● CANADIAN JUDGES FOR CANADIAN SHOWS

THIS question is brought forward by our Provincial Contributing Editor for British Columbia in this issue, and will provide food for thought.

There can be no argument contrary to the contention that the ability to carry out the duties backed by a profound knowledge of the task in hand are the fundamental requirements of any candidate for the position of judge.

These alone should outweigh any other con-

sideration, and to us it matters little from where he or she may come, so long as ability and presence are qualities evident and proven in the wielder of the baton.

That we have splendid judging material in the Dominion no one will deny, and if some of this was called on to officiate they would, without doubt, prove themselves valuable additions to the list of recognized adjudicators. The average show executive, however, hesitate to experiment with unknown quantities, the responsibilities of office weigh heavily, and they often prefer to go further afield, if necessary, to obtain a judge of recognized knowledge and proven ability. The reason for this is hard to explain, unless it is the anxiety for success and fear of failure that is responsible for the non-recognition of home talent.

● SHOP WINDOW DRESSING

WHATEVER line of business the shopkeeper advertises he must decorate his window for results, being the only means he has of drawing the attention of the public to his wares, but the absolute cruelty that is indulged in by exposing dogs, young puppies, and other domestic pets as window attractions is beyond our comprehension. Animals subjected to this treatment cannot help but arouse a feeling of pity as they exist behind sunlit glass hour after hour, a prey to every condition that is detrimental to their well-being and only providing the passer-by with a source of inane curiosity.

Don't Blame the Judge

Hints on Showing a Dog.

By THE MAN IN THE RING.

So many thousands of people are going in for exhibiting every year that a little chat on several matters of importance may not be out of place. I once asked the manager of a famous restaurant how he managed to get such good meat. "We buy the best, and take care of it when we've got it", was the reply.

Of course, it is necessary to have a good dog if you are going to do any winning, and you must also take care of it. Condition and manners in the ring put points upon the appearance of a dog. Don't grouse at the judge, accusing him of partiality and incompetence unless you are quite satisfied that you have done your part. Remember that the judge is not looking at the dog as you usually see him at home, but as you present him in the ring, amid strange surroundings. If he stands in a lifeless manner or pulls himself out of shape by straining on the lead, how can any judge appraise his merits?

I speak feelingly, as one who judges

frequently. It is seldom that I finish my task without having the belief that certain dogs might have done better except for the ignorance or indifference of their handlers. To the judge who is genuinely anxious to place the exhibits in their proper order this conviction is not pleasant, but what can he do? He has to deal with them as he sees them at the time, not as he thinks they might look if they stood properly and moved well. Showing is an art that has to be acquired, and if you will not take the trouble to learn it you must expect many disappointments.

Speaking generally, it may be said that all dogs should stand quietly, well up on their toes, carry themselves boldly, and walk or run without pulling. They should be thoroughly drilled in manners for several weeks in advance, and taken among people so as to overcome any nervousness. But that is not all. If you are observant you will soon appreciate that different methods of handling are applicable to different breeds. Those you must find out, and then so school your dog that you are able to display him to the best advantage.

This is not everything, however. The

question of condition is all important, and that again is governed to a large extent by the breed. In most it is desirable that they should have plenty of muscle and hard flesh, with feet firm and nicely rounded. With Toys that does not matter so long as they are not fat. Too much flesh handicaps an exhibit very much, spoiling his shape and detracting from his appearance generally. By giving plenty of exercise on hard roads you should be able to get a dog really fit.

Wire-haired Terriers require to be trimmed, and if their owners are not experts they should be sent to someone who is. Cocker Spaniels, Pomeranians, and several other breeds also need a certain amount of skilled attention. Instead of being washed immediately before a show, the Wires are dry-cleaned with chalk, which does not soften their coats. Other breeds should be subjected to intensive grooming for at least a fortnight before the show, in order to get a beautiful polish on the coats. If a bath is necessary, let it be given a day or two beforehand to let the coat recover its gloss.

Introducing Our Honorary President

We are conscious of the futility of "painting the lily" and to dare suggest the necessity of introducing our recently appointed Honorary President, the Honourable Mr. Justice McFarland, would appear to be just as ridiculous, nevertheless, we must take that chance in the interest of our newer member readers.

Our Honorary President can lay claim to positive actual contact with Canadian dogdom for the past 35 years, and possibly no other one person has contributed so much so unselfishly as the man who has so lovingly been known to our people as "The Colonel".

Thirty-two years ago there was a Bull Terrier registered by the name of "Wentworth Kid" (8083). It was all white, was bred by the late Mr. Mark O'Rourke, Hamilton, Ont. Sire, "Wentworth Lord Nelson"; Dam, "Wentworth Lizzie". This White 'Un replaced all the canine odds and ends of boyhood days, and one of the "odds" was a favorite old Collie that is still remembered and frequently mentioned. The pride of ownership which "Wentworth Kid" brought in his train laid the foundation upon which has been built the substantial structure which includes breeding, exhibiting and judging by our Honorary President.

At an executive meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club, held at the old Queen's Hotel, Toronto (site of the present Royal York Hotel), on January 11th, 1907, Mr. McFarland was proposed for membership by that early pillar of the Club, the late Mr. Harry B. Donovan, and for the sake of those who may have a flair for the historical we would mention that the since well-known kennel prefix "Franklyn" was granted at the same meeting.

At the annual general meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club held on September 4th, 1907, Mr. McFarland first came officially to the Club's Executive Committee as representative of the Ontario Kennel Club, and from that start his contact has remained unbroken and it still continues.

The 1909 election placed Mr. McFarland on the Club's Executive by virtue of the members votes, and from that time the votes of the members have always been at his disposal.

The records show that in 1912 Mr. G. F. McFarland, of Kerr, Davidson, Patterson & McFarland, was elected Honorary Solicitor for the Club, and his services in that capacity can never be appraised from the viewpoint of monetary values.

Probably the outstanding event which has marked our Honorary President's association with the Canadian Kennel Club was the affiliation with the Canadian National Live Stock Records under the Live Stock Pedigree Act. A glance at the signatures makes one feel proud of the calibre of the men with whom our Honorary President was associated on that occasion, i.e., *John G. Kent, *James W. Bain, F. W. Jacobi, G. F. McFarland, *George Barron, *Dr. Alfred Boulbee. Truly this affiliation was the "rock of ages" as far as the C.K.C. is concerned.

Honors have followed in the trail of our Honorary President in generous measure. The man who we had learned to love as Mr. McFarland came back to us from the world war, Lt.-Col. G. F. McFarland. Speaking one day with a man who had soldiered under Col. McFarland we got a real thrill when he made this observation, "He was fussy as hell about the appearance of his men, but their general welfare was his chief concern, and he was a damned good officer to serve under."

Then came his elevation to the bench of the Supreme Court of Ontario, an honor which he carries with dignity befitting the high office.

The Canadian Kennel Club has been honored by the association for so many years of this scholar, soldier, and gentleman.

The Honourable Mr. Justice McFarland has the distinction of being the only person who ever served the Club as President for two different periods of time, i.e., from January 1st, 1920, until February 6th, 1931, and from February 5th, 1932, until February 8th, 1934. He is also the only Past President alive today, and here we would "touch wood" and pray that he will long be spared to his profession, his family, and the Canadian Kennel Club.

As a judge of Bull Terriers our Honorary President's services have been utilized at the largest and best shows in the United States and Canada, and on such occasions his work in the ring has invariably been characterized by the same thoroughness which has indelibly marked everything that he has ever laid his hands to.

Gentlemen, permit me. Our Honorary President, the Honourable Mr. Justice McFarland. God bless him.

Supply and Demand

DURING the years of readjustment the Canadian Kennel Club lost quite a few members but the gaps are fast being filled. Every week, in fact almost every day, my mail contains an enquiry asking whether I think the breeding of dogs can be made to pay its way and the most profitable variety of dog to breed. The first question is an easy one to answer, but the second not quite so easy. Undoubtedly the breeding and raising of dogs can be made a profitable hobby providing that care is taken in the foundation of the kennel. One cannot expect to make the breeding of dogs a profitable hobby if the start of the kennel is not right. You may be able to buy a good brood bitch for a few dollars, but it is more or less an accident if you do. A well-bred and reliable brood bitch is not always easy to find, and when found is usually worth every dollar her breeder or owner wants. My advice to the novice is, go to a reliable breeder and take his advice, but don't go unless you are willing to pay for value received, and whatever you do don't buy a dog unless you are prepared to pay the price for a prepotent sire. When the times comes to mate the bitch send her to a well-known sire; puppies sired by a dog which has proved that he possesses the ability to sire winners are always easier to sell than puppies sired by a dog with no record as a winner or sire. I believe more novices have given up the sport of breeding dogs through the mistake of breeding from unknown sires than from any other cause. Of course all sires have to have a start but let the other fellow do the experimenting.

Now we come to the second question. If I go in for breeding dogs which variety would you suggest? This is a very difficult question to answer. First of all, you yourself have ideas on this, then we must consider location of the kennel. Some breeds can be successfully raised in towns, others require liberty and lots of it, therefore if the breeding kennel is not in the country, disaster is sure to follow. More important still, if the hobby is to be made to pay its way one must select a breed that is fashionable at the time. I have seen many vogues in dogs since I first

became interested and I am of opinion that the general public are even more changeable than they were; fashions change in dogs even more quickly than ladies' attire. There is a good market today for dogs in Canada but the richest market in the world is across the border and therefore my opinion is that the most reliable guide as to dogs in favour can be obtained by the catalogues of the Westminster Kennel Club and the Morris and Essex, the two most important shows in America.

There was an excellent entry of Pointers at both shows, but there is little call for Pointers in Ontario, maybe if ever we have Field Trials there will be an increased demand. In the western and maritime provinces there is a far greater demand. Practically the same remarks apply to Retrievers, in which category I include flat and curlies, Labrador and Goldens, and also Chesapeake Bays. There has always been a fairly steady market for English and Irish Setters. Strangely enough the more headstrong of the two varieties, the Irish seem to be gaining favour as companions. Spaniels are admittedly the most popular of our sporting breeds but here again we must sign off one or two varieties if we want to make our hobby pay. Clumbers have never "caught on" here, probably because we do not have the well preserved and kept coverts they have in the British Isles, and the sportsman here wants a faster working dog, and for that reason the merry little Cocker has for many years held an undisputed position at the head of our sporting breeds. Canada for many years produced some of the best Cockers in America and we can again, if we settle that vexed question weight. I may be wrong but I am of opinion that in increasing the size of our Canadian Cockers we have paid too much attention to size and not enough to type and symmetry; in fact type, quality and soundness have been sacrificed for size. Our friends across the border prefer a smaller Cocker. Granted that many of the winners across the border do not look to have the stamina required to stand a hard day in the field, but they make ideal companions. I heard a well-known American Cocker breeder state that unless

breeders paid more attention to bone and substance that the day of the Cocker as a sporting dog was past; a rather severe criticism, but the fact remains that the Cocker still continues to gain favour. The Cocker has had opposition and the most serious threat of recent years came from the Springer, size again came into the picture, and mainly through this vexed question the threat became more or less a rumour. That the English Setter was crossed with the Springer is now more or less an acknowledged fact and that the outcross did harm is admitted, for it produced flat-sided leggy specimens that bore little resemblance to the Springer of 20 years ago or the best specimens shown today. We see a great change for the better, but it is going to take time before Springers will show the uniformity of type they did before the outcross. There is a steady demand for good working Springers. Of late we see a great deal of interest being shown in the English Cocker, and he seems to fill a long-felt want; a sporting companion, a size bigger than the American Cocker and not as big as the Springer. There is a future for the English Cocker, but the English breeders apparently are not paying sufficient attention to hindquarters, judging from the imported specimens I have seen. Beautiful heads and fronts are very impressive but you want soundness in the field and I cannot see some of these imported Cockers standing a real hard day's work.

The most popular of the Hounds is the merry little Beagle; there apparently are unlimited opportunities here. Field Trials are creating a steady and increasing demand for this useful and attractive little hound, which also makes an ideal house dog. There has been some interest shown in Bassets and Bloodhounds but not enough yet to give much encouragement to the breeder. The Dachshunde has staged a real comeback, the "Low and Longs" passed out of the picture after the war, but one has to give the German breeder who reaped a rich harvest out of German Sheepdogs and when the interest in this breed began to wane they began to push the Dachshunde. Will they fade away again is an open question. Today there is an increasing and steady demand for the smooths and a limited demand for the roughs and wires which, in my opinion, will never become as popular as the smooths. If I had a place in the country my preference, if I wanted my hobby to pay, would be given to Greyhounds. The racing of Greyhound has undoubtedly caught on across the border and there is an unlimited market for well raised saplings. Our western climate apparently is ideal

and preference is being given by American racing men to Canadian bred and raised Greyhounds; at least this was the information given to me by one of the leading American owners. The question is, can brood bitches be obtained? The demand for good reliable brood bitches is, I understand, far greater than the supply. I was talking to Mr. W. Bixby, one of the directors of the American Kennel Club, and he gave me some facts about the sport of Greyhound racing that were astounding. So vast are the sums of money involved in the sport that the taxess alone, paid by the owners of Greyhound Race Tracks, runs into millions. What a chance for some of our Western farmers to start raising Greyhounds, many of whom came from England where they had experience through "walking" Foxhounds for the local pack. There is only a limited demand for Irish Wolfhounds and Borzois.

Coming to our working varieties, the German Boxer seems apparently to be gaining ground, but the question is will it continue? It has spread right across the States, but so far the breed has made little headway in Canada. Collies, once the most popular of our working breeds, are just about holding their own; there is a good demand for outstanding specimens but they are difficult to find. Doberman Pinschers are not quite holding the same interest they did a few years ago, but a very different story has to be written about the German Shepherd, which has made a real comeback, thanks mainly to a few constructive breeders who steadily refused to breed from unsuitable specimens. The Great Dane, the most popular of our large breeds, progresses steadily. Old English Sheepdogs have never been really popular, why, it is difficult to say, for they are intelligent and make ideal companions. We have had many outstanding specimens, some good enough to go Best in Show and yet the number of breeders seems to be decreasing and the interest is not as great as when Mrs. Tyler Morse and Mr. Morris Kennedy were exhibiting.

Terriers have always and always will be popular. The Airedale fell away a few years ago but today there is an increasing demand. It is generally admitted that the smart Wire-haired Fox Terrier is the favourite of the Terriers. More attention has been paid of late to the Smooth Fox Terrier which today is in a stronger position than it has been since the days of Gooderham, Rutherford and Farwell. Scotties continue to find favour as do Cairns. Sealyhams, one of the most improved of the Terrier varieties, are making a very steady progress. We seldom, if ever,

see Welsh, but the breed is going strong across the border, and good prices are obtainable there for really outstanding specimens. Practically the same remarks apply to Bedlington, Bull, and Kerry Blues, with a preference for the last mentioned. Irish Terriers have fallen away in numbers but I believe that the game and attractive "Dare Devil" is quietly coming back again to favour, and it is pleasing to note the success of Canadian breeds across the border. Of the Schnauzers I give preference to the Miniature. I may be prejudiced as I own one; be that as it may, the little Miniature has many outstanding qualities and the breeds' ability as a guard, companion and vermin killer continues to gain friends. I would like to see more breeders in Canada, for the breeds' outstanding all-round qualities have only to get known for a steady demand for puppies.

The leaders amongst the many Toy breeds are Pomeranians and Pekingese, the last mentioned breed probably generally commanding better prices. At the head of the non-sporting pride of place belongs to the Boston Terrier. There is always a steady demand for puppies at remunerative prices, and outstanding specimens command good prices. The Bulldog has held its position in other parts of the world except in Ontario, especially around Toronto where we used to see splendid competition, there must be some reason for this! The demand for puppies is far greater than the supply. Chow Chows have never been really popular in Canada but there is a good market across the border. Poodles, although not nearly as even in quality as when the Misses Alger and Mrs. Tyler Morse were showing, are commanding attention. The Schipperke, an ideal all-round dog, has never made the progress it should. In conclusion I am of opinion that any of the breeds can be made to pay their way—we may see some of the old breeds coming back. Of the many that have been introduced of late years, the Corgi apparently is the most popular.

Nelles, Stone and McEwen Memorial

Subscriptions are coming in for the fund started to purchase a silver memorial trophy; Messrs. Nelles, Stone and McEwan did much for our sport in Canada and there is rightly a feeling that a memorial trophy to be competed for all over Canada will help to keep the memory of what they did ever before the members of the Canadian Kennel Club. Subscriptions, small or large, are welcome; the treasurer of the fund is Mr. D. Strachan.

Field Trial Clubs

The forming of Field Trial Clubs is, I am glad to see, spreading right across Canada. Mr. W. Pym reported ex-

cellent progress in British Columbia and the writer heard when he was in Winnipeg this spring that a proposal to start a club had been favourably received from a number of sportsmen and now we have a club successfully started in Toronto. The first intimation of this was a letter received from Mr. A. Dunn who wrote:

"During the past several months various owners and interested parties have approached me and expressed a desire to form a club or association of the above nature for the purpose of arranging Field Trials and other matters of interest. We have been fortunate in being able to arrange for an International Judge of both "Field Trial and Bench", whose honour and integrity is second to none, and who has also judged recently at the largest out-door show in the world, to give us a talk on these subjects and his experiences. The writer had a personal discussion regarding this matter today with Mr. J. D. Taylor, Minister of Games and Fisheries, who extended his best wishes for the success of the contemplated association. To further encourage this project, we have been donated the privilege of training grounds extending to over 100 acres of the very best Spaniel and Pheasant country convenient to Toronto, to work on."

The outcome of the meeting was sent by Mr. Dunn who reports as follows:

"We had a very nice meeting and enrolled 17 members including many new faces never before interested in dogs, but from their remarks showed they have had lots of experience in the field and with the gun—and many vowed to have ready, through purchase or otherwise, a field "trailer" when the date is announced.

The club is being formed after a very pleasant talk by Mr. Herbert Routley who was elected chairman of the meeting and finally unanimously elected President of the new club. Mr. W. A. Price was elected Vice-President. Mr. S. T. Sharpe, an enthusiastic owner of Springers, was elected Treasurer. Mr. A. Dunn was elected Secy. pro tem. The fee was set for the present at \$3.00. On the motion of Dr. Sheldon it was agreed that the officers make the executive and the members present make a booster club. We agreed to follow the American Club very closely regarding Field Trials, and to further the standards of Spaniels for show and work. The club is holding a meeting and work-out on the ground donated by Mr. Symes, Barrister, Toronto, on the north bank of the Credit River, 10 miles west of Toronto.

A very high class young dog (17 months), he has done considerable winning at prominent shows and has been well commented on by our leading experts. He leaves some very fine puppies in the Newmaiden Kennels and should quickly gain his title for his new owner, Mr. Jos. Dodds of the Tynedale Kennels, Vancouver, B.C. 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NELLES—STONE—McEWEN MEMORIAL

Our feature writer, Mr. Walter H. Reeves, in his column, "The Canadian Fancy", for July (page 10, centre column), has apparently started something, and already we have had fifteen dollars sent to this office quite voluntarily in aid of the suggestion made by Joseph Calvin Valentine of Guelph, Ont., for a trophy to be known by the above caption, and offered at the forthcoming Royal Agricultural Winter Fair (National Kennel Club) Dog Show.

Brigadier-General Nelles, C.M.G., Charles Arnold Stone and Colonel Robert McEwen were all representative men behind pure-bred dogs in Canada for almost half a century. All three were prominent amongst the faithful few who sponsored the Canadian Kennel Club on September 28th, 1888; all three contributed a large volume of invaluable service during the long period of their membership, and what is probably more important is the fact that each one had frequently expressed the desire to be spared to participate in the club's Golden Jubilee during 1938; therefore, the writer is prepared to offer an amendment to Mr. Valentine's very splendid proposal which is as follows:

The Charter Members Trophy

In Memory of

Brig.-Gen. C. M. Nelles, C.M.G.,
Charles Arnold Stone,
Col. Robt. McEwen.

This trophy to be offered to the dog or bitch bred and born in the Dominion of Canada, owned by a member of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., and registered in the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., Stud Book, having won the most points at shows held in Canada during the Golden Jubilee Year, 1938, at shows held under Canadian Kennel Club rules.

We are of the opinion that such an offering could be enlarged to take in both sex if the proposal found sufficient favor amongst the members of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., and friends of the three men to be remembered by the memorial. We are substantially of the opinion that the offering (or offerings) should be made Golden Jubilee Year features for very obvious reasons.

The first contributions to reach the Secretary named by Mr. Reeves are from the following:

Mr. W. H. Reeves, Belleville, Ont.; Mr. Calvin Valentine, Guelph, Ont., and Mr. E. D. McQuown. The latter very kindly remarks: "During the Hamilton Show I enjoyed the extreme pleasure of a nice chat with Mr. Stone, and at that time I told him that I felt highly honored in having his Irish Setter entry. handling. Upon my return to Chicago the following day (where I was judging) I told Capt. Will Judy of the foregoing experience, so you may know that it impressed me very thoroughly and I sincerely regret Mr. Stone's passing. I did not know your Brig.-Gen. Nelles nor your Col. McEwen, but I can easily sense that the loss of such men to the Canadian fancy can be a challenge to the younger breeders and exhibitors to strive for the maintenance of the same high standards of integrity as were observed by such gentlemen".

Thank you very much, Mr. McQuown, we do appreciate your very generous observations and assure you that each of our three "old war horses" were equally splendid sportsmen and so, thorough gentlemen.

JUDGES AT THE C.N.E. DOG SHOW

Mrs. Marie A. Stone of Milwaukee, Wis., U.S.A., who will judge all Terrier Breeds and Groups is a member of the younger school of adjudicators from whom the fancy may expect an exact interpretation of what she finds in the ring, and the placings will be in strict accordance with that observance. At the Westminster Kennel Club Show, New York, this year, Mrs. Stone's masterly disposal of no less than one hundred and thirty-five Scottish Terriers provided a display of discernment that was conceded to be an outstanding judicial effort.

Mr. Vinton P. Breese of Caldwell, New Jersey, U.S.A., is one of the foremost all-round judges on this continent. He will judge all Sporting Breeds, Sporting and Hound Groups and Best in Show. Mr. Breese is an artist by profession and has a keen eye for make and shape. The followers of his breeds are in for a real treat. He has judged on two occasions previously in Ontario; once in Toronto and again in Oakville.

Mr. George Kynoch, of Winnipeg, Manitoba, will judge non-Sporting, Working Breeds and their Groups. No one is better known as a proficient member of the charmed circle than our own "breezy" Westerner. As a proof of his popularity his services as judge have been called on more than once this year in Western Canada, whilst he has on occasions "donned the ermine" at nearly every important show from Vancouver, B.C. to the Maritimes. His wide experience will undoubtedly be the means of drawing a good entry.

Mr. Alva Rosenberg of Brooklyn, N.Y., will judge Boston Terriers, Toy

Breeds and Group. He, too, is well known in Canada. He has previously judged at the Canadian National Exhibition, London, etc. His standing in the Boston Terrier world makes him one of the leaders of the judge's art, whilst no one enjoys a greater following in Toy Dog circles than the gentleman under notice.

NEW YORK STATE FAIR DOG SHOW

The New York State Fair authorities have recognized the growing interest on the part of the breeders, fanciers and the public at large in pure-bred dogs by erecting a new dog show building on the New York State Fair Grounds at Syracuse for the annual New York State Fair Dog Show which will be held this year, Tuesday and Wednesday, September 7th and 8th.

This building is to be of adequate size, well ventilated and equipped with all modern conveniences for the comfort of the exhibitors and their dogs. It is so situated on the grounds as to provide ample facilities for parking and for the care and handling of the dogs. We believe it to be the only building in this part of the country to be used solely for the purpose of furthering the interests of pure-bred dogs.

The State Fair has always been very liberal in its appropriation of prize money and have tried to secure judges of the very highest calibre and with a new building the show should attract exhibitors generally.

The show will be under the supervision of Mr. George F. Foley, of Philadelphia, with Dr. Albert E. Merry, of Syracuse, acting as director. The State Fair is making every pos-

sible effort to make this building an ideal place for the dogs and is providing every possible convenience for the exhibitors, and all dog owners exhibiting at the Fair will be provided with special parking tickets, enabling them to drive from the main gates direct to the dog show building, where a parking space will be provided.

It is hoped that fanciers will cooperate with the State Fair authorities in their desire to make this annual exhibit outstanding in its line through the East.

THE NORTHERN SASKATCHEWAN GUN DOG CLUB

This enthusiastic body of field dog men are looking forward to an abundance of sport during the various Field Trials to be held this fall. The local trainers with the addition of others from every part of the United States have over six hundred Pointers and Setters in active training, and with the report of Mr. J. R. Hill, deputy minister of natural resources, that game is plentiful, the dry weather being largely responsible for the successful hatching season and excellent results are anticipated. The Saskatchewan Field Trials held at Chamberlain, Sask., commence Monday, August 30th, and last for one week, followed by the Moose Jay Field Trials and others at Gainsborough, Sask., and Pierson, Man.

The Collie

The one breed whose waning popularity has always enjoyed an undercurrent of loyalty from its followers that has done much to maintain it as a bulwark of home and dog show life, in spite of the varying taste of the average dog lover. The reason for this



is not far to seek, the atmosphere of rhyme and legend that surrounded him in his early period did much to establish his recognition, and the space dividing the shepherd's hut from castle and cottage was short indeed when bridged by the love and attraction for a handsome, sagacious, responsive and knowing canine such as the Collie is. When in full coat and bloom, showing the results of the care and attention which are his due, in pose or pace he cannot be excelled in canine beauty. His attractive colouring, alert bearing and knowledgeable expression are virtues that are all his own and help to hold him on a pedestal of popularity hard to equal.

He has enjoyed the favours of Royalty, distinguished himself in every canine sphere, established the early four-figure (in pounds) transactions in dog sales, and today no show is complete without his contributing quota. A striking tribute to the breed was experienced only a few weeks ago when Mr. Hugh Galt, whose name will go down in history as the breeder of that pillar of his race, "Champion Anfield Model", rejoined the list of exhibitors at the Hatfield Agricultural Show, Herefordshire, England, after many years of absence. Emphasizing the saying: "Once a Collie man, always a Collie man". The last decade of the 19th century saw the Collie approaching its zenith, for in 1890 "Champion Christopher" was sold for the equivalent of one thousand pounds by Mr. Tom Stretch, an English breeder, to Mr. Mitchell Harrison of Philadelphia. Five years later "Champion Southport Perfection" cost Mr. A. H. Megson (the then dubbed "uncrowned Collie King") of Manchester, England, one thousand pounds, and whilst many sales around that time ranged the hundreds of pounds

figures the purchase by Mr. Megson at the Liverpool Dog Show, January, 1897, of "Champion Ormskirk Emerald" for thirteen hundred pounds and trade to another two hundred pounds established the highest transaction of the century and stamped the Collie as the breed of the hour. So much for history, but it is well to know that breeds we see today, as in fleeting panorama, have a background of substance which forms a foundation of fact that stands them in good stead when public taste turns to new and more recent attractions.

DESCRIPTION AND STANDARD OF POINTS

(By Courtesy of The Collie Club of America).

Head—Skull flat, moderately wide between the ears and gradually tapering to the eyes. There should be but a very slight prominence of the eyebrows and a very slight depression at the stop. The proper width of skull necessarily depends on the combined length of skull and muzzle, for what would be a thick or too broad a skull in one dog is not necessarily so in another of the same actual girth, but better supported by length of muzzle. It must also be considered in conjunction with the size of the dog and should incline to lightness accompanied by cleanness of outline of cheeks and jaws. A heavy-headed dog lacks the bright, alert and full-of-sense look so much to be desired. On the other hand, the attenuated head is most frequently seen with small terrier eyes, which show no character. Muzzle

should be of fair length and tapering to the nose, which should be black; it must not show weakness or appear snipy. The teeth of good size and even. English standard says, "mouth the least bit overshot", but this is by no means desirable, and if at all exaggerated, should be treated as a malformation.

Eyes—There being no "brow" in which to set the eyes, they are necessarily placed obliquely, the upper portion of the muzzle being dropped or chiseled to give them the necessary forward look out. They should be of medium size, never showing too light in comparison with colour of coat nor with a yellow ring. Expression full of intelligence, with a bright and "What is it?" look when on the alert or listening to orders; this is, of course, largely contributed to by throwing up of the ears which accompanies the "qui vive" attitude.

Ears—The ears can hardly be too small if carried properly; if too small, they are apt to be thrown quite erect or prick-eared; if too large, they either cannot be properly lifted off the head, or if lifted, they show out of proportion. When in repose the ears are folded lengthwise and thrown back into the frill; on the alert they are thrown up and drawn close together on the top of the skull. They should be carried about three-quarters erect. A prick-eared dog should be penalized. So much attention having of late been given to securing very high carriage of ears,





it has resulted in reaching the other extreme in some cases, and that is now necessary to guard against.

Neck—Should be muscular and of sufficient length to give the dog a fine standing appearance and show the frill, which should be very full.

Body—Rather long, ribs well rounded, chest deep, but of fair breadth behind the shoulders, which should have good slope. Loin slightly arched, showing power.

Legs—Forelegs straight and muscular, with a fair amount of bone, the forearms moderately fleshy; pastern showing flexibility without weakness; the hindlegs less fleshy, very sinewy, and hocks and stifles well bent. Feet oval in shape, soles well padded and the toes arched close together.

Tail—Moderately long, carried low when the dog is quiet, the end having an upward twist or "swirl"; gaily when excited, but not carried over the back.

Coat—This is a very important point. The coat, except on the head and legs, should be abundant, the outer coat harsh to the touch, the inner soft and furry and very close, so close that it is difficult when parting the hair to see the skin. The mane and frill should be very abundant. The mask of face smooth, the forelegs slightly feathered, the hindlegs below the hocks smooth. Hair on tail very profuse and on the hips long and bushy.

Color—Immaterial, though a richly or nicely marked dog has undoubtedly a considerable amount of weight with judges. The black and tan with white frill and collar, or the still more showy sable with perfect white markings will generally win, other things being equal.

Size—Dogs, about 24 inches at the shoulder; bitches, about 22 inches. Weight, dogs, about 60 pounds; bitches, about 50 pounds.

Expression—This is one of the most important points in considering the

relative value of Collies. "Expression", like the term "character", is difficult to define in words. It is not a fixed point as in colour, weight or height, and is something the uninitiated can only properly understand by optical illustration. It is the combined product of the shape of the skull and muzzle, the set, size, shape and colour of the eyes, and the position and carriage of the ears.

General Character—A lithe, active dog with no useless timber about him, his chest deep, showing strength, his sloping shoulders and well-bent hocks indicating speed, and his face, high intelligence. As a whole, he should present an elegant and pleasing outline, quite distinct from any other breed, and show great strength and activity.

Faults—Domed skull, high-peaked

occipital bone, heavy pendulous ears or the other extreme, prick-ears; short tail or tail curled over the back.

The Smooth Collie only differs in its coat, which should be hard, dense, and quite smooth.

Why A Puppy From Prize Winning Stock?

MY mail contained the above enquiry recently, so my remarks may answer the question.

How often one hears the remark from the prospective puppy buyer, we don't want to pay too much, so long as the dog is pure-bred it don't have to be from show stock or words to that effect. I wonder if we take the time to explain to these people the why of Dog Shows and what a "judge" looks for.

In judging a dog one looks for the following qualifications, which all go towards the building of health and character in a dog—a sound healthy mouth to aid digestion, a keen clear eye to express health and intelligence, depth and breadth of chest, and spring of rib to ensure the normal functioning of heart and lungs, strength of loin, smoothness and power of muscles, strength of bone and soundness and condition—these are the qualities that go to build a strong healthy animal, and these are the qualities that show what winning dogs are made of.

If dog shows were for the judging of "fads", frills and fancies, as some people think, they would fail in their objective. The difference between a puppy from show winning stock and just an ordinary pure-bred is the difference between health and ruggedness as compared to uncertain character and uncertain health. Dogs of distinction possess the foregoing features, creating a general appearance and symmetry that leads to victory in the show ring. I concede it's good for the dog game for people to know the "why of dog shows."

The regular monthly meeting of the Fort Garry Kennel Club was held in the board room of the Free Press, Winnipeg, on July 2nd; the principal business being finance. This the officials have brought to a successful issue, enabling them to meet the heavy expense incurred by their purchase of new benching and still leave a balance in the hands of their secretary, Mrs. J. L. Pateman.

Fort Garry members should be proud of the new plant, and the success of their office-bearers in this respect.

The Gun Dog Club of Manitoba held a field day recently, which was well

attended, the location being south by eight miles from the City of Winnipeg. With plenty of cover for trying out the Springers and lots of water for the tests therein, the tit-bit of the meeting was the successful retrieving of youngsters at their early stages, three to six months, while the older and experienced dogs retrieved their birds smartly. Labradors and Irish Water Spaniels were also clever and under good control by their owners and trainer. THE annual summer shows of the Alberta Kennel Club of Calgary and the Edmonton Dog Fanciers' Club, to which we have referred in recent issues, are both over for another year. We are very sorry that the hopes which we had entertained for some time for attending the Calgary show failed to materialize as we realized as the time drew near that the condition of our health did not permit of making the trip.

However, word has been received from a correspondent to the effect that the show was a complete success; the weather was ideal and the colorful scenes of the Calgary exhibition and stampede again attracted thousands of visitors.

While the entry of dogs was somewhat below the figures of last year, it could still be considered excellent, and the quality, as a whole, was better than ever before. Sales for the better kinds of dogs during the week was good, prices in several instances running into three figures.

The exhibiting dogs were carefully inspected by Dr. J. Gordon Anderson, B.V.Sc., while Spratts Patent Limited attended to their feeding in a generous manner as well as supplying containers for water. The exhibitors arm bands, also supplied by Spratts, were handled by Mrs. Norman B. Williams. The ring stewards performed their duties in an efficient manner and the Canadian Pacific and Canadian National Express Companies brought dogs to and from the show with promptness and care.

The presentation of the prizes in the ring was gracefully performed by Mrs. A. A. Jullien, the convener of the Prize and Trophy Committee, who, at the close of the show, was showered with congratulations as being a prime contributor to its success.

Visitors from considerable distances were at the show, among whom were Mr. and Mrs. Wood, owners of the Quandella Kennels, Victoria, B.C., who were the guests, while in Calgary, of Miss M. E. Fox. Among others who were seen around the ringside were Mrs. J. R. Clark, Victoria; Mrs. Burchill, Brooks, Alta.; Mrs. D. Collings, Turner Valley, Alta.; Mrs. Emil Schoenhals, Castor, Alta.; Mr. George Duncan, Winnipeg; Rev. H. A. Whaley, Youngstown, Alta.; Mr. Gardener, Sun-

dance, Alta., and Mr. and Mrs. Ainslie and the Messrs. Clutton and Cunningham of Edmonton.

We feel that as the official report of this show will probably be forwarded in time for publication in this issue there is very little we can add to our correspondent's report except to say that we understand from comments made by some of those in attendance that the somewhat novel feature—for Western shows—of having three judges proved an added attraction.

The following last minute report of the winnings at the Calgary Dog Show have been received from another correspondent.

"Silverdale Showman", Old English Sheepdog, owned and shown by George Kynoch, of Winnipeg, was declared Best in Show by Judge S. Sikorski at the 32nd annual show of the Alberta Kennel Club. To the Silverdale Kennels goes the beautiful trophy donated by Hon. R. B. Bennett, K.C., M.P., also the Herald Trophy to commemorate this win.

The Non-Sporting Group was judged by J. E. Hunter. The Boston Terriers were a nice lot, Best of Breed going to "Kirby's Hagerty", owned by A. H. Kirby, of Winnipeg, this little fellow placing second in the Group to "Gentleman Jim of Revervee", owned by N. J. Dinnen.

Mr. Sikorski judged the Toy Group, the winner being Mrs. Jane Howett's Pekingese, "Ti-Nee"; second, Mr. Harry Tomlin's "Silver Queen of Man", a very attractive Pug.

The Terrier Group also came before Mr. Sikorski, first going to "Haldon Bugler", a Scottish Terrier, owned by Thomas Donald. A Terrier with lots of quality but might have been put down in better condition.

Mr. Sikorski was confronted with quality throughout in the Working Group, so out of necessity some real specimens did not get placed, "Silverdale Showman" winning the Group, followed by Mrs. Florence E. Jullien's German Shepherd, "Ch. Cedrik of Cosalta, Best in Show in 1936 under Judge H. P. Saunders.

The Sporting Group provided almost half the show, and many well-known winners were on exhibition. Mr. J. H. Tanton, the judge, had the following for his final Group: Cocker Spaniel, "Calmas Durbar 3rd", owned

by W. G. Climo; English Setter, "Geoffrey Laddie", owned by J. R. Clark; Pointer, "Thomas' Touchstone Queen" (ex "Marvel"), owner, T. E. Thomas; Labrador, "Dusky of Wetmore", owned by Rev. H. A. Whaley; Springer Spaniel, "Lady Jane of Aberfeldy", owned by A. J. Hale; the winner being "Calmas Durbar 3rd"; second, "Geoffrey Laddie".

The Hound Group was won by Beagle, "Trevallen Bo'sun", owned by Major H. W. Francis.

The final Group brought together, "Silverdale Showman", "Calmas Durbar 3rd", "Haldon Bugler", "Ti-Nee", "Trevallen Bo'sun", "Gentleman Jim of Revervee", "Silverdale Showman" getting the call, with second place to "Calmas Durbar 3rd".

As the curtain falls at the close of the summer dog show, activities are commenced for the third annual winter show to be held under the auspices of the Children's Hospital Aid Society in the Hudson's Bay store on November 26th and 27th, when all proceeds will be used by the Society for the benefit of sick and crippled children. Mr. W. H. Pym, of Vancouver, 2nd Vice-President of the Canadian Kennel Club, will be the judge of all breeds.

As has been the case for many years the annual show of the Edmonton Dog Fanciers' Club was held the week following the show at Calgary. Unfortunately, the picture here was not nearly so bright. The entry here was also below that of previous years, and if we may be allowed to give our personal opinion without any intention of "rubbing it in", we would say that the greatest contributing factor to this loss of entry was the reverting to a three-day show, while the tendency on the part of show-giving organizations everywhere is for shorter shows. In addition to this, we had the misfortune to run into what was officially recorded as the two heaviest days' rainfall in the history of Edmonton. And a misfortune it certainly proved, both to the dog show and the exhibition in general, though welcomed by the country at large as the greatest blessing of the year.

Perhaps, like Calgary, we could claim a better than usual average quality of dogs, and the work of the judge, Mr. Joe Caswell, was also of a very high standard. These, in addition to the evidence of the "never say die" spirit so amply demonstrated on the part of all officials and exhibitors in the face of the most adverse conditions, will remain among the pleasant memories of the event. Other pleasing features were a get together by local and visiting exhibitors and fanciers in the form of a banquet held on the first evening of the

show in the Peacock room of The Shasta Cafe and a final get together after the close of the show at the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. V. Clutton.

Among out of town visitors noticed were Mr. Gardener of Sundance, Alta., and Dr. M. D. French of Saskatoon. These two are among the real reliables and we have been trying to remember an Edmonton Dog Show at which they were not in attendance. Mrs. Pat Randall of Saskatoon is also becoming a very regular attendant and the string of dogs in her care at this show were a very valuable addition to the entry. Also noticed were Mr. Perry of Saskatoon, Miss Eileen Mitchell of Calgary, and others.

As it is unlikely that an official report of the show will be published in this issue, we think it might be well to give a partial report of the winnings.

Mr. Caswell found his Best in Show in Mrs. M. D. Gardner's Sealyham Terrier, "Ch. Felbourne Fifi". This little bitch was shown in beautiful condition and the award met with general approval.

The special for Best Opposite Sex went to the Chow, "Chia-Wan's Chinky Wink", owned by Mrs. Pat. Randall and Dr. M. D. French of Saskatoon. This also proved a very popular win.

The winners in the various groups were as follows: Best in Sporting Group, Pointer, "Thomas' Touchstone Queen", owned by Mr. T. E. Thomas, Calgary; Best in Working Group, Collie (rough), "Edmonton Prince", owned by Mr. Edward Williams, Edmonton; Best in Terrier Group, Sealyham Terrier, "Ch. Felbourne Fifi", owned by Mrs. M. D. Gardner, Edmonton; Best in Toy Group, Pomeranian, "Milesleigh Guinea Gold", owned by Mrs. N. Rodis, Edmonton; Best in Non-Sporting Group, Chow Chow, "Chia-Wan's Chinky Wink", owned by Mrs. Pat Randall and Dr. Margaret French, Saskatoon. The Canadian Kennel Club special for best Canadian Bred Puppy was awarded to the parti-colour Cocker Spaniel, "Calmas Boy", owned by Mr. Wm. Carson of Priddis, Alberta.

In the short time at our disposal since the close of the Edmonton show, we have seen two very outstanding, six weeks' old, Sealyham Terrier male puppies is "Ch. Hollybourne Sally", who M. D. Gardner. The dam of these puppies is "Cr. Hollybourne Sally", who is also the dam of the recent Best in Show winner, "Ch. Felbourne Fifi", while they claim as their sire the imported English and American Champion "Hillsome Ace". We learned that arrangements have been completed for shipping "Felbourne Fifi" to the



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eastern United States, where she will be mated to the recently imported English champion, "Hillsome Solo Flight". We also learned that the Wire Fox Terrier "Ch. Eastbourne Mary" is showing in whelp to Dr. Boulding's young stud dog, Talauro Goldfinder".

At the Aberfeldy Kennels of Mr. and Mrs. M. B. McColl, we saw an exceptionally promising litter of eight Springer Spaniel puppies from their bitch "Ch. Belmoss Betty", sired by "Frank of Avondale II."

At the Fidalta Kennels of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph E. Smith, we saw a litter of five six weeks old Cocker Spaniels, all males by "Fidalta's The Brat" ex "Whin of Moray". This is a very even litter, two of which in particular are of exceptional promise. There is also a very nice younger litter by "Melotas Black Nero", ex "Ch. Sweetheart of Ware" (Imp.).

We reported in a recent issue that Mr. J. R. Benson of the Pastime Kennels, Edmonton, intended to dispose of his West Highland White Terriers and confine his kennel activities to Scotties. As steps toward this end he reports that he has disposed of the female "Bencruachan Lightning" to her original breeders, Mr. and Mrs. Victor Blochin of the Bencruachan Kennels, Aurora, Ont., and has replaced her with a young Scottish Terrier female, "Scotsdale Kilts", sired by "Scotsward Necessity", a double grandson of "Ch. Heather Necessity" and whose grand dams both carry the Albourne prefix. "Scotsdale Kilts" was mated before leaving the East to "Heather Sensation", an imported son of "Ch. Heather Realisation", and is due to whelp during the last week of July. Mr. Benson also reports that he has purchased an outstanding young male Scottie from a breeder in Vancouver. The sire of this dog has a pedigree which contains "Ch. Heather

Necessity" four times and "Ch. Albourne Barty" three times, and his dam is strong in Gaisgill breeding.

Mr. J. Rawlings, owner of the well-known Quantock Kennels, Edmonton, has left by motor with his family for a holiday at the Pacific Coast. Mr. Rawlings, in addition to his success with Springer Spaniels, has also become quite a Sealyham Terrier enthusiast of late, and it would not be surprising to learn of some new additions to the kennels on his return.

Mrs. Davidson of the Tulloch Kennels, Victoria, has just left on a trip to take in several California Shows, taking with her four Cockers; it is to be hoped they give a good account of themselves in their U.S.A. invasion and so bring back further laurels to the British Columbia Bred dogs in general. The Tulloch Kennels are soon expecting the arrival of a red Cocker bitch, a litter sister to "Swanky Lad of Ware", from Mr. Lloyd's kennels and is being bred to "Bazel Sovereign" previous to shipment, this new importation carries the same blood lines as "Ch. Stardust of Byffe", etc. Mrs. Buckley, who is returning to England has disposed of her Black Cocker, "Jet of Moray", to the Tulloch Kennels, also her litter by "Dauntless Coon of Tulloch." My remarks in last month's notes with regard to the segregating of the two types of Cockers, namely English and American, has brought me no end of correspondence, and as I merely mentioned this as a suggestion I can only answer your letters through these columns with a further suggestion that the matter under discussion be taken up by each show-giving club and recommendations forwarded to the Canadian Kennel Club for final consideration. I would like to see our Prairie and Eastern Cocker Fanciers give this matter some thought and welcome your criticisms, which I shall be glad to forward to our several B.C. Clubs. News comes to me from Victoria that Miss Margot Robertson of the Drumadon Sealyham Kennels is expecting the arrival of still another importation from across the Pond. Further particulars are not available at time of mailing in these notes.

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Harry Dodds, the guiding star of Victoria Canine affairs, is, we understand, going to surprise the boys and gals with a Wire or two which he is getting ready for the Fall circuit. Harry, the ever alert and courteous Victoria Kennel Club Superintendent, whose expert supervision just puts the finishing touches on Victoria Kennel Club Shows, is deserving of a full measure of credit for the smooth running of the Clubs shows, and regardless of a Judge's placings one feels when returning from a Victoria City Kennel Club show that each and every exhibitor has been treated alike, which leaves a sweet taste in even the poorest loser's mouth.

Mrs. Moundfield of the Bannockburn Collie Kennels reports another sale of a young Collie to S. Kumago of Yokohama, Japan, and has purchased back from Mr. Latta one of her own breeding, "Bannockburn Simplicity."

The writer has tried to refrain from making any mention of my own doggy news but I find that in fairness to a British Columbia Bred dog and the record it made I have to break all precedents and mention the sale of "Champion Winsome Peddlers Double", the smooth fox Terrier bitch, bred by the writer, which went places in 1936. This bitch has now been sold to Mr. Ray McLaughlin of the Elmcroft Kennels, Ottawa, at quite an attractive figure, and it is Mr. McLaughlin's intention to line breed "Double" to his recently imported "Touchwood Tango", who is by "Champion Travelling Fox", who in turn is by the one and only "Champion Avon Peddler". It is said that one man's loss is another man's gain and so all we can add is the best of luck to you, Mr. McLaughlin, and may there be further rewards in store for you in recompense of your plucky purchase. From the correspondence which has crossed my desk I would not be surprised to see some Prairie Fanciers here this year to attend our show; good clean competition is always welcome and it is to be hoped that win or lose you who are contemplating exhibiting at our shows will get a square shake for your entry fee.

W. T. Billy Oates informs me that he has purchased the Setter bitch, "Mallhawk Lady Michel", which was bred by the well-known setter fancier, A. J. Kreuger. This bitch is a descendant of "Champion Rock of Crombie" and "Int. Ch. Racketts Rummy", and her pedigree of six generations contains no less than fifty-seven champions, which is what we call "Some Pedigree." Another purchase of note made by Billy is the Doberman, "Brav Von Dorn", bred by Jasper Daniels of the North Shore. On perusing this dog's pedigree one notices the Canadian

Kennel Club record of the dog's Tattoo identification (both ears). This is one dog which can always prove his ancestry in so far as his registration records show. Another newcomer to the Oates' Kennels is a Red Cocker, "Mountjoy Fine Gold", purchased from Mrs. Nellie Mountjoy McKinnon. Billy's latest Springer purchase is "Seafeld Chief", who needs time to finish but who has gained winners points at Medicine Hat. This dog is line bred to "Professor of Moira" (Champion). Captain Allan Ransome of Victoria has recently purchased the Irish Setter, "Lady Mickey Don", from H. C. Robinson of Nebraska. Mickey Don, previous to shipment, was mated to that Grand Dog "International Champion Irish Perfection", and as a result a litter of ten more Irishmen and women are today inhaling the Ocean breezes of the Pacific Coast. Capt. Ransome is a very keen fancier and has very ideally situated Kennels under the nom de plume of Nitinat on the highways just out of Victoria. Visitors are always welcome and some very fine dogs are housed in these Kennels.

We welcome, shall we say, to the fold of British Columbia new members roll, Mr. and Mrs. Cameron of Whonock, B.C., Dachsie enthusiasts, also Mrs. Jessie Fray of Vancouver, and Mr. A. E. Grant, Vancouver, and Mr. T. L. Wright of Nanamo, B.C.; here's hoping we meet you new members at the next show.

One correspondent writes me this month with regard to the selection of judges. He suggests making this important matter a more vital issue than it appears to be, and placing a stricter responsibility on the show giving club. He ends up by asking the writer what is wrong with Canadian judges? Nothing that I know of. We have here in British Columbia men who have been in the dog fancy for years and years and whose integrity is unquestionable. Their actual judging engagements may not be numbered in high figures but there seems no good reason why their knowledge and reputation should be discounted or overlooked. We pay for experience, both good and bad, and it appears to the writer that the time is most opportune for all show-giving clubs throughout Canada to give this all important matter some real serious thought and take a little more care in the selection of our judges, and last but not least, overlook the material we have to avail ourselves of within our own boundaries.

Mr. Billy Hassel of Alandale Collie fame has just advised me of the purchase of that good dog imported to this country by the Dean of the Collie Fancy in Canada, Dr. Cooper of Sas-

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katoon, "Code of Arken", a dog that has stamped his quality in no uncertain manner on his progeny. He is a welcome addition to the Collie ranks of British Columbia and we understand that it took a very inducive offer to obtain this dog from Dr. Cooper.

DOG SHOWS AND AGRICULTURAL SOCIETIES

The suggestion that we made earlier in the year advising that a co-operation between dog clubs and agricultural societies would result in mutual benefits was taken up enthusiastically by the daily press, both in the Dominion and the United States. 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

THE annual meeting of the Nova Scotia Kennel Club, Inc., was held in the Board of Trade Rooms in Halifax on Tuesday, June 8th. The Vice-President, H. M. McLeod, was in the chair owing to the absence of the President, Mr. C. E. Power, who was confined to his home through illness. This circumstance was generally regretted, particularly as this was the first annual meeting of the Club that Mr. Power has missed in fourteen years. The members requested that the secretary send a letter to Mr. Power, expressing sincere regret at his illness and wishing him a speedy and complete recovery. A report of the last show held in the Mayflower Rink last October was presented and showed that this show was a complete success despite the unfavourable weather conditions. The financial report showed the Club to be in a favourable position.

A new slate of officers were elected for 1937 and are as follows:—President, C. E. Power; Vice-President, J. E. Burns; Secretary-Treasurer, Louis Nelson; Directors, A. V. Martin, Fred Fougere, Miss A. J. G. O'Brien and E. V. Turner.

It was decided to hold the annual N.S.K.C. Show in Halifax during the latter part of September of this year and that an outstanding judge be brought here to pass on all breeds at this fixture. This coming event will be a one-day show of the type now so popular in the Maritimes. A meeting has been scheduled for July to further plans for the coming show which will take the form of a benefit show in aid of the Ladies' Auxiliary of the local branch of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty.

The Bedford Kennel Club held its third annual outdoor one-day show in Halifax on July 1st. A beautiful day, a large number of spectators and an entry of 125 dogs greeted the judge, George Steadman Thomas, who commenced his work at 11 a.m. and closed the show at 6.30 p.m. The Best in Show award went to "Am. Ch. Mistover Tug O' War", a beautiful little black and white Cocker Spaniel, owned by Mr. J. T. McCallum, Thetford Cocker Kennels, Thetford Mines, Que. This dog was shown with his kennel mate, "Thetford Peg O' My Heart", who got her winners points at this show and completed her Canadian championship. The best in show win-

ner, "Mistover Tug O'War", commenced his Canadian campaign on June 5th and finished for the title at the Bedford Show and is now an International Champion. The runner-up for the final award was the Bulldog, "Kildare Chuck O'Luck", owned and shown by John H. Sheehan, Montreal.

The award for best Canadian-bred Puppy, C.K.C. Trophy, went to Mr. G. G. Ryder's Irish Setter bitch, "Lady Barbara of Meynell".

The Classified Specials, which are not included in the regular show report, were as follows:—

Puppy Variety—A. V. Martin's Collie, "Saint Adrian Sir Lukeo"; Novice Variety—Harry Story's Boston Terrier, "Story's Tiny Lady"; Novice Exhibitor—Miss V. Piers' Scottish Terrier, "Rhoderick Dhu"; Breeder's Trophy—G. D. Anderson's Scottish Terriers; Brood Matron Special—Fred O'Connell's Cocker Spaniels; Member's Challenge—E. V. Turner's Pointer; Best Trio—G. D. Anderson's Scottish Terriers; Best Brace—Ian Breakey's Smooth Fox Terriers.

The Nan Brown Memorial Trophy was won by Ian Breakey with his Smooth Fox Terrier, "Ch. Breakeyton Freckles". This is Mr. Breakey's third win on this trophy which is now his property.

We were pleased to notice the presence of many visitors from the other provinces, among these being Mr. R. C. Vaughan, Maritime Director, accompanied by Mrs. Vaughan and son, Ronald; Mr. Robt. Lasky of the Cosnar Kennels; Mr. John H. Sheehan of Montreal; Mr. H. S. Scott of Moncton; Mr. Laurie Bourgeois of Moncton; Mr. Frank Shute, Fredericton, N.B., and others.

Boston Terriers led in numbers of entries with Cocker Spaniels and Scottish Terriers second and third, respectively.

The writer was pleased to meet a new Irish Terrier fancier, Mr. T. Fitzpatrick of Windsor, N.S. This gentleman showed a promising little bitch, "Irish Lady 2nd", sired by "Ch. Newtonard's Irish Kid". This little bitch, being just eligible for the junior puppy class, was too young to compete with the older dogs but deported herself well and we hope to see her appear at a later date and under more favourable circumstances when she will probably give a better account of herself.

It is evident that Springer Spaniels are taking a new lease on life in this district and it was interesting to see four good representatives of this Sporting breed exhibited at the Bedford Show by Mr. Frank Shute of Fredericton, N.B. Some of these dogs were sired by the well-known "Ch. Inveresk Collyshot" and are out of "Ch. Marvella of Avondale". Mr. Shute evidently has a nice kennel of Springers combining the Inveresk and Bellmoss bloodlines.

We also learn that there is an effort being made by parties in England to have a son of "Int. Ch. Major Lukeo", brought from America to take up stud service in the Old Country. As yet no definite arrangements regarding this move have been made but I have been given to understand that, although an attractive offer has been made, it is probable that this good young dog will remain in America.

The loss is a severe one to his owner, and the breed is all the poorer by his demise. COMMONSENSE AND SECRETS OF DOG-FEEDING

By Great Dane
Breeder and Food

The question of food is at the root of all life-conditions, for without food even existence would be impossible; and the animal body is built up of the chemical compounds composing the foods which nourish it, so that the growth and development of an animal depend upon the character of the foods consumed by it, and the composition of its body is noticeably affected by the composition of its food. Put very simply—**according to the kind of food supplied, so to some extent the character of the body varies, for the whole animal is made up directly and solely from the chemical elements in its food**, and cannot of itself originate either matter or energy. Growth is **not** a miraculous dispensation of Providence. A dog, whether well or ill bred, cannot make growth out of nothing or good growth out of poor and stinted food. Its growth comes directly out of the food; and flesh and bone must go in at the mouth in the form of good and proper food before they appear in the animal body. According as we furnish sufficient and suitable or inadequate foods, so in proportion are the bodies of our dogs healthy, sound, well-developed, firm-fleshed and muscular or the reverse. They are as we build them—neither more nor less. But though this general statement is true, it by no means follows that a dog may be regarded as a mechanical apparatus into which foods of definite chemical composition can be fed with the certainty of producing specific results. The vital element must be considered, for a dog is more than a mere machine: it has individuality and personal idiosyncrasy; it has individual likes and dislikes; it has a nervous system exercising great influence on nutrition and so upon growth; and it has high mental faculty, the right development and use of which depend largely on the proper nourishment of its body.

Broadly speaking, **the best families of our various breeds have been raised to their present state of superiority by continual attention to feeding and breeding, and it cannot be said that either of these agencies has played the more important role in amelioration, since both are equally necessary to produce and maintain improvement.**

Digestion and assimilation, like other functions, are certainly more or less hereditary; and our finest strains of dogs, having for generations enjoyed the liberal nutrition so necessary to their best development, have acquired a digestive habit craving ample and well-balanced feeding. We

occasionally see a highly bred dog in unthrifty condition where ordinary individuals seem to do tolerably well; and careless owners too often attribute such cases to the superior animal being naturally a bad doer, without giving a thought to the fact that it inherits from its lines of well fed ancestors an assimilative system calling for good and plentiful fare, and that it cannot therefore reasonably be expected to thrive on a ration barely sufficing for dogs of strains hereditarily inured to indifferent feeding.

The value of highly bred dogs lies

largely in the fact that liberal feeding and good care, continued for generations, have produced an organization capable of responding to proper feeding and care, and of turning them to good account: and to keep the vital powers of such animals at the maximum by liberal nutrition and a general high standard of living must be the principal aim of the breeder who seeks to maintain unimpaired the racial characters for which he values his improved stock.

Food has always been an important factor in producing and maintaining improvement in all useful kinds of animals, and the owner who invests in highly bred stock and gives it the same food and treatment ordinarily meted out to indifferent animals will find succeeding generations deteriorate until the superior strain reaches the standard of the common stock ordinarily kept under such conditions, **for the development of an organism is limited by its environment, and common, every-day stock represents the highest standard which can be attained under ordinary, every-day management.** Hence the familiar saying that highly bred animals which are good for anything should prove superior to ordinary stock under ordinary as well as under improved life-conditions, is as absurd as it is misleading. A well bred dog that has been stinted and neglected is a sufficiently distressful object to destroy anyone's credit. Improved breeding involves improved feeding; and to say that "it costs no more to keep a good dog than a poor one" is to state what is not true. It costs considerably more to properly maintain highly bred animals than common ones, but the profits are proportionately greater, for well bred dogs undoubtedly pay better and give more satisfaction than ordinary ones if proper food and care be provided; but their superiority is due to their having enjoyed superior advantages over ordinary stock in the way of food and management, and if they are to remain superior they must continue to enjoy these advantages. A well grown and well fed, big-breed bitch, for instance, the product of years of liberal feeding and careful management, would do but poorly if afterward restricted to scanty and unsuitable rations, and to expect her, on such ill-liberal fare, to breed puppies of the largest size and greatest vigour would be to cherish anticipations extremely unlikely to be realized. It is not the breeder's purpose to develop families of dogs that will exist on the minimum maintenance ration, but rather to increase their profitable productive ability by more liberal feeding and care by judicious selection.
