THE regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of The Canadian Kennel Club, Inc., was held in the Board Room of the Club's offices, 25 Melinda St., Toronto, on Thursday afternoon, October 17th, 1940, at 2.00 o'clock. In the absence of the President, the Vice-President, Walter H. Reeves, presided. Officers and Directors present included: Mrs. E. Brown, Wm. McDermont, W. J. Risewick and F. W. Walkerdine. Absent: Dr. H. E. Batt.

The Asst. Secretary advised that a letter of thanks had been received from Mrs. Loughheed, formerly Miss Gwen. Pym, for the several wedding presents sent to her by the Board of Directors.

It was regularly moved by Mrs. Brown, seconded by Mr. Risewick, and carried:

Calgary was reached at 10 P.M., and at the airport, Mrs. Freeland, President of the Children's Hospital Aid Society, Mrs. J. M. Bannerman, Show Secretary, and Mrs. F. E. Jullien accompanied by their better halves were on hand to welcome their "flying" judge. The company went straight to Mrs. Jullien's home, where a rather late supper was speedily served, and was greatly enjoyed. A short chat ended the day and Mr. Sparkes went to the Palister Hotel for a good night's rest.

Early on the Friday morning Mrs. Freeland was on hand with her car, and soon a start was made to show the President of the Canadian Kennel Club the many places of interest that abounds in and around the City of Calgary. At noon Mr. Sparkes was guest of honour at a luncheon which was attended by all the "doggy" notables. The guest of honour was officially welcomed to the City of Calgary by his Worship Mayor Andy Davidson, and made to feel that he was part and parcel of the "City by the foothills".

Judging started at 1 P.M. and that little chore kept Mr. Sparkes busy right through until 10 P.M., and so the first day was replete with activity, all of which was interesting and therefore enjoyable.

Saturday morning Mrs. Jullien took charge of the visitor, and in next to no time he had been introduced to the Manager of the Exhibition and the General Manager of the Calgary Stampede. Lunch and the balance of the judging kept all hands busy until 10 o'clock, P.M. The show report will furnish the awards, and show the highlights of a very interesting show. After the judging came to an end a general get-together was held, and here everyone had an opportunity to meet Mr. Sparkes who is loud in his praise of Western hospitality.

Sunday morning furnished an opportunity to become acquainted with the famous Chinook Winds, an experience to be long remembered. Then the airport again and off to Edmonton to meet the fanciers of that section of Canada. At Edmonton Mr. Sparkes was welcomed by the Mayor, the ever-green Harry Nash, and ex-director, Jack Tanton. Later "Red" McColl, Director for Alberta, made possible a visit to the kennels of several fanciers, such as the Victor Kennels of Labradors and Pekes sponsored by H. V. Clutton. Next, to the Marvel Kennels of Mrs. Arno where around 50 Pekingese and some Poms were looked over. Then to the kennels of Joe Caswell where better than ordinary Irish Terriers are kept, and Mrs. Caswell expressed her desire to be remembered

to the many friends she met in Toronto on the occasion of her visit to the Queen City. Jack Rawlings showed some Sealys and Springers, and it is Miss Rawlings who is the able Secretary of Edmonton Dog Fanciers' Club.

Back to the hotel and another banquet, where it was really a pleasure to meet the fanciers of Edmonton in such a happy atmosphere. Mr. Sparkes had to share largely in the speech-making and was pleased at the reception given to his speaking efforts by the friends who came together at this dinner who were interested in hearing the gospel of the C.K.C.

Monday morning found Mr. and Mrs. Jullien awaiting the arrival of Mr. Sparkes at the airport, and for goodly measure Mrs. Bannerman was one of the party. A new pleasure had been planned and very soon Mr. Sparkes had gone around 250 miles into the famous Rockies, a really new experience for judge Sparkes. To see the mountains lose their peaks in the clouds was a new experience altogether. Banff was visited, and then on to Lake Louise where the unique color of the waters of this lovely lake made its own impression. Gazing up at such elevations as the "Three Sisters" and the "Ten Peaks" had the usual effect of making the beholders of the grandeur feel conscious of their insignificance in comparison. Driving through the National Park all kinds of "fur" and "feather" were encountered. Mr. Sparkes found it rather hard to be in the heart of the Rockies at noon the one day, and to be back in his own office in Toronto at noon the following day.

Mr. Sparkes extends his heartfelt thanks and expresses his deep appreciation to all who made his visit so pleasant, and for the many thoughtful plans the Western fanciers' carried out on his behalf.

THE twenty-third Annual Fall Dog Show held by the Ladies' Kennel Club of Canada Inc. is now an event of the past and as evidence of its popularity, people are already talking about the next year's fixture. "A well managed show" sums it up well. Speaking to the lady President, Mrs. Sutherland, I was informed that the show was a decided success; entries were slightly higher than last year, subscriptions higher, gate considerably higher, catalogue advertising much lower but in spite of all these, receipts were very encouraging. Their only regret is that they were obliged to return so many entries, on principle.

An outstanding feature was the appeal of the Seeing Eye Dogs in the ring and while pathetic was also wonderful, truly the result of a worthwhile effort. Mr. Perret with his guide and pal "Duchess", Miss Gordon with "Tam", both provided by the Ladies' Kennel Club of Canada Inc. through the support of exhibitors and public. Miss Walker was also there with her dog provided by the Lions Club of Montreal. May I repeat that if all the dogs shows ever held had only these dogs to show for all their efforts, they have done a noble work. From the receipts of this show yet another person will be provided with another Seeing Eye Dog. Long may this work continue.

Due to the illness of that internationally known Judge, Geo. S. Thomas, he was unable to keep his judging appointment. Luckily for the show and all concerned, our President, R. P. Sparkes, was paying Quebec a friendly visit, and fitted into the picture by dividing judging honours with the genial G. V. Glebe, James (Jim) Spring of Boston doing the Terrier Group.

It is a long time since Montreal saw such a display of Poodles, in fact, the writer has never before seen such an entry of those fascinating dogs. Incidentally one went to Best in Show and a very popular win it was.

Canadian handlers were very much in evidence, Alf. Loveridge, Percy Brown, Harry Armistead, C. C. Costar, A. Collins, Harry Fraser, James Haig, J. Lang, F. W. McKunzie. I always believe this is a healthy sign.

The highlights of the show were the decided new and verile interest taken by the public which brings me to the point that the public like a dog show and will attend any time, when properly run. Another highlight was the attendance of none other than our own Humphrey Elliot of Haymarket fame. Mr. Elliot has not attended a show in our city since "Faultless" was defeated by "Etonian Countess". We hope to see him many more times.

Toys will be Toys and never in my life have I seen more satisfied exhibitors in this section. Unusual, but true, good winners and good losers all.

My October notes seem to have touched a vibrant cord in the Canadian dog world and the experience in Montreal is not local judging from the correspondence it invoked. This correspondence agreed with me regarding trophies. In some cases they

are for trophies but for the most part they feel that shows would be more numerous and have more support at the box office if the proper financing was done by show giving clubs. Give cash prizes in every class. Let breed clubs attend to their specials and they prefer it. This would encourage breed clubs. One said, "I won several cups in the ring, but arrived home without one, not even a rosette". They were all cups that are never won by man or dog.

The value of ribbons is shown when a local win was cancelled due to a mistake in entry. The lady said "I don't mind returning the cup, but I would do anything if I could keep the ribbon".

I was thrilled at the graphic description of the Vancouver exhibition shows, as furnished by our Manitoba correspondent, Mrs. Pateman, in her October notes and I can quite imagine that at last we or they have got the notion that dog-showing is theatrical. The roped in sawdust ring is to be a thing of the past. The time has come when even dog shows are going to show some advancement. We owe it to the game, to the public and the dog. I would like to see a Terrier Specialty Show or Toys for that matter on a theatre stage with a comfortable audience, furnished with understandable catalogues—stage lit up with footlights, batten lights, floods and spotlights on the dog being shown on a rostrum—all the others waiting their turn to be gone over by the judge when they were walked across the stage on a red or green carpet or out on a promenade out into the audience where the audience could see and applaud their choice, while a competent announcer describes the dogs for the benefit of the audience.

When dog shows are held in some old garage, with poor seating accommodation, poor lighting, poor rest room accommodation, catalogues that nobody can follow, same confusion we all saw when we first showed a dog, same old blackboard, etc., is it any wonder Mr. and Mrs. John Public are critical and disinterested? They know that annual fixtures must make money or they could not be annual. They naturally expect to see an improvement of the conditions under which the shows are held.

Stand outside a show and listen for the comments of passerbys. They are like this. "Oh, they are always the same"! I can't warm up to them". "I never go to them", and so on.

After all we are selling an article to the public and while 90% are interested enough to go to see what it is all about they expect something for their money, something to talk about at work the next morning where they have spent a few hours in the afternoon and gone back in the evening for the climax and satisfied they were entertained. Yes, and many would buy a dog as a result, and values would go up instead of down. The other 10%, possibly of whom half are real "doggy" people, would go to a show if it was on top of a mountain or in a cellar.

Fantastic you will say! And where will we bench our dogs? Do you have to bench a theatrical company? I know enough about back stage to say that with dressing rooms and property rooms below the stage and back stage, all dogs in crates, there is enough room for the average big show. Morris and Essex taught us that only group winners need wait to the end. After all, only few people are interested in the dogs on the bench for very good reasons. The bench is no place to see a dog.

When the day comes that dog shows are "staged" instead of run, we will have shown advancement and attracted attention. We will profit all round. I wish I could write what I can imagine for future shows but the blue pencil man is my safety valve and I know my pressure.

It is with deep regret that we report the death of two local Toy Breeders and exhibitors in Madame Gaudry and Madame Poirier, both high respected in Quebec Toy Circles. We extend our sympathy to their family.

Many will be sorry to learn that the late Quebec Director, R. A. "Bob" Ross is under the weather and all will join with me in wishing him a speedy recovery. I believe when Bob misses a show as he did the Ladies' show, he is really ill as he is always on hand at a show.

I understand that the first pug to win its C.B. in obedience class was from the Winna Pug Kennels and only 18 months old at that. All will agree with me this is a very creditable performance and one that all Quebec fanciers will be proud of and pass on the old "more power to our side."

DUDLEY PICKMAN ROGERS 10th PRESIDENT AMERICAN KENNEL CLUB

In a special meeting of the Board of Directors of The American Kennel Club held on September 5th at the organization's headquarters at 221 Fourth Ave., N.Y.C., Dudley Pickman Rogers of Danvers, Mass., became the tenth President of the governing body of pure-bred dogs. The choice of a new head of the AKC was occasioned by the recent death of Russell H. Johnson of Philadelphia, who had held the position since 1933. At the meeting the directors appointed a committee to draw up a proper resolution on the death of Mr. Johnson.

Mr. Rogers has been intimately connected with the governing body since Sept. 1, 1925, when he became the delegate from the Eastern Dog Club of the AKC. At that same meeting, he was named a member of the board of directors. The new President has been a dog fancier for most of his life, but it was not until 1923 that he applied to the AKC for the name "Brecknock Kennels," which subsequently was connected with many notable Sealyham Terriers. From 1925 to 1931 he was Secretary of the Eastern Dog Club of Boston.

In addition to his long interest in dogs, Mr. Rogers has taken an active part in polo and hunting. The Myopia Hunt Club of Hamilton, Mass., of which he was President for 11 years, sent him as a delegate to the United States Polo Association in 1914, when he also became a member of the executive committee of that body, in which capacity he served until 1936.

AFGHAN HOUND IMPORTED

On September 10th, there arrived in Toronto, consigned to Mrs. Viola G. Fielder, well-known Chow breeder, the all black female "Kala of Chaman". "Kala", bred by Mrs. Molly Sharpe, formerly of Scotland, but now a resident of Londonderry, Ireland, was born on August 14th, 1938, and is by "Ch. Westmill Bayezid Ansari" (by "Ch. Badshah of Ainsdart" by "Ch. Sirdar of Ghazni") out of "Safiya" who is by "Ch. Ashna of Ghazni" out of "Ch. Alfreda". Winner of the Championship Certificate and Best of Breed under Judge Miss Simmons at the Richmond (1939) show in her last appearance at the shows, "Kala" is a sister of American "Ch. Rene of Chaman".

"CH. NORNAY SADDLER" RETIRED

"Ch. Nornay Saddler", famous Smooth Fox Terrier of the Wissaboo Kennels, owned by Mr. James M. Austin of Old Westbury, L.I., was retired after winning his 55th Best in Show award at the Somerset Hills Kennel Club Show at Far Hills, N.J., on September 21st.

The "Saddler", who was greatly helped in his career by Leonard Brumby of Hicksville, L.I., N.Y., is by "Travelling Fox" out of "Wyrksop Surprise" and was whelped on March 12, 1936; he was bred by F. Coward.

Upon retiring "Ch. Nornay Saddler", Mr. Austin said that his greatest feeling of satisfaction was that the "Saddler" has helped to prove that a dog who keeps his form and is shown fearlessly reaches his proper level under the great panel of judges covering our dog shows.

Waiting For Their Masters

(London Listener)

At the Blue Cross Kennels at Blackheath are more than a hundred refugee dogs from France and Belgium, most of them waiting to rejoin their new masters after six months' quarantine. The dogs jump up and down and beat on the bars of their kennels as you pass, but the kennel-maids reassured me, saying "that's all right, it's only because you're a stranger here." Because of the quarantine laws, these dogs must never meet, except with a double wire in between them, so that each one has his or her own separate quarters in rows, with signposts, saying "Sunshine Corner," "Shady lane," and so forth.

King of Shady Lane, over which he lords it with an air of undisputed authority, is "Sadi", an enormous black Belgian police dog, who was discovered roaming about the beach at Dunkirk with a label tied round his neck with a piece of string, "will someone please take care of me?" One look at "Sadi" and it would be quite ridiculous even to think of saying "no." So here he is at Blackheath, although his still wearing the pneumonia jacket he had to be popped into the moment he arrived, in order to recover from the privations of his journey.

* * *

Most of the dogs arrived collarless, but "Javotte", a wire-haired terrier, is an exception, for she landed here complete with gas-mask and mackintosh gas-proof coat, neither of which she has since had occasion to don.

At first glance I mistook one dog for a very fat, podgy guinea-pig. His name is "Tommy Atkins", and actually he's a white puppy, of extremely doubtful ancestry, whom Gunner Bowen, found whimpering miserably in a shell crater in France, and brought home with him to England. I can't imagine in the least what "Tommy Atkins" will grow up to look like, but, if I felt my own dog would allow it even for a moment, I know I'd have tried to smuggle "Tommy Atkins" out of the kennels with me.

Here is part of a letter from Driver J. Stuart, of the R.A.S.C. He says, "I am writing on behalf of the dog I have brought back from France with me. I was in Arras and have had him eight months (I have been in France nine months). I saved him from a bad accident and have been more than repaid. He is a Malignoir, a Belgian police-dog, similar to an Alsatian, but not quite so big. He has kept guard in the woods and was instrumental in the capture of four parachutists, who were dropped near our transport line, and more than once he has helped me through. I have had him on my lorry, and together we have covered 11,000 miles from the Maginot to Dieppe,

and as far south as Paris, Nantes and Brest.

"We arrived in England on Monday morning at Plymouth, and he was taken away from me in a police van by the customs to go into quarantine. I am devoted to him, but of course could not insist on accompanying him as I am only in the ranks. I should like you if you can find out where he is. It will be a struggle to pay his fees, but I would sooner borrow than lose him after all this time." Since he wrote that letter, Driver Stuart has heard that his dog is not only well, but will be cared for free of all cost to him at the Blue Cross Kennels.

PROFESSIONAL HANDLERS HOLD ANNUAL CONVENTION

In his welcoming address at the annual convention of the Professional Handlers' Association, held at the headquarters of The American Kennel Club in New York City, Russell H. Johnson, President of the A.K.C., stressed the tremendous good this body has done for the sport of showing pure-bred dogs. Organized in 1926 to foster the best ethics in professional dog handling, the P.H.A. has grown to the point where it is a great stabilizing factor in the conduct of amateur and professional alike.

Mr. Johnson paid particular tribute to the unselfish efforts of Leonard Brumby, one of the principal organizers, now serving his fifteenth term as President of the P.H.A. The A.K.C. head referred to the days before there was such an association and emphasized that the irresponsible handler was practically unknown today.

Harry Hartnett, Treasurer of the P.H.A., served as chairman of the convention, taking the place of Harry Livesay, the Vice-President, who was injured recently in an automobile accident. Mrs. Emmett Warburton was Secretary. Other addresses were made by George F. Foley, whose organization superintends more dog shows than any other in the United States, and Arthur Roland of the New York Sun.

Mr. Foley said that the P.H.A. had done good work not only for the handlers themselves, but for the shows and everything connected with them. He, like the other speakers, gave special credit to Leonard Brumby, President of the body, and its other officers for having enhanced the profession in the estimation of fanciers and the show-going public. He also spoke at a forum at which there was general discussion of show problems. There was talk about improving the conditions in exercise rings at shows and also of what could be done to abolish "cheering sections," through which fanciers of certain breeds seek to boost the stock of their representatives in the eyes of the judges. Mr. Foley as well as the handlers agreed that this was a practice to be discouraged and that the applause should wait until after the awards have been made.

Mr. Roland suggested that the association should not rest on its laurels and that it was up to each member to do all that he could to advance the aims of the organization. He pointed out that the handling art is especially one of the individual, but that the interests of the individual should be made secondary to the welfare of the association. He also emphasized that both novice and veteran fanciers relied on the opinion of handlers and that when handlers, following a defeat reported back to the owner, "We wuz robbed," the latter was likely to feel that the game is crooked. He said he believed the handlers would agree that, in spite of occasional sour decisions, a good dog, shown fearlessly throughout the year, would end up with far more victories than defeats. Handlers, he said, should not necessarily take bad decisions without doing anything about it, but that their protests

should be in the form of united action through the association for improvement of everything connected with the game.

The remarks of Mr. Roland and Mr. Foley were all laudatory of the work done by the members of the P.H.A., laying particular stress on their uniformly high sense of sportsmanship and on their aid to novice exhibitors.

During the coming year the P.H.A. expects to extend a new benefit to its members in the form of hospitalization insurance. This is in addition to the existing life insurance afforded each member of the P.H.A.

WESTMINSTER KENNEL CLUB FIRST TO HOLD LIMITED SHOW

A new stage in the development of pure-bred dog activities in the United States is seen in a rule recently passed by the delegates to the American Kennel Club which permits its member-clubs to hold shows limited to specimens that won first, second, or third prizes in regular classes at previous shows where championship points were awarded. This new type of show may be held only by a club which has been a member of the A.K.C. for ten or more years and which had 1,500 or more dogs entered at its next preceding show. The full details of the rule appears in the October issue of the American Kennel Gazette.

The first organization to try out the limited show will be the Westminster Kennel Club of New York which is the oldest of the 252 member clubs of the A.K.C., having been elected in 1884. At present only two other clubs are eligible to give limited shows, the Morris and Essex K.C., and the North Westchester K.C., but there are almost a dozen clubs that could become eligible by drawing a few hundred more entries. Prominent among these are the Golden Gate K.C., San Francisco; the International K.C. of Chicago; the Eastern Dog Club, Boston; the Detroit K.C.; Western Reserve K.C., Cleveland; the K.C. of Philadelphia; and the Westchester K.C., Rye, N.Y.

Mrs. W. Wylie, Vineland, Ont., will adjudicate on the Pomeranian entry at the All Toy Breed show, of the Progressive Dog Club, to be held on the roof of the Pennsylvania Hotel, New York City, on Sunday, November 10th.

Bethune L. Smith, Toronto, Ont., has been honoured by the Harrisburg Kennel Club by being invited to judge Best in Show and Best American-bred, at Harrisburg, Penna., on November 16th. A nice expression of international good-will.

Reg. P. Sparkes, Toronto, Ont., who has earned the sobriquet of "the Flying Judge" will travel via Trans Canada Airways to share in the judging duties of the Seattle Kennel Club, on November 23rd, his assignment including Working Group, Non-Sporting Group and Toy Group, and Best in Show. Mr. Sparkes, whilst judging at Calgary, took a side-trip to Edmonton and it would not be much of a surprise packet if he decided to take in Vancouver the same way.

A LOST SUMMER

It was early June and the summer of 1940 was just beginning to make its presence felt on everything animate, and after the long Canadian winter, and rather cold Spring the new summer was especially welcome. Early in June Kennel Club business obliged the President, Vice-President, Second Vice-President and Secretary to meet the Department of Agriculture officers to talk over matters considered vital to the general welfare of the Canadian Kennel Club. No meeting could have been any more satisfactory to all concerned, frankness featured both sides of the hearing and when the necessary adjustments were conceded it was agreed that round table conferences had their own special advantages.

Coming back to Toronto it was something new for the chief officers of the club to find time to thoroughly discuss club activities from Coast to Coast. When about half way to the Queen City the Secretary was stricken with an old malady but with a new viciousness which was most distressing, and a herculean effort was necessary to prevent the condition from marring the general pleasure resulting from the visit to the Department. The day ended and the Secretary's agony was still his own secret affair.

It was some days after when the trouble had been properly diagnosed, and on the advice of our recent club member Dr. (Captain) Boyden (who is now at Camp Borden in charge of the health of the Toronto Irish Regiment) it was arranged for a two-stage operation to be carried out at St. Michaels Hospital, Toronto, and here let it be said, that St. Michaels is the hospital with a heart. After two days the first-stage was past and it was successful, and here commences the chief theme of the article which serves to show, that dogdom, like masonry, is universal. Dr. Foulds, the operating surgeon, had decided that his patient could get up for an hour on the seventh day after the first cutting. At the end of that day, in marched a splendid looking specimen of manhood, and without fuss of any kind, undressed and got into the other bed in the room. No introductions were necessary, but I soon learned that he was "Chuck" Ward, and his line was Pard Dog Food, and he soon learned that I was Jim Strachan of the Kennel Club. Next forenoon in came R. E. Lipe, of Boston Terrier fame, who is also interested in Pard Dog Food, and he was somewhat amazed to find two friends in the room instead of one. It was a matter of regret when "Chuck" left room 212.

In due course the second stage was passed 100% plus successful, and a brand new, streamlined plumbing job had been installed. The third week had passed and there had been no mishaps. Room 212 was busy from morning until night, flowers came in from many friends, and some from great distances, books were plentiful too, and fruit in abundance. Seldom was the room without visitors. It was so encouraging to be confronted with so many evidences of thoughtfulness, but then came the dangerous shock period almost without warning, a sus-

pected heart and lung complication had taken advantages and the condition became serious immediately. In came the oxygen cylinders, and tubes to the lungs via the nose went to work, and as consciousness returned there came a surge of welcome relief to a body that had quickly lost strength. Then it was two long periods in the oxygen tent, then the "Visitors Not Allowed" sign went up, and for five long weeks it was strictly a matter of fighting one's way out of a bad mess.

No words can adequately describe a fellows appreciation of the devoted interest of the Mother Superior, the Sisters, Supervisors, special and regular hospital nurses, this will be a cherished memory for all time, of course there were compensations for all the suffering, and many amusing incidents offset the long days and nights on one's back, for instance the day that Mrs. J. R. Kennedy, of the Vivadora Kennels got as far as the bedside, when a flushed supervisor arrived and pointed out the "Visitors Not Allowed" sign on the door. It was suggested that the sign did not include one's relatives, and that the lady was my sister Marion. Profuse apologies ended the awkward moment, and a new sister was added to the family register. Mrs. Phyllis Robson, of the "Dog World", London, England, was a welcome visitor who did not believe in signs. Did not believe that Herr Hitlers novice airmen would ever reach her snug little cottage along the Kent Coast, and so she braved the supervisors very definite belief that Doctors orders must be observed, and came visiting frequently. One day she was standing back in a little inset on the wall of the room, when the irate nurse came along to announce that her orders could not be disregarded. She was advised that the visitor had gone out through the conservatory, and so another critical corner had been successfully negotiated, and a pleasant visit was enjoyed.

One morning after breakfast there seemed to be a strange element hovering around room 212. Outside the sun was shining, indoors everybody seemed to be smiling, and the conditions were contagious. Early in the forenoon, just like zephyr breezes from the Pacific, two welcome visitors from far off Vancouver, B.C., found their way to the bedside where the occupant was busy figuring things out. On the left was Miss Gwen Pym, and the right was Miss Maude Pym, the daughter and sister of our Second-Vice-President, W. H. Pym, both were in excellent health, and both were radiantly happy. There were no more welcome visitors than these during the three months of confinement in the "jug". It was a decided hardship to realize the loss to be sustained when denied the pleasure of showing off the Queen City to two friends who had stopped at nothing when playing the role of hostesses last summer.

A request for permission to make a social call on Frank Beer, of Smooth Fox Terrier fame who had been operated on for appendicitis, and was only two floors removed from 212, having been granted, all necessary

preparations were made, the distance between the bed and the door was laboriously negotiated, so it was back to bed again, and another good intention had miscarried. Mr. Beer had a hard time, too, but thank goodness he has since fully recovered.

It was rather startling for the Sister and her staff to see Dr. Foulds lugging his dog along the corridor in the direction of Number 212, but everything has its beginning. The Doctors dog was a "plum pudding" dog, a coach dog, and all ears were turned in the direction whence such peculiar descriptions came from. Here was a Dalmatian with loads of quality, and as sound as a dollar, but his black spots had been placed almost indiscriminately, and so, as a show specimen he was strictly speaking an "also ran". The kindly Sister complained to Mrs. Bennett, that the hospital fundamentals were being demoralized, when the Doctors brought their dogs along for their patients to look at and mentioned that this was the first time that a dog had been on that floor, but Mrs. Bennett advised her that two little Shetland Sheepdogs had been in room 212 the previous Sunday evening, so that her "Dad" could say whether the little dogs were to be entered for the Toronto Kennel Club, and the Canadian National Exhibition Dog Shows. So what could the poor Sister do about all such supposed to be outlawed activities.

Dr. Hall's dog must not be overlooked here, because it was Dr. Hall who stopped the entrance through the "Pearly Gates", for the time being at least. This dog was given to the Doctor by a grateful patient for the Doctor's children to play with. A mongrel cur that did not amount to anything, but the children did love it, and the dog was their perfect playmate. Innocently, and yet true to the cause of the pure-bred dog, we advised the Doctor that a pure-bred kid should always have a pure-bred dog if he was going to have a dog at all, and we offered to furnish free of charge a Collie, a Shetland Sheepdog, a Cocker Spaniel or a Schipperke, any one of which would be pure-bred, but we would like to see the mongrel dog that was so much favoured, and so we met "Timmy", who was no mongrel at all, but a German Shepherd dog, black, and of good quality. A suggestion was made to Dr. Hall that he ask the donor to furnish him with the dog's papers.

Scatter the incidents recorded herewith amongst the days that have come between early June and the end of October, and you will realize just how much sunshine has been our portion this summer, literally it has been more or less of a lost summer physically, but it is a fact, that there was plenty of compensation too, and it is really good to be alive yet. Thanks to the Board of Directors for their generous kindness and consideration, to so many friends who remembered the sick Secretary. Hope to be back in harness soon, although the Doctors are agreed that it will be a full year before all the advantages of the recent operations will be available. At the moment the underpinning is none too dependable, but a slow but sure improvement marks every passing day now.

Mrs. Phyllis Robson, editor of Dog World, London, England, is probably dogdom's farthest travelled dog woman, and she is at present in sunny California, where, we notice with pleasure, that she was selected to judge Best In Show, at Glendale, on September 15th. Mrs. Robson found the best specimen, in her opinion, in the Irish born Sealyham Terrier, "Ch. Samphire Shindy of Erracht", a dog that had won seven championship certificates before he was 14 months old. On this side of the Atlantic he has won twenty-three Terrier Groups, and fourteen times was Best in Show, and from photographs that we have seen, "Shindy" was in full bloom on September 15th. A. E. Cameron, the owner, handled the dog himself.

OUR FRONTSPICE

Our feature dog for this November issue of Dogs In Canada, is the exquisite brown Poodle (Standard) "Champion Droll v Sadowa of Salmagundi" ("Atos v Groblershof" ex "Lola v Sadowa") bred by Martin Wolff, Germany, and owned by Mr. and Mrs. Justin W. Greiss, Hamilton, Mass., U.S.A., and apparently the dog is now being directed towards an International Championship. This Sadowa strain of Poodles has been conceded to be the best brown strain in Germany, and is noted for type and substance.

Mr. Glebe's choice of Best was a popular selection, and had the approval of those who waited for the final award to be made.

Obituaries

Toronto Boston Terrier circles lost two ardent supporters in recent weeks when Mrs. Florence Tompkins and Mrs. Gerald J. Lynch passed away.

The latter was associated with her husband, "Jerry" to his friends, in maintaining the high standards set by Mr. Lynch and Wm. Greene in their earlier sponsorship of the Bubbling Over Kennels. Mrs. Lynch suffered from a long and painful illness and the end, though long expected, was a source of much regret. And so the sport loses one whose genial personality and ever present smile earned a multitude of friends.

Mrs. F. Tompkins was an old time Boston Terrier fancier who could easily claim belonging to the "old school", for 22 years she held membership in the Canadian Kennel Club, and at all times retained a keen interest in its affairs. She gave patronage to all clubs and to all persons featuring the Boston, but she was positively identified with the old Boston Terrier Club of Canada, and it was always amusing to hear her shout for the old club, no matter what doggie atmosphere she happened to be in. "Old soldiers never die" she used to sing—"they only fade away", and so, she joins the "great majority" beyond the grave, and at that "meeting place" on the "other side" it will be bright and cheerful when Florence Tompkins re-unites with Mrs. Wm. (Midge) Ingram again.

The sympathy of American dogdom goes out to Joseph Tompkins, the husband of as sincere a fancier as ever graced this continent.

Mrs. Marjorie Symons, Waterdown, Ont., is still another C.K.C. member who has crossed the river Styx recently. Her favourite breed was the Smooth Haired Dachshunde, and in her comparatively short career as a dog fancier she had made a host of friends who now mourn her passing. Mrs. Symons had been ill since the Toronto Kennel Club Good Friday show last Spring, and seemed to be making a good recovery, but alas! the promised blessing failed to materialize.

John B. Thompson, known to thousands under the nom de Plume of "Ozark Ripley", died at Chattanooga, Tenn., on August 21st, at the age of sixty-seven years.

He was a native of St. Louis, Mo., but part of his life was spent at Doniphan, same state. Doniphan is located on the Current River, in the Ozarks, and it was in this environment that John B. Thompson gleaned much of the material for his stories and articles. Here he hunted and fished, and, for a time, worked as a professional bird dog trainer.

After abandoning the training profession he devoted all of his time to writing on outdoor subjects and lecturing for the Izaak Walton League of American and similar organizations. "Ozark" hunted many kinds of game, but was fondest of quail shooting in the hills from which he derived his pen name.

John B. Thompson was the author of many books on hunting and the training of dogs, among them being, "Jist Huntin'", "Quail and the Quail Dog" and "Bird Dog Training Made Easy".

For the past several years Ozark Ripley spent his summers' fishing in Canada and doing missionary work for Canadian National Railways. His winters were spent at Chattanooga, Tenn.

John B. Thompson owned many bird dogs during his lifetime, both Pointers and Setters, but the one field trial public is most likely to recall was the Llewellyn, "Winmospeck". Ozark often officiated as a judge at field trials.

August L. Rosemont, a well known figure in the dog show world and one of eight licensed superintendents of the American Kennel Club, died at San Francisco on August, 22nd after a short illness. He was 43.

Known to thousands of dog fanciers on the Pacific Coast as the owner and publisher of the Western Kennel World, Mr. Rosemont had devoted most of his life to promoting interest in pure bred dogs and dog shows in the West, starting out as a catalogue boy at the age of 12 years.

Until his death at the Fort Miley Facility, he was superintendent of the Golden Gate Kennel Club of San Francisco and president of both the Oakland Kennel Club and the Santa Cruz Kennel Club.

His mother, Mrs. Helen P. Rosemont, is internationally famous as a judge of all breeds of dogs, while his father, L. B. Rosemont, now retired, is the founder of the journal devoted to dog owners and their interests.

A veteran of the World War, Mr. Rosemont was a member of San Francisco Post No. 1, American Legion.

He leaves, besides his parents, two sisters, Mrs. E. G. Trissel and Mrs. Ludwig Burket, and three brothers, Edmund, John and Henry Rosemont.

Josiah Macy Willets, retired New York City commission merchant, who passed the recent months at Cassilis Farm, his estate at New Marlboro, Mass. where he raised prize-winning hackney ponies and cocker spaniels, died at 6 A.M., October 7 at Fairview Hospital in Great Barrington, Mass., of a self-inflicted bullet wound. He was fifty-one years old.

For the last thirty years he had raised ponies and spaniels at Cassilis Farm, part of the great manor estate established by Mrs. Willets' father, the late Hildreth K. Bloodgood. For years his ponies won blue ribbons at the National Horse Show in New York, the Devon Horse Show in Philadelphia and other eastern stock shows.

At the time of his death he had a stable of sixty ponies and many dogs. He had been president of the American Hackney Horse Society and the American Spaniel Club and a director in the National Horse Show Association. He was a member of Psi Upsilon fraternity, the Racquet and Tennis Club, Westminster Kennel Club, The Essex Fox Hounds, Society of Colonial Wars and St. Nicholas Society. He was president of the New Marlboro Game Association and a former president of the Westchester County Horse Show Ass'n.

Mr. Willets was also known as an autograph and rare book collector. He received considerable publicity in 1913 when he recovered \$84,000 in a lengthy suit in the New York State Supreme Court resulting from his being allegedly swindled in a rare book deal. His collection included at one time papers and books of Dickens, Thackeray, Mark Twain, Albert Bigelow Paine and Thomas Jefferson.

Canadian Cocker fanciers of the older school will recall the raids made on the Cocker Kennels of Canada by the father of Mrs. Willets, the late Mr. Bloodgood at a time, when the Canadian breeders were producing that type of Cocker that made the breed famous in the United States.

Howard Millar Chapin, authority on Colonial history, especially that of Rhode Island, and librarian of the Rhode Island Historical Society since 1912, died at his home in Providence, R.I. on Wednesday, September 18th. He was fifty-three years old.

Mr. Chapin was the author of numerous books and papers on historical and other subjects, his best known work being his two-volume "Documentary History of Rhode Island." In 1939, he gave, jointly with his wife, who had died the year before, the Peter Chapin collection of books on dogs to the Library of the College of William and Mary. The collection, containing 2,300 volumes, many exceedingly rare, is considered the best of its kind. The gift was given in memory of Peter, a cocker spaniel which lived with the Chapins from the time of their marriage in 1912 until 1918.

A NEW BOOK ON AN OLD SUBJECT

It is surprising how many enquiries are received for a general book on the care of the dog and while this is not by any means a new subject, nevertheless, we have found it difficult to prescribe a book that was up-to-date, was not too expensive and yet was written in such a style that it would be easily understood by the average dog owner.

Captain Will Judy, author of "Care of the Dog" (Judy Publishing Company) writes in an entertaining style and this new work from his capable pen aptly demonstrates the knowledge and experience he has gained throughout his twenty years as publisher of dog books and Editor of a canine magazine.

Containing thirty-eight chapters with seventy-one illustrations the book is a mine of information and contains much practical advice and helpful suggestions for anybody requiring a book of this nature. Copies may be secured through "Dogs In Canada" at \$1.50 per copy.
