The Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., will meet in the Club's Board Room, 25 Melinda Street, Toronto, on Thursday, June 17th, 1937, at 3.30 p.m.

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Meeting of the Board of Directors

of the
Canadian Kennel Club, Incorporated

THE regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., was held in the Board Room of the Club's offices, 25 Melinda Street, Toronto, on Thursday afternoon, May 20th, 1937, at 3.30 o'clock. The President, Col. J. N. MacRae, presided. Directors present included: Walter H. Reeves, Dr. H. E. Batt, Mrs. E. Brown, W. J. Risewick and B. W. Essery, K.C.

It was regularly moved, seconded and carried:—

"That, the Minutes of the previous Board of Directors' meeting be adopted as read."

Secretary: "It is with sincere regret that I advise the Directors this afternoon of the rather unexpected passing of our revered Honorary President, the late Mr. C. A. Stone, which took place at his home on Monday, April 26th. Mr. Stone, in my judgment, was just as keen a fancier at 85 years of age as he was when he was 25. He was an exhibitor at Guelph and had entered for Windsor, and so I can truthfully say that, like our old friend and Past President, Brig.-Gen. C. M. Nelles, he most assuredly died in his harness. Both men were charter members of the Canadian Kennel Club and both had served our organization consistently and loyally for almost half a century. I happen to know that Mr. Stone had been looking forward with eagerness to our Golden Jubilee Year, and it makes me very sad to realize that he will not be with us next year. To have known such men as General Nelles and Charlie Stone was more of an inspiration to me than anything else I could mention. In the name of the President, Directors, and Members, and on their behalf, a message of condolence has been sent to Mrs. Stone, who, as you may well suppose, feels her loss very keenly."

"Captain Waters, as we reported at the last Directors' meeting, was so much improved that he was taken home. Since then he has had to go back to Christie Street Hospital again. The last report is to the effect that he is resting as well as can be expected."

The Secretary reported that he had forwarded the file on Huskies (Siberian) to Mr. R. A. Ross and had communicated with their owner at St.

Jovite, but that a report was not yet available.

The Secretary read a letter from the Records Office dated April 12th, with regard to the registration of Greyhounds. At the Secretary's suggestion, the matter was left in abeyance.

The Secretary outlined the particulars of the di Pietro-Ballingall investigation. This matter was further enquired into and it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:—

"That, Mr. Norman di Pietro be deprived of the privileges of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., for the period of one month, and that Mrs. B. Ballingall be denied the privileges of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc."

A letter from the Windsor Kennel Club was read reporting on the conduct at their show of certain exhibitors. It was regularly moved, seconded and carried:—

"That, further particulars of this case be secured from the Windsor Kennel Club."

Another letter from the Windsor Kennel Club was read which contained the suggestion that judges should not be allowed to accept more than one appointment within a 300-mile radius during a period of three months. The Directors agreed that it was up to the show-giving clubs to make certain from the judges as to their appointments and act accordingly. It was agreed that the Windsor Kennel Club be advised that the Board did not consider it within its jurisdiction to restrict the appointments of a judge or judges.

A letter from the Judy Publishing Co., Chicago, U.S.A., was read offering to donate a copy of each of the books published by that organization to the library of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc. The Secretary advised that he had accepted the kind offer of the Judy Publishing Company, on behalf of the Board of Directors.

A letter of resignation was received from Col. Robert McEwen, London, Ont., a charter member of the Club. The Secretary advised that he had written Col. McEwen asking him to reconsider his resignation.

Upon the suggestion of the President, it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:—

"That, Col. Robert McEwen be appointed Honorary President of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc."

A letter dated March 5th from the Records Office, with regard to printing the Stud Books, was read by the Secretary. After discussion, it was regularly moved, seconded and carried:

"That, the Canadian National Live Stock Records Committee be, and is herewith, authorized to enter into a contract with the National Printers Limited, to print Stud Book No. 41, for the year 1937, by the photographic process, and that the preparation of the necessary copy be undertaken by the Records Office on our behalf and at our expense. This contract to supersede the printing agreement signed on behalf of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., on February 7th, 1936."

In discussing certain suggestions made in a letter from the Records Office it was agreed that the section at present listing all the Champions should only contain the names of those dogs completing their championships in the year for which the Stud Book is issued. It was also agreed that the sections containing the show winnings and the list of Kennel names be continued as at present and that the printing of the registrations should be in the solid type form.

Two samples of tattooing instruments were inspected. It was understood that a complete report on the subject would be presented at the next meeting.

GUELPH DOG SHOW

Sponsored by the Captain Frederick Bond Chapter, I.O.D.E., assisted by the Guelph Kennel Club, this show held on Saturday, April 10th, in the Armouries at Guelph, Ontario, was a huge success. The entry of more than 200 dogs was a record for the Royal City, and the club officials having all arrangements well in hand, whilst the ladies of the Chapter did yeoman service with the result that charity will largely benefit, and one more successful show has passed into history. Mr. Walter H. Reeves of Belleville was the judge, and with this well known practitioner's awards there was not much to cavil at. Sporting breeds made a very good show. Terriers were not heavy and Toys are still lacking that much needed lift up. Twenty-one Cocker Spaniels headed the poll followed by 18 Springer Spaniels and 14 Scottish Terriers.

We have one adverse comment to make and that is against the system that prevailed here in making only one award in the groups. It is quite obvious that after the winner alone is chosen and no other awards or even placing of the dogs in the order of their merit follows, the results of the competition is valueless so far as every other breed is concerned. With 11 dogs each in Sporting and Terrier Groups, as was in this case, the 2nd, 3rd and even 4th placings were of sufficient importance to call for recognition, and in addition to providing information and satisfaction to the exhibitors and followers of the breeds would add to the entertainment of the paying public, and remove the impression that the judging was incomplete.

Mr. Leonard Collins' Old English Sheepdog, "Ch. Ideal Weather", repeated his Hamilton successes by winning Best of Breed, First in Working Group and Best in Show, all Breeds. Terrier Group was won by Mrs. G. W. Hyslop's Cairn Terrier, "Ch. Tinker of Tapscot"; Mr. W. J. Risewick's Bull bitch "Wally's White Duchess", suc-

cessfully contested the Non-Sporting division; Sporting fell to Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Maski's English Setter, "Carmen of Glen Grove", whilst the Toy Group saw Mrs. J. W. Bruce's Pom, "Champion Melbourne Supremacy" have an easy jaunt.

• The Airedale Terrier

The "Biggest and Best Terrier" his followers fondly dub him, and by this adulation a world of affectionate meaning is expressed. He possesses an heredity of gameness, brawn, brain power and outstanding presence handed down from his ancestors, all of which, before, and now that he has attained the polish of today guarantee him to possess a spirit of independence, courage and understanding that is far beyond the powers of many

gameness and rat killing ability was amongst the subjects of the stories of that period. The Bull Terrier, always a bold, fearless, aggressive member was favoured for these qualities, added size and short coat. Then to the outcome of this experiment was introduced the Otter Hound, and whilst he was credited with bringing added bone, substance and a harder weather resisting coat, it was for his well known propensity for work in

published in 1880 and some controversy was roused by the allotted weight, viz.: Dogs forty to fifty-five pounds, bitches thirty-five to fifty pounds. This latitude in avoirdupois was later curtailed and the present requirements which have stood for many years. Forty to forty-five pounds for dog, bitches somewhat less, has proved a safe guide and has done much to cause the production of the splendid specimens of this and earlier days. The late Charles H. Mason imported the first Airedale Terrier to this continent and in 1881 the dog "Bruce" by name won 1st prize in a rough-haired Terrier class at the New York Dog Show. It was about the turn of the century when the breed really started to show progress. Great Britain, the land of its birth, and America fostering to the greatest possible extent. Canada always held a strong hand in the breed and from one end of the Dominion to the other the showings were always creditable, with home-breds going great guns in heavy competition. The Airedale Terrier Club of Canada, with headquarters in Toronto, was an organization of great power for good, their activities included two Specialty Shows, the first in 1917 and amongst the prizes of distinction for which they were responsible was one of one hundred dollars cash for the Best Airedale Terrier at the Canadian National Exhibition Dog Show.

DESCRIPTION

By Courtesy of the Airedale Terrier Club of America

Head. Long, with flat skull, not too broad between the ears and narrowing slightly to the eyes, free from wrinkle. Stop hardly visible and cheeks free from fullness. Jaw deep and powerful, well filled up before the eyes, lips tight. Ears V-shaped with a side carriage, small but not out of proportion to the size of the dog. The nose black. The eyes small and dark in color, not prominent and full of Terrier expression. The teeth strong and level.

Neck. Should be of moderate length and thickness, gradually widening towards the shoulders and free from throatiness.

Shoulders and Chest. Shoulders long and sloping well into the back, shoulder blades flat. Chest deep but not broad.

Body. Back short, strong and straight. Ribs well sprung.

Hindquarters. Strong and muscular, with no droop. Hocks well let down. The tail set on high and carried gaily, but not curled over the back.

Legs and Feet. Legs perfectly straight, with plenty of bone. Feet small and round, with a good depth of pad.

Coat. Hard and wiry and not so long as to appear ragged; it should also be straight and close, covering the dog well all over the body and legs.

Color. The head and ears, with the exception of dark markings on each side of the skull, should be tan, the ears being of a darker shade than the rest, the legs up to the thighs and elbows being also tan, the body black or dark grizzle.

His beginning was lowly enough for he was the result of experimental breeding carried out by the Yorkshire workman with a view to producing a larger dog with all the grit and ability of the smaller gamester, whilst his proposed calling would include an aptitude for work on land as well as in water. The story that the first thoughts resulted in a cross between a Yorkshire Terrier and a Bull Terrier appears quite reasonable, for half a century and probably a decade more ago there were members of the former breed who were anything in weight but the "mighty atoms" we are accustomed to viewing in their cushioned and be-ribboned cages today, whilst their

water that he was considered to be the ideal infusion into the "family tree". The large hound ears which were included in his offerings, however, played havoc with all Terrier character and became a bug-bear to the breed for some years and was probably the reason for the somewhat belated recognition of the breed in some circles.

Be that as it may, judicious mating and strict adherence to sound principles of breeding worked wonders in this particular, and with the production of a medium sized Terrier ear the Airedale really arrived, and no breed made greater and quicker strides towards the ideal. The first standard of the Airedale Terrier was

COMMENT

● JUDGING THE JUDGES

THIS everyday subject causes more discussion and carries more controversy than any other in our great sport.

The word pictures drawn for the benefit of the "listener-in" vary in hue all the way from dull to scarlet.

Old-timers are prone to extol the bygone masters as the last and best word in ability and integrity to ever adorn the canine judiciary.

Critics of the younger school are equally enthusiastic in their demands that new blood be placed on the pedestal of the woolsack.

So from day to day and from dog show to dog show we go along with few or no suggestions of real worth being brought forward, and in the majority of cases discussion yields nothing in the way of constructive criticism or even any reasons why a change from the prevailing conditions should be made.

The licensing of judges as now in vogue provides constantly fluctuating opinions "for and against", and we might state here that the possession of a judge's license was never intended to be taken as a guarantee of the holder's ability by those responsible for the granting of that honour, and the many rude awakenings experienced by show officials and exhibitors have done much to dispel this common but erroneous belief.

However, in the face of expressed opinions gathered from far and near, and personal observation provided by a wide field, we believe that the judging material available today is quite equal in calibre to that of any previous period, admitting as we do freely that there is always the exceptional case with which to contend.

The disgruntled exhibitor, like the poor, is always with us, but he should not be barred from all sympathy, for virtue often lurks in strange places.

Judging dogs involves largely and not much more than a comparison of values, and so long as human nature remains as it is, differences of opinion will be the order of the day. These alone provide the life essence of competition and has done much in the past to lay the foundation of the sport that we enjoy.

● "WHO CARES"

JUST an everyday expression that may fall from the lips of any member of the family from junior to the oldest. One of the strangest meetings we ever had with this time-worn expression was in the early 20's at a dog show held in New York City. There "Who Cares" appeared in the catalogue as the name of a Terrier puppy. The strange nomenclature appealed to us, and early on we witnessed the arrival of the youngster. Whatever the meaning of his title he showed all the timidity of the juvenile, his gangling stage of youth being emphasized with every hesitating step and crouch, and "Who Cares" did not appear to fit him a little bit. But the day wore on as days do and the youngster, who was undergoing a baptism such as his forefathers had done before him, was hourly pulling himself together. "Blood was telling," and "Who Cares" was feeling the urge in his veins. His ears were carried closer, his expression was getting keener, his front was adding a firmness, his loin and middle lost that strange looseness, but, joy of joys, his hindquarters were becoming responsive and his tail expressed his pleasure at being one of such an important assemblage of his kind. We did not witness his debut, but word came down the line that the class had been topped by "Who Cares". The classes were judged, and amongst the contenders for the Winners prize was "Who Cares". His name was now synonymous with his deport-

ment and carriage, he showed all the attributes of a comer, and more important still his "Who Cares" demeanour helped to carry him to the Reserve Winners post in one of the hottest competitions of the breed that New York was noted for at that period.

● THE LAST OF THE OLD BRIGADE

IT used to be very pleasant to believe that our Golden Jubilee would find us fraternizing and celebrating with three of our original charter members at least, but on February 14th, 1936, Brig.-Gen. C. M. Nelles, C.M.G., was recalled rather unexpectedly. On April 26th Mr. C. A. Stone answered the call of the "grim reaper", and now the only one of the three charter members left to us is Colonel Robert McEwen of Byron, Ont., who, we hope, will be spared to share in our Golden Jubilee happenings in whatever form they may be served up to our people.

To remember that the three men mentioned had always remained with the Club from the beginning was quite an inspiration, for each one of them had contributed a full measure of valuable service.

Brig.-Gen. C. M. Nelles, C.M.G., after 43 years as a member, became the Club's eleventh President. Mr. Stone, after 40 years' membership, became the Club's Honorary President, whilst Col. Robert McEwen served as an important member of the several Executive Committees from 1888 until 1912.

It is a well-known fact that the late Mr. Stone was the first Secretary of the Canadian Kennel Club. It is also well known that his blue belton English Setter bitch, "Forest Fern", was registered No. 1 in our stud books. It may not be as well known that he led the first Canadian delegation to the American Kennel Club offices, and came back to Canada with the first Reciprocity Agreement in his pocket, but he did. Col. McEwen also shares in this distinction.

It may not be so well known that the late Brig.-Gen. C. M. Nelles registered the second dog in our stud books; his black Cocker Spaniel "Brant" holds that distinction in our No. 1 Stud Book. Numbers 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10 were also given to Cocker Spaniels owned by the General; of course he was not Brigadier-General in those early days. First we find him as C. M. Nelles, then Dr. C. M. Nelles, and so on up to the time of his receiving the Royal decoration. The kennels were registered as the "Brant" Kennels, and in the first Stud Book 25 Cockers are recorded as having been bred by the



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Brant Kennels; two of these were "Ch. Brant" and "Brant II". Twenty were registered as owned by "Brant" Kennels and one of these was "Ipswich Boy", bred by J. Farrow of Ipswich, England.

To Colonel McEwen and his partner, Richard Gibson (our first President), belongs the highest honors for registration support to our No. 1 Stud Book. This partnership registered 33 dogs and 30 bitches, and amongst them we find the early importations, "Red Gauntlet", a son of "Ch. Charlemagne", "Bonnie Dunkeld", a son of "Highlander", "Gilderoy", a dog out of the same litter as "Red Gauntlet", and the bitches "Daylight", by "Ch. Caractacus", and "Madge", a daughter of "Highlander". For many years Colonel McEwen's "Holyrood" Kennels furnished many of the prominent early winners, many of which were splendid workers on the farms in Canada. The contributions of service which Gen. Nelles, Charlie Stone and Colonel McEwen have to their credits can never be appraised for value in dollars and cents, therefore the only payment possible is that we who are left to carry on, as suggested by the late Mr. Stone at the Directors' luncheon this year, will keep their memories green as long as records may be kept.

Best Dog in Show

THE ambition of every exhibitor is to win the special for Best Dog in Show and there is no doubt that the awarding or judging of this special is the great attraction for the spectators. Of late years there has been a number of excellent changes made in the judging of this special, the most important one is that only one judge is selected. Years ago every breed judge, present when the special was being judged, came into the ring and then the fun started, probably the Pekingese judge could not or would not see any other dog but the Pekingese, the Pomeranian judge might be a little more reasonable and if the other judges would not vote for the Pomeranian would vote for any other dog except the Pekingese. The Terrier judge stood out for the Terrier. Sometimes we had more than one Terrier judge in the ring and each felt compelled to vote for the breed he had judged, we went into "conferences" in the corners of the ring, and often the special was awarded to the dog whose breed had the judge with the strongest convictions and the most persuasive tongue. At other times the voting amongst the judges resulted in a tie, and then a search had to be made for a referee. What a farce the judging for this important special often used to be in those good old days! Happily for the good of the sport the procedure has been changed, now instead of having all unbeaten dogs brought into the ring, we first of all have groups, Sporting, Hounds, Working, Terrier and Non-Sporting, and to be able to compete in his or her respective group, the exhibit must have won "Best of Breed". There is even a weeding out process for this, the winners dog and winners bitch compete against each other, and the winner is called Best of Winners, then the Best of Winners compete against the dogs entered for specials only and the winner of this competition is declared Best of Breed. The Group judging is done, or should be, by judges who are authorities on the breeds in the Group they are judging. The reason for this is that the competition may be very close—we will say between the Wire-Haired Fox Terrier and the Sealyham. The judge should be capable of knowing which dog comes nearest to

the standard of perfection, then he has to weigh up before making his final selection, condition and handling. At times two or more competitors are so close that the final walk decides the issue. Eventually we have the six groups judged, and exhibitors and spectators are on the tip toes of excitement for the arrival in the ring of the six group winners, which will compete for the honour of honours, Best Dog in Show. Surely the judge for this special must be an all-breed authority, and not a judge just familiar with one or two breeds. Lately the writer has viewed with concern that some judges selected to award this important special could not by any stress of imagination be called all-breed judges. Such selections do not help the sport of exhibiting dogs. They make the award for Best in Show a farce. Just imagine asking a well-known hockey referee who had never seen a first-class cricket match to act as umpire for a match, England v. Australia. Do you think the players would stand for such an appointment? Well it is by no means worse than asking a man who is familiar with one or two breeds to award the special for Best Dog in Show. We will always have differences of opinion amongst judges, in spite of standards, and it is a good thing for dogs and dog shows that we do, or shows would soon be things of the past, but if Best Dog in Show is to be an honour eagerly sought after by every exhibitor, it must be the result of a judging competition and not a gamble; just because a dog has won his group it does not mean that he is a great dog, the dogs he has beaten may have been mediocre—and it is for this reason that the very best all-breed authority should be appointed to act as judge for Best in Show, if not, ere long we may see at our shows a ballot box in which exhibitors and spectators will be asked to leave their vote for Best Dog in Show.

The Passing of a Sportsman

The news that dear old Charlie Stone had passed the great divide was a shock to his many, many friends on the American continent, and I always counted it a compliment to be numbered amongst Charlie's many friends. During the years I have lived in Canada we have had many pleasant chats over the "Red Beauties" and only a

few days ago Charlie Stone was exhibiting at the Guelph Show his latest purchase "Winlay Donald" (129283), which was by "Champion Admore Ringleader", a son of the great champion "Higgins Red Pat". The writer was greatly impressed with the quality and type of "Donald" and had no hesitation in awarding him Winners Dog and Best of Breed. Some time after the judging Charlie sent his partner Mr. A. Grossart to me, to ask if I thought "Donald" was good enough to exhibit at the great Morris and Essex Show. This was the first intimation to me that "Donald" belonged to Messrs. Stone and Grossart for he was handled in the ring by Oscar Pierson. How pleased I am now that I was able to say: "By all means do so". Charlie Stone from his early boyhood days was a lover of Setters, he started first with English then sponsored Gordon's, but his real success was with the "Red Beauties". His strain of "Forests" produced a number of great winners and how proud dear old Charlie was of their success. To the best of my memory the last time I saw Charlie handling one of his dogs was at the National Kennel Club last year. To Mrs. Stone I offer my sincere sympathy and I know without question his many friends will join me. When Wordsworth wrote the following he must have had in mind just such a man as our dear old friend:

"The best portion of a man's life

His little nameless unremembered

Act of kindness and of love."

Mr. Bruce A. E. Clouse of Kingsville, Ontario, writes:

"Your article in the May issue of Kennel and Bench in regard to novice exhibitors is decidedly to the point and some method should certainly be worked out to retain as permanent exhibitors the larger number of people who exhibit dogs for the first time. I think your suggestion of giving cards rating very highly commended, highly commended, and commended, after the usual ribbon, would be a considerable help. Several years ago I used to exhibit fancy pigeons and our definition of novice referred not to the particular bird being exhibited, but to the owner. Possibly some regulation such as that could be made to apply to the exhibitors of dogs".

A Plucky Importer

Dame Fortune is a fickle jade and it is certainly about time that she should stop the frowns and throw a few smiles towards R. P. Sparks, that plucky importer of some of England's best Bulldogs. Last August Reg. had the misfortune to lose the two noted champions "Bunzie" and "Primula" a blow which would have discouraged most fanciers, but not the owner of the Kamels, the day after the disaster

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he cabled his agent in England to procure a dog to take the vacant kennel of "Bunzie", and before many weeks were over Reg. announced the fact that he had purchased "Morovian Mainstead" and early this year the kennel was strengthened by the purchase of still another great winner "Ch. Norway Debut". Now we hear that this bitch was found dead in the hotel room at Buffalo where Mr. Sparkes had left her for a few minutes whilst he benched "Kamel Morovian Mainstead" at the Bulldog Club Show. This is heartbreaking news, but Reg. is certainly "one of the Bulldog breed" for after the autopsy to ascertain the cause of death which was said to be indigestion and toxemia, the cables were again busy and Dick Voss has instructions to buy another of England's best Bulldogs. Bulldogs have a disconcerting way of smiling at death. The writer remembers buying a famous champion many years ago from George Murrell, apparently this bitch was in the best of health when she was placed in her travelling crate at Euston Station, yet a few hours later a telegram was received stating that when the box was opened the champion was found dead. It certainly looked like poisoning and therefore she was sent to the noted Veterinary Surgeon Mr. A. J. Sewell, M.R.C.V.S., and the autopsy

revealed that there was no trace of poison, but that the vital organs were diseased and had been apparently so for months.

The Daily Press and Dogs

At last the Daily Press in Canada is becoming aware of the fact that we have dog shows and that the general public are really interested in shows and dogs. A few years ago the Canadian Press seemed to begrudge any space being given to our fascinating sport, but now one can hardly pick up any paper or magazine without finding some reference to the great strides the pedigreed dog is making in Canada.

Your Shop Window

The interest that is being shown by the general public in pedigreed dogs and shows is very apparent to anyone who has visited any of the shows held this year. The writer, either rightly or wrongly, has always contended that Canadian breeders do not seek the publicity they should by sending in news to Kennel and Bench. No business can succeed without advertising and yet look at the support given by our members to their own particular shop window: "The Breeders Register", here you have a perpetual advertisement at a cost that actually means a loss to Kennel and Bench and yet it is not supported as it should be by

those breeders who wish to make their hobby pay.

We are receiving a number of enquiries for young stock every week from Canada and the States as a result of the **Breeder's Register in Kennel and Bench**. Most of our enquiries refer to the fact that they have contacted us through this **Register**."

Type

So often we have been asked by a neophyte what is meant when we have described a dog as "typical". The word type is rather disconcerting to the novice and yet we, who have been breeding dogs, know that some prepotent strains possess the ability to transmit their type to their progeny, an illustration of this is given in the following episode related to Oscar Piereson by Mr. George G. Dimick, the owner of the Dunwold Beagles, at

Shreveport, Louisiana. In writing to inform Oscar of the safe arrival of a Beagle, Mr. Dimick states: "There is more or less a story connected with the purchase of this hound. About a year ago I bought a very fine pup and registered him as 'Dimwold Dudley', I liked him so much and he was such an independent, upstanding youngster that when I later saw a portrait of two Beagles in Hounds and Hunting, I was surprised and pleased to see that one looked very much like him. Upon enquiry I found out that the hound in the picture contained 'River Park' and 'Swampy' blood, and my fine pup was also from the same strain on the dam's side. I then began trying to find out who bred these Beagles and after considerable inquiry got in touch with you. This is really the story of how one of the 'River Park' hounds came from Canada way down to Dimwold in Louisiana. You can see in Hounds and Hunting, September, 1936, issue an account by my friend Dalton of a trip to Dimwold in which the writer refers to 'Dudley', saying: 'To my way of thinking being the perfect example of a hunting Beagle, bold, upstanding, well made and fast looking, with his good blood fairly oozing out of him for you to see and appreciate'."

A Famous Kennel

Mr. John Ritchie of Ottawa has judged Springers at many important shows on this continent, including the great Morris and Essex Show, and his decisions have always been favourably received, therefore when this authority states that he has acquired one of the best he ever had one can count that the "travelling" is going to be a little warm for some of our present Springers. John writes: "I have acquired

from the Green Valley Farm Kennels, Devon, Pa., a bitch by "Champion Rufton Records" ex "Champion Green Valley Dinah"; she is in my opinion one of the best I ever had".

Success of the Haldons

Mrs. Winnifred Batt sends some interesting news of the Haldon Scotties. This enthusiastic and successful breeder of Scottish Terriers writes: Mr. F. E. Simpson's "Haldon Bagpipes" placed Best of Breed at Guelph won the same honour at Toronto, he was also Best of Breed at the Royal I think. Two years ago, "Bagpipes" litter brother "Haldon Foray", owned by Mr. Walker, won at Ottawa and other shows and is well on his way to his title of champion. "Haldon Roundelay", another litter brother, was placed ahead in the Terrier Group at Winnipeg by Mr. Alex. Stewart and Best in Show by Mr. G. Kynoch at another Western show. These three Terriers are by "Haldon Troubadour" ex "Haldon Jessamine". From Chicago comes news of "Haldon Rusticana's" pups, their owners are more than delighted that "Rusticanas Little Buckaroo" and "Red Pheeba" won firsts at Rochester, Mankato and Minneapolis. The writer also hears that there are a number of most promising youngsters at the Haldon Kennel and that sales are brisk. Amongst other sales are five bitches and one dog by "Haldon Duneen" which have been selected by a breeder across the border.

Bad Losers

The writer was very much annoyed and disturbed to hear a well-known American judge describe Canadian exhibitors as "bad losers". We have here, like in every other country a few exhibitors who cannot accept defeat gracefully and some who when beaten have made some regrettable scenes in the ring. When judges come from a distance usually there is some "upsets" of recent placings and more often than not the "upsets" in placings are correct. Seeing the same dogs at show after show at times we don't quite realize that some dogs have "gone off" and some "come on". A judge from a distance sees these dogs for the first time and knows nothing of their past successes or defeats. Very few breeders have not had the unpleasant experience of allowing the "plum" of a litter to go out of their kennel. A notable incident which is recalled by the writer is "Champion Short Circuit", one of the great Wire-Haired Fox Terriers of bygone days, sold by his breeder to Mr. G. S. Thomas for \$250.00, he quickly gained his title of champion for his new owner and gathered in quite a small fortune in stud fees. After his first pup the great English and American champion "Malford Vie" come out.

"Conqueror", the Scottish Terrier, is another great winner that was allowed to leave his breeder's kennel. Harking back to bad losers in the ring, judges are protected by the Canadian Kennel Club and if any judge will report any act of discourtesy to the Club the exhibitor will be promptly dealt with.

Late Hours at Shows

One or two shows last year gained a bad reputation for the lateness of the hour when the principal specials were awarded, one of the shows which suffered in entries through this was Windsor. Several exhibitors informed me that the reason they did not enter at the recent show was that they did not want to experience another late session. I can assure exhibitors that as long as Mr. J. Handyside and the present officials are in power at Windsor they will see that the judging is not prolonged. In the writer's long experience, the show's secretary, Mr. J. Handyside, stands out as one of the most efficient and courteous officials he has ever met. Although the entry was not quite up to expectations the quality all round was a long way above the average. The writer is very doubtful whether any show in Canada has had a higher quality line-up of group winners than those that came before him at this show where he placed Dr. F. D. Rutherford's Springer Spaniel "Ch. Royal Flush of Avalon" Best in Show. All the specials were awarded by 10 p.m.; bear this in mind you absent exhibitors and remember that henceforth the watchword of the officials at Windsor is "No more finishing up the specials in the small hours of the morning."

Coronation Number

The next issue of Kennel and Bench will, I understand, be a special issue. Amongst many other new and interesting features there will be an account of the great influence the Royal Family have had in building up the great industry of breeding dogs in England. This issue of Kennel and Bench will be widely distributed all over Canada, and therefore, every breeder should see that some mention of their kennel appears in the editorial and advertising columns.

Morris and Essex Show

Just about the time our Editor will be passing the final proofs for this issue, the show of the year will be taking place on the beautiful estate of Mr. and Mrs. Hartley Dodge, at Madison, N.J. We all hope that the Canadian entry will be a most representative one and that some of our dogs will be competing in the attractive ring set apart for the groups. Of late years conditions in Canada have had a lot to do with the meagre support given by Canadians. With

THE TORONTO LADIES' SHOW

A Coronation Dog Show for all breeds under the rules of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., was held by the Toronto Ladies' Kennel Association, at the York Badminton Club in Toronto on Saturday, May 1st. Over 300 dogs made a good show on which the sponsors are to be complimented, the results of the efforts put forth was very apparent. The show secretary, Mrs. E. Brown came in, and rightly so, for many congratulations on the successful running of her department. The judges were: Mrs. Geo. Allen, Boston Terriers. Mr. W. Unthank, German Shepherd Dogs. Mr. Harry Osborne, all other breeds, Groups, General, Specials, Best in Show. Mr. Harry McDowell, Obedience Classes. Mr. R. E. Lipe as chief ring steward put in a most strenuous time in the all-rounder's ring; in our opinion 15 hours is too long at one job for anyone. In this case it was apparently unavoidable, for breed classes were still being judged after midnight, and it was later that 1 a.m. before the finals were disposed of. The drawn out proceedings were responsible for weary exhibitors and a reduced audience. The parade of dogs of all nations with their attendants in costume proved a real

attraction with the crowd. It is to be questioned if it can be successfully added as a regular feature to the programme of a one-day show. Twenty-seven Cocker Spaniels were the heavy breed turnout, followed by 25 Boston Terriers and 22 Pekingese, 19 German Shepherd Dogs and the same number of Wire Fox Terriers shared the fourth place.

The Groups were keenly contested and proved to be a tonic for the flagging interests.

The prevalent shyness that is met with in Scottish Terriers is hard to account for, and below I submit an opinion received a few days ago from a successful breeder and I think what he states goes a long way to assist in ridding the fancy of this undesirable defect:

One sees and hears considerable these days of shy-unintelligent Scotties. Shyness is a trait that has no part in the natural characteristics of the Scottie and unless we take strong steps to eradicate it both in our breeding and rearing we'll soon make a very sorry spectacle of this gallant little dog.

In the writer's opinion, the factor that contributes most to this condition is close confinement; one can't expect to keep a bunch of females in cages in a kennel, often lacking sunlight and with a 5 by 10 run (if any) to exercise in, whelp puppies to be raised under similar conditions and expect to produce intelligent, fearless dogs.

If you have a few Scotties with any of the old instincts left, throw them in the back of your car some day and take them out where there are some rats or gophers and watch them really enjoy life and exercise their bodies and brains as well, let your stud dog out with a chip on his shoulder for an odd scrap too, his ancestors revelled in tough going and so will he.

It's the opinion of the writer that the sooner we discard our shy females and start giving our young dogs lots of supervised exercise the sooner we'll stamp out the reputation the Scottie is rapidly gaining of being shy and dumb.

The annual show of the Fort Garry Kennel Club was held in Winnipeg's new Auditorium on the 14th and 15th of May. His Worship, The Mayor of the City, introduced by the Hon. Mr. McDiarmind, Minister of Natural Resources of the Province of Manitoba, opened the show in his usual cheery and mirthful manner. Once more the Mayor's reputation as the Smiling Mayor was confirmed.



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The show was well staged and enhanced by the effect of the new benching, nicely arranged and the whole a credit to the management, which was in the capable hands of Mr. Jack Rogers and assistants, while the secretarial duties were well conducted by Mrs. J. L. Pateman, ably assisted by the ladies of the club. The number of individual dogs, 180, making a total of 294. Cocker were highest with 26, Springers, 24; Scottish Terriers, 18; English Setters, Boston Terriers and Pomeranians, 11 each; Old English Sheepdogs, 7. Remainder of breeds lightly entered.

Mr. Norman McConnell of Vancouver, the judge, was introduced by Mr. Walsh and well received. This would seem to apply even more in the case of show-giving organizations. Before this issue is in the hands of the readers the annual dog show of the Medicine Hat Kennel Club will have passed into history, but so thorough was their system of censorship that we were unable to report anything concerning it even to naming the judge. We trust Mr. Climo has, by this time, been fully restored to his usual health.

The week following the show at Calgary will again see the Edmonton Dog Fanciers' Club staging their summer show with the well-known local handler, Mr. Joe Caswell, handing out the awards in all breeds. Mr. Caswell has been before the fanciers of Western Canada on so many occasions and for so many years that it is needless to further commend him. And we can only say to those who are planning to visit the Western shows, do not miss Edmonton.

We are sorry to report that among the first kennel news brought to our notice this month was the loss sustained by Mr. J. R. Benson of the Pastime Kennels, Edmonton, in the death of his good Scottish Terrier dog, "The Laird", pneumonia being the cause. Mr. Benson is very decidedly the type of fancier to whom the death of his dogs means much more than a financial loss and he was particularly interested in this good home-bred which he had exhibited with considerable success. "The Laird" was sired by "Ch. Littlebury Barty (Imp.)" and his dam was "Tootsie of Isla", the bitch that Mr. Benson had the misfortune to have killed by a speeding auto about a year ago. It is Mr. Benson's intention, however, to continue with the Scotties which were his original breed and he is planning to secure a suitable stud dog to replace

his loss. Some time ago Mr. Benson decided to extend his kennel activities and purchased a very nice pair of West Highland Whites from which he has since had increase. We understand that he has later decided to dispose of his Whites and give his attention solely to the Scotties as he feels that, with the limited time he has from business, the handling of more than one breed changes what was meant as a pleasurable hobby into a somewhat arduous task. We also learn that Mr. Benson has recently mated his Scottish Terrier bitch "Ishbel of Isla" to Mr. J. S. McPherson's new stud dog "Drambuie".

During a visit to the kennels of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph E. Smith we found an addition to the kennel inmates, this being the good Cocker bitch "Ch. In the kennels of Mr. J. H. Tanton we find a nicely marked white and red Cocker puppy from the Calmas Kennels of Mr. W. G. Climo of Calgary. This puppy is a litter mate of the female mentioned in last month's notes and is by "Ch. Daybreak of Barrie" ex "Calmas Misty Morn". Mr. Tanton will not admit to ownership but there is something in his eyes as he looks this one over which gives the impression that the puppy will have plenty of time to become accustomed to his present surroundings. "Goldfinder" is from the well-known kennels of Dr. Boulding at Aurora, Ont. He is sired by "Talavera Symington", who is by the well known pillar of the breed "Talavera Simon".

THE LATE C. A. STONE

It was quite a representative gathering of friends and fanciers that attended the funeral service of Canada's grand old man of dogdom, our Honorary President Charles Arnold Stone, which was held at the funeral parlors of Ross J. Craig, Toronto, On Tuesday evening, April 27th, where our old comrade lay in state surrounded by the choice blooms which he had constantly been familiar with for so many years, and looking serenely at rest, and certainly showing no trace of having taken



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the cares and worries of his 85 years seriously.

The officiating clergyman, Rev. Simon Edwards of Dunn Avenue United Church, made impressive reference to Mr. Stone's life-long friendship with the animal kingdom generally, of his great love for dogs particularly, and of his nigh half century of association with the Canadian Kennel Club. Most impressive was the reading of James Whitcomb Riley's "Away":—

"I cannot say, and I will not say
That he is dead! He is just away!
With a cheery smile, and a wave of
the hand,
He has wandered into an unknown
land,
And left us dreaming how very fair
It must be, since he lingers there.
And you, O you, who the wildest
yearn
For the old-time step and the glad
return,—
Think of him faring on, as dear
In the love of there as the love of
here;
Mild and gentle as he was brave,—
When the sweetest love of his life he
gave
To simple things: where the violets
grew

Pure as the eyes they were likened to.
The touches of his hands have strayed
As reverently as his lips have prayed.
Think of him still the same, I say;
He is not dead—he is just away!"

Those present who were really familiar with Mr. Stone's life as he had lived it, felt that the foregoing

lines were fitting and sufficient requiem for one who was just "Away".

Mrs. Stone and her family received the many expressions of sympathy from those who had come to pay their last respects to one who had deserved their homage.

The fanciers noticed were: Harvey S. Lloyd, the breeder of "Ch. Forest Larry Lloyd" (37398), old Charlie's wonder dog, the dog that was equally at home on the field as he was on the bench, and his bench record shows 35 championship points. As a stud dog old "Larry" was a potential force, and as dogs go he lived for 14 years, almost as long as his beloved old master. We remember the large crystal-like tears coming down Mr. Stone's face as he told how the "grim reaper" of the animal kingdom overtook his trusty old comrade. Then we noticed Allister Grossart, who is part owner of the newest addition to the Forest Kennels, "Winlay Donald", Norman Caesar, Wm. Henderson and Mrs. Joe Hill. We know there were other fanciers and part owners of some of the "Forest" dogs whose faces were familiar but whose names we could not remember having heard.

We know that Mr. Stone was keenly interested in the future of the latest addition to his kennel, i.e. "Winlay Donald", he had this dog ear-marked for exceptional merit as a show dog, and as a stud force. Then, of course, the Golden Jubilee year was in the offing. As the club's first secretary it meant so much for him to look forward to the Golden Jubilee of the club as its Honorary President. But we'll "think of him still the same—he is not dead—he is just away".

I have some very interesting Collie news this month. Mr. W. G. Hassell better known as "Uncle Billy" of Radio fame, the Albert Payson Trehune of British Columbia writes me advising that he has imported the Collie bitch "Nanette of Arken" from Mr. Werbsmen, she is out of "Memory of Arken" and by "Ch. El Troubdour of Arken", "Nanette" is now nursing a litter sired by the famous "Ch. Future of Arken", Collie fanciers will no doubt watch be watching these latest arrivals with much interest, sales from the Allandale Collie Kennels include "Miss Tazewell of Alandale" to a fancier in California, also "Tazewell Transude", both these females have given a good account of themselves in southern shows and in very keen competition, Mrs. G. Hennessy has lately visited these kennels and took back with her the following: "Alandale a Lady", "Achievement of Arken" and "Alandale Avalanche" at worth-while prices, other sales of note include "Alandale Ancestor" to St. Louis and "Canadian Ch. Alandale Ailsa" to the Cloudmere Kennels of Pennsylvania. Mr. Hassell, who suffered a nervous breakdown this spring has now fully recovered, and we hope to see him at our shows with a string of Collies competing for the highest honours, which by the way will be nothing new to him, as his dogs and dogs of his breeding have a very enviable show record, and I can say from personal knowledge that Billy Hassell has preached the gospel of Collie sagaciousness "over the air" and in

I understand Mr. Oda has a very large Collie Kennel in Japan and is an ardent fancier of the breed.

Munson of Vancouver, whose Cocker's carry the "of Dene" prefix informs me that April was an exceedingly busy month, sales from these kennels going to Peniticton, Seattle, Winnipeg and New Westminster, two of Mrs. Munson's Cocker's have attained the title of champion within the past year, which speaks well for the quality of stock emanating from these kennels.

Mrs. D. Pottruff advises me that she has purchased from Mr. R. H. Gardner of Tamarac Kennels, Alberta, the Pembroke Corgi female "Tamarac Marigold", this bitch has a very good show record and is now in whelp to the imported dog "Owencliffe Alert", the fascinating little Corgi is due for a reign of popularity.

Some further importations to the Deutschland Kennels referred to in last month's notes is a black and tan male Dachshund, "Josef von Cellaries", bred by that well-known Dachsie breeder and authority of the breed, Mr. Grayce Greenburg, of California, we hope to give you Dachsie fanciers more information after this dog has made his debut at this month's shows. Mrs. Fletcher has made some interesting sales this month to Victoria, Saskatchewan and California, and is devoting her time solely to the breeding of better Dachsies.

from the interest shown. Mrs. McGee is a strong believer in line breeding and with this in view has very set plans for the future with her Shepherd breeding operations. We hope that her efforts will be rewarded with top honours with some of her home-breds at some future shows. The Vancouver contingent of fanciers who invaded Seattle show on May 1st and 2nd, backed up the courage of their convictions by bringing back a lion's share of the higher awards and silverware. I understand that this show was the largest show held in Seattle for several years and therefore the wins made were not easy. In the Toy Group the black Pomeranian "Milesleigh Tiny Hatma" owned by Mrs. E. Bradley of Vancouver, went Best of Winners, and was barely beaten by the American Champion "Fortunes Delight" for Best of Breed. In Springers, C. M. Butler's "Ch. Prince of Huntswell" again annexed Winners Dogs and W. F. Cleator's "Ch. Okanagan Rose" Winners Bitches and Best of Breed. In Collies the Conwood Kennels, Victoria, went Reserve Winners Dogs with "Glinwoc Grey Gentleman". In Cocker's Mrs. B. Davidson, also of Victoria, went Winners Bitches with "Dainty Charmer of Tulloch", and Winners Dogs with "Dauntless Coon of Tulloch", also Best of Breed Cocker with the last mentioned dog. Reserve Winners dogs and bitches going to Mrs. A. S. Dainard's "Corn Crake of Colwyn" and "Mary of Colwyn" respectively. Mrs. Dainard's brace also won the Best Cocker Brace in show. In Irish Setters Jack Forbes' "Strathbogie Red Mac" won over a hot class to get Best of Breed. In Cairns the honours were divided between Mrs. S. C. Sweeney and Mr. H. J. Irving, the latter's "Ch. Bonshaw Zur" going Best of Breed. In English Setters C. Lumb's bitch "Credentials Lady Betty" went Winners Bitches and W. R. Willgress' "Ch. Shiplake Challenge" went Winners Dogs and Best of Breed. In Golden Retrievers the Rockhaven dogs owned by Mr. and Mrs. S. S. Magoffin carried all before them, the winners dogs going to the top of the Sporting Group. In Shelties Magistrate Mackenzie Matheson went Best of Breed and third in the Working Group. In Kerry Blue Mrs. G. Peers' "Ch. Kil-Barney (Imp.)" went Best of Breed and also Best in Terrier Group and Reserve Best in show. In Wire-Haired Dachsies Mrs. O. Phillipowski went Best of Breed.

The British Columbia Fox Terrier Association will be holding their summer show on the grounds of the President, Mr. Joseph Dodds, Kingsway, Vancouver, on July 1st. The writer has been invited and agreed to judge this

fixture, and with this advance information there will be little excuse for any shortage of entries due to insufficient notice given exhibitors. I was very glad to receive an interesting letter from Mr. Geo. J. Busby of the Poplar Springer Kennels, Abbotsford. Mr. Busby informs me of some recent sales to Powell River and Kamloops, and as these were repeat orders it speaks well for the stock of the Poplar Kennels.

The July issue of Kennel and Bench promises to be a pleasant surprise, and whilst the actual Coronation is now history I hope all British Columbia fanciers will get behind Mr. Bert Swan in his worthy herculean task of making the July issue a truly commemorative "Coronation Year" issue. BULLDOG FRATERNITY LOSES STALWART

Mr. Thomas Grisdale of New York died on Sunday, May 9th, at Hopewell, N.J., U.S.A. His was a world-known figure for he had been connected with the breed he loved for more than half a century. An Englishman by birth he came to America in 1885. The outstanding feat of his career in connection with Bulldogs was carried out a few years ago when he took several over to England to compete for honors at the largest shows. Amongst them was the Canadian-bred "Dominion Fortitude", (formerly "Prince of Wales 2nd"), who, by adding British Championship honors in addition to his previously won Canadian and American titles, was the first of the breed to wear the triple crown. Mr. Grisdale's connection with the Dominion was a long and valuable one. He judged at many important shows. His first appointment on this side of the line was at the National Live Stock Show at Toronto in 1913. He judged Bulldogs, and in the December issue of Kennel and Bench of that year his versatile pen was responsible for the following:

"I am speeding homeward after my first and exceedingly pleasant and highly satisfactory visit to Toronto Dog Show, and sorry my stay, due to pressure of business, could not have been prolonged. The cordiality of those I met, grandeur of the settings surrounding the show, dwarfs all previous descriptions. Of those broad and progressive minds responsible for such staple and fitting grandeur, Canadians have reasons to and do feel proud. To return, I hope, failing will be a regret, if so, this one visit and my first will be one of my sweetest and most satisfactory remembrances of cordiality, broad-mindedness and progress in connection with preparedness for exhibition purposes, it has ever been my pleasure to witness anywhere.

"The dog show management, headed by Dr. A. Boulton, assisted by his able and willing staff, was truly worthy of the setting; quick service, joyful feeling and keen enthusiasm permeated the whole atmosphere, and it was to me a delightful experience."

A very welcome letter from Mr. L. P. Bourgeois of Moncton, N.B., advising the purchase of two Boston Terrier bitches from a Boston Terrier Kennel in New Jersey. "Britts High-Hatter", a beautiful dark seal and white arrived to the order of Mrs. Bourgeois; to say the least this bitch has made a great impression on her new owner and is living up to all expectations.

"Little Sun's Model", Mr. Bourgeois' purchase is a full marked white and dark seal brindle of very impressive confirmation. A great future is predicted for this pair of Bostons. They will be exhibited at all the fall shows in the East.

On Coronation Day the Maritime Ladies' Kennel Club held their second Annual Bench Show; the quality of the entries was equal to any of our eastern shows. Judge Alf. Loveridge found the competition quite keen. For the Best in Show award Miss Dorothy M. Cassidy's Schipperke, "Flapperette O' The South", and Mrs. R. C. Vaughan's Cocker Spaniel male, "Kendon Freckles" made the going quite interesting. Miss Alice J. G. O'Brien's male Sealyham, "Champion Netheridge Nickle", put down and shown to perfection by C. C. Sullivan could not be denied the honour of topping the classy field, with best of opposite sex going to "Flapperette".

Mrs. B. M. Frost's entries from her Saint John Boston Terrier Kennels were heaviest winners in the breed and special classes.

The entry which proved the most unique was the very attractive Afghan Hound, "Ramy", owned and exhibited by Mrs. A. A. Gordon Corbett.

The trophy for largest entry from any one kennel was awarded to the Scottish Terriers from Cossar Farm Kennels.

Several Champions were finished at this show, among them being the Shepherd Dog "Spokie", owned by L. T. Dow. This makes the second Shepherd finished within a few months under Mr. Dow's ownership.

Mr. George Steadman Thomas, noted international judge, has been chosen to pass on all breeds at the Bedford Ken-

nel Club Annual Show to be held in Halifax on July 1st. The Bedford Show is an annual one-day fixture that is very popular and it is expected that the coming show will far exceed any previous shows held by this progressive and wide-awake club. Owing to the fact that this show is held at Francklyn Park, practically on the shores of the North West Arm, a large number of spectators are always in evidence and last year it was estimated that the attendance was in excess of 2,000 persons. This is an outdoor, one-day, show with excellent accommodation in the event of inclement weather.

A visit to the Maritime Kennels of Wire-Haired Fox Terriers, owned by W. G. Smith at Halifax, gave the writer an opportunity of seeing some very promising Wire puppies, about five months of age, sired by Mr. Smith's good stud and show dog, "Burlington Bondman", bred by Robt. McAdam and sired by the well-known "Ch. Gallant Fox of Wildoaks". "Bondman" has been a consistent winner at the Maritime shows and will be shown on the same circuit again this season. His progeny will appear at the Bedford Kennel Club Show and will probably be well heard from.

Was pleased to note that my friend, Mr. J. T. McCallum, Thetford Mines, P.Q., now has another Cocker Spaniel champion in his kennels. This latest title-holder is the attractive little red and white dog "Thetford Manifesto", winners dog at last year's Bedford Show in Halifax, where he was beaten only by his kennel mate, "Ch. Mount Pleasant Belle". This makes three cocker champions now owned by Mr. McCallum, the other being "Thetford Jock 2nd". These good Cockers, together with "Am. Ch. Mistover Tug O'War", recently purchased by Mr. McCallum, and the other good dogs at Thetford, constitute a kennels of part-colours that is now well and favourably known.

Cockers have become very popular in this Province and the local shows are benching greater numbers of the breed and showing much more quality than has appeared in previous years. This improvement in quality and numbers is due largely to the many good importations from leading Canadian and American kennels during the past two years and, as the breed is now well established here and rapidly gaining favour it is quite probable that the Maritimes will produce some outstand-

ing specimens of this attractive breed. Parti-colours appear to be the local choice and, while there are several good solid colored dogs in this district, the partis seem to take the public fancy and we see quite a number of good ones locally owned. Many of these are youngsters and will make their first bid for points at the coming shows in Halifax and Saint John.

Judging from the great number of new dogs that I have lately noticed being prepared and conditioned it is expected that the local shows will bench a greater number of entries than during the past few years. This sudden new interest on the part of the owners, many of whom have been lax in this respect, is a note of encouragement to those of us who have helped to manage dog shows, and particularly so to the judges and ring stewards who have so often been obliged to stand idle while they watched exhibitors making a desperate last minute attempt to trim or groom their dogs after their classes have been called. I do not know of anything more annoying to a judge than to have an incomplete class pawing and shuffling around the ring while awaiting the arrival of a late comer. This is not fair to the judge, the spectators or the exhibitors, who are in the practice of answering their class calls promptly.

An editorial comment in the May issue of Kennel and Bench, under the heading, "Progressive Show Regulations", gives us the new show regulations made by the C.K.C. at the meeting held on February 5th, and I particularly noted No. 6 of these rules:—"Best in Show will be Judged by One Judge Only". To my mind this is indeed a progressive regulation that should meet with the approval of the entire fancy, particularly those who have witnessed the final award being made by two or more judges. This method of judging has always appeared unsatisfactory and seldom seemed to please the majority or to be fair to the judges. The one man method will certainly lend a more final touch to the closing of any show.

Mr. Schooler, Superintendent of the Halifax Shipyards, is a new recruit to the Cocker fancy and has recently purchased a nice little black and white male puppy from Mr. Fred O'Connell of Halifax.

No doubt our readers have noticed that the Maritime News during the past few months has not been up to the standard that we had hoped to maintain in keeping with the other many improvements in Kennel and Bench and, as a result of a scarcity of news items of interest, we have not been able to take advantage of the space allotted to us. We have re-

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peatedly asked for items of interest up a formidable resistance against the invasion by dogs that could not win elsewhere and, as a consequence, a number of those point seekers brought here in latter years have been returned to their kennels minus the expected easy wins. This is not a boast,—merely a reminder of facts that is intended to encourage the breeders in the Maritimes to make an effort to further this much needed advance in quality by exhibiting their best stock and keeping the quality at the local shows at the highest possible level.

WINDSOR KENNEL CLUB SHOW

Held on Saturday, April 24th, in the Arena at Windsor, Ontario, this show was one of the most successful ever sponsored by this society. One hundred and thirty-four exhibitors, of which nearly half were from over the border, were represented by 200 dogs. The surprise entry was that of 27 Springer Spaniels, which just nosed out the popular Cocker Spaniel by two. Thirteen Wire Fox Terriers and a like number of English Bulldogs shared the third position. The Boston Terrier showed a marked shrinkage when represented by only eight dogs.

THE DOG AND HIS FLEAS

The flea has long been a favorite topic for humorists and the great composer Moussorgsky's song about this athletic parasite has become a classic.

But the dog who suffers from fleas derives no fun from their presence. He is not interested to know that the dog-flea is only one of about five hundred different varieties of fleas and that science knows him as *Ctenocephalus canis* Curtis. He is not amused by the theory that the canine tail is provided as a refuge for fleas while the dog is being bathed. He merely scratches himself in desperation and wonders what he has done to merit such torture.

Cleanliness in everything appertaining to a dog is a great help in warding off fleas. Animal or vegetable matter left lying about, especially in rather damp or ill-ventilated places, affords a favor-

able breeding-ground. The eggs are laid on the dog himself, but usually they fall from the coat and in a few days develop into larvæ. In the larval stage their sustenance is derived from any waste matter that may be in the vicinity. The larvæ then pass through a chrysalis stage before emerging as adult fleas—vampire insects whose only food is the blood of their hosts. Dog-fleas live for any period from a month to a year and are a torment all the time.

A clean dog, a clean kennel, frequently changed bedding, and a clean run are the best insurances against fleas. *Ctenocephalus canis* abhors concrete paving and likes soft earth or sand for his breeding operations.

Pyrethrum powder should be rubbed into an afflicted dog's coat, left for about a quarter of an hour, and then thoroughly brushed out. As a preventive a little toilet paraffin should be regularly used on the dog's brush and comb. Do not be tempted to use soaps or other preparations containing carbolic, as this substance is extremely harmful to a dog.

Apart from their own capacity as pests, fleas are believed to act as intermediary hosts for other and more dangerous parasites, and the time and trouble taken to get rid of them will be well spent.—Canine Press Bureau, Victoria Station House, London, S.W. 1.

HERE'S A SIMPLE SPRAY TO KEEP DOGS AWAY

If flowers and shrubs are sprayed with a dilute nicotine sulphate, dogs and cats will avoid them. The spray is harmless and the smell is very offensive to these animals, even when applied so thinly that persons are unaware of its presence.

Nicotine sulphate may be bought at any seed or drug store and should be used at the rate of one-half teaspoonful to a gallon of water. The spray

evaporates and should be renewed after rains, or about every two weeks in ordinary weather.
