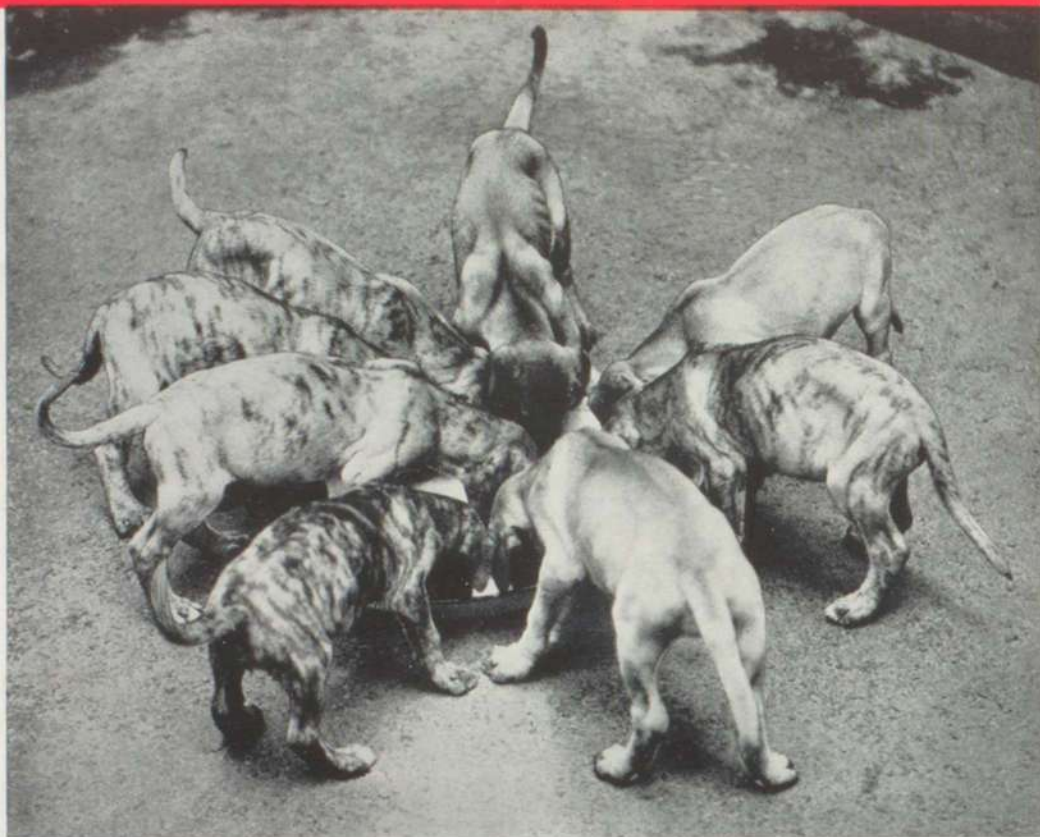

A Puppy's Early Care and Feeding

THE purchase of a puppy is more than just the exchange of money for a young dog. That transaction between breeder and buyer is of secondary importance. The important factor in the transaction is between the puppy and his new master. In return for a comfortable living, a little kindness and a consideration of animal limitations, the puppy promises all the love, loyalty, companionship, protection and service of which only a dog is capable. With the puppy it is a hereditary instinct to carry out his part of the bargain. With his master it requires a little knowledge, an understanding of his pet and an appreciation of a dog's true character.

A pup's housing requirements are limited in the extreme. A basket in the kitchen, pantry or wherever his sanitary misdemeanors are most easily cleaned during house-breaking is all that is necessary for the first few months if the dog be either very young or one of the toy breeds. Larger breeds as they grow older will require a space for exercise—either a spacious run in the garden or a long wire to which their leash can be fastened, allowing them the full run of the wire without the danger of escape onto the roadway.

Outdoor kennels are seldom necessary for most breeds where not more than one dog is kept. He is of more service inside, especially at night and when he sleeps inside there is not the same possibility of him annoying the neighbors with his barking. For some of the larger, sturdier breeds it is healthier to be kept outside at all times; and then a kennel is necessary. It need not be elaborate or expensive. Where a warm shed or stable is available, its use will replace a kennel. Where an individual kennel is necessary, it is best constructed as warm and roomy as possible. Two thicknesses of wood with a sawdust filling make the kennel warm in winter and cool in summer. If the door is cut on one side close to the end the dog can lie out of the wind in colder weather. To prevent dampness the floor should be raised from the ground a couple of inches; and one complete end should swing on hinges to facilitate cleaning.

A puppies feeding equipment is comparatively simple. A non-upsettable bowl for fresh water, kept filled at all times, and another bowl or small pan for food. For long eared breeds a special bowl, fairly narrow at the top and comparatively deep is advisable to prevent the ears from dropping into the food.

Ears continually dragged through food become greasy and matted—a perfect breeding ground for insects.

These utensils must be kept clean at all

times. Just as with humans, dirty feeding utensils cause many a serious illness and, while dogs will often drink from stagnant pools and eat partially decayed garbage, it is folly to invite trouble by allowing pans and bowls to become rancid with old food. Cleanliness cannot be overemphasized both in feeding and in sleeping quarters.

The problem of what to feed a young puppy can best be answered by the breeder who has been feeding him since weaning. He is probably using a mixture he prepares every day for a large kennel of pups, although such a mixture would be neither economical nor convenient for a person with just one or two dogs. The safest procedure is to find out what the puppy has been getting, the amount per feeding and the frequency of meals and stick to that formula for a few days. Then if you desire to make a change in his food, make the change over a period of four days, gradually breaking the puppy in to the new rations. The first day, feed three parts of the old food to one of the new; the second day make it half and half. On the third day use three parts of the new food to one of the old and on to the fourth day use none of the old food at all. Sudden changes will upset a young puppy's stomach and possibly throw him off his food for several days. A gradual change gives him time to accustom himself to the new feeding.

It is folly to underestimate the importance of a balanced diet in a dog's feeding. The requirements of his

body are very similar to those of a human being and excess of any one vitamin and a correspondingly small amount of another will result in the over-development of certain physical parts and the under-development of others. For the average pet owner to analyse diet and balance a dog's rations accordingly is impossible, so the best solution is usually the use of one of the many prepared foods available at most pet supply stores, drug and grocery stores.

Some of these foods are complete in themselves, giving a dog all the necessary vitamins and minerals necessary to complete balanced development. Others require additions to the diet, but if these are necessary they will be marked to that effect on the bag or carton. The selection of a food is an arbitrary matter. There are some foods that certain dogs will refuse and others that they will eat but on which they cannot thrive. The best method of selection is to try some recommended food and watch the pup carefully for a few days. If he shows signs of not doing well, change gradually to some other food until one is found on which the pup does well. Since this publication is operated in the interests of good dogs, any food advertised herein can be considered safe and well tested.

Puppies from weaning time till the age of four months should be fed four times a day in quantities that must be gauged by the owner. Some breeds require much larger portions than others, and it is up to the owner to establish a compromise between thinness and fatness with the axiom in mind that it is better to under-feed than to over-feed. A puppy with a fat little tummy that swells out from the ribs is not in good condition and even though most breeds are more appealing as puppies when they are round and roley-poley, they are much healthier when they look just a little on the lean side.

From the age of four months to six months feeding can be reduced to three times a day, with the same attention paid to quantity. And from six months to a year, a further reduction to twice a day is advisable. After the first year, one good feeding a day is all a normal, healthy dog requires, although two feedings are not harmful.

For all dogs, bones are usually out of the question until after the puppy teeth have been replaced by the stronger, sturdier second teeth. This replacement usually occurs at the age of four to five months and then a good big bone is a splendid exerciser for a puppy's jaws, teeth and digestive organs. Never, under any conditions give even a grown dog small bones such as those from poultry, rabbit or a chop. Such bones as these are apt to break into splinters and lacerate a dog's inside. Large bones only should be allowed, preferably big beef bones which are not as brittle in texture as

others. The dog is equipped with digestive powers so acid that they dissolve the toughest of bone matter. Bones for puppies should be very large and cleaned of all meat that may become tainted. Let him scrape away at a bare bone as much as he likes for it cleans his teeth and gums, although its food value is almost negligible. Two or three bones a week are sufficient for a grown dog, with puppy rations decreased according to age.

A wise pet owner will be constantly on the watch for certain ailments to which a young puppy is particularly susceptible. Among

the most common of these is worms. The importance of keeping a puppy free from this curse cannot be overemphasized because it is often responsible for eczema, malnutrition, indigestion and sometimes inflammation of the bowels. Symptoms of worms include a tight skin, staring coat, depraved appetite, irregularity of the bowels and great distention of the stomach area after feeding. Puppies with worms will twitch in their sleep although this is not always an accurate indication of the presence of worms. A wise puppy owner however, will worm his pet on a regular schedule whether symptoms are present or not. Few puppies escape the disease and it is far better to worm them on the chance that they have worms than not to on the chance that they haven't. While worming procedure will vary with the medicine used, among the most effective is to starve the puppy for about ten hours. At the seventh hour give him a dose of worming medicine or a worming capsule available at any drug or pet supply store. Three hours later give him a little warm milk and then watch for worms in his stools. Another effective method does not require starving—simply a dose of a powerful medicine before feeding. This medicine can be obtained in any drug store, although it is sometimes considered a little powerful for puppies. To be safe, worm a young puppy regularly.

The second common disease one of the deadliest

scourges of the canine race, is distemper. Many breeders recommend inoculations against distemper which are actually a series of injections that give a puppy a mild

True Tales of Real Dogs

I AM telling this story, not only for its dramatic interest, but because it describes one of the very few instances wherein a dog was forced to choose between her own babies and the humans which were her gods. Read it, please, from that angle.

Trixie was a two-year-old fox-terrier; slender, graceful, clever. She belonged to Robert E. White, of 4346 North Sixty-Eighth Street, Birmingham, Alabama.

A long letter from Mr. White, an official of the Alabama state government, lies on my desk here; confirming and adding to the sheaf of newspaper reports which tell of the dog's heroism.

The little foxterrier served Mr. and Mrs. White, with worshipful zest. But her heart belonged chiefly to their twin sons and to Peggy Nell, their pretty daughter. The three youngsters were her playmates and her idols.

Peggy Nell received Trixie as a gift, when the dog was a tiny puppy. Since then, child and terrier have been inseparable chums. The three-year-old twin boys presently were added to Trixie's list of deities.

The quartet was complete: The three little children and a devoted dog. Now for the rest of the yarn:

Mr. and Mrs. White were dead asleep, before dawn, when Trixie hurred herself at their bedroom door, scratching and yelping.

Drowsily, they heard her. But they did not get up to see what might be the matter.

In a cupboard, downstairs, was a basket containing the good little dog's six puppies. They were only three weeks old; and Trixie was fussy and nervous about this first brood of hers. Quite possibly, thought the Whites, some minor trouble with one of the pups had sent the novice mother scampering for human advice or aid.

So they tried to go back to sleep. But they didn't sleep long. Trixie saw to that.

Failing to bring them out into the hall to see what was amiss, the fox-terrier galloped into the nursery. In this big airy room slept the three children and Mr. White's mother. The dog leaped into the children's beds and did not cease her strenuous scratching and yelping until she had waked every occupant of the room.

White turned in an alarm. Trixie rushed back to the nursery, to speed the escape of the children. The firemen arrived in something like record time. Trixie dashed forth to meet them and to lead them indoors.

While she was doing this, the children were carried safely out onto the lawn. The house was empty of its occupants. But Trixie could not know this. As soon as she had ushered the firemen in through the front doorway, she ran to the nursery again.

The smoke was too thick for her to see or scent the absence of the children she loved. Nor could she do anything more to get them out of danger. So she stood guard at the bed of the twins.

Mind you, her own six babies were still in the cupboard; waiting to be rescued. But Trixie put the peril of her little human pals above that of her pups.

She had been a devoted mother. It is not likely she forgot the danger of her offspring. But her first duty and loyalty was to the White children. So there she stayed.

She made her choice; a choice which must have wrung her heart.

White braved the smoke and flame and the intolerable heat; to go to the nursery and carry out the sentinel dog. He took her to the lawn; and showed her all the children gathered there. Now she was free to think of her pups.

Struggling, she leaped from White's arms and sped back into the blazing house; making her way through the torture of smoke and torrid heat to the cupboard where her babies lived.

Again, Mr. White returned indoors and captured her and brought her out to where the puppies, in a basket, alive and unhurt, wriggled about in the bottom of a car. Into the car she leaped with an almost human gasp of relief. The children were safe. The puppies were safe. Nothing else mattered.

Thence, realizing only part of her work was done, she fled back to Mr. and Mrs. White's bedroom door. This time she made such an ungodly din at the lower panels that Mr. White came to quiet her.

She ran a few steps, then stopped and coaxed the man to follow her. So urgent and unmistakable were her actions that White humored her wish. He followed as she led the way excitedly to the kitchen.

The kitchen was full of smoke. The house had caught fire in the cellar. The flames were eating their way upward with a speed which would have turned the whole building into a roaring furnace and would have burned to death every sleeper within it.

Thank you, Hugh Robert Orr, for your very eloquent lines which seem to draw us uncommonly close to the innumerable men who have served the Canadian Kennel Club in days now passed and gone. The very thought of re-living again the years of service given by that invisible army, is a stimulation in itself which cannot be described in written words.

The long period of eighteen years which marked the presidential reign of Mr. Kent, and the even longer period of secretarial service credited to H. B. Donovan, Sr., will necessarily have to be broken up into two or more sections, and, at that, we may be quite unable to chronicle the tireless efforts of both men quite adequately. The year 1899 started out in a most encouraging fashion. The Canadian Fox Terrier Association decided that their Spring show would be held under Canadian Kennel Club rules. George A. Walkem, B.Sc., Vancouver, set out to organize a kennel club in that western city.

The Ottawa Kennel Club had just been organized, largely due to the efforts of A. P. Mutchmor, now of Winnipeg, Man. Mr. Kent was sacrificing time and money in taking his message to the members in person. For that purpose he had attended the shows at Peterboro and at Montreal, and he had paid a surprise visit to the club at Hamilton. From the Canadian Kennel Club's very limited revenue silver and bronze medals were being offered in open competition at shows and trials held under Canadian Kennel Club rules. In fact, all that could be done for the general welfare of Canadian dogdom was being done, and the sum total of the whole was clearly reflected in the secretary's report, as submitted at the annual meeting on September 6th, 1899, wherein he showed a gain of 51 in the membership, and that from the \$980.00 income, no less than \$545.50 had been directly returned to the members through the publishing of their registrations in the Kennel Gazette, refunds to show giving clubs, offering cash prizes, distributing the Gazette and the Stud Book direct to the members free. Because of this

splendid showing, we feel compelled to pay our tribute of appreciation to the Kent-Donovan administration for its obvious determination to bring the Canadian Kennel Club directly to the forefront as a governing body, and because no other such club in existence was offering so much for so little.

It may be worthy of note to mention here the vigorous attack made by the Executive Committee of the Canadian Kennel Club against proposed legislation in respect to the matter of dog licenses which had been before the Ontario Legislature, and was in its second reading, before anyone interested, was aware of its existence or intent, i.e. the taxing of male dogs at \$5.00 each and female dogs at \$10.00 each. With telling effect the members of the Provincial Parliament were canvassed to the point where the iniquitous bill was quietly withdrawn.

The first ten years of Mr. Kent's presidency shows a consistency that is more or less remarkable because of its steady development in respect to registration, membership, dog shows and income. It has been said that figures can be so manipulated as to show most any kind of totals, but the comparative figures we pro-

pose to use here to prove the Club's progress under a business-like management are most intriguing to say the least. For the year 1898 there were 268 registrations, 92 members, 5 shows, Income \$469.38. Expenditure \$394.89. Balance \$94.49.

1899.—397 registrations, 143 members, 7 shows. Income \$1054.99 (first time four figures were reached). Expenditure \$521.99. Balance \$533.00.

1900.—Registrations, 217 members, 4 shows. Income \$1453.75. Expenditure \$783.33. Balance \$670.42.

1901.—491 registrations, 225 members, 9 shows. Income \$1795.67. Expenditure \$995.01. Balance \$800.66. The 9 shows included Canadian Fox Terrier Club, Brantford Kennel Club, Gore Kennel Club (Hamilton), St. Thomas, Western Canada Kennel Club (Winnipeg), Vancouver Island Kennel Club, Montreal Canine Association, Sherbrooke, and Toronto Industrial Exhibition.

1902.—496 registrations, 239 members, 6 shows. Income \$1962.91. Expenditure \$1258.16. Balance \$704.75

1903.—534 registrations, 273 members, 5 shows. Income \$1778.00. Expenditure \$1395.87. Balance \$382.13. It was during this year that a ballot vote of the members, almost unanimously supported the desirability of affiliation with the Kennel Club, England, the Mother Club of the world.

1904.—516 registrations, 245 members, 5 shows. Income \$1594.13. Expenditure \$1292.29. Balance \$301.84. The feature achievement of 1904 was the giving of championship cups to champion dogs, registered owned by members.

1905.—610 registrations, 270 members, 7 shows. Income \$1722.09. Expenditure \$1373.46. Balance \$348.63.

1906.—695 registrations, 267 members, 7 shows. Income \$1856.13. Expenditure \$1544.86. Balance \$311.27. (During 1905 the membership fee was raised from \$2.00 to \$3.00 per year) and the "ten points, three different judges" in respect to Canadian championship was legislated.

1907.—641 registrations, 265 members, 9 shows. Income \$2538.52 (first time an amount in excess of \$2000.00 had been recorded). Expenditure \$1990.60. Balance \$547.92. This year the size of premium lists were standardized to suit the new arrangement whereby the Canadian Kennel Club furnished clubs with their dog show rules.

The year 1907 was featured by the scattering of dog show dates which

kept dog shows prominently before exhibitors and the general public throughout the entire year. The schedule was as follows:

April 13-14—Ontario Kennel Club.
May 9-12—Vancouver Kennel Club.
May 16-19—Victoria Kennel Club.
May 24-25—Brantford Kennel Club.
May 29-June 1st—Montreal Canine Association.
July 10-12—Alberta Kennel Club.
July 25-28—Winnipeg Kennel Club.
September 3-7—Canadian National Exhibition.
September 11-14—Ottawa Kennel Club.

This was the first time that the title of the Toronto Industrial Fair, had been changed to Canadian National Exhibition.

From the foregoing, it will be seen that in the decade covered in this article, whilst it was more or less of an uphill struggle, the principals had the satisfaction of noting that their labors had been steadily rewarded by a consistent development. In the early days, just as it is to-day, memberships, registrations and dog shows were the bone and sinew of the entire Canadian Kennel Club structure. The heart-breaking condition which kept our early officers continuously on the rack, was the scarcity of dog shows and particularly was this condition greatly aggravated when the Montreal Canine Association became a member club of the American Kennel Club and held two shows at Montreal under A.K.C. rules. Victoria Kennel Club, because of the geographical proximity of large American cities also held a show under A.K.C. rules. St. John, N.B., had held a show under A.K.C. rules in 1886 and was skeptical of the influence of the Canadian Kennel Club, and so the early shows at Saint John were sometimes held without championship standing thus allowing our Eastern friends the protection of a neutral platform. It can be easily imagined, that the year 1907, with its nine shows, furnished the greatest measure of satisfaction for the first decade of our history.

The dog shows held in connection with the Industrial Fair, afterwards

the Toronto Industrial, then the Canadian National and now the Canadian National Exhibition, whilst always the most attractive of Canadian dog shows, has not really developed in unison with that great institution. Thirty-five years ago 647 dogs were benched, with a total of 1,014 entries, and on Monday (Labor Day) September 7th, 1903, 13,000 people passed through the turnstiles after depositing 10 cents apiece for their passports. When shall we see the early objective of 1000 dogs benched at the C.N.E., an objective attained.

JOHN G. KENT

Eighth president of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc.
September 7, 1898 December 15, 1916

Next month we will cover the balance of Mr. Kent's presidency which came to an end on December 15th, 1916.

Following is an open letter from Mr. Kent published in the Kennel Gazette of January, 1899:

"It occurred to me that as the next meeting of the Executive of the C.K.C. was to be held on the 10th of next month and at that meeting the constitution and rules would come up for revision it would be well to invite all members of the Club to make any suggestions they thought would add

to the value of either or both, so that we could have them as near perfection as possible. There is nothing like discussion to bring out the different ideas of the various members of any club, and I am sorry that our members do not use more space in your paper sometimes in regard to the different matters pertaining to the C.K.C., as it would show that there was a little more interest being taken in its doings at any rate, if nothing more. The Executive often feel the want of this and I hope when this important matter comes before them next month we will have a number of good useful suggestions to act upon.

"Another thing that I want to say, and I hope many of our old friends will see this and think over it, and that is the feeling of regret that I have at finding so many old members year by year dropping out of the C.K.C. because, possibly, they are not actively interested in breeding or for some other reason, but why should this be? The old Club should grow dearer by old associations, and it seems to me the longer we have been members of it and watched it through its ups and downs, the harder it should be to break away. We newer hands at the helm miss them for experience counts in dogdom as well as anywhere else, and there is possibly a pang of regret in their own heart when they make the final severance. Now, why could we not have a number of our old mem-

bers come in this year and take the same interest in the Club they did a few years ago. They would be welcomed back in such a way that would, I am sure, make them feel that even though they had been "away from home" they had not been forgotten.

"Now, I hope as I said before they will think over this matter well, and I know if they do they will send in their application right away.

The White Cavalier

THE Bullterrier is little known and less understood by the public at large. But by every dog man, whether or not they breed him, he is respected for his intelligence, courage and ability. As a dog partner of mine, now dead, once put it for all time: "He can do anything any other dog can do; then lick him."

But the Bullterrier is not quarrelsome. If he fights he doesn't fight to lose, but, none the less, he is endowed with a splendid character and a very gentle heart—an honest, all-giving heart that, any day of any week, can put my human selfishness, vanity, avarice and ambition to shame.

I came to breed Bullterriers because in my association with all dogs I came first to admire, then to love them above all others. If, today, I may fairly be accused of a fondness that amounts to sentimentality, I'll plead guilty; but I'll say, too, that I was led to them by the practical considerations that most everyone must take into account.

Living in town, and in an apartment, I had to consider my neighbours and find a dog that would not bark unnecessarily. In this respect the Bullterrier is second only to the new-found Basenjis, the newest importation from Africa that doesn't bark because it cannot. The Bullterrier most decidedly can bark, and when he does, it is a full, deep-chested, he-dog's bark that is well worth listening to, for it usually tells you that there is something to bark about. As a silent, intelligent watch-dog that commands respect, the Bullterrier measures up.

I am a Dad and I had to have a dog that would be fond of the children. All dogs are naturally fond of children and there is no sweeter sight than that of a good dog and a child playing together. Never let me claim that the Bullterrier is the one and only possessor of a natural affinity for youngsters, but I do say emphatically and unhesitatingly that there is none that enjoys the society of children more, and that I have never in my entire life and association with dogs, even heard of a Bullterrier laying a tooth on a child. I have known Bullterriers who would obey me in all things else, to deliberately flaunt me and break across a busy street just to wag a friendly greeting and say "Hullo" to some unknown kiddie who had nothing more in the way of attraction to offer the dog than his very childishness. They have a natural sympathy and friendship for children, and as a companion and a guard for youngsters the Bullterrier again measures up.

I had to have a dog that was a family dog—not a "one-man" dog who would lavish all of his fondness on me at the expense of everyone else in the home. I wanted a dog that would not wander or stray, that would scorn the friendly "Come along doggie" of inviting strangers. The Bullterrier measured up.

Size is most important. I had to look for a dog neither too small nor too large. Strong and sturdy, his weight confined to limited compass, powerful enough to stop anything on four feet, the Bullterrier is just the right size, and

a guard dog as well as a watch dog. His very appearance is a deterrent to undesirables, and unwise indeed would be the intruder who persisted in his intrusion after hearing a Bullterrier's quiet throat warning and seeing his tail straighten out on a line with his body. That means action, and once the White Cavalier's fighting spirit is aroused

and he goes into battle with man or beast, a veritable tornado has been loosed. On size, the Bullterrier most decidedly measures up.

Living in town, I wanted a dog the right height from the ground—neither high enough to be inconvenient around and under the furniture, nor low enough for his coat to pick up and bring into the home, the grease, dirt germs and dust of the streets. The Bullterrier's short white coat is as



near to a blessing as any dog's coat can be, for they all must fall at certain times, and those short, stiff, white hairs are the easiest picked up from rugs by broom, carpet sweeper or vacuum. Winter or Summer, the Bullterrier needs no clipping, trimming or beautifying, and, if you do not care for the task, brushing can also be dispensed with. With the housewife the Bullterrier measures up.

A sound constitution I had to have. Sickness is trouble. We have enough of it in the world without inviting it into our homes. A hardy constitution I, of course, knew was the Bullterrier's own special gift from Heaven. He is a hearty feeder and a good doer, not readily subject to the ordinary canine ailments.

Some children leave on their plates until the last of a meal the things they like most. I think I have played rather like that in leaving to the last the thing I demand first, last and always in all dogs. Intelligence is essential. Without it a dog has little to offer in the way of companionship or anything else. That the Bullterrier is possessed of it to a remarkable degree is attested by many prominent authorities. Sir Walter Scott tells us that the most intelligent animal he ever owned was a dog called a "Bull and Terrier." A prominent authority of zoology and a professor of one of the leading universities in the United States rates the three most intelligent of nature's creations below man in the following manner:

First, the ant; second, the elephant; third, the Bullterrier. The Bullterrier, note you,—not "the dog," which he might as easily have said. Many are the stories of Bullterrier sagacity and intelligence, and I have known dogs that have left us wondering whether they actually reasoned and worked things out for themselves. One male Bullterrier we owned actually went out and foraged parcels of garbage for a litter of puppies that had been born to his blind sister. He realized she could not see and thought she

could not feed them. At night he would round the puppies up and cuddle them into his body as though he were their mother. Another dog came back to Montreal all the way from Cornwall, Ont. He had been shipped by Express in a crate. Ten months later he was back at our front door, and a telephone call to Cornwall soon established the fact that he must have walked all the way by road. We all of us read recently in the syndicated articles of Albert Payson Terhune, "Calling All Dogs," of a Bullterrier that begged food at lunch-time from the workers of a factory in the United States and was seen to disappear with it under a shed. Finally, there was discovered beneath the floor-boards of the shed a spaniel who had had her two hind legs cut off by a train. The Bullterrier had been nursing and feeding her for days.

Ladies or gentlemen, in town or country, with or without space, in flat, apartment or other city dwelling, the Bullterrier measures up to most every man's requirements of a good dog. Let us hope to measure up to his small requirements of us and learn to know and love him.

customs and traditions of her beloved Old China. The little Palace Dogs were no exception and were bred with the utmost care and greatly cherished.

As a token of the highest esteem Tzu Hsi would occasionally, "with befitting pomp and ceremony" present a Pekingese dog to a foreign minister or envoy of great rank, but somehow these dogs generally met with an unexpected and mysterious end before leaving China.

Tzu Hsi died in 1908 and preceding her coffin her favourite Pekingese was led by the chief Eunuch, accompanying the last Sovereign of China to the cemetery. After her death, an

Now let us all get together and do our share towards keeping Collies to the fore.

The Collie Club of America hold their 1938 Specialty show in connection with Morris and Essex. A great entry is expected and the prizes will be well worth trying for. The futurity class alone divides over two hundred dollars in four prizes; and in each class to win a fourth will pay your entry fees. Besides this there are many sterling silver prizes.

This club has been issuing a year book of high order for several years back. These cannot be bought but are given to members of the club and are valued as priceless gifts. It is pleasing to note that the preparation of the next year-book will be under the capable direction of Mr. Dick Eames of Clinton Corners, New York, and a great book may be expected.

Hugh Leslie, of Rosetown, an ardent Collie, recently underwent a serious operation. It is said that when Hughie was at his worst the nurse dropped a Collie puppy into his bed and noted an immediate improvement.

Well bred Collies of show type are frequently accused of being useless as workers. This, of course, is a gross libel on the breed and is not supported by facts. We have good reason to believe that as high a percentage of well bred Collies develop into good workers as those not so well bred.

In this connection we have at least two breeders that are specializing in show-bred Collies that are trained to work. One of these is Mrs. Gladys D. Johnston of Lone Rock, Sask., who for years has been breeding from the most fashionable blood lines and training these dogs to do farm work. It will be interesting to turn back to the last Christmas number of Kennel and Bench and re-read Mr. Johnston's article on working Collies. The other breeder I have in mind is Mrs. A. Jean O'Mahoney of Canfield, Ontario, who informs me her Collies which are bred in the purple are regularly trained to drive and herd various kinds of live stock as well as to act as guards and perform other useful duties about the farm. Mrs. O'Mahoney breeds Tricolors, Sables and Blue Merles and they take charge of her herd of pure bred Jerseys and her poultry.

From the Pacific Coast comes the good news that Mrs. W. A. Mounfield of Bannockburn Collie Kennels (Registered) of New Westminster has so far recovered that she is able to re-

sume her Collie activities. Kennels have been enlarged and improved. Her Bannockburn's Sweetheart appears to be a real one. Sweetheart went best of breed and best working pup at Victoria. Again at the Coast City show she went best of breed and at these two shows won five points. She will no doubt make the title in short order. J. T. C.

Dale of Honeybrook, owned by Miss Doreen Keffer, started his show career well, going best of winners three times and reserve winners dogs twice, in the five shows in which he was entered. He was reserve to Am. Ch. Astolat Peerless, owned by R. G. Wills, of Cleveland, at London. Peerless was a surprise visitor to the London and Windsor shows. He is a beautiful specimen of the breed, with numerous wins in the States, having once gone Best in Show.

YOU ARE SUMMONED TO APPEAR, and show just cause, WHY you should not deliver to the scribe for the western section, all news, and interesting facts concerning your own and all other cocker spaniels. The territory included in this section extends from the western boundary of the Province of Ontario, to the eastern extremity of the old Pacific, and from the forty-ninth parallel, to the Arctic, so you see it embraces a vast amount of space. But contained therein is a land teeming with all kinds of wild-fowl, and what breed of dog is better adapted to hunt each type than Cockers.

Little doubt exists that the Cocker is among the most ancient of the spaniel family. He derives the name from the fact that he was first used as an aid to the gun in shooting woodcock, being a handy little dog in getting through the dense thickets and bramble, while as a retriever he has probably not his equal, for nose, and cleverness. At all the shows the Cocker section is the very largest, and the interest in this merry little sportsman probably keener than in any other breed.

The chief points to aim at in breeding Cocker Spaniels are compactness of body, straightness of forelegs, squareness of muzzle, dark eye, and flat coat, with a down carriage of stern.

The Cocker, unlike the field varieties, is free from abnormalities, being a rationally built, and symmetrical little dog, full of buoyancy, and beaming with intelligence, and of tireless energy. The above features and characteristics in the dog, account for its popularity.

Mr. George W. Leavitt, of Boston, Mass., a famous racehorse breeder of yesterday, did very much to improve the cocker standard, and another race horse man in New York, is to-day carrying on (Herman Mellenthin) and of course it was while Clarks Dare, a Canadian product, was making a noted win, at the garden, that attracted the latter to the dog game. And did you know that it was the same Scotty Kynock, of Silverdale, that fitted the Clark dogs, and that he has always packed a Cocker around ever since, and only last week appeared at the Saskatoon show with a nice string.

Mr. Jack Goff, of Medicine Hat,

Alberta, has had one round of success after another with his winning puppy, Skyrocket of Sunalta, born Aug. 3rd, 1937. This youngster has already gone places. Champion Blitz Von Doggenburg is the proud papa and there are some puppies leaving for the United States this month who will do better than the famous sisters.

Morris and Essex is our next port of call, and honours will be upheld by Ch. Alva Gretta (we hope), (Ch. The Dictator, Ch. Naltys Max, Ch. Aslan V. Loheland, and others who we are sure will bring back a good share of the awards.

The editor of this column wishes to take this opportunity to thank the editor of Kennel and Bench for the invitation to take up the gauntlet for the Irish Terrier.

At the outset, I may say that I think the Irish terrier the most neglected breed known. I mean by that that they are neglected and overlooked from all quarters. No later than two months ago they were not even mentioned in the puppy issue of Kennel and Bench which mentioned all other breeds of any note and some of none.

Some of the best Irish terriers in America have been bred in Ontario during the past few years, but while they were in this country they were just Irish terriers. Immediately they were exhibited in the United States, they won group after group—and rightly so. It is up to Canadian breeders to see that we have more attention paid to one of the most valuable breeds in the world.

It is very gratifying to see the increase in members of the Irish fancy and the improvement in quality these past 10 years. Ten years ago I used to take a male and a female to a show and very often I would be alone with my entry. At a recent show in Toronto, 35 dogs were benched and 90 per cent of them were real quality.

While I do not intend to write this column to boost Newtownards stock, a good percentage of today's Irish can be traced to my kennels. Out of 146 entries at New York terrier show this year, 63 of the entries can be traced to my kennels. One of them was best in show, Jimmie Martin's Ch. Irish Battler, who brought back with her a splendid honor for Canada.

While I have missed all the shows in Canada this year, I am following the results very closely and I want to congratulate A. Palmer on finishing his recently imported Shilvoden Boy. Shilvoden Boy's sire, Slemish Splendid, is cutting wide swaths in the United States. To my mind he is a wonderful terrier and it looks now as though his Canadian son is performing a duplication of his success.

Recent sales to the United States would indicate a change has taken place in the dog world. A few years ago all the good ones used to be sought overseas. Since February, here are just a few of the sales to American fanciers.

Our thanks to the management of Kennel and Bench for the opportunity to print whatever worth-while news we may gather from the Canadian breeders and owners of Welsh Corgis each month.

I am going to appeal to the breeders and owners of the Corgi to do their part in making these notes possible by sending me any news they may have. By doing so, you will be doing your part, not only in advancing our breed, but in placing the Corgi among the older breeds in this country in the breed notes established in the May issue.

As a Westerner, I shall be looking forward to Eastern Corgi owners to add to the notes each month, and let the West know of events in the East. Breeders in the West have a responsibility in keeping the East informed.

The Welsh Corgi was introduced to Western Canada a little more than six years ago, by Mr. R. H. M. Gardener who brought a pair to Alberta from England, and has from time to time imported others of the same breed.

The dog shows in Edmonton have seen quite a fair number in the last couple of years.

The writer had a Corgi in the Red Cross show as early as March, 1934, and I believe that was the first of the breed to be shown in Canada, if you readers know of an earlier entry, let me know.

From that time, we have always had a fairly good entry.

There is now another breeder of the Corgi in Alberta, in Miss J. L. Batten, and so, between the two breeders here, the number of Welsh Corgis have increased in the shows, the Corgis have averaged nine, in the last three dog shows held in Edmonton.

How do Scottish terriers retain their popularity? In a large measure, it is undoubtedly due to the mental picture retained by commercial illustrators, cover designers, artists, fashion stylists, etc., of a cocky little old fashioned "distinctivuality" (not bad!) always trotting along at a definite tempo, deep in concentration as if on his way to a directors meeting or something equally important. It's the gait that gets them. Head up, tail up, a strong and rugged little personality, intent on minding his own business. A "distinctivuality" with that certain "umph" that is irresistible. When choosing a stud, see that he has "it", and you will be doing your part in retaining popularity in the public mind of the Scottish terrier.

May was the month of shows, with the Scottie well up in front, in the toughest spot, especially during the spring circuit. I refer to the terrier group, since any of the dogs competing could be put up and the judge would not be making a mistake.

Alf. Delmont did a good job at the Hamilton Kennel Club show. Alf has a reputation as a terrier judge hard to equal and is well liked in Scottie circles. He put Susan of Agbrigg up for best of breed over Haldon Crystal who was placed over Jessica O'Bonnyrigg for winners bitch. Incidentally, Jessica finished at Guelph, needing only one point for her championship.

She has been bred to Heather Sensation son of Heather Realization and is due to whelp on or about June 12.

The Guelph Kennel Club, of which Dr. and Mrs. Batt, of the Haldon prefix, are leading lights, put on an excellent show, although marred somewhat at the opening by the announcement that Bert Swann would be unable to judge due to his illness, the result of which will leave a vacant spot in the Canadian fancy for many years to come. Jack Waggett officiated with a fearless determination, based on a half century of experience with dogs, to place them as he saw them. Ch. Haldon Bagniper, ably handled by Bob McAdam, narrowly missed best of breed but was finally put second to Susan of Agbrigg. The champion had its innings later by going best local dog, any breed, in a large entry. The I.O.D.E., Mr. Guthrie, et al, have our hearty congratulations for a successful show and particular credit is due Wm. Rushton, the competent show secretary on whose shoulders fell the greater burden and whose capable management kept the show moving faultlessly.

As Mrs. Secretan says, "when it comes to doing anything, leave it to a woman". The Toronto Ladies Kennel Club held their show at the Coliseum. We recognized two judges from Buffalo who officiated at a recent sanction show of the Boston Terrier Club at a time when we were grooming young Aberdeen's Braw Wee Dougal for future C.K.C. shows. Mr. Hager, of Buffalo, the terrier judge, placed Haldon Sovereign best of breed and Susan of Agbrigg winners. Mr. Howard, of Merlin Kennels, Montreal, had a very nice little bitch, Merlin Gabelle, entered, but was unlucky on that day. Mr. Howard is well informed on Scottie matters and we enjoyed our chat together. Boldmere Binder looked very fit for this occasion and ringside comment would have had him placed higher. Mr. Stewart's Chanters Jaunty Lad was absent due to lack of coat and we missed an entry from A. J. Milne, of Brantford, the owner of last year's champion, Ardmore Argyle. We heard at London that Mr. Milne has purchased a "showy little specimen" from A. and J. Sinclair (father and son) who own Heather Robin, Heather Lightstone and several other good ones.

The Toronto Ladies ring stewardesses looked very smart in specially made smocks with the club's insignia on their sleeves. The trophies were up to a very high standard and altogether it was a most successful effort on the part of the ladies.

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Canada—London—brought out several breeders and their exhibits who consider Toronto too far to come for a dog show. As a result, we were in an entirely new Scottie atmosphere. Alva Rosenberg, of Brooklyn, N.Y., officiated. It was an experience decidedly worth while, watching him at work. Equipped with long, lean hands that delve into the hidden depths of a dog's coat and furnishings, with discerning gray eyes, he was a most interesting personality.

London is a "hot spot" for Scotties, with Mrs. H. C. Lefroy, of Hyde Park P.O., showing a nice coated one in a son of Heather Sensation ably handled by Bill Adair, Dr. Boulding's kennel manager. The judge saw fit to comment on this one. Mr. Roberts had two typey specimens also sired by Heather Sensation which he recently purchased from Andrew Dunn, of Port Credit. Not to be denied, Boldmere Binder went winners under the capable handling of Alf Loveridge; and Susan of Agbrigg best of breed, put down in tip-top form by Ted Ward.

We have received a great deal of encouragement regarding our efforts in this column from members inside and outside the fancy; especially one from W. J. Risewick, the popular proprietor of Wellstone Kennels and enthusiastic director of the Canadian Kennel Club.

Mrs. Batt, of the Haldon Kennels, will be in England about the time of going to press.

A letter just received from Laguna Beach, Cal., from Mrs. Katherine L. Orr, whose Canadian address is 70 Blackburn Ave., Ottawa, to the effect

that her bitch "Judith of Doone" was bred to Ch. Bothkennar Fashion Plate, a well known dog on the coast, and now has four beautiful puppies to bring home with her.

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DOBERMAN PINSCHERS

Our spring shows have started off with splendid entries for our breed, with the bitches having somewhat more quality than the dogs. This is a healthy condition providing our exhibitors when they decide to breed, use the best stud dog that their purse will allow, and not just use the nearest or cheapest dog. At the Toronto show held Good Friday and Saturday five dogs and two bitches made a good entry for a two day show. Miss Eleanor Warde of Toronto made her first entry in a couple of years with three nine month old male pups carrying her kennel name of Kiswar. The placings at this show appeared in the May issue of Kennel & Bench. The Hamilton show on April 23rd, had an entry of seven with six bitches and one dog on the list. Winners dog being Pocahontas Koneg, a young uncropped red dog. Solvent Ruffels owned by Mr. L. Cornell, of Buffalo, N.Y., went winners bitch and on to best of breed, and completed her Canadian championship. The competition between the four in open bitches was particularly keen and three of the four could finish their championship if favoured by

the judge that day. Anyone of the four was good enough to win and the placing was directly opposite to our last clash. Our Buffalo friend always shows his bitch in beautiful condition and, win or lose, enjoys our Canadian shows.

While a Doberman is an easy one to get ready for a show, you just cannot condition a wormy dog. The worm that seems to be the most common in our breed is the hook worm. For some unknown reason many of our Canadian vets will worm for every kind of worm but the one that is the most common, particularly those over the young puppy stage. I admit that they cannot be seen except under a strong glass but they are very damaging to a dog. One of the first things to do early in the year is to use a Nema Capsule put up by Parke, Davis Co. but be sure to follow the instructions to the letter. The treatment is somewhat drastic but very effective. Grooming with a fine tooth comb and brush, followed by a brisk rub with a cloth will add much to the appearance and condition of the coat. Some think that because of the short coat no grooming is needed, or that on the day of the show a little Brilliantine will do the trick. Healthy gloss on the coat comes from the inside and a reliable judge will note the beauty-parlor methods on the outside.

I am often asked if a Doberman has a good nose. The answer is definitely yes, although certain blood lines are much superior for trailing and man work. Personally I believe some breed of hound has been used in manufacturing the present day Dobe. They have as a rule a good nose for birds or rabbits. I know of quite a few dogs in our North country and we will soon be able to learn if they will work well on deer. Some of the breeders in the Southern States, living on farms claim that their dogs make excellent cattle dogs, but I have never seen them in action. Our good friend Willie Necker of Lake Villa, Ill., who put on such a splendid exhibition of trained Dobermans in connection with the horse show at the Toronto Winter Fair last year, told me of working two of his famous dogs, Amos and

Lottie, in a field trial in the State of Wisconsin. His dogs had never been trained for hunting birds and were entered during the trials on a dare from one of the bird dog men, and both won a rating by the judges of around 85%. Tiger, another of his famous dogs, was fully trained for life saving, but was lacking somewhat in size to keep a full grown man afloat and swim to shore. Tiger is very intelligent and got most of his training by watching his owner train a Newfoundland for life saving. With Willie treading water Tiger would soon drag him to shore but in the case of a drowning man offering resistance the attempt might not be successful.

It is quite evident that we have a very active specialty club on the Pacific coast. I believe it to be the only one in Canada. I am indebted to Mr. Jasper M. Daniels of the Von Dorn Kennels, President of the Doberman Pinscher Club of British Columbia for the following news items:—

Mr. Robert Hunter, manager of the Purdey Cafes in Vancouver, has purchased that splendid trained dog, Franz von Dorn. Franz has not been shown at a bench show yet but we hope his new owner will enter him in some of our coming shows.

Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Huggins who have leased the black bitch, Flo of Kitsitano, report a litter of six males sired by the red Holland stud Tinker. These pups are all black and rust, and are full brothers of both the reserve winners dog and bitch at the Coast City Club show, April 16th.

Dilla von Dorn, affectionately known to the Vancouver Dobe fraternity as "Sissy", finished her championship at the Coast City Club show at Vancouver April 16th, making four points. The week before that she went winners at the Victoria show. Sissy is out of Ch. Beda of Plantation Grove and sired by Ch. Harrad v. Hahn. Her little brother, Dan von Dorn, lacks only two points so it looks like 2 champs in one litter.

Charles and Milne Urquhart, of Vancouver, who have on lease Delia von Dorn, rejoice the arrival of a litter of eight black and tan sired by Rolf v. Lackanblick.



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WEST HIGHLAND WHITE TERRIERS

Writing about that old show-coat last month, brought to my mind the really heroic efforts it has taken to establish West Highlands here. One hears great tales of the "old days" in New York, when there were thirty in a class at Madison Square Gardens, but I cannot find any record of such a thing here.

The struggle to really build up the breed, popularize it and at the same time keep it exclusive, has been an interesting story. When my husband brought his two from Argyllshire in 1927, there were several families loving and when possible, breeding the "white earthe dogges" hereabouts. . . . the Goldies in Guelph, Major and Mrs. Nielson and Mr. and Mrs. Charles Biscoe in Toronto. There was of course, an odd pet or two, very much cherished, but for the most part imported at considerable cost from England, Scotland or the United States. It is safe to say, however, that there was little or no really serious breeding being done, and this was certainly not to be wondered at. A registered Westie sire was a *rare avis*.

Very soon after our dear Archie, son of my husband's historic bitch "Sniezjka", came to Canada from Dunstaffnage Castle in Argyllshire, we lost him; he died in his sleep, at the age of eight. He did, however, leave one son by his Scotch consort, Diana, Archie II. He was to be the pride of a new Canadian dynasty—

and he was cut down in the very flower of his youth, hardly a year old, when he was killed by a motor car. It left us without a single male in our own then very embryonic kennel, and in the same situation as the rest of the devotees of the breed in Canada.

Truly enough, there was, at that time, within the radius of Toronto, one "white hope"—a veteran champion owned by another Scottish veteran—one Donald Mackellar of Oak-

ville, police constable of parts and a breeder of Scotties from away back. In this part of the world we fanciers besieged Mr. Mackellar regularly for

the services of his bridegroom, which latter, being more full of years than of romance, left our nurseries still ruefully empty.

We were quite desperate until the late Victor Ross imported for his daughter Eleanor (now Mrs. C. D. Stewart of Barrie) a little beauty named "Rovan". In services to our kennel, at any rate, he held the fort for some time. However, we were determined to build our own breeding force, and in 1929, my husband's dear friend, Campbell of Dunstaffnage, escorted our second imported sire from Scotland. He was a "Cooden" dog, but registered through Donald Hunter of Oban as "Ardsheal Dunstaffnage". He died most unaccountably the morning that his first progeny were born—a litter of four daughters! They were grand puppies, but our spirits were seriously dampened for a while. We began to think that perhaps it was hopeless to try to do anything. We took heart again, only when we heard that the late Rosewell Goldie had left in his estate (the dog had arrived in this country only a few days before his death) another beautiful Cooden dog. We travelled to Guelph in time to persuade Miss Frances Goldie to let us buy him.

Eureka! That was our beautiful "Solo"—Cooden Solario—the finest West Highland dog to come to this country up to that time. "Solo" lived long enough to give us all some wonderful foundation stock—a daughter of ours who at eight months beat an entry of eight bitches, some of them imported and champions, and who herself became a champion at nine months; and a son, Robin. Mrs. Biscoe bred one of her good bitches to "Solo",

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
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and after his tragic death—he was killed by a connivance of circumstances too intricate to detail here—we brought this son from the litter. He too became a champion; is still a pillar of the breed, privately owned by Mrs. Dean Gooderham of Toronto.

And here, no less a personage than Ottawa's "Gentleman of the Black Rod" stepped into the picture. Major Thomson of Cayuga, brought back a darling from England—"Ch. Derri-ford Ben". Ben was small and full of what it takes. We all loved him and bred to him quite extensively, and he has left an indelible mark upon the best in the breed in these parts. Mrs. Nielson got her fine "Ch. Ronny of Braco" by him, and in Ottawa, the Blinkbonny Kennels have a number of good ones of his blood. He was the sire of our "Ch. Aetna's" last puppies, and they have given us some of our best stock. Our snowy "Cinderella" and "Bully", brood matrons supreme, are his get. I believe Mr. Devereux of Bracebridge has a champion bitch of his descent.

Once again, however, we tried our luck in importing a fine sire. We ordered a litter brother of the earlier Ardheal Dunstaffnage, this one conventionally registered "Cooden Sandstorm". He, with Solo's daughter, established a very showy strain. Mated to "Ch. Aetna", he gave us "Ch. Coto-paxi". Mr. Ross of Montreal, in judging him, once pronounced him "the almost perfect West Highland white terrier", but we parted with "Sandy" because he never seemed to be in real show coat. We sold him to Charlie Ruggles, the Hollywood film star, under whose aegis he soon became an American champion, and is considered the "head man" of the famous "See Are" Kennels in California. One thing about "Sandy" was that he threw puppies as white as snow, and evidently the southern climate agrees better with his own coat, for he has consistently won over big entries in the United States.

So the white doggies have come and gone. The Nielsons and the Biscoes have given up breeding here—the Nielsons gone to England and their dogs disposed of; the Biscoe's matrons retired. The last good little dog of the Goldie family, "Trusty Boy", has passed to his fathers. Our own dear Aetna died, undefeated by dog or bitch, in her third year. Yet we felt that since the breed lost "Cooden Solario", imported by Mr. Goldie and later our "Solo", we had never had a really spectacular example in Canada. And that, after ten years of trying! Our minds went back to Scotland, and to our good angel, Dunstaffnage, who, like Malcolm of Poltalloch, is one of the first authorities on the breed.

We think he found us one, for "Ch. Rowmore Ardifuir", the dog he picked and sent us, is the only West Highland terrier ever to go best in terrier group on this continent. After two years, he is still the joy of our hearts and the pride of our kennel, and we hope, a boon to our fancy in this country. We believe that he has lifted the "jinx" that once beset our little lairds. Westies, God bless them, are on the map at last!

Now, lest this department become entirely historical, I have to announce that it is doing some practical work. I hear from Miss Rosamond Billett of

Victoria, that through our offices "a marriage has been arranged" for her "Kirsty", at Kaslo, B.C., where Mrs. Barclay is weaving the "Westywool" from all our combings. And I hear in turn from Mrs. Barclay, who has just returned from Nelson, B.C., that in that town they are clamoring for Westy pups!

I shall now conclude with the well-known plaint of department-conductors. Won't you let me hear from you? So far, East is East, but only West seems to be Westy. There must be something going on this side of the Rockies.—A.E.B.

GERMAN SHEPHERD DOGS

The writer considers this opportunity to report the shows and doings of that most maligned breed, the German shepherd dog, a distinct honor and privilege; and I sincerely hope that any fancier of this great dog whom I can help in any way will not hesitate to write to me, as I feel that we are all interested in the breeding and showing of that grand breed, the German shepherd dog.

The Hamilton show on April 23 is now a thing of the past, but our breed had such a splendid entry there that I feel I should report the highlights. We had fifty-three entries which, I believe, is the largest in several years. The Hamilton Kennel Club, and particularly Mr. and Mrs. Ray Mall, truly deserve all the compliments heaped on the show. Our judge, Miss Marie Leary, owner of the Casalla Kennels, Greenwich, Conn., and an outstanding authority on the breed, made a splendid impression, judging the dogs on the point system used by the Germans at their Seigar shows.

On the average the dogs were splendid specimens, all indicating the decided upward step toward quality and temperament our breed has made in the past few years. Mr. and Mrs. Marshall Soules, of Toronto, are owners of the winners bitch, Sandra of Dunbar, who also went on to win the coveted honor, best of breed—a richly deserved win. Mr. and Mrs. Soules are to be congratulated for breeding such a splendid female. As a puppy she showed great promise and since then that promise has been fulfilled. Sandra is the ideal size, low to the ground with plenty of substance and a smooth flowing gait—an ideal breeding type of bitch that should go far in the show ring.

Winners dog was Peter of Briardale, very much of the same type as winners bitch—black and cream, low set, with heavy bone and a very deep body.

I am sorry to report that our breed had a very small entry at Guelph—only nine dogs and those entered by the "old guard" of German shepherds in this part of the country. The Guelph Kennel Club has an ideal spot for their show and, with all new benching, deserved a much larger entry. Winners dog was Peter of Briardale, bunting the winners bitch,

Brenda of Briardale, for best of breed.

The Toronto Ladies Kennel Club show had a rather better entry than at Guelph, 17 dogs in all. It was a pleasure to see Dr. and Mrs. Frazier, of Stratford, very keen shepherd fanciers, with their lovely puppies sired by Ch. Dewet von Starrenburg. These puppies show splendid promise. Good luck to them.

Winners dog was Kerry of Northmere, owned by Cameron Chisholm. Kerry is a dog of outstanding German shepherd expression and was put down in perfect condition. Winners bitch was Valerie of Northmere, owned by Alex Gooderham, and she went on from there to take best of breed. This bitch is ideal in type—a black and tan of small size, very hard in muscular development and perfect in temperament. Mr. Gooderham must be deservedly proud to own such a lovely specimen.

Cameron Chisholm is now the owner of Oder Von Bern, a German bitch purchased from John Gans, the owner of the 1937 German Seigar. Oder is a daughter of Vikki Von Bern, one of the really good bitches in Germany, and is sired by Wigand Von Blasienburg—an ideal combination of bloodlines which should do the breed in Canada a lot of good.

In closing, may I ask that all Eastern owners and breeders of German shepherd dogs send me news of their dogs and kennels each month in order that this column may accurately present the German shepherd picture in this part of the country.—T. W.

was bred by Tobias Ott of Germany. Katja was twice Seigerin of Germany; in 1928 and 1929. Austrian Seigerin of 1928 and Holland Seigerin of 1929. She was acclaimed American Seigerin and Champion in 1930 and made her Canadian championship in 1931; she returned to the ring last year to compete in the Obedience Tests and won her C.D. Critics acclaim her to be

the most perfect dog of her breed to date; her show career would substantiate the acclaim, as in her entire show career she was never defeated. I believe I am quite safe in stating she is possibly the only dog of any breed able to claim such a distinction.

Katja was the daughter of Samson and Anni v. both-Blasienberg. Aside from her enviable show career, she possessed the most marvelous character which endeared her to Mr. and Mrs. Sidney, Jr., of California, who acquired Katja when she was four years old. She remained their constant companion until her death last March caused by an acute case of Leukemia. To her owners may I extend the sympathy of the entire Canadian Fancy as well as my own. The tribute paid Katja by Mr. Lloyd C. Brackett is the nicest eulogy one could ever read and my efforts seem wholly inadequate, but very sincere.

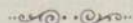

Few judges take such pains in going over their entries as does Dr. Rutherford, judge at Windsor. He looked particularly for movement and soundness and there were many compliments for his thoroughness. His dog, Ch. Fleetwood Dan, requires only one point for his Canadian championship, and his international championship.

Hence, as time progresses, I hope to see in print the views of others as well as my own.

In my opinion the springer spaniel to-day is at a critical stage, not only in Canada but also in the United

States. I have had several letters from my friends across the line during the last few months and I gather that some of the real "big shots" in the springer game across the line seem to think that some of the present day judges are prejudiced against the black and white ones as well as the roans. A Winnipeg man who recently took a few dogs to the recent St. Paul Show made the statement to me that the reason he did not win was that his dog was black and white. It is hard for me to believe that any qualified judge can favor any particular color in a springer, as long as it is a standard color. In other words a good springer cannot be a bad color. I am rather inclined to think that the owners of black and whites that have recently taken a beating, did not have just enough dog to win. However, if there is anything to this contention, it is about time the springer breeders got together, and formed themselves into an organization to combat any prejudice that may insist in some judges' mind as to what color a springer should be. A springer should be judged on its merits and not its color.

Recently I attended the Regina and Saskatoon shows. The Regina entry in springers was very encouraging, there being five points for males and females. All the dogs were in fine condition, and best of breed went to J. F. Tulloch's Hazeldel Ramona, who is a nice sort. The Saskatoon entry was disappointing.

enthusiasts we have in the West is J. F. (Jack) Tulloch, whose chief "hobby" and relaxation in life is the breeding, exhibiting and training of springer spaniels. He appears to have been the leading light in the formation of the Manitoba Gun Dog Club, the continued existence of which at one time looked very doubtful. But so persistent in his efforts was Mr. Tulloch, that to-day it looms as possibly one of the greatest organizations of its kind in Canada. It is an organization which is very much needed in Manitoba. The community as a whole is very fortunate in having such an enthusiast as Mr. Tulloch.

The club has three trials planned for this summer. The first one will take place in July. This, I understand, will be for retrievers only. The latter part of August will see the springer spaniel trials, and the early part of September the pointer and setter trials. All three trials will be run under the rules of the Canadian Kennel Club, and championship points will be allotted to certain stake winners. The judges, as far as I know at this date, will be A. H. Allardyce, Col. C. M. Scott and Glen McDonald. All of these three gentlemen will have the confidence of the exhibitors and visitors. The club is now busy breeding and arranging for all kinds of game for the dogs to work on.

The new training camp of the Silverdale Kennels, which is situated twelve miles north west of Winnipeg, is in full swing again, with Tommy Wade as head trainer and Frank Owens as his chief assistant. Many American springers are in training there this summer. Harry McLaughlin, the genial manager of radio station CJRC, has purchased the good puppy Silverdale Tick, and he will leave her in training until early fall, when he will take command of her himself, and run her in the amateur classes of the fall field trial. Several other springers have been sold by these kennels to U.S.A. clients, and they will also be retained until fall for further training.

The blood-lines of R. T. McFadden's Irish Water Spaniel kennels at Winnipeg were most prominent in their classes at the recent Winnipeg show when every winner in every class were of his breeding. To further improve the stock in his kennels Mr. McFadden, possibly the most consistent breeder of Irish Water Spaniels in the country, has just purchased Denny Maloney, a fine stud dog, from P. K. Swan, California.

I believe the Irish Water Spaniel is due for a comeback in the West. It is gratifying to note that entries are increasing with every show, as well as the quality. This breed of dog is undoubtedly a great water and duck dog, and very adaptable to our Western climate conditions. In some future issue of K. & B. I will discuss this breed at some length.

With summer shows in the near offing, it is high time to start grooming and make a real entry of Labradors. We cannot promote our breed without showing and advertising them at the shows—H.V.C.

BORZOIS

As I proposed last month, after dealing with the standard Borzoi outline as a whole, I shall endeavour to go more fully into the various sections of the standard as they are listed.

First of all we have the head; then the eyes and the ears. These perhaps may well be considered in one issue as they are so closely correlated, and can hardly be considered separately.

The standard reads "Skull slightly domed, long and narrow with scarcely any perceptible stop." Many, without thinking, see in a long nosed dog a long headed dog. However, when we pause to consider, we realize that the skull proper is that part from the eyes back to the junction of the neck. An ideal head is one where the eyes occupy a position midway between the tip of the nose and the back of the occiput. This is a point not written in our standard, but is very distinctly shown in the illustration.

The "stop", or indent, in the top line of the heads of most breeds immediately in front of the brow, should be, in the Borzoi, scarcely perceptible. This is a place where the correlation between the eyes and skull formation is obvious. In order to have an obliquely set eye—not sunken but with the proper soft hound expression—the structure here must be correct.

If the face is well filled in front of and between the eyes, and the brows and temporal bones not prominent, there is only one possible effect on the shape of the eye sockets; i.e. to make them appear slanting upward and backward from the inner corners. If the eye is too small it is set far in the socket and has anything but a "rather soft" or hound like expression. On the other hand, the eye must not be bulging or stary, a fault much more rare in an obliquely set eye, than is the sunken eye.

Having discussed the eye in all the points pertaining to it except colour, we might well conclude with this feature. The eye must not be light in colour. A really light, yellow or greenish eye always has a wild, hard, look about it, no matter how gentle may be the animal possessing it. A

dark brown eye fulfils the standard requirement as to colour, and is always the softest in expression. The eyelids must be dark in colour. A properly set eye, surrounded by dark eyelids, especially in a light coloured face, produces a very unique effect. Light eyelids give a dog a singularly "piggy" look, and are often accompanied by "dudley" or flesh-coloured noses. These defects, of course, are not of conformation but of pigmentation, and are a partial albinism.

Borzoi have been quite prominent of late in the group classes—a fact that indicates the high standard of excellence being maintained by our Canadian breeders. The hound group at the Royal Winter Fair was won by Mr. and Mrs. A. F. Cooper's Ch. Strelka O'Dolina. At the T.K.C. Easter show Ch. Silva of Melnikoff took group honors and at the Guelph show Ch. Strelka repeated her Royal win. J. F. A.

DACHSHUNDE

Where did the breed originate and how old is it?

The German Stud Book of 1840 showed fifty-four registered dogs but the dachshund existed long before this and, as a matter of fact, it is not entirely certain that it originated in Germany. The Germans and Austrians must be given the credit for bringing the breed to its high standard of perfection. They never lost sight of the idea that the Dachshund should be bred as a hunting dog, active, alert and energetic at his work; kind, quiet and loving by his master's fire-side.

The patient, scientific experiments of a man like Wilhelm von Daacke should serve as an inspiration. He was responsible, among other things, for out-crosses with the blood-hound in order to improve the tracking ability of the dogs in work above ground.

We, in Canada, must resist the tendency to merchandise our popular breed merely as pretty, inane little lap-dogs as so many commercial American kennels have done. There is,

of course, a strong temptation for some breeders to breed just what the public wants at popular prices, but too much stress on the dog as "Fashion's Favourite" will probably end in the degeneration of the breed. Those of you who have the courage and tenacity to breed for breedings' sake will find appreciation here from those who have known and admired the dog as a real hunting dog in central Europe and in the British Isles.

The age and origin of the breed are matters of controversy. Wood-cuts of Jost Ammons (1582) show a small burrow dog engaged in rabbit and badger hunts. Mountjoy, an English writer on the breed, refers to the bas-relief on the tomb of Thotmes III, an Egyptian Pharaoh more than 1500 B.C. Another tomb of an Egyptian King carries a representation of a long, low dog lying between his master's feet and the inscription is "Tekel", strangely like the diminutive "Teckel" or "Dachl" used by Germans today.

Xenophon refers to a "beaver-dog" and describes what must have been a dachshund. In the fifth century, in the Lex Bajuvarum appears the following: "He who shall kill the dog known as beaver-dog who hunts underground shall replace him or pay seven soldi for him."

Among the mummies of ancient Peru there have been found small,

short-legged dogs with crooked legs and the Spanish author, Franciscus Fernandez, in 1671 notes the fact that there were dogs in Mexico when the Spaniards arrived which were very short-legged and bore a strong resemblance to the present-day dachshund. Recently, in a book on Mexico by Carveth Wells, I read that the Indians of early days considered a little chocolate coloured dog the most acceptable offering to their Gods after human sacrifice. As the Germans claim that many of the early specimens of the dog in Germany were chocolate, gray and otter-coloured with now and then black ones, it may be that the little dachs has been offered up long long ago in America on other altars than those of Fashion.

In the Judging Ring

It is not often that one month's shows bring forth three champions in our breed. Mrs. Hanson's Lulubelle of Prince Albert, a smooth red puppy bitch, made her first appearance at the Toronto Kennel Club Show and finished as a Champion at London. Lulubelle's owner being in Hollywood, a picture is not available.

Swift victory came also to the English long-haired Champion Varna von Waldberg, owned by Mr. Philip Dickinson who finished her Canadian Championship at London. Mr. Dickinson added further glory to his kennels by finishing the Canadian championship of his German Sieger, Kupper von der Windburg, the following day. Two international championships in two days should be highly gratifying Kupper brought joy to all Dachshund owners by winning in the Hound group at Windsor. His nobility of demeanour and marvellous action as he stepped it off in the ring brought cheers from many who had hitherto paid little attention to the breed.

Windsor is to be congratulated upon obtaining a judge who obviously understands the dogs. It was a welcome relief to see Mr. McDerment looking the dogs over in a way which indicated that he knew what to look for. He pleased the Canadian exhibitors very much and was remarkable for the fact that personal prejudice apparently played no part in his placings. Red dogs, black and tan dogs, small dogs and big dogs received equal consideration on quality. We breeders all remember the judge who not so long ago herded all black and tans to one side, turned his back on them and proceeded to place the reds according to his fancy.

There have been too many judges in the past who have not made a study of our breed and whose decisions are, therefore, entirely worthless to a serious breeder although gratifying to those who take pleasure in merely winning a ribbon or prize. But some of you know my feelings so I shall retire from this subject and quote from the May number of Dog World (U.S.A.) whose dach editor, Mr. Ray Hatfield, says: "It seems to be the general opinion of dach exhibitors that the breed is lacking in judges who actually know the good and bad points of the breed. We do not mean to fault the few judges who are fully qualified and we do not mean to imply there are politics which enter into the decisions. Personally I have been at the ringside many times when the judge, evidently honest in his opinion, was seemingly unfamiliar with the breed. We urge clubs to

select judges from men and women who breed and know dachshunds and who are not influenced by either exhibitors or handler; and to turn thumbs down to those who have repeatedly shown they are unfamiliar with the breed." Mr. J. W. Trullinger expresses similar sentiments in the May "Dog News" magazine. No words of mine need be added to what has been so aptly put by such outstanding writers.

Breeder's News

Mr. W. A. Staebler, of Gananoque, reports that his twelve pound bitch came off successfully in a tussle with a ground hog.

Mr. Philip Dickinson has acquired two more European bitches which will arrive shortly.

Well, Newfoundland fanciers, we have at last what we have all wished for, so long, and that is a Section of Kennel and Bench, devoted especially to our own breed. It is up to us all to see that this section continues to be maintained; and this means that we must all co-operate by sending in any news of interest as to show and breeding activities, visits and births, also sales and any true stories showing the intelligence of this wonderful breed.

I think that, as news for this month is scarce, it would be well to begin by a short article on the origin of the Newfoundland.

Writers vary as to the true origin of this famous life-saving breed; some claiming that they were brought from Norway by hunters but it seems far more probable that these dogs were brought to Newfoundland by French fishermen as early as 1506; and this is borne out by the fact that the Newfoundland of to-day, that is the heavy type we see taking the major awards in the show ring, bear a close resemblance to the Pyrenean sheep-dogs. It seems only natural that, in coming to our shores, the French fishermen would bring with them their cream coloured dogs. Likewise the Spanish and Portuguese would bring their large dogs to Newfoundland and thus developed a new type of dog called the Newfoundland dog. The descendants of these dogs are some straight, some curly coated, some black and some black and white and it is in these, better known as the Landseer, that we can so clearly see how they got their origin from the creamy Pyrenean sheep dogs. While on the subject of Landseers I would like to point out that they are usually smaller and with a different texture of coat than the black; but in all other respects except markings the standard calls for the same points as in the black. The well-known painter of animals, Sir Edwin Landseer chose a black and white Newfoundland as the subject for his very famous picture entitled "A Member of the Humane Society". From this picture came the name Landseer New-

foundland, well-marked specimens of which are unfortunately very rare today. Sir Edwin Landseer was justified not only by the sentiment attaching to this remarkable race of dogs but also by the deeds by which Newfoundlands have made good their claim to such distinction.

Among latest wins of the well-known and sensational young dog Champion Laurel Braes Lifeguard, owned and bred by Mr. E. Emmett, Islington, is that of Group Winner at Hamilton on April 23rd this year. I shall feature this dog in a forthcoming issue. Congratulations are due to Mr. Emmett on completing the championship of his bitch Laurel Braes Gale. This makes the fifth Champion in this kennel, the sixth having been sold to United States. Recent arrivals include five males and two females born on April 28th to Mr. Emmett's Laurels Sea Billow. Sire Ch. Shelton Sea Diver; and 14 puppies. 8 bitches, six males born May 2nd to Ch. Waseeka's Sea Nymph sired by Ch. Laurel Braes Lifeguard also owned by Mr. Emmett.

cious furnishings, it would be a miracle if he were to develop either the required intelligence, or adequate body and quarters. If such a dog turns out stupid and noisy, shelly in body and light behind, why blame the breeding? Blame the breeder. We hear much of the old time Airedale who could do anything any other dog could do, and then lick the other one; but if modern Airedales do not measure up to that standard, the breeders, not the blood, are at fault. The instinct is there, as true and keen as it was twenty years ago; but generations of kennel-rearing can mask it and in time will stifle it entirely. At the risk of being criticized for "home chat", I will mention our only (as yet) champion bitch, bred from purely show ancestors, and when young quite a charming simpleton. Yet when in whelp and nursing, allowed the freedom of the countryside, the buried instinct in her came to life. She started to hunt, and her almost daily offering of rats, rabbits and ground-hogs was a continual surprise. More than that. She turned over a new leaf in more ways than one. From a flighty, disobedient creature, she developed all at once into a steady, bright, obedient companion, and is now the guardian of a baby boy.

If breeders will use this column to air their views on this and other vexed questions, it can be made an exchange of ideas, not merely a report of shows. For example—which is the most important—breeding or rearing, heads or quarters, type or temperament. Let us have *your* views.

Airedale entries at the spring shows have been very poor, and it is not because there are not enough show specimens around Ontario. Three years ago we had twenty at the Toronto Easter show, and nearly thirty at the C.N.E. What about it, exhibitors! We have no Airedale specialty club now, but the new Canadian Terrier Club has an Old Country Airedaler as president and an enthusiastic Airedaler as secretary. It deserves your support. Some day our breed will rate a specialist judge and a list of trophies as long as your arm, but it will not come to pass if Airedale breeders refuse to show.

Rockley Riot Act is now an international champion, with a record of best in show at Hamilton, Toronto Ladies, London and Windsor. She was also second in group at Guelph to the Sealyham that went best in show. I am pretty sure this is a record for a home-bred Airedale, and it is doubtful if anything remotely approaching it has ever been accomplished in any breed. Sincere congratulations to her breeder, Sid. Perkins. Rockley Brigadier, the first of the Cotteridge Brigand-Warland Wondrous litter to appear, went to winners dogs at Hamilton, Guelph, Toronto Ladies and London, with Lamorna Proconsul reserve in the first three. We hear he has eleven brothers and sisters of about equal merit to follow on.

At Windsor, Lamorna Proconsul took winners with Brigadier reserve. Some good looking youngsters, bred by John G. Watson, of Chatham, took the junior classes. Mr. Watson is one of the most consistent breeders in this section, his foundation bitch being The Belle of Aire Valley, by the late Stockfield Jupiter out of a big win-

ner of her day, Ch. The Lilly of Aire Valley. I believe Mr. Watson's young dogs are by Bewdley Advocate out of Rockley Wendy. He was also the breeder of Mr. Jackson's Glenalla Count Nobbler, who went from junior puppy to best of breed at Winnipeg in the fall. This one was from The Belle of Aire Valley by Lamorna King Nobbler.

We have to welcome a new exhibitor in Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Harris, of Richmond Hill, who have been showing a nice homebred brace, Harlynn Nobbler's Prince and Princess. If any dogs have a happy life, theirs do, as they have ample opportunity to hunt in the many acres of bush nearby.

Mrs. K. Marlatt reports that she has an interesting litter by Int. Ch. Cotteridge Brigand ex Affection of Aldon, a daughter of Int. Ch. Warland Protector and Int. Ch. Warland Wishbone. The absence of the Aldon's from our spring shows was most unfortunately due to the illness of Mrs. Marlatt's son, now recovering from a major operation. We hope his recovery will be hastened, and that the Aldon's will again be seen on the bench in the near future.

I believe Airedales have been responsible for more group wins during the past three years than any other terrier, a fact that speaks well for the breed. In British Columbia there was Mr. Chalmers' Ch. Swilton-burn Bright Eyes, one of his imported-in-dam litters by Ch. Aislaby Ethling. In the mid-West Mr. Hogg's Ch. Pun-nichy King II, a home-bred by Dr. French's Ch. Wycote Special Edition. In Ontario Mrs. K. Marlatt's Ch. Shelterock Master Supreme and Warland Michael, our own Ch. Lamorna Princess Nobbler and Lamorna Lyd-dite, and five or six groups to the credit of Mr. Perkins' Ch. Cotteridge Brigand and Warland Wondrous and several more to Ch. Rockley Riot Act. I fully expect there are others I have forgotten, but even these form a most impressive record for any breed, representing as they do, a number of different blood-lines and with dogs and bitches fairly evenly divided.

The late Duke of Anndale is leaving much to carry on. Reba Von der Rheinshanze, the dam of Int. Ch. Rhona of Kittyglade, is in whelp to him, as is also Fauna Von Graf Dane, the dam of Int. Ch. Bengal Von Graf Dane. Bred to two such famous females and on his record as a sire of the Dictator, Duke of Anndale will live again in his puppies.

July will be a dry month in more than the weather, so the dane notes will close this month, in the hopes that the breeders will assist us to keep this column well watered until the fall shows come along.

case of the disease and make him immune thereafter. Distemper is a job for a veterinarian. He who attempts to treat it himself is jeopardizing his pet's life for, even if the dog survives, there will probably be after-effects that cannot be cured.

The first observable symptoms are great lassitude with little inclination to play, dullness of eye, loss of appetite and an increased temperature. A discharge from the nose and eyes follows and there is an eruption on the skin of the stomach and inside the thighs. There will be fits of heat, bowels out of order, vomiting, and scanty, highly colored urin. Accompanying all these symptoms will be a husky cough and sneezing; but the owner who lets a case of distemper advance to this stage has placed his pet in grave danger. On the first signs of distemper, take the pup to the veterinarian. The disease is comparatively easy to cure in its early stages; but once advanced, it strikes with a deadly speed that all the veterinarian skill in the world cannot retard.

The Canadian Kennel Club, Inc.

Meeting of the Board of Directors, May 19, 1938

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., was held in the Board Room of the Club's Offices, 25 Melinda Street, Toronto, on Thursday afternoon, May 19th, 1938, at 3.30 o'clock. The President, Col. J. N. MacRae, presided. Directors present included: Mrs. E. Brown, Mrs. A. McColl, W. H. Reeves, W. W. Rooney, W. J. Risewick and Dr. H. E. Batt.

Col. Bartley Bull, Chairman Canadian National Live Stock Records Committee, R.G.T. Hitchman, Director Canadian National Live Stock Records, and Peter Wright, Canadian Kennel Club Legal Advisor, were in attendance.

The Secretary advised the Meeting that Director Capt. H. Dudley-Waters was again in Christie Street Hospital, and following his operations, he was in a very weakened condition. The Secretary further advised that Bert Swann had been buried the day previous to the Board Meeting, his remains having been laid to rest in close proximity to those of our ex-director, the late Norman K. Swire.

It was regularly moved by Mrs. McColl, seconded by Dr. Batt and carried:—

"That, the Minutes of the April Meeting be taken as read."

The President advised that, because of the action taken by the members at the last Annual General Meeting when certain proposed Amendments to the Constitution had failed to receive support, the Department of the Minister of Agriculture had advised that the renewal of provisional approval of the Constitution could not be considered. The Department had also refused approval of any further registration certificates and had refused to continue provisional approval of the Constitution any longer under existing conditions. Col. Bull, Mr. Hitchman, the Secretary and himself had met in Ottawa on the matter. In fact, Col. Bull had gone to Ottawa several times and, because of that, he had invited the Colonel and Mr. Hitchman to attend this meeting, as they had done everything within their power to be of assistance to the Canadian Kennel Club at this time. The President then asked Mr. Hitchman to address the meeting.

Mr. Hitchman referred at once to the serious situation confronting the Club in respect to the matter of registration. He advised that he had been able to impress the Director of Production Services that, if the Constitution was allowed to continue, there was a provision in it which would make it possible to meet the requirements of the Live Stock Pedigree Act. This provision was included in Article 7, Section 1, which gives the Directors power to call a general meeting of the members at such time and place as decided upon by the Board, at which meeting a notice of motion to amend the Constitution in respect to a satisfactory means of identification would be in order. Such a meeting, when called, would have power to amend the Constitution in that respect. Mr. Hitchman advised that, what was generally understood as "Satisfactory Means of Identifica-

tion" was tattooing. If this arrangement was endorsed by the Board and telegraphic advice to that effect was sent to the Department immediately, he believed the registration of dogs would continue to be allowed.

Mr. Reeves asked what the position of the Club would be, supposing it was decided not to continue operating under the Live Stock Pedigree Act. Mr. Hitchman advised that any five men could ask for a Charter to register dogs, which, if granted, would replace the Canadian Kennel Club in respect to registration.

Mr. Hitchman was asked to explain the course of action that he had in mind. He suggested that the Province of Quebec, being considered favorable to satisfactory identification, it would be advisable for the Board of Directors to call a general meeting in the City of Montreal to consider the following proposed Amendments to the Constitution; formal notice of which was thereupon filed with the Secretary as follows:—

"In accordance with Article 11 of the Constitution of the Canadian Kennel Club I herewith give notice of motion to amend the Constitution Article 7, section 1, first sentence. That this sentence be deleted and the following substituted therefor:

"The annual general meeting of the Club shall be held at such time and at such place as decided upon by the Board of Directors of this Club."

I respectfully request that a special general meeting be called as provided for in the second sentence of Article seven, section 1, thereof."

"That the Constitution of the Canadian Kennel Club be amended to provide for a new article to be known as 15A and to read:

IDENTIFICATION

"A breeder must apply to the Canadian National Live Stock Records for and be allotted letters for his exclusive use in identifying dogs whelped his property. Dogs whelped on or after January 1st, 1939, must be tattoo marked with the identification letters allotted the owner at birth. Animals not registered but whelped prior to January 1st, 1939, must be identified by tattoo marking with the registered letters of the owner at birth. In addition to the owner's registered identification letters there must also be tattooed a kennel number followed by a designating year letter. For 1938 the year letter is 'S', for 1939 'T' and for 1940 'U'. The letters 'I', 'O' and 'Q' not used as year letters."

"In the event of a change in the name of a partnership, kennel or company or if a member of the same family is taken into partnership, the tattoo letters may be transferred on application to the Canadian National Live Stock Records, of the registered owner or his authorized representative. Likewise, transfer may be made from a deceased owner to his heir."

A letter was read from the Editor of Kennel and Bench who requested an allowance of \$20.00 per month in respect to the use of his car in the promotion of the magazine's welfare. It was moved by Mr. Rooney, seconded by Mr. Risewick and carried:—

"That, Mr. Jones be allowed \$20.00 per month for the use of his car on Kennel and Bench business." (Mrs. E. Brown and W. H. Reeves asked that they be recorded as having voted against the allowance.)
