



METHODS OF IDENTIFICATION


In order to comply with the provisions of the Live Stock Pedigree Act in the matter of Identification, the committee appointed by your Directors, viz. Mrs. R. McColl, Mr. F. W. Walkerdine and myself, after consultations with the Deputy Minister of Agriculture, Dr. Barton, and after writing to each Provincial Director for his opinion, has decided to place before the Annual Meeting an amendment to the Constitution covering three forms or methods of Identification, viz., tattooing, nose-printing and charting, the breeder to have his or her own choice of which method to employ. These three methods are each explained by a member of this committee and subject to the approval of the Department of Agriculture and to the Annual Meeting. The acceptance of methods, providing they are workable, reasonable in cost of application and constitute a practical and effective system of identification, will ensure the Canadian Kennel Club a Constitution on a par with all other member Associations of the Records.

TATTOOING

By Colonel J. N. MacRAE

The Shetland sheep dog illustrated here is permanently identified as the fifth dog registered by J. D. Strachan during the year 1938, a positive identification for the lifetime of the dog. AE are Mr. Strachan's registration letters allotted to him by the National Livestock Records; S is the year letter for 1938; and 5 marks this puppy as the fifth registered by Mr. Strachan in that year



Anyone who may have had an ear to the ground in recent days, will have come to the conclusion that the question of identification in respect to pure-bred dogs, must now be given the consideration that it has been denied for the past several years. Chapter 4, sub-section (n) of section 1 of the Live Stock Pedigree Act must now be complied with if the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., is to continue functioning under that Act. The sub-section to which we have made reference reads as follows:

"A practical and effective system of identification." These seven simple words in themselves cannot possibly be misunderstood, literally their meaning is perfectly clear, but the difficulty has been in finding and deciding on what might be considered 'a practical and effective system'. As an association we have steered clear of the issue for several years but now it lies on our doorstep, and there it will remain until we see fit to remove it, but the onus for its removal lies with each individual member of the Canadian Kennel Club.

The brains of our organization have been called upon to face the situation, and so far three possible systems have been proposed, and each system has found its own percentage of membership support. The three systems referred to are Tattooing, Nose Printing and Charting, and the object of this section of a covering article has to do with tattooing exclusively as 'a practical and effective system'. This system has been largely adopted by other associations already and its efficacy has been conceded.

Many members from coast to coast have voluntarily asked for, and have been allotted tattoo letters. Many members own their own tattoo outfit. Such provinces as Quebec and Alberta have taken to tattooing quite enthusiastically, the Edmonton Dog Fancier's Club accepted the principle of tattooing by unanimous resolution.

The illustration used in this section shows a Shetland sheepdog which has been tattooed. Our readers may see at a glance that this system is at least effective. The notation on the certificate of registration reads, "—tattoo AES5 right ear"—so that this dog and his certificate are really synonomous, the one is the other, and the other is the one, and both are the same, and herein lies the breeder's protection as a seller, and the client's protection as a buyer, and with all due respect to "Henry's 20th Century Book of Formulas, Processes and Trade Secrets", nothing will ever remove this identification without showing a permanent mark of interference. Once the certificate and the dog it represents are together protection is foolproof and absolute, of that I am satisfied.

The process of tattooing is quite simple, although the beginner may find it to his advantage to practice placing the letters and figures into the holder of the tattoo instru-


ON ORDINARY DESK PAD

Although dogs have been man's best friend and constant companion for thousands of years, it was not until the year 1938 that a means of identification was found as positive as the fingerprinting of humans.

For the past five years, the question of identification has been before your Board of Directors and each year tattooing was the only method brought to the annual meetings.

It remained for the challenge to be hurled on May 19th before the members became serious, and the result has been the discovery by the Canadian Kennel Club of



the practicability of nose printing of dogs. While an article in the "Philadelphia Inquirer" started the Canadian fanciers to work, the finished product and the adoption of it as a practical and effective system of identification belongs to the Canadian Kennel Club. Most opportune is the fact that this discovery was made in our Jubilee year, and will always be remembered as a highlight of the event.

While a very great deal has already been done to promote ease and effectiveness of the system of nose printing, there remains the necessity of gaining the confidence and whole-hearted co-operation of the dog fanciers as a whole. To this end we hope to enlighten the readers on the basic principles of this method of identification, and to correct some mistaken ideas concerning it.

Probably it would be wise to set forth some of the requirements any method of identification must necessarily possess before it can be considered of value. The first requisite, of course, is that the method be absolutely foolproof in determining the individual dog—it must differentiate between dogs of the same litter, as well as between dogs belonging to different breeds. In addition, the system must be equally effective for dogs of all sizes, breeds, coats and colors. Following this, it is necessary to satisfy our love and high regard for dogs by assuring ourselves that the method is not only humane but fool-proof to the nth degree, and will not inflict any unnecessary, pain on the subject. The third quality the chosen method must possess, just as important, probably, as the first two, is the practicability of its use. The novice must find it as

The nose of a boxer is one of the most difficult of all breeds to print. Note the clarity of this print taken with fingerprinting ink by rolling the paper from bottom to top rather than from side to side easy to use as the veteran breeder. Last but not least, it must be reasonably economical.

From the foregoing it is easily seen that many methods of identification must fall by the way-side through a process of elimination when subjected to these tests. It is reasonably logical to assume that if a suggested method can come through these tests with colors flying, it will be well worth the serious consideration of all dog fanciers.

The experiments already made have proven that the print of a dog's nose is as absolutely individual as any one of the hundreds of thousands of human fingerprints on file in the criminal investigation departments of our law enforcement agencies. The photographs of noseprints reproduced herewith if given studied attention will demonstrate to the naked eye the difference in formation and position of "channels" in the print. In order to make the system practical, the identification provided by these prints may be transmitted by telegraph.

In discussing the method of nose-printing, let us imagine you actually working with your dog. The first step is to wipe the nose dry. Then place a minute portion of the ink on the centre of the nose, spreading it lightly over the entire nostril. A piece of smooth surfaced paper is wrapped around a small round bottle, the size of your finger. The actual print is then taken by rolling the paper from one side of the nose to the other. The curiosity of the dog is such that the whole movement can be completed before he knows it has happened.

There is nothing in this treatment which requires professional knowledge or years of experience. Any novice with a small amount of practice will become proficient in taking good, clear prints. The other advantage of the system is the economy. The cost of the necessary equipment (paper will be supplied with your application blanks) is comparatively negligible.

The simplicity of the process is indicated by the three prints herewith taken on ordinary desk pad paper and common printers ink by the Montreal Toy Dog Club whose letter follows:

"At the annual meeting of the Mount Royal Toy Dog Club held on Tuesday, October the 18th, 1938, the nose printing system was explained and with the following resolution, endorsed by ninety-nine per cent of the members, was passed: 'That we strongly approve and recommend the method of nose prints as the most humane and positive means of permanent identification for dogs' ".


The co-operation of the Live Stock Records office has been valuable in that it has been made possible to embody nose prints on the actual registration form, thus making it impossible to remove the nose print without destroying the entire registration certificate. Two prints will be returned with each application blank, one to remain on file in the office and the other to be applied on the certificate.

The ink has been secured through the efforts of W. A. Fuller, Jr., of Ottawa. It was due to his research work that a suitable type of ink, containing no injurious acids, in a tube container was located, which will efficiently handle the work of obtaining clear prints. These tubes, when purchased by the kennel club in sufficient quantities to supply a large number of dog owners, will be extremely economical for anyone's use.



GREAT DANE AT ONE WEEK




GREAT DANE AT THREE MONTHS

CHART SYSTEM OF IDENTIFICATION

By Fred W. Walkerdine

Having been appointed as a delegate to visit Ottawa and discuss the matter of Identification by the method known as Tattooing, it seemed possible to me, (in view of the fact so many breeders were against the method of tattooing), that some other system or systems could be made available for consideration and adoption. On Friday August 5th last we had the pleasure of discussing this all important matter of Identification with the Deputy Minister of Agriculture. During this conference I suggested an amendment to the original one, which dealt only with Tattooing, so that a breeder who fails to adopt the principle of tattooing for any reason, could adopt other systems if found practical and effective.

Dr. Barton, the Deputy Minister of Agriculture was very interested in any method that would prove practical and effective as a means of Identification, and now the committee has been working toward creating these systems to a point that has satisfied the Minister, action is now the real thing. The dead line of August 15th for Registration has been extended to one week following our Annual Meeting of February, 1939.

In this issue, three systems are being placed before the Members. I shall deal with the Chart System I have recommended. Above is set out an Identification Chart, and it will be seen that the dog is profiled from three different positions. Without a doubt all the markings necessary can be placed in their respective positions, if instructions are carefully followed, so that identification would be a simple matter. It is, of course, understood that this system could not be adopted for dogs of solid color, but nevertheless it would cover a good many varieties of breeds. I have also taken into consideration that sometimes a dog's markings may change in color, but at the same time it is hardly possible for the markings to actually change to a degree that the dog could not possibly be identified from the original application when registered.

Practically every known color has been embodied into these instructions, each one having its own abbreviation, and from the markings set out on chart below it should be a simple matter to complete. It will be noticed on the very bottom line of chart the predominating color is set out, and in this instance the color is white.

It does not necessitate a separate chart for each breed, but drawings of a dog could be adopted to cover as many breeds as possible, such as one for a good many terriers, hounds, etc., etc. In fact, this part can very easily be handled once the system has been adopted and embodied into the Club's Constitution.

In concluding, I sincerely hope that a definite system or systems of Identification will be adopted at the next Annual Meeting in order to comply with the Live Stock Pedigree Act.

impressions on a piece of heavy paper, then when he is satisfied that he understands the method he is ready to commence tattooing.—AES5—found on a dog's ear, his lip, belly, flank or other suitable location would mean that this was the fifth dog registered by our Secretary J. D. Strachan in 1938, AE being Mr. Strachan's alloted letters. 5 would represent the fifth dog registered in S the year letter for 1938.

To tattoo properly is simplicity itself. First you clean off the location chosen for the tattoo marking. This may be done with a wet rag, although a piece of cotton wool soaked in rubbing alcohol will be found very efficient.

Then you will spread the ink evenly over the chosen place, put the instrument there and bring it together quickly. Following this, the procedure is that the ink must be rubbed into the spots made by the needle points of the letters or figures. Time removes the ink left on the surface, leaving tattooed markings—a clear cut idenment and then trying the combination out, by making tification for the lifetime of the dog.

As President of the Canadian Kennel Club, I have been obliged to favor tattooing as the only method brought forward up to that time, and as your President, I was duty-bound to ask the members to conform to the requirements of the Live Stock Pedigree Act, and that I have conscientously endeavoured to do without fear or favor.

True Tales of Real Dogs

NIPPER: THE CAVALRY MASCOT

BACK in 1923, Nipper joined the army. In the summer of 1932, a file of soldiers fired a military salute over his grave and two regimental buglers sounded "taps" over him. Those were the first and the last scenes of Nipper's martial experience. But between the two lay nine years of gallant and unfailing martial service.

Nipper came from nobody-knows-where. One morning in 1923, he strolled—or, rather, strutted—into the cavalry barracks of the Royal Canadians—known as "Lord Strathcona's Horse"—in Winnipeg.

As I said, he strutted into the barracks as one having a legal right there and entitled to a welcome. He did not slink in seeking for food or shelter, nor wag his way ingratiatingly into those sacred precincts. No general offi-

cer could have made a more pompously self-assured entrance. He made the round of the premises. Then he settled down in the stables, evidently choosing them as his future home. He belonged to nobody there. He did not make particular friends with any one of the cavalrymen. He just made himself calmly at home.

That was Nipper's introduction to the Canadian cavalry service. That was the start of his nine years of volunteer military duty. Perhaps because of his self-assured manner, the troopers welcomed him.

Professional dogbreeders, seeing Nipper for the first time, described him as a "black

mongrel," but they were careful not to speak of him in that way where any of the cavalrymen of the Strathconas could hear them. Troopers have hard fists. And they hit first and listen to explanations afterward. Also, their whips have a nasty sting when they slash across the faces of civilians who speak ill of anything connected with the service.

The Strathconas, themselves, characterized Nipper as "a mixed Scottish terrier." I have seen photographs of the grand little dog. And assuredly he was much more a Scottish terrier than anything (or everything) else.

The best kind of Scottish terrier—"Scotty," if you prefer—is hard to equal. He has the heart of a lion in the body of a pigmy, the brain of all canny Scotland encased in a small and rough-haired head.

In any event, Nipper quickly won so many friends and admirers among the Strathconas that it would have been next to suicidal for any outsider to have referred openly to him as a mongrel or a mutt.

Soon, the newspapers were mentioning the queer little mascot of the Strathconas. And one of these articles about

him, in the Winnipeg Free Press, gives a mighty good reason for the ever-growing devotion of the cavalrymen for him.

"Nipper adopted the 'Straths', and particularly their horses, as his especial charge. He was small and black and wise. He was always present, but never in the way. He bore himself with the dignity befitting a soldier. Ever he kept himself clean and dapper.

"Nipper scorned civilians. Perhaps before he enlisted with the 'Straths', civilians had not understood the little fellow, and, with canine sagacity, he liked his revenge.

"Unless a man were in Khaki, Nipper ignored his presence completely, and remained as aloof and isolated as a dead planet. Despite his short legs, Nipper religiously

kept his place in the troop, taking, as if by right of seniority, either the head or the rear of the column, as his fancy dictated."

Never in all his nine years of service did Nipper miss a parade. No matter how fast nor how far the regiment might ride, his flying black legs were always carrying him along with it. Sometimes the strain must have been terrific, as when the order came for a charge or for galloping. But Nipper was right there. With almost miraculous cleverness he picked up the duties of the regiment.

For instance, within a very few weeks after he "joined up," he knew the meaning of every

one of the various bugle calls, and what actions on the part of the men and the horses these bugle-calls entailed.

In Winnipeg, as in the northern parts of the United States, the summers are often grillingly hot and the winters, bitter cold and snow-laden. But mere trifles like sunstroke weather or zero-and-snow could not keep Nipper from his place in every parade of every squadron of his chosen regiment.

If the heat half-singed his coarse black coat, if the cold struck to his very vitals, if it was hard wading through the deep snow in which even the horses floundered, Nipper did not flinch. His place was with his men and his horses. And always he was in his place, "either at the head or the rear of the column."

Always he was the perfect soldier, alert, fearless, visiting the various posts, accompanying the pickets on night duty, up at gray dawn to superintend the first activities of the men who were on stable duty.

And for nine long and happy years, this busy mode of life went on, while yearly the "Straths" grew more and (Continued on Page 27)



THE CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB, Inc.

"Since the Canadian Kennel Club II 38 became incorporated under the National Live Stock Pedigree Act of the Federal Department of Agriculture, it has risen from a practically obscure organization to an honored place amongst the most pro-minent Live Stock Associations of Canada. Kennel & Bench, August, 1917

HE above quotation can be taken as being literally representative of the feeling of the management at the time it was written. Indeed the dark days were over and the Club's lucky star continued to climb encouragingly. In Canada the people were becoming alarmed as the war dragged towards the end of its third year. Information had come through the English canine magazines that, because of pressure which had been brought to bear on the Kennel Club there by the British government, a resolution had been passed not to register any dogs born after September 7th, 1917. This was a virtual prohibition of breeding that was traceable to the country's food requirements and it is quite possible that the measure had a sobering effect in every country in the world having canine registration control. This prohibitory measure was enforced in England until after the signing of the armistice and was only removed on and after November 22nd, 1918, when breeding operations were resumed. More could be written around this epochal legislation, but it is sufficient to say that many puppies were born during the prohibited period, and whilst arrangements were made to allow the 'war babies' to be exhibited, registration in England was frowned upon, and so, many found their way to the United States and Canada, giving an impetus to importation such as had hitherto been unknown. Bulldogs came out steadily and included such dogs as "Joe Penfield", "Penfold Selection", "Quapaw Civilian", Mersey Pilot", "Jellicoe Westall", "Try Again William", "Overgreen Marquis", "King Moston", etc. Airedales to come over were "Parkton Sweet Olive", "Potterry Invader", etc.

When 1918 came into focus, and before our people had got over exchanging their New Year Greetings, Mr. Humphrey Elliott had taken his beautiful bull terrier "Ch. Haymarket Faultless" to Westminster Kennel Club Show sporting his Canadian crown, when lo and behold the noble "Faultless" was chosen as best dog of all the 1,636 dogs benched. This Westminster Kennel Club Show dates back to 1877, a mere trifle of 41 years at that time, or 61 years at the present time, but the great "Haymarket Faultless" was the only dog ever to bring Westminster's highest honors to Canada and this outstanding incident in itself

made 1918 Canada's greatest year from a purely dog show standpoint.

At the election of 1919 the writer was elected 2nd Vice-President of the Canadian Kennel Club, but the fates had decreed that he was not to be permitted any length of tenancy in the new office, as on February 10th, 1919, he was offered the Secretary-Treasurer-Editorship and accepted the same. The vacant 2nd Vice-Presidency was then filled by Mr. Fred W. Jacobi.

During the preceding thirty years of the Club's existence no established office routine had been perfected, as for instance when a championship had been completed it was customary to send a claimant an Application for Championship form, leaving the onus on the applicant to show where the dog had been in competition, when, under what judges and the championship points claimed, this aggravating policy was provocative beyond description, and usually the form came back to headquarters with a letter of sarcastic criticism and the only check at the office was the marked catalogues and oftentimes these were missing. One of the first adjustments made was to enter up all winnings on the reverse side of the office copy of a dog's pedigree as the shows were held, carrying the number of points won to the extreme right of the form, and in a column for that purpose, so that when ten points showed, and a check showed three different judges, a letter was promptly dispatched to the owner of the new champion advising of the distinguished event, and offering the Club's congratulations, and in the past twenty years this practice has not been improved upon. Banking was something that had been neglected terribly, and the policy of banking each week, on Friday, was inaugurated and still continues. Filing equipment was procured, suitable desks were purchased, and for the first time the Canadian Kennel Club headquarters took on the appearance of a place of business. The long standing complaint that "the office was never

open," was at once removed and anyone with Club business to be taken care of could find satisfactory service from 8.30 a.m. until 5.30 p.m. This policy has continued for twenty years, too, only the hours are now 9 a.m. until 5 p.m., Saturdays 1 p.m. It took some considerable time to spread satisfaction, and to engender confidence from the one coast to the other, but in time that happy condition became actual. In this work of revamping the Club's structure and policy the co-operation of the President and the Directors was always enthusiastically given.

As further encouragement at this time the President of the Canadian Kennel Club was honored by being made a Director of the Canadian National Exhibition. This preferment was greatly appreciated by Canadian dog lovers who remembered the long years given to the Presidency by the Exhibition Manager,

Mr. John G. Kent.

During 1919 the remnants of the Western Canada Kennel Club, The Winnipeg Kennel Club and the Manitoba Kennel Club merged and the Fort Garry Kennel Club was born. Our Manitoba Director, Mr. George Kynoch, was given full credit for giving the new club its name. Each of the merging clubs had assets and liabilities, but the F.G.K.C. assumed everything, and after a period of readjustment Winnipeg became one of Canada's leading canine centers.

Just as the year 1919 was drawing to its close, and to be more exact, on December 29th the American Champion Collie, "Alstead Aeroplane", which had been brought to Toronto early in the year and had taken "french leave" of his importer, Mr. Alex. Donaldson, the Sunday morning after his arrival in Canada and had been at large for ten long months, was recaptured in High Park, Toronto, by Dr. J. A. Campbell, and hard as it may be to believe, this magnificent animal was in excellent condition when he was brought back to the owner, who naturally was of the opinion that his collie was one of the best in the world, and in this respect there were many who agreed with Alick. "Champion Alstead Aeroplane" came out at Toronto Kennel Club Show in April. 1920, and from there he was campaigned from London in the east to Winnipeg in the west, and he never met defeat by one of his own breed or sex. Canadian Kennel Club records show that he won breed honors at the Canadian National Exhibition in 1920, 1922 and 1924. Such winnings mark this lovely tri-colored collie as the best specimen ever to come

From a financial viewpoint 1919 was a most encouraging year, and income had

exceeded 5 figures for the first time, and Kennel & Bench had shown a substantial profit in its first year.

At the Annual Meeting of 1920 Mr. Russell embarked on his fourth term as President from a kindly acclamation at the hands of the members, but it was with a measure of alarm that they received the information that he had given up his seat in the Provincial House because of ill-health, and it was a great relief when he made it clear that he would continue as President of the Club. The Financial Statement showed Receipts \$13,037.07, and Disbursements \$9,794.55. Kennel & Bench had earned \$2,378.08 and spent \$2,208.82, so that in spite of meeting heavy obligations in every department, the Club was living well within its means. However, just to make ends meet comfortably and to get beyond the financial stringency which had so long been characteristic of the Club's functioning, the members agreed to raise the membership fee from \$3.00 to \$4.00 per year.

The cost of printing the February, 1920, Special February Number of Kennel & Bench was \$610.94, a new all time high, and there were many who criticised the outlay, however, the President and Directors had agreed that in order to make money, some money would have to be spent, and their answer to the critics was raising the Editor's salary \$10.00 per week at the Directors' Meeting held on March 18th. A further mark of growing interest in the Club's magazine was the invitation extended to the Editor by the Regina Kennel Club to attend their summer show in the capacity of official reporter, all expenses to be paid by the host club. The Directors authorized acceptance of the invitation and arranged for the necessary leave of absence. This visit to Regina was the appetizer that led to the later visit to the far west in 1926, and to the east in 1927 when contacts made in every city and town visited led to friendships which have had a steadying influence on Club affairs ever

Just prior to the Canadian National Exhibition of 1920 the Club's Honorary Veterinary Surgeon, Dr. J. A. Campbell, had the degree of Batchelor of Veterinary Science conferred upon him by the very conservative Ontario Agricultural College. This preferment was well deserved and the worthy Veterinarian received the congratulations of a host of admirers.

As 1920 spent itself the years business showed that an income of \$14,773.72, when added to the Bank Balance of \$3,242.52 had piled up the extraordinary total of \$18,016.25. The expenditure being \$10,857.09, the balance to be carried over to 1921 was \$7,159.15. Small wonder then, that one of the Club's members in an outburst of enthusiastic appreciation of the Club's affairs went

on record as saying: "The salvation of the Canadian Kennel Club only came with the selection and election of Mr. Joseph Russell as President." This excellent encomium, deserved as it unquestionably was, could not be complete without acknowledgement of the Live Stock Records affillation.

The Annual General Meeting held on February 7th, 1921, was indicative of a returning Provincial confidence when the election results showed that the President, Vice-President, Second Vice-President, the Directors for Alberta, British Columbia, Manitoba, the Maritimes, Quebec and Saskatchewan were all elected by acclamation. At this election Col. G. F. McFarland came back to the Ontario directorate.

At the beginning of August, 1921, the teeth of the Live Stock Pedigree Act bit into our Canadian dog fanciers with a vengeance when it was found that an application for registration containing a false or fraudulent statement regarding the pedigree of a dog contrary to Section 17, Chapter 31 of the Act. A fine of \$100.00 without costs had a deterring effect that must have been to the advantage of Canadian dogdom generally. As it will serve no useful purpose to mention names, or to give further particulars regarding the above indiscretion we make no further reference to it.

September brought a new Patron to the Club in the august person of General The Right Honourable Baron Byng of Vimy, G.C.B., K.C.M.G., M.V.O., Governor General of Canada.

The summer of 1921 found the 'grim reaper' overtaking some of the men who had rendered major service to Canadian dogdom generally. June noticed the "passing hence" of Mr. John H. Kenyon, and July marked the passing of Mr. Arthur Atkinson, both men had given leadership to Toronto Clubs, and service to the Canadian Kennel Club.

The year was magnificent from a financial viewpoint, and it was most gratifying to the officers to find the business expanding beyond their fondest hopes. Receipts \$26,179.00, and Expenditure \$17,503.75, with the difference carried forward into 1922.

February, 1922, found Stud Book No. 24 in the office, and this marked the Club's stud book obligations met to December 31st, 1920. The book was one

of 377 pages and included the 2,526 pedigrees between 22,950 and 25,476. Two volumes had been published during 1921, and it was hoped that Stud Book No. 25 for 1921, and so right up to date by the time of the Annual Meeting. This made three stud books to be distributed to the members in a period of two months. The Directors felt that arrears of stud books constituted the Club's first obligation to the members, and it was a great relief to find that in future the Club's finances would be freed from this terrific strain, and the future was welcomed with a feeling of joyous security.

When 1922 gave way to 1923 it was possible to start off the new year on the right foot with a Bank Balance of \$10,-638.18, and it was a source of official pride that the Official Organ continued to show an encouraging surplus from year to year.

1923 was marked indelibly in many ways, as for instance it was found that the Alsation Shepherd Dog Club of Canada was to be the instrument used in bringing the breed (now known as the German Shepherd dog), into great popularity in Canada. Then the old established Toronto Kennel Club which had remained in a more or less dormant condition during the years 1920, 1921 and 1922, left its legarthic cobwebs, and due to the application of new energy at the hands of Mr. George Ward, Mr. Ed Ward and Mr. George Eastham, the loose ends of the old club were brought together. Some where inclined to raise the old banner under a new name but sane judgment prevailed. The new officers with the old club found themselves on an even keel and with an asset of 300 benches, all in good condition, then of course there were valuable club dies, etc., which meant an excellent start from the very beginning. The Toronto Kennel Club, like the Shepherd Club are both agressive organizations at the time of writing. 1923 will always be an outstanding year in the dogdom of the world. It was then that the "Field Distemper Research Fund" was first placed before the world's dog lovers. The appeal was favorably received officially in Canada and the Canadian Kennel Club handling their first genuine, untrammelled surplus funds decided to donate one hundred guineas in four yearly instalments, and so \$124.04 was donated in 1923, \$118.65 in 1924, \$127.95 in 1925 and \$125.64 in 1926. Surely no better investment ever was made and the mortality of dogdom owes its present enviable rating to the research made possible by the success of the "Field" appeal.

We pause here to pay tribute to a cocker spaniel that first saw the light of day at Winnipeg, Manitoba, believing as we do that this particular dog was never

"Records from April, May, June and July issues of the American Kennel Gazette give results from 71 shows, having a combined entry of 32 187 dogs. Of this number 3,083—nearly 10 per cent of the total entry—were Cocker Spaniels, yet the Cockers had the honor of going Best in Show but twice. Had the percentage of Best in Show wins been in accordance with the entries, the breed would have gone Best in Show seven times.

"Now what is wrong? Is it that the Cocker Breeder is not careful enough in his breeding to produce more sufficiently good dogs? Is it that he shows any specimen so that the shows will have a large entry? Is it that the Cocker is not a sufficiently attractive and dignified dog to be worthy of the honor of Best in Show? It doesn't seem possible that so many good Judges could be overlooking good Cockers, and it doesn't seem possible that out of 3,083 Cocker entries only two were good enough to go Best in Show, when Breeds with comparatively small entries went as high as eleven times Best in Show during the same period.

"If the present condition is due to the way the Cocker Breeder is breed-ing, it is time he changed his system. If it is that the Cocker is the forgot-ten breed (as far as Best in Shows go) then it is time he is being remembered.

"Mr. and Mrs. Cocker Fancier, what do you think is the matter? The Michigan Cocker Spaniel Club would like your comment on this and maybe the trouble can be remedied and the most popular breed in the U.S.A. and most popular breed in the U.S.A. and Canada today—the Cocker Spaniel—will be on a level with the rest of the dog world. Please let us hear from you. We want your ideas."

Among the many replies and opinions received à propos of Mr. Downer's article, there has been nothing but commendation. The general impression seems to be that shyness and hysteria are hereditary, and that dogs and bitches known to be afflicted should not be bred from. While a puppy can be forgiven a hysterical fit at his first show, surely adults should be capable of taking shows and judges in their stride. A dog with this "germ" of unsound temperament inherent in his breeding can be sent off by the merest trifles, loud-speakers, fire-crackers, thunderstorms, and frequently by indigestion, where a sound dog will be quite unaffected. There is an appreciable difference between actual shyness and the in-difference sometimes shown in the ring by a working dog who regards shows as just so much unnecessary and meaningless routine, and the judge's nods and becks as extremely dull in comparison with the serious manoeuvres of a ground-hog. Any judge, and indeed, any ring-sider, can tell the difference, but shows are shows, and it is obvious that many a game, keen worker in the field who can only achieve an expression of can only achieve an expression of patient long-suffering at a show, will go down to the charming "show-offs" that have all the tricks of the chorus-

that have all the tricks of the chorus-girl. The ideal is of course, to com-bine the two, but for that you have to "catch 'em young."

It is only fair to our Canadian airedales to say that a very fair per-centage of the windows are of the per-centage of the windows are are sensible and intelligent, but some are excellent workers. Mr. Thompson's Glenalla Mississauga Don has only

recently, (and to his disgust!) left the free life of the northern woods for the show kennel, and is a natural hunter. Our own Eastthorpe Patience was taken in hand soon after she arrived in this country, and striking up a friendship with our No. 1 groundhog killer, surprised us this spring by bringing home a few herself, in direct competition with her "pal". It is a fact, and several American judges have noticed it, that for a number of years now, there have been no shy or hysterical Canadian-breds at our shows. The occasional "jittery" one, the "chip-on-the-shoulder" lad, the dog that backs up and his companion who tries to bite the judge, have been

seen, BUT, believe it or not, they have NOT been Canadians! Count Cardelli's Allfire of Aldon, purchased as a puppy from Mrs. Harlatt, is going strong in the U.S.A., and we are hoping to see him in Canada before long. In fact, if all the "dark horses" we have heard about lately turn up for the Royal, there should be a record entry. In the old days when there were twelve in each class and an entry of 100 was no class, and an entry of 100 was no novelty, it was an honour to get any place at all. Now, we have fewer dogs and make our entries more cautiously, but I do not see why we cannot have fifty Airedales at the Winter Fair, and the Terrier Show. With fair specials, and two judges who most con-spicuously please themselves and place them as they see them, exhibi-tors should make a real effort to enter all they can, and end the year in fine style.



In answer to many requests and to settle a number of controversies on Dane color we reproduce here that portion of the standards adopted by the Great Dane Club of America, the Canadian Kennel Club and the Ameri-

can Kennel Club pertaining to color. Color—(a) Brindle Danes. Base color ranging from light golden yellow to deep golden yellow, always brindled with black, strong cross stripes. The more intensive the base color and the more intensive the brindling, the more attractive will be the color. Small white marks at the chest and toes and also light colored eyes and nails are not desirable. Faults: Silver blue or grayish blue base color; dull

showing.
(b) Fawn Danes. Golden yellow up to deep golden yellow color; black mask is desirable and also black nails. The deep golden yellow color must always be given the preference. Faults: Yellowish gray, bluish yellow, grayish blue and dirty yellow color (drab color) must be given lower rating. With regard to white markings, what has been stated above under (a) also applies here.

(c) Blue Danes. The color must be a pure steel blue as far as possible without any tinge of yellow or black. In connection with blue danes, lighter colored eyes are permissible. Faults: Yellow or deep blue color, very light, piercing or glassy eyes. What has been stated under (a) above applies here also with regard to white mark-

(d) Black Danes. Color black, glossy, black nose, dark eyes. Faults: Yellow black, brown black or blue black; light colored eyes. Danes with striking white markings must be given striking white markings must be given a lower rating in shows. White markings, such as stripes on the chest, speckled chest and markings on the paw are permitted here, but danes with deep white collar and high stockings and white belly should be excluded from shows.

(e) Harlequins. Base colors pure white, if possible, without any pointings, with black spots irregularly and

ings, with black spots irregularly and well distributed over the entire body, pure white neck preferred. (Eligible but less desirable are a few small gray spots.) The eyes should be dark but light colored eyes or two eyes of different color are permitted but not desirable. Black nose; black spotted or pink colored noses are permitted. Faults: White base color with a few large spots, bluish gray pointed back-ground and water colored, red or bleary eyes.

Males should not be less than 30 inches at the shoulders, nor females less than 28 inches.

Ideal conformation of an ideal great dane is seen in the Porcelain Statue by Rosenthal "Deutsche Dogge" No. 960-1, 2046-1.

At long last the three judges weeded out the candidates to five, two Scottish Terriers, a Cocker, a Chow and a Dalmatian. With all due deference to the three judges, we contend they were not at all well advised to keep two specimens of the same breed in such a small number for the final. We have never seen such a thing done before. Surely one of a breed is enough from which to make a selection? The Scottish Terriers were Mr. Robert Chapman's ten months old dog puppy, Heather Benefactor, purchased a month ago, formerly named Walsing Wonder and owned by W. M. Singleton, and Mr. G. M. Barr's bitch, Rosehall Bright Charm, and the piquancy of the situation was that Mrs. Pacey, the eminent Scottish Terrier judge, had already placed the bitch as best of breed, thereby beating the dog. It can therefore be imagined with what mixed feelings the vast doggy crowd watched the three

expert judges solemnly give a dog—which had been beaten for best of breed—the supreme honour of best in show.

The Scottish papers commented on this award in no uncertain terms. The Scottish "Daily Express" said "Boos mingled with cheers when Heather Benefactor was judged best dog of the 55th Scottish Kennel Club Show," and "The Bulletin" said "A verdict received in silence by the crowds around the judging ring."

Whilst congratulating Mr. Robert Chapman on winning the supreme award for the fifth year in succession at the Scottish K.C. show, four times running with Ch. Heather Realisation and this year with a son of his late champion (surely a record)—we do feel very strongly that the Kennel Club should not allow the two challenge certificate winners to compete for best in show. Only the best of breed should be permitted to come in for the final contest. This method would shorten the now wearisome procedure of three judges going over some 80 to 100 dogs and finally selecting one which has already met its Waterloo.

Truly the American system of selecting best in show from groups is far ahead of ours and never does such an anomaly occur in the States as that of a beaten dog taking the supreme honour.

Our sympathies are with Mr. G. M. Barr and Ch. Rosehall Bright Charm, but might there not be a cause underlying all this controversy. We will presume in the first place that "Heather Benefactor" is sound, then we will refer to last year's Metropolitan and Essex Show, Earl's Court, London. 5,049 entries, held on Dec. 9, '37. Mr. J. L. Merrill judged Scottish Terriers. His critique in the "Gazette" read "Rosehall Bright Charm, good-bodied bitch, nice head; lost on movement and soundness." If the three judges decided that "Heather Benefactor" had movement and soundness, therein lay the reason for their final judgment. "Our Dogs" on commenting upon Mr. Merrill's thorough job on the day has this to say "Mr. Merrill evinced decided ideas about the weight question while he was judging, because on several occasions he lifted the exhibit from the floor."

the weight question while he was judging, because on several occasions he lifted the exhibit from the floor." Having watched Ch. "Rosehall Bright Charm's" career from a pup we were extremely interested in the above, especially as our "Ch. Susan of Agbrigg" met and defeated "Bright Charm" twice, under Mr. J. L. Merrill at the above mentioned Metropolitan and Essex Show. Now let us hear again the judges' emphasis on soundness, on the day. His critique in the "Gazette" reads "Susan of Agbrigg, real good bitch, one of the few sound ones here today, nice clean skull, good body, front and hindquarters, should make a name for herself."

Our next show will be the Canadian Fox Terrier Ch. Show held at the Labor Temple, Church St., Toronto on Nov. 12th. Mr. Arthur Ellison, possibly the most experienced in point of actual breeding of Scottish Terriers, will be judging our breed. He deserves an excellent entry.

There is one show at which we can be sure of meeting all those interested in the breed, namely the Royal Winter Fair. This fixture finishes the 1938 circuits and is slated for Nov. 21-23. Clarence Grey, Esq. of international reputation will be our judge.

The next fixture of the Canadian Terrier Club will be held on Friday, Dec. 9th, at the Labor Temple, Church St., Toronto. It is at shows of this quality, that your young dogs will get the experience, that will so well stand them in good stead at future championship shows. We have advance knowledge that the premiums already subscribed, are away and above those usually experienced at sanctioned affairs.

ALL-TERRIER SHOW NOVEMBER 12

A goodly list of prizes and special trophies has assured a splendid entry for the all-terrier show of the Canadian Terrier Association to be held in the Labor Temple, Toronto, on November 12. NEWFOUNDLANDS

Breed Editor, Mrs. Mercedes Gibson, Carlington Post Office,

There has been, among breeders of the Newfoundland, a great deal of controversy regarding what a really good specimen should be. It might, therefore be as well, in this issue to give the official standard (as adopted by the Newfoundland Club of America) and in later issues to discuss

Symmetry and General Appearance. The dog should impress the eye with strength and great activity. He strength and great activity. He should move freely on his legs with the body swung loosely between them, so that a slight roll in gait should not be objectionable; but at the same time a weak or hollow back, slackness of the loins or cowhocks should be a decided fault.

HEAD. Should be broad and massive, the occipital bone well developed, there should be no decided stop, and the muzzle should be short, clean cut, and rather square in shape.

COAT. Should be flat and dense of a coarsish texture and oily nature and capable of resisting the water. If brushed the wrong way it should

fall back naturally into place.

BODY. Should be well ribbed up with a broad back. A neck. strong, well set up on to the shoulder and back with strong with strong

back, with strong muscular loins.
FORELEGS. Should be perfectly straight, well covered with muscle, elbows in but well let down and feathered all the way down.

HINDQUARTERS AND LEGS. Should be very strong; the legs should have great freedom of action and a little feather. Slackness of loins and cowhock are a great defect.

CHEST. Should be deep and fairly broad and well covered with hair but not to such an extent as to form a

BONE. Massive throughout, but not to give a heavy inactive appear-

FEET. Should be large and well shaped. Splayed or turned out feet

are objectionable.

TAIL. Should be of moderate length, reaching down a little below the hocks. It should be of fair thickness, and well covered with long hair, but not to form a flag. Tails with a kink or curled over the back, are very objectionable.

EARS. Should be small, set well back, square with the skull, lie close to the head and covered with short

hair, and no fringe. EYES. Should be small, and of a dark brown colour, rather deeply set

but not showing any haw and they should be rather widely apart.

COLOUR. Dull jet black. A slight tinge of bronze or splash of white on chest and toes not objectionable.

HEIGHT AND WEIGHT. Size and wight are your desirable and and wight are your desirable.

weight are very desirable so long as symmetry is maintained. A fair average height at shoulder is 28 inches for a dog and 26 inches for a bitch and fair average weight is dogs, 140 to 150 lbs.; bitches, 110 to 120 lbs.

The results are apparent in quality stock in both Canadian and American kennels. We understand Mrs. W. Wylie, of Cairndhu fame, has made arrange-ments to take over the Lindy stock.

We anticipate, with the issue of Kennel and Bench, readers will be in possession of all particulars in regards to the prize list of the forthcoming National Kennel Club Show at the Royal Winter Fair in Toronto. The increase in entries at the Canadian National Exhibition was a matter for congratulations but it is as yet far from what we have witnessed years ago and which ought yet to be a normal condition at our shows. Our breed is generally in good condition at this time of year and we look for it to be represented in quality and numbers in a reasonable ratio to the registrations which disclose the popularity of the pomeranian as the favourite toy dog.

DOBERMAN PINSCHERS

Breed Editor. Edwin L. Kerr, 432 Main St. E., Hamilton, Ont.

Space will not permit of general information on the feeding of dobermans, particularly puppies. However, if there is one food item that our breed must have plenty of, it is meat. A three month old puppy should have one half pound of meat a day and gradually increase this amount so that from six months to maturity one pound of meat per day is given. Beef or horse meat are the best. Never feed pork, potatoes, cake or pie crust. The meat fed with kibbled or broken biscuit along with milk should be the main diet. Meat may be fed raw twice a week and cooked the other days. Salmon, beef heart or pig's liver can be fed as a change in diet. Cooked carrots grated and few dessertspoons of tomato juice over the food twice a week are beneficial. Never give chicken or small bones. Large veal bones are best for puppies as they are soft and do not splinter. All dobermans should have plenty of exercise as they are an extremely active breed. Puppies owned in the city should be broken to the leash early in life, and must never be abused with the lead. Never use the lead as a means of punishment. A sharp clip with a folded newspaper and harsh words are all that is needed. A puppy recognizes the tone of your voice if you are scolding him, and they do not like to have you cross with them. They are usually anxious to please even if they do not seem to show it. The leash should be recognized as a signal for a walk, or a run, and never be looked on with fear and trembling. Puppies should be taken in the congested areas, made acquainted with noises people, street-cars, autos, and the general racket of city life. Take it very easy at first, stop when he stops, do not yank him, speak quietly to him. Gently urge him along but let him look everything over until he learns he has nothing to fear.

IRISH TERRIERS

Please pardon the omission of the many valuable suggestions, hints, and ideas sent in by the various Irish terrier breeders and fanciers as this article was written before the letters started to pour in. However, accept our thanks and rest assured that good use will be made of all the information received.

The Irish coat is unquestionably straight and wiry, medium in length and harsh in texture, giving a broken appearance, with a heavy or thick undercoat to bear exposure, since the Mick is essentially a working dog.

The correct coat requires very little attention and will never at any time hide the pleasing, jaunty, racey lines of the dog. The right type of coat will take the breeder a long way.

The Mick, however, like most other things, has gone modern. The craze for long, lean heads with lots of whisker by, may we say, surface buyers who buy on sight and appearance rather than on stability and soundness, has been met by breeders pro-ducing long whiskers. Such whiskers are invariably accompanied by a much softer and linty coat at the expense of the natural, correct coat.

The continued success of the Irish coat depends entirely on the care with which breeders make their matings in an effort to eliminate the linty element which will eventually produce soft, sheep-like terriers.

In color, red is the most desirable with permissible shades running from deep mahogany to wheaten. What is more pleasing than a nice warm wheaten red showing such quality and vitality making tampering and ca-mouflaging in the show ring unnecessary.

Like every living thing, Irish coats will respond in texture, color and growth to conditioning, treatment and diet; but space does not permit a de-tailed explanation of such treatment. Possibly, in some future issue we will be able to discuss conditioning; but in the meantime we will be glad to help with any problems our readers may come across.

Meeting of the Board of Directors, Oct. 20, 1938

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., was held in the Board Room of the Club's Offices, 25 Melinda Street, Toronto, on Thursday afternoon, October 20th, 1938, at 3.30 o'clock. The President, Col. J. N. MacRae, presided. Directors in attendance included W. H. Reeves, Dr. H. E. Batt, Mrs. E. Brown, Mrs. R. McColl, W. J. Risewick and Capt. H. Dudley-Waters.

The President called for the reading of the minutes, and it was regularly moved by Mrs. McColl, seconded by Capt.

Waters and carried:

"That, the minutes be taken as read.'

The Secretary advised that Mr. Walkerdine would appreciate meeting the Directors that afternoon at 4.45 o'clock. The President advised that he had invited

Mr. Walkerdine to attend.

The President reported that in view of the resolution passed at the last Board meeting he had written to each of the Club's Directors (excepting the Directors present at the last meeting), on the matter of satisfactory methods of identification; a copy of such letter was read as information. However only two Provincial Directors had replied, Mr. Rooney, and Mr. Irving both of whom had ex pressed their opinions frankly on the several proposed methods. The President advised that a conference had been held at Ottawa on the previous day when the matter of the means of noseprinting had been discussed, and reminded the Directors that full particulars of all proposed methods of identification would have to be filed with the Department before the end of the present month in order that the proposed amendment could be considered in good time. He thought that such amendment should embrace the alternates of tattooing, noseprinting, charting or any other method which may noseprinting, hereafter be found to be practical. To the President's proposal the Directors agreed.

Dr. Batt suggested that the November issue of Kennel & Bench would offer an opportune time for the appearance of a short educational article with illustrations and it was agreed to leave the preparation of the articles in the hands of Mrs. McColl, Mr. Walkerdine and

the Secretary.

A letter was read from the American Kennel Club which set forth that championship points were the same for all shows whether separate specialty shows or when held in conjunction with an all-breed show.

The Secretary read a letter from the Club's legal adviser reporting on the matter of the Committee on Constitution (Col. J. N. MacRae and himself), and received instructions to have a copy sent to each officer and Director as advance information.

In respect to the calling of Special General Meetings, the forthcoming such meeting called at Montreal for November 4th, the Secretary mentioned the impossibility of compiling certain information asked for. The President advised that the figures in respect to the Records end of the Club's business could be compiled but that the cost might be in the vicinity of \$1,000, and of course this would not and could not include the cost of preparing the figures of the Toronto office

A letter was read from the Club's legal

adviser, Mr. Peter Wright, with regard to the proposed Toronto Pet Shop By-law. Mr. Wright was of the opinion that it would be quite essential that the Kennel Club would make sure that certification for kennel licenses would only be made in the interest of bona fide owners of registered dogs.

The secretary advised that Mr. Walkerdine had just entered the office, and was instructed to have him attend in the Board Room, and upon Mr. Walkerdine entering, the President advised that he had received a letter from Mr. Walkerdine who had been informed that the chart system had been considered abandoned, and that he had agreed to drop it altogether, but that was not so. President was of the opinion that the chart system could function with the other two systems, and it was his intention to frame an amendment to the Constitution that could be discussed by the members at the Annual General Meeting.

After discussion it was regularly moved by Mr. Reeves, seconded by Mr. Risewick and carried:

"That, Mr. Walkerdine had been assured by the President that the Working Committee was still func-

tioning.

The President suggested that the various proposed methods of identification must be in his hands by October 27th in order that a properly worded proposed amendment could be drawn up and made ready for the Minister of Agriculture.

A letter was read from the Records office in respect to membership cards for 1939, and it was agreed to endorse the action of the Secretary in authorizing

them to be printed.

A letter from Mr. Irving, Vancouver, was read together with a statement of costs in connection with the Special General Meeting held at Vancouver on August 12th. At this juncture a letter was read from the Club's legal adviser and in consequence it was agreed to hold this matter in abeyance until Mr. Wright was in a position to advise the Directors

given the publicity which it deserved. We refer of course to "Major Oak Perfection", who was laterly known as "Lucknow Lottery". This dog came out at the Canadian National Exhibition Dog Show in 1920 under judge Mr. Arthur Garrick, and went from novice to winners. The 'wiseacres' shook their heads in mournful fashion, and Mr. Garrick's decisions were criticized and ridiculed with an irritating frankness. The critics just couldn't see anything in the little invader from the "'Peg", but here is what followed immediately afterwards. In 1921 the dog went to winners at Nassau County Kennel Club, at Devon, Poughkeepsie, North Shore, Rhode Island, Fairfield. Delaware, the Bronx and at Englewood. Then in 1922 our Canadianbred cocker hero won Best Sporting Dog -All Breeds at Westminster, Winners at Morris County, Best in Show -All Breeds at Mineola (587 dogs), Long Island, Moston, Patterson, Tuxedo. Specialty Show at Boston gave him Best Sporting Spaniel (106 dogs), 1923 he won the honors at the New York Specialty Show, Best Sporting Spaniel at Westminster again, Best Sporting Spaniel at Belmont Park, Best Sporting-All Breeds at Long Island and at Mineola again, Best Sporting Spaniel. During his show career "Major Oak Perfection" (Lucknow Lottery), came under Messrs. W. T. Payne, H. E. Mellenthin, F. Neilson, Townsend Scudder, Dr. H. B. Kobler, Macy Willets, Mrs. Halcy Fiske, Dr. John de Mund, Howard Garden, etc., etc. The dog was bred by Mr. Jack Sutton, Winnipeg, and it is a pleasure to record this belated tribute to a worthy dog, we have had other Canadian dogs that have built up wonderful show backgrounds for themselves, many of these were imported from England and elsewhere, but this dog was a Canadian-bred.

The year ending December 31st, 1923, found that from a bank balance carried forward from 1922, of \$10,202.42 there came to be added an income of \$25,071.08 which made a total of \$35,273.50, and on February 21st, 1924, Col. McFarland recommended the investing of a portion of the Club's funds in Canadian Government Bonds, and the Directors very promptly passed a resolution embodying the Colonel's recommendation, and named Mr. Russell, Mr. Strachan and Col. Mc-Farland a committee to look into the matter of investments with power to act. Truly the pangs of financial starvation were fast becoming the residue of an

ugly nightmare. On March 20th, 1924, the "Committee on Investments" reported the purchase of Canadian National Railway 5% Bonds guaranteed by the Dominion of Canada Government, dated February 1st, 1924, and due February 1st, 1954, to the value of \$10,000.00, the purchase price being 981/2.

This chapter of our Club's history has been produced under a terrific handicap, and for its known lack of cohesion we crave our reader's indulgence.

Then, early in 1932, the once-tireless body began to falter. Age was coming on. Nobody knew how old Nipper had been when he attached himself to the "Straths" in 1923. But he had been no puppy, in those early days. And the cavalrymen had to admit, among themselves, that he was now an OLD dog.

During spring months, he would sometimes neglect a parade or a visit to the sentries. This for the first time in his career. More and more, he missed his former selfimposed duties. And he slept a great deal. Then, one July morning, Nipper awoke, seemingly as vigorous and as gay as ever. From sunrise until noon, he jogged gaily about on his oldtime routine. At lunch time, he trotted into the mess kitchen. There he stood for a moment, wagging his tail. Then he tumbled to the floor, stone dead. Do you wonder they buried him

with full military honors?

REVISED PRIZE SCHEDULE AT WINTER FAIR SHOW

Principal news emanating from the recently issued premium list of the

National Kennel Club All-breed Show, in conjunction with the Royal Winter in conjunction with the Royal Winter Fair on November 21, 22 and 23, is a revised schedule of prize monies which is claimed to be a great deal more fair than any system heretofore at this show. The old system was found to be economically sound up to an entry of four or five hundred dogs, but beyond that point prize money. but beyond that point prize money started to exceed revenue. In addition, it is claimed that the former system embodied a vicious principle that allowed breeds with small entries to take away as much prize money as those with larger entries, thus working a hardship for the breeds that best supported the show.

Under the new schedule, prize monies vary directly with the size of the entry, up to twelve dogs, and an additional prize of five dollars is offered for best of breed, in all breeds with an entry of five dogs (both sexes) or more. That the plan is being well received and that its essential fairness is being recognized by breeders is well proven by the number of applications for entry forms from both Canada and the United States and the volume of advance entries being received at the Royal Winter Fair office. Competent judges have been appointed for the show. Their identity is shown in the advertisement of the National Kennel Club in this issue.


