The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of The Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., was held in the Board Room of the Club's offices, 25 Melinda Street, Toronto, on Thursday afternoon, May 18th, 1939, at 3.30 o^{*}clock. The President, Mr. Reg. P. Sparkes was absent on account of illness. The Vice-President, Captain H. Dudley-Waters was also absent. Director Basil W. Essery was voted to the chair.

Mr. Essery made report on the matter of Standard Club Constitutions, and mentioned that he expected to have his final report ready for submission to the next meeting of the Board.

A letter was read from the Secretary of Saskatoon Kennel Club re an alleged hardship on Western Clubs arising from the discontinuance of the \$25.00 donation for show returns received at headquarters on time. It was agreed that this legislation having been endorsed by the Board of Directors as a whole no change could be made at this time.

Letters re proposed Articles of Affiliation were read from Mr. Pym, and Mr. Irving. After a general discussion the Board decided that the procedure as outlined in the minutes of the Annual Meeting was being, and would continue to be followed. The secretary suggested that it would be wise to have Mr. Pym meet the Board of Directors after keeping his judging appointment at the Morris & Essex Show, when an opportunity could be taken to review the whole matter of Articles of Affiliation, and to properly mark the distinctive compliment that had been paid to the Canadian Kennel Club through its second Vice-President having been invited to judge Best Dog in Show at the Morris & Essex Show this year.

THE DOG GAME HITHER AND YON

At the International Kennel Club of Chicago dog show, the Canadian Kennel Club was well and capably represented by the President 'Reg P. Sparkes, and the Secretary, J. D. Strachan. The presence of the President and Secretary here must be con-strued as a purely business proposition, as they were two very busy men for three whole days. This writer was not in the hotel five minutes until he was "collared" by the President and Secretary, and hustled off to a conference dealing entirely with Cana-dian Kennel Club matters for five solid hours; not being satisfied with that session, the two hustlers immediately corralled several professional handlers and explained to them the objects of licensing handlers in Can-ada. Then to top off the first session, both gentlemen made telling speeches at the International Kennel Club banquet which placed the Canadian Kennel Club in a most favorable position in the eyes of many people from dif-ferent parts of the Continent. Then on the following two days, both officers could be observed answering questions and generally 'selling' the Canadian Kennel Club idea to all persons interested.

In this respect one is reminded of the ancient wall of China, and it occurs to me that the Canadian Kennel Club has quite unconsciously placed a wall around its activities as a national organization. Have we not been far too local — to parochial like should not our Club be represented at all important canine affairs if we are to take our proper place in the scheme of things canine?. This writer believes we have been far too conservative in this respect, and if we would expand properly we must send our publicity commissioners abroad regularly.

It was pleasing to see Walter H. Reeves renewing acquaintances with hundreds of friends of years standing, and then to see him top off a truly great show by a masterful performance as Judge-in-Chief.

One could not leave the subject of the Chicago International show without referring to the stirring spectacle of thousands of spectators, representing the cross-section of citizenship baring their heads and standing at attention while Show Manager C. E. Harbison recited the late Senator Vest's Tribute to a Dog. When one word of command will bring thousands of people in reverence, to their feet out of respect of a dog, surely there is more to this dog game of ours than appears on the surface.

From Chicago we journeyed through the grand old prairies to attend the Saskatoon show. Here is a City that surely sets an example for all Canada in staging an interesting dog show. The venue being the Hudson's Bay Store which was ideal. Beautiful new benching painted in two tones, large exercising ring which was as clean as a drawing room, and controlled exercising privileges. Here dogs were exhibited at their best. Not a straw in sight, and not a dog in the building that could not be handled by any lady in her finest attire. It matters not if there were a hundred dogs or a thousand benched, the Sas-

katoon Kennel Club have rendered a real service to show giving Clubs in general by insisting upon presenting a group of dogs to the uninitiated public as dogs should be presented clean and wholesome—fit for any persons home.

True I have not seen all the prairie shows in recent years, and I understand great progress has been made in other parts of the prairies in demanding better and more centrally located buildings for dog shows. When our exhibitors and show officials band together as a class and refuse to stage dog shows in anything but a suitable building, our game will occupy the position in the community that it deserves, but not before.

Certain Clubs in Winnipeg, Regina, Calgary and Edmonton, have also held shows in departmental stores as independent ventures, and they have been highly successful, and it is significant to note that the poorest accommodation provided for dog shows, is when shows are held in connection with Provincial Exhibitions. And that goes double for Vancouver. What is the matter, are we afraid to demand modern accommodations, or are Exhibition managements themselves lacking in showmanship attributes? Pride alone should demand that every exhibit of whatever kind should be housed in a suitable building at our exhibitions, and dog shows are as important to the paying public as any other major exhibit.

Hard times have been blamed for many things. Yet nearly thirty years ago we had very attractive dog shows from Winnipeg to the Coast, and in those days we had as many reasons for going "broke" as prevail today. He who has not gone broke in Oil and Real Estate booms has missed a lot of fun with a little grief thrown in-but we had good shows just the same; and "travelling dog shows at that". Who does not remember the years when a carload of dogs would come west from Toronto; with at least one more carload of dogs from Winnipeg and western points. When Winnipeg and western points. When Con Knapp of Buffalo, N.Y., would bring his string of Bostons to the west and decorate his kennels in a manner that would do credit to a jewellery store show case. When we encouraged the finest dogs on the Continent to compete at our shows. When we start breeding the type of dogs that are in demand, the old cry of "you can't sell a pup" will vanish. It is a fact that model "T" Fords are not in demand today, and it should be understood that the dog game has advanced just that much in certain parts of this Continent; and it should be remembered that "Challenge Cups" which no exhibitor ever lives long enough to win, went out of date with the Model "T".

During our brief visit to Calgary, we saw Col. Ritchie's new Scotty female, and she is just good enough for the best any place. Here we met the well known H. P. Saunders once more. Mr. Saunders has been a life long fancier and writer, how is it that he does not display his knowledge in the judging ring more often?. Show giving Cubs should jot this name down on their judging slates for future reference.

From Calgary to Riverside, California, for the Junior Aid Sunday show of 350 dogs. One of those pleasant daylight to sundown events with the dogs benched in the shade of the trees surrounding the Country Club Golf Course where you help yourself to the oranges by picking them off the trees. Some of the Globe trotting dogs owned in the south were in competition, yet it makes one wonder why the merit of many of our dogs is kept such a deep secret. We have dogs on this coast of several breeds that can hold their own in any competition if they were given the opportunity.

In Vancouver there is one kennel kept as a pure hobby by its owner G. Tyson, that houses some forty odd wire-haired fox terriers. If the inmates of these kennels could be benched at any show in Canada, or at any of the "500 dog shows" in the United States, they would prove a sensation. Yet we are told that but one B.C. owned wire-haired fox terrier completed its championship last year when we had thirteen shows within an eighty mile radius. Why are so many fine fanciers staying away from our shows?—The answer is "KNOCK-KNOCK-KNOCK". three damaging words which should be discarded from our vocabularies and the three words "BOOST-BOOST-BOOST" substituted therefor giving every fancier due credit for that which he has been able to accomplish.

Through the initiative of our B.C. Director, J. A. H. Irving, a most interesting event occurred in Vancouver on April 18th., when some thirty odd fanciers gathered around the banquet table at the Hotel Georgie, to honor Mrs. Edith Bradley on the accomplishments of her grand Pomeranian American and Canadian Champion "Wembley Gold Shade", the winner of the Stone and Cox, Ltd. trophy during the Canadian Kennel Club Golden Jubilee Year Competition.

Among the speakers were Dr. G. L. Lamont, President of the B.C. Canine Protective Association. Dr. Lamont vigorously opposes all antidog legislation in this province, he has rendered valuable service to the fancy in general.

fancy in general. T. P. Elder, well known Barrister, spoke on the necessity of "selling" the dog game to the public, and dwelt upon the importance of dog shows, etc., in the community.

The well known Archie Hogg, Director of the Canada Pacific Exhibition spoke in his usual jovial manner and promised his co-operation in securing better accommodation for the dog shows held in connection with his Fair.

It was pleasing to have with us Mr. Larsen of Walkerton, Ontario. Mr. Larsen intends to become an extensive English Setter exhibitor, and it is understood he has secured his stock from W. R. Willgress.

Other speakers were R. W. Hatley, W. R. Willgress, and W. H. Pym, while Director Irving proved himself to be a fine Master of Ceremonies.

Keeping the C.K.C. Wheels Turning

It is almost nonsensical for correspondents to offer copy that has for its chief claim to "reader interest" such items as John Smith's "Alice Blue Gown" having whelped a litter sired by "Little Boy Blue", that has no reader interest at all, even if it is slated that "the litter will be watched with interest", or "that there are several potential champions in the litter", there is still no "reader interest" indicated for anyone only John Smith, and the owner of "Little Boy Blue", both the matters of such litters belong to the legitimate advertising section of our magazine worth its salt, and we believe that "Kennel and Bench" belongs in this latter category.

Correspondents will be well advised to steer clear of "filler" in their copy, otherwise their efforts must necessarily be manhandled by that little stub of "blue pencil" that is always so anxious to do its little bit.

NOTES FROM OLD QUEBEC

Letters to the Editor in "Our Dogs" have always been a source of interest to me and I think they have been responsible for creating a much better understanding between breeders, ex-hibitors and judges in every way. I am forcibly struck just now by the great interest displayed in its columns on the question of inoculating dogs against distemper. These letters, while they do not always agree, do provide food for thought and prove to Can-adian fanciers that other countries are face to face with the same problems as we are. However, they have this medium for "letters to the Editor" which evidently is a well supervised section, and necessarily so. In the same paper is a nice definition of "professional" and "novice". "The novice", says the writer, "is a beginner or learner much the same as an ap-prentice to a trade; he has to learn by experience." An apprentice does not expect to turn out the same work as a master craftsman. Why then does the apprentice in dogs groan so crooked judges, etc., because the man with thirty years' experience gets ahead of him? Surely all the knowl-edge, painfully and expensively col-lected should put an experienced loudly, and complain so bitterly of lected should put an experienced breeder well up in his own class. The professional is defined as being "the highly talented amateur (the one-time novice) who decides to turn his talent into money and offer his services to those willing to pay for greater knowledge than their own". These are, I think, good definitions for these two classes of exhibitors and as in all other things, the longer we live, the more we learn how little we really know

With the passing of Holland Buckley, known by some as the unofficial "Squire of Burnham", the dog world is poorer today. Reading the account of his burial, I could not help thinking that in the dog game (or as Dr. Batt called it), the "dog business" there is something more than owning and showing dogs. Looking down the names of those who attended this gentleman's funeral, I was satisfied that it means a great deal more than showing or winning. Dog lovers the world over have something in common and the ladies and gentlemen of the finest cultured classes become bound together by their common love of man's best friend. The social side of the game, or business, whichever you like best, is something that is worth considering when we notice the re-spect paid to such men as Holland spect paid to such men as holiand Buckley, a man known and respected the world over. An extract from an appreciation says:—"His influence on his generation was great; more so than will be generally realized." The ladies interested in dog affairs

The ladies interested in dog affairs in England are now seeking representation on the "all male committee" of the English Kennel Club; they base their claims on the fact that women are now engaged in almost every activity and in most businesses. The fact is, that the dog business in England shows more of the fair sex entering and exhibiting dogs more than do the sterner sex. This might be accounted for by the fact that the male might be engaged in the task of earning the money that enables their wives and daughters to breed and show dogs. If the ladies succeed in breaking down the barrier at the English Kennel Club and get representation there we "shall enjoy the fight from the ring side" when they are finally deciding what it shall be. I have always said, "The women are the boys".

So we are to have "Basenji's" in Canada. Barkless dogs to me would be like a "footless stocking without a leg" but I am glad to notice that Canada will lead the other countries in bringing to her shores the latest, even in dogs. I see that two unrelated dogs will soon come to Canada, and if wrinkles are their beauty, they are well endowed in that respect. Let's hope that their bite will be no worse than their bark. I wonder who the all-rounder will be who can enlighten us on the breed, and how will he arrive at his decisions. We may have Zulus, but do they know Basenjis?

The Mount Royal Hunt Club have imported eight English Foxhounds. I will try my best to get more particulars about these from the master of the Hunt, W. W. Ogilvy. "Dogs in Art" in Montreal is by no

"Dogs in Art" in Montreal is by no means in the background. In this respect a few weeks ago, I received a letter asking permission for an artist to paint my Bull Terrier "Bricktops Spitfire" and I readily gave my consent. The artist was a charming young lady of the teen age who was permitted to come to my house as often as she liked, and imagine my surprise when as I watched the painting progressing day by day, and finally when it was finished, it was truly a work of art in every detail. The unusual position of the dog made it, I should think, unique, and I believe we shall hear more about this young lady and her art in the future.

Boarding kennels are busy just now getting ready for the summer season, paint brushes are busy for miles around, outdoor pens are undergoing repairs, signs are being restored, letters to last year's clients are all ready for mailing. The National Ken-nel Association of England have taken into consideration boarding and other kennel problems, with a view to im-proving them and here again the fair sex have taken the initiative and with Lady Margaret, Countess of Suffolk as president, Lady Kitty Ritson, Mrs. Erie Madwood, Miss E. Grimm as committee, I predict better boarding conditions for dogs and greater satisfaction for the owners. I believe this is a move in the right direction.

Some dissatisfaction is being felt in Sealyham Terrier circles of the dogs that are winning at the shows, and one correspondent says, "If only Captain Edward could see what is winning today, he would not approve of so many big ones", and suggests that the judges look over their standard before it is too late (if it is not already so) and goes so far as to suggest that no dog should be awarded a certificate unless it complies fully with the standard. He also says, that no puppy should be allowed to compete for championship certificates. "How many times have we seen a puppy win his title only to become very big when matured?" he askes. Such a dog's show record brings plenty of stud fees with disastrous results to the breed and the breeder. Judges have no right to apply their own "tastes" to this or any other breed. Their job is to find the 3 or 4 dogs in the ring that comes closest to the standard. All things being equal, he must have no choice of his own, if he is to judge them right.

From the Malabar Kennels, at Point Fortune, where we find Wires, Boxers, and lately a Welsh Terrier, comes some interesting news. Mr. Scarpa's new "Welsh" who has gone Winners at two of the larger shows in the U.S.A. has now six points to his championship there and since coming to Canada she has won six Best of Breed awards. In Wires, we find "Malabar's Happy Choice" after going Winners at Windsor was sold at the same show. Mr. Scarpa has also bought a youngster from Mrs. Ken-nedy of the Vivadora Kennels, To-ronto. The breeding goes back to "Gallant Fox" on the sire's side and the dam is the imported "Thet Tripit' the dam is the imported "Thet Tripit" by "Ch. Thet Tetrarch" ex a "Ch. Tan-jard Thriller" bitch. In Quebec, we see the Boxers coming along very nicely and the report is that the breed seems to be much in demand. The American Champion "Venus von Isebek" now has six points towards her Canadian title and the bitch imported from Germany, "Unze von Dom", has won three points and is nursing two nice puppies by that famous Boxer "Int. Ch. Dorion von Marienhof" who is considered to be one of the world's is considered to be one of the world's finest Boxers. Another good one is 'Int. Ch. Lustig von Dom" who is a full brother to "Unze von Dom". And still another fine Boxer is "Int. Ch. Sigurd von Dom" who is the sire of the previously mentioned "Venus von Isebek". These dogs are owned by Mr. Eaton but are kenneled at the Pointe Eaton but are kenneled at the Pointe Fortune Kennel, Among other Boxers in Quebec there is a fine red brindle son of "Ch. Just von Dom" of "Ch. Fanga von Dom" owned by A. C. Grant of Montreal, an imposing son of "Int. Ch. Sigurd von Dom" belonging to Mrs. Long and a very typey daughter of "Int. Ch. Baster von Elbenfer" owned by Mr. Budge. With such splendid stock in Boxers in and around Montreal, it is easily seen that we will soon find some well filled classes at the coming shows.

Now members, can I expect more news from you? This is our page, yours and mine, give it your support with advertisements and general reader interest news. Let this page be a means of bringing us closer together and getting to know each other better, don't let us be trailers. Help to put Quebec in the forefront in Canadian dogdom.

RABIES CONTROL-SPECIAL

New York, May 20—The American Kennel Club's course in the fight against rables has been charted by the special committee appointed by the Board of Directors of the governing body of pure-bred dogs. In its first meeting the committee studied the results of scientific experiments and investigations by some of its members and discussed many points relating to the better control and eventual elimination of the disease, and then appointed a sub-committee to put its conclusions in proper shape. At the second meeting of the committee, held this week, the sub-committee submitted a paper for final discussion and the framing of the report. After the expression of many thoughts, the report was drawn and unanimously adopted.

Those who have approved are: William L. Smalley, chairman; Dr. Leslie T. Webster of the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research; Dr. Roscoe R. Hyde of the Johns Hopkins School of Hygiene; Dr. Edwin R. Blamey, official veterinarian of the A.K.C.; Dr. William H. Best, Deputy Health Commissioner, City of New York; Sydney H. Coleman, executive vicepresident of the A.S.P.C.A.; Dr. Max Danziger, Health Dept., City of New York; Dr. J. E. Gordon, Harvard University Medical School; Walter Arnold, Westfield, N.J.; Dr. L. A. Merillat, American Veterinary Medical Association; Dr. Charles J. McAnulty, New Jersey Veterinary Medical Association; Arnold J. Brock, attorney; and Harry I. Caesar, director of the A.K.C.

Under the recommendations approved by the special committee, and which will come before the next meeting of the Board of Directors of the A.K.C., on June 13, it will be possible to accomplish many worthwhile safeguards to canine and human life. The report is as follows:

1. The control of rabies is essentially a responsibility of government and primarily the function of the Public Health Authorities. The recommendations of this Committee are intended to assist in formulating a uniform policy based upon current scientific knowledge relating to this communicable disease.

2. Progress in the control of rabies is dependent upon an enlightened and co-operative public, particularly the dog owner.

3. The American Kennel Club can render great service to dog owners and to the public generally by continuing the dissemination of authoritative information concerning rabies.

- 4. Rabies can best be controlled: (a) By an adequate system of
 - licensing dogs.
 - (b) By continued efforts to eliminate stray dogs, licensed or unlicensed.
 - (c) In the event of a significantly increased prevalence of rabies, as determined by Public Health Authorities, by confinement of dogs to premises, except when leashed or muzzled.

5. Protection against rabies in dogs by vaccination is still in an experimental stage, and it is unwise to place reliance on any available vaccine. Dependence on such vaccination may lead to a false sense of security.

WITH THE GUN DOGS

The Spring Field Trials of the Ontario Bird Dog Association, were held at Niagara-on-the-lake, Ontario Sunday, April 16. This section of Ontario is known as the garden of Canada, it is famous for its peach and grape orchards. It is a place of beauty in the summer time, but with the cold north-east wind on the 16th, it was anything but a summer garden. Dogs came from far and near for the Ontario Trials, which are becoming very popular with Canadian owners of bird dogs as well as our good friends from the states of New York and Pennsylvania.

The entry was much larger than we anticipated and we had to divide our classes under two sets of judges in order to complete the trials in one day, 49 dogs were on the grounds and ready to start at eight o'clock in the morning. L. M. Brill, of Batavia, N. Y. and R. K. Palmerton, of Geneva, N.Y. was responsible for the judging of the Open Derby Stake and of the Age Stake. G. G. Vincent, of Port Nelson and W. D. Elliot, of Owen Sound took charge of the Puppy and Untrained Stake.

The weather was anything but ideal for field trials. We had rain and snow all of the previous week, leaving the fields in many places with a considerable amount of water, which made it tough going for both man and beast, in fact, it was so bad that we had to give up our originally arranged courses and ran from the main highway, however, birds were found on all courses giving the dogs an equal opportunity on game.

Palmers "Village Procter" of Snyder, N.Y. carried off the honours. He was down in eighth brace in a wide open field bordering on a peach orchard, which gave him an excellent opportunity to display his ability. He is a big slashing capable wide going dog. Well trained, finished on his birds, and would make it very interesting for any dog that we have seen down at our trials. He was handled in a very efficient manner, by Roy S. Johnson, of Buffalo. We would say that Mr. Johnson has put in considerable time this spring and feel that he will be heard of in some of the bigger trials to the south at a later date. The winner of the Derby was "Sinaland Rap the Devil", pointer dog, owned and handled by Mrs. U. Burreau, of London. This pointer is a beautiful type of animal, wide and fast, well developed, is birdy, has style and range. We feel sure, Mrs. Burreau will have an all contender of merit.

The winner of the puppy stakes was "Leamington Lou", pointer bitch, owned by George Harrington, of Leamington. This good little dog, fresh from winning the puppy stake at the International Trials at Kingsville and a real prospect.

Open All Age Stake—The winner of this stake was "Palmers Village Boy". A bold, big going pointer, covers his country very nicely, handled well. Takes in all the birdy places in a big going manner, he had two stops to flush, and three points, he stands up nicely on point and handles birds in a very intelligent manner. Second was "Raps Timmed Pal" well known pointer dog, owned by Clayton Rugg, of Jamestown, N.Y. We have seen this dog many times before. He is still going very nicely. He had one flush point on a pheasant.

Third place dog was of "Finger Lakes Rowdy" a setter dog owned by Gal. Hamilton, of Senecca Falls. This is a very nice going setter, one of the best we have seen put down. He ran a big race in open territory while he did not get on game. He was placed on his style and range.

Open Puppy Stake — The winner "Learnington Lou", pointer bitch, owned by George Harrington. It is a very fine type of setter bitch with plenty of speed, range and style. She hunts her course in a very intelligent manner, taking in all the birdy places. She had two finds and is well advanced for her age.

Second was "Palmer Stylish Beau", pointer dog, owned by S. W. Palmer, of Snyder, N.Y. This pointer is a big fine going dog and hunts his course very nicely in a very intelligent manner.

Third was "Shot", pointer dog, owned by J. G. Crang, of Toronto, handled by George Harrington, of Leamington. He is a nice stylish going dog, a little restricted in range, but hunts the birdy places and apparently has had plenty of opportunities for one so young.

Open Derby—This stake was won by "Smalands Rap the Devil", pointer dog, owned by Mrs. Burreaus, of London. These derbies were put down in wide open field, where they had plenty of opportunity to show their wares and were judged on style and range. This dog has plenty of all it takes to make a good bird dog. He covered his course in a highly intelligent manner.

Untrained Stake—First place was "Meg of Donaghmore", Irish Setter Bitch, owned by Bains and Grosarts, of Toronto. This setter covered her course very nicely. She has plenty of style and range, and we hope may develop into a real Irish contender for an all age stake.

Second was "Forest Molly", Irish Setter Bitch, owned by I. S. Smith, of Toronto. This setter is a nice going performer who with training has prospect of making a real shooting dog.

Third was "Romer Jerry of Fallingbrook", Irish setter dog, owned by Gordon Harkness. This setter is a beautiful animal who has recently completed his championship on the bench. He is of a rich mahogany colour, very free in action and we would like to see Gordon put this dog into the hands of a good trainer.

NEW VETERINARY DIRECTOR GENERAL

Dr. A. E. Cameron, M.C., of Ottawa, who since 1925 has been Chief Veterinary Inspector, Health of Animals Division, Dominion Department of Agriculture, has been appointed Veterinary Director General to succeed Dr. George Hilton, who retired on superannuation in July, 1938.

on superannuation in July, 1938. Dr. Cameron graduated with hon-ours from the Ontario Veterinary College in 1904 and after a short period in private practice entered the Meat Inspection Service, Dominion Department of Agriculture. In 1910 he was transferred to the Contagious Diseases Division in Saskatchewan. Three years later he went to the Pathological Division, Veterinary Research Station, Lethbridge, Alberta. Then came the war and in May, 1915, Dr. Cameron was appointed Veteri-Dr. Cameron was appointed Veteri-nary Officer, 6th Canadian Light Infantry Brigade, and went to France in charge of the horses of the brigade. He served with distinction during the war and was awarded the Military Cross. After demobilization he re-turned to the Veterinary Research Station at Lethbridge and in 1925 was appointed Chief Veterinary Inspector with headquarters in Ottawa.

Dr. Cameron has represented Canada since 1932 on the Executive Board of the American Veterinary Medical Association. He is a member of the Associate Committee on Parasitology, National Research Council, a member of the Canadian and United States Public Health Associations; United States Live Stock Sanitary Associations; American Society of Parasitologists and Vice President of the Central Canada Veterinary Association.

Cocker Spaniel breeders generally will regret to learn of the passing of this great Cocker Spaniel, who never knew a prize ribbon to be less than the coveted purple winners on any of his four show appearances which gave him sixteen championship points. He was good for five points at the Canadian National Exhibition in 1926, and for four more at the National Kennel Club Show in 1929-he was a laster. He died on Friday, May 5th.

As a Stud force his greatness is attested by the very many registration records which embrace his influence in that respect. Of course he was bred to be a great show dog, and a powerful Stud force in the first instance, being a son of "Robinhurst Foreglow" out of "Midkiff Seductive".

Almost fourteen years old, the one time star 'slipped his collar' in his sleep, left what was mortal of him, whilst his spirit made for the 'happy hunting grounds' where the woodcock is still plentiful, and the bramble and thicket are none too dense for old-timers such as "Limestone Laddie".

When J. B. Forsyth, Toronto, called Kennel and Bench office to report the passing of his pal, it did not tax the imagination to detect tears in a voice that told of tears in his eyes, but with dogs as with men, the years take their toll, and the laws of life are unrelenting, as they always have been.

There are very few Boston terriers as well known at the shows as "Wee Sam", a dog that was campaigned fearlessly at all the shows as they came along. At his first show in 1935, The Canadian National Exhibition, he won 1st Limit and 1st Open and at his won 1st Limit and 1st Open and at his last one, Toronto Kennel Club, he was Best of Breed. In all his 15 starts "Paddy's Wee Sam" had always to be contended with. "Odin von Busecker Schloss"but what's in a name anyway? made history for the German Shepherd Dog breed at Cleveland, on March 26th, when he was chosen as best dog in Show, all breeds by Mrs. Hartley M. Dodge. Cleveland being one of the really front rank Shows of the United States "Odin's" achievement is the most pronounced. Raymond L. Patterson judged the breed classes and selected the son of "Dachs von Bern"-"Gerda v Busecker Schloss" as his Lest, then George Thomas placed the handsome dog first in the Working Group, and the "Lady of Giralda" completed the circle. Commenting on placement after the show Mrs. Dodge went on record as having said "This is the first time I have placed a German Shepherd best in show. Possibly I am too critical in the evaluation of my favorite breed against tothers, but I simply could not refuse this grand dog, "Odin". Miss A. S. Colgate of the Hobby House Kennels, Tuxedo, N.Y., has been showing a pair of German Shep-bards at some of our Spring Shows

Canada has always a welcome for our Cousins from 'tother side o' border; but an especial welcome awaits visitors to our dog shows, and if the visitors bring their dogs along and put them into competition with ours, then the welcome goes all the way 'round.

GREYHOUNDS

Greyhound breeders will be interested to learn, that in the opinion of the racing expert Major J. Y. Baldwin, Cheltenham, England. "Ballyjoker" is the fastest Greyhound living to-day. It was Major Baldwin who prophesied that "Beef Cutlet" would become the greatest sire in England, now it is conceded that "Beef Cutlet" is the greatest sire the breed has ever known and his sire "Mutton Cutlet", was the greatest sire before him.

"Ballyjoker" is the ruling favorite for the Derby, but another son of "Beef Cutlet" called "Windsor of Waterhall", the 33 to 1 chance is acknoweldged to be a real threat.

"Mick The Miller", the chief pillar in the English greyhound structure in recent years, has left his worldly pursuits and has gone over to that canine valhalla from which good greyhounds ne'er return. The famous 'Mick" was the same to greyhounds as the lion with the turned up tail is to sterling silver. "Mick The Miller" was 13 years old at the time of his death on May 5th and it is said that his cash earnings amounted to approximately \$100 000.00, this amount being shown in the ledger as prize money, stud fees and moving pictures.

It has been often said that greyhound racing would never amount to anything until betting on the races was legalized but it is very true that the sport is developing most satisfactorily in Ontario and probably this stimulation is directly due to the great amount of promotional leadership that has been so steadfastly sponsored by the Ontario Greyhound Association, who formally opened the 1939 racing season at their plant situated on O'Connor Drive, Toronto, on Monday, May 8th. This training track will operate on Monday and Wednesday nights and on Saturday afternoons. All the better known hounds and a crop of youngsters will furnish plenty of good racing sport this season.

of good racing sport this season. The Ulster Stadium, Toronto, is almost ready for feature racing on a large scale and this venue will soon be ready to operate. The members of the Ontario Greyhound Association have contributed their time and labor most generously and this, plus the spending of \$2,000.00 makes available a really desirable plant that is up-tothe-minute in every respect.

The registration of greyhounds born in Canada is an important matter that will have to be tackled in earnest sooner or later. In the United States, England, Ireland and Australia there are separate stud books kept for greyhounds and such books enjoy the confidence and support of all persons interested in breeding racing greyhounds but only one stud book is permissible by law in Canada and steps should be taken aggressively by all interested parties to have the Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book officially recognized as the Greyhound Stud Book in this country and in this respect there should be no unnecessary delay allowed.

DOBERMANS

What a show record is that of the Doberman Pinscher Tri-Int. Ch. "Troll v.d. Engelsburg" and apparently the end is not yet, as, so far in 1939 three more Best in Show Awards have been tacked on. With these additional triumphs, no less than eleven more trophies have been added to an already extensive and elaborate collection. The show record is now Best of Breed 37 times, Best in Working Group 29 times and Best dog in Show, 19 times. Of course "Troll's" record as a Stud force is even more scintillaling, and his owner, E. Bornstein, Peoria, Ill., has every right to be proud of his dog. GREAT DANES

Some people say "Here's one for the book," but we say "here's two for the book," and so we come right upto-the-minute. At the 3rd Annual Puppy Sweepstakes contest of the Great Dane Club of America, held at Portchester, New York, on May 6th, there were three divisions for males and a like arrangement for females—3 to 6 months, 6 to 9 months and 9 to 12 months, with males and females judged separately. The winners of the 3 to 6 months classes were a brother and a sister out of the same litter, "Pierrot of Unalburn" and "Pierette of Chalburn", both sired by the well known Canadian-born harlequin, "Alva Schatzie", by Ch. "Blitz v.d. Doggenburg" ex "Gretta", bred by Mrs. R. McColl, Toronto, who will now have a renewed interest in her "Schatzie" who enjoyed a rather brilliant career at the shows in 1936.

BULLDOGS

Ben B. Matthews in his "Bulldog Notes" to "Dogdom" for May has this to say concerning a "Canadian-born bulldog".

"I also visited Mr. and Mrs. Paul Maddux, of Frankfort, Ind., owners of "Kamel Kloddy Kloy". I was anxious to see this dog as he is a son of my all-time favorite, Ch. "Basford Idea" and he has quite a few of the qualities of "Ideal", but is not quite as compact, however, if he can carry on some of that dog's characteristics, he will be doing a great deal".

"Kamel Kloddy Kloy" was bred by "Reg" P. Sparkes, roronto, and being by Ch. "Bastord Ideal", a son of Ch. "Basford Revival", who in turn is a son of Ch. "Son O' Gill". With good breeding on his dam's side, he should be a good one to all intents and purposes.

AFTER-EFFECTS OF DISTEMPER The convalescence of a dog after an attack of distemper is often a slow process, and it is essential not to attempt to nasten the resumption of his normal routine. Exercise, for example, should be given in small daily doses, as otherwise a great strain is placed on the lungs and heart and may cause irreparable damage to these organs. A light but nourishing diet, too, is essential-milk and milky foods, tripe and minced lean beef are items which help to bulid up the dog and place the minimum of strain upon his digestive organs. Chills, too, with the risk of pneumonia in the dog's enfeebled state should be guarded against. But plenty of fresh air and sunlight should be given when the weather is genial.

One of the commonest of aftereffects of distemper is chorea, which in the opinion of eminent veterinarians is often caused by failure to regard the dog as an invalid for a fortnight at least after apparent recovery from distemper. The chief symptom of chorea is a muscular twitching in various parts of the body. Recovery from chorea is usually a very prolonged process. Here again recovery is expedited by feeding with light and nourishing foods. Some owners are inclined to be over-alarmed regarding these twitchings, but so long as a gradual improvement, however slight, is observable there is good ground for hoping that the twitching will eventually cease altogether. Medicinal tonics in chorea cases should only be given under veterinary advice.

Another common aftermath of distemper is discoloration, or damage to the structure of the teeth. When distemper occurs before a puppy has cut his permanent teeth, these teeth when they appear are sometimes found to be structurally faulty. In either case there is nothing that can be done to remedy the defect, but apart from its being a disadvantage if the dog happens to be a show specimen, there is no reason why this discoloration or damage should affect the dog's general health.

MAN'S BEST FRIEND-THE DOG

The devotion of dog to man, that unquestioned, unswerving and unparalleled loyalty, antedates all written history, though appearing it is true, in the folk lore of every country. The very inexplicable nature of this love for we humans is indeed one of the glories of this world. To me that devotion is something so fine and beautiful, that we all could profit by the unstinted manner in which it is lavished, asking so little in return.

It is perhaps not unnatural that we take a dog's affection for granted. Do not our earliest recollections include a pet which played no inconsiderable part in our childhood? Were we not taught at school that a dog was a quadruped of great intelligence and attachment for man? Through subsequent years have we not continued to accept that love, blindly given without thought of recompense,—given perhaps in too many instances without return, or even decent treatment?

But how many realize the hundreds of centuries this incomparable devotion has endured? Incredible as it may appear, dogs' love for man dates back 10,000 years B.C.—perhaps for an even greater space.

an even greater space. It was in the kitchen middens along the coast of Denmark of at least 10,000 B.C. that the bones of the first domesticated dogs are found, according to Geoffrey Parsons, "The Stream of History". These are long piles of skulls and bones, the refuse of prehistoric Norsemen who dwelt in wattle huts, and pushed off shore in rude boats.

"It is possible", says the author, "that dogs were tamed by paleolithic hunters". One cannot feel sure of negative evidence here. But it is fairly clear that the dog was the first wild animal to become the friend of man and that this important event had happened before this time. This first dog of the Danish skull-keap was of the jackal type, like the eskimo dog but smaller—later a larger dog more like the wolf was tamed to guard sheep. He may have been the ancestor of the modern collie.

We are also informed in Smith's "Human History" that while the date of easterly migration of the most primitive representatives is unknown, fossilized remains, discovered at Talgai, Queensland, reveal that the earliest known Australian, when the great marsupials were still living, were located in strata, in which were found fossilized dogs teeth. This suggests that those early emigrants from Asia were accompanied by their dogs around 4000 B C

Asia were accompanied by their dogs around 4000 B.C. "Earliest Egyptians had already domesticated the dog and had come to regard it as a friend, as they buried dogs in human cemeteries", says that author. A far greater respect for man's best friend than is shown in these ultra modern times.

Legendary history contains many entertaining stories of famous dogs such as "Argus", the dog of Ulysses. During biblical days man's friendship with dogs is well attested, for no fewer than forty-five references to dogs are to be found in the Bible.

Early English history informs us that dogs were of the utmost value in the protection of both the humble hut

and lordly castle. They accompanied their masters to war and uncomplainingly did their share of sentry duty. They were even taken to the crusades and to various foreign wars. Small wonder is there that the bull dog became the symbol of British tenacity. All too are familiar with the part that the dog played in the early life of Canada as instanced in the story of "Pilotte" at Ville Marie.

From the earliest days man sought his game aided by his dogs. To-day man indulges in this sport in precisely the same way as did his forefathers of long ago. It is, therefore, not surprising that in every clime dogs play some special part in the life of that country. In many lands they are almost a necessity. For example, in Belgium, they are the milk carriers, in Switzerland their noble work is to carry food and medicine across the Alps to succor travellers. In many parts of the frozen north they provide the only means of transportation and, as in the days of yore, they are indis-pensible in the safeguarding of flocks.

While dogs intense love for man remains a mystery, it is not difficult to understand man's love for his best friend. Who could withstand that appealing glance and friendly tail wagging which speaks his joy at our approach? Even a child soon recognizes him as a friend, and he makes no error even in the case of a dog an adult would be wary of, for that mutual feeling of confidence is reciprocated. He is ever our friend unless we justly incur his enmity.

Almost daily we read of a great deed of heroism some dog has performed. Yet how ingloriously such deeds pass from our minds. How little does it dawn on people's consciousness that a dog is really worthwhile, not only as a companion and pal but as a protector who gives his best in our service at all times, asking only that he be allowed the association of his master or mistress.

Man's sagacious friend as the "seeing eye" for the blind has been much to the fore of late and it is impossible to give too much credit both to dog and teacher. The idea is, how-

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ever, by no means new as over two hundred years ago, dogs cheerfully and with unerring intelligence are recorded as having devoted their lives to the care of their blind masters.

Medical science also recognizes the benefit to be derived by the companionship of a dog as part of the treatment of certain nervous disorders. The idea may have been copied from long years of knowledge that the presence of a dog had a soothing effect on highly nervous thoroughbred horses.

If we humans could penetrate the minds of our canine friends or if we were able to understand their language, then we would know why dogs want to be our friends, why with such reckless abandon they sacrifice everything else and choose to be with us; why they give so much and ask so little. This is something we will probably never know, for as far back as history takes us, no human being has ever been able to offer any solution to this question.

Let us then presume that for the same reason that we are trancendant in our realm, so God in His great eternal plan, has seen fit to put in the world, an animal whose virtues outnumber those of any other living thing. And, while He has endowed them with a goodly portion of man's intelligence He has given them none of man's falseness. 1 like to believe that the dog is the born protector and friend of man, and that he was definitely created for that purpose.

And so our faithful companion is with us to-day as in the countless ages past, and despite our position in life, he is above all our devoted servant. His love for mankind knows neither discouragement nor corruption and we might well be envious of his noble qualities.

Today much is being done to imthe various breeds of dogs, prove from the proverbial lap dog to the aristocratic setter, the regal dane, and the lordly mastiff. Not only has their intelligence been raised but their general morale has been greatly im-proved upon. The education of a dog i.eed no longer be a hardship to his owner, but a pastime in which the master reaps an abundance of pleasure, for the dog of today has a keen understanding and adapts himself easily and quickly to our ways and humours. He is almost pitiful in his anxiety to please. He is exceedingly responsive to good treatment, and, his obedience bespeaks his high mentality. In short he places himself completely and utterly at our mercy, and if he developes into a nuisance for lack of proper care and training, the reflec-tion is not upon him, but directly upon his owner.

It would be interesting to learn just why so many people treat a dog with such utter contempt, and why they refuse absolutely to understand them. For a dog can teach man many things. With a little patience and tolerance he can be educated into ways of inoffensiveness and he will pay you back with long years of devotion and loyalty, such as nothing on earth can buy. DALMATIANS

HOT WEATHER HINTS

Dogs are more susceptible to extreme heat than they are to extreme cold, and if your dog is one of those that develop a luxuriant covering in spring it is a wise and kindly move to have him trimmed, or "stripped" as it is usually called. This does not mean that the dog should be denuded of hair—although some "strippers" leave little enough—but a judicious trimming and tidying that makes the dog feel cool and look well-turned-out. Stripping is a job that is best left to the expert: the few shillings it costs is negligible when it is borne in mind that it keeps the dog comfortable and smart for months. The novice is liable to make a hash of the operation and have a sore and sorrylooking dog for a week or two.

The dog's food as well as his rai-ment calls for adjustment in the hot months. Plenty of cool fresh, clean water always is a necessity: the average dog drinks little and often. Stodginess in food should be avoided; the meat ration can be reduced and boiled

food for dogs. Kennels should be in the shade for at least the hours when the sun is high; a wooden kennel gets like an oven when the summer sun beats down upon it at mid-day. Summer exercise is best given in the cool of the morning and evening. Most dogs enjoy a swim in hot weather, but it is best to give them a brisk rub down with a rough towel after they have shaken themselves. Care should be taken to dry the skin between the toes as this can be a very sore point if left to dry itself.

RABIES?

A meeting of dog fanciers was held in Vancouver, to consider an outbreak of Rabies in the State of Washington. Dr. G. D.
