

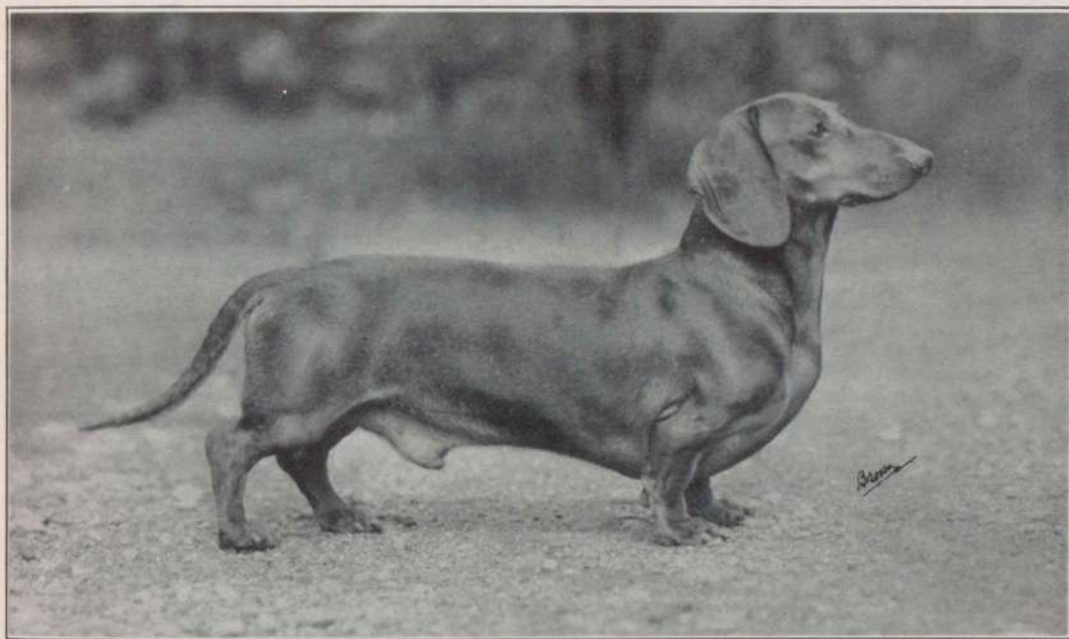

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB, OCTOBER 19th, 1939

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of The Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., was held in the Board Room, of the Club's offices, 25 Melinda Street, Toronto, on Thursday, October 19th, 1939, at Two o'clock P.M. The President, Reg. P. Sparkes, presided. Directors present included Capt. H. Dudley-Waters, Mrs. E. Brown, W. J. Risewick, Wm. McDermont, B. W. Essery and Dr. H. E. Batt.

It was regularly moved, seconded, and carried:

"That, the minutes of the Board of Directors meeting held on Thursday, September 21st, 1939, be adopted as read."

The Board considered several complaints in connection with registration etc., and decided the action that should be taken in connection with each such item.

It was reported by the Secretary that he had not received from the Secretary of the Toronto Kennel Club the report on the judging at the most recent Toronto Kennel Club show.

A letter was read from the Club's legal adviser re Directors disciplinary rights when dealing with persons whose conduct was believed to be prejudicial to the best interests of The Canadian Kennel Club, Inc.

A letter was read from the Bull Terrier Club of America, advising, that at a meeting of that Club held on September 27th, it was resolved to notify The Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., that the action of The Canadian Kennel Club in separating white and coloured Bull Terriers had the Club's approval. It was agreed to file the letter.

A letter was read from the Canadian Patriotic Dog Fanciers show, asking if it would be permissible to add a litter class to the classification of the proposed show to be held by the above organization at an early date, the convenience to be for this one show only. It was agreed that the suggestion was at variance with the spirit of Dog Show Rule 10 (c), second section, therefore the Directors were obliged to rule negatively.

It was regularly moved by Mrs. Brown, seconded by Mr. Risewick, and carried:

"That, the General Accounts, Kennel Names and Applications for Membership, as submitted, be approved."

A letter was read from the Canadian Patriotic Dog Fanciers Show, applying for the date December 9th, for the purpose of holding an all-breed dog show, with a view to placing the proceeds with the Red Cross, Soldiers Funds, or other patriotic organizations. It was pointed out that the date, December 8th, had been granted to the Toronto Ladies Kennel Association for the purpose of holding a Christmas all breed sanction show. After discussion, it was regularly moved by Mrs. E. Brown, seconded by Mr. Risewick, and carried:

"That, Saturday, December 16th, be granted, providing that the date be found suitable and convenient. If otherwise, then any suitable date thereafter."

It was agreed to grant the date, Saturday, October 28th, to the Shepherd Dog Club of Canada for the purpose of holding a Specialty Show. The judge, Dr. Hopkins, Rochester, N.Y., was approved of.

It was agreed to grant the date, October 20th, to the Alpha Delta Pi Kennel Club, Vancouver, B.C., to hold a sanction show. It was further agreed to grant the date, October 27th, to London Canine Association to hold a sanction show.

The matter of member indebtedness for advertising in Kennel and Bench was again reviewed and the Secretary was instructed to write all persons owing, and advise that unless their unpaid accounts have been paid in full by November 10th, that he will be obliged to take action under Article 3, Members, Section 3, 4

and 7 of the Constitution, thereby denying all such the privileges of the Club, and he having no other alternative. The matter of non-members indebtedness was left in the hands of the Secretary who was instructed to write all delinquents again.

It was moved,

"That, this meeting do now adjourn."

OUR FRONTISPIECE

Featuring our front cover for November is the extremely attractive Dachshund, Int. Ch. "Herman Rinkton", property of Mrs. Annis A. Jones, South Orange, New Jersey, U.S.A., and quite the outstanding dog of his breed at the present time, being a son of Int. Ch. "Achat von Werderhavelstrand, ex Ch. Anny Rinkton", a daughter of Ch. "Arno von Luitpoldshelm", he comes by his grand quality honestly.

Int. Ch. "Herman Rinkton" is a Smooth Dachshund and carries a rich coloured red jacket that fits him like the proverbial glove. As a showman he is in a class by himself and his phenomenal winnings bear out this statement. In the United States and Canada he has topped his breed no less than ninety-nine times. He has topped the Hound Group sixty-three times and he has won the coveted Best Dog in Show honors fourteen times, and Best American-bred dog in show twice.

To Victor Moench, Buffalo, N.Y., goes the credit for breeding our feature dog for the month. The adorable Int. Ch. "Herman Rinkton" was whelped at Lackawanna, N.Y. on November 22nd, 1935, and is therefore just coming into his prime, and if the fates continue to be kind to the dog, his future success can only be a matter for conjecture.

On all his recent show travellings which have taken him from the Atlantic to the Pacific Coasts, through the South and into Canada he has been splendidly handled by H. H. Sachers of Whippany, N.J. and it has been said that with "Herman" around Hans is always happy.

At Mrs. Jones' Esruma Kennels there is another star Dachshund in Int. Ch. "Cids Lone Ave von Dachshafen", so that "Herman" is always in rather select company.

As a sire "Herman's" first puppies are just coming of show age. His "Esruma Hans" (10½ months old) won 4 championship points at Roanoke, Va., 3 more at Wilmington, Ill., and 2 more at Sandy Cove. So it looks as if his 1940 show crop will all go "tops", and there are some very promising youngsters romping around at present.

We will continue to watch the "Esruma" Dachshunde with interest.

THE PRESIDENT'S PAGE

Having shared in the pleasures of the judging of the recent Canadian National Exhibition dog show, I had a close up opportunity of seeing most of the magnificent entry of the various breeds. It was a very definite pleasure for me as President to meet so many of our members and out of town exhibitors from far and near.

It was generally conceded that the C.N.E. dog show committee had made good the promise made to our members at the last Annual General Meeting when an improved dog show building was being discussed, the new location was all that could be desired, and though it was extremely warm, that was a condition that was directly attributable to the terrific heat which prevailed outside the show building. The fanciers were appreciative and Mr. Macdonald, the chairman of the dog show committee, was very happy because of that.

Adolf Hitler and his war lords has led the allied countries, into what may be a repetition of the World War of 1914-1918, and at the moment it is open to conjecture, just what effect the present disturbance may have on the breeding and exhibiting of pure-bred dogs, but we may be well advised if we remember and take advantage of our experiences as gained a quarter of a century ago, if we do, we will be quite liable to steer clear of many irritating influences which might have a tendency to becloud our otherwise sound judgment. Very likely there will be outbursts of feeling, more or less prejudiced, directed at some of the popular breeds that are foreign in their origin. We will probably be obliged to take notice of such outbursts, as they may be made to appear to rest on the foundation of patriotism, nevertheless, as experienced fanciers, we must cheerfully furnish the necessary leadership that will offset any attempt to injure any breed of foreign dog during the present conflict, and particularly should we keep in mind the German Shepherd dog, Boxer and Dachshund breeds.

England, as usual will suffer first, as she must necessarily suffer most. It is true that the conservation of foodstuffs will not be as important an issue as it was in the last war, nevertheless the dog breeding industry has already been crippled in Britain. When breeding is restricted the Kennel Club suffers, and breeding has already slowed up. When dog shows are

restricted the Kennel Club suffers. The Harrogate championship show was probably the last such fixture to be held this year although over 50 licensed dates have been declared cancelled. Imagine the effect of this condition on England's governing body, and on the canine magazines 'Dog World' and 'Our Dogs', then on to the manufacturers of dog foods, and supplies, the only sunray that is visible at the moment, lies in the hope that the struggle that has started may soon come to an end and be a complete vindication of democracy. On this side of the Atlantic we will have many opportunities to help bear the burdens of our allied brethren.

There has been some show of irritation against the foreign breeds, and likely this condition will develop further, but all fair minded fanciers will be prompt to discourage this antipathy which is quite unwarranted. When Judge W. H. Pym, selected the very attractive Dachshund Int. "Ch. Herman Rinkton" for his Best in Show award at Ottawa, many raised their eyebrows, and even the daily press expressed opinions, but Mr. Pym was not judging 'Hitlers', he was judging dogs. At the C.N.E. Judge Chris Casselman also favored the Dachshund for his Very Best Dog, and a murmur of disapproval could be felt, if not heard, but Mr. Casselman was quite right, he too was judging dogs by prescribed standards. We should remember that many of our good breed representatives of German origin, are Canadian-bred and born, and as such, should be acknowledged as Canadian citizens of the Canine race. The great little "Herman Rinkton" himself is an American-bred dog, and what if German Shepherds and Boxers do participate actively in the present war, and with Hitler's forces, the same breeds, plus, will be performing like service for the Allied cause, so let us think clearly, and be fair to our dogs, in spite of everything they will still continue to be 'man's best friend', and so as your President I council all unprejudiced fanciers to refrain from sharing in any action unfavourable to breeds of dogs of German origin. Our own club is already feeling the effect of European conditions, just as we are feeling the effect of the changes made necessary by the functioning of our constitution since September 1st, but I am confident that the members will all find a satisfactory working policy quickly and possibly unexpectedly.

WESTMINSTER

Mr. J. Gould Remick, recently appointed chairman of the Bench Show Committee of the Westminster Kennel Club Dog Show, has announced the board of judges for the 64th annual exhibition, to be held in Madison Square Garden, New York, on February 12th, 13th and 14th, 1940. This list, which is composed of the most noted experts in the United States and Canada, was selected by Mr. Remick's committee, which includes Mr. Caswell Barrie, Mr. Franklin B. Lord, Mr. David Wagstaff, Mr. Walter H. Reeves and officers of the club who are Mr. Gerald M. Livingston, Dr. Samuel Millbank, Mr. Harry I. Caesar and Mr. Joseph C. Hoagland.

The list is headed by Dr. Millbank, who will make the highest award of the big exhibition. The six judges who will officiate in the groups are Mrs. Walton Ferguson, Jr., Sporting Breeds; Mr. Joseph C. Quirk, Sporting Breeds (Hounds); Mr. John G. Bates, Terrier Breeds; Mrs. M. Hartley Dodge, Working Breeds; Mr. H. L. Mapes, Toy Breeds; and Mr. Carey W. Lindsay, Non-Sporting Breeds.

The Obedience Test Classes, which met with such success last year, will again be incorporated in the program and will be judged by Mr. Josef Weber. The popular Children's Handling Classes will be in the capable hands of Mr. Harry Hartnett.

As in the past few years, the show will be limited to three thousand dogs. This is necessary because of lack of space in the Garden and the desire of the Committee to make the show as comfortable as possible for all entries.

I have been informed by members of the C.K.C. that they had been showing eligible dogs, champions and dogs that were potential champions in the hope of one day winning the C.K.C. Cup for some seven years, but without success. However, these same members were gracious enough to tender their congratulations, without acrimony, if not, however, without any tinge of disappointment."

Thanks Doctor, 'Ye Editor himself hopes to live long enough to win a C.K.C. Trophy, and he has made champions of every breed he ever laid his hands to, but that C.K.C. silver is rather elusive.

NOTES FROM THE EDITOR'S DIARY

"THE best laid plans o' men an' mice gang aft agley", so said the poet, but there was more truth than poetry in that philosophy. When we arrived in Glasgow, on Saturday noon, August 19th, our best bet for getting back to Toronto as soon as possible was the "Duchess of Bedford", leaving Glasgow on September 1st, and this sailing we did arrange to take, and would have taken only for the British Admiralty taking the ship over on her sailing date, and declaring her sailing cancelled. Correspondence from Toronto and Vancouver enabled us to steer clear of worry, and to continue adding to our reserve strength in order to cope with whatever the days lying ahead had to offer.

The week lying between August 19th, and 25th, we spent in covering many places in Scotland, and particularly the little town of Wishaw where we spent, at least, one half of our lifetime. One of the highlights of this happy week, was a visit to the palatial Hotel, at Newhouse, on the main Edinburgh Road, where ex Provost Macnab Chassells, of 'Inveresk' Springer Spaniel fame, has built the most imposing hostelry of its kind in the west of Scotland, quite probably in Great Britain, and no Canadian fancier who may be sojourning in Scotland should miss paying the ex Provost a visit. Besides seeing some famous Springers, they will see some rare animals and birds, and meet one of Scotland's foremost fanciers.

On Saturday morning, August 26th, we went down to London. It was expecting too much to hope for the war clouds not to appear, the very atmosphere suggested war in the offing, every man and woman, boy and girl, even children under 2 years old, and everyone with his or her gas-mask, and never at any time could you find any person without the gas-mask, this condition in its very self suggested the nearness of war. So whilst we anticipated anything happening, at any time ever since we landed in Scotland, we were frankly amazed at the wonderful atmosphere that followed us to the very heart of the Empire itself. Londoners had "a spot of work to attend to" and they certainly were attending to it in real earnest. Imagine the heart of Hyde Park torn out to make air raid shelters, imagine public buildings sand-bag protected 2 stories high, and yet the live chatter of "Old Bill an' the better ole", on everybody's lips. After dinner we went to the Palladian Theatre, a variety show featuring England's best variety talent, and never have we noticed people so genuinely happy, though unquestionably all were fully conscious of what a day might bring forth.

Taking advice from a fellow passenger on the 'Ida Bakke'—that splendid ship that brought us from New Westminster to Glasgow in safety, and picked up the crews of the torpedoed boats "Influence" and "Cheyenne", off the south of Ireland, and took them to the coast of England—God bless her—we made the Regent Palace Hotel our London headquarters, and we are under obligation for such advice. On Sunday, August 27th, we went to Beaconsfield, Bucks, and in the company of our hostess of 1935, Mrs.

Hobbs, we attended at the cemetery and placed flowers on the grave of her late husband Captain H. E. Hobbs, the founder of the Tail-Wagger's Club, and my very good friend and host of 4 years ago.

Monday I was back in London again, and visited my friend Mr. H. T. W. Bowell, the Secretary of the English Kennel Club, in his comfortable offices, and here I was fortunate enough to meet Mr. Raymond L. Patterson, the Morris and Essex 'Key' man. After refreshment and luncheon with the officers of the Kennel Club we realized that there were warm hearts abiding everywhere in the world. The days that followed from August 28th until Friday, September 1st, were full days in every sense of that term. The day hours were spent in looking at London's preparedness, and feeling the tempo of her people, both amazingly wonderful. Monday and Tuesday nights were spent with as wonderful people as might be found anywhere in the world. Mrs. Hartley M. Dodge the Patron of the Morris and Essex, and Mr. Raymond L. Patterson, both having completed heavy judging engagements at Cheltenham, Alsatian League Championship, on July 29th, and at Monkstown, Ireland, on August 7th. Mrs. Phyllis Robson, Editor of Dog World (England) and Mr. Percy Averill. The programme for each evening included cocktails, dinner and theatre. On Wednesday the Giralda folks left for the United States, on the 'Queen Mary', and on Thursday night, the remnant, Mrs. Robson, Mr. Averill, and the writer again followed the plan of the earlier programmes, and exchanged notes, and remembered kindly those of our party who had just left us.

As our week in London drew to its close, we decided to find out first hand what the "Evacuation" was all about, and that was an experience that has been engraven on our hearts. 100,000 odd children leaving their parents for the so-called safety areas. World history was being made before our very eyes. Here was the greatest outpouring of mother love that we had ever seen, and we were inordinately proud of the women of Britain that last forenoon that we were to be in dear old London, but it was with mixed feelings that we made our way back to the Regent Palace. The day was warm, the sky was blue. London, with all her old hustle and bustle, and yet, we seemed to sense something extraordinary was near at hand. On Friday we decided to attend Harrogate Championship show, and for that purpose we betook ourselves to King's Cross Station to go north for a visit with the folks there. What a train-load of people we have never witnessed before, men of all ranks, and of all branches of the service were on their way already. We arrived at Harrogate to encounter the "black-out" for the first time in our experience, and a black-out in Britain is literally just that. So it was with lots of difficulty that we navigated the quarter mile from the station to the Alexander Hotel, everything was just as black as tar, and there was no exception. Not a cigarette burning, nor being lit, and this was the first night of the black-out. The immediate and happy response of the

British people to the wishes of the British Government simply made it impossible for any visitor to entertain any thought of complaint.

On Saturday morning we were at the Harrogate Championship Show grounds long before most of the exhibitors got there. It had been rumoured that the show would not open at all, and that it would be cancelled. We have felt sorry for show managements before, but here was a heart-breaker if ever there was one. Just imagine if you can, that Harrogate was your Club's show, and that half of your judges (18 of them) and a third of your entry had not turned up, how would you feel about things but that happened at Harrogate this year, the day before the second World War was declared, and the last champion show to be held in England in 1939.

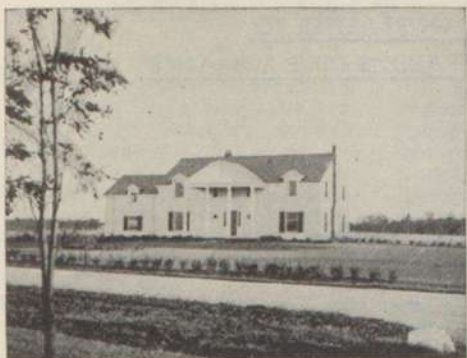
To have the privilege of meeting such men as Chris Houliker, Sam Warburton, George Wallwork, J. W. H. Benyon, Bob Barlow, Dick Voss, Clem Wood, Ernest Roddy and Jimmie Knode was worth crossing 3 oceans for and we had actually travelled 18,000 miles to get here. Another privilege was to have our hands on England's greatest bulldog of the present time, "Ch. Bosworth Queen", for whom our C.K.C. president, Mr. Sparkes, had offered a big price, but Jimmie Knode and his "Bosworth Queen" are a combination that money isn't going to break up. This bitch would likely continue her very spectacular show career on this side of the Atlantic if she ever got here, but in the nursery her glamour might not carry on because of her size. But oh, she is grand. Still another privilege was to have enjoyed several happy hours with Mr. R. H. Voss who has again agreed to sponsor English dogs for the forthcoming Christmas number of *Kennel and Bench*.

Sunday at Harrogate we shall never forget. We had read in the paper that Mr. Chamberlain would talk to the nation at 11.15 o'clock and we tried to visualize our Canadian freinds sitting at their sets turning the dials. Thus occupied we noticed a card featuring a couple of scotties in a rakish pose and under the picture were the following lines which we memorized as we waited:

"Good luck I wish you,
Sure foot and aim,
The pluck to smile
Though in a losing game.
The grit to struggle,
The strength to stay
And improving skill
What'er you play."

After the voice of Mr. Chamberlain had died away, there was a very definite air of sure, steady determination to "get on with the job" that was positively bracing and encouraging, so we just breathed our newly learned toast to the British and French Governments and to the bearers of arms representative of both.

At noon on Sunday we arrived at Harrogate station and asked for a ticket to Glasgow. The clerk in charge suggested that we were rather optimistic and asked how and when we hoped to get there. The time table had showed 8 trains but now war was on, so we took a train to Leeds and got another eyeful there. Leeds,

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as a city, appears to be rather cramped and the matter of fire following possible air-raids had not been overlooked and to protect life and to lessen hazard from fire, great water tanks were being built on the sidewalks of the main thoroughfares. We had not noticed anything like this anywhere else than in Leeds. In time we found ourselves back in Glasgow and in the arms of a real honest to goodness black-out, the only suggestion of light being the spark from the overhead electric wires as a trolley car would pass an intersection. To bump into a person was the same as bumping into a postal letter box and neither expected any kind of an apology.

Glasgow is just the same as she was when we left her, only her chin was in and her chest was out. "Get on with the job" was the spirit obvious everywhere. By this time we have learned the lesson that to avoid black looks from one's fellows was to always carry the gas-mask wherever you went, if it was only around the corner to the postal box for a penny ha'penny stamp.

Wednesday, September 6th, we have all our papers for to leave on the Saturday from Greenock on the "Duchess of Athol". A ticket for the train is one of our vouchers. So we breathe easy. Thursday morning a telegram is handed to us, as we start to eat the good old Scottish porridge. We read it, "Duchess of Athol" will not touch Belfast, nor Glasgow. Proceed to Liverpool to-day." Well, now, what do you think of that I ask you. Anywhere where there's a will there's a way and so we leave the oatmeal and very soon we are on our way to Liverpool and there we really do learn that war is really on. We pick a hotel with a timely name, "The Lord Nelson", and there are over 100 people there ahead of us, all waiting for the "Athol". Many are Australians, some New Zealanders, some Americans, some from foreign countries but most returning Canadians, 150 are survivors of the ill-fated "Athenia" and since we missed contacting her through an economic argument we rather inclined to the more or less

nerve wracked "Athenia" survivors. The next 5 days was a merry-go-round. Every day the "Athol" would sail but you would get all the information the next day at the C.P.R. office at 10-30. This dose was hard to swallow and discontent grew apace. For this condition there could be no excuse as it was known that the admiralty was arranging for our convoy but such is the human being, fidgety and jittery. Probably so many of the "Athenia's" passengers at the hotel had something to do with the tense feeling which prevailed. On the Wednesday morning we brought a paper in from Lime Street station and it had a powerful headline which read "Godammed Germans Can't Be Trusted". The ejaculation being that of an American with sympathy for Germany who had been on the "Athenia". His whole ejaculation was "You can't trust the Godammed German Government and you can't trust the Godammed German Navy." We felt that this was a bad omen, for Herr Hitler, coming as it did from an American.

Sunday, September 10th, rainy, cold, windy and overcast skies, but the bacon and eggs were particularly good, and the marmalade was the best yet. Several places offered us invitations, one of which was Blackpool by bus for a dollar and a quarter, we remembered that Albert Roberts, and his good wife (Shensi, to Canadians) were likely to be found at 2 Huntley Ave., Luxton, there, so it was rather tempting, but, oh it was such a cold morning. Then we thought of Maghull, Lances, and that cozy cottage

'Rockland' where our friend Frank Featherstone breeds better than ordinary Wire Fox Terriers, and advertises some of them for sale in our August issue of Kennel and Bench we believe. Mr. Featherstone is bar-tend on the 'Duchess of York' (Tourist) and just came into port on Saturday. (We had hoped to sail to Canada with him on August 19th)—just as we were pondering over the possibilities the Maghull bus came in, and we boarded her to get out of the cold and rain.

Arriving at 'Rockland' we found our friend a la Percy Brown, all dolled up in wash day toggery, and already 3 wires had been through the bath tub. He was happier than we had hitherto known him to be. The dogs were all well, and the four 'Evacuees' two boys and two girls were meeting their new 'Uncle Frank' for the first time. What a happy little family group. We had been proud of the Mothers of England the day we left London for Harrogate championship show, as we watched the evacuating children, leaving the city by the thousand, 100,000 some one said, and here were four of that number at Mr. Featherstone's home, and as we listened to the little visiting evacuees say 'Aunt Lil' or Uncle Frank', we had difficulty in keeping the old 'Adams Apple' from developing into tell-tale proportion. On the way back to Liverpool several churches emptied themselves of their worshippers, and each one had their gas-masks along. Oh yes, we had ours tucked under our arm too.

Monday, September 11th. was just another cog in our merry-go-round wheel, at 10-30 the C.P.R. clerks gave us the same old parrot cry "come back to-morrow morning at 10-30". Nevertheless it was comforting to see the blimps staggered in the sky-line. We would like to tell Kennel and Bench readers about these, but feel that it would be rather unwise to do so at the present time, better wait awhile until they tell their own story to the world. The best news of the day is that "Canada has declared war on Germany". On Tuesday and Wednesday we get visits into Chester, New

We formed the opinion that 'following the leaders' would slow us down several days on our way back to Canada after we do commence the long trek, anyway, we will be happy to see Montreal and Toronto at the earliest possible moment, and thereby uphold the truism of the old saying 'glad to get away, and glad to get back again'. The expressions heard on every hand by holiday makers waiting to move on to the four quarters of the earth, emphasize their impatience at the enforced delay. One old gent from Pittsburgh, Pa. does his thinking out loud, as so many good Americans do and one of his thoughts ran this way 'Darn the blasted Heinies anyway, I'll fire every darned one of them when I get back to Pittsburgh'.

Thursday, Sept. 14th. Believe it or not, the trek from all Hotels to Princess Pier was spontaneous this nice morning, and by 10-30 there were over 1,000 people ready to show their passports, and be shown to their berths, however, it was 11-30 before the first move was made, but by 1 o'clock everyone had found his berth, sorted their baggage and had found the dining salon ready for their first meal. It was a really delightful luncheon, and much superior to the luncheons at the Lord Nelson Hotel. You can take our word for that.

After luncheon we just had time to breathe in comfort when we were called to well defined muster stations for the 'Abandon Ship Exercise' in this we were joined by the whole crew. Those of us who had gas-masks were obliged to appear in our life-belts and masks. The manner of lowering and filling the life-boats was explained at great length by an 'old salt' who 'knew his stuff'. His explicit instruction was to carry our life-belts with us wherever we went on the ship, and all the time. This instruction has been observed closely ever since, but in this respect foreigners on board take first prize, they do lug their belts along every move they make. In the middle of the Mersey River, and down towards Southport we await the Empress of Britain, the 'Duchess of York', other vessels, and our convoy, but to be on the way home feels good. Friday and Saturday were rather listless days, and there was a nervous tension that could quite easily be felt, and no won-

The result of the attempt to get the 'Athenia' survivors a second time cost Herr Hitler one of his boasted U boats.

We take our hats off to the Captain, officers and crew of the 'Duchess of Athol', their efforts to allay fear through the media of Bingo games, card games, horse racing, moving pictures, etc., were greatly appreciated as much as it was possible to appreciate such things under the circumstances.

Friday, September 22nd. 'Brite an' early' is a fitting slogan for this particular day. The Au Revoir dinner last night with its accompanying jollification seemed to shake leaden loads from weary shoulders. Do not think this long run from Liverpool to Quebec has been a jubilee. Why we have 'Athenia' survivors actually smiling this morning, some of whom have never had their clothes off since they came aboard. Some of them would have jumped through the roof yesterday if a kid's balloon had burst. Canada looks lovely this morning, and it does look like God's Country, and no mistake. We thank God that we are

British, and for our British institutions and government, we feel that we have so much to be thankful for, that to be otherwise would be sinful.

Saturday morning, Montreal, honestly I could have knelt down and kissed the concrete. Whilst looking for a C.N.R. expressman we noticed our Director W. W. Rooney, and could tell that he had been in the rain for awhile, and we realized that Tom and Jessie Ritchie will not be far away, nor are they. "Away we go to Westmount, and over a wee Johnny Walker", and the ham and eggs we tell the story that we have written for the other of our Kennel and Bench reading friends. Then a little quiet rest. Then a few of Montreal's leading fanciers for a quiet evening of travel recital, and other items of interest that bring midnight and train time all too quickly, but it is true that time and tide wait for no man, and so away we go on the choo choo for Toronto, and we cut our financial cloth to fit our financial garment in such a financial way that we are obliged to pay for a berth with a ten shilling note, and some English silver. KEEP THE "DOG" FIRES BURNING

EVEN a war cloud has a silver lining, and there seems no real reason why Canadian dogdom should not gather in some of the warmth of the sunshine that finds its way through the war clouds that hang over Europe. War time is a sentimental time when the heart is touched and human sympathies are tenderly pitched, and always at such a time dog is closest to man. Men feel the need of him, women left alone feel safer with a dog's protection and companionship, little children whose daddies and brothers are in uniform are consoled by some dog's playful ways, that is why war time is dog time, and in Canada where food problems never have been so acute as to make it necessary to curtail dog breeding from an economic standpoint, kennel activities should boom. They will, unless the Canadian dog fancier adopts the feeling of pessimism which ruined dog sales during the years of the depression when a panic among breeders dropped the price of good dogs of popular breeds to an all-time low.

Let us look at some of the reasons why dog breeding should make a gain from a financial standpoint, and at the same time aim a blow at what might form a bogey to the timid in the fancy who are entertaining grave doubts for the future of their hobby.

Production in all saleable merchandise is governed by its market. There is nothing in the European situation that threatens Canada's market for dogs. Overseas markets for Canadian dogs will be closed, of course, but at no time in the history of Canadian dogdom have sales to the European nations or our own motherland amounted to anything more than dabble-dabble, and actually no steady market for Canadian dogs have ever flourished beyond the American continent. Certainly dogs have been exported from Canada to practically all the European countries and to other continents as well, but these sales have been few considering the number of dogs bred annually in Canada, have been spaced over many years and have been participated in by such a small proportion of our breeders that the shutting of the doors of these distant countries will work no genuine hardship on Canadian dogs. When doors close they shut in as well as shut out, therefore Canadian dogs will occupy many a worthy place in Canada that might have been held by an imported dog had peace held.

Yes indeed, the market for Canadian-bred dogs has been and still will be the Americas, Canada and the United States, and this writer advances the opinion that this market will expand and that the wiser among our Canadian breeders will increase rather than retard kennel activities.

Let us survey the home market. Cruel as the thought may appear, it is predicted, by industrially conscious Canadians, that the war will bring more employment to Canada, that unemployment which has been a serious problem throughout the world will be practically stamped out in the Dominion. Labor will be in demand, and always at such a time wages increase. If this war is to be a long one, and Empire leaders appear to feel that it

will be, then Canada as in the Great War will send a great share of its young manhood out of the country, and jobs that have been held fast by workers will be open for those less fortunate in securing employment. More money will come into many Canadian homes, even as young manhood pours out of them. Canadian people have always wanted dogs, they would and did pay the price for them, and many who have wanted good dogs for many years and have had to go without will again have the cash to pay for them.

Don't overlook the man in training. Many a young soldier in Canada's new army will be on a payroll for the first time in his life, and the man in uniform in the last war was one of the best customers kennel owners had. A dog was the favorite gift from a soldier to his girl friend, to his mother or to the young kid brothers and sisters he was going to leave behind.

True, the mongrel dog was the camp follower, but the dog the lads left behind, as another binding link between those he loved at home, was most often a pure-bred.

In connection with the soldier and his dog, there comes to mind a conversation I had with a man connected with censorship of letters during the last war. He told me it was amazing how many letters from home were filled with exploits of the family dog, and how many boys, facing the grim realities of a terrible war, never forgot to mention their old pets. He said that at first he found himself striking out references to "Colonel", "Major" and "Captain", thinking they referred to men of those ranks in the army, until it dawned on him that such names were the favorite war-time names for dogs. When such remarks as "the Colonel is staying out all night these nights", that the "Captain has fleas" or that "the Major was running around with that little bitch next door" would be highly censorable material if they referred to a man of rank in the army, they certainly needed no black pencilling when he realized that "Colonel" was the collie the soldier had bought as a puppy, that "Major" was nothing more distinguished than a pet spaniel and that "Captain" was the regiment mascot, a bulldog of ancient lineage.

Although the high rate of exchange that divides the Canadian dollar from the United States dollar is a real hardship when a Canadian wishes to visit the United States, and when men who, like myself, derive a portion of their income in Canadian dollars and spend them in the United States where they make their home, find them considerably shrunken when they take them to U.S. banks, the exchange rate will be a real benefit to the Canadian who has a dog attractive to a United States buyer. If a sale is made and paid for in American money the seller gets considerably more than his asking price when he transfers his American bills to Canadian funds. On the other hand, the fact that a money order payable in Canada in Canadian currency can be purchased in the United States for considerably less in American funds, makes the United States buyer bargain conscious and

many of them are bound to take advantage of this fact and avail themselves of this opportunity of purchasing Canadian stock at a considerable saving. There, then, is the Canadian fancier's great chance, and he has a splendid additional bit of sales talk when presenting his Canadian doggy wares to the prospective American buyer.

There may be a wave of uneasiness in the ranks of breeders of dogs whose breed extraction or development is associated with enemy countries. In the last war the feeling was strong enough to cause some of the breeds so effected to have their names changed. The feeling is different today. This war is against Hitlerism, not against the German people, as Prime Minister Chamberlain has so aptly pointed out. If we can accept the assurance that this war is to save the real Germany for the real German people and to restore peace in Europe for all time, hate against the Germans themselves will not gain the headway it did during the past war.

The breeder of dobs, dachshies, shepherds and boxers, can start a little propaganda of his own. He can point out, and truthfully, that the class of Germans who engage in dog breeding are the peace-loving, home-abiding, pipe-smoking, beer-drinking down to earth sort of men we associate with firesides and good fellowship, men who would rather be at home with their dogs than on any battlefield, even as you and I, and is there only because of a hateful system. It is to crush that system and to make the world's firesides safe again that the Allies are waging war today. There is your argument, Mr. and Mrs. Dog Breeder of the breeds so effected, make use of it, keep a stout heart and the breed of dog you love need not to be frowned upon, you need turn to no other breed for your hobby, and unless your dog is named "Hitler" there will be no need to change his name.

Dog shows will have no cause to fail. With the Red Cross and other patriotic endeavors making constant drives for money, the wise kennel clubs will put on their shows under the sponsorship of some worthy organization. The ticket selling and driving power of the good people who have the time, means and talent to engage in the work of service clubs, and such like, coupled with the experience of dog show giving clubs, should, and probably will, put the dog shows across in Canada better than many shows of the past. In the cities that are headquarters for troops in training, there will be a much wider gate to draw from.

One of the most important home duties during war is to keep up one's spirits. Moping at home won't help the boys in the battlefield and it will be unpatriotic and un-Canadian to let dog breeding lapse in any way. Keep the "dog" fires burning is the message I have tried to convey here, but as I write comes word of a Patriotic Show in Toronto to fill in the gap caused by the cancellation of the Royal Winter Fair show—good old Canada, it is always one jump ahead, even one jump ahead of the writers.

RELATES HIS RECENT EXPERIENCES IN EUROPE

I arrived in Southampton on the 10th August and, spending a day in Hampshire, got to London on the 12th. On Sunday, the 13th I was in Holland, and was back in London on the 14th. On the 15th I left with W. H. Judd, of the Arnold Arboretum, on a horticultural research trip which was to take us to France, Italy, Switzerland, Germany and Holland.

Around Nice, in the south of France, and at Ventimiglia, in Italy, there was a little more evidence of border troops, etc., than in other years, but when we arrived at Genoa on the 21st August everything seemed quiet with no indication of war.

We spent the next few days visiting Pisa, Florence, Milan and gardens on Lake Como, in blissful ignorance of any approaching storm. Only on Friday, the 25th August, when we went to Cook's office to have our tickets re-routed through a different part of Germany, did we find there had been a crisis and that two days before all Britishers were ordered out of Germany. On visiting the Canadian, British, and American Consular offices in Milan all three advised us to get out of the country unless very urgent and important business would detain us, (and this advice we followed.)

I was in London one week during the crisis; one week after war was declared, and one week in Holland, and preparations for WAR, WAR, WAR, were in evidence on every hand. I do not know which phase was the most spectacular, but one could not help being impressed with the cool, methodical, way, in which the British people acted, (and the French). The saddest sight was the evacuation of the school children and their mothers, the latter worried and many in tears, but most of the children appeared cheerful and happy—in fact one cartoon explained their feeling, in most cases, better than I could do. It was a School Mistress asking a class to spell "holiday", and the answer was "e-v-a-c-u-a-t-i-o-n".

London (and the whole of England for that matter) during a blackout is something one can never forget. To give one a little idea of how completely light has been extinguished—the little slits of green, amber or red, that are not blackened in the traffic lights, could be seen distinctly for over a quarter of a mile on Oxford Street at night, when everything else was in darkness, but it is one devil of a job to try to follow the faint and dim light that directs the traffic, from these same slits, in the daytime.

There is so much to wonder at, and so little one can do. If ever I felt helpless it was in London where there is absolutely nothing that a 65 year-old can do except a sort of Boy Scout or Rotary service in helping mothers with their parcels and baggage (during evacuation) around the railroads and underground stations. I could tell you of a very pathetic instance where a very poor woman and her daughter with four children, and burdened with baggage, handed me a shilling for the little help I gave them when I told them I was a Canadian stranded—(of course I meant stranded for a boat, not for pocket money.)

To try and describe how sandbags were piled up against the buildings; how Air Raid Precaution Shelters had been established throughout London, and about the three air raid alarms, would perhaps be censored, as well as any reference to the restrictions about taking money out of the country, etc.

No information was available from Shipping Companies, neither as to date of sailing or whether British ships would be convoyed, etc. The ship I was booked to return on, on the 9th September, I understand has not sailed yet. Perhaps the saddest scene of all was the pathetic enquiries at shipping offices and other places for the survivors of the "Athenia".

The shipping offices around Trafalgar Square looked like a run on a bank (so many Americans wanting to return). "Exit Permits" were required from the Passport Office of the War Department, and one had to wait in line for hours and take his turn (Youths from the south of Ireland

predominated on the days I waited in the queue). Until your passport was stamped by the passport office no steamship line would sell a ticket. At last I was granted a permit to go to Holland to conclude a business transaction (I had tentatively placed an order there on the 13th August for a million bulbs for clients in the United States) and on Saturday, the 9th September I sailed for Rotterdam on the Dutch steamer "Batavier V" (the boat which a few days before brought Ambassador Henderson home from Germany).

I arrived in Amsterdam on Sunday morning, September 10th and spent a week with friends with whom, for the most part, I had done business for forty years and, through their influence, succeeded in booking a passage on the Holland American Line, now a one class boat—the "Zaandam" (which, in normal times, I would class as among the very best transportation values on the ocean.) On this particular voyage we were crowded with 50% additional passengers in upper berths hanging to the ceiling in each two berth cabin.

From Amsterdam we were piloted through Dutch mine fields out into the North Sea, and when we reached the East Coast of England we took on a British pilot and were piloted through mine fields in the North Sea and English Channel. What with life-belt and life-boat instruction, and cabin doors left open day and night, we were on our toes until well out in the Atlantic. We had no mishaps of any kind and the smoothest crossing I think I ever made. For the first time, I think, on any of my Atlantic trips, the fog-horn never blew. I was asleep when we left the Bishop light in the Scilly Islands, but saw the Nan-tucket Lightship a week later, on the 24th September, and docked at Hoboken, N.J., safe and sound, on Monday, the 25th. At the mouth of the Thames and the Dover Downs we stopped to let one pilot off and take on another. I never saw so many ships of so many nations as were at anchor at the mouth of the Thames, and in that region. We only saw a few British warcraft, including airships which every now and then flew over our heads. In the daytime there would be a large Holland flag and the name of the boat spread on the deck and the name and flag painted and illuminated on the sides of the ship, and at night the flag and the name and country of the ship were lighted, and no lights were extinguished.

I arrived home a little too soon and found the Ragwood still untouched with frost and had to go back into Laurentians for a few days to get clear of a slight attack of Hay Fever and Asthma and to-day, the 11th October, 1939, I am back at my office, thankful to be home, and yet with a longing to be of some use somewhere and feeling keenly for my friends in the British Islands and Europe where so many of them must be "scared onlookers" at this time of "Hell on Earth". For the first time in many years I did not get to Scotland (That saved me from being torpedoed on the "Athenia").

Mr. Quilley also took along the Dalmatian, "Count De Marker-Roff", owned and imported by Mr. and Mrs. A. R. Ayerst. I mentioned some time ago in my notes that this was a real one, and he has come right up to expectations for he went best of breed at Toronto.

Now that the game season is open, the utility side of the Spaniels, Setters and Pointers is being demonstrated. I often wonder whether Albertans appreciate the fact that they are the most fortunate people in the world, as far as hunting goes, for all kinds of game are to be found in their own Province, within easy reach, and no hardships attached to going afield, or returning home, thanks to automobiles, and many, many thanks to those who had the foresight to undertake the preservation of the different kind of game for us. All the sloughs are filled with ducks, and every day except Sunday the Retrievers are busy, and the bags are above par. Hungarian partridge are real plentiful, and those who are fortunate enough to own good working dogs soon get their limit. The different highways are being policed every day, and each car approaching the city is stopped and the game is checked over. Mr. "Nimrod" must show his license and as very few prosecutions follow, Albertans are very law abiding citizens.

Now to get back to the practical side of the sporting dog, I always hunt duck with Cockers, and I have found that they can handle all the work any two guns give them. They do it so merrily, they are just as willing at the end of the day as they

were in the morning, and they pack away so easily after the night flight. The law only allows an even dozen birds and a 24 lb. Cocker thinks that is duck soup for him, so why burden yourself with any more pounds of dogdom.

I always hunt the upland game with an English Setter for they seem to stand the racket better, and the weather does not bother them as it does the shortcoated dogs. He can turn on a cold snap with very little provocation, and the Setter seems to be able "to take it". Anyway that breed suits me right down to the ground.

Charley Webster announces his determination to show all and sundry the way home at the forthcoming trials, to be held near Balzac. His puppy and derby prospects are both English Setters and they are fast and staunch to the nth degree. Bill Clements of Rockyford, has some real contenders that he intends taking to the Alberta Field Trials at Lethbridge. Bill has some of the "Air Pilot" strain that will make them all step. He has spent a lot of time on his dogs and they are now under perfect control. Bob Arthur of Strathmore has been working his dogs since the last field trial and he has been shooting over most of them. Walter Thompson of Red Deer, certainly knows how to train hunting dogs too. He has the imported English Setter, "Roc of Happy Valley", and the female, "Shiplake Misty", and now he is working some

of their progeny. He is delighted also has some real retrievers, and he delights in making them strut their stuff. I was delighted to see his dogs and will watch with interest his with their prospects.

The official premium list of the fifth annual fall show of the Children's Hospital Aid Society of Calgary to be held under Canadian Kennel Club rules is now in the mail, and the indications are that there will be a record entry. "Bill" Wandless has a son of the above dog that is hard to get past. Bill is a professional conditioner, and his dog always looks fit to show any day anywhere.

"Tommy" Cook of Calgary claims the palm for training Springers. Tommy is an old Whippet runner and trainer as well, and I don't think he has a peer when it comes to making a Springer work.

We understand she is progressing very nicely and all Club members will join with me in wishing her a speedy recovery. Another popular Club member Miss Ina Donald is in the hospital, and latest enquiries elicit the information she is progressing steadily. Her father, Tom Donald has also had a tough sojourn in the hospital, but it was noted with pleasure that he was up and about again at the recent matinee show held at Sturgeon Creek.

The Gun Dog Club of Manitoba plan to hold their annual meeting on November 9th next in Theatre A of the Manitoba University, when trophies and cups will be donated to the owners of the dogs winning the events in their annual Field Trial for Spaniels held last September 16th. An excellent show of motion pictures will be on view, giving a running action story of the club's activities since its inception, which will prove of great interest. They also will have some able speakers for this occasion, who will discuss topics of interest with membership. Further details may be looked for later.

On October 18th a meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club members of this city as called in the Marlboro Hotel and a very nice turnout of members resulted. Matters of interest were discussed, chiefly that of the proposed amended point ratings, and some interesting discussion took place. A motion was passed deploring the action of the Editor of Kennel and Bench in deleting a report of recent All American Field Trials, at Melita, and as one member put it, we in the west are proud of these events, as there is nothing in the Dominion, either in shows, or other trials to even come near to the enormous amount of money spent on participating dogs, the establishing of training camps, etc.; and yet a Canadian Kennel Club member goes to the trouble of attending the event, writing up its activities, mentioning names that are a legend to sporting dog owners, only to have it cut right out.

We on the Prairies are proud of these trials, and certainly a news item of this calibre did deserve space. It was felt there was something wrong somewhere, and the director was instructed to handle the matter with a view of having the thing cleared up. On the same line it was also noted that news items of dogs from Winnipeg, winning at Toronto recently, was also deleted. We figure we sent down one of the finest St. Bernards bred in recent years from this neck of the woods. It went 'tops', and will be heard from in New York next February, and yet this was blue pencilled, lost or something. No wonder the members do not read our official organ as they should.

There is very little individual kennel club activity to report, other than rumours of shows in the near future in the city, and regular routine activities of the two show giving clubs in the city.

I hope to have something definite to report in this connection shortly.

A further note of progress was struck at the recent meeting of Canadian Kennel Club members, when it was moved, seconded and carried unanimously that the C.K.C. should refund the \$25.00 to show giving clubs as heretofore. In this connection the Secretary Treasurer will be advised officially and in proper form. We hope that other clubs in the west will take similar action.

Kennel and Bench has no apologies to offer for the non-appearance of the report on the field trials at Melita, nor is the magazine ashamed of the space given to unlicensed field events in its regular columns. The story "A trip to Melita" was well written copy, but contained little of general reader interest for Kennel and Bench readers. It is a fact that items of much greater importance did not appear in our last issue, but the 1939 policy of the magazine has been "cutting the garment to suit the cloth", so that our budget may be kept within due bounds.

OBITUARY

It was with real regret that we received from our Saskatchewan Director, Walter J. Pym, a clipping from the Regina paper dated Thursday, October 19th, telling of the death of Charles Sedley Keating, at his home in Regina, on Wednesday afternoon at the age of 66 years.

The late Mr. Keating was considered to be one of the best dog show secretaries in Canada, and his activities, in that capacity, when serving the Regina Exhibition dog show were pronouncedly noticeable each year. A close friend of the late Norman Mackenzie K.C., of Regina, at one time the Airedale Terrier King of Canada, the late Mr. Keating favoured the Airedale Terrier himself, and his pride in the breed, as it existed in Regina, was well known indeed. Our old friend was a member of the Canadian Kennel Club from the Spring of 1914, until the end of 1927. And we can never forget the year when the late Bert Swann, the late Norman K. Swire, and the writer were invited to attend the Regina Exhibition, as its guests, this well remembered invitation came to us from the hands of the kindly little gentleman whose demise we deplore this day. Oh yes, the year the three SSS's went to Regina, was 1920, nineteen years past August 27-30. The big shots of that year at the Regina show were Norman Mackenzie, K.C., Ch. "Polam Maxim", Charlie Keating, Charlie Watson, Jack Newman, Herb Clements, Evan Gravell, with Swire, Swann and Strachan—The good old days.

A well known figure in international dogdom left the ranks, on August 21st, when Mr. Frederic C. Brown, the owner of the far famed "Pinegrade" prefix died at his summer home in Maine. All our readers and particularly all our sealyham lovers will regret to learn of Mr. Brown's passing. In the Canadian Kennel Club offices hang a pair of pictures which portray the greatest brace of sealyham terriers the world has ever seen, as such. One is the great dog Ch. "Pinegrade Perfection", the sesquicentennial (American Kennel Club) winner of 1926, Westminster Kennel Club Winner of 1927 and Eastern Dog Club (Boston) 1928. Here was a sealyham terrier good enough to win Best in Show at one of America's foremost shows in three consecutive years. Mr. Brown, we believe, was a brother-in-law of the late Mr. Robinson Beard and both men were close friends of our late beloved C.K.C. President, the late Mr. Joseph Russell.

By the death of Mr. Bayard Warren, Prides Crossing, Mass. New England lost one of its finest and best known sportsmen on September 7th last. Always interested in jumping horses, and pure-bred dogs Mr. Warren's stock name "Barberry" was well known everywhere, and particularly when it was attached to his Afghan Hounds, and Sealyham Terriers. It was noticed at Westminster last February that three Afghan Hounds out of one litter won 1st and 3rd in the American-bred class for dogs, and 1st in the same class for bitches, whilst a couple of litter brothers in Sealyhams won 1st and 2nd prizes in the Puppy dog class.

My Own Brucie", and if memory can still be depended on, it was "Brucie" who took the rich spoils offered at this generous prize offering fixture a year ago, but this year the mantle for Best in Show fell over the easy moving shoulders of "Ch. Che Le of Matsons Catawba", a Pekingese, owned by Mrs. James M. Austin, Old Westbury, N.Y. With the win went the President's Gold Cup which carried a \$1,000.00 value.

On September 23rd, the Eastern States Exposition, at Springfield, Mass. featured Bethune L. Smith, Toronto, in the role of Best Dog in Show judge, and from an entry of 450 dogs, Mr. Smith found his Best in Show dog in Mr. and Mrs. Francis N. Crane's Great Pyrenees "K'Eros de Guerveur de Basquaerie" (Imp.) and being shown for the first time. A really brilliant win.

At this same show, our First Vice President, Capt. H. Dudley-Waters, J.P. Highland Creek had the task of passing the rule over many of the more popular breeds, and amongst them, his old favourites, the Airedale Terriers, Capt. Waters was kept very busy sorting out dogs during the entire day of the show.

As we go to press, Capt. Waters is en route to keep a judging appointment, at Lansing, Mich.

INFORMATION

For Exporter's of Dogs to the United States desiring to have such dogs enter free of duty

The requirements of the United States Government regarding free entry of dogs into the United States are

1. The importer must be a citizen of the United States.

2. The Canadian Kennel Club certificate of registration must be transferred by the Canadian National Live Stock Records to show the ownership of the United States buyer and this certificate must be at the point of entry to the United States on the arrival of the dog.

3. Strict compliance with the regulations is necessary. Certificates of Registration showing transfers are reviewed by the United States Government inspectors at the border before being submitted to Washington. If the certificate of registration showing transfer are not at the border when the dog arrives, duty will not be refunded there, for it is essential not to ship the dog until the transfer of ownership has been recorded at the Canadian National Live Stock Record office, and the certificate of registration returned to the seller.

4. When the certificate of registration showing the ownership of the United States buyer is returned to the Canadian seller, it will be accompanied with the following forms, "Affidavit of Identity", "Application for Certificates", and "Customs form 3327", these forms are sent for the convenience of the United States buyer and they must all be completed by him, in duplicate. All forms must be executed in the United States to be acceptable. The Canadian seller should send these forms to the United States buyer immediately he receives them from the Live Stock Record Office.

Quotations From United States Regulations

"The dog must be accompanied at the United States port if first arrival by—

- (a) Pedigree certificate
- (b) Complete transfer of ownership from foreign (Canadian) breeder to American importer.

"After the dog has been examined by a Federal inspector the pedigree certificate and transfer must be forwarded to the Bureau of Animal Industry, Washington, D. C. They will later be returned to the sender.

"Description of the dog taken at the port of entry must agree with pedigree certificate as to age, colour markings, and other identification such as chart, nose-print, or tattoo."

If your dog is tattoo marked be sure tattoo marks are legible.

To facilitate registration in the United States the Live Stock Records office send to the American Kennel Club a duplicate of the certificate of registration, where it is held pending application for registration in the United States.
