

The Canadian Fancy

By WALTER H. REEVES, Belleville, Ont.

MUST admit that until recently I did not realize how Dominion-wide the agitation was amongst the Fancy for the registration of our unregistered champions. At the annual general meeting of the C.K.C., I reported to the members, that no word had been received from the Minister of Agriculture, the Hon. Mr. Weir, as to the result of my interview with him, asking for the reopening of the stud books. A few days before the National Live Stock Record's annual meeting—the following letter was received:

Ottawa, 7th March, 1932. Walter H. Reeves, Esq., Dear Mr. Reeves,

I have your letter of February 19th with reference to unregistered Canadian Champion dogs. I am advised that the amendment to the constitution submitted on October 14, 1929, with which you are thoroughly familiar, was not approved. This action, I believe, was due to the fact that the Canadian Kennel Club had agreed, in writing, that the terminating date for the registration of three generation animals was to be January 1st, 1920, and that this date was to be considered as the final limit.

Several attempts have been made since that time, in the way of reopening the Stud Book to dogs with three generations of breeding. In all cases it has been deemed advisable to refuse these requests, as a result of the considered opinion of the National Live Stock Records and the Department of Agriculture. Because of this fact, and in that I am thoroughly familiar with the matter of registration, generally, as applied to other classes of live stock, it would seem to me that the reopening of the books to permit of the registration, generally, as applied to other classes of live stock, it would seem to me that the reopening of the books to permit of the registration of dogs with the required number of points and a short pedigree, would be a retrograde step. If, however, it proved to be the unanimous opinion of the breeders that such action be contemplated, it would be with the understanding that the listing of dogs be discontinued, so as to preclude any re-occurrence of the consideration in question.

It is evident that the Minister of Agriculture has changed his opinion which he expressed to the writer at the interview, and as the Hon. Mr. Weir does not seem at the present time to grasp the importance of registering our unregistered champions, therefore I have sent another letter to the minister as follows:

The Hon. Mr. R. Weir, Minister of Agriculture, Dear Mr. Weir:

I wish to thank you for the consideration you have given to the amendment to the constitution submitted by the Canadian Kennel Club for the registration of unregistered champions. From the contents of your letter I gather that you are not quite familiar with the amendment. The Canadian Kennel Club are not asking for the registration of unregistered champions with a "short pedigree," but for the registration of unregistered champions with which a three generation authentic pedigree can be furnished. This would be carefully protected by the Canadian Kennel Club

With regard to the listing of dogs: To do away with the listing would seriously diminish the entries and support given to our shows by U.S.A. exhibitors and by our own Canadian people and would do serious harm financially to all Canadian dog shows and breeders.

May I, in view of the facts brought forward in this letter ask you to kindly reconsider the request of the Canadian Kennel Club for the registration of our unregistered champions. If you accede to the Dominion-wide request of Canadian dog breeders, it will mean that these unregistered champions will be of immense value in helping to improve our Canadian-bred dogs. The slogan today in breeding is "Individuals" and these unregistered champions have been picked out by the leading Canadian and American judges as the sires and dams breeders should use to improve their stock, and moreover it must not be forgotten, that many of these unregistered champions are descendants of England's best producing

On Wednesday, March 16th, Robert Ross and the writer were present at the annual meeting at the Canadian National Live Stock Records which was held at the Chateau Laurier, Ottawa. We were both pleased to welcome our director, John W. Bruce. We tried to get the meeting to vote on the following resolution:

"That this meeting of the National

Live Stock Records Board endorse the application of the Canadian Kennel Club for the registration of unregistered dogs which have obtained their championship at recognized shows held under Canadian Kennel Club Rules."

In spite of assistance received from Geo. Robertson and A. A. MacDonald, the resolution met with considerable opposition from the Chairman and the following amendment to the resolution was proposed and accepted:

"To arrange a meeting between the representatives of the Canadian Kennel Club and the Department of Agriculture."

During the long wait for the departure of the train that evening to Belleville, the writer paid a call upon the well known Bull Terrier breeder, Humphrey Elliott, and we had a most interesting time talking over some of the old time celebrities. Going back to the hotel, the writer found Messrs. Gunderson and McCullough from the Records offices who very kindly offered themselves as guides so that the writer could see some of the Ottawa fanciers and their dogs. Our first call was upon "Dick" Briggs who we found was attending a meeting of the Ottawa Kennel Club. However, Dick's son was pleased to show us some of the noted inmates of the kennel and we were just admiring some of Frank Plant's Irish Setters when we were joined by Mr. Plant, Dick Briggs and Allen C. Me-Guirl. After looking at some particularly promising Wire-haired Fox Terrier puppies, a very neat little black Cocker, and an Irish Setter of more than average promise, we congratulated their owners, and then made a rush trip to Allen C. McGuirl's Cocker Kennels as the writer was particularly anxious to see a somewhat recent importation from England, the black Cocker "Church Leigh Beu," a son of "Fullery of Ware" and "Monreith Bess." "Church Leigh Beu" was bred by the well known Irish breeder, F. Smith, and I am confident that this dog will prove extremely useful to Canadian Cocker breeders, for he certainly has breeding, type and quality. Allen McGuirl showed us a number of typical Cockers and amongst them a little parti-colored bitch, probably one, if not the last of the Cockers left by that successful and constructive Ottawa breeder, the late "Andy" Armstrong. After admiring a rare bodied black and white bitch it was time for us to hurry back to the hotel where we arrived a few minutes before train time, having spent a very enjoyable time-thanks to our energetic guides.

I hoped to find time whilst in Ottawa to run out and see some of the importations of Geo. Bailey. This well known Ottawa breeder and exhibitor, in writing to give me some news of his kennel, wrote that he was somewhat under the weather having been laid up but just getting over a very stubborn attack of bronchitis. I was particularly anxious to see "Thet Topsy" for I was very much impressed by her photograph and also her breeding, sire, "Ch. Epping Eldorado," dam, "Simons Dimple." This attractively marked little wire won two firsts at Cardiff Championship Show and also two firsts at Richmond Championship Show, a record to be noted, for the competition is always pretty keen at these important English Shows where so many of our past and present celebrities have made their debut. "Thet Topsy" before leaving England was mated to "Ch. Thet Tetrarch" and arrived in capital condition at Ottawa on February 23rd and is due to whelp on March 31st, a few days before these notes will appear. "Thet Topsy" should certainly produce something of extra merit from this mating, particularly as her dam is one of England's best producers, being also the dam of another importation of the Ottawa Kennel "Thet Trojan," a certificate winner at the Great Joint Terrier Show where he met and defeated, under no less an authority than S. Loraine, "Ch. Crackley Startler," "Ch. Rodio of Cotts," "Ch. Grandon Masterpiece," "Ch. Beau Brocade," and a host of other good terriers. Miss Dixon and will then join his late companions. My correspondent writes that it is now his intention to keep only a small select kennel and he has a very laudable ambition, to try and breed a wire good enough for the Garden.

H. Smith, MacDonald College, St. Ann de Bellevue, Quebec, is a new and valuable recruit to the ranks of Wire Fox Terrier breeders. He has undoubtedly shown judgment in his initial purchase by acquiring from Geo. Bailey the all white bitch "Barrack Hill Purity," a daughter of "By Town Statesman."

Before leaving the Ottawa kennel "Purity" was mated to "Thet Timberson," therefore this new fancier should be off to an excellent start for he has acquired a real nice matron, which has been mated to a dog that should suit her.

Another sale which is important from Geo. Bailey's Kennel is the purchase of "Barrack Hill Fashion," a very nice all round Wire, whose new owner is Geo. B. Sprowll of the Clayton Kennels, Claysville, Penn. "Barrack Hill Fashion," before leaving Ottawa, was showing unmistakable signs of being in whelp to "Master Key."

The writer is sorry that an error was made through his notes last month in stating that the weight of Cocker Spaniels had been increased.

As all Cocker Spaniel breeders know the weight has not been raised but only made compulsory. Personally, I heartily congratulate the Cocker Spaniel fanciers on having established a fixed weight for one of the most useful of our sporting dogs.

Returning from New York Show, I went into the smoking car on the New York Central Rly train en route for

Montreal, and sitting there I renewed acquaintance with one of my boyhood friends. As we had both drifted to the breeding and showing of dogs in England at about the same time, very naturally we were soon talking about man's best friend, and incidents which had occurred at some of the English shows thinty years ago. I soon found out that my friend was living on the American Continent and the surprising thing was, that he was not taking any active part in dogs. Why? I asked. Even more surprising was his reply. "The sport in which we were both so interested when in England is by far too professional on the American Continent. Can you imagine the English Kennel Club allowing Terriers to be so over-prepared for shows as they seem to allow both in the U.S.A. and Canada?" my friend continued. "I spent some time at New York Show today and I watched with consternation the way exhibitors were cutting the coats of their Terriers before taking them into the ring. Can you imagine what Walter Glynn would have done with one of these over-trimmed Terriers if it had been shown under him?" "Oh yes," I replied, "we do allow a little more latitude in trimming!" "You may call it trimming," my friend replied, "but I call it faking, what chance has a novice exhibitor with Boston Terriers? I was watching some of the exhibitors level up the blaze on the skull of their Bostons and blacken the muzzle; in fact you need to be a beauty parlor artist to show Bostons." I tried without success to tell my friend that he had old-fashioned ideas. "Well maybe I have," he replied, "Do you ever allow the cutting of tendons to improve the carriage of tails? The reason I am asking is, that I have rather a nice Irish Terrier whose chief fault is a very gay tail. I asked a handler to get him ready for a forthcoming show

in the West, but I cancelled these instructions when he suggested a little operation on the tail." I have been thinking over this conversation since my return and really believe it would be for the good of dog shows if we did tighten up a little on preparation

As announced in the last issue of Kennel and Bench, I am including in my paper a typical Welsh Terrier, the English and American Champion, "Hulloa of Halcyon" the property of the Halcyon Kennels, Goshen, New York. It seemed to be the general impression amongst Terrier men at New York Show that the game little Terrier of Wales is at last going to have much more attention than hitherto -therefore I am giving a few salient features of the breed. In the "New Book on the Dog" edited by Robert Leighton and published by Cassell & Company, Ltd., I have found a most interesting history of the breed by probably the world's best known authority, Walter S. Glynn. From it I get the following information. "This breed is near akin to the Wire-haired Fox Terrier, the principal difference being merely of color and type. The Welsh Terrier is a wire-haired black or grizzle and tan. The most taking coloring is a jet black body and back with deep tan head, ears, legs, belly and tail. Several specimens have, however, black foreheads, skulls, ears, and tail and the black will frequently be seen extending for a short way down the legs. There must, however, be no black below the hock-there must be no substantial amount of white anywhere, a dog possessing either of these faults is, according to the recognized standard of the breed, disqualified. Many of the most successful bench winners have, nevertheless, been possessed of a little white on the chest and even a few hairs of that color on their hind toes and apparently by the



common consent of all the judges of the breed, they have been in nowise handicapped for these blemishes. Though one would of course prefer to have a whiteless specimen, as long as the mark in that color is not on a prominent position of the dog's anatomy, and is not in any way extensive, there is no need to trouble about it." Delving into the history of the breed, the author states as a show bench exhibit the Welsh Terrier is not more than twenty-two years old. He has, however, resided in Wales for centuries. There is no doubt that he is in reality identical with the old black and tan wire-haired dog which was England's first Terrier and which has taken such a prominent part in the production and evolution of all the other varieties of the sporting terrier. The author's remarks on the wrong types are as follows: "Amongst those of wrong type that are sometimes to be seen are specimens which show a distinct likeness to an Airedale, Fox, Irish or Bedlington Terrier, even to a Collie. All these are, as has been said, easily discernible by competent judges, who will have none of them and adhere manfully to the proper Welsh type.' Besides the disqualifying points mentioned by the author, the following disqualification points appear in the Standard of Points, nose white, cherry, or spotted to a considerable extent with either of these colors; 2, ears prick, tulip or rose; 3, undershot jaw or pig jawed mouth.

I have just been informed by one, in whose word and judgment I can place every confidence, that A. V. Martin, the Secy-Treasurer of the Nova Scotia Kennel Club, Inc., has a litter of collies, that have only to go on as they promise to make history, they own as their sire "Champion Major Lukeo" and as their dam that sweet headed bitch "Ch. Lodestone Memory." Blood lines which commend themselves to even the most critical student of breeding.

My mail this month contains a letter from W. Norman Higgs, the hon. secv. of the English Mastif Breeders' Association. Some twenty years or more ago my old friend owned the strongest kennel of Mastiffs in the world. I am therefore more than delighted to hear that he has been induced to again take an interest in one of England's oldest breeds. My friend asks me if we have any active breeders of Mastiffs in Canada? I am afraid not. If by any chance, this should be perused by anyone interested in the breed, I wish they would write and let me know if they have any Mastiffs, and their breeding.

This winner was the Mellenthin bred "The Great My Own", now owned by Leonard Buck of New York City. If we ever see 9,389 entries less 170 in Canada, then we will know that this country has gone to the dogs sure enough, but what gives us the greatest thrill at the moment is the fact that Cocker Spaniels topped the list for entries at this year's Crufts. Keep the merry little Cocker on top.

The Cocker Spaniel, "Ch. Fayette Fascinator," owned by Chas. A. Kolb, Pittsburg, Pa., has been collecting his championship points at shows from the Mississippi to the Atlantic. He was best of breed thirteen times between Omaha, Nev. and Rochester, N.Y., and was winners, dogs, at twelve shows from Tulsa, Okla., to Buffalo, N.Y.

It is nice to remember that C. E. Living of the Carleton Kennels, Ottawa, one of the oldest Cocker breeders now alive in Canada, was the breeder of the United States globe trotting history maker. Indeed, "Ch. Fayette Fascinator" is a little brother to Mr. Living's "Carleton Fascinator" who went best in show at the Ladies' Kennel Club show at Montreal in 1925.

In the Buffalo show held March 2 and 3, there were 47 Cockers benched with good competition from the East. The different Classes were carefully judged by Miss Ethel W. Fischer, who was most thorough and gave satisfaction to all. One comment we received on the show was—"Miss Fischer showed great interest in her work and tried to do justice to every Cocker that came before her."

Judge's Comment and Awards. JUDGE W. W. BROWN, Montreal

THE Pekin Palace Dog Association held its Seventh Annual Show in the Alexandra Room of the King Edward Hotel, Toronto, Saturday, March 19th was one of the best managed, smoothest and cleanest shows that was ever held in that city. I have seen plenty of shows in the last 25 years, but none to equal this one. The Pekingese fanciers and exhibitors who have never entered at any of the above club's shows don't know what they have missed, and I advise that they get in on the next one.

Judging was to start at 2.30 p.m. so I arrived at 2.20 and enquired where the Dog Show was being held. bell boy said "right in here, sir." I stopped into the magnificent Alexandra room and found all the tables covered with snow white linen, nicely decorated cages on them, with seventynine lovely Pekes of both sexes all resting comfortably, not a sound to be heard. The ring was large and roomy, the floor covered with a nice carpet, beautiful gilded chairs all around for every person to sit down and be comfortable. At the far end of the ring were two long tables packed with a wonderful array of the cups, silverware, cut glass and many other nice prizes that were to be won. Looking the whole thing over, it would naturally appeal to all and sundry that this was indeed the Royal Palace of the Pekin Palace Dogs. The officers and committee were all hustling here and there putting the finishing touches on everything so that the show would start on time. Dr. C. C. Clemmer, the president and show superintendent deserves much credit for the way he handled everything. Then his wife, the treasurer, a real worker and a good sport, had a kind word for everyone that came near her; and at the same time was busy getting all her specials numbered in order to save delay after the judging of the classes. We noticed the vice-president and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Pendlebury doing their share helping the public to get settled down. Then there was the hard-working secretary, Mrs. M. Walker, always as busy as a bee answering all kinds of questions, collecting money and keeping everything and everybody in order, so with the balance of the officers and committees all doing the share which had been allotted to them, the show was a success from the very start.

Last but not the least is none other than "Len" Morris, my ring steward, a fine jolly fellow, and a ring steward from the word "go." I should imagine his services would be always very much in demand. When entering the ring I was advised that I had drawn an entry of 79 dogs benched, which made 40 classes, some of them with 8, 9, 10, 11, 12 and 13. Judging started on time and by 5.40 p.m. was informed by Dr. Clemmer and the ring steward that we had finished the major part of the classes, and that we would stop for At that moment we were supper. joined by our Canadian Kennel Club Secretary, J. D. Strachan, so off we went, the doctor, "Jimmy," Len Morris and myself. When we arrived at the dining room of the Elliott House, I was surprised to find nearly the whole of the officers, committees and exhibitors were all there before us and what a happy family we were, everybody was feeling fit and full of pep. We returned to the Alexandra room and resumed judging at 7.30 p.m.

By 10.40 p.m. the last class had been judged, and the specials were soon distributed and there were plenty of them. At 11 p.m. practically everything was over and I could not help feeling that I had been a co-worker for a day with a good lot of sports. Everybody was happy and smiling, even the hard working officers and committee workers who were really tired out, joined in to make this the end of a perfect day for me.

This brought back pleasant memories of Dog Shows in dear old Montreal years ago. My Winner's Dog and Best of Breed was "Whitworth Michael," owned by Mrs. R. Strathy of New York city. A very, nice dark red, beautiful headed, nice bodied and good fronted dog, low to ground, and a good mover who showed well.

The Winner's Bitch and best of opposite sex was "Stocktonion China Toy," owned and bred by Mrs. L. F. Luke, Toronto, a nice cream coloured bitch, nice head and face, good coat, feet, down in the pink of condition, and a perfect shower.

In the Canadian-bred class for dogs I found a dog that had much to demand, and to hold my attention, but finally he had to give way to the more matured and better ring mannered "Whitworth Michael," nevertheless, 1 shall watch this No. 6 dog if he appears at future shows. My notes show that he was "Shensi Ming Toy," and bred by Alf. Roberts at the Shensi Kennels at Humber Bay. It is very gratifying to me to realize that Canada can put Pekes in the show rings as plentifully and of such splendid average type as the dogs that came before me on March 19th at this Pekin Palace Show. Taking the entry as a whole, they were a splendid lot of Pekes, and most of them will be heard from in the

On Sunday feeling nicely rested, I found a car at my disposal and in company with our Canadian Kennel Club Secretary and his daughter, a few of the kennels were given a rush visit, I had no idea that time could fly so quickly and in the early afternoon we were a trifle undecided whether the next stop would be the Badminton Kennels of Mrs. Mitchell, or Christie Street Hospital where dear old George Eastham is a war broken patient, however, it was Sunday, and the Christian thought prevailed, so to Christie Street we went. On our arrival there we found that a "flu" quarantine had just concluded and that our friend, George had left for an afternoon at home. We followed the instructions given to us at the hospital, but found the door closed at the address supplied. We left regretting we had not seen Mr. Eastham, but wherever he was we do hope that his company was congenial, and that his change was pleasant.

There is lots of pleasure and good fellows left in the game yet, so we must all strive to make the most out of it, and be prepared to put all we can into it. This was my first experience officiating at a licensed show in Canada. I am delighted to know that my work was appreciated and well regarded, so I shall look forward to similar appointments with pleasure.

CATALOGUE of the recent show of the Golden Gate Kennel Club of San Francisco, which was kindly lent me, containing the marked awards of the Wire-haired Fox Terriers, it is of interest here, owing to the fact that two of our breeders' names appear as having bred two terriers that got into the money -"Ch. Keythorpe Pansy," by "Ch. Beckside Bonus," ex "Ch. Keythorpe Biddy," bred by the Hon. Mrs. P. B. Tyrwhitt of Vancouver, and exported by Mrs. Thornton Sharp, got 2nd in Open Bitches. In Limit Dogs, "Weyburn Brigadier," by "Simon of Cantilupe," ex "Ulidia Frip," bred and exported by Wm. J. Moffett of Burnaby, got 3rd in Limit Dogs.

Four young wires from the Ulidia Kennels, by "Simon of Cantilupe," found new homes in the United States during February.

The first show of the year for Vancouver, irrespective of the so-called "Parlor" shows, will be that of the Coast City Kennel Club, to be held in the Drill Hall, Vancouver, on May the 18th. I learn from their Secretary, G. L. Stock, that five judges have been selected-H. Lester taking all terriers; E. Cargill, Cockers. C. B. Payne, Shepherd Dogs (he has been appointed as specialty judge by the Shepherd Dog Club of British Columbia); Stanley Dorrell, Toys; J. Meadows, all other breeds. Three judging rings will be in use continuously during the show, which is, as it should be. Most of our dog shows are far too long drawn out, and one finds a spirit of apathy amongst the exhibitors until their breed is judged, we want our shows to be more bright and cheerful. Certainly our first show of the year promises to go off to a good start.

After the Coast City Show, comes the Vancouver Kennel Club Show on May 24th. Oswald Balshaw is again Secretary, they have secured as judge, Henry Oppenheimer of Seattle, Wash, who will take all breeds—Mr. Oppenheimer is a new judge for us, however, the Vancouver Kennel Club have a happy knack of getting good judges.

We regret to report the death of James Bates, for the past fifteen years inspector of the S.P.C.A. for Vancouver, a lover of animals, he endeared himself to all with whom he came in contact. Our sincere sympathy goes to his widow in her great sorrow.

At the Pomeranian Specialty Show, recently held in New York - Reserve Winners in Dogs went to Mrs. Emick's "Scamp," with fifty-two dogs competing, also best bred by exhibitor, out of ninety-six dogs in all. "Scamp" is the result of a bitch being sent from the United States to visit "Hello Bill" (imp.), by "Ch. Minegold Monseiur," ex "Frisian Girl" (imp.), the property of Wm. White of Eburne, B.C. It is particularly gratifying to us all when we hear of stock, by or out of our local dogs, going to the top at the biggest shows, and we heartily congratulate Mr. White, one of our keenest and most astute breeders.

Mr. White has recently sold "Ch. Fraser View Aye Ready," to Mrs. Edgeler of Monroe, Mich. "Ch. Fraser View Jacobean," to Mrs. Magill of Butte, Montana, and "Ch. Annie Laurie," to a British Columbia fancier, not many (in any breed) could dispose of a team like this, and yet at the present moment his kennel contains some of the best he has ever owned, one young dog in particular, being of exceptional promise.

Animal Welfare Week, in Canada and the United States, will be held this month, April 17th to 23rd. This animal anniversary week originated a good many years ago in the United States, it was adopted in England in 1922 to celebrate the centenary of "Martin's Act," the first law ever passed in any country for the protection of animals. "Animal-Welfare-Anniversary" affords an opportunity for presenting to the public the many aspects of the animal's cause. It is a week given over to a national proclamation of what Societies for the Prevention of Cruelty are, and what they stand for. Though they are fighting the meanest of all vices, the most important part of their work is not the punishment of offenders, but the prevention of offences, through education-"Punishment smarts but education lasts."

The latest addition to dog clubs in this Province is the British Columbia Sheep Dog Society, organized in Vancouver on March 11th, with the following officers:—

President, R. C. Sibbald, Matsqui; Secretary, Andrew Macfarlane, Colony Farm; Directors, F. Nelson, Cloverdale; A. C. Stewart, Abbotsford; R. A. Harrison, Langley; R. Gardiner, Colony Farm; C. Turner, Kilgard; D. S. Blacklock, Matsqui; E. A. Gamble, Chilliwack; J. D. Campbell, Vancouver; and Arthur Morton, Dominion Livestock Department for British Columbia. Im-

provement of the sheep dog breed and promotion of sheep dog trials are the principal objectives of the society. Mr. Sibbald, the president, demonstrated at Vancouver Exhibition three years ago what properly trained sheep dogs can do.

Mrs. Vernon of Kaledon, B.C., wellknown to us formerly as Miss Linton Lewis, of the Linton Airedale Kennels of Vancouver, has a young Airedale bitch of high quality coming out from England, which she intends mating to her "Ch. Clonmel Linton." She has also purchased a young Scottish Terrier bitch from the Swansea Kennels of Vancouver. Mr. Vernon has the "Saffron" Golden Retrievers, a breed tremendously popular in England, and steadily coming to the fore in Canada, due to no small part that he has played - a smooth Fox Terrier, "Hillview Tiny" purchased through Mr. Owen of Vancouver, has also joined these kennels-so we may expect great activity this year in the kennels of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon.

We hear of the uncommonly good job put up by Mr. Pym at New York, note with interest the winning English Setters on which he passed judgment, we believe the principal winning dogs were all closely related to British Columbia Setters—the 3rd in Open Dogs, "Harewood Kilmartin Grouse," bred by Reese Jones of Nanaimo, by "Old Pal o' Mine," ex "Lonesome Gal," first appeared at Victoria in 1929 owned by Hunter McCloy—hence the well-known "Kilmartin" of our director, Alex. McCloy; congratulations to all.

Notes from Manitoba

UCH has been written on "Foods and Feeding of Dogs," and the following extracts have been taken from a paper, the work embodied in which, was carried out whilst the author, W. P. Blount, M.R.C.V.S., was holding the "Centenary Post Graduate Fellowship, Royal (Dick.) Veterinary College, Edinburgh."

"When removed fresh from the cadaver, the stomach (normal) of the dog is felt to possess definite "tone" (firmness) due to the thickness of its walls, and there is usually quite a distinct configurative live of demarcation between the fundus (part nearest the oesaphagus (gullet), and the more thicker pars pylorica (part nearest the intestine).

Internally (best examined by slitting the organ along its greater curvature), the fundus presents ridges and folds of mucous membrane; the latter (about ten in number), run parallel to the curvatures of the organ. They are not effaced under pressure usually, whereas the sinuous folds are definitely associated with distension of the organ. Two of the primary folds appear to pass into the pyloric portion of the stomach, where they effectually assist in forming the line of demarcation between the two stomach areas, namely, fundus and pars pylorica.

The thickened mucous membrane of the pars pylorica possesses but a few low ridges since its increased tonicity is due chiefly to hypertrophy of the muscle layers.

The water-distention capacity of the stomach of the average dog (of 28 lbs. weight), is about 1.080 c.c., or nearly two pints. The physiological capacity is believed to be about two-thirds the water-distention capacity, i.e., about 720 c.c. or 26 ounces.

The greater curvature is seen to be, on the average, about 2.31 times as long as the lesser curvature for the normal empty stomach; for the fully distended organ it is about four times as great. It is convenient to discuss the changes in chronic gastric distention in the dog under two headings: (1) Anatomical, (2) Physiological. (1) Anatomical - On first handling the organ the most important character in which it differs from the normal stomach is its tone. The dilated stomach is thin, flabby, and devoid of turgidity. Internally there are equally important changes. The folds of mucous membrane are never as numerous as in the normal stomach, nor are they so well

developed. On the contrary, the ridges are frequently greatly increased. This is to be expected because their presence is due to the relaxation of the walls of the distended organ which causes a wrindling, often of almost honeycomb appearance. The stomach tone is lost, so that the mucous membrane becomes excessively ridged and disorganized. Further, during distention neither the pars pylorica nor the lesser curvative of the stomach vary very much, whereas the fundus swells and accommodates the ingoing contents.

The first evidence of chronic gastric dilation is the presence of additional ridges and a thinning of the upper part of the fundus. In time, with continuing irritation, this thin area spreads, so that in extreme cases practically the whole of the fundus becomes thinwalled. The general appearance is one of degeneration, pallor, atrophy, and loss of character (atony) in that there may be no mucous folds and few very sinuous low ridges.

The par pylorica is affected very little, although it, too, loses tone, and is obviously thinner than normal. In some cases there may not be any pyloric sphincter (the muscle which encircles the opening into the small intestine), because the muscle layers are atrophied and unable to hold back the gastric contents. (2) Physiological—In the examination of a stomach from an animal which has suffered from chronic gastric distention, the diagnostic feature is its abnormal capacity coupled with degenerative changes in the mucous membrane.

In addition to allowing the organ to hold abnormal quantities of food, gastric distention causes alteration in the stomach structure, and consequently of its function. Gastric atony means inefficient churning of its contents and consequent failure of the gastric juices to penetrate the food mass. The degenerate mucous membrane means inefficient outpouring of secretion with consequent indigestion, and more work for the pancreatic and intestinal glands to perform.

Aetiology

In the consideration of the causation of this condition, we are faced with the fact that the present-day house dog cannot in many respects be considered normal. His food, exercise, and general behaviour under existing civilized conditions are certainly not natural, so that one must infer that the condition in question is created by man himself rather than by any fault of the animal. The possible causes may be as follows: (a) Pyloric stenosis (stoppage); (b) Old age; (c) absence of

vitamin B, or other factor known to be associated with gastric movement; like vagal degeneration (degeneration of the nerve which supplies the stomach), etc.; (d) repeated acute dilation.

(a) Pyloric stenosis is not common, although practitioners do occasionally meet with cases where the pylorics appears to be temporarily, sometimes fatally closed. Physiologists teach us that its tonicity is maintained by the presence of acids in the first portion of the duodenum (first part or division of the small intestine), and one action of the pancreatic juice is to neutralise these acids and so cause relaxation of the sphincter but these factors and the relationship between the abdominal sympathetic and vagal nerves is still incompletely understood.

Foreign bodies in the pars pylorica will also cause partial or complete stenosis of the pyloric valve, but again, that is a rare condition. Occasionally nature endeavours to overcome pyloric ulceration by hypertrophy of the muscle layers, which causes incomplete pyloric stenosis, as also does tumour formation. (b) Old age-This is a physiological cause of gastric dilation; but as chronic dilation of the stomach of the dog occurs at any age (from puppyhood to maturity) this need not be considered. (c) Vitamin B,-Inasmuch as this vitamin is present in nearly all proprietary dog biscuits, and in addition is not destroyed by ordinary cooking methods, it can hardly be regarded as having an important bearing on the question. Little is known in Canine pathology of sympathicontic conditions, or of vagal inhibition (bodi of which may conceivably be associated with gastric distention), but in repeated acute dilation of the stomach we have the predominant cause of the chronic state. (d) Acute gastric dilation,-The two cardinal factors associated in the production of this condition are: (a) excessive quantities of foodstuffs; and (b) abnormal foods.

For many years it has been the custom for dog fanciers to feed their animals but once in the day. The probable reasons for this are that it is econonucal, little couble, and a prevalent belief that dogs should be fed once only in twenty-four hours. tunately, these fanciers are frequently dog breeders, and pass on these ideas to their respective clients, so that the average layman believes it is a mistake to feed his dog more than once daily. This is, of course, quite erroneous, because no dog in a natural environment will limit itself to one meal per day; nor will it do so in unnatural surroundings, provided the food is supplied oftener.

The important fact which is overlooked is that the capacity of the dog's stomach is not adapted for large quantities of food. Not only does the fancier feed his dogs once daily, but because of economical reasons he is unable to purchase the foods natural for the dog (namely, Carnivorous materials) because of their high price. He therefore gives the animal large quantities of unnatural foods once daily, and this, in the writer's opinion, is the greatest cause of gastric dilation. The bulky nature of the material fed causes a primary distention, which is aggravated by the disintegration of the carbohydrates. Putrefaction occurs, gases are formed, the stomach still further distends, and in many cases the distention becomes more or less permanent.

Another probable cause in the case of puppies is the overloading of the stomach with cowsmilk or other unsuitable food. It has to be remembered that young animals sucking their mother's milk, receive very small quantities at body heat, and usually of normal composition. It is, therefore, very easy to commence gastric disturbances by loading the animal's stomach with abnormal foods at wrong temperatures. Cow's milk is very different from Bitches' milk, more particularly if it is heated; the cream, lime, and content, taste, vitamins and colloidal properties are all altered, but because the puppies do not show any signs other than perhaps a "pot bellied" appearance, few people realize the possible harm which is thus commencing.

Treatment

As the condition is seldom diagnosed during life, treatment is not resorted to on many occasions. A careful examination of many patients will reveal signs compatible with chronic gastric dilation. The essentials in treatment are a drastic reduction in the quantities of foods supplied (preferably feeding several times daily), and above all supply only natural foodstuffs. Tonics may be tried also ferments for starchy materials and for nitrogenous foods."

Success or Failure in the Show Ring, Which?

Success or failure often depends on condition plus training and in some breeds a good trim or a poor one often spells success or failure. An exhibitor who possesses a really good dog owes it not alone to the dog, if shown, but also to the breed, that the dog is "put down in the best possible condition." A good dog, but in poor condition will invariably be placed, if

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placed at all, in an inferior position to an inferior dog or specimen of the breed which is "shown in the pink of condition," and such a dog in all probability will be advertised at stud, the win in question being in his favor. But what about the puppies compared with those by the better dog that was shown in poor condition and as such probably unplaced.

The same applies to training in so far as "ring manners" are concerned. One often hears it said of a dog. "He isn't a typical specimen but he shows like a million dollars." Whereas you have often heard a fancier ask a judge, why his dog wasn't placed, only to hear the answer: "Oh, he just wouldn't show," or "he was too nervous." Some fanciers recommend a large block of wood, a box or a board in the exercise pen, on which the dogs are taught to jump or stand at command and on which they are taught to pose.

Again in breeds that are trimmed. It is all in knowing at just what time, and how to trim the different parts of the body, and when to add the finishing touches that count when the judge is "looking them over."

If you don't know how to trim your dog, then by all means obtain the services of someone who does.

And last but not least is the experience and resourcefulness of the handGive your dog the chance both he and the breed deserves.

There is nothing to equal a succession of meetings and social events to keep a club's membership upon its toes, and by the way, there will shortly be another executive meeting to deal further with arrangements for the show.

I have it from a very authoritative source, that a breeder of Wires called to see the puppies. As he was examining them, he picked up the little Bull puppy and pronounced it the best Wire-haired Fox Terrier puppy he had ever seen. Duncan had purchased another Boston from the other side - so I slipped over bright and early last Sunday morning to see him. Beyond saying that he is a nice mahogany brindle, with very flashy markings, that he has a short-blocky head and is a real terrier. I do not intend to pass on him but will leave that for the rest of the critics. His breeding, however, is ideal. He is a "Moshula-Hagerty Cross," sired by "Tommy Byng," He by "Ch. Tommy Tucker," and his dam by "Tim Hagerty," he by "Ch. Hagerty King, Jr." will be sufficient to stamp him as a Boston Terrier of Aristocratic lineage. Mrs. F. McClain of Neepawa, Man., a lady who is interested in standard bred

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horses, and who is also interested in Bostons, has already bred her "Mc-Clain's Brownie" to him. She is a very nice 14 lb. bitch by "Ch. Trapystok Personality." The new dog's name is "Lightning Bill II." He is a very quick mover, hence, I suppose that is where his name originated. I also saw young Pete the dog I wrote about in his puppyhood. He is ten months old now and appears to have all one could desire in a typical Boston. He is being registered as "Trapystok Headlight," and George claims he will not mature over 15 lbs. I was also advised that his brood bitch, "Trapystok Bonnie" that was shipped to the Kewayden Kennels, Minneapolis to be bred to "Kewayden All Hagerty," is now showing heavy in whelp.

Bill Cook of West Kildonan, Mrs. Newell and Mrs. Ostrander, all report nice litters by "Ch. Trapystok Personality." Mr. Wilson, a new comer in the game has bred his female to "Trapystok Bantam," and George reports a litter by "Bantam", out of his "Vittywinks."

Wire-Haired Fox Terriers — "Challerton Blackcap," owned by Geo. Kynoch, is nursing a nice litter by "Fox Hollow Startler." Harry Baker's "Silverdale Sadie," is also nursing a litter by "Fox Hollow Startler."

Scottish Terriers — J. Gillen of Moose Jaw, has shipped his bitch, a daughter of "Ch. McWilliam of Tay Side," to be bred by Geo. Kynoch's "Normandy Airth."

"Normandy Airth" has done considerable service at stud, but owing to lack of space and also time, these and other notes will have to wait until later.

Maritime News

THE New Brunswick Kennel Club in Saint John, N.B., after a lapse of many seasons from winter activities decided to put on two evening shows, with silverware prizes for each breed and local judges.

Notwithstanding the tight-fisted economy of the provincial government in cutting off all monies or grants for industrial or live stock shows and vocational school training in New Brunswick, the Saint John Exhibition votes to carry on, also the New Brunswick Kennel Club have made plans to hold their annual dog show as usual. Herbert J. Keyes, a sporting dog and Terrier exhibitor, is our Show Chairman, and man of experience, ably supported by the capable T. A. Linton, Show Secty.

The grim reaper death, has laid low in the prime of life one of our former day exhibitors of Cockers and Irish Setters, Earnest J. Wallace. Mr. Wallace acted sometimes as Superintendent of N.B.K.C. Shows, one of his best winners being the useful red and white Cocker and Canadian-bred "Ch. Drumclamph Baronet." While with him he was not successful at stud so sold him to a large Cocker Kennel in U.S.A. where he made good. His best Irish Setter was "Rheola Andy," always in the awards column. Of more recent years on retiring from show activities he took up model yacht racing. The sympathy of his many friends is extended to his wife and child in their great loss.

Terriers always so dominant, especially Fox Terriers and Scottish, need no booming while just now it seems as though "Scotties" are crowding in on the "Wires" not only in U.S.A. but in Canada. There is in New Brunswick a continued demand for Fox Terriers and Scotties, also Irish, while a new interest is revived for Airedales. important purchase from James Chapman, Glenboig, Scotland, noted with his brother Robert for famous Clydesdales equally as well as for their "Heather" prefix is a braw Scot for Miss Aileen Smith, Saint John, known as "Heather Scottie" who claims a famous sire, "Ch. Albourn Reveller," and for dam, "Lockside Betty." "Betty" is sired by "Heather Barty" ex "Johnston's Bunty." "Scottie" is a junior dog, unshown, black brindle, full of power at both ends, Early in March another Scotty puppy arrived in Saint John for Mrs. F. A. Peters, a smart, neat eared, dark eyed youngster with a strong foreface, grand body, hard feeling coat and short tail. Bred by Mrs. R. A. Ross, and named "Drumclamph Jock II."

New Brunswick toy breeds are getting new recruits as only recently George V. Parker, Fairville, N.B., has taken over all the Pekingese, except one favorite, from Roseland Kennels of Mrs. Harry Short who is going in more strongly for Poms. Mr. Parker, some will recall fifteen years ago, had Airedales and the French Bulldog bitch, "Doncella." The "Frenchie" did considerable winning and was one of the best. "Doncella" was bred by Warren B. Purdy when living in New England States, but makes his home now in Saint John, his native city, breeds and shoots over Irish Water-spaniels. Mr. Purdy owned the sire "Ch. Nellicote Gamin" and the dam "Ch. Noet of Doncella," both of whom won heaps of specials and much prize money when French Bulldogs were so popular twenty years ago. It will interest Halifax exhibitors who had this breed there and quite popular about eight years ago to know that in 1906 at the "W.K.C.", New York, 100 Frenchies were catalogued and two years previous 84 at a Philadelphia. This breed was always a close contender for nonsporting group and specials. It is quite deplorable to think how this fascinating bat-eared minature bulldog has waned, we hope for its revival.

"Cedarcrest" Pekes of Kentville, N.S., are still doing missionary workselling the breed-to the far corners. One puppy dog has taken the long journey to Trail, B.C., for Dr. Eaton. Doctors seem to know what they want and asked for the breeding and son of "Ch. Pagan Prince of Cedarcrest" ex 'Romeo's Sunshine." Another male biscuit youngster has gone to a Mr. Smith of Halifax. Its breeding is by "Sundatis Master" ex "Somesa of Cedarcrest." A promising brood bitch delivered and sold in whelp to Mrs. D. Lang, St. Louis, Mo., is "Lady Wenda of Cedarcrest." She was mated to her new stud dog "Rajah's Mon Chink."

A word or term so often used-"this thing called 'luck'," it would seem were no such thing as far as the Cocker Cedargrove Kennels and J. G. Cavanaugh are concerned. Mr. Cavanaugh has had the serious misfortune one way and another to lose three litters in two seasons out of four breeding attempts. In March his solid bitch failed to raise her litter, sired by the sterling black stud dog "Allahambra Chief," while only three bitch puppies survive from his parti "Ch. Roman's Western Beauty." Messrs. Ritchie and Smith find their typical black Cocker dog "Allahambra Chief" much in demand for stud. Frank Stuart, Montreal, of "Derby" fame has used this excellent son of "Ch. Peter Manning" on three bitches with good results.

The popularity of the Cockers seems proverbial due, no doubt, to their many virtues, good looks, manners, handy size and usefulness, all which keep this breed ever in demand. It's bound to be so, so long as breeders keep the breed up off the ground. Weight is not so important, this twenty-eight pound avoirdupois, not mass or bulk but a right stationed dog whose purpose is different from that of the low set ground Terrier. Some Canadian breeders are using English Cocker blood with noticeable improvement in fronts, hindquarters and eye-essential factors in every shooting dog.

Supporters of gun dogs certainly had their innings at the major international fixtures this year with a Pointer topping the lot at Westminster, a Labrador Retriever at Crufts', and a Cocker Spaniel at Boston. The saying that the style in dogs for the year in America is set by Westminster's best. It looks like better and brighter times for those who breed the Pointing dogs that take us afield in quest of Woodcock, Partridge and Quail.

The Nova Scotia Kennel Club held their annual general meeting in the Halifax Board of Trade Rooms, on Wednesday evening, March 3rd. President C. E. Powers welcomed the largest annual meeting for the past three years, which shows that interest is not lacking in this section of Canada, also the club starts the year with all accounts paid and the largest cash balance in its history. In spite of the fact bad weather which was responsible for a loss in gate at the two fall shows of \$150, over the 1930 shows. The meeting voted to hold two C.K.C. point shows and a spring matinee show, the latter to be held in May and judged by local talent.

The Mayflower Rink, which is light and spacious, is being secured.

The following directors were elected, C. E. Power, H. M. McLeod, A. V. Martin, Eric Flowers, Miss A. O'Brien, John Fry, Jr., and Fred Fougere., The Directors at their meeting elected C. E. Power, President; H. M. McLeod, Vice.-Pres., and A. V. Martin, Secretary. Mr. Power enters on his fifth term as President.

It was decided to purchase fifty galvanized, solid partitions, and each year add as many as finances would allow until all wooden benching is done away with.

At the close of the annual meeting a show committee meeting was held and Eric Flowers elected as Chairman, supported by a very strong active bunch of workers, they will aim at putting on at least three point shows.

The prospect of a Bloodhound Kennel in Halifax, has had another hard rap and just about blew up the foundation. "Doug" Anderson called me up last week to sorrowfully inform me his bitch, "I'm Alone" had followed "Pioneer," a victim of distemper. This is certainly a keen set back but "Doug" intends to have some dogs so don't be surprised to read in K. & B. of some new ones from the Bluenose Kennels.

Tomorrow being "St. Patrick's" day it is only fitting to send the doings of the Irish. Haliburton Kennels have had a big demand for puppies by "Ch. Mike Haliburton" ex "Ch. Lady Haliburton," Henry is retaining one male for himself, the other seven have gone to Eric Flowers, John Fry, Jr., Wm. Haley, Miss Hutton, all of Halifax, E. H. Horne, Grand Lake, J. Smith, Calidonia and Dr. Eaton of Truro.

John Fry, Jr., reports a demand for Fox Hounds, many use them for rabbit dogs in these parts. Henry McLeod and W. T. Miller have each secured one and are going to have them trained for work on the "bunny."

Dame Fortune smiled favorably on the Cardigan Kennels of Miss Alice J. G. O'Brien, at the Eastern Dog Club Show, Boston, where her Canadian Champion, "St. Margaret's Serial," went first in Limit dogs and his newly imported kennel mate "St. Margarets Jemima," accounted for second place in Limit bitches. Mrs. Cora Charters, owner of the St. Margaret's prefix, returned to England via Halifax. She just had to look over some of the "young hopefuls" at the Cordigan Kennels before returning. We are wondering if she touched any with that magic wand which writes the prefix of champion before the names of so many famous Sealyhams.

Claud Rutherford has purchased a male puppy by "Cordigan Cardinal."

Mr. Doncin, also of Halifax, has secured a litter brother.

Mr. James and Mr. Sparling, both of Halifax, have purchased dogs puppies by "Ch. St. Margaret's Serial" ex "Ch. Shelterfield Semple," while bitches from the same litter have gone to D. F. Seapatrick Dabchick," Dam of the new importation is "Coleen of Uskvale" a daughter of "Seapatrick Dandman" who is a son of "Ch. Seapatrick Dandy." The Sire of her litter is "Felcourt Rocket" a first prize winner at Usk open show under Roger Thomas. And so is enriched Canada's Sealyham population in a most desirable manner.

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
