Meeting of the Board of Directors

of the
Canadian Kennel Club, Incorporated

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., was held in the Board Room of the Club's offices, 25 Melinda St., Toronto, on Thursday evening, August 20th, 1936, at 7.30 o'clock. The President, Colonel J. N. MacRae, was in the Chair. Directors present included Reg. P. Sparkes, Captain H. Dudley-Waters, F. W. Walkerdine, B. W. Essery, K.C., and R. Tyrwhitt.

The Secretary reported that Director James Eccles was under the weather and would not be able to attend; that Mr. Swann had been installed in the Editor's office; and that a Stock Room had been built in the basement of the building.

It was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That, the Minutes be taken as read."

The Secretary reported that he had instructed the Live Stock Records Office to first refer all matter of registration and transfer offered by parties in arrears for advertising in Kennel and Bench to this office for attention. The matter of unpaid advertising accounts was left in the hands of the Secretary, and it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That, no items of advertisement from any person in arrears for advertising be accepted, until such advertising accounts are paid up, regardless of who they are".

The Secretary reported that Director for Manitoba, Mr. G. Kynoch, had been instrumental in securing adjustments of the Marsh-Gislason complaint, and that the file, including Certificate, transfers and fees, had been returned to the National Live Stock Records Office several days ago.

The Secretary reported progress in connection with the Swift-Widgett complaint.

A letter was read from British Columbia Director, J. A. H. Irving, recommending as the members of his Island Provincial Committee Dr. W. F. Daw, W. C. Burns, Miss L. A. Hickling and Mr. C. W. Lonsdale, and it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That, the appointments, as read, be confirmed".

A letter was read from the Club's Auditors in respect to possible changes in the system of bookkeeping arising from the report of Kennel and Bench Committee, and it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That, the suggestions in the letter be accepted and adopted".

A letter was read from Telephone City Kennel Club advising that it had been found impossible to get a suitable building for the show scheduled to be held on September 5th, and asking that the date be cancelled and the fee held in abeyance to be used later in respect to a show being held when a building was secured. It was agreed to grant the request of the Brantford Club.

A letter was read from T. P. Murray, Vancouver, stating that he had heard that the proposed Field Trials of the Springer Spaniel Club were to be held under peculiar conditions, and it was agreed that the Secretary would write Mr. Murray and send him a copy of the Field Trial Rules, pointing out that these rules would be observed by the Canadian Kennel Club in respect to the proposed Trials.

Mrs. R. McColl and Mrs. T. C. Hopkins, who were in attendance in response to the request of the Directors, were then heard, and it being apparent that the matter was being amicably adjusted, it was agreed that it should be considered closed.

It was decided that, when applications for registration are offered to the Registrar for Harlequin Great Danes, the application be returned with the request that the colors be definitely described.

A letter was read from Mr. Wm. Henderson of Toronto with regard to the wording of an advertisement, and after consideration it was decided that no action should be taken.

Smith and Secretary, Capt. H. Dudley Waters, M.C., present.

A PLEASANT afternoon was enjoyed at the Ranch, at North Kildonan, Man., of the genial Bob Simpson and Brother Charlie. I had the good fortune, on my visit, to meet a large number of fur ranchers who had been on the same mission as your writer. The guests were received in a well secluded spot under the trees, where a fine array of refreshments were served in rustic style. Great raconteurs those fur men are and the competition was keen in yarns, each one excelling the other, to add to the enjoyment of the gathering.

The Of Isla Kennels and Fur Ranch is one of the best appointed and privately owned establishments in the Dominion. The animals consist of over one hundred silver fox and nigh three hundred mink of the highest quality, and are housed in the most up-to-date manner in individual runs. I noted an extensive addition to the mink quarters was under construction and Charlie is the designer. From the enthusiastic Chow Chow breeder and exhibitor, Mr. F. C. Bell, Bannatyne Ave. Kennels, comes the interesting records of the doing of his stock. "Mardis Pale Girl" had three dog puppies sired by "Chief Long Lance". One has been shipped to Dr. Funk, Morse, Sask., and Mrs. Wade of Winnipeg has become the owner

of another, both owners being delighted with their purchases. The third is being retained to augment the strength of the kennels. The sensational puppy "Kin Wong", who made his debut and great success at Fort Garry Kennel Club and later at Calgary, was bred by Mr. Bell and is by the same sire and dam as the above puppies. Alberta Notes

IN a recent mail we noticed the familiar letterhead of "Canadian Kennel Club, Inc." and as no correspondence was expected at this time we were rather curious as to what it might contain, and were very pleased, as well as surprised, to find that it was just a hearty "How do you do" from our new Editor, Mr. Bert. Swann. And while this letter would be just one of many sent out to all Provincial Contributing Editors, and probably others actively connected with the organization, the fact that it was dated August fourth, while he had only taken over the duties of his new position on August first, goes to prove that no time was lost in showing a very commendable spirit that speaks well for the future.

Our personal acquaintance with Mr. Swann is very slight, having just met him at the time that he judged a dog show at Edmonton several years ago. And while as a writer of matters of interest to dog lovers he needs no introduction, there is a feeling in this section of the country that if he gives the same satisfaction in the Editor's chair that he gives in a judging ring, then his appointment to his new office was all that could be desired.

As for the retiring Editor, Mr. J. D. Strachan, our meeting with him was very much like our meeting with Mr. Swann, and was even longer ago, it also being at the time when he paid a short visit to the West, which if memory serves us was just ten years past in July. However, we have always felt a much closer acquaintance with Mr. Strachan, because on several occasions we have bothered him for advice on matters which we knew rightfully should have been taken up with the Live Stock Dept. But his replies were always written in such a way that one could almost imagine him being displeased if we had done otherwise, and so in common with many others we cannot help a feeling of regret that he has vacated the position in which many of us had looked on him as a fixture. In his final "Editorial Comment", in which he takes the opportunity to review the history of the Canadian Kennel Club, Mr. Strachan reminds us that for almost seventeen years he has held both secretarial and editorial duties, and rumors coming through from time to time give the impression that his

health has not always been the best. So we may only hope that with the lighter responsibility with which he will continue, that he may enjoy many years service with the organization to which he has given so much, and join him in the wish expressed in his closing paragraph that under the new guidance our magazine will rise to greater and newer heights.

While writing of matters concerning the Canadian Kennel Club at headquarters, we are pleased to mention that since last writing, the C.K.C. members and their friends in and around Edmonton had the pleasure of meeting President Col. J. N. MacRae and Mrs. MacRae, at a very friendly and well attended banquet, held in the Corona Hotel. They heard Col. MacRae give a very pleasing and clear-cut address on the functioning of the C.K.C. and its relation to the Canadian National Live Stock Records branch and many other things. At the close of his address he gave some time to answering questions which he did in a very pleasing manner, and one could not think otherwise after such a meeting together with reports of their visit from other points than that the tour of the President through the West was really worth while. While we hope that he was convinced of the sincerity of our desire for a better place in the Sun, we also hope that after he had travelled these countless miles of parched prairie, that he realized we are still a far cry from patterning our dog shows after the "Westminster" at New York, as may be the case in some of the larger centers in the East, and that after first hand knowledge of the distance between points where shows are held, in proportion to population, that he will agree with our contention that our present system of point rating needs further revision, as there can be no doubt but that at the present time it places too great a handicap on owners of breeds that are few in number.

We see on looking over the list of "New Champions", in the last edition, that even in Ontario a lady living in Toronto had to attend nine shows in order to complete a championship with a Newfoundland dog. That, of course,

means nine shows at which her dog obtained winners' points.

It is perhaps possible that there are people who are so situated financially and who like the show game so well that they could enjoy such an experience, but we are sure they are the exception.

While on the subject of shows we may mention that we have received a letter from John E. Hunter, the president of the Alberta Kennel Club, at Calgary, and Mr. Hunter says that he has good reasons to state that the second annual bench show under Canadian Kennel Club Rules, under the auspices of the Children's Hospital Aid Society, of Calgary, is to be held on November 27th and 28th next. Application for permission to hold the show will be made very shortly.

All proceeds of the show are for the funds of the C.H.A.S., whose officers and members are making a big effort to have the biggest and best show ever held in Calgary. Full particulars will be announced in the October issue of Kennel and Bench. On behalf of the Alberta Kennel Club, Mr. Hunter wishes to express through the columns of Kennel and Bench most sincere thanks to the management of "Daily Newspapers" and "Doggy Press" for their gracious help. The press has always been courteous to the Club, and has done all in its power to assist whenever required.

Mr. Hunter believes that the dog show held during Stampede Week was the best summer show ever held by the Club, and he hopes it will still go on to even greater success.

Mr. Hunter also reports a nice litter of Smooth Fox Terriers sired by "Int. Ch. Oltee Lenpal" ex "Hunters Bitter Sweet". A good litter of Springer Spaniels sired by "Mutual Triumph" ex "Hunters Chocolate Cream", and two litters of Scottish Terriers sired by "Brockley Kiltie" that seem to be of great promise.

Further word from Calgary states that H. P. Saunders' kennels have a litter of Cockers sired by "Ch. Day-break of Barrie", their dam being, "Fairy Ware of Aberfeldy". These puppies have the ear marks denoting that they will be going places when mature.

The same kennels have on exhibition two litters of English Setters, one sired by "Currie's Pal", an outstanding son of "Pal Hanson" from a "Feagans Mohawk" bitch, and the second litter claiming "Currie's Beau" a son of the famous "Florendale Lou's Beau," from a Nugym bitch. The owner says that without fear of contradiction that these puppies carry the best field trial blood that it is possible to assemble, and that great things are anticipated when the

youngsters get into training. Messrs. Webster and Currie have selected a pair, and they will be trained by that dean of trainers, Charlie Webster. The latter is very enthusiastic over a son of "Saunders Unomont Chick", this youngster is handling his birds like an old campaigner and has speed, style and grace that will win favor with the most exacting.

Mr. Bob Brand, of Staveley, has some real contenders. He has just returned from Saskatchewan where he has been getting some tips from the Southern trainers on five classy pups which he is finishing off for the next trials.

All the field trial men, and their prospects are getting down to good hard work, and the dogs are enjoying their morning and evening run. Most trainers report the birds are good and strong, with good prospects for the coming trials.

Calgary will be well represented at the forthcoming events in Saskatchewan and hope to do as well as last year.

Mr. Saunders is training some Springers, and already has five top-notchers, all anxious to strut their stuff, each trying to outclass the other. They are being worked in the Bow River where the water is fast, so that they will be developed good and strong when the duck season opens.

This report from Calgary reminds us that in the rivalry which has always existed between the Northern and Southern sections of this province which centers mainly around Edmonton and Calgary, one of the points that we in the North must concede is that in the South they have locations very suitable for the running of field trials for bird dogs, while the Northern sportsman, whose mind might turn to the owning of a fine Setter or Pointer, finds that he is far removed from the sort of location where a dog of field trial calibre could even be worked on game with any degree of satisfaction, with the result that these dogs are not as popular as could be wished for, and we understand a closed season has been proclaimed on all upland game birds north of the North Saskatchewan River. This will mean that, more than ever, those who like to hunt with a dog must choose a Retriever, and we wonder when our local sportsmen will start to capitalize on the boom in Retriever trials that is sweeping the country south of the international border.

We were also interested in the report about Mr. Saunders working his dogs in the Bow River, as we are glad to learn that we are not alone in working dogs in a fast river. Being located about a couple of hundred

BRITISH COLUMBIA fanciers have quite a lively time ahead of them during the next two months starting with the Nanaimo show, followed by the Vancouver Exhibition, then the Labor Day show, after that comes the Vancouver Island dog fanciers show in Victoria, then the Victoria City Kennel Club show; certainly we can not complain of not having opportunity to complete a championship in British Columbia.

Saskatchewan Notes

ANOTHER Saskatoon show has passed into history and although entries were down in number compared with the last spring show, the competition was interesting in many varieties.

The show itself was well laid out with everything running smoothly under the able supervision of Mr. R. Hogg, the Superintendent. Mr. W. Quilly, of Edmonton, making his first appearance here as judge, created a very favourable impression and every dog that came before him received a very thorough examination, his placings being the result of thoughtful judgment. Mr. Quilly made no mistake when he placed the Wire Fox Terrier, "Bridegroom Major Supreme", Best of All Breeds in Show. This dog, every inch a Terrier, was put down to the minute and shown to perfection by his owner, Mr. Hugh Allen, of Winnipeg.

Runner-up for Best in Show was the Great Dane, "Rozane of Tappen Zee", owned by Tappen Zee Kennels, Huntington, Conn., U.S.A. "Rozane" was handled in the ring by her owner, Mrs. O'Connell, who proved herself a real sport when she was heard to remark after the final award had been handed out: "I never mind being beaten by a good dog".

In the July 10th issue of "Our Dogs", Mrs. J. L. E. Aspinall, writes as follows: "The only Airedale to take Best in Show in Canada during the last two years is Mr. Robert Hogg's 'Ch. Punichy King 2nd', which gained the honour at the Saskatoon Show last summer".

This dog was bred by Mr. Hogg, of Saskatoon, being out of the same owners, "Ch. Miss Winnitoba", and sired by "Int. Ch. Wycote Special Edition". The latter dog, often referred to as a champion only, won his championship in England before annexing his Canadian title, thus making him an International Champion.

Rumor has it that another Saskatoon bred Terrier, a Scottie bitch named "Janet" by "Rosehall Rector" ex "Ruadh", is going to make things interesting around the Scottie rings in the near future. Bred by Dean A. M. Shaw of the University here, she has been purchased by Mr. G. Kynoch of Winnipeg.

"Playboy Select", owned by Mr. C. E. Musk of Prince Albert, went best

Airedale at the Saskatoon show. He was bred by Mr. A. E. Danby of Wakaw, with "Int. Ch. Wycote Special Edition" as his sire, ex "Wakaw Jill". Mr. Musk is a new exhibitor at our show and we hope this good win will be an incentive for him to come again. "Playboy" was well handled by Mr. John Willox, of English Springer fame, who rarely misses a Saskatoon show. "John" has benched some real good springers in the past and is still breeding a few and maintaining his interest in the breed. Here's hoping to see the "Teviotdale" colors to the fore again in the near future.

About twenty members of the Canadian Kennel Club attended the banquet in honor of the C.K.C. President, Colonel McRae and Mrs. McRae, held at the Bessborough Hotel on July 23rd. Dr. J. T. Cooper occupied the chair and in welcoming Colonel and Mrs. McRae to Saskatoon, emphasized the good that would result from the President's visit to the Western provinces. The speaker reminded us of favours granted to the Western members that were denied those resident in some of the Eastern provinces. He also assured those present that any motion submitted by a western member had always received impartial consideration by the members in attendance at the annual meetings.

Mr. A. E. Danby, a C.K.C. member of long standing, told, in a very fluent and witty manner, of his long association with dog shows, of the friendships created and expressed his delight at meeting Colonel and Mrs. McRae and renewing acquaintance with others in attendance.

Colonel McRae replied, thanking the members for their welcome and speaking very highly of our present Provincial Director. He assured us that in Dr. Cooper we had a representative who always had the best interest of the dog game at heart, and whose opinions and suggestions were always highly valued at the annual meetings. Mrs. McRae in a few well chosen words thanked the members for their kind hospitality and told of the many kindnesses that had been accorded them on their western trip.

Owing to the fact that several of those present were due back at the dog show the discussion of doggy subjects was left over until the following evening, when a large number of

fanciers gathered at the home of Dr. M. D. French. Here the President spoke on topics that mostly concerned the fancier of today. At the conclusion of his speech he was asked many questions, these leading to interesting discussions amongst those present.

On the following day Dr. Cooper and Colonel McRae motored out to the camp of two American trainers where between thirty and forty field trial pointers and setters were in training. In relating what transpired, I cannot do better than quote Mr. J. W. Burkinshaw, who was also at this camp and whose letter reads as follows:

"On the Saturday afternoon following the Saskatoon Kennel Club Show, (which by the way was the first I had not competed at since 1929), we received a visit from Colonel McRae, President of the Canadian Kennel Club and Dr. J. T. Cooper, our provincial director. Introductions were made to my friend, Mr. Dewey English, the professional trainer from High Point, North Carolina, the man who put that great Setter, 'Sports Peerless' through all his paces.

The first question the Colonel asked was how we liked the field trial rules adopted by the C.K.C. last spring? This started the ball rolling with show dog and field trial talk following pretty fast. Mr. English said he had as good a dual purpose dog as could be found anywhere, and sent me to fetch a son of that great dog, 'Florandales Louis Beaux'. The Colonel agreed he did not look at all bad. Then I brought out a Roy Kelly Derby, and did he smile, but although he is not a show dog he is a coming great setter. Next I showed them a Pointer which is going to win some big trials this year or I miss my guess. The Colonel said, 'Well, that is a real good show Pointer.' Yes, and he is a field trialer of the class A circuit too. His name is 'Uncas Flying Devil'.

When the Colonel made the above remark English said, 'Now Colonel, you and I are going to get along,' and they had quite a chat. Evidently the Colonel got English going for in a few moments the latter turned to me and said, 'Alright, lets have about ten dogs in the wagon.'

Dogs aboard, the Colonel and Dr. Cooper, with myself acting as coachman, started out in a bennet buggy, and the two visitors soon had an insight into this field trial business. Of course these dogs made mistakes as they had never seen Prairie Chicken (sharp tailed grouse) before arriving in Saskatchewan.

However we saw some lovely races with dogs out a mile, then the call of 'Point' and handlers riding up to their

dogs, for, of course, they are mounted on horseback. We went tearing across the prairie and there we saw those big going dogs on point. Then they worked the Singles, never attempting to go out of gunshot range until they had given them the whistle. Later they were put in the wagon and the young dogs brought out on check cords and made to handle marked birds.

Up from nowhere came a western dust storm with some very large drops of rain. The colonel was in his shirt sleeves trying to get wet in the west, but not enough of it. He told us the only thing he did not want to get damaged was the pictures he had taken of 'The country Doctor' and 'Milligans Stylish Mac', on point, also a few snaps of some good derby's.

We are hoping to hear from Colonel McRae through Kennel and Bench just what he thinks of this field trial game.

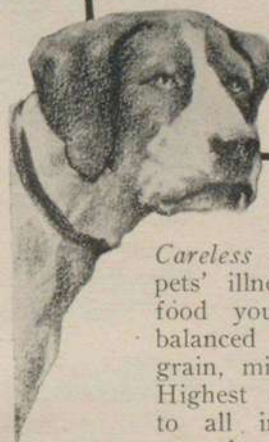

The admittance of the colored bull terrier to show classification and registration in the stud book of the American Kennel Club has let loose a flood of ink to spill over the pages of the dog press. Proponents of the white bull terrier are fearful that the years of breeding effort to produce the "White Cavalier" will bring about miscegenation because of the recognition of the colored bull terrier. These fears seem groundless. If prospective purchasers buy their stock from reputable breeders, they should be assured of pure pedigrees. In all breeding where color is a factor, there is always a possibility of miscoloring. The action of the American Kennel Club does not mean that the all-white bull terrier is doomed, but gives recognition to a growing group of bull terrierists who see in the colored bull terrier a more interesting looking dog with his Joseph's coat of many colors.

USEFUL SKIN OINTMENT

Boil together 1 lb. lard, 1 lb. petroleum jelly, ½ pint of castor oil; remove from fire and add 1 pint of petroleum (lamp oil). Boil up again to ensure thorough mixing. After cooling off add enough sulphur to produce a thin paste. Apply with the hands, rubbing well into the skin. Treat every part of the dog thoroughly. One application is usually enough, but any spots may be treated in about four days. Keep the ointment in a cool place.—By Freeman Lloyd in Field and Stream.

Britishers Show Appreciation to Mr. Chas. Cruft, who in February last celebrated his golden jubilee as a showman and, incidentally, held the greatest dog show the world has ever known, has received his gift from breeders and fanciers as a tribute to his fifty years of work for dogdom.

The presentation, which was made by Mrs. Phyllis Robson, took the form of a set of gold spoons to Mr. Chas. Cruft and a magnificent fitted dressing case for Mrs. Chas. Cruft.

It will be recalled that at a request of fanciers a fund was opened through the "Dog World" to commemorate the achievement of Mr. Chas. Cruft, whose wizardry in organization had made his show the envy of the world.

Mr. R. Rudman of Rochdale, Eng., who died recently, was one of the leading lights of the Collie fraternity. His prefix of Seedley is known all over the world. When manager for the late R. H. Lord and afterwards he produced many champions including that dozen of the breed "Champion Seedley Stirling". Mr. Harry Hungerford, then of Chicago and well known in Canada, where he resided for some years, was a heavy buyer from Mr. Rudman.

The Great Dane Breeders Association of England, held a Specialty Show at Ouborough, the home of Mr. J. V. Rank, in the County of Surrey. The entries averaged 15 per class and open bitches numbered 20. The judge was Baron Van der Hoop, a well known Terrier enthusiast from the continent.

The English Fox Terrier Club is 60 years of age, and was founded in 1876. From 1885 the club has been controlled by only seven officers.

The town corporation of Blackpool, England, (the well-known Lancashire resort) presented a cup valued at 100 guineas for Best Dog in Show, being won by the Scottish Terrier, "Ch. Heather Realization."

The 23rd International Championship Show of the Kynologen Club of Rotterdam was favored with the presence of Mr. Sid Simpson, the well known English all-rounder, also one of the judges, who states the following in "Our Dogs":—

"I saw quite a number of dogs of several breeds that had been imported and I make no apologies for stating that they should never have been sent out. It gives a wrong impression of

our stock. Of course, I'm not saying that big prices were paid for all of them, but, in any case, many of them should have been drowned at birth." Candid, what?

stall's Mills. The runner crumpled up a handkerchief in his hands for three or four seconds, afterwards handing it to Mr. Burrows, who put it in his own pocket. The runner left, accompanied by a friend, half an hour before the hound was started off on the line. Mr. Burrows had no misgivings re 'Madcap's' ability to hunt such a hot trail successfully, for she had many times followed lines to accurate termination which were at least 18 hours old. When 'Madcap' was brought out of the stable and given the scent of the runner's handkerchief, she turned a few figure eights with her nose to the ground, then set off confidently, with so much vigour that such an experienced handler as Mr. Burrows was almost dragged off his feet. The scent was so good that 'Madcap' put on great speed; she strained round corners, and then, much to everybody's relief, began a long run downhill! It was a short-lived relief, for 'Madcap' leaped a stream, and we had to follow less gracefully. Then 'Madcap' dragged us into a wood, and left no doubt in our minds about her prowess. The runner had trodden down the bracken, and 'Madcap' put her nose to the footprints. We needed only to leave the hound to her job, and watch our own steps! The hunted man had swerved among the trees, so that handling was an arduous matter, but the handler managed to describe some of the painstaking methods of a well-trained Bloodhound. 'Madcap' now led us into another sloping field. A stiff breeze flattened the grass, and when 'Madcap' ran in a semi-circle it was thought the wind had drifted the scent somewhat. Suddenly she doubled her pace and dived towards a hedge. A man whose appearance suggested that he slept in a different place every night looked very startled as 'Madcap' approached, but, true to her line, she ignored him and proceeded on her way. A five-barred gate leading into another field was open, but the handler was delighted when 'Madcap' refused the easy passage and ran through a narrow wicket gate. Then followed a stiff run uphill, after which we 'spotted' the runner. He had found a 'sanctuary' beside a hedge some yards from his companion. The closing stage of the chase was the most fascinating feature. 'Madcap' did not see her quarry; her nose was to the ground, and she passed his companion. Her first view of the 'fugitive' was when she sniffed at the 'turn-ups' of his trousers! Then she stopped; there was no 'baying' and one word from the handler put an end to the chase. The runner had hoped that 'Madcap' would follow him back to the house, but her speed had shortened the trial."
