Canadian Kennel Club, Incorporated

The membership at large of the Club have no doubt been puzzled and disquieted for many months as to what has been going on in connection with the recent election of Officers and Directors. No explanation could properly be made on account of the fact that the election was under investigation. The investigation has now been completed and the report filed with the Minister of Agriculture, and I have been requested by the Board of Directors to publish an explanation to the members of the Club.

It will be remembered that at the last election there were two separate and distinct slates of candidates appealing for votes and that one slate was elected in its entirety. Immediately after the announcement of the result of the election certain members of the defeated slate began to make very serious charges as to the manner in which the election had been conducted by Messrs. Edwards, Morgan & Company, the Auditors of the Club. I am informed that statements were made that I, personally, had arranged for Messrs. Edwards, Morgan & Company to be appointed the Auditors of the Club and had connived with them to have my slate elected. This was an absolute falsehood and was known to be such by the persons who repeated it. In the same connection a statement was made in a letter written by one of the defeated candidates, and one very active in the subsequent proceedings, that I had endeavored to prevent the investigation going on and had made a trip to Ottawa for that purpose. This also is an absolute falsehood and known to be such by the man who wrote the letter.

Immediately after the election a recount of the ballots was demanded by certain of the defeated candidates and on February 10th, 1932, Messrs. Bone & Teskey, Solicitors for Mr. R. Scott Wilson, wrote the Canadian Kennel Club asking that the ballots be obtained at once from Messrs. Edwards, Morgan & Company to allow the recent candidates to inspect them. Messrs. Edwards, Morgan & Company took the ground that in view of the fact that they had reported in accordance with the terms of the constitution and that their report had been verified by the sworn affidavit of one of their principal officers, the demand for a recount constituted an attack on the honesty of a firm which had had a splendid reputation for a great number of years in Toronto and that if any recount of the ballots was to take place it must be before a County Judge or

some similar responsible official with sufficient authority. This I submit was a perfectly reasonable position for that firm to take and this position was duly communicated to Messrs. Bone & Teskey.

The matter was discussed at a meeting of the Directors held on the 17th of March, 1932, and the Directors were unanimous in the opinion that in order that the air should be cleared and the honesty of the ballot completely established whatever steps necessary should be taken at the expense of the Club, and the suggestion was made that some official satisfactory to Messrs. Bone & Teskey, Messrs. Edwards, Morgan & Company and the Board of Directors should be chosen for this purpose. This suggestion was duly communicated to Messrs. Bone & Teskey.

The Constitution provides that the ballots are to be retained until April 1st and then destroyed. On March 31st the Club received a telegram from the Minister of Agriculture, followed by a letter, stating that certain complaints had been filed under the terms of the Act by two of the unsuccessful candidates, who had made representations to the Minister that they had been refused inspection of the ballots and were not satisfied with the manner in which the election had been carried out, and requested that the destruction of the ballots required by the Constitution be postponed. I immediately gave instructions that the ballots were to be retained until further instructions were given, and on the 6th of April, 1932, I wrote to the Minister of Agriculture explaining the situation. For the information of the members I quote the last three paragraphs of my letter to the Minister:—

"The complaint sent to you, it seems to me, changes the complexion of the affairs, and I would respectfully suggest that an official of your Department should be appointed for the purpose of the examination of the ballots. Anyone whom you may select will be satisfactory to me and to the Directors of the Club. In the meantime I have instructed Messrs. Edwards, Morgan & Company to retain the ballots, which are in a sealed package in which they were placed directly after they were counted, and which package has never been opened. They are in the vault of Messrs. Edwards, Morgan & Company and are available at any time.

"May I assure you that it is the unanimous desire of the Directors that this matter be cleaned up and

the Election Commission vindicated. We are positive that an examination of the ballots will give exactly the same result as the one which has already been furnished and sworn to.

"I would be glad to hear from you in this connection at your convenience, and I am prepared to carry out any instructions which you may choose to give."

The Minister replied to my letter on the 13th of April, agreeing to my suggestion that an officer of his Department should be appointed for the purpose of examining the ballots, and advising me that Mr. A. P. MacVannel, Chief Registration Officer, had been appointed for the purpose, and that the two members who had laid the complaints, Mr. R. Scott Wilson and Mr. W. H. Carter, were being notified to be present at the recount.

Mr. MacVannel's report in full follows herewith:—

"In accordance with arrangements made, and the suggestion of the President of the Canadian Kennel Club, Incorp., I attended and supervised the examination of the ballots as used in the 1931-32 election for officers and directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Incorp., in the office of the Club, 25 Melinda Street, Toronto, Monday, April 18th, at the hour of one o'clock.

There were present at this meeting the following gentlemen:—

President, Lt.-Col. G. F. McFarland.

Secretary, Jas. D. Strachan.

Mr. R. Scott Wilson, unsuccessful in contest for director.

Mr. W. H. Carter, unsuccessful in contest for director.

Mr. H. A. Wilson, elected director.

Mr. W. Stockdale, unsuccessful candidate for first Vice-President.

Mr. R. Tyrwhitt, unsuccessful candidate for director.

Mr. Edwards, Mr. Poutchard, representing Messrs. Edwards, Morgan & Co., and

Mr. A. P. MacVannel, Chief Registration Officer, Live Stock Branch, Ottawa, Ont.

At the suggestion of Col. McFarland, Mr. MacVannel took charge of the meeting and explained the purpose of the meeting to be the examination of the ballots used in the recent election, on request of Mr. R. Scott Wilson and Mr. W. H. Carter, and at the invitation of the President of the Canadian Kennel Club.

At this time Mr. Edwards laid on the table a sealed package which he

stated contained all the ballots in question, and that he was prepared to give affidavit to this effect.

Mr. Edwards further explained that personal envelopes which had been prepared in the Canadian Kennel Club, were used for mailing the ballots, and that ballots contained a distinguishing mark which he had placed thereon and on his own initiative.

Mr. Edwards further stated that ballots were opened January 5th, and that they did not leave his custody until delivered to the Club Secretary. Mr. Edward Beck, supt. of Star and Cox Printing Office, was sent for and identified the ballots as being those printed by his firm and supplied for the election, and stated that one ballot marked 1931 had not been supplied.

Col. McFarland and Mr. Edwards retired at this time. The package of ballots was opened immediately. The examination of the ballots showed:

At the commencement of the examination of the ballots, Mr. R. Scott Wilson and Mr. W. H. Carter handed the Dominion Officer the following statement:—

Dear Sir:—

We give below a list of ballots which should be with those ballots cast at the last election of the Canadian Kennel Club. We are prepared to furnish proof that these ballots were marked as shown and mailed to the Election Commissioners, viz.,

1. A ballot with only Mr. Lee Wainwright's name indicated for Ontario as Director.
2. A ballot with the vote mark opposite the name of A. Donaldson only.
3. Four ballots with the vote marks opposite the name of Mr. F. W. Walkerdine.
4. A ballot with the vote marks opposite the names of F. W. Walkerdine and W. H. Carter.
5. Two ballots with only a vote marked for R. Scott Wilson and Ward Wright (R.S.W.).
6. A ballot marked for the under-mentioned names:—
W. Stockdale, H. A. Wilson, W. H. Carter, A. Donaldson, Harold Shaw, R. Tynwhitt, F. W. Walkerdine, R. Scott Wilson. The mark for Walkerdine was placed at the extreme left of the column placed therefor.

In regard to statements (1), (2), (4), (5) and (6) referred to above, it may be stated that these gentlemen could not locate ballots answering description of these sections. At the request of Messrs. R. Scott Wilson and W. H. Carter, I designated or marked six ballots on underface as follows:—

1. **MacV.** This was ballot with name of Mrs. Gertrude Wilson, 241 Salisbury Avenue, and showed crosses placed irregularly, but was counted.
2. **MacV.** This ballot showed a cross opposite each of two candidates for Vice-President, and were not included in our count.
3. **MacV.** These ballots were marked V instead of a cross and counted.
4. **MacV.** This ballot had opposite names of
Wm. Stockdale,
Harry A. Wilson,
5. **MacV.** This ballot had opposite names of
F. W. Walkerdine (only).

6. **MacV.** This ballot had a cross opposite the names of
Wm. Stockdale,
Harry A. Wilson,
Alex. Donaldson (only).

The examining officer's attention was drawn to certain other ballots by Messrs. Wilson and Carter, who claimed that these ballots showed identical marks. These marks were not clear to the examining officer and the ballots were not marked.

What significance may be attached to the ballots which were marked, I am not prepared to express an opinion.

In summing up, I wish to say that the result of the examination of the ballots show my findings to compare very closely with the sworn statement of the auditors of the Canadian Kennel Club and which statement was shown to the meeting by the Secretary of the Club. The slight differences in the votes for each candidate would not change the result of the election.

At this stage, the ballots were re-packed and sealed in the presence of all representatives present, and taken away for safe keeping by Mr. Pouchard of the firm of Edwards, Morgan & Co.

In conclusion, I wish to express my thanks for the courtesy and assistance rendered by all representatives present at the examination.

On the 27th of April I received a letter from the Minister enclosing a copy of the Chief Registration Officer's report. I quote as follows from the Minister's letter:—

"It was hoped that the examination would have cleared matters in connection with this election to the satisfaction of all concerned. The examination seems to have opened up new problems and as further representations have been referred to me it has been decided to have the Royal Canadian Mounted Police continue the investigation, especially in regard to certain ballots which were identified, and others which were referred to by the complainants, but not identified, and regarding which the complainants are not satisfied. It is planned that the investigation be concluded as early as possible."

In accordance with the above Corporal Veitch of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police was detailed to look after the investigation, which lasted several weeks and was conducted with the greatest care and efficiency. The result of it is contained in a letter to

myself from the Live Stock Commissioner, dated June 9th, 1932, which is here quoted in full. (The underlining is my own).

Re: Canadian Kennel Club

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police have completed the investigation of the election of 1931-32 of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., and made on complaint of two members of the Club, viz., W. H. Carter and R. Scott Wilson. The report received from the Commissioner, Royal Canadian Mounted Police, makes it clear that this last election was carried out properly and fairly by Edwards, Morgan & Co., and that the majority of the complaints were without foundation, and the others were unsubstantiated. Further, the report also makes reference to the ballot which was claimed did not respond to the hot iron test, but later on a hotter iron was applied, and the brown mark of the acid showed quite plainly.

With reference to the ballots, which I understand, are in custody of Edwards, Morgan & Co., it would seem that as this case is concluded nothing can be gained by retaining them further, and the ballots in question should be disposed of in accordance with the constitution of the Canadian Kennel Club.

Surely things have come to a pretty pass when officers and members of the Club, and the Club Auditors, have to submit to a campaign of mud-slinging like that which has been going on for several months. In every case where these slanderous statements, or allegations of irregularity or crookedness were investigated by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, they were found to be based on vague rumours, loose conversation or absolutely false statements. The fair name of the Club has been besmirched and its reputation seriously damaged needlessly and without cause at Ottawa and throughout the country, and also in the United States. The whole attempt from the outset has

lacked honesty, sportsmanship and even decency, and as far as the reputations of the individuals concerned in the effort are concerned I leave them to the judgment of the membership at large in full confidence that the innate sportsmanship and decency of that membership will form their own rational opinion.

In conclusion, I desire to express the complete confidence of the Board in Messrs. Edwards, Morgan & Company, who were absolutely exonerated of the false charges made against them, and our deep gratitude for their very efficient and entirely satisfactory services as Auditors and as Election Commissioners during the years in which they have so acted.

Meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Incorporated

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., was held at the Club's Offices, 25 Melinda St., Toronto, on Thursday evening, June 16th, 1932, at 8 o'clock.

The Secretary advised that Directors Peter Herd and John W. Bruce were out of town on business.

The President, Lt.-Col. G. F. McFarland presided. Directors present included Col. J. N. MacRae, Brig. Gen. C. M. Nelles, Major E. Ward Wright, Capt. H. Dudley-Waters and W. H. Reeves.

The Minutes of the previous Directors' Meeting were read and it was moved, seconded and carried:—

"That, the Minutes be adopted as read."

W. H. Reeves reported that his Committee had experienced a further successful session and remarked that the Dog Show Regulations were now in conformity with the Dog Show Rules.

The Secretary reported, that Wm. Sweetman, Toronto, had advised him that the documents in the Wasson complaint had been forwarded to the Live Stock Records Office for the purposes of registration and transfer. And it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:—

"That, the matter be left with the Secretary."

A letter was read from Geo. B. Rothwell, Live Stock Commissioner, and it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:—

"That, in view of the tremendous amount of correspondence received by the Board of Directors in connection with the 1931-32 elections of the Club, none of which has been published owing to the investigations being made by the Dominion Government, and the Government report having been received, it is now resolved, that the President of the Canadian Kennel Club be instructed to prepare a statement dealing with the charges made in connection with the said election, and to include the publishing of the Government's findings therewith."

The matter of the Club's Auditors was discussed, and it was agreed that the President would arrange for the new Auditors, Clarkson, Gordon and Dilworth to arrange for the auditing of the Club's accounts.

The Secretary was instructed to write our late Auditors, Edwards, Morgan and Co., expressing our sincere appreciation of their efficient services rendered on behalf of the Club for so many years.

A letter was read from Thomas P. Murray, Vancouver, who requested that his Judge's License be extended to include All Breeds. The Secretary was instructed to refer the matter to the British Columbia Provincial Committee for attention in the prescribed manner.

A night letter from Wm. H. Pym, Chairman of the British Columbia Provincial Committee was read, which requested All Breed Judges' Licenses on behalf of Wm. Squelch, Vancouver, B.C., and Thos. P. McConnell, Victoria, B.C., advising that the proper endorsements were now in the mails and following. A similar request was made by Dr. J. T. Cooper, Chairman of the Saskatchewan Provincial Committee on behalf of John C. Fletcher, Calgary, Alta.

It was agreed to grant temporary judging licenses to the three applicants, pending consideration of their formal applications.

It was agreed on motion to grant an all breed Judge's License to Charles C. Sullivan, St. John, N.B.

Riome, of the Mutual Kennels, Moose Jaw, who contributes the "Saskatchewan News" each month is most generous in his boosting of the "other fellows" dogs, and content to keep his own dogs in the background, however, on checking over his contribution for July we noticed that he had nothing to say about the recent splendid winnings over a large area of ground by the "Mutual" Kennel inmates, therefore we voluntarily take over his horn and give it a toot for him.

"Ardbahn Moira," an Irish Terrier bitch, takes the front of the parade. She was winners at Coast City Kennel Club, Royal City Kennel Club, and Vancouver Kennel Club. At the two latter shows, she was made Best of Breed. Hustling back over the Rockies she headed for Winnipeg, and the Fort Garry Kennel Club Show, where Judge Frank Walsh selected her for his "best" in all the 200 dogs entered. Mr. Walsh has been a judge of Sporting dogs since away back when, and no doubt he had Sporting dogs of quality aplenty to judge at the Fort Garry fixture, therefore, the win of Mr. Riome's good Irish Terrier bitch "Ardbahn Moira" is very noteworthy, indeed, it is said, that in Mr. Walsh's opinion, "Moira" is one of the best Irish Terriers he ever had the privilege of judging. These several wins just leave the comely "Moira" on the threshold of the entrance to the "Charmed Circle."

Other Irish Terriers that are well on their way to championship honors under the "Mutual Kennels" colors are "Sporting Sheila" (litter sister to 'Ardbahn Moira'), and "Pat Healy," two dogs that will probably finish their championships some time during the present year.

The Fox Terrier Smooth, "Oxford Fairy," who first saw the light of day at Vancouver, finished her championship at Fort Garry Kennel Club Show.

Howard Riome who is obviously a "chip of the old block" had his fleet-footed Whippet "Silver Slippers" at Fort Garry Show, and as a result this smart little "long tail" is nearer to the championship goal than ever before.

It takes the breath out of "Old Man Depression" to notice the support given the shows by our Saskatchewan correspondent, who in season and out, keeps calling on co-operative unified support for all Western Shows, and putting his preaching into practice, shows the way himself, it takes money and courage for a man living in Saskatoon to support the shows from Winnipeg, "The Gateway of the West," right through to the Western Coast.

NO USE TRYING!

No use trying to evade the English quarantine regulations, and Brian Russell attended a summons at Tonbridge police court, on May 17th, charged with "aiding and abetting"—landing two dogs from France at Capel, Kent, on January 16th, from an aeroplane. The charge was laid by the Ministry of Agriculture, and was the first case of its kind to be tried in England.

Russell pleaded guilty to making a false declaration on landing, and was fined in £25 0s. 0d. or two months' imprisonment on one summons, and £100 0s. 0d. on another, and ordered to pay £4 10s. 0d. costs.

Walter Morosco, said to be in the United States, was also summoned in connection with the irregular landing of the dogs, and the charge against him was adjourned for three months.

WHAT'S THE USE?

What is the use of placing one's reputation as a sportsman in jeopardy? To do so is to awaken to the fact, sooner or later, that the game is not worth the candle. People sometimes come with their tongues in their cheeks, and whisper tales of crookedness that make us shiver, but in such cases we usually find, that a request "to put the particulars in writing, and over a signature" often ends such allegations of "dirty work at the cross-roads."

Sportsmen do not do crooked things, and would-be sportsmen should not even try sharp practice, it does not pay, so what's the use?

No doubt there are many, many people throughout the world today who would willingly give their right hand to undo something that they were guilty of doing in an ill-advised moment.

Readers of *Kennel and Bench* would notice in the reported minutes for May and June that one named D. Dickinson had ran foul of our Rules of Entry under very trying circumstances, with the result that he has been debarred from further participation in the affairs of the Canadian Kennel Club, because he caused to be presented to the Live Stock Record office an application for registration of a litter, supposedly signed by the owner of the service dog, but which signature was found to be a forgery.

What does all this mean to a man? It simply means a forfeiture of all registration privileges in the United States, in England and in Canada.

So, what's the use?

FORT GARRY KENNEL CLUB SHOW

Comment by Judge Frank Walsh

In compliance with the request in your letter, I am sending you a few notes on the classes I had the privilege of judging at the Fort Garry Kennel Club Show on June 10th and 11th.

The writer judged all Sporting Breeds, Boston Terriers, Alsatisans, and placed the award for Best in Show. T. Kay MacKenzie passed on all other breeds.

I understand that over 200 dogs were benched.

Sporting Group was won by the recently imported English Setter, "Maesydd Malcolm," a quality dog with good head and eye—moves well—needs development in hind quarters which will no doubt improve with exercise.

Working Group Winner was the Collie, "Elmhill Jupiter"—good coat and a sound dog—long head and good ears, but is nervous in the ring and consequently fails to make the most of himself.

Terrier Group was won by the Irish Terrier, "Ardbahn Moira"—a beautiful bitch hard to fault—size, coat, color, head and eye are all that could be desired.

The Pomeranian, "Jaunty Queenie," recently imported was the winner of the Toy Group—a very attractive bitch, shows to perfection—her coat is excellent but should improve when she gets acclimatized—will then be hard to beat in any company.

Non-Sporting was won by the Bulldog, "Sensible Lady," excelling in length and width of skull, good turn up, wide in front but carries too much "beef" behind.

For the Best in Show I selected the Irish Terrier, "Ardbahn Moira," with the Setter "Maesydd Malcolm" best opposite sex.

In the breed classes, Bostons had 18 entries. "Valentes Aviator" was selected as winners dog and best of breed. He was closely pressed by "Trapystok Headlight" reserve winners dogs—both are classy dogs; well marked, good showers—to my eye the winner was better in front of the eyes and moved the more freely of the two. No doubt these two dogs will meet again when I will watch the result with interest.

"Cromwell Peppy Girl" won winners bitches. She is a nicely marked small one, none too clever with her ears but otherwise good. "Winchester Flying Queen" might have won but was handicapped through lameness.

I cannot truthfully say that we are making headway in Alsatisans — there seems a complete absence of uniformity of type and breeders up here ap-

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parently have no objective in their breeding operations.

There were two outstanding dogs among the Cockers entered—"Merrie Durbar," a black, and "Senor Lavika of Chalvey," a parti-color—about equal

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in size which to my mind was about ideal for a Cocker—sufficiently high on leg to enable them to carry out the work for which a Cocker is intended; free merry movers and sound.

The quality in English Setters was high—"Maesydd Malcolm." I have already referred to. High honors in the breed was disputed with him by the winning bitch, "Jonas Sweet Marie"—very sound in every respect but was under the handicap of approaching maternal duties.

The winning Springer was "Lammand's Mike," a very sound dog—good head and outline. His rather smudgy roan coloring detracts from this dog's appearance to a certain extent, but I consider him one of the best of his breed.

VANCOUVER KENNEL CLUB SHOW

Comment by Judge H. Oppenheimer

I wish to take this opportunity to compliment the show officials, especially the secretary, Mr. Balshaw, on the wonderful way they handle a show. The building was suited particularly for his exhibition, and the ring and lighting could not be improved upon.

The Toy Group went to a puppy black Pom, "Fraserview Jacobean II," owned by Mr. White. This dog was in marvelous coat, perfect tail carriage, nice bone and showed to perfection. In Non-Sporting the English Bulldog, "Kingsway White Re Echo," owned by Mrs. Sleeth, topped this group. The Terriers had as their representative in the final awards the Smooth Fox Terrier "Coat's Correct," owned by W. M. Coats, a very fine one, sound and marvelous in bone and type. The Working Group found the Shepherd "Toni Nahon," owned by Mrs. Alsen going best. This bitch is one of the best that has appeared in this section in some time and is a fine mover, having plenty of substance. The Sporting Group had the Golden Retriever "Ch. 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The Canadian Fancy

By WALTER H. REEVES
Belleville, Ontario

AN old friend from across the ocean writes to me from the Middle West (where he has been living for the last nine months), stating that he brought over from England four very nicely bred Wire Fox Terrier bitches and a dog, which he carefully selected, paying particular attention, not only to type and quality, but also to ancestors. In due course the bitches were bred and he is of opinion that the puppies are of more than average merit, except in quality and texture of coat. This is by no means an uncommon experience gone through by British breeders in their early breeding attempts on the American continent. Preparing a Wire or rough coated dog for exhibition in America or Canada is an entirely different procedure to the method used in England. Over in England, owing probably to the moist atmosphere we only need to top a coat removing the old outer coat and leaving the undercoat which comes out gradually with combing. It took me some years to be convinced that English methods of trimming would not answer on this side. Here one has to strip the coat to the buff, after stripping it will be found very beneficial to the growth of the new coat, if a warm bath is given twice a week and to produce the excessive whiskers and leg feathering favoured on this side the whiskers and legs should be washed using warm water no less than twice a week. If preparing for a show your Wire should be carefully washed and great care should be taken in rinsing so that no soap is left in the coat before the coat is thoroughly dry, comb out carefully and pack the coat with English chalk, and then place a linen coat on.

Before judging see that your Terrier's muzzle and legs have been carefully washed using English chalk before the hair is dry, the body coat, providing a coat has been kept on, will require very little attention except to straighten out with comb and brush.

My friend also asked me if we are as particular about cutting as they are in England—the answer is emphatically no, in fact, I think judges are far too lenient in this respect. I have had to change my attitude considerably on trimming, but I personally still penalize a Terrier which shows palpable and undeniable signs of a safety razor having been used recently on the cheeks and neck. Only the other day a handler showed a Wire under me at a show across the border with nothing on his back but undercoat. He

was a really nice little Wire, but he had to pay the penalty of not being fit, his handler was somewhat annoyed and remarked when I called his attention to his charge's lack of coat that he had been on the circuit! Then why show him in this condition was my reply! It was the old old story, I want the fee for handling.

The great one-day show on the American Continent, the Morris and Essex Kennel Club is now a thing of the past. "Bob" Ross and the writer arrived early in the morning of Friday, May 27th, at the beautiful estate of Giralda Farms and we were able to watch with a great deal of interest the vast preparations for a show of this magnitude. The chairman of the show committee, Raymond L. Patterson and McClure Halley were busily engaged superintending the erection of the huge marquees and the judging rings—the benching was in the capable hands of Messrs. Spratts-Patent, Ltd., and the George F. Foley Dog Show organ, Inc., were looking after the management. It is almost needless to say that, as usual, the arrangements were perfect although all concerned had some anxious moments between 5 and 6 o'clock on the Friday for some ominous black clouds made their appearance in the sky and a terrific wind storm swept over the beautiful polo field, considering that over 1,600 feet of canvas was used and that the wind storm laid flat all the tents, and that one was ripped to pieces—one could understand the anxiety of all concerned. However, thanks to a most efficient field force everything was ready when the show opened on Saturday morning. To hark back to Friday night, all the judges were as usual entertained to dinner and a dance and the writer had the particular pleasure of having as guest companion an old friend and confrere in Mrs. Phyllis Robson, the Editor of *The Dog World*, who was visiting some of the old American shows as the guest of Dr. and Mrs. J. De Mund. I was particularly glad of the opportunity to talk over pre-war shows in England and to hear news of many fancier friends.

It is through the generosity of Mr. and Mrs. Hartley Dodge that the Madison Show is held and once more the Canadian contingent wish to thank very sincerely Mrs. Hartley Dodge for her generous hospitality. The Bungalow

which faces the polo field was again Canadian Headquarters and our good friend, Raymond Patterson left absolutely nothing undone for our comfort. Unfortunately, the writer and "Bob" Ross had to leave directly after the beautiful trophy for Best Dog in Show was awarded, and we were accompanied by the Springer judge, John Ritchie, from Ottawa. Our "Editor," however, had the extreme pleasure of staying over until Sunday and was able to see the wonderful teams of Giralda dogs, under the personal guidance of that real lover of dogs, Mrs. Hartley Dodge.

Leaving the Bungalow early on Saturday morning the Canadian contingent were greeted by a very remarkable sight, a vast array of tents, no less than thirty-nine rings and hundreds of dogs and their owners, in fact, every road to Madison was a continual procession of motor cars containing exhibitors and their dogs. The day was gloriously fine and right on time the judges started their arduous tasks. The entry in spite of the fact, that business is far from good in the U.S.A. showed little falling off from last show, in fact, Madison Show is a show at which fanciers cannot fail to have a representative of their kennel competing. We were greeted by fanciers from all parts of the American Continent, two Canadians were making their debut at the show; John Ritchie, the well-known Ottawa breeder and exhibitor of Springer Spaniels was judging his favorites, and Norman McConnell, probably the smartest authority on English Setters on the Pacific Coast, was judging English Setters; both of them admitted to the writer that the show was by far the most impressive they had ever seen. Dr. C. Y. Ford, who was judging Old English Sheepdogs, was looking far from well, and I know his many friends will wish to join me in wishing him a speedy recovery.

Mrs. Wilson Wylie's awards in Pomeranians were well received. "Bob" Ross judged the Non-Sporting Group in his usual painstaking and masterful way. We and many others missed two of our prominent Canadians who were present last year, Major E. Ward Wright, who certainly would have been greatly interested in the very level entry of Sealyham Terriers, and I am sure Capt. H. Dudley-Waters would have passed an agreeable day watching the Terriers. All too soon for many, the six group winners paraded under Frank H. Addyman and the writer was particularly interested in one of the group, the Irish Setter, C.

F. Neilson's "Champion Higgins Red Coat," for he had placed this beautiful Setter "Best of Breed," and he undoubtedly made a very impressive showing. Frank Addyman carefully went over the six contestants and he made no mistake when he asked Mrs. Hartley Dodge to present the beautiful trophy for Best Dog in Show to Dr. and Mrs. Samuel Milbank's beautiful Wire-haired Fox Terrier, "Ch. Lone Eagle of Earlsmoor," an exceptionally fine Terrier, handled superbly by Leonard Brumby. Thanks to the kindly thought of Jack Kennedy, Toronto, an unique and well deserved compliment was paid to Mrs. Hartley Dodge, our "Editor" directly after the judging presenting her in the ring with a very attractive box of toilet articles. Friend Jack will see from Mrs. Dodge's letter that his gift was greatly appreciated.

Everybody has been most envious of the contents of my wonderful box and they are so beautifully packed and done up that I really hesitate myself, to open them as I have enjoyed looking at them.

We feel that much of the success of our show is due to the enthusiasm and help of our Canadian friends, and we think that this year it was even better than last. We were pleased to have some 200 more exhibitors than in previous years and though we had less dogs, we thought the quality was very high. It was a great pleasure having you with us.

Please will you express to the other members of the Canadian contingent my very many thanks for their thoughtfulness and kindness for the gift which I am going to enjoy so much."

Just one final word, for we feel we cannot finish this brief resume of a wonderful show without a word of praise to Raymond Patterson, who was responsible for the "get up" of the unique catalogue.

At the time these notes are being prepared, the Toronto Ladies' Kennel Association are holding a Puppy Show on Mrs. Whitelaw's Estate, at Oakville, Ontario. Everything points to a most enjoyable and interesting show—the judges were W. Wylie, All Toys; Alex McCartney, Terriers; B. R. Stitt, Alsations; J. Fraser, Boston Terriers, and Col. G. F. McFarland, Bull Terriers. Isn't the time about ripe for a big outdoor show near Toronto?

The committee appointed to bring the Dog Show Regulations and Dog Show Rules up to date reported progress at the usual monthly meeting on June 16th. The committee are very desirous of receiving suggestions as to

Championship Rating, so far very little interest has been shown by exhibitors in the proposed change. Please send along your suggestions. In going through the Dog Show Regulations they showed that they certainly needed to be brought up to date. At the next session, the committee are dealing with Dog Show Regulations, and Rule 30 will give the committee some anxious moments. It reads as follows:—

"The winners class for which there will be no entry fee shall be open only to undefeated winners of first prizes in the Puppy, Novice, Canadian-bred, Limit, or Open Classes, recognized by the Canadian Kennel Club at that show, all of which shall constitute the regular classes."

This rule is very definite but complications have arisen recently which really defeated the object of awarding winners.

The award of winners, the Canadian Kennel Club intend should be given by the judge to the best dog and bitch in his opinion competing in the classes. At a recent show in the west a most courageous judge reversed himself knowingly, a competitor failed to show in Canadian-bred and was placed second. In the open class, the first and second prize-winners again met, and the defeated Terrier made a much more impressive showing, in fact, he looked and showed so differently that the judge reversed himself knowingly, (congratulations, Mr. Judge! for doing the right thing)—if he had done otherwise he would not have been carrying out the ethics of the judging ring, to place the best dog ahead without fear

or favor and mind you, it requires a lot of courage to do so, under the circumstances. But now complications have arisen for both the winner in Canadian-bred and open are defeated dogs, and owing to the very definite wording of this rule, the only undefeated winner was the winning puppy—which in the opinion of the judge was the third best dog competing.

Another question is, was the puppy brought in to compete for winners? If so, further complications would arise—The Canadian Kennel Club when they made this rule, no doubt, never thought that such complications would arise, and it really looks as if we need a Solomon amongst our Directors, to decide whether or not because a judge was honest in his convictions, the best dog in his opinion should be penalized and denied the honor which the judge considered was his due owing to the very definite wording of Rule 30.

My interpretation of the rule is that the Directors when they made Rule 30, never intended to interfere with the judge's decision, but the reason for the rule was to do away with a re-judging of all the classes, and to stop all the placed dogs being brought into the ring again, when winners was being judged.

The Western fanciers are certainly deserving of hearty and sincere congratulations on the plucky way in which they have met the depression in the West. From all parts of the West, the writer is delighted to hear that fanciers are carrying on as usual. I have heard very glowing accounts of the success of the Victoria Kennel

Club Show, held on May 14th, where G. Tyson's home-bred Wire Fox Terrier bitch, "Lyncote H.C. O.L." gained the Canadian Kennel Club Trophy for best Canadian-bred, and also the special for best bitch in the show. The Scottish Terriers must have been particularly interesting, such well-known overseas winners as S. Dorrell's "Gaisgill Great Scot," and Mrs. C. Stelz's "Merlewood Rose" competing; in fact, I am given to understand that the quality of the British Columbia Scotties has never been so good as at the present time.

CANADIAN DOGS AT THE MORRIS AND ESSEX

At the luxurious Morris and Essex Dog Show held on the Polo Field of Giralda Farms, Madison, New Jersey, on Saturday, May 28th, there came together the elite of dogdom. The largest kennels were strongly represented—the owners and their dogs striving to prove superiority on the day. At the helm, was the President of the Morris and Essex Kennel Club, Mrs. M. Hartley Dodge, and so perfect were the general arrangements that the 1,577 dogs entered had appeared before their forty judges in the short space of eight hours, and by early nightfall, had left the grounds in search of further fields to conquer.

Old Man Depression, was conspicuous by his absence at this wonderful fixture. Boston Terriers, Wire Fox Terriers, were down in entries this year, but Cockers, Collies, Bedlington Terriers and Springer Spaniels set new high records for all time as far as the Morris and Essex Show is concerned. Cocker Spaniels were 145 dogs with 176 entries and Judge H. E. Mellenthin had a man-sized job on his hands which kept him busy the whole day long. Collies were 66 dogs with 91 entries for Judge Dr. O. P. Bennet. Springers were 58 dogs with 80 entries for Judge John Ritchie of Ottawa, who was making his debut as a judge on this auspicious occasion. Bedlington Terriers were up over 100 per cent with 31 dogs and 35 entries, an indication of a possible returning to popularity of the Tyneside Pitman's Terrier.

Forty rings for 39 breeds and the miscellaneous classes—each ring with ample chair accommodation—were surrounded by thousands of people, bent on watching the fortunes of their favorite breeds. The weather was ideal; the sun was hot enough, but there is always a delightful breeze playing across the elevation which is the Polo Field where the show is held, so that even on the hottest days, there is comfort for man and beast.

Soon after the proceedings started, your scribe slowed up at the Old English Sheepdog ring where Dr. C. Y. Ford was slated to do the judging, but it was quite five minutes before we could definitely be sure that the occupant of the chair by the table was the genial Doctor himself. Never in all our years of acquaintance with Dr. Ford, have we ever noticed him to be so ill. Upon making enquiry we found that he had been pretty badly under the weather as the result of a blood vessel having broken in the region of the stomach. No doubt the Doctor was glad to find a lean entry of only ten dogs, and no doubt this size entry

taxed his strength to the limit. We trust that he will soon be restored to his normal health and strength again.

Mrs. W. Wyllie of Vineland, Ont., had an entry of 22 Pomeranians—a new low for this breed at the Morris and Essex. The quality was select and that made Mrs. Wyllie's task rather pleasant, we should imagine.

Norman McConnell of Vancouver, had an entry of 68 English Setters, which was unquestionably a great tribute to Mr. McConnell. Only once in the history of the Morris and Essex Show has this entry been topped, and that was in 1931, and also the peak year for strength of entries. Mr. McConnell has promised to furnish his impressions for **Kennel and Bench** readers later.

Walter H. Reeves, Belleville, Ont., drew a record entry of Irish Setters to the number of 82 dogs, one of which was later favored for best dog in show by plenty well qualified to analyze in that direction, and our readers should not be overlooking Mr. Reeves' feature article—**The Canadian Fancy** in this issue.

John Ritchie of Ottawa, Ont., as we have mentioned before, drew a record entry of Springer Spaniels. Those who know Mr. Ritchie best, know how brutally frank he can be, and usually is, all the time. Well, he made no secret of his disappointment. An ardent admirer of the best in dog flesh at all times, he felt that the general quality should have been of a very much higher order.

Robert A. Ross, Montreal, P.Q., had an opportunity to enjoy the show in its fullest sense, as he was only expected to get into the picture when the Non-sporting group came up for judgment, but just try and keep the genial "Robert" out of the picture as long as that, and so we were not surprised to find him acting as ring steward where the going was strenuous and long.

Probably the highest rating of merit to get into the hands of a Canadian, was when "Ted" Ward—Canadian handler—received from Judge Norman McConnell, the winners ribbon for the English Setter Bitch, "Tula 11 Jagersbo" owned by Erik Bergishagen, of Rochester, Mich.

Next highest honors that we noticed, was the taking of reserve winners by C. Hammet's (London, Ont.), much discussed Boston Terrier, "Rockaround Rosie"—a win that was as heartily received, as the winning of the Droll and Rosenbloom dog "Hagerty's Model"—the cheering of which could easily be heard all over the extensive

Around the English Bulldog ring, we lingered for a brief moment, hoping to find some Canadian-bred dog making history for the "Land of the Maple." Here we noticed such dogs entered as "Son of Crewe So Favorite" and "Patsy O'Dare" both Toronto-bred Bulldogs, and "Pugilist's Punch" showing our old friend, Allan Chisholm, Montreal, as breeder, but we did not notice any of these in the heavier contention.

We noticed Mrs. G. W. Hyslop, Toronto, collecting the well charged blue envelopes with her Cairn Terriers in competition, which was really hectic. In Schipperkes, Wm. Unthank, Toronto, was seen with a blue envelope in his hand, as he left the ring after the judging of bitch puppies.

Notes from Old Quebec

DID you read the article "Appoint-the Adjudicators" in "Our Dogs" Christmas number by Will Hally? After writing two full pages on the subject of Canine Judges, Mr. Hally winds up his write-up with the following remarks:

"Tomorrow is still empty and there 'is plenty of room in it; room in it for 'the winners to lose and the losers 'to win; room too for a little kindness to animals—those often abused 'animals—the judges. They have a 'hard time of it and they have hard 'luck, too, for it must be hard luck 'to lose one's halo."

Terriers.—That Robt. J. Ross, of Notre Dame de Grace, is a man that knows Scottish Terriers, was fully proven when he bought our own "Craigellachie Pookie," a son of "Craigellachie Nowhere" which he intends to show in New York next February. He says that "Pookie" is the most perfect "Diehard" puppy he ever put his eyes on, and that the much tooted imported dogs will have no chance against him. "Pookie" is a beautiful dark brindle, has big bone, very short body and extraordinary big long head and full foreface. I was much surprised at Mr. Ross telephoning me a few days ago about the pup, which is only 3 months old, not having both ears up yet. I was forgetting that the said "Bob" Ross is not our own "Bob" of Ville St. Pierre, Director of the Canadian Kennel Club. My, but life is full of surprises.

But wait a minute! R. H. Waddell, the popular owner of Glen Garrell Kennels, whose advertisement appears in this issue will have something to say when it comes to "laying Scottish Terriers on the line" in this Province. It is a sure thing that all the good Scot-ties are not around Toronto.

I would like to add a few details about the dogs he advertises. First, The "Masher," a little brother of "Ch. Heather Fashion Hint," and sired by "Ch. Heather Necessity." The dam of this dog died shortly after whelping five puppies, two dogs and three bitches; the dogs were reared by hand, and now we have one of them right here in Montreal that will be an acquisition to the breed in Canada. He is a short backed little fellow with a glorious head and expression and say is he a stud dog? Well, he bred a bitch on board the T.S.S. Letitia the first Sunday he was here.

Secondly, "Craigsidde Confident."

Do I need to tell you anything about Mrs. Dingwall's dog? He has already sired some wonderful puppies around Montreal, and some in the States. I don't need to describe him as he was already reviewed in this publication but suffice it to say that the smallest litter he has sired is five. Perhaps, I should let you into a secret that before leaving England he was used at stud, and I am told by none other than Geo. Sapey, the well-known English judge, that he left two storming puppies that have already done a bit of winning. The dam was a "Ch. Albourne Berty" bitch.

Third, "Haldon Tam o' Shanter." This dog is now maturing into a real one and being sired by "Gaigsgill Mac-Simon," which was imported by Mrs. Batt, he contains some of the best blood that is in America. A bitch bred to him is now nursing eight puppies, six dogs and two bitches. This bitch as well as "Tam" is the property of A. Nelson McKim.

Fourth, "Heather Marten," another of the imported dogs from the Scottish Trade Mission Ship. The "Dark Horse," and one that will be hard to beat when he is at his best. A worthy son of "Ch. Heather Fashion Hint." The owner thinks so much of him that he will only be at stud to approved bitches and those must be of the first rank. Mr. McKim also owns him.

Fifth, "Glen Garrell," a smooth Fox Terrier that has two bitches already showing in whelp. "Glen Douglas" his sire, is by "Ch. Arrogant Albino," while "Bliff of Bail" needs no comment. Hildebrand Wilson sold him to Alexander Hamilton, of Australia, for two hundred pounds and that was before he was twelve months old. He only served one bitch and "Glenbetty" was one of the litter. He is a shade big but full of quality and certain to leave his mark. His head and ear carriage can't be beat.

Montreal certainly had some shrewd buyers when I state six of the eight dogs on the Scottish Trade Mission Ship remained in Montreal, and three of them are advertised at stud in this issue. Norman Craig, Mr. Chapman's representative wishes to express here his appreciation of his reception in Montreal, and that he regretted very much that the time at his disposal did not allow him to accede to all the requests to be entertained. He purposes coming back in the early fall with a large draft. What about staging a show in Montreal on the dates of his return? Now, Clubs do not speak all at once! But on top of all these remarks we must not forget to tender our sympathy to Mr. Waddell for the great loss he sustained by the death

of one of the dogs, a Wire Fox Terrier, which he purchased on the Trade Ship, "Talavera Tiger," and also by the death of his good Sealyham bitch, "Ashantee Gaiety" which was due to whelp on July 1st. She only needed one more point for her championship.

Mr. Waddell is also handling another little black "Scottie," a son of "Tremont" which is not being advertised at stud in this issue on account of being a bit too young. He was bred by Harry Jones of Scotland. Mrs. Waddell is now in Scotland, and she will probably bring over something good as she certainly can pick a good one.

Hugh MacDevitt, of Montreal, has bought the American Champion Kerry Blue "Sheepshead Lad," a son of "Ch. Grabbair," and "Blue Lady of Duroy." I think that the Kerry Blues are the best property and body guards in dog-dom, and when they come to be extensively known they will become as popular as the Fox Terrier. All they need is to be tried. They are uncannily intelligent, very brave and could easily be trained for police work.

Working Dogs.—But the question at issue is what is a police dog? The City Council of Quebec has passed a by-law to forbid the keeping of police dogs within the city limits. But again, what is a police dog? We understand that the Prime Minister and the Lieutenant-Governor of the Province both own Alsatian Shepherds. Of course, those are not police dogs!

Many mongrels that roam the lanes of the big cities are outcrosses from Alsatian Sheepdogs, and are certainly very vicious and not to be trusted more especially with children. But the registered German Shepherd is just as safe a dog as any other big breed and should not be made to suffer for the sake of those mongrels. So, if anybody who owns a Shepherd dog is being troubled by the city police in Quebec, the owner may easily prove that his dog is not a police dog by showing his registration papers and some members of the German Shepherd Club of Montreal would be ready to get in the witness box to swear to it.

Sporting Dogs.—The Cocker Spaniels are forging ahead with a vengeance and Terriers will soon have to step aside the top of the ladder to make place for the little sports.

Fred Coleman, of Hull, has done a good turn for the Cocker breeders of this province by buying from Chas. L. Bowen, the coming champion, "The Coming Storm," which everybody will remember as the winners at the Ladies' Kennel Club and Ottawa Winter Fair Shows.

They will mature closer to 30 lbs. than 25 lbs. so that "Samson" may be depended upon to throw the right weight and ideal bone.

Toys.—My heart always thumps a little bit faster when I come to write about the Toys as they are always so closely associated with the ladies. It was left to a Montreal lady to write a new page in Toy history by importing two of the best mites of dogdom that ever crossed the seas. Mrs. A. Riou of the Royaume Kennels is happy to put before the Eastern fanciers the most beautiful Red Shaded Peke, "Shawlee Red Shadow", whose beautiful photo appears in this issue. "Shawlee" was bred by C. Holden, England, sired by "Throston Hur Dandy," out of "Shawlee Gem."

The following champions appear in

his pedigree: "Wun Dah of Chinatown," "Tsan Pam of Chinatown," "Chuerle of Alderbourne," and "Kat Ru of Buderop." He is a ready Stud and sires gorgeous puppies with flat faces, big eyes and of a lovely red color. His is certainly the shortest body we have ever seen in this country on a Peke. There are now several bitches in whelp to him in Montreal. He weighs exactly 6 lbs.

But talking about a ready Stud, the beautiful 3 lbs. Pom, "Red Mite Golden Double," which Mrs. Riou also imported can't be beaten. He mated "Royaume Stella," the Montreal well-known winner on the day of his arrival in Montreal and she shows heavy in whelp. "Red Mite" is a solid Red, has an extraordinary short body, very small bone, beautifully carried tail and

wonderful coat. He is a real flyer, very bold and has pleasant manners. Bred by C. A. A. Harding of England, sired by "Bowenville Red Mite," out of "Orange Nancy," which was out of "Ch. Peter of Black Acre," and "Ch. Perivale Mist of Gold," "Red Mite" is bound to become a pillar of the breed in Canada.

The beautiful female Pom, "Golden Meg," also imported by Mrs. A. Riou and which we also reviewed in a previous issue is quickly recovering from an accident which she suffered in transit. Soon she will be in condition to grace our fall shows. Her winnings in England were two 1st prizes, under Judge M. V. Hughes, in a class of 16 exhibits and another of 8 Poms of both sexes, one 1st, one 2nd under Judge J. Holgate, one 2nd under Judge Hudson, and one under Judge C. Houlker.

British Columbia News

HAVING been unable to attend any of the shows on our recent circuit was a great disappointment to me, however, the accounts I have received show of at least two outstanding successes. Dr. Ballard's benching and feeding as supplied to the Coast City Kennel Club was, I am told, far ahead of anything we have yet had, and he surely deserves the thanks of the community for his help, the benching is easily moved and erected, with solid divisions between the exhibits, besides being attractive in appearance, the feeding provided by Dr. Ballard must have been a veritable banquet.

The Coast City Kennel Club are to be commended for their courage in times like the present, putting on their show at the drill hall, and it is to be sincerely hoped that the show was a financial success, and that the benefit of a downtown fixture received the gate which it so fully deserved, no better site can be found in Vancouver, a most attractive show was provided, with none of the unnecessary delays so often associated with dog shows.

The Vancouver Kennel Club Show went off smoothly in their new quarters at Hastings Park which I hear are admirable for a dog show, they have ample room and light, and the benching being along the walls give the spectators lots of room to see the dogs.

The Vancouver Exhibition Association's Show will be held in the same quarters on September 2nd and 3rd, the judge being A. P. Semple, Regina. After several years of shows held in tents and dismal basements, it is to be hoped that fanciers will show their appreciation of these new quarters by making a bumper entry. With the huge crowds that invariably attend the Exhibition, this is without a doubt our best shop window. Oswald Balshaw, one of our most efficient and obliging secretaries, will again hold that office.

The show of the Royal City Kennel Club was I hear a success, and ably judged by Joseph Dodds.

The Victoria Show appears to have passed off with the usual good management of this well-known fixture, run by an enthusiastic and sporting crowd.

The advantage of running four shows within ten days of each other is a debatable point, striving to make it possible to make champions in the circuit is not the Alpha and Omega of dog shows, rather should it be to make more competition in the classes with the best procurable competing in the

ring, and "not for exhibition" or "specials only" (which is only desirable in few cases), entries helping to make up the championship points, surely it was never the intention of our legislators that championship points were to be won other than on the actual number of dogs in competition. One must be an optimist to be satisfied with championship points made up by the aid of entries "not for exhibition" and "specials only," it may fool the novice, but only until he ceases to be a novice. It would seem to be much more worth while to devise some championship system where breed and not collective competition counted.

Looking through our show entries, several breeds were noticeably up, Scottish Terriers are coming along fast, probably owing to the team work of the breeders, the same may be said of Collies, largely due to the enthusiastic W. G. Hassel, well-known to many thousands on the air as "Uncle Billy," the popular radio announcer. Wire Fox Terriers usually an attraction had a deplorably small entry at the four shows, yet there are possibly more Wires in Vancouver than any other breed.

On July 9th, the British Columbia Fox Terrier Association will hold their annual summer matinee show in the grounds of 6249 Elm Street, Vancouver, kindly lent by George Lydiatt, while these shows are not held under Canadian Kennel Club rules, like the winter show, it serves a very useful purpose in introducing new fanciers, and has been a stepping stone for many entering the breed, as well as the first ring in which many of our best timers have made their initial appearance. This show is quite different to anything held here, under delightful surroundings, with a charming host and hostess, afternoon tea is provided for all attending.

A. E. Grant will judge both coats; he requires no introduction to local fanciers as he has been breeding Fox Terriers for a good number of years, and up to some time ago had the largest establishment of Wires in the Province, besides locally his stock have won at New York shows as well as in California, etc., always a strong supporter of our shows, sometimes with a string of ten to fourteen Terriers in competition, he was a formidable contender for top honours. Before the war, Mr. Grant dabbled with success in Airedales, the Wires came after the war, when he personally and with the help of Her Grace, the Duchess of Newcastle picked his foundation stock from the famous "of Notts" Kennels, and another Wire, he owns a loft of some of the greatest racing homers in Can-

ada. Now, here we have one of the most popular and highly regarded of men going to judge, let us give him a really big job, he has no fads or fancies. The other day I was asked, "What sort does he like?"—Well, he likes a good one.

Mrs. Witherby of Sannich on Vancouver Island, who made a start in the popular Wire Hair, by securing from Mrs. Thornton Sharp a bitch that has since arrived, presented her owner with a good litter by "Ch. Becksides Bonus," has decided on going further into the game, and this time purchased from the same source a bitch puppy by "Kemphurst Craftsman."

To reach a ripe old age is not the lot of many city dogs these days, yet we have recently heard of a Wire-haired Fox Terrier, bred by us in July, 1916, being still alive in Vancouver, this is unusual, inasmuch that this dog has always had his liberty to come and go as he liked.

I have just received a letter from Gerald L. Stock, President of the Coast City Kennel Club, in which he advises me that the sporting editor of the Vancouver Daily Province was given a list of the 1st, 2nd, 3rd prize-winners in all classes, two days after the show, so that it is not due to any neglect on the club's part that those who got into the money failed to receive due publicity. Mr. Stock has been told that the complete returns will yet appear in the paper. Our friends resume of the show emphasizes several points in which we all are or should be interested, notable entries, he says "As far as I can gather only three American exhibitors took in the whole circuit of four shows, we did, I feel confident jeopardize our chances of local entries by staging four shows in such close proximity to each other, as we have to a large degree to depend upon the less fortunate (financially) exhibitors for the bulk of our entries, four items of disbursements credited to dog shows within ten days proved too strenuous for most, however willing they might be." Mr. Stock mentions that the show was a three-point rating to which he attributes several causes, but personally I think, taking into consideration present conditions, this is a pretty good effort, and upon which they are to be congratulated as far as the number of entries is concerned.

At the Morris and Essex five-point show, British Columbia, English Setters again came to the fore, to Dr. Daw, of Victoria goes the credit of breeding the English Setter, "Jiggs Mallwyd," by his imported "Mallwyd Monarch," who had the distinction of going best of winners, the winners bitch was sired by the well-known "Ch.

Rackets Rummy," formerly owned by J. J. Cottle of Nanaimo, wins in this class of competition give us a thrill of pride in our local dogs, and we heartily congratulate all concerned. Dr. Daw has recently sold "Dorothy D" to Mr. Pratt of Kingshort. At the time of shipment she was showing in whelp to "Mallwyd Monarch." There is a steady demand for our good Setters even in these times.

Miss Margot Robertson, of Drumadon Kennels, Victoria, is evidently going into Sealyhams with enthusiasm, she has imported "Christofer of Tytherton," by "Ch. Eastfield Candidate," ex "Tytherton Toscin, and the bitch, "Brampton Butterscotch," by "Cranleigh Crasher," ex "Brampton Pet," due to whelp June 26th to "Eastfield Chef," by "Ch. Eastfield Cadet," ex "Budleigh Primula," two more bitches are to be imported, so a strong kennel is to be expected, we wish success to Miss Robertson and hope to see her exhibiting in the near future.

Mrs. B. W. Drury of Chemainus is another of our Sealyham breeders, her "Stormy Petrel" has just presented her with a litter of two dogs and two bitches by "Borlick Joker," both the sire and dam are from imported stock.

From Walter Riome of Moose Jaw, our Saskatchewan Provincial Contributing Editor, comes a very delightful letter of goodwill and thanks to the three mainland shows for the care taken of his Irish Terrier bitch, "Ard-bahn Moira." I feel sure I am expressing the feelings of the entire fancy in our appreciation of his sporting entry, and offer our heartiest congratulations on the splendid wins of his bitch, so satisfied is Mr. Riome with the services given by these clubs, next year he hopes to send us more entries. The sporting spirit of our Saskatchewan friend gives us all heart.

Jack Cottle of Nanaimo helps to keep our notes going, in a letter touching on many aspects of our fancy, he advises me that H. Sheppard of Nanaimo, a Curly Retriever breeder, has bought from the East a Newfoundland bitch, "Black Bess," we wish him success in his new venture. J. Sencer of Northfield, near Nanaimo, has taken up some more breeds of gun dogs, his place being situated in a district well stocked with game, they will have ample opportunity for work. Mr. Cottle's own Northfield Kennel of Irish Setters are increased by two new litters, "Northfield Irish Peggy" whelping seven, but unfortunately only two are now living, the imported "Rosie of Glenora" had two dogs and one bitch, both litters being sired by his well-known "Northfield Irish Boy," may the best of luck be with this popular fan-

Let Us Talk About Cocker Spaniels!

(Continued from page 20, June issue)

Conformation at a glance on the comparative chart using a twenty-five pound dog, 15 inches at the withers as a basis:

a-c—15 inches.

a-b—7½ inches, one-half the height of a-c.

d-e—18¾ inches; one and one-quarter times the height of a-c, giving the length of the body from the fore chest to rear of flank.

c-f—7½ inches; one-half the height a-c, giving length of neck.

f-g—6¾ inches; one-tenth less than height a-b of nine-twentieths of the height a-c.

f-h—3¾ inches; five-ninths of f-g, giving length of skull.

i-j—3¾ inches; equals that of f-h, giving depth of skull.

h-g—3 inches; four-fifths of f-h, giving length of muzzle.

l-m—3 inches; equal that of h-g, giving depth of muzzle.

h-k—3 inches; equal that of h-g, giving width of skull.

m-m—2½ inches; four-fifths of f-h, giving width of muzzle, slightly less than length or depth.

w-x—one-half of u-v, giving width between the eyes.

b-d or ss—6¼ inches; one-third of d-e, giving outside width of front.

n-o—3¾ inches; vertically one-quarter the height of a-c.

n-p—7½ inches; vertically one-half the height of a-c.

n-q—11¼ inches; vertically three-quarters height of a-c.

n-r—15 inches; vertically same height as a-c.

T—The set on of Tail.

When the dog is standing with his back level and the front of the lower hind legs slightly behind a vertical line from the rear of flank as shown by dotted line 19-20 should give the angulation as shown.

9-10—n to o x Should leave the level perpendicular forming an angle of 90 degrees with the ground.

10-11—o to p x Should form an angle at the hock of about 131 degrees.

11-12—p to q x Should form an angle at the stifle of about 103 degrees, a slightly wide right angle.

12-13—q to r x Should form an angle at the hip of about 102 degrees, a slightly wide right angle.

When the dog is standing with his fore legs perpendicular to the level as shown at (a), the angulation should be as shown:

3-4—a-b x Should have the level per-

pendicular forming an angle of 90 degrees with the ground.

4-5—b-s x Forming an angle at the elbow of about 138 degrees.

5-6—s-c x Forming an angle at the lower shoulder of about 93 degrees. A slightly wide right angle. The shoulder joints should set slightly back from the fore chest d.

17-18 Shows the level of the head passing through the eyebrow and occiput. The top of the muzzle should be slightly below and parallel with same. The under jaw should be slightly above and parallel with the level of the back.

14 Shows the line of movement of the stifle when the dog is in action.

15-16 Shows that the occiput is almost vertical with the fore chest.

The angulation of the dog if the eighties are very similar to those as described above.

The following is suggested as the relative heights and weights:

Height at Withers	Pounds
12½ inches	20
13 "	21
13½ "	22
14 "	23
14½ "	24
15 "	25
15½ "	26

From the foregoing it will be at once seen that the length of the body, from the fore chest to the rear of the flank, is one and one-quarter times the height at the withers. I have taken these measurements in preference to those suggested by some fanciers, that the length of the back from the withers to rear of flank should equal the height at the withers.

My reason for this is that a dog, through faulty shoulder placement may give the dog a right proportion, but if that same dog had correct shoulder placement would be short in the back. And at the same time, a dog with the correct length as I have suggested with incorrect shoulder placement would appear to have a long body, and a short neck. Therefore, I think, the most logical way is to take our measurements from the fore chest to rear of flank, as they are more fixed.

Figures 1 and 2, and 22. Illustrates the foregoing proportions.

Figure 3. Shows an equal length of skull and muzzle, which, in my opinion, do not give us a well-balanced head as we have in Figure 1. It has a tendency to shorten the skull, therefore giving it a somewhat short appearance, and the muzzle an extra long appearance. In

this it would be well for us to take care and not overdo it, as is the case with many English Cockers. Let us take note of what Mr. E. C. Spencer told the English Fanciers when he said "breeders want to be careful not to exaggerate in length of foreface and depth of muzzle. What is required is a well balanced head." While we may adopt either of these heads, I am of the opinion that any further attempts of length should be discouraged.

Figure 21. Shows that the width across the eye is divided into four and that each eye occupies one quarter of that distance. The other two quarters or one-half of the distance between u and v as the width between the eyes.

Figure 4. Shows a receding skull. Many of our dogs have this type of skull, and while it is favored by some breeders, it at the same time gives the dogs' muzzle, a down appearance, and has a tendency to shorten the neck. It makes the junction of the head and neck less defined. It also gives the dog the appearance of a higher ear carriage.

Figure 5. Shows a dish face giving the dog a weak jaw, in many cases the flow of the lip is considerably below the level of the lower jaw, this should be discouraged. In others undershot, that is to say, that the under jaw protruding beyond the upper jaw, the lower incisor teeth projecting beyond the upper as in a Bulldog. The eyelids are often drawn down exposing the haws giving the expression of a Smooth Basset hound and particularly so when the loose skin on the head falls in a wrinkle over the head and down the side of the cheek as I have seen on a few occasions.

Figure 6. Shows a weak fore-face—snipey. The top and bottom jaws very weak, nose small, often pig jawed, that is, the lower jaw is shorter than the top one, teeth not meeting.

Figure 19. Gives a fair idea of what is wanted in our Cockers.

Figure 20. Gives a fair idea of an English Cocker head.

Figure 17. Shows a head where the stop is not so pronounced as it should be, giving the skull the appearance of receding. Such heads usually have small eyes, and are very full under the eyes, not chiseled out as it should be. In many cases the muscles of the cheeks are overdeveloped giving a fullness to the face instead of a nicely cleaned out face.

Figure 2. Sets forth, a good idea of a typical Cocker. Front. Good width of chest, elbows close in to the body. Good

strong straight front legs. Feet rather large. The rather large feet and plenty of hair is a great asset to the dog when swimming or walking over soft mud where a small footed dog would sink deep into the mud. The pads should be pliable, not horney, but very tough.

Figure 7. Shows a loose elbow, bent forelegs, weak pasterns, feet turning out. Flag or splay footed. Such fronts are usually the results of improper feeding and lack of exercise in their puppyhood.

Figure 8. Shows another form of crooked fronts with inturned toes. Often caused in the same way as No. 7. Many otherwise good dogs have been spoilt under these conditions. When the dog is in action they have a churning movement, that is, one foot passing over the other.

Figure 9. Shows a narrow front. Such fronts place a great handicap on the lung space.

Figure 10. Shows a very weak thigh, and almost straight stifle, there being little room for muscle development. The lower leg being placed far back from the vertical of the rear of flank. Such leg formation usually shows the back to have a decided downward slope from the shoulder to the stern, which causes the dog to be much lower behind than at the shoulder. It also shows a high stern carriage. Figure 13 shows the angulation of such legs.

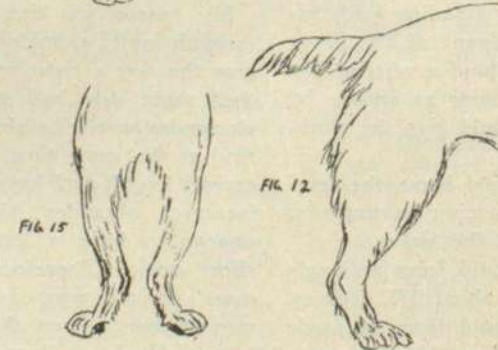
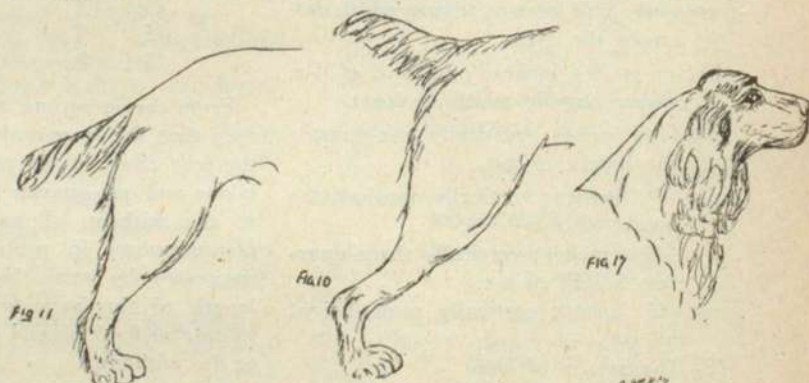
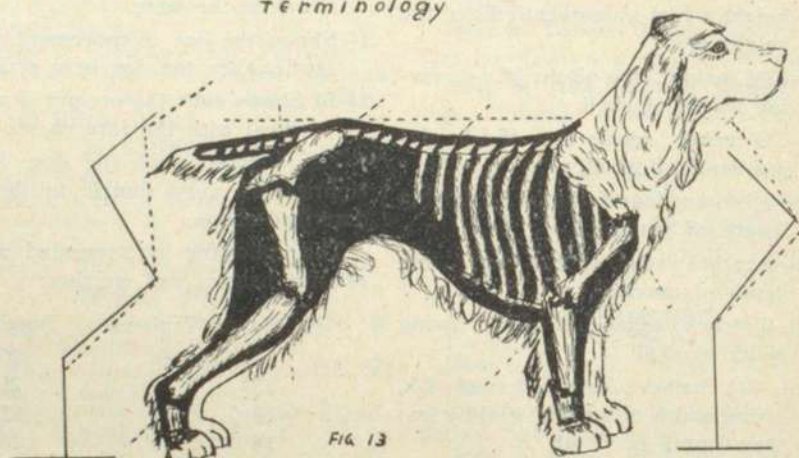
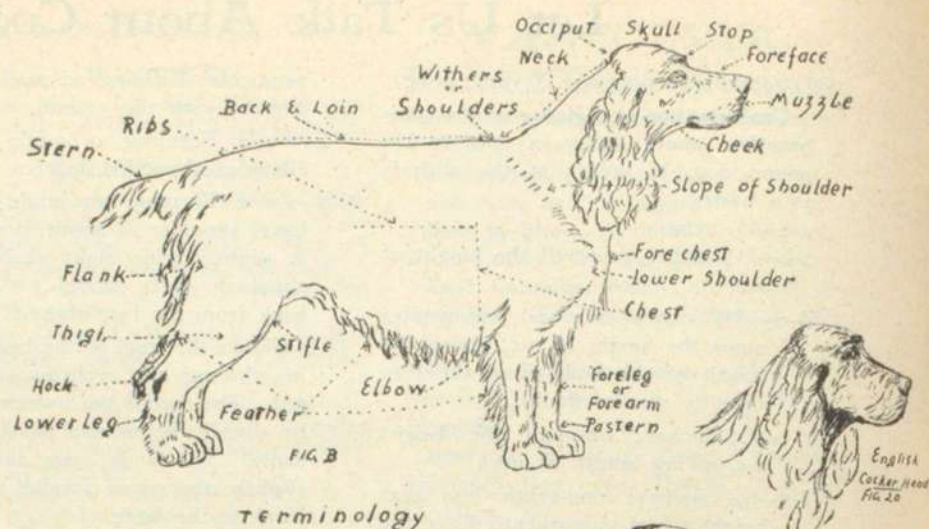
Figure 14. Shows a weak pastern. This is a common fault with a lot of dogs, particularly sporting dog breeds.

Figure 11. Shows a straight hock. This style of hock is very weak, and in many cases when pressure is brought up on the loin the joint will bend forward instead of backward. This style of hock is often found in Bostons. It also shows a low tail carriage.

Figure 12. Shows a side view of what what is known as "Cow hocked." It will be seen that the lower thigh is almost upright, while the lower leg is placed so that its hind feet comes well under the body.

Figure 15. Shows a "cow hock" when viewed from behind. The hock joints are brought almost together, and the lower leg turns outward. Such formation causes a peculiar movement when the dog is in action, swinging their legs outward and their hind quarters giving a decided roll.

Figure 16. Shows a well developed

Anyway, let us have the Open Forum now and decide in favor of the breed's best interests. 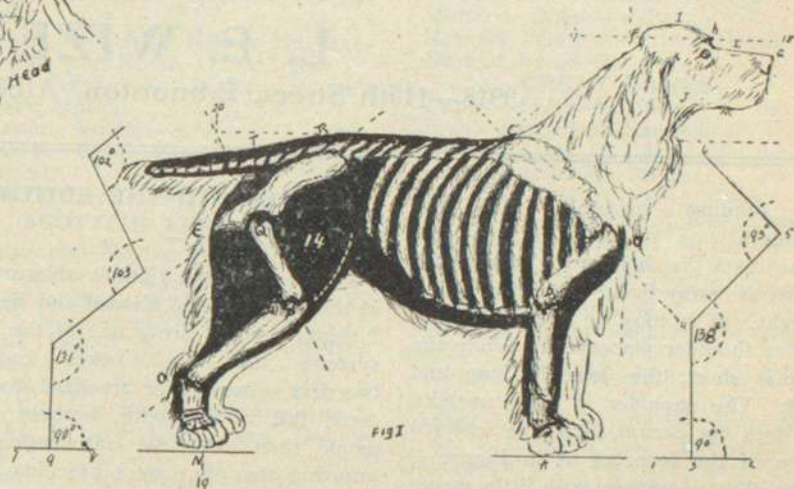

hind leg, showing great width of thigh, giving plenty of room for muscle development. This can only be obtained by good angulation. The lower thigh is strongly muscular, stifles well bent, hock strong and nicely bent. Feet round and deep. Such hind leg gives

power and strength.

Figure 13. Shows many weak points of the Cocker; it also gives the comparative angulations of what is right and what is wrong. The solid line showing the correct angulations as suggested in Figure 1.

The skull shows a prominent occiput similar to that found in a Setter. This should not be encouraged, but in its place a nice clean sweep, free of any bump. The neck is straight, narrow, running abruptly into the shoulders. The neck should be strong, muscular

and running smoothly into the shoulders.

The back is hollow or commonly known as "sway back" instead of being straight. It is long on account of incorrect shoulder placement. While the neck is short, the loin is long and weak. The shoulder is more upright, and does not permit such free forward action of the fore leg as in Figure 1.

The chest is narrow with little spring of rib, and not ribbed back as it should be. The loin has a tucked-up appearance. The hind leg is similar to that in Figure 10.

Figure 18. Will convey a fair idea of how Figure 1 would appear to my way of thinking a nicely proportioned dog, a dog capable of doing any work needed of him, having plenty of lung space and lots of muscle development, and at the same time not overdone. But a nice compact, well put together, active little dog of great strength.

Explanatory: Figure A shows a Cocker Spaniel of the early eighties around which our present standard was compiled.

Figure 1 shows the chief bone structure, and the angulation of both fore and hind quarters, and shows roughly the length of the body as compared with the height.

Note the comparative length of the skull and muzzle as compared with Figure 3, which is of equal length.

Figure 22 shows the relative depth and width of muzzle.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Mr. Editor:—

I have read Mr. Climo's able article in the May issue of **Kennel and Bench**. I think it would prove one of the best systems that the Cocker Spaniel breeders or any other breeders of dogs could fall in line with, because they would then have the satisfaction of knowing that they were breeding to a standard that could not be changed within 15 or 20 years. It would work the same for both the breeders and the judges and as it has been brought before us by one of our foremost Cocker breeders, I think it would be wise to study it well before discarding it.

Now, in regard to the weights of Cockers, were we not given to understand that the weight question was gone thoroughly into by the Cocker Spaniel Club? and I honestly believe, that when the same Clubs decided on the standard of 23 to 28 pounds, they were leaving plenty of room for everyone, and also giving the dog justice, so why tell me that the standard of 23 to 28 lbs. has probably kept people from Washington or Oregon, or any other part of the United States, from showing their dogs at Victoria, B.C. I think that it is a very poor excuse and rather hard to swallow. If a Cocker is under 23 pounds, then it should not be a Cocker, but rather a Toy Spaniel. Now, some people are saying that we will not find a market for our surplus stock across the Border. Well, figure this out. Some two or three years back, we were told that the "Old Country" Cocker was no good on this side because it was too big, and now the people who want the smaller Cockers, are selling their shirts to import these very same, no-good big Cockers. Do

you think they will take them to the Vet. to have pieces cut off here and there? Don't be led astray, Fanciers. Get a **good big** Cocker, and then see whether they will buy it or not.

London Canine Association Show

Special Report to Kennel and Bench.

IT was generally conceded that the London Canine Association Spring Show this year was by far the most successful show that "Canada's Oldest Dog Club" has staged for some time. A much improved dog show building, with a roomy ring in a large out-of-doors tent, plenty of exercising space, and lots of accommodation for the dogs, made the venue more attractive than usual. Leon J. Iriberry, of Brooklyn, N.Y., who has filled many judging engagements in the eastern states, judged all-breeds except non-sporting dogs, which were ably taken by J. B. Dale, old-time breeder and judge from ePtrolia, Ontario. Mr. Iriberry made a good impression with the exhibitors, and the usual ringside criticism was cut to the minimum.

Although the entry was not as large as at some former shows, the quality was there, and a perusal of the awards will show that the going was good in almost every breed, and that a number of dogs that have won group and best in show honors at other events were competing here.

It seemed like old times to see Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Weldon on hand, for London was always a favorite show with these good sports from Galt. Mr. Weldon ably piloted Mrs. Henry Stroh's gorgeous little Pekingese, "Shenshi Ming Toy," through to Best Toy in Show.

Mr. Dale found for the best of his sporting dogs, E. Bergishagen's "Tula II. Jagersbo," closely pressed for this honor by Mrs. Patterson's Russian Wolfhound, "Romanoff Kosloff 2nd."

The working group appeared an easy victory for the good showing German Shepherd bitch, "Una of Picardy," owned by Mrs. Helen Walsh, of Detroit.

Terriers found the Hamilton show hero, W. H. Shortt's "Vanity Bantam," at the top of affairs, and non-sporting went to the home-bred Boston Terrier, Clarence Hammett's "Rockaround Rosie."

For best in show honors it narrowed down between the Setter, the Fox Terrier and the Boston, with the award going by a close margin to "Rockaround Rosie." This, we believe, is the first time that a Canadian-bred Boston Terrier has been judged Best in Show at a Canadian Kennel Club show held in Ontario, although the honor has gone on different occasions to invaders from the United States.

The show was saddened by the mes-

sage that James Murphy, past-president of the Association, and the oldest member of the club, had been suddenly stricken and was not expected to survive the day. He died early the next morning and his loss will be deeply felt by all his friends, for "Jim," as he was known to everyone, was the grand old man of the London Canine Association, never known to miss a meeting when he was well, and always ready to boost the show with an entry. This year is the first show ever held in London that did not have his name among the exhibitors.

To Gilbert Jackson, the secretary of the club, who has no interest in dogs other than a love for them, goes most of the credit for the success of the show. John C. Fitzgerald, president of the club, was up for the first time in months following a severe illness and sat in the ring throughout the judging.

Hopton, and about these latter shows we will have something to say in this column next month.

After a long time away from the judging rings at American shows, Alf. Delmont had an assignment at the Wissahickon Kennel Club Show on May 29th, of so many of the 622 dogs entered, that he had a giant's sized job on his hands for the whole day. The size of the entry would seem to indicate that the fanciers generally were keen to have Mr. Delmont again "don the ermine."

We had the pleasure of meeting Mr. and Mrs. Delmont at the Morris and Essex fixture, and both looked to be enjoying life most heartily. Holland Buckley's Impressions At Mineola

(From "Our Dogs" (English), Issue June 3rd, 1932)

I NEVER can resist the urging lure of voyaging to the great open civilized spaces of the world, and particularly to the great Republic of the Western Hemisphere, "Hands across the sea" is a very fine sentiment, which in terms of actual living contact is of vital interest, and is of immense value in the two English-speaking nations, and which today is stronger than at any time during their history. There is no underlining of secret agreements, but one of frank understanding and mutual respect.

The fact of Great Britain's balancing her Budget, albeit with great sacrifices, has made an enormous impression in the United States, and the unversed belief in the States in our Island Kingdom is everything from the dark twilight of depression which has enveloped America, and from which perfectly sane thinking Americans can see no escape in their time; which view, with great deference, is in my judgment, entirely fallacious, and will prove so just as soon as facts are faced and dealt with in the old superb way of America's great statesmen of the past.

The Voyage Out

A great surprise was mine a few days before the voyage, and a most pleasant one, for my old friend, W. S. Green, the famous Irish Terrier breeder and judge, decided to take a vacation and go with me. His personal popularity in the States was instant, for all our friends there took him to their hearts, and hospitable invitations were fairly rained upon him.

An old favorite "little yacht" of mine, the s.s. Aquitania, was the selected vessel to make the long trip, but owing to fogs and heavy seas, even this magnificent ocean greyhound lost a little time, and owing to the burning down of the big Cunard pier which was our destination point, our arrival was a little late, and it was the day after arrival that I stepped into the ring at Mineola Show, which was certainly a rather saucy time-table.

However, my luck was right in from the start; the biggest pool on the ship's run came my way, and the "Solon of Southampton's" luck proved uncanny at backing the winners of the horse-racing on board at fair tote prices.

It shows what a cosmopolitan game dog breeding and showing is, for many of the passengers and members of the ship's staff are breeders, including Mr. Myers, Junr., an Airedale breeder, and Mr. Sibrian, a friend of Mr. Winder, the Fox-terrier expert.

The kennels on the boat, under the

keen and able superintendence of Mr. Waybill and his assistant, were really luxurious and finely kept; in fact, some Wire Fox Terriers were actually going through the usual preparations for show, although that, of course, was not their objective. A good Bulldog and a fine Labrador bitch that Lady Howe was sending to Frank Lord, and a charming Scottish Terrier dog that Miss Jarry, the successful Watford breeder, had arranged to send out to the order of Baroness Burton, I made the pick of the dogs on board when my judgment was invited.

All in all, I surely had a great time in this wonderful ship, with her officers simply radiating cheerfulness and verve.

Amongst my friends that met me at the dock would naturally be "Ted" Offerman, O. Carly Harriman and his lovely wife, and radiant Mrs. Helena Greeff, and so when I got through the somewhat tiresome Customs, and landed at my "little home in the West," my cup of happiness was very complete.

The Judging at Mineola

And now to our muttons, for "the show's the thing." It must be a "packet" of time since I last judged at the Ladies' Kennel Association of America's show at Mineola, for L. P. C. Astley was then my co-judge for the second day's "doings." In this year of grace the panel of judges was all-American, with the exception of myself, and the bulk of the work fell to my share, which is, after all, a not unusual proceeding.

Gundogs—Particularly Pointers

To take the breeds seriatim: Pointers held pride of place, and proved a really grand collection and took a deal of sorting out. The open dog class saw "Nancolleth of Happy Valley" in the lead; a good specimen of class, bred by the English West Country breeder, Mrs. A. Rowe. The limit bitches produced "Stylish Cicely of Happy Valley," bred by an old friend, in Mr. Isaac Sharpe, but "Stylish Flower of Happy Valley," bred by the same celebrated authority, went to "winners." For best of "winners" there was "Ch. Fancy of

Crombie," bred by W. J. Shannon, but evidently from Dr. Turton Price's kennel. She started a great day by first of all going in front of "Nancolleth Markall of Happy Valley" (breeder, Mrs. A. Rowe), and afterwards winning the honor of best dog (all breeds) in the show, after winning a red-hot group class.

The English Setters came well up to the high reputation of many of the contestants. "Happy Valley Bridegroom," by "Wagg of Crombie," is very typical and sound, and won the American-bred class, while in limit an emigrant from the Scottish kennels of Dr. Turton Price, "Maesydd Monty of Stucile," by "Marvel of Crombie" ex "Alice of Crombie," gained the spoils. Its name is quite familiar in Great Britain. A beautiful American-bred bitch, in "Blue Comet Meg of Crombie of Happy Valley," won her class and annexed the open. She is by that grand dog, "Ch. Crossfell," about which myself and Isaac Sharpe differed at the Kennel Club show some years ago, the result being that the late Francis Redmond was called in to give his fiat, which went to this good dog, thus beating a very wonderful Sheepdog for best in the show. "Meg" was yet another winner from the great Scottish kennel of genial and popular Dr. Turton Price.

I have read many glowing descriptions of "Ch. Blue Dan of Happy Valley," somewhat doubtfully I'll confess, but everything written of this superlative Setter is absolutely and entirely correct, and I congratulate D. B. L. Compt on the wonderfully good fortune that produced one of the best English Setters of all time. Also felicitations to Ben Lewis, junr., who showed all his charges in simply superb form. The same would apply to the handler of the winning Pointer, Clarence Halley. Neither of these craftsmen have anything to learn from our own people.

Most of the Gordon Setters came from J. B. Munro's kennel, and they were not in any sense, outstanding, with the exception of "Rob Roy," which is typical of his breed.

The Irish Setters came up in fine numbers, and some very good specimens paraded before me, but as they appear to be all American-bred, they lack a touch of interest to English readers. Suffice it to write that "Ch. Higgins Red Coat" would hold the fort against many of our foremost dogs. The same would also apply to the lovely "Queen Maive."

The type and size of the American Cocker, especially the former, differ

very materially from ours, so there is no point in discussing them in this story. There were no contestants from Great Britain in the entry.

The English Springer entry, however, disclosed some of the best imported in recent years. "Tedwyn's Trick," by "Ch. Tedwyn's Trex" ex "Banchory Bright," bred by Lorna Countess Howe, was easily the best benched, and was declared the best Springer in the show. "Inveresk Chancellor" appears to be doing his share in getting winners, as such a good Springer should, and of "Horsford Highlander" the same can be written. "Inveresk Carminetta," bred by McNab Chassells, won the limit, but was beaten by an American-bred bitch for "winners"—and by a really good specimen at that, by "Ch. Horsford Highlander."

The Dachshunds were sparse in numbers, but fine in quality. The best were apparently importations from the Fatherland.

A handsome Greyhound, covering a deal of ground, "Viverton Princess," bred by R. Matthews, was easily the best present.

Elkhounds were nearly a complete wash-out, and the same could be written of the Irish Wolfhounds, unfortunately.

"Ch. Lodestar Lute" was a long way ahead in the Collie section. "Miss Glenn" obtained the declaration for best Sheepdog; she was bred by Miss J. F. Langton.

Terriers

The Bull Terriers were well-judged by my old friend, James Spring. It is heartening to see that such an old and successful breeder in the past as Frank Dole, whom I was glad to see looking just as keen and hearty as in the old days, breeding a useful specimen, fully

capable of winning first prizes. "Virgin's Tangle," bred by our own Dr. G. M. Vevers, won the limit in Bull Terriers, but "Wildfire of Blighty" carried too many guns for all of them and was the best of his breed, a fact which will be appreciated strongly by the "archpriest" of the breed in England. "Ch. Comfey," bred by H. L. Sumner, came second to the "Wildfire" representative.

Cairn Terriers, under such an able and popular judge as O. C. Harriman, did not come up to expectations. "Fiery Stefan" got his head in front of "Divor of Gunthorpe" in limit, but the American-bred "Darbie o' Tapscott," by "Ch. Knighton Dean," beat the lot for "winners." "Dainty of Otford" went to third in limit bitches, but "Darkie of Tapscott," bred in the States and sired by "Knighton Dean of Tapscott" rounded off a good day for his famous kennel by the award of best of his breed, a good performance in a field that included "Ch. Southborough" and "Prudence of Otford."

Smooth Fox Terriers came up pretty well and were in some instances rather outstanding. It delighted me that probably the oldest breeder of the variety possibly in the world, Winthrop Rutherford, is still keen enough to breed, raise, and show good Terriers. "Warren Broadcast" will improve, given time, in several departments. He is by "Ch. Croydon the Bat," which himself was more than useful. "Ch. Millhill Margin," by "Southboro' Soranus" ex the exquisite "Ch. Watteau Donzella," is a rare good pattern of correct size and has power in small compass. He was wonderfully well put down and was shown by Percy Roberts. A really beautiful bitch took my eyes at once in "Warren Symbol," which won her

classes in effortless style, and I congratulate Mr. Rutherford on breeding such a lovely bitch. Second to "Symbol" came "Heathside Her Highness" (bred by another personage in Robert Sedgewick), a very sweet specimen. "Warren Symbol" went to "winners," and will soon be a champion, or I am a worse judge than many people think I am. E. W. Kerr's "Millhill Margin" won the award for best of his breed.

The Wire Fox Terrier section proved a splendid entry, and was grand alike in quality and general "presence." "Warwell Windstorm" very easily annexed the Dog Puppy Class; a promising youngster of great merit. "Middlecote Memorandum" came out in the American-bred class to make a page in canine history; exquisitely balanced all through, not excessive or exaggerated anywhere, perfect in texture of coat, size, ears, eyes, and expression; splendidly sound, and put down to the minute; he managed to straddle the entire opposition. Felicitations to Frank Lord on breeding such a sterling youngster. The superbly bred "Reflection of Wildoaks" just lost in class of skull and feet; the latter item is doubtless due for improvement; altogether a high-class one. "Wycote Sensation of Glynhir" just got his long head in front of "Halleston Knockout," chiefly by reason of luckier "timing" for the show, for the "Knockout" was decidedly short of leg hair and whiskers. Both are beautiful specimens of their breed. Arthur Cartledge had another home-bred puppy in the bitch competition; very classy in all departments, and as usual with this craftsman, extraordinarily well known, like her stable companion, the successful dog puppy. She is by "Ch. Lone Eagle of Earlsmoor," which bids fair

to leave a high and honorable mark upon the breed. The second, "Halles-ton Thrill," is very sweet and typical, but the show came a little too soon for a proper display of her charms. "Delightful Lady of Wildoaks," by "Ch. Gallant Fox of Wildoaks," made a delightful impression; a lovely bitch of great charm.

American-bred bitches went also to the "Golden Bridge" establishment by a wide margin, for "Fascination of Wildoaks" is redolent of many of the qualities that make a champion. By "Ch. Crackley Supreme" ex "Ch. Gains Great Surprise," her excellence can cause no surprise. "Flornell Sketch of Warily" is a grand specimen of true Fox Terrier attributes, and will, without any doubt whatever, finish a champion. Bred by T. Hand, she impressed me very much. "Newmarket Star Light" was clean off her form, and appeared very light.

"Ch. Kemphurst Carnation" won the open after a stern struggle with "Sketch of Warily." The former's condition left something to be desired, and probably the explanation is that this beautiful bitch is not yet acclimatized. Her superb head, body, and great character just turned a wavering scale in her favor. "Earlsmoor Snowflake," by "Ch. Lone Eagle of Earlsmoor," is a lovely little "morsel"; very straight and true and such a mover! A little more time is needed, however, for face furnishing. "Winners" went to "Kemphurst Carnation."

The Middlecote representative then warded off the successive challenge of historical figures of this breed comprising the following, which were not entered in the regular classes; "Fylde-lands Margaret," by "Ch. Chantry Call Boy"; she is a very beautiful specimen; "Ch. Eden Aristocrat of Wildoaks,"

"Ch. Weltona Frizzette of Wildoaks," "Warwell Writer," "Flornell Standard," and "Ch. Lone Eagle of Earlsmoor"—certainly a marvellous group of celebrities of their breed. "Memorandum," however, survived the battle, and our heartiest felicitations to a good fellow and sincere breeder on such an outstanding victory, which was richly deserved on the day.

W. S. Green, whose knowledge of the "Irishman" is profound, tells of good specimens benched, of which the best came out of the judging in the exportation from Ireland by James R. Jackson. We refer to "Culbain Chloe," which beat the band.

The outstanding Kerry Blue was the grand-looking sound "Ch. Bantry Beauty of Oakcrest."

Scottish Terriers came up well for Robert D. Hartshorne to judge, who was very generally credited with having made a rare good job of them. On the few fugitive occasions on which I could screw my eyes round to his ring the results impressed even my hardened orbs. "Domino of Rookwood," by "Lonkley Laddie," looked fine value for his victories. He is out of "Ch. Rookery Doon". "Sporran Roger" also shows class and "power in little," and has great substance. He is by "Nordic Roger" ex "Laurieston Lauder." "Ch. Heather Essential," bred by Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Robb, was in anything but show form, and suffered a merited defeat by "Ch. Heather Reveller of Sporran." When conditions comes, however, this son of "Albourne Reveler" is more than likely to reverse the placings. The winner, of course, was bred at the famous establishment from which he takes his prefix. "Littlebury Wonder," bred by that stalwart of the breed, Mrs. Burrell, down Cambridge way, went to third in limit. "Harlothian

Locket," bred by that fortunate and able confederacy, Mr. and Mrs. Walton, won the open class; looking fine, with the well and favorably known "Craigie-burn Bard" a somewhat unlucky third, or so it seemed. "Redlington Romeo" made an excellent showing. He was bred by Miss B. Somers, whose prefix is widely known, and who is never concerned with any but good ones. The puppy bitches made a fine show, "Cedar Pond Charity," by "Albourne Reveller," winning with something in hand. An old and consistent breeder and expatriate, Herbert Hankinson, bred the winner of the American-bred competition; a goodish sort. "Ch. Heather Enchantress of Hitofa" annexed the Limit with much certainty. Bred by Robert Chapman and superb in every way, she would have been my own choice for best of her breed; in all human probability a hard runner for other high honors. Second came "Garrell Dorothy," a sturdy sort, bred by W. Erskine, and sired by "Garrell Todder." Third was "Invermark Gem of Sporran," by "Ornsay Guest" ex "Ornsay Gipsy," and bred by J. Galbraith. "Talavera Juliet," a close contestant, went fourth. A hot competition indeed. "Rosehall Gem" is very taking, and as handsome as they come; great head and substance; if her ears were a shade smaller, and her size ditto, she would be unbeatable. She is by "Albourne Reveller," and was bred by William Crawford. "Craigiburn Expectation of Sporran," by "Rookery Repeater," breeder, Harvey Marshall, made a pleasing third, with "Nordic June of Ballantrae," another by "Repeater," breeder, N. K. Boyd, following on. "Heather Enchantress" was best of "winners," but was short-headed by "Heather Reveller" for best of breed. A grand collection of some of Great Britain's best.

Carly Harriman soon polished off the Sealyham Terriers. Class was well represented all through, "Fastnent Fury," by "St. Margaret Swell Fella," just got his nose in front of "Brash Burglar of Pinegrade Rex." Both are promising in many ways. "Pinegrade Peppermint," by "Ch. Delf Discriminate" ex "Pinegrade O'Katie of Pinegrade," is a beautiful specimen, as one would expect of such breeding. Congrats to genial Fred Brown. His enthusiastic "Peppermint" annexed the American-bred class, and "Eastfield College Boy," in fine form, won the Limit dog. The latter is by that good Terrier, the West Country-bred "Cherry's Surprise," ex a real good dam in "Manyweather's Muscatelle." Breeder, Mrs. E. S. N. Pilkcathley. This constant English winner showed the way in Open dogs; not yet at his best. "Rensal Rio Rita," by "Scotia Duplicate of Rensal," was quite easily the best puppy bitch present; a very attractive youngster which, with ordinary good fortune, will go right to the top. Congratulations to that fine fancier and breeder, the owner of all the "Rensals." The "Pinegrades" were again to the fore in bitches, with a lovely young bitch, "Pinegrade Polyamia," in glorious form. "Redlands Ribbon," bred by Mr. Clarkson, won both the Limit and Open. A very grand bitch and very fit. "Scotia Aurora of Pinegrade" must have raced very hard for the verdict, for she is absolutely outstanding in every department which goes to make up the elite of this breed. "Gunside Begonia of Rensal" looked in tip-top form and will always be a dangerous competitor no matter what company may be arrayed against her. "Pinegrade Pantomine" made a winning appearance in "bred by exhibitor," a lovely specimen, very hard indeed to fault; she was bred by the owners. The award for best Sealyham went to "Ch. Redlands Ribbon."

James Spring made no "bloomers" in judging the bonny little "Taffies," and his selection of "Ch. Halcyon Play Boy" for the best of the breed was very commendable. The brace of exiles from gallant little Wales for the limit and open bitches were "Aman Melody of Hitofa" and "Aman Memory," which went straight to the eye. Credit to the breeder, J. F. Hitchings. "Melody" was the judicial preference, and rightly so.

Miss M. van Schaich had a hand of Aces in the West Highland White Terrier entry, "Hatton Jockie," by "Ornsay MacSporran" ex "Ornsay Charm," led in American-bred; "Roving Robber," bred by C. Jackson, won the limit, and "Cooden Slave" the open. "Springmead Carry On," yet another Ornsay produc-

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tion, was the best puppy bitch, while "Cooden Skia," bred by Mrs. O. R. Williams, was the selection in the open class, and was preferred to the field for best of her breed—a very easy victory.

Our own Mrs. Andrews had the great honor of breeding the best Pekingese in "Benjamin of Toddington," a heavily-coated dog and very typical. He was shown by an old friend of my own in Mrs. F. Y. Mathis, "Ch. Little Effendi," lovely in coat, body, and head, was the best Pomeranian.

The great days when the best Bull-dogs were brought from England seem mainly a thing of the past; however, "Crovan'spring" would have made some of the best of them gallop to have got past him. A rare headed and bodied dog which could and did move to perfection; a really grand specimen which nearly brought off a long shot for best exhibit in the show.

The Tally Ho kennels of Dalmatians had a splendid collection of it best forward, and rightly accounted for most of the prizes. I have never seen any breed in better shape, and I heartily congratulate the fair owner, Mrs. Florence Bonney, who is in England to judge her favorite at Richmond Ch. Show. Exhibitors can take it from me that their exhibit will be truly and faithfully judged with outstanding ability. "Ch. Gladmore Harper" won the award for best of the breed, a sound, typical coaching dog of size and substance.

I spent the week following the show in a merry round of visits to many of the big kennels and old friends. A week-end with Stanley Halle at his wonderful country house was a heartening experience. The Terriers all looked fine, and some home-bred youngsters will in all probability make their mark. The best, however, were at Percy Robert's kennels, and here I saw a charming bitch puppy, a sure champion for the future for my old friend.

But I am "sitting pretty," knowing full well that I shall "draw the boodle" in due course.

I AM indebted to J. C. Fletcher, well-known international judge of Calgary, Alberta, for the following review of the Medicine Hat Kennel Club Annual Dog Show:

The Medicine Hat Dog Show, held under Canadian Kennel Club Rules, on May 24th, was a stupendous success viewed from all angles. The Show was well attended. The gateman told me for paid attendance they had broken all previous records. The venue of the Show was the spacious Arena which was all decorated up with flags and bunting for the occasion, with spick and span new benching, a good big ring and comfortable quarters for the dogs, which were kept very clean, as was the whole building, lending considerable color to the show. I noticed the ring was kept going with a swing and there was no waiting. Everybody in the Club seemed to have a job and did it extremely well.

Looking around the show it looked like the "Who's Who of Dogdom." It sure was a gathering of the Clans; "Sam" Jackson of "Winchester" fame from Winnipeg was on deck and uncorked a couple of "hot" ones for the Boston fans to look over, as did "Bob" Carter of Assiniboia. V. W. Williams and E. F. Brierley represented Lethbridge and had a few good ones to display in Collies, Pokes and Whip-pets. Hughie Leslie, all the way from Rosetown, Sask., had a nice string of various breeds to handle, which he did to perfection. Our Alberta Director, Arthur Wright of Edmonton, brought in a classy bunch of seventeen, and gave a good account of himself. There should be a great rush of applications for membership in the Canadian Kennel Club from the "Hat" district, as Director Wright told all and sundry why they should join, "and how."

Walter Riome of Moose Jaw, Sask., seemed to have the entire canine population of that city along with him. I don't know just how many he had, but every time I saw him he was just "going to show one" or was "showing one"; he certainly was a busy man. "Tommy" Little, also of Moose Jaw, was very much in evidence among the Irish Setters. I think "Tommy" and "Bill" Forrest of Calgary were the entertainment committee for the "Hat" show; they had a demijohn of butter-milk or something in a corner. I don't know exactly what it was any further than that it was good. It's a cinch it wasn't anything synthetic.

Mr. and Mrs. "Pat" Render, "Ed"

Monro, William Forrest (the latter is the judge elect of the forthcoming Calgary fixture), and the writer, represented Calgary. Hamish Middlemas was there from Regina; he only had a couple, but what a brace. See award list.

The 1932 Show of the Medicine Hat Kennel Club will go down in history as the best ever. It was one of those "real affairs." Everybody seemed happy, and in a good sporting mood. A great deal of credit is due the Club, "Bill" Armstrong, the popular President, was backed up with his entire Executive. They had everything running smoothly. The, old war horse "Charlie" Parks, is a topping good Secretary, and attended to his end of the business perfectly. I could not single out any particular member for special mention, they all worked as one man.

The Fanciers more-or-less look upon the "Hat" Show as a preliminary to the Western Canada Circuit. Judging by their recent performance, unless the Western Clubs look to their laurels, the Medicine Hat Show may prove the main event of the season. The Show was a quality one with well over three point rating.

Archie Semple, of "Cactus" fame, from Regina, was on the "woolsack," and acquitted himself commendably. He went over the dogs thoroughly, and his awards were well received by the exhibitors. At the close of the show we were all happy, packed up the "pooches," and caught the "rattler" for our respective homes.

The following is a brief "critique" of the Best of Breeds as I saw them from the ringside. I took no notes, and as this is from memory, should I have overlooked anybody or any dog, I am sorry. Mr. Semple has promised to cover all awards from his angle.

Pekingese, a nice little Black and Tan female "Mimosa." Typical head, plenty of bone, moderate body, very sound mover. Lacking in coat on the day of the show.

Pomeranians: "Cairndhu Courtier," a very stylish little Pom. Gorgeous coat, nice head and body; real Pom action. A dandy shower, put down very fit.

Bostons, "Valente's Aviator." A nice sized, well-marked, flashy Terrier. Shown very fit. Nice blocky head, free from wrinkle. Good short back, good front and moves very well. A mighty nice Terrier.

English Bulldogs, "Sergeant Murphy." A big little one. In color, brindle. Good front, low to the ground, good skull, well smashed up face. Nice body, good turn up and underjaw. Sound and moves well. On the bench he is a shade careless with his ears.

Dalmations, "Par Lap." Just a mod-

erate sort. Nice condition, and well spotted.

Airedales, "Goldendale Toranado." A nice sort; good body, legs and feet. A good coated one. Just a youngster who needs time to finish.

Fox Terriers (Smooth), "Oxford Fairy." A nice bitch. Good head, eye and expression. Capital front and quarters. Nice bone, good head, nice size. Free mover and put down fit. A very pleasing bitch.

Irish Terriers, "Pat Healey." A nice sized "Mick." Good coat and color. Nice body and front. Could carry his ears better; on the day of the show was a bit wild in this direction. Decent head; a sound Terrier.

Scottish Terriers, "Ruglan Rabbie." A good Scottie of correct size, exceptionally long in head; short body for such a long-headed one, good front, splendid hindquarters, and a nice eye. I fault him a bit in tail, a nice coated Scottie when put down fit, on the day his coat was not in the best of form, but when ready he will trouble the best of 'em, as he is all "Scottie."

Collies, "Rose Brae Rising Sun," an attractive Merle, a good headed one; ears well carried, plenty of coat of the right texture, well shown, and quite the best there.

Old English Sheepdogs, Only one—"His Nibs," would do better in the beardy Collie Classes.

German Shepherds: "Detlef of Stockade," a nice black and tan, a well set up Shepherd shown in faultless condition, he excels in head and neck properties, plenty of bone, good length of body and very nice action, a good one.

St. Bernards, "Cypress Carman," a big sound youngster, typical head, lots of bone and good body, when fully matured should go far.

Chesapeakes, "Paddy." A good coated Chesapeake; correct color; good body and front, but rather coarse in head.

Pointers, "Sport of Brooklands," a flashy liver and white, sound mover, good head and running gear, a good all round Pointer shown in splendid condition.

Retrievers (Curly), "Queenie," best of a very moderate lot, thick in head, swayed back, bad in front, fair coat.

Retrievers (Labrador), "Smokey," a workmanlike Retriever, nice size, decent head, good legs and feet, good body and sound mover.

Setters (English), I don't remember the name of the Best of Breed, but it was a nice bodied one, strong in head, with good legs and feet, fair coat, lacking feather, moves well.

Cocker Spaniels, "Merrie Durbar," a

Fox Terriers (Wire-coated), "Burlington Marguerite," all Terrier, a sweet expressed one, good head and reach; topping body and front, feet o.k., nice top and hindquarters with good bone, shown well in Classes, but tired in the Varieties.

Irish Setters, "Blarney," a pleasing Red, real Irish Setter character, nice head and front; excellent body, moves well, a well-balanced Setter.

Springer Spaniels, "Snigger of Sarcee," a black and white, good head and front, nice bone, sound mover, with good hindquarters, fair neck, shown too fat.

Whippets, "Calgaree Silver Slipper," a pleasing fawn, nice size, good head and body, good front, "springie" mover, in make-up resembles her sire, "Ch. Taffy's Pride."

It was with extreme pleasure I noticed **Leon F. Whitney's** book, "**The Basis of Breeding**," mentioned on the "Book Mart" page of the May issue of "**Kennel and Bench**." Here is a book that can be heartily recommended to all readers of "**Kennel and Bench**" who are sincere breeders out for the betterment of the breed they sponsor. Dan of Avandale," ex a daughter of "Inveresk Commander" (Imp.), which is most promising. Congratulations are also in order to the breeder of this good young dog, Ross G. Elliott, who spared no expense in shipping his bitch "Queen

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Romni" to the best available sires in America. "Detlef" is the offspring from a mating of "Queen Romni" to U.S. "Champion Cito von Mundtsdorf," Sch. H. and P.D., before he was exported to the Orient, and is strong in Uckermark and Riedekenburg bloodlines.

MEDICINE HAT DOG SHOW

By the Judge, A. P. Semple

My visit to the "City of Perpetual Light" was most enjoyable. Medicine Hat is unique, and "the stranger within its gates" is always interested to learn that it is cheaper to allow the gas lights to burn all day, than it is to turn them out and light them again. There were many other "Lights" at the show, as no fewer than four Canadian all-breed Judges were handling dogs, and showing them for all they were worth. There may be depression in some parts of Alberta, but there was none visible at the Arena Rink which was well filled with exhibits and spectators all radiating proofs of good fellowship and good sportsmanship.

To handle a show of this size in one day was no easy task, but the work was made considerably lighter by the efforts of "Bill Armstrong," the efficient Mr. Park and their willing and able assistants. My sincere thanks are tendered to all the officials. It was very pleasant to see many old friends and supporters of the game from other cities and towns—notably Jack Fletcher, and William Forrest, of Calgary, and "Scottie" fame, Walter Riome, Hugh Leslie, V. W. Williams, Sam Jackson, Winnipeg, and Bob Carter, Assiniboia. The old western spirit was in evidence all day and the decisions handed out were received in the best manner. The Arena Rink is an ideal place for a show. The dogs were comfortably benched and the place was tastefully decorated in the National colors. I especially admired the "kiosk" erected to exhibit the wonderful array of silverware and specials.

It has seldom been my pleasure to see better quality throughout, with only a few poor specimens among the twenty-seven varieties present. I cannot mention all the breeds as my space is limited, but in many of them the classes were well filled, especially Collies, Springers, German Shepherds and Wire Fox Terriers. In all these the competition was hot, and many good specimens had to go unrecognized. My

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group winners I found in the following:—

Sporting.—"Merrie Dunbar," a black Cocker Spaniel owned by S. Robertson, of Edmonton. Nice size, wonderful headpiece and expression. Good coat and feathering. Shown to perfection by Jack Fletcher.

Working.—In this group the two outstanding dogs were, "Rose Brae Rising Sun," a blue merle Collie shown by his owner, V. W. Williams, of Lethbridge, and "Detlef of Stockade," a German Shepherd dog who took a stubborn turn and refused to oblige his handler in any way. The Collie, on the contrary, asked for the honour by his showmanship in addition to his other qualities of bone, coat, size and true Collie expression and the verdict could not be denied him.

Terriers.—In this group there was an array of exceptionally fine Terriers. I found my winner in the recently imported Scottish Terrier dog, "Ruglen Rabbie," owned by H. Middlemas, of Regina, and handled by Hughie Leslie (a brither Scot). This dog was outstanding for his length of skull, strong muzzle, well placed ears, heavy bone and good coat. A real cloddy, low to ground, rugged cart horse type of Scottie.

Non-Sporting.—I found it hard to keep my eyes away from "Valentes Aviator," a Boston owned by Joe Valente, of Winnipeg, and shown by the veteran Boston breeder, Sam Jackson, who missed no opportunity of showing the qualities of his charge at every moment.

Toys.—My winner in this group was the Pomeranian, "Cairndhu Courtier," owned by the "Marvel Kennels," of Edmonton. A nice size, plenty of coat, very fine bone with good "Pom" expression. Well shown but needs more lustre to coat.

The five winning dogs were a sight worth seeing; they all showed to perfection in the final stage. The "Scottie," "Ruglen Rabbie," still held my eye, and after careful deliberation I felt that he was the dog of the day, with the Boston, "Valentes Aviator," a close contender for the major honour.

A little prophecy before closing. The reserve winner Boston male, "Reigh Counts Sensation," owned by "Bobbie Carter," of Assiniboia, only needs maturing to trouble the best.

Mr. Williams, Moose Jaw, recently bred his Irish Terrier, to the Mutual

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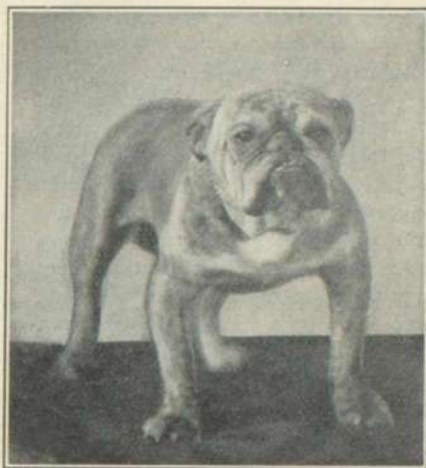

Congratulations, too, are extended to our old friend, "Sandy" Robertson of Edmonton, on the judge's award of best Cocker Spaniel to his beautiful black, "Merrie Durbar," which went to the top with colors flying. I have been given to understand that the best Toy, Harold Bentley's "Jaunty Queen" has, together with her kennel mate, "Jaunty Spark" another dog very much in the limelight in England, been purchased by Mrs. Griswold of St. Louis.

It will be remembered that this lady,

an ardent admirer of these beautiful dogs, also purchased from Mr. Bentley "Ch. Sandhills Gold Puff" shortly after he had gained his Canadian Championship. Could anyone desire any better recommendation? Mrs. Griswold must have been more than satisfied with "Puff" when she comes back again to Canada and to the same breeder for more specimens of this delightful breed. New champions were made at this show, Col. Alexander's beautiful Samoyed bitch, "Galka" repeated previous wins and has now the requisite number of points that entitle her to the coveted prefix of Champion. It will be remembered, too, when I wrote up Harold Bentley's Boston Terrier female, "Cromwell Peppy Girl" that I remarked she would go far. She has now the allotted numbers of points that entitle her to the prefix Champion. I often wonder why beautiful specimens of breeds that are poorly represented at our shows do not go farther than they do. Col. Alexander's Samoyed bitch, "Galka" is a beautiful specimen of the breed and went second open in very hot company at the Westminster Show, New York.

We had also Mr. Hansford's (Rose-town, Sask.), Chow Chow, "Woo Sung" a really typical Chow, who although retaining some of his puppy coat showed remarkably well, and was handled beautifully by C. Carruthers of Saskatoon. We were all delighted to meet Mr. Carruthers, who brought a string of dogs from Saskatchewan. J. J. Howe's Chesapeake, "Howe's Pat" finished his championship under his expert handling. Under his care also were A. R. McLaren's (Rudell, Sask.), Manchester Terrier, "Mancurea Milord," an exceptional specimen. He was bred by L. Schrieber, Alf. Delmont, the judge of last year's Saskatoon Show being the owner of his sire. Mr. Gordon's German Shepherd bitch, "Sassoon Freda," a female that may do better when fully developed, and J. Jackson's English Bulldog, "Moravian Mutineer" (Imp.), an exceptionally nice heavy weight. We hope to see more of Mr. Carruthers at our future shows, not alone for his sportsmanlike qualities but because he is a real fancier.

When we mentioned the dogs that had gained Championship honors at this show, we omitted Geo. Kynoch's Scottish Terrier, "Normandy Airth." And when we were so intent on congratulating Mr. Riome, we entirely omitted to say he also sent down four other dogs which gave a good account of themselves, and which will be seen in the official show records. The largest entry in the show, I believe, will be credited to the Trappist Fathers of St. Norbert, Man., included in which number were nine Great Danes, one

of which has been credited with rescuing a boy from the water.

Comment by Judge A. W. Forbes

English Setters and English Springers were the strongest classes; followed closely by Golden Retrievers. In English Setters, the males were a better lot than the females. The winning dog, "Wellington Boy" is a nice upstanding fellow and very sound. His style and movement is above reproach. He also accounted for Best Sporting in Show and numerous other specials. I also believe this completed his Canadian championship. Some very nice Springers came before me and some of the young ones were very sweet, and I may make special mention of a brace handled by H. Dodds. Golden Retrievers were headed by "Ch. Speedwell Pluto," a very nice sized one and nicely coupled up with good color, good bone and lovely pads and a sound mover, a nice coat.

Cocker Spaniels were a mixed lot. Some good Canadian type and well up on the leg and nice size, while others were of English type and much longer before the eye. While others were very small and short of limb and mostly described by breeders as the American type. Best of Breed going to N. McConnell's "Holdfast Nel Desperandum," a very nice black dog.

Terriers were quite a nice lot with very few poor specimens of any breed being benched. Scotties led the way in numbers. "Gaisgill Great Scot" finished on top, a real Scottie, I am sure he will soon make his championship. He was ably handled by "Billy" Oates.

The winning female, "Merlewood Rose," is of the correct size and of good type, with a good coat, just lacked the fire and go of the male. "Dandie Dinmonts" were a great lot, with 7 entries and all were well boned, with real hindquarters, and well placed sterns. All were correct in mouth, only one mustard, all others were peppers. Wired Haired Fox Terriers were good in quality, the winning dog, "Craven Mixture," is a nicely balanced little fellow with good rear end and well let down hocks. Nice size, lovely mover, good coat and put down and handled well.

PROBABLY the largest kennel of Boston Terrier bitches in Eastern Canada are those of our Saint John Boston Terrier Kennels, who at present maintain fifteen, several of whom are champions, others near champions while three stud dogs help to provide and produce with their kennel mates new show prospects each season. Mrs. B. M. Frost, who is so enthused over this American made breed showed her first Boston, 1922, named "Little Maxine," sired by the Sherbrooke winner, "Little Manxman." "Maxine" still lives the life of ease and affluence in a far away home in Western U.S.A. A lot of "little" ones have come and gone—sold, since then. New stud dogs and bitches too, though most of her bitches are home-bred and consistent winners.

Recently, a new American-bred bitch has come to this Saint John Kennels, named "Lady Castlewood, an August puppy, whose sire is "Hagerty Gambler," and dam, "Sunnycrest Tijuana." A new stud dog too, "Saint John, Introduce Me," who is expected to do his bit for "home and beauty" that is, if good looks, size, color, markings and type mean anything. This charming fellow, a junior dog of their own breed-

ing and boasts for his sire, the Canadian and American "Ch. Rockaby Dempsey," so much like him too! "Introduce Me's" dam is Mrs. Frost's own bred "Parrtown Winookie," a successful matron and dam of "Saint John Coupette," winners bitch at two shows last Fall.

Such a well-bred dam cannot but produce something good in each litter, as "Winookie" is by the popular sire, "Ch. Kirkpatrick's Sunny Jim," her dam the attractive show bitch, "Ch. Lady Winchester."

Boston puppies from these kennels have made many friends for the breed this year with the prospect of more to follow.

After an indifferent following the last few years Airedales in New Brunswick seem to be taking on a new lease of life. Edward Bates, a most capable young contractor and builder of Saint John, has purchased a "Rockley" puppy from that loyal and staunch friend of the breed, Sid. Perkins, Toronto. This year old puppy is by "Ch. Rockley Brigand," while the dam is a daughter of the good "Ch. Warbeck Mixer." Such useful breeding and new blood will, we hope, give a fillip to Airedale owners here. It is to such breeders as Wm. Kiervan, C. A. Christie and James Merryfield we look for a revival of this most useful of the sporting terriers.

The first Japanese Spaniels shown East of Quebec were those owned by Mrs. F. M. Gilman, Montreal, who exhibited two at each Fredericton Kennel Club Show, 1921, and 1923, under R. A. Ross and W. H. Reeves. Her first one, "Tama," was a very smart typical black and white which under ordinary circumstances or less keen competition would have been Best Toy but he ran third toy variety with "Ch. Stormlight of Dara," and "Ch. Ting Fang of Merrydale." A Pom and Peke that afterward went Best in Show at various times. Mrs. Gilman's second Jap whose name I don't recall was an attractive marked Toy but failed in face, not quite sound.

The prospect of having this fascinating breed in our midst is realized with Cedarcrest Kennels, Kentville, who have imported a very nice bitch, "Keuwanna Yuki," from Miss Georgianna Cuthbert and bred to her American "Ch. Odano of Keuwanna." This is good foundation stock of the best German importation and American breeding. Another, a "King Charles" dog, "Amo's Bundy," has already been mated to "Celamo Armada." "Bundy" is out of the imported sire, "Goblin Cherry Blossom," and by "General G." This pair so excellently bred means a colorful variety of Toy breeds for summer sales.
