Meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Incorporated

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club Inc., was held at the Club's Offices, 25 Melinda Street, Toronto, on Thursday evening, June 18th, 1931.

The Vice-President, Col. J. N. MacRae, presided. Directors present were: H. A. Wilson, Reg. P. Sparkes, F. LaRue, A. Donaldson, R. L. Wainright, R. Tyrwhitt and F. W. Walkerdine.

The minutes of the previous Directors' meeting were read, and it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That, the minutes be adopted."

(In the minutes reported for May, the attendance of Director, F. W. Walkerdine was overlooked, and it was moved, seconded and carried, "That Mr. Walkerdine be now credited with the attendance.")

The Secretary reported that he had attended the meeting called by the Canadian National Institute for the Blind and that he had found the meeting well attended and mostly by blind people. Mrs. Eustis had explained the work being done at Fortunate Fields at Switzerland and at Nashville, Tennessee, in training dogs to become the eyes for blind folks. Mr. Franks had given a demonstration which served to show, that a dog trained for the work, and a man trained for the dog, when they had come to understand each other, the result was truly wonderful. That it was hoped that trained dogs would be brought here, and that certain blind persons would be trained to the dogs with a view to bringing dependable substitution for sightless eyes.

It was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That the Secretary's report be accepted."

The Secretary reported that a letter had been sent to the Mayor of Toronto, endorsing the matter of Toronto Humane Society handling the stray dogs of the city.

It was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That the sending of the letter be endorsed."

The report which had been received by the Canadian Live Stock Records in connection with the investigation on the Helvetia Kennels of Mrs. P. G. Brockington, Montreal, was read and considered and it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That, Mrs. Brockington and the Helvetia Kennels be expelled from the Canadian Kennel Club from this

date, and that thirty days be allowed for any registration or transfer applications which might have to be sent to the Records Office to cover any sales made on or before June 18th."

The Secretary reported the progress which had been made in the Carabre-Manitoba Club's complaint and it was agreed to allow the matter to remain in the Secretary's hands.

The Chairman of Kennel and Bench Committee submitted a report on behalf of that Committee, and it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That, the report be considered clause by clause, and then voted on as a whole."

An amendment was moved, seconded and carried:

"That the report be considered Clause by Clause and voted on Clause by Clause."

The motion was withdrawn. The report in full follows:

Kennel and Bench Committee Report

This Committee, having held several meetings report as follows:

1. It is our opinion that the paper is badly made up, the items relating to the various breeds being mixed up, making it difficult for the reader to find the news pertaining to the breed or breeds in which he or she is most interested.

We propose the adoption of the grouping of news, sporting, non-sporting, terriers, working dogs, toys, etc.

2. There is too much overlapping of news. Items which have been covered by the Provincial correspondents are again referred to under the heading "The Canadian Fancy."

We suggest that this department—The Canadian Fancy—should in future be managed by the Editor of Kennel and Bench, thus preventing the above condition.

3. In our opinion the editor should keep in closer touch with the various show-giving and specialty clubs with a view of obtaining more news and advertising.

4. Illustrations should be encouraged. The expense of cuts to be borne by the owners of such dogs; the cuts to become his or her property. Only cuts of dogs that have won at the larger shows or in strong competition or that have proven their worth in the breeding kennel should be used.

5. It is the opinion of this Committee that show reports (with the exception of the list of awards) as they now appear in Kennel and Bench

are of little or no value. There is very little comment on, or criticism of, the various winners or placings. In fact, many dogs which have won consistently in strong competition and at our largest shows have never been even mentioned in the columns of Kennel and Bench. If the winners in any particular breed are not referred to, not only are the owners and breeders deprived of their due recognition, but what is even more serious—the breed as a whole suffers. Worthy winners regardless of ownership must be recognized. In fairness to all concerned, both judges and exhibitors, awards should be endorsed or criticised by a competent critic.

6. In the opinion of this Committee, the expenses of the Secretary-Treasurer to attend the different dog shows should not be paid by the Club. Reports of shows could be obtained from the judges or others at the show capable of making same. These reports can be obtained at little and in many cases no expense to the Club.

7. There is nothing like the amount of advertising in Kennel and Bench that there should be. In our opinion, if Kennel and Bench were made more interesting, more advertising would come in as a result. Also there is advertising to be had at the expense of a little interest and energy.

8. From time to time paragraphs and even pages in Kennel and Bench are filled giving the details of the death of so-and-so's pet dog. The readers of Kennel and Bench no doubt have every sympathy in the loss, but as this full-page death notice is probably the first time that ninety-nine per cent of them heard of these particular dogs, we feel that this space could be used to better advantage in giving news of more general interest.

9. In conclusion we feel that if Kennel and Bench is improved to the extent which we believe possible, it will create new and sustained interest and life in the sport of breeding and showing dogs; and to obtain this result, this Committee recommends that an advertisement covering one-third page be placed in the July issue of Kennel and Bench for some one qualified to take over the duties as Editor of Kennel and Bench. We also suggest that the present Editor devote his time to the duties of Secretary-Treasurer of the Canadian Kennel Club.

This Committee are prepared to point out ways in which economies can be effected which will make allow-

ance for a fair salary to be paid the new Editor without adding to the cost of publishing the paper. Also it is our firm belief that the ability and energy which would be brought to the position would result in increased advertising with a consequent reduction in the cost of publication.

Clause 1 was considered and endorsed.

Clause 2 was considered and endorsed (Mr. Sparkes dissenting).

Clause 3 was endorsed with the addition of the words "This to be done by mail," following the word "advertising."

Clause 4 was endorsed, with the words "or in some outstanding way" added between the words "Kennel" and "should" and the words "the larger" taken out from between the word "at" and "shows."

Clause 5 it was agreed to withdraw clause 5.

Clause 6 was endorsed.

Clauses 7 and 8 No action was considered necessary.

Clause 9 was endorsed.

It was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That, the report as submitted by Kennel and Bench Committee be published in Kennel and Bench in its original form and the amendments added."

The Committee agreed to furnish one-third page copy to be used in the advertisement and the Editor was instructed to put the advertisement across the top of a page.

A deputation consisting of R. H. D. Sim and Frank Caley representing the Boston Terrier Club of Toronto were introduced, (Mr. Sim spokesman). Mr. Sim advised that he had requested the Editor to announce the forthcoming picnic to be held by his Club, and that he had advised the Editor that if the announcement could not go in as reading matter, the Club would pay for it, and the announcement had not appeared, although similar mention had been made concerning the picnics of other Clubs.

The Editor advised that the reason for the announcement not appearing was because he considered it to be advertising matter, and that begging Mr. Sim's pardon, he did not remember any mention of paying for it. Mr. Sim agreed to furnish copy in writing for the announcement.

A letter was read from the Records Office re the Wilde-McMahon complaint and the Secretary was instructed to advise the complainant, that the Board had done everything possible to assist him, and to suggest to him, that he take Court proceedings if he wanted to take the matter further.

A letter was read from Director Major Ward Wright advising that he was leaving for England on June 14th, and that he expected to be back about July 11th.

A letter was read from W. H. Reeves who advised that it never had been his intention to prepare a petition on behalf of the unregistered champions, when so able a pleader as Lt.-Col. G. F. McFarland was available. The letter indicated the line of argument Mr. Reeves had in mind for the support of the petition.

It was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That the matter be referred back to Mr. Reeves with a view to having it brought before the Minister of Agriculture."

The letter from N. H. Duckworth which had been laid over from the May meeting was further considered.

And it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That, the letter be filed."

The Secretary advised that he had not been notified concerning the removal of all complaints on file against J. C. Fletcher, and it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That, unless Mr. Fletcher adjusted all matters of complaint, to the satisfaction of the Canadian National Live Stock Records Office by the date of the July Board Meeting, Thursday, July 16th, 1931, that he will be suspended from all the privileges of the Canadian Kennel Club from that date."

The Quebec Provincial Committee's report on the letter from W. W. Brown was considered. The report advised, that the Provincial Committee could not recommend the lifting of Mr. Brown's suspension.

And it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That, the Quebec Provincial Committee's report be received and accepted."

The matter of paying travelling expenses to Directors attending the monthly Board Meetings other than the expenses of Ontario Directors having been referred to the Club's legal adviser, a letter was read from Lt.-Col. McFarland. After discussion, it was regularly moved, seconded:

"That we pay Mr. La Rue's travelling expenses, the amount not to exceed \$10.00."

It was then moved, seconded and carried:

"That Mr. La Rue's travelling expenses for this meeting (June) be paid."

A complaint from A. R. O'Donnell, Winnipeg, against A. H. Skidmore, Winnipeg, was read, and it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That the complaint be referred to the Manitoba Provincial Committee for consideration and report."

The Secretary advised that 15 applications for Judges' License had been received and were on file. And it was agreed to leave the applications over until the next meeting of the Directors.

It was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That any Club or organization holding a Dog Show under Canadian Kennel Club rules after date of September 15th, 1931, shall appoint only those who have received Judging Licenses from the Canadian Kennel Club. Immediately application for dates are made, by any Club or organization, the Secretary shall notify said Club or organization, that the Judge or Judges whom they may select must apply for license, if they are not already in possession of same."

The Secretary asked for the appointment of a Field Trial Committee.

The Secretary advised that he had been considering as an economy, the grading of the cups offered to all-breed shows for best Canadian-bred Dog and it was agreed to leave the matter in the Secretary's hands.

The Secretary advised that he had been asked for a ruling, whether or not it was compulsory for all dogs to be benched at licensed shows. And it was ruled, that all dogs shown at licensed shows must be benched.

CANADIAN DOGS AT THE MORRIS & ESSEX SHOW

(Continued from last issue)

It was rather thrilling to find so many winners out of the very few dogs from Canada who were starters at the great Morris and Essex fixture. It was quite pleasing to notice a few Canadian-breds taking the best of breed silk from the hands of the efficient judges, and the higher prize that went to Glenarden Dusky Ruth the 3rd prize winner in the non-sporting dog group.

Fox Terriers, smooth, mustered 16 entries and the best of these was J. J. Farrell's Gallant Fox, bred by Frank Beer, Toronto. Gallant Fox was elegant to look at in the ring. A son of Gallant Fox was G. J. McKerchers' Gallant Knight 2nd, bred by W. E. Newton, Ottawa, Black Knight 2nd, won the novice dog class.

Bull Dogs were an entry of around 80 for Paul S. Shaver to sort out, amongst the lot were several champions, but the choicest morsel was Glenarden Dusky Ruth, bred by Mrs. C. G. Collinson, Toronto, and now owned by Mrs. G. W. Hosmer, Washington, D.C. This good brindle bitch is a daughter of Stillbattlington ex a daughter of Herbal Dispenser (Imp.).

Fox Terriers (wire) were over 100 strong, ten of the entry came together in the limit dog class, and here Fred Hargraves of Hamilton brought in his home-bred Wellington Crusader, and took the first prize ribbon in nice shape.

Bull Terriers were 54 all told, and all the good ones within reasonable distance were on hand, and here Lt.-Col. G. F. McFarlands' Ch. Franklyn Galloper found the reserve winners station, whilst the same owner's Ch. Albion Victor won 4th in the open class.

The Cairn section was a pretty sight and like the Scottish Terrier the Cairn is unquestionably catching the public fancy quite noticeably. Mrs. W. C. Routley, Toronto, was the biggest winner of ribbons on the day as far as Canadian exhibitors were concerned. Her Alberta-bred Scottie of Clairmar won 1st Novice, and 1st Limit, 2nd open and reserve winners, same owner's Tam O' Shanter of Clairmar won 3rd in the Limit Class where his kennel mate Scottie of Clairmar was first. In bitches Mrs. Routley won 3rd Limit with Sorrel of Sheafdon, and in the open class Sorrel placed 4th. Truly the Cairns are coming in Canada, fourteen were benched at the recent show at London, and although the Forest City lays claim to being the oldest show giving city in Canada, the 14 Cairns benched was

said to be a record showing for this smart little breed at London.

Poms were 45 in all for Joe Greenwood to level up, and we noticed that he found Fairy Prince of Pomona—by Ch. Fairy King of Pomona, ex a daughter of Ch. Perivale Ambergold—for his reserve winners dog, and we realized that Madam Beland of Pointe St. Claire, Que., would be more than interested in this fine win, and also that Mrs. George G. Thompson, Ottawa, the breeder would be happy in the win.

Mrs. A. R. Kittermaster, Toronto, had two females down Dainty O Toole and Merry O' Toole. Dainty won 2nd open, and little Merry won 1st Limit, 2nd open and reserve winners.

Snow Bunting an old English Sheep Dog, bred in England and came to Canada in Dam to the order of F. T. James, but now the property of Mrs. Walter Roester, Great Neck, N.Y., won 2nd open, and reserve winners bitch.

In Springer Spaniels we noticed the Peterboro-bred Springer Spaniel Trent Valley Recorder—bred by Herb. Routley, and now owned by F. N. B. Close, Fishers Island, N. Y.—winning 1st open dogs then on to reserve winners. Another Springer Trent Valley Fire Pride touched 4th place in the Limit Class.

Scottish Terriers were out in strength and touched the Biblical "three score and ten" mark, giving Robt. A. Ross of Montreal, the greatest and best lot of Scotties to judge that has come together for some time. Haldon Wendy bred by H. E. Batt,

Guelph, Ont.—by Ch. Jhelum Julian Imp. ex a daughter of Ch. Sella Mac Imp.—won 2nd Limit Bitches for her new owners Dr. and Mrs. C. H. Holmes.

German Shepherd dogs were a tribute to the noted English judge, Lady Kitty Ritson, no less than 140 of America's best were entered, 11 of which were entered for specials only, and two for exhibition only. Of this great entry there was one that was particularly interesting to the writer, a puppy dog, bred and owned by A. H. Graves of Windsor, Ont., by that noted producer, Ch. Hettel von Bodman, ex Krafta of Jessford. The youngster was early in his ninth month, but had travelled well, thanks to the care of Mrs. Graves, who was in charge of his comfort on the long motor journey to far away Madison. His name, Cito von Luxemburg, and Lady Kitty found him worthy of 2nd place in a class of 8 grand puppies.

Lady Kitty in her report to "Popular Dogs" has this to say for the lone little Canuck of the entry, "Nice depth and front. Expression fair. Good back and angulation. Nice size. Gait sufficient."

Watch this youngster, he's a comer.

In this section it was a treat to meet Lee Duncan and his marvellously trained dog of the "movies," the one and only Rin-Tin-Tin, born in the trenches during the Great War and adopted by the dog loving aviator, Lee Duncan and here we must chronicle, that when Mr. Duncan was putting Rin-Tin-Tin through his paces in the dining enclosure, the 30 odd rings were left to exhibitors, judges and stewards, every other person was paying tribute to the famous dog, now beginning to grey a little round the muzzle.

It was a hard show for handlers with too many dogs, as the 31 breeds, 31 judges, and 31 rings, starting at the one time made it quite impossible for any one man to handle very many. When one considers that close on 2,000 dogs were judged in about 6 hours the wonderful management will at once be apparent.

The greatest honor of the show fell to the lot of Walter H. Reeves, Belleville, Ont., whose handling of the Best in Show Award will long be remembered by those present. Careful, dignified, and extremely pleasing in the ring Mr. Reeves made an impression in keeping with the great Morris and Essex fixture. As a representative of Canada's only canine magazine who was a guest at the show the writer was quite proud of Canada's showing on the day.

The British Columbia Shows

Commencing on May 16th at Victoria, and continuing until May 25th at New Westminster, the atmosphere around the province of British Columbia was decidedly doggy and from reliable information which has just come to hand we learn with great pleasure, that the shows were all very successful, and in a general sense very satisfying. The shows were all well patronized by entries, and by attendance from the public. The quality reached higher heights than ever before. On the whole the judging was considered satisfactory. And the points earned towards championships took a very decided jump over previous years.

At Victoria judge Chris. Shuttleworth found the hours flying past all too quickly for the work he had on hand, and when he had finished, he realized that he had been judging a man sized show.

The Coast City Kennel Club was fortunate in having a large string of dogs from California, Oregon and Washington. Some of these were successful, whilst others had to fall before the quality of the local dogs. Mrs. Greenburg, one of the judges, gave the talent some of the cleanest cut judging to look at that has been seen for some time at the coast, and no doubt other invitations to judge will be extended to her in the future. Where quality was lacking Mrs. Greenburg showed rare courage in withholding the winners ribbons on several occasions, and as this procedure is the only solution for the "cheap champion" problem, Mrs. Greenburg is to be complimented and other judges will be well advised to be eternally on their guard to handle this delicate matter properly. Judging must always be from the head and not from the heart if judges desire to bring the utmost of satisfaction out of their work.

W. T. Oates gave a good account of himself—as a terrier judge, and he will also be given an opportunity to repeat ere long.

Possibly The Coast City Club found one day much too short to run a dog show, as the judging continued to the "wee sma' oors," and many of the exhibitors became restless and left the building before their dogs were judged. We noticed that the best in show all breeds at Victoria was practically lost at Coast City.

Vancouver Kennel Club had Anton B. Korbell as all rounder and his work satisfied generally, which is a compliment to any judge.

The Royal City completed the circuit with W. J. Moffett on the "Wool-salk" and here again the Victoria best in show was 4th in a class of four. Another thing we notice is a Whippet being placed second and an English Setter 3rd in the Sporting group, and immediately afterwards when the Canadian Kennel Club Trophy was being awarded the Setter was placed over the Whippet. We hope the judge had good reason for the reversal.

From a championship viewpoint the shows were outstanding. Victoria, 4 points, Coast City, 4 points, Vancouver Kennel Club, 3 points and Royal City, 2 points, a total of 14 points at four shows in ten days. If one day shows are to continue early starts are indicated if the work is to be properly handled, of course, extra rings and extra judges soon take care of a large entry, as for instance 2,000 dogs (approximately) judged at the Morris and Essex Show between 10 o'clock a.m. and sun down.

Leaves From a Kennel Note Book

A. McCLURE HALLEY, of Madison, New Jersey, has been engaged to judge the annual bench show at St. John, N.B., in September next. This appointment reflects the wisdom of the executive of the oldest of the Maritime Kennel Institutions, perhaps, the longest established exhibition body of its kind in the Dominion. Somewhere or another

I have the older catalogues of the St. John dog shows held in the 70's or 80's of the last cycle. These were presented to me by Le B. Wilson who everyone knows, not only as a downright and up-straight fancier of Irish Terriers, but father of Keltie Wilson, sportsman and Pointer dog admirer—good as a shot as a fellow creature. In those far back days, the St. John shows were held under the rules and regulations of the American Kennel Club, which, supposedly, was in existence before the founding of the Canadian Kennel Club. The late Harry Lacy, of Boston, was one of the earliest, if not the first judge to officiate at the City of the Loyalists—always a delightful Canadian spot of beauty and pleasure wherein to sojourn.

Mr. Halley asked your correspondent if there was much to see around St. John—for late summer will be the occasion of his first visit. So I told him about the St. John River, the moose hunting, salmon fishing in the spring, woodcock shooting, and how that once when driving along the road that skirts the broad waters, C. C. Sullivan the noted St. John gun dog owner and exhibitor, had pointed out a hundred favored spots, and gave a sort of guarantee that each of these small patches of cover, held anything from a brace to half a dozen cocks, during the shooting season. "Bobbie" Laskey, of St. John, was another of the party and called upon as a witness to swear that everything Sullivan said was as true as true could be.

Anything to see in and around St. John? Why when the fogs are at their densest and the fog horns loudest, even the bull moose walk into the centre of the city expecting, it must be, to meet a sweetheart in that lovely little park in the middle of the town's business quarter! As Mr. Halley delights in the recreations connected with the diversions of the rifle, gun, fishing rod and excellence of first class sporting dogs, his, indeed, should be a holiday of holidays among the sterling sportsmen of New Brunswick. Among other relics of the older St. John dog shows, I possess an engraved diploma of a kind then presented to owners of prize winners in all breeds. And such reminds one that this class of diploma prize has passed out of the presentation departments of most if not all of our show-giving communities. True, the C.K.C. and A.K.C. grant their parchments to owners of the winners of championships; but, save a ribbon, the ordinary dog owner has nothing in token of his victory to hang on the walls of his domicile be it mansion or shack. The old-time St. John prize which I treasure, is engraved with a reproduction of Landseer's famous painting of a Newfoundland dog and the child he had just saved from the angry flood. It is called "A Distinguished Member of the Humane Society." This particular diploma was awarded by the St. John people to a St. Bernard dog, which had

been instrumental in saving life. A Swiss breed of dog had in an emergency acted just as the artist's white and black Newfoundland dog had done. So honors were easy, and all rejoiced. The Maritimes call you around August and September. Mayhap, I've heard the command!

There was a large assembly of well-known persons at the burial of the late William Livesey, of Madison, N.J., whose death was reported in the last issue of this publication. Among those from afar was Bert Swann, the well-known international judge, of Toronto. Mr. Swann said he was there to represent a few friends who had met the previous day in the Queen City. Then it was decided he must at once go and represent them at the last rites held over the remains of one of the most beloved among the international professionals of our kennel world. And, surely, it will be pleasing to Canadians to learn that their brotherly action was admired and much commented on by the saddened gathering of relatives and friends at the funeral of William from Wigan.

Boston Terriers still hold more than their own in the American market, notwithstanding the depressions all have been passing through. Five hundred dollars was given for a seven to eight months old puppy at the Queensboro Kennel Club show in May. Since that time a twelve or thirteen pound dog of the famous Haggerty strain has been acquired by Droll and Rosenbloom, of New York. Of course, it's only hearsay, but great and favorable reports are flying around regarding the superior qualifications of the new dog owned by the Bowery live-stock merchants who probably pay more lump sums for magpie pigeons than any similar firm of importers in America, and sell in small packets over the counter, as much as fourteen hundred pounds of canary and other bird seed in a week of trading. While Droll stays in the store, Rosenbloom visits the dog shows. It is said that the firm's stud Boston Terriers, return three to five hundred dollars each week—especially in the spring and early summer. During the hot weather the stud business falls off; but the average earnings are very likely greater than have ever been received by owners of any other breed or breeds of stud dogs. Returning to the subject of the new and said to be sensational light-weight Boston Terrier, it is reported that the youngster is to sail under the name of "Benny Sent Me"—with "Haggerty" preceding the main moniker just to give the baby "class" or distinction, 'twas said.

Charles F. Grosse of Rocky River, Ohio, who judged the Boston Terriers at the recent Madison, N.J., show, is an extremely likeable sort of man, although reported as a person of very considerable wealth! Nowadays, it is pleasing to hear a judge expound his views or judgments regarding the dogs he has just looked upon. And here I am reminded that, in the future, we may expect to see and read more reports written by judges, than we have been used to enjoying in North America. The official reports of praise, adverse, friendly and learned descriptions of all breeds of dogs—reviews written by judges, in the English Kennel Club Gazette, have, for scores of years, been looked upon as the more praiseworthy guides for British breeders and exhibitors to follow. America is now on its way to follow the same safe and sane path, where all may read and learn what qualified men and women may be pleased

to write about dogs, good or otherwise.

Reverting to my short conversation with Mr. Grosse, all the way from Rocky River, in the Buck Eye State, it struck the correspondent that such a man would be well able to describe the most admired and other "points" of a Boston Terrier as well as other men and women from all necks of the woods here, there and everywhere! Incidentally, I am sure that George B. Yard Jr. will be pleased to read that Mr. Grosse thought a lot about his E. D'Is Carry On bred by Miss Emily V. Shire. Mrs. Ben Tracy's bitch M'Gal was "the best seen out for a long time and without fault as far as I could see, save her slight undersize—about eleven and a half pounds. Miss March On, reserve, was beautiful and hard to fault, although slightly masculine; and lost to the winner because of that." The foregoing are Mr. Grosse's words.

Well, what is one man's meat is another man's poison, and in that matter of sporting dogs and the larger and more "noble" breeds, I, for one, prefer to see a bitch with a head inclined towards masculinity. Boston Terriers and other "fancy" dogs are not to be considered in the following argument in favor of dog-head bitches. We know that the index to a dog's breed is to be found in the dog's head; and that doggie headed bitches may be more relied on to throw good or representatively headed dogs and bitch puppies, than weak-headed bitches can possibly produce. Breed from over-effeminately headed bitches, and it is more than likely that you will be cursed with weaker headed puppies—weaker and worse than their dam. Such dogs as Pointers, Setters, Spaniels, Hounds and all other hunting dogs should have large rather than small heads; for the reason that the best scenting heads are big heads; and the olfactory powers of the hunting dog are paramount in the construction of the head properties of the animal. That, it is thought, should be the reason why the thinking judge should bear in mind, not only what the light-headed bitch is on the day of his judgment regarding her, but what she is likely to produce in the way of first-class good-headed specimens of her own race.

I once heard of a man—who was not of the artist sort of man-milliner or picker of ambitious girls about to be "glorified" on the stage or screen. He was asked and consented to judge a lot of amateur bathing beauties of the human kind. He claimed that if he had not the eye of a painter, he possessed the eye of a man. So he made his own mental type of what he con-

CARE FOR THE DOGS

From Bulletin 78 State of Connecticut Dept. of Motor Vehicles by Commissioner Robbins B. Stoeckel

There is a curious law regarding dogs. A dog is apparently within his rights when he is under the immediate direction of his owner or on the highway adjoining his owner's property. This law is clearly an attempt to meet a situation created by the tendency of dogs to stray and to wander around other people's property than their owner's, but it seems curiously inadequate when the nature and general habits of dogs are considered. So far as enforcement of such a law is concerned it might possibly fit one case in a thousand and yet it is hard to see how any legal preparation can be made which will meet all conditions. A dog is required by conditions to rely largely, for protection and fair treatment, upon the willingness of the traveling motor vehicle operator to accord to the dog not only legal rights but those privileges which ought to go with right-minded thinking. In brief, the dog has a right to live, and to kill him just because he is outside his minor rights not only might be construed a breach of moral conduct but might also occasion the dog's owner irreparable damage.

The number of people who love dogs and who understand them and to whom the companionship of the dog is an incalculable comfort is increasing. Aside from law, or its adaptations, or of morals and their application, it seems possible to bring to any person who is willing to think a little, the right attitude to assume in connection with super-care for dogs.

LIVE WIRE OF DOGGY NEWSPAPERS AND OF INTERNATIONAL INTEREST

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Whether a creature, be it a man, woman, child, dog, cat, squirrel or bird, has rights at law, seems immaterial. Certainly every "superior" can well afford to concede rights and extend enough consideration and care so that each may be safe.

Human beings, of course, have legal rights. Where children are concerned the operator must know that they may do unexpected things, and must govern his car to be ready for whatever action they may take. This is settled law. The statistics of automobile accidents to children and the manner of their happening show that operators are living up to this doctrine.

To carry this further, it is conceded that dogs and cats are fairly safe now, even when and where they are outside their highway rights. Average operators, possibly because they are more considerate than they formerly were, try to give a dog or cat its moral traffic rights. All in all there is a much better understanding of what constitutes good form about animals and birds than was formerly the case. A dog or cat which is struck is usually the victim of its own mistake. These accidents are much like those which happen to pedestrians. There is in each usually a distraction of attention. There are also some dogs which persist in the belief that the rear tire of a car is an enemy and ought to be bitten. Such action sooner or later brings retribution.

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Are the Exhibition Shows to Continue?

IT is up to the dog fancier if the dog show in connection with provincial and county fairs is to remain an annual feature or to become a thing of the past. Fair Boards everywhere are fretting under the desire to eliminate expense and endless trouble and the dog show is doomed to go, if Mr. and Mrs. Dog Fancier don't put their shoulders to the wheel and push with all their strength to keep the dog show a live issue.

Just let one or two fairs drop out of the line, and other fairs will be quick to follow, you can depend upon that. Even the Canadian National Exhibition show which is the biggest event in Canadian dogdom may become but a memory—for these fairs work hand in glove and are quick to follow the lead of even their most modest competitor if the lead is in the right direction and means the saving of cash and worry.

The Central Canada Exhibition which has been depended upon to send forth a most attractive prize list with real money in the classes gave us the first indication of the "handwriting on the wall." The officials at Ottawa make no bones about the fact that the show this year is "on trial" and if it does not come up to scratch this year, it will be the last such event to receive the backing and the financial support of this important organization. What a disaster that would be to have the Capital City deprived of its one show of the year.

It is only this week, after much hard work on the part of the officers of the London Canine Association, and the insistence of a delegation from our club, that the Western Fair Association re-opened the question of holding a dog show at the fall event in London, and after having definitely cancelled the show earlier in the year. The Fair Board has decided to try once again, and to give the dog fanciers an opportunity to prove that a dog show is an essential at Canada's second largest exhibition. Only the seasoned exhibitors can realize what a loss the London show would have been to the dog fancy. It is second only to Toronto Exhibition in the prize money paid. As high as \$6 for first prize is given in several of the breeds, and this money is not placed on the percentage basis but is paid whether there are ten dogs in the class or but one. Even a fair dog pays expenses when he is entered in enough classes at London, and how many shows today pay expenses?

What is the trouble? Certainly it is not just the number of dogs entered, for last year at London the two shows held taxed the accommodation of the dog show building. Financial loss is not the big issue, for the Fair officials at London desire a good big show, and they know that the larger the show the more money it costs, for the entire prize money is used up if there is a first, second and third dog entered in all the classes. A small one point show is the only one that has showed a surplus in London for years, and the most successful shows in the point of number of dogs entered have always showed a deficit.

The fact of the matter is—and mark this well—Fair Boards are becoming sour on dog fanciers. And we, the fanciers, are the only ones to blame.

To begin with the dog fancier hasn't much respect for Fair Boards. He adopts the attitude that he is doing the fair a favor to show his dog at all—which perhaps he is, but the way the situation is now, Fair Boards think, in fact know, that they are doing the dog fancy a big favor by having a show at which dogs are allowed to compete. If the entry was closed on the official closing date at the average show—not one half of the dogs would be entered. Last year at London on the date of closing the entries, which was less than a week before the show, not one quarter of the entry had been received—and they kept coming in to within twenty-four hours of the London shows—which didn't give the secretary or the printer a chance, and the catalogue produced was a great example of what a dog show catalogue should not be—there were more dogs posted in the "Added Entry" list than there were in the catalogue proper. And even then fanciers who should have known better, and certainly had had plenty of show experience, tried to get their dogs shoved in somehow on the day the show opened, and were angry because their entries were declined.

The answer to that, you say, is to have a closing date and stick to it. That was tried a few years ago. Advertisements were run in *Kennel and Bench* saying that entries positively would close on the official date, that the practice of taking last minute entries at Toronto Exhibition would be discontinued—and a similar announcement was posted glaringly at the front

of the premium list. The result of that was some sixty odd dogs entered, and an eleventh hour rush down to Toronto show to take entries in spite of the resolve not to do so, for the "gate" had to be considered and so small a show could not be presented to Fair patrons at the usual admission.

Then, too, there is the "want to go home" dog fancier, and he or she seems to increase with the years. I don't greatly blame the fancier for that—it is a most trying experience to have to hang around a dog show for three days, and sometimes four, and especially so if the dog has been defeated and everything has gone wrong. But the fact remains that when a dog is entered for a show, unless it is a puppy, it is understood that the dog is entered for the duration of the show—and that means until ten o'clock of the last day of the show. If the last train goes before ten, then that is the fancier's tough luck, and must be considered before the dog is entered. If Fairs are to make ends even partially meet at a dog show, the gate must do the trick—and can anyone blame Fair Boards for being angry when complaints come from patrons who have paid a fair admission price, that they viewed mostly empty stalls. People so tricked certainly won't visit the dog show in future years. Goodness knows there are big enough gaps left by the puppies that depart on the night they are judged, without matured dogs being taken out.

That, you say, rests with the superintendent. "Pleasant job!" sez you! "Ugly, distasteful job!" sez I!

In Canada the superintendent's job is greatly different from that in the United States where men make a business of it. The superintendent of a Canadian show is usually some poor misguided creature, like I was for some years, who was talked into hours of labor, and longer hours of worry, because there was no-one else who could, or would, do the work. From the time the show opens until the moment it closes, the superintendent is at everyone's beck and call. If he is a man all the fancy know (and because they know him only too well, respect him very little or not at all), he gets all the abuse, most of the work, and certainly none of the credit. After the first class is called and judged the parade of fanciers who want to "get home early" starts. He is button-holed at every opportunity. He is taken to see dogs that look a bit tired but are declared dying in spite of what

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the veterinarian says. He is brought to view women who have fainted with the heat or perished with the cold—it depends upon the weather—and he is told that he is a heartless wretch because he takes the stand that if she goes her dogs must stay. He is shown telegrams—he is told heart-breaking stories about dying relatives at home, who should not have been left—and can only murmur under his breath, "Then why in — leave them."

Dog show time is really the time when everyone's relatives either die or are taken desperately ill—last fall one man's mother who died when he was a mere child had somehow come back to earth and been taken down with some new fangled disease that wasn't even in existence when she last sojourned on earth. Oh yes, they tell it well, and the worst of it is, who can say which is fact and which is fiction? Let the superintendent but weaken once, and let one person go—and then he hears on all sides—"Mrs So and So went with her dog, why can't I go with mine?"

And the worst of it is—and this is the part that "gets the goat" of the various Fair Boards—they go over the head of the man in charge of the dog show, and assail the administration building and carry their tough luck story there. Does a hard working Fair Secretary, with a million problems of his own to work out, want to be bothered or have his Board annoyed by petty dog show troubles?

Put on top of that the traffic troubles? Dog show fanciers arrive now in motor cars and motor trucks. They insist upon bringing their cars into the grounds to unload their crates,

and break all rules and all orders about parking and persist in leaving their cars in the space handy to the dog show, but unfortunately reserved for directors cars. What care they if the director's chauffeur must look for hours for a place for his employer's car? Does that, I ask, make the director any more friendly towards the dog show?

And the exercising of dogs. The rules are printed in all prize lists, but I have never been at any show here, or anywhere else, where exercising rules were either enforced or followed. And dog fanciers persist in exercising their dogs on the greenest grass, no matter whether or not it is in front of the best buildings or on grounds intended for picnic parties. Exercising spaces at dog shows are inadequate, especially at fair shows, but nevertheless they can be put up with, and they must be if the dog fanciers wish to regain the good graces of the officials.

If the dog fancier wishes to have Exhibition shows continued he must reform. He must forget his own interests and look to the Fairs' interests.

Even if looking to the Fairs' interests means losing the last train home on the last day of the show and staying over until the next day, driving home late at night in a storm or whatever the weather offers. He must be prepared to put up with bad exercising facilities for his dog—even the largest shows offer little in their exercising privileges. He must, if needs be, make up his mind that he will have to park his car outside the fair grounds and leave it there while someone helps him get his dogs into the dog show building, crates or no crates. He must make up his mind that he will be back at nine o'clock in the morning of the second day and the third day of the show—to get his dogs benched for the morning "gate" and not about noon or one o'clock as he has done in the past.

And he must keep his mouth shut about the judge! Ah, there's the big order! But what good has it ever done anyone to crab? Think what an impression it makes on the Fair visitors who hear the judge audibly condemned on all sides—and no matter who he is, big or little, great or insignificant, the judge gets panned regularly by the losers. Stories of bad judging get to the Fair officials—and don't tend to put them in a good frame of mind concerning the dog show.

There is no doubt about it, Fair Boards everywhere must be considered. We are the ones who want the dog shows—they are the ones who grant it to us under protest—and they are only waiting a good excuse to get rid of the show. Let's make them want it—let's work like the very dickens to prove that we are for them. It is the only way—and there can be no exceptions.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

To the Editor of Kennel and Bench.

Sir,—Having been a member of the C.K.C. for many years, and not having taken up any of your valuable time, by correspondence, I thought that at this time, I would endeavour to give my views, for probable improvement in present-day conduct by judges at Dog Shows.

At the Annual General Meeting, you advocated the licensing of judges. This was an excellent step in the right direction and enhances the fact that you are not unaware of conditions as they are. The letter of Mr. A. Roberts, is very timely, and enlightening, to

many of us who have suffered unnecessarily. "Favouritism" or "ignorance" has become so pronounced, that corrective measures should be adopted in a constructive effort to eliminate these evils.

Suggestions to the directorate of our club, in a remedial effort, should be welcomed, as most exhibitors wish to see the best dog win. I cannot agree with the text of "Dog Show Ethics" in the May Issue, personally I believe the man who takes what he knows to be the best dog, into the ring and gets beaten by inferior dogs, through inability of the judge, is not to be considered a "sportsman" by his silence, but would be more worthy of the name if he did his best through the proper channels to better conditions.

My suggestion, if nothing better is forthcoming, is that the Provincial Representative (who generally knows dogs) be paid a nominal fee, say \$25 by the show giving club to be on hand and in the event of an exhibitor, feeling an injustice has been done, he shall appeal to the representative who will explain his views to the presiding judge and reverse the decision if necessary.

He bred many magnificent Pointers which made wonderful performances in both the Manitoba and American Field Trials. Many of his dogs were bench show winners too, and the following are a few of the many Geo. Kynoch piloted through to championship honors. "Ch. Prince Cash," "Ch. Rodanda Prairie Queen," "Ch. Low Pearl Stone," "Ch. Raps Ben," "Ch. Katy Flyer," "Ch. Sir Royal Trick." J. Fletcher of Calgary, also handled many of his good dogs.

The arrangements which had been made for Fort Garry Kennel Club Show left nothing to be desired either for the comfort of the visitors or the convenience of the exhibitors. Any clouds that might have been in the sky when arrangements were first made to hold a show, began to scatter as the entries came in and were finally dispersed as the happy crowd watched the judging go forward in the ring. In the ring stood a large table covered with silver cups and some one hundred special prizes, the result of the efforts of the committee in charge of the show awards. Mr. Ridge and his committee of lady workers are to be congratulated on the success of their efforts.

Mr. Shuttleworth told me he was very pleased with the quality of the exhibits. The Shepherds, however, he thought were a mixed bunch, some too short in back and others too light in bone. He had seen nothing better, on his journey up the Pacific Coast in English Setters than "Harwood Kil Martin Grouse." E. Chevrier's entry which went right through to best specimen in show; winning the Harmony Cup for Best in Show, the McLimont trophy for best sporting dog, the T. Eaton Co. Ltd. trophy for best in Sporting group and the Canadian Kennel Club Cup for best Canadian-bred specimen in show, "Harwood Kil Martin Grouse," was recently purchased by Mr. Chevrier from Alex. McCloy of Victoria, one of the British Columbia Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club.

The Fort Garry Kennel Club were happy in their selection of Chris Shuttleworth as judge. He more than lived up to the reputation he has made for himself by his satisfactory work at

previous shows. Smiling, happy, but absolutely fearless, he went about his work in such a business-like manner that he quickly won the confidence, admiration, approval and hearty applause of the crowd. During the whole time I was privileged to be there I did not hear any disparaging remark or any adverse criticism on the awards.

Trophies other than those mentioned as won by "Harwood Kil Martin Grouse," were Spratts Canadian Trophy for Best puppy in Show, won by Mrs. Ivy Pateman's German Shepherd puppy "Freda von Vogel." The Toronto Kennel Club Trophy for Best Novice in Show, won by D. E. McLean's English Setter "Iona Blue Rock." The Welcome Home Cup for Best Opposite Sex to Best in Show, won by E. Chevrier's English Springer Spaniel "Royal Flush of Avondale." The Hudson's Bay Co. Cup for Best in Working Dog Group, won by Mr. Pickard's St. Bernard "Alpine Chieftain." The Hotel St. James Cup for Best in Show from St. James won by D. E. McLean's English Setter "Iona Blue Rock." The Winnipeg Cup for Best in Non-Sporting Group, won by Geo. Kynoch's English Bulldog "Silverdale Leader." Lawrence E. Wilson Trophy for Best Novice in Show won by D. E. McLean's English Setter "Iona Blue Rock." The Geo. Kynoch Trophy for Best in Terrier Group, won by Geo. Kynoch's "Redcliffe Arc Light." Tribune Trophy for best Airedale, bred in Manitoba, champions barred, won by Mr. A. Gray's Airedale "Eric Mike." Silverdale Kennels Challenge Trophy for Best Novice Airedale won by A. Gray's Airedale "Major." The Sifton Trophy for Best Bull Terrier in Show won by Captain Wilkes' "Hades Sensation."

Other awards will be found in the official report on the show elsewhere in this issue of Kennel and Bench.

A delightful feature of the show was the large number of ribbons and trophies won by our Military friends who are stationed at the Fort Osborne barracks, Winnipeg. Some twenty-seven ribbons had been won before the judging on the evening of the last day commenced. But this is as it should be. Where, the world over will you find such sportsmen, as are to be found among the officers of the Imperial Forces?

"They were picking them up at

almost every station now—men and women coming in for the Christmas week, with racquets, with bundles of polo sticks, with dear and bruised cricket bats, with fox-terriers and saddles."

It was indeed a great pleasure to see the benching of another club in use as one entered the amphitheatre. It proves just what a sportsmanlike spirit of harmony and goodwill can obtain, when all fanciers do their best for the successful showing of the aristocracy of the canine world.

One must not forget to mention the Children's classes which were handled so nicely and sympathetically by the judge. The best handler in each class was presented with a silver cup given for the occasion by J. P. Finn.

"Witty" Warren of Whippet fame, was seen feasting his eyes on his first love the "Sour Mugs." The first Nova Scotia owned dog to go Best all Breeds was a Bulldog "Ch. Dunaalant" and he was piloted to victory by "Witty" Warren (get Witty to send you his Poem, The Handler); we are very sorry to report "Dunney" passed on last Sunday, it was a hard blow to his owner, Mrs. Ora Doherty, who valued him more as a pal than for his worth—fine show record, which started in September, 1925, at St. John, under Alf. Delmont, again Best in Show at Halifax. A week later under V. P. Breese, then to the Royal at Toronto, where under Dr. Glen Adams he completed his Canadian Championship when still under sixteen months of age, defeating several well-known Champions. The following year Walter H. Reeves, placed him Best in Show at Halifax, and Messrs. Preston and Fry, placed him for the same award at Amherst.

"Dunney" was born June 27, 1924 and died June 7th, 1931, he was by "Dundee Legal Challenger, by "Kilburn Legal." He was out of "Ch. Muiravonside Lass," his dam "Toddalaunt" had the great Irish Alaunt for sire and "Tin-toddles" as her dam. He has left "Ch. Novalaunt" now the property of Mrs. Sylvia Ross, Bar Harbour, Maine and the St. John and Montreal winner "Nova's Son O'Dun" who only lacks two points of his title to carry on. Bulldog breeders seem to have a lot of sorrow but oh my, how like their breed—they stick. You have so often heard the old saying, "Once a Bulldog man always a Bulldog man."

F. W. Johnson's "Ch. Danby Mogal" has started a precedent, he is the first Nova Scotia owned Smooth Fox Terrier to win a Championship Certificate. Dr. C. Y. Ford awarding him his final points at Montreal, where he was a hot contender for Group honors. Another Nova Scotia dog to finish his title at Montreal Show was "Petrofski of Marlboro" the third son of "Ch. Koral" to win the coveted honor. It would be interesting to check up how many champions own Int. "Ch. Johnston's Krilenko" as their Grand Sire.

"Bobby" Laskey had a nice string at Montreal from St. John, including "Bobby" Orr's hope, "Esco Lucky Ripper" by "Ch. Post Road Jeff II," ex "Girlie Dapple Joe," a daughter of the

This old English Sheepdog is a deep blue with white head front and legs, an excellent mover, sound as a bell with bone to spare. R. H. Waddell of Montreal, Secretary of the Canine Society of Montreal, has just received a promising Smooth Fox Terrier from the Haligonian Kennels with the top-rung name of "Haligonian President," he is the first son of "Ch. Danby Mogul," ex "Danby Model II."

Theo. Marples, F.Z.S. Passes On

The world's outstanding figure in dogdom, is no more. He passed away suddenly on Sunday, June 7th, at the War Memorial Hospital, Congleton, as the result of a motor accident. The funeral was at Manchester Crematorium Southern Cemetery on Thursday, June 11th.

The late Mr. Marples would be to Great Britain, what Charles A. Stone would be to Canada—the grand old man of the game. Mr. Marples was eleven years old when the first dog show was held in England, at Newcastle-on-Tyne in 1859. Already a dog fancier, it naturally follows that he was the Father of dogdom in England.

Not long ago, Mr. Marples wrote his own biography, and because of the great amount of historical information it contained, and because Mr. Marples lived to be 84 years old, because he was an "ancient landmark," and because he was Theo. Marples, F.Z.S. and the founder of the world's greatest dog magazine "Our Dogs," we reprint the autobiography as a mark of esteem from his many friends in Canada.

"In late years I have been importuned by my many friends to write a brief history of my somewhat extended and, more or less, eventful career in connection with Dogs, but I have, so far, declined to fall in with their request.

As I propose, in this year of grace, 1931, to retire from the judging ring, I think, perhaps, that I may now signalize that decision by penning and publishing some reminiscences of that career, which will, I dare say, be read with more or less interest by contemporary dog owners, old and young, of both sexes, and particularly by those who take a deep interest in the breeding and exhibition of dogs of high degree, and the general advancement of the traditional friend of man.

I was born in 1848, and if you reverse the last two figures it will reveal my present age of 84, upon which I have just entered. Strictly speaking, I am 83, and 'not out!' My birthplace is the rustic village of Baslow, in Derbyshire, which is overlooked by the famous Derbyshire domain of the Dukes of Devonshire. 'Derbyshire born and Derbyshire bred, strong i'th' arm and awake i'th' head.' My father was a Nonconformist minister, and served his apprenticeship with his uncle, Mr. Matthew Marples, a well-known saddler in the village, but directly his time was up he threw down the awl and took up the ministry. His father, Mr. William Marples, was the sexton of

Baslow Parish Church for over thirty years.

My late father, who became the Rev. John Marples, B.A., went to a lot of trouble in endeavouring to find out the origin of the 'Marples' family. He found that they are descended from the Huguenots, who in 1685 were expelled from France and settled in the North of Ireland. They were farmers and landowners, some of them migrating to England and settling in Marple, where they built Marple Hall, the village taking its name from the hall. Probably some members of this family, or other Marples, migrated from Ireland and settled at the village of Baslow, as several Marples lie buried in the graveyard of Edensor Church, in Chatsworth Park, the date of their graves being close upon 1700. I myself possess the 'Marples' crest.

My father's first charge of a chapel was at Stoney Middleton, Derbyshire, where Squire Bateman, of Middleton Hall, built a chapel for my father to preach in. One of his daughters came to live in Manchester, and I remember selling her a Pug when she was about 19. She became a successful and noted breeder of Pugs and Irish Terriers. She married Sir Harcourt Clare, who became Town Clerk of Liverpool, and lived at Bank Hall, near Preston. He afterwards became Clerk to the Lancashire County Council, at a salary of £5,000 a year. They have both, alas! paid the inevitable debt.

When I was a boy, about six or seven years old, my parents removed to West Burton, in Wensleydale, and I went to an old endowed country school at Aysgarth, which school served several surrounding villages. It was when residing here that I first came in close contact with dogs. The parents of a boy friend had a litter of puppies which they wanted to get rid of, and I bartered for one with the boy, giving him some eggs for his mother and three-pence for himself—all the money I could scrape together. I took the puppy home in great glee; my mother was fond of dogs, but not my father, and I had ultimately to part with my pet. This was in 1855, one year before dogs, as beasts of burden, were abolished by law in England, although they continue to be so used on the Continent to this day. It was also about three or four years before the first dog show ever held, viz., at Newcastle-on-Tyne in 1859, for Gundogs only, which was promoted by Mr. Pape, a gunsmith, of Newcastle-on-Tyne, and Mr. Short-hose, who used to keep and shoot over Pointers and Setters. As I grew up, and as a young man, I indulged in my natural love of dogs, and kept a few, and in due course became acquainted with the two promoters of the first dog show ever held in the world.

From West Burton my father removed to Queensbury, previously called 'Queenshead,' and I was sent to a boarding-school in Halifax—viz., Holder's Academy, in King Cross Lane. It is a singular coincidence that two of my dear friends in after-life, who became very noted breeders, exhibitors, and judges of dogs, went to the same school. I refer to Mr. R. Hood Wright, a Halifax man, who was a noted Deerhound and Bloodhound breeder, and Mr. Harry Rawson, also a Yorkshireman, who also affected Deerhounds, and was in business in Edinburgh, but both of whom have, alas! passed on. Mrs. Rawson survives, and is still interested in Chow Chows, with which she has been very successful, and which she often judges.

At Halifax I went in the evenings to the Mechanics' Institute. Such institutions were then beginning to spring up all over the country, and I happened to be among the prize-winners in one or more subjects. Sir Frank Crossley, Bart., head of the great carpet manufacturing firm in Halifax, on this occasion presented the prizes won at the Institute, and I shall always remember what he said of boys when he did so—viz., that he thought boys with moderate ability and great energy made

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better out in the world than boys with great ability and only moderate energy. I suppose he said this by way of encouragement of the boys who excelled in energy but were deficient in ability. The Crossley family gave to Halifax its beautiful People's Park.

After holding one or two situations at Halifax and Thornton, before I reached 21 I got myself a position as salesman at a clothier and outfitter's business in Blackburn, and ultimately bought the business. I did very well in this business for some years, until there came a severe depression in the local cotton industry, the almost staple industry of the district. The operatives were starving, and went to the home of Mr. Rainsford Jackson, President of the Master Cotton Spinners' and Manufacturers' Association, turned his horses out of the stables, and then tarred the house and set it on fire! The Mayor, Mr. James Johnston, J.P., read the Riot Act and called out the military, the town being in such a state of turmoil and disorder. This was about half a century ago. Trade was bad, local shopkeepers falling like skittles, and I, unfortunately, was among them. When I started business in Blackburn, Mr. John Crossley, of the famous carpet firm in Halifax, sent me a substantial cheque as a present, in remembrance of my father.

When in Blackburn, too, a relative of mine at Worksop, who was associated with Lord Galway's Hunt, sent me a Fox-terrier bitch puppy out of the celebrated bitch Grove Nettle. I reared it successfully and bred several good Fox-terriers out of it, founding a small kennel of good dogs.

In 1870 my father and family emigrated to Canada, he having previously

joined the Presbyterian Church, and was sent out by the Scotch Presbytery to superintend a group of churches in Canada. He died there in the early part of the present century.

This is about 50 years ago. I exhibited at shows and was quite successful, adding from time to time one or two other breeds to my kennel, such as Yorkshire Terriers, Pugs, and later Sporting Spaniels. Yorkshire Terriers' coats were too much for me, so I gave them up. I had a good kennel of Pugs, and may here mention that I sold one to Mr. J. E. Watmough, who was then a youth of 16 or 17. About this time the great Tichborne trial was on, much of the evidence in this famous claim of the Wapping butcher, Arthur Orton, to be the lost Sir Roger Tichborne relating to the life of the late baronet at Stonyhurst College, near Whalley. I called two of my Pugs after two leading witnesses in this trial, which lasted seven or eight weeks and cost over £100,000—viz., Bogle, the black witness, and Mrs. Jury.

Dog shows at this time were of a very primitive nature. There were no dog benches at shows to begin with, the dogs being just tethered to stakes round the field at agricultural shows. They were judged in rings, of course, and the judges were few and not very experienced. Two of these judges, who, by reason of their judging all breeds that came before them, were called 'all round' judges. Their names were Mr. Lort, a great Gundog man, and Mr. George Hellewell, 'Yorkshire George,' as he was familiarly dubbed.

The particulars given of the dogs, in those far-off days, were very meagre and not always genuine. Many dogs had the same name, and had to have

distinguishing marks recorded in the catalogue. I remember an old exhibitor showing a puppy (which should not have exceeded one year) until it was nearly two years old! I asked him how long he was going to show it as a puppy, and he laconically replied: 'As long as they'll have him!' The Kennel Club did not exist at this time, but a few ladies took up the breeding and exhibition of dogs, including Mrs. Mary Ann Foster, Mrs. Troughear, a great rival in Yorkshire Terriers, Miss Holdsworth in Pugs, Mrs. Arkwright (whose son became a very distinguished Pointer author and authority), Mrs. Bligh Monk, Miss Dawson, Lady Brooke, Mrs. Horsfall, Duchess of Newcastle, Mrs. Jagger, Miss Manley, etc.

I judged my first show at Halifax in 1873—viz., a little show of several breeds, held in connection with a church fete. A little incident occurred at this show which is worth recording. A Mr. John Speak, well-known in Sporting Spaniel and Yorkshire Terrier circles, showed a dog under me, but not of either of these breeds. It was a Fox-terrier, and while he was handling it someone tapped John on the shoulder and told him he was wanted at home, quick! He gave someone else his dog to show and hied off home at full gallop. On his return, I asked John what was the matter at home. He replied, in the Yorkshire vernacular: 'Oh! nought much, only my wife has given birth to a fine boy, that's all!' John was about 20 years of age then, and subsequently he removed from Halifax to the Manchester district, still dabbling in dogs. His first-born grew up to be a fine boy, and, like his father, became an ardent dog fan-

cier. When he reached 50 years of age and his father 70, the two showed dogs under me at a Heywood show, and I gave them both prizes.

The Kennel Club was founded this year, 1873. Mr. S. E. Shirley, M.P. for Monaghan, in Ireland, was the originator, and he got around him some of the leading sportsmen and doggy experts of that time. I knew Mr. Shirley, and once stayed with him at his home, Ettington Park, Stratford-on-Avon. He affected Pointers, Setters, and more particularly Flat-coated Retrievers, and, of course, was the first chairman of the Kennel Club.

Show dogs, with a Kennel Club to look over them and regulate their exhibition and registration, which was soon adopted, began to make great strides, leading owners and ladies now entering their ranks as breeders and exhibitors.

Incidents of the kennel cult were numerous and often interesting. I can recall one of many. This was at the first Dundee Show in 1878, where I exhibited Pugs, and my friend, Tom Swinburne, who is still alive and well I hope, Black-and-Tan Terriers. He was a successful breeder and exhibitor of Manchester Terriers and Greyhounds. The judge at this show was Dr. Gordon Stables, a retired naval officer and Scotsman. I won first and cup for best dog or bitch in Pugs, and Mr. Swinburne first in Black-and-Tan Terriers. I should here mention that there was a very celebrated Pug in England, at Bristol, named Champion Sooty, the best on the show bench. Dr. Gordon Stables lived in the Midlands, and to amuse himself, took in selected dogs to convalesce them. Mr. Lewis's Champion Sooty was one of them. The dog travelled about with the Doctor, who wrote to the papers about his intelligence and antics. Well, at the Dundee Show it appears Champion Sooty was entered, but had not been sent. Another Pug, however, which some Scot had got hold of, a very moderate specimen, was put in Sooty's pen and was judged with the rest, but got nothing. An exhibitor or someone said to Dr. Stables, 'Do you know, Doctor, that the great Champion Sooty is here and you have given him nothing?' 'Oh, dear!' replied the Doctor, and went to look, and a Pug was in his pen, but not Champion Sooty. The Doctor, however, assumed it was, and begged a first prize for it from the Society and put it on the dog's pen! Tableau!

Well, my friend, Mr. Tom Swinburne, had a nasty experience at the same show. He won first prize with his Black-and-Tan Terrier, and his dog

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was duly labelled with a first-prize card. On his return to the show, however, after lunch, someone had taken the first-prize card off his dog's pen and put on one of second prize! Imagine Tom's wrath! He was going to make somebody sit up, and being young and a well-made six-footer, he certainly was a rather formidable subject to cope with. However, the officials at once rectified the matter; 'all was well that ended well.'

Practically the only fanciers' weekly newspaper which existed at this time—the end of 1880—was 'The Fanciers' Chronicle,' of which I was a shareholder and contributor on dogs, although I once showed pigeons for a short time. About this time 'The Canine World' was started in Manchester by Mr. John Tatham, formerly a partner in an engineering firm at Rochdale. He had two brothers who were interested in dogs—Mr. Walter, a Bull-terrier, etc., enthusiast, and Mr. William, a St. Bernard breeder, with whom the late Mr. Fred Gresham, a great authority on this breed, became a partner. I was appointed Assistant Editor of 'The Canine World,' which, however, had a very short life.

In 1892 I founded 'The British Fancier,' devoted to Dogs, Poultry, and Pigeons. I secured the support of several leading dog enthusiasts or philoquons at that time, including: Dr. George MacGill (chairman, and at one time chairman of the Manchester Dog Show Society), Mr. Tom Stretch (both

since deceased), Mr. Will T. Rylance (the present chairman of the Manchester Dog Show Society), Mr. Isaac Woodiwiss, Mr. Schunk (Pigeon Editor), and one or two others, myself acting as Chief Editor and Managing Director. I was successful in securing the consent of Her Majesty Queen Victoria for the illustration of the Queen's lovely Golden Pomeranian, Marco, on the front page of 'The British Fancier's' first issue. I made arrangements with Sir Henry Ponsonby, Her Majesty's Private Secretary, for me to go to Osborne, Isle of Wight, where the dog was kept, to take a photograph of Marco. Sir Henry Ponsonby brought two or three portraits in oil of Marco, drawn by Royal Academician artists, for me to look at, and got the Queen's Highland servant, John Brown, to hold the dog in the courtyard while its photo was taken. When all was fixed up and the photographer had got his instrument nicely fixed on the dog, a nurse, with a little boy and girl of about six years, emerged from the side doors, the boy exclaiming as he came into the courtyard: 'Oh! look here, they're photographing Grandma's dog,' and he whistled to the dog, which pricked its ears and enabled the photographer to get a good snap. That boy was the present Prince Arthur of Connaught. The photo, duly appeared on the front page of 'The British Fancier,' embellished by a beautifully designed border, the work of Mr. F. Cruikshank, the artist. Copies of 'The British Fancier' were sent to the Queen at Osborne, and Her Majesty was so pleased with the illustration of the dog that she ordered a dozen copies, printed on art paper, distinct from the journal, which were, of course, duly sent. I have Sir Henry Ponsonby's three letters, giving me the Queen's permission to go to Osborne to photograph the dog, making the appointment, and writing for the separate photos of the dog. There is a sequel to this Royal consent to illustrate Marco in 'The British Fancier.' It appears that some London newspaper took the liberty to copy this photo of Queen Victoria's Marco, which was brought to the Queen's notice, who compelled the firm who had been guilty of this piece of flagrant plagiarism to call in all the copies which they had issued!

'The British Fancier' was a journal of promise, but after it had been going about two years, I conceived the idea of a well-conducted and up-to-date weekly journal devoted entirely to dogs. I left 'The British Fancier' in 1894 in a fairly flourishing condition, to start OUR DOGS."

CONGRATULATIONS must be extended to the Medicine Hat fanciers, first on their Dog Show building, the Arena, which would be worthy of the "Royal" itself and secondly on the high degree of sportsmanship which they have attained. The Judge, E. Thirlwell, who has been favourably known as a Terrier specialist both in the British Isles and in Western Canada, had in taking on the task of all rounder assumed a responsibility greater than his powers. This was particularly noticeable in the judging of Springer Spaniels, but visitors and local fanciers alike took the awards in good part and the only complaints heard were from some of the winners sympathizing with those defeated, whom they thought should deservedly have been placed above them.

Best Dog or Bitch in Show went to "Oltee Lenpel" a Smooth Fox Terrier owned by Harry Price of Calgary and recently imported.

The Canadian Kennel Club Cup for Best Canadian-bred went to Harry Champ's beautiful little wire puppy bitch "Cliff Becky" by Int. Champion "Beckside Bonus" ex "Redcliffe Frisky." This little lady also secured the Director's Trophy for best Alberta-bred puppy.

Reserve went to Vic. Williams beautiful blue merl Collie "Rosebrae Rising Sun," who also took the special in working group.

Best Sporting went to "Cossack Zyclon" owned by J. Procter of Calgary, an outstanding Russian puppy of size and quality.

Best non-sporting to the English Bull Dog "Sergeant Murphy" owned by W. R. Carter, Carstairs.

A terrible and sad incident marred the close of the show, when a visiting Fox Terrier was poisoned in the streets of Medicine Hat while being led on his way home by his owner. Report says this dog was "Oltee Lenpal," but at the time of writing this is unconfirmed.

No less than fifty dogs were poisoned in Medicine Hat just previous to the Show and this state of affairs quite naturally affected the entries, and a two-point event was the result. Needless to say both the Kennel Club officials and the police are making a determined effort to bring the guilty party to justice.

PLAYING THE GAME

An incident well worth recording came to our notice the other day, when it was found that the open air show of the Hamilton Kennel Club clashed with the show of the German Shepherd Dog Club, also an open air event. The sportsmen of the Hamilton Ken-

nel Club, having noticed the clashing of dates, at once arranged to change their date from June 20th to June 27th, and no doubt the German Shepherd Dog Club will show its appreciation by swelling the entry at Hamilton.

There is a strong feeling of resentment prevailing at London because of clashing or overlapping of dates, and so prominent is that feeling, that there are rumours of the discontinuance of the Show that has featured the Western Fair at London for almost 50 years. In fact, frankly the situation is this, the dog show building has been set aside for some other attraction, and no dog show building is now available, so that if a show is held this year at the Western Fair, very likely it will be held under canvas. The trouble arises from the circumstance of two shows being held in the one week, for some years London and Peterboro, and later London and Kingston, and argument is the splitting of an available entry of perhaps 300 dogs into two groups, with the attraction negated as the result.

Of course it is well known that for many years one week was shared by London and Ottawa. Even so, the arrangement was never considered satisfactory, we believe this vexatious matter will come before the Board of Directors at their next meeting when a solution to this knotted problem may be found. Like every other branch of sport, the schedule of playing calls for attention if the best results are to be obtained, and the players and managements are to be satisfied.

RED BRUCIE COCKERS

Dr. A. N. Jenks and A. R. Stuart, Montreal, were so pleased with a black cocker bitch which they had purchased from the well known H. E. Mellenthin, that they sent her to be bred to that great producer Red Brucie, and their reward has materialized in seven male puppies, five of the litter are red and the other two are black. The dam is a show specimen as well as a splendid breeder and a rare mother.

Breeding such at this must always be rich in reward. The bitch to name her is Derby Formula Sire, My Own Tailor, Dam, My Own Gold Medal, and when we keep in mind that Red Brucies' fee is \$100 there is reason for looking for splendid results. The regret of D. Jenks and of Mr. Stuart is that there were no female puppies in the litter.

Mr. Stuart has just purchased a young Red bitch by Ch. Merryfield Wildfire ex Ch. Merryfield Jonjuil and both her and Formula will be shown later on this season.

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RAMBLES WITH BIRD DOGS

A great deal of pleasure is to be derived from a little work with the bird dogs during the spring months prior to the nesting season. Also not a little profit. The dogs will enjoy some practice on the game scent, and it keeps them in touch with their work, which is much to their advancement in the coming season. For the owner who has not before followed the dogs at this time, there is much in store. The wonders of spring in the country are ever a source of the greatest interest. Even the most practiced veteran of the country-side cannot refrain from enthusiasm over the glories of the new life.

In this northern latitude of Greenlawn, Alberta, each day dating from the arrival of the first crow, brings with it something fresh. But when the bird migration is general the feast for the observer is rich indeed. Most sportsmen are familiar with the birds only in their autumn plumage, and perhaps quite unaware of the glories of the garb our feathered friends assume for the mating season. Even those of the most sombre appearance have all their subdued beauties intensified, while others, such as the water fowl, are so gorgeous in their coloring no artist can do them full justice with his brush.

All true sportsmen are more or less naturalists, even though many do not realize this fact. Rambling over the game preserves, in the spring, with a good brace of dogs, will reveal the truth of this statement. Armed with field glass rather than gun, he will find that sport is obtained in more ways than the actual killing of game. At this season the birds are not nearly so wild as they are during the shooting season, in fact, they appear to be fully aware that they are protected by the law from the leaden shower of one's fowling piece.

The gun, however, should not be left at home while making these excursions. For there is much food for it in the way of hawks, owls, etc., and, incidentally, this will prove splendid practice to improve marksmanship. A few boxes of shells expended in this manner will repay the effort a thousand times in the lives of useful birds which would otherwise be sacrificed to feed the ravenous broods of raptors and egg-stealers. It is pitiful to witness the number of game-bird nests destroyed every year by the detested crows and magpies. In spite of all efforts the latter bird is extending its range at an alarming rate. Ten years ago magpies were unknown in this

vicinity. Now they may be noticed at any and all times.

Young dogs are greatly benefited by a little time spent upon them in the spring. Opportunities to handle them while pointing are obtained, which are quite impossible during the shooting season. The birds are tame and will lie like stones until the handler is ready to flush them. Scent is usually very good as the air is more humid than in the dry parts of the year. Everywhere will be found song birds such as meadow larks. They are so numerous that the dog will soon realize that he is not expected to pay any attention to them.

Prairie chickens (sharp-tailed grouse) are the birds which give the best opportunities for dog-training in the spring. They are found in moderate to large packs. They do not pair off like the Hungarian partridges. Almost any morning or evening prairie chickens are to be found performing their mating rituals—the characteristic dance peculiar to these birds of the uncultivated lands. One can spend hours of the best of training on the pupil with the same pack of birds. It seems impossible to disturb them sufficiently to cause the chickens any alarm—provided the gun is kept silent. They always choose a slightly elevated piece of ground for their pow-wow, and will return to the exact spot year after year. Strangely enough I have known their dancing grounds to be used regularly after it had been turned up with the plough and several crops removed from it. In fact I have seen young wheat literally trampled out of existence for several square rods on specially favoured locations.

But with the young dog it is better to select a ground where there is a little more cover. Although there may be two or three score of birds around you, nearly all can be flushed singly. Could better practice be imagined for any dog? Even the experienced or veteran dog of many shooting seasons, has to attend strictly to his business to detect the scent of a single bird and mark him with accuracy, the while the whole atmosphere must be permeated with the scent of the chicken packs in general.

If, during a work-out of this description, the novice handler becomes sentimentally inclined, he might have all his fears of wrongful disturbance allayed. For it is impossible to separate the birds. A visit to the same spot an hour after the chickens have all been flushed, will find the whole pack in conference with unabated vigor.

This is all good work towards steadying a dog. But to teach him to

range well, the Hungarian partridge is supreme. In pairs you will find them, often lying tight where there is scarcely enough cover to hide a mouse. So wonderful is their protective coloring that it is almost impossible to see them until they move. They may be anywhere in a field, often rising from the most unexpected places, but always with an explosive bound that puts them into top speed immediately they leave the ground. They get out of sight so rapidly that the average dog soon realizes that it is useless to give chase.

Spring work has much to recommend it as a diversion. Out with young dogs you may steady them. In the case of the older dogs you give them a little practice and a great deal of pleasure. As for the sportsman, he may gather a wealth of information and much healthful recreation.

But don't forget to allow the birds to enjoy complete solitude once the nests are started.

AN OLD TIMER DEAD.

One of the landmarks of Montreal dogdom was removed by the death of Thomas Moore, on Saturday, May 2nd. Mr. Moore had reached the ripe old age of 93 years and for some time past had been slowly losing his strength.

Wire Fox Terriers were his favorite breed and quite a few good ones sported the Moore colors at many shows under the kennel name, "Donnington." Probably the last time that a team of Mr. Moore's terriers were shown at Toronto, was at the Live Stock Show under the late James Mortimer.

Mr. Moore was buried in Mount Royal cemetery, and the faithful followers of the Montreal fancy were prominent at the funeral.

Mr. Moore was born at Shardlow, England. He served as a captain in the 18th Hussars in Africa, after resigning he came to Canada and established himself at Winnipeg. During his residence in Manitoba, he was for many years resident magistrate at Lake Francis. He was one of a commission of three appointed by the Manitoba Government to draft the first game laws in the prairie provinces.

Tall, straight as a reed the late Mr. Moore was readily noticed at all the Montreal dog shows; abrupt yet kindly, strong in his likes and dislikes—a man of strong character and generous to a fault. His associates at the time when the Donnington Kennels were in the hey day of their popularity were the Lynns—Jim and Dan, the Lyndons,

Charlie and Jack, Arthur Atkinson, Dr. and Mrs. Webster. In our "Bob" Ross, the late Mr. Moore had untold and unlimited confidence and for Mr. Ross our departed friend had the utmost respect.

As a judge of "Wires," Mr. Moore was a stickler for hard honest jackets plus quality and character and bad shoulders, legs or feet were an abomination to him.

Around 1918 his kennels were burned down and he practically lost all his breeding stock. However, with the help of his friends the kennels were restocked to a certain strength, the Strachan's, Jim and Andrew, with Dr. and Mrs. Webster, furnishing the kennel with some of their best Wires. From this start Mr. Moore kept on until his eyes began to fail him. Success followed the "Donningtons" and towards the end, a bitch was bred that was good enough to sell Captain Shaw McKean, who brought her out at New York where she touched the high places in strong competition.

By the death of Mr. Moore, dogdom in this country loses one of its stalwarts, and our sympathies go out to those of his family who are mourning his loss.

DOGS AND 1000 YEARS AGO

Although there is little or no authentic historical record of distinctive breeds of dogs in the days of long ago, we do know that the Ancient Briton, clothed in sheepskin and armed with a club, made use of dogs in his search for food. The love and cultivation of a dog is not therefore of recent date; there were doubtless dog-breeders here when cave and forest life predominated. There may have been dog-shows, but the chances are that there were more fights than shows, for those ancient British dogs were large and high-spirited animals.

The Romans brought us civilization and in return we gave or sold them dogs. Perhaps our blue-painted ancestors sometimes "sold them a pup," but they must have been fairly honest, for their dogs are named by the old historians as being among the most important exports of Britain. It is a pity that no-one wrote the life of an early British dog. We might then have obtained valuable hints on their training with sheep—for sheep rearing was one of our ancestor's principal occupations. Interesting stories of the adventures of British dogs in Eastern lands, where they were taken by the Phoenicians and the Romans, would also have been available. But even without a written dog-story we can imagine how proud a prince in far off Palmyra must have been when a British dog came to his Court. "That is a dog from Britain, the only one of its kind in Palmyra," we can hear him saying with much pride. "The finest dog in the world!"

We do not know how the early Briton treated his dog; but we can guess how he fed him. Probably the hunter's dog, like the hunter himself, was ravenously hungry most of the time and his zeal and daring in the chase were greater because he knew that unless the wild boar or deer were caught, there would be no supper for him or his master. In

those days food was the main object of pursuit and while to-day it is of great importance to mankind, there are other things to be sought after. It may be that the desire to have something more than food makes present day life so strenuous. But although our human wants have increased, a dog's needs do not seem to have changed very much. To him food is still an important interest in his life and, when we consider what a dog does for us, how he admires us and helps to cheer us up when we are down-hearted, it is not unreasonable to determine that he shall, at any rate, be given the food he likes and the food which is good for him.

The Ancient Briton's dog could pick up a rabbit when there was nothing else to be had, but the average home dog is usually without means of adding to its menu. He looks to us to provide him with proper food and in this respect the dog with a good owner has the advantage over his primitive forbears. If Caractacus could pay a visit to a modern dog-biscuit factory he would be as much amazed as he must have been when he saw Rome for the first time. "All this for dogs?" he would exclaim in amazement. "Surely the dog of today is fortunate in his owners!"

If he went to a Dog Show he would see the result of the scientific breeding and feeding of dogs and would be wonder-struck at the magnificent animals on view; he would marvel at their glossy coats, glistening teeth and alertness; their general appearance of well-being. His first question would be "What do you feed them on?" Then he would remember his visit to the Dog-Biscuit Bakery and cause and effect would be apparent to him. He would be "on to it" like a terrier on a rat.
