Meeting of the Board of Directors

of the
Canadian Kennel Club, Incorporated

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., was held in the Board Room of the Club's offices, 25 Melinda Street, Toronto, on Thursday evening, October 15th, 1936, at 7.30 o'clock. The President, Col. J. N. MacRae, was in the chair. Directors present included Reg. P. Sparkes, R. Tyrwhitt, Capt. H. Dudley-Waters, B. W. Essery, K.C., and F. W. Walkerdine.

The Secretary advised the Director James Eccles would not be present on account of illness.

It was regularly moved, seconded and carried:—

"That, the Minutes be adopted as read."

Mr. Sparkes reported that a proposed "Form of Agreement" had been given attention by the Secretary and himself, and had been sent to the Records Office for the attention of Mr. Brant, therefore, progress to that point was now being made.

Mr. Walkerdine reported that rules for the proposed children's classes had been given the attention of Mr. Sparkes and himself, and, at the request of Mr. Sparkes, it was agreed to refer the matter back to the Committee for its further attention.

The Secretary reported that he had been advised by Mr. Andrew Buchanan, Toronto, that Mrs. Claire Maynard had received her papers of registration showing ownership, and that Mrs. Maynard's complaint had been removed.

The Secretary reported that he had been advised by correspondence from the office of the Chairman of the Express Traffic Association of Canada, that the matter of express charges on dogs would be considered as soon as an opportunity to deal with the matter could be found.

A letter from the American Kennel Club on the question of protection of Kennel Names was read by the Secretary.

The Secretary advised that the Club's bonus of \$100.00 to the late bookkeeper, Miss E. Crew, had been turned over to the recipient on

October 8th, when he had been requested to advise the Directors of her appreciation of their thoughtful kindness.

The Secretary laid before the meeting letters from the following parties, E. J. O'Hara, R. A. Ross, and Windsor Kennel Club.

The matters raised were considered and appropriate action was directed.

A letter from Mr. H. V. Hopkins, Toronto, was read which had reference to mixed classes and their effect on point rating at shows. The Secretary was instructed to advise Mr. Hopkins that the Open Classes at all shows were divided by sex and dogs desirous of winning championship points should be entered in the Open Class for their sex.

A letter from the Secretary of the Toronto Ladies' Kennel Association, Toronto, advised that, owing to difficulty in finding a suitable building to hold their licensed show on November 7th, 1936, the Association had found it impossible to hold the show and requested that the date fee should not be forfeited but held towards a date to be chosen in the Spring of 1937.

It was regularly moved, seconded and carried:—

"That, the request of the Toronto Ladies' Kennel Association be complied with."

A number of complaints which had been brought before the Board of Directors were then given due consideration.

The Secretary reported that several complaints had been amicably settled and no further action was taken on them.

A letter was read from Mr. John MacAuley, Toronto, who had shown an Irish Setter at three shows as a listed dog, and showed that the dog was the progeny of registered Sire and Dam.

It was moved, seconded and carried:—

"That, Mr. MacAuley be written to and informed that he can continue showing his dog by paying the necessary listing fees."

Organ at a Five Dollar fee had been discussed, and, whilst it had been conceded that a man might charge a Five Dollar Stud fee for his dogs if he wished, it should not be so advertised in Kennel and Bench.

Therefore Kennel and Bench Committee submitted the following report:—

Kennel and Bench Committee Meeting, held on Monday, October 5th, for the purpose of meeting a delegation from the Canadian Cocker Association, comprising of W. A. Price (Convener), F. Shawley, N. S. Duckett and C. J. Williams.

The delegation pointed out that they had been appointed to meet the Kennel and Bench Committee to bring to their attention that certain advertising of stud fees at \$5.00 were derogatory to the fancy in general.

After due consideration, it was felt by the Kennel and Bench Committee that the gentlemen comprising the above delegation should attend the next meeting of the C.K.C. Directors, when the matter could be dealt with relative to the future policy of accepting advertising for Kennel and Bench. SIGNED. Reg. P. Sparkes, Chairman. B. W. Essery. F. W. Walkerdine.

It was moved, seconded and carried:—

"That, Kennel and Bench Committee's report be endorsed and that, in future, the policy of Kennel and Bench was to be that no stud advertising where the fee is under Fifteen Dollars, and no sales advertising where the price is under Twenty-five Dollars be accepted, however, advertising in any acceptable form will be received without any such fee or price figures being given."

The delegation from the Canadian

Cocker Spaniel Club, being in attendance at the invitation of Kennel and Bench Committee, were ushered into the Board Room and introduced in turn by Mr. Sparkes. The delegation was comprised of Messrs. F. Shawley, N. S. Duckett and C. J. Williams, with the former acting as spokesman. Mr. Shawley referred to the reaction of members of his Club, who had been considering taking space generously in the Christmas Number of Kennel and Bench, to certain advertising which had appeared in the September and October issues where a Champion dog had been offered at Stud at a Five Dollar fee and gave it as his opinion that any such scale of advertising as his Club had in mind would necessarily be nullified, if such a type of advertising as that complained of was allowed to continue appearing.

The President, speaking for Kennel and Bench Committee and the other Directors, advised the delegation of Kennel and Bench Committee's recommendation and its endorsement by the Board. The delegation expressed its approval and left the Board Room.

The President mentioned the matter of the forthcoming Golden Jubilee of the Canadian Kennel Club and suggested that all Directors give serious thought to possible ways and means of suitably celebrating the auspicious occasion.

This being the business coming before the Directors at this time, it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:—

"That, this meeting do now adjourn."

CANADIAN FOX TERRIER ASSOCIATION

Secretary Milligan assures us that prospects for a real good show are very apparent, many more enquiries for premium lists have been received than for any previous show. The list of Special Prizes has increased by leaps and bounds, every breed being well provided for. The Annual Senior Puppy Stakes for Fox Terriers will provide one of the outstanding competitions. Assisting chief steward W. McDermott will be Messrs. A. C. Crush and F. Johnston. Judging will commence sharp at 2 P.M. Wire Fox Terriers at 7.30 P.M.

EDITORIAL

COMMENT

● THE ONE-DAY SHOW

THE popularity of these shows of shorter duration has grown to such proportions that any fixtures covering longer periods lacking the background of an exhibition or a fair will soon be forgotten. The one-day show has everything in its favor, if conducted on proper lines. It is a time and money saver to officials, exhibitors, judges and visitors. It is easier on the dogs, and being away from home for shorter periods ensures them against loss of bloom, and cases of nerves are reduced to a minimum. The only objection that can be found against the one-day show is the all too protracted proceedings that have been allowed to govern some of these fixtures. There have been cases where one-day shows have, to everyone's discomfort, been prolonged until well into another day. This can be laid at the door of (1) Lack of preparation; (2) Inexperienced officials; (3) Officials of the silent partner order; (4) Judges who pose. These conditions will have to be improved or removed, as the case may be, if the one-day show is to attain that standard that will enable it to retain its place in public favor. We would suggest to show officials that an early application for a show date be made with the immediate securing of a show location, and with the operation of a well-planned advertising campaign, thus the ground work be laid from which the many intricacies of show preparation may be successfully carried out. Coming to the day of the show, judging should commence at 10 a.m. sharp. This has been recognized as a real lifeline to dog shows from the beginning, and with a ring service rehearsed until perfect, the judge and all concerned advised of the necessity of their steady endeavor with the task in hand; with the ring kept clear of all persons except those engaged in its workings,

the show should be off to a good start, and with the programme strictly adhered to the finish should be reached without undue haste and in reasonable time. Dogs, at least 80 per cent (in all classes except Puppy) show their gait in a once, up and down. The majority of judges insist on seeing a repetition of movement from two to five times. This is a striking example of time-wasting. Rejudging a whole class when confronted with one or two new arrivals is another. It is only necessary to compare the newcomer with and from the previously marked first dog down the line, until a niche is found for him. Over fussing with already placed exhibits is harassing to them, annoying to their handlers and uninteresting to the spectators.

● THE KING AND HIS DOG

RECENTLY the daily papers of both continents had for a headline the story that King Edward VIII left London for Balmoral with newspapers under his arm and accompanied by his dog. It is easy to visualize the Euston terminal with the busy happenings associated with the more important railway stations, and amongst the crowd of holiday seekers the King arrived to go on his annual summer vacation. His Majesty's equerry and the Royal servants with the baggage formed a necessary part of the picture, but in the panorama, and no doubt playing a major part, was "Jacques", the King's Cairn Terrier. The little chap would doubtless be all quivering with excitement, his barks and yelps of delight at the unusual rush and bustle would add to the moment of departure. The servant in charge of him was no doubt fully aware of his responsibilities and the travelling comfort of the Royal canine would be

IN these days of modern transportation, such as airplanes, automobiles and streamlined trains it was a curious sight to see P. J. Carroll and his wife pull into the Silverdale Kennels with a team of six dogs. Mr. and Mrs. Carroll, who trap and prospect in the wilds of British Columbia, still believe in the faithful dog for their transportation, and they left the northern part of British Columbia over six months ago and have as their goal Halifax, N.S., which they expect to make early next spring. The dogs, all half-bred St. Bernard, are very obedient.

It was Mr. and Mrs. Carroll's intention when leaving their home to make the trip right across Canada without entering the U.S.A., and while the dogs are all clad in patented boots made out of 8 oz. duck, they feel that the roads east of Winnipeg and in the Lake Superior district would be too hard on the dogs' feet, and left for their destination via Minneapolis and Chicago.

Undoubtedly many readers of Kennel and Bench will see Mr. and Mrs. Carroll when they arrive in the East, and your correspondent advises that they may do worse than to have a fifteen-minute talk with them. While in Winnipeg the travellers made contact with the president of the Junior Tail Waggers Club who, with a few members, presented the visitors with a fine assortment of mocassins for the dogs.

Another interesting visitor in Winnipeg on October 9th was Ray P. Holland, Editor-in-Chief of the publication Field and Stream. Mr. Holland and his party, who included Mr. Harry P. Shedd, New York, Mr. C. T. Newberry Irvington, N.Y., and Mr. F. J. Weckesser of Wilkes Barre, Pa., passed through Winnipeg in the early part of October in their private car for a few days' shooting at Findlater, Sask., and they reported that they had a most enjoyable shoot and the game very plentiful. The party took back with them two beautiful Springer Spaniels and an English Setter bitch which they purchased through Mr. George Kynoch. Mr. Holland, in an interview with the Winnipeg Free Press, was very critical of the game laws in Manitoba, especially the law which only gives sportsmen two days of chicken shooting each fall. Mr. Holland says

that this is not in the interests of game conservation, especially when one of the days fall on a Federal holiday, as every man who owns a gun will be out that day, and the birds will be positively murdered, while if there was an open season of ten or twelve days, sportsmen would not feel that they must get out on a certain day. Mr. Holland also stated that several states had experimented with only two days of shooting on certain birds, and when final returns were made it was discovered that 38 per cent more birds had been shot in the short season than in the longer season.

George Kynoch of the Silverdale Kennels reports sales exceptionally brisk the last month, and has shipped several of his "best" to clients across the border, and we understand that there are several more important deals pending. Mrs. Helen Rosemont, of San Francisco, will be judge of all breeds, and we believe this should prove an added attraction, as this is the first time a lady has held an all breed appointment in Alberta.

We learn that Mr. D. J. Lonsberry, of Lethbridge, breeder of quality Collies and Schipperkes, has in his kennels two really choice litters of Collies, one litter sired by "Ch. Buddy of Brookland", and the other litter sired by "Elmhill Equality", and also two very attractive litters of Schipperkes, both black and chocolate colors. Mr. Lonsberry was a successful exhibitor at the past summer shows, and we will look for several of these youngsters on the benches next season.

Miss M. E. Fox of the "Foxhall Kennels", Calgary, reports having purchased a Silver Dappled Dackshunde bitch in whelp from the kennels of Mrs. Hedley-Peck, of Victoria, which has been mated to "Scarlet Slipper", and real quality puppies are expected soon.

Campbell, of Forget, Sask., won the Championship Stake, as well as the All-Age Stake, to become the outstanding performer of the trials. Second in the All-Age was "Sally", owned by J. N. Gunn, of Calgary, and handled by Charles Webster, of Calgary. Third, "Timyck Captain Jack", owned and handled by Clark Ouen-dergrast, of Nobleford.

Derby Stake—First, "Ontario Rose", owned by M. R. Christie and Charlie Crist, of Calgary, and handled by Mr. Crist. Second, "Ambleode Queen", owned by J. A. Tweedle, of Calgary, and handled by Bob Arthur, of Strathmore. Third place was tied between "Stavely Hill Kelly", owned and handled by Bob Brand, of Stavely, and "Currey's Pal Hansen", owned by Fred Currey, of Calgary, and handled by Charles Webster.

Shooting Dog Stake—First, J. N. Gunn's "Sally". Second, "Rex", owned and handled by Henry Repp, of Calgary. Third, "Bow River Noble", owned and handled by A. De Co, of Calgary, and "Tinker Taylor", owned and handled by Walter Taylor, of Turner Valley, tied.

As we have reported all available news from the southern part of the province we turn our attention to happenings nearer home. We feel that it is our sad duty to pay a tribute to our friend, M. F. "Mike" Greville, who passed away in an Edmonton hos-

pital on Monday, October fifth, at the age of 38 years. Mr. Greville was well and favorably known to many who are interested in dogs, as by an arrangement with Mr. W. R. Graham of 12234 97 Street, he had for some time been manager of the Rockmount Kennels. He was also particularly well known to exhibitors and others attending recent dog shows, as at the last two annual shows conducted by the Junior Hospital League and also the recent summer show of the Edmonton Dog Fanciers' Club, he acted as assistant superintendent, and his genial smile and ever ready helping hand were known to all, and being blessed with a pleasing Irish personality, he had a way of getting around situations that might look formidable to many. We met him last just a month ago, and he appeared in excellent health and spirits. But those who knew him best knew that he had been a sufferer for years, and that it was only hidden from the public by the great fortitude that is found in men of his type. Just a week before his death he spent several days on a hunting trip, returning home on Thursday, he went to hospital on Saturday and passed away on Monday morning. At the time of the great war, while still a mere youth, he joined the colors and served his country at the front. After his return, he served some years with the Mounted Police, and when he knew the end was near one of the last wishes he expressed was that the R.C.M.P. should take part in the funeral, and when at the close of the service which was conducted by Rev. Captain K. C. McLeod, Chaplain with the colors overseas, the flag-draped casket was carried from the Funeral Home by scarlet-coated men of the Mounted, while Chief Shute, Deputy Chief Blackwood and twelve of their blue-clad stalwarts of the City Police lined up and stood at salute. It was looked upon as a fitting tribute to this impulsive, big-hearted Irishman, by those who really knew him as he was.

the Editor expresses the same opinion. However, he only suggests that ribbons be handed out to "second, third and even fourth place winners" so that it may be more fully impressed on the spectator just how these dogs were placed, and we most heartily second his suggestion as far as it goes.

But why not at the same time allow all these dogs whatever benefit in the matter of points that such an arrangement would reveal. For instance, let us take the perhaps unlikely but not impossible situation where a dog coming into the group with the highest rating by reason of the number of entries in his breed would be eliminated, would it not then be fair that all four dogs placed over him should get the rating rather than just the group winner, as is now the case? Or should the third or fourth dog be the one to represent the largest entry? Why not give the benefit of his rating to the two or three placing over him and not to the winner alone, as in this way at least a part of what was taken away by the change in system of point rating would be returned to the winners of the small entry. And while there was undoubted merit to the argument that under the old system there were too many dogs getting championships without real competition, we can see no reason why, if the best of the small entry is qualified to place over the best of the larger entry, they should not be entitled to at least the same number of points.

It must be remembered that in most cases the small entries are among the large sized breeds which are more difficult and expensive to ship. And while Mr. Swann's idea of a ribbon would be better than no recognition at all, it would in no way decrease the number of shows which would have to be attended in order to win a championship or the cost connected therewith.

We know we are not alone in sponsoring this idea and that it has been fairly well circulated throughout the Dominion.

ENGLISH SPRINGER SPANIEL CLUB OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

The first Canadian Kennel Club Licensed Field Trial for Springer Spaniels to be held in Canada was held on the Surpentine Flats, a well known hunting ground adjacent to the cities of Vancouver, New Westminster, B.C., and Blaine, Washington, on October 4, 1936.

This attraction staged in a natural setting where game birds abound, was the magnet that drew a gallery of over two hundred English Springer Spaniel enthusiasts to watch twelve starters compete in the all-age stake for Canadian Kennel Club championship rating.

The English Springer Spaniel Club of British Columbia deserves great credit for sponsoring this event, which was a first class sporting affair from beginning to end. The Club worked in conjunction with the B.C. Game Commission, which body issued the official permit to hold the trials under actual hunting conditions at this period of the year. The Game Commission was represented by the personal attendance of the genial and competent officer, Inspector Cunningham.

The dogs were worked on live ring-neck pheasants purchased and liberated by the Club. Reeve Gauer, the well-known all-around sportsman, and Tom Jacobson were the official guns. These two expert marksmen turned in a one hundred per cent performance, which added greatly to the success of the trials and the pleasure of the gallery. Dr. T. E. Sleeth was the official veterinarian, and Vic C. Williams was my very able assistant as steward. The birds shot in this trial were later donated to the Crippled Children's Hospital.

There was marked ability displayed in the requirements of the trial by the various contestants, but the sum total of the merits in each case was only sufficient to justify awards to the following: First, Percy Scott's "Buelah Vista Pride" (Reg.). Two birds were allotted to each dog and my score card shows that the winning dog received practically a one hundred per cent score on his second bird. Second place to the bench show champion, Wm. F. Cleators' "Ch. Frank of Avondale 2nd." The second prize dog was a fast, high-headed dog, and scored particularly on his grand performance on both birds in obedience to signals, quartering his ground thoroughly, his bird sense, and a fine retrieve executed in spite of interference from a loose dog. The third place dog was another bench show Champion, A. J. Blair's "Ch. Rocky of Avondale." This dog also excelled in obedience, quartering and bird sense, and made a most difficult retrieve which necessitated his swimming a wide ditch; only a dead game dog that marked the fall of his bird could make that sort of retrieve; this dog actually enjoys his work. The fourth place was won by Dan Ewart's "Springfield Bing" (Reg.); this dog gave an excellent exhibition of obedience to signals, quartering and use of the wind and his nose; he is a willing worker that was unlucky on his game on the day, but he will be heard from again.

Those who still entertain doubts about show dogs being unable to hold their own in the field should remember the placements of the two bench champions and the fact that all prize winners were registered dogs, as were

practically every dog that started in the trials.

For the benefit of those that have not digested the new C.K.C. Field Trial Rules, it might be well to explain that the dogs were judged on their game finding ability, steadiness and retrieving. A successful bird dog must be obedient to heel and to signals. In order to find birds in an average day's shooting the dog must quarter his ground thoroughly and use the wind and his nose to advantage. He must be steady to flush and shot, as it can readily be realized how a rushing, barking dog could disturb game beyond gun shot range. The dog that will mark the fall of his game is of great value and when he retrieves the fallen bird and delivers it right up to hand without a tooth mark showing on the carcass, he can rightfully be designated a practical agency for the preservation of wild fowl life for the reason the genuine sportsman will only shoot his proper allotment and by the aid of his retrieving dog all shot birds are recovered.

A dog must be fast in the field and to resort to the vernacular, a dog is only as fast as his nose. As an example, a hunter walking in a given direction reasonably expects his dog to quarter the ground thirty yards or so to his right, then turn and cover a similar distance to the left, so while the hunter is walking say twenty yards, his dog should cover approximately one hundred and twenty yards. Thus the necessity of speed, and the futility of a slow pattering dog that covers the same ground twice is apparent. So it was on this basis that the trials were judged.

In appraising the work of a dog afield, this writer refuses to be stampeded by a single spectacular effort. It is the general all-around performance of field dog requirements that will secure my final vote. The English Springer Spaniel Club of British Columbia have rendered a great service to the fanciers of this dual purpose sporting dog, and they have also proven to hunters at large that a well trained dog is an absolute necessity if the full pleasure of a day's shooting is to be enjoyed on a sporting basis. My thanks are extended to the members of the Club for their many courtesies during the trials.

B.C. GUN DOG CLUB FIELD TRIAL

The first annual Pointer and Setter Trials to be held by the B.C. Gun Dog Club, under Canadian Kennel Club rules, took place at Ladner, B.C., on Sunday, September 27th. Mr. Chris. H. Barker, Vancouver, was the judge. Eleven Setters and three Pointers competed in the All-Age Stake. First was awarded to the Pointer "Egertons Sport", owned by W. N. Egerton. Second was the Setter dog, "Duke". Third was another Setter dog, "Egertons King", owned by W. N. Egerton.

Two Setters and two Pointers competed in the Puppy Stake, the winner of which was C. Murray's "Sport", a Pointer.

GALT FAIR DOG SHOW

This is one of the growing number of country fairs that have added to their many attractions a dog show, and have found it to be a popular drawing card with dogs tops, or thereabouts. Friday, September 25th, saw six groups provided and the exhibitors were children only. The President of the Cana-

dian Kennel Club, Col. J. N. MacRae, a local resident, is identified with the project, and the panel of judges was drawn from the headquarters of the Canadian Kennel Club at Toronto. They were Mr. Reg. P. Sparkes, Mr. James D. Strachan and Mr. Bert Swann. After the show the three adjudicators were the guests of Col. and Mrs. MacRae at dinner; another member of the party was Mr. Mark Gardhouse, the well known judge of live stock, who had some knotty problems to solve at the evening horse show. There were about one hundred and fifty dogs and quite three times as many children. The Sporting group of 32 was topped by a good smooth black and tan Dachshund. The huge Terrier aggregation saw a Wire Fox Terrier put down in good shape on top. Working was topped by a sound young Collie with gay ears. A Pekingese headed the Toys, whilst in Non-Sporting the heroine of the show appeared in a really good sort of Schipperke bitch whose fair handler needs no tuition on how to show her dog. Best in Show was robbed of some interest by the absence of the Sporting and Toy groups winners, the honor going to the aforementioned Schipperke.

The outstanding group was number 6 for dogs of "unknown lineage," and we were unfortunate that our duties prevented us seeing Mr. Strachan's disposal of this responsibility. The winner, according to someone, was a "gas house" dog. This being a new variety to us, we looked him up and found that one of his ancestors was a colored Bull Terrier. His grand condition, muscular development and aggressive demeanor gave one the impression that the "gas house" representative, at least, had some object in life. Taking in the night sights of the fair, the three dog impressarios were seen to shun the Fat Lady Show and Wheels of Fortune spending some time at a Shooting Gallery, and completing our tour at Murderer's Row, viewing the effigies of some of America's most turbulent citizens, then it was decided to call it a day and Toronto was chosen as the next stop.

Cooper, our C.K.C. director, was an interested spectator on both days.

Thirty-two entries were received with twenty-five dogs actually competing for honors in the three events: the Shooting Dog Stake, the Derby and the All Age.

First place in the Shooting Dog Stake, which was run on the first day, was awarded to "Hagel's Nell", an English Setter owned and handled by Mr. W. Little of Rosetown. Second to Mr. T. Matthews' English Setter, "Pal", and

third to J. W. Burkinshaw's Irish Setter, "Peggy of Homerville".

The sun was shining intermittently through the clouds as we headed westward into the wind to watch the first brace of dogs in action in the All Age Stake. This was on the morning of the second day. Mr. T. Matthews' English Setter, "Pal", and Mr. J. Burkinshaw's Pointer bitch, "Mutaz Mahal Sonorias", handled by their respective owners, were down in this heat. Both dogs got away in good style, ranged out well, but failed to point birds until time was almost up. It was then that the Pointer treated the gallery to a piece of stylish bird work similar to that which enabled her to win the Derby Stake here a year ago.

A wide cast, that proved fruitless, had just been made to the northwest. After circling some bluffs she was returning across in front when she snapped into a point that proved to be the most stylish we were to witness during the day. One look was sufficient to assure us that she had birds, and "had 'em right". Standing broadside to the gallery she presented a perfect picture, one that her handler seemed in no hurry to spoil.

About twenty autos, filled with enthusiasts, with others on horseback, crowded up as closely as possible. The little bitch remained stanch, apparently oblivious to everything but the job in hand. As the birds were finally flushed from the stubble just a few feet in front of her nose, a murmur of appreciation arose from the gallery. A dog that "hits the skyline" fills the eye of many field trial followers, while to others a snappy stylish point at the end of a well-run race is the greatest thrill.

No time was lost in getting another brace of dogs away, and as we followed one could not help but marvel at the beauty of the scenery through which we were passing. The bluffs with the leaves still clinging to the trees, presented a blaze of brown, green and gold, while the yellow stubble lay before us like some gigantic carpet. It is doubtful if just such another scene could be found anywhere outside of this western country of ours. Truly, the grand sport of field trialing is here to stay.

To describe all the heats would take up too much space. However, the Pointer already referred to appeared to be the winner right up until the last brace of dogs were sent away in the final heat. It was then that "Cobalt's Happy Rap", owned and handled by "Bill" Little, started out to "do his stuff". This eight-year-old liver and white Pointer soon showed us that he was wise to all the "tricks of the trade". No aimless running all over the country, yet he covered his course well, travelling at a fast clip from one "birdy spot" to another. It was quite evident that he

had just one objective in mind and that was to find birds. Every spot where game was likely to be in hiding was given the "once over". On point he did not show as much style as the bitch, while some might claim he does not possess the range necessary for a high-class field trial dog. Nevertheless, the judges considered him good enough to place first in this stake, with "Muntaz Mahal Sonorias" second. Third place went to "Paynes Springdale Queen", an English Setter owned by Mr. Payne of New Jersey and handled by Mr. J. Burkenshaw. A dog that showed class but was handicapped by a brace mate whose sole ambition seemed to be to chase all the birds out of the country.

Mr. Little completed the "hat-trick" when he handled his English Setter, "Whoopee Bess", to win first place in the Derby. Second went to Mr. Burkinshaw's lemon and white Pointer, "Blenheim Sonorias".

This decision was arrived at after these two dogs had been put down together for an extra ten minutes, during which time the more experienced Setter found and pointed a single, while just before being ordered up the Pointer ran right through a covey of birds. However, this latter puppy, just eight months old, will bear watching as he proved that he possesses the necessary range, style and bird sense. With age and experience he should develop into a high-class field trial dog.

Third place was awarded to Mr. "Pit" Graham's "Margo", a lemon belton English Setter bitch that should also improve with experience.

The advertisement of the Heavensgate Kennels, featuring Cocker Spaniels and Scottish Terriers, will be found in this issue. This will also appear in the

Christmas number. Some interesting news received from Mr. S. Saidman, the owner of these kennels, is being held over until next month.

Speaking of the Christmas number, our Editor has already stated that as an advertising medium next month's issue of Kennel and Bench will have no equal. We hope as many Saskatchewan breeders as possible will take this opportunity to advertise their kennels. Advertisements intended for the Christmas issue should reach the office of Kennel and Bench in Toronto not later than November 20th.

DOG BAZAAR AND DRAW

The Canadian Cocker Spaniel Association held a bazaar and draw on Thursday evening, September 24th, at the King Edward Hotel. There was a large attendance of Cocker Spaniel fanciers and some outsiders. There were quite a number of ladies present.

The President, Mr. Fred Shawley, was in charge of the bazaar and Alderman Wes. Benson outlined the purposes of the bazaar and the activities of the Club since its inception two and a half years ago. He pointed out that the Club had endeavoured to bring the novice along and instruct him so that he would be more conversant with the salient features of the Cocker Spaniel, and also gave other helpful information pertaining to the breed. Mr. A. Weir acted as auctioneer and after spirited bidding all the articles were sold.

At nine o'clock, sharp, the draw for the Cocker Spaniel was made. Mrs. T. J. Worthy, one of the oldest Cocker Spaniel breeders in Canada, made the draw. The lucky winner was Mrs. Gladys Davies, of Newtonbrook. We must at this time congratulate Mrs.

Davies on her win, as she obtained a very splendid specimen and one that should help her considerably in the breeding of Cocker Spaniels.

This Cocker Spaniel, "Blackstone's Bloom," is a black female, six months old and a very splendid specimen. It is sired by "Ch. The Great My Own," who won Best of Breed in New York two years in succession. This female was purchased from Mr. Leonard Buck of New York City. Tickets were sold throughout the Dominion and it is the opinion of the members of the Association that more of this type of Cocker should be introduced into Canada for the betterment of the breed.

After the completion of the draw, a general round table discussion was carried on until late in the evening. The speakers pointed out problems and made suggestions that were very constructive, and all together the Cocker fancy enjoyed a very happy evening.

Messrs. A. and J. Palmer, of Toronto, Ontario, won 2nd Novice and 3rd Limit Dogs with "Newtownards Irish Kid." Mr. J. Martin, also of Toronto, won 3rd Limit Bitch with "Irish Kitty."

Maritime Notes

CHRISTMAS is just around the corner and it would be well to remember that the Christmas number of our only Canadian dog magazine, *Kennel and Bench*, will be on the news stands before this matter can again be brought to the attention of the readers of this important dog journal. This is the first year our present editor has been in charge and it would be a nice gesture on the part of the fancy to contribute articles and advertise the stock in this annual number. Times are getting better and the dog game is picking up, so advertise and place the puppies you have for disposal in their new homes.

When these notes appear, dog shows in the Maritimes will be over for the year 1936, and to say they were a success would be putting it mildly. The Bedford Show, held at Franklyn Park, July 1st, saw the first showing of the Maritime Bull Terrier Club, and speaks well for the interest shown in "The White Cavalier" in the Maritimes. At this show two St. John men appeared in the role of judges and handled their assignments to the satisfaction of all concerned. They were George Kane, who has judged on several occasions in the U.S.A., and Ronald C. Vaughan was a novice as far as the judicial role was concerned. We understand Mr. Vaughan has been invited to judge at several Upper Canadian shows.

At the Saint John show, one of the best judges in Canada officiated. It was none other than William H. Pym, of Vancouver, B.C., and his placings were well received. The description of the groups by the judge in the October issue of *Kennel and Bench*, speaks volumes for the class of dog entered at this annual. Three of the group winners were bred in England, one in the United States. The only Canadian-bred in the ring for the final, was the Saint John bred Pointer "Easco Ridgewood Scout," bred by Robert Orr.

The York County Council started something last July when they had a motion put through the council making it illegal to possess a police dog or any strain thereof in New Brunswick after March 31st, 1937. It was claimed by Mr. H. H. Ritchie, Chief Game Warden of the Province, that these dogs are a menace to wild game, and should not be allowed in

the Province. The town of Sussex, New Brunswick, has now turned against the German Police dog as they term the breed, and the following item appeared in the *Telegraph-Journal*, under date of October 5th: "At a meeting of the Town Council, a motion was made regarding the dog situation in the town, whereby no canine pets will be allowed to run at large within the limits of Sussex. All license fees for dogs will be doubled, and under no circumstances whatever will a license be issued for the breed known as the German Police Dog." A number of Alsatian breeders are getting together and intend to fight the above.

At the rate the Great Dane is gaining in popularity in New Brunswick, many new breeders will, no doubt, take on the breed. That there is ample room for them in the field is evidenced by the fact that breeders who are turning out quality stock find them in great demand. One of the features at N.B.K.C. was the Dane exhibit. Mr. L. G. Rock, Saint John, deserves much credit for the high quality of this breed, there being 14 exhibited through his efforts.

Mr. Ronald Vaughan, Garwood Kennels, announces that his wire bitch, "Rothsay Patch", has just presented him with a litter of three males, and two females, sired by "Burlington Bondsman". Ronald says they sure look real. The same owner's "Hallwyre Heirloom" has been mated to Mr. Samuel E. Kominsky's well-known winner and sire, "Hallwyre Hardy Punch"; Punch is being kept very busy at stud. There are some fine litters by him in the Maritimes. Punch just arrived from Montreal show where he was Reserve Winners under George S. Thomas, defeating several well-known circuit winners.

Miss Dorothy Wilks, Saint John West, called on Mrs. A. S. Kirkland, and was so much impressed by a four months' old Scottie male puppy that had just arrived from Mrs. Eva M. Benskin's Scotch Bloom Kennels, Redling, Riverside, California, that Mrs. Kirkland was persuaded to part with him.

Garwood Kennels reports their imported Scottish Terrier, "Ashbank Cameronian Lass", is showing heavy

in whelp to Mr. G. O. Anderson's "Ch. Glen Garrell Skipper".

The news has just come to me from Robert Orr, of the sale of that famous Pointer "Easco Whichone" who has left our Province for Quebec. "Whichone" was a great favorite of Mr. Orr's, but the price was one that could not be refused.

Mr. Arthur Morris reports a litter of four male wire-haired terrier puppies, sired by the writer's "Mayfly Storm King", and out of "Glen Falls Twinkle", also a litter of Blue Merle Collies by "Ch. Stonehaven Blue Splendor", out of "Annahassit Alright".

It is with much regret that I report that Mrs. Ronald C. Vaughan, wife of our popular Maritime Director, had the misfortune to fracture a bone in her foot, and is confined to her home.

The Maritime East's leading Irish Water Spaniel breeder, Mr. Herbert Keyes, is around again after having spent some time in hospital with a broken ankle.

Mr. Patrick O'Keefe, of the Hickey Road Gun Dog Kennels, is mad at himself, and the work in general, because his physician advises him not to enter the covers and work his dogs.

It is the wish of the members that these dyed in the wool fanciers will soon have recovered.

The Nova Scotia Kennel Club will hold a one day indoor show at the Mayflower Rink in Halifax on Saturday, October 24th. This event will be judged by Mr. Charles C. Sullivan, of Saint John, N.B., who has ably judged previous shows in the Maritimes and it is expected that he will draw a large entry. This will be a C.K.C. sanctioned show.

Damages totalling \$50.00 and costs, amounting to another \$50.00, were awarded Joseph Ternan, Bedford, N.S., by His Honor Judge R. H. Murray, in a decision recently handed down against J. W. R. Hibbets, also of Bedford.

Hibbets, it is alleged, instructed his "agent and servant", Thomas Hobin, to shoot and kill the dog of the plaintiff who claimed \$215.00 damages for value of dog, \$200.00 general damages and \$15.00 for the cost of breeding the female mate of the dead dog, an expense caused by the defendant's action.

"I think," said His Honor, in part "that the amount of damages claimed by the plaintiff is, as in cases of this sort, excessive. I would assess the damages reasonably in view of the fact that, while the dog had been a prize winner of note at shows, the plaintiff is not in the dog business.

"Were I to assess on sentimental grounds hardly any sum could com-

pensate the owner. I cannot give vindictive damages as I think something might be said for persons who are annoyed by neighbors' pampered children and ideal pets. I think the claim for costs of breeding is remote under the circumstances."

This case arose out of the shooting of a Scottish Terrier, April 21, 1936, and recalls a similar case which was settled a few months ago in a like manner. Cases of this kind are all too numerous in this district and we are pleased to note that the perpetrators of these crimes are being punished, especially as the punishment meted out serves as a warning to others who may be so minded.

Mr. Geoffrey G. Ryder is justly proud of a litter of eight, four of each sex, Irish Setter puppies, recently whelped by his good bitch, "Lady John" and sired by Major E. P. Flowers' "Ch. Mike Haliburton".

For several years past there has been a ban upon the importation of dogs into the Province of Prince Edward Island, due to the Fox industry then flourishing on the Island. Previous to the placing of this ban the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick dog shows benched some very good representatives of various breeds then owned by residents of P.E.I., but when the prohibitive law came into effect further entries from the Island could not be received and the local shows suffered as a result. We are, however, pleased to note that the ban was lifted on the first day of September of this year and it is now permissible to ship dogs to and from the "Garden of the Gulf" and it is hoped that fanciers on the Island will get behind their favorite breeds and again grace our benches with some good quality stock such as those formerly exhibited by Mr. Rodgers of Charlottetown, as well as some others whose names I do not recall.

In the last issue of Dog World, (Am.) there appears a picture of "Int. Ch. Major Lukeo", chosen by Mr. Edwin L. Pickhardt as the Collie of the month. A copy of "Lukeo's" pedigree appears with the picture and Mr. Pickhardt has the following to say regarding the now famous show and stud Collie—"A beautifully colored and marked dark sable and white—outstanding in true Collie head, eye and expression. He is second to none in these points.

"He has a deep chest, good body, heavy bone and is sound. A little length of leg would help. He should contribute materially to good type wherever used.

SASKATOON 2ND ANNUAL POINTER AND SETTER TRIALS

At 1.30 p.m., September 26th, before a large crowd of dog-lovers, the first brace to go down was "Tony", an English Setter, owned by E. A. Bond, Saskatoon, and "Springdale Queen", Setter, owned by J. O. Paine, New Jersey. "Bonds Tony" found two covies, was very steady on point, but flushed his birds before the handler could reach him, chased his birds, he is a good range dog but not under control, and run very wild all through his heat, good ability to locate birds, good nose, and style. "Springdale Queen" made one find, held her point very steady, well under control, backed her mate on both his points, slow in movement, stayed close in, with great style when hunting.

The next brace to go down was "Mathews Pal", Setter, owned by Tommy Mathews, Saskatoon, and "Cobolds Happy Rap", Pointer, owned by Mr. Husher, Wiseton, Sask., handled by Bill Little, Rosetown, Sask.

"Mathews Pal" found five covies during his heat and performed some good work; very steady on point, when under control, and very stylish. "Cobolds Happy Rap" was unlucky as he did not make one find in this heat, but he showed ability and form; he backed his mate at all times, and flushed his mate's point and chased once, but at that was under control to the handler; he stayed out well.

The next brace to go down was "Joes Peggy", Irish Setter, owned by Joe Burkinshaw, Saskatoon, and "Lloyds Daisy", Pointer, owned by Lloyd O'Reilly, Saskatoon. "Joes Peggy" made one find and held her point very steady, and worked well to her handler, made two false points, but found her birds sometime later, having been runners, which went well for her as she had this cove for some distance before her handler flushed them; she is a very stylish worker, with great ability and performance. "Lloyds Daisy" was very unsteady and ran over birds and running wild, flushed, chased, but stayed out well, but not

under very good control, very stylish, nice goer, requires work.

The next brace to go down was "Littles Whoope Bess", Setter, owned by Bill Little, Rosetown, Sask., and "Muntaz Mahal", Pointer, owned by Joe Burkinshaw, Saskatoon. "Whoop Bess" made two finds in her heat, held her points steady, but flushed before her handler could reach her, chased but under control to her handler, good ability to locate birds, and very stylish on her work, a little slow in pace. "Muntaz Mahal" was unlucky on finding birds, but backed his mate on all her points, speedy, stayed out well, with lots of pace and range, flushed his mate's point, chased but under good control, a very stylish dog.

The next brace to go down was "Hairs Tim", Setter, owned by John Hair, Saskatoon, and "Hagles Nell", Setter, owned by Bill Little, Rosetown, Sask. "Hairs Tim" did not commence to work until about the end of his heat, but the last 10 minutes of his heat showed the ability and style, being a young dog, and not been handled by the owner, it was all strange to him, a beautiful upright dog, requires work. "Hagles Nell" made two finds, held her points steady, beautiful on her ground work, very stylish, and well under control, working every minute to her handler, great ability and a real type of Gun Dog.

"Mathews Pal" was run against "Springdale Queen" and "Bonds Tony" to decide decision, but the latter two dogs faulted themselves, which placed the Irish Setter third place.

Final awards—First, Little's "Hagles Nell". Second, "Mathews Pal". Third, Burkinshaw's "Peggy".

"Whoop Bess" made two finds, held her points steady, but flushed before her handler could get to her, and had to be handled as she chased on three times, her ability to locate birds was outstanding. "Muntaz Mahal" was very unlucky, but backed his mate on all points, stayed out well, flushed and chased, but a very stylish Pointer.

The first brace to go down, 1.30 p.m., was Pat Randall's "Grail", Setter, and Graham's "Margo", Setter. "Grail", only a 7 months' old puppy showed great ability to hunt, and his work on ground was beginning to show up towards the end of his heat. "Margos" ability to hunt, and her ground work was outstanding, a little unsteady, and was lucky to find a cove of birds at the close of her heat, but flushed and chased a little, but the making of a hunter.

The next brace to go down was "Blenheim Sonoras", Pointer, and "Spunky Creek Lady", Pointer. "Blenheim Sonoras" started out in great style and soon found birds, held her

point for a while, but got a little excited and flushed, her range and pace was good, and style of going was splendid. "Spunky Creek Lady", only a 7 months' old puppy did not range very good, and requires handling. A nice stylish bitch.

The next brace to go down was "Whoopie Bess", Setter, and "Maud Gonne", Setter. "Whoopie Bess", as in her previous heats, showed great style and did some good ground work, and located a wounded bird, and showed great style on this find, her point was steady and worked to her handler, and retrieved the live bird to her handler's hand, splendid work. "Maud Gonne", only a 7 months' old puppy, showed the ability to hunt and find birds.

The next brace to go down was "Mahoneys Sonya 2nd", Setter, and "Mallow Rover", Setter. "Sonya 2nd", only a youngster, did not show any signs of hunting or ranging and would not leave her handler's feet. "Mallow Rover" showed great ability to hunt, range, ground work good, action good, and a real type of shooting dog.

Final:—First, "Whoopie Bess"; second, "Blenheim Soneras"; third, "Grahams Margo".

In addition to the above prize winners, owners of other dogs, was John Hair, Russ McQuarrie, Tom Smithwick, Mike Geary, Dave Mahoney, Mrs. Pat Randall, all of Saskatoon. Included in the list of spectators who followed the trials were, Dr. M. D. French, Dr. J. T. Cooper, A. Goddard, and many of the Saskatoon Kennel Club Members. It was a great surprise to all when a car drew up with some three gentlemen who turned out to be H. D. Ruhl, S. C. Whitlock, and J. H. Stephenson, all of Michigan State Department of Game Conservation, who are making a tour of Manitoba and Saskatchewan. This party had some Pointers and Setters with them, and after the writer talking to them, in reference to trials etc., and asking them would they wish to run their dogs, I was informed that these dogs were not trained on Hungarians. They all passed very favourable remarks upon the performance of the heats they had seen up to then, and were very pleased they had been able to be present with us. They took several photos and stated we would be seeing these in all the American dog papers, and on departure stated they had had a very pleasant day with us, and you will be hearing from us when we return home.

Several owners of the dogs, stated that a Gun Dog Club would be started, and that some \$600.00, be given in prizes; also several cups and trophies. All the owners were keyed up to see

bigger and better trials held at Saskatoon next year. To me it was encouraging to know that we had got the owners of Setters and Pointers interested to such a point as to talk prize money, as we were only able to run the 1st and 2nd Annual Trials on a shoe-string, relying on the entry money to pay the expense of horse hire. We had 30 entries, 10 in the Gun-Dog Stake, 10 in the All-Age Stake and 10 in Derby Stakes. Total, 20 dogs.

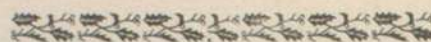

TELEPHONE CITY KENNEL CLUB SHOW

Brantford, Ontario, Saturday, October 3rd, saw the local kennel club stage an all-breed dog show, under the rules of the Canadian Kennel Club. It was housed in the Alfred St. Rink of happy memories and whilst the event under notice lacked the pageantry of those of previous years the prevailing free and easy conditions lent themselves to a very enjoyable time. The entry was only fair, about one hundred and fifty dogs; the highest breed turnout being half a score in Boston Terriers, nine Cocker Spaniels came next with Wire Fox Terriers and Collies in third place with eight each. Probably the outstanding entry was that of the Celamo Kennels of Rochester, N.Y., who benched no less than seven English Toy Spaniels. It is years since Canada saw such a representation of this aristocratic old breed.

Mr. Gerald Buck, of Rochester, N.Y., did yeoman service acting as general factotum in the allrounders ring. His duties in addition to those of steward included the writing up of judges books, announcing, etc. The thanks of the club are due to him. The lack of any ring structure for the judging of sporting breeds and the use of the same section with just boards laid flat on the ground as the dividing lines between the spectators and the operations for the judging of Groups and Specials, also the necessity of securing some dogs on the floor called for comment. The judges were Mrs. M. Stevens, Toronto, Ontario, Boston Terriers; Mr. Geo. K. Alton, Freeman, Ontario, Sporting Breeds (except Dachshunds), and Group; Dr. Thomas Buck, Rochester, N.Y., all other breeds, General Specials and Best in Show.

The Sporting Group was headed by Mrs. T. J. Dunlop's Russian Wolfhound "Champion Romanoff Sandra." She has added lustre since the Toronto Exhibition and in the hands of Mrs. J. Paterson she stood out. Next came O. C. Pierson's Beagle "River Park My Ideal," and in third place was Joseph Maski's English Setter "Mike of Brimore," who makes his best efforts under the care of Oscar Pierson and was in improved form. Terrier Group. Here the good headed Wire Fox Terrier, Malabar Kennels' "Startling Event of Wildoaks" was jockeyed to first place by George Ward, Jr., second a real good sort of Scottie in Dr. H. E. and W. Batt's "Haldon Juanita"; third, Mrs. Kenneth D. Marlatt's Airedale Terrier "Champion Admiral of Aldon," well known and on the top of his form. He looked the favourite here, but not being in accord with his handler he suffered accordingly.

THE MANITOBA CLUB'S CHICKEN TRIALS

A half century ago—in September, 1886, to be explicit—a little band of bird dog lovers gathered at Morris, Man., for the inaugural trials of what became the Manitoba Field Trial Club. Fifty years is a long time, but ever since that little host of idealists came together on the prairies of Canada to foster a sport that was later to become an institution of gargantuan propor-

tions the bird dog has played its part in the affairs of Canadian sportsmen. True, there was a hiatus of a few years during the period of the World War, but with this brief lapse this little club has gone on uninterruptedly. There were vicissitudes, glamorous seasons, occasional off periods, but on the whole the Manitoba Club has gone down through the years of a half century of achievements with credit to itself and a history-making record such as no other bird dog organization in this wide world has ever experienced.

At Pierson, Man., on September 11 and 12 of the present year, the club's fiftieth anniversary was celebrated. Not perhaps with the blare of trumpets and the marshaling of the captains that might have been hoped for, nevertheless it was an episode that will mark a distinct phase in the affairs of bird dog men.

Only two members constitute the present Manitoba Club, W. R. Milton and Edmonton Smith respectively.—The American Field.

INT. CHAMPION INVERESK COCKSURE DEAD

The great Jock, as he was known to his friends, one of the pillars of the English Springer Spaniel breed, has passed on. He was whelped April 16, 1924, and was imported from Scotland by Mr. H. G. Placey, of Sherbrook, Que., in October, 1925. He commenced his career on this side the water with a modest 3rd prize at Westminster, New York, in 1926. He soon struck his real stride however, and went on to gain his American title without further defeat. In Canada he was always on top or thereabouts, and several times achieved the top honour of Best in Show, All Breeds. He was a prolific sire, his winning sons and daughters, grandsons and granddaughters being legion. As a constant companion for more than 10 years and a great canine personality, Mr. Placey will surely miss him.

These mere facts, however, do not commence to tell the story of the travel venture involved in this itinerary. To arrive at Boston on the morning of the show it was necessary for Mr. Sparkes and his dog to travel by air from Cleveland, which was done by the aid of the United Air Lines, leaving there at 11:40 p.m., arriving at Newark, N.J., at 2 a.m. on the morning of the 12th. Bits From Britain

The International Sheepdog Trials at Ayr. Over two thousand spectators attended on Wednesday, the final day. The twelve dogs selected on Tuesday were tested over the full championship course, which includes an outrun of 800 yards for one lot of 10 sheep and then a redirection for another lot of 10 on the opposite side. The lots are then combined, and the dog must take the drove round a triangular course in which two sets of gates have to be negotiated. Shedding consists of separating 15 unmarked sheep from the score, the dog to hold up five marked sheep which are finally penned.

The course set for the International provides a supreme test for both handler and dog, and the winner is entitled to be termed a world champion. He wins the "Blue Riband of the Heather." This distinction can now be claimed by Mr. Jas. M. Wilson, Whitehope, Innerleithen. With his International champion Roy, he has again won the highest honour in the pastoral world. And Roy is the only dog to have won this honour twice. He won it at Cardiff in 1934. Mr. Wilson won outright the Championship Shield on that occasion. Roy's performance at Ayr was a classical exhibition of guiding and controlling skill. He gathered his charges well, starting off with as fine an outrun as has ever been seen in the contest. He hesitated in the second gather, but once he understood the commands of his master he sped off and brought the sheep right up to the appointed place. In driving he deviated slightly from line in the cross-section, but in shedding and penning, the work was that of an artist. It was a magnificent achievement.

Otter Hunting on the Cairn—Rain was falling heavily from a leaden sky when the Dumfriesshire Otterhounds arrived at Dalgona Bridge, Dunscore, recently, to hunt the River Cairn. When hounds were cast off above the bridge the river was rather on the large side for hutning. The pack continued upstream, passing the innumerable willow holdings and marshy banks in silence, but at the island about half a mile from the bridge hounds opened on a strong drag, and found their otter in a clump of undergrowth and roughage.

Hounds drove the game from the covert into the river, where they spoke to its foil in loud chorus. Hunting was very difficult, and the pack had to rely almost solely on their scenting power:

owing to the fact that the darkened surface of the stream hid the quarry from sight. The otter encircled the thickly-covered island very frequently, trying to elude the hounds by continually swimming under overhanging willows and briars, which greatly impeded the progress of the resolute pack.

After a spell of good hunting in the proximity of the island, a great burst of music from the leaders of the pack indicated that the otter had left its stronghold and was slipping downstream. Hounds marked their otter in a strong earth, the quarry having sought refuge in a rabbit warren on the right bank.

The terriers bolted the otter, but after going down-stream a short distance it doubled back towards the island, hounds speaking in lovely melody. There the pack turned it again, and the quarry swam downstream with hounds close at its ruder. Exciting sport ensued, until an open drain tempted the otter to seek cover. The terriers once more proved the masters, and the otter bolted in full view of the field. This time it did not take directly to the river, but galloped across a hay field and jumped a stone dyke, and then entered the water by a circuitous route. Hounds quickly swam the otter into the lower reaches, and later bowled over a sporting bitch otter of 14 lbs. on the left bank just above the bridge.

The "mask" was presented to Mr. Donald Cross, Otterden, Maybole. The hunt lasted for two and a half hours.—The Border Telegram.

"Gyp", Oldest Dog in Britain, is 23.

London.—Britain's oldest dog was discovered recently by Bob Martin, famous authority on dogs.

The dog is "Gyp", 23 years old and still going strong.

"Gyp" is a record breaker", Martin declared. "Few dogs live longer than 12 years. Yet she had her last litter of puppies when 18, and followed the

To revert to the question of big litters, it is difficult to understand why Nature is so recklessly prolific. A bitch has only eight serviceable teats, and only exceptionally strong animals can do justice to more than eight puppies. To rear more is likely to chance what may be the best puppy of all turning out a weakling, or to exhaust the bitch, and possibly sacrifice most of the puppies. If, as people sometimes tell me, six puppies feed while the other five are sleeping, and then the five take their turn at the maternal fount while the others sleep, the poor bitch herself gets no respite, the milk supply deteriorates in quality as well as in quantity, and the puppies have to be weaned too early, or else they turn out rickety weaklings. Far better have six lusty, well-nourished puppies and a happy mother than a dozen weeds and a bitch on the verge of hysteria.
