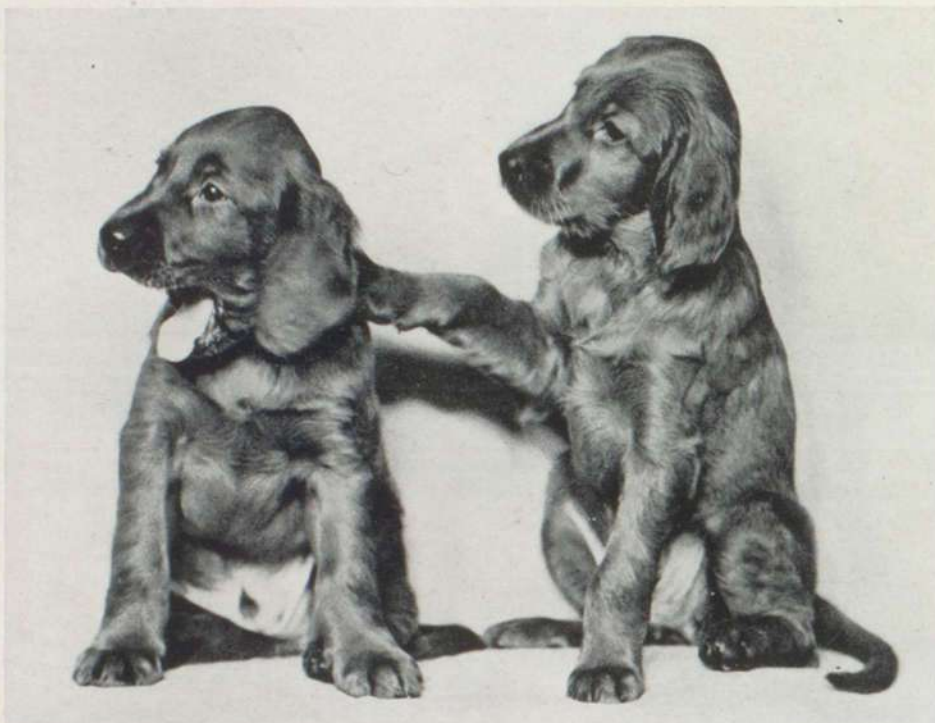

Meeting of the Board of Directors

of the
Canadian Kennel Club, Incorporated

THE regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., was held in the Board Room of the Club's Offices, 25 Melinda Street, Toronto, on Thursday afternoon, October 21st, 1937, at 3.30 o'clock. The President, Col. J. N. MacRae, presided. Directors present included: Walter H. Reeves, Dr. H. E. Batt, B. W. Essery, K.C., Mrs. E. Brown and Capt. H. Dudley-Waters.

The President and Directors gave Capt. Waters a warm welcome back to the Board Room after his long seige of sickness.

It was regularly moved by Mr. Reeves, seconded by Dr. Batt, and carried:

"That, the Minutes of the last meeting of the Board of Directors be taken as read".

The Secretary read letters from the Club's auditors and from the Records Office indicating that both would co-operate in having the Club's financial statement ready in time for publication in the February issue of Kennel and Bench.

The Secretary reported that the new proposed sections "I" and "J" of Article 17 of the Constitution had been approved and that applications for registration under these sections were now being proceeded with. Mr. Reeves suggested that a letter be sent to the Greyhound Clubs in London, Toronto and Oshawa, outlining the advantages of the proposed conditional legislation.

The Secretary read a letter from the Records Office with regard to printing of Stud Book No. 41. New prices having been quoted by the National Printers Limited for printing the book on the photo plate system. The recent contract had been waived and an amending resolution was indicated. It was regularly moved by Mr. Reeves, seconded by Mrs. Brown and carried:

"That, the new contract for the printing of Stud Book No. 41 under the photo plate system be awarded to the National Printers.

The matter of artificial insemination was then discussed. In this connection the Secretary read a letter from the Records Office containing advice concerning a meeting to be held in Toronto for the purpose of considering this and other matters.

After discussion the President named Dr. Batt, Mr. Reeves and the Secretary as the official delegates of the Club and extended an invitation to the other Directors to attend.

The matter of reliable identification in respect to registration was again considered.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

● IN THE BIG RING

EVER since the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair at Toronto have carried on their great night Horse Show we have fondly hoped that at some future time, in that magnificent setting, with the thousands of spectators ready to acclaim anything in the way of super animal specimens, that dogs would be allowed to partake of the attending glamour.

By the effort of the National Kennel Club with the hearty co-operation of General Manager W. A. Dryden of the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair, our hopes are to be realized. Each evening from November 16th to 20th a brace of Champion dogs, one representing Canada, and the other from the United States, will be paraded and posed for the benefit of the vast Horse Show audience. November 22nd to 24th, which are the dates of the National Kennel Club, Inc., Dog Show, a parade of well-known dogs will be sandwiched in the Horse Show programme. Every evening the dogs on view will have the benefit of that past master at the loud speaker, Mr. C. E. Harbison of the Conde-Nash Publications, Inc., New York, who, as each dog is brought forward for "spotlight" distinction will entertain the crowd with a bright summary on that breed.

● JUST A SUGGESTION

MR. MILTON DANZIGER, dog editor of the Springfield Daily Republican, started something in the way of a discussion when he suggested that the regular classes, as we know them, Puppy, Novice, Country Bred, Limit and Open, did not attempt to fill the bill of requirements of dog shows today. He goes further and shows how the same results would be reached by the elimination of at least one, if not two, of the offending classes, and the exhibitor would finish up with competing for the top honours with money saved and the event hours ahead when the close was reached. We find ourselves almost in accord with Mr. Danziger, changes could be made with a view to lessening and hastening the task of a one-day show, but in Canada there are cases where a substantial revenue is desired from all these classes in entries, and the consideration would need to be both deep and far reaching before any drastic changes could be made

with our long-lived classification, for what may be considered beneficial to one section may be absolutely taboo elsewhere. But, the Puppy class will always have our vote for does it not provide for the first step of youth. The Novice class, with its "never having won a first" clause never did, and could not raise the value of a competitor. The Canadian-bred class provides the incentive to "Cheer, Boys, Cheer", for it does bring out the results of home endeavour, and invariably the winner in a strong Canadian-bred competition can carry his flag to the top rung of any competition. The Limit class has always struck us as a needless venture for a good dog, and then we come to Open, where everyone's ambition may be realized. To sum up the situation: Winners Dogs, Winners Bitches, Best of Winners and Best of Breed cover every exhibitors' ambition and to attain one or all of them with the least possible fuss and trouble should be the aim of everyone responsible.

● BRITISH CO-OPERATION

AGAIN we are able to look forward to our Christmas Number with confidence, and our readers will find keen interest to pass the festive holiday, and that it will find its way into the library for at least a year is almost certain. By no means the least of the attractions offered will be the British Section, with Mr. R. H. Voss of Manchester, England, again in charge. This was a much appreciated contribution a year ago, and our British representative has the highest hopes for the 1937 outcome.

● FALL FAIR DOG SHOWS

THIS year has seen the innovation of dog shows held in connection with agricultural fairs, and has spread over the Dominion practically from coast to coast. Whilst this may be only recognized as history repeating itself, for the early dog shows were dependent for their very existence on the local fairs, past years have seen a decline in the combination, and both have lost considerably by that isolation. The return is welcome, and a further step to one-day dog shows, promoted by responsible kennel associations and held under the rules of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., at these local fixtures, would do much to increase public interest.

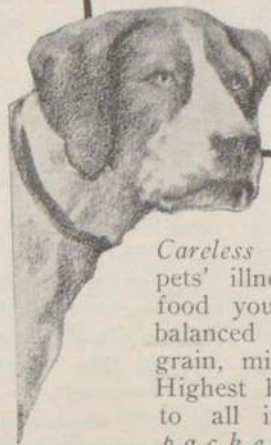

The Canadian Fancy

Judging by the number of letters received by the writer from members of the Canadian Kennel Club all over the Dominion, the most important news item in the last issue of *Kennel and Bench* was the conditional amendments to article 17, Rules of Eligibility, which are to be approved by the members at the 1938 annual general meeting. These conditional amendments are so vastly important that I am going to repeat the information given to the members in the last issue:

"I. Dogs born in Canada and registered in the National Coursing Association, The Field and the International Fox Hunters stud books providing the certificate of registration as issued by any organization above stated, is filed with the National Live Stocks Records. Registration of such an animal may be made but no certificate of registration issued. This rule shall be deemed to have come into effect on August 1st, 1937, and if a dog born in Canada for which provision for registration has not been previously arranged, and for which is filed a complete three-generation pedigree of authentic breeding, shall be and from August 1st, 1937, shall have been eligible for registration. This Rule to terminate the 31st December, 1938. For the convenience of owners of dogs that cannot furnish an official three-generation pedigree in connection with registration, declaration forms have been prepared and will be sent on request of those interested so that authentic evidence of three generations of pedigree may be filed with all such applications for registration."

Although the amendments to article 17, Rules of Eligibility, have to be approved at the annual general meeting next February by the members, the record office are in a position now to deal with applications for registration coming within the scope of the conditional amendments. Sincere congratulations are due to our President, Col. J. M. MacRae and to our Secretary, J. D. Strachan and also to the officials of the National Live Stock Records for a long sought-after change to the Rules of Eligibility for registration. The writer has been striving to obtain this ever since he became a director of the Canadian Kennel Club and heard the crying need of such an amendment so ably voiced by our 2nd Vice-President, W. A. Pym. At this meeting the writer was elected a dele-

gate to the National Live Stock Records and when he and another delegate, R. Ross, brought up the question of registration for our unregistered champions at the annual general meeting of the Canadian National Live Stock Records, we found to our dismay that our need found little sympathy with the other delegates. We tried again the next year with similar results. The writer then arranged for a meeting with the Hon. W. Weir, the Minister of Agriculture, who I found most sympathetic with the members' request that the many unregistered Canadian champions should be registered so that they could be used for breeding; in fact I left Ottawa convinced that the meeting had accomplished its purpose, but there was strong opposition from somewhere, and until the meet this September our unregistered champions and many other good dogs, whose parents had not been registered, were unavailable for improving our Canadian dogs. In the majority of cases which have come to the writer's attention, many of the ancestors of these unregistered dogs had been imported or brought over to Canada from the British Isles, and many were descendants of strains of immense value, which, on account of the breeding restrictions in the British Isles during the war, had died out. These remarks apply particularly to Sporting dogs, such as Pointers and Setters. What a chance the amendments to article 17 has given to our Canadian breeders who are now able to avail themselves of the services of dogs and bitches which have descended from strains not available anywhere else, providing the owners of these unregistered dogs avail themselves of the opportunity to register before December 31st, 1938. In some instances it may cause time and trouble to furnish authentic evidence of three generations of pedigree, but it is important that this evidence be collected not tomorrow or next week, but at once, for, as I have mentioned before, the members of the Canadian Kennel Club have on previous occasions dilly-dallied in sending the registrations to Ottawa before when the stud books have been re-opened. Many of the new members and maybe some of the old members may not be familiar with the lack of co-operation of the members with the National Live Stock Records in the past, so I will repeat the particulars.

The Canadian Kennel Club was incorporated as a Record Association in the year 1915. It was found before the rules were drafted that the Canadian Kennel Club had been accepting for registration unauthenticated pedigrees of dogs purported to be of three generations of breeding. The Record Committee informed the Kennel Club that unless the recording of these pedigrees was discontinued that the dog records could not become a part of the Canadian National System. A meeting was arranged between Mr. John G. Kent, then President of the Club, and the Record Committee and after discussion it was agreed that after January 1st, 1917, no more three-generation dogs would be registered. The Record Committee were asked to extend the date until January 1st, 1918, as it was found out that a number of members had not availed themselves of the privileges granted. This was agreed upon. At the end of 1918 it was still found out that a number of western dogs were still unregistered and the Record Committee were asked to extend the date until January, 1920. In spite of all these extensions the Canadian Kennel Club in 1921 and 1922 again asked for further extensions, and this was the situation when Bob Ross and the writer asked the record meeting of delegates to assist us in our request to have our unregistered champions registered. No wonder that we found the other delegates unsympathetic, they knew about our previous requests and the broken promises. I for one did not and I don't think Bob Ross did either. It has taken years and years to prove to the National Live Stock Records that we really wished to co-operate. We have succeeded. Everyone admits that the Live Stock Records has a great system of registration, to-day. The officials of the Records are doing their part to help along our sport, so that it is now up to the members of the Canadian Kennel Club to show the Records that the visit of our President and Secretary to Ottawa was on account of a need and a very pressing need of our members who wished to avail themselves of the boom in pedigree dogs to use these unregistered dogs in their breeding experiments. Many of these dogs can trace their ancestors back to pillars of the English stud books. Sporting dogs and greyhounds have never been in such demand as they are to-day across the border, and preference is given to Canadian-bred and reared Greyhounds, and the many famous English Setters that have been raised in British Columbia have caused many enquiries from our friends across the border for names and addresses of Setter breed-

ers in British Columbia. The question is, are we going to let this market slip between our fingers? on account of may be, a little time and trouble to trace authenticated ancestors. Remember we only have until December 31st, 1938, to register.

Greyhound Racing

The writer finds that his remarks on Greyhound racing have created much interest and apparently we have a great number of readers interested in the sport. For the information of those who have written to me asking for particulars I have ascertained that there are three active Greyhound Associations in Ontario. Mr. W. Dyson is the Secretary of the Ontario Greyhound Association, Mr. H. F. Brown the Secretary of the Oshawa and Mr. G. McFadden of the Western Ontario at London. The other day I had a most interesting interview with Mr. Dyson, who gave me particulars of the last race meeting of the Ontario Greyhound Association which was held at the Exhibition Park, Toronto, on Monday, Oct. 11th, where about three thousand spectators witnessed some thrilling races in spite of the inclement weather. "Gallant Warrior" again ran consistently, winning the George S. Henry Cup and the sweepstakes. The Palmer Kennels' "Circus Clown" also won two races. The Weldon Kennels' speedy longtail, "Limerick Blue Run", was evidently trained to the minute for he equalled the time 19-4 of "Gallant Warrior". The following are the results:

Present Day Bulldogs

A letter has been received from an old time Bulldog breeder who asks me to settle an argument as to how past celebrities of the breed, such as "Broadlea Squire", "Prince Albert", "Nuthurst Doctor", "Phulnana Kitty Royal" and "Silent Duchess" compare with today's cracks, and also whether we have a strain today as prepotent as the Stone. Dead champions, like dead puppies, always seem to have been faultless. There is only one way, and that is impossible, to settle such an argument by comparison. The dead champions I knew well and each had their faults as regards the Stone strain. Walter Jefferies certainly bred many fine Bulldogs and he was a most

convincing talker on the merits of his dogs when one paid a visit to his kennel at Camberwell. I always thought his best dog was "Rival Stone". Bulldogs generally, I believe, deteriorated probably more than any other variety during the World War. At least that was my opinion when I again played an active part in shows after the war. There has been a very decided change the last ten years and I think that today, if anything, the all-round quality is better than pre-war. Regarding strains I certainly do think we have some quite as prepotent as the Stone.

The March of Time

This year the writer has had the opportunity of visiting a great number of the important shows across the border and the other day he happened to walk to the part of the show ground reserved for the handlers, and here he noticed one of the greatest changes that has taken place in travelling to dog shows. Practically every handler, and in fact, most kennels of any size now travel from show to show by car instead of giving their dogs to express agents. Some of the handlers have fitted up trucks capable of travelling fifty dogs in comfort and more important still, all carry portable exercising rings, which are quickly set up, enabling the handlers to give their charges exercise en route, but there is still a greater change and that is in the way the ladies have superseded the men. In pre-war days eighty per cent of the personnel of those interested in our sport were men, whereas, today it seems that by far the greater portion are the fair sex. It does not matter in which variety you are interested, many of the most successful breeders are women. We have also a number of very successful women handlers and only the other day I saw particulars of a lady who had qualified as a veterinary surgeon and intended to specialize in dogs. We have a number of show-giving clubs in which the personnel is solely composed of the fair sex and we, who can look back to the time when the ladies first started to become interested in the sport of breeding and showing dogs, must admit that much of the success we enjoy today is due not to the men, but to the very great interest taken by the ladies.

Is Unsoundness Increasing

The writer believes that of late years our dogs have probably improved considerably in shoulders and legs and feet, although today through the fad of excessive featherings it does not matter very much if a dog's front legs are straight providing of course it is a rough-coated variety. Some years ago I was examining an Airedale's front legs and I found that one of the

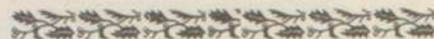
legs had evidently been broken and very badly set for the bone showed a decided curve. On examination, the leg was very cleverly trimmed, in fact when the Terrier was standing it was quite impossible to see the curve; clever trimming can and does hide many faults but there is one fault that it cannot hide and that is action and movement in hindquarters. It does not matter which variety of dog you may be judging, it is the exception to find a really good mover behind, cow-backs are certainly on the increase and so are straightbacks. They are not only prevalent amongst the mediocre dogs but also amongst the crack dogs of the day. In my judgement the one place that our present day cracks do not compare favourably to the stars of other days are in stifles and hocks and, in my opinion, judges and breeders must pay more attention to these very essential parts of a dog's anatomy. I was speaking to Mr. George Foley the other day at Tuxedo, and in the course of our conversation he made the remark that a good judge of dogs would also be a good horse judge but, in the horse show ring the judges certainly pay far greater attention to hind action that we are doing today. A good horse needs sound hindquarters and so should a good dog.

The National Kennel Club

This influential club, which holds its annual show in conjunction with the Winter Fair, one of Toronto's society events, is staging a novel parade. For five nights in the horse show ring, five American champion dogs and five Canadian champions will be led into the ring and the salient features of each breed will be explained to the audience by no less an expert on the "mike" than Mr. Harbison. This should prove a splendid advertisement for our sport. I have been informed by American handlers that on previous occasions they have experienced trouble when bringing their dogs across the border. This year there will be no trouble at all, as arrangements have been made at Ottawa to pass all dogs which are en route for this show at the border without any trouble. American handlers who are attending the Specialty Club's show at Chicago can arrive in ample time for the judging, but those who intend to travel by car should let Mr. Foley know where they intend to enter Canada, so that the information can be passed on to the Custom officials.

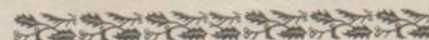

WORKING TERRIER ASSOCIATION OF IRELAND'S HUNTING COMPETITION AND MINOR FIELD TRIALS

Judges' Report

A thick mist, afterwards developing into a heavy drizzle, on Sunday morning, Sept. 12, did not augur well for enjoyable field trials, which were held, by the usual kindness of Messrs. Richard Blake, M.C.C., and Thomas Kennedy, at Esker, Lucan. That did not prevent a fine muster of owners and dogs, and their courage and sportsmanship were rewarded by an excellent day's sport under, in the afternoon, ideal weather conditions.

Seventeen dogs were entered, and the entry showed great variety in breeds, comprising eight Kerry Blue Terriers, six Fox Terriers, one Bedlington, one Glen Imaal, and one Wheaten Terrier, and of these, 15 actually competed.

The arrangements, under Mr. Patrick Blake, left nothing to be desired. Rabbits and rats were plentiful and in good fettle, and the stewarding was admirably carried out.

Of the performances in general we can say that they were of a very high order, which probably we should expect, as quite a number of the dogs had already proved their merit as hunters. At the same time, it is no small tribute to them that there was not one of the 15 that was not a keen field dog. Individual lapses there were, but without exception there was not a dud amongst them, and it was no easy task for us to separate the winners.

The prize-winners were: 1st and the Wigoder Cup, P. Blake's soft-coated Wheaten Terrier, "Kingdom Leader". This was the debut of the first soft-coated Wheaten Terrier at our official trials, and didn't it go with a swing! After a few seconds circling, "Leader" got on a long trail with speed and accuracy, broke through heavy cover, worked with great sagacity, and killed. His trial over rat was equally spectacular; he worked well in cover, took to water several times to reconnoitre, and killed. 2nd, P. Casserly's Kerry Blue Terrier, "The Joker". This well-known hunter picked up the scent immediately, and raced the trail unerringly. He bolted his rabbit from cover, and again hunting with great gusto, found to kill. At rat he could not be excelled—he worked perfectly in water and in cover. Only a couple of marks, lost by extra circling just before he killed his rabbit, separated this great field Kerry Blue from the Wheaten. 3rd and the Blake Cup, W. Lombard's "Fearless Fairy". This game Fox Terrier gave a practically

faultless display in her rabbit trial. Her rat trial promised a like success, but she allowed her rat to escape after catching it. True enough, she retrieved lost ground by again finding and killing in the water, but her momentary lapse lost her first place.

W. Ryan's Wire-haired Fox Terrier, "Parkgate Rambler", was a very close runner-up to the winners. At first too eager to nose carefully, when he did settle down he trailed excellently, entered a thick bramble cover with great courage, and worked it to kill. He took fearlessly to water, and having worked well in cover, killed.

Of the other dogs we need not go into full particulars, but we cannot refrain from making special mention of J. Doyle's Glen Imaal Terrier, "Pride of the Valley". In picking up the scent, quickness and accuracy in following the trail, and working in thick cover from which she twice bolted a strong-running rabbit, she was faultless. Though she lost the rabbit her hunting was excellent, approaching intelligence rather than instinct. Incidentally she scored full marks for the rat trial.

The following were deemed well worthy of certificates of merit: D. Murphy's Kerry Blue Terrier bitch, "Vigil of Clonmore"; W. Lombard's Wire-haired Fox Terrier bitch, "Fearless Fairy"; P. Blake's Kerry Blue Terrier bitch, "Fertagh Lass"; P. Casserly's Wire-haired Fox Terrier dog, "Sir Sydney"; P. Blake's soft-coated Wheaten Terrier dog, "Kingdom Leader".

The Evening News, one of Nova Scotia's leading dailies, following a flattering editorial comment on the local Dog Show held on October 6th, had the following in their edition of October 7th:

Pictou County Kennel Club Scores a Success—Initial Benching Contest Pleases Many.

Yesterday the road for many dogs and their owners led to the Arena Rink. There canines barked, paraded and won prizes. There were over two hundred dogs exhibited and in many cases they represented the very best in their respective class that could be found in Eastern Canada. Dog fanciers came from Saint John, N.B., and Halifax in large number, while Truro was well represented. But most surprising were the entries from Pictou County both in number and pedigreed dogs and their quality.

All day long people thronged the rink, crowded about the ringside watching the judging, and applauded the winners. It was amazing the interest shown by the spectators and how keenly they watched the judges as they scored each dog and gave it a place.

To those who were responsible for the Show there must be accorded every credit. The whole affair was admirably handled. The President, Chester Gregory, was on hand with that smile of his. But the burden of the work fell upon W. M. Murray and he made an excellent job of a heavy task.

To be sure he had assistance from Vice-President, John Sparks, and the Executive and Show committee, but all will accord to Secretary Murray the large medium of praise to which he is so rightly entitled.

The judges were James D. Whitely, of Bedford, in the Terriers, Hounds, Sporting dogs and Best in Show, and A. V. Morton, of Halifax, who placed the Toys, Non-sporting and Working Dogs. They went about the business as if they knew it and the decisions were accepted without a question. Many kindly comments upon the Show and its conduct were heard from outside exhibitors who were pleased with the arrangements and the courtesy shown.

The show was conducted under the sanction of the Canadian Kennel Club and its rules prevailed. Then the array of cups awarded as special prizes was something to behold.

In the different classes the Toy dogs outnumbered all others and especially in Fox Terriers, Scottish Terriers, Pekingese and Boston Terriers there were large entry lists.

Space will forbid us publishing a list of the prize winners and in that respect we will have to be content with praise for all the dogs, our laudation for those who engineered the Show, bringing together so many in such an interesting contest.

SETTER AND POINTER CLUB OF CANADA

The first Fall meeting of the Setter and Pointer Club of Canada was held in the King Edward Hotel, Toronto, on the evening of October 14th.

point shows have been held, and the continued falling off in numbers of entries is evidence that we are running off the track in this respect. A suggestion that this club confine its activities to one point show per year, with one or more sanction shows as occasions arise, found favor with the meeting. After all, the shows here are but local events, with a few entries from outside of the province. This subject will be more fully discussed at next meeting. The constitution and by-laws of the club, which have never been favorable to many members, is to be revised by the committee and brought before the members at next sitting so that notice of motion to alter rules can be submitted as required for the annual general meeting of the club, to be held January, 1938. The annual banquet and dance of the club will be held in the Hotel Majestic on the 19th November, and a large turn-out of members and friends is expected. The conducting of the banquet will be in the hands of a capable and experienced committee.

Meeting adjourned at 10.45 o'clock.

The many members of the C.K.C. that I come in contact with at shows, meetings and visiting, are not the least backward in saying they do not like the new set-up of Kennel and Bench, all seeming to like best the old style, so that they may see all that is going on

It is so much easier for you to sit down with the old pen in hand and write us all your activities. So many of you are under the impression that to speak about your own dogs will appear to others as though you were wagging your own tail. Don't be so silly, if you are not capable of wagging your tail, who else is going to do it for you. So let all the Saskatchewan fanciers get together and keep in touch with one another through the columns of your own magazine, Kennel and Bench. How about it, Moose Jaw? We haven't heard from you yet.

Fanciers are pleased to note from the minutes of a recent meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club that all dogs with an authentic three-generation pedigree may now be registered.

This will allow the registration of many good dogs that from no fault of their owners have previously been ineligible for registration.

The Regina Kennel Club greatly regret the loss of two of their members, Mr. and Mrs. C. Porter, who are leaving Regina to take up residence in Vancouver, B.C. As they are taking with them one female Peke and three puppies, we will no doubt be hearing of their activities at the coast.

Walter Pym, club president, presented the departing couple with a handsome gift from the club.

Mr. Jones, former secretary to the Regina Kennel Club, has just returned from an extended trip to Europe. As Mr. Jones has been too busy since his arrival home to give us an interview, we can only surmise as to how much of his holiday was spent in the kennels on the other side of the pond.

A visit to the kennels of a Saskatoon Boston breeder, James Lawson, didn't get us a great deal of news but quite a surprise, as we found Jimmie much more anxious to talk of hunting dogs and field trials than his favorite Buxton Bulls. The possible reason for this is that Mr. Lawson has in his boarding kennels both English and Irish Setters, also some Pointers.

The English Setters, owned by J. Hair, were the main subject of our discussion, as the finishing touches were being put on their training in preparation for the coming field trials.

Smooth Fox Terriers will be the topic of a lecture at a meeting held by the Saskatoon Kennel Club in the latter part of October. W. Childs was unanimously elected as lecturer for the evening. He will bring three of his own Smooths to use for demonstration purposes.

As Mr. Childs is quite an authority on this breed, the club are looking forward to a very interesting discussion. The continuation of breed lectures, which seem to be gaining favor in many kennel clubs, will greatly depend on the interest and attendance of the first meetings.

TATTOOS INITIALS ON DOGS

Successful tattooing of dogs and other animals to permit certain identification has been accomplished after experiments lasting over a period of six months. Dr. H. E. Batt, B.V.Sc., of the faculty of the Ontario Veterinary College, announces in a special report contained in the annual report of the college, just released.

The operation is simple and easily accomplished, and while dogs of any age can be tattooed, it was found best done on young animals—as soon as the ears of the pup are large enough to have room for the letters desired

—in most breeds about two months of age. Larger breeds may be done at six weeks or less, while Toys may have to be older on account of their small ears.

Ears are the best place, Dr. Batt found, and on each ear is a spot a little over one inch long and about half as broad, free from hair and wrinkles.

The ear operation is over in a second and the pup seems to have forgotten in a minute or two. No after effects are felt that the marks are permanent.

Antiseptic ink is used, making it unnecessary to prepare the area previously by washing. The small tool is merely given one sharp squeeze after which a little more of the intense black marking fluid is rubbed into the marks with a tooth brush.

The same general procedure is applicable to the tattooing of all classes of livestock for identification purposes under regulations required by the National Live Stock Records.—Toronto Evening Telegram.

The Pekin Palace Dog Association held their first fall meeting Wednesday evening, October 20th, at Central Y.M.C.A. There was a nice turn-out of members. Dr. Clemmer presided. A few of the members were absent on account of sickness. Mrs. Burrows, being seriously ill in the hospital, was sent a beautiful bouquet of roses.

It was moved and carried that the association try and produce harmony among the Pekingese breeders of the city, and so reduced the dues until January, 1938, in the hope that all those interested in the advancement of the breed would unite with the Pekin Palace Dog Association and work together.

It was decided to hold the thirteenth annual show early in the new year. The remainder of the evening was spent on show work.

STIMULATING REGISTRATION

On page 43 of the October issue we featured an important notice having for its coverage two conditional amendments to article 17—**Rules of Eligibility** of the Constitution of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., said conditional amendments being referred to as "I" and "J", the former reading:—

I. "Dogs born in Canada registered in the National Coursing Association Stud Book, The Field Dog Stud Book, The International Fox Hunters Stud Book, provided the certificate of registration as issued by any organization above stated is filed with the Canadian National Live Stock Records. If official three-generation pedigree is not obtainable, evidence of authentic ancestry for three generations may be filed

with the Canadian National Live Stock Records. Registration of such an animal may be made but no certificate of registration issued. This rule shall be deemed to have come into effect on August 1st, 1937",

and the latter reading:—

J. "A dog born in Canada for which provision for registration has not previously been made and for which is filed a complete three-generation pedigree of authenticated breeding shall be and from August 1st, 1937, shall have been eligible for registration. This rule to terminate December 31st, 1939",

the whole having the endorsement of the Honourable the Minister of Agriculture, The Live Stock Commission, The Canadian National Live Stock Record Board, and the President and Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc.

The two measures of relief referred to will, necessarily, be required to conform to rigid tests, so that authenticity will be established beyond doubt, and that our cherished records will stand to lose nothing by their operation.

It is to be hoped that all our purebred Canadian-born dogs that are not now registered, will find the protection of registration through the functioning of either "I" or "J". We understand that supplies of all necessary forms have been sent out from headquarters to all Provincial Directors in order to facilitate the business end of the conditional arrangement.

It must be clearly understood that dogs born in the United States may only be registered in Canada by virtue of registration in the American Kennel Club Stud Book.

DOGS ON STAMPS

Bearing in mind the part the dog plays in our lives and the variety of pictorial devices that have been used on postage stamps, it is strange to find that very few stamps have borne pictures of dogs. The first postage stamp was printed in 1840, but it was not until 47 years later that a dog first appeared on a stamp. This was the half-cent stamp of Newfoundland, and it bore a reproduction from a Landseer picture of a head of a representation of the national breed. Five years ago, the Dominion issued another dog stamp, with a magnificent full-length portrait of a Newfoundland. In the following year the islands of St. Pierre and Miquelon—French settlements off the Newfoundland coast—followed their neighbour's lead, issuing a set of 11 stamps bearing a picture of a Newfoundland. So this breed has been honoured philatelically more than any other.

Canada, on the occasion of the sixtieth anniversary of her attainment of Dominion status in 1927, issued a special delivery stamp illustrating the various methods of mail transport and among them is a team of dogs drawing a sleigh.

The only territory in the Old World to depict a dog on its stamps is the Saar, which in 1926, when still under French rule, issued a 40-centime stamp with a picture of a blind man being guided by an Alsatian (or as it is now known, German Shepherd) dog.

The idea of dogs on stamps is one that might well be followed more widely when postal authorities of the various nations are seeking pictorial subjects which unmistakably identify the stamp with the country of origin. The Dachshunde, for example, might be added to the already extensive philatelic picture gallery of Germany. And for ourselves, if we were not so incorrigibly conventional in our stamp designs, a picture of the Royal Princesses playing with their Corgis would make an exceedingly attractive subject.

BY THE JUDGE

I want at this time to thank the members of the Boston Terrier Club of Toronto for the hospitality extended to me at their 19th Annual Specialty Show, also my sincere thanks to the exhibitors that made it possible to put on such a fine show. It was indeed a pleasure to attend the dinner given by this progressive Boston Terrier Club and to note the feeling of good fellowship that seemed to exist. I sincerely hope that this good sportsmanship will continue and that the 20th anniversary of the Boston Terrier Club of Toronto will have a



record breaking entry for next year's show.

I will try and give a brief review of some of the dogs entered at the show.

Junior Puppy Dogs just a fair lot. Senior Puppy Dogs was won by "O O Oscar Odd". A very good sort, with a little more time to finish will always be in the ribbons. He also was winner of Canadian-bred and Limit Dogs under 15 lbs. Novice Dogs, under 15 lbs., was won by "Turners Bugle", a small flashy marked dog with a beautiful head. Second went to "Richardsons Flash", a different type than winner.

Open Dogs, under 15 lbs., was won by "Ch. Little Man What Now", brought out every good point this dog had, being a beautiful headed fellow with excellent body and limbs, a good sound fellow and moved like a hackney, I placed first and later Winners Dogs. Second went to "O O Oscar Odd". Third to the Junior Puppy winners, "Sunnybrook Sam." Novice, Canadian-bred and Open Dogs, 15-20 lbs., won by "Cayleys Flash", not very good ring manners, but a very good dog. Limit Dogs, 15-20 lbs., won by "Rockabye High Hat", a very good specimen was placed Reserve Winners to "Ch. Little Man What Now." Limit and Open, heavyweights, 20-25 lbs., brought out three very good dogs, the winner was "The Last Round Up", an exceptionally good dog winners first. "Scot Payne" was second. "Reaping Reward" was third. This dog would not settle down and show being a better dog then placed, but I could not get him to show his best. All in all they were three good ones.

In Junior Puppy Bitches I found one of the sweetest little types I've seen in years. She is "Maid of the Mist XVI", and is just eight months old, and with a little more age I predict a great future for her. Second, was "Artsis Model", a very nice female and rightfully named.

Senior Puppy Bitches was won by "Tomkins Lady Christian", a rich mahogany brindle with good head and body, sound, and a good mover. This female will always be in the ribbons. Second awarded to "Blue Donna", a very good one that will bare watching.

Canadian-bred Bitches, under 15 lbs., was won by "Paddy's Rockfellow Ilwyn." This female has plenty of quality. Second, "Susan of River-view", another good one.

Limit Bitches, under 15 lbs., was won by "Argold Glory." Second, "Paddy's Rockfellow Ilwyn." Third, "Abetee Pretty Girl", all good bitches, a hard class to pick.

Open Bitches, under 15 lbs., was won by "Personality Rockabye Babe 2nd." This female is outstanding

with a good clean head free from wrinkles, dark soft eye, beautiful body, and a great show miss. Later I placed her Winners Bitches, I believe completing her Canadian championship, and her American championship at a later show, thus making her an international champion.

Canadian-bred Bitches, 15-20 lbs., also Limit was won by "Bubbling Marie", a very fast female; with proper handling should go very far to championship. Very timid at times. Second, "Kennys Lady."

Open Bitches, 15-20 lbs., was won by "Hagertys Madonna." Later I placed this female Reserve Winners. Second going to "Bubbling Marie." Third to "Chore Girl." Three very fast bitches. Best of Winners was awarded to "Little Man What Now."

Best of Breed brought out a fine lot of champions, both Canadian and American. After going over all of them I placed "Little Man What Now" best in show. The class of dogs at this Show was above the average. This speaks well for Canadian breeders.—M. J. Donlon.

FIELD TRIALS WITH TRAILS AND ECHOES

The interest that is being shown in Field Trials of Sporting Dogs apparently is growing apace, and through the kindly forethought of Dr. Cooper, our director for Saskatchewan, I have some interesting particulars of the doings of the Saskatchewan Field Trial Association. The training of Shooting Dogs and holding of Field Trials in the Western Province brings thousands of much needed dollars to the West, in fact I am of opinion through perusing the particulars of the Trials held under the auspices of the above association that the Canadian Kennel Club should certainly take a far more active part than they have done in the past. I hope that the day is not far distant when all Field Trials in Canada are held under Canadian Kennel Club Rules as they are in England. The great interest taken in these trials is shown by the photographs taken and sent to the writer by Dr. Cooper regarding the entries. I find that fifty-eight dogs were entered in the Derby Stakes, and eighty were in the All Aged Stakes, and thirty-eight were entered in the Championship Stakes. Dr. Cooper informs me that about 1,200 dogs are brought into Western Canada for training purposes, and about two to three hundred men. They spend their money freely. They come to Western Canada because it is the best game bird country in the world. The Provincial Government do all they can to encourage and locate the trainers and their dogs by giving them allotted training grounds and by guaranteeing that their grounds will not be molested by trespassing. No doubt Dr. Cooper will have some suggestions for the directors at the next annual general meeting. I certainly agree after perusing the particulars that these trials and training grounds mean a big thing in the doggy world, and that it behoves the Canadian Kennel Club to take a more active interest in them than they have done in the past.

A large gallery of spectators, numbering in the hundreds, had braved the inclement weather and they were just as enthusiastic as the dogs. The results of the trials after the adjudged four best dogs had been given a third and fourth bird was as follows: First, a black and white bitch owned and bred by Keith Coughlan, "Keiths Patsy"; second, a black and white dog owned by Mr. W. F. Cleator, "Ch. Frank of Avandale 2nd"; and third, Ernie Scott's "Buella Vista Pride", a liver and white dog and incidentally last year's winner. The Judge, Mr. Jack Forbes of Irish Setter fame, gave a really fine display of judging and his awards were received with very pronounced approval by both the entrants and onlookers and a win under such circumstances is all the more desirable and worth while.

Mr. Alf. Blair, and the whole membership of the Springer Spaniel Club much credit is due for the success of this year's Trials. The grounds on which the trials were held were very kindly loaned to the Club by Magistrate Bose and the Club desires to thank Mr. W. S. West and Captain Manson who were the men behind the guns for the day. Mr. Vic. Williams again acted as steward in charge of the actual trials. Now a word about the three major winners: the first, "Keiths Patsy", trained by her owner, Mr. Coughlan, gave a wonderful performance in quartering, dropping to command, flushing and retrieving, and was under perfect control at all times, her final dropping to shot and quick retrieving was conceded to be a 100% performance. Strange to say this bitch had retrieved her first pheasant on the day of the trials and had been trained under rather difficult circumstances and her remarkable performance and intelligence made her win all the more popular.

The second dog, Mr. W. Cleator's "Ch. Frank of Avandale 2nd", showed the result of careful and strenuous training and was a dog also kept under control, but his retrieving was not as spectacular as the first prize winner. This dog quartered well but rather close, however a worthy winner for second laurels. The third dog, Mr. E. Scott's "Buella Vista Pride", will always be a close contender for the highest honors and what might be termed luck and in this case tough luck seemed to be against this dog. He had some trouble finding one of his birds and this fact discounted some of his other work in the field. As related in the foregoing remarks this was a very unusual trial for both dogs and owners, and in

view of the difficulties a very good display of practical Springer Field Trial requirements was turned in by all entrants.

The British Columbia Gun Dog Club Field Trials for Pointers and Setters were held at Ladner last week-end and were considered the most successful Trials held in the Province for many years. Mr. Charles M. Butler, the popular President of the Club, is to be congratulated on the manner in which he conducted this event. The Judges, Mr. David Kerr and Mr. Clarence Willgress, gave a fine exhibition of picking the winners correctly from a field of thirty-one starters. A fine gallery of several hundred spectators were thrilled at the well-trained dogs. To Mr. W. N. Edgerton goes the honor of winning the first Field Trial Championship of any breed held under Canadian Kennel Club rules. His Pointer, "Edgertons Sport", repeated his win of last year and also won the W. W. Boulbee Memorial Trophy. Chas. Murray's Pointer, "Pep" was second with an excellent exhibition of pointing but was closely pressed for the position by W. T. Oates' "Stylish Patch", which was placed third. The Derby was won by Alf. Gough's Pointer, "Pat." A. O. Madill's English Setter, "Dan", was second, and Frank Kinsman's English Setter, "Rippling Breeze", was third. The Puppy stake was won by Jack Penrice's English Setter, "Horosford Dashing Drake"; E. Hasswells' English Setter, "Dan" was second, and Chas. Grey's Irish Setter, "Red", was third. Much credit is due Chief of Police Scott Fenton of Ladner who personally supervised the selection of the various courses, and to Charles Bradbury, the Club's secretary, also Danny Ewart, assistant steward, who kept the affair moving

at a rapid rate. At the conclusion of the trials the spectators and contestants gathered at the Ladner Municipal Hall where Mr. Henry Castillou presented the trophies.—V. W. W.

CANADIAN NATIONAL BEAGLE CLUB TRIALS

The weatherman was in sympathy with the beaglers at Forest, Ont., from September 27th until October 2nd, and a splendid week's sport was enjoyed by the largest group of contestants and followers that has ever featured such Trials in Canada. The first intimation of the extent of the entry to reach headquarters was the receiving of the club's cheque covering 136 listings. This was the club's 24th consecutive Trials and a new high marked the club's advancing years.

All the Canadian clubs were well represented, and beaglers were on hand from Montreal, Oshawa, Toronto, Hamilton, Woodstock, Windsor, and Forest, the club's headquarters for the Trials. A veritable invasion of beaglers from the United States warmed the hearts of the club's officers and members. Dale Sutton from New Haven, Ky., brought along no less than 29 hounds, Aurie Landers and George Kelley from Indianapolis brought 10 more along, Carl Vogel and Blueford Jackson from Cincinnati, Ohio, added 19 more, so, when those figures are totalled, and the members' dogs are added, the entries showed 168 entries for the several Derby and All Age Classes, and the extra nine Two-couple Packs.

The judging was in the capable hands of Messrs. Herb Edwards and Lloyd Wampler, but so strenuous were their labours, that the services of Messrs. Lloyd Courtice and Beryl Bishop were secured and the work nicely allocated.

Game was plentiful and no time was lost in putting the braces down and the results will serve to show how the "merry little Beagles" stand as their efforts were appraised by the judges.

Big things are already being planned with a view to suitably marking the 25th Trials of this substantial old club. The grounds will be re-stocked this winter. The winner of the all-age stake was

"Mohawk Spot Light", English Setter dog, owned by Edward McCoy, of Hamilton. This beautiful dog was imported from Kentucky last fall, spent this summer on our Canadian prairies and was in excellent shape to carry off this event. Second place went to "Drews Glad Ghost", English Setter dog, owned by G. G. Vincent, of Port Nelson. This good little Setter was only fifteen months of age and shows excellent prospects for one so young. Third went to the English Setter "Marveline", owned by D. T. Barnes, of Mitchell. Beside the winners were several very good dogs, who, if they are brought into better condition will likely be heard from at our later trials. The puppy stake was limited in numbers, first place going to "Dinna Selkirk", English Setter bitch. Second to "Danny Selkirk", English Setter dog. Both these puppies were owned by W. D. Elliott, of Owen Sound. They are an excellent type of field-trial dog and if given the opportunity should make very fine shooting dogs.

Fields of Russian Thistle made the going hard, particularly when it almost reached over some of the puppies' heads. Birds were conspicuous by their absence, as brace after brace were picked up after their allotted time of running, without having a single find.

After a somewhat late start, the Puppy stake got under way, with ten dogs competing.

"Rapid Sue", Pointer bitch, bred by L. H. O'Reilly, owned and handled by Wm. Little, of Rosetown, placed first. Second place was taken by "Drewery's Mack", Pointer dog, owned by Angus McNeil, and handled by Wm. Little. Third, "Lloyd's Dolly", Pointer bitch, owned and handled by L. H. O'Reilly. Fourth, "Masher", Pointer dog, owned and handled by Mike Geary.

All Age Stake

Sunday, the third, saw the running of the All Age, with eleven dogs competing. Adverse weather conditions discouraged many would-be spectators, and did not noticeably add to the comfort of the more hardy ones.

"Blanford Sonorias", Pointer dog, owned and handled by Joe Burkinshaw, placed first in this stake. Second went to "Whoopee Queen", English Setter bitch, owned and handled by Wm. Little. "Blenheim Sonorias", Pointer dog, owned and handled by Joe Burkinshaw, coming third.

Shooting Dog Stake

First, "Pal", English Setter dog, owned and handled by Tommy Matthews, who retired from judging to handle his own dog. Second, "Hagel's Nell", English Setter bitch, owned and handled by Wm. Little. Miss Marion Hair, only lady handler at the trials, managed to bring her English Setter dog, "Gyp", owned by J. Hair, into third place. Fourth, "Margo", Eng-

lish Setter bitch, owned and handled by Mike Smith.

In addition to winning the Black Trophy for this stake, Matthews also annexed the Challenge Collar, which compels him to run his dog against any challenger during the season. The first challenge came from Wm. Little, the heat to be run later in the Battleford All Age Stake.

Following we humbly submit our greenhorn opinion of some of the winners, and others.

In the Puppy stake, "Rapid Sue" showed by far the best ground work, her pace and range were well sustained throughout the heat. For a Puppy, she handled exceptionally well, but was unable to connect with birds. "Lloyd's Dolly", also showed good ground work, and bird sense, when she connected with two coveys of huns, which she unfortunately ran through. This, of course, is permissible in a Puppy stake, while her range was not quite as good as that of "Rapid Sue's", it was also well sustained, and she was able to finish strong.

"Drewery's Mack", while not outstanding in pace and range, showed nice style in his frequent points on meadow larks and such, which also is permissible in puppies.

"Lloyd's Tiny", Pointer bitch, started in good style, making one or two fine casts, managing to put up birds twice, but letting down badly after about fifteen minutes of running. One of the highlights of the stake was the way in which Joe Burkinshaw's five months old Pointer puppy started out in the first brace to be set down. It showed the true instinct of a real field trialer, casting out wide and far in search of birds. One long cast made to likely looking cover showed sense creditable to a grown dog. Unfortunately, the pup was stepped on by his trainer's horse, when on one occasion he came in too close. He was lamed so badly that his trainer was forced to pick him up.

The consistency of the judges in the All Age was a little hard to follow. While the first and third placed were undoubtedly the class dogs of the stake in speed, range, pace and application, the second placed dog, on the strength of her one find, should have, in our opinion, been placed either first or third, and not in between those two dogs, which had both run birdless heats.

Comments on the Shooting Dog Stake are not in order as we were not able to be present to witness all the running. As there are many very fine Retrievers in and around Saskatoon, it was quite a surprise and disappointment to find the trials had been called off from lack of entries.

There is no reason why Saskatoon Field Trials cannot compare favourably with the larger Moose Jaw Trials. Possibly, with more experience and perseverance, they will be holding their own with the best of them. P.R.

DACHSHUNDE—The death of "Ch. Liebling of Kilkee", first Wire-Haired Daschshunde Champion in Canada.



Kilkee Kennels, Cowichan Station, B.C., report that "Ch. Liebling of Kilkee" was run over and killed on September 23rd, 1937.

Liebling was whelped November 15th, 1934, of parents imported from England, and first shown when she was a year old, going Best of Breed. She attained her championship in well under a year, and in ten times shown went Best of Breed seven times. With "Pumpnickel of Kilkee" she went Best Brace in Show, any breed, at Nanaimo in August, 1936. At the time of her death she had acquired several points to her American championship.

When just over six months old she started her training as a sporting dog, and in the fall of 1935 and 1936 was used for pheasant and grouse shooting, proving very satisfactory for this type of work.

She was temporarily retired from the show ring in the spring of 1937 and mated to "Hansel of Kilkee", a young dog bred by the Babel Kennels in Groton, Mass. She whelped three puppies, one in particular who seems to be going to develop into the image of her famous dam.

The death of "Liebling", or "Doodles" to her intimates, has been a great loss, for not only was she the outstanding dog of the kennels, but the faithful and loving friend of the owners, Mr. and Mrs. O. Phillipowsky.

Mr. A. W. Butler, Crowthorne Kennels, Newtonbrook, Ontario, imported the American-bred black and tan Smooth "Florham Lena". Before being shipped she was bred to the well-known "Florham Zeouon Gosewassu-fall", and has presented her new owner with a family of seven puppies.

NOVA SCOTIA DUCK TOLLER—

We have received some inquiries regarding the breed known as the Nova Scotia Duck Toller and as the writer is not very familiar with this breed we are taking the liberty of quoting from an article appearing in the New York Times and written by Edward R. Hewitt, in which he gives an interesting description of the use of the so-called "Toller Dogs" to attract ducks. Mr. Hewitt states that a short time ago he saw an interesting description of the use of these dogs in Nova Scotia. This, described as something entirely new, and as if it had been discovered in this region, and here, in part, is what Mr. Hewitt has to say: "This is far from the fact, as this is really the very oldest known way of getting ducks, and has been in use for well over 2,000 years in the county of Norfolk in England. There exists there today two traps which date from prehistoric times and are so old that they are not subject to any game laws of that country. These consist of a cover made of willow wattles built over small creeks entering the bays.

"The wattles are about six feet above the water and are spaced so that ducks cannot fly through them. The cover is several hundred feet long and closed at the upper end. Part way up there is a trap door that can be closed with a string. Small dogs are trained to cut up antics along the shore and bring in the ducks from the bay, the dogs following along the line of wattles and leading the ducks into the traps. When they are well inside the trap door is sprung and the ducks are taken with a hand net." Mr. Hewitt concludes by saying: "No doubt the men in Nova Scotia knew of this practice and trained their dogs for bringing in the ducks in a similar way."

• The Bull Terrier Club of Canada

The second annual meeting of the Bull Terrier Club of Canada was held in the Board Room of the Forum Building at Montreal, Saturday, September 25th, 1937. A representative gathering of the leading supporters of the breed in Canada was present.

Mr. W. W. Rooney, President of the club, was in the chair and, in opening the meeting, outlined to newcomers and others the origin, motives and aspirations of the organization. He dealt briefly but pithily with what are generally conceded to be the needs of the fancy and pointed out directly how such needs could best be answered by organization.

He spoke of type and the urgent need of aiming in a given direction rather than being swayed this way and that by the many types of champions that spring up in widely separated parts of the country. A Bull Terrier, Mr. Rooney asserted, should be a Bull Terrier north, south, east and west, and to his way of thinking, there should be less heard of English and American Bull Terriers. They all come from the same original tap-roots, and the difference in the conceptions of novices was due largely to the influence upon the breed that had been exerted by "all-round" judges who had never owned nor bred a Bull Terrier in all their lives.

At the meeting there was, of course, the same variance of opinion as is to be met with all over America, but it was readily conceded that the judges' "On the day"; "I always thought"; "Fore me", etc., were excuses and evasions not to be encouraged and for which a properly laid down standard should afford no room. The law as it is written for the judges of the Bench is a vastly more complicated subject than is the anatomy of a good Bull Terrier; yet it is very carefully defined for the judges who read and mete it out, and it is very definitely their business to keep all prejudices and personal tastes in check and to govern themselves in their judgments by the law of the land. "Cannot", Mr. Rooney asked, "a standard be so devised that it will do away with all personal inclinations; and if it is then the ill-fortune of the Bull Terrier fraternity to have to accept the opinion of a man who has never bred and does not understand the breed, cannot we hope for him to understand the standard as it is written and so come nearer to his true objective—satisfaction to the exhibitors?"

It was suggested that it is due to the looseness of the present standard that the Bull Terrier is often denied

what real students of the breed know to be his right in Group Class and Best in Show competition. It was remarked by the President and concurred in by all present that the modern Bull Terrier, as put down for show, is all honest-to-goodness dog, with good points and faults laid out for all to see. He plays the show game with his cards on the table—bone, muscle and outline—but he plays it often against dogs that are permitted to hide a multitude of sins behind a skillful trim. "The swimming bath", Mr. Rooney said, "is the leveller of all humanity", for in it one has great difficulty in distinguishing banker from shoe-shiner, and if dogs were judged in their bathtubs instead of in the show ring, the Bull Terrier would be heard from a great deal more often when the awards for Best of Show are handed out. A study of dog show catalogues of the past will disclose the fact that Bull Terrier fanciers have been consistent and generous in their support of the game but, in favour of the come-and-go followers of the come-and-go breeds, they have been steadily ignored in the handing out of the awards that act as boosts for the breeds and play a large part in popularizing various types of dogs with the general public.

The president in passing onto the year's affairs and the successful show of the day which had brought forth some seventeen entries from Montreal, Toronto, Ottawa and Port Hope, paid tribute to the splendid spirit of fellowship, reciprocity and the genuine love of the breed that was responsible for the presence of the out-of-town dogs and the showing of many local members. There had, he said, been little or no selfish consideration given to the matter of who was or who was not the judge of the day, and whilst such goodwill continued to exist between Bull Terrier fanciers, and there was engendered of it the friendly inter-city rivalry that had that day been apparent, there could be little wrong with the Bull Terrier fancy and their dogs.

Mr. Rooney said that the club had done much but that there was still much to be done. He welcomed all members present and thanked them earnestly for their presence and support.

Mr. Stanley Wisdom, an old-time enthusiast now returned actively to his hobby, in a few well-chosen words thanked the Rooneys, father and son, the president and secretary-treasurer respectively, for their untiring efforts and generosity throughout the year to all interested in the breed. In a broad

sense, Mr. Wisdom said, owing largely to the Rooneys, the time had come when Canada could well set about breeding her own champions instead of importing them from overseas, and he pointed to the winners of the day "Ch. Tanbark Impetus", Best of Breed, and "Tanbark Chink", Best Opposite Sex, as evidence of this. Both dogs, Mr. Wisdom said, were bred by the Rooneys, the senior member of whom he had known for more than twenty years as a dyed-in-the-wool Bull Terrier man and a true friend of the dog and anyone who had the dog's interest at heart. Mr. Wisdom pointed also to the Rooney's part in last year's New York Show, and the fact that the winning puppy, "Combroke Snap", was sired by the Rooneys' "Bricktops Spitfire"; and the second puppy was Mr. Wisdom's own "Tanbark Impetus", again bred by the Rooney father and son partnership, and that the third puppy was their Montreal bred and owned "Buxton Streamline". With these blood lines and others available in Canada, Mr. Wisdom stated that Canada should be well able for years to come to maintain the respect that had been won by Canadian dogs of the past, and that there was little or no need for the importation of ready-made champions.

Mr. Wisdom was followed by Mr. Lewis, of Toronto—"Lewis III" as he should be known in Bull Terrier circles, for he is the third member of a family that parallels the history of the Gales in the United States—the third Lewis, in direct line, to be "bitten by" Bull Terriers, and to show dogs carrying the famous "Charlwood" prefix. This father-to-son, generation after generation, staunchness to the breed is something of which Bull Terrier fanciers and more particularly the dogs themselves have reason to be proud. In England the Hink's have made Bull Terrier history for the best part of a century. In the United States three generations of the Gales's have carried on; in Canada three Lewis's. In Anthony Rooney, Secretary-Treasurer of the Club, Mr. Rooney has a son who can pick them as well as himself; and in Bobby, the "kennelman" at the Tanbark Kennels, Mr. Wisdom is raising an enthusiastic young fancier who will be able to carry on where he leaves off. Such family loyalty is indeed a tribute to the sterling worth and character of "The White Cavalier", for it says very patently that he is most loved where he is best known.

Mr. Lewis seconded graciously and appreciatively Mr. Wisdom's vote of thanks to the officers of the club.

The Secretary then read the minutes of the last general meeting and submitted the club's financial statement, which showed some \$3.75 owing for club trophies and \$1.80 in the bank. The smallness of the figures he pointed out was certainly no indication of smallness in the club's activities, and followed by reading out a long list of the various places at which the Bull Terrier Club of Canada had offered cups and cash prizes during the short time it had been in existence.

Mr. Stan Wisdom, whose name portrays the man, spoke on the "Coloured" question and pointed out the desirability of the club's avoiding being stampeded into any action that might raise controversy at this time. Whilst all present, including the speaker, were ardent enthusiasts for the white dog and the preservation of his purity,

separate registration, etc., there might perhaps be found a solution that would give the Bull Terrier Club of Canada government of the coloureds as well as the whites, and this would be vastly superior to putting them beyond the pale and allowing control to go elsewhere. He recommended all members present and all interested in the White Bull Terrier to become individual members of the Canadian Kennel Club and, working with that governing body, to make the voice of the white dog heard. Mr. Wisdom stated that he had not yet seen the coloured dog worthy of being mated to one of his whites, and, until there was one produced of such surpassing excellence as to make it worth while to breed out all of the trouble bred in, there would be little temptation to Canadian fanciers to make the crosses. He spoke of the beneficial advertising the coloured dogs had derived in the States from the organized opposition with which they had met, and stated it would be in the best interests of the "Whites" to avoid such publicity in Canada. Mr. Rooney, following Mr. Wisdom, cited the case of the late John Miles, of Toronto, a luminary in Bull Terrier lore, who at one time bred a black and tan into his white dogs to eliminate coarseness. Mr. Miles complained bitterly years after of the waste of time and thought. "Coarseness", he told Mr. Rooney, "is something to be gotten rid of by selection. Colour is something I shall never be rid of until I die". Mr. Miles is now dead, but we have with us many black spotted and ticked dogs to testify to the wisdom of his final judgment.

All at the meeting were agreed that the future of the Bull Terrier was never brighter than at the present time, and the spirit of fellowship and good will of the members one towards another certainly augurs well for progress and a new-found popularity.

The question of Specialty Judges was next brought up and it was agreed that, in view of that one day's showing of seventeen entries, the Bull Terrier Club should now be in a position to demand of other show-giving bodies reasonable consideration in the matter of the choice of judges for their dogs. It was asserted and agreed that the Bull Terrier is a highly specialized breed, and that it should never be judged by any man who had neither owned nor bred one, and, whilst it was not considered desirable at this particular moment to submit a list of proposed Specialty Judges to the Canadian Kennel Club, it was hoped that the club would shortly be able to suggest the names of men its members knew to be possessed of the necessary specific knowledge and with whom ad-

vancement of the breed is a first consideration.

The City of Toronto was chosen as the venue for the club's next Specialty Show, and Mr. W. B. Lewis of Toronto (Lewis III) was appointed a committee of one, with power to enlarge, to undertake the actual promotion of the event. Mr. Lewis promised to make it the best and biggest yet.

Lewis III then offered the club a Memorial Trophy in honour of the memory of past members of his family who had been associated with the Bull Terrier, this trophy to be first competed for at the Toronto Specialty Show, 1938.

The election of officers was next on the order of business and the slate of the last two years was adopted enthusiastically and unanimously.
