

United States Customs Regulations

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR EXPORTERS

The freedom of action that has been enjoyed by Canadian breeders of all classes of Live Stock including dogs, when selling their stock to purchasers in the United States has been somewhat restricted since June 15th last, when certain new regulations introduced by the Bureau of Animal Industry, Department of Agriculture, Washington, D.C., became effective.

Frankly speaking, and advisedly, we are obliged to record that live stock exporters have, in large measure, themselves to blame for the condition which made the new regulations necessary.

Hitherto, and by a mutual agreement between the Canadian National Live Stock Records, Canada, and the Bureau of Animal Industry, Washington, a dog for breeding purposes could be taken into the United States under bond provided the ownership of the United States purchaser has been registered by the Canadian National Live Stock Records Office, and an export certificate showing the ownership of the United States purchaser issued and forwarded to Washington, an arrangement that should have continued with mutual satisfaction if sellers had been careful to make intelligent and timely use of the privilege, by supplying other papers essential to free entry. Under the arrangement Canadian certi-

ficate of registration did not have to go to Washington but was turned over by the seller to the buyer to be used for registration in the United States or for any other purpose.

The export certificate has been discontinued and with its discontinuance a great and desirable convenience has been withdrawn, and the new regulations will naturally be responsible for some confusion, and will undoubtedly introduce some measure of hardship and confusion between seller and buyer until such time as the new regulations become properly understood.

The production of the Canadian certificate of registration showing the ownership of the United States purchaser is now an absolute essential when an animal crosses the border. Failing to produce this certificate, the shipper or the buyer, as the case may be, will be faced with one of two alternatives: either to return the animal to the shipping point, pending receipt of the certificate of registration showing the new ownership endorsed, or pass the animal through the United States customs and pay duty, and, we understand, that in cases of this kind, where duty has been paid, a refund need not be considered.

Under the New Regulations

The following requirements will govern the free importations of animals into the United States:

1. The ownership of United States purchaser be placed on record by the Canadian National Live Stock Records, Ottawa, and endorsed on the Canadian certificate of registration.
2. That the Canadian certificate of registration, not a copy or duplicate, must accompany the animal when crossing the United States border.
3. The Canadian certificate of registration will be taken up at the border by officials of the Bureau of Animal Industry for identification purposes.
4. The certificate of registration will be surrendered at the border to the United States customs and forwarded to Washington, with the various papers essential to application for free entry.

STRICT COMPLIANCE COMPULSORY.

Strict compliance with these regulations is compulsory.

If the original certificate of registration showing the United States purchaser's ownership does not accompany the animal to the border, the animal will be refused entry, or duty will be collected, refund will not be considered.

The Canadian National Live Stock Records Office with commendable promptitude and in order to offset hardship in connection with the operation of the new regulations decided at once to send a duplicate certificate of registration to the American Kennel Club, in the case of dogs, and for other animals to the corresponding record Association in the United States, to be retained for registration purposes when the new owner seeks to register in the Stud Book of the United States.

DO NOT SHIP A DOG

to the United States until you have the Canadian certificate of registration, with ownership of the United States purchaser endorsed, which certificate must be at the point of entry to the United States when the dog reaches there, together with the necessary consular papers if the selling price is over \$100.00.

DOGS OF THE EMPIRE

AS Hugh Dalziel, Vero Shaw and Rawdon Lee, the foremost writers on kennel subjects during the Victorian Era, were close acquaintances of mine, we spent much time discussing subjects dear to our hearts. Dalziel was a learned man in the lore of history of dogs, and he delved deeply into matters relative to whatever work he was on. His

daughter acted as his secretary; the notes taken were voluminous and fresh from a quick brain. Thus Dalziel not only turned out lots of first-class work, but had time to look after the laboratory of a great firm of kennel-requisite purveyors; indeed, it was Dalziel who first put on the English market an extensive variety of proprietary medicines for dogs. He said that as an apprentice to a druggist and chemist he ran away; he had for a while taken to the sea, eventually to settle down to the life of a land-lubber, and write about dogs. Dalziel's "Diseases of Dogs" remains a standard work, and the probability is that it will remain so because of its simplicity of language; its descriptions of the symptoms of diseases and their simple treatments; and name of drugs, etc., given in plain English.

Dalziel naturally inclined towards the breeds of his own and beloved Scotland. His literature has helped to popularize the Scottish dogs. He was also a naturalist with the acumen of the scientist. In 1885, when just venturing on the thin ice of writing about dogs, Dalziel was often the distinguished mentor to one only too willing to grasp the meaning of the higher things. At this particular time, there was a bulldog with its lower holders or teeth set out in front of or beyond the upper canine teeth. The "Fancy" was making a great fuss about this dog's head, general make-up of face, jaws, etc. It so happened that Dalziel or "D. L." as the Scotsmen pronounce this name, sat in the very seat where Dr. Samuel Johnson used to repose in the dining place at the Old Cheshire Cheese, Fleet St., London. "I hear there's some new bulldog they are making a fuss over. Can you describe him to


me?" So, I went "through" the dog so far as my memory served. "What are his teeth like?" Dalziel insisted. "The lower tusks show." "Ah!" cried the old warrior, "you are a young writer and have a lot to learn. In your next article you will ask the people if they ever saw an animal that God made with his lower canine teeth protruding outside or beyond the upper canine teeth". I *did* ask the question, and unto this day there has been no reply.

There was Dalziel, the hard-headed Scotsman who more than helped to make Scottish dogs.

The late Thomson Gray was a real power behind the throne of Scottish or Scotch terriers. This was about the time of the heyday of Champion Dundee, a beautiful Scotch terrier, owned by Capt. Mackay, the skipper of the famous racing yacht "Thistle". This was about thirty-four or five years ago when Scottish terriers were known as "Aberdeen Terriers", and there were classes for half-prick or fully prick-eared dogs. The name of "Aberdeen Terrier" still survives in America. Especially is this the case in the dog ads appearing in a New York afternoon sheet where the cards are alphabetically arranged. So as to get to the top of the column the Scotsman—pioneers as they are—have dropped the "Scottish" and re-adopted the "Aberdeen". "A" is a long way before "S", so the Aberdeens are placed on top of the advertising lists. Canny men are the Scotsmen.

One of the grandest sights ever seen at a Scottish show was the entry of Dandie Dinmont terriers at Dumfries. They were lovely sized little terriers and every one of them appeared to be wagging its tail. They were not quarrelsome or fighting-inclined, but real, honest, hard-appearing terriers and about the size that you would require were you wanting a dog—a terrier to go to a fox or even an otter. Dandies were then working with otter

hounds in Scotland, it was said. The worthiness of the Border terrier (which would be of Scottish-English descent) was not spoken about, the probability being that the Dandie was then (35 years ago) more in use with Scottish and English Border otter-hound packs than the still smaller Border terrier, practically newcomers so far as dog shows are concerned. The festivities at a Scottish show on a New Years' Day can be pretty well imagined. It

appeared as if every tradesman in Dumfries had given some special prize. There were gallons of whiskey and boxes of herrings; cases of pipes and pounds of tobacco; knitted stockings and cured hams; bottles of port and boxes of cigars. At the night dinner or show banquet, at the chief hotel, the haggis was introduced amid the swirl of the bagpipes. There were speeches galore and old ballads were sung. The chairman called upon the best speakers of his dog show committee. As the night grew on the harangues became less understandable to the unsophisticated ear, but I *did* hear Bobbie Burns' lines anent the collie dog, at their very best. It was the late James Clark of Dumfries, afterwards well-known in London as the owner of several first-class Dandie Dinmonts who was called up to recite:

"He was a gash and faithful tyke,
As ever lap a shaugh or dike," etc.

When Sir Walter Scott wrote *Guy Mannering*, one of his characters, Dandie Dinmont, was depicted as a rough ad ready farmer-sportsman who had terriers of the mustard and pepper colors. The original of Scott's "Dandie Dinmont", was a Mr.

Davidson who lived at Liddesdale had two dogs and they bore the name of Tarr and Pepper. The late and Rev. J. Cumming Macdome (who judged Gordon Setters and Pointers at the Westminster Kennel Club Show, New York, May 8th-9th and 10th, 1877) was, in 1869, the fortunate discoverer of a document in James Davidson's own handwriting which ran thus:

"1800 Tuggin from A. Armstrong, reddish and wiry; Tarr, reddish and wire-haired, a bitch; Pepper, shaggy and light, from Dr. Brown of Borjenwood. The race of Dandies are bred from the two last.—J. D."

Nowadays "pepper and mustard" when used in connection with the colors of Dandie Dinmont terriers, are just flippant terms in our conversation. Yet these two words go back to the bedrock or root of the terriers that formed the breed.

It will be seen from the above that "Tuggin", one of Dandie Dinmont's terriers, came from A. Armstrong. These Armstrongs of the Clan Graham were always numerous on the Scottish side of the Border. Incidentally, Landseer's wonderful pictures of deerhounds—Scottish Deerhounds, did much to popularize that breed—not to say anything about art. These deerhounds belonged to the late Edward Armstrong.

The original deerhounds were used to run down the stag, and that fact is responsible for the often common use of the word "staghound" to designate what is rightly styled the Scottish Deerhound. The Staghound is a super-sized foxhound and used to hunt the wild deer or stag. These staghounds are sometimes called Buck Hounds. I

am not prepared to give the reason for this change in nomenclature for one and the same breed of hound, except it be that in the case of a captured or taken stag, and his antlers being then sawed off close to the head, he is styled a buck for sporting purposes. The best deerhounds for running down a stag in Scotland (which would be highly difficult work) were dogs of 29 to 30 inches in height, the dog weighing from 95 to 105 pounds.

About fifteen years ago being again in Scotland, I was lucky enough to run across an old friend who was a grown-up game keeper in Wales when I was merely a youth. This man had always interested me in the wonderful things the Scottish breeds of dogs could do, and how to breed the bold and upstanding deerhound was one of his favorite themes: "Ay lad, you will always find deerhound bitches much smaller than the dogs, and the only way to breed big puppies is to breed from big dogs". I reminded the dear old man of what he had told the writer before he had gone out into the world, and had only seen the pictures of deerhounds—those deerhounds painted by Landseer and baying the stag. He thought that everyone

should know that a 26 to 29-inch bitch, weighing from 65 to 70 pounds should be put to a 30-inch dog. There is likely to be a new endeavor in the interests of Scottish deerhounds in the United States. There can be nothing more rugged and imposing than a noble representative of the Scottish deerhound. Besides being a useful dog for the plains or prairies, he can hold his own as a coyote killer. The deerhound crosses or the results of an ad-mixture of

his blood with that of the greyhound and the Russian wolfhound, are greatly called for in Canada, Australia and some parts of South Africa and India.

What is now known as the Bearded Collie and, in olden times, the Rough Collie, is seldom seen save at a few shows in North Britain. Some time ago a dog was exhibited in New York that approximated the Highland or Bearded Collie. Whether the dog at present known as the Old English Sheepdog originally came from Scotland, or the bob-tail or short-tailed sheepdog was taken into Scotland from England or Wales, is not known.

Different nationalities have a great way of appraising the dog breeds of other people's, and, in time, or after a few generations (of dogs) give them another name, a name that shall connect them with their new home. In this way the Clumber Spaniel lost its old French name and the English Setter in America, might be passing into the Llewellyn Setter. France, Alsatia and Germany claim the birthplace of the Shepherd or Police Dog; the old fashioned fighting terrier of New England has become merged into the Boston terrier. A mongrelized Yorkshire Terrier has become the Australian Terrier,

Philip Reinagles' Scottish "Shepherd Dog" makes me think that the short-tailed sheep dog had as much to do with North Britain as he did with England and Wales. Reinagle

was faithful in his studies and portrayed Nature as he saw it from the middle of the 18th century until the first quarter of the 19th cycle. His painting representing a shepherd dog among the Scottish hills, must be quite a hundred years old. Yet how wonderfully near the type of the English working Bobtail this Scottish

down any game, from a rabbit to a deer. Cut the dog's tail off and he's like a ship without a rudder. The Rough Collie of Scotland was once an ordinarily bob-tailed dog of the shepherd kind. Cross this breed (as Reinagle, R.A., depicts it) with a Scottish Deerhound, and you could produce a somewhat lurcherized Bearded Collie of Scotland!

"Oen of them, Prudence Prim, was especially attached to Mrs. Coolidge. We lost her in the Black Hills. She lies out there in the shadow of Bear Butte, where the Indians told me the Great Spirit came to commune with his children. One was my companion, Rob Roy. He was a stately gentleman of great courage and fidelity. He loved to bark from the second storey windows and around the south grounds. Nights he remained in my room and afternoons he went with me to the zoo."

At Lethbridge that perfect little diamond "Victory Flying Mistress" the celebrated Whippet which Mr. J. H. Hunter, Calgary, obtained recently from Quebec, went over the top. We have since broken

Judge Jimmie Sullivan gave the greatest satisfaction to all exhibitors by the very able manner in which he did his work and it is to be much regretted that the entries were not more numerous.

Calgary set a new standard of perfection in the handling of dog shows in this part of Alberta. On entering the building with my hounds I was handed an envelope containing full instructions and the metal tags for our dogs' collars. The show was opened by Mayor Osborne supported by Lord and Lady Rodney, President Hugill, members of the executive and prominent citizens.

The mayor in a short but able speech, outlined the benefits to the community which such a show fostered. Lady Rodney very kindly consented to give the prizes to the owners of the fortunate winning dogs. The ring was tastefully decorated with flags, bunting and cut flowers, as were the exhibits of some kennels, particular mention of which should be

made to that of Scott Bros., the Calgary Collie Fanciers Section; Climo had notice boards showing the dogs entering, those being judged and the positions of those in the last class conspicuously posted, which was of great benefit to the ring side. Mrs. Julian and Mrs. Swan, who worked like Trojans throughout, kept every bench up to date with a ticket displaying the wins made by that exhibit. In spite of all the enormous amount of labour involved Mr. Climo was able to balance his finances and tell to a cent where the club stood before the show closed. Judge J. H. Tanton, who handled the Gun Dogs from a sportsman's viewpoint in a most able manner will, we know, have no difficulty in drawing all the Gun Dogs in any part where he may officiate. Mr. Tanton indulged in a system that was an innovation to the writer. He did not place the dogs on the block in their order of merit, as is usual with most judges, but handed out the ribbons as he thought fit, apparently just where the dogs happened to be. He explained his reason for this, that it kept the handlers and their owners guessing as to where their dogs were placed until the ribbon was actually handed out, seems sound enough on the face of it, but it is undoubtedly very confusing to the ring side. For example, in the Pointers, in giving his decision, both Sec. Climo and myself erroneously arrived at the conclusion that he had given the awards as the dogs were placed and in the next class that he had reversed his previous decision. It was not until the Sec. received the judges slips that we found out our error.

We should be very pleased to have Judge Walter Reeves ideas on the subject given us in the Canadian Fancy. Judge William Forest handled all the other breeds in his usual efficient manner. The awards were received by the exhibitors in all cases in a most sportsmanlike spirit and there was not the slightest sign of dissatisfaction anywhere in the placements of either judge. Mr. Forest informs me that the larger dogs have much more size and quality at home than the average in Canada. Having attended most of the princi-

pal shows across the water recently he is well up in all that is taking place in dogdom in the British Isles. Undoubtedly the larger breeds are having their day. Apart from the still popular Cocker, the Irish Wolfhounds, the Russian Wolfhounds and the Greyhounds seem now to be the most popular varieties, especially with the fair sex.

Sec. Climo's wonderful little Cocker went best in show, as time has already passed on this will be too late for the August issue, we must leave further report on this show till the next number.

The fly in the ointment at all the southern shows has been the small number of dogs benched. At this time last year we wasted a great deal of ink in emphasizing the fact that unless we could get some relief from the excessive express rates the continuance of our dog shows was jeopardized. Our clubs have made a determined effort to insure success, they have made their arrangements and advertising well in advance, obtained the services of able and popular judges, no stone has been left unturned to ensure large entries. A circuit starting at Medicine Hat followed by Lethbridge, Calgary and Edmonton should have seen at least fifty dogs en route. With what re-

sult? Three one point and we understand a three point show in the North, which is usually achieved anyway. One Edmonton fancier informed me that the express on his one dog already amounted to \$65 and he still had to get the dog home. Can we reasonably expect fanciers to support the game under such circumstances. If we cannot get relief we must evolve by co-operation some cheaper means of transportation. It can be done by trucks and as suggested by President V. Williams of Lethbridge the three southern clubs could combine and hold one large show at Calgary. There is evidence in the record gates at the Calgary Exhibition and Stampede that the public have plenty of money to spend, so that the small entries are not due to financial stringency.

So the owners of the 150 odd dogs entered felt comfortable at Moose Jaw, and two championship points were further recompense for attending.

"Jimmie" Sullivan, fresh from the Manitoba Kennel Club's big show, was judge, and of course his eye was keen for the quality of the entry coming before him, and so it is not surprising to find the best of the show in the English Setter, O'Dell's Tilly, owned by the O'Dell Kennels (Winnipeg), over whose destinies our ex-director, Alex. MacKidd, presides day in and day out, and takes great pride in planning matings just to produce "Best in Show" specimens. Time was when our Springer fanciers were easily counted in Canada, but the faithful seem to be adding to their numbers steadily and enthusiastically, and John Ritchie, of Ottawa is doing his fair share of the progressive work.

"PUTTING THINGS OVER BIG."

That is what Lt. Col. Sydney E. Francis of Sherbrooke says regarding the forthcoming dog show at Sherbrooke, in a neatly prepared book of 60 pages and cover. The Colonel covers the personnel of the men who are "Putting Things Over Big" at Sherbrooke this year. He has something to say for the dogs and as he says it well we repeat it here:

"The Dog Show"

"Hark' Hark' Hark'

"The Dogs do bark . . . so runs the old doggerel (and no pun is intended); and why should they not bark if they want to, somebody has to make a noise, and the proverb says 'Why keep a dog if you have to do your own barking.'

"And now having laid down the case for the dog let us tell you what it is all about: of course if you own a dog, and to own one is proof positive that you like dogs, you are a member of the E. T. Kennel Club, and if you are not you ought to be.

"Well the E. T. Kennel Club have taken over the work of the Dog Show, in a similar manner that the Poultry Assn. have taken over the Poultry Show, much to the appreciation of the Exhibition management.

"In spite of cramped quarters, a converted lunch room in which the dogs are located, the Show in past years has met with success as measured by kind words and a reputation for goodfellowship and sportsmanship, but owing to the scarcity of dogs, anything larger than a one-point Show seemed impossible—and as the breeders and handlers, without which a Show cannot be run, are looking for points to make a possible Champion, Sherbrooke is regretfully passed up in favour of a more generously endowed Show: more points, more dogs and vice versa.

"It has therefore been decided to stage TWO SHOWS, at which it is expected that practically the same dogs will be entered, but as they will be judged under different judges, the exhibitor will be able to collect one point from each show even if the number does not exceed the minimum.

"The Management confidently expect, however, that the two shows will attract a greater number and are now practically assured that each of the shows will be a "two point" thus

giving a chance to the successful exhibitor of adding FOUR POINTS to his record.

"Tuesday and Wednesday, at 12 o'clock noon will be the Exhibition Show under the well known and popular judge Frank W. Addyman of Ardsley, N. Y., and Thursday the Eastern Townships Kennel Club will take charge and have secured as judge Mr. Walter H. Reeves of Belleville, Ont., to preside on the bench.

"Without Dog Shows the world would be much poorer—the pure strains that give so much pleasure would rapidly disintegrate and instead of the companionable terrier—the lordly deerhound, the dignified setter and the numerous other well known breeds there would be nothing but 'dog' as in the wild and uninhabited countries of the world—a menace to all with whom they come in contact."

Now for Sherbrooke. It should be quite possible for the Colonel's dream to come true, i.e., for points to "Put things over big" at the friendly city.

OUR VISITORS DAY.

We were privileged to have as a visitor to Kennel & Bench during July none other than Captain Hobbs from the home office of Spratt's Patent, London, England, who was travelling for a limited time in the United States and Canada, and it is quite possible that Captain Hobbs is as well known in England as any public man over there.

NOTES FROM HERE AND THERE

By A. HAMILTON, JR., Dennyloanhead, Stirlingshire, Scotland.

A greatly interested spectator at the Caledonian Championship Show was Mr. J. A. McIlwham, Battle Creek, Michigan, who before emigrating owned a select kennel of bull dogs at Perth, Scotland. Mr. McIlwham is on the staff of "Dogdom" an American canine magazine and intends to return to the land of his adoption in a few weeks.

Another visitor we have at the moment is a Mr. Walker from South Africa, who is keenly interested in the fortunes of the collie and has purchased a good sable and white dog.

"Strongheart," the well known dog cinema star, has died at the age of 13, says a Reuter message from Hollywood, California. He was trained in Berlin kennels and served with German Red Cross during the war and was then brought to Hollywood to become the pet of Jane Morgan, by whom he was introduced to the films. He was a great success in "The Silent Call," "The Love Master," "White Fang" and the "North Hat."

An article that caused quite a lot of discussion in Afghan circles in England appeared in the "American Kennel Gazette" by Miss Jean Manson. One of the illustrations is of "Bucknell champion stud of England." Many authorities contend that this honour belongs to Ch. Lirdar of Ghazni who has won 8 challenge certificates.

The Schnauzer Club of America has decided that the standard of the breed be changed to prohibit dogs born after Sept. 1, 1929, from being cropped.

The Irish Terrier Club of India is to import as often as possible good brood bitches mated to first class stud dogs from the best kennels in England. On arrival the bitch and her puppies will be "drawn" for among the subscribing members of the scheme. It is thought that the journey from England to India will be made by air.

The China Kennel Club held an interesting show on June 8 at Shanghai. This is an annual exhibition and I understand that quality is steadily improving.

That great little Scottish Terrier Ch. Heather Necessity, the property of Mr. Robt. Chapman, Glenboig, Scotland, was the best dog in the show at the Caledonian Championship Show. It will be remembered that Ch. Heather Necessity had a similar (or greater) victory at the Crufts Show.

The Honorary Secretary of the Burma Kennel Association, the headquarters of which are at Rangoon, India, is Mr. W. S. Robinson, who is on an extended holiday in the Old Country. Mr. Robinson has a number of Burma Kennel Association medals with him, and he is interchanging them with several canine societies in the Old Country. The idea is to offer them as special prizes at their respective shows. These interchanges of courtesies should go a long way to build up international friendship, and we hope this lead will become more universal.

The American Canine Ambassador, Mr. Geo. S. Thomas, sailed on June 19 on the S.S. Aquitania, bound for Old England, where he intends to stay for several months.

Before a distinguished company of surgeons in Paris (says the Central News), the French savant, Dr. Normet, demonstrated the uses of a new serum he has discovered, which, he claims, will abolish blood transfusion.

Experimenting on a dog seemingly dead, and whose heart had stopped beating, Dr. Normet injected some of his serum, and within a few minutes the animal got up and walked about as if quite normal.

It is expected that the serum will be used in Paris hospitals in the near future, and remarkable results are expected from it.

Following the embargo on the importation of Alsations into Australia, the Ministers of Agriculture of the different States are pressing for the destruction or sterilization of Alsations that are already there. The grounds are still the same—the fear of interbreeding with the dingo or wild dog.

Export pedigree certificates were issued during May for 127 dogs for the U.S.A.

From January 1st to the end of April this year 16,500 dogs have been registered by the American Kennel Club, against 18,800 last year.

The seventh annual show of the German Kennel Club was held at Hanover on June 8 and 9. There were 1,225 dogs present, and the championships went to the following: Alsatian Dogs (22), Harras Von Glockenbrink; Alsatian Bitches (23), Alsta von Sonnenbild; Wire Fox Terrier Dogs (31), President v. Grunenwold; W. F. Terrier Bitches (34), Blondel v. Bult Tattersall; Scottish Terrier Dogs, Angias v. Necktar; Bitches, Yutta V.D. Ilungquelle. Wire Fox Terriers and Scotties were of good quality all through. Sealyhams were not numerous, and the best was Seapatrik Druice. Airedales were strong in numbers, but poor in quality, judging by our standard. Salukis, although not numerous, were of good type. In Pekingese Dogs the championship went to Nanking Bi Tai Tu; Pekingese Bitches, Yah Ling of Alderbourne; Great Danes, Brindle Dogs (11), Double Champion Dog, V.D. Saalburg. Brindle Bitches (9) were hardly as good as the dogs. The Harlequins were also poor in quality, although there were 5 dogs and 7 bitches. Fawns were better in quality, and the best was Ch. Bosko V.D. Saalburg. Quite a good show, but not up to the standard of a British Championship Show.

Morocco had a dog show on the 9th June at Marrabeck, but I have little information on the subject, with the exception that quality in most cases left much to be desired.

The Societa San Uberto d'Italia held a successful show at Genoa on June 1 and 2, with an entry of 350 dogs.

TOM B. GRIMSHAW CROSSES THE DIVIDE

For many months now the readers of Kennel and Bench and other friends of Thomas Benson Grimshaw, Newtonbrook, Ont., have known that the master of the Benson Kennels was seriously ill, and that being so, the shock of this article becomes greatly lessened. Tom passed away quite peacefully around the zero hour on Saturday, July 6th, telling the watchful friends that he was satisfied with the day and would go to sleep, and so was the end.

People may have their own ideas about dog fanciers generally, but what a good-hearted, sympathetic lot they are when the testing time comes around. It was imperative that our late comrade should not be left without attendance night or day for quite some time past; nor was he; the faithful were on hand night after night, with plenty of volunteers to draw from, and for this service we thank all those who so ungrudgingly participated in this labor of compassionate love.

Comparatively speaking, Mr. Grimshaw was quite a young man; born in Farsley, Yorkshire, England, in 1886, he was but 43 years old. A first-class carpenter by trade, he came to Canada in 1906, and the "land of promise" looked very inviting indeed. Good progress was made until the Great War made its claims on Canadian manhood, and to its undermining influences we place the tragedy of Tom's early death.

An astute breeder of dogs, he startled the Fox Terrier world when he introduced to the Canadian and American show rings the noted Terriers, Ch. Benson Dark Horse (Flor-nell Ginger-nut ex Benson Snowdrop) and Ch. Benson Showgirl (By Town Moonshine ex Benson Snowdrop). The former won Reserve Winners at the Canadian National in 1927, and came back in 1928 and went to the top, and it is well known that it takes a real Wire to do that at Canada's biggest show. The latter made her championship quite easily. Coming out at Toronto Kennel Club as a puppy in 1926, she won her first points, won the Canadian National and Hamilton the same year, and early in 1927 she was sold to the United States for a comfortable price. And it is a matter of history well known to the fancy that Tom Grimshaw took his ups and downs from the show ring without demonstration or complaint.

The funeral took place on Wednesday, July 10th, at Prospect Cemetery, and was in charge of Oakwood Lodge, A.F. & A.M., and of Oakwood Chapter, of which Tom had been an officer who was greatly respected, and, in fact, would have held the First Principal's office next year if he had lived and had had his health.

The Rev. N. H. Noble, Thornhill, spoke the words of comfort at the "Benson" home, and committed the spirit of dear old Tom to the care of the Great I Am at the graveside, which was surrounded by flowers, plentiful and of choice summer varieties.

The pallbearers were all old friends, and all dog fanciers, and included Matt Gracy and Harold Mountain, Tom Hilton and Jack Latham, Harry Draper and "Jim" Gray. A feature of the sad picture was a life-sized floral piece depicting Champion Benson Dark Horse, the work—we believe—of Harold Mountain, and viewed from any angle, this beautiful thought which Mr. Mountain had shaped seemed to say, "My owner and your friend is now leaving us, never to return," and the faces, as read from their expressions, seemed to agree with that sentiment.

As a breeder and exhibitor, Mr. Grimshaw was exceptionally successful, and it is said that there are puppies at the Kennel now that are superior to any that have already been raised there. As a man he was 100 per cent. Quiet and unassuming though he was, his presence could always be felt wherever he appeared. The "Benson" Kennels has lost its able head, and the dog game generally has lost a staunch, experienced fancier, and so to his mother and to Mrs. Grimshaw and all our late comrade's friends we extend the whole-hearted sympathy of the entire doggie fraternity.

Who is there amongst us that is unfamiliar with that "old landmark" of dogdom Mrs. E. O'Rourke of Hamilton, Ont.? In days gone by a similar question could have been asked concerning the late Mark O'Rourke, famous as a supporter of the White Bull Terrier, but Mark left our ranks some years ago, and since then "Mother" O'Rourke has been constant in her support of all the shows. And whilst we dare not mention her age here, our readers may assume that she is no longer eligible for any other class than the Open.

At this late hour however Mrs. O'Rourke is rejoicing over her latest achievement as an exhibitor, the making of an International Champion of her Pomeranian Melbourne Wentworth Nona (C.K.C.S.B. 53612) by Melbourne Chip of Chiswick II. ex Chiswick Queenie. The new international champion is a sound black and typical Pom., and the high honors came to Mrs. O'Rourke and Nona as a result of winning at the recent Pittsburgh show.

From 1926 until 1928 Nona was benched at an even dozen shows in Canada, won winners at seven, and reserve at several others, so was always at or near the top wherever she was

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shown, and perhaps we owe it to Int. Ch. Melbourne Wentworth Nona for having kept Mrs. O'Rourke so actively interested in the shows.

Bruce at the Melbourne Kennels, and so she shares largely in the honors as well, and it is well that a breeder should be remembered when reporting occurrences similar to this, and we can well imagine the owners of the "Wentworths" and the "Melbournes" picking out the jazz records, wiping the cobwebs from the old "His Masters Voice" machine and having a real old fling as they pledged the health of the little International Champion. When one sees Mrs. Bruce at a dog show smiling Mrs. O'Rourke is not far off.

What was comedy to many was tragedy to Mrs. O'Rourke when one time when leaving a dog show to go out for her "five o'clock cup" she thoughtfully or thoughtlessly—just as you will have it here—took her little dog with her, only to come back to suspension in Canada, the United States and Great Britain—terrible. And the dear old soul would not intentionally break any dog show rule for all the wealth of the Dominion. However the penalty was soon removed.

THE SCHIPPERKE STANDARD

From the American Kennel Gazette, pages 41 and 42, July issue, we take the liberty of clipping the Standard of the Schipperke Club of America, Inc., as it will appear in the book of Standards to be published by the American Kennel Club, which, we understand, is now in process of printing.

We also wish to give credit to Miss Isabel Ormiston, the Secretary of the recently organized Schipperke club, whose name appears as the contributor of the article.

The Standard of the Schipperke Club of America, Inc., as it will soon appear in the book of Standards of the American Kennel Club, follows:

Appearance and general characteristic: Excellent and faithful little watch-dog, suspicious of strangers. Active, agile, indefatigable, continuously occupied with what is going on about him, careful of things that are given him to guard, very kind with children, knows the way of the household, always curious to know what is going on behind any closed door or about any object that has been moved; betraying his impressions by his sharp bark and upstanding ruff, seeking the company of horses, a hunter of moles and other vermin, a good rabbit dog.

Color. Solid black.

Head. Fox-like, fairly wide, narrowing at the eyes, seen in profile slightly rounded, tapering muzzle, not too elongated nor too blunt, not too much stop.

Nose. Small, black.

Eyes. Dark brown, small, oval rather than round, neither sunken nor prominent, expression sharp and lively.

Ears. Very erect, small, triangular placed high, strong enough not to be lowered except in line with the body, nearer together at the tips than at the base when erect.

Teeth. Meeting evenly.

powerful, with rump well rounded, tailless (about an inch allowed). Hocks well let down.

Body. Short and thick set.

Feet. Small round and tight (not

Faults. Light eyes, large, round, prominent eyes, ears too long or too rounded, narrow head or elongated muzzle, too blunt muzzle, domed skull, scanty coat, curly or silky coat, lack of ruff and culottes, too long hair, teeth slightly over- or under-shot.

Disqualifications. Drop or semi-erect ears. Born with white (a few white hairs are objected to but are not disqualifying). Badly over- or under-shot.

There can be no objection taken to the Standard as written, and if our judges in Canada will interpret it correctly and be governed by its requirements, no Schipperke fancier will have any complaints to offer. The Standard is certainly the accepted conception of a Schipperke, and dogs not conforming to it, must be rated down according to the extent of their shortcomings.

The color question is definitely settled, and black only may be considered. A Schipperke that is not black, no matter what his quality amounts to, hardly seems to be true to breed characteristics.

With the advent of the Schipperke Club, we hope to see the "Skip" become the popular little dog that he has every right to be in this country and in the United States.

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
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
