Meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Incorporated

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., was held in the Board Room of the Club's Offices, 25 Melinda Street, Toronto, on Thursday afternoon, October 17th, 1935, at 3.30 o'clock. The President, Col. J. N. MacRae, was in the Chair. Directors present included Mr. Wm. Stockdale, Dr. H. E. Batt, Dr. C. R. Boulding, Brig.-Gen. C. M. Nelles, Mr. Harold Carter and Mr. James Eccles.

The Minutes of the previous Directors' Meeting were declared adopted as read.

The Secretary reported that there was very little activity in respect to registering Pointers and Setters.

A letter was read from the Live Stock Records Office regarding the breeding ages of dogs and mentioning that the application for the registration of a litter of puppies out of a bitch four months and eight days at the time of mating had been refused.

It was agreed that an amendment to the Constitution covering the matter would be prepared for consideration at the next annual general meeting.

Mrs. E. Brown, Toronto, appeared before the Board of Directors and made a statement declaring her dissatisfaction in connection with the reinstatement of Mr. George A. Cranfield to the privileges of the Club at the last meeting of the Directors. Mrs. Brown stated that because of alleged unwarrantable persecution her character and her business had suffered and suggested that arrangements should have been made which would have given her the opportunity of meeting Mr. Cranfield. Mrs. Brown was advised that Mr. Cranfield had settled with the Secretary, with the Canadian Kennel Club, with herself, and had apologized, and because of his having done these things he had been reinstated.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Sir:

I have just read, with great interest, Dr. Campbell's timely advice regarding distemper prevention treatment in **Kennel and Bench**. I am a strong believer in having dogs inoculated, having arrived at this conclusion as a result of over fifty years of active dog breeding and exhibiting in an extensive way, during which time ample opportunity has been afforded me to realize what a serious and disastrous menace distemper is to the breeder and exhibitor of pedigreed dogs. It may interest some of our fanciers to know that during one outbreak in my kennels some years ago I lost 37 dogs.

I have been a close student of the subject of distemper and its treatment ever since I became interested in the rearing and showing of dogs, and have tried everything that has been recommended in one way or another for the relief of distemper. As soon as "The Field" began investigating canine distemper, I eagerly awaited the findings and reports that were issued. When I heard that Dr. Campbell was going to visit the Mill Hill Laboratories in England to get first-hand information on distemper and its prevention, I begged him to bring me back treatment for six young dogs I intended showing at the Fall Shows.

Dr. Campbell very kindly did this for me, and the dogs were injected—which, I believe I am safe in saying, was the first occasion the Laidlaw Dunkin "Vaccine and Virus" method was used in Canada—in August, 1929.

I exhibited the six dogs at the C.N.E. and five or six other shows, ending up with the Royal Winter Fair. The weather was hard on dogs that year, being very changeable and quite cold at times, and owing to sickness I was forced to entrust the care and handling of my string of Setters to others.

Five of the dogs ended up the circuit in splendid condition, but one took sick after the last show. I thought for sure I was in for another "dose of distemper" and immediately called in Dr. Campbell, who assured me that the dog could not possibly have distemper and that probably it was suffering from just an ordinary cold, and not to worry. In two days' time the pup was as well as ever again, and no others took sick. From that time on I have never failed to have my dogs protected, and I am not afraid to mix them with others any time, as I now have no fear whatever of their contracting distemper. Brother Fanciers! The advice of "one of the old guard" who has bred and shown hundreds of dogs, is "Take no chances! Have your valuable stock safeguarded against this great canine scourge!"

THE SEVENTY-FOURTH SHOW

When we think about dog shows and find one described as the "74th", we are obliged to go back to the very beginning of organized canine government. It is recorded that the first dog show ever held was held in the Town Hall at Newcastle-on-Tyne on the 28th and 29th of June, 1859, a mere matter of 76 years ago, but the show we mention specifically here is the 74th Kennel Club Show to be held at Crystal Palace, London, England, on October 9th and 10th. The origin of this fixture dates back to the 17th, 18th, 19th and 20th of June, 1873, and 'way back then the show was also held in the Crystal Palace. The entries for the first show were 975, and the entries for the forthcoming show total 5,905.

The largest entry for this year's Kennel Club fixture at Crystal Palace has been rolled up by the Cocker Spaniels with 363 (154 dogs), Pekes 192 entries (125 dogs), Cairns 187 entries (108 dogs), Irish Setters 202 entries (101 dogs). Total number of entries 5,905. Total number of dogs 2,923.

Imagine a show with close to 3,000 dogs benched somewhere in Canada. It would be a fixture worth going a long way to see. We congratulate the Kennel Club on its splendid entry, and thank the Kennel Club secretary for the advance information.

THE DAY OF FIELD TRIALS

Truly this is the day of Field Trials, of taking dogs to the work intended for them by nature. Setters and Pointers have been the leaders right down through the years. Then the Beagles were featured, and since then bird dogs generally, and now we have the little Dachshund doing their stuff at Gladstone, N.J., on September 22nd, when an entry of thirteen gave a splendid exhibition before a greatly interested group of owners, and a rather critical gallery, but it does make rather interesting reading to learn of the "Dachshe's" "making finds" showing "initiative to hunt," and "picking up his chucks", and it is a certainty that if ever we are near enough to this sport we will be sure to take it in. As it is we have long been interested in the "Teckels" of Northern Germany, and the "Dackels" of the South, and notice happily the position of importance taken by the Dachshunde at the largest shows being held in the United States and in England at the present time.

Cross Country News Hunting

RICHMOND Championship Show was a very pleasant fixture indeed, the weather man being on his very best behaviour. This event is nearer to being like the Morris and Essex than anything else that we could imagine. The judging started at 11 o'clock and by 4 o'clock many of the dogs were on their way home, and in this respect Richmond leads the way. There can only be one explanation for shows with entries reaching the "thousands," being handled so efficiently and so speedily, and that is the perfection of the dog show mechanism in England. We were told that certain printing plants had so specialized in printing show schedules (Premium Lists) and catalogues that the show secretaries' responsibility in these matters had been reduced to a minimum. The sameness in schedules and catalogues is very striking, but both are pretty nigh perfection in their clarity of intent, and both are very easy to follow.

Here we had determined to notice such breeds as Cockers, Russian Wolfhounds, Old English Sheepdogs, Bull-dogs, Cairns and Pugs particularly, and with all due respect to what we looked at, at this mammoth show, we felt certain that we had plenty of good dogs in Canada.

Aldershot was appealing from the viewpoint of general interest. It was more like our Royal Winter Fair than anything else, only it was held under canvas. The horse show, and the varied and general exhibits at Aldershot were of a very comprehensive nature, there was no feeling of "dragging", but rather there was plenty of pep to be noticed everywhere around.

England is a glorious country and the English people are a splendid people, therefore it was with much regret that we left our Buckinghamshire domicile and made for London by auto accompanied by our host and hostess, Capt. H. E. and Mrs. Hobbs. Leaving Euston Station in the early forenoon we found that it took "silver change" to secure the comforts of travel. The train was a heavy one, and it was packed to the very last seat. For a travelling companion we had a Yorkshire manufacturer who had lots of sympathy for our ignorance on such matters as the "dole" and the "housing scheme". So we were rebuked and educated through this contact. We had been taught to look on both of the above measures rather disdainfully, but the average Englishman is proud of both, and then rubs in his argument by declaring that the British budget is a balanced budget.

July 8th will long remain green in our memories. We arrived in Wishaw

—the dear old home-town—that day at noon. At 4 o'clock we attended the Y.M.C.A. building and found about 100 men of Wishaw Old Men's Club waiting to welcome their wandering boy back home. Provost Chambers was in the chair, and the happenings were many and very pleasant. It was a joy to be back with the schoolmates of childhood, and the workmates of early manhood. Mr. George Ross, who had taught us our demi and semi quavers, had composed a Welcome Home march for the occasion, and as he "tickled the ivories" the "oldsters" were a care-free lot as they entered fully into the spirit of the occasion.

After dinner there was a programme that was reminiscent of the earlier days. Vocalists who have long since passed the "three score and ten" gave their lungs a test calculated to remove the carbon. "Fiddler Miller," once the pride of Wishaw, started out to play the old reels and strathspeys. A chair was brought for his comfort but he waved it away, the old trouser spirit prevailed. Three men who took part in the programme featuring the "Farewell" were again on the programme featuring our "Welcome Home." God bless them all.

On July 9th, the members of Wishaw and District Canine Club played the part of host. Mr. James McLauchlan, the president, was supported by Provost McNab Chassels, of the noted "Inveresk" prefix (Springer Spaniels), Coatbridge, and Mr. J. W. H. Benyon, Edinburgh (officers of the Scottish Kennel Club) and others. This gesture of good-will was greatly appreciated and will long be a cherished recollection.

Probably July 12th was the brightest of the many bright spots marking our visit home. On this beautiful summer day it was the writer's privilege to play host to the members of Wishaw Old Men's Club, at the Popinjay Hotel, Rosebank. About 70 of the old comrades attended and we had one very joyous day together, the comradeship may easily be measured when it is mentioned that we had everything, including the pipers. Mr. Harry Hyde, a man well over 80 years of age, sang six songs, and by a special request he sang a seventh—"Tom Bowling"; the rather shaky baritone voice simply echoed along the banks of the Clyde, but we must hustle along.

Sunday, July 14th, found us visiting the home of the first citizen of Coatbridge, Provost McNab Chassels. We found the genial Provost in his kennel coat doing his own work, and when we remind our readers that there are Cairns and Springers at "Inveresk" it

will be realized that Provost Chassels takes his dogs seriously. After some refreshment we paid a visit to the world-famed "Heather" Kennels at Glenboig. This kennel name has been a household word in Great Britain for nearly half a century. Many of the old-time Collie breeders will remember the Heather Collies of the late Mr. Robert Chapman, of Glenboig, and every present day breeder of Scottish Terriers will recall that the Chapman Brothers—Robert and James—carry on the glories of the Heather prefix to this day. What a privilege it was to meet that great Scottie "Ch. Heather Necessity," face to face, and what a thrill it was to handle a better Scottie than "Necessity" in "Ch. Heather Realization." And it is just an open question whether any Scottish Terrier judge ever handled as many good Scotties in any one day as we did on that memorable Sunday. Here are a few of the names we dotted down at random, besides the two super dogs: "Ch. Realization," winner of the Scottish Kennel Club's highest honors in 1934 and 1935, a wonderful feat, and "Ch. Heather Necessity," winner of 20 challenge certificates and sire of 16 British Champions, "Ch. Heather Fashion Hint," sire of 11 British Champions, "Ch. Albourne Barty," sire of 9 British Champions, "Ch. Heather Ambition," sire of 3 British Champions, "Ch. Masterpiece of Rookes," sire of 2 British Champions, "Ch. Heather Ambition." Other dogs were "Ch. Cricht Certainty," "Sandheys Steady Lad," "Heather Fresh Fuel" and "Ch. Heather Ambition." The Chapman Brothers have a record that may never be beaten when they record that in the past 5 years the dogs in their kennels, and the progeny thereof have won 187 Championship Certificates out of a possible 238, which is equal to 78 per cent., and very likely this percentage has been raised considerably since we visited Glenboig.

We would say that the best two dogs we looked at whilst overseas were the Scottie "Ch. Heather Realization" and a home town bred Labrador Retriever, "Craigleith Dandie," owned by Mr. J. D. Harrower, Wishaw; this youngster had just passed his first birthday and was a near perfect dog; he swept the boards at the Caledonian Canine Society Open Show at Edinburgh on July 17th, and if £100 had not been so large a figure when reduced to Canadian dollars we might have brought the elegant "Dandie" to Canada.

Wednesday, July 17th, found us at Central Station, Glasgow, ready to start for the open show of the Caledonian

EXTENSIVE, EXPENSIVE CAMPAIGNING

To campaign dogs at the shows in Canada is expensive enough, goodness only knows, but when the larger breeds have to be campaigned the costs must always be a serious consideration. What must it be, then, when a fancier decides to go after the "honors" in different countries? The idea almost takes one's breath away. Our thoughts have been steered in the direction of heavy costs in campaigning dogs after noticing that Mrs. G. W. Hyslop of the Cairndania Kennels, Brockville, Ont., had been successful in making her home-bred "Ch. Max of Cairndania" a full-fledged champion in the United States. However, additional compensation would be the lot of Mrs. Hyslop when the lovely "Max" picked up "Best of Breed" honors six times in a row, the wins taking in territory including New Jersey, New York, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, and the State of Maine.

Mrs. Hyslop sold "Max" at one time, and no doubt she is now glad that she was given an opportunity to buy him back again.

"Quagga von Loheland", Mrs. Hyslop's becoming brindle bitch, will soon be looking for the small balance of points required to make her a Canadian champion, and when she wins this balance of points, she, too, will be a champion on both sides of the international boundary. This splendid specimen has been awarded the Best of Breed prize a dozen times at American shows and the end is not yet.

BLOOD WILL TELL

When Mrs. Howard Le Platt's fine litter of Cairn Terriers, sired by Mrs. G. W. Hyslop's "Ch. Divor of Gunthorpe", were born on April 10th, 1934, she had every reason to believe that they would indeed be a fine lot, but it took the Englewood show and the expert judge, Mr. Robert Sedgewick, to find one of the litter, i.e., "Dividend of Eastcote", to top no less than three Sweepstakes, and since then, at the all-breed show of the Ox Ridge Hunt Club, Darien, Conn., Judge Mr. Wm. Nichols, London, England, found this youngster for his Winners Dog, Best of Winners and Best of Breed, and the entry was 34 Cairns competing. This is a great boost for Mrs. Hyslop's "Ch. Divor of Gunthorpe", and both ladies are to be congratulated.

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WESTMINSTER CALLING!

Announcement of the Westminster judges would be sufficient to make fanciers on either side of the border Westminster conscious, if such particular stimulation to such consciousness were required. That it is not required; that Dominion fanciers carry this consciousness uninterrupted through the year has been proved again and again by the constant preparations made for the big event over the line, and by the strong support given the show each year by the highest type of Canadian breeders.

This year alone, a band of about fifty Canadians, hailing for the most part from Ontario, entered at Westminster some eighty-odd dogs representing twenty-four different breeds. Of these, Cairn Terriers led numerically with fourteen, the largest share of this notable contingent being brought by Mrs. G. W. Hyslop. There were nine Pekingeses, seven each of Great Danes and Wire Fox Terriers and a fair sprinkling of the other varieties, including seven Manchester Terriers, the latter belonging to Mr. Fred C. MacLean of Quebec. Miss Marjorie McClearey entered her Italian Greyhounds, and Mr. W. B. Cleland nominated the one Lakeland Terrier.

This turnout, however, was not at all unusual for Canada has been staunch in its support of the great American classic which welcomes dogs and exhibitors from all the far corners of the earth as well as from our nearest neighbor boundaries.

And it is not alone as exhibitors that Canadians come to the Garden for many come whether they have dogs or not. Led by that popular international figure, Mr. J. D. Strachan, they come to visit and talk dog. They come as judges, too, for there is talent throughout the Dominion that has been called upon again and again for the sane, sure adjudication of Westminster dogs. Such famous appraisers as Mr. Walter H. Reeves, Mr. Robert A. Ross, the late Dr. Carleton Y. Ford and Mr. W. H. Pym are just a few of the Canadian judges who have graced Westminster rings, and next year when on February 10th the big show opens again we will find the Collie expert, Mr. W. M. Ormiston Roy, and the Bull Terrier master, the Hon. Mr. Justice McFarland, officiating in their respective rings.

TORONTO FANCIERS AT THE MARITIMES

Mr. and Mrs. W. L. McGill and Mr. and Mrs. J. Tompkins, all of Toronto, and all of the Boston Terrier Club of Canada motored through to Halifax recently, and were no sooner around and settled down, than our

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Maritime Director, Mr. A. V. Martin, came on the job and whisked the visitors off to Mr. R. McKay's to see some Bostons. From there the direction led to Mr. Martin's own home, and here we found around a "dozen of the faithful" burning the night oil getting the Premium Lists ready for the shows. Off again, and this time we covered the kennels of many fanciers, and everywhere we went we received a hearty welcome.

After a week at the Eastern coast, we turned the "Lizzie" towards Toronto again and soon we were at St. John, N.B., and here we descended on Mrs. B. M. Frost, whom we found to be a very happy person, bubbling over with enthusiasm for the Boston Terrier. This kindly woman demonstrated

to our entire satisfaction that she understood every phase of the business featuring the Boston. Her "Flash Against Stand By" is a sturdy little chap that we predict a bright future for, and we will not be surprised when we notice his name appear within the charmed circle.

We take this opportunity to thank Mr. Martin and all the nice folks we met for the splendid reception tendered to their visitors.

MAKING HEADWAY

Two years ago, Miniature Schnauzers, known in England as the Affenschnauzer, were practically unknown in California, but today five-point ratings are frequently made. So great is the enthusiasm for the breed at the moment that Anne Fitzgerald, the secretary of the American Miniature Schnauzer Club, has her book, "The Miniature Schnauzer", now on the press, and as soon as it has been distributed a further stimulation of interest is frankly anticipated. We will refer to this book again in the near future.

We understand that Miss Helen Cluff, Toronto, is training a few specimens with a view to showing them at the coming shows, and if this young lady can do the same with the Schnauzers as she did with the "bob-tails", she will develop an enthusiasm for the breed in Canada which she may be held responsible for.

Canada boasts a champion Miniature Schnauzer in "Ch. Nette v. Mumltingtal", a pepper and salt colored daughter of "Avi v. Schillerberg" ex "Heiday v.d. Hermannsburg", who first saw the light of day in Germany.

The group status of the breed has been challenged. In Canada they have been placed in the Toy Group. In England they appear in the working division, and in the United States, until quite recently they appeared as belonging to the working group. However, the Miniature Schnauzer Club, backed by Anne Fitzgerald's new book will seek to place Schnauzers, Standard and Miniature, in the Terrier Group, as has been done in the United States.

FORTY-FIVE ENGLISH SETTERS

The English Setter Club of California paid a nice compliment to Mr. Wm. H. Pym, our second vice-president, when it selected him to judge the first specialty show to be sponsored by this up-and-coming organization, and held in the Ambassador Hotel, Los Angeles, California, on October 12th and 13th, and is one of a number of specialty shows being held at this venue and on these dates; the other breeds coming together as specialty features being Cockers, Dachshunde, Great Danes, Pekingeses and Scottish Terriers.

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FAMOUS CANADIAN-BRED BULL TERRIER DEAD

Mr. Fred W. Coles, Toronto, advises us that the Bull Terrier, "Lionheart", died in his sleep at the home of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Coleman, Cincinnati, Ohio. "Lionheart" was bred by Mr. Coles, and was whelped on November 9th, 1919. His sire was "Ch. Brockley Topper" and his dam was "Ch. Belle Mahone". A nice compliment was paid to the great "Lionheart" by the breed authority, Mr. Enno Meyer of Milford, Ohio, who registered a carefully selected Bull Terrier, "Son of Lionheart", *"to keep green the name of the greatest headed Bull Terrier that ever lived, there will never be another like him; in head he was the absolute perfection of the right type."*

Another tribute paid to "Lionheart" which is worthy of recording came from the pen of another well-known breed authority, i.e., H. H. Stewart of Wynnewood, Pa. Said Mr. Stewart: *"I saw 'Lionheart' for the first time in 1922 at the old Garden, where he was Best of Breed that year, and being very much impressed with him I came home and painted his picture, which hangs today in my home."*

THE A. B. C. OF FIELD TRIALS

Sportsmen in all parts of the United States and Canada are becoming bird-dog-minded. More than two hundred clubs sponsored close to 400 individual field trial meets during 1934, and with 1935 little more than two-thirds over, it appears that this year will eclipse the '34 record.

The sport of bird dog trials is rapidly gaining new recruits, many of whom are novices and desire authoritative information about this fascinating pastime. A little volume, entitled the "Field Trial Primer", answers all questions for the novice and veteran alike. Written by William F. Brown, manager of the "American Field", it describes in A, B, C style the features of actual field competitions for bird dogs.

The "Primer" gives complete information on the organization of field trial clubs, model constitution and by-laws, requirements of grounds, actual operation of trials, and the basis of judging the canine contestants. Everybody interested in this great sporting dog activity will profit by reading this book.

Probably it would be complimenting your bird dog loving friend if you were to arrange for sending him a copy of "Field Trial Primer" at Christmas time.

MANY HAPPY RETURNS

Mr. Charles (Charlie) A. Stone, Toronto, the Honorary President of the Canadian Kennel Club, who, incidentally, was the first secretary of the organization, has been receiving the congratulations of his many friends on the occa-

sion of his 83rd birthday. Hale and hearty is Charlie Stone and he looks a fair bet to reach the three figures in years. Tends to the breeding, exhibiting, buying and selling of his own dogs. Looks after a garden that would trouble many a younger man, and he gets a great thrill out of any uncommon specimens of bushes or plants, "quint" tomatoes, "double" cucumbers and the like. On the writer's desk here lies a bag containing peanut plants with eight nicely proportioned and well filled peanuts. We have placed an order for a pound or so, but probably this is expecting far too much; to gather as many nuts as that might easily give our old friend a "crick" in his back, and we don't want that to happen.

NOTED GERMAN SHEPHERD DOGS DEAD

We gather from "The Shepherd Dog Review" that two of the outstanding

Shepherd dogs of the last decade have been withdrawn at the hands of dogdom's "grim reaper," both dogs made the championship grade in Canada and in the United States, and both were well worthy of their high honors.

"Int. Ch. Iso v. Bergholtz" was one of the greatest Shepherd dogs ever bred in Canada, and had for sire the great "Iso v. Doernerhoff," and for dam, "Roxawana of Kaslo." On October 26th, 1926, he was sold to Miss Marie J. Leary, Greenwich, Conn., who became extremely proud of the dog and she now mourns his death, and no doubt, Mr. Alf. Loveridge, Toronto, who bred "Iso," will also have a dull feeling in the vicinity of his heart when he reads this.

The other Shepherd dog that we had in mind was also a son of "Iso v. Doernerhoff" ex "Hexe v. Humboldt-park," and none other than "Int. Ch. Bello Bex of Doreborn," a solid black dog that was well known in Canada in the years 1927-28, when he appeared in competition no less than five times and was always returned the winner. The owner at that time was Mrs. J. O. Sanborn, who, by the way, has since changed her name to Mrs. A. B. De Witt, and any of the old friends of yesteryear will find "Billie" at Doreborn Kennels, Millington, N.J.

THAT ELUSIVE WHITE COCKER

A Kingsville, Ont., reader in the person of Mr. Bruce A. E. Clouse, was interested in reading our reference to Mr. H. B. Cox's seven-week-old white (nearly) Cocker Spaniel. Mr. Clouse feels that he can go one better still, and makes mention of a litter of puppies now seven weeks old that has for one of its number a white Cocker, male, and all that removes the youngster from being all white is a colored part on his left ear and a red spot the size of a bean on the top of his head, and Mr. Clouse suggests that if anyone is really interested in breeding white Cockers, here are two that might form the nucleus of a start.

It may interest our Cocker breeders to learn that Mr. Clouse's dog, "Whitey", is a son of "Diplomat of Barrie" (red and white). "Diplomat of Barrie" is by "Ch. Wayridge Miracle Man" (red) out of "Julie of Barrie" (black and white). The dam of "Whitey" is "Lady Lucann of Barrie" (red and white), and "Lady Lucann of Barrie" is by "Int. Ch. Romilla of Barrie" (black and white) out of "Shiela of Barrie" (black and white).

Probably there are other white, or near white, Cockers around in some fanciers' kennels, and we would like to hear of any showing, at least, 95 per cent white.

THE LADY OF POMONA

An Appreciation by J. D. Strachan

Sunday, October 13th, marked the end of a vain but persistent struggle by Madame Diane Beland, Pointe Claire, for the recovery of a robust health that at one time was characteristic of the lady who made the Pomona Pomeranian Kennels outstanding in dogdom on the American Continent. Just a stone throws distance from the beautiful spot that had been home to Madame Beland for many years, the placid waters of Lake St. Louis seemed to sing a requiem as it lapped its shores and suggested peace and calm. The nearby maples in their fall mantles seemed to realize that one who had adored their rich colorings had ceased to exist. All nature seemed to rejoice, and only frail humanity grieved for the passing of a well-beloved friend, a known genuine fancier who loved the game for the game's sake, and loved the players because they were her friends.

The records show that Madame D. Beland joined the Canadian Kennel Club on January 13th, 1917, so she was really a fancier for the past 20 years, and she was prominent from the very beginning. The records show that she imported, bred or otherwise owned something over a score of champions. Madame Beland prized her Canadian Kennel Club affiliations and some of her closest friends she had found in the sport. The writer's visit to her before he sailed for the Old Country brought her much pleasure as the end approached. My report to her that she owned superior specimens to any I had seen at Taunton, Richmond, Aldershot and Edinburgh shows simply filled her soul with satisfying joy, and she spoke about that in her own very limited way to everybody. When I turned the money back to her, together with my report, she gathered all her dogs around her, and examining each one separately, she seemed to say, "There are none better than you in all England."

I'm not at all anxious to appear sentimental, but every one of her many little pets seemed to realize that something untoward was happening to their beloved mistress, and in their own mute way they have demonstrated their sense of loss in many remarkable instances. Each dog had become accustomed to her affliction, each one knew her moods, the happy and the heartbreaking; they knew it all, and her friends knew that her one ambition was to own the very best specimens that could be bred or purchased, but all that now is merely a pleasant memory when the Madame comes into our thoughts.

Some weeks ago the best brains in the medical world prescribed for her. She had started on a treatment that was probably a trifle too strenuous for her

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fast ebbing strength. She had faith to believe that her speech, beyond every other consideration, would be restored to her. I believe, too, that a partial restoration had actually set in, but on the occasion of her last visit to Montreal she contracted a chill that developed into pneumonia, and in three short days the "grim reaper" had overtaken her,

SHEPHERD DOG TRIALS

Year after year there is a pilgrimage to the Manor Farm at Clarkson, Ont., the occasion being the Annual Field Trials of the German Shepherd Dog Club of Canada. The atmosphere is invariably congenial and the weather is usually on its best behaviour. The Trials were held on September 15th and the judge was Mr. Z. J. Joyce, the President of the Club, and the steward was Mr. Cecil Corry, a combination that sees everything, hears everything and discovered that the day was long and that it was cold. It is bad policy to argue with the judge and so we agree that the day was far too long, and in future the Trials should be given two days at least; this necessity has been established beyond question, and it was cold.

The "night before" promised a stoppage of the Trials; the rain came down in torrents, but despite this threat the day was fair and the fields were dry. Eight entries were made for the Service Dog class, and five of these were of the fairer sex; and it was the "ladies" who gave their best on the day, so much so that the 1935 Championship was won by Mr. Tom Lee's "Tillie v. Rhein", who won 412 points out of a possible 500. Reserve was Mr. Alex. L. Gooderham's "Gai Cherie of Northmere", who was given 393 points; and here Mr. M. S. Soules' "Blue Magic of Northmere" came within a "whisker" of equalling "Gai's" performance by scoring 391 points. Those three named animals were all rated as "very good." Reserve to No. 3 was M. C. Chisholm's "Jill of Northmere" with 342 points.

Mr. Joyce's report is a masterpiece of Trial reporting, and his summing up will furnish sufficient food for thought to keep the club interested until the next Trials fall due.

I am in receipt of some information from that well-known Vancouver Island fancier and breeder of Cairn Terriers, Mrs. J. Aitken of the Cunloden Kennels, Duncan, in which I am informed that her Cairn female, "Lady Malice", has presented her owner with a litter of three males and two females by "Ch. Silver Stirrup", and that two female puppies by "Tom Thumb" ex "Golden Year" are showing much promise. The Cairn females, "Silver Belle" and "Lady Susan", have both mated to "Tom Thumb" and are due the latter part of October. Here's wishing them success.

I am informed by Mrs. Pottroff of Swastika Kennels that she has just shipped a very promising young Shepherd Dog puppy to a client in Honolulu, Mr. Ely Flores. This young dog is sired by "Victor of Shadowbrook" ex "Erma of Holmstead", and this shipment went by the Empress of Canada on her last voyage.

There were two outstanding events in dogdom of Vancouver this month and the first was held on Friday, September 20th, when the Alpha Delta Pi Kennel Club held its first show and did those gals put it over? The fanciers turned out by the battalion, so it seemed, and when I looked around it appeared to me as if the U.B.C. Faculty had conspired to pack the building—Moose Auditorium—for it just would not hold another soul. Miss Gwen Pym, the president of Alpha Delta Pi, was introduced to the gathering, and after a few well-chosen remarks she in turn introduced the judges, Mrs. G. O.

Alsen, Mrs. Moore and Dr. T. R. Sleeth, who were ably assisted by the stewards, Mrs. O. Balshaw and Miss Eva Dodds. Mrs. Blake Manning Wilson made the drawing for the Airedale puppy. So numerous were the entries that it was 1.20 a.m. when the last dog was judged. I noticed our B.C. director hard at work all the evening and he only caught the last ferry by "stepping on the gas". Oh, well, everyone had a glorious evening.

Sunday, September 29th, away at the crack of dawn to witness the revival of Pointer and Setter Trials in British Columbia. There has been considerable discussion as to how these Trials would be received by the sporting public, and now they are over they are the one topic of conversation in Vancouver. Boy, oh boy! what a turnout: eleven brace or a total of twenty-two dogs were entered and every one of them competed. Irish Setters, Gordon Setters, English Setters and Pointers. What a sight, and pheasants galore. The first brace were sent away at 8.15 a.m. sharp, and from then onward at thirty-five minute intervals the highway was a sight to see. A string of automobiles over a mile long and approximately a gallery of four hundred. Fortunately the best of the courses could be seen from the highway, which was a godsend for the gallery, and through the courtesy of the owners of these wonderful farms, courses were

close at hand and everything suitable for dogs and handlers. A halt was called at 11.45 for lunch, and within half an hour the judge was instructing his steward to call the next brace and away we go, far into the afternoon until shadows begin to appear before the last brace is called, when we find two Pointers are drawn together. This particular heat was watched with great interest and before mentioning the winners let me tell you of a very strange coincidence brought to my notice by digging into the Field Trial reports of years ago. I find that on September 29th, 1919, the British Columbia Pointer and Setter Trials were held in exactly the same place and the same judge, Mr. Syd Conway, made the awards and that in this year 36 dogs were entered and actually ran, it being at that time a four-days' affair, and a very notable feature at the Trials was the running of an English Setter named "November the 11th", by Charley Murray, a colored gentleman and trainer of Field Trial dogs par excellence, who from the reports I have before me was considered one of the best trainers in North America at that time and for many years could usually be found during training season out on the prairie with his dogs and the sky was his roof at night. And now may I say to you sporting dog fanciers that I have at last persuaded the old-time Field

Trial man to tell you what is required of an all-age shooting dog in such a stake as run off on September 29th by the B.C. Gun Dog Club.

"The all-age dog is the completely finished dog. When starting on the course at the beginning of his heat the dog must select likely looking cover and go to it at a rate of speed that he can maintain for the duration of the heat. He must, however, confine his casts to a reasonable distance and not beyond the control by voice, whistle or signal of his handler or the officiating judge.

"He must hunt cover rapidly with head high and up wind, and if no game is found continue in the direction of the course which is being followed by his handler.

"He must quickly approach to the correct distance from game

when found. Stop and point instantly and accurately the location of game by the direction of his point. He must hold the point staunchly until his handler comes up and flushes his birds. He must remain stationary until he is ordered on again. He must stop and back his brace-mates points. He must not confine his search to bare and unlikely ground.

"He must not go over ground repeatedly. He must not turn back in the reverse direction to that of his handler. He must not continue casts made at angles to the course so far as to leave his handler's control by voice, whistle or signal. He must not cut in to his handler. He must not be slow in his rate of speed or so fast as to exhaust himself before the expiration of his heat, or pass by or through game.

"He must not slow down to a walk or persistently hunt foot scent. He must not approach the birds close enough to flush them or point so far from them as to delay his handler flushing them, and he must not point in any direction other than that of the game.

"He must not leave birds once scented and go on without pointing. He must not point where there is no game or where it has not recently been present. He must not trail his brace-mate but must show class, i.e., bird sense, speed, range and stamina, must hunt to the course, search up wind for body scent, locate and point quickly and accurately.

"He must be staunch. Back on sight, and be steady. He must not get out of hand. Cut in. Cut back. Bolt. False point. Hunt foot scent. Blink-trail."

Brewster, of Vancouver.

Today I visited the Dorn Dog Training School operated by Mr. Jasper Daniels, and I was agreeably surprised to see what a fine place he has. There are about 25 dogs on the premises. Of these I understand, eleven are in for various forms of training. The surroundings are ideal for the kind of work done. Mr. Daniels informed me that he was patiently awaiting a litter of Wire Fox Terriers. Unfortunately I did not get particulars as to sire and dam. The whole lay out of the kennels is very nice indeed and is surrounded by a 12 ft. board fence. I think before very

long Mr. Daniels will be confining his training business entirely to training sporting dogs.

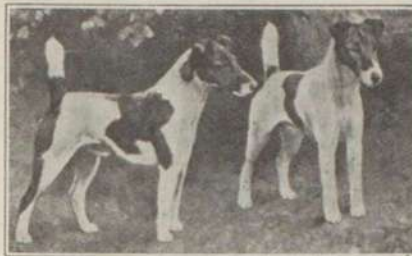

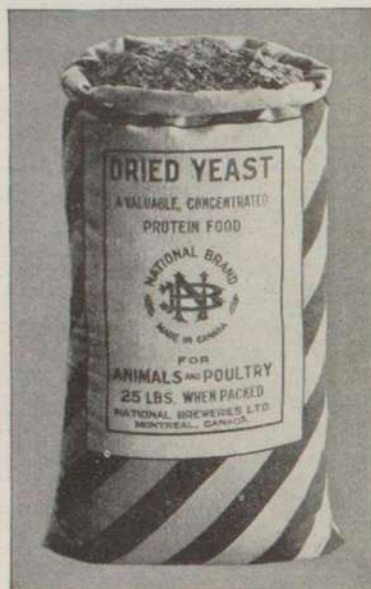

Anyway, it is conceded that he is a wonderfully successful trainer of Guide Dogs, a wonderful trainer of the people who own such guide dogs. The British people are extremely proud of their "Tail-Waggers" Club and of the magnitude of its beneficial operations.

Canadian National Exhibition Dog Show

Impressions of the Judge,
MR. W. J. NICOLS, London, England.

EVERYBODY in England is familiar with the magnitude of the Canadian National Exhibition and particularly with the excellence of the Annual Dog Show, which, for forty-seven years, has been a feature of the Fair. All Canada is proud of the C.N.E., but the people of Toronto feel that the whole show is theirs, and accept it more or less as a family asset. Many English judges have accepted invitations to function at the Canadian National Exhibition, and this year I was delighted to be added to their number, and I am convinced that the claim, "The Greatest Fair of Its Kind in the World", can easily be substantiated. It is a veritable city, with all modern city equipment, even to banking, telegraph, fire, etc. The buildings are all substantial structures of brick and stone, and it is hard to believe that they are only used about four weeks out of the yearly fifty-two. Frankly I was amazed at the colossal grandeur and magnificence of the whole spectacle, and it is with much pleasure that I pen my comment herewith, and at the special request of the Editor of **Kennel and Bench**.

The dog show building was part and parcel of "The Million Dollar Equestrian Building" and was replete with every modern requirement for lighting and ventilation, and notwithstanding the extreme Canadian summer heat, the automatic controls kept the building cool and the air fresh at all times.

The Superintendent, Mr. Peter Herd, is a man of action, and is particularly adapted for his onerous position, so the whole show passed off without a hitch as far as I could see, and it must be remembered that his visible responsibility was open to the public gaze for three full days.

The Chairman of the Dog Show Committee, Mr. A. A. MacDonald, was one of the first Canadians to favorably consider, to the point of actual importation, many of our best Fox Terriers, away back in the early days of the Canadian National Exhibition, when the fixture was known as the Toronto Industrial Exhibition. This veteran fancier is not exhibiting now, but actually he is just as keen a dog lover today as he was some four decades ago, and he takes a great pride in the Aldon Airedale Kennels of his daughter, Mrs. Kenneth Marlatt, of Oakville, Ont. Mr. MacDonald is a respected Director of the Canadian National Exhibition.

I must mention the General Manager,

Mr. Elwood Hughes, particularly. Here is a man who keeps his fingers on the pulse of the whole concern all the time. I found him to be one of the most unassuming men I have ever met, and yet he impressed me as being one of the most efficient personages I had ever met.

Mr. S. Foster, the Director of Agriculture, has my sincere thanks for many courtesies extended in a manner that was almost invisible. To all those harnessed with the responsibility of the Canadian National Exhibition, I tender hearty congratulations on the wonderful manner this gigantic exhibition is carried through in its multivarious sections.

The Secretary of the Canadian Kennel Club, Mr. James D. Strachan, devoted lots of his valuable time to me. The several introductions to ladies and gentlemen, prominent in Canadian dogdom, made things rather pleasant for me, but there were innumerable instances in which Mr. Strachan was able to "make the stranger within the gates" feel happy and contented. Mentioning this matter of the Secretary's attention to several prominent fanciers, I gathered that he was a past master in this respect, and also that his intense interest in the Canadian Kennel Club had become almost proverbial. The keenness of his vision, the thoroughness of his labors, and the extent of his fairness, were attributes of Mr. Strachan's which were generously conceded.

But I must get back to the dog and the dog show, and of all the several breeds which came in front of me, perhaps I had my greatest pleasure when overhauling a marvellous entry of **Beagles**. Their number and quality was strikingly remarkable. If we had a similar entry at an English show, what a surprise it would create, and what a "gate" draw it would make. They were a nicely balanced, gay group of dogs indeed, and were outstandingly sound, with splendid bone, good feet and action. **Long Haired Dachshunde** were backed with a first rate entry. The leader was the high class, black and tan, "Ch. Rupert of Primrose Patch", typical in all the principal essentials. Some of the **Smooth Dachshunde** were more ragged in type, still I made the black and tan, "Brunhilde", stand out as being best. Her size, beautifully turned body and gayness were essentials that were hard to pass over lightly. I am treading on dangerous ground when I say that I could not become enthusiastic over the **American Foxhounds**, from a show point of view. I found them generally plain and very little uniformity of type. **English Setters** were a workmanlike lot. Gilroy's "Chief Topic" "carried too many guns" for the rest. A big, up-

standing dog, rare bone, beautiful head, balanced body properties. **Irish Setters**. After careful thought and overhaul, "Lammond Lassie" landed the red ribbon. Not a big one—but I am not at all struck with large Setters—smart head, good color and conformation, whilst her action was decidedly satisfactory.

Gordon Setters. I was sorry to find that the years had nearly knocked out this "good old has been", "Ch. Stylish Piper", but Anno Domini has almost laid his hand on this veteran, but on the other hand, this dog retains all the type which identifies the breed and in this respect he is still able to do educational work for those interested in this grand variety of gundog. **Springers** appear to have lost ground and several appeared to be erratic in respect to the standard. **Borzois** (Russian Wolfhounds), proved to be another competitive group that gave one food for thought. I found "Romanoff I Can" to be a dog of rare size, perfect coat, wonderful front, neck, shoulders and feet. Head just wants a little more length, but then, after all, one must consider all the other points as well. **Collies**. I expected to find a much sounder group here. "Ch. Trosach's Milady" winning in a convincing manner. **Newfoundlands** ran close on each other. "Ch. Waseeka's Sea Nymph" (black) was a treat to handle, and I dare venture to state that we have nothing on this side of the Atlantic to beat her. **Old English Sheepdogs**. Here the champion of the entire show "bobbed" up in "Ch. Mistress Fay of Pastoral", not too large, a grand body, dense jacket, perfect hocks, first-rate skull. This "bobtail" possesses the most desirable bearlike roll. **Alsations** (German Shepherd Dogs), came up capitally. Competition was exceedingly keen. However, a glorious black and tan bitch shone out in "Ch. Gai Cherie of Northmere", who was hard to beat anywhere. **St. Bernards** a disappointing entry of four. **Airedales**. I made "Warland Wishbone" Best. Sorty, attractive and sound, but a size larger would be all the better. **Fox Terriers** (Wire). Here my selection was "Annandale Miss Fox Trot", and it appeared to be a decidedly popular decision. Elegant style, ideal size, characteristic head and abundance of Terrier character. By this I do not mean that the "winning Miss" is exactly a "star turn", but she will always be able to beat more than will ever be able to beat her. **Manchester Terriers**. Here I found another pleasure. This breed is seldom seen in England now. They brought back to mind the old days when Manchesters were indeed Manchesters. I congratulate Mr. McLean on owning such a fine collection. **Irish Terriers**. My choice was "Ch. Newtownards Dare

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Devil", and he had the map of "Ould Ireland" stamped all over him. **Sealy-hams.** My congratulations to the owner of "Marine Brazen Son of a Gun" and "Marine Brazen Marina", on possessing such a good home-bred brace. I found my best Terrier in "Marine Brazen Son of a Gun". **Pekingese.** Most typical and sound was the parti-colored "Fu Fu Lily". This entry was quite numerous and on the whole, typical. The winner owns a smart body, good facial properties and a splendid movement. **Pomeranians.** I should imagine that the owner of the Champions "Melbourne Fascinator" and "Melbourne Supremacy", two brothers, but from different litters, would be proud of this brace, and of their sire, "Melbourne Supreme", who, I understand, is also a home-bred one.

In conclusion I take the liberty to use the columns of **Kennel and Bench** to thank all those who so generously backed me—a stranger—with their entries, and the splendid sportsmanship they displayed when accepting my decisions throughout the proceedings of the show.

PRESENTATIONS

At the last general meeting of the Toronto Ladies' Kennel Association, Mrs. E. Brown, Toronto, was made the recipient of a handsome English

hand-bag to mark the appreciation of the Association's membership for her untiring efforts in her capacity of show secretary. Much of the credit of the success of the Association's point shows is conceded to be due Mrs. Brown because of the quality and consistency of her labors. The success referred to being now in the shape of a comfortable bank balance.

Mrs. Brown made a suitable reply, and said that she felt that she had just done her share of the work, however, she was thankful for the beautiful and useful gift which she would no doubt find convenient at times.

It was rather a surprise to Mrs. M. Firman, Toronto, when, at the banquet featuring the Boston Terrier Club of Toronto Specialty show, held on Thanksgiving Day, she was asked to approach the head table at the request of the Club's President, Mr. H. Shaw.

Arriving at the Chairman's station, Mr. J. D. Strachan presented Mrs. Firman with a generously equipped week-

end travelling case on behalf of the members of the Club, who, being appreciative of Mrs. Firman's long and faithful services, ungrudgingly given over a period of years, had taken this opportunity to tender their thanks.

After the strains of "For She's a Jolly Good Fellow" had died down, Mrs. Firman declared that the services she had been able to give the Boston Terrier Club of Toronto had always given her much pleasure, and that she really did enjoy doing what she could in the interests of the dog game. "This gift is very lovely," said Mrs. Firman, and "I accept it with pleasure and sincere thanks."

CHAMPION COLLIES SOLD

We notice from a number of transfers received from the Records Office, that our Maritime director, Mr. A. V. Martin, has sold his "Int. Ch. Major Lukeo" and "Ch. Oakland Sensation," a daughter of "Ch. Major Lukeo" to James and Grace E. Christie, South Hanover, Mass.

For some time past there have been rumors around that Mr. Martin was receiving offers for this pair of Collies, and now we have the confirmation of the actual selling, however, there are a few good ones ready to make their debut no doubt as Mr. Martin is far too enthusiastic to slow up even.

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The Alberta News

THE Yuletide is fast approaching and the activities in dogdom have only a short time to run before the close of the year. As we look around our kennels and review our stock, can we satisfy ourselves that we are nearing the goal set before us? If we have accomplished these things, then our year's work, to produce a dog of standard requirements, has not been in vain. We produce much surplus stock, and specimens that are worthy representatives of their breed are really an asset to the fancy if placed amongst breeders looking for dogs of such breeding. **Kennel and Bench** is a good medium to help you to dispose of such stock, as it reaches the interested fancier over a large area.

Last year the Alberta fanciers contributed very loyally to the Christmas Number, let us again assist our Editor in making the 1935 Christmas Number the very best yet.

During the past few weeks much activity has taken place in the prairie provinces. The Field Trials have been held which have given much pleasure to those interested. How little we realize the magnitude to which these trials have developed. It is estimated that well over one thousand dogs were in training, being handled by about one hundred trainers.

The Alberta Field Trial Club held their annual fall event on Sept. 27th, 28th and 29th. The trials were run over the club's course at Stavelly.

Mr. Farrion, of Alabama, presided in the capacity of judge. Mr. Farrion was particularly impressed with the opportunity for bird dogs in this part of Canada, and expressed his admiration for these opportunities, as well as the manner in which the trials were handled. So well pleased was he with the amateur dogs, that he expressed the opinion that it would be to their advantage to continue seriously in training.

It was a pleasure as well as a means of immeasurable value to the club members to be able to avail themselves of Mr. Farrion's services, and his decisions as well as his timely advice which he was ready and willing to impart at all times, were much appreciated.

Ten braces of dogs competed in the All Age Stake event which opened the week. Birds were plentiful and ample opportunity was afforded every dog put down to show on five or six coveys during the half hour heats.

Mr. R. Christie's "Freckles Babe" proved the ultimate winner in this event. "Babe" showed splendid range,

her pace was well sustained and she handled her finds in a finished manner, being particularly sound in her bird work, that left little to be desired. "Taylor's Kay," a Setter, owned by Major A. C. Taylor, of Vancouver, ran second, showing plenty of range and speed, handled her birds well, but unfortunately made a false point. A Pointer, "Reisinger's Goldie," owned by Mr. Al. Reisinger, was third, did not show range or pace, but handled her birds in a finished style.

The Derby Stake had fourteen starters. This event proved very interesting to the large number of spectators that had gathered to witness the trials. So close was the running that six had to be brought in for the second series before a choice could be made. "Cushbawn Sally," a Pointer, owned by Dr. N. J. Gunn, of Calgary, did everything essential of a Derby Winner, she showed excellent pace and range, and never let up. In her second series she handled her bird in a masterful manner. Her win could not be disputed. Mr. C. A. Crist, of Calgary, ran second with "Cutey Joyeuse," who showed plenty of speed, range, and endurance, but did not handle some of her finds satisfactorily. "Gosswald Spunky," a Pointer, owned by Mr. W. Clemons, of Rockford, was third, not steady on her finds, needs time to finish.

The Shooting Event, "Stavelly Hill Ghost" won this event, having found, handled and retrieved in approved shooting dog style on four occasions. His owner, Mr. R. Brand, was well pleased with his dog's performance. Second was awarded to "Cutey Joyeuse," although only sixteen months old, and third to "Shorty," a Setter, owned by Mr. W. Bultis, of Baintree. This dog left little to be desired.

The puppies brought out a very promising lot. Although some were scarcely six months old they showed a keen desire for work. However, the older one captured the laurels, "Taylor's Acacia" winning first, 9 months, a real prospect. Mr. Frank Graham, of Tacoma, winning second with "Chetah," another Pointer. These two ran very close with very little to separate them. "Calgary Gold Dot," third, owned by Mr. H. C. Covey, showed much promise.

Championship event. On Sept. 29th an early start was made to avoid the heat that had prevailed during the two previous days. Ten of the best dogs ran in heats of 45 minutes. "Cushbawn Sally" and "Calodine," two Pointers, owned by Messrs. N. J. Gunn and Frank Graham, was the first brace down and they turned in a wonderful performance. Birds were found and handled in finished style on eighteen occasions, an accomplishment very

hard to beat. However, undaunted, Mr. Charlie Crist and Mr. Charlie Webster put down "Jackie Joyeuse," owned by Mr. A. H. Mayland and "Tinker Taylor," owned by Mr. Walker Taylor, of Okotoks. By this time "Jackie" had come into his own with his fast style of going, and captured the event. He found and handled his bird in a manner required of a real champion. "Calodine" was Reserve.

Mr. Farrion ran two of his dogs in an exhibition heat, "Ch. Dr. Blue Willing" and "Ch. Pelsh Sam." These dogs gave an hour's exhibition to the three hundred or more spectators that was a revelation and an object lesson in field work.

The Children's Hospital Aid Society has things well under way for its forthcoming show.

Mr. Ralph Smith, of Edmonton, reports a litter of promising Cocker puppies, whose sire is "Ch. Calma's Durbar," dam, "Wendy Mayhart." Three males, one female.

Mr. Burrows, of Medicine Hat, is very pleased with the yield from his Bostons, there being ten males and two females in the last two litters.

The Calma Kennels has just added to their kennels that grand parti-color Cocker, "Ch. Daybreak of Barrie."

Saskatchewan News

WITH the increasing interest being shown in bird dogs running at the field trials staged each year throughout the West, the future of our Pointers and Setters is assured, especially so now that the Hungarian partridge are so abundant practically everywhere. These fast-flying little gamebirds are quite numerous around Saskatoon, many of them nesting this year well within the city limits, evidently as a protection from hawks and crows so common in the open country. One nest which I located this year contained twenty-three eggs, while a later visit to this nest revealed that every egg had hatched.

Another line of sport in which dogs play the important part will surely become popular in the near future. I have in mind now the coursing dogs, Greyhounds, Whippets, etc. Watching dogs racing after an electric hare may pro-

vide thrills for thousands of people, but to one who has followed the coursing hounds when the object of the chase was a natural quarry, the former sport must be somewhat tame in comparison. Here on the prairies we have the fleet-footed jackrabbit which have been increasing in number for the last few years. Hunters seldom waste a shell on them, more being killed on the highways at night while racing along in the glare from the lights of speeding autos than by the hunter's gun. Coursing could be enjoyed to the full out here on the prairies, with very few bluffs of trees to obscure one's view. Followers would be able to view the chase from start to finish.

Speaking of jackrabbits recalls to my mind a rather amusing incident which happened in the spring of 1912. One Sunday morning four young Englishmen, one of whom was the writer, went for a walk across the prairie. Three of us had been in Canada for a whole year, long enough to realize that we were no match for the speedy jackrabbits of Canada's prairies, no matter how good runners we may have been in the Old Country. George, the other member of our party, had just arrived in Canada and we "old timers" thought it would be interesting to take him out and show him the old wallows and trails left by the buffalo that could still be seen just north of the city. We had barely left the last house behind us when up jumped a jackrabbit, almost at our feet. George never hesitated a moment but just grabbed his cap in his hand and raced after him. The rabbit didn't appear to be worrying very much as he cantered along in front of George for probably one hundred and fifty yards, and then he decided to show this green Englishman just how fast he could run. What a laugh we had at our friend when he returned, but George could not see where the laugh came in, and said quite seriously, "Had I been wearing my running shoes I bet five bob I would have caught him."

While on a visit to Winnipeg recently, Mrs. "Pat" Randall of Saskatoon, well known to fanciers of the West as a handler of sporting dogs, selected a young blue belton English Setter bitch, a granddaughter of "Int. Ch. Rackett's Rummy," from the kennels of Mr. and Mrs. Corson, her sire being "Dewain of Avandale," and her dam, "Nora of Arthurlie." "Pat" has been conditioning

and handling dogs successfully for a number of years for other breeders, and has now decided to start a kennel of her own. This may turn out to be a Mr. and Mrs. proposition, as Mr. Randall is very much interested in his wife's dogs. The writer had the pleasure of accompanying "Alec" on a little shoot this week. A young Setter bitch that he brought along did some good work among the partridges. She ran into difficulties in the early morning when the birds were out feeding and wide awake, but towards noon, when they were more settled and resting, she handled several coveys in fine style. Mr. and Mrs. Randall attended the recent field trials and had a most enjoyable time.

The writer received a very pleasant surprise one day last week upon answering the doorbell, to find Mr. Hugh Leslie of Rosetown with his hand outstretched to greet us. While in conversation with our visitor we found that Rosetown is still one of Saskatchewan's leading "doggy centres", with sporting dogs and Terriers leading in popularity. Chief among the former is Dr. J. T. Cooper's Springer, "Scotty K", who, under Hughie's able handling, has developed into a finished field performer, being a good retriever and steady under all conditions. Mr. Leslie has several Springers in his own kennel and reports some good sales, several blue roan puppies being sold recently to customers who were well pleased with their purchases.

Mr. G. A. Heatherington of Rosetown intends branching out in Irish Terriers and is at present on the lookout for a female to mate up with his "Newtonards Kelly". The H. M. H. Kennel of Chows, also of Rosetown, is doing a good business in the sale of puppies, quite a number of them being shipped to Alberta.

In last month's issue of **Kennel and Bench** we gave the opinions of three Saskatchewan fanciers on the question of size in present-day English Springers.

Having shot over Springers of all sizes, and watched them working under all conditions, such as are encountered out here in the West on land and water, the writer has come to the conclusion that size, within reason, has very little bearing on the ability of a dog of this variety to perform his or her work in the hunting field.

So many things, such as speed, determination, tractability, nose (and the

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ability to use it), enter into the make-up of a purely working Springer, that size is of a minor consideration. I have seen dogs make hard work of the task of retrieving a mallard duck of about three pounds weight, while others of the same size, with the right stuff in them, would make a clean pick-up of a jackrabbit weighing around eight pounds, and make their return at the gallop. Possibly under different conditions, such as those encountered at Fisher's Island, N.Y., and in certain parts of Great Britain where game has to be sprung from the tangled brambles and briars, a certain size or type of Springer may have the advantage.

So much for the working Springer and now for the show specimens on whom we depend to perpetuate and maintain the size, type, conformation, etc., so essential to the well being of our variety. Confining my remarks to observations made in Western Canada, it appears to me that while many good females have been produced out here in recent years, few really outstanding males have made their appearance. This I attribute to the fact that many stud dogs used in our breeding operations have barely met the requirements of the present American standard as to size, with the result many males have been produced that were more or less "bitchy" in appearance. On our experience we have found that a couple of inches or so over standard height, and say five pounds overweight, are good faults in a stud dog, providing of course that type, quality and breeding is not lacking. This being the case we feel judges are justified in handing out winning ribbons to males that are a bit on the big side, as measured by the American standard, providing, of course, such specimens are not placed over dogs of ideal size possessing the same degree of quality.

The English Springer clubs of Great Britain at the last revision of their standard, raised the height from eighteen to twenty inches, and the weight from forty-five to fifty pounds. While I do not consider any change is necessary or desirable in our American standard, I do feel that breeders should strive to produce Springers that meet the specifications of this standard in size, weight and balance, and so maintain those uniform characters that we all look for and admire in the English Springer of today.

The foregoing are my own personal opinions. No doubt there are many breeders who will disagree with me, and for this reason I would appreciate receiving letters expressing the opinions of Springer breeders throughout Canada on this subject, especially from those who have had more years of experience

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than I have, so that some may be published in *Kennel and Bench* for our mutual benefit.

A letter just received from Mr. B. J. Perry, Lurgan Kennels, Reg'd., Saskatoon, advises that he has just purchased, from the kennels of the late Mr. Malcolm McCraith of Vancouver, a nice smooth Fox Terrier bitch sired by "Ch. Nottingham Lamb," dam, "Ch. Valeford Nippy" (Imp.). Since arriving at her new home she has presented her owner with an exceptionally promising litter of four females and one male. These being sired by "Ch. Nottingham Aristocrat", he by "Ch. Summerhill Beau" (Imp.), dam, "Ch. Valeford Nippy" (Imp.).

I was sorry to hear of the loss through whelping of this fancier's good Irish Terrier bitch that went Winners and Best of Breed at the last Saskatoon show. However, another litter is expected shortly from the bitch that went Reserve Winners at the same show, while two six-months males are being retained with a view to campaigning them around the show circuit next spring.

We hope as many of our Saskatchewan breeders as possible will advertise their kennels in the Christmas issue of *Kennel and Bench* this year, and a memo. should be made of the fact that copy, photos, etc., should be in my hands by November 13th, at the latest.

Setter and Pointer enthusiasts are sure enjoying the spotlight these days. Word has just come to hand that a most successful trial was staged at Battleford on October 5 by the newly-formed North Saskatchewan Gun Dog Club. Weather conditions were ideal, birds plentiful, while a large crowd of spectators were on hand to watch the dogs

in action. First prize was awarded to "Pal", an English Setter owned and handled by Mr. T. Matthews, second to Dr. MacNeill's Pointer, "Glenbush Rabby", bred and handled by Mr. E. Howe; while third prize went to Mr. Howe's Pointer, "Glenask Peggy".

A splendid reproduction of a photograph taken at the above trials showing a brace of dogs on point, appeared on the sport page of the Saskatoon Star-Phoenix of October 12. On the same page was a notice to the effect that the first annual Saskatoon field trials will be held on Thanksgiving Day, October 24, with two events on the programme, the Derby and the All-Age Stake. Mr. J. Burkinshaw and Dr. Carlson are busy making the necessary arrangements. The writer has agreed to act as one of the judges, while the other has yet to be appointed.

I trust my readers will not think, after reading this page, that I am catering to the sporting breeds and neglecting the many other varieties as I wish it understood that our desire is to make this page generally interesting to all our readers. Terriers, Toys, working dogs, etc., will all receive their share of publicity, providing fanciers will send me news of the varieties in which they are most interested. In fact, the whole matter is in your hands—if you are interested, **show** your interest.

For all the rest of us unfortunates, parlor shows seem to be our sine qua non, no hall combining suitability of location, convenience and price being available to house a Canadian Kennel Club show; so unless we train our other fifty odd varieties of dogs to go "a rabbiting" we're just grandly out of luck.

McDerment, of Toronto, judged the Ladies' Kennel Club matinee show last month and it was most unfortunate this was not a Canadian Kennel Club fixture as his thorough and competent manner of judging gave a real value to his awards. and a Dachund each came in for a cup in well filled variety classes. A diminutive and very perfect Toy black and tan Terrier went best Toy; an imposing black Chow, Best Non-Sporting; a well known parti Cocker, Best Sporting; an excellent Blue Merle Collie, Best Working and a topping Wire-Haired Fox Terrier, Best in Show All Breeds. The little show proved an altogether pleasant gathering, the proceeds of which will provide Xmas baskets of delicacies for aged cripples.

Glad to hear from Mr. A. W. Hatcher, of Sherbrooke, who now possesses two champion Cocker Spaniels in his kennel. The well known "Ch. Middlesex Mercury" is as yet in his prime and siring puppies which are usually spoken for before leaving the nest as happened with a recent litter out of "Sherbrooke Lucky Style." The new champion is the beautiful parti-color female, "Queen of Hearts," home-bred and by "Middlesex Mercury" out of "Mistour Dream." Maritime News

ANOTHER good dog has completed his championship in the Maritimes and left for fields afar. The latest exportation was the newly crowned "Ch. Binks of Balcroft," bred by Treleaven and Hatcher, Toronto, and, until recently, owned by W. G. Smith of the Maritime Kennels. "Binks" has been sold to a "Wire" breeder in New Orleans, La., and his new owner reports his delight at the first sight of his new charge and states that he considers this smart little terrier to be a valuable addition to his kennels.

On October 3rd the Nova Scotia Kennel Club completed the 13th annual dog show to be held by that organization. This fixture benched more than 140 dogs in a three-day show which was ably judged by Mr. A. A. Rost, of New York, who did a real good job on all breeds. For the first time in the history of Maritime dog shows a Boston Terrier went to the top, and a home-bred one at that. The best in show winner, "Jean Whiz," was bred by Mrs. B. M. Frost, Saint John, N.B., and was sired by "Saint John Introduce Me," and out of "Saint John Jean Whiz." Though not yet a year old, this classy little Boston entered the ring with the deportment of a seasoned circuit goer and showed like a veteran. The ring-

side gave her plenty of support and encouragement from the moment of her first entrance until the final award of the President's Trophy for best of all breeds in show.

It is encouraging to see home-bred puppies topping all breeds and it is hoped that this will be only the beginning of many more such awards.

It appears probable that the lateness of the season, together with other inconveniences attending fall shows, will write finis to the three-day dog show, particularly in connection with the Nova Scotia Exhibition and plans for earlier shows of a different nature are being advanced and will likely receive the attention of the Club at the next meeting.

The possibility of the one day outdoor shows becoming more general is being considered and has been suggested for next summer in place of the less favorable three day fixture. Outdoor shows have gained general favor in Halifax and district and it is possible that the same might be introduced into New Brunswick. It is expected that the Nova Scotia Kennel Club will make a decided effort to hold at least one show of this nature during the coming year.

There is much to be said in favor of outdoor shows, from the standpoint of both exhibitors and spectators, and if the support afforded the two outdoor shows held by the Bedford Kennel Club is any criterion of their popularity, it is safe to suppose that the success of any future shows of this nature is well assured.

The Cocker Spaniel breeders benched a good entry at the N.S.K.C. show and both partis and solids were well represented. We were particularly pleased to have two visitors from the Province of Quebec, namely, "Thetford Jock 2nd," and "Thetford Peg Of My

Heart," both owned by Mr. J. T. McCallum, Thetford Mines, Que. These two Cockers made a good job of their trip east and took away with them the awards for Winners Bitch, Winners Dogs, Best of Winners and Best of Breed, against strong competition.

An exceptionally good young Newfoundland dog put in an appearance at the Halifax show and topped the classes to gain the award for Best of Breed. This one is "Westerland Captain," owned by Dr. F. F. T. Malcolm, Dartmouth. "Captain" was bred by Mr. S. G. Lapierre and was sired by "Ch. Westerland Monarch."

Mrs. Ora Doherty is back in the Bulldog game, having recently purchased a young brindle dog, "Nova Buckaroo," by "Roseville Buckaroo" ex "Restrict London Chiffon." 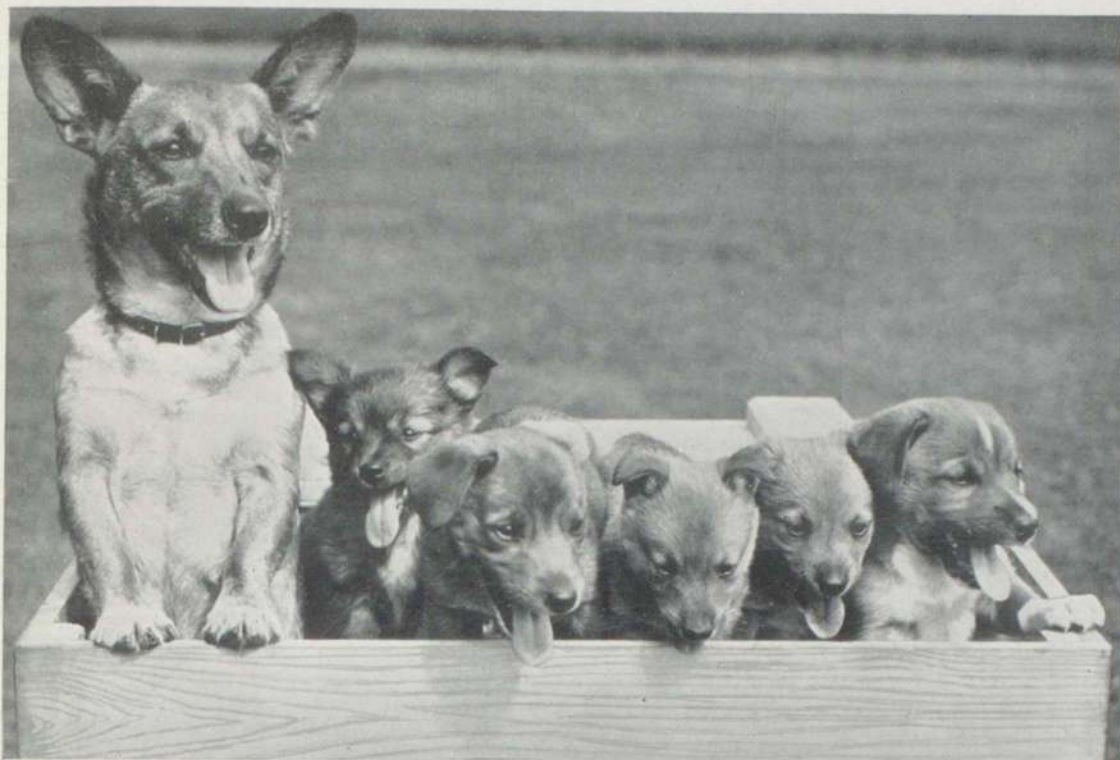
