SIXTY THOUSAND PEOPLE

Can you imagine 60,000 interested people attending an attraction featuring a few men, a few dogs and a few sheep? Well, the International Sheep-dog Trials held at Hyde Park on July 2nd, has sufficient of appeal to make such an audience possible.

The first event, the National Championship Course, there were 5 entries from England, 3 from Scotland and 3 from Wales. The winner was J. M. Wilson with his bitch, "Nell."

The "Doubles" brought 2 entries from Scotland, 1 each from England and Wales, and this event was won by L. J. Humphries, Wales, with his dogs, "Toss" and "Lad."

It was just such owners and dogs that our Canadian people had anticipated meeting in their cities from coast to coast in Canada this coming Fall. Unfortunately, and because of business conditions the proposed visit has been reluctantly cancelled as far as this year is concerned.

We believe that our President, Lt.-Col. G. F. McFarland, and our Saskatchewan Director, Dr. J. T. Cooper, were very much interested in the Sheep Trials for Canada, and no doubt both men will be ready to co-operate with any scheme which will mean the actual coming of the dogs and their masters sometime in the future.

Meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Incorporated

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club Inc. was held at the Club's Offices, 25 Melinda Street, Toronto, on Thursday evening, July 21st, 1932, at 8 o'clock.

First Vice-President, Col. J. N. MacRae, presided. Directors attending included Capt. H. Dudley Waters, John W. Bruce, Peter Herd and W. H. Reeves.

The Secretary reported that the President was out of town. That Major Ward Wright was leaving for New York and that Wm. R. Aitken was under the weather at Montreal.

The Minutes of the previous Directors' Meeting were read, and it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:—

"That the Minutes be adopted as read."

W. H. Reeves reported that the Committee on Rules had met in the afternoon, and had been able to cover considerable ground.

The Secretary reported that Wm. Sweetman had furnished Wm. Wason with necessary documents of registration and that W. W. Brown had furnished similar documents to Mrs. Leupold, and that he had nothing to report on the Gammond-Booker-Edgeler matter, and that the matter of receiving essential documents with dogs imported from England was receiving satisfactory attention.

Wilfred Heighington, of Symons, Heighington and Shaver, Barristers, Toronto, was present to make representations on behalf of James Lane, Toronto, who had protested the decision in Boston Terrier dogs at the National Kennel Club Show held last November. Mr. Heighington showed that he was perfectly familiar with all the circumstances that had entered into the matter, and requested a reconsideration on behalf of his client, Mr. Lane, who also was present, together with A. Loveridge, Mr. Lane's handler. After the case had been discussed from every angle, Mr. Heighington thanked the Directors for their courtesy and retired with his client and Mr. Loveridge.

From the viewpoint that the intention of the Dog Show Rules was to acknowledge that the judge was best qualified to say who were the best dogs, it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:—

"That the former decision of the Board be re-affirmed."

A complaint was received from Fort Garry Kennel Club, together with correspondence in support.

It was regularly moved, seconded and carried:—

"That, having received the complaint of the Fort Garry Kennel Club, and Mr. Kynoch's reply thereto, it was requested now that Fort Garry Kennel Club be asked to lay a definite charge supported by sworn affidavits and that Mr. Kynoch be asked to offer his defense in a similar manner."

Letters from John Milner, Ottawa, and R. Scott Wilson, Toronto, were read, and the Secretary was instructed to refer them to Major Ward Wright for consideration.

A letter from the Live Stock Records office re the Ferguson-Croy complaint was read and ordered laid on the table.

Wm. H. Pym, Chairman of the British Columbia Provincial Committee, submitted a report on the Corkett-Butterworth complaint, and it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:—

"That the report be received and that no further action be taken on the matter."

The Secretary advised that he had not heard from James Cassina, and it was agreed to lay the matter on the table.

The Canadian Fancy

By WALTER H. REEVES
Belleville, Ontario

THE following paragraph written by a Canadian correspondent appears in an American magazine, "There are less shows in Ontario this year than before the war. If the present conditions continue there will be but two shows, the Canadian National and the Royal Winter Fair." A statement like the above, if allowed to pass unchallenged, might lead our friends across the border to imagine that the depression in trade was going to kill all interest in breeding and showing dogs, which is not the case.

The shows held in Ontario for the period of 10 years prior to the war were: as follows:—1905—3; 1906—4; 1907—3; 1908—5; 1909—6; 1910—5; 1912—6; 1913—6; 1914—14; 1915—8. Shows held in Ontario for a similar period prior to 1932: 1923—9; 1924—16; 1925—16; 1926—14; 1927—16; 1928—17; 1929—18; 1930—20; 1931—17. And so far in 1932 licenses have been granted for 12 shows to be held in Ontario.

In fact, I never remember such a heavy mail as this month, and as far as I can see Ontario shows for 1932 will show little, if any, falling off from previous years. The August circuit starts off with the Central Canada Exhibition at Ottawa on August 23rd 24th and 25th. With so capable and acknowledged an authority as George Kynoch acting as Judge and a particularly liberal schedule, I share the opinion of the Ottawa fanciers, that the show will be a record as far as entries and quality are concerned. The popular George goes on from Ottawa to judge the 24th annual show of the New Brunswick Kennel Club, which show will be held at St. John on September 5th, 6th and 7th, and Mr. Kynoch will judge all breeds except Scottish, Sealyham, Cairn and White West Highland Terriers, which will be judged by Caswell Barrie of Scarsdale, N.Y. It is certainly a pity that St. John clashes with the great Canadian National Exhibition, where no less than three hundred and thirty-eight classes are to be given. Walter Lee, the energetic secretary of the Welland and District Kennel Club, has arranged for his Society's Show to be held on September 28th and 29th. One of the keenest bodies of fanciers to be found in any part of the world are the Saskatoon fanciers, notwithstanding the fact that the west really have had their financial troubles with butter selling at six cents a pound and eggs at four cents a dozen. A friend, who owns a very large ranch in the west, was visiting me a few days ago,

and he remarked that he had heard more of the depression since he had been East for a week than he had heard in a twelve month out West. This will be the second show held in Saskatoon this year. Calgary and Edmonton are also right in the wheat growing district and no lack of interest was shown at their shows held in July. Coming back to Ontario, the Western Fair, London, Ontario, are holding two shows in September, the London Canine on Sept. 13th and the Western Fair the two following days. Interest in shows and dog breeding is increasing and the reason for this is that dogs are, without exception, the only kind of live stock that has increased in value since the war. Our wonderful roads have been the means of our friends across the border visiting Canada far more frequently and they are beginning to echo the sentiments expressed by a very prominent American (who this year, instead of going to England, spent his vacation motoring through Canada visiting and inspecting some of our prominent fanciers). Why! he said, I am surprised at the quality of the dogs you are breeding and I have never enjoyed a holiday so much. For years and years dog breeding in England has ceased to be a hobby, and has become a very paying industry, and the financial troubles on the American Continent have really worked out to the advantage of the Canadian breeder, for he has a ready made market and a profitable one at his back door. One thing, and a very important one, of which the Canadian has yet to be convinced, is the value of publicity. When they really do realize its value the dollars will flow across the border and not across the ocean as they have been doing for the last thirty years.

I brought out some of these facts when approaching the Mayor of Belleville and Aldermen when someone objected to a new Kennel being erected by the successful Springer breeder, C. Tilbrook. He acquired from the city an excellent site for a house and kennels, and when they were half erected received notice from the council, that he would have to obtain permission from the Council before he could continue as the proposed site was in a restricted area. I appeared before the council and pointed out that the breeding and kenneling of dogs was today carried out scientifically and it was be-

coming an industry that should be encouraged rather than discouraged, and am glad to say that the Belleville Councillors evidently were convinced that the Tilbrook Kennel, instead of being a public nuisance, would prove an acquisition to our beautiful city.

I am indeed glad to hear of the successful efforts of Mrs. Mercedes Gibson of Woodstock, Ontario, in bringing that grand variety, the Newfoundland, before the general public. The Newfoundland, like other large varieties, such as the old English Mastiff and the St. Bernard used to be very popular, at our English Shows. I have often judged them when the entry numbered fifty and over. Mrs. Gibson bred her first litter in Canada a year ago, and I gather from her letter that she may have been interested in the breed in England, for my correspondent writes that she is a friend of the Rev. J. Skinner, the well known English Smooth Fox Terrier breeder, whose strain of "Borlase" are world famous. I hear also, that Mrs. Gibson's house was at that delightful river resort, Nearlow, one of the most picturesque stretches of country that the River Thames runs through. The first litter of Newfoundlands bred at Woodstock numbered thirteen, six males and three females being raised—one of the latter "Princess Bess" was acquired by E. Emmett of Islington, and she certainly proved a credit to her breeder and to her sire "Ch. Baron" and to her equally well bred dam. The letter also contained a snapshot of "Perivale Duke" and "Perivale Pierre," the latter won best of breed at Hamilton, and "Duke" gained similar honors at London, at which shows they were very much admired. Mrs. Gibson also has a litter sister to "Pierre" and "Duke," a very typical specimen weighing over a hundred pounds. At the present time there must be quite a gathering of Landseer's favorite breed at Woodstock, for I hear that a litter containing no less than sixteen were born in March. Mrs. Gibson concludes her letter with the following. "I hope to see sometimes a mention of Newfoundlands in the Canadian Fancy."

The writer of the Canadian Fancy has repeatedly in these pages asked fanciers to send news of interest, it is difficult to make bricks without straw, and the writer of these pages finds it just as difficult to help along a breed by giving it publicity without something to write around. Newfoundlands are undoubtedly on the verge of staging a comeback, for a few weeks ago

at the Ladies of Mass. Show, the writer had some really interesting classes to judge.

A recent visitor to Belleville was the well known Irish Setter breeder, Dr. G. C. Brink, and in the course of our doggy talk I heard glowing accounts of a young bitch sold to a recruit to the breed living at London, Ont. This recruit happened to be a son-in-law of Dr. Wallbridge, a fellow townsman, and a few days after Dr. Brink's visit, J. Jefferies happened to be visiting his father-in-law and brought the puppy along. It is many and many a day since I have seen such a beautiful puppy, in fact she reminded me of the famous O'Boyne's, whose name slips my memory, that I saw when visiting the great Irish breeder J. Carberry, at Drogheda, Ireland, some years before the war. The puppy has only to live to make history and further fame to her breeder and to her sire "Red Pat of Brimore" and her dam "Colleen of Brimore." I understand that Dr. Brink has still some of the litter and it would be well worthwhile for anyone interested in one of the most attractive of our sporting varieties, to pay this breeder a visit.

Miss O'Brien sends quite a budget of Sealyham news from Halifax, N.S. This well known breeder and exhibitor is full of anticipation over a litter that is expected daily by "St. Margarets Serial" ex "Sheltonfield Sample." "Kitty of Rensal" is being bred to "Serial." Miss O'Brien writes of the latter, "I expect you have seen 'Kitty' for she was shown a good deal in Canada before Mrs. Alger of Detroit bought her. Mrs. Alger gave her to me last year when I was in New York." Yes, I remember "Kitty" very well, a real nice Sealy perhaps a shade big for present fashions, but a bitch which should prove a great producer. The latest acquisition to the Halifax Kennel, "St. Margarets Sequin," is coming along nicely. Miss O'Brien has been spending considerable time with a nephew, who is visiting her from England, and therefore the Sealy's have been a little neglected, but I expect when they are shown under Bob Ross at Halifax Show, they will carry both bloom and condition. The Halifax Sealyhams always appear in the ring and few, if any, Terriers are put down in better condition than Miss O'Brien's. It is hard to understand why this attractive breed does not gain further recruits than it has so far in Canada, they make ideal companions and the puppies command good prices.

GERMAN SHEPHERD DOG CLUB OF CANADA SPECIALTY SHOW

Report by Judge Dr. J. W. Sherer,
West Orange, N.J.

The setting for the 6th Annual Specialty Show of the Shepherd Dog Club of Canada was an ideal one, thanks to the courtesy of the Ontario Jockey Club. The weather, which was threatening toward the end of the Show, did not mar any part of the outdoor showing on the spacious greensward of Woodbine Park.

After judging the entries, it was my pleasure to witness an excellent performance of obedience work by a class of ten dogs and bitches which certainly was illuminating from the standpoint that our Canadian neighbors still regard our beloved breed as being working dogs primarily. My old friend, "Champion Hettel von Bodman" and his progeny running true to form, walked off with the lion's share of the awards. It was a rare treat to see his seven month old daughter, "Northmere Dawn of Fortune," go through her obedience exercises as snappy and sure as a veteran. The influence of "Hettel" on the breed in Canada is of a very real benefit.

The number of entries, even for a Specialty Show these times do not exactly crowd the judge out of the ring, but gives one, however, more time for reflection on the animals present. If I am to judge only by the material passed on at this show, it must in truth be said that the quality was rather disappointing. I like to believe that there are many good dogs in your part of Canada that were not shown. The dogs were better than the bitches. Canadian breeders would do well to give more attention to the old adage, "The Mothers Are the Builders of a Race!" If you would breed a Shepherd dog worthy of the name, start with a low-stationed, well knit bitch with a deep body of long underchest that gives a loin out of which something can be born and **who has a good temperament**. Don't insist on a black eye—she should possess a sound mouth and a strong under jaw. Don't be disturbed if she carries her tail a bit gay at times if she has just ahead of that tail a well placed croup that will give a powerful thrust under her body to her hindquarters. Remember all animals of speed and endurance depend on the correct makeup of that section for propulsion. I noticed a great percentage of animals travelling too low in front due either to looseness in shoulder, lack of forechest or badly placed shoulder blades. A prominent prosternum, high long withers and firm ligamentary attachment of musculature is absolutely essential for that free easy, **gliding** not

high stepping stride of a real Shepherd gait. How I looked in vain for a few such!

Puppy Dogs — 1, W. A. Warwick's Falco von Etzdorf. Ch. Hettel von Bodman — Elsa Hegerslust. Ten month old, well balanced, smooth youngster of lovely temperament and alert expression; 2, J. B. White's Northmere's Dark Fortune. Hettel von Bodman—Blague of Fortunate Fields. Like the first, a black son of Hettel. Not as good in proportion, goes low in front; 3, D. A. Graham's Fritz von Etzdorf. Black and tan litter brother to the first. Overbuilt, too long in loin, good hindquarters but loose in front. All three good temperaments.

Reserve award to A. B. Calow's Derich von Stephanitz. General Nuisance of Roadside—Ch. Alla von Bergholtz. Best angulation in class, long stride, long and soft back, poor temperament. This was a clear example of wrong selection of sire. My notes on his sire read: Loose weak backed dog of timid, shrinking disposition and that at seven years of age. Such a dog should not be used for breeding.

Novice Dogs — 1, W. A. Warwick's Falco von Etzdorf; 2, J. B. White's Northmere's Dark Fortune; 3, M. J. Morgan's Carlo of Morgandale—Pleasing young dog, better angulation in rear than in front, weak foreface.

Reserve award to D. A. Graham's Fritz von Etzdorf.

Canadian-bred Dogs—1, W. A. Warwick's Falco von Etzdorf; 2, B. J. White's Northmere's Dark Fortune; 3, M. J. Morgan's Carlo of Morgandale.

Canadian Bitches — 1, Mrs. H. G. Slean's Lady of Dawn. Grey Dawn of Kaslo—Rosemary of Kaslo. Substantial, long bitch of very good angulation, especially nice front, excellent size and a free mover. She must tighten up a bit still and become steadier in her behavior; 2, Dr. H. H. Hodgson's Mathilda von Rhein. Ch. Hettel v. Bodman—Peggy von Mathildenhof. A young bitch of promise, excellent temperament, still lacking forechest, great hindquarter but rather hunched up over croup, making her travel rather low in front. A wonderful worker; 3, D. A. Graham's Elsa Hegerslust. Ch. Iso v. Doernerhof—Asta von Langeloh. A feminine, well-knit, worthy Iso v. Doernerhof daughter seven years old, a lovely type and temperament. I am told she has produced 72 puppies which you could scarcely credit. But for being a bit soft in the back, she is very trim and youthful.

Reserve award to Alex. L. Gooderham's Blue Magic of Northmere. Ch. Hettel v. Bodman—Ch. Pia vom Haus Schutting. A young bitch of very good temperament, rangey with rather shelly body, well angulated hindquarter. Four pre-molars missing. A great working youngster.

Limit Bitches — 1, D. A. Graham's Elsa Hegerslust; 2, R. Thornton's Ismallia's Lora. Merrieboy of Dingerlein—Lucille de Bethune. Insufficient angulation and gait, lacks pigment; 3, R. Perry's Betty v.d. Rottwiese. Erich v. Gendarmeriekorps—Della v.d. Leuchtertanne. Also fading color, stilty gait.

Reserve award to A. C. Corry's Beta von Prinzenhof. Balder von Velp — Elsa Hegerslust. Lacks depth and angulation, no gait.

Open Bitches—1, Mrs. H. G. Slean's Lady of Dawn; 2, Nebrie Kennels' Sioux's Lassa von Walnutwald. Flock von Bern—Iowa Belle. Light colored bitch of very good angulation, very good mover but travels close front and rear. Shown too soon after maternal duties when even bone looks shrunken and coat all gone.

Winners Bitches—Mrs. H. G. Slean's Lady of Dawn.

Reserve Winners — D. A. Graham's Elsa Hegerslust.

Due to an oversight Dr. H. H. Hodgson's Mathilda von Rhein did not compete for Reserve Winner, which award she should have had, had she put in an appearance.

Alex. L. Gooderham's Ch. Hettel von Bodman, Ch. Donar von Overstolzen—Asta von Bodman. Still the same grand personality. Were he but a shade more masculine in structure and more outreaching in gait; Mrs. A. Wells' Ch. Arko von Prinzenhof. Zeres des Renardieres—Elsa Hergerslust. Rugged dog of great bone, somewhat loose and a bit soft in back; Mrs. E. C. White-law's Ch. Norbert von Borsdorf. Ch. Hettel von Bodman—Keathe von Borsdorf. Bad mental makeup, tail pincher. Should not be used for breeding; E. L. Sanderfer's Ch. Erich von Bern. Ch. Erich von Grafenwerth—Helga von Duesternbrock. A dog I have always wanted to see. Nearly ten years old, the old gentleman now finds the going a little strenuous in the procession. Quite loose in front and falls on the forehead, a beautiful size and great masculinity. When I looked into his eyes I felt I stood once more in the presence of the "Noblest Roman of them all," his illustrious sire, Int. Grand Champion Hamilton Erich von Grafenwerth. Where is the progeny from this dog? Why was a dog of this calibre not used intelligently to help build up his breed before it was too late for him to do good? I was sorely tempted to award him best in show but youth with its power and drive will be served! The award, therefore, went to Arry of Dellpark.

I wish to once again thank the members of the German Shepherd Dog Club of Canada for their very kind invitation to their midst and for the hospitable week-end accorded me. I anticipate keenly visiting their wonderful country again in the future.

CULLING TO ADVANTAGE OR— THE GOOD RESOLUTIONS

What is the next step in our breed in America; in other words, "Where do we go from here?" I need not recount to you the meteoric rise in popularity the Shepherd had around the period of the Armistice, how this popularity was capitalized by persons labeling themselves, "Importers and Breeders," many with good intentions, but others also who only saw the profits to be gathered in from rank barter, seeing in our splendid dog merely a commodity much in demand in exchange for dollars. Every Shepherd bitch was bred every time she came in season, every pup born was kept on the bitch whether she whelped five or ten and nearly every pup was "spoken for" before he was born. In short it meant—money.

Our breed led all others at shows in number of entries in the space of a few years. There was great enthusiasm. Fabulous prices were paid for imported dogs, in some cases to be sure, the quality of said imported animals was out of all proportion to the price paid which, in the long run, made no staunch friends for the breed. Unheard of

offers were made for famous animals and refused, and "a good time was had by all."

The reaction was bound to come. The old saw "That which goes up must come down," held true. All things subjected to boom methods pass through a similar history. What has happened in the Shepherd breed over the past few years, every thinking person in touch with the breed can reason out for themselves. There are many things I might mention that have not helped our breed that had better go unsaid, but this I cannot leave unsaid: **We have all sinned against the breed.**

When the popularity of the Shepherd sobered down to a condition where his admirers began to feel that the sterling character and beauty inherent in the breed was sufficient in itself, a healthier condition was bound to make itself felt. Many of the professional shepherd dog dealers as well as those kennels that took up the shepherd because he was the fashion have turned to other fields for their operations.

It is now the era for the serious breeder who loves the dog, has the welfare of the breed at heart and is going to stick with it for its perpetuation and improvement. It is these men and women that I hope to set thinking on the future of the shepherd. The time has arrived when our shepherd can again go forward only because of his intrinsic worth, impressive character and beauty. This cannot be brought about, however, unless every serious breeder will commit himself to stringent principles of breeding.

The time is here when breeders of other breeds must control their output and adhere to sound principles of breeding if they are to survive. If it is true that we have no longer to fear distemper since the new English distemper prophylactic has become available and Nature does not step in with a new scourge of some kind to keep a balance, a very serious situation may develop within a comparatively few years if every dog immunized against distemper remains alive his normal span of years.

If we look back in the history of civilized peoples it has almost always happened that, when any situation got out of hand so that the welfare of a people or community were threatened, when anything became a nuisance or detriment, laws were enacted which had for their purpose the remedying or abolishing of said threatening conditions or nuisances. We all know of such instances of legislation. It may be wise legislation or it may be most pernicious and unjust. Therefore, I most earnestly ask all fanciers and

breeders to give some thought at once to ways and means of controlling our breed before legislation steps in and attempts to tell us what we may or may not do. Sounds like fantasy? Perhaps. However, don't dismiss this thought entirely from your mind!

I wish to go on record on what to me is the most serious situation in our breed at the present moment and that is: **That a concerted effort must be made on the part of the entire Shepherd Breeding Fancy in America for rational restriction and control of its breeding operations.** Under such control I mean as much important the reduction of size of the litter the bitch whelps. This procedure, when one has really practiced it, cannot fail to convince any real breeder that nothing but good can result from it. The heroic culling of large litters can turn your breeding operation from one of drudgery, worry and ultimate disappointment into joyous, interesting, thoroughly satisfying and inspiring recreation.

You say at once: "You may destroy the best pup in the litter." Well, I will tell you that your "best pup" kept in your crowd of nine or ten is not likely to become the dog that any one of the four or five that remains in the nest of a carefully culled litter will. Culling can begin the first day, but the observant breeder, studying the litter daily, will see things that will determine their elimination from the nest. Culling should, however, not stop here. Every pup should be studied up to maturity and any that show shyness, viciousness, bad doers, those showing neurotic tendencies, in fact all that fall outside of the picture of the normal, healthy alert young Shepherd dog should be humanely and expeditiously destroyed.

We all have had to listen to the query: "How is it that Germany can sell its Siegers and Siegerins every year and still send dogs over here that can defeat the best of our American breds?" I acknowledge that the above is very close to the truth. The answer is no mystery to me and should not be to you. The average breeder in Germany for economic reasons does not have more than one brood bitch. He does not have a kennel housing a score of pups; instead, he concentrates his energy on perhaps a single pup, makes him a part of his family, rears him properly and develops his character. In other words, he makes him an individual, who, when he has reached maturity constitutes a real Shepherd dog. Self-reliance, alertness, ruggedness, understanding due to human companionship, the wit and will to serve his master are written in every line.

Is it any wonder then when such a dog comes under the judicial eye in the ring that whatever he has of structure and beauty of line is brought out in full flower by that elusive quality called Shepherd dog character?

The second factor in the control of our breed does not loom so large if we carry out the first, intelligent culling. This has to do with animals that for one reason or another have nothing to contribute to the breed. As an example, the bitch that shows gross faults of structure and transmits these faults to her get in spite of proper compensation through the stud siring her litter, should not be kept in the breed. If she has good character she may be useful in some capacity, but if she leaves your hands, even if you retain her pedigree and registration certificate, there is grave danger that her new owner may mate her to his neighbor's "police dog" or she may make a misalliance. Think of your breed and destroy her!

Also those extra bitch puppies that you kept in your litter. They are now perhaps five months old, they promise nothing for the breed, you are feeding them and they clutter up your place. You look around to place them in a "nice home." In fact, you are tickled when you have found a haven for them. Well—more often than otherwise you will make the pleasant discovery that your bitch puppy, during her first season of course, while tied to the clothes pole in the rear of her new home, had an adventure, the result of which is just one more thing that does not help the breed. We, at Shereston, have had just these grievous experiences cited above. So if you haven't it in your heart to destroy surplus bitch pups that are intended only for pets, by all means have them spayed. There are other evils in our breed that must be corrected that time does not permit to discuss.

The time has come when we can no longer side-step the obligations that are ours if we would call ourselves breeders. Some group must be far-sighted enough to make a start. Such a group of breeders should pledge themselves to abide by a definite set of principles, which may be called for want of a better term "The Shepherd Dog Breeders' Code." It may read somewhat as follows:

1. I will breed only from mature, healthy, robust animals.
2. I will breed no bitch earlier than her third season.
3. I will leave no more than four whelps with a bitch having her first litter and never more than six at any subsequent whelping.
4. I will destroy or have destroyed,

humanely and quickly, all whelps that appear to be weaklings, those showing deformities, white or extremely light ones, and those born with heavy double dew claws.

5. I will practice rigid culling at all times.

6. I will breed and keep only the minimum number of shepherds that my circumstances and facilities permit in order to give each animal the maximum amount of personal contact and intelligent rearing.

7. I will not sell or give away a shy, vicious or mentally degenerate shepherd, but will have all such humanely destroyed.

8. I will not breed any shepherd, male or bitch, that falls outside of the picture of the true shepherd as defined by the Standard.

9. I will work with my dogs at every opportunity in order to develop the true shepherd dog character.

10. I will at all times keep my dogs under control so they may not be a nuisance to my neighbor nor a possible danger to the community.

11. I will encourage my fellow breeder not only by successful breeding experiences, but more by the failures I have had in order that he may avoid the pitfalls.

12. I will at all times defend my breed by meeting misrepresentations with facts and will make every effort to safeguard its good name.

In such a group of breeders it should not be difficult to select from their midst a person or committee qualified to act in the capacity of "Zuchtwart" (overseer), to whom such members of this group could turn for assistance and advice in carrying out these articles. It is my humble opinion that dogs bred by observing some such code would mark the beginning of a new era. The thinking public would not be long in discovering that, in acquiring an animal from a breeder subscribing to such principles, they had made a real investment, that their dog bears the hallmark of character.

What is the ideal shepherd of the future to be like? Our efforts in the future must tend toward the consolidation and fixing of the desirable points and qualities of the great animals that have gone before rather than to be aimed at any change. I would capture in my ideal shepherd the upstanding masculinity and fire of an "Erich von Grafenwerth." I would capture in my ideal shepherd the almighty stride of that paragon of angulation "Cito Bergerslust." I would capture in my ideal shepherd that elegance and fleetness of foot of a "Geri von Oberk-lamm." I would capture in my ideal shepherd the nerves of an "Alf von Hoekendyk" and the will and heart to work of an "Alto von Spenglerhaus."

I would then endow my ideal shepherd with the character of "Hector Linksrhein," called "Horand von Grafath." Von Stephanitz described him as a very good medium size with powerful bones, beautiful lines and nobly-formed head; clean and sinewy in build, the entire dog was one live wire. His character corresponded to his exterior qualities, marvelous in his obedient fidelity to his master, and above all else, the straightforward nature of a gentleman with a boundless and irrepressible zest for living. Although untrained in his puppyhood, he was obedient to the slightest nod when at his master's side; but when left to himself, the maddest rascal, the wildest ruffian and an incorrigible provoker of strife. Never idle, always on the go, well disposed to harmless people, but no cringer, mad about children and—always in love!

To breed one approaching this ideal is no inglorious task and worthy of any man's steel. There is much work ahead. This, ladies and gentlemen, I believe is the next step in breeding shepherds in America. It must be taken by the American breeder! Will he take it?

The President of the Club, Lt.-Col. D. Ritchie, M.C., showed his administrative ability and power and everything went off with a swing.

Great praise is due the Secretary, Carl Cummer in whom the Club has an ideal worker who seems never to tire of his duties and always willing to oblige.

My duties were rendered light by the splendid work of the Show Superintendent, Jack Fletcher, who seemed to be here, there, and everywhere.

The Ring Stewards, Phil Heather, Bob Robson, P. M. Render, and Calder Duncan rendered useful service in bringing the dogs forward.

Many outside fanciers were in attendance. Arthur Wright, J. G. Young, "Sandy" Robertson, G. Kirkwood, D. G. Latta, S. W. Foster, H. Husband, and the evergreen Joe Caswell of Edmonton, H. Bulldogs—Silverdale Hush and Sensible Lady were easy winners of their respective classes.

Chow Chow—H. M. H. Prince Woosung: Not in best of coat, otherwise a nice Chow. Ch. Ching Sun Tee, an outstanding dog owned by Marjorie Earnshaw, accounted for the special in this class and afterwards won special for best belonging to a member of the Club.

Airedales—A. O. Bean's Goldendale Tornado: Nice body properties, good in front, long head; might be better in eye. In bitches, Springlake Peggy, good head and best of coat.

Fox Terriers (Smooth)—Calgaree Real Spice: Body, legs and feet good. Showed well, but on the big side. Calgaree Chosen Damsel: Lovely headed one, on the day shelly in body.

Fox Terriers (Rough)—Mayart Sharpshooter: Nice in size, with good head and front, hard coat. Bitches: Farncliffe Ruby: Good type, best in head and front.

Scottish Terriers—Gaisgill Great Scot: All a Scottie, with long head, good in front and built low to ground. On the big side. The winning bitch Tayette, gave a hard run for best Scottie, correct size, good in body, straight front and well set on tail. Head might be a little longer. In the best of bloom.

Collies—Geo. Kynoch's Elmhill Jupiter: A nice upstanding dog, good head and ears and in good coat. A trifle shy. In bitches, Scotia Stylist, of good type and character.

The Moose Jaw Kiwanis Club, in common with the Kiwanis spirit everywhere, is always looking for an opportunity to stimulate and develop any good cause, and to pyramid the outcome for the general welfare of their communities.

On July 1st, the Moose Jaw Kiwanis Club asked "Jimmie" Booth, of Moose Jaw to stage a few races midway in a double-header baseball attraction, and the popular "Jimmie" logically accepted the invitation and made the necessary preparations. The attraction was a novel one, and the crowds in the grandstand vociferously acclaimed the winning "longtails" at the end of each well matched race.

With Mr. Booth, Harry Smith, of Moose Jaw, furnished the dogs for the feature attraction and whilst the Booth dogs won the laurels, the Whippets from the Smith Kennels, were far from outclassed, and it is anticipated that a feature card will be presented at the Exhibition grounds in the near future to meet a clamorous and popular demand, so great was the impression made on the crowd present on this occasion.

Of course, the mechanical hare which is the invention of Mr. Booth, proved itself to be a dependable device, and there were no delays between the races. Two races of 200 yards were completed in 12 3/5 seconds; the last race of 200 yards was a shade better and the time 12 2/5 seconds. A race against time was won by "Wild Night Again," when the "clockers" watch found the time to be 12 3/10 seconds. Not much time wasted in these races, but Kiwanians are not functioning in their respective localities in the capacity of time wasters, so the Whippet speed fitted in splendidly with Kiwanis requirements.

For several years the Hartford Kiwanis Club sponsored dog shows for the purpose of raising the funds required for community service, and there can be no good reason why Kiwanis Clubs in Canada should not consider the further sponsoring of this sport with a view to raising funds for service purposes in their several communities. As it is well-known that dog shows properly managed can be operated quite profitably; and as Moose Jaw Kiwanis Club has always been in sympathy with Moose Jaw Kennel Club possibly a dog show sponsored by Kiwanians, and managed by dog fanciers would prove itself to be a profitable venture for both organizations.

At this show, prize money is offered in the classes, regardless of the number of dogs competing. Canadian judges of prominence will officiate at both events.

The dog show building at the Western Fair Grounds has been re-modelled and will present a snow white appearance for the coming shows. Adequate exercising space has been provided and the judging ring will be larger and more suitably arranged.

While other exhibitions have fallen down in the number of outside attendance, the Western Fair at London has kept up its gate record. London has always been a good selling show, and exhibitors with stock to sell are well advised to attend London shows. Its nearness to the American border assures plenty of visitors from American cities, and buyers with money in their pocket will be there.

A special effort is being made to have both shows earn a total of four championship points. W. D. Jackson is secretary for both shows and prize lists and entry blanks can be had upon application. His address is in care of the Western Fair, London.

PLENTY OF SALES

Sid Perkins of the "Rockley" Airedale Kennels, Toronto, enthusiastically advised us the other day, that no less than nine litters of Airedales had been born at the "Rockley" Kennels within the last couple of months, and in point of numbers for the litters born, the smallest litter was one of seven puppies—two litters of seven each; 3 litters of eight each; one litter of nine, and one litter of twelve, and this last litter was born to a bitch who was furnishing her first contribution to the Kennel.

James W. Bain, K.C., Dies Suddenly

TAKING our seat in the street car on Monday morning, July 18th, "The Mail and Empire" was the usual attraction. On coming to page four we were shocked to find the sad news of Mr. Bain's death, and at once our minds went trailing down the years when "Jimmie" Bain had been active in the affairs of dogdom at its most troublous times in Canada.

We are obliged to go back to the year 1905 to find the date of our good friend's coming to the Canadian Kennel Club as a member. Airedales were coming with a fast clip to the forefront in Canadian dogdom. Such well known names as "Pete" Bawden, Ridgetown, Ont.; R. W. Kenney, Winnipeg, Man.; A. C. Houghton, Winnipeg, Man.; "Tom" Wyndham, Vancouver, B.C.; "Joe" Laurin, Montreal, P.Q.; "Pete" Ross, Winnipeg, Man.; "Nat" McConnell, Vancouver, B.C.; Albert Greenwood, Vancouver, B.C.; Frank Wood, Toronto, Ont.; Jas. D. Reid, Elgin, Man.; Bert Swann, Humber Bay, Ont., and Joe and Sid Perkins, Toronto, and etc., were all enthusiastic for the Airedale, and Mr. Bain found his place right there, and became quite as enthusiastic as the best of them, probably a trifle more so. Together with A. Greenwood, Mr. Bain bought the Airedale bitch "Culmington Nettle" from Joseph Worton, England, in 1906. This bitch was the sensation of her time, and was by "Crompton Performer," a son of "Crompton Oorang," a son of "Crompton Marvel." For dam she had "Bush Lass," a daughter of "Colne Master Royal," a son of "Clonmel Chilperic." "Culmington Nettle" was shown from Montreal to Winnipeg and was never defeated by any Airedale of her own sex for winners, and made her championship early and easily. Her best win was probably the Canadian National Exhibition of 1914.

Other Airedales in the lime-light of 20 years ago were "Cheltenham Peter," "Kil-arney Queen," "Swale Lady," "Clonmel Flockmaster," "Bradford Nell," and "Busy Body Vie," a bitch bred by Mr. Bain and sold to Mr. Broughall, Winnipeg. She was sired by "Colne Freeman Terror," and was out of the great "Culmington Nettle."

A further importation from England was "Clonmel Master Crack." This dog

was born on January 28th, 1911, bred by Smith Bros. Sire—"Primrose Rebound," a son of "Primrose Royalist," a son of "Midland Royal." Dam—"Marsden Gipsy," a daughter of "Rockley Oorang." One well qualified to express an opinion is of the belief that it was a great error of judgment not to have bred "Culmington Nettle" to "Clonmel Master Crack," who was a Primrose-Midland-Oorang combination of tremendous breeding possibilities.

In 1913, Mr. Bain was chosen as a member of the Executive Committee of the Canadian Kennel Club—a most fortunate selection from an historical viewpoint. At this time, Dr. Wesley Mills, of London, England, was Honorary President, and the late John G. Kent was President; E. D. Adams, Calgary, Vice-President. Other officers included A. A. Lees, Hamilton; T. A. Moore, Montreal; W. M. Coats, Vancouver; Dr. A. Boulton, Frank Britton, Lance Farewell, Arthur Atkinson, Fred Jacobi, Chas. L. Mewburn, P. Bawden, "Andy" Armstrong, John Miles, G. B. Sweetnam, G. F. McFarland, and etc., etc. What a galaxy of talent, alas that so many of those stalwarts should have "passed onwards," but we thank God that the spirit of those early days con-

tinues to remain in our organization to this day.

Mr. Bain was born in Toronto, and educated at Upper Canada College, the University of Toronto, and Osgoode Law School. Upon graduating, he read law with his father's firm, Bain, Laidlaw & Kappele, now Bain, Bicknell, White & Bristol. Mr. Bain was called to the Ontario Bar in 1897 and was created a K.C. in 1908.

Head of an extensive and influential firm of Barristers, and a director of several important Canadian concerns, Mr. Bain was an extremely busy man, but it is known that an appointment to see a dog fancier was always easily arranged.

It was not known that Mr. Bain suffered from heart trouble, but his death has been attributed to heart failure. Sixty-one years of age at the time of his death, and from all outward appearances, promise seemed to indicate that he would reach a ripe old age. That the shock is felt severely by all who knew Mr. Bain is frankly conceded everywhere.

We mentioned the circumstance of Mr. Bain's becoming an officer of the Canadian Kennel Club as having historical significance, so it is now recalled that Mr. Bain, together with his con-

freres of that day, the late John G. Kent, the late Dr. A. Boulton, went to Ottawa in 1914 to seek incorporation of the Canadian Kennel Club under the Live Stock Pedigree Act, and to represent the 26 years that the Canadian Kennel Club had properly functioned in this country, and so entitled to incorporation. Formal application was made on August 28th, 1914, and was granted on April 15th of the following year, and it is no secret today how success after success followed that incorporation, until today our organization is a conceded power in the interests of Canadian dogdom.

Today we recall past services faithfully rendered by one whose sudden death has shocked us from top to bottom and pay this poor tribute to one who was a man among men—James W. Bain, K.C.

His life was gentle, and the elements so mixed in him, that nature might stand up and say—"This was a man."

To the widow of our late confrere and his sorrowing family, we extend the sympathies of all our people from the President to our latest member.

The funeral service was held in Grace Church-on-the-Hill on Tuesday afternoon, when the Rev. Canon James S. Broughall officiated. Lt.-Col. G. F. McFarland, Major Ward Wright, Capt. H. Dudley-Waters, Sid Perkins, Joseph Perkins and J. D. Strachan represented the Canadian Kennel Club.

DANA L. SPRING DIES SUDDENLY

Dana L. Spring, the genial president of Buffalo Kennel Club for several years was stricken suddenly in his home on July 8th and died shortly after.

Like our own well loved James W. Bain, Mr. Spring was a loyal supporter of everything pertaining to the welfare of dogdom and, like Mr. Bain, he was an outstanding figure in the legal profession. Mr. Spring was regarded as one of the most brilliant trial lawyers in New York State, and those of us who were interested in finding "Bette o' the North," the little dog stolen from Buffalo Kennel Club Show, will long remember Mr. Spring's splendid friendliness and his wonderful cooperation.

The Bar Association of Erie County must have had the foregoing in mind when they selected Warren Tubbs and James O. Moore, two of Mr. Spring's sportsmen-friends, both members of the Buffalo Trap and Field Club, and both deeply interested in dog trials.

We extend our sympathies to Mr. Spring's family in their great bereavement and to Buffalo Kennel Club in the loss of such a valuable and kindly officer.

GOLDENS CATCHING ON AT B.C.

When S. S. Magoffin, Vancouver, decided to develop his Rockhaven Kennels, and to feature the Golden Retriever, he could hardly be expected to anticipate the success which would attend the venture.

It was the September issue of last year which carried the picture of "Speedwell Pluto" on its front cover. At that time this elegant son of "Ch. Michael of Moreton" ex "Speedwell Emerald"—a daughter of "Ch. Cornelius," had taken the British Columbia circuit of shows by storm and had, as a consequence, made his Canadian championship.

An analysis of "Ch. Speedwell Pluto's" pedigree shows that he was born on June 26th, 1929, bred by Mrs. K. Evers Swindell, England, and brought to Canada by Mr. Magoffin on October 30th, 1930, and his show record has already been referred to, but to the championship mentioned, we must add, that "Ch. Speedwell Pluto" won for Best Sporting Dog at Vancouver Kennel Club over an exceptional entry of high class gun-dogs, and at Oregon City Show held near Portland, Oregon, he won second Best Sporting Dog, and was only beaten by a Cocker Spaniel which is claimed to be one of the best of his breed in America.

Naturally, these splendid wins have had a tendency to focus the eyes of Western sportsmen on the Golden Retriever as an ideal gun-dog for upland, and for water work.

It must be remembered too, that "Speedwell Emerald", the dam of "Ch. Speedwell Pluto," is sired by "Ch. Cornelius"—probably the most outstanding specimen of all England's Golden.

Line-breeding based on an intelligent application of the "Michael of Moreton" and "Cornelius" strains, is planned by the Rockhaven Kennels, and for that purpose, two bitches of outstanding merit and selected by Evers Swindle, the Secretary of the English Golden Retriever Club, have arrived at Vancouver. Of these, "Wilderness Tangerine," who was bred by Sir George Bower, is by "Speedwell Barley," a full brother to "Ch. Speedwell Pluto," out of "Ch. Wilderness Maud," who is by "Ch. Cornelius." The other bitch is "Chillington Light," bred by Lady Ursula Abbey, has as grandsire, the famous "Ch. Cornelius," and is truly the outstanding type of Golden Retriever. Both of these importations are excellent gun-dogs, and from them, it is hoped, will be developed a most desirable strain of Golden, particularly with a view to field work, and also true type for Bench Show purposes.

Another of the Rockhaven bitches,—this time "Rockhaven Amber,"—a daughter of "Ch. Speedwell Pluto" ex "Saffron Penelope," who is by "Ch. Haulstone Dan" ex "Ch. Dame Daphne" (Imp.),—has only been beaten at one show, and then only by her cousin and kennel mate "Rockhaven Lempi." "Rockhaven Amber" is well on her way to a championship.

NEW BRUNSWICK KENNEL CLUB SHOW, Sept. 5, 6 and 7, will for its twenty-fourth annual fixture have two judges. Caswell Barrie, Scarsdale, N.Y., and George Kynoch, Winnipeg, well-known as a most active and successful breeder of sporting, non-sporting and Terrier breeds. "George," whose familiar presence is known to the "Old Guard" in the United States, and at all the important show centres in Canada, will make his first appearance in Saint John and the Maritime provinces. The owner of Silverdale Kennels is an experienced judge having at various times past so officiated for most all of the western Canadian show-giving clubs—also at the Canadian National Exhibition Show two years ago.

Before coming to New Brunswick, Mr. Kynoch will judge the Ottawa Show the week previous. We wish them a successful show and trust the echo of the big shots of the Imperial Economic Conference won't scare the entry—rather strengthen and enlarge it.

Unknown maybe to some of local fanciers, Mr. and Mrs. Caswell Barrie, have been summer residents on the opposite shore of the Bay of Fundy from Saint John at Smith's Cove, N.S., for over fifteen years. We could hardly allow the talent and experience of Mr. Barrie, as a judge to rest so near our door without inviting him to officiate at one of our Maritime Shows. Scottish and Cairn Terriers, West Highland Whites and Sealyhams will parade before him in the N.B.K.C. ring. Mr. Barrie's "The Laird o' Ballantrae" has bred and owned some outstanding Scotties, including, "Ch. Heather Venture o' Ballantrae," "Ch. Everready o' Ballantrae," and "Ch. Ballantrae Wendy"; the latter two bitches of his own breeding of which "Wendy" was supreme. She won at least 100 American points in her winners classes, was three times Best of Breed at the Scottish Terrier Club Shows, also repeatedly best American-bred and best bred by exhibitor. The only near rival of this most excellent bitch was "Ch. Allscotts Bellstane Blossom," twice the "Club's" specialty show winner, 1924-1925. Another rival, "Ch. Locktay Winsome" extols her name. It would take a most superlative "three of a kind" to beat the record of these American-bred bitches, or the equally good home-bred dogs, "Ch. Rannock Moor Cricket," "Ch. Fairwold Currie," and the most recent winner, "Ch. Sporrnan Roger."

Mr. Barrie for years Secretary-Treasurer of the Scottish Terrier Club of

America, is also an American Kennel Club Director, who has judged this popular breed at the Eastern Dog Club, the "Scottish" specialty, while for the North Westchester Club Show at Mt. "Sieger" and "Rusty" are both bred by H. McPherson, St. John's, Nfld.

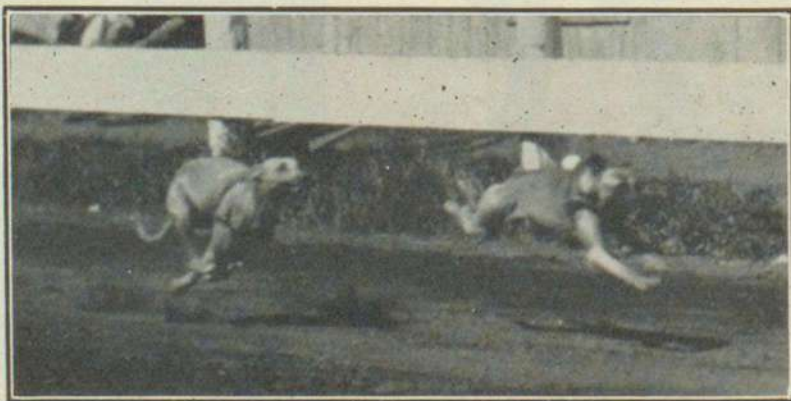
Before Mr. Fleming left for his home, Hamilton, Ont., he called on two local

breeders, who have owned and bred this life-saving breed of name and fame for a number of years. James Donnelly, who owns two dogs and a bitch and Isaac Hahn, who reports the loss of his "Ch. Carlo," caused by a defective heart. "Carlo" was a grand specimen of the breed, and won many honors for his owner, who also bred his dam, "Ch. Nero Lassie." Several years ago, Mr. Hahn showed "Carlo" at Madison Square Show, and on the American circuit, well rewarded too for his show venture.

Moose Jaw's seventh annual dog show, held on July 1-2, was a decided success. Joe Gibbon, the president, and his staff of officers and workers were well repaid for their enthusiasm and all the hard work they put into this fixture. The ground floor of the Douglas Block is an ideal place for a show, being practically all glass on three sides, with lots of light inside for the evening judging. Nothing was crowded, either in the benching or in or around the ring. Judge Art Picard of St. Vital, Manitoba, took the utmost care and thoroughly examined every exhibit before handing out the awards. The judge's decisions were well received by all exhibitors, and we heard nothing but praise for his work. While we were not able to get a four-point show this year, owing to general conditions, we were well pleased with the quality of all the exhibits, and particularly were we pleased to see so many visitors present from outside points.

The Regina boys have had quite a struggle to stage a show this year, and we commend them for their pluck, for after all negotiations with the Fair Board had fallen down, these enthusiasts decided to put on a show on their own account. August 3rd and 4th will see Regina Canine Society staging a show entirely sponsored by the local society. The Regina merchants have responded splendidly to the call for special prizes, and at the time of writing everything points to a most successful show. Premium list, etc., are being rushed out, and while very little time has been allowed for preparation, we know the stuff the Regina boys are made of and the show is bound to go over big. We noticed Jack Favelle, Regina's vice-president, at Moose Jaw show, and no doubt Jack was busy doing some missionary work for the forthcoming Queen City fixture.

The Saskatoon lads, too, had to step out on their own to stage their summer show, but knowing the personnel of these societies, we are assured, profit or loss, the big show has to be put on. The response for more news and advertisements for August issue of **Kennel and Bench** was not as good as it might have been.

I suppose we expect too much in these times of strain and stress. Everybody is busy just now and cash is scarce, but it is likely to be more scarce if those extra dogs are not sold and that litter of puppies grow to adults before finding new homes. Spectators at these trials will realize that while the Sheep Dog Trial is a keenly competitive sport of most spectacular and enthralling nature, the primary purpose of these events is to encourage the breeding and training of the finest type of dog for sheep work and to raise the standard of shepherdship to the highest level. We might well take a pointer from the programme of the Sheep Dog Trials, namely:—Spectators are kindly asked to refrain from applause during the course of trials. Distracting noises of any kind are liable to make it difficult or even impossible for the competing shepherd to control his dogs. We have often seen the disturbing effect of ringside applause—on the dogs in the ring, at our own shows.

Dr. C. Macleod of Glendhall Kennels, Yorkton, Sask., reports that his Irish Terrier "Nortoba Mickey" has a litter of 3 males and 3 females. The Sire of these daredevils is "Patrick of Penlea." One of Mickey's puppies went 1st Open at Saskatoon Spring show.

We understand that Mr. Macleod still has some Shepherds of outstanding quality that he is finding new homes for to make room for the Irish Terriers.

Hamish Middlemas, Regina's president, writes to say he was far from being well at the time of the Moose Jaw show, and was sorry he was unable to renew old acquaintances this year.

W. A. Childs, the Saskatoon Terrier fancier, reports that all the puppies from his "Warlands Ditto," Airedale bitch, were readily sold and a couple of cheques had to be returned where puppies could not be supplied. This instance should give courage to the Western Airedalers.

2. At New Westminster Show, end of May, under International judge, Mr. George Cranfield, went Best of Breed, and Best Terrier (all breeds) in Show.

Gammond, Hamilton, Ont., after an illness of about three months' duration, caused by an infection of a septic nature brought about by the paring of a troublesome corn, and which failed to respond to medical attention. She was given a large funeral, indicative of the respect she enjoyed in her community, and as she was borne to her last resting place on the 27th, many members of the fancy were in attendance to pay their last respects.

As we recall the very many old-timers who have passed on to their rewards, we are mindful of scriptural assurances, and can visualize the reunions as we sadly note the vexatious partings, and join with our readers in extending to Mr. Gammond our sincere sympathy at this time.

BY the time these notes appear, our spring shows will be a thing of the past, and fanciers should be getting their entries in shape for the Vancouver Exhibition Association show to be held on September 2nd and 3rd. There will not be another opportunity of reminding exhibitors regarding this show, so please do not forget. A. P. Semple of Regina will be making his initial visit to the coast as first man in the ring; let us show him our best, and lots of them, so that he may take back a pleasant memory of high-class exhibits and well-filled classes.

The annual matinee show of the B.C. Fox Terrier Association, held on July 9th, in Mr. Lydiatt's delightful grounds, was, as is usual with these events, a pleasant outing for those fortunate enough to attend. The secretary, Mrs. Hatley, had everything in apple pie order. As was to be expected, A. E. Grant judged ably and with precision. Best Smooth puppy in show went to H. Lester's "Oxford Earl," also Best Smooth Novice. Best Smooth in show Miss Mavis Harrison's "Lincolnshire Lass." Best Wire puppy in show, R. O. Bromley's "Bromley's Guard." Best Novice Wire in show, best Wire in show, and best in show, either coat, Mrs. Thornton Sharp's "Lyncote Hoyden."

Best opposite sex in show, R. O. Bromley's "Bromley's Guard."

We have pleasure in taking hats off to Mrs. Thornton Sharp on her win of best in show. This good fancier from her small but select kennel invariably turns out high-class stock, which have gone to the top at some of the best shows in Canada and the United States. Her winning home bred bitch, "Lyncote Hoyden," is by "Simon of Cantilupe," ex "Ch. Keythorpe Pansy," and is in whelp to "Kemphurst Craftsman," a mating which should produce more winners for this clever breeder.

Congratulations to H. Lester on breeding the smooth haired Fox Terrier "Oxford Fairy," who went to best of breed at the recent Medicine Hat and Fort Garry shows. She is the property of the popular Saskatchewan contributing editor, W. W. Riome, to whom we offer our felicitations.

W. C. Burns of Sidney, while on a trip up Vancouver Island, visited the "Of Moray" Cocker Kennels of Mr. and Mrs. Rhodes at Cowichan Station. He writes that they have a beautiful litter from the imported pair "Lucky Streak

of Ware" ex "Dutch Girl of Ware," and says they are choice. From this breeding it is not to be wondered at, and certainly no one knows a Spaniel better than the Burnside expert. Two litters are expected shortly by the same sire, and yet another by the imported "Felbrigg Mark," now a champion. "Dutch Girl of Ware" won well in England and also at our spring shows. Mr. Burns adds that the kennels are beautifully situated and all the dogs in splendid condition. His own Burnside kennel of Springers have two fine litters, one by the good young dog "Brake of Burnside," who is now in New York, and the other by "Barry of Burnside," by "Ch. Wynne of Avandale," ex "Flints Flirt of Avandale." Some prospective winners are among them, and five have recently been sold.

Dr. Calvert of Armstrong has sold the good bitch "Sugar Baby of Burnside" and purchased a pair of nice puppies from Mr. Chevrier that should be heard of later.

Mrs. M. A. Collings of Cliffside, Vancouver Island, reports a promising litter of Springers, four dogs born last April by her imported dog "Philipstown Dan," ex "Belmoss Caroline," both being by "Ch. Inveresk Chancellor." The previous litter by the same mating produced some wonderful field dogs. With these qualities added to their excellent breeding some valuable show and field stock are to be expected.

The production of high-class winning stock over a long period of years invokes in most of us a certain amount of inquisitiveness as to the breeder's system or method. In an interesting letter from Mrs. C. M. Castle of the Shantung Pekinese Kennels, Victoria, we learn of her method of success up to the production of her latest champion, "Shantung Fi Fi," whose certificate has recently been received with the usual courteous congratulations of the Canadian Kennel Club.

In October, 1919, Mrs. Castle purchased from a lady recently coming from Regina a nice red bitch puppy of the well-known "Cactus" family. She bought her as a pet, something to take her mind from the sorrows and losses of the war. Becoming much interested in the little lady, she bought from Miss Camille La Violette of Montreal, now Mrs. De Doniphan, a promising youngster called "Shantung of Wanza," eventually making him a champion and giving her kennel its name in memory of him.

A few years later realizing that the western public liked, not only a solid red colour, but a smaller, more compact type of dog than the older Peke, purchased again from Mrs. De Doniphan this time the imported dog

"Kowli of Alderbourne"—this young dog had taken a third at the Crystal Palace, London, in a huge class—but in Vancouver did not even get a place, later, however, he became a Champion, and today "Shantung" or "Kowli" can be seen in seventy-five per cent of the Pekes in Victoria.

Mrs. Castle having always favoured the massive Peke, later bought the imported biscuit coloured bitch "Ashton More Hushi" whose sire was the famous war baby "Ashton More Wen Chu," that was the type of head she wanted, so the next experiment her daughter "Ch. Mousmee of Shantung" gave her an even better head than her dam, more like the incomparable "Ashton More Wen Chu" whom she so much resembles. Considering "Mousmee's" head perfect, but not liking her legs, tried again, and in the new Champion "Shantung Fi Fi," says she has almost as good a head and perfect legs. In the meantime had bred two pretty good red bitches "Ruby of Shantung" and her daughter "Ku Shan of Shantung" both of whom became champions.

Mrs. Castle early decided to do two things, one was never on any account to have a dog on the premises who was not eligible for registration in the C.K.C. the second resolve was to pay first and particular attention to the brood matrons, in all these years keeping faithfully to this rule. Recently "Dak Kee of Shantung" owned by Mrs. Hamilton in Seattle, one of the soundest dogs Mrs. Castle ever bred gained this International Championship at Oregon City.

Mrs. Castle concludes her letter by saying that "owing to ill-health and anno domini my Kennel is now very small, but I have a nice daughter of 'Ch. Mousmee' and a sturdy young dog pup whose dam is of the 'shensi' (Toronto) stock."

"I am my own dogs' severest critic, desiring always something better—I cannot say that lately I have made money—just paid expenses, but I can say I have tried to improve the breed, and I know I have never given any one a 'dirty deal'."

"Having bred five champions, one of whom has attained international honours, besides bringing two other puppies that I brought to championship."

This is a great record of Mrs. Castle's, and I am sure that her fellow fanciers in the province and throughout the Dominion will wish her many more years of health and happiness, and continued success in her hobby.

The Garforth-Ramsdell Kennels of North Vancouver, in the partnership of Mrs. Arnold and Miss Garnett, two

of our keenest fanciers, are to be congratulated upon making the Cairn Terrier "Sammy of Burton" (imp) a Champion at the recent Victoria Show. He is sired by "Offley Brimon," one of the most noted sires in England today, his stock winning more prizes in 1928-29-31 than any other sire. In Scottish Terriers are the following sales from this kennel, "Garforth Wee Lassie" to Mr. Cargill of Cocker note. "Garforth Andy" to Mrs. Cooper—and "Garforth Janey" to Mr. Perry. These puppies are by Mr. Dorrell's "Albourne Simon." In Cairns "Ramsdell Imp" has gone to a lady in Winnipeg, and "Ramsdell Hamish" to Mr. White of Caulfield. In the kennels are two litters of Dandie Dinmonts, "Widbrook Twinkles" with a litter of two by "Ch. Widbrook Whatsit," and "Widbrook Jonquil" with a litter of five by the well known "Ch. Matching Gleikum Deil," who is a descendant of Sir Walter Scott's dogs—also a litter of Cairns by "Ch. Sammy of Bourton" ex "Silver Tassie of Bourton" (Imp.). While more Cairns and Scotties are expected towards the end of July, several of the older puppies and dogs are being prepared for the coming show of the Vancouver Exhibition Association in September.

This month brought another letter of news from the enthusiastic Irish Setter fancier Jack Cottle, of Nanaimo, in which he tells me of two new breeders interested in Wire Haired Fox Terriers, Mr. Dendoff and Mr. Wilkinson, who are very keen on their dogs and have some good youngsters coming along, acting under the guidance of Robt. Mercer and Harold Kneen. Mr. Griffiths has also a litter of nice Wires. Rees Jones is another who now enters the wire section, and finds them great vermin killers. All of us who keep Wires know the qualities of these game little sportsmen. Some years ago in and around Nanaimo was a hot bed for these Terriers, and several champions of repute first saw the light of day there, and real game ones too, nothing else suited these Nanaimo breeders, and rightly so. If Rees Jones is as successful with his Wires as he is with English Setters we can expect to see him with some real ones. I hear he has some good prospects in Setters and Pointers coming along.

Mr. Cottle asks, where are our Gordon Setter breeders these days? how often do we see one benched today? He finds the Gordon Setter a really good shooting dog and easily handled, and thinks that if some new fanciers got interested in this breed, they could easily be kept to the fore with gun dog lovers. The implication of this article would seem to be that the new Standard of Weight in Cockers was responsible at the Victoria Kennel Club Show, for the loss of one Championship Point.

Granted that Cocker entries were considerably lower than last year, it would seem only fair, all the facts of the case should be examined before blaming the Cocker people and the new Rule in particular.

I have carefully compared the 1931 entries with those of 1932, as printed in the official catalogues; and amongst other breeds to slump might be mentioned the following:—

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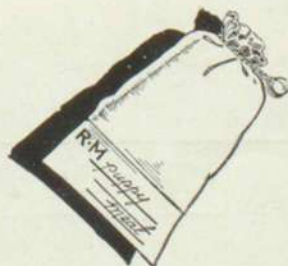
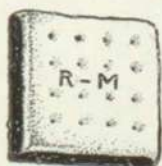
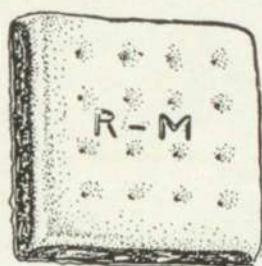
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
