PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION AND DOG SHOW RULES

I hereby give notice, that at the Annual Meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., I shall move the following Amendment to the Constitution—"That, Article 7—Meetings—be amended by the addition of the following paragraph:

6. "Any contract entered into by the Board of Directors, and or any Amendment passed at the Annual General Meeting, shall not be cancelled or rescinded until the next Annual General Meeting, except in case of emergency when a complete vote of all the Directors shall be taken by registered mail."

Mr. James D. Strachan,

Pursuant to Dog Show Rule 64, Amendments, I will move at the next Annual Meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club Inc., that Dog Show Rules 37, 39 and 41 be deleted in their entirety and that Dog Show Rule 36 be amended to read as follows:

"Rating—the number of Championship points allotted at any show, shall depend upon the number of dogs actually benched, as follows: not less than 500 dogs shall count 5 points; not less than 400 dogs shall count 4 points; not less than 300 dogs shall count 3 points; not less than 200 dogs shall count 2 points; not less than 100 dogs shall count 1 point."

In support of the Proposed Amendment, I hold that the time is now ripe for all Canada to be governed by the same scale of Championship rating. It is absolutely unfair to clubs like Hamilton, Welland, London, Brantford,

Windsor, etc., when they have struggled as they do in order to secure a twopoint rating, whilst shows in other centres outside of Ontario with only a few more dogs benched, may obtain a five-point rating. To me the present arrangement is totally unfair and it does not offer any encouragement to the smaller Clubs in this Province at all, so I for one, feel that a great injustice is being done to us, and I know it is the feeling of lots more than me, so let's hope we may be able to pass this desirable Amendment.

Meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Incorporated

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., was held at the Club's Offices, 25 Melinda Street, Toronto, on Thursday evening, November 19th, 1931.

Brig.-Gen. C. M. Nelles, the President, presided. Directors present were: H. A. Wilson, Col. J. N. MacRae, Major Ward Wright, R. L. Wainright, A. Donaldson, R. Tyrwhitt, F. W. Walkerdine.

The minutes of the previous Directors' Meeting were read, and it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

That, the minutes be adopted as

The Secretary reported that Lt.-Col. G. F. McFarland was out of town on

Col. McFarland had submitted the following report on the matter of the American Kennel Club and Judges' Licenses which had been referred to him for attention :-

Board of Directors,

Dear Sirs :-

"At a recent meeting of your Directors a resolution was passed and referred to myself in the matter of negotiations with the American Kennel Club on the subject of Judges' Licenses.

"I had hoped to be able to arrange a personal interview with the Officers of the American Kennel Club, but found that to be impossible. I have, however, had some correspondence with the President and the Secretary of the American Kennel Club, and in view of the facts that exist I do not know that a personal interview is now neces-

"This matter appears to have been first brought up by the American Kennel Club early in the year 1930 in the form of a request to the Canadian Kennel Club to enter into a reciprocal agreement by which the Canadian Kennel Club would not allow anyone to judge in Canada who was barred in the United States, and vice versa. The answer of our Club was an acknowledgement and an intimation that if and when a system of licensing Judges was adopted by the Canadian Kennel Club the reciprocal arrangement would probably be entered into.

"As you know, such a system was adopted by the Canadian Kennel Club at its last Annual Meeting, and the matter of its relations with the American Kennel Club came up by the action of the Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club on July 23rd, 1931, in granting Licenses to certain residents of the

United States who are barred from judging at American Kennel Club Shows. This action was protested by a letter written by the Secretary of the American Kennel Club dated 11th of August, 1931. I was asked to report on the matter to the meeting of the Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club on September 17th, 1931, and you will see my letter dated September 16th, which was submitted to that meeting and in which I expressed the opinion that the 'Reciprocity' Agreement between the two Clubs does not affect the matter, but that it is purely a matter of policy.

Our Directors not having taken any action, the American Kennel Club have now actually refused licenses to certain of our members who are in perfectly good standing with the Canadian Kennel Club, and these applicants have been informed by the American Kennel Club that such refusal is no reflection on them, but is simply by way of reprisal to the action of the Canadian Kennel Club in granting Licenses to members of the American Kennel Club who are barred by that organization.

"Personally, I think that the only possible reasonable action for our Club to take is to accede to the request of the American Kennel Club and refer all applications for Judges' Licenses in Canada presented by members of the American Kennel Club to that body for their endorsation that each applicant is in good standing with the American Kennel Club as far as a judging License is concerned. I am informed that this was the practice adopted by the American Kennel Club up to the time when they suspended granting Licenses, that is, all applications received by the American Kennel Club from residents of Canada were referred to the Canadian Kennel Club for approval. This seems to me to be the only reasonable solution of the difficulty. We should also suspend any Licenses which we have granted to disqualified residents of the United States."

The following report on the matter of registering unregistered champions was submitted :-

"The Directors,

"Canadian Kennel Club,

"Gentlemen:

"On Monday, October 26th, I went to Ottawa, and on Tuesday afternoon I had an interview with the Hon. Mr. Weir, The Minister of Agriculture at the Federal Building with reference to the registration of our unregistered Champions.

"I found the Hon. Mr. Weir not difficult to convince that it was to the advantage of Canadian breeders that these unregistered Champions should be available in the breeding kennel.

"His final words to me were:-

"I will go carefully into the matter. I can see no objection to the registration providing a three generation authentic pedigree can be produced. It certainly appears to me from the arguments you have brought forward, that the registering of the unregistered Champions must work out to the advantage of future Canadian dogs.

"After leaving Mr. Weir I went to the Records Office and found Mr. Brant not in favor of the registration, and also found out, that Mr. Pym's 1929 amendment had been turned down there.

"I believe Mr. Weir to be a constructive breeder and am therefore of opinion that he will overcome the Records Office destructive policy in their objejction to the registration of our unregistered Champions.





THE SHETLAND SHEEPDOG

THE SHETLAND SHEEPDOG

VERY few people seem to have a really clear or perfect idea of the correct type of Shetland Sheepdog, therefore, this picture of the lovely youngsters who played so great a part in the history and rapid rise to general interest to breeders at this time. Miss E. P. Humphrey's (a Descendant of Simon de Mountfort of Magne Carta Iame), was probably the first breeder to sponsor this breed in the South of England, and her great friend, Miss E. E. Sparrow, then of Lingfield, Surrey, England, now of "Wizbang," St. Jean, P.Q., was one of the next, and it is from "Mountfort" breeding that most of the present-day Champions on both sides of the Atlantic are descended—chiefly Ch. Specks of Mountfort. This dog is the founder of the noted Eltham Park Shelties and the "Carveliard" Shelties both of England, while he also is sire of Ch. Eurega of Eltham Park (late Peter Pan of Mountford) and Ancestor of many of the other Shelties in the States, and also of the "Sheltieland" Kennels.

He was grandsire of the wonderful English Champion Gawaine of Carveliard, who has sired three years running, the different bitches who took the Championships at Crufts and E.K.C. shows. Surely a record for any breed this, and the reason why all the bitches shipped to "Wizbang" were first mated to Ch. Gawaine of Carveliard. The size of this breed varies rather according to the fancier—those who wish the dog for sheepwork (at which they prove themselves adept), prefer their dogs at around 16 inches in height, while those breeding for the show bench have elected II to 12½ inches (with an inch either way) as their standard, but the American fancier is very keen on the minature specimens. As regards type—the nearer to the Collie type they are, the better,



but one must bear in mind that this is not an old breed of the show bench and has been bred from the small Shetland Collie, or small Highland Collie, and thus shows a remarkable degree of intelligence and at times, the shy retiring nature of the Scots. The catalogue of Crutts, 1929, on page 404, gives a picture of Ashbank Fairy, the Changion birch bred by Mr. Graham Clark of Aberdeen, who took a Championship at 2000 Clark Rennel Club Show. Sire, Ch. Blacberry of Clerwood, a shelice isn't a descendant of either Chemure and the cause he's of both! Downfield Olaf, America's latest import, is also sired by Ch. Blacberry of Clerwood. This picture of Ashbank Fairy resembles very much he latest Wizzbang Champion "Ch. Wizbang Joy," save Joy is a golden sable and Fairy a black sable and Joy has a lar better ear-carriage, so one proceeds to the E.K.C. Stud records. Ashbank Fairy is out of Ashbank Jean, she sired by Rounie of Mountfort, who happens to be dam of Wizbang Godiva (late Godiva of Mountfort) who happens to be dam of Wizbang Godiva (late Godiva of Mountfort) who happens to be dam of Wizbang Joy. The older the dog, the heavier the ear. Therefore, it is greatly to the English Breeder's credit, that with his usual perseverance, he has at last reached an era where 9 out of 10 Shetlets have a good ear-carriage. The Crufts Catalogue gives them the Club description of the breed (future judges please note the following description):

Like most of the animals associated with the Shetland Isles the Shetland Sheepdog is very small. Some of them do not measure more than 12 inches at the shoulder, but they manage to herd the sheep. Although the standards suggest that they should be approximately show collies and the sheep of the animals associated with the Shetland Isles the Shetland Sheepdog is very small. Jessica of Mousa, the runner-up, failed to the winner in eye, foreface and coat, but she is a really good bitch with a lovely outline and an example of what action ought to be." There are several lovely sons and daughters of English Ch. Gawaine of Carveliard being held for future showing in the States, including Wizzbang Gold Gawaine, and Wizbang Fairie Queen (out of Ch. Queen of Mountford) and Wizbang Easter Hero (out of Callab Mor) and last but not least, the lovely Ch. Wizbang Joy. Therefore it is to be hoped that in 1932 and 33, the Canadian flag will top the mast over the American entry, as Miss Sparrow is confident that she has at least, one who should grow on sufficiently to beat the hitherto unbeaten Ch. Wee Laird.

The "Royal" Show

There have been many shows held in Canada during the last fifty years, but the National Kennel Club Show of 1931 must be credited with being one of the most colorful shows ever held in Canada. It is true that there have been other shows with more dogs benched, but for quality this show had everything stopped. The building itself was perfection for air, light and exhibitor and exhibit comfort this show was outstanding. When it is considered that the best winning dogs of the United States, which really means the best that England has sent across, and when it is remembered that the famous Wire Fox Terrier, "Ch. Pendley Calling of Blarney," twice best dog in show all breeds at New York Show, was one of the contestants, the quality of the show will become more apparent.

Always a colorful show because of its association with the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair, which is the social event of the Toronto year, the show this year was quite distinguished by long visits by His Excellency, Earl of Bessborough, Governor-General of Canada—who is patron of the Canadian Kennel Club—and his party. Hon. W. D. Ross, Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario and his party were also interested visitors on several occasions during the show.

Unfortunately, Mrs. L. B. Daley failed to keep her appointment to judge the Boston Terriers and this was possibly the only hitch that marred an otherwise perfectly pleasant fixture. Judge Joseph Quirk was first to start judging, and he must have made an instantaneous hit with his large gallery, if one is to judge by the hearty cheering which greeted his placings in every class. A Toronto ringside never asks many questions concerning dogs or owners, but is always content to cheer for whatever it decides is the best dog, and a ringside often "knows its dogs" better than it is given credit for. Dr. J. E. Reddin was next to function, and it was obvious that he knew his job, and was there to do it. Exhibitors with ideas of their own had to forsake them temporarily and been obliged to handle their dogs according to the judges' instructions. Watching Dr. Reddin judge his sporting breeds gave one the impression that he was both conscientious and com-

Rev. F. J. Heaney did not take long to sort out a small but choice entry of Bull Terriers. Robt. A. Ross got a start on Collies, and there were none too good and none too bad for careful handling on the part of the judge.
Gus V. Glebe, an old Ontario boy started on terriers, and he seemed to feel quite at home with his feet planted on his native heath, the other judge, T. P. Ritchie was not in the line-up for the first day's judging, but when he took over his ring on the afternoon of the second day, he gave a good account of himself.

Sometimes ringside judges exceed their privileges in the shows and the writer noticed this condition in bloom around the Toy ring, and a complaint made and properly investigated might easily have led to exemplary disciplinary measures having the necessary deterring merit. There is no excuse for any one indulging in insulting remarks at a ringside, there can be no excuse for those who "don the ermine" themselves occasionally indulging in the questionable pastime. Exhibitors know when they make their entries who their dogs will be judged by, they contract to take a judge's opinion, and nothing more is offered than that, therefore it should be accepted as such. If there is any complaint to be made let it be made through the proper channels but the proper channel is not through the media of the "Anvil Chorus," around the ringside of a dog show.

Perhaps it may be of interest to Kenned and Bench readers to know that the dog show was held on the second floor of what has been aptly named "The Million Dollar Horse Palace," and as the name implies it is safe to say that there is not one solitary great show stable in the world that can in any way approach the splendid stabling now available for the accomodation of horse flesh at the Royal Winter Fair, where there are 600 loose boxes and over 500 stalls, wonderful ventilating and heating systems, hot and cold water convenient to all stalls, lounge for lady exhibitors, the stalls and boxes are gray and black, the doors of the building itself are red and black and the contrasts of color are delightful to the eye. In all our travels in Canada we have not seen dogs benched on a large scale in so magnificent a building. In fact we hope that the same quarters will be available in future to all Toronto shows.

At the close of the show Mrs. J. J. Cawthra graciously handed out the handsome trophies to the fortunate exhibitors amidst the unstinted applause of the large gallery present. The battle for supremacy was bravely fought by the Wire Fox Terrier "Pendley

Calling of Blarney," the English Setter "Blue Dan of Happy Valley," the old English Sheepdog "Snowflake," the Chow Chow "Chia Wan's Perfection." and the Yorkshire Terrier "Haslingden Dandy Dinty," it was a delightful struggle to watch, each dog had its supporters, but the real contest was with the three dogs named first, possibly "Pendley Calling" has never appeared to better advantage than she did on this occasion. "Blue Dan of Happy Valley" and "Snowflake" were put down as nicely as human hands could present them, presently the gallery sensed that one judge was for the Wire, and the other was for the Setter, who would it eventually be? Both dogs were sent down the ring again for a final inspection of their action, and both responded nicely, the Wire tripping along in perfect rythm, and apparently conscious of the fact that it was really up to herself if she won, the judges agreed, and so the great little conqueror of New York two years' in succession was crowned Queen of the Royal" for 1931.

Major J. J. Cawthra, the president of the National Kennel Club, together with his officers and members, are to be congratulated at this time, and in this respect Capt. H. Dudley-Waters, the show Secretary, must be particularly mentioned. To all concerned we would say you have achieved many successes during the last nine years, make the tenth year the best of all to mark the maturing of the National Kennel Club.



Woodthorpe Honey," Imp., now the property of David Shepherd, West Springfield, Mass., was sent to Holyoke show so that Mr. Shepherd could determine how good his puppy was and this youngster, who was born on April 15th this year romped home to his new master with the Best Cairn in show ribbon tucked under his collar.

FAULTS AND VIRTUES

At the October meeting of the Bull Terrier Club of New England, held in the University Club, Boston, that past master of the "White Uns," T. Dickson Smith was the guest speaker of the evening. The faults were pointed out and described, the virtues were frankly stressed.

After the speaker had resumed his seat, it was found that according to Mr. Smith's opinion, the most common faults of the modern Bull Terrier are poor feet, unworkmanlike front, lack of foreface and underjaw, large light eye, lack of balance or symmetry, according to the poundage of the animal, whilst gait was worthy of more than usual consideration.

Mr. Smith's demonstrated lecture was most instructive and enthusiastically received by the members, who at the close of the meeting passed a hearty vote of thanks to their guest speaker.

Now is the time to commence making new resolutions on behalf of that wonderful 1932 puppy, and in this connection Mrs. Leiper, that good fancier of the Scottish Terrier has beaten the gun and purchased "Haldon Rosemary" from Dr. Batt, of Guelph, Ont., in order to have some new blood, and we hope some real good Scotties ready for the 1932 circuits. This bitch is showing in whelp to "Ch. Jhelumm Juilan" (Imp.), and is expected to arrive at the "Calumet Kennels" any day now, we hope in due time she will present her new owner with a litter of "good 'uns." In addition, Mrs. Leiper has purchased from the Barrack Hill Kennels of Geo. D. Bailey, Ottawa, Ont., a very promising brood bitch, and a bitch puppy of the Wire-haired Fox Terrier breed, also "Kegworth Kim" another of this breed from a local fancier. This breed is a new venture with this fancier, and one that will no doubt prove successful. In addition to the above this kennel is the home of several fine "Scotties" comprising of the blood lines of "Ch. Ellwyn Chiel," "Ch. Eglington Lairdie" and the imported "Jock of Calgary." Very little has been heard of Mrs. Leiper so far, yet she has been quietly feeling her way for the past two years, and during that time has shipped quite a number of Scotties throughout Canada and the U.S.A., and made many friends for the "Diehard." Dodsworth's, West Highland White "Cragside Wynnchat" Best Terrier Puppy and also Best Senior Puppy in Show. Mrs. Lennards' French Bulldog "Nougat of Taplow" recently imported from England was awarded Best Non-Sporting. Best Working Puppy and Best Working and Best Novice in the Show going to J. H. Cobley's German Shepherd, "Rex." Harry MacKenzie's very promising young English Setter Bitch "Marvel of Bank Bay" carried off Best Sporting Puppy and Best Sporting. The same owner with "Miracle of Bank Bay' picked off the prize for the Best Junior Puppy in the Show. In the competition for the challenge trophy, Mrs. T. H. Hayward of Langford, and Mrs. Hedley Peek of Deep Cove are tied with twelve points each.

After the general business of the last monthly meeting of the Victoria City Kennel Club was concluded, the judging of three English Setters, namely, "Monte Carlo Topsy", "Racketts Nell", and "Rose" from Dr. Daw's Kennel, by three well known authorities took place. The first judge placed them as follows: "Rose", Topsy", "Nell", the second, "Topsy", "Nell", "Rose", and the third, "Rose", "Nell", "Topsy". Each judge gave the reasons for his placings which caused lots of friendly argument between the judges, and the Club members. When Dr. Daw was asked his opinion, he agreed with the placings of the first judge. To finish off the evening, Dr. Daw gave a very interesting talk on the English Setter, which was very instructive and greatly appreciated by all. Here I might say a few words about that grand old bitch "Monte

Carlo Topsy" who despite her nine years of age, looked and acted her part just as well as any of her kennel mates. She possesses a wonderful body, coat and an abundance of feathering, and a very clean cut head. She is the proud Granddam of the sensational "Blue Dan of Happy Valley" that has gone so many times Best of All Breeds, both in Canada and in the United States.

Harry MacKenzie has just brought in from walk, two very promising young English Setter bitches, namely, "Miracle of Bank Bay" and "Marvel of Bank Bay," both made their debut at the Parlor Show already referred to. These puppies are the result of the mating of "Crossfell" and "Isobel of Bank Bay" the formers sire is "Ch. "Groeswen Rock" and the latters "Old Pal O'Mine". The imported "Pennie Patsy" is the dam of them both. As will be observed these puppies are line bred and prove that it pays to stick to the "family tree." I understand "Marvel", like the rest of the litter will soon have a new home.

In order to have more accommodation for her dogs, that good lady fancier, Mrs. F. J. O. Woods has purchased a nice piece of ground, and erected a new home and kennels on the Island Highway, four miles from Victoria. The new home and kennels will be known as "Ouandalla," and the German Shepherds and Cocker Spaniels that originate from there will carry that name. The latest addition to the latter breed is a very promising young bitch "Lady Roman of Quandalla" purchased from Mrs. Roman of Seattle. The sire of this being "Sands Spring Red Rust" the dog that went Best of Breed at Victoria last May against thirty others. dam is "Ch. Roman's Pure Gold." If breeding counts for anything, the goods should be here. In German Shepherds, "Abarard Minka Von Fesha" is the latest addition. This bitch is the daughter of "Ch. Coltness Flying Dutchman" and "Fesha of Arrydon" and was bred by that master breeder, J. Davies of Vancouver, B.C. "Minka" is a wonderful show bitch and is gifted with a "million dollar gait," she has been shown fearlessly during her puppyhood, and since maturity, and has never been unplaced, she was purchased to fill the vacant place left by "Der-Kuss" who died while nursing a litter, which litter was hand fed, and raised to strong healthy puppies which were eventually sold for a good price.

Another fancier who has moved further afield is Mrs. J. Smales, the proprietor of the "Kinross Kennels," which has been the home of "Scotties" for the past few years, the Kennel is now shared with Cairn Terriers. The imported "Jock of Calgary" still reigns supreme amongst the Scotties here, although he is getting somewhat grey around the muzzle, he is still the same game old "Diehard" and still doing his duty at stud. The Cairn Terriers in this kennel are all imported stock, and the true type with great coats, good bone and substance, and above all they are game to the core, and all good showers.

Major H. M. Reynolds that great supporter of the Springer Spaniel is very enthusiastic over a recent litter from his favourite bitch "Ch. Judy of Osborne," consisting of fire dogs and three bitches, which have just reached the interesting age of two months. He predicts a great future for this litter both on the bench and in the field, for both the sire and dam are excellent with the gun and will retrieve on either land or water. Situated on the shore of the beautiful Esquimalt Harbour where there are ducks in abundance, with several acres of wooded land behind him, he spends most of his spare time with his dogs and gun, without going away from home, with the result that his dogs commence their training, just as soon as they leave the nest.

Approximately one hour's run by motor from Victoria, along the West Saanich Road to the end of the Saanich Peninsula, will bring one to the "Widbrook Kennels" which is nestled in a grove of shade trees, and surrounded by a thorn hedge, such as one sees in the old land. Here is the home of real Dandie Dinmounts and splendid Dachshunds, to the number of well over fifty in all stages of development, enjoying life to the fullest extent in their well appointed kennels and runs. The proprietor, Mrs. Hedley-Peek, who feeds, grooms and does practically everything that is required to be done around a kennel, is busy from dawn till dark, yet she is never too busy to welcome visitors. Mrs. Hedley-Peek is a dog lover in the true sense of the word, and nothing gives her more pleasure than to show her dogs, and to talk "dog" to anyone who is at all interested. All the foundation stock was brought out from England via the Panama Canal by this good fancier two years ago. Since that time, three of her "Dandies" and two "Dacks" have won the coveted prefix of Champion. Many of her puppies have found homes in Canada and in the U.S.A. During the past summer no fewer than sixteen puppies were shipped out from this kennel. Mrs. Peek is doing all in her power to popularize both of these breeds, for she believes the "Dandies" and the "Dacks" are just about as game breeds of dogs as anyone could wish for, and at the same time they are wonderful companions, and very easy to manage. I would not be surprised to hear of this fancier going in strongly for the Sealyham Terrier, for on my last visit, she intimated that she was seriously considering the matter of importing a stud, as included in her recent shipment from England were two bitches of this breed, one of which was mated to the imported "Ch. Colvic Topper" and a nice litter was the result.

Situated within a stone's throw of the "Widbrook Kennels" is the home of our old friend, W. C. C. Burns and his famous "Burnside" Springer Spaniels. Here also is a welcome for all, in fact, it is written all over the house and also the chimney pot, so don't fail to visit him when in this direction. At the present time he can show you a litter of nine of the most promising puppies that "Thelma of Avandale" is nursing, who boast of "Int. Ch. Lil'e Messenger Boy" for a Grandad. There are also two very promising puppies by "Wynne of Avandale" ex "Flints Flirt of Burnside." The latter being half sister to "Vale of Burnside," the sensational bitch that went Best of Breed at New York this year. "Brake of Burnside," another good one bred in this kennel, has proved himself a worthy sire and is being retained to fill the place of "Wynne," who passed on to the "happy hunting ground" this last summer. The loss of this dog was a great blow to friend Burns, as he proved himself to be an excellent stud force, a wonder with the gun, and above all a great companion. During his stay in B. C. this good fancier has been a great supporter of all the shows within a reasonable distance, and his entries have always been in the money, usually on top, and he has done much to popularize the Springer in the West. In the portion of his wonderful pear orchard not occupied by Springers, is a neat chicken run and house which is occupied by a grand flock of White Leghorns. This side line (eggs) is possibly no doubt responsible for the excellent coats and bone possessed by the Burnside Springers.

When driving along the Island Highway just beyond Colwood Station and roughly eight miles from Victoria, there is a modest little sign tacked to a fence bearing the inscription "Alandale." A

peep behind this sign will disclose the neat little home of Mrs. T. H. Hayward and her kennel of Boston Terriers. You will possibly be disappointed at not being greeted by a pack of Bostons when you reach the house, for very often when one visits certain kennels there is not the slightest sign of any dogs around. However, all that is necessary is the usual tap on the door of the house, and Mrs. Hayward will instantly appear, accompanied by, at least, half a dozen of her children (Bostons) as she calls them. At the present time the inmates of this kennel number eighteen, including a litter of seven just recently arrived. The sire of this litter is "Hi Born Intruder." and the dam is "Lady Peggy." During the past few months puppies from this kennel have been in great demand, and extra broods have been purchased in order to take care of the orders now placed. Amongst the latest additions being "Principes Sheba," who has just weaned a nice litter by "Ch. Mushon Peter Blink." "Society Sue," another prospective brood, is a daughter of 'Lady Dazzler" ex "Victoria Flash," the latter being a son of the famous "Int. Ch. Playfair Lets' Go." "Hollywood Lady," another inmate, is the daughter of "Lady Dazzler" ex "Hi ex "Hi Born Super Six." For breeding good, well marked, and good coated Bostons this lady fancier is hard to beat. During the past year representatives from this kennel have done remarkably well on the bench, the last win being Best Opposite Sex at Shawinigan Lake. Dogs from this kennel have annexed twelve points towards the challenge trophy offered by the Victoria City Kennel Club at their Winter Parlor Shows, which places them in first position, which position is shared by Mrs. Hedley-Peek. As well as being the home of good Bostons, this ranch is also the home of a flock of some hundreds of White Leghorns, which keep Mrs. Hayward, and also her "Hubby." on the jump from morn till night. Some three years ago the world's record laying hen was one of the Hayward flock, and one that the Haywards were responsible for raising.

The passing of our old and esteemed friend, Rev. Frederick Christmas, of Duncan, removes one of the oldest fanciers in B. C. He came to B. C. forty-one years ago and, being a keen supporter of any kind of clean sport, he soon made a host of friends. His particular fancy in dogs being Pointers and English Setters and until recent years very few shows were complete without entries of these breeds from him. On many occasions he donnéd the ermine with great satisfaction. The

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passing of this great sportsman will be regretted by all who knew him and I am sure they will join me in expressing the deepest regret to Mrs. Christmas and family.

Rather a severe blow has been aimed at the fanciers in Oak Bay, a superb of Victoria, B.C., by the Council passing a by-law which practically prevents them from keeping dogs for sale or for breeding purposes. In the first place the by-law requires breeders, or those having dogs for sale (no mention is made of the person keeping as many as he likes for pets or being a general nuisance in the neighborhood night and day) to be within a certain distance from any dwelling, in other words, he or she must have a block of land consisting of roughly two acres, which is nigh to being impossible, as most streets are surveyed with a lane at the rear. There is no doubt but what this rotten piece of legislation is aimed at the man who has invested heavily in canine stock in an attempt to produce something better, and at the same time obtain a fair return on his investment. The fact that cattle and horses are still kept in Oak Bay in considerable numbers is sufficient evidence that the above by-law is not rendered necessary by density of population.

Can anyone suggest a possible means of combating this legislation successfully? If so, I will be glad to hear from you.

Mrs. E. M. Vernon, of the "Saffron Kennels," Vernon, B.C., has advised me of the arrival of a litter of Golden Retrievers consisting of four dogs and two bitches, the sire of them being "Gilnockie Flyer" and the dam, "Ch. Dame Daphne." Also that she intends to import another bitch from England

These bitches, "Dutch Girl of Ware" and "Cinderella of Ware" have done considerable winning at many of the larger shows in England, the latter being placed first by Lt.-Col. Kyffin at Bristol the day before shipment. "Dutch Girl" is showing in whelp to that great dog, and possibly the best ever produced, "Ch. Lucky Star of Ware."

It is this fancier's intention to concentrate on the English type of Cocker entirely, and she surely is starting off with the best.

A daughter of this grand bitch will in the near future give her mother a good run. Harry does not believe in too large a kennel, but does believe in keeping a few good ones. ANOTHER AIREDALE FOR TORONTO

The "Rockley" Airedale Terrier Kennels at Toronto, whose destinies are controlled by the astute Sid Perkins. has been quite outstanding for the past several years in keeping the honest Airedale right in the limelight in Eastern Canada. As a matter of cold fact, the "Rockley" prefix is famous in this country for the general excellence of its inmates at all times, but in recent years many of England's best dogs have crossed the Atlantic tagged "Sid Perkins, Toronto, Canada," and because of their breeding and of Mr. Perkins' uncanny breeding plans, the imported dogs have became champions themselves and their progeny have also taken a large share of available championship certificates.

"Rockley Duplicate" is somewhere between Montreal and Toronto at the time of this writing and he is expected to arrive any time now. And just because Sid Perkins has bought the dog, the quality of his latest importation may quite easily be considered as a foregone conclusion. Sid's new dog is a son of "Ch. "Clee Courtier," "Devoncote Duchess," and is a Warland-Cragsman blood combination, the combination that has produced real Airedales for so many years. The dog is a youngster, too, having been born on May 14th, 1930, so whatever his credentials are, he will have all his life to justify Mr. Perkins' confidence in his latest purchase.

Looking Back Over Fifty Years

T may be interesting to many of your readers to receive from me some reminiscences and experiences of the Doggy World when looking back over a period of fifty years.

Surely I must have been born a lover of dogs. As long as I can remember I have always owned one or more, and now as I am growing old, I really don't know what I would do without them as pets and companions.

I love them, and what is more, I am sure they love me, too, and, consequently, I am satisfied with my fourfooted Irish friends.

My fancy has always been confined to the sporting classes, such as Pointers, all Setters-English, Irish and Gordons, also Spaniels. I have owned and bred quite a large number of winners in my time, but never shall I forget my first experience with one that I could really call my own-a livercolered Spaniel, who died with her puppies by the hands of a poisoner. Naturally, it nearly broke my boyish heart, but the gift of a brace of Spaniel pups from an officer of an English Regiment then stationed at London, helped to considerably offset the blow. I might mention here, that when the different regular regiments were stationed in Canada, the officers were, to a very large extent, titled gentlemen and when coming from England, brought out to this country, some very fine horses and some really well-bred dogs, which were principally of the sporting breeds, and when such officers would be removed to some other British possession, they would usually dispose of their dogs. I particularly mention this gift brace, as I broke them both to the gun afterwards.

One of them was of a type quite common then, but never seen now. It was somewhat of the build of an Irish Water Spaniel, but not so large in body, no top knot, or rat tail. It was a liver and white, beautifully ticked on the legs, and also on the body, with large liver spots, soft silky hair, and very small curls, with a head not unlike an English Setter, but not nearly so large-long muzzle, short ears. This dog might have been an English Water Spaniel, but in any case, it was the best Retriever that I have ever owned. He had a very distinct peculiarity-that of pointing game for a few seconds before flushing. The other dog was smooth-haired and more like the present Springer, but on a smaller scale. Upon finding game, he would leap up in the air about two feet, rush in and flush.

It has been perfectly remarkable how

the fancy has changed in respect to dogs. At one time, everybody wanted St. Bernards, rough or smooth; then either the Mastiff, Great Dane, Greyhound (no Russian Wolfhounds in the early days), Dalmatians-then called "Coach dogs" and every person who drove a fine span of horses, would have one running under the carriage. I fail to find any improvement in this breed and in fact, the old stock was much better in head, and was more evenly marked or spotted than our present day Dalmatians. Pugs were quite plentiful, as were the King Charles, Prince Charlie, and the beautiful Blenheim Spaniels, also the saucy little White Poodles, Curly and smoothhaired Pomeranians, and Pekingese. Chow Chows were unknown.

I think it was some time around 1874, that L. H. Smith of Strathroy, imported from the Kennels of Purcell Llewellin, England, the English Setter "Dart" in whelp to "Leicester", which he afterwards brought out. Champion Paris was one of this first litter, and he was mated to a female by the name of "Lill" owned by J. W. Humpredge, of London. That mating produced "Ch. London," a great Setter, whose picture is still shown on the front cover of the "American Field." "Ch. London" was acquired by Bailey Harrison, of Tilsonburg, who placed him in the hands of William Tallman for breaking, and the dog soon won at a Southern Field Trial. Mr. Harrison also owned "Ch. Dick Laverack" (by "Thunder ex Peeress").

I remember purchasing an English Setter Female which I named "Forest Fly," from A. Coster, Secretary of the Eastern Field Trial Club, Washington. Fly was by Luther Adams' imported "Ch. Drake," ex "Lathorops Luna." Drake was a "Prince" ex "Dora" product, and considered to be one of the finest field dogs of the time. I bred her to "Ch. Dick Laverack," and she presented me with a remarkable litter which became the foundation of the "Forest" Kennel. One of them, "Forest Dora," after winning at New York, was sold to Wm. Talliman, and she had the distinction of having a litter registered with the American Kennel Club, as follows: By "Ch. Foreman," "Ch. Royal Albert," ex "Forest Dora," and owned by Fred Crawford.

Three years ago, whilst attending New York Show, I was admiring an English Setter owned by Dr. James Hair, and I happened to mention "Dora's" name, and I was not altogether surprised when he told me, that the dog went right back to Dora, and that he had always had some of her stock in his kennels ever since. From a litter sister of Dora, when bred to "Prince Royal" (Pride of "Border" ex "Ruby"), came "Forest Fern," who had the great honor of having been the first dog to be registered in the Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book, her number being No. 1. From that early day to this date, some 100,000 additional registrations have been made. At this time, a number of dogs of the "Prince"-"Dora" strain, which included the Gladstone strain, were imported and were called Field Trial dogs. As the name did not seem at all suitable, Dr. Rowe, then Editor of The American Field, suggested the name Llewellin Setter, and that name has stood ever since. Arnold Burgess brought out "Druid." A number of dogs were also brought out from the Kennels of Mr. Laverack, one of which was "Ch. Thunder"

In 1876, during the Centennial Exhibition held at Philadelphia, Charles Lincoln, who was a resident of London at that time, was appointed Secretary and Superintendent of that great show, and John Davidson of Monroe, Michigan, was one of the judges. Here "Paris"—now a noted English Setter—won his Championship honors. That same fall or the fall of 1877, I am not sure which, the London Kennel Club held a dog show with Mr. Lincoln,

Superintendent, and Mr. Davidson as judge. The London Kennel Club erected a large frame building on Richmond Street, London, on the site of the present Grigg House of that city—the city which gave me my Kennel name of "Forest." This, I think, was my first dog show as an exhibitor, and I have been showing more or less ever since. Charles Lincoln often went to New York. The records will show that he had charge of the Westminster Kennel Club Shows at Madison Square for some years, or until his death, when he was succeeded by the late James Mortimer.

London had the honor of bringing out for the first time, many of the old Judges—among whom were Charles Mason, John Davidson, Major Taylor, James Mortimer, Harry Lacey, George Bell, and others.

About 1879, Dr. J. S. Niven of London, imported the Gordon Setter, "Ch. Blossom," bred by the Rev. J. Cumming Macdonald, in 1872. "Ch. Blossom" had won many prizes and Championship honors in England and in Scotland, and he continued his winnings in this country. He was a beautiful looking dog, well put up, and nicely marked, not at all of the heavy type so common at that time. I knew the dog well, as the Doctor and myself were near neighbours. The Doctor also had a Gordon Setter by the name of "Grouse." This dog was of the heavy type, but he produced some really splendid stock. J. Lorne Campbell of Simcoe, had a grand Gordon, in "Ch. Becky Sharpe" and Mr. Fraser of London also had some splendid specimens, many of whom I have shot

Dr. Niven's fancy, like my own, ran to the lighter type—a type known as the Malcolm standard type, which was introduced by a Dr. Malcolm and was a type that was much smaller and symmetrical than the Gordons of that time. However, I have owned quite a number of the heavy type also—"Ch. Guy," who was the same type as Blossom, was a big winner on the bench, and she was also good in the field, a beautiful black and mahogany in color, with perfect markings on head, chest and feet.

Well do I remember the great controversy in the sporting papers over the new fangled breed of dogs, Boston Terriers, some claiming that they were a cross between a Bull Terrier and a Pug. At London, I think it was in 1889, I was acting as Secretary and Superintendent of the show held by the London Kennel Club that Fall. A gentleman down in Boston, who was greatly interested in the new breed,

agreed to send a number to the show, provided classes were made for them. This was done, and some six or eight were sent up. This was some time before the breed was recognized by the American Kennel Club, and these were about the first classes ever made for Boston Terriers at any show in this country.

London and vicinity in those early days, was a great centre for dogs of all breeds. Col. Robt. McEwan had Collies; R. Gibson, the first President of the Canadian Kennel Club, had Fox Terriers; Frank Wheeler, rough and smooth Fox Terriers and Bull Terriers; Dr. Niven, Gordon Setters; Frank Glass, St. Bernards; Lorne Campbell, Gordon Setters; T. G. Davey, Wm. Wells, Dr. Kine, had Setters and Pointers; Gen. C. M. Nelles, Andy Laidlaw, Jim Luckwell, Geo. Douglas, had their Cocker Spaniels.

Looking back through the years, I don't see any great improvement from the old stock of English Setters. Many of the present time dogs have fairly good bodies, while others are long in loin, great large cumbersome flat heads, short in nose, and the occipital bone showing very prominently, and which the English and Gordon Setter should not have, a characteristic that surely belongs to the Pointer and the Irish Setter, and which should be well developed in these breeds. On the other hand, the Irish Setter has very much improved over the heavy short nosed, thick skulled type of the old days. This improvement has come with the narrow heads, the long nose and showing the oblong flatness on both sides of the skull, high brows and the occipital protuberance well defined; narrow front, deep chest, well tucked up. In fact, a high stationed lathy dog. The Gordons are away off, both in type, color and markings, which markings should be on the lips, cheeks and throat, with a spot over the eyes and

I placed a fairly good one at New York State Fair about four years ago, and I noticed that the same dog repeated the win at Madison the following spring. Pointers as a whole, are not quite as good as some of the old Westminster Kennel Dogs, quite a number of present-day dogs being thick in head, long in loin, short in nose, and not showing the round flatness of the skull on sides, nor the occipital proturberance so characteristic of the pointer. In my show managing days, I could always depend upon a large entry of Cocker and Field Spaniels, but I can't see any great improvement in these breeds, but I consider that they are breeding them altogether too small and making them incapable of being used in the field as gun dogs, where nature intended them to shine. How long would some of our present day winners last, or be of any use whatever, either in the field or in the water after game? I council Cocker breeders to give the breed a chance and to support the Cocker of around twenty-eight pounds.

Along in the early eighties, a large number of Western Fanciers and others, claimed that the American Kennel Club was using very arbitrary means in the transactions of the business of the club to their detriment, and in consequence, decided to form a new club, to be known as the National Kennel Club, in opposition to the American Kennel Club. There was considerable controversy, and any number of discussions appeared in the Eastern and Western sporting papers, and feeling ran very high indeed. Canadians 'stood pat" but they received any number of circulars which offered inducements from each Club to join up. and it must not be overlooked, that the Canadian fanciers at that time, carried considerable weight in the affairs of the doggy world. Our sympathies at that time were, to a very large extent, with the Western people, and our favor was capable of making much difference to the Club receiving it, but it was quite astonishing how such small affairs may grow into great importance. Walking down to the old Tecumseh House, London, one day, I was accompanied by T. G. Davey and Frank Wheeler, and we were discussing the formation of the National Kennel Club which was to function in opposition to the existing American Kennel Club, and it was then that I suggested the formation of a Canadian Kennel Club. The idea was further discussed at a meeting of a number of dog fanciers called for the purpose of visiting the New York Show the following February, together with their dogs. The following, as near as I can recall, were present-Col. Robert McEwan, Richard Gibson, T. G. Davey, Lorne Campbell, Frank Wheeler, George Douglas, Gen. Chas. M. Nelles, and C. A. Stone, and it was at this meeting that the Canadian Kennel Club was practically formed, with Richard Gibson, President, and the writer Secretary. Col. McEwan, T. G. Davey, Frank Wheeler, Geo. Douglas and myself, were appointed a Committee to wait on the American Kennel Club, which was then housed at '44 Broadway, New York City, during the holding the New York Bench Show. At the meeting in New York, Col. Mc-Ewan did most of the talking, and in-

formed the meeting, that we considered ourselves as fanciers of a Foreign country, and would not join with either Club, and that we had decided to form a Kennel Club of our own, to be known as The Canadian Kennel Club. At a subsequent meeting held in New York, arrangements were made whereby among other very important matters that were transacted, the American Kennel Club agreed to recognize the dog show wins and the disqualifications made by the Canadian Kennel Club, and the Canadian Kennel Club agreed to reciprocate. This agreement stood for some years, but later it was abrogated by the American Kennel Club for some reason, or reasons which I have never heard explained by anyone.

During my visit to New York at that time, I was officially appointed on the staff of the American Field, by Dr. Rowe, the Editor, and I was instructed to take charge of all Canadian business for the paper. This position I held for about two years, then I moved to Toronto to take over another position, and so I resigned, but I continued my connection as Canadian Correspondent for several years afterwards.

About 1889, the London Kennel Club formed a joint stock company, each member taking \$100 worth of stock for the purpose of erecting a dog show building, which was built on the grounds of the Western Fair. It was furnished with the latest type of benching, and all the other appliances suitable for holding a first-class show. The building was opened the same year, myself being Secretary and Superintendent. The following spring, I moved to Toronto, and that fall I was appointed Secretary and Superintendent, and so helped to direct the furnishing of the present dog show building of the Toronto National Exhibition, and it has done service ever since. I held that position for some years. The dog show building at London some vears afterwards, was burnt down without any insurance-consequently the boys lost the money they had invested in it. In those days, we had no ornamental fixtures on our Dog Show Committees-the kind that do all the talking and fault-finding. Everyone had to take his coat off and get to work, and it was often amusing to see members of our Club, Doctors, Lawyers, Bankers and prominent business men doing their share as "spealers" outside the show building in order to entice the public to come in and see the dogs. Their story usually was "come and see the rough smoothhaired dogs, large and small dogs and the great Mexican dog without any

hair, except a few on his head and a few on his tail, all for the sum of 10 cents, and well worth \$1.00." These men were truly dog lovers and not the kind we have "in the game today and out tomorrow"-or the kind that come to a dog show and try to impress upon everyone by a lot of "hot air" that they are the only ones that know anything about dogs-that there is not a good one at the show, and "if I had entered "Carlo" or some other of my dogs, they would simply have swept the field." When I hear such a person expressing himself, I want to tell him "why in H- don't you show your darned dog, and give the Judge a chance to place the red ribbon on it, and by such means, educate the public and have your name handed down in history as the only man that ever owned a perfect dog, or knew one when he saw it."

How I miss the many old faces such as Dr. Mills of Montreal, who, besides being a fancier of pigeons, always had a string of many breeds of dogs, at the show or when he officiated as Judge. John G. Kent, with his Greyhounds and Russian Wolfhounds, Mr. Taylor with his Greyhounds. R. Bedlington, Bedlington Terriers; Mr. Wixam, Beagles; Geo. Sweetnam, Bloodhounds; Mark O'Rourke, Hamilton, Bull Terriers; A. A. Macdonald and Geo. Gooderham, Fox Terriers; Jno. H. Taylor, W. P. Fraser, German Hopkins, Frank Dole, H. E. Hoff, Ottis Fellows, a man who knew a Spaniel with the best of them, as well as dear old Lance Farewell, and not forgetting that wild Irishman from London, Dan. O'Shea, who could produce any breed of dog from his Kennels, or the best game Cocks to be found anywhere, and all ready for the pit. Dear old Ben. F. Lewis, who was always a good friend of mine, and supported all my shows by bringing to Toronto the cream of the best Kennels in the United States, as did Dr. Harry Jarret, with his Collies. The Semmiole and Emporium Kennels, Jack Dunbar and John Marony, always had their complements of Irish Setters; Harry Taylor, Beagles; Charlie Mead and J. B. Carlisle, Field Spaniels.

In conclusion, let me say, that I notice the prevalence at the majority of shows, of the number of Special prizes. Sometimes three or more Specials are offered for the best dog at the show, or best sporting and such like. Why let one particular dog scoop in the whole shooting match, when the Specials might easily be spread over to 2nd and 3rd dogs, an arrangement which would be more agreeable and quite interesting, not

only to exhibitors, but to the general public, and would show the relation of the winners up to the winning dog. Another thing—many valuable special prizes that are offered, are more sought after than the prizes offered in the regular classes.

Trusting that I have not taken up too much of your valuable space by my recollections and that they may prove of some small interest to your many readers, and I do trust that Kennel and Bench readers will pardon any errors or omissions that I have made. All of the foregoing has been taken from memory and as the period covered, is all of fifty years, it should serve to show that my memory still serves me very well indeed, and I wish to take this opportunity to thank the Editor of Kennel and Bench for the kindly, though insistent invitation to furnish this contribution, and for the pains he has taken to find the necessary space for the article, and if I may be permitted to make a final statement, it will be, that we hear any number of people declare that dogs have only instinct to guide them but I declare that every person who has made a companion of a dog, will readily substantiate what I contend-that they have not only instinct, but they have also a mind that thinks, understands and remembers. I talk a great deal to my own dogs, and I am quite satisfied that they understand what I say to them. For instance, I have two dogs which Ican give a paper or letter to, and tell them to take it to a party, mentioning the name, and they will deliver the parcel or letter without making a mistake. If I tell one of my dogs that I will take him for a run tomorrow, he remembers it, and when morning comes, he will not leave my heels until I have made my promise good.

Now as for instinct, I have noticed a dog on his bench at a show, who would receive all the petting and carressing from hundreds of the public passing, when all of a sudden, along comes a man or a woman and the same dog is up in arms, straining at his chain that he may tear the party to pieces. Dogs know! Personally, I place the public on a 100 per cent basis as far as dogs are concerned, 75 per cent of whom are lovers of dogs, 15 per cent are those who like a dog as long as the dog doesn't conflict with their comfort but rather will give them notoriety or add to their pocket-book. The last 10 per cent are those who hate dogs, in fact, hate most dumb animals. Among this small percentage may be found the poisoner, the thrower of ground glass, or boiling water.

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ANOTHER HEATHER NECESSITY BITCH FOR CANADA

Scottish Terriers are riding on the crest of the waves of popularity at the moment, and much credit must be given to the great winnings of Robert Chapman's (Glenboig, Scotland) splendid Scottie "Ch. Heather Necessity." This popularity has reached every land and clime. Canada is enjoying a full share of it.

Hamish Middlemass, Regina, Sask., felt the urge to get in the swim, and he left the choice to Mr. Chapman himself, and as a result "Lady Necessity" by "Ch. Heather Necessity' ex "Gartcosh Laura", a daughter of "Albourne Barty" is now in Regina, but that is not all the good news concerning this importation. She was bred to "Ch. Heather Fashion Hint" before leaving Scotland, and she is believed to be in whelp, and in time it is hoped that she will add a substantial quota to our Scotties in Western Canada.

FROM SCOTLAND TO OTTAWA

A beautiful blue roan Cocker has arrived at Ottawa, sent over the Atlantic by that noted all-breed connosieur ex-Bailie James Dalgleish, of Galashiels, Scotland. This newcomer to our shores is but 17 months old. His name is "Flashlight of Glenervie," and he has just finished training to the field and the gun. His new owner, Frank Plant, Ottawa, is enthusiastic about his new purchase, and has appraised the quality of the dog sufficiently high to have entered him in competition at the Winter Fair dog show, to be held at Ottawa, December 2 to 4.

Louie Wright of Welland, Ont., is mourning the loss of a smart wire-hair fox terrier bitch through strychnine poisoning. The little bitch had not been out of her kennel runs for four days, and on November 15th, and between the kennel and the home, a distance of but 200 yards, she picked up the poison, and as a result she died within a few minutes.

Mr. Wright had but recently bought some land and had kennels and runs built with a view to breeding "Wires" in a vigorous way, and this bitch, which had been selected carefully, was really recognized as the nucleus of the new kennel. Fortunately, she has left three choice puppies sired by "Ch. Stormy Boy," and these three youngsters, which show much promise, are left to Mr. Wright to carry on with.

We are advised that Mr. Wright is more disgusted than he is discouraged, but he would like to know what can be done in the way of punishing persons who can so cruelly put to death "Man's Best Friend." Frankly, we would like to see all persons showing cruelty to dogs, be they poisoners or otherwise, brought to justice, but it has been almost invariably found that these death dealers work so mysteriously that it is hard to get them as far as the courts of justice.

"NECESSITY—THE MOTHER OF INVENTION"

That is just exactly what James T. Booth, Moose Jaw, discovered in connection with racing a kennel of Whippets. To race from twelve to twenty Whippets in one night, after laying down the tapes, and making ready in other particulars, is a big job at anytime, but for two men to do it after a days work, is almost an impossibility on account of the nearness of darkness, so the necessity of some device that would lend itself to quick placement was urgently required if the dogs were to be given any reasonable chance to make good at the critical moments, when preparedness spells success or disaster in the twinkling of an eye.


Naturally Mr. Booth had in mind the idea of the "moving rabbit" as featured on the Greyhound racing



tracks, and so he concentrated on that, and as a result he has perfected a machine and other equipment, which can be transported quite comfortably, and installed ready for operation in less

than five minutes. And on grounds admirable for the purpose.

We do not know whether our Whippet fanciers will be able to work practically from Mr. Booths decription of his equipment or not, but since he has very kindly described it to Kennel and Bench, we will do our utmost to give the particulars here. The machine is built on an angle iron frame, and operates a drum arrangement, that takes in a cord, to which a skin or rag is attached, which skin or rag is taken into a trap at a certain distance, and so disappears as far as the dogs are concerned.

The machine is geared to allow a very high rate of speed, the cord with its teasing end is brought to within ten yards of the dogs that are about to race, the rag is always in sight, which is an advantage over the standard system which prevails everywhere, where the rag is shown to the dog by an owner or handler, who travels the allocated distance yelling and whistling, and arrives all out of breath just as the slipping is done to the report of the starting gun. The device is so arranged, that as soon as the rag starts to move, and the dogs are slipped, it can be taken in just a little faster than the fastest Whippet can travel, the chief end in view is to keep the rag moving ahead of the speedsters at all times, and to have it disappear into the trap, so that they don't get at it, and so the possibility of "scrapping" is

practically eliminated. The trap is a small bevelled opening running into a box, where a roller ensures the cord running smoothly to the drum. This trap is sunk into the ground about six inches, so that the dogs in passing never injure their feet.

A lid is provided for the trap which can be easily and quickly raised, so that the rag and cord may be speedily returned to the starting point for the subsequent race and when it is remembered that, usually, six dogs start in a race, it will quickly show the advantages of Mr. Booth's invention.

The persons taking the dogs to the starting point, pick up the rag, but before lining the dogs up at the starting line throws the rag ahead of the line a few feet, and the slack is taken up by the drum. The dogs can be started from a cage, or if there are sufficient "slippers" available the dogs can be "slipped" individually, and even handicapped according to requirements.

Since this equipment has been used Mr. Booth has never known a dog which failed to start, and a keenness to "get goin'" is always in evidence, even before the rag begins to move. Whippeters know the different temperaments of the dogs in their kennel, they also know the dogs that can run-but wont, the dog that is always the heartbreak of the day as far as the owner is concerned, but it has been Mr. Booth's experience, that the bad actors, the interferers, the tape jumpers under the old style of running, now show no inclination whatever for anything eise, only to catch that moving, tantalizing rag which always eludes them, and gets away in spite of their speediest efforts, although every race is a true race in every respect, and this is explained by Mr. Booth this way, that the rag is always before their eyes whilst the race is actually in progress, and reminding them continuously, that it is their job to catch it.

Mr. Booth very kindly says, that if there is any Whippeter member of the Canadian Kennel Club, desirous of getting the advantages of Mr. Booth's experiences in feeding and training Whippets, he or they may receive such for the asking. Mr. Booth himself—is always willing to learn, and believes, that the man who knows everything might know but very little in a showdown. A letter addressed as follows: Jas. T. Canada has always held a strong hand in Bulldogs, that much has generally been conceded. In recent years there has been a falling off in the number of our really outstanding dogs, but there have always been a few that the "other fellow" wanted to buy. One of these is the Toronto bred "Dewhurst Dan," bred and owned by Percy Alderson, Birchcliff. Mr. Alderson's honest-to-goodness Bulldog has been on the circuit since he came out as a Puppy at the Borzoi Club of Canada show in 1929, and he lacks but one solitary point to his championship in Canada.

At New York show last February "Dewhurst Dan" was proclaimed Winners and Best of Winners under Judge Herman Fensterer, and with "Dewhurst Durham" a full brother to "Dewhurst Dan" from a later litter, Mr. Alderson was awarded the special for the Best Brace

"Dewhurst Dan" has distinguished himself by being able to get the Judges to recognize his real merit at the Detroit and Chicago Specialty Shows where he was placed at the Best in Show Station at both of these important fixtures. "Dewhurst Dan" is a son of "Blightys Burslay" ex "Toronto Lady", a granddaughter of that great producer "Hefty Monarch."

Another Bulldog bred in Toronto by Mrs. C. N. Gibson travelled from 2nd Puppy at the Canadian National Exhition in 1930 to the Reserve Winners station in 1931. At the Canadian National Exhibition. She is "Tiddle Pom" a daughter of "Ch. Crewe So Favorite" ex "Lady Jeanie" a granddaughter of "Ch. Hefty Argo." "Tiddle Pom" was bought by W. E. Chetwin of Syracuse, N.Y., and those who really know "Ted" Chetwin know that he can only become interested in the best.

A word of praise is due the "Wire" Fox Terrier "Vanity Bantam," bred by the veteran London breeder W. H. Shortt. "Vanity Bantam" is by "Walnut Gamecock" a son of "Talavera Simon" ex "Vanity Snowmaiden," a daughter of "Ch. Chantry Coddy." This smart youngster was 1st Puppy and Winners at Windsor (Spring), 1st Open and Winners at Windsor (Fall) shows last year. This little dog is perhaps a little better than he has been rated. Mr. Shortt brought a good one to "the races" when he had "Vanity Student Prince" at the "Royal" Show just closed. Here is a real smart youngster by "Loneacre Student Prince" ex 'Vanity Fair Girl," and born on March 7th this year, who has all the "earmarks" required for the "first flight."
In fact he went from 1st Puppy to
Winners, and then to Best Puppy in
show All Breeds at the "Royal."

Allen's "High Hat" a Boston Terrier owned by Mrs. G. W. Allen, Niagara Falls, N.Y., one of our members, and a frequent visitor at our shows, made the Canadian Championship in the matter of a few weeks and is now on the threshold of the door asking for his International crown. He was Reserve Winners at the Rochester Specialty Show.

Earl A. Brown, Toronto, "rocked the boat," a trifle when he introduced his puppy "Brown's Oh Boy" to the talent at the Canadian National Exhibition this year, and piloted the youngster from Puppy to Winners there, and with the win at Montreal (Ladies' Kennel Club) tucked under the puppy's belt, a total of 10 points had been served as two helpings. The title was won at Hamilton. At the Rochester Specialty Show we notice that Brown's Oh Boy" was a serious contender.

The best win of all in Mr. Brown's good judgment, was when Ted Ward smartly piloted "Brown's Oh Boy" to Winners and Best of Winners at the Cleveland Specialty Show, where "Mike" Donlon referred to the dog as "Earl Brown's Oh Boy", not quite a year old but a fast youngster.

At the Rochester Specialty Show another Canadian shared in the prizes, when A. E. Patchell's "Hagerty's Naughty Girl" was busy helping herself to the first prize ribbon in the lightweight class.

Still another brilliant win was made by the Toronto Boston Terrier breeder, Mrs. M. Stevens, Toronto, when she piloted her "Ch. Susan Conde" to the very top over the Winners dogs and the Winners bitch, under Judge John J. Barrett. This is a most remarkable win, when it is considered that the dependable "Susan" is not above taking up her maternity duties during the off season for the shows.

Unquestionable Identification

To be able to identify a dog bred in your Kennel from puppyhood to the day of his death—and later than that if necessary—would be quite an achievement, nevertheless it is now several years since such a possibility became an actual fact. Several months ago Harry Armistead the capable manager of the Ormsby Kennels at Montreal, made a statement through Kennel and Bench, that he could positively identify any dog bred at the Ormsby Kennels within the last three years, if he met such a dog in far off Japan.

Mr. Armistead spoke in a positive manner, and he knew whereof he spoke, he would be taking no chance at all in the venture, and besides, there are others who could as positively identify an Ormsby bred dog besides Mr. Armistead, or the owner of the Ormsby Kennels, James F. Strachan himself.


Any Live Stock Records Officer would be able to identify such an animal, so it will be clearly noticeable, that the experimental stage of absolute identification of animals has been passed, and that the practical era of such identification has now actually been reached, it is simply the

Tattooing of Dogs

Since the article on Identification of Dogs appeared in Kennel and Bench we have received many enquiries concerning the "value of tattooing." "What is the attendant expense?" Will tattooing hurt the ear carriage?" "Will the tattoo marks not disappear?" "Are the tattoo marks easily distinguished?" and etc. Most enquiries have raised the question of cost, and so the intent of this short article is to give timely information to those breeders who have declared their interest in this most dependable Kennel practice in respect to identification.

The process of tattooing in itself is very simple and in actual practice nothing of an injurious nature has been noticeable; neither is the process painful to the animal being tattooed. Perhaps we should put it this way, neither is the process painful to the animal being marked, because after all, that is simply what it all amounts to, the painless marking of an animal for the purposes of unquestionable identification.

For each breeder or owner the Live Stock Records will register certain letters as an exclusive right. These letters when registered create a perfect protection for identification as it is impossible for any owner or breeder to have the same letters after registration.



"I got my identification"

In practice the letters are tattooed in the right ear of the dog. In the left car the first puppy marked in any year is tattooed with the figure 1, followed by the year letter which designate the year in which the puppy was born. Then the next puppy is tattooed with the figure 2 followed by the year letter, the next will be tattooed with the figure 3 and so on.

To further describe the practice we must necessarily refer again to James F. Strachan of Montreal who has found the idea to be quite indespensable. Mr. Strachan has the letters A.A. registered for his exclusive use. He tattooes these letters in the right ears of all the young stock born at the Ormsby Kennels. When he began the system of tattooing in 1928 the year letter was "F," in 1929 the year letter was "G", in 1930 "H.", and in 1931 "J." In 1932 the letter "K" will designate the year letter, because of the resemblance of the letter I to the figure 1, which might readily lead to some confusion if used as a year letter as our readers will quickly notice. The same year letter is used for all breeds of live stock that are to be tattooed for identification purposes.

Now for the cost of the necessary marking equipment. The marking outfit primarily manufactured was for the use of Mr. Strachan, and was made by the Ketchum Manufacturing Company, Box 501, Ottawa, Ontario, Canada. The cost of the instrument including two sets of numerals, 1 to 0 inclusive, and two year letters, and a supply of indelible non-irritating ink is \$10.00. Any additional letters may be secured at a cost of 50c. per letter.

The secret of successful tattooing lies in the puncturing the ear with the needle-like instrument, then rubbing the ink well into the ear with the finger, or with a soft bristled tooth brush. Reasonable care must be observed when using the instrument not to make the puncture in the cartilage of the ear. Our rather comical illustration will serve to show a pair of ears altogether out of proportion but it serves the purpose we have in mind. Here is shown the right ear tattooed, and back from the cartilage of that ear. In the left ear we notice first the figure one (1) which designates that it is the first puppy born in any one year, then follows the year letter K, which designates the year in which the puppy was born, the next dog would be tattooed with the figure two (2), the next three (3), and so on. The numerals and letters appearing in the sketch are punched by a tattoo instrument used for tattooing dogs.

Already many dog lovers are discussing the question of tattooing of dogs for identification purposes, and in a large Kennel the system should be indispensable. A tattoed dog is that dog and no other. The only doubt with dog fanciers seems to be the interference with the cartilage of the ear, and as we all know, the ear plays such an important part in all show dogs, the balance of the head plus the symmetry of the body can be easily upset through a bad carriage, or a light or improperly shaped or placed eye, but it has been found, that even in the smallest breeds of dogs there is sufficient tattooing space available in every ear for tattooing without interfering with the cartilage, and only common sense care is necessary in connection with the operation.

The sketch shown, not only shows the tattoo marks in prick eared fashion. It leaves the inference that the ear has been tattooed, and when the ear is tipped or folded to suit the breed requirements the tattoo mark is there.

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Leaves From a Kennel Note Book

"A Time for Joy, a Time for Cheer; a Christmas Good, and Bright New Dear"



NCE again Christmas is on our threshold, and we are inclined to look back upon the past year, and forward to the next. The last twelve months have not been good ones for those who go in for breeding and showing dogs. The big money has been more than scarce, and the entries at bench affairs meagre in number and often below parity in quality. Somehow or

another the disagreeableness that occurred at the Westminster Kennel Club's show, in New York, left a nasty taste in the mouth. It still remains among the chief topics of today, and is likely to recur wherever two or three doggie men are gathered together. Small entries have been received when there should have been more; and, worst of all, well-known adjudicators have been heard to express their disgust for the judgments of others. Can such persons be right in their criticisms or are these carpings or fault-findings merely the frothy expressions begotten of petty jealousies—just as flapstick comedians and fish wives are often wont to declare that their rivals' actions and wares are of the rottenest descriptions?

Anyway, these rivalries are matters that may not be treated in just a casual way. There are too many ill-mannered tirades—those abominable things that glibe so easily off the tongues of the unemployed judges of the day—those who have to idly stand outside the rings. Really the kennel clubs of North America could, with advantage, remind their licensed judges that they at least should remember they are supposed to be "gentlemen" and refrain from calling their brethren a wholly incompetent aggregation of nincompoops or something worse. The harm these slanders must do are incalculable. What must the uninformed listeners think when they are forced to listen to the backbitings that appear to be becoming more and more rampant! Judges, like hounds, should possess good manners.

This has been a great season for Spaniel field trials. Altogether there have been ten days of strenuous work at which very many of the best springers and cockers have taken their parts. In some cases there were over twenty entries in a stake-a good card of dogs to run off in one day. The trials at Fishers Island in Long Island Sound; at the Vail Estate near Poughkeepsie, and on the Verbank Hunting Club's 4,000acre shooting property or rights were enjoyable. We were favored with fine weather and plenty of game in the form of pheasants and a few rabbits. Very high-class work was performed; indeed, Capt. Obslow Traherne of Aberkenfig, Glamorgan, South Wales, who came over to judge at Fishers Island, publicly declared that the leading winners at that meeting would be quite good enough to run prominently at trials on the other side-that was, if they kept up to the form shown in their own country. From what I saw at the tests and heard from the lips of this judge, he wasn't of the "oheverything's-splendid" sort of person given to overdue politeness and pleasantries. On the other hand Capt. Traherne and his associate, David Wagstaff of Tuxedo Park, a fine type of American country gentleman, called upon the spaniels for the most trying work that spaniels may be expected to attempt

The photographs of the Fishers Island country fail to give

you the right impression as to what its cover is like. The patches of thickets or brakes appear small and easy as compared with the ordinary covers seen or met with on the mainlands of America and Europe. Because of the bleakness of the storm-beaten island, the shrub-like growth is not only stunted but beaten almost flat by the assaults of the elements. So it is that the spaniel has to enter in and work through patches of wicked stuff that in some places might be likened to a mixed entanglement of barbed and small meshed wire netting. The local or Fishers Island-bred or broken spaniels are acquainted with these obstacles; furthermore, they are aware that if they wish to find and rattle out game, feather or fur from such places, they must push through it.

It therefore stands to reason that a Fishers Island owner wouldn't be foolish enough to pay an entry fee for a shy-of-cover spaniel. So it is that it is always hard to put down a spaniel at Fishers Island—a dog that is so willing to face that cover—like the Fishers Island-bred and trained spaniel. Just as you purchase your made hunter (horse) from out of the same sort of country as you wish to ride him over, so it will be just as well to consider the kind of terrain your new spaniel is to come from. You don't go out to find your Alpine climbers in the slums of New York; and, for your Canadian hunting guides, you must look for them in their own fastnesses of forests and big waters.

Capt. Traherne sprang a new idea on the company assembled on the eve of the trials at the Fishers Island Club. He recommended a return to the cocker blood to improve the hunting desires and methods of the springer spaniels. The style and merriness of the larger cocker was superior to that of the setter-like springer. These were not the gallant sportsman's words; but it was gathered that such was the full meaning of what he said. Here was a good and practical suggestion, it was thought. Lots of springers are not only too long in the leg for cover work, but they lack the power or desire for the penetration of the more difficult stuff. On the other hand, it seems that what would be sauce for the springer should be sauce for the cocker. To make a real and dependable hunting dog of the cocker, it would be well to put into him a dash of the blood of the springer. The cocker requires more length in leg, and power of jaw-if the cocker is to be looked upon as a fast-hunting and retrieving spaniel of any importance. But, someone will say: "You are advising cross breeding-the mixing up of two varieties of land spaniels!" That is so. But by all means allow the dyed-inthe-wool fanciers to continue to breed fancy dogs. But at the same time it should be borne in mind that the spaniel is a strictly sporting dog. And the more usefulness you can get out of a good shooting dog, the better 'twill be for the vast multitude of men who go a-gunning.

Dr. John de Mund, on his recent return from England, where he had been judging Russian Wolfhounds and Greyhounds at the Kennel Club Show at the Crystal Palace. London, told your correspondent that the Russian borzoi over there were of the larger description. Moreover they were a sound lot. It was understood that the A.K.C. president wished to convey that as a class the English borzoi were bigger than those we are used to seeing in the United States. If that be so, it cannot be said that the English are at fault. It has been noticed there has been a lack of height and weight in American winners; but whether or not we have been

seeing the best owned in the United States at the exhibitions of the last year or so must be a matter for further enquiry. Twenty-six inches is the minimum height of a Russian wolfhound, according to the printed official descriptions as sent out by one or more clubs. That height would appear to be less than what would be required by a bona fide wolf hound. Whether the borzoi grow higher and heavier in Canada than in the United States, it is not known. But from the sworn-to figures before me there can be no doubting that the height and weight of Champion Peterhoff of Marlboro, the borzoi owned and bred by Maurice B. Zwicker of Halifax, Nova Scotia, are above the ordinary ones. In the affidavit sworn to on October 25th, 1931, before Carl P. Bethune, notary public of the Province of Nova Scotia. the following official measurements of the dog, taken October 15th, 1931, will prove interesting reading and a guide for the breeders of Russian Wolfhounds the world over :-

"Length of head from nose to occiput, 131/2 inches.

Height at shoulder, 34 inches (under standard).

Girth, back of forelegs, 37½ inches. Weight, 102½ pounds.

Charles Packman, former resident of somewhere in Eastern Canada, who went to the War along with the Dominion

Forces, is again back in the neighborhood of New York, where he has bought a farm at Cross River, Westchester County. Mr. Packman has always been very fond of cocker spaniels. Some ten or more years ago he came south to superintend the cockers owned by Mrs. Haley Fiske at Bernardsville, New Jersey. From thence Mr. Packman went to Baltimore to look after the cockers possessed by the late C. H. Reuben Miller, Secretary of the American Spaniel Club. A capable man with cockers or any other sporting breeds, Mr. Packman is a native of Lossiemouth, Fifeshire, Scotland. My old friend is not ashamed of relating that, as a boy, he was fired by a wandering adventurous spirit and ran away from his home. With a black retriever dog bearing the name of Nero, he made his first tramp as far as Buckie, about 18 miles from his old habitat. He was footsore, sorry in spirit and hungry. It so happened that several men were fishing off the wharf or wall and now and then an unattended fishing rod was pulled into the water. But Nero was equal to the occasion and retrieved the poles. Tell it not in Buckie, but one fine Scotsman gave Charlie a whole shilling, and the a-hungered and a-thirsted lad was able to buy a meal and a place to rest his weary bones. And so it was that Charles Packman made his first assault on a waiting world where even the dogs

have been able to bring bodily comforts to many of us besides the lad from Lossiemouth. What a fine bit of "business" for a scenario written around the adventures of a boy hobo!

Ward Binks of Manchester, England, famous painter of pointers, setters, spaniels and other dogs in the field, arrived in New York early in November. Mr. Binks came over to execute commissions for Mrs. M. Hartley Dodge of Madison, New Jersey, whose gundogs, beagles and German Shepherd dogs are mostly of international championship calibre. Mr. Binks has painted very many beautiful creatures of the animal kinds. It is thought that never in the world's histories of artists has any painter undertaken so many and long voyages on sea and distances on land as has Mr. Binks for the one purpose and intent of conveying to his canvasses the treasured dogs of world-wide known notabilities. It was only the other day that Mr. Binks returned from India, where he had been executing the commissions of the Maharajah of Patiala. There the artist was among the wild as well as domesticated beasts-the delights of one of the greatest and richest of Oriental princes. But, said the painter at the Paterson, New Jersey, Show on November 7th: "I must say I never before saw such a collection of small bronzes of animals and birds as that possessed by Mrs. Dodge.

Cockers and Springers

AST month's page did the trick.
Letters came from Thetford
Mines, Quebec, New Brunswick,
Saskatchewan, British Columbia, Ottawa and various parts of Ontario. This
is not bad for the second month and
all letters were enthusiastic, cheerful
and full of pep. In addition to these
letters we have been able to get the
opinions of other American breeders.
These opinions are certainly worth
while, in as much as it gives a definite
indication of how our neighbors to the
south are thinking. The following letters are from some American Breeders:

A Mid-West breeder writes: "The show proposition, in my personal opinion is about one-tenth of one per cent. Nine-tenths of the public want a companion for the family and practically all of these want the hunting type, not the show type." The big proposition then, is this: The public wants what it wants and in the long run it gets what it wants.

To quote from F. B. Warner's letter. "I am not satisfied with the present weight limits as specified by the standard—not as a sporting dog. Eighteen to twenty-four pounds is not large enough. Twenty-eight pounds might hurt their popularity as pets but increase it as hunting dogs." Warner has shot over many Cockers and considers them ideal land dogs and equally as good as "light water" dogs.

Mrs. Arthur Vogel, of the Freeland Kennels, West Long Branch, N.J., writes that she is satisfied with the present weight limits for the show type, but for hunting—and she has shot over the Cockers—the larger ones, around 26 pounds, are preferable.

Glen V. Peverill, Waterloo, Iowa, writes, "I am not satisfied with the present weight limits of 18 to 24 pounds. From 20 to 26 pounds would be much better. I prefer the Cockers for field work."

From Mrs. C. Cudmore, Detroit, Mich., comes the following: "18 to 24 pounds is all right as a pet but as an all round dog added size would help. I prefer 28 pounds as the maximum limit." She has shot over Cockers and enthusiastically declares that, "for me, Cockers always for field work."

Dr. C. L. Lee, Iola, Wis., writes: "Hunting men want larger dogs for field work. Around 28 pounds is preferable. I have shot over Cockers and consider them equally good on land or water." He prefers the Chesapeakes or Irish Water Spaniels, however, for all round water work."

WHAT SIZE COCKERS?

Our object in putting forth the foregoing American opinions is to give the readers of Kennel and Bench both sides of the story. Now we give you the Canadian Breeders' opinions:

H. A. Ross, Brampton, writes: "I be lieve absolutely in our standard which calls for weights from 23 to 28 pounds, as Cockers that size should fill the bill for both hunting and show purposes, at least as far as size is concerned. It is all very well for breeders and judges to say they pay no attention whatever to size in Cockers, but I do. I believe in breeding as near to the standard as it is possible to get. Type and quality are undoubtedly the most essential qualifications, but where would we be if there were no limitations placed on the size of Cockers. It is human nature to go to extremes and the first thing we would know there would be a whole flock of miniature Springers or else "carpet sweepers" invading our show rings. I would also like to see the American and Canadian breeders get together and adopt a common standard. I am sure it would be beneficial to all concerned.

C. W. Lonsdale, Shawnigan Lake, V.I., British Columbia, writes: "I feel constrained to drop you a line in answer to your invitation. I am not a breeder of Cockers, but for years kept them in England, and my happiest shooting days have been over English Cockers varying in weight from 22 to 28 pounds.

Mrs. H. A. Rhodes, Cowichan Station, Vancouver Island, B.C., writes: "This matter of the weight of Cockers certainly calls for an expression of opinion, which will, I think, be backed by the large majority of breeders out here.

A matter of a month ago, The Western Cocker Spaniel Club of Canada, almost unanimously (if not quite so), raised their scale of weights to read from 24 to 28 pounds.

To me the point is this—If U.S.A., who indisputably, have imported from Europe and chiefly from Great Britain, all the foundation stock of every variety of pedigreed animal, wish to start a new breed of Cocker, let them do so; but surely call it by some other name, such as "The American Toy Cocker Spaniel."

It is ridiculous to say that the 20 pound dog can hold its own with the larger dog in the field. I have seen it tried many times in Scotland, in both heather and roots. The small dog has been "all in" by lunch time. I have quite a large Kennel of Cockers, consisting of both types, but I am going out of the American type and concentrating on the British, as I am convinced that the dogs wanted both here and at home are identical. What may be popular in the South is for the South to worry about. Should it not apply to dogs as to most other forms of sport, that within reason: The good big one will always beat the good little

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For the Kennel Club Show (England)) held at Crystal Palace, London, on October 7 and 8, Cockers had an entry of 424 (not dogs benched, but entries actually made" and to show the strength of the Cocker entry by comparisons, Irish Setters came next with an entry of 274, Cairns are next with 196 entries, Pekes 170, Smooth Fox Terriers, 170; Scotties, 162; Sealyhams, 161; and the Lakeland Terriers for which classes are being made at the Royal Winter Fair this year for the first time in Canada, for which the Kennel Club (England), have offered Championship Challenge Certificates for the first time in history, rolled up the respectable entry of 42. MRS. J. R. KENNEDY IN KENNEL ACCIDENT

Mrs. J. R. Kennedy, of the Vivadora Kennels, Toronto, encountered a rather unusual experience on Friday morning, October 30th, the result of which obliged her to visit the Toronto East General Hospital for necessary attention, and if Hallowe'en stands for general fooling she found no fooling in her escapade.

Ch. Mitzi von Thueringen, the unbeaten Doberman in 1926 and 27, was nursing a litter recently born, and one of the babies appeared to be uncomfortable, a condition distressing to Mitzi's mistress who sought to adjust matters in the interest of the puppy. This good intention Mitzi must have misunderstood, although she is unusually intelligent, for she attacked her mistress violently, leaving wounds that required several stitches to close.

We are pleased to report that Mrs. Kennedy is now at home and making a speedy and satisfying recovery.

This incident should again remind us that, after all, our very best dogs are dumb animals, and we should never overlook the very important fact that it is inherent in the female of all species to protect her young at all costs, and we can never be too careful when attending the female dog in her nest, not only that, but the dog, through his long association with man, and no doubt because of a grateful instinct, has actually, and quite naturally became a protector of life and property, and this sense of protection is noticeable in this accident. Indeed Mitzi was considered to be quite unvaluable as a protector at the Kennedy home, a friend of the whole family and of the host of friends known there, a circumstance which makes her indiscretion all the more painful at the present time.

Should it so happen that "Mitzi" will be destroyed, as perhaps she will be, the writer will remember her kindly, as the most intelligent member of the Canine race that he has ever known, a pal dog in every sense of that term, and the worst that can be said of her is that the suspicion born of her handicap of speech was alone responsible for the attack she made on her mistress. If it had been possible for Mrs. Kennedy to have made her intentions known to the dog the accident would have been impossible.

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CANADIAN NATIONAL BEAGLE CLUB-FIELD TRIALS AND BENCH SHOW

The 1931 Field Trials of the Canadian National Beagle Club were held the week of October 5th to 10th, at Point Pelee, National Park, near Leamington, Ont., and if a 25% increase on any former entry may be considered a criterion by which to measure success, then we should imagine this, the oldest Field Trial Club operating in Canada, will be overjoyed at the success of the meet this year, and possibly the 93 entries obtained marks the largest Field Trials ever held in Canada.

The Canadian Kennel Club's championship rating was introduced and operated for the first time, and from reports received, we gather that the Beaglers are well satisfied with the new rules.

Judge L. M. Kemp, of Akron, Ohio, furnished his quota to fresh history for the Club when he "flew" to the trials by airplane, as no doubt Mr. Kemp was the first judge to use this mode of transportation to keep an appointment with a club. We don't know what his impressions were as he travelled through space, but we are informed that with two handkerchiefs stuck in one ear and a pair of socks in the other he arrived in good time for the trials.

Good weather, good grounds and a plentitude of game, caused Mr. Blakey, the second judge, to remark, "I have judged at 31 Trials and your Pelee grounds are second to none." The "bedroom" series, which is considered to be quite legal in Canada, was a series that did not appear in the premium list, although it drew quite a large entry in itself.

On Wednesday evening a bench show was held, and although the entry was down a little this year, the quality of the dogs was first class.

The success of the Trials and Bench Show was attributed to the several committees which functioned perfectly, and to the efficiency of the Field Marshal, Frank Dueweke, who knows his job from start to finish.

The final results of the meet day by day with notes by the judges follow:

13 Inch Derby-15 Starters

October 5th.-Under weather conditions that were hot and dry, the little derbies were started, the quality of their work spoke well of their ability to run a rabbit under such conditions, and there were many good ones not placed just because some of the others did just a little better work.

Swingalong Susie won the stake, she is owned by "Buck" Sherman and is

Capitola Pharmacies, Vancouver, B.C. Stearman's Drug Store, Nanaimo, B.C. by the well known producer, Milldale Rocky and Swingalong Bell, in both of her series she was a clean and close driver, and handled her game like a veteran. Haig's Fudget, owned by Dr. Haigmeier, was the second place hound, one of those fast driving kind that surely could wheel a rabbit, her last race was one of the longest of the stake.

Canomich Flasher placed third and is owned by H. C. Austin, the Club's secretary. Both times called on, this youngster ran a steady, hard working race, he is blessed with a real hound voice. Flasher was the winner of the Spring Derby, which proves that he is no flash in the pan. Ord's Bugle Boy Belle is another one of those fast driving hounds that always makes a rabbit go places; she placed fourth. Swingalong Snap, a little sister of the winner, looked mighty good at times, but could not beat those placed above

15 Inch Derby-21 Starters

October 6th.-This stake furnished some nice work in its first series, but all the hounds to place failed to improve in their second series. Happy Go Jo stood out over the class in steady line work and clearness of voice, showing a lot of rabbit driving ability at the same time.

Swingalong Driver, a beautiful voiced hound, came up to win his place here, having showed the best of the second series work. Tuscan Knight, the high hound in the first series, failed in his second, and lost his chance to win the stake. Galloper's Jeano and Kingsbury's Stately, after a nice first series, had the bad breaks of the field trial game and failed to come up in the standing.

13 Inch All Age Bitches-18 Starters

October 6th.-This class proved to be the class of the week's trials, and many were the good races run. Sunnybranch Bell, owned by Geo. Abel, won the stake after a hot battle from her daughter, Swingalong Bell, owned by Buck Sherman. Both hounds are of the same style in their work, their drives were of a very high order. Hendrick's Lady, who is always in the results, gave a great race. The derby Happy Go Freckles, who was high hound in the derby, then failed to place, came back to prove her worth by being placed fourth; she is a litter sister to the winner of the big derby. Peggy Grand, a driver, won the reserve place from the other high class second series hounds.

13 Inch All Age Dogs-9 Starters

October 7th.-This class was full of up and down races, and outside of the winner, Jackie, who always drove his game fast and far, the other hounds failed to be consistent in their work. Kingsbury's Rascal and Canomich Duke had the better of the rest entered in the second series and ran a nice race. Turmay Sheikie, who was not in running shape, had to step into 4th place. He was too fat to show his real worth. Canomich King failed to improve and was given reserve.

2 Couple Pack Stakes

October 8th.—The Pack Stakes was started with five entries, the Officers Cup was won by the Canomich 13 inch Pack, which did some very nice work, being started on a marked rabbit. They drove continuously for twenty-eight minutes, with only three checks, which were lifted after some very close work by the derby Canomich Flasher and Hendricks Lady, with Canomich King and Duke taking the lead on the drive; these four little hounds packed well and were under complete control at all times.

The Swingalong No. 2, 13 inch Pack, was second; they got away to a hard drive, but failed to lift a hard check. This Pack was winner of last year's event but the absence of Rockfield Honey Girl was noticeable, she being replaced by a younger hound.

Kingsbury, 15 inch Pack, got away good but soon had a split rabbit and rather upset things from then on; they were well handled by Mr. Kingsbury.

The Egan 15 inch pack, placed fourth, was a well matched pack, but the breaks seemed to be against them or they might have went higher.

Reserve went to the Swingalong No. 1, 15 inch Pack, winner of the Spring Pack stakes, was the favorite to win before the start, but had tough luck to start their rabbit in thick underbrush, then failed to drive him out into the open; just another tough break, which sometimes govern the results, but the 2 Couple Pack Stakes will ever be popular at the Canadian National, as it always furnishes plenty of excitement for handlers and gallery alike.

15 Inch All Age Bitches-12 Starters

October 8th.—This class as a whole was the best of the week for steady hound work, full of good drives, as every brace gave nice hound work and all the winners were just high class hounds. The second series work was very high class in every way and the margin of the places was very small.

Kingsbury's Laudable, the winner, Haig's Daisy, Egan's Brownie and Haig's Turmoil could not be beaten on this day, as their work could not be better. The derby Greenfield Lassie won her place by getting in on a lot of long runs.

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15 Inch All Age Dogs-18 Starters

October 9th.-Swingalong Barney and Kingsbury's Ramsey had a "walkover" to win their places-the rest could not compare in hound work this day. Down together in their first series they did a hundred per cent, race and never lost their game, both are pickers that have brains and know when to drive. Swingalong Barney is owned by Harry Gould and as this was his first win at a field trial, he had just reason to be proud of his hound. Merritone Gohy, a derby, did a nice piece of work, being a worker of the same style as the winner, and is owned by another new beginner, Allen Brooks, Kingsbury's Gamester and Beau Joy, both drivers had it out for the other places.

All in all, a full week of genuine sport was enjoyed most thoroughly by the contestants themselves, and by a large gallery following the daily events with enthusiastic eagerness. Good fellowship was in the air and everybody seemed to draw a full share of that desirable commodity. And as this Trial was the eighteenth consecutive meeting it may be taken for granted that the Club is in a stronger position today than ever before.

The new Field Trial Rules revised and amended on August 20th, 1931, require 13 in. dogs to win 30 championship points to make a Field Champion; 13 in. bitches, 50 points; 15 in. dogs, 50 points; 15 in. bitches, 50 points, and the following rating of points have been allocated to the winners of these Trials.:

However, everything has to get its start, and the new rating represents the progress of Beagle Trials in Canada to this date.



The Leighton Kennels, of St. Lambert, report the sale of six husky Irish pups from "Wild Irish Runa," sired by "Squire," and bookings for the coming litter. Mrs. A. Hird, "Squire's" owner, is greatly elated over the class of puppies he produces. Mr. A. T. Keiller, of the 'ville ou demeure notre Bob," has certainly produced the goods by winning consistently with his great female, "Sheba of Kildona." It is only fair, however, to remember that both "Squire" and "Sheba" were sired by "Wild Irish Barney." Indeed, that enthusiastic breeder, P. Doyle, can well claim that the blood from his kennels is the very fountain of winning Canadian-bred Setters. Imported stock from the Wizbang Kennels are putting up a game fight for the awards, however, as reserve winners in both sexes were carried "haut la main" by "Wizbang Barriboy" and "Wizbang Marguerite" in the last Montreal show. "Wizbang Marguerite," which went to best of breed in both London shows, was sired by "Nutbrown Borcal" out of "Nutbrown Maid." What a wealth of outcrosses can be found in these kennels for the astute Irish Setter breeders! We claim that Montreal is undoubtedly the biggest center of Irish Setter breeding in Canada.

Cocker Spaniels are certainly not so numerous here as they should be. However, we must not overlook the Enright prefix and its winning solid Cocker, "Ch. Enright's Deelight," that great daughter of "Ch. Enright Midnight." It would be well to remember that these kennels are housing some of the best bred Cockers in America, including the blood of "Ch. Lucknow Lothario" and "Ch. Limestone Laddie."

We are also proud of the "Of Derby" prefix, owned by A. R. Stuart, of Montreal. Mr. Stuart should be congratulated on the numerous winnings achieved by his "Dean of Derby," the great son of the celebrated "Carlton Mickey" and his "Derby Deb," one of the best parti-colors ever seen in Canada. That "Deb" is a daughter of "Ch. Limestone Laddie" should be a great inducement for those who look for the best available blood to book an order

for one of her puppies. We are sorry that none of the above named Cockers were pictured in this magazine. It's up to the owners to send us their photos. I had the pleasure of visiting the Chaudiere Kennels, owned by Harry Collins, of the city where the statue of Liberty ought to be, I mean Hull. They certainly house the classiest lot and best bred Cockers east of the Chaudiere Falls. They are full of the old "Ch. Ottawa Tartar" blood (I mean the kennels, not the Falls), and they certainly are typical specimens of the prefix which is world famous.

Springer Spaniels are getting more numerous every year in the homes and around the bushes of this sporting province. However, it is hard to explain why there are only six or seven exhibits of that most beautiful and useful breed in every show. H. J. Placey may have withdrawn his dogs from the circuits on account of poor health, but his name appears in every catalogue as the breeder of most of the winning exhibits, just as it is written down in the hearts of all those who have known him as one of the never-to-be-forgotten personalities met at the shows. "Belmos Jacobite II," whose picture appears in this issue, is a son of "Ch. Inveresk Chancellor" and "Ch. Belmoss Jacqueline." His great depth of muzzle, good length of neck and beautiful shoulders are well backed with a short body and strong hindquarters. He seems to improve with age just like good old wine. He will certainly make the grade to Championship Station in record time.

Another son of "Ch. Inveresk Chancellor," out of "Ch. Belmoss Countess," is owned by the active Dr. Chs. B. Baker. This dog has been most successful at stud during the closing year, most of the bitches sired by him throwing six males or over. The writer is raising one of his get, a beautiful three color which should make history. The dam was "Craigellachie Corselette," a daughter of "Ch. Inveresk Collyshot," out of "Lassy of Oxford."

Mrs. Paul R. Hanson, of Montreal, has also some very promising puppies sired by "Collyshot" out of "Belmoss Libertine" and we wish her to keep one good enough to make the running hot for our own "Cocksure of Killarney."

Whippets were really good, though not very numerous around our shows. Mr. McGregor, of Montreal, showed a very good silver fawn and white dog with a well set neck, a great roach back; a well balanced racer covering lots of ground. A fawn and white female with a great depth of chest,

WORKING DOGS

Collies, with many other working breeds, had decreased a lot in number around Quebec during the last fifteen years on account of the "engouement" for Shepherd dogs; but they are now gaining ground by leaps and bounds. Pride of place belongs to C. G. Higginson's newly-crowned tricolor "Ch. Black Prince 2nd," whose picture appeared on the frontispiece of our October issue. Suffice it to say that "Black Prince" is as intelligent as he is beautiful, in fact a real "Payson Terhune" dog. "Rural Dawn," the sire of the above named champion, was bred by the well-known breeder, W. O. Roy, and is also owned by Mr. Higginson. John Meehan still owns the dam, "Bellevue Dolly."

E. Smyth of Verdun has some very classy stock and his "Smyth's Moonshine" will certainly make some keen competition when fully matured.

Keeshounds, so far, have been represented only by Miss E. Butler's "David of Evenlode." That breed sports a beautiful coat and is well fitted to our cold climate. They are really attractive and altogether different.

Newfoundlands. That self-sacrificing and most devoted breed, are certainly not occupying the high place they deserve in the Canadian Fancy, only three or four good specimens are seen at every show; N. McCallum's "Blackgang" and "Lady Dinah" are outstanding specimens and we would like to see their picture in this magazine. It would certainly help the breed.

J. Foucault of Montreal, that dyedin-the-wool Newfoundlander, is still in the game and we hope that he may bring out some flyer soon. This would recall the good old times when his monstrous exhibits were fighting it out with Mrs. Beland's diminutive Poms for best in show awards.

German Shepherds are here to stay, with such stickers as Mr. and Mrs. S. J. Rowe, Miss M. Moffatt, J. St. Onge and, last but not the least, Nicholas Klebnikoff. The Belgium Kennels also bring out some typical importation every year.

TERRIERS

Bull Terriers, once the pride of Griffintown and Farebourg, Quebec, are very seldom met with in Montreal, but R. M. Kenny of Buckingham is still upholding our Provincial pride all over America.

Dandie Dinmonts, probably the strongest animal in proportion to their size in dogdom, have only one representative in our midst as far as I know. Won't somebody import a mate for Stanley Wharton's "Clearbrook Hector" that quaint looking son of "Ch. Potford Plunderer"?

Fox Terriers (Smooth), are well represented in the Wizbang Kennels and the untiring secretary of the Montreal Canine Association, R. H. Waddell, has made a good start by acquiring a daughter of Dandy Marksman, Trixie.

Fox Terriers (Wire), hold the centre of the stage in Quebec shows, no less than 40 having been benched in the last show.

Easily leading in the winnings are the well known Ormsby Kennels with such specimen as "Ormsby Winsome," "Ormsby Pass 'Em and "Lucienne," Netherwood, Wynot, Iclas Barbara, Belmore, and North End Kennels all hailing from Montreal have benched some outstanding specimens.

In Hull, F. Coleman, he of the "Shining Top" has brought out three successful puppies in "Wrightville Prince", "W. Paddy" and "Dolly."

Robitaille & Pelland of the North End Kennels have recently imported the good female "Overton Pride" whose picture appears hereunder. She was



bred by F. Brownrigg, England, sired by "Viscount of Harford" out of "Mischief Maid." She has a wonderful neck, short back and grand hind-quarters. She should be mated to "Carsington Cyclone" the new importation by E. Cork of Verdun, which was advertised in our October issue. "Cyclone" as was shown by his pedigree is an extraordinary combination of the Champions "Talavera Simen," "Fountain Crusader" and "Barrington Bridegroom" blood.

Irish Terriers are at a standstill at the present. Those incomparable pals and unyielding protectors should have more representatives in the homes of our burglary infested cities. The big-gest hearted fancier in Montreal, Henry Whitley, will soon have the pleasure to see some of "Ch. Goodfellow and J. Mildenhall also keep on producing real show specimen and we may verily say that what the breed lacks in number it brings out in quality.

BOOK REVIEWS By Capt. Bayldon, England "ABOUT OUR DOGS"*

Here one of our very greatest kennel authors and experts deals with the complete subject, authoritatively, concisely, and interestingly, and this in a single and moderately-priced volume. Mr. Croxton-Smith succeeds in eliminating the faults of previous omnibus books; and, with the introduction of new features, provides us finally with everything that such a volume should be

Taking breed by breed the author briefly describes their origin and history; then follow the standards of perfection, as laid down; in the case of nearly every breed (in sixty-four, to be exact) a photograph of a modern champion; and in many examples are given diagrams by Hay Hutchinson, who knows his canine anatomy besides being an artist of repute, which illustrate the outline of a dog with the outstanding points clearly explained in the picture—and this, to my mind, is incidentally one of the most useful and attractive features of the book.

As a further index of its comprehensiveness the following headings are some of the many included in this book: "Glossary of Technical Terms, On Buying a Dog, In Kennel and Home, The Daily Routine, Making a Gentlemen of Him, The Art of Breeding, The Brood Bitch, Rearing the Puppies, How to Show Your Dog, The Legal Side of Dog Keeping, and The Veterinary Section." In addition there are eight beautiful plates in colour by Ward Binks, and an Introduction by Lorna, Countess Howe. Altogether it is a most excellent work; and, moreover, as a book of reference, invaluable. Provided with such a volume as this, and perhaps a specialist book on his own particular breed, many fanciers of today would possess ample matter for their own immediate needs. Though every one of us who can fortunately contemplate a greater number of kennel works upon the shelves, will nevertheless be surely ill at ease till "About Our Dogs" is safely added to the library.

"PATCH"*

Apart from being an intensely live story about a dog, this book possesses the distinction that its authoress is only thirteen years of age. It appears, too, that this is not her maiden effort, for Moyra Charlton has previously written another book ("Tally Ho") to which this is the companion volume.

I read the book before I knew anything about the authoress' age; and, frankly, I would never have dreamed it. It is a good story, telling of the adventures of a dog that got shipped to America as a stowaway, of his adventures there, and how everything came right with a happy ending.

In an Introduction Lord Howard of Penrith, writes an appreciation of the authoress. The coloured frontispiece and other plates are by G. D. Armour, whose hunting subjects one loves so well in "Punch" and elsewhere; but with all due respect to Mr. Armour I must say that "Patch" is a rare good bodied 'un, and has wonderful bone, legs and feet, for just a mongrel! Moyra Charlton can write better than many in print who are double her age and more; and great things from her pen should be looked for in the future.

"FLAX: POLICE DOG"*

This is a book that all dog lovers, and Alsationists in particular, should delight in. There is something very reminiscent of the late Jack London's "White Fang" in this story about "Flax",* told in a manner that carries the reader breathlessly from start to finish, and losing nothing in the translation from the Danish by Mr. E. Gee

Flax leads a hectic life of adventure. The methods used in his training may appear somewhat barbarous to British minds; but he emerges none the worse for them; and is as responsive to kindness naturally as he is a terror to evildoers. The appearance of this book, moreover, is opportune since the public interest in Obedience Tests is unabated, and in making comparisons between the methods touched on in this book and those of our own, no little instruction can be gained from a technical point of view.

The illustrations are by Cecil Aldin—whence comment is superfluous; and the book is produced in the manner that one expects from Messrs. Eyre & Spottiswoode.

"LOST, STOLEN OR STRAYED"*

It can be taken that "Lost, Stolen or Strayed"* has been written by the owner of "Woppets," a Scottie, the hero, partly as a vent to her feelings after having undergone a painful experience and partly as a warning and help to others.

I have remarked before that I do not like reading about the sufferings of animals, real or imaginary. What happened to Woppets is true, but at the same time I was relieved that one's feelings were not unduly harrowed; because this little dog was not apparently very cruelly treated, but only suffered the callousness of professional dog thieves and dealers; and Miss Ashmore has not piled on the agony.

We all owe a debt of gratitude to the authoress for showing us how the professional London dog thief goes about his horrid work, and the means whereby she got her dog back safely home again—How, I am not going to give the story away by telling.

Mr. Cecil Aldin collaborates as illustrator, and his drawings are as numerous as they are excellent. Mr. Patrick R. Chalmers writes a powerful little Foreword; and the authoress' Postscript of Warning behoves us all never to let our dogs out of sight in public places.

DOGS OF TODAY

It is sometime since we had anything from the pen of Major Harding Cox, who incidentally was breeding and judging and an M.F.H. when most of us were still in our childhood.

His latest book is neither an elaborate treatise, nor is it a sequel to the doggy and sporting reminiscences wherein this popular author is so exceedingly entertaining; but in "Dogs of Today"* we now have something in the nature of a large vade-mecum of reference - résumé of all the principal breeds, illustrated by sixty beautiful pictures in photogravure. Facing these is given a brief description of each, including the author's views as to the origins of the different varieties, which by virtue of his extraordinary knowledge are probably much nearer the mark than are most. But this is not all -for brief as these are Major Harding Cox cannot escape from the style that is so uniquely his own, wherefore the reader who not inexcusably might be included to deem such matter dull and oft-told, is quite disillusioned. For it seems impossible for anything by Harding Cox to be dull-far from itthese notes are brimful of spice.

The Dog's Best Friend


concern then, when one of the grooms at the McFarland estate at Lake Simcoe, reported that he had found the dog in a nearby field obviously suffering from a broken leg, the injury no doubt having been the result of a contact between the hind hoof of a horse, and the hind leg of the dog, and right here is where it was demonstrated most vigorously, that man is the dog's best friend.

The puppy was brought to the General Hospital at Toronto, and had the damaged leg X-Rayed. The first negative showed the break but dimly on account of the severe swelling which had naturally developed. Subsequent X-Ray negatives clearly showed a bad fracture of the hip bone, and the cherished hopes for the life of the puppy were now none too sanguine, the Lethal Chamber became more than an imagination, but still "Man's" interest had to be a factor in all the possibilities. One of the most prominent bone surgeons practicing in Canada today, happened to be in the hospital, and was interested in viewing the X-Ray photographs, and on noting the serious nature of the fracture, he asked for permission to make a surgical experiment for the purpose of testing out certain theories which he had on the subject of bone development. The good surgeon gave his assurance, that the operation would be conducted according to the very best methods, and that there would be a reasonable chance of a complete recovery. Consent was readily given,

The puppy was operated on at the Banting Institute. He had everything for his canine comfort that his friend "Man" could bestow; two prominent surgeons, a fully qualified anaesthetist, and a trained nurse were in attendance, (Lucky dog). They opened up the leg, and what they found will be seen in the accompanying illustration taken directly from the X-Ray photograph, a complete break in an awkward location, When the broken parts were finally placed in alignment they were made secure by a silver splint which was held in place by three screws fastened directly to the bone, and as seen in the second illustration, there is a perfect alignment.

The days of grave concern following the operation were rather disquieting on the whole, particularly so, since convalescence presented the opportunity for daily observation, at one time gratification, at another time grave doubt. However, from the entire disturbing condition has come cause for much optimism, and who can tell? perhaps the little "White Cavalier" will "strut his stuff" in our dog show rings, and defy his judges to find the damage that at one time so nearly cost him his young life.

Bred up to a definite breeding programme, much was anticipated from the little hero of our story. Sired by "Ch. Albion Victor," a dog that has never been beaten in his classes wherever he has appeared in Canada. As a further tribute to "Albion Victor's" quality, we recall his winning the Canadian National Exhibition in 1927, and in 1929, a son of "Ch. Haymarket Senator," who is a son of "Ch. Coolridge Grit of Blighty" (Imp.), and out of "Haymarket Spot," a daughter of "Hay-market Laddie," a dog that had the great "Grit of Blighty" for sire also. The dam was "White Delight" (Imp.), she by "Ch. Hades Cavalier," a son of "Ch. Hampstead White Hot," and out of "Treviso," a daughter of the great

White Imp. It will be noticed just why it was so important, that the horse-kicked little "Franklin" prospect should make a speedy and complete recovery.

and we trust that our review of this regrettable accident has demonstrated satisfactorily to our readers, that in appreciation of a dog's devotion to mankind, "Man" himself is just as strongly devoted to the Canine race.

DOGS AND WINTER AILMENTS Bronchitis

By John England

It is during the autumn and winter months that dogs are very liable to contract what is generally thought to be "a cold," whereas the possibilities are, that complications of a far more serious order are on the way. . . . for instance Bronchitis and Asthma. Let us consider the two forms of Bronchitis, their symptons and home treat-

The two forms referred to are cute and chronic. The first named is an acute inflammation of the bronchial mucuous membrane accompanied by a cough and the second is a chronic catarrhal inflammation of the bronchial tubes-a distinction with a big differ-The symptons are very similar in both cases but the "chronic" form of bronchitis can result either from persistent action of improper hygiene especially damp atmosphere. origin of "acute" bronchitis, although associated with such diseases as distemper and influenza, can too often be traced to careless housing conditions on the part of the dog's owner. Exposure to cold and wet; rapidly changing atmospherical conditions; fogs and mists; the breathing in of irritating substances are among other causes. A most distressing cough develops and a rise in temperature (two or three degrees) takes place. The novice can learn little from a dog's expectorations. When chronic bronchitis intervenes, septic conditions may arise, which in turn bring about a loss of appetite and a general falling off in health. In both cases, constipation is to be guarded against and if the tongue becomes coated or dirty, a reliable purgative should be immediately given.

The patient should be kept in a well ventilated room of even temperature -not less than 65 deg. Place the dog in a flannel coat, avoid poulticing except when congestion of the lungs ensues. The dog's head should be kept higher than the rest of the body as that position serves to facilitate breathing. Strongly camphorated codliver oil may, with great advantage, be rubbed into the chest in the case of smooth-coated dogs and cod-liver oil should be administered in all cases after an attack of acute bronchitis. Chronic bronchitis is greatly relieved by the employment of a "bronchitis" kettle or inhalations should be given night and morning. The patient should not be exposed to cold air for at least an hour after the inhalation, even though recovering.

As regards diet, this should be given in grue Iform, such as Bengers Food;

The patient's appetite can be tempted by giving a warm mash made up of broken dog biscuit, hound or terrier meal thoroughly soaked in hot gravy, soup or beef tea. As health and strength is regained, a mash made up of household scraps and hound or terrier meal can be given. In the ordinary way, dog biscuits are an excellent food, but where the system requires special nourishment, Cod Liver Oil Dog Cakes should be substituted. Fish Dog Cakes likewise are excellent and particularly appetising and attractive to dogs off their feed. At all times a plentiful supply of clean fresh drinking water should be available for the patient.

It is a peculiarity of ailments common to human beings and animals, that although they may be known by the same names, the symptoms and characteristics oft-times differ. Whereas pure "asthma"-as is known-is not a common disease in dogs, asthma, as far as it is associated with bronchial and cardiac (heart) troubles, is prevalent. Asthma is a spasmodic disease, characterised by paroxysms of difficult breathing, accompanied by great wheezing, a dreadful sense of restriction in the chest coupled with long intervals of healthy respiration. Whatever the cause, it is generally admitted

that the vasomotor nerves (spinal nerves affecting the heart) or the nerves supplied to respiratory system (bronchiolas) control the phenomena.

The cause of asthma can be either "local" or "general." "Local" irritation of the mucuos lining of the nose, pharynx (throat) or bronchial tubes may be brought about by injurious inhalations of dust, or by climatic influences such as damp, cold, winds, fogs, malaria or even by the continguity of trees. When an attack comes on some time after food has been taken, the cause cannot be attributed to irritating foodstuffs. It is generally the direct result of indigestion. In this direction, it is most unwise to feed dogs on highly spiced or rich foods.

Asthma may occur at any time. . . . usually in the early hours of the morning due to the tendency of the nervous system to reflex action during sleep. Normally there is no warning, the onset, being quite sudden. Temperature is unaffected. Respiration is not particularly hurried unless the heart is affected, but is very labored. Respiration is short and deep, expiration much prolonged. Breathing is noisy, wheezy and whistling. Asthma must not be confused with bronchitis and the former may be distinguished from the latter by an absence of rise in temperature. To relieve difficulty in breathing, Iodide of Potash or Liquid Arsencalis is useful. If heart complications are present, Nux Vomica and Digitalis should be given. The alimentary (food) tract should receive attention of it is disordered. The nasal or nose passages may also be treated if necessary by spraying with solutions of Stovaine, Chloral, Chloroform and Ether. The novice is well advised to pay a visit to a veterinary surgeon before dabbling with treatments of too complicated a nature, the more especially when drugs are called into play. Asthma is serious at the best of times, but unless checked, the tendency is to increased frequency and severity of attack and subsequent organic disease, resulting in death.

Notes From Manitoba

HE old year is drawing rapidly to its close, yet notwithstanding that business has been transacted with the utmost caution and that expenses have been cut, and are still being cut to the limit, kennel clubs have held their dog shows as usual. Some shows have had larger entries than in previous years whilst others were not quite so successful in the matter of entries. Without doubt, they were all carried through with the same old enthusiasm. So far as business is concerned the financial depression rightly gets the blame where sales have not been so good as in former years. Several of our Winnipeg fanciers, however, have consistently reported business as usual, and that so far as they were concerned there was no depression. And even now all around us in the business world we see signs of renewed activity. Men have quit looking around for some leader, and are taking the initiative them-It appears that the turn has come before the end of the old year and that the New Year will see us well up the slope on the opposite side of the valley.

Let us revert to what was said last month about the warmth of the kennel in winter, its relation to the amount of food required and its further relation to the subsequent health of the This matter was only briefly touched last month, due to lack of time. The temperature of a kennel should be about 60 deg. F., perhaps a little less for a dog accustomed to his liberty during the day. If a kennel is not kept warm enough, more food than is usually given has to be supplied in order to keep the animal in condition, and it is quite evident the extra food has been required to supply body heat. This not only taxes the digestive organs but reduces his power of resistance to disease and also renders him more susceptible to diseases other than those of the digestive tract. Acute indigestion, gastric catarrh, and gastritis are the common sequel to persistent overfeeding and more particularly so if the food given is of a bulky nature. The stomach is quite closely related to the heart, if we look at it from the viewpoint of its nerve supply, quite too closely related for some of us sometimes. A branch of the great nerve which supplies the stomach also supplies a depression branch to the heart, so that it is quite readily understood why collapse often speedily occurs when there is a sudden attack of acute indigestion. to diseases other than those of the digestive tract is seen in the increasing numbers that go down to disease in the late winter and early spring, diseases which in a number of cases have a fatal ending.



ANOTHER BERGHOLTZ CHAMPION



Here we find a German Shepherd dog that has been a faithful campaigner at all the shows from Sherbrooke, Que., to London, Ont., during the years 1930-31. Particularly in 1931 has Mrs. A. B. Calow, Toronto, been enthusiastic over the appearance of her recently crowned champion, "Alla von Bergholtz," who, after attending over a dozen shows where she was at the top, or near to it, she put the 5 points won at the Canine Society Show (Montreal), to good advantage by securing 2 more points at Sherbrooke, and on the following day got 5 more points at the Ladies' Kennel Club (Montreal).

"Ch. Alla von Bergholtz" is the usual answer to the oft repeated quotation, "Like begets like." Her sire, "Ch. Emir v.d. Sudenburg" and her dam, "Int. Ch. Alla v. Krone," are both animals from the breeding lines that continue to furnish quality progeny, and no doubt if Mrs. Calow continues breeding German Shepherds she will always hold a strong hand in competition. One thing certain is, if Mrs. Calow gets the right puppies, she will know how to raise them to the greatest advantage, and that is the secret of making cl.ampions, get them first, and then raise them right. It is not all the champions that are born that make the championship grade.

"Ch. Alla von Bergholtz" has been bred to "General Nuisance of Road-side," a grandson of the great Gerri v. Oberklamm, and the puppies are expected to arrive around December 13th, and given the breaks some of them will be offered for sale in our business 1 ages in January issue.

"A BIG ONE"

That is what the fisherman usually says about his catch, but the "big one" we have in mind is than the St. Bernard, "Pancrase de la Solitude"—a dog owned in Belgium and shown at the International Dog Show held at Versailles recently. "Pancrase" is said to be the largest and heaviest dog in the world, weighs 227 lbs., and stands so high, that he nearly touches his handler's shoulders.

We do not know the height of the handler at the shoulder; neither have we learned the actual height of the dog itself, but we do know that it was declared the finest animal at the Versailles fixture, and we have in mind that there has been no scale of points adopted for the St. Bernard on this Continent, although the descriptive standard adopted by the St. Bernard Club of America specifically states, that the height at the shoulder ought to be 27.56 inches for males, and 25.59 inches for females, and we are left to wonder how good the "Big One" would be considered in this country.

And now that we are writing about St. Bernards, reminds us of the specimen that came in to the ring at the Canadian National Exhibition to compete in the Working Group, which indicated in itself that the dog had made half a championship at the show. So much did his appearance impress us, that we referred the matter to Mr. Meyer the judge who had stamped his approval on the dog. Frankly, we asked the judge if the animal was of championship calibre, and just as frankly he admitted that it was not, therefore we mentioned, that with his approval the dog had won half the necessary points at the show, Mr. Meyer admitted his error of judgment, explaining that, at shows held under American

Kennel Club rules, a dog having no competition would receive no points, and that was what he had in mind when he handed out the winners ribbon for St. Bernards at the Canadian National Exhibition Dog Show.

But it is rather peculiar how some of our judges view their obligations in the ring, and to notice how often their hearts win over their heads in some cases. At Hamilton, judge George Kynoch withheld the winners ribbon for St. Bernards, whilst at London's two shows both judges gave out the winners ribbons, and our judges should never overlook the very important fact, that a cheap champion must always be more if a reflection on the judges themselves than it can be on the Canadian Kennel Club rules. In fact every judge selected to judge a dog show in Canada, is officially advised as soon as possible after his appointment, that it is the desire of the Canadian Kennel Club, that he should withhold his favors from dogs, which in his judgment lack in championship merit. It is the judges who make the champions, and it is their privileged duty to do justice to their calling in this respect.

THE WIZBANG KENNELS

Miss E. E. Sparrow has taken over all the "Wizbang" establishment—the houses, kennels, and the dogs. Already extensive alterations have been made, and the whole plant will be remodelled and new runs have been furnished. Many of the dogs will be disposed of at reasonable prices, as Miss Sparrow has decided to visit England early in 1932, with a view to purchasing some fresh stock.

Those persons who may be on the lookout for Christmas presents, such as puppy Bull Terriers, "Wires" or Scotties, might do worse than mention their needs to the understanding Miss Sparrow.

The Royal Winter Fair and the Ottawa Winter Fair shows were not attended by the Wizbang dogs on account of uncertainties of weather conditions and risk of distemper, therefore the Wizbang string of Setters, Kerry Blues and Shelties will be specially cared for and made ready for the Spring shows; in fact the pick of the year's breeding will be retained and prepared for next year's breeding and exhibiting plans.

Great consternation has been caused in the Barracks St. Jean by the poisoning of Mrs. Forgrave's Irish Setter "Wizbang Shannon," one of "Ch. Wizbang Buntiebell's" beautiful sons, and a dog with plenty of promise.

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PROPER FEEDING FOR COCKERS

Many are the arguments put forward, both for and against, regarding the converting of the sporting type of dog to the domesticity of home life. The fact remains that many of the more popular dogs, both in the home and on the Show Bench, belong to this class; entries at Dog Shows give emphasis to this fact. In this direction few will deny that the Cocker Spaniel has everything to recommend him and the reasons for his popularity are not far to seek. Into his dainty little being he packs an abundance of vitality and a wealth of cheeriness and affection that makes an irresistible appeal to both sexes. There is no dog more delightfully adapted to home surroundings and in temperament, he is perfection itself. His appearance, likewise, can only be described as charming, It is pleasing to find, however, that the transferring of the "Cocker" from his original vocation of "flushing" the Woodcock (hence his name) has not destroyed his inherent characteristics. Whether it be in flat, villa, town, house or the country, the Cocker is equally at home. He fits in. . . he has the happy knack of doing what is expected of him.

A word of advice becomes necessary on the management of this most ancient member of the Spaniel family, to those who already own or contemplate ownership of this attractive breed of dog. In company with the remaining six varieties of Spaniels, the Cocker is a greedy feeder. Food in almost any shape or form will be eaten with avidity-so much so that his master or mistress might be forgiven for assuming that the dog was hungry or underfed. Overfeeding must be avoided, otherwise surplus "avoirdupois" will be the resulting factor coupled with habits of laziness which will be found most difficult to dispel. More dogs are ruined by the giving of titbits and "inbetween-time" snacks than any other cause. Lasting love, trust and palship will never be won by these means. Two regular feeds a day are all that a Cocker requires to keep him mentally and physically fit, and each meal should consist wholly or partly of meat dog biscuits in one form or another. Variation can be introduced by giving the biscuits sometimes "dry" and at others, well soaked in hot gravy or soup or mixed with dinner table scraps. Occasionally a large meaty bone can be given-excellent for the exercising of jaws and teeth. Sweetstuffs, chocolates, bread and the like must be rigidly taboo. Cockers love these things but they are ruinous to their figures and constitutions.

WHAT IS THIS?


