

### **IDENTIFYING THE DOGS**

We have been interested in following the tastes of our members when selecting their choice of the three alternate methods of identification and must frankly admit, that in actual practice, our own preconceived opinpractice, our own preconceived opin-ions have stood up to all tests re-markably well. We had opined that our people would only adopt one of the three methods when necessity obliged them to do so. How true this opinion has turned out to be. We believed that nose-printing and tattooing would be the favored methods and in that order and here tattooing would be the favored methods and in that order and here again the available figures have not let us down, but we notice with regret that a trifle more than half of our members still have to make their choice yet.

The list of persons entitled to nominate or to be nominated, as it ap-



peared in our October issue, was representative of the persons who were in good standing as members, as before the 15th day of September and there were 1,316 names on that

The table shows that out of 1,316 paid up members, 618 have already arranged with the Records Office for that method of identification which they have considered to be the most satisfactory to themselves and leav-ing 698 members to still decide on their own choice of method and this should only be a matter of a very short time. For, like the "time and tide that waits for no man", regis tration must be kept up to date if the welfare of a kennel and its clients are to be properly safe-guarded. Probably it would have been ex-

pecting too much, if we had antici-pated no disturbance in our affairs through the inauguration and the functioning of the new identification legislation, frankly we did expect a measure of interruption, but with equal frankness we would say that we did not expect the apparent dis-ruption that the figures for October show. For comparison, we show the registration and transfer figures for October 1938 and 1939:

October, 1938 — Registrations 698, Transfers 753.

October, 1939 — Registrations 333, Transfers 408.

This condition cannot be blamed on the war, therefore we must place it directly to the upset in our business, following directly the identification legislation coming into practice. We do earnestly trust that complete adjustment will soon become the rule rather than the exception, but, if almost one half of our members find it to their advantage to select one of the three alternate methods at the of the three alternate methods at the end of the second month after the inauguration of the necessary "pra-tical and effective system" we trust that the other half will make a choice before "Santa Claus" reaches Canada in the course of his visitation to the Christian world Christian world.

Countless numbers of fanciers cross International Borders without inconvenience for the express purpose of attending dog shows in neighboring countries.

Year after year there is an exchange of judges, while at dog shows from San Francisco to New York, and from Victoria to Halifax, you will find foreign entries which lend an international aspect to the competition. Immigration and Customs officials at border points are particularly efficient and most helpful to all those who are willing to abide by the laws of the land they wish to enter, and it would appear they are especially friendly to dog fanciers. As a shining example of good will

As a shining example of good will among men, carefully examine the tenor of the "Secretary's Diary" which has been printed in Kennel and Bench. Here we find that James D. Strachan, starting at Toronto, crossed Canada, then sailed down the Washington, Oregon, and California coast. At every port he was greeted by dog fanciers, many he had never met personally before. Crossing the ocean to the old land he was greeted by fanciers at every turn, and when he returned to his own country, there on the pier at Montreal were dog fanciers with the "hand of welcome" fully extended. Would that all men in all countries could travel likewise today.

today. When the S.S. Ida Bakke sailed from Straits of Georgia for the Panama and Glasgow, with the Secretary aboard, this writer together with his daughter sailed

from the port of Vancouver for Honolulu on a dog fanciers mission. When our ship the Empress When our of Canada headed out into the Pacific Ocean charted for Lat. 20 N., Long. 15 W., one could not but meditate on what laid beyond the prow of that ship plowing steadily day and night through the blue Pacific waters. After five days on board we dropped anchor off Diamond Head for quarantine and immigration inspection, but even before it was our turn to pass inspection, a quiet spoken gentleman

approached us saying he was Sid Walker of Honolulu and promptly draped us with beautiful lei's (The Hawaiian symbol of friendship). Soon we were in dock and greeted by many fanciers and to receive more lei's, and to make new friends we hope we shall never lose.

Honolulu is probably the most doggy minded city of its size in the World. Imagine if you can a beautiful park with row upon row of modern kennels, each containing running water, cement and cinder runs, and shaded by Coconut trees with gorgeous flowers covering the iron fences. This is the so-called quarantine station with competent attendants in charge. Here dogs shipped in from the mainland are kept for a given time, while the owners are privileged to visit their dogs at all reasonable hours. If dogs could speak I am sure they would have nothing but praise for this necessary institution. If you read the Honolulu daily papers you will readily discover that there are four writers devoting considerable space to doggy activities each week, with the very competent Sidney Walker ever alert to boost the game during his radio talks.

I have been asked repeatedly as to the quality of the dogs owned in Honolulu. If you would like an agreeable surprise you should attend a Honolulu show. Here you will find dogs of real merit in every breed represented. How many mainland shows of a thousand dogs and less can boast of thirty-six shepherds all beautifully trained and not a midiocre one in the lot with the top dogs good enough for any competition; Great Danes that would surprise you with a home grown puppy that barring accidents, would make the best in the world of his age step to beat him; Irish and English Setters, Cockers (American and English type) that arouses your admiration; Irish and Wire-haired Fox Terriers in abundance; Pointers, Whippets, Doberman Pinschers that can waltz to their championships on the mainland. Griffons, Bostons and several other breeds that are a credit to their owners and breeders. Honolulu is the home of good dogs, if you intend selling dogs over there, the most friendly advice I could give you would be sell first class stock only, as fair specimens would merely clutter up the canine population and certainly would not get to first base in Honolulu competition.

On the Sunday following our arrival on the Island of Oahu, it was our pleasure to assist Mrs. Fordham, of Highland Park, Mich., and the well known Anton Rost, with the judging of the 7th annual show of the Hawaiian Kennel Club held on the beautiful Waialae Golf Course. Here Mrs. Fordham distinguished herself by turning in a beautiful job of judging; while Anton Rost was his same competent self that has judged dogs in many countries, and here let it be said that the same Anton is now an enterprising Honolulu business man and a hustling member of the Chamber of Commerce.

Who is responsible for staging such successful shows at this far away Paradise of the Pacific? and the answer is Arthur Zane, President, well known as a judge over here, and owner of the Central Market. Mr. H. K. L. Castle, a sportman of the old school and the busiest man on the Islands with his Banks, Ships, terminals, Industries of various kinds, to say nothing of a twelve thousand acre ranch stocked with the finest of Aberdeen-Angus cattle, Polo ponies, Great Danes and Shepherd dogs. Sidney Walker, of the Honolulu Advertiser, Fred O. Bevin, of the Island Hotel interests. Dr. Napp Young, J. Platt Cook, W. K. Jordan, Dr. H. Dorothy Dudley the Alexanders and Schmidts, Edward Towse, H. A. Walker, and the efficient and much travelled Secretary Miss Sadie Dyson, well known on the mainland, together

with scores of genuine fanciers who can accept a third ribbon quite as graciously as they do a first. Honolulu is a city of culture and beauty, a business culture and beauty, a business bee-hive, with the Royal Hawaiian Band playing you in and out of port with unfor-gettable melodies. To our globe trotting Secretary I would suggest that his travels will be quite incomplete until he meets the Hawaiian dog fanciers on their own soil.

# HELEN KELLER AND HER PETS

HEN Helen Keller, the world's most famous deaf and blind woman, was interviewed by the press, she stated that next to her work for the blind, her hobby was her love for dogs, six of which she has at her new Westport (Ct) home.

This summer Miss Keller received a Japanese Akita, a breed which resembles the Chow and is quite intelligent. The dog is supposed to be of the "barkless" variety.

The dog named "Kanzan Go", meaning Sword Mountain, was a gift of the Japanese state department and was trained from puppyhood to be a companion for Miss Keller. Two years ago when Miss Keller was touring Japan, her former Akita ("Kamikaze") died. To console her, the Japanese government requested the police of Akita to train a dog for her of the breed named after that town. When the Akita finished its training early this year, it was sent on its 11,000mile journey to Miss Keller.

The governor of Akita located Ichiro Ogasawara, a policeman who gave Miss Keller her first dog and he agreed to donate and train another for her.

W. B. W. Fleisher of Beverly Hills, Cal., agreed to handle the details in the shipment of her second Akita to America, and in appreciation, Miss Keller wrote to Mr. Fleisher in part:

"I have always been fond of dogs. When Nature infused a spark into a bit of clay for the dog, I think she was in a good mood. Certainly I marvel at the dog's fidelity, loving us in silks or rags, when we feed him or forget his food, with our eyes full of light or groping through darkness.

"It was natural then, that among the countless gifts bestowed upon me by the Japanese people, the one I cared about most was the dog presented by a police officer in the town of Akita. Moreover, Kamikaze symbolized the love and generosity of the people who welcomed me from one end of the empire to the other.

"I like big dogs best and that big one, though but five months old, was an Argus- eyed watchdog without the ancestral menace to strangers which brings me uneasiness as well as safety. His devoted master left him by my side, I sensed, with a wrench at his heart, aboard the Asama Maru at Yokohama. Of course, the pupper expected to see him again and pathetically sniffed around the deck for the footsteps with which he was so familiar. However, as the ship surged into a world he did not know, he transferred his trustful loyalty to me and such a compliment from an Akita dog made me bow my head in humility.

"Always during his long journey from Yokohama to my home in Forest Hills, L.I., Kamikaze kept close to me. Every time Miss Thomson and I had to leave him in our stateroom, she said a tragic look came into his great eyes, and on our return he nearly pulled me down to the floor in ecstacy. Once he was accidentally shut out in the hall. He knew I was alone inside the room. He barked something he seldom did—and banged his handsome head against the door until somebody opened it, then he jumped up in my lap and nearly covered me. I had a sensation as of wide protecting wings. How happily he was named—Kamikaze—"Wings of Gold"!

"In the sun his deep coat shone all golden from his ever-questioning ears to his never-still tail. He could not bear to see me sad. If I cried from loneliness for my beloved teacher, he would put his big paw up on my knee, press his cool nose to my cheek and lick away the tears. His intelligence and insatiate curiosity, his friendliness to everyone and bubbling delight over a walk or a meal made him the pet of the Asama Maru.

"Afterward at the Mayo clinic, where I was operated upon, the doctors and nurses who saw Kamikaze at my bedside declared he was the most lovable dog they had ever known. A strange foreboding pursued me that I might lose Kamikaze. Miss Thomson and I did what we could to insure his health by inoculations. I will pass over in silence the desolate heartache I endured when he died. I will only say he seemed one of my teacher's dear thoughts which had been taken form to gladden me for a little while. From the description I have tried to give above I hope you may gain some idea of the peculiar appeal the Akita dog has for me".

Flying fragments of fur and feathers indicated the location of the victor at the moment of viewing the struggle, "Buddy" was just about holding his own, and so the fair young lady—our heroine, having more than just a passing interest in her Boston Terrier, gets into the fight, fresh and rather vigorously, and so the "Allies" were now two to one as it were.

However, any way we look at this great win, it most certainly scintilates like a newly ground diamond in the sunlight.

Adding further lustre to Mr. and Mrs. Beers Cleveland invasion was the wins of their "Menow" who garnered in the desirable American-bred ribbon and then went on to the reserve winners station to take her place beside her half sister "Glamour Girl", as "Menow" is out of "Ch. Dancing Doll" by "Ch. Farleton Foxearth".

We are familiar with the measure of sincerity which Mr. and Mrs. Beer bring to their breeding plans, so that we were quite ready to absorb this good news when it came along and we unreservedly congratulate the proud owners and breeders of such outstanding dogs and wish them continued success.

SIBERIAN HUSKIES

O CALL the Siberian a "Husky is partially erroneous, for the word Husky, as it is commonly used to-day implies any northern dog of mixed breed and usually with a wolf cross. The Siberian is a pure bred dog coming from the Kolyma River district in Siberia, the dog of the Chuchi people. He is their utility dog their pet, and the only toy of their children—a highly prized pos-session. As there is no animal known more susceptible to his environment more susceptible to his environment than the dog, the Siberian reflects the temperament of the easy going no-madic Chuchi and has become known as the "sunny tempered Siberian." Unlike the Indian Malamutes and cross breeds, for the most part under-fed and ill treated they are used to fed and ill-treated, they are used to gentle handling and thus make equalas good pets as they do sled dogs. Also, unlike the other northern dogs, they are small and light, with remarkable endurance, holding the racing speed records of the northern classics against all comers. When the Norwegian

explorer, Roald Amundsen, planned his expedi-tion to the North Pole, starting from Alaska, his friend and countryman, Jafet Lindeberg, the discoverer of the Nome gold fields, wished to make him a present of a dog team of Siberians. Thus a picked string was imported from Siberia. As Amundsen's trip was cancelled at the last moment, these dogs came into the possession of Leonhard Seppala, another of his country-men. With them he won the 408-mile All Alaska Sweepstakes three years "Alaska's Trail King." Besides the speed records set by these Siberians in the races, they freighted supplies in the construction of the Alaska railroad, and to them is attributed the credit of making possible the linking together of the outlying districts in the development of Seward Peninsula.

When brought to the United States and Canada by Seppala, so astounding was the disposition of the Siberian, his striking appearance, his attributes as a pet and his line of pure breeding in contrast to all other northern dogs, that he was recognized by the American Kennel Club. His ability to adapt himself to the warmer

line from the original imported stock and from the dogs that made the heroic dash with the diptheria serum in Alaska in 1925, as well as from more recently imported stock.

Seppala has returned to the north but the strain of Siberians introduced by him has been carried on by Mr. Harry Wheeler at Gray Rocks Inn whose fame as a racer of dog teams is well known to all who follow this

climates makes him as fine a house pet as any of the other better known "bench" dogs. The puppies from the Seppala Si-berian Kennels at Gray Rock Inn are genuine pedigreed Siberians, in direct

sport. The dogs in the Seppala Ken-nels at Gray Rocks have won many cups in international events with Mr. Wheeler as their driver.

Owing to the affectionate nature of the Siberians they have become extremely popular in the past few years as pets. A considerable number of Americans who have been guests of Gray Rocks Inn have returned at Gray Rocks Inn have returned home with Siberian puppies.

# DACHSHUND NOTES

S THE year 1939 draws to its A close, it may be wise to con-sider, for a moment, just what the Dachshund Club has been able to accomplish for its members, and for the breed itself. For its members the club has never held out any particular inducements as an attraction to build up the Club's roster, nevertheless, the co-operation of the Club's officers has greatly increased sales among the members and have made many valuable contacts possible. Per-sonally I have turned over around an even dozen sales and service trans-actions to fellow members. These transactions were shared in by at least 8 different kennels. Other officers have had similar experiences no doubt, probably other officers have had even greater opportunities than I have had to make the club membership profitable as well as interesting, all this can be accomplished with confidence, as it is one of our chief aims to encourage high standards of scien-tific breeding. The friendly attitude of the club members in respect to all matters of breeding makes it com-paratively easy to better appraise the canadian stock that we, as breeders, have available. We are well equipped in this country to engage in breeding programmes capable of yielding re-sults second to none. We need no longer stand in awe before any new foreign champions as they are paraded before us, indeed, we can now afford to critically examine every virtue such dogs may have to offer before deciding whether or not, they have or whether they are any improvement over our own Canadian stock. Field Trial rules have been pre-

pared, considered and approved of. The members will soon receive mimeographed copies, and later, when the proposed rules have been applied, the results will determine their suitability, when they may be ordered further amended or printed.

amended or printed. The cancellation of the National Kennel Club Show for 1939 was a great disappointment to the members of the Dachshund Club, but we are all looking forward in expectation of the proposed patriotic show which is said to be in prospect for early in the New Year.

War has cast its menacing shadow over us all and has aroused some speculation as to the effect it may have on dog breeding in general, as its events have proven conclusively that there is no abatement in the interest and sympathy towards our breed shown by the general public, we who have the privilege to own, or to breed Dachshunde rejoice that these gentle creatures are safe in our care and we hope, that when war is over, that the world will be a better place to live in, not only for ourselves, but for our dogs as well.

A menacing instance of war hy-steria reached me the other day. It was the report of the destruction of a dog of the larger breeds, which had been destroyed, for the reason that its rations would be enough to feed a starving child. Well, I doubt very much that this condition exists at the present time, the larders of the

allied nations are known to be generously stocked and I doubt very much if the portion of dog's meat would be desired by any child, starving or otherwise. Do not allow ourselves to become stampeded because of the strain on our nerves. Let us keep in control of our senses. I hope it will always be possible to have enough food to spare. My heart goes out to the great hearted watch dog who paid with his life his misplaced trust in human gratitude.

A word to the purchasing public. At the Christmas season you will be in the market for dogs and you will in the market for dogs and you will be well advised, that in this market, as in any other, you will get exactly what you pay for. If you only want a pet, be frank and say so, breeders sometimes have puppies to sell for pets, but do not be foolish enough to ask for "just a pet" if it is some-thing else that you really grant lf thing else that you really want. If vou want a show specimen, or some foundation breeding stock, go to reputable breeders and make your choice and it very likely will be wise for you to leave the choosing to him, if you are not familiar with the finer points of the breed yourself. A breedpoints of the breed yourself. A breed-er gets just as much thrill out of the dog that he has sold you, as he would have got if he had kept it himself. Always remember, that an experienced fancier, when attending a dog show, invariably looks at the dog show catalogue to ascertain the





There is an old tradition that the breed was an offspring of some Spanish white dogs, at the time of the Armada, wrecked on the Isle of Skye —but, it is not likely that the Spaniards would take dogs on a military expedition and the Highlanders were known to have working terriers long before this time, probably brought over from Scandinavia by Norsemen who ruled the Hebrides three centuries earlier. The Skye had its early home on the 'Misty Isle of Skye' but was also found in Lewis, Oronsay, Colonsay and other of the Hebrides as well as the mainland of Scotland. The Dandie Dinmont, Cairn, Scottish and Cludesdale terriers are all

tish and Clydesdale terriers are all related but which is the parent breed it is almost impossible to determine.

The Skye was included in the first volume of the English Kennel Club Stud book.

The breed became very popular in England during the reign of Queen Victoria and from about 1843 onwards she always owned some beautiful specimens, an example which was followed by many of her loyal subjects. Her first, as far as we know was "Islay" a drop eared specimen. Later one was given to Her Majesty by a Mr. Pratt, a very famous Skye fancier, from these Skyes others were successfully bred in the Royal Kennels and one of these, "Cairnach" was an especial favorite with the Oneen

nels and one of these, "Carnach" was an especial favorite with the Queen. Later Her Majesty owned "Diana of Aldroalloch", bred by the Rev. David Dolbin and said to have had the longest pedigree of any dog of any breed. After that she had "Rona II" a gift from the Rev. Dr. Rosslyn Bruce. "Rona II" is immortalized in the well known picture with Her Majesty by William Nicholson.

Mr. Pratt, known as "The man with the dogs" of Paddington, owned among others the well known "Sandy Grant" and "Piper". Other well known fanciers were Mr. Clark and the Duke of Argvle, Mrs. Hughes of "Wolverly" fame, Sir Claud and Lady Alexander of Ballochmyle, Mrs. Freeman, Miss Bowyer Smyth and Miss McCheane. Later Mrs. Hugh Ripley and the Countess of Aberdeen, whose favourites were the drop eared variety, Miss Wilmer, Miss Whishaw and Mrs. Sandwith.

Today we have in England breeding and exhibiting such famous names as Sir Claud and Lady Alexander, The Rev. Dr. Rosslyn Bruce, The Lady Marcia Miles, Miss Whishaw, Mrs. Cuthbert, Mrs. Axtell and Mrs. Morgan, Miss J. Craig, Mrs. Eaden and Mrs. Mowbray.

In Scotland — Mr. Millar, Mr. Blackie and Mr. Brash.

We also hear that the Queen Mother has now a 'Skye' for a pet and that one is owned by The Duchess of Luxenburg and another by a Scandinavian princess. Since 1930, Germany and France have been buying a great many of England's fine specimens and there are now some very excellent kennels in France, Germany, Denmark and Sweden.

Actresses and screen stars in France and Germany taking up this breed, gave them much publicity. In the United States a Mr. Sanderson of West Philadelphia owned a

In the United States a Mr. Sanderson of West Philadelphia owned a very fine dog as far back as 1885. Mrs. Robert H. McCurdy and the Swiss Mountain Kennels also had one

or two good Skyes. In Canada the late Mr. George Caverhill of Montreal had some very fine show dogs and from 1904 the writer has owned, showed and bred many fine specimens. Today in the United States Mark

Today in the United States, Mrs. H. Davis, Mrs. Michael Stillman, Mrs. Edward Spencer, Mrs. Chas. Dewey, Mrs. Scudder and Mrs. Tulman have some lovely examples of the breed, also Miss Lily Pons, Miss Jeanette MacDonald and I think Miss Janet Gaynor.

In Canada the "Talisker" Skyes still carry on their pioneer work.

The Skye of today varies very little from the Skye of 50 years ago. He is without doubt one of the most beautiful dogs in existence and always commands a great deal of attention and admiration wherever he makes an appearance.

Altho' the present standard gives the weight as 18-20 lbs. for a dog and 16 to 18 lbs. for a bitch, Sir Claud Alexander (the greatest living authority on the breed) says his recollections go back 60 years in the breed and during that time there never were any Skyes of 18 pounds or anything near that very low weight. This is very interesting and very important to know. About 40 years ago Sir Claud weighed a large number of Skyes both dogs and bitches of his own and others. The dogs varied from 26 to 32 pounds, the bitches hardly varied at all from 24½ to 25 pounds. A Skyes weight cannot be wrong if he is long enough and low enough. The Skye Club of both England and America have now no weights mentioned in their Standard of perfection.


ard of perfection. The Skye has a long level back, short, straight legs, very heavy bone —his feet are large and firm and pointing forward — not in the least like a fox terrier. His tail that of a setter. His head is long and lean with medium close set hazel or preferably dark brown eyes with a soft pathetic and loving expression. A Skye lover alone knows how a Skye can look at his master. His ears may be either prick or pendant but should be well feathered and his face long and thick. His coat in colour varies from light cream with black ears, nose and muzzle, dark or blue grey, silver or fawn with black points, on no account red or liver with noses of the same colour.

The coat should be long and straight, 5½ inches is the approved length altho' many show specimens have coats as long as twelve inches. This coat should be of a hard weather resisting texture with a soft rather woolly undercoat. A great many of the very long coated dogs are inclined to have softer, silkier hair. The coarser coats seem to take much longer time to grow.

To the average observer these long coats seem to present a great difficulty. This is not the case. If the dog is well bred, in good health and well fed on a meat diet, plenty of fresh air and exercise, his coat is easily kept and the experienced breeder and exhibitor spares the brush and comb and so saves the coat. The Skye is very seldom bathed, and is only brushed and combed perhaps

once a month. When combing, begin from the bottom of the hair, gently combing the snarls, if any, down gradually, thus avoiding breaking even one hair if possible of a show specimen. If a show coat is once broken, it takes a full year to grow a coat to show length again.

In choosing a puppy it is safe to pick the biggest and ugliest one of the litter, but safer to choose a show specimen after six months, as it is then more easily determined how his ear and tail carriage is going to be, also the colour of his eyes and the texture of his coat. The Skye is a late finisher and it takes him at least two years or more to fully develop and reveal all the qualities which go to make up a champion.

If given good care he will live a very long time. Fourteen years being a good average.

I hear that this breed is becoming very popular again in Europe and in America, and that the supply cannot meet the demand—"Every dog has his day".

### A NEW KENNEL CLUB

Puppies Usually For Sale of Outstanding Show Type



HE Canadian Kennel Club lost a warm friend when Major E. Ward Wright, K.C., passed on Saturday night, Novem-away on Saturday night, Novem-ber 18th, after having experienced a long and trying illness. The Major's contribution to the Canadian Kennel Club was extensive, whole-hearted and valuable beyond appraisal in dollars and cents. The records show that his membership commenced on March 31st, 1922, and was continuing at the time of his demise. Sealyham Terriers was his chosen

breed and amongst his first show specimens were "Woodside Della", who won her first and only championship points at the Western Fair Show of 1923, and "Della", when bred to the noted Ch. "Twicknam Brigand" (Imp) Woman", the National Kennel Club winner of 1924 and the Canadian National Exhibition winner of 1925. On January 15th, 1924, a puppy came to the Edgewater Kennels, from the kennels of J. A. Burden, Syossett, N. Y. and this "blast o' Janwar win" was christened the "Barrister" and this dog never knew a win worse than the coveted winners at 10 of Canada's leading shows. Then came "Peggy of Uskvale" from England, selected for Major Ward Wright, by the late Capt. H. E. Hobbs the founder of The Tail-Waggers Club in England and the records show that "Peggy" was a "Purple" winner at every show where she appeared and at her first four shows in 1932, she earned her cham-pionship. Before leaving England pionship. Before leaving England "Peggy of Uskvale" had been bred to "Felcourt Rocket" and this union produced Ch. "Edgewater Careless". Ch. "Peggy of Uskvale" when bred to Ch. Brash Bravado of Rensal produced the latest Edgewater champion in Ch. "Edgewater Breeze". Ma-jor Ward Wright was proud of his "Sealvs" and no wonder.

At the Canadian Kennel Club election for 1928, "The Major" as he was always lovingly referred to, was elected to the Board of Directors and he held that office until 1933, and only relinquished the office to take up the burden of legal adviser to the club. At the end of 1934, he was obliged to resign from that office, but in doing so his "mantle" fell on the shoulders of his only son, Mr. Peter Wright, himself a brilliant lawyer al-

though yet a young man. The funeral service was most im-pressive from start to finish and was in charge of the Rev. Dr. George H. Sedgewick, of Westminster Central United Church whose message was entirely comforting.

Premier Hepburn and several of his Cabinet Ministers represented the Ontario Legislature. E. H. Coleman represented the Federal House of Parliament. Chief Justice Robertson represented the Supreme Court of On-tario and the Bench. The Canadian Kennel Club was represented by President Reg. P. Sparkes, Vice-President Capt. H. Dudley-Waters, Secretary J. D. Strachan and Director B. W. Essery; National Kennel Club by Bethune L. Smith; Boston Terrier Club of Toronto by H. M. Jackson.

The pall-bearers were members of Major Ward Wright's own office and were selected in accordance with his own wishes. They were Messrs. Wil-kinson, Binch, Langford, Lynch, Bery and our own Club's legal adviser, Ross Dunn.

On arriving at the cemetery the cortege was met by a firing squad, bugling party and decorations bearer from the Royal Regiment of Canada, the wartime regiment to which Major Ward Wright had belonged. This provided an escort to the graveside and here the impression deepened as Mr. Sedgewick committed the body to the grave. The firing squad fired the customary rounds and the buglers sounded the "last post".

Outstanding amongst all the mourn-ers was Lieut. Peter Wright, Major Ward Wright's only son. His internal heart-break was thoroughly concealed by a facial control which was magnificent. The crucial test came with the first sounds of the searching "last post" but the jaws clenched tightly and in due course the salute was given in masterly fashion-a real soldier.

It is with sincere regret that the officers and members of the Canadian Kennel Club are obliged to bid this old and tried friend adieu for the time being and a whole-hearted sympathy is offered to his widow Mrs. Ward Wright and to his only son, Lieut. Peter Wright.

◀ HROUGH the courtesy of the Director, Canadian National Director, Canadian National Live Stock Records. we have re-ceived a clipping from "The Citizen", Ottawa, from which we learn of the death of C. E. Living, Westboro, Ont., who had the distinction of being the only honorary member of the Cana-dian Kennel Club. Our late friend was 79 years of age at the time of his death, and as he had been a dog fancier all his life. he simply was re-cognized as one of the pillars of Canadian dogdom, in fact the records show that he had membership rank almost as early as our charter members Gen. Nelles, Col. McEwan and C. A. Stone. three early stalwarts who just failed to live long enough to share in the Golden Jubilee celebration in 1938, in fact an effort was made to have Mr. Living attend the Golden Jubilee Year banquet. but for health reasons he was reluctantly obliged to forego that distinction. We well remember attending the


Central Canada Exhibition dog show in the Fall of 1923, and the supper that we had with "Ned' Living on the evening of the second day, when much of the early history of the Canadian Kennel Club was reviewed at considerable length, and to the writer the recital was one of absorbing in-terest. During the chat we mentioned the scarcity of records at headquarters and particularly being without copies of the early Stud Books and the early volumes of the Kennel Gazette (one time official organ) to our surprise Mr. Living declared that he had all the records that we were in need of and we remember him say-ing, that "When his time came to go" such records would be considered as being without value, and so become so much waste paper only and it was agreed that his records would be sent

to Toronto. On March 20, 1924, we reported to the Board of Directors of that day, that Mr. Living had sent us the first 12 volumes of Kennel and Bench which embraced the period between 1888 and 1900, plus several of the early Stud Books in good condition. This information was received with pleas-ure and a resolution was written into the records which read "That Mr. C. E. Living, Ottawa, Ont., be made an honorary life member of the Cana-dian Kennel Club, with full privi-leges", and as far as we know, Mr. Living was the only person, so hon-ored as long as the club has been in existence.

Mr. Living was endowed with a deep sense of honour and he gave his life in the services of Ottawa School Board as teacher, principal and clerk of supplies, only retiring as recently as 1934. To Ottawa Kennel Club he was a veritable bulwark and his advice was often sought when anything of a disturbing nature threatened the harmony or welfare of the club. As a breeder of Cocker Spaniels and as a judge of that breed he ranked with men like the late early enthusiasts "Andy" Armstrong, Lance Farewell and Jim Clark, fanciers that he now rejoins in the "Great Beyond".

The sincere sympathy of our people is tended to Mrs. Living and her family at this time.

MANITOBA dogdom mourns the death of one of its feature members, in the late Mr. John Stokes, of the noted "Cambusnethan" prefix, which word has been associated with many of West-ern Canada's foremost Collies, which breed had a place close to the heart of Johnnie Stokes ever since the days when the Collies, of the late Robdays when the Collies, of the late Rob-ert Tait, Wishaw, Scotland, were to be met on the streets of Wishaw—the nearest town, to his birth place. Col-lies like "Ch. Wishaw Clinker" and "Ch. Wishaw Leader", made Wishaw folks Collie conscious with a consciousness that continued through life in many instances. It was from Mr. Tait, that Mr. Stokes purchased the Collie "Wishaw Rose" back in the early summer of 1923 and "Rose" was really a "Wishaw" bred Collie if ever really a "Wishaw" bred Collie if ever there was such a thing and it was from this Tait bitch that came "Cam-busnethans" best Collies. Like "Wish-aw Sweet Memory" "Ch. Cambusne-than Model" "Cambusnethan Rose" and her son by "Ch. Elmhill Jupiter", "Ch. Lord Clyde II". As a puppy







She was award ad the first prize of her bread in 1925 ed the first prize of her breed in 1935 at the dog show in Basle, Switzerland. She also won the first prize "Excel-lent" and C.A.C.I.B., which is the h i g h e s t championship certificate awarded on the continent of Europe. It is called the International Beauty Championship Certificate.


The Bernese Mountain dog is wellbalanced, standing from 25 to 27 inches at the shoulder, bitches up to 25 inches; with jet black, silky and slightly wavy coat of medium length; white markings on chest, feet, tip of tail and on foreface; rich russet brown body and tail; with a brown spot over each eye, which may never be missing; dark brown eyes, which seem to invite trust; ears V-shaped and set on high, hanging close to head; flat, short broad muzzle; level mouth; long bushy tail or brush, carried low, slightly upward swirl permissable; compact, not too long body; muscular, straight fore-legs and well developed stiffes; and an all around robust dog. This gives a fairly good picture of a really good specimen of the Bernese species of Swiss mountain dogs.

Writing on the Bernese Mountain Dog, Mr. Shadow has this to say:

"These dogs are very powerful and alert. They are excellent watch-dogs for homes and estates. I know of no other dog that has as much reasoning as does the Bernese dog. They are more or less the one-man type, but recognize all members of a fam-They are quick to learn the serily. vants and employees who are entitled to enter the premises, and understand readily when the master tells them it is permissable for certain persons to enter or not to enter. They are very loyal, in fact, are ready to fight for their master, whether it be a child or an adult. I know of no other dog that makes as fine a pet and companion for a child as does the Bernese dog. A puppy raised with a child is one of the best nurses and care-takers a child could have. No one could molest or carry off a child one could molest or carry off a child that one of these dogs has been raised with. They love to play, and are very affectionate. They are especially acclimated to higher, cooler climates, but do well in the South when their heavy coat is clipped at the approach of hot weather. They are very hearty and easily kept."

"Fridy" and "Felix" are the only two imported dogs of this breed in the United States. At present there are ten puppies raised from this pair of dogs, several of which are for sale. 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### WAR DOGS **ON THE WESTERN FRONT**

Once more the war-dog is at the front, facing all the horrors and heroisms of 1914-1918 over again. We thought that the mechanisation of the modern armies put the end to the use of dumb animals in warfare, but the new war has found a use for them, and in the recent activity on the Western Front they have played an important part in the Maginot and Siegfried lines. The Poles also used them in the earlier stages of the war when well-trained Polish Alsatians carried first-aid equipment and helped lay communication wires.

No fewer than a dozen different breeds of dogs have been reported in use on the Western Front, and the most interesting have been the watchdogs of the Maginot Line-the Alsatians, Groenendaels, and the Malinoes, used by the French observation corps to detect and give the alarm of any approaching patrols or enemy attacks across No Man's Land. It is suggested that these are also used to give additional warnings of enemy planes, but this is not a very likely use for them under the conditions of modern warfare.

The Alsatian is working near its native Alsace, where for generations it has been the watchdog guarding the flocks of sheep against marauding wolves.

Breeds with a keen sense of smell are used by the Army Medical Corps during the night patrols in No Man's Land in search of the dead and wounded, while others carry first-aid equipment attached to their collars and shoulder harness. Greyhounds, and shoulder harness. Greyhounds, Deerhounds and Wolfhounds, all strong and fast breeds, are used by patrols and advanced guards to send messages back to their bases, to lay communication lines, and for general communication over dangerous territory where enemy activity makes it impossible for despatch riders to stand much chance of getting through, and much chance of getting through, and where a soldier squirming along on the ground would be too slow. There is also a fifth use, chiefly for large, heavy breeds like the St. Bernards, Great Danes and Alaskas which pull the small dog-carts in peace-time Central Europe, and are now adopted for the transport of food, medical sup-plies, and in the hills, ammunition and dismembered parts of field guns or other equipment.

The war-dog has certainly a very busy time in the present war, and both Keeshonds and Spaniels were in a batch of dogs accompanying a party of stretcher-bearers on the Western Front near the Maginot Line. Attempts to single out speial breeds used in the war and shown upon the official photographs received from the Ministry of Information are difficult, for apart from the easily recognized Alsatians and Great Danes, most of the dogs are of a mongrel type, heavy and strong of build. As they are selected for work and ability rather than fine show points, it is only na-tural that they have not the finer perfections of the show-bench animals. Even the Soviet's Red Army is equipped with well-trained Alsatians

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and other large dogs in its Far-Eastern manoeuvres along the Mongolian and Manchuko frontiers. Many ani-mal-lovers would wish military science could substitute a mechanical replacement of the dog in war, but so far as the present fighting is concerned, he seems to have a very active part to play. May he come through to peace-ful days again.

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
