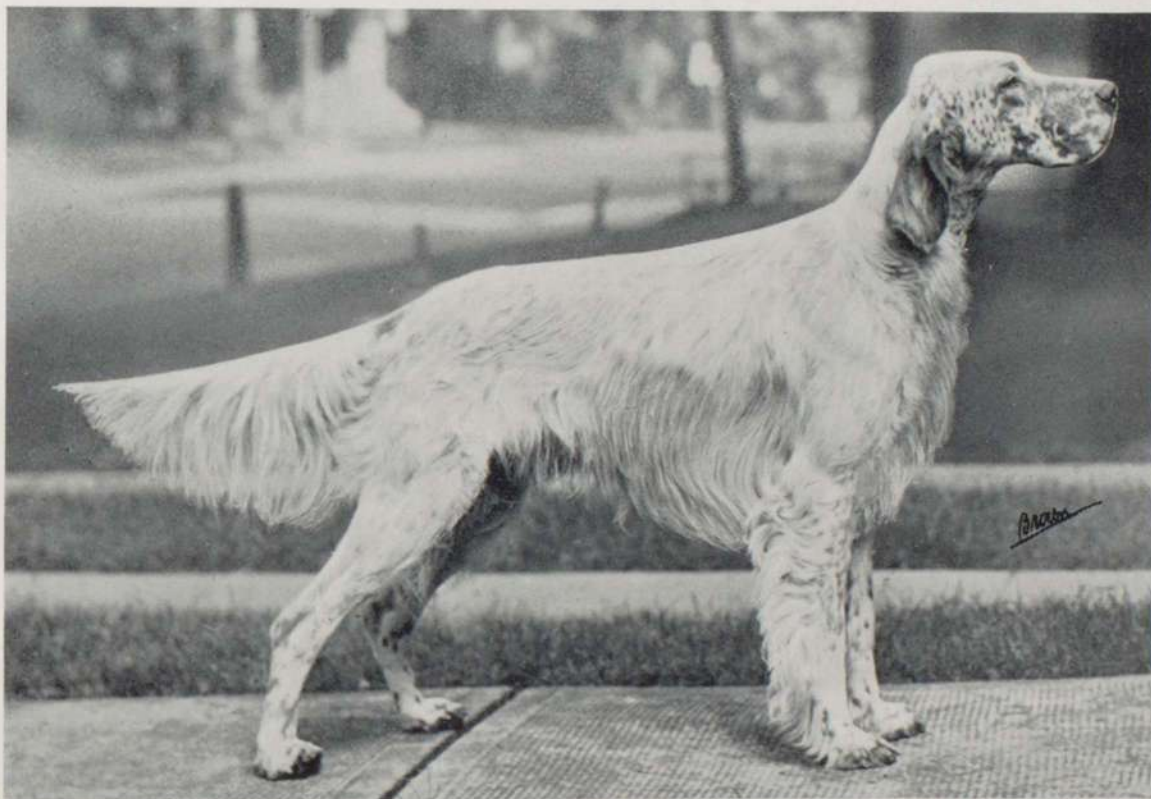

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# WHY I LIKE POINTERS

Owner of the Famous Janard Kennels—the Home of America's Pointers

I HAVE been very hesitant about writing an article with this title as, if the average magazine reader is like me, he will look at the title and the author's name. Then he will say to himself that he is glad that "Mr. Flotsenbottom" likes "Wire-coated Persian Slinks" and let it go at that without bothering to read on to find out why. On rare occasions, if I am especially fond of the breed of dog or happen to be acquainted with the author, I might read the complete article, but at the end of it I usually find that I know no more than before. The usual stock phrases will be there, such as "a fine disposition", "keen intelligence", et cetera. The author could be writing about almost any breed.

It is always difficult to tell some one why you prefer one breed of dog to another, especially if you have not owned and learned to like every other breed. Naturally, the true dog lover does not dislike any type of dog, although he will prefer one or more breeds. However, when he tries to put the reasons for his preference in writing, the phrases sound very stilted and trite.

There is a great deal of chance in the way that one becomes a breeder and protagonist of the "only type of dog to own". Somebody gives you a puppy or you visit a kennel and see just the "cutest little dog". From then on it starts, and before you know it you start breeding so that you can help make your breed popular by scattering puppies throughout the World and by doing some great winning at the shows.

In my own case, when I was a child in a city apartment, I had an assortment of breeds, such as Boston Terriers, Wire-haired Fox Terriers and other small town dogs. However, just when I began to be very attached to a dog, my parents decided the city was no place for a dog, and my pet mysteriously ended up with some friends who lived in the country. I then decided that as soon as possible I would live in the country with lots of dogs.

Some time ago when I was in England, a friend of mine suggested that I

look at some Pointers in a kennel. I knew nothing of the breed, except that Pointers seemed to be favored by painters of field pictures. I was captivated by a fresh and lively little dog called Spot, and brought him to the States with me. This was the beginning. Since then, although I now have English and Irish Setters and Beagles in the kennels, I am a rabid Pointer enthusiast.

## Pointers as House Dogs

Most people think of the Pointer as a kennel dog that looks well in the field. I have discovered that he makes one of the best house dogs I have ever seen. He is short-haired, and agile enough so that he does not bump into furniture as other dogs of his size might. He is very intelligent and easily learns what he may or may not do.

There is no better breed than the Pointer for the outdoors. He is always ready for fun, yet will never get so wild as to get out of control. One need not worry about the brush spoiling his coat as one must with the long-haired breeds. No dog is quicker and more alert when accompanying a shooter of game. The Pointer never becomes lazy or sullen as I have seen so many other breeds do at times, and it is a rare Pointer that moves with his tail down.

As in my own house, Pointers are great companions for children. My dogs worship my son and follow him everywhere. They are very gentle and yet make wonderful watch dogs. There are few strangers that would dare come too near my children without one of the family being there. Should a stranger be so foolhardy, I would not speak for his safety.

I believe that everybody cannot help but notice a Pointer either in a bench show ring or at a field event. He seems to say, "Here I am and I do not have to hide under any fluff or fancy trimmings". This is definitely so. When you look at a Pointer you can tell right away what sort of a dog he is. His sleek lines are apparent without putting one's hands on him as is not the case with so many other breeds. I have often been to a show where I have seen

what I thought was a beautiful woolly or long-haired dog. On closer examination by touch, I have sometimes found that the dog was really misshapen although his coat covered these "sins". A Pointer can not do this, but is definitely as he appears.

If you have had the stamina to read this article through to here, please accept my sincere gratitude. I hope that I have been able to pass on to you some of my enthusiasm for Pointers, although I fear that I am no different from the other people that I mentioned in an early paragraph—it really is difficult to write the reasons for liking a certain breed of dogs.

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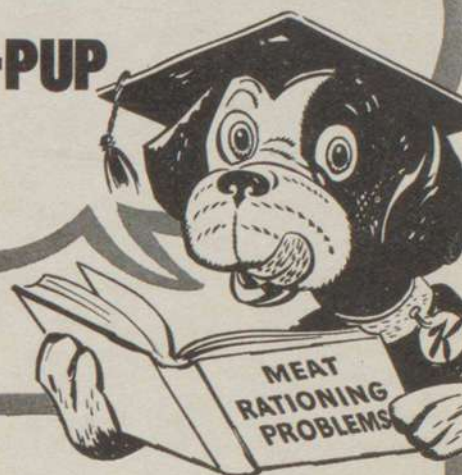

## WINNING TERRIERS

Several months ago your Editor and a Terrier enthusiast were discussing "Winning Terriers" and in the course of our conversation the Terrier fancier made the observation that perhaps an article or two on outstanding Terriers would prove interesting, the adjective "outstanding" in this instance meaning those Terriers which have demonstrated that they are of superior quality by reason of such major wins as Best in the Terrier Group and Best in Show.

Ever responsive to suggestions on what might be good reading material a check was made of all those Terriers which were Best in the Terrier Group or Best in Show at all our championship shows in the last ten years, and from the information thus compiled a number of tables were prepared.

The next table indicates the 9 Terriers which earned the greatest number of Best in Group awards and here we find F. H. Secretan's Scottish Terrier, **Ch. Desril Rock**, leading with 12 such awards to his credit. Throughout his Canadian show career Desril Rock has been handled at the shows by his owner,—"Dogs In Canada", Dec., 1942.

**Detroit, Mich.—Best of Breed (35 entered).**  
**Morris and Essex, N.J.—1st Limit (12 entered).** Three Points towards U.S.A. Championship.

## OUR FRONTISPIECE

No one has done more to further the cause of the English Setter in Canada than Mr. F. L. Rife, whose Fairglens Kennels are situated out at Rockwood, Ontario, ten miles east of Guelph. Mr. Rife is engaged in business in Toronto and finds much relaxation in his hobby. He is a great dog lover and runs his kennels as a pastime and not from commercial motives. It was with great pleasure I accepted an invitation to go and see for myself all the good dogs and promising youngsters coming along.

The star of to-day is Rummey of Fair Glen, whose portrait appears on our frontispiece. The picture speaks for itself as to his quality, and he is a fine mover. He was born on January 1st, 1941, sire Mike of Stagboro, dam Ch. Carmen of Glen Grove. His grandfather was the famous Rummey of Stagbow, who has sired approximately thirty-two American champions, and Ch. Carmen has been a consistent winner in the past and taken many Best of Breeds and finished her title when under a year old.

As a puppy Rummey took 1sts at the Toronto Exhibition and Peel shows, and at the last Toronto show in June, 1942, he went Best of Winner; at Guelph he was Best of Breed, and again this spring at London he topped his breed.

As a sire he is going to make a big name for himself. His get is just arriving at the show stage, and there are several litters of outstanding puppies by him. What pleases Mr. Rife is that they are showing exceptional hunting qualities. I was privileged to see a litter of nine Blue beltons by Rummey ex Patsy of Fair Glen, which certainly contains potential winners. Another litter of older puppies by him out of Ch. Broadlands Bashful have been bred for hunting purposes and have all good heads. I also liked an orange puppy out of Ch. Broadlands Bashful sired by Rummey. Another pup of promise is a blue Belton by Mike of Stagboro ex Ch. Carmen of Glen Grove. I was interested in seeing Ch. Carmen, who is a big winner, also Cinderella of Fair Glen, a promising young bitch who won the puppy class at Hamilton; Ch. Broadlands Bashful, a big winner in her day, and Mike of Stagboro, who is a double cross to the famous Rummey of Stagboro, and a very attractive orange belton four years old.

I was very much impressed with the natural conditions under which Mr. Rife keeps his Setters. His home is ideally situated for hunting dogs. It is perched on the top of a hill looking down into a valley where there is a swimming pool, and beyond this a trout stream. The whole estate comprises many acres of woods where game is abundant—so it is small wonder his dogs are good workers with such ideal surroundings in which to train.

My trip out to see the kennels was marred by a terrific thunderstorm, followed by torrential rain, so there was nothing to do but return to Toronto. I had as companions Mr. and Mrs. H. R. Drew of the Wildair Kennels and, despite the wet, we enjoyed the company of our congenial and interesting host so much that we were so bold as to ask him to renew his invitation so that we could spend another day with him later on.

## SEX PREDETERMINATION EXPERIMENTS CONDUCTED AT THE ARDEE KENNELS, WALDHEIM, SASK.

About two years ago Dogs In Canada published a contribution from Mr. Harry Dean, a member of the Provincial Committee—of the Ardee Kennels, Saskatchewan—in connection with his experiments in "Sex Predetermination". Many articles have been received by the writer since the article appeared asking for additional information, indicating that it was read with interest by a large number of our readers. Letters are still being received, so Mr. Peake decided to bring the matter up to date with the latest experiments and results.

During the last three years Ardee Kennels, Waldheim, Sask., has conducted 15 sex predetermination experiments. These experiments were based on the theory that an alkaline condition of the vagina will produce a pre-

ponderance of males, an acid condition resulting in females.

A breeders' belief of long standing suggests a female mated in the early part of her season or heat will probably produce female offspring. If mated toward the end of the heat period males are more likely to be result. Recent scientific tests have shown these so-called old-time superstitions are not without foundation. A normal female's vagina begins the cycle in a more or less acid condition, becoming neutral toward the middle of the cycle and gradually changing to an alkaline condition at the end of the cycle.

In these experiments males were desired. The most satisfactory results being obtained where the mating took place near the end of the heat period.

Sodium bicarbonate was used, varying in strength from 2 oz. to 8 oz. mixed with two quarts of sterilized luke-warm water. The solution was put in a two-quart hot water bottle, equipped with a hose and gooseneck nozzle. A small

quantity of vaseline was put on the nozzle in order to make the insertion painless. There appears to be no discomfort to the bitch during this operation as no protests are made.

The same sire was used throughout these experiments with the following results appearing in table.

# Brevities from Britain

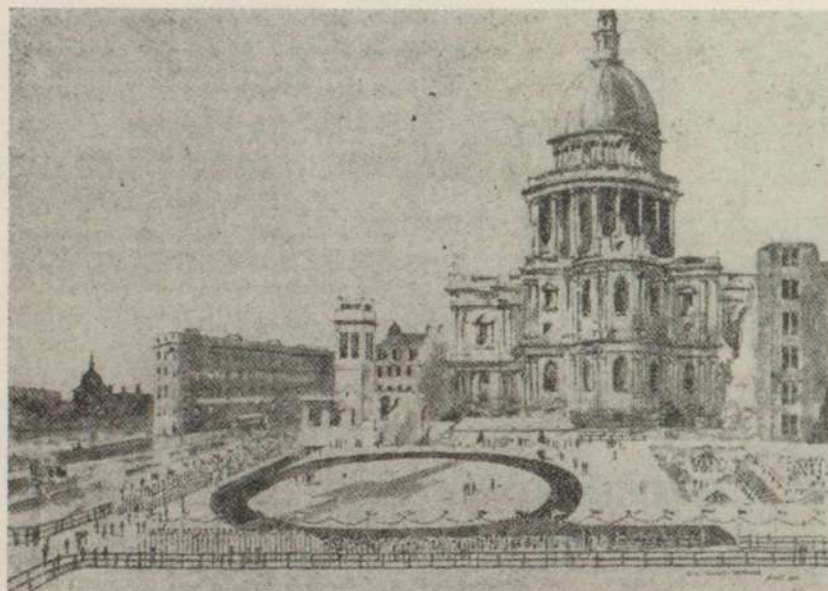

Maybe one day we'll have the perfect dog show, when that day comes, your professionals won't say that if Mr. Blank judges he can win for you because he's been his pal for years, your next door neighbour won't drop in to tell you, five days before the show, what's going Best in Show, and all you'll have to do to get it yourself is to have the best dog, just in case that day doesn't come the easy way, it might be a good idea for those of us who really care to try for a steady improvement, nothing is so good that it couldn't be better, if it was there'd be no fun breeding dogs.

Bill Carson had another good letter in "The Voice of the People" last month, anytime he dips his pen in the ink he has something worth reading, we'd like to quote one paragraph:

"Let us keep our American type Cocker a true sporting dog, which means a better, stronger and harder dog. It will go far in eliminating a lot of the deformities brought on by fads and fadists which are so often seen at our bench shows, it will also have the effect of winning back many lost exhibitors."

## What Is Faking?

I would like to point out an inequality that exists in our dog show rules.

Why should it be show rules to use colored chalk on a colored terrier any more than to use white chalk on a white terrier? Mind you, I have never used colored chalk on my dogs, but have seen it used on dogs at shows. If white terrier breeders use it to CLEAN their

breeds, is it to be assumed that all white terriers at shows are DIRTY? Certainly if the dogs are clean they do not need gobs of chalk on them in the ring, and who would take a dirty dog to a show? If they are clean, then the chalk must be used to cover up a poor coat or improve its color (and what else do the users of colored chalk use it for?) Furthermore, if so used it is just as much faking as the colored chalk.

I wonder if I took a Welsh terrier into the ring full of white chalk, would the judge disqualify it? White chalk is O.K. on one breed, so it should be O.K. on the rest. I certainly would be altering the color of my dog, so why can not it be said of the others. Colored chalk on a white dog would be faking, for it would be altering the dog's color. On a colored dog it would be improving the color, as the white chalk does the white dog, but the rules say it is faking.

I am not putting up any squawk because I cannot win over the white dogs, for if I can breed or buy a good enough dog I can win my share of the prizes. Winning or losing makes little difference to me, and when I have progressed to the point that I feel I really know a good one, and we have this war won, I shall take enough time off to go after said prizes. I do like to show and meet the folks there, and if I have a dog worthy of winning, don't go away angry because I get a best of breed or a group.

Wishing you every success and assuring you that I will do my little bit to help out the dog game whenever possible.

### Is Dog Judging Scientific or Pseudo Scientific?

Dear Editor:

I have been interested in the letters

appearing in your magazine concerning poor judging. I am not at all disturbed about the grouse, but I do think it is too bad that a novice like Mr. Thomas F. Argue should swallow Dr. Shute's and Mr. Fingard's contributions whole.

I started my career in the dog game by showing the family pet—a French Bulldog—at the age of twelve and going Winners Dog. The judge was Mr. Enno Meyer and he had certainly never heard of me or my dog. Competing against me was a string of Frenchies from a kennel; but it just so happened that my dog had come from a good kennel, too, and had developed unusually well.

For the past year or two, I have worked as kennel maid and assistant handler for various kennels and for one prominent handler. I have occasionally seen my employers win over dogs which were just about as good as what we were showing, and have felt that the prominence of the exhibitor had some weight. However, this has only happened when the choice was very near fifty-fifty. Most of the time, the placements seemed fair and we went down plenty of times.

I would say that a novice cannot be stopped if he has a really good dog and knows how to put it in shape. One thing the novice, with a few dogs, has time for, is proper ring training. May I point out the astounding success of the Pocono Kennels of Shetland Sheepdogs, owned by Miss Betty Whelan, in Pennsylvania? Miss Whelan certainly started as an amateur with a few pets and has developed heaven knows how many champions and obedience dogs. The point is she knew dogs and could see their faults as well as their virtues, so that she was able to improve her stock by correct breeding year after year. She also attracted considerable attention in the ring by her expert training. The tremendous applause which has greeted her every year in the Garden when her team of four Shelties has gone best-in-show, three times in a row, attests to the popularity of the novice who becomes a champion, herself.

Of course, it is only sensible to watch judges and learn which ones prefer your type of stock. It would be foolish to show a heavy, working type of English Setter under a judge who obviously prefers a lighter, more showy type. My present employer breeds Afghans and I have noticed a disparity of type in this breed. All-rounders, who do not know the breed well, are inclined to put up a heavy-headed, coarse dog over one of better type who may be on the over-refined side. You can't expect an all-rounder to know every breed on the books. In some breeds, he can judge only for general conformation and soundness. It is perfectly true that he may put up a dog who has gained world renown because he knows him by sight, and for no other reason. But after all, the dog would not have gained world renown if he weren't pretty good.

My name won't be known to more than two or three readers, and I am strictly a novice. My function has been mainly to exercise and feed the dogs which were shown by others in the ring. Sometimes it has even been my function to point out to a grouching employer that from my more objective

point of view, he really didn't have the best dog in the ring, that day!

And I still think the dog game is tops.

### What Is Wrong With Dog Shows

Dear Editor:

I have read with interest the various Letters to the Editor in the past issues, particularly the references to abuses, etc., at dog shows. These "airings" appear to me sound and what we need to inspire clean, honest dog shows, and while constructive criticism is necessary in order to bring this about I do feel however that no such criticism should be directed against a particular dog with the resulting discredit against it unless accompanied by unquestionable proof of facts stated.

It is with a spirit of friendly rebuttal that I would like this answer be made to part of my friend, Doctor Wilfrid E. Shute's letter in the July issue, since there is obvious criticism of my dog, the personal aspect of which I cannot ignore.

Being unable to attend the show in question, it was necessary to engage the services of a handler, one whose ability is rated among the highest and needs no mention. It was the showmanship exhibited by the dog upon which Dr. Shute based his critical remarks. It was called to my attention later by a number of people that the dog did jump after the liver held before him and was off his feet most of the time. This was due to the dog being new to the handler who really placed himself at a disadvantage showing a dog entirely new to him. Since Dr. Shute infers that due to lack of showmanship in both my dog and the one other dog referred to, his dog should have won, would it not appear then that among other things my dog should have won the following show if showmanship was any part of a basis for judging? It will have to be admitted that the dog showed reasonably well as did all the dogs at this latter show.

While true that a dog should "show" in the ring as well as stand for examination, otherwise how could the judge go over the dog and see his faults or virtues, I daresay that in the instance referred to my dog stood for examination, which he did at the following show, and has never failed to do since I have shown him.

This brings to mind an interesting fact in seven shows, five of them successive one after the other my dog defeated another one five times. In the last four shows, the first of which gave my dog defeat by the other one, then next day the decision reversed and next time my dog again won, later to be defeated by the same dog and at no time until now, has showmanship ever been mentioned. Of the five judges who saw fit to put my dog over the other one, two were specialty judges. This indicates among other things that different people make different observations, have different interpretations and further, that no dog is so good but what he can be beaten.

To quote from Dr. Shute's letter, "moreover, the first dog showed all the time, one of the MAJOR FAULTS of the breed". What are these major faults? Before me for reference is the latest standard for the breed as adopted



and approved by the American K.C., March 10, 1942, which lists the major faults as follows: UNDERSIZED OR OVERSIZED, SHYNESS OR VICIOUSNESS, ANY MISSING FANGS, INCISORS, MOLARS, TWO OR MORE PREMOLARS, UNDERSHOT OR OVERSHOT EXCEEDING 1/4 INCH, POSITION OF WITHERS LOWER THAN THAT OF CROUP, FRENCH FRONT OR BOWLEGGED FRONT. Dr. Shute must agree that my dog has not one of the above faults listed as major and evidencing degeneration of the breed. To what then does he refer?

I recently learned that I was faulting the dog picking him up from underneath to place him, which gave him a roached appearance, while not classed as a major fault, yet is undesirable and it is this to which I assume Dr. Shute refers. Having been at the next show and observing the dog in the ring, it was noted that in order to keep him on his feet and not up in the air after liver, the handler had to keep shoving him back with his knee, which naturally caused curvature of the back and I believe would be true of any dog. If a dog is shoved backwards he will have to hump up whether on his hind feet alone at the time or not. A dog that has a roached back will not only have a curvature of the spine but, in addition, will have a high tuckup, giving the greyhound appearance; neither of the above can be said of my dog.

With this in mind, we will again refer to the outline drawn for the supposed perfect doberman as set up for the standard. First, we take the skeleton structure of the back starting from the shoulder blade, there is a downward slope into a slight recession in backbone then a rising upward curve which finally straightens to the hip bone than down into the tail placement. Second, from the general outline drawn for body conformation we DO NOT see a perfectly straight line down in a pronounced slope from withers to croup, there being a slight rise in backline just preceding the croup.

It may be true that proof of quality lies in the Ch. title, but is not true that quality is proven equally well or better in the kind of competition met and overcome as well as the number of dogs defeated in obtaining ch. points whether said dog may have gone straight on to the title or have taken the knocks of an uphill knock down, drag out fight against any and all comers?

From the inferences in his letter, it would appear Dr. Shute was plugging his own dog or dogs at the expense of both my dog and the gentleman owning the other one referred to. On the other hand, however, I am neither trying to discredit his letter, anyone's dog or to enter into a frivolous controversy over whose dog or what dog is good, bad or medium, but am merely defending my dog as I am sure he would for me, if needed. My dog needs no plugging, as his outstanding record of honest wins on merit alone is sufficient proof of his excellent quality. His intelligence is more than proven by his recent average of 92.5 per cent for his three qualifying scores to qualify for the C.D. title, even though trained and shown by myself, the first dog I have ever shown or trained for obedience. His scores are 95.5 per cent, 87 per cent, and 95 per cent, finishing each time in large entries the first two taking third place and last

with second high score in an exceptionally large obedience class.

I am quite in agreement with Dr. Shute or anyone else trying to promote clean, honest judging and will assist any way possible, as we all know the human element has permitted politics to inject its influence in some of the present shows, both here, and in, no doubt, Canada. It is with great pride that I can honestly say, however, that Jackie and I have started from scratch and are way up the ladder, meeting any and all competition on our own with no aspirations but to continue fighting, therefore we owe no one anything and if we had never seen a ribbon we have something not measured in points, ribbons, dollars or cents, that is, true companionship, love and devotion. So you see, we don't have to care if we had never seen a dog show nor do we care who wins, it is a sure thing we will give them a run for their money at any show and always come back fighting.

### Are Lotteries for Dogs in the Best Interests of the Dog Game?

Dear Editor:

Members of the C.K.C. Inc., and fanciers in general across Canada have recently been asked to dispose of books of lottery tickets in spite of the fact that lotteries, sweepstakes, etc., are illegal. That is one unpleasant aspect, the other and more deplorable to my mind, as a member of the C.K.C. Inc., and as a breeder of pure-bred dogs since 1928, is the fact that the prizes are "Man's Best Friend".

I wonder if the sponsors of these lotteries stop to consider that in nine cases out of ten the person who pays a few cents for the lucky ticket and therefore for the prize puts exactly that value on the dog. It is human nature to value that for which a price is paid and to consider lightly easily gotten gains.

Why should we members of the C.K.C. Inc., be called upon thus to depreciate our fancy that many of us have spent years and much talent and money to further? I do not consider this method of disposing of surplus stock to be in the best interests of the dog game and certainly not in the best interests of the dog. It is hard to imagine any breeder who has the welfare of his dogs or of his breed at heart allowing one of his puppies to be disposed by this means—but perhaps that is the distinction between a fancier and a dog huxter!

In conclusion, I might add that in this often maligned metropolis the C.S.P.C.A. will not allow such raffies in aid of their funds for humane reasons and yet we C.K.C. Inc., members, breeders and fanciers throughout the Dominion are being asked from time to time to support lotteries in which "man's best friend" is the PRIZE for a few paltry cents. At times the sponsors agree to purchase the prize for a stipulated sum in case the lucky ticket is held by an unappreciative person but alas it is not always thus!

### "Shows and Judges"

Dear Editor:

I have been reading with considerable

interest the letters regarding Shows and Judges and I welcome the opportunity to express some of the views of an exhibitor and breeder.

With reference to the judges. So few of them have the courage of their convictions and when asked a reason for their placements evade the issue by such replies as: "Oh, I forget now, I will look it up in my book and let you know later the reason for such and such placement."

How many judges ever give advice, encouragement and help to the novice exhibitor. One of the finest and most capable of all rounders always had a kind word for the exhibitor, told him or her the faults and good points of the dog, gave advice and help, but when judging in U.S.A. was severely censored and temporarily suspended by the Kennel Club for daring to publish an adverse criticism on a dog. Why cannot we in U.S.A. and Canada be better sports and welcome the criticisms good or bad of the judges and why cannot the remarks be published with the show results the same as they are in England?

Why are exhibitors in Canada allowed to speak to the judges before the judging commences, and why are they allowed to invite and take the judges out to lunch and dinner, etc.? This creates a bad impression and bad feeling.

Why cannot judges see past the dog's head in 99 per cent of the cases? Surely most judges seem to forget entirely the particular use to which a dog is or was intended. How many times have I seen a Newfoundland with a beautiful head but terribly cow hocked, unsound, etc., put up over a really sound, well-balanced dog with a less beautiful head. What encouragement has a breeder of this breed or any other to import sound good dogs only to see them put down to inferior ones which never, never in this world could pull a load or do the work nature intended them to do, or to have a judge put up a female of much inferior quality that was never shown, except so heavy in whelp, that the poor creature ought not in the first place to have been allowed on the bench at all, and could not be judged in this condition.

By all means let us have judges that know the breeds and are not afraid to state their reasons for their placements and stick by their decisions, and let us have judges who can and will remember the use of a dog, and above all, judges who are allowed to give help, encouragement and advice to the breeders. Last but not least, let us have exhibitors that are better sports than the average exhibitor.

When we see show reports, let us have them more useful and interesting by having remarks made on the dog's placements. Really, we begin to wonder do the judges ever write up the show reports books or are these books merely a farce?

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## VALUABLE HINTS TO DOG OWNERS

The following lines are reprinted from the *Police Dog Gazette*, one of the funniest pieces of doggy literature ever published in the U.S.A. The magazine was a burlesque on the breeding and showing of dogs with special application to German Shepherds and we acknowledge our gratitude to the Editor for allowing us to print excerpts:

### Training Your Dog

"When one of our advertisers inveigles you into buying your first puppy, you will determine at once to make the little punk the most obedient dog in the world. This feverish obsession will probably last at least a week, so you may as well pick up a few pointers and do the smallest possible amount of damage.

"First, remember that Pleece Dogs are smart. It has been proven that the breed's lowest I.Q. is equal to that of the average owner and that even this is damning it with faint praise since the test dog was fourteen years old and had been hit on the head by two baseballs and a trolley car. At any rate, your pup is smart, so don't cuddle him with such nauseating bon-bons as 'itsy, bitsy, snooky-wooky whoozle toots! Willums win allum pwizes for mama-kins?' Such drivel will soon convince your house pet that you are slightly balmy and he will never take you seriously again. Obviously, this will react unfavorably on your vanity in the presence of company.

"Since cleanliness is next to godliness and to avoid having your feet fly out from under you when you come in late, little Bolivar should first be housebroken. This can be accomplished by lifting him by the tail and swinging his nose over the spot, beating the hell out of him, or inserting a cork. Use your own discrimination, but by no means combine suggestions one and three.

"Bolivar, now called Pumpernickle Constipated Hofbrau for short, will soon discover that your food is tastier than his and will suddenly appear in your lap during dinner. This is all right for you, who love him, but what of Bolly? Suppose he chokes on an upper plate while trying to snatch a half-chewed morsel from the parson? To avoid this, rent a bitch in season whenever you entertain.

"In training for the coveted F.D. (Futility Dog) title, nothing is more important than a strong scent. Smell memory identifies your dog with any judge, so never bathe the little stinker! That you will only be ruining his

chances is well proved by the results of the annual tracking contest on the rolling acres of the Hennerly Backhouse Estate, where Mr. Yosef Bibber, the judge, inadvertently gave first prize to an Aberdeen Angus calf.

"In conclusion, may we add that dog and master enjoy training only if the proper understanding exists between them. Since you can't fathom Bolivar's philosophy, and he won't voluntarily bother with yours, it doesn't sound like much fun. We recommend, therefore, that you let Pleece Dogs be Pleece Dogs and allow Bolly to snarl and snap at everyone, a trick he will pick up easily after watching you at the shows."

### How to Influence Judges

"Anyone who lays three dollars on the line to enter his expensive mistake in the Novice Class has outlandish hopes of taking Best of Breed, Best of Group and Best of Post Mortems after the show. Obviously, to accomplish this, the poor dope can hardly rely on the merits of his dog, which are doubtful, nor upon the intelligence of the judge, which is a myth. Even he knows in advance that the Committee selected a particular stooge to keep the trophies in the Club, to say nothing of his having heard, via the grape-vine, that two large competitors have been entertaining the Big Boy lavishly since his appointment and that in any event, the dear soul takes his instructions from his wife, who would like to know the Right People.

"How, then, can the sucker save his bad investment? Several listed methods suggest themselves.

"The first of these is simple. As you pass the judge, while being careful to keep your eyes on your dog, hiss impatiently, 'Come on, Pepper, son of Debit, grandson of Hutz out of Stella.'

"It goes without saying that you must always lead the line around the ring. This is good psychology. It shows your manliness and athletic ability, and at the same time defies the judge to run fast enough to put anyone ahead of you. How you do it is immaterial, but try to keep clear of the law and avoid bloodshed.

"The relative merits of hogging the block or dropping a fifty-dollar bill as you stand for teeth inspection run neck

and neck. Your choice will be determined by your financial position. Naturally, if another dog is showing so well that you are hopelessly outclassed at the start, it is always permissible to kick his handler in the groin.

"If you have previously relied upon more intimate methods of judge-persuasion—possibly the night before the show, you have nothing to worry about (you hope). If, however, you feel that pyorrhea may have ruined your sex appeal, simply give your dog the command to attack, grab the silver plate and run, don't walk, to the nearest exit."

## ADVICE TO AMATEURS ON SHOWING A DOG

"I have a good dog and I want to show him. Will you please tell me how to proceed?" From time to time this question is put to me . . . but answering it is by no means easy!

Nothing appears more simple than the 'walking round' of a dog attached to a 'lead'—to run him up and down, to lead him forward when ordered to do so by the Judge. And yet many a budding champion has had its future nipped in the bud through the lack of 'ring craft' of its master or mistress. Just as an athlete must train and discipline himself in readiness for a sporting event, so also must the Show Dog be drilled prior to its appearance in the Ring if it is to do itself and its master justice.

The novice must remember that the business of the judge is to adjudicate upon the merits of the dogs as he then sees them. He cares nothing about the breeding, neither is he concerned with how the dog might have comported itself had the dog in front or behind not interfered at a critical moment! Conditions in the Ring are far from ideal at the best of times. It is quite impossible to anticipate the sudden antipathy which one dog will display to another and the effect on a dog's temperament resulting from the "argument"! Home training and discipline can easily be practised and will go far to acclimatize the novice dog more readily to carry out his part when in the Ring.

A few sticks or chairs, so placed as to indicate a fair-sized square, the dog on a lead—and if a second person is available to act the role of judge, so much the better—is all that is necessary. The position of the Judge must be visualized and on no occasion must the Exhibitor interpose his body between the dog and the Judge. Practise walking and trotting the dog round and about the Ring on the lead, always displaying him to the best possible advantage. Teach him to 'stand' well at the whispered word of command and to look alert—every nerve and muscle at concert pitch—at some inconspicuous sign from yourself. Dogs are wonderfully intelligent and the time spent in this way, providing always, of course, that the dog physically is a potential winner will mean the difference between a first and second prize or nothing.

The 'conditioning' and preparation of a dog for a Show is not an eleventh hour undertaking.

Regular feeding, exercising and grooming should be every day practices—no dog can be physically and mentally fit and balanced unless it has of the best all the year round. The majority of

Show Dogs are fed on dog biscuits, hound meal or terrier meal, coupled with an occasional feed of lean beef or mutton. Dog biscuits, besides being highly nourishing, provide excellent exercise for jaws and teeth, keeping them in the healthy condition essential to the well-being of every dog. A good feed is a mash made up of suitable household scraps to which has been added a handful or two of hound meal or terrier meal.

### MASCOT PUP OF CADETS BURIED WITH HONORS

## UNSELFISHNESS IN DOGS

By Kennel Specialist

Here is a god doggy story—the truth of which I can vouch for—and a moral!

Some friends of mine had two famous Great Danes — famous on account of their beauty and for the number of prizes they had won. At the beginning of their show career a great difficulty was experienced to bring them into condition, one being too thin and the other too fat. Either state was wrong in a breed that should be shown hard and fit, with plenty of good muscle. When they were placed under observation it was seen that at feeding time one, with rare unselfishness, allowed the other to eat most of his dog cakes or hound meal, whichever happened to be on the menu for the day. Thereafter, the greedy one was tied up in a corner, while the bowl of the other was placed at a respectable distance.

Still no improvement — one remained fat and the other thin. Again they were watched, and an explanation was forthcoming. As soon as the kennelman had left the yard after feeding them, the unselfish dog carried the bowl to his mate, and took it back when empty. It was only by separating them completely that they could be conditioned properly. To be quite frank, I should not like to say that such solicitude for another is any commoner among dogs than it is among — men, say, but occasionally one reads anecdotes that are touching in the extreme. In *Dogs You'd Like To Meet*, the author tells how on a bitter winter's night a female sought the hospitality of a kennel that was too small to hold two. The inmate vacated his home for her, and the six puppies arrived in safety. The dog that went outside perished of cold.

The story about the greedy dog has its lesson. Whether a dog is too thin or too fat, something is wrong either with the health or with the feeding. The sensible person adjusts the meals in accordance with the appearance of the animal. If you have more than one dog, feed each separately — a light meal in the morning, but a more substantial one at night. Do not break up the biscuits unless the dog's teeth are in such a state that they cannot do the work properly. They will not become diseased if they have had plenty of work to do from puppyhood. Of course, one could not give the large dog cakes to toys or puppies, but the small sizes, such as are manufactured specially for the little ones. Hound and terrier meals make a welcome change especially when mixed with soups, fish or meat and cooked green vegetables.

A little cod liver oil once a day will

effect wonders with a bad "doer", and it is a preventive of rickets in the young.

Private Elmer Moore of the Can. Inf. Bde., who is "somewhere" in England writes as follows:—

"After being discharged from the hospital for the second time, I took a nine-day leave in Wales, where they were holding a couple of Sanction Dog Shows.

"The hospitality and thoughtfulness of the people, the natural beauty of the country, (picturesque rolling hills and valleys) and the fact of again seeing dogs with breeding and class in the ring, has put me in the best of spirits again. [The italics are ours.—Ed.] I was simply overwhelmed with kindness.

"The largest classes in both shows were of the Terrier variety and justly so as Wales is

a country where Terriers are still used as the game little fellows were meant to be, i.e., hunting and killing rats and foxes.

"One of my most interesting experiences was seeing a five months' old Irish Terrier at work. She was killing rats like an old timer at the game. She was perfectly steady to the gun and would retrieve either feather or fur. A little poaching was necessary to see the bitch working under favorable circumstances but that is part of the game here and gives that little extra thrill to the sport.

"Going back to the shows. The first one was held at Meath, the proceeds going to the R.A.F. Benevolent Fund. Mrs. Winnie Barber judged the show of over 300 entries and did a grand job. The society can boast of a show committee with perfect timing. They worked as a team with every man right in there doing his particular job just as it should be done. The ladies assisted, by Mr Butler, served the lunch and a refreshing cup of tea and in spite of this evil called rationing the tea was really Tea with a capital T.

"An interesting side event of great financial importance was the raffle of a bottle of whisky, it increased the fund by £17 10s. Maybe you think the stuff isn't rationed here? F. Morgan, a future handler and judge, donated a fine piece of his own workmanship in the form of a model of a Spitfire. The Spitfire, two lemons, a kettle and a tea pot raised the R.A.F. fund another £6. Best in Show went to the Welsh Terrier, "Penhill Primrose", owned by Mr. A. E. Harris. Best opposite sex to the Wire Fox Terrier "Aman Game Cock", owned by Mr. J. F. Hitchings.

"The Blaenavon Show was of special interest to me in that the judge, Mr. Leo Wilson, gave a 'running commentary'.

"The running commentary is the subject of much controversy in this country but is, I think, here to stay and will soon be the recognized method for all show clubs.

"Mr. Wilson gave each dog its just dues and the show was a definite boost for the 'running commentary' method.

"Best in Show went to the Wire Terrier bitch, Ebbw Swell Rose; best opposite sex to a Dalmation, Turpins Shadow.

"I'll not bore you with opinions on the war situation, which at best can only be a wild guess, so will close wishing you continued success in keeping doggy interests alive."

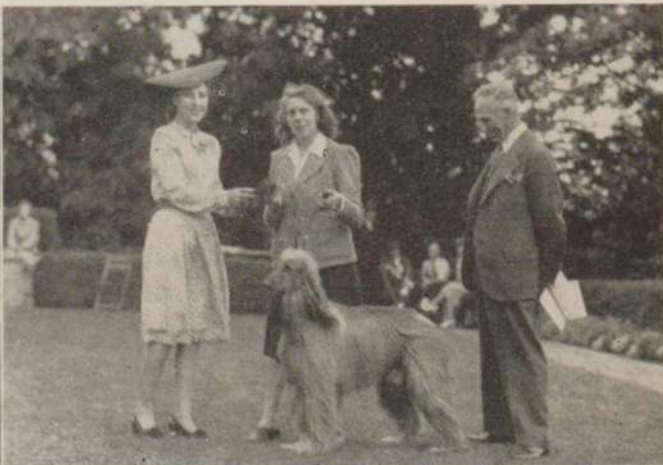

In Borzoi Mrs. Lorna Jackson's "Kad-veleroko'dolina", a beautiful five-year-old male, went Res. Winners Dog and offered Mme. Dubois' "Prince Peterhoff of Glen-

wild" his stiffest competition in the Open Dog class. Open Dog, Best of Winners and Best of Breed went to Mme. Fantechi Tavanti duBois' "Prince Peterhoff of Glenwild", whom I was told by the owner had that day finished the points for his international championship.

Pic of Chaman" though each had different sires. When the Hound Group was judged by Capt. H. Dudley-Waters, he liked the Afghan best, and gave it the Hound Group so it later competed for Best in Show.

In closing, I extend my thanks to the exhibitors for their fine support; and to the Peel County K.C. for the assignment. I hope to be invited to judge at the Canadian fixtures from time to time, and will continue to send up my entries from the States occasionally as conditions permit.
