contention of the graziers is that if the Alsatian and the dingo (the native wild dog) were crossed the result would be a particularly bloodthirsty progeny.

A wave of that dread disease Huttgart is sweeping through England, and it is stated that dogs are dying in hundreds. It is two years since an epidemic of this kind was in England. Up to the moment of writing only isolated cases are reported in Scotland. The symptoms of this disease are easily distinguished by the tongue, which turns the color of a rusty nail and in extreme cases, part or the whole of the tongue drops off. A sedative or stimulant should be given and never an emetic. Huttgart takes its name from the town in Germany where it was first diagnosed.

The best dog at Ayr Championship Show was Mr. S. M. Stewart's Aire-dale Terrier, Belfort Supreme of Shelerock. The reserve was Mr. J. A. Carberry's well-known Irish Setter, Tarsfield of Boyne.

Dr. L. Turton Price has exported a

trio of English Setters in Sandie of Crombie, Rose of Crombie and Sallie of Crombie to Mr. D. C. Kok of the U.S.A.

Mr. R. S. Holland, the well-known Irish judge, is spending the first fortnight of June in Denmark.

Export pedigree certificates were issued by the English Kennel Club for 97 days during April for the U.S.A. and Canada.

As was expected, Mr. W. L. McCandlish drew a record entry at Guernsey, Channel Islands, on May 16. Mr. McCandlish is Chairman of the English Kennel Club.

A breed that is rapidly declining in popularity in England is the Pomeranian. Can nothing be done to boost this one-time favorite?

The Bulldog Club (Inc.) held its Championship Show at Bloomsbury on May 16. Mr. H. Schlaferman adjudicated. The Challenge Certificates went to Ch. Nizam of Woodhouse and Ch. Dames Double.

The committee of the English Kennel Club has decided that the correct name on the register of "Any Other Variety" of the breed previously described as "Finnish Spitz" shall in future be called "Finsk Spitz."

Many Scottish fanciers have noted that Mr. Wm. Forrest has been appointed to judge terriers and non-sporting dogs at Alberta Kennel Club Show, to be held at Calgary during the exhibition and stampede week, on July 10, 11, and 12.

The Sealyham Terriers Breeders' Association held its second champion-

ship show in the Royal Botanical Gardens, Regents Park, London, on June 11. There were 348 entries, and the judge was Mr. W. S. Glynn. The best dog was Mrs. Barber's Scotia Stylist. The best bitch in the show was Mrs. Pearson's Rannerdale Eloquence.

"**W**AIT till we show her in Montreal next month," said Miss Mary Coleman, when she saw her pet Cocker bitch unplaced in the Ottawa parlor show, and her fondest dreams were fulfilled when "Mary's Love" went to best of breed on May the 29th in the Ladies' Kennel Show. Big cash offers were refused by Fred for this nine months old puppy before he left the city of the beer your great-grandfather drank.

Another particular puppy bitch bred by A. R. Stuart of Chambly Bassin got best of breed on May the 30th, Derby Deb, a daughter of Ch. Limestone Laddie, with wonderful bone and substance for such a young specimen of what is supposed to be the weaker sex.

Our friend, Allan C. McGuirl, who was the first to congratulate Fred Coleman for his win, also had a good share of the winning in that merry and intelligent breed with his "Brampton Silver Critic" going to winners dogs on both days and Brampton Dream Kisses winners bitches, solid color, on the 30th, which place had been occupied by Derby d'Or on the previous day.

That silent sportsman from Hull, Harry Collin, was the owner of the solid color winner on the 29th, Chaudiere Red Jacket, and of course everybody ought to congratulate him for breeding Mary's Love.

I would like to go over those winning with more details, as the Cocker Spaniel is certainly one of the most numerous breed of dogs in the Province of Quebec, and if we could only get the French-Canadians to show their dogs, there should be over 100 entries in Cockers in every Montreal show.

In 1913 I made a bet with Mr. Coristine, then secretary of the club, that I would have over 25 English Setters in the spring show. I won handily with 27 entries, all from French-Canadian exhibitors. But how sorry I felt for my activities when my newly-found exhibitors started to crowd me with recriminations. It seems that people of my race are so struck on their own pets that they cannot understand a judge giving them anything but first prize. Just as a mother will always think her own baby to be the prettiest in the village, so are my countrymen unable to see the faults of their own dogs, and the good points of the others. And this is not caused by a lack of sportsmanship, but rather by an overdose of affection for the animals which they have reared. Of course, there are exceptions, and I was one of the happiest men

in Canada during the twin shows in finding one. How glad I was that Mr. Jules Laurencelle's newly imported wire, Epping Expert, went down to defeat, nobody will ever guess. How could I have known Mr. Laurencelle's sporting spirit if he had won? At the end of the second day, somebody walked over to the Seed and Birds stand and said to Jules: "A quoi bon? Nobody can beat Mr. Strachan in Montreal." His retort was quick and to the

point: "Yes, it can be done and I will do it some day. My dog was not so classy nor so well put down as Mr. Strachan's. I'll import others and maybe beat his with some of my own breeding."

He might have in his own kennels now something that will sweep everything next year as he imported with Expert the great Florence Cuckoo in whelp to Ch. Epping Eldorado, who is supposed to be one of the three best "wires" in England, and she whelped three of the most promising puppies ever seen in Canada.

Ormsby Formula, one of the classiest "wires" ever bred in the Ormsby Kennels, went to best of breed and best Fox Terrier. She seems to improve with age and is showing more depth of brisket and more bone than ever. We depend on the most dependable of kennel managers, Harry Armistead, to keep her in trim for the Ottawa shows. We will put up a big fight for best Fox Terrier with our own Craigellochie Fireside, but we want all the fliers from this province to be there and put up a big argument with Dancing Master, who will fly the colors of our friends from the Glen Gyle Kennels.

Let us make these Ottawa shows a real national proposition, and here is hoping that best all breeds may be won by this province. A votre sante, n'est ce pas!!

In smooth Fox Terriers we were glad to see for the first time C. T. S. Capel's Dame Darkie, imported from England and really one of the best headed Terriers to ever reach these shores. She also has bone to spare, and when shown a bit fatter she will put up a big fight for best Fox Terrier.

She is also as game as a Bull Terrier and shows like a plucky Irish Terrier.

I had the pleasure to handle two smooth Fox Terrier bitches from Halifax, entered by that gamest of sportsman, F. W. Johnston. The dear little pets had been on the road for over forty-eight hours when they were delivered at the Arena. In spite of the hot weather, they did not look tired nor thirsty. Both were evidently

house pets and quite sore at having been torn away from their beloved home. Although I have been in the dog shows for over twenty years and am most interested in the standard points of each breed, the first thing that interests me on meeting a strange dog is his character, his personality so to speak. Before looking at the long foreface, the good front and well placed tail of a Terrier, which are, after all, only man-made qualities, I try to read the dog's mind, that wonderful unfathomable God's creation which so often nearly borders the human soul itself. What were these two little doggies thinking of the talkative person from the peafields?

The mother, Prides Hill Sapphire, thought the sound of my language funny indeed, but she was thankful to me for having rescued her from that closed crate. On account of that she restrained herself from biting me, but would not show and quenched her wrath on everybody else within her reach. Her daughter, Onyx of Halifax, who boasts of Ch. Prides Hill Resultant as her sire, looked just as dejected as a human being sentenced to the gallows. She would not get mad or gay over anything. She sat down on her haunches with a vacant look in her eyes like that of a child who has been given an undeserved punishment. I offered her milk and hamburger steak, cold water and juicy salmon. Nothing doing! She would not even scent these. Suddenly I had a genial idea. I took off her collar and sat down on the bench with the puppy in my arms and petted her like a baby. I wish you had seen the transformation in that dog. She just put up both her paws on my shoulders and looked me square in the eyes, and from that minute I could have made her walk on a stretched wire if I had asked her to do it. Onyx is an unusually well proportioned Fox Terrier with very good bone and a promising body. As her dam is a daughter of Ch. Lemoine of Prides Hill and Ch. Prides Hill Watteau Gem, she has the three best lines of "smooths" from England and the United States, and she certainly will make herself useful in the improvement of the breed in this country. The Prides Hill prefix seems to have chosen the Dominion of Canada for its preferred market lately, as we hear nearly every week of some of its inmates having crossed the border.

Mr. J. O. Pelletier, the genial manager of the Central Hotel, Hull, Que., has become the owner of the wire hair stud, Prides Hill Bounce, a grandson of Ch. Ridgeway Dark Boy, and probably the biggest boned stud in Eastern Canada. The dog has a long neck and a strong foreface; mated to a daughter of Craigellachie Flashlight, he is expected to throw fame on Hull, the city which makes Milwaukee jealous.

Outstanding amongst all kennels in the Ladies' Kennel shows were the wins of Mr. and Mrs. Batt's Scottish Terriers of the Haldon Kennels. Cairngorum Chief went to winners and best of breed in both shows.

In bitches, our Craigellachie Sterling, shown under the name of Barbara Highland Lassie, swept everything on the 29th, whilst the well-known winner, Airdrie Peggy, turned the tables on the next day. There is a demand just now that is well-nigh akin to a craze in Scottish Terriers all over Canada, and specially in Montreal, and we are glad to hear that the Haldon Kennels have numerous promising litters from their champion stock to offer.

One of the keenest fights for winners took place in the

Irish Terriers between Henry E. Whitley's Kilvera Postman and Murphy's Irish Boy. The young Kilvera dog had been first puppy in New York, whilst the Murphy entry lacked only one point for his championship. Eventually the young Postman won best of breed and also put a stiff bid against the Pekingese Rajah of Hesketh Wo-Kee for best in show, being the last Terrier to be left in the ring in the grand finale.

I cannot restrain from reporting here what an old Montreal breeder, who is always sparing in his compliments, was telling me about the owner of Kilvera Postman: "He is the biggest hearted fancier in Montreal."

A daughter of the Int. Ch. Ridgeway Game Feather, the Pointer bitch, Ridgeway Jenny Lind, owned and shown by W. J. Bartlett of St. John, N.B., came very near to hooking best all breed in both shows. She reminded us very much of the Great Herewithem J.P. at New York.

In English Setters the Imported Wild Irish Surprise, owned by Mr. S. T. Doyle, got best of breed over his kennel mate, Pajaro Diane.

In Irish Setters, Otta H. Gross, of Pittsburg, Penn., stamped himself as one of the best judges of sporting dogs that ever came to Montreal by putting Mike of Kildona and Horseshoe Nancy winners. The thoroughness with which Mr. Gross goes over the dogs is a delight to the eye of the connoisseurs. Mr. John E. McSoley of Malone, N.Y., deserves our congratulations for breeding and showing Horseshoe Nancy.

The Giralda Farms had an easy walk-over with their wonderful German Shepherds, Hettel Von Bodman and Koni Blasienberg. The Bulldog bitch, Ch. Westdorfs Miss Cintrason, owned and shown by Reg. P. Sparkes, of Toronto, was a great favorite with the rail birds, and her win of best in show thrilled the

attendance to the core. Another great favorite of the public was Mrs. Beland's Pomeranian, Young Black Gentleman of Pomona. Ted Ward's string of dogs nailed many a winners or best of breed ribbon, being put down in wonderful shape and perfect condition. These included the Bulldog, Ch. Dick O' The Main, the Chows, Tutani of Elcher and Tutanky of Elcher, and the Bull Terrier, Haymarket Dawn, owned by R. H. Elliott.

The Ladies' Club have incurred a tremendous expense in benching these two shows, and why they were not rewarded by the expected big entry that would have made these three- or four-point shows, is hard to explain. The crushing heat certainly caused the gate receipts to dwindle down to a shameful level.

It is my single aim and object to make "Notes From Old Quebec" representative of "Old Quebec." I am easily reached by correspondence, and it will be ever so much better if I can depend on you, rather than have you depending on me. How easy it is for you to keep me posted regarding what is doing at your kennel that is of a nature that would interest Kennel and Bench readers generally. Model Swampy Queen showing in perfect condition on the day. No less than Best of Breeds of three recent shows were in the ring together for Brantford's best and the Beagle bitch was proclaimed Queen. The beautiful Garden City Press Trophy and the splendid Glenrose Flashaway Trophy were other valuable spoils that came to Ch. Model Swampy Queen's bag on the day, and speaking of Beagles reminds us that between Harry Nolan and Oscar Pierson 24 of the 25 Beagles benched were from the kennels of those two sportsmen, naturally the Beagle entry was one of the features of the show. Bostons were out in strength and went over the 30 mark. Shepherds were down to 19, but under judge Rost, who is a specialist of the breed, the judging was most interesting, the dogs being "gaited" outside of the ring where there was plenty of room for the dogs to show everything they had to offer to their judge.

The usual banquet was held at the Belmont Hotel, the headquarters of most of the fanciers, and much credit is due to Mr. Fraser, the proprietor, for the very excellent general arrangements of the banquet, and for the particularly high quality of the meal that was served. His Worship Mayor Beckett welcomed the fanciers to the Telephone City, and spoke most encouragingly to the Brantford fanciers. Other speakers spoke of their desire to come to Brantford Show each recurring year, and no doubt this show will be bigger in every sense as the years roll past.

Kindly reference was made to an absent fancier who always loved the Brantford fixtures, Norman K. Swire, and as a result of the reference the proposed "Norman K. Swire Memorial" became an actuality, and the first \$100.00 towards the Memorial is now on hand, and it was obvious, that, if our late comrade liked Brantford, Brantford liked him just as well.

At the banquet the judge left the fanciers with lots of room for thought after he had given them a talk on the relationship between those being judged, and the judge himself. He said that the fanciers should not take a judge's placings too seriously. After all they were just getting the opinion of one man. Some other good man might see the same dogs quite differently. The dogs themselves showed to better advantage on certain days. Their faults were discovered on some days and on others the same faults might not be glaring, these latter conditions often being controlled by clever handling. It was the uncertainty of the whole arrangement that made dog showing the fascination that it was conceded to be. Putting everything together the Brantford show was enjoyed by all those who attended.

THE annual spring circuit of shows has run its course, and following on the very successful fixture of Victoria Kennel Club the scenes were shifted to Vancouver and then to New Westminster.

May 24th and 25th were the dates of the Vancouver Show, held at Hastings Park and not altogether under the most favorable circumstances. Owing to the extensive building operations at the Exhibition Grounds and the old Dog Show Building being amongst these operations, here it was necessary to hold the show in the Cattle Building, this building was large enough, and had many advantages, the dogs were benched on the floor, well bedded down, and as space was no object, all the dogs had plenty of room and were quite comfortable, this applies especially to the larger dogs, and as one passed along the aisles the absence of barking, and the usual noises, due to the comfortable positions of the dogs, was very noticeable, and we would commend this manner of benching, where at all possible. While the whole building arrangements were a matter of last resource, under the circumstances everything passed off quite smoothly and in the matter of the judging ring, I would state, that the light was quite the best the writer has noted at a number of shows, and the arrangement for the spectators was very good. The weatherman might have been on better behaviour, as it was somewhat cool and showery throughout the day, which circumstance had a tendency to keep many away, but withal the gate was very good. The entries at this fixture had fallen away considerably and one is at a loss to account for this, other than the fact that it was left more or less to the exhibitors themselves to make their entries and there was no last hour rounding-up process. The judging was in the hands of W. H. Moffett, of Vancouver who went about his work in a competent manner, giving all a fair going over, and handing out his decisions as he saw them, and we think we are right in saying that he gave good satisfaction all round.

The Show Committee that handled this affair so very acceptably was composed of: Mr. Balshaw, Mrs. Balshaw, Mrs. E. A. Dunn, Mr. Tremere as Show Secretary, N. McConnel as Supt., put it across O.K., while Wm. Squelch acted as Ring Steward, and Drs. Hoggan and Ballard as Hon. Veterinaries.

With the Calgary and Edmonton events following closely fanciers are naturally busy getting their dogs in first class condition.

A great deal of interest has been aroused in Calgary canine circles by the formation of the Alberta Fox Terrier Association. The directors and executives are as follows: Honorary Secretary-Treasurer, Mrs. J. M. Daintrey, Box 1598, Calgary; Honorary Presidents, Lady Lougheed, the Venerable Archdeacon A. J. B. Dewdney, Col. G. West-Jones, Lt.-Col. L. F. Page, D.S.O.; President, M. J. Carr, Esq.; First Vice-President, Capt. J. F. MacNeill; Second Vice-President, F. D. Walker, Esq.; Executive Committee, Mrs. P. M. Render, Mrs. M. J. Carr, Miss A. K. Clarke, and Messrs. P. M. Render and G. Murray.

The Club held their first matinee on May 24, and a grand array of special prizes donated by citizens of Calgary and district contributed not a little to a very successful affair indeed. Special efforts were made to induce dog owners who had not exhibited before to support the show, and there is no doubt that the interest so aroused will induce many of these new fanciers to support the point shows.

The judges were: H. P. Saunders, Gun Dogs; Sergt.-Maj. F. Steavenson, Alsatians; L. H. Cooper, all other breeds.

The Welcome Cups, donated by the Dominion, the Alexandra, the Yale, Empress, Noble, St. Regis, Imperial and Royal Hotels, drew a large entry from outside points, and were hotly competed for, the one for best male going to a beautiful pointer owned by Miss M. Walsh, Beiseker. Best female was won by A. Wright, Edmonton, with his grand little Boston bitch, who has been a consistent winner in the East. V. W. Williams, Lethbridge, was runner up with his lovely "Merle" collie. The finals for the Challenge Cups gave the three judges food for thought; their decisions were,

however, agreeable not only to themselves, but to the ringside also. The smooth fox terrier final resulted in a hard tussle between Mr. Melcod's dog and Mrs. Woods', the decision going to the lady. Best in show was a popular win, Col. D. Ritchie securing same with his lately imported "Aber-tay Trigg," a Scottie of type and quality. He not only took the Dallas Cup, but also the A. H. Perkyn Cup for best terrier in show. The W. S. Herron Cup for best sporting dog was won by Phil. Heather's Gordon setter. Working dogs went to V. W. Williams, Lethbridge, with his collie. The T. Eaton Cup for best dog owned and bred in Calgary was won by A. P. Patrick. The Albertan Cup for best smooth went to Mrs. M. Woods' "Farleigh Peppy," as well as the cup for best novice smooth fox terrier donated by Archdeacon Dewdney. Lt.-Col. Page Cup for best smooth puppie went to the same little rascal. The P. Burns Challenge Cup for best wire-haired terrier went to Mrs. Daintrey. Mrs. P. M. Render secured the Lady Lougheed Cup for best wire novice, also the Col. West-Jones Cup for wire puppy. Members Cup, any variety, donated by A. G. Agnew, was won by Dr. F. T. Campbell with his Labrador retriever. The Vair Anderson Challenge Cup, best novice, any variety, went to V. W. Williams. Birks Cup for best terrier owned by a member was won by Mrs. Daintrey's "Old Bill." The following cups were won outright: Best Toy, Miss Unice Caddick's Pom, "Wee Billikins," a splendid little one shown in grand condition; V. W. Williams, Lethbridge, best working dog, and A. Wright, Edmonton, best non-sporting with his Boston terrier.

A considerable discussion has been aroused in Greensburg, Pennsylvania, U.S.A., because "Teddy," a terrier who for fifteen years had given complete devotion and loyalty to the family of H. H. Kettering, was buried in the family vault. Every respect was shown and the same expense incurred as would have been accorded a human member of the family. Mr. Kettering believes that dogs have souls, and no disrespect was shown any human by burying the dog in the cemetery. In at least half a dozen

papers of various kinds from all parts of the globe during the past month the question as to whether dogs have souls has been raised. A Polish author in his book, "The World of Souls," affirms that human love and affection for a pet can endow the animal with a soul. We Christians realize that it would be presumption on our part to think such an event in the religious sense possible, but after all, are souls absolutely and entirely spiritual? The dividing line between physical, supernatural and mental influences in human beings is very hard to define. How, then, are we to say that dogs do not possess souls? The present day position of English science towards psychical research is equally applicable to dogs as humans. The following is the summing up of Dr. Brown, Wilde Reader in Mental Philosophy, University of Oxford:

"When a child is born it has certain inherited characteristics as the basis on which to build its own personality. As a child grows, the extent to which it develops its character and personality governs the quantity of soul matter which survives bodily death. There is now definite evidence that those who had built up strong personalities and great characters during life were survived after death by souls of a very strong receptivity, enabling them to enjoy to the uttermost the benefits of the world in which they subsequently found themselves.

"On the other hand, those people who existed in this life without developing their characters and creative faculties were survived by souls of feeble attainments. Thus, the souls surviving in the next world depended largely on the use made of our attributes in this.

"There is this to remember, though, that it would be wrong to assume that the souls surviving are guided by physical senses, such as eyes, hands or ears."

Is our Polish friend entirely wrong? Dogs are very largely what we make them; unselfishness, self-sacrificing love and disinterested devotion are certainly more natural attributes of the canine than the human race at the present time, and we can hardly ascribe this to lack of intelligence!

At the ripe old age of fourteen years, our wonderful Greyhound, "Rena," departed from this life. It is a good many years since our Editor invited me to give you all some details of the extraordinary intelligence and devotion of this gentle yet lion-hearted little bitch. In the rush of the busy season it would not be possible for justice to be done to the subject, but when old mother earth is covered with her soft, white mantle of snow and the pine logs are blazing away the heat of many a summer's sun, then you shall have the tale of "Rena," and having read it, you will probably wonder, like myself—Have dogs souls?

WELL NOW—HAVE THEY?

H. J. CHURCH JONES THINKS SO.

The Venerable H. J. Church Jones, Archdeacon of Brecon and Vicar of Builth Wells pays a touching tribute to his Fox Terrier, Jack, who was recently killed in an accident. After expressing his gratitude for "the general feeling of regret" at Jack's loss, the Archdeacon says:

"Jack was as well known as, and more widely loved than, his master. His specially marked feature was undoubtedly his remarkable and entirely self-taught love of religious exercises. He attended the daily service in church as often as he could, and had he been allowed to do so, would have come on Sundays too. Whenever he heard the church bell, no matter where he was, he would scamper off to obey its summons. On the morning on which he was killed I found him in church, when I got there for Matins, and he sat quietly by my side in a pew throughout the service.

At home, when I knelt by my bedside to say my own prayers, he always, if present, came and laid his head on my arm or shoulder, and remained passive until I got up from my knees. I have often said he was the best churchman in Builth. From my long experience of the wonderful sagacity and untiring faithfulness of a dog, I have never had any doubt that dogs have souls. I am bound to confess, quite candidly, whether it shocks or not, that for me the joys of the next world will be incomplete unless I meet there for renewed fellowship those four-footed friends who have helped to make this life happier for me."

Maritime Notes and News

After several years of unceasing endeavour, the Nova Scotia Kennel Club have at last succeeded in becoming affiliated with the Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition, and the annual show of the Kennel Club will be held in the building formerly used as a dining hall. This will mean much to the Club in every way, which until now has managed, first to establish itself, then to exist, by its own unaided efforts, in spite of very severe handicaps. It is safe to say that this autumn the hardest years will have been left behind, and coming with the looked for better financial condition, will be many needed improvements.

The heartiest of congratulations to Mrs. B. M. Frost and J. Bartlett, of Saint John, and to our President, F. Wm. Johnson, on the splendid showing made by their dogs at the two recent shows staged by the Ladies' Kennel Club of Canada in Montreal. The Boston Terrier dog, Dorchester Billy Hagerty, and the bitch, Lady Wynnewood, both the property of Mrs. B. M. Frost, were each awarded first in their respective limit classes, and reserve winners, and on the second day these awards were repeated.

J. Bartlett's lovely Pointer bitch, Ridgeway Jenny Lind, was on the first day placed first in the open, winners, bitch, and best of breed, best in the sporting variety, and won the Canadian Kennel Club Cup for the best Canadian-bred. On the second day her breed wins were a repeat, and in the sporting variety she was placed second to the Springer, Inveresk Clip.

F. Wm. Johnson's Smooth Fox Terrier home-bred puppy, Onyx of Halifax, was on the first day second in the puppy variety to the Pekingese, Gay Boy of Hong Kong, and on the second day he was placed first in the same variety.

As far as we know, these four dogs were the only representatives from the Maritime Provinces at these shows, and each and every one gave a very good account of himself, or herself, as the case might be.

Professor Robert Dawson of the University of Saskatchewan, and whose summer home is in Bridge-

water, N.S., purchased from Dr. B. Keyes of Halifax, his young Airedale dog, he being out of his winning bitch Mudge.

Louis R. Peebles, Ravenswood, last week secured from the Marlboro Kennels an exceptionally nice young Russian Wolfhound registered as Quin-tenoff of Marlboro, but better known as Sunny. This black marked, white youngster is by champion Korol ex Champion Felice of Haywra, and should be able to give a good account of himself when shown. In fact, we believe it was the intention of the Marlboro Kennels to retain this pup for the fall shows.

At a recent meeting of the Halifax Board of Health some complaints were made about kennels being kept in the city, and some of the committee even went so far as to propose that a law be passed whereby the number of dogs allowed to be kept at a residence be limited. Most of the kennels in the city are known to the writer, and all the kennels are small ones, containing only a few dogs. The larger kennels are situated outside the city limits.

We all agree that if dogs are to be kept healthy—to leave human hygienics out of the question for the present—they must be kept clean, and their living quarters must be sanitary; also they must have plenty of clean water, fresh air, and sunshine, and it is only right that these conditions should be rigidly adhered to. I can truthfully say that I have never yet seen a foul, odourous, or filthy kennel in this city, and in fact many of the kennels are kept in a more sanitary condition than some houses or homes where dogs are not tolerated. Certainly, I have yet to learn of any place where dogs are kept, which from the afore-mentioned foul odours or filthy quarters, would endanger the health of neighbors.

Many of the staunchest supporters of the Nova Scotia Kennel Club are people living in the city and keeping maybe one or two, or three or four dogs. Are they then to be deprived of the privilege of keeping these can-

ine companions, because narrow-minded, bigoted neighbors, loathing the sight of anything finer than themselves, object to dogs? Few have sympathy with the people who let their dogs run abroad both night and day, destroying gardens, racing, chasing, and barking at all passing vehicles and pedestrians, and in general making a public nuisance of themselves—however, let it be pointed out that valuable dogs are not allowed to run at large, but are kept at home safely enclosed in their own runs. On the other hand, no sympathy is lost on those soured individuals, with ingrown dispositions, who look without ceasing for cause for complaint, and at last hit upon the hapless dog.

The time has passed when these fanatics should be heard in silence. Members of the Nova Scotia Kennel Club get together immediately—for once let **DO IT NOW** be your motto, and take steps to forestall any action which would curtail your liberty, and which would inevitably have a serious effect on dog breeding in this province.

Roy Zwicker, of Bedford, N.S., lost his greyhound Bonaparte 2nd, and for nearly two weeks was unable to locate him, but, fortunately he was found, and is at home again at "Pinecrest," happily none the worse for his adventure.

A. V. Martin has just received a nice sable and white Collie bitch from Wm. Calvert, Belleville, Ont. This bitch was formerly owned by the late H. B. Hungerford, and is a litter sister of the dog sold by him for the sum of one thousand dollars. Registered as Mountaineer Mistress, this bitch is sired by The Mountaineer, ex Mountaineer Mink 2nd, and is a proven brood, being the dam of A. V. Martin's Loch Lomond Miss, the winner of the novice cup in the variety classes at the last Nova Scotia Kennel fixture, under Charles G. Hopton. As yet unshown, this bitch is expected to give a good account of herself in the ring.
