Meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Incorporated

THE regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., was held in the Board Room of the Club's Offices, 25 Melinda Street, Toronto, on Thursday evening, April 16th, 1936, at 7.30 o'clock. The President, Col. J. N. MacRae, was in the Chair. Directors present included Reg. P. Sparkes, James Eccles, B. W. Essery, Raymond Tyrwhitt, F. W. Walkerdine and Capt. H. Dudley-Waters.

The President welcomed Mr. Tyrwhitt to the Board of Directors.

The Minutes of the Board of Directors Meeting, held on Thursday, March 19th, were read, and it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:—

"That, the Minutes, as read, be approved."

Mr. Sparkes reported on the activities of Kennel and Bench Improvement Committee, and in doing so, he offered several suggestions of a constructive character with a view to immediate improvement, and submitted that the Committee felt that steps must be taken to secure an Editor for the official organ and requested authorization to proceed with advertising with that end in view. Mr. Sparkes advised that he was reporting progress on behalf of the Committee. It was regularly moved, seconded and carried:—

"That, Kennel and Bench Improvement Committee be given permission to advertise, as they see fit, for an Editor for Kennel and Bench."

The Secretary read correspondence from Lt.-Col. Cyril H. Colwell on the proposed recognition for registration of the breed known as the Nova Scotia Duck Toller Dog. This matter was left in the hands of the Secretary with instructions to collect further information and photographs of at least six more specimens.

A letter from the Office of the Live Stock Commissioner advised that Ministerial approval had been granted to the life of the Constitution, being extended for the period of one year, and also that Article 17—Rules of eligibility had been amended by adding to section 1, sub-section (b) "The Austrian Kennel Club" and that Article 18—Application for Registration had been amended by adding paragraph 10."

"No dog or litter out of a dam under six months or over 12 years of age at time of mating, or by a sire under six months or over 12 years of age at time of mating, will be registered unless the application for registration shall be accompanied by an affidavit or evidence which shall prove the fact to the satisfaction of the Canadian National Live Stock Record Office."

A letter was read from Mr. W. J. Moffett, Vancouver, B.C., who suggested that Mr. R. H. F. Purdon be allowed to contribute Fox Terrier Notes, and it was agreed to turn the letter over to Kennel and Bench and Bench Improvement Committee for attention.

A letter was read from Mr. J. Burkinshaw, Saskatoon, taking exception to statements made by Mr. George Kynoch at the Annual General Meeting, and it was agreed to turn the correspondence over to Provincial Director Dr. J. T. Cooper for attention and possible disposition.

A letter of complaint from Mr. J. Weatherall, Toronto, was read, the complaint setting forth that Mr. Weatherall had been unable to secure vouchers of registration for a Bulldog which he had purchased from Mr. John Longo, Toronto, about a year ago. It was understood that Mr. Longo was at the mercy of Mr. J. W. McNulty, Toronto, in respect to his (Longo's) obligation to Mr. Weatherall.

It was regularly moved, seconded and carried:—

"That, Mr. Longo and Mr. J. W. McNulty both be written to and advised that unless this matter is cleaned up, and the papers of registration turned over to Mr. Weatherall immediately, both will be denied the privileges of the Canadian Kennel Club."



The Coloured Variety of Bull Terrier

By H. K. McCAUSLAND, England

THE progress made in the establishment of the Coloured Bull-Terrier as a competitor with the more popular white dog is very marked, and classes formerly confined to the white dog but now open to both varieties rarely fail to see at least one or more brindle or other coloured dog or bitch competing with the "Whites."

There is no denying the fact that owing to careful mating and persistent breeding from the best lines the colors are knocking very hard at the door, but in my opinion they have yet some way to go before we find more than an alien case of a coloured dog consistently beating the Whites.

Coloured dogs, especially Brindles, have a very attractive appearance, and appeal to many as companions in preference to a white one, perhaps partly owing to the fact that a white admittedly does not look his best if his coat is soiled, while the coat of a dark haired one is always of clean appearance if well brushed—so much for their respective merits as to appearance as companions.

I hope my remarks which follow, regarding the position of the colored variety in England as compared with the non-acceptance of the breed in America, will not be considered an impertinence, and I wish to point out that my suggestions are in the nature of pleas, rather than advice. The Kennel Club of England have long ago decided to give equal standing to both varieties, with the result that registrations show such considerable increase as to warrant the distribution of a larger number of Challenge Certificates, and thus encouraging larger entries at the shows and the provision of classes for the breed at all championship events. There is no bar against coloured dogs competing in White Classes, although there is a reservation against "Whites" competing in coloured classes where the clause "White not to predominate" prevails.

I have noticed with regret in my numbers of the American Kennel Gazette, which I read with great interest, that the entries of Bull Terriers are becoming smaller in practically all the shows, and I venture to suggest that if the coloured variety were given recognition, the increase in entries noticeable here, would quickly be reflected in America. I believe that in India where there is a very keen Bull-Terrier organization, the followers of coloured dogs are already making progress and the variety is accepted.

I would stress the point that I have not a full knowledge of the position in America as to the non-acceptance

of coloured dogs, and am only writing on hearsay, but I should be very much interested in any report that may have been issued on this subject. humble opinion is that a Bull Terrier is a Bull Terrier all the world over. and I think that all Bull Terriers of a three generation pedigree should have equal treatment and acknowledgment, thus allowing coloured dogs to be registered and exhibited in competition with Whites, and when, or if this suggestion should become an accomplished fact, I feel sure that show promoters who support the Bull Terrier breed, will soon find their classes paying their way.

The history of progress of the coloured variety in England dates back a good many years when the followers of the "White Cavalier" received a shock by the awarding of the Challenge Certificate to a Brindle dog, "Bing Boy," but this dog did not come into any greater prominence. A few years later a Brindle bitch, "Lady Winnifred," one well worthy of the title, obtained a certificate, and after persistently pursuing the quest, finally obtained two more awards, which gave her the coveted title, and my opinion is that it was fully deserved. A further period elapsed, and once more the variety came into prominence by the advent of another brindle dog named, "Bokos Brock." This dog won his first certificate I think at Brighton last summer, and has since qualified for his full title, and this in a year when White dogs were strong. A still further inroad has been made into Whities when at the recent Metropolitan and Essex Show a further brindle dog, "Mystery Knight of Leuch" overcame all opposition and was awarded the premier position. On that occasion, as there were two champion White dogs, one White battling for his third certificate and one champion brindle dog, the winning of the premier honors was no mean achieve-

I have written the foregoing to demonstrate my view that there is every fair reason why coloured dogs may claim to be recognized and placed on a level footing with the Whites, of which I am an enthusiastic supporter. Should the Kennel Club of America honor me by giving further consideration to the position of coloured dogs, and decide favorably, I should be very happy.

Of the newly registered variety of Bull Terrier in England, the Staffordshire—I have found it difficult to reconcile the reasons for establishing this so-called breed. It has appeared to me that the advocates of the Staffordshires up to recent times have done little more than cast stones at the legitimately recognized Bull Terrier as a show dog, frequently stating that all the original courage and varminty character is being bred out. I think few who have kept in touch with our breed would allow this, but if fighting propensities are the only arguments that can be brought forward in favor of Staffordshires, it needs little intelligence to understand that the arguments in the present day would meet but frail support,

Thank goodness the barbarous sport of dog fighting is a thing of the past, and personally I have always considered such so-called sport as the first step to the gallows. There is an old saying, "To keep a fighting dog one must be a fighting man," and if this is a true saving, it is not difficult to analyze the troubles that may eventuate for the keepers of fighting dogs. I myself have no animus against the Staffordshire, only the suggestion that if this dog is to be introduced into the legitimate show ring, it would be advisable that its prowess in the fighting pit in the past should not be continually brought forward as an asset in 1936.

The first work, as the Bull Terrier Club has done, is to create a standard, and breed to it, as from what I have read in show reports so far there is little to distinguish between the right and the wrong type.

The Schipperke

By T. Leonard Bott, England

More than one theory has been advanced as to the Genesis of this breed. When we see much more recently classified breeds—breeds of British manufacture—of whose source there is equal doubt, and equally conflicting theories, we cannot be surprised that speculation has provided likely and unlikely theories as to the origin of the Schipperke.

One fact is certain—it is a breed of considerable antiquity. Proof of this exists in two directions. In Belgium, its native country, there are collars peculiar and undoubtedly belonging to it, exhibited in the museums upwards of two hundred years old. Another proof is the uniformity of the breed in form and colour, also the persistency with which the Schipperke characteristics prevail after several outcrosses into other breeds, even those of such unlikeness as Fox Terriers.

We are indebted to J. U. Berrie for introducing the first Schipperke into England in 1887. This he brought with him when returning from a judging visit to Belgium.

In Great Britain, those who know not the breed, mistake it for a Toy. Indeed, quite recently, a widely circulated brochure on dogs of all kinds, has erroneously classed it with the Toys. In its native Belgium, it is regarded as one of the most useful and adaptable of dogs, and has very definite duties to perform; on the provision carts, it keeps a watchful eye on the goods thereon, so preventing their theft while on the barges which throng the numerous canals of that country; it performs a similar task, tirelessly trotting around and about the craft with a keen look-out for piratical visitors alongside; indeed, it is from the efficient way these duties are performed that has earned for it the nick-name Bargee, while its correct name Schipperke (pronounced Schipper-ke) means "Little Skipper." It has been suggested that the tail was first cut off entirely because it was an hindrance to him in rapidly running and twisting about the narrow shelf running round the boat. This is not a very convincing theory, because, when permitted to have a tail, he twists it carefully away on top of his back. Indeed, if he would make up his mind as to the length of tail he prefers and that preference was for a full length one, he looks quite gay with its possession.

Between 1887 and 1891, the breed was usually shown among "Foreign dogs" at the shows. In the latter year, the Schipperke Club (England) prevailed on the Kennel Club to pro-

vide a separate classification. With this dignity conferred upon it, the breed became more popular and numerous. Several devoted and assiduous breeders took up the fancy. As will be readily understood, differences as to points of most importance arose amongst these enthusiasts. Some concentrated on the frill and culotte, whilst others regarded head as of chief importance, while a few went for a generally well-balanced specimen endeavouring to breed for the majority of breed characteristics without allowing any to deteriorate. A second Club was formed as a consequence, and sought to justify its existence by procuring a dog to its ideal. This dog's name was "Champion St. Hubert". He was imported direct from Belgium and the Club became known as the St. Hubert Schipperke Club. Happily, these differences disappeared and although there are today three breed Clubs, they work quite amicably and all for the one type. The third Club was formed to foster the interests of the breed in the North of England, where it is very popular and is named "The Northern Schipperke Club". Judges for the breed are drawn from each of the Clubs and members of all exhibit under them, confident that the sole aim is merit.

One point in the standard calls for a well-rounded rump. If a puppy is carelessly docked a small projection, or stump of tail is left, while an experienced person can dock to eliminate this without causing any more pain. In 1896, an outcry was raised and accusations were made to the effect that Schipperkes and Old English Sheepdogs were subjected to cruelty through the tails being "cut out" too deeply.

The Kennel Club, always keenly alive to the well-being of the Canine species, investigated the charges and ultimately decided, that they could safely leave the lovers of these breeds to guard their best interests.

At the time that the great war broke out, the Bargee as a breed, was "sail-

ing along" merrily, winning admiration and claiming affection wherever he became known. The wise and patriotic action of the Kennel Club in discouraging dog breeding at a time when the nation required all foods possible for human consumption, arrested the advancement of the breed, as it did all others. After these restrictions were removed, the three Clubs again became active and today the breed is being freely distributed and appreciatively received throughout the country. Attempts have been made-very painstaking attempts-to produce a coloured variety other than black. Other breeds such as Pomeranians, have several colours, and it was thought that similar varieties could be produced in the Schipperkes. It occasionally happens that a chocolatecoloured pup appears in a litter of otherwise black puppies just as there is often a black lamb born in each flock. Specimens of these were procured: also the parents who produced them most freely and after very thoughtful calculations had been made and hopeful anticipations formed, they were mated in what was thought the best manner, with the result, the puppies were a most beautiful black.

For a long time there was no book featuring the Schipperke, as the book written by Dr. Freeman was allowed to go out of print, but this has been taken care of by Mr. E. B. Holmes, of Duffield, whose book, "The Schipperke" has been well received, and widely distributed. Some of the dogs whose names are to be found in most of the present day pedigrees are:-"Uncle Pick", "El Capitan", "Flying Fox", "Joy of Greta", Bapton Fox", "Percy", "Joe of Moorfield", "El Dorado", "Prestwich Joe", "Dancing Firl", "Glen", "Grissley Bear", "Leigh Tommy Atkins", "Royd Oregonian", "Royd Ruffian", "Royd Rex", "Jeffry", "Tommy Ruff", "Soldier Boy", "Son O'The North", "Bear O'The North", "Rothbury Squire", "Tinker Rose" and "Rosy Rapture".

BEDLINGTON TERRIER FOR HAMILTON

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Williams, Hamilton, Ont., has imported the Bedlington Terrier "Outdoor Goil" from the Holmstead Kennels, England. The newcomer came out at Hamilton Kennel Club Show and found many admirers. The Bedlington is noted for its gameness as a breed, and "Outdoor Goil" may be as game as they come, but one remarked on her appearance of absolute composure as she sat up in her bench receiving the remarks of praise from those who were familiar with Bedlington in the County of Northumberland, from whence the breed takes its name.

Alberta Notes

E are indeed sorry to report that among the first notes to reach us this month contained the sad news of the death of Mrs. R. W. Funnell of Calgary, the wife of one of our good fanciers, who is a member of the Canadian Kennel Club, and also a member of the Alberta Kennel Club. We are sure that all Alberta fanciers, together with a host of other friends, will join in extending sincere sympathy to Mr. Funnell and family in the loss of a very devoted wife and mother.

We hear rumors of an addition to the Labrador list in the Province by the arrival of a male dog from Ottawa to Mr. M. Cook of Calgary. We have had no definite information about this dog yet, as to age, breeding, etc., but gather the impression from what we have heard that he is of the type that will cause him to be heard from later.

We were exceedingly glad to receive a letter from a new member of the C.K.C., Mr. S. F. D. Roe of Red Deer. Mr. Roe is particularly enthusiastic about the Golden Retriever, and reports that his bitch "Rockhaven Queen" recently whelped a litter of seven puppies, sired by "Ch. Sandy of Nutwood" (imp.) owned by Mrs. Constance Burbidge of Edmonton. "Rockhaven Queen" is from the well known "Rockhaven Kennels" at Vancouver, which, incidently, bred both "Rockhaven Rory" best of breed winner at recent New York show, and "Rockhaven Moonshine" winner of same award in a large entry at Boston. Mr. Roe would like to get in touch with owners of "Goldens" who would be interested in forming a Golden Retriever Club.

Very sorry to hear of Mr. J. G. Young, owner of the "Normandy Kennels", being on the sick list, but we are glad to learn that it is not serious, and that he expects to be around again in a few days, so here is hoping it will be very few.

In looking over the last issue of Kennel and Bench we see almost a half page under the heading "Canadian Winners at Cleveland" and it starts out by saying that several new records were hung up at Cleveland on March 14 and 15, one of which was the Springer Spaniel entry, said to be the world's largest entry, of 117 dogs. But how many of the readers knew that the dog that topped that entire record entry was Alberta bred? being

born in Mr. Jack Rawlings' "Quantock Kennels" right here in Edmonton. This great little bitch, "Quantock Beauty", has been making some records on her own account since crossing the international border, where, in eleven starts, she has been nine times Best of Breed, and once Best of Winners, and while we are unable to give place and date for all of these wins, the fact that they included Cleveland should be ample proof that they were not of the "flag station" variety.

This bitch, which has attained her American Championship probably twice over, was sired by "Ch. Belmoss Count" and her dam is Mr. Rawlings' good bitch "Ch. Quantock Vale of Kent", she by "Ch. Hightide Barney" and out of the former Westminster winner "Ch. Vale of Burnside". This reminds us that Mr. Rawlings reports the sale of "Quantock Brownie", litter brother of "Beauty", to Mr. W. C. Burns at Victoria, also the sale of "Quantock Supreme", the young female that went Best of Breed at Calgary last December, to a gentleman at Cleveland, Ohio. This one is also from "Quantock Vale of Kent", but sired by Mr. Rawlings' latest stud, "Apslyn Advancer" (imp.). There are now at the kennels a litter of 5 males, 2 females, just over three months old from this mating, and Jack says he has had an unusual number of inquiries, many of them from across the border, but that he is no hurry to sell, and we think he is planning on springing another flier, so watch out for a real junior puppy to come out at the summer shows.

Sales appear to have been quite brisk of late at the Fidaltas Cocker Kennels, according to a report from Mr. & Mrs. Ralph E. Smith. They have sold to R. Pettigrew of Winnipeg, "Fidaltas Mandy", and to Stan Bear of Millet, "Fidaltas Gilded Lady"; both of these females are by "Romeo of Moray" ex "Whin of Moray" "Dinah", from their first Cocker "Fidelis", has gone to C. Harford of Provost, Alta., and to David Chattell of Edmonton, "Fidaltas Rufus", and to W. Oram of Edmonton, "Fidaltas Nigger"; these puppies are by "Ch. Calmas Durbar" ex "Mayart Wendy". They also report having two very promising puppies by "Merrie poleon" out of "Merrie Durbar's Mitzie" and that "Whin of Moray" has been bred to "Ch. Calmas Durbar", from which mating real results are expected. It seems that with all these sales there should be some replacing, so they have purchased from Stan Bear of Millet, "Black Nero" by "Calmas Lucky Boy" ex "Matlock Vaida". Mr. & Mrs. M. B. McColl, of the "Aberfeldy Kennels", also report the sale of a Cocker female to R. Petti-grew of Winnipeg. This bitch, "Darky Ware of Aberfeldy", is at present nursing a nice litter by "Merrie Napoleon" after which she will be shipped to her new home.

Having heard a few days ago that Mr. J. R. Benson had the misfortune to lose one of his Scottish Terriers by having it killed by a motor. We got in touch with Mr. Benson by phone and he promised to write us the particulars. Mr. Benson says he had a lovely litter from this bitch sired by "Ch. Littlebury Barty" (imp.), one of which he has retained, and which placed First Junior Puppy and Winner at the Junior Hospital League of Edmonton Show and also First Junior Puppy and First Limit at Saskatoon last week.

Mr. Benson expects to mate his remaining matron, "Ishbel of Isla", to "Ch. Littlebury Barty" in the near future. He says, "she produced a beautiful litter from this dog last summer and I am hoping that she will repeat. This will be one case where bitch pups will not be frowned upon, as I intend to enlarge my kennel by keeping some of them anyway."

A note at hand from R. A. Cross, contains word that he has had the misfortune to have his young Wire female, "Eastbourne Tessa", struck by a motor car, resulting in a broken leg. However, although apparently having more than his share of bad luck, he is not giving up, and is bringing in another young Wire female sired by "Int. Ch. Gallant Fox of Wildoaks" ex "Signet Soubrette" by "Crackley Startler". "Soubrette" won a certificate under Capt. Phipps in England. "Gallant Fox" has sired more winners than all others combined in England last year and is rated the world's foremost producer.

We had hoped to be able to give a report on the Saskatoon Show, but we will merely state that the fanciers from Edmonton, Mrs. M. D. Gardner, A. J. Hale, Billy Quilley and son Tom, are loud in their praises of the treatment accorded them at Saskatoon, and wish the members of the Saskatoon

Club even greater success with their next venture.

There seems to be a lot of activity in Labrador circles these days. Mr. W. C. Bradburn is very enthusiastic about a litter sired by his "Ch. Black Boy of Wetmore".

While Mr. & Mrs. H, V. Clutton report the arrival of two litters total-ling eighteen, fourteen of which are males and sired by their "Grand Duke Victor".

Just as we thought we had completed this part of "Alberta News" we received the official report of the Chesapeake Retriever Trial held on the estate of Mr. R. M. Carpenter at Benton, Md., on Saturday, March 28th.


We were specially interested in the following:—The number of dogs competing was fourty-four, a jump from fourteen last year, and just equal to the largest gathering of the breed on record, that being the Club's Specialty Bench Show at Morris & Essex in 1935, and only exceeded by one retriever trial in the United States, the all-breed Brookhaven trial in the fall of 1935.

The derby and novice stakes were both won by "Just Ted" sired by "Ch. Chesacroft Newt", this dog being at present in the Airline Kennels. Fourth place in the novice, with an entry of seventeen, went to "Airline Stepping Stones". This young bitch is sired by "Airline Modish Major" ex W. G. Slocombe's "La Nonne Peggy", she by "Ch. Airline Sir Bud" and was sold to Mr. Anthony A. Bliss, but is now the property of R. R. M. Carpenter, Jr., of Montchanin, Del.

There were several points in the British Columbia notes of last issue that took our attention, one of which was the raising of kennel licenses in Kamloops.

However, we feel that all things considered, this is mild in comparison to the scare that was thrown into the ranks of dog fanciers in Alberta, by a bill that was introduced at the last sitting of the Legislature, by which it was proposed to place a tax of one dollar on all dogs in the Province, not excepting those owned in cities and municipalities where a tax is already paid. It was also proposed to charge ten dollars for kennel licenses, this was also understood to be in addition to those already paid, the purpose of this tax being to provide a fund for the reimbursement of farmers for losses of sheep killed by dogs.

With still vivid memories of earlier and better days, we have genuine sympathy with those who sustain such losses, but when in the argument in support of the bill it was admitted that in most cases the responsibility

for ownership of the dogs could not be placed as most of the killing was done at night, and that there were considerable losses from coyotes and other predatory animals, why should a lady with a small kennel of Poms or Pekes, the limit of whose range is the house and a portion of the yard, and who already pays taxes to the limit to the city or town in which she lives, be asked to pay an additional tax for the benefit of some sheep breeder whose loss might not have been caused by dogs at all.

Then it would be so easy for those employed in enforcing this tax to walk into such a kennel and establish the ownership. But what of the hordes of large, half starved brutes belonging to Indians, trappers and a lot not owned by anyone? and all potential sheep killers, scores of which no tax would be collected on year after year.

Perhaps a very small tax to provide means of identification for dogs not already taxed, would be fair, with a fine for those who tried to evade it. Make the fee small and the fine large.

There is, however, another class perhaps more vitally interested in the dog nuisance than anyone else, and that is the organized dog breeders. They have felt for a long time that from them, and them only, should come the means of regulation, but as we know from experience year after year when support has been sought for measures that would have a very beneficial effect, it has just been a case of butting into the proverbial stone wall. But you will always find those who think they know your business better than yourself.

We seem to have again covered the average amount of space and while appreciating the notes that have come in, we are still far from satisfied with the number of fanciers who have sent in news from outside the Edmonton district.



The dog from the Toy Group was Mrs. A. W. Rose's Pomeranian, "Ch. Salisbury Sensation," who had won the Toy Group 9 times, and was nominated the best Toy for 1935. The best Non-Sporting dog was L. T. Spragues' Chow Chow, "Ch. Tokio Sontang" with 4 group victories. Best in Working Group was Miss Marie Leary's superb German Shepherd dog, "Ch. Anthony of Cosalta," with 9 wins in his group.

Maritime Notes

OW that the warmer days are just around the corner, and as distemper appeared to be quite prevalent among our Maritime dogs, during the past winter, it would be a good idea for all fanciers to thoroughly disinfect their kennels right now.

The practice of carrying out the periodic disinfection of kennels, is one to be highly commended. The process corresponds to that of the spring cleaning of a house, during which accumulations of dust and dirt are got rid of and the premises generally cleaned and tidied up. It is a form of prevention which should be more generally adopted than it is at the present time. When carried out as a routine measure the process is naturally not so thorough as after the occurrence of an outbreak of disease. The method of procedure and the extent and thoroughness of the operation of disinfection depends on the character of the premises in which the diseased animal has been housed, and also on the nature of the disease, but the following is a guide to the disinfection of a building after the occurrence of a highly contagious disease such as distemper. The error committed by most people when disinfecting premises is to start by removing accumulations of excreta, discharges, dust, dirt, etc. By doing so, the casual organisms or viruses contained in them are disseminated throughout the building in the dust created, and they may lodge in places which cannot be reached subsequently by the disinfection solution. The proper method of procedure is first to apply liberally to all parts of the premises which could possibly have become contaminated, a suitable disinfectant in solution and to leave it in contact for at least 24 hours. After it has been allowed to act for 24 hours, the walls, etc., should be scraped, the debris collected and removed outside, soaked with sufficient paraffin oil and burnt. In due course the walls, etc., can be whitewashed or painted. Limewash by itself is not a disinfectant and sufficient carbolic acid should therefore be added so that the final solution contains 5 per cent of the disinfectant. Leaving all doors and windows wide open, thereby allowing the free air circulation and the penetration of the maximum amount of sunlight, will help the process of rendering inert any infectious material which may have escaped the disinfectant.

An interesting item on dog shows ap-

peared in a late issue of an English magazine. The first dog show ever held was that at Newcastle-on-Tyne in 1859, and as the pioneer of a world-wide movement, it was a notable event. It was held in conjunction with a poultry show and was confined to Pointers and Setters, of which there were 23 entries of the former and 37 of the latter. A local paper of the time remarked that certainly at no former time was ever witnessed in this town, and to sportsmen, such an interesting exhibition. The first prizes in each class were doublebarrelled guns. The idea was so acceptable that Birmingham followed suit within a few months, and ever since then, with the exception of war years, the Birmingham Dog Show Society has been among the foremost promoters of shows. A contemporary newspaper, describing the show, wrote that "it would have been well if the dogs could have been arranged on raised platforms instead of lying on the floor, as the space between them was not more than sufficiently wide to accommodate one "crino-With all these disadvantages of space the affair was a grand success. Nearly 10,000 people visited the exhibition.

I recently had the pleasure of viewing some lovely photos of that grand bench and field Pointer, "Easco Old Gold," owned by Leigh Devoe of Saint John.

The pictures show her on several different points, and speaks well for Mr. Devoe as a photographer and trainer.

This bitch, in the last couple of years, has been a consistent bench show winner, and last Spring won the trophy for best sporting dog or bitch at the show sponsored by the Maritime Ladies' Kennel Club at Saint John.

Mr. Devoe is highly elated with the success he attained with "Goldie" her first fall out.

She was bred by one of Eastern Canada's pioneer breeders and exhibitors of Pointers, Robert Orr, who has had the honor of breeding numerous dual type champions.

She is by the good dog "Easco Whichone", out of "Easco Parmachene Belle".

And now we will hear from Mr. Burns:

The annual meeting of the Nova Scotia Kennel Club took place on Tuesday evening, March 24th, with the largest attendance in many years. It was decided that the club would hold a one-day show during the coming summer, the location of which has not yet been decided. The members voted against a continuance of shows in connection with the N.S. Exhibition and held the unsuitable condition of the dog show building and the advanced dates of the Exhibition as reasons for this

new move. A slate of officers for the current year is as follows: President, C. A. Power; vice-president, H. M. McLeod; secretary-treasurer, A. V. Martin. The directors are: E. V. Turner, Dr. Keyes, Major E. P. Flowers, F. Fougere. A new and special committee known as the Social Committee was formed and is composed of: E. V. Turner, Geoffrey G. Ryder and Mr. Andrew Ross.

H. F. MacDonald of Halifax has purchased, from the Glenalla Kennels, a young Wire-Haired Fox Terrier dog, "Glenalla My Punch", a nice sized, hound marked dog with many good qualities that should prove a great aid to his show and stud career. This one was sired by "Corinthian Cyclone" and is out of "Glenalla Mollie". Some well-known Wires are named in his lineage; some of these are as follows: "Ch. Talvera Simon", "Walnut Gamecock", "Ch. Vanity Bantam", "Ch. Fountain Crusader", "Dogberry Live Wire" and "Ch. Chantry Coddy".

Not long ago the writer drew attention to unsportsmanlike conduct of certain exhibitors at local shows, which conduct consisted of efforts to influence the judge in making his awards, remarks detrimental to certain entries, complaints, criticisms and stage whispers regarding the ability of the judge. Such actions always create a very bad impression, particularly among those who are attending their first dog show, and is, to say the least, an evidence of poor sportsmanship and a matter of very bad taste. Fortunately, those guilty of such offences are greatly in the minority; nevertheless, it is a practice that callsfor concerted effort on the part of fairminded exhibitors to discourage such actions, regardless of whether the guilty parties be novices or experienced exhibitors.

Saskatchewan Notes

ELL its been a splendid show", "Its been a real show". Such were the comments heard on all sides as the eighth annual spring show of the Saskatoon Kennel Club was drawing to its close. The writer has not witnessed so much interest shown in dogs on the part of the general public in Saskatoon for a good many years. From two o'clock on Friday, when the show was officially opened by his Worship Mayor R. M. Pinder, until the last Special was handed out late on Saturday night, large crowds filled the building. Entries were up fully forty per cent over many of the shows held here in recent years. Competition was keen in many classes and the average quality of the dogs compared very favourably with that seen at many of the larger shows.

The show itself was exceptionally well staged with all benches newly painted and splendidly arranged. In fact there was a noticeable cleanliness and neatness to the whole arrangement that was indeed a credit to the Superintendent, Mr. Frank Jackson.

As show Secretary, Mr. J. M. Ayre was as efficient as ever in his duties, and from first to last everything ran smoothly. That sterling fancier, Dr. Margaret D. French, the President, worked exceptionally hard to make this show a success, and must have felt well repaid for all her efforts.

Mayor Pinder in his speech at the opening of the show complimented Dr. French, especially, for her interest in the stray dogs of Saskatoon, and also to her assistance to the city in eliminating many of its doggie problems.

Mr. J. C. Fletcher of Calgary, who judged all breeds, gave entire satisfaction; in fact "Jack" was at his best. His work in the ring reminded one of the silent moving pictures of a few years ago, when actions spoke louder than words. Patient and considerate with Amateur and Professional alike, he did everything possible to bring the best out of every specimen that came before him.

Right here I would like to mention his work in judging the handlers class. There were seventeen ladies in the ring competing for the best lady handler, including "Billy" Quilly of Edmonton, who had donned a ladies skirt, coat and hat, and was stepping daintly around the ring. About a dozen of the competitors had been given the gate when Billy produced a tooth brush and commenced brushing his dogs teeth. The judge immediately ripped off some of the disguise and ordered Billy out of the ring, accompanied by a swift kick. This diversion caused much merriment among the large crowd of spectators. The remaining competitors were then given different dogs to handle, Mrs. Pat Randall of Saskatoon, being the eventual winner.

Numerous entries were received for the best boy handler under fifteen years, the ring being crowded with youthful contenders. One little fellow about twice as high as his wire Foxterrier was called upon to pose his dog on the board, and a good job he made of it too. The judge then presented him with a box of candy, pinned a red ribbon on his chest and escorted him from the ring while the crowd applauded. The older boys were then called upon to "do their stuff" and the eliminating process started. Before giving them "the gate" each boy was shown just how his dog should be posed, and received a box of candy as a consolation prize.

The competitors were now reduced to two; Clarence Kerton with his wire Fox Terrier, and Herbert Jackson with his English Bulldog. Both dogs were moved by the judge, but the boys were not to be caught napping and immediately placed their dogs back in the correct position. Jack appeared ever so serious as he endeavoured to arrive at a decision. Finally a broad smile appeared on his face as he walked over and selected two first prize ribbons and pronounced it a dead heat. Again the crowd showed its appreciation.

When being complimented for the way he had judged this competition, Jack's only remark was "Mister, I love Kiddies".

"Ch. Broadlands Blue Bob", the Old English Sheepdog, owned and handled by Mr. G. Kynoch, Winnipeg, won best dog in show. This dog was in grand fettle, moved as a dog of this variety should move, and showed to perfection.

"Springlake", the home of Dr. French, has always been "open house" whenever a dog show is being staged in Saskatoon, and this occasion was no exception. Visiting and local fanciers alike gathered there in a real get-together. Mr. W. F. Newman, Rencot Kennels Reg'd, Moosejaw, writes that he has an exceptionally promising young Scotch Terrier male, named "Rencot Stout-Fella". This youngster is sired by "Ch. Cockpen" his dam being "Wyrecote Rencot Lassie". Two females, sisters of this dog, have been sold recently. This fancier also states that he intends to breed his brood matrons to the very best stud dogs available, which is a mighty good plan to follow, for the old saying "like begets like" still holds good. Nothing but disappointments can come from the matings of inferior specimens.

Representing the Saskatoon Kennel Club, the writer attended the banquet of the Saskatoon branch of the Saskatchewan Fish and Game Association, held in the Bessborough Hotel, Saskatoon, on March the 23rd. About four hundred attended this banquet, which was undoubtedly one of the largest of its kind ever held.

Delegates were in attendance from Alberta, Manitoba and from many points in Saskatchewan.

Mr. Lester A. Colby, of Chicago, representing the General Wild Life Federation, travelled fifteen hundred miles to be in attendance at this gathering. He was the main speaker of the evening. In outlining the Nation wide game conservation program launched in the United States through the General Wild Life Federation of that country, the speaker assured those present that a genuine effort was being made across the line to return annually to Canada a larger number of migratory birds which regularly winter in the south.

A new method is to be adopted in Saskatchewan this spring in an effort to combat the crow menace. About one thousand crows are to be trapped alive. These will then be banded and liberated in different parts of the province. Prizes of from one to one hundred dollars will be paid for the return of these bands. The Government of Saskatchewan will spend approximately three thousand dollars in this campaign.

Many persons still consider the crows innocent of the accusations made against them, yet moving pictures shown at this banquet revealed some of these black marauders actually stealing the eggs of waterfowl and upland game birds.

Early one morning last spring, the writer, accompanied by his young son, were taking a walk over the prairie. when we spied a crow's nest in a tree. George climed up to find the nest contained four young crows. Leaving the bush we were walking across a dried out slough when, upon a pile of dead reeds that had once been a duck's nest, we found the empty shells of forty-seven partridge eggs, some of them still containing liquid yolk. We gazed back at that nest in the tree with thoughts of murder in our hearts, but it was the Sabbath morn so we continued our ramble.

The sad news has come to me this month of the death of Mr. Thomas William Jackson of Regina, who passed away on March 21st, from the effects of wounds received in the Great War eighteen years ago. He was in his thirty-eighth year, and had been a resident of Regina for thirty years. A real dog lover, his favourites were the Irish Setters. Fanciers throughout the province will join in extending our deepest sympathy to Mrs. Jackson in her great loss.

Vitamins In Food

Being a paper read to London Canine Association

By Dr. J. M. Rice, London, Ont.

Vitamins are used in the treatment and prevention of various vitamin deficiency diseases. Their use is a matter of supplementing the food with the vitamins lacking, and their action depends upon the internal secretions of ductless and other glands.

Although vitamins may not actually cure disease by direct action on the morbid tissues, they do hinder complications. For example: vitamin A, if given in canine distemper, does not cure it, but it does prevent the advance of bronchial complications if given before the killing form comes on. The action of this vitamin on the cellular layer which lines the respiratory mucous membrane is so beneficial that it should be a part of modern treatment of infections invading the respiratory organs.

Vitamin A is also called the growth promoting vitamin. It works in combination with calcium. Builds up resistance to disease. Common colds are retarded by the action of vitamin A, in fact, all the cellular layers which line the internal cavities and canals of the body are affected by this vitamin being absent from the food.

Carotene, which is the yellow coloring matter of carrots, is supposed to be the same as vitamin A, and has been used with good results in the treatment of diseases caused by vitamin A deficiency.

Certain eye diseases are caused by the lack of vitamin A. One of these: the eye takes on a dry and lusterless appearance and in time the whole eye becomes useless. The bony structure or canal where the optic nerve passes through, becomes pinched, due to the porous and swollen condition of the bone, consequently the optic nerve is also pinched which condition does not allow sufficient nerve force to be carried to the eye.

Positive Factors in Health or Functions of Vitamin A.: Vitamin A promotes tissue formation, reproduction, increases blood platelet (that which tends to make blood coagulate) promotes growth and a feeling of wellbeing, increases the appetite and aids digestion especially in children and young animals. It is essential to the health and vitality of all tissue which lines the various organs of the body and its resistance to infection, especially of the eyes, tonsils, sinuses, air passages, lungs, stomach and intestines.

Results of Deficiency: Loss of appetite, retardation of growth and development, physical weakness, susceptibility to diseases of the eye, middle ear diseases and kidney diseases. Interferes with reproduction, by failure of the egg or ova to develop in the female and by temporary injury to the internal structures of the male organs. Secondary anemia, excessive growth of lymphoid (fluid) tissue, formation of kidney stones, diseases of the stomach such as gastritis, inflammation of the bladder, bronchitis and formation of pus in various parts of the body. Failure of appetite, cessation of growth and sterility in both sexes.

Most reliable sources of vitamin A are cod liver oil, dairy products such as whole milk, cheese, butter; green and leafy vegetables, yellow corn, yellow sweet potatoes, carrots, spinach, green beans, peas, bananas, and fish oils. Alfalfa which is dried in the shade has more than four times that which is dried in the sun. Excessive heating tends to destroy vitamin A, it is also easily destroyed by exposure to air. It can stand drying and ordinary cooking. The loss of vitamin A is 20 to 50% by winter storage.

Ontario Bird Dog Trials

The Spring Trials of the Ontario Bird Dog Association, held for Setters and Pointers, consisting of Puppy Derby and All Age Shooting Dog Stakes, were held at Hamilton on Good Friday and Saturday, April the 10th and 11th, on courses located one mile south of the Ontario Hospital.

These courses are ideal for Field Trials, consisting of open rolling grass lands, old orchards and open woods, just the proper place to test the ability of these dogs. Birds were not as plentiful on these courses as last year, due no doubt to the long, cold winter. Most of the birds found were cocks, and these are difficult to handle under ideal conditions.

Residents of the district reported the hen birds still in a bunch, but we were unfortunate in not being able to locate them. It is quite apparent from the number of birds found on the courses that some additional protection and propagation will have to be given these grounds if we are to continue to run our Spring Trials at Hamilton. Weather conditions were anything but ideal for the Trials. Good Friday was dull and cold with strong raw winds blowing. Saturday was wet and cold with rain falling off and on all day. These conditions made scenting very poor, the dogs having difficulty in locating their birds.

The drawing took place at the office of Meakins & Sons, King St. W., Hamilton, at 8 o'clock on Thursday, April 9th.

We had a very nice turnout to watch the Trials on Friday—many new faces were seen. Sportsmen interested in Setters and Pointers are most enthusiastic. We feel certain the future is very bright for these Trials in Ontario. Our Association now has members from Ottawa to Windsor and from Niagara Falls to Owen Sound. What we need most at present is a suitable, well stocked, protected area, located in central southern Ontario, that would give us definite assurance of plenty of native birds.

Due to illness our President, Col. W. N. Singer, was unable to attend and he was greatly missed. We wish him a speedy recovery.

Puppy Stake

6 Setters and 2 Pointers (20-minute heats).

3rd Brace: Black Marvel of Numar with Jim Reid. These were both puppies with little or no experience. However, Jim ran into a cackling cock pheasant. I don't know which was the most surprised, but Jim was steady as a rock.

4th Brace: Chap of Glengrove with Sport of Numar. Both these puppies were restricted in range and lacked experience.

3rd Brace: Captain Jene Chedoke with Igopon. These are two real shooting dogs, both covering their course at limited range and speed. one find, well located, but the bird kept running, refusing to lay.

4th Brace: Tony Selkirk with Niagara Ghost. This was the classiest heat of the day. Tony ranges well and is a very smooth running dog; had one flash point. His prairie training sure improved his going. Ghost also ran a nice heat, more limited in range, but could not find game.

5th Brace: Pals Prince Rodney with Chocolate Soldier as a second series dog. Pals started off to run a nice heat but connected with a running bird and left for parts unknown, and by the time his handler got him back on the course the time was up. Soldier ran his usual stylish race but did not improve his position.

From the daily press we learn that the Alberta Government has just been considering a bill having for its objective the taxing of ordinary dogs \$1.00, and pure-bred dogs \$10.00 a year in order to raise revenue to compensate farmers whose sheep might be destroyed by marauding canines, however, the bill was defeated on its second reading without division, and in view of the strength of the opposition it has been struck from the order paper.

The Alberta Government should take cognizance of the very important circumstance that pure-bred dogs are protected to a certain extent by the Live Stock Pedigree Act. It is generally accepted by Provincial and Municipal authorities that they have nothing to fear from pure-bred dogs that are considered to be valuable from the breeding and exhibition viewpoints. Such dogs are properly kennelled and controlled. When the sheep killer is
