VER 45,000 people—over 4,000 dogs—over 60 judges
—over 50 judging rings—automobiles in such numbers that would make General Motors on a busy day look like a mongrel Chihuahua with a tapeworm—over 300 cocker spaniels—over 300 dachshunde—over 150 Boston terriers—over 140 German shepherd dogs—as many Irish setters—almost as many collies—doberman pinschers and great Danes—Kerry blue terriers topping the 100 mark. That was the 1938 Morris and Essex.

What a show! Judges from England, Germany, Ireland —from Maine to California and from Vancouver to Quebec.

The accumulative effect of Morris and Essex furnished an intricate study of combinations and contrasts of every

That was a rather broad jump we took in the last issue of Kennel and Bench, but in order to function within the limits of our self imposed time Schedule, we just had to increase the tempo-and did, we showed our readers that the membership at the end of 1897 was only 92 (after nine years) and that the registrations were 268 for that year, and only slightly over 4,000 registrations after nine years. We also mentioned that only five shows had been held in 1897. We also showed that the 1898 income had been \$469.38, and expenditure to have been \$394.89, and from that point we passed on to 1899 when the income had passed the thousand dollar mark for the first time in our Clubs history. In 1902 our expenditure passed the \$1,000.00 mark for the first time, in 1907 we had passed the \$2,000.00 figure for income, the whole leaving quite a reliable kind of yardstick with which to measure, what must be considered, a healthy, though none too vigorous development.

It would appear to this recorder, that the pulse of the Canadian Kennel Club could always be interpreted more accurately by the number and quality of the dog shows held in any given year, than by any other means, we hardly expect all our readers to agree with us when making this observation. But we would expect them to concede that we have based the suggestion on an honest impressive conviction, so we would mention here that the present chapter of our serial will start with a cursory glance over the compilation of figures which represent the 1898-1907 episode, for the first of those years we had a membership of 92 with a registration of 268 dogs and five dog shows, as mentioned above. At the 1907 station we found 265 members (a new high) 641 registrations, and nine dog shows.

In the misery of our growing pains, we had struggled to take the grip of our elder sister—the American Kennel Club, we had taken grips with the Pacific Kennel League—the Western Kennel League, but as the "pains" decreased, chiefly because of the growth of dog shows in Canada, and particularly in Manitoba, Alberta and British Columbia. The real pleasures of managing a National Canine Government finally began to give our

officers a comfortable, satisfying feeling. Mr. Kent's declared platform being "The Welfare of the Club", "The Promotion of Dog Shows" and "Every Obligation Due to Members", and no President could have had any more substantial foundation, upon which to build, than that.

With the coming of 1910, came an alarming extention of the Rabies Scourge which had reared its ugly head in 1908 when six cases of Rabies had been sent to the Pasteur Institute from Ontario. In 1909 twenty-two cases had been sent to the Institute, and at the end of January, 1910, fifteen cases had been sent. Naturally every fancier's thoughts were turned to England, where Rabies had been more or less prevalent from 1887, when two hundred and forty-seven had been treated, until 1889 when three hundred and twelve cases focussed public opinion on the menacing scourge, and it was this public opinion which later crystalized into compulsory muzzling as an essential precaution, results were at once convincingly satisfactory, and the muzzling order was recinded. The most devastating results followed immediately, so much so, that in 1895, rabid dogs in England had reached the almost unbelievable figure of six hundred and seventy-two, then the

muzzling order was again introduced, and by 1897 the number of cases had been reduced to one hundred and fifty-one. New teeeth vere inserted in the muzzling laws, and by 1903 the British Isles was free from Rabies. But the wisdom of the British law makers had arranged for the added protection of a six months compulsory quarantine.

The western part of Ontario bore the brunt of responsibility for the continuing outbreaks. Tillbury and Strathroy standing out as afflicted centers.

Past President Dr. J. S. Niven, London, Ont., (1893-1895) gave valuable leadership to the Provincial and Federal Authorities by suggesting that they should resort to muzzling, and to force their edicts to cover all dogs on the streets or in public places. All other dogs to be kept in confinement. Stray dogs were doomed under the measures advocated, and were soon removed from consideration. The good Dr. Niven, always mindful of "Man's Best Friend", had some substantial, sensible advice to offer in respect to muzzles from the humane viewpoint.

In every instance where there is an element of tragedy, there is also a vein of humour, and Dr. H. J. Grassett, Toronto's Chief of Police, at that time, gave it as his opinion that "One way to make dog's mad was to muzzle them", and hoped that the measure would not be enforced in Toronto. The good Chief soon found that he had spoken out of his turn, for the very next day the precisely similar Orders-in-Council, representative of joint Provincial and Federal action were circulated and made public. There were no alternates, you either conformed to the muzzling laws or faced a fine not exceeding \$200.00 under the Dominion Act, and \$20.00 under the Provincial Statute. And for good measure the destruction of the dog was also involved.

Canadian citizens were hard to convince that the laws were not obnoxious beyond the limits of rhyme and reason, and during the whole of 1910 they writhed under their subjection to the new legislation. That the situation was indeed serious may be realized, when we mention that all the Provincial shows. All-breed and specialty were dispensed with because of the uncertainty of entries, and the possibility of contagion.

Even the great Canadian National Exhibition Show was more or less isolated, and the taking of entries from owners of dogs east of Toronto, or from the United States was discountenanced by those empowered with the administration of the muzzling orders.

Dr. J. A. Campbell, Toronto, the Honorary Veterinary Surgeon for the Ontario Kennel Club, then as now, was looked to for a contribution for the information of the layman. In response he furnished the following paper for publication, it represents a paper which the learned Doctor had read before the Toronto Veterinary Medical Association.

"In making a diagnosis of rabies in a dog, it is preferable to preserve the animal in order that the development of the disease may be observed, but in case the dog has been killed it is possible to make a diagnosis, if the brain has not decomposed, by the inoculating process, or by means of the Negri-bodies. These are small round or oval structures found in the nerve cells, located chiefly in the cells of Hippocampus Major, and can be demonstrated by proper staining methods. This procedure is universally adopted by state authorities.

"Now the question arises when and when not is a dog suffering from a true case of rabies. No doubt

everyone has seen a dog suffer from hysterical convulsions which appears to the average layman to be raving mad.

"It has been my experience to attend a number of dogs which have presented typical text book cases of rabies. I might cite two cases in point, one a Fox Terrier that I was called to see. On Arriving at the house I was informed that the dog had been acting in a peculiar manner for two days, and suddenly seemed to lose all control of itself. I found the animal in the cellar in a highly excited state, oscillating eyes, frothy muzzle, snapping and biting and giving vent to a characteristic howl-like bark. Here was apparently a typical text-book case of rabies.

The dog rushed aimlessly about, colliding finally with the clothes horse of which it seized the leg. I took the opportunity to grasp the animal by the neck and carry it to the laundry tub, allowing the cold water to run over its head. During this period the animal was furious, snapping the tap and sides of the tub. I was almost convinced that it was a case of true rabies and decided to take the dog to my hospital, so that I could watch the development of the Disease. On arriving at my office I administered a dose of chloral hydrate, and placed the animal in an isolated care. It

A CARTOONIST'S SATIRE ON MUZZLING

A cartoon published at the time of the muzzling for rabies discussions that played an important part in C.K.C. history outlined in this article

was very much exhausted and crawled into a corner and collapsed, remaining in the same position up till ten p.m. No new symptom appearing I left for home. On the following morning I found the dog apparently normal except for a slight condition of exhaustion. On being offered food the animal ate greedily, and from then on steadily improved. I had the case under my observation for a week, and sent it home in a normal condition. Here was a case in which the condition was brought on by teething.

"The second case I might mention is that of a Bulldog which was suffering from what appeared to be a case of dumb rabies, the lower jaw paralyzed and drooped, the tongue protruding and cyanosed, eyes staring and oscillating, marked paralysis in the hind quarters and great emaciation. On careful examination the case proved to be one of Gangrenous Stomatitis.

"These cases simply go to show that one must not be too hasty in rushing blindly to a diagnosis, but must view such cases from a sane and scientific standpoint, and I may truly state that many of the above conditions require the keenest observation. Now we must admit the actual existence of the disease rabies, but it is not common, and in a large per-

centage of cases said to be rabies it has been found that the diagnosis is at fault, the condition is simply one of cerebral or spinal irritation, brought about by gastric disturbances, example, due to poison, teething, intestinal absorption of toxic products or retained faeces, or extreme irritation brought about by intestinal worms.

"The condition may also be brought about by a rapid rise of blood.

"This being the first occasion that the question for the prevention of rabies has been brought so prominently to the public notice, and owing to the extreme agitation in the public mind concerning this subject I consider this a most oppor-

tune moment for bringing the question of rabies before this society for discussion.

"I shall endeavor to epitomize a few of the widely scattered facts concerning the disease.

"Rabies, coming from the Latin "rabere," to rave, is all that the name indicates. It is a disease of the dog and his species, communicatable to man and domesticated animals, the infection transmitted by inoculation only and under no circumstances does it develop spontaneously. The virus, whatever it may be, is located in saliva and the nerve centres of the body. It is found that in man the period of development extends from

True Tales of Real Dogs

The Afghan Hound, Hero of a Strange Conquest.

Some of you have seen the Saluki—the Afghan hound—at dog shows and elsewhere, during the past few years. There are only a few of them in America thus far, though they are becoming popular in Europe, and though they have been used for hunting in various parts of the Orient for centuries.

The dogs are of various colors, and they look like rather small grayhounds with shaggy tails and with longer hair than the grayhound's. They are incredibly swift runners. Their Oriental masters use them chiefly for hunting antelopes.

I am going to tell you the true story of one such hunt, in the Near East, a hunt with a strange ending.

The hero of this story was a Saluki named Halil, which is the Arabic word for "The Well-Loved." Halil lived up

to his name. For he was the favorite possession of Uthman, lord of the Kifri tribe.

Uthman loved the beautiful brown-and-silver hound, and kept Halil at his side, wherever his tribe wandered. The dog slept at the chief's feet at night in the royal tent, and ate all his meals with him. This in a land where a dog usually is regarded as unclean.

But Halil deserved his master's favor. He was an inspired hunter and faster in the chase than any other dog in that region. Fleet indeed must be

the desert antelope which Halil could not run to earth.

To westward of the Kifri domains lay the country of the Beni Zor. Ysouf, chief of the Beni Zor, was Uthman's mortal foe. Time and again the two tribes had clashed.

In fair battle the Kifri warriors nearly always were victorious over their foes. But in craftiness—such as the successful raiding of unprotected Kifri flocks and heards of supplies of grain and the like—Ysouf's men were far more successful.

For generations the two tribes had hated one another. Many a time had the sands been stained with blood, from single fights or wholesale combats between them. It was a hereditary feud.

Then, because each side was exhausted and becoming impoverished, truce was patched up between them. Neither had ceased hating the other. And Uthman and Ysouf were as bitter enemies as ever. But it was good policy just then to hide this mutual hatred and to pretend to be friends.

As part of this friendly policy a grand hunt was arranged; a hunt which was to end in a feast to which the foremost men of each tribe were to be bidden.

Now one of Uthman's fiercest grievances against Ysouf was that the chief of the Beni Zor owned a big jet black Saluki dog, "Shaitan" by name, (Arabic for "devil"),

which Ysouf had always declared was twice as fleet and three times as brave and clever as was the gentle Halil.

Ysouf had joked unkindly about Halil and about Uthman's devotion to the dog, and had said Shaitan could race the legs off the Kifri dog. So, craftily, Ysouf now proposed that the hunt begin with a race between the two mighty hounds.

Eagerly, Uthman accepted the challenge, for he knew Ysouf was as proud of Shaitan's prowess as he, himself, was proud of Halil's. He saw a chance to humiliate his lifelong foe in the presence of all their tribesmen by the defeat of the black dog of which the Beni Zor men bragged so loudly.

Many ounces of silver and many Arab horses were wagered on the result of the race. These were to be the

> conditions of the contest: The two chiefs and their respective dogs were to go out to a gully which was a favorite feeding place for antelope. Their followers were to accompany them.

The hounds were to be held in leash until one of the "beaters" should scare up an antelope and send it scudding away, over the flat miles of sands just beyond. Then, at a signal, Halil and Shaitan were to be let loose.

Whichever of them should first overtake the antelope and pull it down was to be ad-

judged winner of the race.

The conditions were simple, and they were fair. The test would prove, once and for all, which of the hounds was the faster. On that vast expanse of sand, the conflict could be seen by everyone.

The morning of the hunt arrived. The two chiefs, each holding his dog by the leash, stationed themselves upon a hillock. Behind them the sands were black with spectators.

Beaters crept forward to the gully. Presently an antelope flashed up the slope, in terrified flight across the desert.

The signal was given. Uthman and Ysouf unleashed their straining dogs. Both hounds had caught sight of the antelope. Both tore away at top speed in pursuit of their prey.

The race was on!

The chiefs and their retinues sprang to the backs of their horses and galloped after the fast-flying dogs, in order not to miss one detail of the contest.


Arab-like, they scourged their steeds to a mad run, while the riders spun their long muskets high in air with their free hands and screeched encouragement to the hounds.

Across the sands sped the antelope. Close and closer

CH. MUCH ADO ABOUT NOTHING

The influence of this dog in Canada is apparent in his progeny at many Canadian shows. He is also the sire of several younger dogs well on their way to a championship.

The Cocker—Its History and Standards

A LTHOUGH not generally recognized as an ancient breed, the cocker spaniel undoubtedly existed in the sixteenth century for Arcussia, writing in that time, mentions a "small black spaniel' the description of which can fit no other breed that what is now known as the cocker. The first authentic record of them, however, is in the nineteenth century when the field spaniel breed, tremendously popular at that time, was divided into two groups—large spaniels (springers) and small spaniels (cockers).

These smaller spaniels were principally used in Wales and Devonshire as sporting dogs because their size thoroughly adapted them to the low, close growing covert to be tound in those districts. Blaine's description of the breed in those days was: "The cocker is so called from the appropriation to woodcock shooting, has a short round head when compared with that of a springer; he is also

much smaller in size, more compact in frame, and not high on the legs, his ears are usually long and well feathered, as are his legs and tail".

These spaniels were indeed a hardy lot. In South Deven sportsmen gathered them from anywhere in the neighborhood for a day's sport and allowed them to find their own way home after the fun was over, much as a trencher-fed pack of foxhounds does. Whatever merits may be credited to them, their greatest recommendation is that no covert was too thick or forbidding for them to

Most of them were allowed to breed in their instinctive fashion, but a few owners kept their own

strains. It is surprising how well they kept to type, although some were a bit curly in coat and some had their ears set on a little higher than we care for them today. Principal colors were liver, liver and white, blue and liver roans, and, of course, black.

The classification of "large and small" field spaniels existed until 1901 when the English Kennel Club saw fit to provide separate classes for springers and cockers.

In the meantime cocker fanciers in Canada and the United States had been importing splendid examples of the breed from England and breeding along their own theories. So successful were they that late in the nineteenth century English breeders imported a few Canadianbred dogs to correct a snipey condition developing in the heads of their dogs. Among the first of these was "Toronto" a dog bred by George Bell, in Toronto, and sold to C. A. Phillips, one of England's most prominent

breeders and author of several splendid books on the breed.

Today's cocker is a very different animal from that of fifty years ago, or even twenty-five years ago. As gun dogs they still maintain the determined qualities that first popularized them; but in more recent years they have developed another appeal as house-dogs and pets. Their merry, lovable and protective disposition constitutes an appeal all its own and today, if we may judge by the registrations, they are the most popular dogs on the continent.

The following is the description and standard of points recognized by the American Kennel Club:

Skull.—Not so heavy as in other Sporting Spaniels, with smooth forehead and clearly defined eyebrows and stop, the median line distinctly marked and gradually disappearing until lost rather more than halfway up, a well developed, rounded and comparatively wide skull showing

no prominence in the cheeks, which, like the side of the muzzle, should present a smooth, clean-cut appearance.

Muzzle. - Proportionately shorter and lighter than in the Field Spaniel, showing no fullness under the eyes, the jaws even and approaching squareness. Teeth sound and regular, the front ones meeting. Lips cut off square, preventing any appearance of snipiness. Nose well developed in all directions and black in color excepting in the reds, livers, particolors of these shades and in the roans of the lighter lines, when it may be brown or


Black.

Eyes. — Comparatively large, round, rather full, yet never goggled nor weak, as in the Toy Spaniel kind. They should be dark in the blacks, black and tans, the darker shades of parti-colors and roans. In the reds and livers and in the parti-colors and roans of these colors they should be brown, but of a shade not lighter than hazel.

Ears.—Lobular, set low, leather fine and not extending beyond the nose; well clothed with long, silky hair, which should be straight or wavy.

Neck and Shoulders.—Neck sufficiently long to allow the nose to reach the ground easily, muscular, free from throatiness and running into clean-cut, sloping shoulders, which should not be wide at the points.

Body.—Comparatively short, compact and firmly knit together, giving the impression of a concentration of power and untiring activity. Chest deep rather than wide, not

Trimming the Cocker Spaniel

of much controversy among Cocker exhibitors in this country and it is this writer's opinion that the sooner the question is settled, the better for all concerned.

It is true that the show rules do not permit the trimming of any but the few breeds named therein. However permission is given to "remove dead coat in all breeds". Just what parts of the coat may be termed "dead" in a full coated Cocker may be debatable, but common practice has it that the coat may be trimmed down by the commonly accepted methods (i.e. stripping knife and comb) to give the body the full benefit of it's natural grace and balance and to set off the beauty of the head and expression.

Often we hear complaints from exhibitors whose dogs are shown in poor condition with coats that defy even expert trimming. Dogs that are well "put down" are accused of being faked, clipped, or otherwise tampered with. Naturally any suggestion of faking should be investigated and if found to have been practised the usual C.K.C. penalties should be imposed.


Mrs. Ella B. Moffitt in her excellent book "The Cocker Spaniel" sums up the trimming of Cockers very nicely in the following: ". . . . I can hear raise the subject of whether trimming of dogs with the idea of enhancing the value of the good and reducing that of the poor points does not approach what is known as faking. My answer is to compare a well turned-out man or woman with a well finished dog. Should a man to whom a smooth face is more becoming wear a mustache? Should a woman with an inclination to have hair on the face be seen in public with it? Should a man with a long neck wear low collars? Should a woman whose hair is most becomingly worn around the face, wear it straight back? Finally

should a man be seen in public unshaved or a woman with a shiny face? Faking of dogs is comparable in my opinion to facelifting and hair dying".

This writer believes that Mrs. Moffitt, who is one of America's greatest authorities on Spaniels, has put the whole situation in a nutshell and it is with the objects outlined above that the following suggested methods for trimming are given.

Before going further, a word of warning to the novice might be well





Using a Duplex or other sharp stripping knife, remove all the thick or wooly hair from the skull, leaving it clean smooth and short haired. Take care not to leave any choppy marks of your work. Carry this trimming down the line of the neck, especially if the dog shows a tendency toward a short or thick neck. Bring out the presence of stop at the junction of the skull and neck and work your way down the sides of the neck removing all surplus hair that tends to spoil the graceful lines.

From the point where you left off on the sides of the skull keep on trimming to the set on of ear and shorten all the hair on the top of the ear to a point one inch down the ear itself. Sometimes it is found advisable to trim even lower down the ear to give lower ear carriage. Remove all surplus hair on the inside of the ear and on the sides of the neck under the ear to give a flat closelying appearance.

Remove whiskers and all superfluous hair from the muzzle, taking care to leave enough on if the muzzle is inclined to be snipey. Smooth the cheeks in a similar manner and carry the procedure down the throatline, being

careful not to leave any loose ends, and smooth the cheeks.

Examine the dog carefully and see if it needs trimming of the coat on the shoulders to give it the required streamlined appearance. Every individual dog requires special treatment and only a general rule can be given here. Try to get the appearance as near as possible to a long graceful neck with clean sloping shoulders.

Side feather on the legs is (Continued on Page 27)

W. J. Risewick, popular bulldog fancier and proprietor of the Wellstone Kennels, once remarked "If I owned a building in which it was proposed to hold a dog show, I should first insist that Scotties be brought into the ring with steel collers and into the ring with steel collars and chains, so that they could not break away from their handlers and make a hole through my wall". W. McDer-mott, critique extraordinaire and the Sherlock Holmes of judiciaries, has said "I will not put up a Scottie, no matter how good a speciman, has to be propped up or is grovelling around the floor of the ring. It must show itself á l'Anglaise at the end of a loose lead"

Bravo, gentlemen. You have called the trick. And yet another to join your ranks is the famous breeder and judge, Reg. P. Sparkes, who recog-nized the Scottie "distinctividuality" in judging best in show at the Canadian Terrier Club show in Toronto. He awarded top honors for all breeds to a Scottie—that game little Aberdeen showman "Lindburn Braw Wee Laddie". He is not a "Realization"; nor is he a "Fashion Hint", but has he got distinctividuality! Placed best of breed by John Latham, best of group by the same judge, Laddie attracted the admiration of Judge Sparkes who gave him the highest award of the day. Most of the judging was done in the rain, and you breeders know that the average Scot does not look his best in a bathing suit.

Getting back to distinctividuality, it is a fine recommendation to own a dog with every sire a champion and the old slogan "blood will tell" (or nearly will) will probably hold good in your breeding. But in my humble opin-ion, the character of the sire is of paramount importance. Investigate the proposed stud's ancestral showmanship propensities. Mrs. Batt, of the famous Haldon prefix, once told me that Laddie owes his gameness and style to his grandfather, Int. Ch. Haldon Minstrel, the gamest Scot ever bred in the Guelph kennels. Thus the character of the sire follows through

in his offspring.

This win for the Scotties will perhaps encourage our good friend, L. Lindsay, of the Lindburn Kennels, Thornhill, to again be seen in the ring with Segaris Jo Jo or some of his other good ones; for it was he who bred Lindburn Braw Wee Laddie.

The Maple Leaf Gardens show was great entertainment but seemed to lack the atmosphere to which we have become accustomed. No barks, no nothing, although benching was decidedly better than anticipated. Walter Reeves passed on our breed and fancied Chanters Jaunty Lad who was also placed best Canadian-bred in show. Mr. Stewart at the Canadian show. Mr. Stewart at the Canadian Terrier Club show had two extremely fine little puppies of Jaunty's with

marvelous quarters.
The York Kennel Club's annual show at Richmond Hill was its usual brilliant success. Lunch at the United Church was a pleasant affair with the Great Dane Jernigans, the Borzoi Coopers, the Setter Clancys, the Fox Terrier Beers et al. Aberdeen Kennels' Susan of Agbrigg obtained her fifth best of breed under Anton Rost, an international judge who had a busy day (which probably helped to keep him warm). The Haldon entry, Boldmere Binder, Chanters Jaunty Lad and several others were unlucky to the winner that day.

Mrs. Lefroy, of Thornhill Kennels situated five miles north-west of London, has moved three times since commencing to breed Scotties. She is now definitely settled for good and is busy preparing that good puppy, Thornhill Thereabouts, for the Canadian Na-tional Exhibition. Incidentally, London was the pup's first show and he went reserve winners.

We hear that Mr. Bennett, of Heather Sensation fame, is bringing back two females from England—one for himself and one for the Blochins, of Rowmore Ardifuir renown. It looks as though competition will be hot this fall, with Mrs. Batt returning from England with (perhaps) a good one. DOGS ON TARRED ROADS

Road tarring has begun again, and with it an annual menace to canine well-being. People exercising dogs should avoid using freshly tarred roads, for dogs' feet are liable to damage not only from tar, but from the sharp, gritty particles of road metal that adhere to the tar. The most vulnerable point is the tender skin between the toes. This should be examined daily and any tar or other foreign body removed. Tar can be easily wiped off after applying a little fresh butter, olive oil or eucalyptus oil-but never turpentine, which can be excruciatingly painful to a dog.

To allay foot irritation, immerse the dog's feet for a few minutes daily in a bath consisting of methylated spirit (one part) and water (four parts).



Otherwise you will come to a narrow-minded and, possibly, an unjust conclusion in considering an individual dog. A person faced with a choice be-

tween two very fine animals will probably resort to the point system to aid him. The perfect dog rates 100% with the points allotted in the following

dog's anatomy are considered impor-tant. If you add the points for head, neck and forequarters, you will find thirty-five points—more than a third of the total. You will readily under-stand why this is when you recall that the front of the dog is the busiest part of him during a badger hunt. He needs good lung and heart room, strong jaws with well formed teeth, a powerful and supple neck and a clean-cut long head.

gether disagreeable-nothing to induce the greatest optimist to remem-ber the "silver lining" promise. Even the weather man had made a gloomy prediction for the morrow. Then, what happened? The 28th of May dawned with a clear sky and a sun that promised freckles for many a nose. The grounds were a riot of color, the club's purple and gold vieing with the green of grass and shrubbery and the whole combining into a never-to-be-forgotten picture.

Ten o'clock finds the judges and their stewards already in the ring and may the Lord help late-comers.

Wonder of wonders! Here we find Ernest E. Ferguson, from far-off Cali-fornia, judging the Old English sheep dogs. For his best he selects Leonard Collins' Ideal Weather; and our Toronto handler, Alf Loveridge is en-abled to take the comely dog to the working group. There, he meets the greatest of the great working dogs; but he still maintains his superiority and comes out with top group honors.

While this has been going on, similar elimination processes have been effected; and now they gather for final selection. It is a tense moment. Among the contestants are such dogs as Maro of Maridor, full litter brother of Daro of Maridor who was best dog in show at Westminster last February, and himself a tremendous favorite to take the Morris & Essex crown to-day the Morris & Essex crown to-day
—the pomeranian, Sealand Moneybox
—the borzoi, Vigow of Romanoff
—one of America's stellar performers, the fox terrier Nornay Saddler
—the poodle, Ch. Blakeen Jungfrau. Remember that any one of these dogs is a creditable best-in-show dog and all have been winning the highest honors regularly. And so into highest honors regularly. And so into a ring that has undergone a complete transformation since the opening hour. Now it is a blaze of color with the Now it is a blaze of color with the red of hundreds of geraniums and the green of shrubbery. Into the ring steps veteran Harry T. Peters, M.F.H., of Islip, L.I. His task is to select the very best specimen of 4,213 dogs.

The striking English setter attracts a cheer from the crowd as from a single throat. The borzoi gets a vociferous ovation. The poodle has an army of well wishers. So have the fox terrier and the pomeranian. But judge

terrier and the pomeranian. But judge Peters has had the roar of the populace in his ears before and on him its reaction is lost entirely. Finally he centers on the easy-striding, great coated bob-tail and it is only a matter of moments until the master sportsman has Alf Loveridge and Ch. Ideal weather standing on the most coveted spot in the grounds—that marked "Best in Show". There was very little about Ideal Weather the judge did not know when he finished. Yet he found in the honest little Toronto bob-tail the dog that came nearest to perfection in his estimation.

I have known Alf Loveridge for some time and I have seen something of his various moods. But I have never seen him with a more happy satisfied look than when, on one hand, Mr. Peters was handing him a trophy and, on the other, Mrs. Hartley Dodge was handing him another.

There have been twelve Morris and Essex shows at Madison, N. J. Each has been better than its predecessor. The 1938 fixture will be written into the records as the world's greatest outdoor dog show. I can only apologize for my failure to do the show justice in this altogether inadequate description.

generally removed, but if the legs are not too straight, careful trimming is not too straight, careful triming is indicated to lessen the faulty effect. It is advisable to study the individual dog carefully before attempting this job, and then trimining accordingly.

Using shears, the feet are then trimmed to give the required cat's paw effect. Excess hair between the toes

should be removed.

Sometimes excess coat on the back, where it meets the tail, should be trimmed down especially where the back is long or where the tail is short. Trimming at this point may shorten the appearance of the back by an inch or more, and will give this much added length to the tail. In a short backed dog which has a low set on of tail, this part of the coat is best left on. Shorten the hair at the base of the tail and carry this procedure down to, but not including, the feather between the hindlegs. Leave all feather on the back of the hind legs from the hock downwards, trimming off all side feather as noted above.

After the dog has been trimmed to your satisfaction, the next move is to give him a good bath. We have found that soap chips such as Lux give the best results since they appear to remove excess oil and dirt better. However a good cake soap or liquid shampoo should do the job very nicely. The dog should be rinsed in clean water to remove any soap left in the coat and then dried; and if the coat is inclined to be fluffy or unruly a blanket should be fastened on and left on until the show.

Frequent brushing to bring out the natural sheen of the coat should then follow, using a stiff brush or a wire glove brush. Follow this with further brushing using a soft brush or cloth, and finish with polishing with the bare



What we must aim for is good sturdy breeders and pups that show their bone and coats from the cradle. Avast with the sometimes heard plaint-"I got him just a leetle too fine." I like them fast as butter and as hard as nails up to six months. If the breed-ing's there, the points will follow as the night follows the day. If I had to, I could buy a flyer with my eyes closed if someone read me his pedigree and I felt his strong little well-fed and I felt his strong little well-fed body. What we want to produce is a varminty, hardy, race in Canada. The only criticism I would have made of some of the typey little fellows at Madison Square Garden this year, was that they lacked that "self-esteem" that the strongerd cells for esteem" that the standard calls for, and they didn't bounce enough. Their little hindlegs were too lady-like. They ought to spurn the ground, as though they were going to start scratching at any minute. (By the way, did you ever notice how the Westy bitches scratch? Just like dogs. They're often just as swashbuckling as any Lothario.) And those grand doggy bitches are the best of mothers-whelp easily (in a paw-made nest in a fence corner if they have to) and bring up the babies faithfully. I'll never forget Mrs. Lefroy's surprise and joy at the little trouble she had with her Foam Flower, after the sorry times she had be with the broads. Yes left the had with other breeds. Yes, let us keep them forever the braw "earthedogges" that they are. It seems to me that Canada is the ideal place to naturalize a Scotch dog, too. I never saw a Scotsman that didn't flourish here.

Speaking of Westies being good mothers, Mrs. Barclay also told me in her last letter, that her Derrigs still takes a toy pup to bed with her every night. She hasn't had any of her own for a while, but is hoping to wake up and find one some day, I think.

AIREDALES

The controversy about Airedale temperament continues, both in the U.S.A. and in England. Judging from a recent article in the Old Country magazines, Airedales have been shown there to the highest success honours with their tails between their legs. Perhaps we are lucky in Canada, but I cannot recall one adult Airedale at a show that could not keep his tail where it belonged, and certainly some of the grandest showmen of recent years have been Airedales and bitches at that. From far and near have come letters support-ing my contention that show-bred dogs, given the opportunity, can hunt with the best. Mr. Geo. Shupee, U.S. Game Warden, of Corpus Christi, Texas, writes of a brace purchased from Mr. L. R. Krueger, of San Antonio, "Their intelligence is little short of marvellous, and it is indicative to me of what their get will be." In building a pack for killing power and intelligence, and real hard work over rough ground and in a trying climate, show-bred Airedales were chosen, bred from outstanding English winners, some of them wellknown in Ontario, notably Int. Ch. Flornell Walnut King, who spent his last few years with Mr. Krueger, and sired some of his best stock. The same tale is told by Mr. McQuin, of Masson, Que., who was showing a fine brace by Ch. Cotteridge Brigand ex Fallcrest Charm at the Maple Leaf Gardens show. Some of his dogs, bred from imported winners for generations have gone north to forest rangers, and all have proved that the old hunting spirit is still there, only wait-

ing for the opportunity.

The Morris and Essex was a triumph for Canadian dogs, and Mr. Perkin's famous Int. Ch. Rockley Riot Perkin's famous Int. Ch. Rockiey Riou Act kept the flag flying by going to best of breed in the very best of company. Her brother R. Roastine Hot topped open dogs and went to winners, and another brother and sister, Rockley Sweet Memory of Shelterock, and Shelterock Jock, the property of Mr. S. H. Stewart, were high up in the award list with a half-brother, Rockley Brigadier, heading his classes. I understand the Shelterock brace are well on their way to the championship. Mr. McQuin's puppy, Rockside Tyrant, came 2nd. in his class, and Mrs. Marlatt's puppy bitch, by her own dog, Warland Michael, was 2nd. puppy, 1st. novice. Apologies if I have missed one, but I had to get news of this show second hand.

Dr. French writes that entries have been poor in the west, and economic conditions of recent years have discouraged several exhibitors, However, Mr. Danby who bought Rockley Patent Pending from Mr. Perkins last year, has sent one of her daughters to Int. Ch. Wycote Special Edition, and as L. Madame Hobbler is to be mated to the same sire. Perhaps in 1939 there will five-point shows again

in the prairie provinces.

To Mrs. G .- Every colour is allowable and merely a matter of personal taste and there are no preferential colours in the show ring; I've even read somewhere "that a good Peke cannot be of bad colour" but, be that as it may, there is no doubt that an attractive colouring goes a long way and will sell many otherwise plain puppies. Breeding for colour is a "will O' the wisp" as a few strains (except perhaps the new specialists in Blacks or Whites) are to be found who have not intermixed their colours in their aim to produce specimens, correct in points rather than of uniform colouring. I would rely more on the Dam to transmit her colouring, than on the sire, all the more so if one particular colour predominates in her pedigree, but it isn't a sure bet and you may get lots of throw backs and surprises. Particolours are most flashy and attractive and often carry more coat than reds or blacks. ground colour which may be black, red, biscuit or sable must be evenly broken with the white; ideal mark-ings being white blaze on forehead and cheeks, white chest, mane, legs, half tail and breechings. A special General Meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., will be held in Salon B. in the Mount Royal Hotel, Montreal, P.Q. on Saturday, September 3rd, 1938, at seven o'clock p.m., (D.S.T.). This meeting will be strictly confined to members in good standing and decision will be be standing, and admission will be by 1938 membership card only. This meeting is called by the Board of Directors and is in compliance with Article 7—Meetings, Section 1—
"Other general meetings shall be held at the time and placed fixed by the Board of Directors.

The object of the above meeting will be the consideration of the following proposed amendments to the Constitution:

"In accordance with Article 11 of the Constitution of the Canadian Kennel Club I herewith give notice of motion to amend the Constitution Article 7, section 1, first sentence. That this sentence be deleted and the following substituted therefor:

"The annual general meeting of the Club shall be held at such time and at such place as decided

upon by the Board of Directors of this Club."

IDENTIFICATION

"A breeder must apply to the Canadian National Live Stock Records for and be allotted letters for his exclusive use in identifying dogs whelped his property. Dogs whelped on or after January 1st, 1939, must be tattoo marked with the identification letters allotted the owner at birth. Animals not registered but whelped prior to January 1st, 1939, must be identified by tatoo marking with the registered letters of the owner at birth. In addition to the owner's registered identification letters there must also be tattooed a kennel number foltattooed a kennel number followed by a designating year letter. For 1938 the year letter is 'S', for 1939 'T' and for 1940 'U'. The letters 'F, 'O' and 'Q' not used as year letters.

"In the event of a change in

name of a parnership kennel or company or if a member of the same family is taken into partnership, the tattoo letters may be transferred on application to the Canadian National Live Stock Records, of the registered owner

records, of the registered owner or his authorized representative. Likewise, transfer may be made from a deceased owner to his heir."

"That Article 21, 'Fees' be amended in respect to fees, twelfth line, "Registration of Tattoo Letters." That the present fee to members he deleted and no fee to members be deleted and no fee charged. The fee to a non-member to be \$1.00 instead of \$2.00.

"In accordance with Article 11 of the Constitution of the Cana-

dian Kennel Club I herewith give notice of motion to amend the constitution as outlined above and I respectfully request that a special general meeting be called as provided for in the second sentence of Article seven, section 1, thereof."

It was now agreed to discuss the matter of the Minutes and the change in date referred to. Mr. Rooney explained the impossibility of members of his Province attending a general meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club in Montreal on August 24th, a date which conflicted with the Central Canada Exhibition dog show, and hence his reason for changing the date to August 30th. He assured the Directors that his action had been prompted by the most sincere motives, and that he felt obliged to register his objection to the remarks made by Mrs. McColl in respect to his attendance at the Directors' Meeting in May.

The President was requested to make an explanation concerning the present position of the Club's standing with the Department, and, in response, submitted the following statement:-

"After our Annual Meeting the position of the Department of Agriculture regarding our Constitution was so impressed upon me and on the Live Stock Records that Col. Bull, Chairman of the Record Committee, Mr. Strachan and I went to Ottawa to interview the Director of Agricultural Production, Mr. Rothwell, who is responsible to the Minister of Agriculture for the carrying out of the provisions of the Live Stock Pedigree Act,

to try to have our position straightened out. The Live Stock Pedigree Acts stipulates that all breed associations registering under the Act must provide in their Constitutions for some method of identification of animals. An amendment to this effect was first introduced at our Annual Meeting, February, 1935, but has been consistently turned down ever since. The Minister of Agriculture being willing to grant us time, has provisionally approved of our Constitution until this year. At the meeting in Ottawa above mentioned, the situation was thoroughly discussed, it being the consensus opinion that the annual meeting being held in Toronto and being controlled by Toronto members, that it was use-less to try to have the amendment passed there. Various ways of having it passed were suggested, one of them being to have a general meeting either in Winnipeg or Montreal, both of which centres seemed to be favourable to the amendment. Nothing, however, was decided, awaiting the decision of the Minister.

"On April 30th last, a letter was

"On April 30th last, a letter was written by the Assistant Director of Production advising us that ministerial approval of our Constitution would not be further granted. This left us in the position of not being able to register dogs. Realizing the seriousness of the situation, Col. Bull and Mr. Hitchman, chairman and Director Mr. Hitchman, chairman and Director of the Records, got in touch with Mr. Strachan and myself suggesting that, as it seemed impossible to have matters straightened out by a Toronto general meeting that the Directors' meeting of May 19th call a general meeting in Montreal to endeavour to pass the amendment adopting indentification, they having the promise of the Department that if the Directors would agree to do this, that registrations would be continued up until that time. Col. Bull, Mr. Hitchman and Mr. Rooney, at my request, attended this meeting and explained the position of the Kennel Club to the Directors, and they passed a resolution calling for a general meeting in Montreal, and an amendment was introduced to be brought up at this general meeting, which would cover the situation. The Department at Ottawa was wired as to the action taken, and provisional approval of our Constitution to September 15th, up to which time dogs will be registered, has been received. As to whether dogs will be registered after that time or not depends on the

action taken at that general meeting.

My chief interest lies in the good and welfare of the Canadian Kennel Club, but the Kennel Club has been more than leniently dealt with. One other Association in the Records, the Minister of Agriculture himself being a member of that Association, has been checked up much more harshly than we have. It has been stated that we would be much better off out of the Records but again this is not correct. Under the provisions of the Live Stock Pedigree Act no person or Association can issue registration certificates without the approval of the Minister of Agriculture. Since our affiliation in 1915 with the Records, the Kennel Club share of the Department grant has amounted to \$25,755.68. The total revenue of the Kennel Club during that time was \$356,984.22. cost of conducting the work at the Record's office was \$114,021.35, of which the above \$25,755.68 was paid by

the Government. The actual cost to the Club was therefore \$88,265.67, or 24.6 per cent of the money received, leaving the Club a net profit of 75.4 per cent. In addition to this we received free postage or franking privileges (paid by the Department of Agriculture). This cannot be estimated in cash, but on the 1100 Stud Books sent out in 1937, the Department paid sixteen cents per copy alone, and more correspondence is handled for the Kennel Club than for any other Associa-tion. In addition to all this the Government furnishes the Records with a free building, light, heat, cleaning and elevator service, printing service in everything except Stud Books, which if the Records had to pay would add very materially to the cost of the various Associations.

"There are only two things to do if we wish to continue to register dogs, either to bring such pressure on the Minister as to get him to agree to further provisionally approve our Constitution, and in this we would have the strong opposition of the majority of the other Associations in the Re-cords, or to approve the amendment at the general meeting.

After further discussion, it was regularly moved by Mr. Reeves, seconded by Mr. Rooney and unanimously carried:-

"That, the Minutes be adopted, showing the date of the general meeting to be held at Montreal as on Saturday, September 3rd, 1938, at 7 o'clock p.m. (daylight saving time), and not August 24th, as in the original Minute."

This being the business coming be-

fore the Directors at this time, it was moved: that

"That, this meeting do now adjourn."

narrow fronted nor yet so wide as to interfere with free action of the forelegs. Ribs well sprung, deep and carried far back, short in the couplings and flank, free from any tucked appearance. Back and loin immensely strong and compact in proportion to the size of the dog, the former level and the latter slightly arched. Hips wide, with quarters considerably rounded and very muscular.

Legs and Feet .- Forelegs short and straight, though proportionately longer than in any of the other breeds of short-legged Spaniels; strongly boned and muscled, with elbows well let down and straight, short, strong pasterns. Hindlegs proportionately short. Stifles well bent, strong thighs, clearly defined. Hocks clean, strong, well let down, presenting an impressive combination of propelling power. Feet neither small nor large, round, firm, not spreading and with deep, strong, horny pads and plenty of hair be-tween the toes. They should turn neither in nor out.

Stern .- Should be set on and carried level with the back, and when at work its action should be incessant in


