

WHY I'M GLAD I'M A COLLIE By Kerrin

Hello, Canadian friends! My mistress says she cannot say why she prefers a Collie, so I'll tell you why I'm glad I am one. Would like to give you a brief history of our breed and some of mine.

The origin of the Collie is not definitely known but it is supposed that he descended directly from the wild dog, or that he came across Europe and found Scotland and England so to his liking that he stayed there tending the sheep. These sheep most frequently raised had black faces and the Anglo-Saxon word for black was "coll". The sheep were known as "colley sheep" and as the prevailing color of the original dog now called "Collie" was black, it became known as the "colley dog" and tended the "colley sheep". The word was pronounced "coalie" and in Scotland is still pronounced that way.

The Collie was and is a hard worker, faithful and intelligent. He still has all these qualities and must be racily built, have good shoulders, legs and feet, also strong loins and quarters, so that he can travel, gallop or trot for hours without exhaustion. His head should be long, (blunt wedged shaped) to enable the dog more readily to nip the cattle or sheep. As he works by sight and sound, he should have small intelligent eyes, dark in color, and small semi-erect ears. A profuse coat is necessary to keep him warm in winter and cool in summer. There are four colors of Collies, tri (black, white and tan), sable and white (sable is brown) blue merle (greyish blue body coat, mottled with black) and white, (tri head, or sable, body spots are allowed but not over 20 per cent other color than white). No dog is more adaptable to exisiting conditions than the Collie. He is at home in a house and thoroughly enjoys himself in a small yard. All he asks is a reasonable chance to get a daily supply of fresh air, food and water and to be with those he loves. Most Collies of to-day are not farm dogs, but have learned to transfer their working habits to protecting and guarding their loved ones and their homes in the cities. Many heroic deeds are told of the Collie in life saving and courageous feats, and many today are in Dogs

My own origin is not so important, I had a nice mother and a nice father and was the usual fluffy, cuddly puppy, the only unusual thing about me was that I'm all white except my head which is sable. I lived the usual life of a puppy until my mistress took me into her home and then I really started a "dog's life". Coddled and spoiled and petted. That was swell until my folks decided I needed a mate. They got me

one, Thea Bride of Kerrin, and we proceeded to set up housekeeping. Our family came all at once, one day we were two and the next day twelve. This was a little bit too much for the house so it was decided to build a kennel to house us, as the folks couldn't part with any of the children.

The puppies were then trained, they weren't going to be the "spoiled brats" that I had been, so when they were six months old they were acting as veterans about a show and started on their careers. Out of this family we had two champions, I am very proud for I am the first white sire of any champion and I had two. Ch. Kerrinson Layle, my first born is the first and only white champion in the world, and his sister Avril, you may remember seeing in Canada, oh she is a beauty, won the group at Chatham a few years ago. She now is the proud possessor of fine titles, Int. Ch. Avril of Kerrin D. (Companion Dog) and I'm now the proud grandpa of her five new squirmy, crying babies, but they are

We went on from there, had many more children Thea and I, and they have made names for themselves too, too many for me to tell you all about Needless to say, however, that I'm still the boss of this ranch, I still stay in the house and let it be known that I resent all the others coming in, their place is not with me, but sometimes I have to stand it. I'm a good watch dog, yes sir; no one can get in our car when I'm alone in it, nor can any one come in the house until I know they are O.K., when they are, then I sit down and give my paw in welcome. We are not aggressive dogs for fighting, we are friendly with other dogs until they decide they want to fight and then we will, can and do, but most of the time we are peace loving, law-abiding dog citizens.

My mistress likes to get all the Kerrin families together, and now that I'm a great, great grandfather, you know how many there would be. The year of 1939 we had 37. She likes to have all of them shown too, remember a few years ago, there were 31 Kerrin Collies

in the Detroit show, and 16 of us in Chicago. Yes, it's nice being a Collie and getting to so many different cities to look over the other dogs.

Guess you know now, why I'm glad I'm a Collie and by this time guess my mistress knows why she likes the Collies too, she must for she is always writing and talking about us and interesting all she can in getting one of our breed. She says folks don't know the Collie well enough as city dogs, we love the city, the noise doesn't bother us. yards are big enough for we don't like to roam the country but to be close to our home all the time. When our folks come out and play with us that's the time we like to romp and run, otherwise stick right around under their feet. I'm like all proud papas and want to show you pictures of my children,

Identified by a photograph published in The Globe and Mail, Ordinary Mascot Lucky of the Royal Canadian Navy has been given a decent burial in United States soil after drowning in Lake Erie.

Lucky, a six-weeks-old Cocker Spaniel puppy, went overboard on an August night from the quarterdeck of H.M.C.S. Winnipeg, then on its maiden voyage from Port Arthur shipbuilding yards to the sea. Lucky just "packed up," as the sailors put it. He disappeared without trace, and he was listed as "missing at season and preserved lost."

Word that the body had been found and that Lucky
had been given a decent burial was received at Winnipeg by Mayor Garnet Coulter from D. Donaldson, a Detroit resident

Mr. Donaldson wrote that he found the limp body along the lakeshore several days after H.M.C.S. Winnipeg had passed down the lakes. He didn't know then that the puppy was a war casualty, but he found out later when he saw a picture of the mascot in *The Globe and Mail*.

Had he known a few days earlier, Mr. Donaldson said in his letter, he would have given the Cocker "full naval honors

Lucky, the pride of the ship's company, was a gift to the Winnipeg from George Kynoch, dog breeder and judge of Winnipeg, and he was worth \$50 if puppy love can be measured in monetary terms. But Mr. Kynoch took the tragedy in good part and immediately donated a half-brother to the sailors. He's called Luckier, and "he hasn't been seasick yet," according to a letter received from one of the officers, Lieut. J. E. DOG SHOW JUDGES By GEORGE F. FOLEY

In view of the many letters which have appeared recently in our columns about Canadian judges we think this article which is reproduced by courtesy of Popular Dogs will be of interest to our readers-Act. Editor.

In going back over forty years of dog shows, first as an exhibitor and then as a show superintendent, I am struck by the similarity between the complaints today and those heard around the shows at the turn of the century. While dog shows have changed considerably, while we are holding many more shows now, judging complaints are still "the same old stories." And if anything, they are more vociferous this season than ever before. You hear them whether you go to shows in the East, in the Midwest or in California.

It is true that some of these are justified; others are not. But aside from the initial aggravation, nothing of a concrete nature has been attempted to improve dog judging. Hundreds of compaints are accepted as a matter of course or as parts of show procedure. Yet, if we review the increases in the number of shows and the number of dogs exhibited during the past ten years and compare these figures with the efforts made to improve and clarify the judging system, it is obvious that our present methods are outmoded, that they lag far behind and that they could stand revision.

It is quite possible that some exhibitors do not want a true approximation of their dogs. Many, it would seem, are content, regardless of a judge's knowledge or lack of it. The temper of exhibitors is changing, however. More and more are asking for "better judges". We know this to be so. Some months ago Popular Dogs made a survey to find out if kennels were breeding as much this year as previously; if they had difficulties in procuring dog foods; if they planned to go to shows. No mention was made of judging, but from the replies, it would appear that good judging is a more paramount issue than breeding or feeding.

The American Kennel Club has been criticized for not offering a tangible course whereby an appreciable improvement would be made. I have been asked for a solution many times, and I feel that through the work at the training schools established by the Armed Forces for war dogs, we may be approaching the answer. Being a Director of Dogs For Defense and closely associated with the training of dogs for the Services, I have been astounded at the progress made in training thousands of men and dogs.

The establishment of schools, where men and women who would be judges might learn from authorities all phases of dog show judging is, I believe, the answer. Here fundamentals would be taught well; pupils would have to pass periodic examinations and from these schools would come the country's supply of judges for all dog shows.

The idea is not new. Unlike other plans, such as the one the German Shepherd Club of America tried for some seasons, this should be national in scope. It should be under the jurisdiction of the American Kennel Club, and its operation would automatically cancel the licenses of the more than two thousand judges who today carry A. K. C. judging permits. The plan would start from the beginning to build up a body of knowing amateurs and professionals qualified to pass on the country's show dogs.

You will note that I have used the phrase, "learn from authorities". "Who are the authorities?" you will ask. "Have we any?" Let us see. Might not the Board of Directors of the Kennel Club appoint a committee from all branches of the dog world to select these authorities? This committee to be made up as follows: two members of the Board of Directors; two members of the Professional Handlers Association; two professional judges; two dog show superintendents; two breeders. committee would not only establish methods of teaching, but it would also serve as a Board to guide permanently these judging academies.

The teachers or authorities selected

their standards might be improved and clarified.

If we are to have good judging, we must have a more widespread knowledge of standards. Judging should be done according to the standards and by comparison. I am of the opinion that scoring will never be a success. I recall that a Boston Terrier club asked ten well-known judges to score a dog at a meeting some time ago. The scores varied from eighty to a hundred and ten. You can score working ability, but in judging the scoring system does not

seem a particularly satisfactory one.

There is no profession or business that is entirely self-taught. The doctors, lawyers, accountants must study for years before they are capable of going out and performing well the duties of their professions. The boy who starts in business is not entrusted with important work at the outset. He must learn. At the present time there are very few

would be paid out of fees which students would be charged for the courses. Teachers would instruct, grade and suggest suitable judges to the American Kennel Club. The school might be established in various show centres New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Chicago, San Francisco, Cleve-land, St. Louis, Los Angeles. I men-tion these cities only as examples. To be a qualified dog show judge, it would be necessary for a man or woman, regardless of the length of time they had spent previously in judging dogs or where they had officiated, to be "graduated" from one of these schools.

Briefly, the curriculum might be as follows: 1. Fundamentals (obligatory to all). 2. Sporting Dogs. 3. Hounds. 4. Working Dogs. 5. Terriers. 6. Toys. 7. Non-Sporting. Those wishing to judge only one or two varieties would not be obligated to take the complete course, but would concentrate on the groups in which they were interested. Should they wish, at a later date, to take up more breeds, then it would be necessary to return to school for further instruction. The classes would be set for a certain day or evening; be of a specified period of duration and those not attending regularly would be dismissed.

In discussing the subject of judging we must also take into consideration the fact that the standards of many breeds, as they are now written, are ambiguous. In these schools, where the standards would form the basis of all teaching, the instructors would be in a position to suggest to breed specialty clubs how

judges who could answer such questions as: What constitutes general condition in the breed you are judging? Explain the conformation of the breed. What is the correct movement? Should an eight-months old exceptionally good puppy be penalized because it has not shown? There are many other questions, also, that might be asked; questions that judges should be able to answer easily, but which, under the present system, they are vague or evasive about, simply because they have never been taught by a competent authority.

I do not feel that these schools would still the talent for judging which is in-nate in a few. Rather, I believe, the curriculum would serve to make this talent more pronounced, to guide it in proper channels. By the same token there are many who will never make a good judge-"an eye for a dog" can't be taught-and these, a school could sift out quickly.

Our American judging system is ready for changes. We must be willing to accept inconveniences until we have established a workable method for schooling dog show judges.

of totally different types of ear. One can, in fact, tell almost any breed of dog by the shape of his ear alone.

Incidentally the dog does not always "hear" through his ears. The sensitive-ness of his body to vibrations conveyed through the ground or floor often tells him of the approach of a person or vehicle before it is within earshot. In this way some dogs that are completely deaf as far as their auditory organs are concerned sometimes convey to an observer the impression that their hearing must be normal—in fact this strange gift of "hearing" through their bodies often enables them to perform a watchdog's duties just as efficiently as a dog with normal hearing.

Some breeds, especially white-coated ones, are prone to deafness. The Bull Terrier was a notable example, but thanks to the determination of reputable breeders to refrain from breeding from deaf specimens the fault has been practically eliminated from the breed.

Deafness in dogs is, of course, not always congenital, but may be due to some aural disease or even merely to the accumulation of wax on the drum. This can be easily determined by a visit to a veterinary surgeon or canine clinic.



Brevities from Britain

By PHYLLIS ROBSON

A very important case on the subject of newspaper criticism has just been fought in the Law Courts in London. It appears two radio artists objected to a criticism in a letter in the Daily Telegraph on one of their broadcasts which was described as "an insult to British intelligence", and said "we must be a race of lunatics to permit such a waste of money'

They brought an action for libel against the paper. In giving his verdict for the newspaper, Lord Justice Scott said the comment in the letter represented the newspaper's honest opinion and made this pronouncement - "The more freedom newspapers have in criticism, the better for the welfare of

the public."

There was another very interesting aspect of the case inasmuch as the criticism appeared in a letter written to the editor and signed, "A. Winslow, The Vicarage, Wallington Road, Winchester" This address was later found to be fictitious. In giving judgment, Lord Justice Scott said, "I cannot accept the submission that there is a general rule of law making it the duty of every newspaper to verify the signature and address of a writer before publishing a letter. On public grounds it is desirable, as far as practicable, that a newspaper should do so. But to hold that the absence of such verification destroys the plea of fair comment would put too great a burden on newspapers. It would be a burden so deterrent in practice as very much to reduce the valuable contribution to public discussion of correspondence in the Press.

Lord Justice Scott's decision is of vital interest to newspaper owners and writers all over the British Empire.

I get three daily papers from England plus three Sunday papers so I keep well in touch with the other side. One of the dailies is The Sketch, London's best illustrated paper and it is interesting to note that though it is now cut down to only eight pages, every day the best part of a page is devoted to letters to the editor which are regarded as one of its most attractive features.

It was a triumph for journalism that in a court of law a judge upheld a newspaper's rights to criticize which is in accordance with British traditionsthe spirit of justice and freedom-for which we are all fighting for our very

existence these days.

EXPERT ADVICE By H. C. Peake

I've been raising dogs for at least a year, so I feel that I am perfectly qualified to give some of you older fellows a few tips. I know you'll appreciate it. That's one thing I like about dog breeders. They just love to have some young guy who's read all the books come along and give them the works on how to run their kennels.

Well, it's all perfectly simple. The first thing is to provide yourself with a good bitch. Some of the more timid breeders prefer to use the word female, but not me. I like that word bitch. It has a fine salty flavor, and you can roll it around your tongue in such a satisfying manner. Anyhow, as I was saying, provide yourself with a good bitch.

There are several ways to do this. Of course, if you have no imagination, you can go to another breeder and lay good money on the line, but that is not necessary. All you have to do is find the house where the female of your choice resides. Then go to the nearest butcher shop and get a pound of hamburger. I don't care how you get it. Buy it if you have to. It'll cost you a coupon or two if you're not smart, but think of the fun you'll have! Then stand in front of the house.

Pretty soon the door will open, and maybe one, maybe two bitches will come out. (But you're only interested in the one with the fur coat. It's summer, so they won't both be wearing them.) (a) knowingly and with intent to deceive, sign or present or cause or procure to be signed or presented to the recording officer of The Canadian Kennel Club or to the person in charge of the Canadian National Live Stock Records, any declaration or any application for registration or any transfer of ownership respecting any dog containink any material false statement or representation, or

(b) falsely hold out any certificate of reigstration as applying to a dog other than the one in respect of which it was

issued, or

(c) wilfully commits any act in contravention of the rules promulgated by The Canadian Kennel Club or Canadian National Live Stock Records, or

(d) as owner sells or contracts to sell a pure-bred dog without furnishing or agreeing as an integral part of the con-tract of sale to furnish the certificate of pedigree registration together with the duly recorded transfer of ownership thereof to the actual buyer.

Anyone convicted of any of these offences is liable to a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars and costs and not less than one hundred dollars and costs, and in default of payment to imprisonment for any term not exceeding two months.

BENCH CHAMPION IRISH SETTER WINS OPEN ALL AGE STAKE AT SASKATOON FIELD TRIALS

The newly formed field trial branch of the Saskatoon K.C., held its first fall field trial for Pointers and Setters, under Canadian K.C. rules, on September 5th and 6th. Ernie Howe, of Baldwinton, Sask., and Arthur Goddard of Saskatoon, being the official judges.

Very little harvesting had been done.
Many fields of grain being still uncut, making it necessary to run the dogs over grass-

covered courses, dotted with poplar and willow bluffs. Birds were quite plentiful on some courses, and very scarce on others; so that the luck of the draw played its part in some of the decisions. We missed the vast stretches of rolling prairie, carpeted with yellow stubble, over which Saskatchewan trials are usually run. We missed, too, the brilliant sunshine of the prairie, and the tang of the air in the fall; as showers of cold wind-driven rain beat down upon us at intervals, to be followed by bursts of sunshine. Judging was carried on through shower and sunshine, even lunch was eaten on the fly; a lady from the gallery very thoughtfully providing the judges with drumsticks of delicious cold chicken. One pause was made in the running of the Open All Age Stake, when a flock of about two hundred snow geese, or wavies, appeared from the Northwest. Judges, handlers, and gallery alike reined in their horses to watch them in flight as they winged their way Eastward, silhouetted against the dark, low-hanging clouds.

His main objective was to put this trial over in a big way, and the success of this, his initial venture, must have been very gratifying. A wrinkle appeared upon his brow, when Ernie Howe phoned to say he had run into a regular cloud-burst enroute, and would be late in arriving. It disappeared just as quickly, when that very versatile lady, Mrs. Pat. Randall, our C.K.C. director, yielded to persuasion, filled the vacant saddle, and very ably assisted the writer in judging the puppy, and shooting stakes which were scheduled as the first events on the program.

The secretary, Newton C. MacGregor, together with other members of the executive, co-operated whole heartedly with the president; all lovers of the pointing dogs, their ambittons for the future are to make this annual event second to none held in Western Canada.

THE RUNNING

The open all-age stake, with eleven entries, was won by Ch. Elmcroft Red Ace, Irish Setter dog, owned and handled by H. Dean, of Waldheim, Sask. Harry received many congratulations as he was presented with the large silver cup emblematic of his dogs splendid achievement. This big, handsome red dog, put down with the fleet-footed Pointer, Wascana Buddy, ran a splendid race. He appeared a bit slow to get going at the commencement of the heat, which was started in a downpour of rain, but improved fast as the rain ceased and he warmed to his work. His casts were made with purpose, taking in all the "birdy" spots. In the closing minutes he had two finds in quick succession on Hungarian partridge, which he handled in good style. Time was called soon after, however "Ace" wasn't through yet. Nellie's Queen, English Setter bitch, owned and handled by N. C. MacGregor, had put up an excellent performance, when running as a bye, earlier in the day. She was put down with "Ace" after the Irish Setter had been given a rest. In the overtime session, the stylish son of Ch. Sugan of Shunavon, and Ch. Elmcroft Molly; again proved his ability as a birdfinder by snapping into point on another bevey of "Huns".

Soon after this, as there appeared to be no more birds in the vicinity, the dogs were ordered up.

Mr. Dean's ambition is to breed and raise Irish Setters that can give a good account of themselves on the bench and in the field against all comers. Harry is only a young man yet, and we wish him every success in his worthy undertaking. "Queen", the sweet little lemon Belton Setter, was in there punching all the time. She had two finds the first time down, and proved steady as the gun was fired. She did not run as wide, and her points were less stylish than the first place dog; however, she was a worthy winner of second place. Third place went to Wascana Buddy, owned by A. C. Barbour, and handled by R. L. Orge. Buddy proved to be one of the widest ranging dogs seen in action at the trial. Running with the

Irish Setter, he was credited with one find. He came to point some distance to the rear of "Ace", on what appeared to be a perfect back, however, as Dean flushed a large covey of Hungarian partridge ahead of his Setter, a single prairie chicken arose from behind, and to the left of the latter. Buddy's head was turned directly in line with the spot from where the chicken flushed, so was therefore credited with the find.

THE DERBY

With thirteen dogs competing, this stake saw some of the best run, and most keenly contested races of the day, however, space forbids but a brief summary of the running. "Buster", a rangy liver and white Pointer, owned by Mrs. T. M. Guytar, and handled by Mr. Guytar, took first place. This dog had plenty of style and a fast, yet easy-going way of covering the ground. He showed plenty of bird sense; searched the likely places, and was bird-hunting at all times. Buster had two finds on priarie chicken, being very stylish on point, and handled them like a veteran. Just before being ordered up he backed his brace mate on a find of Hungarians, in the most approved manner. "Wascana Buddy", another liver and white Pointer took 2nd place. This dog ran a most heart-breaking race; making wide casts, taking in all the available country. Evidently this wasn't Buddy's day, as he failed to connect with birds. Given the opportunity this dog should go far. Both these dogs are sired by Rip Rap's Duke, and are products of the kennel of R. L. Orge. Another ownerhandled Pointer, J. H. Van Impe's Seaview Jerry, placed third. Johnny may well feel proud of this promising young bitch. She had one stop to flush on a lone Hun, that got up wild, and was really going places as the heat ended. To wim a place in such fast company was indeed an honor. The quality of the dogs in this stake was of a general high order.

This was followed by the presentation of handsome silver cups, and other valuable prizes to the winners, by Mr. D. C. "Donnie" Samson, president of the Saskatoon K.C. The members of the Field Trial Club greatly appreciated the generosity of Mr. Mendal, who supplied a number of first-class saddle horses. A final windup was held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Orge, whose kindness enabled all to join in bringing the trials to a most successful conclusion. Five a.m. to three a.m., what a day. Bedtime came at last,—yet even as I slept, I seemed to still hear the boys calling "POINT", while prairie chicken, and partridge continued to flush in all directions.

At the Thanksgiving Day Show at Toronto, there were many things of interest while meeting our grand neighbors and friends that worked so hard for the Boston Terrier and the show.

One can learn so much visiting with such youngsters as Mr. Jackson, Dr. Campbell, Mrs. Firman, and others that were present twenty-five years ago at the conception of the club, and studying the dogs brought in Strong resemblance was noticeable in puppies to older stock. Both having mostly the same faults. This would be corrected, if breeders would change bloodlines more often. In the males there were three puppies that showed a lot of promise. One, a real stud type sound, with no outstanding faults. The other two were more of the show type, which, with proper handling and training should make their presence felt in amy ring.

My winners male and my reserve were very close, with the winners male being superbly handled, getting every bit of good from his dog possible. I watched this fellow very close for a fault that I thought he had, and could not find, but did later in Best of Winners, which brings us to females.

As in the States, I would say the females are better than the males. At least there were more of a higher quality. This may be a healthy condition for the breed, because the better the Bostons we are going to have, as it is wrong to expect a good male to do more than his share.

There is no question but that my winners female class if ever they come together again may be reversed, as I had two females in that class that were simply gorgeous, and were handled as well as anyone could do on that day. It was regretable that this had to be their off day, but when a handler pulls a dog across the ring and has to carry them back, a judge cannot carr

award.

My Best of Breed was a dog that any judge would enjoy working with and is hard to beat.

You may use any of this information as you wish, as these remarks are meant only as constructive and hope no one will take them otherwise.

With many thanks to the club members exhibitors, Mr. Reggie Sparks, and yourself. I sincerely wish you loads of luck, and hope for an early victory overseas.
