The Native Breed

Our own lovely native breed, the red Irish Setter, had only a modest entry and breeders of this variety must arouse themselves to a greater activity if it is to hold its own in Ireland in post war years.

The terrier group had good entries in the more popular breeds, and only a passing reference is possible. The three native Irish breeds, the Kerry Blue, the red Irish Terrier, and the more recent addition the "soft-coated wheaten terrier" were all moderately good, but I can see a greater future popularity for the Kerry Blue than the other varieties. I do not expect that a representative of the "soft-coated wheaten terrier" has reached the shores of America, as the breed is only in its "infancy". This variety is about the size of the Kerry Blue, but in appearance somewhat "nondescript". Those fostering the "wheatens" are adamant in regard to trimming, not a hair must be touched that would create the impression of being "trimmed". But if it is to become popular as a terrier then it must bow to the inevitable in this respect.

Wire Fox Terriers and smooth were well up to the average at Irish Shows, with quite a lot of nice ones winning and near the top of their classes, and the same remark applies to Cairns and Scotties.

Fun at an Irish Show

So much for the Dogs. Of our Irish Shows it can truthfully be said that they are outings which everyone enjoys. There are many, naturally, who experience disappointment as well as winners who are jubilant over their successes. But with the losers congratulating the winners, and the latter standing drinks all round, the day is passed with much enjoyment. To the observant eye there are incidents full of good humor, and there are few who take things very seriously. There is indeed lots of fun to be had at an Irish Dog Show.

BREEDING PRINCIPLES

There are several essentials of breeding practice, common to all breeds of animals. Successful breeders of cattle, horses, sheep and dogs are successful because they understand these principles and apply them in their operations.

Perhaps the most important principle depends upon the familiar truism that "like begets like". One cannot produce good stock from poor parents. Any dog inherits the characteristics of his ancestors, some from his parents, much from his grandparents and to a lesser but still very important degree from great grandparents, etc. Gregor Mendel's breeding experiments demonstrated the pattern of this complicated inheritance and emphasized the truth of the statement that the chance of producing good dogs with the occasional one of champion calibre increases with the excellence not only of the parents, but also of all the dogs in all the generations behind them.

The Mendelian Theory explains the mechanisms of inheritance. With the many inheritable characteristics forming a complicated pattern obviously, in any mating, no two puppies will be alike. This variation works both for and against the breeder, since there is a chance that one or more dogs will pick up most of the best characteristics of the parents. If both parents are excellent in body conformation and of nearly the same bloodlines, their background of inheritable characteristics must be nearly the same, and so the possible variations are much less. A more uniform litter will result from such a mating.

In the background of all dogs certain characteristics are dominant, certain others recessive. In some dogs the frequency with which certain characteristics appear in their progeny is increased above the average expectation and when these characteristics are highly desirable, the dog whether male or female is of greatly increased worth. A very rare individual is dominant in most of the most desired characteristics of the breed and when mated to suitable partners does something exceptional for the breed. Such individuals were the Dobermans Lux v. Blankenburg, Troll v. Blankenburg, Ch. Favorite v. d. Koningsstad, etc., and more recently Sieger and Ch. Figaro v. Sigalsburg and Ch. Adonis of Pontchartrain. More recently still Ch. Bank v. d. Domstad and his sire, Sieger and Ch. Muck v. Brunia were such individuals.

The successful breeder of Doberman pinschers—it follows directly from the above—is he who chooses a top show type but thoroughly sound female with a minimum of important or serious faults and breeds her to the most dominant sire available of as nearly identical bloodlines as possible, provided that the sire's faults do not duplicate the dam's. In this way, provided that the dogs behind both parents have been uniformly good, an even litter of good pups has a better chance of arriving. Actually most successful kennels in America and Canada today were based on just this principle.

Mr. Daniel's "von Dorn" Kennels in British Columbia have produced more Canadian Champions than any other Canadian kennel—all stemming back to the beautifully bred bitch Ch. Beda of Plantation Grove. In America, and more recently, the success of the Glenghugl kennels of Mr. John Cholley has depended upon the successful mating of Ch. Blank v. d. Domstadt, dominant son of Sieger and Ch. Muck v. Brunia to Siegerin and Ch. Ossi v. Stahlhelm—dominant producing daughter of Sieger and Ch. Troll v. d. Englesburg—he also by Muck. Blank produced also two champions when bred to the Ch. Prince Clause daughter Roselein Rot v. d. Heide.

Line Breeding

The breeding together of dogs of the same strain, often of quite near relatives is called line-breeding and has produced most of the best dogs in every breed for the reason explained above, that the possible variations are more limited in such a breeding.

Eventually a closely-bred line may deteriorate and may produce dogs of smaller size and less fertility. Such dogs are often exceedingly valuable because they have concentrated in them the characteristics of their line to an

unusual degree. Such dogs are exceedingly valuable used in either of two ways. If such an individual is mated to a dog of another equally closely bred line the resulting progeny may inherit the desirable characteristics of both lines with marked increase in size and fertility. On the other hand, such an individual can be mated to a wholly unrelated dog and the product of the outcross when mated back to the original line may keep the size, fertility and vigor of the outcross with an intensification of the virtues of the original line.

It has been said that most of the good show animals have been produced by such dilute inbreeding. Cousin to cousin matings have been particularly successful when the common ancestor has been an exceptionally prepotent individual.

In contrast outcrossing of dogs may produce valuable and beautiful animals but since the possible variation in the resultant progeny is greatly increased, the usual result is an occasional flyer with the balance of average to poor quality.

The Chihuahua

The Oldest Breed of Record
Only 100% Native to the Americans

Up to then Mrs. Miller had always been associated with Scottish Deerhounds and the professional handlers made fun of her and said she would never dare show a Chihuahua. Then her daughter fell in love with the breed and she and a friend wanted to go in for it in a large way. So Mrs. Miller visited all kennels and bought the best dogs available and continued to show for the first mentioned breeder who insisted her dogs be shown in Miss Miller's name. Amongst those was "the biggest dog I ever knew", little Impy, about 1½ lbs.—Editor.

Let's play we are archaeologists, and in imagination do a bit of exploring into the pyramids. Oh! not in the ancient ones of Egypt. They are 2,000 years less ancient than those we are going to visit, and beside there are only five there.

We are going to take a flying visit to the land of old Mayan, Toltec and Aztec civilization, and nose around in dozens of pyramids, for we are looking for little figurines of Chihuahuas.

Yes, I promise you, we'll find them, for you see the Chihuahua was all mixed up with those ancient religions, and delegated to guide the souls of the faithful across the Seven Rivers to the Heights of Heaven.

Well, that dates the little fellows back 8,000 years, or 2,000 more than we can trace any other breed. If you want to be technical, the Chihuahua is of the Canis Familiaris Palustris, and seems to have left his mark on the dogs of our American Indians, and perhaps across the land-bridge that is now Behring Strait into Siberia, China and other lands.

We used to think, for some reasons, that the "new world" got all its dogs from the old, but more than one rare breed has shown up in identical form in far flung places of the globe.

It seems quite probable that only the tiniest of the Chihuahua tribe were particularly valued, even as is the case today. One who has ever seen a particular fine one of the littlest of these can easily understand. So much dog, so much personality, so much brains in such small compass.

However, personally I think the three to five-pound ones most satisfactory, presuming of course that they are typy.

The Mother of the Breed

The "mother" of Chihuahuas in the United States was Dorothy Atwood, who brought beautiful specimens from Mexico, and the descendants of these dogs are still making good in the show ring.

Contrary to popular opinion, the Chihuahua, all things being equal is a hardy dog, and adaptable to almost any climate. They love to play in the snow, and can stand cold, so long as they are exercising.

Too much inbreeding, of course, produces specimens that cannot stand up as any breed should, but the more intelligent breeders are working to produce sound dogs, whether "sleeve" specimens or larger. In all conscience a five-pound dog is

small, although in Chihuahuas the 2½ and 3 lbs. are often entirely sound.

One has a very wide choice of coloring in this charming breed, for they may be any color, or any combination of colors.

The most characteristic thing is a pair of glorious eyes, set in an apple-domed skull, with large, wide-flaring ears, set at a 45 degree angle, like the wings of an airplane.

The "Blues"

The "blues" are supposed to be particularly "lucky", and the "ruby eyed" ones are most interesting, for they shine like jewels in the dark.

In ancient days the Chihuahua was called "Techichi" or "Alco", and it is said that at the time of the Spanish Conquest of Mexico the Spaniards refused to believe that any thing so small could be a dog.

Carlotta, wife of the Emperor Maximilian of Mexico, was particularly fond of these toy dogs, and they say the palace was "over run" with them.

But valued as the Chihuahuas have been in the homes of the mighty, and in their role of mental and spiritual guide in ancient mythology, they have also run wild in the mountains, and fended for themselves with boldness and sagacity when only a few pounds larger than our "show specimens" of today.

Now the Chihuahua comes in two coats, smooth like that of a Fox Terrier, and long-haired, something like the Papillon, which he may have fathered, but it is amazing how many people confuse the Chihuahua with the Mexican Hairless, which of course as the name

implies is hairless. The breeds are totally different.

A Rare Jewel

This rare jewel of a dog has many attributes that endear him to the discriminating. His size enables one to carry him in a muff, inside a coat, in a small zipper bag, anywhere. He is discreetly silent. He can speak emphatically, but does so when speech is in order. For the deaf he makes a fine pair of ears, and will give the alarm when a door-bell or phone rings.

He is full of delightful, amusing antics, and can clown with the best of them. He gets plenty of exercise in one room, if need be. He can be taken on the stret, but doesn't need to be. He is dainty, cleanly, and of rare intelligence, giving his owner an unsurpassed measure of devotion.

When "Sweetie", the New England marvel in Obedience Trials, first made the highest rating in an all-breed show, he did a great thing, for his work commanded the respect of the entire dog world, who is all too wont to speak of the little dogs with very belittling remarks.

Recently a new Chihuahua Club was formed, with the hope of being an international organization, although at present only allowed the name of Interstate Chihuahua Club. It is anxious to get in touch with all interested in the breed, no matter in what country, and be helpful in every way.

No dog is more suited to wartime conditions, for space, grooming and feeding is a negligible quantity, and no breed can help more to keep up home morale for the Chihuahua has everything—except size, and that right now is an advantage. In fact an advantage at any time, if one wants it possible to take one's dog anywhere, any time.

Yes, the Chihuahua is everything one could ask for in a dog companion, and certainly he is the least trouble of any breed, and the "upkeep" is negligible.

Men who know the breed, those big enough to admit liking little things, are even more enthusiastic than women.

A dog is a dog, whether he weighs two pounds or two hundred pounds. He is just as loyal, just as affectionate, just as intelligent, just as companionable.

THE MEDICINE CUPBOARD

It seems advisable that anyone who makes any pretense at breeding, showing, keeping or boarding dogs, should have a medicine cupboard or chest. While it is obvious that the services of a veterinarian are at times quite necessary, it is also desirable and effectual to have a small cupboard set aside for medicine and medical supplies . . . keep the cupboard locked . . . the act of unlocking and opening gives pause and time to think and thus prevent the chance of a wrong drug being taken out in the hurry of an emergency.

On the top shelf keep the internal medicine: Brandy—small bottle filled with good brandy useful for heart exhaustion . . . Bismuth Powders . . . Subcarbonate—for gastric disturbance . . . Subgallate—for internal treatment of inflamed conditions of intestines; and externally for wounds, burns and moist

eczema . . . Subnitrate—for stomach disturbance . . . Bromide—bottle of, useful for hysteria . . . Condition Powders . . . Citrate of Magnesia—cooling to the blood, excellent in hot weather . . . Epsom Salts—purifies the blood, good for liver troubles . . . Liquid Paraffin—good for constipation and hysteria.

On the bottom shelf: Boracic Powders—useful for sores . . . Permanaganate Crystals—useful for washing wounds . . . disinfectant—bottle of . . . Cotton—a roll of high-grade cotton, useful for many things. . . Fountain Pen Fillers—several for eye droppers and ear droppers . . . clinical thermometer—one easy to read . . . Enema apparatus—one of the regular size and one of the baby size.

Medicines supplied by a vet should be carefully labelled, stating which dog they were used for and for what purpose. Often much of a medicine re-

mains after the dog has recovered, and it cannot be used again, but care must be taken to see that the medicine has not gone bad . . . different kennels and different breeds have their own particular needs, but the foregoing list will serve as a starter toward a medicine chest . . . additions, if desired, will be sent on request. Your favorite vet will inform you as to the dosage for your needs.

DOG-WORM CURE

Hydrogen peroxide, familiar as a bleaching agent, is said to dispose of all species of worm parasites in the intestinal tracts of dogs. The United States Bureau of Animal Industry, a division of the Department of Agriculture, will give veterinarians information on dosages and procedures.

SUGGESTED LAY OUT FOR BOARDING KENNEL

By ALLAN HORWOOD of Ottawa

The accompanying sketch is a suggested layout for a Boarding Kennel. The foundation walls and floor of the building are of concrete and the walls above of 2" x 4" studs 16" on centres.

Walls are covered on the outside with 7/8" drop siding, and the interior is sheathed, walls and ceiling, with gypsum board. Walls and ceiling are insulated with rockwool batts. Roof to have 2" x 6" rafters cover with 7/8" sheathing and wood shingles.

Each cage has an exit to an exercise run. These runs fan out from the building, to give greater area, and each run is enclosed by a solid board fence. The fence around the outside to have an additional height of three feet of wire mesh. The runs are connected by a series of gates, to allow the attendant access for keeping them in order.

The cages shown are for the accommodation of the smaller breeds; terriers, spaniels, etc., up to forty pounds weight. Each cage has a raised wood platform to form a bed, and this is removable for cleaning. The doors on the inside of the cages are full width, with wire meshed fronts, to give air circulation and heat in winter. The exterior doors to runs are double thick solid doors made to slide up, and controlled from the top of the work benches. The top of the cages may be covered with Masonite or other hard board which is readily kept clean.

There is ample cupboard space provided and storage for foods and fuel.

The sink and stove are centrally located, the sink being of the pedestal type and may be used for bathing the dogs as well as for dish washing.

A kennel of this kind of course requires considerable ground, and is intended for the outskirts of a city.

If business should warrant it, two kennels might be built to segregate the sexes.

IS YOUR DOG WELL-BEHAVED?

Not long since, when visiting a friend, I was enthusiastically welcomed by four young dogs. To this day the warmth of my reception is still evidenced by the traces of several tarry footmarks on a light suit.

I was unable to have a meal in peace, because every other minute two paws and a doggy muzzle were thrust in my lap. My hostess merely remarked, "Dogs are so clever—they always recognize those people who are fond of them."

Now, more correctly described, this kind of "cleverness" in any dog is a sign of bad training . . . the blame for which rests not on the animal but on its owner. With a little attention to a few essential details of elementary training, anyone can succeed in turning out dogs to be a pleasure rather than a plague to the family circle and their guests!

Every dog has a very definite sense of possession, so by way of making your dog or puppy feel at home, provide him with a comfortable basket in some place out of people's way. If he whines at first give him a biscuit to gnaw or play with—maybe he is hungry—and he will soon be quiet. At meal times especially he must be made to "stay put", for once a dog is allowed to wander round the

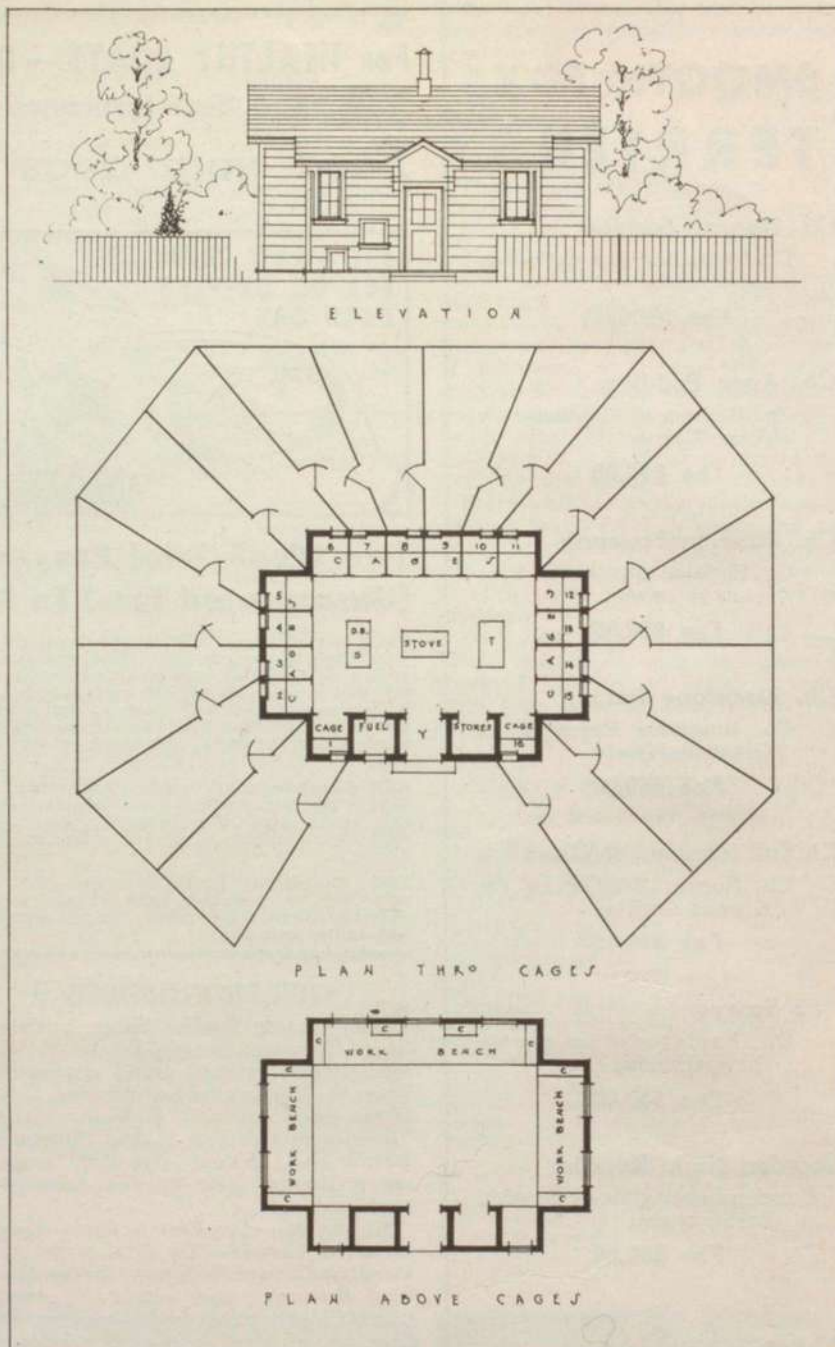


table cadging for food, the habit is exceedingly difficult to break. As a rule, it arises from one of two causes. Either the dog, being thoroughly spoilt, knows that he will get a succulent titbit for the asking, or he is really hungry because his meals are irregular or unsuitably prepared. Normally speaking, he will not have the inclination to beg unless trained to do so, if food and feeding has been correctly planned and chosen in the first place. Dog-owners cannot do better than follow the example set by Veterinary Surgeons, Exhibitors and those whose job it is to treat dogs as a business proposition. Two regular feeds per diem is their routine, one consisting of 'dry' biscuit and the other broken biscuit, served with hot gravy, soup or mixed with dinner table scraps. Dog or Puppy biscuit alone is a balanced diet . . . nothing better for sound physical growth and maintenance of health from puppyhood days and onwards.

If this common-sense diet is ignored, and the dog exists mainly on rich scraps

and sauces dished up haphazard, his health inevitably suffers, and he becomes, like a human dyspeptic, uncertain tempered and forgetful of his manners.

The trick (inherent in every puppy) of jumping up is easily cured. Push the pup down gently and hold him down for a few minutes, and when he next offends give him a tap on the nose sharp enough to make him sneeze. Do not bully or try to beat a dog into obedience, and never let an order go by default. Inconsistency is fatal—if you check a dog one minute and allow him latitude the next he will take every advantage. All dogs respond to firmness, but not to nagging. Remember, the canine brain cannot assimilate too many lessons at once, but if you show him by easy stages what you want done, and praise him or reward him with a titbit when he does it, he will come to take a pleasure in obedience. His affection will not be in any degree lessened because it is tempered by a wholesome respect for discipline.

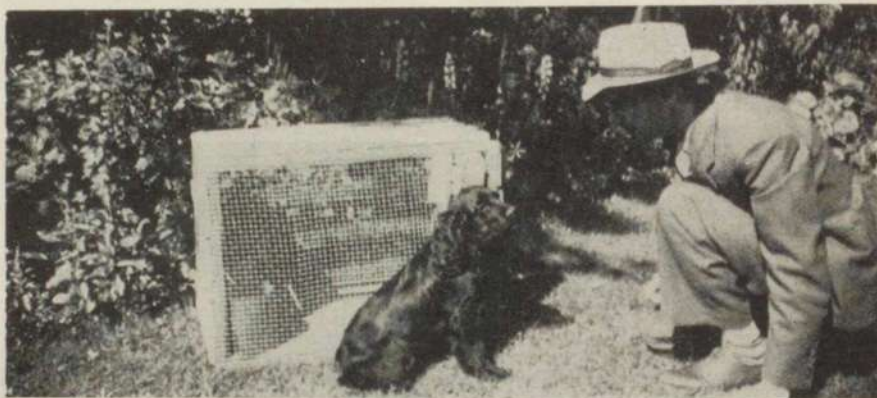
My notes this month will be in the form of a short report on the highlights of the show.

His wins were: Best Sporting at Halifax; Best Sporting and Best in Show at New Glasgow and Moncton; Best Sporting and second Best in Show at the 38th annual show of the N.B.K.C., and Best Sporting and Best in Show at the 39th annual of the N.B.K.C.

THE BOSTON TERRIER

Records are made to be broken, so Eddie Campbell, Philadelphia thought he would have a hand in the breaking of some when he brought the beautiful little Boston Terrier Kolles Miss Tiny Tip to the Maritime Show Circuit. She is owned by Mr. and Mrs. Harvey C. Kolstedt, Monee, Ill. She is a little masterpiece and obeyed every wish of her handler.

Here is her record-breaking performance as told to me by her handler, Eddie Campbell: It is the first time a Boston Terrier has won two Best in Show awards and five Best Non-Sporting awards in eight days. This record is not for the Maritime Circuit only, Campbell stated, but for the breed in its fifty years of existence. She also made

her ch. in less time than any Boston Terrier has ever done. Her wins on the Maritime Circuit were: Best Non-Sporting and Best in Show at Halifax; Best Non-Sporting and Reserve Best in Show at Moncton; Best Non-Sporting and Best in Show at the 38th annual of the N.B.K.C. at Saint John and Best Non-Sporting at the 39th annual of the N.B.K.C. at Saint John.

THE KERRY BLUE TERRIER

Four out of five judges can't be wrong and their decisions for the beautiful Kerry Blue Kenmare Commander in the Canadian-bred class have made a record for the breed in the Maritimes. Owned by F. C. Spiker and shown by his daughter, Miss Beth Spiker, he was a perfect showman and was the best behaved Terrier one would want to see. The lovely handler and gorgeous Kerry made a pretty picture as they were always trying for the top award. They did not make the top, but came very near twice and it was a close run that they gave the Boston Terrier at Halifax and the Pointer at Saint John.

History was made for the breed down east and perhaps in Canada as a Kerry Blue was the winner of the Best Canadian-bred award at all five shows on the Maritime Circuit. Four went to Kenmare Commander and one went to Phoric of Kilberry, owned by Mrs. T. H. McGuire of Hamilton. The five awards went to Hamilton as the Spiker's are also from there, and this makes the first time that dogs from Upper Canada have captured all the awards for the Best Canadian-bred on the Maritime Circuit.

Kenmare Commanders wins were: Best Terrier, Best Canadian-bred and reserve Best in Show at Halifax; Best Terrier and Best Canadian-bred at New Glasgow; Best Kerry and Best Canadian-bred at Moncton, and Best Terrier and Best Canadian-bred at the 39th annual show of the N.B.K.C. at Saint John.

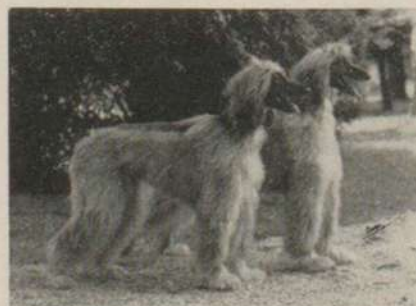

Information Wanted About Kelpies

Dear Editor:

Could you furnish me with a list of reliable breeders from whom I might obtain a good specimen of an Australian Keltie (or Kelpie) or an Australian Sheep Dog or an Australian Cattle Dog. As I understand it these are three separate breeds and are distinct breeds, although they are all working dogs of the herding type. I would also like a fairly complete and detailed description of the breed.

We have much pleasure in complying with our reader's request and publish a picture of an Australian Kelpie. We do not know of any breeders in Canada but understand a Kelpie Club was formed a year or two ago in the States with Mr. Charles H. Stolz, of Spokane, Wash., who has been raising the breed for the past 20 years, as president. An effort was made to get the breed included in the A. K. C. stud book. Many authorities on the Sheepdog are of the opinion that the Kelpie is "the finest Sheepdog in the world". According to the new standard male dogs should be 19 to 22 inches at the shoulder, females 18 to 22 inches and the weight of males from 40 to 50 lbs. and the females 35 to 40 lbs.

Colours permitted are blue mottled with black spots for the body color with the blue shade that varies from a sky blue to a deep Maltese. White markings are to be found on the legs, chest, collar, feet and tip of tail and also the white blaze on the face is common and considered attractive. Any white spots mixed throughout the body color is a disqualification, however, tan snadings on the legs and cheeks are permissible.

Sables, blues or blacks with sable body markings, other than those mentioned are not registrable colors. Blacks should be solid color, or blended with blue, but never sable, other than the slight markings on legs and cheeks. The white markings allowed and forbidden have already been mentioned.

The general characteristics of the Kelpie is a quick active dog, powerful and strong, lithe but not streamlined like the Collie or Borzoi. He is truly a worker, and, therefore, cannot be slow or clumsy and as the sponsors of the breed claim must "turn around on a dime". Like the Scottish Sheepdog which they resemble to a great extent, the Kelpie makes an excellent pet, is a good watch dog, is faithful and loyal to his master and mistress and docile with children. He is easily acclimatized to all kinds of temperatures and because of his hardy and rugged body development can withstand the heat as well as the cold.

Because of his protective instincts he loves companionship and likes to be with people, but will permit no transgressions by either human or animal intruders and marauders. He is quick to discern what is proper and improper in the protection of life and property. The official standard as adopted by the Kennel Control Council of Victoria, gives the following: "General appearance—The general appearance shall be that of a lithe, active, alert dog, capable of untiring work, showing great suppleness of limb, neither massive nor heavy, free from cloddiness and coarseness, showing great quality and at the same time free from any suggestion of weediness. It must not approach the greyhound type."

A friend of ours tells us he has seen the Kelpie work at the great sheep stations of Australia and also perform at the Sheepdog trials at the Royal Agricultural Shows in the great land of the Southern Cross and knows them to be all that their American enthusiasts claim on their behalf.—Act. Ed.

Should Officials Exhibit at Their Own Shows?

The officials of a show choose the judges and some of the judges want return engagements and it is only human nature to

lean towards their bread and butter, and so when the official's dogs are put up, often no doubt quite rightfully, it leaves a nasty feeling and invites criticism.

I was reading recently in the English paper, *Our Dogs*, a letter on this very subject, and noted that the Committee of a certain dog club passed a resolution on the suggestion of the Secretary who wrote:

I am glad to say that the committee passed the resolution unanimously. In order to exclude all self-interest in the running and management of the society's shows, the following resolution was passed: "That all officials of the society and members of the committee of the society shall in future be prohibited from entering, handling or showing any dog in any of the competing classes

scheduled at any of the society's shows; officials and members of the committee will be permitted only to exhibit or handle any dog in the classes scheduled exclusively for the officials and members of the committee." We intend to put on a few classes for the officials and committee members only, but any exhibitor who may care to enter in these classes may of course do so. As you well know, there is always a certain element who will issue unfair and unjust criticism regarding the supposed favour shown to officials of any show committee, and we believe that by taking this course of action we shall silence such criticism for all time. I am blessed now with a committee whom I know to be wholeheartedly for the society alone, with no self-interest in the running of the shows, and with a sincere desire to promote keenness and a square deal for the novice and the beginner. We believe that we have taken a step in the right direction, and that most of the judges will agree that this will be a good thing for the dog fancy generally.

Sex Determination

Dear Editor:

In your September issue there appears an article on "Sex Pre-Determination" which gives results favourable to the production of a preponderance of males by use of a combination of alkaline douches and late mating. This acid-alkali theory of producing females and males, respectively, had quite a run in the U.S. a few years ago, a New York daily publishing a running account of the experimental findings of a private research institute that conducted the experiments. Later, the experiments were published in book form. At least three Governmental institutions ran similar experiments and completely negated the results. The fad even spread into human medicine, the physicians, some serious, some not so serious, over the outcome, knew they would be right in half of the cases. They also knew the proud parents would quickly forget a mistake, unless perchance a girl intended for a boy should develop a Tom-boyish complex.

The facts regarding sex determination are well known but they have not as yet been controlled. In the higher animals 50 per cent of the millions of sperms present in the seminal fluid of the male are female determining, and the other 50 per cent male determining, owing to each containing what is known as an X or Y chromosome, respectively. Nature leaves to chance which type of sperm shall enter the egg and, therefore, determine the sex. While many theories have been propounded on sex control, the more recent and scientific ones have attempted, by use of various chemical and physical agents, to weaken or separate the male from the female determining sperms. In order to do this it is necessary to collect the semen artificially so that all the millions of sperms receive the treatment and then inseminate the treated semen artificially. The mere act of douching does not permit of all sperms coming into contact with the douching fluids.

Since sex cannot be controlled, how is it that the results of some experimenters are suggestive of such control? The answer is that there are usually several experimenters and as every breeder knows a run of males or females can be occasionally expected which naturally leads the lucky experimenter to assume that the treatment is doing the trick. Hence, the findings are proclaimed while the unlucky ones attribute their failures to faulty technique or other causes and one never hears from them. The writer has known several sex control experimenters, some of which have worked for years on the problem. Time has cured them all and rarely has one had the courage to publish his negative results. This does not mean that the problem is insolvable, but that our biological techniques are as yet too crude to separate the male and female determining sperms.

It is perhaps fortunate, judging by the use we have made of explosives, that the control of sex has not yet been discovered, though Nature has evolved an ingenious mechanism of ensuring a preponderance of females in some insects, for example, in the honey bee (the workers are undeveloped females) and plant lice. Some eugenicists shudder at the thought of sex control becoming a reality, since they are afraid that a large proportion of couples would prefer a preponderance of boys. This fear appears to be a hangover from earlier times when girls were a family liability. In these days of stenography, girls are often more of an asset than the aeroplane-model-building boy. Or is it that such welfare wishers of the human race have been influenced by the insistence of their better halves that this is a man's world and that the least they (the better halves) can do is to have fewer daughters and thus reduce the stringent competition which necessitates the maintenance of a svelte figure, painted nails, finger-waved hair, and innumerable hats in order to gain the favour of men. Be that as it may, it is well we cannot control sex.

Re Dead Rot in Judges

Dear Editor:

Recently I read an excellent article in an imported dog magazine which I feel sure would interest your readers as it dealt with the incompetence of some of the present day Dog Show judges.

I wish I were able to send you that article for publication. Unfortunately, I have mislaid the same but to the best of my memory here is the gist of it:

The article criticized the present method of selecting judges, which is not sound, as some of them are not fully competent to judge dogs of all breeds. It recommended that the governing bodies of Kennel Clubs should set up committees to examine and appoint competent judges, and at the same time work out some comprehensive scoring charts for dog shows, in order to do away with the undercurrent of dissatisfaction which is undoubtedly present.

It pointed out that in all forms of competitive sport, such as racing, boxing, football, swimming, etc., etc., prospective judges or referees, have to go before a governing body of officials and examining board, and prove by oral examination and practical demonstration that they are fully qualified and thoroughly experienced. Why should not this rule apply to Dog Shows.

The extra expense involved in this procedure, could be met by charging an examination fee and by making a small increase in entry fees for shows. Such action would improve the standard of judging to such an extent that it would help to increase entries, popularize dog shows and give confidence to the novice-exhibitor.

Dear Editor:

Replying to the letter which appeared in the September issue of *Dogs In Canada*, by W. M. Steggall. On reading this letter, the first feeling or impression was extreme pity. Pity for anyone who could express so much mistrust or lack of confidence in his fellow man, in such a short letter. Pity for anyone who could write such insinuations on ignorance of the facts.

Let us start at the beginning: The heading: (No. 1) "Are lotteries for dogs in the best interests of the dog game?"

The British War Victims' Fund might well be considered number one world cause, and any efforts or sacrifices which we or our hobbies might make should be worthy.

(No. 2) "C.K.C. members and fanciers across Canada have been asked to dispose of lottery tickets despite the fact that lotteries, sweepstakes, etc., are illegal."

On the front page of every bond cover recently issued, printed in plain English, is the permit number which was given and granted by the powers that be. Is there anything illegal or unpleasant about this?

(No. 3) "Another unpleasant aspect and more deplorable to my mind as a breeder of pure-bred dogs since 1928, is the fact that the prizes are 'Man's Best Friend'."

We don't think there is any dog, regardless of breed, that would not make any sacrifice possible for the comfort and happiness of his master or human beings in general. Is it possible that a person breeding pure-bred dogs since '28 has not read of the many cases in blitzed England where dogs, even when wounded, would not leave their masters, who were in the same boat? Have they not also read of the same people who were found in the rubble through the efforts of a dog?

(No. 4) "I wonder if the sponsors of these lotteries stop to consider that in nine cases out of ten, the person who pays a few cents for the lucky ticket and therefore for the prize, puts exactly that value on the dog. It is human nature to value that for which a price is paid and to consider lightly easily gotten gains."

If any person bought a ticket for 50c which entitled them to a beautiful specimen of Irish Terrier from Ireland or \$150 cash, or as an example which happened the other day, a man for \$1.00 bought a ticket which entitled him to a beautiful home worth \$17,000. Anyone who could possibly value either of these wins at the cost price of the ticket is absolutely void of human nature, and should not be at large.

(No. 5) "Why should we members of the C.K.C. be called upon thus to depreciate our fancy?"

Can any fancy be depreciated by helping such a worthy cause.

(No. 6) "I do not consider this method of disposing of surplus stock to be in the best interests of the dog game."

It is very difficult to appreciate the warped thoughts which are behind this statement. Can you imagine the top-notch breeders in Ireland, United States and Canada picking out their best specimens and paying transportation charges on them to Toronto in order to merely dispose of them?

We at Ballycliff have not been able to raise enough Irish Terriers in the past two years to fill the demand and I challenge W. M. Steggall to find surplus stocks of Irish Terriers anywhere in Canada.

(No. 7) And here is one where the cap fits me and I am prepared to wear it. I say this because we only know of one case where a man offered to buy back the dog which he so generously gave. Here is what Steggall has to say: (No. 7) "It is hard to imagine any breeder who has the welfare of his dogs or of his breed at heart allowing one of his puppies to be disposed of by this means—but perhaps that is the distinction between a fancier and a dog huxter."

We have offered to buy and have bought many of the dogs back and in connection with our recent campaign, we bought the Irish dog, paid the winner \$150 and, believe it or not, W. M. Steggall, we would not sell her to you for \$5,000. The number 6 dog on the program was also bought at \$150 and in addition to this a third party in Toronto was unable to keep one of the puppies won and we also bought it. So, if the title "dog huxter" is the most worthy title in your opinion for anyone doing this kind of work, particularly for the B.W.V.F., we are honoured to wear it and continue the work.

Part of the last sentence, and we think the meanest insinuation of all is as follows: "At times the sponsors agree to purchase the prize for a stipulated sum in case the lucky ticket is held by an unappreciative person, but, alas, it is not always thus."

There is not one speck of truth or foundation for such a miserable statement. At no time have we offered a dog or a choice of so much money was the money refused or not gladly given.

At any rate, we prefer to be on the active side rather than on the destructive side. Only a short time ago, one of the greatest men in the world suggested—if you cannot help, don't hinder, and one is safe in assuming the people who will make such statements or write such an article is seldom on the giving side. Their energy and efforts are overloaded with destruction.

During the last year dogs given from Ballycliff Kennels have raised two thousand dollars, this is not counting the recent campaign which raised three thousand, three hundred and thirty-three dollars.

Later on, we bought two dogs, also from the same breeder. I suppose the NOVICES would expect we got a pair of tramps. Well, we didn't. In four straight shows, those two dogs took ten first ribbons and three Reserve Winners.

Impartial Judging

Dear Editor:

I have been very interested in the many letters you have published on the subject of judging and would like to take this opportunity of congratulating you on the absolutely impartial way you have dealt with these—for and against. After all, the Canadian Kennel Club is a democratic body run by the people for the people—we elect the Directors to represent US—and not themselves, and it is very refreshing to find a paper run on such a broadminded policy as is *Dogs In Canada*—more power to it.

I was interested in the suggestion that dog judges should pass an examination—no doubt a good theory, but hardly practical. Who are to be the examiners? Surely not the Directors of the K.C.C., who would be absolutely impartial, but have they the knowledge themselves?

All I ask of any judge is that he shall look at and consider my dog. Provided he does this, I do not care where he places me in a class; but what I do object to is a judge who can only see the prominent exhibitors in a class and is not sure enough of himself to put a novice's dog up even though it may deserve it. I have seen cases where a novice, after being beaten, has sold his dog to a prominent exhibitor, and the same dog, shown under the same judge at another show has taken all before it. Condition and show preparation mean a lot, I know, but it cannot account for all this difference; and

we could do with more judges who are knowledgeable enough and impartial enough to see potentialities in dogs regardless of who is handling the exhibit.

I consider the ideal judge is one who would be willing to place a dog belonging to his worst enemy at the head of the class, over one owned by his best friend. I am sure amongst our Canadian judges we have people of such integrity and strength of character that they would do so, should the occasion arise.

Brevities from Britain

The spirit of Britain was exemplified by the show held under the shadow of St. Paul's Cathedral of which I gave a picture last month—when the entry totalled the prodigious number of 1,800! Think of that, and listen to this, some £4,000 will go to the various charities as a result of the generosity of dog-loving people of London and over a wide area. I hear that the show was quite a pre-war gathering in many respects and that re-unions abounded and a great deal of good was accomplished at the event and in so many ways.

At the Wodford Canine Soc. show, held in aid of the Dogs of Britain Red Cross Fund, the event was opened by the American Ambassador, Mrs. John G. Winant, who said:

"Although I am an American and have raised many dogs, I and other dog lovers in the States always look to England for our foundation stock.

"It was my good fortune to have visited many dog shows in England before the war and I look forward to the day when we shall meet again from all parts of the world in the British Isles where the great blood lines originated. I am sure that at the end of this war Britain and America will be the most forward-looking countries in the breeding of dogs, and good dogs depend more on British and American relationship than on any other single factor, because we are the two countries that are interested in fine dogs, so we work together."

Mrs. Winant recalled the story of an irate momma who dashed up to the gate-keeper at a big U.S. show and said, "Will you keep that dog quiet, stop him barking; my husband can't get no sleep?" and he replied courteously, "Which one, madam, there are two thousand of them in there?"

"This show," Mrs. Winant went on, "is held to support the appeal of the Red Cross Agriculture Fund, on which there is a great many demands, and it is imperative that they continue to raise large sums of money to continue the good work. So far the Duke of Gloucester has raised £22,000,000, which has been used for providing parcels for prisoners of war, and in many other ways to aid our fighting men in their hour of need.

"The parcels are carefully packed and are made up in such a way as to give a balanced diet. Cigarettes and tobacco are also sent, and as you know, wounded soldiers are well looked after. They receive special equipment and medicines. Also, it is to the Red Cross that we turn when soldiers are missing. These are but a few of the things the Red Cross does, and it is to help them with this work of mercy that we are all here today. I now declare the show open and wish you all the best of good fortune."

Mrs. Winant is a most charming woman and a true dog lover who keeps a big kennel of White West Highlands and Scotties at her New Hampshire home. The last time I met her was at Boston show and jokingly she said: "I'll be in London before you will, but I'll give your best wishes to them all over there."

Ten thousand ownerless dogs, completely out of control, are roaming the countryside, a National Farmers' Union official said recently.

So great has the menace of "killer dogs" become to Britain's meat supplies that the Union have submitted evidence to the Ministry of Agriculture of dam-

age done by the dogs, and have asked for powers to be given to farmers to shoot them on sight.

At present the law allows farmers to shoot only dogs actually seen to be worrying stock.

Evidence shows that one dog may destroy in one night the equivalent of three people's meat ration for a year.

One farmer near Birmingham has been forced to sell his stock because of the number of sheep he had killed by stray dogs.

In Durham alone 800 cases of sheep-worrying have been reported to the National Farmers' Union in twelve months. Here it is estimated, there are 1,000 ownerless dogs ranging the countryside.

Thousands of pounds of meat and countless young lambs are being lost to the nation each year as a result of the dogs' attacks.

THE PERSONALITY OF A DOG

Complete mutual understanding is the essence of a happy partnership between man and dog. From what is written, you may learn of your dog's physical needs, of the broad principles of training to obedience and good manners; but the psychology of the dog is only gauged from long continued observation of his behaviour. If you want to make a pal of him, you must take the trouble to get inside his personality. Some people lump all dogs into one category and leave it at that, forgetting that they are in one respect very like human beings. Much the same feelings of joy and sorrow, affection and dislike, which influence our own lives animate canine nature. Not only has every breed its own peculiar characteristics, but no two puppies, even of the same litter, are of precisely the same temperament or intelligence. So the development of the latter depends entirely on the care with which the former is studied, and the wise owner makes allowances for any individual peculiarities there may be.

Most people who are good with chil-

dren are equally so with dogs. This is perhaps because they know that the essential factors in the handling of all young things are patience and self-control. Your puppy's mind, like a child's, is a curious mixture of forgetfulness and definite reaction to certain impressions. He cannot take in too much at once. At first his lessons are a meaningless jumble of words. Only as his brain develops do your wishes take on a definite meaning and does his response to them become instinctive. So the first thing to do is to study your dog's natural inclinations and act accordingly. All dogs are endowed with a wealth of intuition. Once lose patience and your dog will know it. Thrash him without good and sufficient reason and you will break his spirit. If you are inconsistent, allowing him latitude one moment for a fault for which you punish him the next, he will lose respect for you. Your most valuable hold on him will be gone.

But no animal responds to firm, yet kindly treatment with so much generosity as a dog. He looks to his master for all his creature comforts, and his health, even his life, depends on the way in which these are satisfied.

No dog will refuse a plate of savoury meats swilling in rich sauce, or a lump of pastry or a slab of chocolate, but indulge him thus and you drive the first nail in his coffin. It has been said that the way to a dog's heart is through his stomach, but it is not even remotely true, for the dog whose stomach is clogged and whose brain is dulled from sloppy unwholesome feeding soon loses all sense of companionship and degenerates into an unhealthy, irritable specimen of premature old age. Therefore, feed your dog sensibly. He is by nature carnivorous, and the basis of his diet should be good meat dog biscuits in one form or another.

Have him with you as much as possible, for without your presence his daily run loses half its charm. Talk to him, encourage him, and study his moods, and you will cement a friendship which tends to the ideal.
