MONTHLY MEETING

The Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., will be held in the Club's Board Room, 25 Melinda Street, Toronto, on Thursday, June 18th, 1936, at 3.30 p.m.

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Meeting of the Board of Directors

of the
Canadian Kennel Club, Incorporated

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., was held in the Board Room of the Club's Offices, 25 Melinda Street, Toronto, on Tuesday evening, May 19th, 1936, at 7.30 o'clock. The President, Colonel J. N. MacRae, was in the chair. Directors present included Reg. P. Sparkes, James Eccles, Fred W. Walkerdine, Captain H. Dudley-Waters, B. W. Essery, K.C., and Raymond Tyrwhitt.

It was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That, the Minutes be taken as read."

Mr. Sparkes, Chairman of the Kennel and Bench Committee, reported progress on behalf of the Committee.

The Secretary mentioned that, on May 6th, Miss E. Crew's eldest brother was buried, and that, as a consequence, Miss Crew left the staff of the club in order to go home and care for her mother. The Secretary reported the appointment of Miss L. Mae Kelsey to fill the position vacated by Miss Crew.

The Secretary reported that Mr. Climo requested that the name of Mr. H. P. Saunders be added to the Alberta Provincial Committee in place of Mr. D. B. Young; that Mr. Ross had requested that the name of Mr. E. M. Wright be added to the Quebec Provincial Committee in place of Mr. S. T. Doyle.

The complaint of Mrs. A. L. Oxenham against Mrs. F. D. Elsted was reviewed by the Board of Directors, Mrs. Oxenham having alleged that the dog identified by certificate of registration (126722), and under the name of "PHANTOM FLIGHTY BESS" was not of the age and colour as represented on the certificate of registration. Her complaint was referred to the Chairman of the British Columbia Provincial Committee for investigation. Mr. Irving, having heard that "PHANTOM FLIGHTY BESS" had been returned to Vancouver, made arrangements to have the bitch examined for age and color, and submitted a report signed by R. G. Cuthbert, B.V.Sc., T. R. R. Hoggan, M.R.C.V.S., and K. D. A. Sewell, V.S., who gave it as being their opinion that she was approximately four years of age. The color, not being strictly a veterinary

question, was described as black with white hairs intermingled, giving a greyish appearance to the coat. A further veterinary report was on hand from Dr. T. E. Sleeth, Vancouver, who attributed the coat color to iron deficiency in the system having to do with pigment coloring in coat, causing the animal to go grey in early life.

After further consideration of the evidence of Doctors K. D. A. Sewell, T. R. R. Hoggan, and R. G. Cuthbert, also that of Dr. T. E. Sleeth, the various sworn statements, and other circumstances considered favorable to Mrs. Oxenham's contentions (as set forth in her own letters), it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That, this Board concurs with the report submitted by the Director for British Columbia."

It was also agreed that Mr. Irving would be reimbursed for his expenses in respect to the investigation.

The Secretary reported that he had received a file from the Records' Office concerning the purchase of a Collie by Mr. Swift from Mr. Widgett, and requested the matter to be left with him in the meantime. It was agreed that the matter of Mr. Swift's complaint against Mr. Widgett be left in the hands of the Secretary.

The Secretary referred to a letter from the Records' Office in connection with Kennel Names that had lapsed according to Article 15, Section 3, of the Constitution, which reads as follows:

"After the expiration of five years, a registered name will be forfeited if it has not been used in registering a dog by the registered owner, unless the owner has been a continuous member."

Mr. Sparkes and Capt. Waters voiced objection to the present arrangement as provided for by the Constitution and advanced several arguments why Kennel Names, once registered, should hold good for life.

After further discussion, it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That, the matter be left on the table."

A letter from Mr. L. E. O'Neill, Director of the Ontario Department of Agriculture, was read concerning the advisability and possibility of the Live

Stock fraternity throughout Canada making arrangements with one of the larger hotels in the City of Toronto whereby space might be set aside to be known as a Club Room and Meeting Place for the Live Stock men when in the City of Toronto, and where paintings and photographs of men who had contributed to the success of Live Stock in Canada might be hung.

After discussion, Col. MacRae was appointed as delegate of the club to the meeting proposed to be held at the time of the Canadian National Exhibition when the matter would be discussed further.

The Secretary reported that the matter of Mrs. Winslade's complaint against Mrs. Patemen had been referred to the Director for Manitoba, Mr. Kynoch, but no report had as yet been received from him.

Letters complaining of the conduct of Mr. C. N. Gibson at the Canine Breeders' and Exhibitors' Show having been received from Mr. Sparkes, one visitor (Mr. Hird) and from Judges, Wm. McDermont and Fred Smith, were read. Mr. Sparkes mentioned that his letter was not prompted from the viewpoint of an exhibitor, but primarily as Vice-President of the Canadian Kennel Club, who felt that there was great danger of this manner of behaviour spreading, if not curbed at the very start.

In virtue of Article 3, Section 8, of the Constitution, it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That, due to several complaints having been received from several sources including that of two officiating judges, Mr. C. N. Gibson be denied the privileges of the Canadian Kennel Club."

A resume of Mr. Weatherall's complaint against Mr. Longo, was given by the Secretary. Mr. Longo, Mr. Stockdale (representing Mr. Longo), Mr. Taylor, Mr. McNulty and Mr. Weatherall were requested to enter the Board Room, the gentlemen named being in attendance by arrangement.

In the questioning of Mr. Longo, Mr. Weatherall and Mr. McNulty by Mr. Sparkes, Mr. Stockdale and the President, the following facts were revealed:

1. That the dog was bred by Mr. McNulty, Sire, "White Solarium," Dam, "Baldwin Contribution." Born October 25th, 1934, and therefore eligible for registration. These facts were proven by the certificate of registration of the litter which was produced by Mr. McNulty.
2. That Mr. Longo purchased the dog from Mr. McNulty for \$15.00, Mr. McNulty securing a written agreement from Mr. Longo setting

forth that no papers were to be furnished at that price. Mr. McNulty produced a written agreement at the meeting showing that Mr. Longo had agreed to that condition.

3. That Mr. Longo held no signed agreement from Mr. Weatherall that papers were not to be supplied.
4. Mr. Longo admitted receiving \$5.00 from Mr. Weatherall in payment of the dog but denied receiving \$10.00 to complete the purchase price. Mr. Weatherall said that he had paid \$5.00 for the dog and that there was a service credit \$10.00 to be considered.
5. It was agreed that the fault lay with Mr. Longo not supplying the papers to Mr. Weatherall because he (Longo) did not have a sworn statement as required by the Constitution, therefore no fault could be attached to Mr. McNulty who had in his possession a signed agreement.

Mr. McNulty voiced objection at the wording of the minutes as reported in Kennel and Bench. The Directors agreed that this would be corrected in the minutes recording final settlement of the matter when it appeared in Kennel and Bench.

After considerable discussion, Mr. Weatherall said he would pay \$10.00 in order to secure the papers. When this offer was made, it was agreed on a motion regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That, the matter be laid on the table until the next Board Meeting, at which time action under the Live Stock Pedigree Act will be taken if no settlement has been made."

This matter of deferring the case for one month was made possible when Mr. McNulty exhibited willingness to assist in the adjusting of the difficulty.

The Secretary reported that the representatives of the following clubs had met at the Carls Rite Hotel in connection with the possible change in Beagle Field Trial Championship Rule No. 39: Canadian National Beagle Club, Hamilton Beagle Club, Oshawa Beagle Club and Le Club de Beagles Ta-I-O de Montreal, Inc.

The present rule No. 39 reads:

"In order to become a Field Trial Champion of record, a dog must be placed first at one Championship Trial."

The suggested change proposed reads:

"In order to become a Canadian Field Trial Champion a Beagle must be placed three times at recognized championship trials and that one of such placings must be a first place."

It was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That, Beagle Field Trial Rule No. 39 be changed as suggested to conform to the requirements of the Beagle Hound Clubs in Canada."

The proposed recognition of Nova Duck Toller Dogs was again brought up for discussion when it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That, the matter of the recognition of the Duck Toller Dog be laid on the table until the sponsors are in a position to furnish satisfactory proof of uniformity of type for the breed."

The Secretary advised that the Marsh-Gislason complaint had been investigated and reported upon by Dr. J. K. Morrow early in the year. Dr. Morrow's report and recommendation had been received, endorsed and both Marsh and Gislason had been advised accordingly. The file was returned to the Record's Office. However, Mr. Gislason had not yet taken care of Mr. Marsh's transfer requirements and so the matter was again before the Directors. It was agreed to send the file to Mr. Kynoch for further attention.

The matter of the maturing of two \$1,000 Province of Ontario Bonds, the property of the club, was brought up for attention. After discussion, it was agreed that the matter be brought up for further notice at the next meeting.

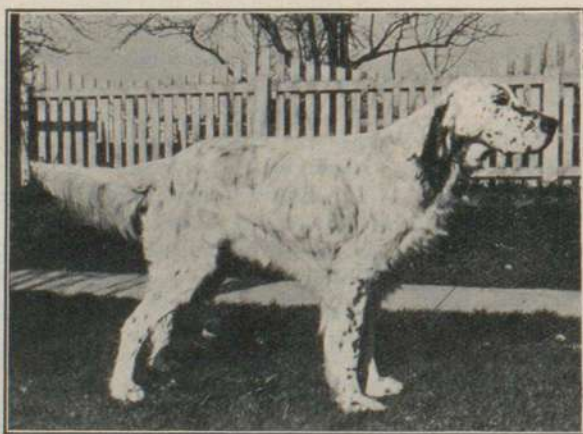

• "The Greatest Beagle I Ever Saw"

Under the above caption, Ike Carroll, the able editor of our contemporary, "Hounds and Hunting", invited his readers to step up and say their piece. Several essayed to oblige, but naturally there was a reticence based on a very logical reason. However, seven unbiased contributors obliged, and one more who might be excused if he did have the possible prejudice of ownership. Anyway, we were pleased to notice that three out of the eight paid their respects to the Preston, Ontario, bred International Field Trial Champion "Haig's Traveller" (112208), a dog that the breeder-owner, Dr. L. G. Hagmeier, of the "Haig" Kennels, is justly proud.

Mr. Harry C. Austin, a one-time secretary of the Canadian National Beagle Club, a Beagle judge and handler, had this to say for "Haig's Traveller":

"While being associated with this great little breed of hounds for the past fifteen years, in following them to the gun, in training several hundred of them, and in attending the most of the major trials from the Mississippi River east to the Atlantic Coast for several years and competing against the great, and also called great Beagles, I find this a real big question to answer.

"After giving the question considerable serious thought and without prejudice or reservation I believe International Field Champion 'Haig's Traveller' is the greatest Beagle hound I have ever had the pleasure of watching run a rabbit, with Field Champion 'Avon Blue Dispatch' a close second.

"Not because of the field championships that they have both won with such high honors, but because of their technique in running a rabbit and overcoming obstacles that I have seen other hounds falter at, their willing and cheerful dispositions, their competitive spirit, not excitable under strain, and most of all, brains, and how to use them.

"So many times I have seen 'Traveller' at the trials and also in training, led off the line by a faster brace mate (there are quite a few faster Beagles than 'Traveller', for a short distance) but he would soon overcome the speed factor by staying closer to the line and at his checks, and as I started to say, when being led off the line, after going a few feet, I have seen him stop, throw up his head and think, but only for the fraction of a second, and then snap back toward the line, and he has an uncanny

way of always casting in the right direction, grab the line and in his deep, booming voice give the challenge: 'I've got it, let's go,' and the race would be on again.

"I have seen him run alone, in brace, and in pack, for hours at a time, and never change his style, his desire diminish, or his spirit wear down, a tireless all-day hunter and searcher who loved the gun, and also loved to win, but would not cheat to do so.

"There are probably a few Beagles as good and maybe better, but if so I have failed to observe them or not seen enough of them to change my opinion, for 'Traveller' was in my hands for two seasons and did all of his placing at trials with me, excepting once, and was also at my kennels for six months in training, therefore I have seen more of him than I have seen of the other so-called great hounds of the past fifteen years.

"In checking over the records, I find that there was only one hound placed over him at the trials, but what he had defeated one or more times in the same class, and this one hound was never in the same class with him but once, and I feel sure that 'Traveller' could have defeated him in direct competition.

"I have another Beagle man's opinion to back up mine, an Eastern judge who has been judging Beagles for a long, long time, he had judged 'Traveller' before and given him second place when he could have just as well been given first, but in this particular instance at a Mid-Western trial, 'Traveller' was braced with another great little hound (who is now a field champion) and this hound had been giving 'Traveller' plenty to think about on a rabbit around and through a large brush lot, twisting and turning and trying to throw the hounds off his scent, but finally the hounds got too close for him and he took down through a valley across a raging stream about twenty feet wide, the judge could not get his horse across the stream, so he stayed up on the high bank where he could observe every step the rabbit and the hounds took. I do not know how the rabbit got across the stream, but both hounds plunged in and took up scent on opposite side, and here is where 'Traveller's' good qualities begin to show for he was first across and in the lead, the rabbit tore across the valley, up the hill along a fence for some distance, then through the fence into an open field and back toward

the valley again, he came down the hill almost to the stream, changed his mind (stream too cold, maybe), doubled back up the hill about twenty feet from the line he came down on, then off at a left angle when he heard the hounds coming toward him and bounced off never to be seen again. The hounds came on with 'Traveller' catching the turns and in the lead, down the hill and caught this double on the dead run, going exactly where the rabbit had gone coming right back up toward us. The one judge, the other handler and myself followed the hounds all this distance. As we reached the edge of the bank I began to wonder what had happened, but just then the hounds were ordered up and we caught them.

"Upon returning across the stream and coming up behind the judges still talking it over, the judge who had remained behind and seen it all, was heard to say: 'That was the greatest piece of hound work I believe I ever saw, when 'Traveller' come down that hill catching the double and right back up again in full cry, without a moment's hesitation, neither casting or swinging to right or left, just laying on that line and going like —.' Of course, we handlers were not supposed to hear this, but we could not plug up our ears and the judges did not know we were there, but needless to say, 'Traveller' got the nod and I felt better after, not knowing what happened down the valley and back up the bank.

"And seeing these things and others just as thrilling happen with 'Traveler' many, many times, makes me think that 'Traveler' is the greatest Beagle hound I ever saw run a rabbit, and as I said at the beginning, I think Fd. Ch. 'Avon Blue Dispatch' is a close second, for they are so much alike in their style and performance. I might have to change my mind to conform with my good friend, Bill Sulceberger, for I have heard him say all these good things about Fd. Ch. 'Whiteheart's Challenger' and Fd. Ch. 'Avon Blue Dispatch', and for the same reason, he had seen more of them in their every day work, than he or I had seen of some of the other truly great Beagle hounds of our day.

"But what a sight it would be, to see all these great hounds braced together on the same rabbit several times, until we did find that one greatest Beagle hound, and until then I will string along with International Field Champion 'Haig's Traveller'."

EDITORIAL COMMENT

THE CONDITION OF DOGDOM IN CANADA

Probably the time is opportune to focus attention on some phases of the condition of Canadian Dogdom at the present time. Generally speaking, the industry—or sport—whichever term our readers may prefer, is substantially sound and healthy. Nevertheless, we are reluctantly obliged to notice evidences of the lack of good sportsmanship indicated here and there, and from time to time. If our dog lovers, as a complete whole, could only be as consistently on the “up and up” as the dogs are themselves, what a beautiful canine atmosphere might prevail in this vigorous young country of ours.

The Constitution of the Canadian Kennel Club places the onus of individual registration on the person owning the dam at the date of the birth of the litter. This arrangement gives rise to almost unlimited dissatisfaction and to suggestions of poor sportsmanship, therefore considerable thought should be given to a more satisfying individual registration policy. The breeders' responsibility in respect to registration might well end when the litter has been properly recorded. There is no other part of our business which gives rise to so much disturbance of our operations than the individual registration policy as at present prescribed by our Constitution, and, in this respect, the broad-minded members of affiliated Live Stock Associations might concede that dogs are different than horses, swine, sheep, etc.

Let us notice what happens following the birth of many litters of puppies. The breeder very properly records the litter. Later, he may sell the progeny at modest prices, i.e., \$10.00, \$15.00 or \$20.00 each, and from these amounts the costs of litter registration, individual registration and transfer must be met. What really happens in many cases is this, the breeder registers the litter, and later he sells the progeny at the prices quoted, but individual

registration becomes “a cat of a different color.” Here, the seller seeks to impose different obligations on the buyer. The seller may not mention registration papers at all—why should he? Or, he may suggest that the buyer should pay for the registration and transfer costs, and this—in 99 cases out of 100—the buyer will be willing to do. Here, the seller should be able to take his price, furnish the buyer with an application for individual registration form prepared to show the transfer to the new ownership, hand this voucher to the new owner and consider the deal consummated. Much of what we are obliged to describe as “poor sportsmanship” certainly arises from the individual registration obligation of the breeder, at the present time. The present arrangement may not be the best arrangement, and, any change that would place the onus of individual registration on the buyer, would stimulate individual registration in Canada.

Since the repeal of prohibition, we regret to notice an undesirable condition developing at our shows. With the freedom of personal liberty we do not seek to interfere, so we are content to express our regret at being obliged to notice fanciers indulging too freely sometimes. It is characteristic of the human to become careless of his or her speech, and general behaviour, after any extended period of “looking on the wine when it is red,” and things are done and words are spoken that should neither be done nor spoken. In certain atmospheres these lapses from the “straight and narrow” might be condoned, but, in the atmosphere of a dog show, they are liable to be correctly branded as samples of poor sportsmanship.

The Canadian Kennel Club is highly honored in having for their especial trust the good and welfare of “Man's Best Friend,” and in this respect its members

and adherents should be men and women eager to play their parts in the general scheme of things openly, joyously, frankly and friendly. The matter of suspicions and distrusts should be controllable in such a manner that either of these evils could be properly established and easily recognized before being presented to the "powers that be" for attention.

The business of dog breeding and exhibiting should be a pleasant business and, speaking generally, it should be a profitable business. Pleasant because it centers around the animal that man has chosen to be his friend and protector, and profitable because

there is always a market for the well-bred dog that has developed into a show specimen from the yield of a carefully planned mating of selected animals.

There should not be any necessity for the suggestion of "poor sportsmanship" because our people are really "Good Sports" at heart, and any attention paid to the ethics of our game should lead to an evaporation of such a suggestion. Dog fanciers have so much in common that their only consideration should be the lifting of the sport to higher elevations that any reached heretofore.

SASKATCHEWAN FISH AND GAME LEAGUE

The third annual Saskatchewan Field Trial for Pointers and Setters will be held on the usual trial grounds 25 miles north of Moose Jaw on Highway Number 2, commencing on August 31st next and lasting one week. Participants in this trial, who will train some six hundred sporting dogs in the vicinity of the trial grounds during July and August are U. R. Fishel, of Hope, Indiana; Carl Duffield, of Tyler, Texas; Merrill Grimes, of St. Louis, Oklahoma; John Wacper, of Nashville, Tennessee; C. B. Black, High Point, North Carolina; John Harper, of Reydon, Oklahoma; George Crangle and Son of Waynesboro, Georgia; L. R. Durberow, Brooklyn, New York; Howard Kirk, of Sumner, Illinois; Fred Bevan, of Waynesboro, Georgia; O. S. Redman, Wellston, Ohio; Gordon Dubois, of Corsicana, Texas; J. D. Daniel, of Fairfield, Texas; Wm. Hudson, of Carlinville, Illinois; Clyde Anderson, Blessing, Texas; Mac and Pete Pritchette, of Catoosa, Oklahoma.

Edward Farrior, Jake Bishop, of Union Springs, Alabama, Lawrence Campbell and others will train at Forget and attend the trial from there.

Sharpe tailed grouse and Hungarian partridge survived the winter well. High cover resulting from the wet season of 1935, will provide ample safe nesting grounds, where less damage can be expected from crows and other predators.

NEW BULL TERRIER CLUB

A long felt want has now been satisfied with the formation of the Bull Terrier Club of Canada. The club had its very humble beginning in Montreal when five local Bull Terrier breeders got together at an evening show and expressed their opinion on the formation of a club. This informal meeting, needless to say, was but the forerunner of a formal meeting when officers pro tem were elected, and the Bull Terrier Club of Canada came into being.

This meeting was followed by writing to all those whom we knew to be interested in Bull Terriers. The results of the first letter was not altogether encouraging by a follow-up with a second letter made up in encouraging replies. Another meeting of the same five

breeders was held and the results of the letters were discussed and it was then decided that the replies warranted the continuance of our efforts.

The meeting was also followed by much writing of letters with which a copy of the proposed Constitution and By-Laws, an agenda of the meeting and a ballot was enclosed. The result of the return of the ballots was made official at a meeting of the Montreal members on the 18th of May. The voting showed that the slate of officers and honorary officers is as follows:

The object of the Bull Terrier Club of Canada is to promote the breeding of pure Bull Terriers in every possible way; to publish a description of the true type and a scale of points or standard. The club is to consist of an unlimited number of members and we invite each and every owner, fancier and breeder of the Bull Terrier to become a member. We are sure that there are many whom we have not already written to, and it is to these in particular to whom we direct this invitation, and this is also extended to our good neighbors to the south.

LIVE STOCK RECORD MEETING

The thirty-first annual meeting of the Canadian National Live Stock Record Board was held at the Royal York Hotel, Toronto, on April 21st, Hon. F. C. Biggs presiding. After luncheon the meeting was called to order by the chairman bidding the representatives welcome and introducing the Honourable Duncan Marshall, Minister of Agriculture for the Province of Ontario.

Hon. Mr. Marshall in the course of his remarks emphasized the circumstance of the Live Stock Record Board being one of the most important of the Live Stock organizations in the country, and that it was the only organization including all the pure-breeds.

Pedigree records of Canada have a very high standing in every country

in the world, and people from the United States who buy pure-bred animals in Canada had always recognized that a certificate of registration issued by the Live Stock Records of the Dominion of Canada was a true voucher and a safe record on which to purchase. Of course there was the odd person who messed up a pedigree record, but such a one was usually dealt with drastically enough.

The speaker paid a fine tribute to Mr. Tom Hitchman, assistant director of the Records office by referring to that gentleman's many known qualities, and to the fact that Mr. Hitchman had grown up with the Live Stock Records from the very beginning and even before that when records were first kept by individual organizations way back in 1899.

The Canadian Kennel Club representation, viz.: Col. J. N. MacRae, Reg. P. Sparkes, Capt. H. Dudley-Waters and Basil W. Essery, K.C., were all in attendance.

The election of officers found the following Record Committee elected for 1936: Chairman, Hon. F. C. Biggs; Vice-Chairman, Lt.-Col. Bartley Bull; S. J. Chagnon, W. A. Drydon, P. J. McEwen, James Douglas, J. M. Gardhouse, and Jno. W. Brant, Secretary.

EIGHT INTERNATIONAL CHAMPIONS

That is what Mr. H. P. Placey of Sherbrooke, P.Q., had in his kennel in 1929, that fateful period when the world seemed to go topsy turvey all at once. At the head of the imposing list of celebrities were the Triple Champions "Iveresk Chancellor" and "Iveresk Collyshot", with the great "Iveresk Cocksure" adding his lustre to the brilliant picture.

Mr. Placey's "Ch. Belmoss Countess", who was by "Cockshure", out of "Belvedere Flossie", has just been bred to Mr. Ray Beale of Buffalo's great winning Springer American Champion, "Marol Sir Hector", the National Kennel Club winner of 1935, when over two score Springers made up the competition.

Mr. Beale is a rare type of fancier, fair, frank and honest. Springers are an obsession with him, and in his dog, "Ch. Moral Sir Hector", he has a splendid specimen from the bench and breeding viewpoints. This dog's run after championship honors was short and sweet, whilst many of the "fair sex" attend regularly at his court.

Mr. Beale furnished a real thrill when he declared in his outspoken way that his first successes in Springers followed a visit to the Belmoss Kennels of Mr. Placey at Sherbrooke, P.Q., in 1929, when he induced that celebrity to part with "Ch. Belmoss Jacqueline", and

about two months later "Belmoss Cocksure" was also secured, and if ever a Springer Spaniel went through to the victor's honors more quickly than "Belmoss Cocksure" did, then the circumstances must have escaped my notice. He won his international crown in a very short time, and so it was recorded that Mr. Placey's assistance and advice that put Mr. Beale solidly upon the Springer Spaniel map of America.

Would it be outside of our jurisdiction to express the hope that the Can. Ch. "Belmoss Countess-(Am.) Ch. "Marol Sir Hector" alliance will yield the wherewithal that will bring the erstwhile substantial breeder-exhibitor Horace Placey back to the shows permanently once more.

FAVORS THE BULL TERRIER

Mr. W. R. Woollatt, the genial president of the Canadian Greyhound Lines, Ltd., and the busy Secretary of the Thorncliffe Park Racing and Breeding Association, Ltd., comes by his love for dogs quite honestly. The other day we were engaged in historical research work when we stopped at page 28 of the Kennel Gazette for March, 1893 (or just a trifle over 43 years ago) which read as follows:

"Mr. William Woollatt, General Superintendent of the Lake Shore and Detroit River Railway, Walkerville, has presented Mr. John Smillie, Toronto, with the exceptionally well-bred Pointer bitch, 'Jessie Croxeth.' She was bred by Mr. A. Harrington, Leamington, and was whelped May 14th, 1892. She is by 'Bud' out of 'Pope's Trixy', and in her extended pedigree are such names as 'Robt. Le Diable,' 'Patle M,' 'Prince Bang,' 'King Bow,' 'Croxeth,' 'Champion Donald,' etc."

The "William Woollatt" mentioned was Dad to our friend "W. R." of today, who advises us that his father owned around 100 Pointers and Setters at one time, and amongst them "Bacharach," a famous Pointer in his day. This splendid field working dog was given to Pater Woollatt by Si Milkins of Leamington. As a youngster "W. R." used to join his dad and such other celebrities as Sir Edmund Walker, Z. A. Lash, Arthur Harrington, Billy Stokes and others in a quest for quail at Leamington and Wheatley, but even with all this early environment Mr. Woollatt, Jr., never went in for sporting dogs to any great extent, but the "White Cavalier"—the Bull Terrier, could always meet his personal requirements in dog flesh.

At the Woollatt home there is a favorite Boston Terrier who is old enough to vote. He is "Teddy Nations" (54328), a son of "Jackson's Teddy," who was a son of "Ch. Jack-

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son's Paddy Dee." Dam of "Teddy" was "Nation's Little Imp.", and she was a daughter of "Ch Globe League of Nations." "Teddy Nations" was born on January 20th, 1926, and at the Windsor Kennel Club Show of 1930 he won for best Canadian-bred.

Here we get back to the Bull Terrier, and just to say that the next vacancy is going to be filled with a "White 'Un."

VISITORS FROM THE SUNNY SOUTH

During May we enjoyed visits from Mr. and Mrs. Ralph White, South Beverley, California, who were touring Canada in de luxe fashion. Their commodious trailer was the last word in automotive travel and offered the comforts of the very best hotels. During the time it was parked on Melinda Street it was as popular as the "Flying Scotchman" was during the visit of that great exhibit to this country.

Mr. White has a flair for dogs generally, and was the owner of the Bulldog, "Vesey Viceroy" at one time, but his real taste was discovered from the multitude of photographs featuring sporting dogs and particularly Cocker Spaniels which he carried in his brief wallet. Mr. White has a judge's license for All-Sporting breeds from the American Kennel Club and enjoys judging these breeds occasionally when he finds it convenient to do so.

Then we had Mr. and Mrs. Earl W. McIntee, all the way from Los Angeles, California, and their superb Boston Terrier, "Int. Ch. Stepin Fetchit," sire of three champions and winner of best of breed 54 times. This was a very happy little family party who had been visiting Mr. McIntee's folks at Dunville, Ont., and were getting ready to move off to the Morris and Essex Show as part of the attractions to be looked forward to on the way back home. The McIntee's have been visiting the Vancouver Shows regularly since 1930 and claim as their friends most of the British Columbia fanciers.

NEW PEKE FOR CANADA

Mrs. Ita Mae Maguire, of the Pekin Inn Kennels, West Hill, Ont., has acquired the Red brindle Pekingese, "Huc-Dah of Chinatown" (130737), and places the dog at stud in this issue of Kennel and Bench, and for those breeders who appreciate the Peke value of the "Chinatown Strain" will welcome this addition to the Peke Stud dog colony hereabouts. For the convenience of the breeders in Toronto and vicinity the dog is at the kennels of Mrs. L. L. Lewis, 219 Hamilton St., Toronto.

LEAVE IT TO THE LADIES

From the "Daily Express," London, April 29th, we gather the oft repeated statement made by Mr. Walter H. Reeves, i.e., "Dog breeding has become an imported British industry," has been endorsed, not only that, but the information is added "and women control it." In proof of the latter assertion it is set forth that, of the exhibitors attending the Ladies' Kennel Club Show, at Olympia, London, 1,046 were ladies and a mere handful of male exhibitors numbered but 400 all told. In fact, in the Peke classes supported by 50 lady exhibitors and not one single male to mar the perfect balance. In Great Danes women exhibitors furnished 27 entries as against 9 made by men, and for good measure a lady introduced the White Chow, "Choonham Moon Fang." One of the newer breeds was the Rhodesian Ridgeback Lion Dog. On this side of the Atlantic where Cockers have been large entries at all recent shows, the Ladies' Kennel Club just benched 245 of them.

Breeder exhibitors included the Duchess of Newcastle; the Duchess of Montrose; Eveline Countess of Essex; and Lorna Countess Howe.

WINS AT FIRST START

Master J. Neilson ("Neil") Kennedy, son and heir of the "Vivadora Kennel" Kennedys—Mr. and Mrs. J. R.—made an auspicious debut at the Canine Breeders and Exhibitors Association Show on Saturday, May 9th, when his attractive black and white parti-colored Cocker Spaniel, "Fandance of Barrie" swept the boards, and we believe, completed her championship. "Ch. Fandance of Barrie" had to be in prime condition to overcome the challenge of the beautiful red colored dog, "Joyful Joe of Barrie," whose coat shone like burnished gold under the overhead electric lights, and who moved going and coming with a freedom that was refreshing. This win was splendid and was richly deserved.

NEW BEAGLE FOR MONTREAL

Mr. J. A. Thouin, K.C., Montreal, P.Q., has purchased the bench type field trial winning Beagle, "Fish Creek Pansy", from Clarence W. Jones, Dunkirk, N.Y. Her field performances include 1st in a class of 14 at the Frontier trials on April 11th. At the Southern Tier trials on April 18th, in a class of 16, she was again first, and at the Lake Erie trials on April 25th she was first in a class of 17. This is very consistent running at any trials, and so it may be taken for granted that in the Recorder's most recent purchase Canada has added one more desirable hound to its already strong list of field performers.

A REALLY HIGH CLASS BOSTON

Mrs. R. E. Lipe, Toronto, had her sweet little bitch, "Lipes Bonnie Kaye", at the Northeastern Indiana Kennel Club Show at Fort Wayne, Ind., on May 9-10, under Judge Mr. Vincent G. Perry of London, Ont., and won the Best of Breed prize with her precious charge. This win hoisted the Toronto Boston over a champion that had won Best of Breed over several other champions under Mr. Perry at the Chicago Specialty.

Mr. Perry judged all Toys, all Non-Sporting breeds, and also the Working and Terrier Groups, and the quality of his work is somewhat measured when we say that his choice for the working group went on to win for Best in Show all breeds.

HILO, HAWAII, GOES TO THE DOGS

The first show licensed by the A.K.C. was held at Hilo, Hawaii, on Saturday and Sunday, April 4th and 5th, when the dogs of Hilo were given an opportunity to fraternize with the dogs of the Islands of Oahu, Maui and Kauai, and so the domestic and imported dogs had their first championship field day on their own stamping ground. The veteran authority, Mr. George Steadman Thomas, was the adjudicator, and it is

interesting to note that 64 of the 158 dogs entered were German Shepherd dogs, and Mr. Thomas earned the whole-hearted appreciation of the exhibitors through his painstaking treatment of them and their dogs. Particularly did the judge show patience with novice exhibitors, many of whom were showing their charges for the first time. The imported Great Dane bitch, "Perle v.d. Rhon", owned by Mr. Harold K. L. Castle, was declared the Best in Show at the conclusion of a very enjoyable semi-social fixture.

ROYAL PATRONAGE FOR KENNEL CLUB, ENGLAND

His Majesty King Edward VIII has graciously consented to become Patron of the Kennel Club, England, in succession to his late Majesty King George V. It is well known that King Edward VII, when Prince of Wales, consented to become the first Patron of the Kennel Club, England, at its foundation in 1873, and that when he succeeded to the throne in 1901, continued his patronage.

HONORING A VETERAN DOG JUDGE

The Epsom Canine Society will honour Mr. W. J. Nichols by calling its Whit-Monday fixture the "Billy Nichols' Jubilee Show" to celebrate his fiftieth year in dogs. Mr. Nichols judged acceptably at the Canadian National Exhibition Show last September. He has judged in the Channel Isles, the Continent, and in the United States.

Sir Steven Lenard handled his own dog and is very interested in a fall trials under actual conditions during the open season, and during our conversation he mentioned the fact that he hoped the club would be able to stage such an event in the fall.

However, no doubt there will be many asked at the next lecture in the near future, when Professor Boving has promised that he will continue upon the same subject. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered to the speaker and so ended a wonderful evening. These lectures are open to all fanciers and others interested in our friend the dog.

A visit to the Hampton Kennels on Sunday, May 10th, was very interesting. Here I saw Fox Terriers of the wire-coated variety, and all strictly up

to name when you say "wires." "Hampton Susan," nursing a litter of 6, consisting of five males and one female, sired by "Barovian Bobby," who is by "Ch. Becksie Bonus," out of "Barovian Wrose." We extend the thanks of the Edmonton Club to Mr. Hunter for his reference to helping fanciers who expect to attend the Edmonton show, as this is the spirit that is required all along the line to ensure success. We might mention here that the Edmonton Dog Fanciers' Club have decided on a two-day show, instead of the three-day fixture held in the past. The reason for the three-day shows in the past has been

largely due to the fact that the management of the Edmonton Exhibition who provide the accommodation and assist in various ways in staging the dog show, did not care to have the building vacant longer than could be avoided, while the other attractions remain for the entire week. However, they were quick to see the reasons for objection to the extra day, and readily agreed to leave the whole matter in the hands of the Dog Fanciers, and it is now up to them to see that attractive evening programs are provided so that

those who like the dogs but like the races just a little better, may have an inducement to visit the dog show after the days' racing is over. So this year's dates are Wednesday and Thursday, July 15th and 16th, as with an even break in weather conditions these have proven the best days for attendance and it is hoped that the new arrangement will prove attractive to visiting and local fanciers alike, and that Edmonton's first two-day summer show may go down in the records as a real success.

● The Old Master is Dead

Breeders of the German Shepherd dog the world over are grieving over the death of Rittmeister v Stephanitz, who "passed over" on April 22nd. Lovingly he was referred to as "the father of the breed," and certainly no man ever gave so much of fatherly interest to any breed of dogs than did the one and only Von Stephanitz, and when the breed became world famous at the close of the Great War the personality of Von Stephanitz was the aggressive influence behind the propaganda of that period.

From the formation of the club in Germany in 1896—when his was the moving spirit—until a few months ago, when he felt obliged to begin easing off, his influence was readily conceded. Each year he judged the Sieger show and the breed would be patterned for the year after his placings. His philosophy, "The German Shepherd is a working dog," was the very scriptures to an untold number of followers, and on that doctrine the basic essentials of structure and temperament developed.

The 600-page book, "German Shepherd Dog in Word and Picture," when it appeared on this side of the Atlantic was a sensation; nothing near like it had ever been written around any one breed before, and here again the pride of allegiance to a leader was demonstrated as the owners of German Shepherd dogs clamored for copies of this great work; fanciers in reduced circumstances sacrificed many things to purchase the "Old Master's" wondrous book.

We had the pleasure of meeting Captain M. von Stephanitz and his good wife, Frau Agnesza von Stephanitz at the Morris & Essex Show on May 24th, 1930. Around the judging ring were hundreds of fanciers studying directly from their acknowledged master. Of course our interest lay chiefly with the dogs from Canada who had come far for marks of the Captain's favors, and when "Derich of Cosalto", who had

come all the way from Calgary, Alberta, was placed second in the American-bred class, we noticed that "Derich's" mistress, F. E. Julien, was a very happy person indeed. On the same day, and in open dog class, Mr. Alex L. Gooderham's "Hettel v. Bodman" was placed third. Dr. J. W. Sherar had the Winners Bitch in "Abigail of Sheraston" and Reserve Winners dog in "Allason of Sheraston". At this show the great "Utz v. Haus Schutting," owned by Mr. and Mrs. D. W. Hewitt, was Best of Breed.

There was one clever handler there who had a wonderfully trained dog. For obvious reasons we refrain from naming either one. Anyway, the handler took up a prominent place near the shade umbrella which protected Captain von Stephanitz and his interpreter. The handler posed his dog in the approved style and the dog held the pose as if he had been born to it. Piece after piece of liver was given the "pretty picture", and Judge Stephanitz seemed to be greatly amused at the spectacle. Bye and bye he rose from his chair and said: "I want to see your dog do his work. I don't want to see him eat his breakfast". Fortunately the dog was "all there", so he gave a good account of himself in spite of the apparent handicap of ring cleverness.

It is with affection that we bid au revoir to so great a personage as Captain von Stephanitz, an honored old warrior in every sense of that term.

A FINE PUPPY POINT

Because of a new ruling now in force in England, a puppy born on January 1st in any year will be allowed to compete as a puppy on January 1st of the following year; this additional day being allowed to permit the puppy to enjoy the first anniversary of its birthday to count as part of its puppyhood. The same concession will be allowed in the Junior Classes where 18 months is the limit of age.

Obituary

DR. DOUGLAS C. COUPLAND, DEAD

We were grieved to notice from the daily press of May 13th, that Dr. Douglas C. Coupland, Ottawa's noted young dental surgeon and radiologist had passed away at the age of 35 years. A member of the board of governors of the Royal College of Dental Surgeons of Ontario, and a member of the staff of the Ottawa Civic Hospital, Dr. Coupland was destined to encounter further distinguishing honors, but alas! he has been withdrawn from the fields of earthly ambition.

Dr. Coupland was well known to dog fanciers over a large area because of his keen interest in the Doberman Pincher breed. One of his favorites was the lovely bitch, "Ch. Lady Asta von Hatzenburg," the 1933 Canadian National Exhibition winner.

FRANK H. HIPKISS PASSES ON

Many fanciers of the Toy Section of Dogdom and particularly in the Pug and Pom sections, will regret to learn of the death of Mr. Frank Hipkiss, Toronto, which took place on April 27th from colitis, a malady which had given our old friend much distress over a period of time. He was 52 years of age. The late Mr. Hipkiss was of a quiet undemonstrative character who said little but accomplished much, he enjoyed an appreciative clientele and many of his clients depended on him for every dog they were interested in buying. The sympathy of a large circle of friends has been expressed to Mrs. Hipkiss and her family in their bereavement.

MONSIGNOR ROGER MCGINLEY DEAD

Collie fanciers of yesteryear who remember the genial Father McGinley, one-time President of the Collie Club of America, and we believe the owner of the super blue Merle Collies, "Ch. Treffynnon Blue Sol," and "Ch. Lady Blue Jeanne of Bournbrae"—the latter a beauty, bred by the late Pat Tully and one of God's own gentlemen, will regret being advised of his death on April 28th, following a heart attack in the rectory of St. Aidan's Church at Jersey City, N.J., where he had been pastor for the past 24 years. Monsignor McGinley was 65 years old at the time of his death.

Saskatchewan Notes

BOSTON TERRIERS led all other breeds in entries at the Regina Kennel Club Show held on April 17th and 18th. This no doubt was due to the presence in the ring of that expert of the breed, Mr. Sam Jackson, Winnipeg, who judged all breeds at the show. Scottish, Airedale and Wire Fox Terriers had well-filled classes. In the sporting breeds English Springers, Irish Setters and Cockers were well represented. Among the toys, Pekingese led the way, with an entry of 12, while six Chihuahuas were a centre of attraction for many visitors.

Entries were down as a whole, compared with last year, due, no doubt, as Miss H. Mabson, the Secretary, pointed out, to the almost impossible condition of the roads leading out of Regina. Dr. Robbs' string of English Setters were absent from the show for this very reason, being out in the country for their spring training.

I was informed on good authority that Dr. Robb's ambition is to produce a dual champion, and that his well-known bench winner, "Ch. Blue Dans Pal," has developed into a high-class performer in the field. His owner intends to run this dog at the field trials next fall.

While waiting for the judging to commence, a small group of fanciers listened attentively while Mr. Hugh Allen, of "Antrim" fame, related interesting incidents of his early life in Ireland, when, as now, Terriers were his chief hobby, while the common rat provided much sport.

The writer well remembers, as a boy, participating in one rat hunt, where during the excitement I grasped a full-grown rat around the neck and choked it with my bare hands, one of the villagers remarking: "I wern't a caught him like that bor, if yew'd a give me a gallon o' beer."

But Hughie's idea in catching them was to bring them back alive. The way he accomplished this was to grasp one by the tail as it swam in the water, swing it quickly up under his arm and holding it firmly against his body. The rats caught in this manner were taken home to be used later in training his young Terriers.

From Terriers the conversation turned to Greyhounds and coursing. The records of many famous hounds, both past and present, being discussed. Hughie reminded us that the dogs did

not always catch the hare, citing one instance where, in the final for the famous Waterloo cup, a strong hare ran clean away from the brace of dogs that were contesting the final heat.

A discussion followed as to which was the fleetest: the European hare or the Canadian jack rabbit. We agreed there was very little difference between them, as far as speed was concerned, but felt the hare had a more varied "box of tricks."

As a boy I witnessed many coursing events, but there is one unscheduled event that remains fresh in my memory. The scene was a grass-carpeted lane, little used by vehicular traffic. It was here in the spring the primrose bloomed in profusion, and where, in the hedges on either side, the linnets and bulfinches had their nests. But the time of which I write was the harvest time. In the company of two other boys, we were out gathering hazel nuts. Wandering ahead of my companions I climbed over a five-barred gate into a field of wheat stubble. This field, oblong in shape, was bordered on either side by tall hawthorn hedges. Just as I entered, a hare came racing through another gate at the far end of the field, closely followed by a brace of greyhounds; a black dog and a black and white bitch that I recognized at once as belonging to a neighboring farmer. Evidently they had already run quite a distance, as the hare appeared to have difficulty in keeping ahead of the dogs. Running downhill, a handicap to the hare with its long hind legs, they headed straight in my direction. Standing as still and straight as a bottle I watched them approach. The dogs with their necks outstretched two or three feet behind the hare, who, with her ears laid flat and eyes in the back of their sockets, was watching every move of the dogs and racing for her life. She attempted a "balk," losing a tuft of fur to the bitch for her effort. One ear went up, a signal of distress. The race was nearly over. Any moment the dogs would close in for the kill. But that little hare had one more card left to play and this is how she played it: by jumping about four feet up in the air. The dogs travelling at full speed passed underneath. By the time they had applied the brakes and made the turn, the hare had "scuttled" through the hedge and escaped.

Boy like, I had stood thrilled at the

thought of witnessing the kill; yet I remember I felt glad afterwards that the hare had so cleverly outwitted those two fast-moving streaks of dog flesh.

Purebred Greyhounds run entirely by sight, so that once the quarry is out of sight, even if only hiding under a sheaf of grain, it is lost as far as these dogs are concerned. There is nothing crafty or cunning in the Greyhound's make-up. He runs straight and takes no shortcuts.

The many friends of Mrs. C. S. Hunt (the former Mrs. A. P. Semple) will be glad to hear that this good fancier is still in the game. Her Schipperke, "Ch. Which One O'the North," entered for specials only, being a lone entry in this variety at the Regina show.

Mr. M. M. Wallace, Drumnod Kennels Reg'd, Saskatoon, has sold a pair of nine-months-old Newfoundlands to Miss E. B. Loring, Waseeka Kennels, Ashland, Mass., U.S.A. The male, "Cabin Boy of Drumnod", won the C.K.C. for the best Canadian-bred puppy, all breeds, at the recent Saskatoon show, and is thought to be the most promising youngster benched by this kennel to date. The female, "Marina of Drumnod," while still unshown, is a typical specimen of the breed. Mr. Wallace thought a great deal of this young bitch. Their career in the United States will be followed with much interest.

"Longshot of Lynn," an eleven months English Springer that went winners dog at the Saskatoon show, has been sold to Mr. V. Cruickshank, Saskatoon. This pup, trained by the writer, was dropping to wing and shot when less than seven months of age. A fast brainy worker, possessing a tender mouth and an exceptionally good nose, he should make a real pal for his new owner who purchased him especially for a hunting dog.

Mr. D. Kirton, Saskatoon, a newcomer to the ranks of the Wire Fox Terrier breeders, has acquired a young bitch sired by "Vivadora Masterpiece," ex. "Winsome Sweetheart." Carrying one of the hardest coats seen in years, she should produce something really worth while, providing she is mated to the right stud dog.

W. (Billy) Quiley of Edmonton has been selected to judge all breeds at the Saskatoon show to be held on July 15th, 16th and 17th.

I was reading in a recent issue of "Our Dogs" an account of the Terrier trials held in Ireland, where the first three prizes were awarded to Kerry Blues. It told how one dog of this variety drew a badger weighing thirty pounds. I wonder how one of these "Kerries" would fare if pitted against a fully matured prairie badger?

Colonel W. J. White, who owns a large farm a few miles west of Saskatoon, told the writer how a dog badger, weighing 42 pounds, and his English Bulldog, with no one at hand to separate them, fought desperately for two hours.

Cockers and Scottish Terriers are the two breeds sponsored by Mr. S. Saidman, Heavensgate Kennels, Canora, Sask. Two young Cockers have recently been imported from Pasadena, Cal. One of these, "Cinder of Heavensgate," born May 26th, 1935, won three firsts and reserve winners at Regina. This black dog is a son of the well-known American winner, "Ch. C. B's Little Black Cinder," his dam being "Prune's Own Black Queen." ("Ch. Freeland's Own Boy"-Ch. Prune's Miracle"). Great things are expected from a litter of six puppies just two months old, sired by a brother of this dog and out of a line bred "Robinhurst Foreglow" bitch.

The Scottish Terrier bitch "Bron Wyn Princess Necessity" has a litter of two bitch puppies sired by "Ch. Littlebury Barty." (Imp.)

The friends of Mr. Frank Jackson, Saskatoon, especially those who were in attendance at the recent Saskatoon show at which time he appeared to be enjoying his usual good health, will be sorry to hear he has been ill in a local hospital. Although allowed to return to his home, his condition is such that his physician has ordered a complete rest. I am sure his many friends will join with me in wishing this lover of the English Bulldog a speedy return to good health.

Early June being weaning time for

many litters of puppies, a few words of advice to beginners might not be out of place, for it is from this time onward that many otherwise good specimens are ruined, through faulty feeding methods, lack of judicious exercise, etc.

Over-fatness should be especially avoided in early puppyhood, if we are to keep them "right on their pins." Meals should consist of nourishing food, given regularly, little and often. A liberal supply of meat, either raw or cooked (we prefer to feed most of it raw), is good for development and supplies the necessary strength of bone. Some beginners hold up their hands in horror when advised to feed raw meat to their puppies, yet after all meat is the natural food of the dog. Take for instance the coyote that roams over our prairies, its diet consists almost entirely of raw meat and bones. Yet who ever saw one of these animals in their natural state with a crooked front?

While out on a hunting trip last fall, as I was passing through a bluff, I noticed an animal of some kind disappear down a large hole underneath a willow bush. Soon it reappeared and much to my surprise I found it to be a German Shepherd puppy. Slipping a lead on my Springer bitch I stood still and watched. Presently another one appeared, then another, until four of them stood gazing at me with the hair standing straight up along their backs. What struck me as I stood there, was the excellent condition of these pups which I judged to be about ten weeks old. With no house or building within miles, they must have depended

entirely upon their dam for food, which no doubt would consist mainly of raw meat. So do not be sparing with the meat. Bones with some meat left on, large enough so that puppies can place their two front feet against them while pulling upward with their teeth, seems good for their digestion and the proper development of neck and shoulders. Some vegetable food should be mixed with their cereal. Scraped raw carrot is good, also lettuce, cabbage, etc. Pilchard or cod liver oil should also be added.

If possible each puppy should be fed separately, as some eat so much quicker than others. Never feed as much at one meal as will noticeably extend their stomachs. If a meal has been omitted, do not feed an extra portion at the next one, but just the usual amount. A little extra can be given for the last feed at night if desired.

As the puppies develop, raise their feed pans up off the floor, (that is providing the standard of the variety you are breeding calls for a straight front), as this prevents them from spreading their shoulders when eating. Increase the amount of food gradually as they develop. Once they have become sturdy on their legs, food of a more bulky nature can be provided. No drastic change should be made in their diet at any time. A certain amount of exercise during the growing period is necessary for proper development, but not too much until their legs have become sufficiently strong to carry the body weight.

Masterpiece of Avondale". Something good is expected of the other females who have been mated to "Punch".

BY the time this issue of *Kennel and Bench* has gone to press, several Maritime fanciers will have visited the world's greatest outdoor show, namely the Morris and Essex, held on the vast estate of Mrs. Geraldine M. Dodge, proprietress of Giralda Farms and Kennels.

It is interesting to note that no group class judge at this show is ever assigned a breed to judge that would afterwards appear under him in the Group. This year over \$20,000 in cash and sterling trophies will have been offered, to be won regardless of how many dogs are entered.

Included in the large list of judges are three of our own Canadian authorities, namely Robt. Ross, Montreal, who will pass on Collies, and Bedlington Terriers; Col. J. N. MacRae, Galt, Ont., German Shepherd Dogs, and Mr. Walter H. Reeves, Belleville, Ont., Kerry Blues and Sealyham Terriers.

It is rumored that some Eastern Canadian fanciers plan on returning with some new blood, to add to their already high-class kennels.

Last month Maritime dog world lost a staunch supporter and follower in the death of Mr. Francis Kerr, attorney-at-law. Mr. Kerr had not been enjoying good health for some time, but his death came as a severe shock to all.

McKim of Amherst, N.S., who has been a breeder and exhibitor of Springer Spaniels for quite a few years, sends me an interesting letter, with news of activities in the district in which he resides, and advises me that he has a nice litter of Springers out of "Lovely Lady" and sired by his good dog, "Blue Bok of Avondale", three males and two females. Mr. McKim is expecting the arrival of a litter on May 10th. These will be out of "Betty Lee of Amherst" and sired by "Blue Bok of Avondale." The dam was winning bitch at the Bedford Kennel Club show last fall, under Judge Mr. Clarence N. Grey. A nice blue roan puppy from Mr. McKim's kennels was sold to Mr. Fred De Forrest, Saint John.

The Springer Spaniel bitch, "Beechdale Rita," recently whelped a litter sired by "Blue Bok of Avondale." "Rita" is owned by Mr. A. W. Foster of Amherst. She whelped a litter of five male puppies.

Mr. A. N. Potter and family sailed from Halifax on April 25th and will reside in England, where Mr. Potter has secured a position. They took with them the Irish Terrier, "Donegal Pal," Winners Dog at the Nova Scotia K.C. show last October. "Pal" was bred by Mrs. Burns and was sired by "Steady Larry Gaff" ex "Ch. Fermanagh Rusty Maid."

Mrs. Burns has bred her "Ch. Donegal Red Riot" to Major Wm. Borret's "Donegal Piper," he by "Ch. Maritime Tony" ex "Ch. Fermanagh Rusty Maid." "Piper" won the award for best Irish Terrier at the N.S.K.C. show in 1933, this being his only time shown.

The ladies of the local branch of the S.P.C. have presented the society with a new and attractive animal ambulance, the feature of which is the addition of a built-in lethal chamber which utilizes the monoxide gas generated by the engine of the car and provides a modern and humane method of destroying small animals. This will prove to be of great aid in alleviating the suffering of severely injured animals and will help to

relieve congestion at the Animal Shelter.

A letter from Mr. B. L. White of Amherst advises me that he has purchased a Chesapeake Bay Retriever, "Duke of Cumberland," from Mr. Charles W. Berg of Philadelphia, Pa. "Duke" was purchased by Mr. White for his son, Norbert White, goal-tender for the Amherst Canucks and in whose name the dog is registered. This dog was born September 15th, 1935, and was sired by the good dog "Ch. Floating Power" and out of "Port Ann Peggy." Mr. White has two other Chesapeakes which were purchased from Mr. Neil Nelson of Wooler, Ont. These two, "Queen of Cumberland" and "Peter of Cumberland," are out of the same litter and were born September 12th, 1934, and sired by "Brighton Chesty" and out of the good bitch, "Queen Dawn." This line contains the name of some winners, such as "Nutan Nymph," "Ch. The Major," "Ch. Blondy" and "Ch. Lady Betty 4th."

A local motorist was just recently fined thirty dollars and costs for killing a Cocker Spaniel, the property of a city resident. The accused asked for time to pay the fine but this was refused and, unless the money is forthcoming very soon, he will be obliged to spend twenty days in the City prison. "I will not give you even one day to pay the fine for what I consider a very serious offence," the Magistrate told the prisoner, who declared that he did not know that he had run over the dog until told by a passenger. Another case in the County Court has to do with a suit for damages arising out of the deliberate shooting of a Scottish Terrier, the property of a well-known resident of Bedford, where the offence is alleged to have taken place. During the past few years there has been far too many cases of this nature come before the courts and it is gratifying to note that the guilty parties are being prosecuted for their violations. A couple of months ago a beautiful imported stallion, "Golden Fancy," was found dead in his stall, death being due to a large dose of poison having been given the unfortunate animal. "Golden Fancy" was the property of Dr. K. G.

Mahabir of Halifax and was a big winner at local and other shows. Through a local newspaper we get the report of an approaching investigation into allegations that attempts were made to bribe Dr. E. Watson, of Toronto, judge at the Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition Horse Show last fall. The investigation will be made almost immediately by the Exhibition Commission. In a letter to Dr. Mahabir, Dr. Watson mentioned that petty jealousy existed amongst a few who had "just nags" and also stated, "I was approached on different occasions." Two parties, the judge informed, said "that it would be to my interest if a certain horse did not win." In another letter to Dr. Mahabir Dr. Watson advises that he had been looking forward to seeing "Golden Fancy" winning the stallion class at the Royal Winter Fair this year in Toron-

to. A report from a reliable source advises that detectives investigating the circumstances surrounding the death of the horse have the name of a person reported to have been seen leaving "Golden Fancy's" stable before the poisoning. Dr. Watson is reported as having named the persons alleged to have approached him. In the interests of fair play and good sportsmanship it is to be hoped that we will soon learn that those responsible for the death of this horse, considered to be the best of the local equines, will be brought to justice.

At a meeting of the Bedford Kennel Club, held recently, a new slate of officers was elected to carry on the affairs of the club for the coming year. The newly elected officers are as follows: President, Mr. E. Murray; vice-pres., Mr. F. O'Connell; sec.-treas., Mr. G. D. Anderson. The executive committee is composed of Messrs. J. Huggins, E. V. Turner and J. Ternan.

This wide-awake and progressive club will stage its second annual dog show at Francklyn Park in Halifax on July 1st. This will be an outdoor, one-day affair, with provision made for ample shelter for both dogs and exhibitors in the event of rain. The show will commence at 10 a.m. and will end about 6 p.m. the same day. Three capable judges have been engaged and entries are already coming in for an event that is confidently expected to be the best that this live club has yet attempted. There will be a dining hall in operation and exhibitors may obtain excellent meals or refreshments at all hours. The Maritime Bull Terrier Club will make this its specialty show and an unusually large entry of Bull Terriers will be on hand. The writer has received inquiries from several out-of-town breeders who desire to send representatives from their various kennels to the Bedford fixture and already a large entry of good dogs is assured. The original club was at Papineau Road, where the Angus shops are. In 1891 they moved to Outremont, where the present attractive Club still is. The kennels are out at Fresmère. Many times in the past we have had the pack with a huntsman in attendance at our shows—a very smart, attractive sight it was. Let us hope we can have them with us again in future, for it is a pity to miss something that adds so much to our shows.

We believe Mr. Stanley Wisdom has come back to the fold and has purchased from Mr. Rooney a very fine pair of Bull Terrier puppies. Mr. Wisdom in the past has been a keen follower of the breed. Mrs. Percy Adams is importing a female Skye Terrier from Lady Miles, of the famous Merry Mount Kennels in England. Mrs. Adams has been a follower of this breed since 1904 and I am sure we all wish her the best of luck with the new importation and her own very fine male. KENNEL NAMES CANCELLED

The registration of the Kennel Names, "BIRDLAND" and "ROCKLAND", has been cancelled.

We have heard of many large litters of puppies being born, and have often heard the claim that such and such a litter was a record one, but Mrs. Phyllis Robson, Editor of "The Dog World," England, has received information of a bitch, belonging to a resident of the Hungarian Parish of Kis-taresa, which recently gave birth to a litter of 26 puppies, and with Mrs. Robson we agree that this must be the record litter for quantity to date.

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• Colored Bull Terriers

IF ever there was a divided camp in dogdom, surely the first prize division is to be found within the ranks of the Bull Terrier cult at the present time. Not that repercussions are being heard over the length and breadth of the land, but the camp is divided, and the noise of battle may just be in the offing.

Away back in 1825—when at Warwick, in England, Bull Terriers were backed to fight with the lions at Wombwell's Menagerie—and did, the result being that Mr. Wombwell "gave in" in the name of the lion "Nero"—the breed was then in the making, the crosses being the Bulldog-Terrier, or Mastiff-Terrier. The early Bull Terriers were white, marked with patches of some other color, occasionally black and tans, with a weight of around 30 to 40 lbs.

To James Hinks of Birmingham, England, who died in 1878, is given the credit for bringing the present day white Bull Terrier into being, by crossing the heavy and variously colored Bull Terrier with the English White Terrier. The dog-fighting fraternity of that time openly derided Mr. Hinks' experiments, but he gave his tormentors the quietus when he backed the new cross with a five-pound note and a case of champagne. "Puss", a white Bull Terrier bitch, was chosen to meet an old-fashioned, bulldog type, and "Puss" killed her opponent at "Bill Tupper's" place in half an hour. In 1864 at a bench show held in Ashburnham Hall, Chelsea, "Puss" was placed second in a class for Bull Terriers, whilst a kennel brother, "Madman", was placed first.

The early breeding problems seem to have been breeding out the projecting underjaw, the crooked forelegs, the small hindquarters, and the perfect dog was the dog showing the least of the enumerated major faults. It would be a mistake to believe that the Bull Terrier was produced for fighting purposes only. Britain excelled in the strength of its Terrier family, but something exceptional had to be produced to handle the pole-cat, the badger, or the marten-cat, and so the English White Terrier-Bulldog crossing.

Mr. Hinks made white dogs popular in the early days, although color in the original standard only called for a 5 points consideration, whereas 35 points were allocated to the head—skull (15), face and teeth (10), ears (5), neck (5), then a further 40 points were allocated to the body—shoulder and chest (15), back (10), legs (10), and feet (5). Symmetry was given 10 points, and coat, color and tail but 5 points each.

In the matter of color the early standard specified, "The color (value 5 points) for show purposes must be pure white, though there are many well-shaped dogs of other colors. This is, however, purely a fancy breed, and as such there is not the slightest reason why an arbitrary rule should not be made, as it was without doubt in this case, and it is useless to show a dog of any other color."

Throughout the history of the Bull Terrier, which, by the way, is but a short history after all,—not more than 100 years, the cherished and approved color has been white, and yet we find in modern standards, that the neck, shoulders, body and tail carry 20 points; legs and feet 20 more; head, skull, jaws, lips and teeth another 20; eyes and expression 15 points, whereas condition and color only get a total of 10 points, and ears the remaining 5 points. So it would appear that the matter of color has never been considered important at any time as the breed has come through the several stages of its interesting evolution.

The Bull Terrier Club of America is considered to be the "parent club" for the Bull Terrier in the United States, and by its standard, white has been preferred for color, with the stipulation that "markings are a bad fault". Those who have sponsored the "White Cavalier" in America, and who never imagined their beloved breed in any other color than white, are greatly disturbed by the inroads being made by colored Bull Terriers. To introduce the question with a view to discussion reveals a violent and turbulent opposition that refuses to yield, and yet in England, such a conservative judge as the late Jack J. Holgate, rose above all bias and prejudice at Taunton Championship Show in 1933 and gave the dog championship certificate to the heavily marked, black brindle dog "Isis Nap". We could hardly say that this colored Bull Terrier was as good a specimen as the outstanding white dog, "Ch. Brendon Gold Standard", but in fairness to both we must say that they are both wonderful specimens in their respective color divisions. Having taken the trouble to whiten the colored "Nap", we have no fault to find with him, in either color he is a good one.

Supposing that England's first Champion brindle and white Bull Terrier "Ch. Boko's Brock"—who made history for the breed when he won his third Championship Certificate at the Ladies' Kennel Association Show on May 30th

last year—had been a pure white dog, who would have refused him an honored place in their kennels? Shown fearlessly and at a time when the breed was at its very peak for quality, this colored Bull Terrier won the Certificates at Brighton and Cheltenham before finishing at the Ladies' Kennel Association fixture. Take the dog that was second to "Boko's Brock" at Brighton, i.e., "Mystery Knight of Lench", and analyze his quality—forgetting his color—and you have another real Bull Terrier. "Boko's Brock" and "Mystery Knight" won under England's authority on dogs, Mr. W. J. Nichols, so irrespective of prejudices there is an issue before the Bull Terrier breeders on this side of the Atlantic that must be faced in an even temper and fair decisions arrived at one way or the other.

The recognition of colored Bull Terriers is an issue that must be faced fearlessly, because they are here to stay. A good Bull Terrier is a good one, irrespective of his color, all the governing bodies are agreed on this, and so it would appear that we will have whites and coloreds together in the regular breed classes, the only other alternative is to offer a separate classification for coloreds, in which case the best whites and the best coloreds would come together for Best of Breed, the winner to go on to the Terrier Group as the breed representative, or possibly whites and coloreds could be given separate breed recognition, but this arrangement sounds rather far fetched, because in that event we would find two Bull Terriers going to the Terrier Group instead of one.

Perhaps it is not enough for the standard to say "Markings are a bad fault" when color only represents five points out of one hundred. The judges must be governed by the standard, and the matter of objection to color is not rated with the list of faults in the regular manner, and just as the matter of color is debatable, so must the matter of weight be. We cannot imagine the requirements of the Bull Terrier standard ever being found in a 12-pound specimen.

The battle is raging, and as the party on the outside looking on, we hope the best side wins, and the best side as viewed from this angle is, the Bull Terrier, as a breed, irrespective of color. Any other finding must be based, more or less, on the principle of compromising arbitration.

• Dog Show City

This is the only descriptive caption which adequately fits the world's greatest outdoor dog show, gigantic Morris and Essex. Imagine the immensity of 3,751 dogs separated in groups with each group in its own section marked plainly, and in such a manner that the location can be noticed from any part of the grounds. The American Kennel Club recognizes six groups, the hound group being responsible for the difference. Sporting, with the letter A, to Non-Sporting, with the letter F, make it easy for one to go immediately to any breed of any group that he or she might be interested in. Other conveniences were the judges' room, the press tent complete with telegraph and telephone equipment, handlers' tents, where all the handlers prepared their charges in comfort. At each end of the benching arrangements spread along both sides of the polo field there were veterinary offices, where competent veterinarians were constantly in attendance with the incomparable Dr. George Anderson, of New York City, in charge. Parking space was available everywhere, and to reduce congestion to a minimum two new roads had been opened up from the main highway since last May. Then, of course, there were the buildings for refreshments and

trophies all very essential and all very commodious. The largest entries were Dachshunde with 213 dogs, and Cockers came close up to the top with 205. Entries rich in compliment to the Morris and Essex Kennel Club, and to the judges selected, were German Shepherds, and here Col. J. N. MacRae, the president of the Canadian Kennel Club drew the flattering entry of 127, the fourth largest entry in the territory of this famous fixture, not only that, but it was conceded that never before had the breed furnished so much in every essential for the show ring, particularly was type and temperament truly outstanding, and what a beautiful example of careful knowledgeable judging was let loose by Col. MacRae, who had his task completely in control at all times.

Another Canadian judge that was definitely distinguished because of the quality and size of his entry was "Bob" Ross, of Montreal, who drew the all-time high Morris and Essex record of 105 Collies, and when he got through with his Collies and then took on 25 Bedlington Terriers he was conscious of the potency of the New Jersey sun. Walter H. Reeves, Belleville, Ont., had 42 Kerry Blues and 40 Sealyhams as his share, so he had very few idle moments on his hands during the

prominent day of the two countries, Morris and Essex day in the United States and King's Plate day in Canada.

While lingering with the judges time must be taken to refer to the splendid entry of 118 Scottish Terriers which greeted their judge, Mrs. Cecil Barber, who had come all the way from England to give them the "once over." One hundred and eighteen of them, and our American cousins must have been thrilled when they found that her choice for best was an American-bred female Irish Setter puppy sired by "Ch. dog that had first seen the light of day in the State of New Jersey, the dog was "Monagh Lea Mariner," bred and owned by the kennel, and it was noticed that there was quite a struggle going on for first place in the Terrier Group between the Airedale Terrier, S. M. Stewart's "Shelterock Merry Sovereign," who was bred by Mrs. Stewart, and was also born in New Jersey.

From Col. MacRae's ring came the German Shepherd, Paul Tishman's "Foigga von Kannenbackerland," a circumstance favorable emphasizing his selection.

When the judges had completed their group judging and when Armory L. Haskell's "Ch. Mr. Reynal's Monarch"

Notice the garden effect surrounding the placing block. This attractive setting was put in position in 20 minutes, and when placed it looked as if it had been there all the time.

(Harrier); Mr. S. M. Stewart's "Shelterock Merry Sovereign" (Airedale); Mrs. V. Matta's "Ch. Little Sahib" (Pomeranian); Murphy O. Tate's "Ch. Drinkmoor Homebrew" (Bulldog); Owen A. West's "Ch. Jockel V. Burgund" (Doberman Pinscher); and Leonard J. Buck's "Ch. Torohill Trader" (Cocker Spaniel) came into the ring for the final analysis under the greatly respected Dr. Henry Jarrett, of Philadelphia, the highlight of the fixture had been reached. There was no way of compiling the figures of the percentage of the 40,000 people in attendance on the day had waited for the "Supreme moment," but it did appear that all had remained. Dr. Jarrett, seasoned with years of practical experience inside and outside of the dog show rings, carried the "silks of the highest court" with a rare dignity, painstaking to a degree and without "theatricals" he went over each dog with a trained eye and with a practical touch, and in the end, when he motioned the beautiful Harrier to the center of the stage, his choice was long and loudly endorsed from thousands of throats, and with other outward signs of absolute approval.

What a marvellous finish to a marvellous show on a marvellous day, in fact superlatives fail when used in an endeavour to describe the Morris and Essex, the world's greatest and most beautiful outdoor dog show fixture.

The memory of these closing moments of this particular show will for ever remain a pleasant memory with all Press representatives, and with all members of the Dog Writers' Association present and both were fully represented and thoroughly taken care of within the scope of 100 per cent perfect general arrangements.

Mrs. M. Hartley Dodge, the patron saint of the Morris and Essex Show, was on the grounds throughout the whole day, and her direct personal influence and the influence of her perfected management was everywhere noticeable. The Master of Field Ceremonies, Mr. McClure Halley, had everything in the palm of his hand and without fuss his plans materialized faultlessly.

Any enlargement of the Morris and Essex classification, or entry will be a definite challenge to the records of the world's greatest shows outdoor or otherwise. This statement is not made on the spur of the moment, the records prove it, like this—1927 (595), 1928, (920), 1929 (1150), 1930 (1507), 1931 (1922), 1932 (1517), 1933 (2346), 1934 (2827), 1935 (3175), 1936 (3751)—these figures show a healthy and consistent development for the last 10 years and any further stimulation of entries will make history.

There were thousands of celebrities on the grounds during the day but pride of first place must go to Mrs. Phyllis Robson, the charming editor of "The Dog World", England, who was the guest of Mrs. Dodge for the second consecutive year. On this occasion our English guest was brilliantly beautiful and looked the very embodiment of happiness, and her continuously clicking camera certainly had a busy day.

No story built around the Morris and Essex show would be, or could be complete without reference to the Foley Dog Show organization, and mere words are superfluous in respect to any enlargement of this theme, therefore, it is sufficient to say that the whole scheme of this show was close to perfection, if not completely perfect.

Thanks to Mr. R. L. Patterson, the Canadian contingent were splendidly entertained socially during every hour before, during and after the show. He is a great "Patty" and he has a warm spot in his heart for Canada and for Canadians.
