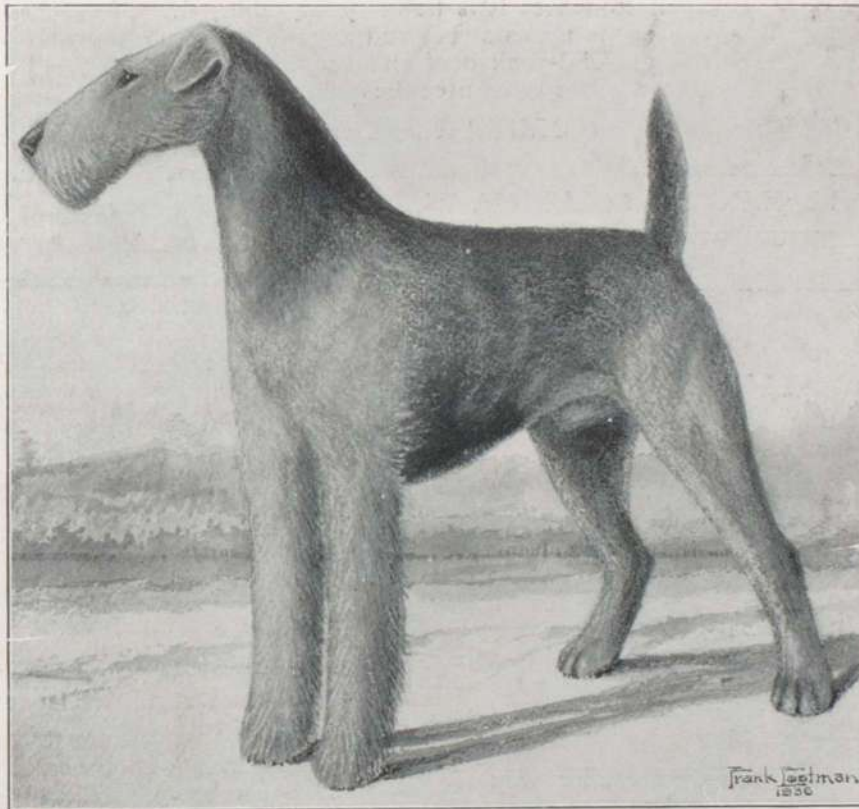

Meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Incorporated

THE regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club Inc., was held in the Board Room of the Club's Offices, 25 Melinda Street, Toronto, on Thursday evening March 19th, 1936, at 7.30 o'clock. The President, Col. J. N. MacRae, was in the Chair. Directors present included Reg. P. Sparkes, B. W. Essery, J. Eccles, F. W. Walkerdine and Capt. H. Dudley-Waters.

The President referred feelingly to the loss the Club sustained through the death of Brig. Gen. C. M. Nelles.

It was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That the Minutes of the Directors' Meeting held on Wednesday February 5th, be taken as read."

It was pointed out that Mr. Walkerdine's name had not appeared in the list of Officers attending the Directors' Meeting held on Friday, February 7th, and the Secretary was instructed to make the necessary correction.

It was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That the Minutes of the Directors' Meeting held on Friday, February 7th, be adopted as read."

A bound Minute book with the pages numbered in print was inspected, and it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That the new style Minute Book be adopted."

It was agreed that the Chartered Stenographer's Report of the Annual General Meeting as prepared be considered to be in the nature of a bound book.

It was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That the practice of sending copies of Minutes to all Directors be discontinued."

The Secretary read quotations for the printing of **Kennel and Bench** from June 1936 until and including May 1937.

It was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That the contract with Stone & Cox be renewed on the basis of their quotation."

The matter of the President's proposed visit to the members of the Canadian Kennel Club resident in Canada was considered and the President announced his intention to take the month of July for that purpose.

The President named Directors Sparkes, Essery and Walkerdine as a "Granting of Dog Show Dates Committee."

The Secretary reminded the Direc-

tors that it was the wish of Mr. Stockdale as expressed by him on Wednesday, February 5th, that a Committee be appointed to go into the matter of revision and familiarization of office duties, manner of recording and filing. After discussion no action was taken.

The matter of non-members being allowed to attend meetings called by Provincial Directors before coming to Toronto for the Annual General Meetings was considered, and it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That each and every Provincial Director be written to immediately and advised that any meetings they hold in the interests of the Canadian Kennel Club, none but members of the Canadian Kennel Club be allowed to attend."

The Chairman of the Kennel and Bench Improvement Committee (Mr. Sparkes) reported progress.

A letter from the Live Stock Records Office advised that Mr. F. Brockington, proprietor of the Royal Kennels, Napierville, P.Q., had been fined \$100.00 on one count, and had been given suspended sentence on several other counts for contravention of the Live Stock Pedigree Act.

The Secretary reported that he had no reports to make on matters referred to the Alberta Provincial Committee, and that a complaint made by Mr. W. Jeffrey had been referred to the Quebec Provincial Committee.

A letter was read from Mr. F. Blackledge, Toronto, and it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That the matter be laid on the table."

Notes From Old Quebec

I T give me great pleasure to announce, at last, that a Canadian Kennel Club Show is in the offing. Mrs. Enright, President of the Ladies Kennel Club of Canada, has just informed me the Club has applied for their date—September 26th—which should be a most excellent time. August was found to be unsatisfactory—as it meant sandwiching it in between other shows, also a great many people are still away in the country in August. Mrs. Enright hopes to find new quarters for the show, but if such can't be found, why, they will fall back on the old Coliseum building in Guy St. again. It is to be hoped that breeders will support this fixture in every way possible. The Ladies Kennel Club has always tried to better the dog game, and all through the depression the Club has ridden many a stormy sea, and stayed right on top. Let us hope this is the beginning of a new era of Canadian Kennel Club Shows. In this province we need them to educate people to take an interest in pure-bred dogs, breeders gain their championship points and dog shows stimulate the selling of good stock at correct prices. I have been requested to write something about prices. At present prices here are simply ridiculous, and dogs are selling for from five to ten dollars and from pedigree stock. Why any breeder should want to waste his time and his money to get such small returns is hard to understand—when an article sinks to that price level it becomes a "pot boiler"—also it is most injurious to the game in general. A puppy must bring twenty-five or over to justify its being in this world and if it comes from a fashionable breed—where stud fees are high—fifty dollars at least, is the lowest a puppy should be sold for, because it must be remembered that the good sales must make up for the losses which are bound to happen in any kennel. Last year I wrote an article in one of our Montreal Magazine's on the subject of "Buying a Puppy" and I strongly emphasized the necessity of going to a good, honest, reliable breeder, and also paying an honest price for an honest puppy, and for all breeders' sakes I do hope that this advice was widely read, and inwardly digested. Some times I think a breeders' union would be a good thing, and prices could be regulated, and the "pot boiler" crowded out. Anyway to make the game worth while prices must be raised, for at the present rate nobody can afford to better his stock and im-

port new blood on what puppies are selling for.

The Montreal Kennel Association held its annual meeting on March the 4th and the following officers were elected: President, Dr. A. A. Etienne; Vice-President, Recorder J. A. Thouin; Directors, R. A. (Bob) Ross, H. E. Whitley, W. W. Rooney; Secretary, Miss MacMahon; Treasurer, S. T. Doyle. There has sprung into being lately a new Boston Terrier Club and a new Bull Terrier Club—more about these later. On April the 2nd the M.K.A. are putting on a matinee show to raise funds for a Canadian Kennel Club Show a little later on. This is also a club that has weathered many storms and kept on going. Let us hope it will be a financial success, so that they may go ahead with their original idea.

CANADIAN JUDGES FOR AMERICAN SHOWS

We notice with much interest that our Canadian judges are being invited by clubs in the United States to come over and help out with the judging chores. Of course, we have always enjoyed this confidence and have reciprocated frequently, but the invitations as far as we are concerned seem to be increasing.

At New York—Westminster Kennel Club, Mr. Justice McFarland, Toronto, and Mr. W. O. Roy, Montreal, filled very important judging appointments in the Bull Terrier and Collie departments respectively. At Buffalo, Mrs. M. Firman, Toronto, Mr. Randall Perry, Islington, Ont., and the writer were entrusted with the Boston Terrier, German Shepherd and Collie entries in that order.

On February 23rd, Mr. V. G. Perry, London, Ont., judged Boston Terriers at Chicago, at the Western Boston Terrier Club Specialty.

March 27-29 Mr. W. H. Reeves, Belleville, Ont., will judge all Toys, Bostons and Bulldogs at the Mississippi Valley Kennel Club Show, and on April 3, 4 and 5 he will take on the largest judging consignment at Chicago Kennel Club Show.

On April 11th and 12th, Mr. Reg. P. Sparkes, Toronto, will judge French Bulldogs and English Bulldogs at Detroit Kennel Club Show, and at the same fixture Mrs. E. Brown, Toronto, will judge the Schipperke classes.

May 16th, Mr. Sparkes will judge French Bulldogs and English Bulldogs at the Ladies' Kennel Association of America Show at Mineola, L.I., and, of course, Mr. Sparkes functioned in the capacity of judge at the Pekin Palace Specialty Show on Saturday, March 21st.

May 23rd brings the Morris & Essex Kennel Club to the front, and here our President, Col. J. N. MacRae, Galt, Ont., will take care of the German Shepherd section of the show, a most important assignment. Our Quebec Director, Robert A. Ross, Montreal, will judge Collies and Bedlington Terriers, whilst Mr. W. H. Reeves will be entrusted with the Sealyham Terrier and Kerry Blue Terrier sections of this important summer show.

Here and There in British Columbia

HERE we are at the beginning of the spring season and several kennel clubs are now making all preparations for their usual annual bench shows.

I am very sorry to hear that there seems to be no signs of the combined kennel club's Jubilee Show becoming assured, and why this is so I cannot understand. However, why the Jubilee Committee should refuse to get behind a show of this kind, and at a time like this, is more than I and many others care to discuss, particularly when you know that the City of Vancouver collected some seventeen thousand dollars from individual and kennel licenses in 1935.

I am very much of the opinion that it is because there are too many kennel clubs in operation here in Vancouver and vicinity, and this being so, the powers that control the finances are of the opinion that if they give any financial support to any one show, they would in all probability be expected to do the same for them all. However, it is not yet too late to make another effort to put over this Jubilee event with an outside judge, and one who has never been here in Vancouver before, so let's go to it.

I happened to be in Steveston on Tuesday, March 3rd, and being quite near the Imperial Canning plant, I decided to go and see the new Pet Brand Dog food being made. I can assure you that it was quite an interesting sight to see all the operations that are necessary to produce this new product. The girl employees were all wearing white uniforms and white gloves even at the large vats where we saw the vegetables being washed in scalding water before using, and from there we went to the meat cutting department, where I was very much interested in the grade and quality of meat being used in this dog food. Perhaps both Mr. Philips and Mr. Furness thought that I was too much interested in the whole method of production, however I went out to see what was what and decided to let nothing get past me that would not seem O.K. May I say that every particle of the meat being used in this product is strictly cow meat and really fit for human consumption. I saw it cut up and put into the cooker, and the same with the vegetables and other ingredients, then I saw it after being cooked and the cans being filled and sealed. After which they are again

placed in the ovens or retort for another hour of cooking, I think there are around one hundred and ten cans on each tray and as they leave the ovens they are given a complete submerging in a trough of scalding water to wash away any grease that may have been left on the cans; they are then ready to be labeled after cooking.

I was very fortunate in being there just in time to see the finish of the day's work, and believe me if you could have seen the final operation you would have commented upon it. All tables, carriers or trays used during the preparation of this new dog food are all washed down with scalding water from a two-inch hose held by one of the employees, and all residue is carefully cleaned away so that everything is left in a very clean condition for the next day's operations. As Mr. Philips remarked to me, this food is made up to quality and not down to a price. Here's hoping it is kept so, and may I take this opportunity of expressing to Mr. Philips and Mr. Furness of the British Columbia Packers, Ltd., my sincere thanks for their very courteous reception.

And now may I say to our members in British Columbia that in regards to the publishing of Parlor Show reports in **"Kennel and Bench,"** the Editor is of the opinion that they are not news of general reader interest, and so you will now understand that your correspondent is not at fault when these reports do not appear for they have been sent in with other news and apparently blue pencilled. I am in the hopes that the committee of improvement on **"Kennel and Bench"** will have a definite policy laid out for the various correspondents to be guided by in the near future. So interested am I in this decision that I shall welcome the opinions of any of our members on the subject of publishing any, or all parlor show news, for after all the magazine is the property of the Canadian Kennel Club members, and so to you all I say that if you are interested in the future of your magazine, let me have your opinions on the subject of Parlor Show reports, as to, should they, in your opinion be printed in full, or should they not be printed at all.

Working Dog News—I am informed that there is considerable activity at the Bannockburn Collie Kennels of Mr. and Mrs. W. Mounfield, where there is a newcomer in the Collie circles by the name of "Old Faithfull," she being a daughter of "Ch. Lodestone Landed," and she will present her new owners with a litter within a short time. I am also informed that "Bannockburn Vicky," who was placed Best

of All Breeds at the recent Cocker Spaniel Club Show, is now nursing a healthy litter of sable and whites, 4 males and 2 females and all doing well.

There is considerable Collie interest just at present which leads me to believe that the entry for the forthcoming bench shows will be considerably strengthened in this breed.

Terrier News—The well known Conwood Kennels of Vancouver Island inform me of the success of "Conwood Puck" at the recent Golden Gate Kennel Club Show in San Francisco, where he was awarded Winners in dogs and "Conwood Michael" was placed reserve to him. There were twenty Cairn entries I am informed, and I understand that the success of the Conwood stock has already brought an order from another American Cairn Fancier, and so congratulations to you, Conwood Kennels, on your wonderful wins.

The Wildwood Kennels situated on the North Road at Burquitlan, report a nice litter of West Highland White Terriers from "Cragstone Stonechat," sired by "Bobby of Rushmore," and I understand that the Cairn Terrier, "Wildwood Isabella" is nursing a litter sired by "Wildwood Sahib."

It is my privilege to announce this month the arrival at the Bonshaw Kennels of a newly imported Cairn Terrier by name, "Dochfour Dervaig," female, red brindle in color, sired by the well known Cairn Terrier, "Dochfour Jock Buie," whose sire was the great producer, "Ch. Dochfour Ean," Jock Buie's dam being "Cairny Belle." "Dochfour Dervaig" is out of "Dunwich Dell," who is by "Shinnel Bronze," out of "Shinnel Ruth." These kennels were again in the limelight at the Boston Show, when I understand "Rockhaven Moonshine" was awarded Best of Breed in an entry of fifteen of the Golden Retriever breed. Well done, "Rockhaven."

I have received a very interesting



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letter from Mr. R. S. Sears of Kamloops, B.C., in which he informs me that he has never heard any news of the Springer Spaniel female who was unfortunately lost somewhere last fall, and to our British Columbia fanciers may I say she is black, white and tan in markings and answers to the name of "Baby," so if there is a stranger in your vicinity at some future time in the Springer Spaniel breed, you may be the fortunate fancier to spot this lost animal and earn the everlasting gratitude of a brother fancier. Mr. Sears also informs me that they are expecting two litters of Springers very soon out of the following dams, "Marceline of Avondale" and "Little Fawn of Burnside." I understand both females were mated to "Brake of Avondale," who is by "Ch. Lammond's Mike," out of "Lady of Teviotdale."

Shiplake Suggestion," out of the dam "Patsy of Salem," and rumor has it that he is a pretty fair specimen.

IN this our first bona fide effort to contribute to the doggy news from this province, we first wish to take this opportunity to extend to all fanciers in Alberta our sincere greetings, and to remind you that our address is 9617-101st Street, Edmonton.

It is our wish also to explain that notwithstanding the fact that our good friend, Mr. W. G. Climo, very kindly forwarded a few items last month under our name, we did not understand that our appointment was confirmed until too late to notify the fanciers in other parts of the province.

So that this month's number will essentially have an Edmonton tinge, we hope that it will have the effect of creating sufficient resentment in other parts to bring us a flood of mail in time for the next issue. Because, as our fellow correspondent for Saskatchewan wrote last month, "It is not our wish to cater to any particular section of the province or to any breed or group."

We have, however, received at least a few notes from outside and on the principal of first come, first served, we report as follows:

H. P. Saunders, Calgary, reports a very promising litter of nine Springer Spaniels, sired by "Ch. In addition to his Springers and Setters, Mr. Saunders is a very ardent Cocker fancier, and among others at present in his kennels are two youngsters, one a red, the other black, and it is expected that more will be heard of this pair in particular in the near future.

The feature event of the present month was of course the show held on Friday and Saturday, March 6th and 7th, under the auspices of the Junior Hospital League of Edmonton.

This was the third annual show conducted by this organization and was again staged on the fifth and sixth

floors of the Hudson's Bay Company Store at 103rd Street and Jasper Avenue by kind permission of the manager, Mr. J. K. Hill.

What these young ladies have accomplished in two years in the way of becoming a self-contained show-giving club is really a revelation in efficiency, so congratulations are due to the convener, Miss Willa Sandison and every member of the Junior Hospital League, and also to superintendent, Mr. R. A. Cross and his staff, to the ring steward and general master of ceremonies, Mr. W. D. Gardner, as well as to Judge, Mr. Frank A. Walsh, for their part in the promotion of this event.

It is perhaps superfluous to repeat that the entire proceeds from these shows are devoted to charities. The object at present is to support a hydrotherapy pool for treatment of infantile paralysis.

We feel sure that Mr. J. S. Cowper, feature writer for the Edmonton Bulletin will pardon us under the circumstances if we cull from his column. Mr. Cowper says: "That was a happy inspiration of the Junior Hospital League when they promoted the Dog Show in the Hudson's Bay Store on Friday and Saturday of last week in aid of the fund for Cripple Children. I suppose there's no affinity on earth deeper and more understanding than that between a crippled youngster and his dog. The aristocrats of the kennel, if they knew—and I think they know a good deal more than we guess—must have felt proud of helping in the good work for the kiddies."

I remember of hearing a beautiful story of a little boy's love for his dog, "Paddy." Alas, one morning "Paddy" came to an untimely end under the wheels of an auto. A family council was held, and it was decided to break the terrible news that poor "Paddy" had been run over and killed. To the mother's relief the little chap took it bravely, like a man. Later in the afternoon, loud cries were heard, "Paddy's dead; 'Paddy's' dead; what will I do?" The little chap's anguish at his loss was terrible to behold. Comforting her son, the mother said, "But I told you this morning, dear, that poor 'Paddy' had been run over and killed." Overcoming his anguish for a moment he blurted out I didn't understand, I thought you said "Daddy."

While only able to give the show a very small portion of the time that we had intended, our general report must be limited.

It must be admitted that, as was to be expected after such a winter, the entry was slightly below that of other years. In quality, however, the comparison was much more favorable.

As was also reasonable to expect

the decrease in the entry was largely in the Terrier classes, as any one at all familiar with the requirements in preparing Terriers for the bench will know what it meant in such a season, and with those kenneled outside it simply could not be done.

Much credit for this part of the entry being as good as it was is due to the old firm of Caswell and Quilley. They worked hard and were in evidence at all times, and after seeing the part they play one is left to wonder just what a show would be without "Joe and Billy."

Another combination also deserving of mention are Messrs. J. H. Tanton and R. E. Smith. While both are breeders of the merry little Cocker, and, perhaps give their next choice to the rest of the sporting group, they are always ready to boost any breed and never overlook a bet that will help a show. And while Mr. Tanton is quite an old timer in the fancy, Mr. Smith is comparatively a new comer, and one of the all too few who are "following through."

In this connection one cannot help thinking of the advice so often heard re encouraging the novice, but in this regard just who is the novice? It has always been the writer's experience that it is not so very difficult to get the beginner to show for the first time, but after they have shown a few times and become aware of the petty bickerings and jealousies they just fold up and call it a day.

Among others who were glad to see return as an exhibitor was Dr. W. A. Wilson. The doctor, always a true sportsman and a field trial enthusiast; also shows that he does not overlook a good Retriever as he benched both a Labrador and a Golden.

It seemed strange indeed to see the veteran president of the Edmonton Dog Fanciers' Club in the role of a private spectator. Well, we admit you have earned a holiday, Harry, but don't let it become a habit. A few that we happened to notice as outside exhibitors were Messrs. W. Burrows from Medicine Hat; S. C. Bear, Millet; A. Cusson, Winnipeg; T. E. Thomas, and of course our Provincial Director, "Genial George" Climo, from Calgary. We cannot help but think that some keen observers of dog show awards who were not in attendance at these events may wonder at what would appear to be a complete reversal of decision by Judge F. A. Walsh, and more particularly as it concerns the dog that was awarded best in show. This dog, the Wire Fox Terrier, "Eastbourne Mary," owned by Mrs. M. D. Gardner, being placed below her kennel mate, the Sealyham, "Hollybourne Sally," when the latter topped the Terrier

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group under Mr. Walsh at Winnipeg, just two weeks before. When it is known, however, that "Sally" paid a return visit to the Hollybourne Kennels, where she was mated on January 18 to "Ch. Elmwood All Serene," and as she is now nearing her maternal duties, two weeks make a very noticeable difference in her condition.

This, together with the fact that "Eastbourne Mary" was still a junior puppy, and fast developing, make the change of decision a very justifiable one. Incidentally we learn that arrangements have been made to have "Eastbourne Mary" travel to New York, where she will visit "Ch. Lone Eagle of Earls Moor," owned by Dr. Samuel Millbank. As "Mary" is sired by Dr. Boulding's "Ch. Talavera Symington" (imp.), and her dam, the much lamented "Talaurora Belle," also from Dr. Boulding's Kennels, it looks as if the "Lady of Felbourne" is really set to go places in the Terrier world.

We think it only right, however, to add a word of appreciation for R. A. Cross, who was largely responsible for the condition in which these dogs were put down. "Bob" is a real student of Terriers, and while his trimming is complete it has a naturalness which is in pleasing contrast to that which is too often seen.

Another feature in connection with the Junior League Show was the parading in the ring on the last evening of Mr. and Mrs. H. V. Clutton's Labrador bitch, "Ch. Grand Duchess Victor," she having just returned the same day from the east where she placed second in open bitches at New York and reserve winners at Buffalo. The writer at the same time led into the ring the Chesapeake dog, "American Champion Chesacraft Newt," this dog had also just arrived that afternoon, being loaned to the Airline Kennels by the dynamic young president of the American Chesapeake Club, Mr. Anthony A. Bliss. "Newt" besides being an American bench champion has a very impressive field trial record as well as the distinction of being the sire of the three first place winners in the last puppy stake held at East Islip, Long Island, N.Y. Both these dogs were distinctly travel weary and in no condition to show at their best, and might we be pardoned for mentioning that the Airline-bred bitch, Canadian and American Champion "Airline Theresa," now the property of Mr. Bliss, was again awarded best of breed at New York for the second successive year.

We are here reminded of another Canadian dog that has been making

his mark on the American side. Mr. and Mrs. M. B. McColl reporting the sale of their good Springer, "Ch. Belmoss Count" to a partnership of American fanciers. "Count" has been campaigning the shows on the other side of the line in the care of the well-known handler, Jimmie Sullivan, of Chicago, who, we understand, arranged the sale.

Let us once more extend to all fanciers an earnest request to send in your notes and so help to keep Alberta to the front.

NOTED DANDIE DINMONT FANCIER PASSES

Thanks to a British Columbia fancier we are able to record the death of Dr. Herbert B. Maxwell, a one-time resident of Vancouver, who made many fast friends in that Western city.

"A lifelong lover of the Dandie Dinmont and a regular visitor to our shows has just passed away in the person of Dr. Herbert B. Maxwell; he died last week, after an illness of only a few days. Dr. Maxwell was the eldest son of the owner of Broomholm, in Dumfriesshire, but he was so keen on his profession that he felt that the life of a country gentleman was not for him. After practising medicine in this country he went to Vancouver, B.C., where he was a leading practitioner for some years, and until he joined the army at the outbreak of the war and returned to England. He was a lifelong friend of Mrs. Simpson Shaw and her family, and when he went to Vancouver he took out with him an Alpin bitch of the small, old type, which he particularly loved. I believe he sold a brace from that bitch's first litter to the Hon. Mrs. McDonnell. Dr. Maxwell's professional work, to which he devoted his life, prevented him from having a big kennel as he would have liked, and becoming a regular exhibitor, but he attended practically every show at which Dandies were classified. To his wife and their three sons I respectfully tender the Dandie fancy's sincerest sympathy on the passing of one of the breed's sincerest lovers."

The dog world, as well as the medical profession, have lost two supporters and fanciers this winter. Dr. L. T. Dunlop, whose death occurred last month, could always be found at our shows with an Irish Terrier. The other, Dr. E. J. Ryan, as Boston Terrier fancier, and though he seldom frequented our shows, always had one or more of these terriers.

All Maritimers join me in offering condolences to the bereaved families.

Our new director reports that Eastern Canada may be paid a visit from one of the heads of Canada's Dog World in the person of Col J. N. MacRae, M.C., President of the Canadian Kennel Club, who hopes to make a trip to the Maritimes this summer, probably towards the end of July.

The other day a young lady asked me how much exercise she should give

her dog. Many dogs suffer from lack of exercise. From the diminutive toy to the huge St. Bernard, daily exercise constitutes an indispensable factor towards health. Some people exercise their dogs with strict regularity, others do so in an intermittent manner, and the animal suffers. Age and condition plus the duties the animal is required to perform, should be considered; but as a rule house dogs should be given two miles per day, and sporting dogs five miles. It is not exercise to turn them out in the morning for an hour left to their own resources. Where an open space is available a good deal can be done by throwing a ball for them to retrieve.

Every dog, and more especially the long haired breeds, should be groomed daily with a good brush. If this attention is given a dog, along with the proper exercise he will more than show the care of his keeping.

Now we will have the Nova Scotia doings from Mr. Burns.

The willingness of the Halifax Finance Committee to accede to the request of the local branch of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to pay the Society \$1,500 annually for special services, which would have cost the city about \$4,000 annually to carry on as a separate service, will have a gratifying effect on all dog lovers in the province.

It has been stated that the S.P.C. has decided to discontinue carrying on these special services in the event of lack of co-operation from the civic officials. The Field Secretary stated that the Society paid for the use of the gas box, disposed of the carcasses and kept a man and a car on duty at all hours. The Society's request was not for a donation but for "adequate recompense for work done, extra and beyond its regular work", which has been carried on by the Society for the past several years. An estimate of the cost to the city to do this work itself totalled \$4,486 per annum for the special services alone, with the costs of food, gas box and pound extra items.

We hear the report of the arrival at the port of Halifax of two Bulldogs from the famous Basford Kennels of Mr. Ernest Roddy, England. We are given to understand that these two good dogs were imported by a breeder in another province and it is quite likely that we will hear more about them in the near future.

The number of Bulldog entries at the local shows has decreased considerably during the past few years and the writer remembers back eight years, to the summer of 1928, when the Nova Scotia Kennel Club benched twenty of this noble breed, one of which gained

the award for best of all breeds in the show, this one being Mr. Reg. P. Sparkes', "Kippax Jock", who celebrated his arrival in Canada in no uncertain manner and going from here to other and larger shows, soon gained his Canadian Championship. There are still a number of Bulldog lovers in Nova Scotia and the apparent depression in the fancy of this old breed is difficult to understand.

Mr. W. W. Flett, local Boston Terrier fancier, recently purchased a beautiful young bitch, bred by Mrs. B. M. Frost, of Saint John, and known as "Saint John I Wonder". This is a dark mahogany brindle with correct markings and a wonderful coat, good size, nice body, head and quarters. A brief glance at her pedigree showed me the names of "Ch. Rockabye Dempsey", "Am. Ch. Introduce Me" and "Am. Ch. My Rockabye Baby". Mr. Flett is very well pleased with his new purchase and is justified in having high hope for the future of this smart little bitch.

Mr. Henry McLeod reports the sale of an Irish Setter puppy sired by the imported dog, "Dash of Banside" and out of "Mac's Nora". This puppy went to Mr. H. Smith, Digby, N.S.

A resident of Halifax was recently arrested and charged with the offence of shooting an Irish Terrier, the property of another local resident. The accused pleaded self defence, but the owner of the Terrier brought about fifteen witnesses to prove that the dog was exceedingly good natured and a friendly pet. The Magistrate gave his decision in favor of the plaintiff and awarded him the sum of \$40.00 and costs. This offence was committed at Grand Lake during the hunting season and it is probable that the dog was mistaken for a wild animal. However, whatever the reason for the shooting,

the fact still remains that there are entirely too many valuable dogs being shot and poisoned in this Province, many of which we do not hear about. It is gratifying, therefore, to note that this case has had an airing in court and that the Magistrate's decision favored the dog owner as this decision will probably aid in putting an end to the ruthless slaying of other people's pets.

Another new Wire-Haired Fox Terrier has just arrived in Halifax, consigned to Mr. W. G. Smith, dean of the Wire breeders in the Maritimes. The new arrival, "Burlington Bondman", was bred by Mr. Robert McAdam of Toronto and is a good one. This dog is not yet 2 years old and is, I understand, as yet unshown. He was sired by the famous "Ch. Gallant Fox of Wildoaks" and his dam is "Dogberry Myra Bella". I have seen "Bondman" and believe that he is the best Wire that has come east in many years. Nice size, splendid coat, head, ears and expression, a beautiful body, good feet and legs and a nice mover, well coupled and good both front and rear. He is a showy little dog of attractive appearance and one that should do well both as a stud and show dog. I understand that he has already proved his value as a stud force and hope to see some of the Maritime breeders take advantage of this opportunity to improve their stock as he possesses some of the qualities lacking in many of our eastern Wires.

At a recent meeting of the Bedford Kennel Club it was decided to hold a point show on Dominion Day, July 1st. This affair will be held on the Francklyn Park grounds in Halifax and will be an outdoor show with the provision of the use of a suitable building on the grounds, in the event of inclement weather. The judge for this fixture

has not yet been named, but I understand that the Club is negotiating with a well-known and popular all-rounder to do the honors and I know that their choice will be a good one. Considering the number of new, and good, dogs now kenneled in and near Halifax, together with the promising young stock whelped here during the past year, it is generally expected that the coming Bedford Club show will meet with much success.

Halifax welcomes a new resident in the person of Mr. C. C. Sullivan, formerly of Saint John, N.B. Mr. Sullivan, who was recently transferred to this city, is well and very favorably known in the fancy, having had many years experience as a breeder, exhibitor and judge of all breeds and can be classed as one of the veterans of the game. During his years of association with affairs canine he has shown and bred breeds but now specializes in Sporting Dogs, with English Setters as his top choice. Mr. Sullivan holds a responsible position in the shipping world and we welcome this gentleman as a new citizen of Halifax and sincerely hope that his stay in our city will be a very lengthy one.

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THE St. Agnes Guild of the Children's Hospital, Winnipeg, benefited to the extent of \$1,055.00 from the Greater Winnipeg Kennel Club Show held through the courtesy of the Hudson Bay Company in the fourth floor Auditorium of their Winnipeg store.

The show, held February 21st and 22nd, was easily the best patronized ever held in the West, the location being an ideal one, record gates being taken on both days. The general layout of benching, etc., could not have been better, and the discarding of straw bedding in favor of a special paper, was a decided improvement, giving the show-room an enhanced and clean appearance, a credit to the show committee. The teamwork of the Ladies Auxiliary of the Club, arrayed in their attractive green smocks, was an outstanding feature. The secretary, Mr. T. A. Smith, and his able assistant, Mrs. "Bobby" Jopling, had everything on the table in great style, and both lived up to their reputations as expert handlers of their office.

Reviving the Boston Terrier Club:

The Boston Terrier Club of Western Canada, which was organized over twenty years ago, was a thriving club for many years, having members throughout the entire West. Of recent years they deemed it advisable to affiliate themselves with the All Terrier Club of Canada, which was very active at that time, and in 1933, when the Greater Winnipeg Kennel Club was formed, both these clubs affiliated with

them, but each club retained its own identity, carrying on in this way until January of this year, when a meeting was held of the members and it was decided to revert back to a Specialty Club, and asked release from the affiliation, which was granted. Officers were then elected as follows:

President, Mr. R. P. Biller; Vice-Pres., Mr. Allan Millward; Sec'y-Treas. Mrs. J. F. Kerr; Executive, Messrs. George Duncan, W. J. Harley, J. F. Kerr. The Club will offer their list of Specials at all Western Shows, when the "three members competing", will be the control rule. That the ranks of the Scottish Terriers are being swelled is evident by the prospects asking for show specimens, which we heard at a recent show, also the talk of forming a Scottish Terrier Club. I think that is a good idea, and I submit this is the time for Scotty fanciers to get together and form a club in the interests of this breed, which has become so popular in the West. Think it over Manitobans, and "raise your standard" here, as was done in Scotland nearly fifty-five years ago, by a few enthusiasts.

After a talk with some Collie fanciers I am tempted to ask what has become of the Collie Club which functioned here some years ago. As I have suggested to the Scotty fanciers, I repeat to the Collie breeders, get together in the proper spirit and cater for your own breed. Boost them back to their former high point of popularity on the Show Bench. Now—All together Boys. The game is only as good as you make it.

"Crufts": The descriptive account in the Hamilton (N.B.) Advertiser by Philokun in his "Tailwagger Chats", on the popularity of dog shows, was specially interesting to the writer, bringing back memories of the first great show by "Crufts" held in London. Showing the great strides made over the half century mark. I recall the departure from Glasgow of a few fanciers, London bound with their exhibits in the Jubilee year 1887. Among the travellers were Willie McKinley with his Toy Black and Tan, "Jubilee Wonder", a six pound dog, tucked away in a "tile hat" box. Willie sold him for £50 to an English client. Barney Duffy with his great Clydesdale Terrier, "Nelson", conceded by many to be the best product of this period, and one the writer made special note of when reading his article on the Clydesdale before the Glasgow and District Canine Club in 1904.

Scotties Old and New: I note with

interest the steep price recorded in **Kennel and Bench** for the "Ch. Heather Realization", property of R. Chapman, Glenboig, Scotland, exactly twenty times the price paid for "Dundee", fifty years ago, then the "wonder dog", owned by Captain MacKie and John D. McColl. They exhibited at the second annual show of the Scottish Kennel Club, held in Glasgow, their exhibit was "Dundee", "Dunkeld", "Glen Gretna" and "Glen Gogo", all of whom I saw at that event. The two dogs were sold to Mr. H. J. Ludlow, and were shown by him as "Tuath Dundee" and "Tuath Dunkeld". £100 each was the price recorded paid for them. Captain MacKie was the skipper of the "Vandura", a pleasure yacht belonging to the Coats family of Paisley, and one well known on the Clyde and Lochs of Scotland. John McColl was an auctioneer by profession. Regarding "Dundee", I note with surprise, that Robert Leighton in his book gives "Rambler" as his sire. This is an error, his sire was "Dunotter" by "Dunolly" ex "Calleach"; his dam, "Glenorchy" by "Bodeach" ex "Callach". In the obituary article when Captain MacKie passed on, mention was made of the grand dam of "Dundee" and her prowess among the foxes. This article was written by Mr. J. B. Smith, who afterwards became a contributor to "Our Dogs". He used the pen name St. Mungo. Mr. Smith was a life long friend of the writer.

Irish Terrier Doings: Mr. H. L. Dargie, of Winnipeg, Irish Terrier Breeder, who has in the past imported quite a few specimens from the British Isles, is now bringing out from the Emerald Isle a real one with the "Mourne" prefix, from the kennels of Mr. J. Brown, Strabane, Ireland. It is expected here by the end of the month, so until then we will live in expectation.

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TYPES IN CAIRN TERRIERS

The Scottish judge, Mr. J. W. H. Beynon, writing in "The Dog World" under the caption, "Stop this diversity of type in the Cairn Terrier", says in part: "Not long ago I watched a famous all-rounder judging Cairn Terriers. It was the usual mixed lot. He discarded several well-known winners because he considered them too short in muzzle—not weak, mind, but too short. These same dogs shortly afterwards went to a championship show under one of the old school of Cairn Terrier judges, where they won several first prizes. The very point which caused their downfall in the one instance was their salvation in the other. Both are men of high repute and ability. Now which was right and which wrong? Both could not be."

Asked by a correspondent to define type, Mr. Beynon continues: "Type is the fundamental agreement in structure and characteristics in organic beings of the same order. It is more than just a mere family likeness or facial resemblance, such as one finds in a particular strain or family. We have in Cairn Terriers several distinct strains and families, and in most of these they are all of the one type, i.e., they have the fundamental agreement and characteristics in common."

"For obvious reasons I cannot mention these strains, but he who scores may read. It is all very well after a big show to state that the Cairn Terriers were a splendid lot and very uniform in type, etc. All very true of that particular show, but that show does not represent the breed from the general point of view. It simply represents the knowledge the exhibitors have of the judge and that they would be wasting time and money to exhibit a type which the judge is known to disapprove of. Go to some of the smaller shows and under the 'lesser lights' if you wish to see the difference."

"How often is it asked: 'Do you know So-and-So? I wonder what type he likes'. And often enough an exhibitor will enter two or three dogs of different patterns with the hope that one at least will catch the eye of the judge. If there is another breed on the register of the Kennel Club in which this can be done, I'd like to know it."

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MY OWN CHANCE

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Dog Shows And Their Procedure Simplified

THIS article has been prompted by reason that from more than one source it has been suggested that information along this line would be most beneficial, also due to the fact that so many enthusiastic fanciers have taken over the position of a Kennel Club Secretary, not realizing that a great deal of work is attached to the position, and who afterwards have become discouraged through the lack of some instructive information to assist them in running a dog show on a systematic basis. It is with this viewpoint in mind that I have decided to offer some assistance to those who are not altogether familiar with the details required to ensure a smooth running dog show.

Having proclaimed the dates for your show which is to be held under Canadian Kennel Club rules, everything is then in readiness for all members to gather in as many special prizes as possible, and as many prizes are required for a point show it is always a good policy to have typewritten or multigraphed one hundred slips of paper or cards approximately six inches by four worded along these lines: **"We have pleasure to donate Special prize for** (leave three blank lines so that donor can allocate it to any breed desired), **then print underneath to be allocated as the committee may desire,** following which two lines are indicated so that name and address of donor can be filled in. These are distributed among the members who will do their utmost to canvass specials and in due course return them to the Secretary duly filled in. My past experience of this method of handling the Special Prizes has proved to be really first-class (even club members sign the slips) for the reason that between the time of the person, or organization, donating the prize and the opening day of show, forgetfulness may creep in and we may be unable to locate the person authorizing the donation or prize in a large departmental store and etc. Production of the printed slip eliminates all trouble and responsibility for those running the show. When the time arrives it is the duty of the Secretary to write all members, informing them that on such and such a date an Executive meeting will be held to consider the distribution of the Special Prizes collected, to the various breeds, and it is essential that all prize slips should be sent in prior to the meeting, and suggesting that their full co-operation is absolutely essential.

Assuming all is in readiness for the

production of the Premium List, the Secretary of any organization should consider the benefits due to all those who advertise in the premium list and catalogue. It is a surprising fact, that often I have perused a premium list and have noticed how this feature has been ignored, not intentionally, but no doubt it has never been given consideration in the light of the advertiser receiving one hundred per cent publicity for the investment, due to the fact that the Secretary may not have had any training in this field. I feel that I can be of some service in this respect especially to those who are filling for the first time, the position of a dog show Secretary, and one who is more or less responsible for the smooth running of the dog show. One of the worst features from the advertisers point of view, is to have a classification of breeds printed concurrently with not a single advertisement appearing therein. In my estimation there are two classifications for advertisers, one being the breeder and exhibitor, and the other the strictly business advertiser. Dealing first with the breeders advertisement, there is only one place for that (unless the individual advertiser is desirous of selecting a preferred position), and the correct space is in the classification of breeds for the Premium List and likewise among the class entries in the catalogue; let me illustrate this point. Presuming your classification will commence with "Airedales" here is the spot for the breeder of Airedales who is desirous of space, either one quarter or one-half page. Another favorite breed following the above is the "Boston Terrier," which breed is divided into various weights; this classification will extend over far more space than that required for other breeds and therefore it is logical for the opposite page to contain the advertisements of owners of Boston Terriers, and you can very often obtain four quarter pages, or even two half page advertisements from this source. It must be remembered that two copies of your classification and prize list, typewritten or printer's proof, must be forwarded to the Canadian Kennel Club Secretary for endorsement. Then, there are the business advertisements and special allocations are in order for these. A full page advertisement from either the largest auto dealer in town or any other large establishment can be given the inside front cover. Other spaces best suitable for business advertisements are opposite the list of club officers, and this page could be used

nicely for two half page advertisements. Another suitable space for a business advertisement is immediately under the judging programme, which usually covers the top half of one page. I think the foregoing clearly illustrates my idea of giving the advertisers a 100 per cent service. This procedure followed throughout, there will not be any doubt but that the revenue from advertising will offset the cost of printing both the Premium List and Catalogue; to the average organization this is usually quite an item, and as indicated it should be given the show Secretary's most careful consideration.

Your mailing list should always be up-to-date, and this is best maintained through the aid of an alphabetical book wherein all names of exhibitors are tabulated from the various catalogues of dog shows held in and around the local vicinity. With the mailing of the Premium Lists concluded there will be a lull in the intervening time for the day of entries closing. It is a very good policy to call an executive meeting during this period, and to designate three or four committees consisting of two or three members each; their duty being to devote their spare time in an endeavor to obtain entries. In order to avoid overlapping of territory, the committees should be divided, so that they cover various parts of the community such as north, south, east and west or of given locations suitably arranged.

The important thing being entries, every effort should be turned toward this goal if the show is to be a success both financially and otherwise. Presuming all the entries are in the hands of the Secretary the next item then is to tabulate them into catalogue order by breeds, such as Airedales and so on, running them alphabetically or in the various group classifications as desired. Having all the entries lined up, the Secretary should then staple together twenty-four plain quarto sheets heading each one A.B.C.D. and etc.; this will form your list of exhibitors required for the end of the catalogue. While checking back the entry forms make sure that if more than one dog is entered thereon, that it is for the same breed, as very often two or three different breeds are entered on the one form. Handlers are mostly guilty of this nuisance, due to the fact that they may not have enough entry forms to make their entries properly. Having done this you can now allot the bench number to that entry, and presuming the entrant's name is John Smith and the dog's bench number is one, you will now turn to your stapled quarto sheets (just previously mentioned) to the letter "S" and enter Bench No. 1, John Smith, 24 Main

Street, Toronto, classes 16, 18 and 20. All this information is before you while checking over your entries, and this procedure eliminates the double handling, in other words it will save valuable time, and you will have your exhibitors list all in order and ready for the printer. Your list of breeds being now completed you are in a position to arrange your judging programme and naturally your largest entries of various breeds will have preference for the evening judging, and so on, as in every instance the public like to see well filled classes; if the Secretary has not the authority to arrange the judging programme, then the committee should be called together immediately and decide upon its order. I might add here, that a great deal of time can be saved if your printer knows dog show catalogue procedure, as the original entry forms can then be handed to him for copy. This will depend entirely upon the linotype machine operator, so if possible spend half an hour with him and start him off on the right track, to work from the original entry forms before him. Space will not permit me going into this part of the programme more thoroughly, but I feel sure that the newly appointed Secretary can obtain more detailed information from older members of the club who, no doubt, will be glad to lend their assistance.

While waiting for the printer's galley proofs, several late entries will have arrived and these should be kept strictly in order and given bench numbers, etc. in the regular way. Always request your printer to furnish you with two sets of galley proofs; the duplicate set will be of much service to you. I will refer to this later on and explain it in detail. Upon receipt of the galley proofs together with the original entry forms, you will be ready to check, and if any alterations are necessary (as nine times out of ten there will be due to the rush at this time), see that they are made on both sets of galley proofs. This applies especially to the classes, and this is very important if you wish to have a smooth running show and not be bothered by having exhibitors coming to your kicking because their dogs are entered in wrong classes or omitted from their classes altogether. As you proceed to check the galley proofs insert your late entries under their proper heading and likewise in their respective classes (not overlooking the insertion of name and address in printer's copy of List of Exhibitors); this will avoid those unsightly pages headed "too late to classify." When all entry forms have been checked against the galley proofs, and corrections made, return one set to the

printer marked "O.K.," making sure to keep the duplicate set for yourself as they will prove very useful to you in more ways than one. First you will make use of it to compile your judges books commencing from the start of class list No. 1 in the catalogue, and continue right through to the end. If you have carefully checked your entries and added all late entries in the galley proofs, then your judges books will be complete and in perfect harmony with your catalogue, the result of which will surely be a show running smoothly and without interruptions by disgruntled exhibitors. The satisfaction of all judges books being made up complete, prior to the show, is most beneficial for the reason that if some unforeseen circumstances should arise and the judging programme is switched, you are prepared to meet the situation. Your catalogue in galley form will have a further use in assisting you when the benching is being erected, and bench numbers can be placed properly and to the best advantage.

The usual procedure is to mail exhibitors their passes and their bench tags prior to the opening of show. There is of course exception to this rule and the same applies to late entries taken over the telephone and those whose fees were not paid when entry made. This is a simple matter to take care of, and each entrant whose fees are not paid enclose exhibitors pass and collar tag in plain envelope and mark outside, name and state the amount due in top right hand corner. When this task is completed have them in strict alphabetical order, secured with a rubber band and upon the opening of show the exhibitor will ask for his pass and bench number; it will be an easy matter to locate name and ask for the amount specified on the envelope. Hand over pass and collar tag making sure to keep the envelope as this will be your check up for completing each entry form that is not marked paid; a special space is provided on entry form for Secretary's use only.

It will be necessary to have the original entry forms with you in strict numerical order, so that reference can be made to same at a moment's notice if the occasion should arise; also all prize ribbons, judges books, supply of letterheads and a few plain envelopes, as often the latter are required during the progress of the show.

A blackboard should be provided and the wins of each class posted thereon immediately after the classes are judged. It is a good policy for the Secretary, when a recess in the judging takes place, to write on the blackboard the programme for the

assignment, similar to the following, "Judging will commence at 7 p.m. and breeds will be judged in this order, Boston Terriers, Wire Fox Terriers and Collies."

Arm bands are now compulsory and these will prove useful in every respect. As each Best of Breed winner is declared take the corresponding arm-band for this winner and write on the back thereof, the name of the dog, the breed and the owner, sorting them into their various groups, such as Non-Sporting, Working, Sporting and so on; each group of arm-bands being secured with a rubber band. Having done this, you will realize how simple it will be when the group judging time arrives. Each group is complete and can be called to the ring, and if any delay takes place the arm-band will give full particulars on the reverse side as to the dog required. It must be remembered that the Secretary is held responsible to have the judge mark all absentees in the group classes, similar to the regular classes. In some cases exhibitors refuse to show in the group class, thinking they have no chance, but the Secretary should be careful to point out to such an exhibitor that under Dog Show Rule No. 13, section (e), it is essential that "dogs receiving points for winning must, to retain them, compete in all groups in which they are eligible." Much annoyance would be caused if a novice had winning points cancelled, if not notified of this rule which is laid down for a specific reason.

As the show is drawing to its close it is always good business to have all the special prizes lined up for easy identification by number tags corresponding with the numbers as set out in the catalogue.

Before concluding, may I also mention the fact that your show must receive publicity advertising some weeks prior to the date set for opening, and the Secretary should make it a point of sending, to the local paper, a write-up of any special features relating to the show together with the name of the Judge, etc., as usually the co-operation of the press can be gained. In most large towns contributions to the Santa Claus fund is generally provided by an evening show, supervised by the local canine organization: remember the slogan, "It pays to advertise" and this applies to your Canadian Kennel Club Show.

While this article is written with a view to act as a guidance for those who are about to officiate for the first time, nevertheless it should prove somewhat interesting reading to other club members who have the interest of their organization at heart as all should know.

Bunjie Best at Buffalo

That substantially put together, all white English Bulldog, which has been known to us as "Bunjie" has travelled high, wide and handsome since his arrival in Toronto in the middle of last May. In his first four months he had amassed sufficient championship points to permit of his entrance to the "charmed circle", and at the National Kennel Club Show he was most distinctive in his winning of Best Dog in Show all breeds, but he was really brilliantly imposing at Buffalo where he encountered the very cream of present day competition. Even in his own group he met competition worthy of his rugged quality, but when he came in for Best Dog in Show, he was outstanding amongst many celebrities, chief of which was the Westminster winner, "St. Margaret Magnificent of Clairedale," the Westminster Kennel Club Best in Show winner this year, and for further background the magnificent Irish Setter, "Ch. Milson o' Boy", the 1935 Morris & Essex Best in Show; a Doberman Pinscher, on the large side perhaps, but what beautiful type, he was "Jackel von Burgund"; the Greyhound, "White Rose of Boveaway", and the Brussels Griffon, "Hitane of Burligame". In fact the group winners at Buffalo Show were simply splendid animals of supreme quality, and when the steady-going Sparkes-Bunjie combination scored for Canada, it was an event for the records, and at the same time it was made possible for Mr. Sparkes to add the three impressive words, "Tri-International-Champion", before the word "Bunjie", in future.

The 10,000 odd ringside gathered around the four sides of the immense ring seemed to be divided in their support of the six representative dogs, and yet each dog seemed to have a substantial following, and trying to gauge this expression of approval, we felt that the Sealyham, Irish Setter, Bulldog, Greyhound, Griffon and Doberman were being rated in that order.

The critics had their suggestions to offer for the "whys" and the "wherefores". The Irish Setter didn't move to the liking of some, the Sealyham was too fat for others, the Greyhound was too thin, some said, and so on and so forth. "Bunjie" was kept on his toes every second by his owner, Mr. Reg. P. Sparkes, and he was right in there enjoying the spotlight and making his bid for the place at the top, and when Judge Mr. G. V. Glebe motioned the Sealyham back and indicated that it was his wish to place the Bulldog first, and therefore best, the applause was hearty and unstinted. The tension was broken and the show was all over but the cheering, and of course, the photographing,

and Mr. Sparkes was deluged with fanciers offering their congratulations.

Other successful exhibitors from Canada that we noticed battling for the spotlight included Mrs. R. E. Lipe and Mrs. Martha Stevens, both of Toronto, and both contesting for winners in Boston Terriers (bitches). Mrs. Margaret Firman, Toronto, was judge, and she seemed to be extremely anxious that she would make no mistakes when she finally would hand the ribbons out. The tenseness of her large ringside audience could almost be felt. In the end, Mrs. Firman found her choice in Mrs. Lipe's "Lipe's Bonnie Kaye", and Reserve to Mrs. Stevens' "Jubilee See-Me-Go". It was quite a tribute to Canadian breeders of Bostons to find that Winners Bitches and Reserve Winners Bitches were both from Toronto, and that both were Canadian-bred.

In Airedale Terriers, Mrs. Kenneth D. Marlatt, Oakville, had a gala day when her recently acquired "Shelterock Master Supreme" was made Winners Dog, and her "Warland Wishbone" won for her sex, then went on to Best of Winners and Best of Breed.

Pomeranians found Mrs. J. W. Bruce's (Richmond Hill) "Melbourne Supremacy" on top.

Russian Wolfhounds gave Winners Bitches to Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Dunlop's (Riverside, Ont.) "Romanoff Sandroff", and the higher prizes to their "Romanoff Icon".

In Newfoundlands, E. Emmett, Islington, had a nice win with his "Shelton Sea Diver", who won Winners Dogs and Best of Winners.

German Shepherds found a winners ribbon for Toronto, when Mrs. A. B. Calow's "Alpha von Bergholtz" topped the section for dogs.

Mrs. W. C. Routley made a clean-up in Cairn Terriers when her "Nifty Boy

of Clairmar" was Winners Dogs and her "Bonnie Face of Clairmar" won the higher honors.

For a while the show looked like a Toronto fixture, because of the size of the contingent who had found their way over the border to attend it and probably to share in the social whirl which was a feature of the evening of the first day. Whatever the attraction may have been, Toronto fanciers turned out in large numbers. The committee in charge of the social were swamped entirely when, literally, hundreds more than were expected turned up to wine, dine and dance.

Many of the lesser awards were won by dogs from Canada, and we feel sure that our people made noticeable inroads on generous cash and other prizes which were offered for competition.

The Children's Classes were features in themselves, and Judge Mr. Tom Gately furnished a real spectacle as he jockeyed the youthful handlers through the established motions known to the members of the Professional Handlers' Association only. Little Miss Mary Jane Newell, Detroit, was outstanding as she handled the Boston Terrier, "Int. Ch. R. Wee Joy", in a manner that was a big improvement on her Westminster effort, and we have an idea that this little lady will win the Children's Handling Grand Challenge Trophy offered by the Professional Handlers' Association for competition between the Westminster Show of 1936 and 1937; at least she has our vote in that respect anyway.

REVIEW

Dog Encyclopedia

The first edition (5,000) of **Dog Encyclopedia** by Capt. Will Judy, of the Dog World (Chicago), having been all bought up in quick time, a fresh edition of 10,000 copies have just left the bindery and are now ready for mailing. Captain Judy has very gallantly dedicated the new issue to Ruth Chapin—an inspiration apparently when he started writing the book, and who is now Mrs. Will Judy as the book has been completed—and a further acknowledgment is made to Ruth's Cocker Spaniel "Kummel Chapin"—"Kim" for short.

Capt. Judy has really built up a new structure on a greatly reinforced foundation, and he may well be proud of his handiwork. The coverage is just as complete as modern thought makes it possible, and no doubt it will meet every requirement until a further edition is called for. Saskatchewan Notes

MR. JESS HOWE, Saskatoon, is quite elated over the success of the Chesapeake dog, "Ch. Howe's Pal," which he shipped to Mr. Anthony Bliss, Westbury, Long Island, N.Y. "Pal" won first open, winners, and best of winners, at the recent New York show.

Speaking of Chesapeakes recalls to mind a duck shoot on the first day of the shooting season several years ago in which I participated, in the company of a friend who had brought along his Chesapeake bitch. As dawn broke we enjoyed an excellent shoot, the dog being perfectly steady to shot and never once attempting to retrieve without orders, in spite of the fact that ducks were falling into the water just in front of our blind. With the morning flight over we went in search of a winged Mallard we had marked down about a half mile away.

Arriving at the location the bitch was given the order to "seek dead," but, although she searched diligently, no trace of the duck could be found. Finally we concluded that the duck must have taken to wing so started on our way back to the car. The bitch, however, continued to search. We had walked some distance when I happened to look back just in time to see her dash into a clump of willows. The duck arose flying low down wind with the dog in pursuit. The chase continued until they came to a wide stretch of freshly plowed land. Here the bitch stopped, gazing after the duck, which kept in flight until it finally alighted in some tall grass on the other side of the plowing. The bitch immediately looked back in our direction, and was waved on by her owner. Away she went, but instead of going straight for the duck, made a wide circle coming up wind searching carefully. Suddenly she stopped, made sure of the location, then rushed forward to grasp the duck before it could again take to wing.

Had this happened at a field trial I suppose she would have been ordered up for chasing. Knowing our dog, however, we considered it a brilliant piece of work, for, as her owner remarked, "Belle" knew as well as we did that the duck was wounded.

Posing dogs in the show ring as practiced in this country and the United States, is a subject that comes up for discussion at many of our shows. Some there are who maintain this practice should not be allowed, and that all dogs should be shown on a loose lead, which is the custom at the shows

in Great Britain. Their chief argument against this method of showing is that it enables astute handlers to cover up certain faults that would otherwise be detected by the judge if dogs were shown in a natural pose. Personally, I thoroughly enjoy this feature of dog showing, not only in posing my own dogs but also in watching other handlers from the ring side. I fail to see how competent judges can be deceived by this practice. On the contrary, with all dogs in a class posed in practically the same manner, the judge should be better able to make comparisons and to accurately appraise the qualities of the different specimens. Such defects as faulty movement, gay tails, etc., can be detected as the dogs parade around the ring, for it is at this time that such faults are most conspicuous.

Prizes are awarded at most shows for the best girl and boy handlers. While some may consider this feature of little importance, we must bear in mind that these same girls and boys who compete so earnestly are fanciers in the making. Also that many spectators around the ring side enjoy watching these competitions, while the parents of the youthful handlers become exceptionally interested, all of which is good for our dog game.

Judges can do much to encourage these budding fanciers by awarding prizes only after careful consideration has been given to the ability of each competitor. By providing bitches instead of dogs, much of the fighting that sometimes occurs during these competitions can be avoided.

Mrs. "Pat" Randall, of Saskatoon, another new Canadian Kennel Club member for Saskatchewan, is off to an excellent start with her English Setters. Visiting her kennel this week I was shown a litter of six, three of each sex born February 6th. The dam being "Girle of Arthurlie," and the sire, Dr. Robbs' "Ch. Blue Dans Pal." The offspring from such well-bred specimens should furnish their owner with a breeding foundation of great value.

Many readers of *Kennel and Bench*, and Collie breeders in particular, must have thoroughly enjoyed reading in last month's issue the excellent write up on the Collies at Westminster by the Judge, Mr. W. Ormiston Roy of Montreal. Only a lover of the breed with many years of experience, and possessing exceptional powers of observation could describe in such a delightful manner the specimens that came before him.

Miss Hazel Mabson, of Regina, reports that Mr. R. J. Turner has recently purchased three English Bulldogs, all females, from Mr. E. Marshall

of Edmonton. Mr. Turner is getting together quite a large kennel of English Bulldogs and Boston Terriers.

Mr. Bert Johns, Regina, has one Boston Terrier puppy, born February 13th, from his female, "Regina Peggy," by "Drakes Curly."

Miss Mabson has two Wire Fox Terrier puppies, male and female, born February 4th, 1936, from her good bitch, "Susan of Billment," imp., the sire being Mr. E. Roberts' "Ch. Startling Storm of Ilerwire." Great things are expected from this pair of pups. And no wonder when we find close up in their pedigree such famous wires as "Ch. Crackley Startler of Wild-oaks," "Talavera Joker," "Crackley Sensational," "Beau Brummel of Wild-oaks," "Ch. Eden Aristocrat of Wild-oaks," "Ch. Talavera Simon," etc.

Mr. G. B. Willis, of Humboldt, Sask., writes that his kennel of Labradors have come through the severe winter in excellent condition, and that a young dog and bitch are being prepared for the Saskatoon show.

Mr. C. E. Halliday, Wilkie, Sask., is expecting two litters of English Springers in early Spring. How about benching some of those good ones, Mr. Halliday?

This month I take the opportunity to write up my own kennel of English Springers. "Landsdowne Floor 'Em All," purchased especially for stud purposes, is an upstanding dog possessing a great head and neck and is typically Springer in make-up. He promises to be a decided asset to our "Lynn Kennels." Sired by "Inveresk Contra," and having for his dam, "Int. Ch. Follow Through of Solway," his breeding gives us bloodlines that, judging from his first two litters, promises to "nick" with the blood of the females in our kennel. A litter of three males and two females from "Nighthawk of Avandale," sired by him, are developing nicely. A black and white male and a liver, white and tan female are exceptionally promising and have the not-for-sale tag on them. These will be retained for showing and for carrying on our future breeding operations. "Ch. Halcyon of Lynn" has also been bred to this dog.

A Tribute to the Late Brig.-Gen. C. M. Nelles

The General has gone West. Another link with the past has been severed. As a matter of fact I always found it hard to realize that this dapper, alert, active, keen, obviously-ex-soldier was old enough to have been midwife at the birth of The Canadian Kennel Club. I did not get to know him well until I became Acting President, but during the many years of our association on the Board my admiration of, and affection for him grew steadily. He was so uncompromisingly straight and fair—so plainly the perfect sportsman—so obviously the courteous gentleman. He had a "nose" for crookedness of any kind. Some of us thought at times that he was a little too uncompromising, but we knew that the reason was his determination that the reputation of the C.K.C. should be like that of Caesar's wife, and that no breath of suspicion must be allowed to sully the game of which he was so fond, and to which he was such an ornament.

There is a place in Valhalla for men like "Charlie" Nelles, and it is described by Kipling in the following lines:—

"Beyond the path of the outmost sun through utter darkness hurled—
Farther than ever comet flared or vagrant star-dust swirled—
Live such as fought and sailed and ruled and loved and made our world.

And oft-times cometh our wise Lord God, master of every trade,
And tells them tales of His daily toil, of Edens newly made;
And they rise to their feet as He passes by, gentlemen unafraid.

Beyond the loom of the last lone star, through open darkness hurled,
Further than rebel comet dared or living star-swarm swirled,
Sits he with those that praise our God for that they served His world."

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INTERNATIONAL CHAMPION FALSTONE DUCHESS (Imp.)

Many pleasing remarks have been made concerning our front page illustration for the March issue of **Kennel and Bench**, and of course, the picture set forth in bold relief the typical Bulldog bitch, "International Champion Falstone Duchess," (Imp.), the property of Mr. W. J. Risewick, York Mills, Ont.

This brindle and white bitch has been a consistent winner at the shows in Canada and the United States since she came to this country in the early summer of 1934. At Oakville, Toronto Ladies' Kennel Association, York Kennel Club, and at Hamilton in the first year on this side of the Atlantic she scored all the points she required in respect to her Championship.

At the shows held in the United States the wins of "Falstone Duchess" were even more impressive. At Pontiac, Mich., under Judge Mr. C. H. Bodycott, she won her first Winners ribbon across the line, then, and in quick succession, came Chicago World's Fair Specialty, Winners again, this time under Judge Mr. Bert Swann, Toronto, then Best of Winners at Skytop, Lackawanna Kennel Club, under Mr. R. H. Trimpi, Best of Winners at Philadelphia under Mr. H. H. Brunt (where the entry was 75 dogs and bitches), Best of Winners at Baltimore, Maryland, under Mr. T. J. Parvin, and so the International Championship.

Mr. R. H. Voss, the noted Bulldog authority in England, through his columns in "Our Dogs," recently said: "Falstone Duchess" would, undoubtedly, have become an English Champion had she remained on our shores and she is chock full of Bulldog type and character."

The recognized judges of three countries having attested to the quality of this distinguished English Bulldog we can only add that her international honors were merely a matter of time, and Mr. Risewick is to be congratulated upon his ownership of such a splendid quality bitch.

It is more or less customary for fanciers, paying for publicity, to keep the spotlight turned on themselves, but Mr. Risewick is an exception to that rule. He is tremendously appreciative of the fact that Mr. B. R. Sharp, of the Falstone Bulldog Kennels, South Shields, England, who has been breeding "sour mugs" for the past thirty-six years without a break, bred the distinguished dog now under review. He is of the opinion, that, of all the great Falstone Bulldogs bred by Mr.

Sharp, our International Champion, "Falstone Duchess," is not the least by any means. An extension of Mr. Risewick's appreciation embraces the circumstance of Mr. James W. Tillett, Toronto, having been the importer of the engaging lady now being featured.

We notice that the four great grandfathers showing on her ladyship's pedigree are "Ch. Son o' Jill," "Ch. Markham Spot," "Ch. Hardgate" and "Roy of Hart," so it looks as if "Int. Ch. Falstone Duchess" comes by her quality honestly.

PURE-BRED COLLIE WINS HERO MEDAL



SIR BOB OF CLUNY

On Thursday, January 30th, Toronto Humane Society's Hall was the meeting place of many animal lovers who had come together to take part in the decorating of the Collie, "Sir Bob of Cluny" (103587), by the Toronto Humane Society. "Sir Bob," who is a son of "Ch. Captain Lukeo," out of a "Ch. Eden Emerald bitch" earned the attention of the Society because of two outstanding items of life saving. Toronto newspapers made it appear that "Sir Bob" had saved the lives of two different individuals, but our recollection leads us to believe that the dog helped to save the same man's life on two different occasions and the particulars are as follows:

One evening in the winter of 1934, Mr. E. J. O'Hara, Toronto, the owner of our hero dog at that time, was out on the waterfront of Lake Ontario, at the Beaches district of Toronto, when he was overcome by a fainting spell arising from his Great War experiences. At the time the board-walk was icy and Mr. O'Hara slid down onto the ice which gave way under his weight, leaving the semi-unconscious man in grave peril of drowning and it was right here that "Sir Bob of Cluny" entered the limelight and made his bid for the rewards that go to the heroes be they men or dogs.

"Bob" sank his teeth in his master's clothing and started backing him up on the ice and toward the shore. A young couple passing along noticed the plight of the man and the efforts of the dog and soon "Bob" had much needed aid and the story of his heroism soon became the subject of much favorable discussion.

The other occasion was another day when Mr. O'Hara was crossing the street, and again he was attacked by a fainting spell and this time he went down on the car tracks. "Sir Bob of Cluny" was painfully conscious of the fact that his master's life was again in jeopardy and that it really depended on him alone, so the gallant and sturdy "Bob" set to the task of dragging his master to safety again. The policeman who came into the picture on this occasion "had his suspicions" as policemen will have 'em, but when he found that "his man" was the victim of "some other ailment" he behaved splendidly and stayed with Mr. O'Hara until he had been placed in bed.

We felt that "Bob" had earned the right to enter the ranks of canine celebrities and marvelled at the delay in the "powers that be" in taking action, but on January 30th, Dr. J. A. Campbell, Toronto, Veterinarian, presented "Sir Bob of Cluny" with a beautiful medal which had been inscribed "For courage and resourcefulness."

Mrs. W. Diment, the present owner of this fine upstanding Collie, accepted the medal on "Bob's" behalf, and Mr. Diment made acknowledgement on behalf of "Bob's" adoring mistress and "Bob" himself.

"Sir Bob of Cluny" has had a splendid winning record at the dog shows during the last three years and only lacks two championship points to enter the charmed circle, and like old wine he improves with age, so that at Hamilton and at Leamington Shows in 1935 he was returned Best of Breed and at Western Fair, London, he won the Working Group.

We congratulate Mr. W. Fear, Toronto, the breeder; Mr. E. J. O'Hara, who owned the dog from July 4th, 1932, until December 14th, 1934, and Mrs. W. Diment, Toronto, who has owned "Sir Bob" since that latter date.

Dr. Campbell, whilst making the presentation speech, stressed the argument that the pure-bred dog was superior to the mongrel dog in respect to the virtue of intelligence, and we compliment the Doctor on having made that observation as his opinion is based on a lifetime experience of dogs of all kinds.

Royal Kennels Proprietor Fined \$100.00

Charges of no less than eight infringements of the Live Stock Pedigree Act were laid against Mr. F. R. Brockington, of Napierville, Quebec, by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, on October 26th, 1935, at St. Johns, Que. Mr. Brockington came up for trial on November 2nd, 1935, when the case was adjourned to November 15th, 1935, then to November 29th, 1935, then to December 13th, 1935, then to January 10th, 1936, and finally the case came before the court for trial on February 21st, 1936, when Mr. Brockington pleaded guilty to all the following charges:

Section 18 (b) Live Stock Pedigree Act.

Selling an animal as pure bred, without furnishing proper registration.

Section 18 (a) Live Stock Pedigree Act.

Transporting an animal as pure bred from one province to another in Canada, without having the animal properly registered.

Section 18 (a) Live Stock Pedigree Act.

Transported from one province in Canada to another province in Canada, a Newfoundland dog, name, "Royal Queen Kole," No. (231-150)*, from St. Johns, Que., to Mr. John Steeves, Lomond, Alta., without furnishing the actual buyer (Steeves) with a certificate of pedigree registration as issued by The Canadian Kennel Club, Inc.

Section 18 (b) Live Stock Pedigree Act.

Sold a Newfoundland dog, name, "Royal Queen Kole," No. (231-150), to Mr. John Steeves, Lomond, Alta., without furnishing a certificate of pedigree registration.

Section 18 (a) Live Stock Pedigree Act.

Transported from one province in Canada to another province in Canada, without furnishing the purchaser with certificate of registration as issued by the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., for pure bred St. Bernard dog, "Royal Neville," No. (233-131)*, purchased by H. Neville, 729 Queen St. E., Toronto, Ont.

Section 18 (b) Live Stock Pedigree Act.

Sold a St. Bernard dog, "Royal Neville," No. (233-131), to H. Neville, 729 Queen St. E., Toronto, without furnishing certificate of pedigree registration issued by the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., to the actual buyer.

Section 18 (a) Live Stock Pedigree Act.

Exported from Canada dogs for which certificates were not issued by the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., to the purchaser, W. H. Knox, 21-24 State St., New York, N.Y., U.S.A.

Section 18 (b) Live Stock Pedigree Act.

Failure to furnish the purchaser, W. H. Knox, 21-24 State St., New York,

N.Y., U.S.A., with certificates of registration issued by the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., for Newfoundland dogs purchased from Royal Kennels for export to Buenos Ayres.

Mr. Brockington was fined \$100.00 and costs on the first charge or two months in jail, and was given suspended sentence on the other charges, and he must report back to the court one year from the date of sentence to be formally relieved of the several charges covered by the suspended sentence.

The accused was quite an attractive advertiser in a small way who, in order to satisfy his clients regarding registrations, gave them certificates issued by himself on behalf of the United Kennel Club of Kalamazoo, Michigan, which organization is not recognized in the United States, Canada or elsewhere.

The Live Stock Pedigree Act provides that a pure-bred dog whelped in Canada and sold as such either to a person in Canada or for export to another country must be registered in the Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book.

It is to be construed that Mr. Brockington was supplied with blank certificates of registration by the United Kennel Club of Kalamazoo, Michigan, and by that organization appointed an inspector for registration as his name appears on United Kennel Club certificates as inspector. In this connection it may be stated that Mr. W. H. Knox, of New York, purchased two dogs from Brockington for export to South America which Mr. Knox now states were inferior specimens.

It should be thoroughly understood that the only certificate of pedigree registration meeting fully the requirements of the Live Stock Pedigree Act, for dogs born in the Dominion of Canada, is the certificate of Pedigree issued by the Canadian National Live Stock Records Office on behalf of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., a breed association affiliated with the Canadian National Live Stock Record Board.

THE CONSTITUTION

We have received intimation from the office of the Live Stock Commissioner that our Constitution as amended at the Annual General Meeting held in Toronto, on February 6th, has been approved of by the Minister of Agriculture. And also, that our Constitution has been approved of until May 12th, 1937.

The Amendments are:

Article 17—Rules of Eligibility, Section 1, Subsection (B)—**Recognized Foreign Breeds** amended by adding:

"The Austrian Kennel Club."

and:

Article 18—**Application for Registration**, amended by adding the following as Section 10:

"No dog or litter out of a dam under six months or over 12 years of age at time of mating, or by a sire under six months or over 12 years of age at time of mating will be registered unless the application for registration shall be accompanied by an affidavit or evidence which shall prove the fact to the satisfaction of the Canadian National Live Stock Record Office."

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OUR FRONTISPIECE

The Airedale Terrier—largest of the Terrier family, and once the pride of the Terrier breeds—is fast returning to popularity on this side of the Atlantic. It has been conceded that several of the larger of the medium-sized breeds suffered with the advent—in this country—of the German Shepherd dog soon after the end of the Great War and perhaps the honest Airedale was the hardest hit of all those breeds. The popularity of the Airedale in the past is reflected by the circumstances that only Fox Terriers, Wires and Smooths, have furnished more Best Dog in Show winners at Westminster Kennel Club Shows since such records were prepared 'way back in 1907. The Airedales winning New York's highest honors being "Ch. Kenmore Sorceress" in 1912. "Ch. Briergate Bright Beauty" in 1919. "Ch. Boxwood Barkentine" in 1922 and "Ch. Warland Protector of Shelterock" in 1933, and there are more Airedales in the offing that will make bold bidding for Westminster's highest honors in the years that lie ahead.

Our feature dog this month is Mr. Sid Perkins' imported Airedale Terrier, "Ch. Rockley Duplicate," who was bred by Mr. T. Heath, England, and brought to Canada by Mr. Perkins towards the end of 1931, and almost immediately after reaching our Canadian shores this first rate son of that famous producer, "Ch. Clee Courtier" made his debut at the Ottawa Winter Fair so successfully, that he was away to his championship from scratch. Taking the better shows as they came along "Duplicate" completed the honors at Windsor Show in 1934. Emphasizing our feature dog's super quality we need only add, that at the Airedale Terrier Club of America Specialty Show for 1933, he won 2nd Limit and 2nd Open in strong competition, and at Westminster Kennel Club Show on the following day he moved up a notch and won 1st Limit, 2nd Open and Reserve Winners.

In England, "Ch. Rockley Duplicate" won over forty firsts, many special prizes, and three wins at Crufts.

Mr. Sid Perkins, Toronto, believes that "Ch. Rockley Duplicate" is the only direct son of "Ch. Clee Courtier" standing at stud on the American continent today. The winner of sixteen championship certificates in England, "Ch. Clee Courtier" stands right out in a class by himself, and he has to his credit a cup won for having sired the most Airedale winners at shows held in the United States—a great sire, and a great son.

"Ch. Rockley Duplicate" is siring wonderful young stock himself, and all being well he may be considered a sure

producer of quality puppies for a long time to come. He is not yet six years old, and is therefore at the peak of his prime.

Other notable Airedales in the Rockley stables include the near "Champion Shelterock My Superex," "Ch. Rockley Masher," and the smart young sire, "Bewdley Advocate," who produced a brace in the first litter sired by him which sold for \$200.00, so again we say the Airedale, as a breed, is on his way to the higher places, and Rockley Kennels are well to the front now as always.

WEST HIGHLAND WHITE TERRIERS

It is seldom that we find this game little terrier referred to in our present day dog journals, but we do feel that the "Westie" is coming back surely, if slowly. Probably those who sponsor the breed are more to blame than the Kennel Press, but be that as it may, we believe that at a show held at Ottawa recently, no less than seven Westies appeared in the class for Open bitches; this entry was sponsored by Major A. R. Thompson, and had grown from one lone entry made around 1929 when he first took to the game, and he has had much pride watching the large entry in the ring, and recalling that they had come from his original breeding.

Further indication of the increasing popularity is the fact that quite recently Major Thompson had received enquiries for West Highland White Terrier stock from as far away, and as divergent places as Ohio and Alaska.

When reporting the Boston Terrier section of America's greatest indoor dog show in our last issue we inadvertently overlooked mentioning the win made by William Blum's (Toronto) lightweight bitch, "Susan of Riverview," who was placed third in a class of seven, with but one absentee.

Another nice winner that we overlooked was Miss Sheila Proctor's (Toronto) Samoyede, "Viga" who, apparently was entered in the dog section of the breed classification, however when she was properly placed she lost no time in annexing the big prize money in the Limit and Open Classes and finished up with taking the winners ribbon. It was rather hard to locate this information at the show, but we have picked up the information from our valued contemporary "Popular Dogs."

Mrs. Viola G. Fielden, Toronto, had a couple of smart Chow Chows entered in the Novice Classes, and "One Yang Fu Red Riot II" won first prize. Then there was 'Brant II'

by 'Brant' out of 'Bonita,' 'Brant Red Jacket,' the first of the really good red Cockers. I hope he will—and I'm sure he will—be welcomed when he appears at 'The Gate,' for if 'true sportsmanship' and 'clean records' are not the passwords then I must be all wrong."

Thanks, Mr. Burns, we believe that your passwords are genuine, and that our late comrade was fully familiar with their significance.

"I am sure that we haven't a member from coast to coast but will regret the passing of our old friend, Brig-Gen. C. M. Nelles. This dark brindle daughter of "Hagerty Once Again," ex a daughter of "Captain Try Again," passed over to the "happy hunting grounds" on February 26th. Bred by Mrs. A. Enders, Buffalo, N.Y., "Naughty Girl" came to Mr. Patchell's Kennels when she was about 7 months old, but when she was sufficiently matured to go to the shows Mr. Patchell gave her plenty of opportunities to "show herself" to those interested in looking at a comely Boston, and the records show that she attended 12 shows in 1931, eight in 1932 and eight in 1933. She won her first points at the Ladies' Kennel Club of Canada Show in 1931, and finished at Guelph in 1933, and during those years there were few Boston Terrier bitches known to the regular show habitués than "Ch. Hagerty's Naughty Girl."

Then there were 13,504 persons in attendance for the two days, or almost twice as many as attended the fixture a year ago. The second largest entry was 90 Cockers, which were judged by Mr. Ralph Craig, the Cocker judge who found favor in Canada when he judged at the Canadian National Exhibition last September. Chow Chows were an entry of 80 and that is more than we have ever seen together at any one time anywhere, and since "Ch. Choonam Hung Kwong" won for best dog in show at Crufts record-breaking fixture held recently, there is a popular wave developing in dogdom for the Chow.

We are indebted to Mrs. "Alva" McColl, Toronto, for particulars of a troupe of six Pomeranians who were clever in many interesting vaudeville acts, and amongst the troupe was "Wembly's Gold Vision," a Pom, bred by Mr. George Potts of the Wembley Kennels, Toronto. These Pomeranians are all show specimens.

Top honors for the Canadian contingent was taken by "Tri-Int. Ch. Bunjie," owned by Reg. P. Sparkes, Toronto, who represented the Non-Sporting division, and was placed second to the famous Poodle, "Ch. Nunsoe Duc de la Terrasse of Blackeen". There were 39 Bulldogs benched and "Bunjie" won for Winners Dog, Best of Winners and Best of Breed.

Mrs. G. W. Hyslop, Brockville, Ont., has her smart Cairn Terrier on the circuit with Nate Livine of Philadelphia, and we notice that her "Conachon of Cairndania" has been topping the lot at Toledo, Columbus, Ohio, and at Cleveland.

Mrs. M. Stevens is getting a lot of nice wins with her Boston Terrier "Jubilee See-Me-Go", and the latest winnings include Winners Bitches and Best of Winners at Toledo, and Winners Bitches at Cleveland.

Mrs. Kenneth Marlatt, Oakville, Ont., won Winners Bitches with her "Warland Wishbone". For a sum said to be \$400, Mrs. Marlatt has sold an Airedale out of the same litter as "Allspice of Aldon", the Westminster Pupper Winner.

Forty-three Irish Terriers indicates a developing popularity for the "Micks", and the Clarkson-bred "Newtonard Aristocrat" went to Best of Winners for his new owner, Mr. John Culhany. Mr. W. T. McCord, Clarkson, Ont., won Reserve Winners with "Newtonards

Mrs. W. Diment, Toronto, won first Limit in Wires with her "MacLeans Margaret" and third American-bred with "Wireclad Major of Glynhir".

Mr. H. V. Hopkins, Toronto, won second in Limit Bulldogs with "Hefty Son o' Dan".

Mr. Frank Hunnisett, Jr., made his debut as an exhibitor by winning first prize in Puppy Dachshunde with "Prince Albert Rott", a red dog bred by Prince Albert Kennels, Cooksville, Ont.

In Western Canada, Saskatoon Kennel Club will feature Mr. Jack C. Fletcher of Calgary as their all-round judge, and we trust that the show will justify the dogged determination of this club to carry on in the face of much

discouragement. May this fixture show cause for shedding the blanket of pessimism—which was born of the depression—and re-robing with the more desirable garment of optimism, the forerunner of happier days for our Western fanciers. These remarks apply equally to the Regina fixture on April 17th and 18th, and to the Medicine Hat Show on May 25th.

April and May will find the shows in Ontario in full swing. On April 18th Windsor Kennel Club will open shop at the Fox Building on Sandwich Street. The judges are Mr. Frank Kingsbury of Lansing, Mich., a dyed-in-the-wool Beagler who loves Beagles, a man who knows what a Beagle should bring to the field and to the bench, and if Mr. Kingsbury does not draw a large entry we will be sadly disappointed. Mr. Enno Meyer of Milford, Ohio, will be the all-rounder, and he, of all men, needs no further introduction to Canadian fanciers. Mr. Meyer, being an animal artist, is familiar with his dogs, inside and outside.

Hamilton Kennel Club, on April 25th, at the Arena on Barton Street, East, Secretary Mr. James Eccles had something new in judging to spring on his loyal exhibitors, at least that is what we have heard. We believe that Mr. Eccles has a specialist group judge for each group, with an extra judge for Boston Terriers, and an all-rounder to pick the best of the final five for best in show. This arrangement may accomplish what Mr. Eccles has in mind—a big show and a good one. We regret that this aggressive show secretary has been under the weather, and a large entry would just about make a new man of him, we believe.

On May 9th the Armories on University Avenue, Toronto, will house the second annual show of the Canine Breeders' and Exhibitors' Association and a most successful fixture is anticipated. Mr. Wm. McDerment, M.B.E. (late of England), Toronto, will share the all-round task with Mr. Fred Smith, Toronto, and their task will be considerably lightened by Mr. W. A. Price, Toronto, taking over the Cocker section and Mrs. W. Wylie, Vineland, taking all the Toy breeds.

On the last week day of May, May 30th, York Kennel Club plans will materialize at the Eglinton Hunt Club, and in the open air, if the weatherman is in a kindly mood, and indoors if he is disposed to be ugly on the day. Mr. Bert Swann, Toronto, takes on the heavy end of the judging, but Major W. Neilson has a lot of special attractions that he is busy perfecting with a view to drawing an immense entry, but the exhibitors will have to be content to wait a little longer for full particulars.
