



Meanwhile, there are some brood mares there and some acbrood mares there and some ac-tive racers, of which the best known are "Ucha" and "Onte-gra". "Ucha", now a 4-year-old, was bred by the noted Toronto horsewoman, Miss Kathleen Christie from the mating of "Buddy Bauer" with "Bad Girl". "Ucha" carried Mr. Risewick's red, white and blue silks with fair suc white and blue silks with fair success last season. Her record reveals that she won three of her twelve starts, finished second twice and third the same number of times. She was the mare that figured in the huge double at the fall meeting of Thorncliffe Park last season.

"Ontegra", bred by the Parkwood Stables, is another member of the Ravina Stable. So is a 3-year-old mare, "Seebe" by name, who was bred in Montreal from the union of "Brother Joe" with "Chicsal". This young mare never has raced, but is reputed to have shown speed in her gallops. Mr. Risewick has a couple of 2-year-olds that will make their turf debut in the coming Canadian season. One is "Phalamaid", a daughter of imported "Haytime 2nd" from "Lady's Maid". She was purchased at the William H. Wright yearling sales in Woodbine Park paddock last autumn. Then there's "Alfred T.", sired by "Arlesian "from "Daughter of Dawn", which makes this colt a full brother to the speedy "Ardawn". The services of "Arlesian" have been leased by Mr. Risewick, who believes this one-time shifty racer is capable of siring racers that will reproduce the speed qualities of their daddy. Incidentally, "Cup Winner", owned by the Dook of Avion, otherwise Bill Campbell, was sired by "Arlesian". He's been a good hoss, hasn't he Dook ?

Though Mr. Risewick has come into the racing and breeding game in a modest way, there are strong possibilities that he will enlarge his present interests. We hope he does, for racing has plenty of room for business men of his type."

THE MORRIS AND ESSEX

G EORGE S. THOMAS, of South Hamilton, Mass., best known of the all-around professional judges and one whose opinions are sought by exhibitors wherever dog shows are held, has been selected to head the list of seventy experts who will judge the fourteenth annual show of the Morris and Essex Kennel Club at Madison, N.J. on May 25.

Mr. Thomas, who recently returned from a judging engagement in Australia, will make his choice for top honors in the world's biggest dog show from the six dogs sent to him by six other widely known all-arounders; Vinton Breese, of Caldwell, N.J., for the gun-dogs; Louis H. Murr, of Spring Valley, N.Y., the hounds; Walter H. Reeves, of Belleville, Ont., the workers; Enno Meyer, of Milford, Ohio, the terriers; Mrs. Enno Meyer, the toys; and Matt R. Korshin, of Media, Pa., the non-sporting.

With the exception of a few Canadians, the Morris and Essex list this year is composed entirely of American experts. As usual, they have been recruited from all parts of the country, from the deep south and the Pacific coast, in order that exhibitors may have the benefit of opinions that have not recently been illustrated by other judging engagements in this vicinity.

The judging list reveals that Ch. "My Own Brucie", the cocker spaniel, and Ch. "Nornay Saddler", the smooth fox terrier, which met at the last Morris and Essex and at the recent show in the Garden, will not be entered since their owners are judging. Herman Mellenthin, who owns Brucie, is doing the American cockers and best of breed, while James M. Austin, who owns Saddler, is doing the wirehaired terriers.

Mr. Reeves has been made responsible for inter-sex competition in Dachshunde. In Fox Terriers he will select the best of the two coats. He will judge the Pomeranians (Specialty) and he will judge the Working Group, so he will have a busy day on Saturday. May 25th.

Saturday, May 25th. Other Canadian judges include John Ritchie, of Ottawa. Ont., who will judge the English Springer Spaniels (Specialty), Fred C. McLean, Hull, P.Q., will judge Manchester Terriers, also Toy Manchester Terriers, Mrs. W. C. Routley, Toronto, Ont., will judge the Cairn Terriers. A. McClure Halley, in whose capable hands so much of the detail of

McClure Halley, in whose capable hands so much of the detail of the Morris and Essex is placed, points out that no less than 32 clubs, 30 of them with a nation-wide influence, have elected to recognize this fixture as being their Specialty Show, and he explains that the arrangement makes a substantial contribution to the bag of gold that is at the end of the Morris and Essex rainbow each year. The Dachshund Club of America, sponsoring as it does the three coats characteristic of the breed. Each year the Morris and Essex Club manages to find new ways to make its annual show more attractive to exhibitors, which is one of the principal reasons why it has become the world's biggest dog show. It has now arranged an innovation which will have a special appeal to fanciers of the toy breeds.

For them, the fourteenth annual Morris and Essex affair will really be a show within a show, since the club has arranged to give them a space of their own adjoining the big polo field on which, since its inception, the show has been held.

At the northwest corner of the field, where the exercising paddock for the horses used to be, a new field has been cut out of the woods. A space 300 by 200 feet has been levelled off and sodded and on it will be the big 220-foot tent for the toy varieties and the six judging rings in which those breeds will compete for the beautiful silver trophies and the cash awards open to all contenders at this show.

The problem of the toy dog exhibitors is somewhat different from that of fanciers in the larger breeds. Most of the toy dogs come to the show in private cars and in the special baskets in which they are exhibited. They are not taken from shipping crates and walked to their places on the benches. The cages have to be carried from the parking spot to where the dogs are shown. Under the new arrangement, the toy dog fanciers will be able to take their cars to a special parking field of their own adjoining the tent and, as a result, they will find it much more convenient to exhibit than has been the case in the past. The new toy field will be reached by the road along the left side of the field, past the luncheon tents, where, as usual, all exhibitors will be guests of the club at luncheon.

In addition to making the field itself, the club has had the brush thinned out in the woods around the space so that there will be ample opportunity for the exhibitors to exercise their dogs in a shady spot. It represents one more substantial contribution Mr. and Mrs. M. Hartley Dodge, sponsors of the show, have made to the comfort of exhibitors, especially since they have desired to keep as much of Giralda Farm as possible in its natural state.



some encouragement. He may appear to be hard boiled and void of feeling, but actually he is more likely to be

not take judging assignments, and if they do, refrain from discussing their placements for publication. It would be better, instead of judges' critiques, to have critiques of the judges by some capable, un-biased, unfettered writer and ob-server."

We agree with Mr. Danziger entirely, but capable, unbiased, unfet-tered writers, and observers, do not grow on berry bushes, like competent all-round judges, they are admittedly very scarce. Those that are available cost considerable and the space taken up by their copy costs plenty too. Then we have to consider what can fairly be done with the available talent and is there sufficient to go around? There is room here for much food



HE many indignant expressions * concerning what transpired at the Annual General Meeting can never be construed as being favorable to the Canadian Kennel Club. One lady said, "I think it was disgraceful and said, "I think it was disgracerul and it should draw letters of condemna-tory indignation from all the Clubs in the country". Said another, "If I were thinking of starting a Kennel and was fortunate enough to find out that "Dogs in Canada" for March, 1940, was the official organ of the Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., most assuredly I would refrain from starting, I would say 'not for me'." Another one said, "I was so disgusted that I only read one column, then decided I had had enough". Still another said, "it's high time the Annual General Meeting of the C.K.C. should be held in some other city than Toronto." The continuents overseed are from some sentiments expressed are from some of the members and from some of our local disturbers, and we have a few. One of them said, "I think the meet-ing was alright, that is the only way we get our money's worth and it is a good job some one gets after those guys up there". So you see we have some fairminded members in our midst and it will also be gathered that we have some of the disturbing element in Quebec, some who would wreck anything and everything that they could not run their own way. We even have some of the type who would like to make the bullets and expect their Directors to fire them and strange as it may seem these are the people who have done the least toward building up our Canadian Kennel Club, the people who make the most out of the game and in some cases make a living out of it and even then they are not satisfied. Some are disturbers in everything they get into, but I have made up my own mind that I will refuse to be a mouthpiece who for these disgruntled persons have been little less than a blot on the fair name of Canadian dogdom. Of course they are the type who are always right, the type who boo at the judges at our dog shows, the poor losers, the type who spoil every phase of sport they ever get into, the kind who, living in glass houses as they do, should not indulge in the pastime of throwing stones.

No, "Dogs in Canada" readers, I refuse to blackguard anyone when I realize they are doing a real good job and doing it for the good of the game; if they are making a livelihood out of it, good luck to them, the better the livelihood they make, the more credit I will give them. From my personal observations our headquarters at 25 Melinda Street are an open book and were it not so, I would be big enough and frank enough to say so, but I will not allow myself to calumniate anyone just to please that class of people whose chief assets are hate and dishonesty. In defence of the staff who serve the C.K.C. members, I tell you they are untiring in their efforts and have only the Club's interest and welfare at heart. Our Secretary is respected the entire dog-

world over. He has earned that respect because of his sterling character, he has commanded that respect. This I know and have proof of and when he tells me that advertising will not be allowed in the Provincial pages, I am with him, he is saying so in our best interests and he is not alone in that respect. This I know because only last week the Ladies Kennel Club of Canada went to one of our local daily newspapers to ascertain why they could not get publicity via the 'reader' route, they were told plump and plain that they would have to guarantee \$250.00 worth of advertising in order to get the free pub-licity they had in mind. So there will be no free advertising in this page quite irrespective of what these deadbeats and failures in everything may have to say. Let us be honest above all things, let us give credit where it is due and when undeserved criticism hurled at us, let us weigh well where it originates and by what authority they criticise. We should be glad to notice that the members' paper is fair to every person and that favoritism is unknown in respect to it, and it is only to be expected that people who expect everything but give nothing are likely to be disappointed. The game is full of such people and the sooner they learn that their influence doesn't count for much, the better it will be for all concerned. Some people don't care who pays for what they want as long as they get

it. I am most reluctantly obliged to speak as I have done, but I am in a position to see for myself "Who is Who" and in my 25 odd years in the game locally, I have met and know all our discontents. Some have enjoyed much more than they were ever entitled to and some have never been any credit to the game since the first day they got into it. They never have a good word to say about any Show or any person, everyone is wrong but themselves.

Members, the time has come when we can afford to talk plainly and let us hope that we may be able to do so. The persons who boo and make ugly noises at dog shows when a judge's decisions are made are the people we must avoid and positively refuse their entries, explaining the whys and the wherefores to headquarters. Those who cannot say a good word about a dog show or its officials are in the same class as the anonymous letter writer, the class that stab decent fanciers' in the back.

I have always endeavoured to promote harmony through the Quebec page. I have honestly tried to promote trust and confidence in our officials at Toronto and at Ottawa where lies the great secrets of our success but that seems to be misunderstood in some quarters. I have been accused of joining 'the clique' because I refuse to trump up something to harass our officials. Let me assure our Province of Quebec members that I would be the first man in the world to speak right out if I had anv cause to do so and then I would do it in a gentlemanly manner as you would expect me to do as your representative. Let me ask some of our members this, do you like and expect fair play from your own employer? I know you do, then for the sake of good sportsmanship extend the same privilege to

those whom you employ. When you consider that there are hundreds of members from Coast to Coast who may all feel that they should be attended to first and that they are the only concern of the C.K.C., I know only too well that the patience of our officials are often tried to the limit, but I also know of the courteous and diplomatic manner in which our affairs are handled which assures me that we have a good, honest, efficient staff at Head Office and I know first hand whereof I speak.

I am heartened by the thought that I enjoy the confidence and association of so many wonderful people in the dog world, if it were not for this I would not wish to continue in the service myself. Many people are with me one hundred percent I know but it is a pity that so many charming people must of necessity be brought together with the element that makes itself so obnoxious most of the time. Our fairminded people will, I feel sure, understand the attitude I have taken.

We have so few good Poodles in the Province that we can ill afford to lose any of them.

Two moving pictures from Field and Stream were shown, one of which, "Ducks, Dogs and Decoys" was taken by the Pathe Co., of U.S.A. was a gem on waterfowling, gunning and retrieving, it was being shown for the first time in Canada, and it had just been released to the leading theatres. Two other shorts in technicolour taken in Western Canada, as well as those of the Club's latest field trials were shown and thoroughly enjoyed. The Chairman of the Field Trial Committee J. E. Tulloch outlined the Club's programme for the coming season. Water trials in early summer and the regular trial for springers under C. K.C. Rules later on in the year. This club has as its secretary the energetic R. Hillier who reports a steadily increasing membership.

The Fort Garry Kennel Club are now actively engaged in perfecting plans for their Spring show, and several outstanding judges of inter-national standing have been contacted. The show is being sponsored by the Imperial Daughters of The Empire and the proceeds will go for the fur-therance of war work. Further details will be forthcoming as the plans ma-ture and they will be outlined in our next issue.

The show was held on Yonge Street, and this move was justified by the large crowds at-tending proving that the arrangement had been found convenient by the general public.

President Jack McNaughton had the close co-operation of his officers and committees from curtain to curtain, and at the close of the show he was and at the close of the show he was on the receiving end of many com-pliments. Mrs. J. W. Bruce had charge of the office detail as usual. Honourable Mr. Justice McFarland, A. A. Macdonald, and S. Foster, graced the ring, and shared in pre-

senting the prizes to the Group Winners, and for Best In Show. As each Group came to the ring moving pic-tures were taken, and Mr. Hopton gave much information concerning the breeds, and was given a generous hand from the large crowd that listened to him attentively. 
