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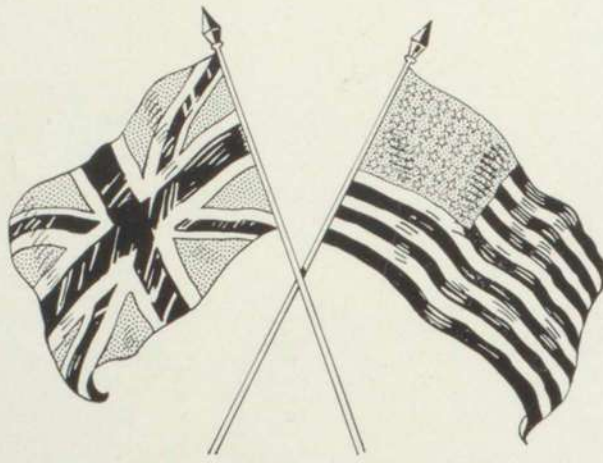

President's Christmas Message

ANOTHER year has passed since I penned my last Christmas Greetings to the members of the Canadian Kennel Club. Another year during which our organization and the membership as a whole have had our share of ups and downs, these we have sought to adjust in conformity with our Constitution, believing that better days are in store for us all.

As we celebrate Christmas this year, many of our members will be separated from sons and daughters serving in the Services—"Somewhere". Such will be very close together spiritually, on this day of all days. Others will be confronted with the vacant chairs, their consolation will be in the realization that their offspring gave their all for something they had regarded as being greater than themselves.

As doggie people, I believe that we have much to be thankful for. So far the war has furnished very few major problems for us to contend with. I have had the co-operation of the Vice-Presidents and Directors when meeting the problems coming before us during the year now closing in on us so quickly.

Early in January, Mr. Brown, the Secretary-Treasurer and Editor, informed me that he had enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force, and that he would report for training early in June. One would imagine that five months' notice would be sufficient for the Board of Directors to make all the necessary adjustments to properly carry on the many functions of the Club, but actually the time element proved to be of little or no advantage. Many efforts were made through National Selective Service to secure some likely person capable of taking over the Secretary's duties, but the results were definitely disappointing. It was suggested that Miss Kathleen Corley, the senior member of the staff, should be prevailed upon to take over the onerous position, and happily she decided to accept. During the transition period, Director J. D. Strachan, arranged to function in an advisory capacity, and I am quite satisfied that this arrangement furnished the solution to a very definite problem.

We were very fortunate, at that time, in having Mrs. Phyllis Robson, Editor of "Dog World" (England) residing in Toronto, and when she was approached with a view to editing "Dogs In Canada", she quite readily agreed to function in the capacity of Editor until it would be possible for her to return to Britain. Mrs. Robson's effort on behalf of our magazine has been widely and favourably commented upon, and I trust that she will continue to receive membership and other support.

Last year, at this time, the membership were asked to express their wishes in respect to the holding, or otherwise, of the Annual General Meeting when the answer was "NO". This year the members will again be asked to say whether or not the Annual General Meeting for 1944 will be held, and I ask each member, in good standing, to exercise the franchise, so that the Board of Directors will have a proper direction in the matter.

The many hardships encountered by our show-giving Clubs have received sympathetic attention at the hands of the Board of Directors, and every reasonable adjustment has been made in the general interest of dog shows. The first war year saw a curtailment of dog showing activities, but it is very encouraging to notice that our sport is in a definitely healthy condition and with the return of peace to the world, we will at once become normal again. I have been very proud to notice from time to time, and all over the country generally, that the proceeds taken at our shows have been handed out to the various charities. Four figure amounts have been amassed for such purposes in several localities.

From comparative figures tabled at each meeting of the Board of Directors, it is now apparent that there will be quite a substantial increase in the number of memberships, registrations, transfers, and kennel names, with a very desirable increase in the Club's revenue generally, and when the financial statements have been prepared by our Auditors at the close of the financial year, I am quite sure that the membership will be well satisfied with our financial standing.

I have been advised by your Secretary of my re-election, by acclamation, as President, so I take this opportunity to express my sincere appreciation of the high honour and of your continued confidence in me. I shall endeavour to give the Vice-Presidents and Directors such leadership as may lead to club government in conformity with the Constitution therefore satisfactory to the members.

So, to you, my friends, I sincerely offer the seasonal greetings of the Christian world, a very Merry Christmas and a Happy and Prosperous New Year. To those of our many members overseas, "Happy Hiking", "Pleasant Sailing", and "Happy Landing".

Some of My Experiences In Judging Smooth Fox Terriers

You ask me to write you an article on why I like Smooth Fox Terriers, and some of my experiences—presumably at shows at which I have judged. Well, for one who is not given to writing articles of any sort, I will say right at the start that you have set me a difficult task. One must not forget that a lot of poor stuff is written about dogs, and I feel somewhat reluctant to add to it.

As a lover of all breeds, it is not easy to single out one, but for over 38 years I have been particularly interested in the Smooth Fox Terrier. One has to recall the circumstances perhaps that brought one into the breed, and those that one was associated with at the start (most of them, unfortunately, now no longer with us). Desmond O'Connell inspired me on my way home from South Africa, with the wish to breed Smooths, but it was not until I had been breeding for a couple of years that I became really bitten with the desire to have many more than the one bitch, "Oleander", purchased from O'Connell, and at that time well established as a household pet.

In 1910 I judged Smooths for the first time at a Championship Show, and it was in that year that I was prevailed upon by Desmond O'Connell to go to Lyons and judge "Terriers Divers". On enquiring what Terriers I might expect, I was told in addition to a number of Smooths, probably a Scottie or two, a few Wires, and a few Bull Terriers, and this was about all that did put in an appearance. About 1935 I judged there again, but Wires then predominated.

In Paris

It has been my good fortune to judge at least half a dozen times in Paris, but not always Fox Terriers—for instance, in 1935 I judged Scotch breeds for "Les Amateurs de Terriers d'Ecosse", which comprised Cairns, Skyes, Dandie Dinmonts, West Highland Whites and Scotties. On another occasion, Kerry Blues. Can it, therefore, be wondered at that I am fond of a "Smooth", for it has been this little fellow who has been responsible for taking me many times to the Continent and further afield, and, moreover, thanks to him, I was brought into contact with such interesting and experienced breeders amongst others as Francis Redmond, Sir James Hosker, Frank Reeks, Robert Vicary, J. C. Tinne, N. A. Loraine and Holland Buckley, all of whom, alas, have joined the Great Majority, to say nothing about those who are carrying on the good work even in these difficult days.

In January, 1920, F. W. Bright, who for ten years had acted as Honorary Secretary of the Fox Terrier Club, resigned, and when I filled the gap I little thought that in 1943 I should still be functioning.

In Sweden

In 1922 Redmond asked me to go to Stockholm, as he was unable to do so, and after some persuasion I agreed, and there judged pretty nearly the whole show, and surprising to say, this led to

my having many invitations to judge various breeds for both the Svenska Kennelklubben and the Svenska Terrierklubben—in all I visited the Venice of the North on five occasions, and Gothenburg once. I remember on one occasion when in Stockholm the King of Spain arrived, and seeing the King of Sweden embark in his motor launch and go alongside the Spanish battleship and return with the King of Spain. The Grand Hotel where I was staying is on the opposite side of the water to the King's Palace, but very near. It is said by some that Stockholm is built on 22 islands; some limit the number to 17; whichever is correct, it is a very delightful city. Once, my wife and I went from Gothenburg to Stockholm by canal—a small steamer used to leave at 9 a.m. on Wednesdays and arrive in Stockholm at 6 p.m. on Friday; it is a very interesting trip and one I can recommend anyone taking. The Sven-

ska Kennelklubben very kindly made me one of its two English correspondents—this has not entailed any work, but it is an honour to be so recognized. The Royal Fox Terrier Club de Belgique were also good enough to make me a Life Honorary Member, which honour was also conferred on the late Mr. Francis Redmond, and upon Captain H. T. Crosthwaite of "Bowden" fame. I judged for this club in the late '30's.

In the States

In 1930 I had the great pleasure of judging at Greenwich, Connecticut, for the L.K.A. The breeds I judged were Smooths, Wires, Cairns, Scotties, Sealyhams and Welsh Terriers. What a delightful trip that was, and the kindness I received was amazing. Arriving in Quebec with my son, we stayed there a night or two and went on to Montreal, and from there to Vermont, Manchester, where a friend met us and motored us through New England to Dublin, Hampshire—it is lovely country, and the autumn tints of the maple leaf were ex-

quisite. Here we stayed from Monday until Thursday, being royally entertained the whole time. The last day we were motored to Boston, and after doing justice to an excellent luncheon at the Ritz-Carlton, we were taken over Harvard University. Later in the afternoon we trained to New York, and the following morning went on to Greenwich, where we spent a couple of days with the late Mr. Spiekerman. I started judging after luncheon and carried on the whole of the next day. I also judged Best in Breed, making Weltona Frizette, the Wire-haired Fox Terrier bitch, Best in Show—which I understand was her 14th such win. Second went to a Great Dane, who had already been twelve times Best in Show. The six dogs that came before me were selected by that entertaining and delightful person, Mr. Justice Hanna, who, unfortunately, had to return home the following day.

We spent the following night with Mr. F. B. Lord, at his beautiful place on Long Island, and he took us on the following day into New York. At a luncheon given to us at the Leash Club, we were invited by Mr. and Mrs. David Wagstaffe to spend a night at Tuxedo, and a most enjoyable one it was, for we were a party of 18 for dinner. The

following day we were taken to lunch with Mr. John Bates, and I had the great pleasure of going over his kennel of Wires afterwards.

At Monte Carlo

In 1933 I joined Holland Buckley and his daughter, Mrs. Barber, George Howlett and his wife, at Monte Carlo and there judged Fox Terriers. I remember having the most marvellous lunch at Cap Ferrat given to us by Baron van der Hoop; we had 50 different kinds of hors d'oeuvres, followed by the finest capon I have ever eaten; on congratulating the proprietor on the excellent repast, he expressed his regret that the Baron had limited him to 50 hors d'oeuvres, whereas he could have supplied 63! We also had some 1847 Sherry, which was very good—I had never heard of this vintage in respect of sherry before—the port of that year, of course, is famous. A day or two later we went on to San Remo, where the Baron judged Fox Terriers, and I judged

the other Terrier breeds, which he had judged at Monte Carlo.

In Australia

Another ever-memorable visit for which the Smooth Fox Terrier was responsible was that made in 1937 to Australia. I went via Jamaica, the Panama Canal and New Zealand, and was much interested in passing through the Gatun Lake and Canal—the whole a very marvellous engineering achievement. After leaving Panama it took three weeks to get to Wellington—one sees hardly any land—we did stop in the dark for an hour or two at Pitcairn Island, that small island upon which the mutineers of H.M.S. "Bounty" landed and established themselves, and whose descendants come aboard and sell you flowers, walking sticks and small wooden cigarette and snuff boxes. From Wellington I trained to Hamilton, and from there motored to Rotorua, where I stayed a night. Volcanic conditions here are such as to produce many geysers, which are everlastingly emitting steam—rising in some cases to a great height; the curious thing is that the small streams hold large trout, and yet within a few feet of the bank, geysers abound. Maoris, I was told, catch the trout and cook them on the spot. The journey from Rotorua to Auckland is through very pretty and varied country, and in many parts one gets some fine landscapes.

From Auckland I was fortunate to travel with the President of the New Zealand Kennel Club—that good fellow, Norman Wade, who was also going to judge at the Royal Agricultural Society of New South Wales Show, on the S.S. "Awatea"—a fast vessel accomplishing the voyage in just over 60 hours. Bill Hamilton (for many years President of the N.S.W. Fox Terrier Club and an active member of the R.A.S. of N.S.W.), known to all his friends as "Bill", was on the quay to meet us, and from that minute we never had a dull moment the whole of the fourteen days I was there. The Royal Agricultural Show of N.S.W. is marvellously run and brings people from all the States; roughly speaking, three-quarters of a million pass through the turnstiles during the ten days the show is on.

The dog section is, of course, but a small part of the whole, which comprises, apart from the exhibition of practically all "live stock", trotting races, rodeo, expert axemen's competitions and a score of other things of interest. The Smooth Fox Terrier entry was a record one—the 18 classes averaged 21 per class. I enjoyed every minute of the days' work in spite of the heat, for it was most interesting sorting out the dogs, and I can candidly say there was not a bad one amongst the lot.

On my homeward journey I stayed a long weekend in Melbourne, a couple of nights in Adelaide and a day in Perth, and met with the greatest kindness in all these cities from the doggy fraternity. On leaving Fremantle, I went to Colombo at the invitation of the Ceylon K.C., and judged their show at Kandy. Kandy and the surrounding country is perfectly lovely, and about the prettiest that I can recall in all my travels, which extend to South Africa and some of the West Indian Islands, in addition to those mentioned.

On my way home I landed at Malta—little did one think that in the course of three years she would be called upon to endure and achieve so much. It was when in Malta that I heard a part of the Coronation Ceremony over the wireless. I came overland from Marseilles, and thus ended the longest holiday and one of the most enjoyable I have ever spent.

In Portugal

In 1938, I went to Lisbon and judged the show held by the Sociedade Por-

tugués de Canicultura, and had a very enjoyable week, receiving the greatest possible kindness from all with whom I came in contact. The show was visited by President Carmona, to whom I had the honour of being introduced.

In conclusion, some of the reasons why I am so attached to a Smooth Fox Terrier are because he is a real sportsman—ready to tackle anything living either above or below ground, and in addition, a good watchdog, and with his short coat a good dog for the house. I am very fond of several longer coated dogs, but they do bring more dirt into your house, especially if low to ground.

Finally, why I like the breed (both coats) is because of their beautifully symmetrical appearance. I do think that a well-made Fox Terrier, particularly Smooths, where the points are so much more easily seen, make him very attractive—that is to say a good neck let into well-laid shoulders, good round bone, cat-like feet, short back and hind quarters, are also pleasing to the eye.

IS YOUR DOG TIMID?

Often dogs are thought to be dull when they are only timid. It has been my experience that the rather timid dog possesses exceptional intelligence, which soon responds to the proper treatment.

Many dogs that fear nothing else are frightened out of their wits by a thunder storm. We all know persons similarly susceptible, but we do not call them dense or cowardly. When raging elements have the power so deeply to impress man with his insignificance, his utter helplessness to combat them, why expect calm confidence in a dog?

Often dogs are abused for their fear of fireworks. To me, this fear is an evidence of good sense in a dog. His head is much nearer the ground than a man's and his eyes in more danger from a sizzling cracker. Also, his hearing is keener and the detonation more of a nerve shock to him.

I once saw a terrier actually attack a

big firecracker when it was about to explode, but I rather have my dogs reasonably afraid of such things. Their instincts are given them for self-protection. To tease a sensitive puppy with fireworks, in the hope of habituating him to them, is generally useless and always cruel. It will usually make him still more fearful, and end by his associating you with the object of his annoyance.

"Gun-shy" dogs are pronounced worthless by sportsmen. One hunter tried in vain for months to accustom his spaniel to the gun's report. The dog would run away every time, and subsequent discoveries revealed that he had once been shot. No wonder he feared a gun! Many times this is the case—that some former experience makes the dog afraid of certain objects.

Another point: We surely should accord the dog the good sense to know his own weaknesses. As a boy, I owned a dog that could hardly walk a log across a stream to save his life. His sense of balance was off, subnormal, and he knew it. Unless the log was particularly large he preferred to swim the stream. It must have been the fall he dreaded, because the worst that could have happened was a tumble into the water—to which he took by choice.

Another instance of good canine sense—too often called cowardice: A friend and I were the joint owners of a canoe, and he had a valuable foxhound. At the beginning my partner knew nothing about paddling, and he was unusually clumsy in learning. On the other hand, I had been used to canoes, and handled the little craft with some skill and confidence. The dog seemed to understand the situation, for he absolutely refused to get into the boat with his master, but would go with me any time. On land he was a "one man dog" and would do anything his master ordered. Either observation or some peculiar instinct warned him that his master was no boatsman and might give him a spill.

Don't tease the timid dog. Animals often differ surprisingly even when of the same parentage, and to some teasing means torture. Seldom perhaps is the misery inflicted purposely; but we should be more thoughtful and observing. No matter how obviously harmless an object may be to us, that same thing may be highly alarming to our pet.

When I was a lad, living in a small "backwoods" town, some of the boys used to catch dogs and tie a can or small bucket of pebbles to their tails. One dog actually ran himself to death; and another was shot by a farmer who thought him mad. The dog had finally rid himself of the can, but was still acting strangely from the fright.

Many pets are made irritable and ill by constant teasing. A dog should not be expected always to be ready for play—no more than a human being should. And if dogs are persistently teased when they are ill or when they misunderstand, we should not be surprised nor indignant if they resent it. Unless an animal plays willingly he should not be induced to play.

Too much teasing often defeats a pet owner's efforts to make his pet love him. A little, as long as the animal understands it and is not being forced in any way, is all right; but repeated too often it makes the pet suspicious and mistrusting. He can't be entirely happy with such a master.

A RUSSIAN WAR DOG

The Bravest of the Brave

We motored one Sunday a hundred miles to pick out a Newfoundland puppy from a litter of four months' old dogs. Had we known as much about the breed as we do now we would never have purchased her for she was not in any sense a good specimen of her breed though she threw some very good puppies. She had rickets, worms, fleas,

brought into the house she knew, how we never could fathom. She loved to go in the car and I had only to say "Dinah, want to go—that she would be at the door and into the car like a flash. Once there she always sat with her hind quarters on the back seat and her front legs on the bottom of the car and although she was not usually cross with strangers she never would allow anyone to approach the car even if we were in it. The only other time she ever showed the slightest signs of anger was if anyone laid a hand on me as if to

lice and was very pot bellied, but we soon put these troubles right and she took possession of our home and of our hearts. Though she had been kennel raised and never been inside a house she only misbehaved in the house once. Her only claim to fame was that she was in Ripley's Believe It or Not as having had fifty-three puppies in twenty-three months. She certainly was a remarkable mother and never had less than twelve puppies in one litter. She must have had good stuff behind her for when bred to the well-known Ch. Baron gave some good stock and her first litter produced two full champions and one that needed only one point to finish, she also had several champion grand-children.

What endeared us to Dinah was that she had remarkable intelligence, good temper and a wonderful disposition towards other dogs. She mothered every puppy that was brought into the house so that no young strange puppy ever cried or was lonesome for it slept right from the first between Dinah's front paws. Dinah's favourite food was a Ross Miller Biscuit, she got that we could not mention these two words without her asking for one. Then we had to say R.M. but she soon knew that and even when it was reduced to Um-Um she knew. If there was a bag of these in the house and she decided she wanted one there was no peace till she was given one. If there were none in the house she knew and never asked for one but the minute they were

When she was twelve years old she developed serious cancerous growths on the breasts and it was found necessary to put her to sleep. This day I had had her son, Champion Perivale Coastguard King put to sleep and had the veterinarian look at Dinah. He advised me to have her destroyed. I was sitting on the floor in my home beside King and as I said, "Well, I suppose I shall have to have Dinah put to sleep too". She surely understood what I said, for she came and laid her head down into my lap. I am not ashamed to say I cried and though it is three years ago we still miss her for she held a place in our hearts no other dog can ever fill.

Bred to International Champion Chia Wan's Wun Dai Dream, her litter produced Kylin of Chalfont, Nana of Chalfont, and Ryma of Chalfont. The latter has not yet been shown, but the two former have been very success-

fully campaigned as teammates this past summer. Both commenced their championship show careers when only eight months old at the Peel County Kennel

At the recent Progressive Dog Club's initial show, where Mr. Alf Loveridge judged, Mrs. Kenyon had the supreme pleasure of winning Best in Show in a fine entry with Kylin of Chalfont, an award greeted with loud applause. As Kylin is still a puppy, a great future is predicted for him.

The Queen of the Kennels is Champion Treasure of Chia Wan, a two-year-old female, who at the age of eighteen

months completed her Canadian title at the Hamilton Spring Show. Treasure is by Chia Wan's Red Monarch 2nd ex International Champion Reverie of Chia Wan, and has both International Champion Chia Wan's Red Monarch and International Champion Blue Monarch in her blood lines.

Treasure was imported into Canada as a 4 months' puppy from Mrs. Ralph W. Spike, Chia Wan Kennels, Port Huron, Mich., U.S.A.

Another outstanding young dog is Kwong of Chalfont (also a son of Choonam Che Yen) who was Best of Breed at Guelph this summer. So it will be seen that the bluest of blood is to be found in the kennels of these good fanciers and those wanting really good Chows should note the address. I may add that there will be some very super duper puppies for disposal in the near future, as Persimmon has recently given birth to a litter, some of which will be for sale about Christmas or shortly afterwards.

Here's wishing Mr. and Mrs. Kenyon all the best of good luck and may they breed a Ch. Choonam Hung Kwong is my best wish.

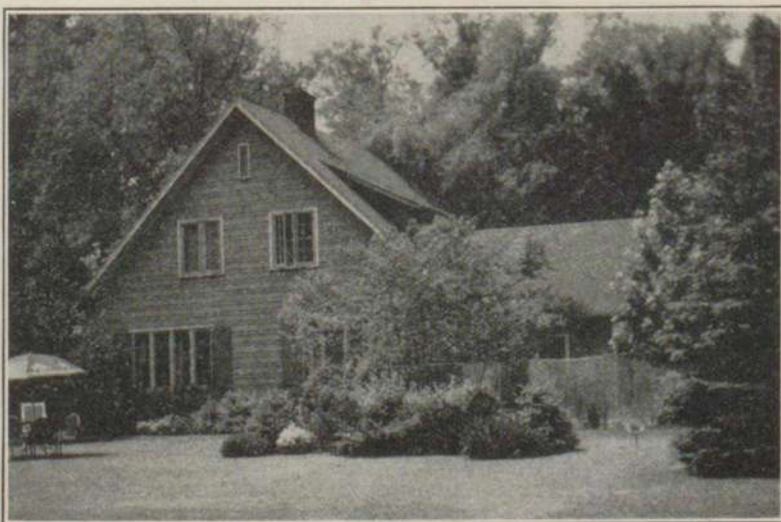

Dear Readers:

"Infallibles"

As our noted American friend Ripley would say—"believe it or not"—for the first time in twenty-six years as an editor I have been, so to speak, crushed. I might use the same phrase again—"believe it or not"—by a person in whom I have always believed, and have well sponsored, and the gentleman in question is none other than Mr. A. Palmer. This gentleman is obviously inexperienced in a literary world and press circles. Mr. Palmer is of the opinion, rightly or wrongly, that an editor merely publishes, without scrutiny, opinions made adversely or otherwise. Editors and publishers, upon whose shoulders rest the responsibility for publishing what might be construed as slanderous or libelous statements, to say nothing of erroneous opinions, which are all too frequently written for publication, must take discretionary measures to prohibit such articles.

I am not pretending to be one of the "infallibles." I, like other human beings, make mistakes. Mr. Palmer appears to be one of the people alluded to by Mr. Winston Churchill in his recent brilliant remark "Everyone is in favour of free speech, but some people's idea of it is that they are to say what they like, but if anyone says anything back, that is an outrage."

I want to thank the very many people who have expressed their sympathy with me over Mr. Palmer's castigation and asked to be dissociated with his views.

Mr. Palmer has not suffered one iota of what I have, through the war—and never will do, so his suggestion that I blue pencil his letter to injure the cause of the British War Victims' Fund is puerile. Being a victim myself, with my home blitzed, as well as my enforced exile—I have been refused a permit to return to England as I am over the age limit, offsets Mr. Palmer's allegations and I greatly resent a statement he made to some of the Directors of the C.K.C. that "had Hitler read the Steggall letter he would have sent an 'Iron Cross to Canada', and furthermore that people were beginning to wonder if I was really British. I leave the judgment to all fair-minded Canadians.

The reason of Mr. Palmer's "pique", is because he did not get enough publicity over his Terrier show in advance. I wrote a full column which should have come out in the June number. This was the first issue I edited. I worked at a disadvantage, everything being strange to me and unfortunately the whole page was missed out. This contained reports of a death, a club meeting, a dinner and Mr. Palmer's boost for his show. Happily for me, a copy of the printed page is in the possession of the Directors. I explained the matter to Mr. Palmer. I put a notice in the Personal Paragraphs about the show in the July issue—before the show, and after—it was held, in August gave a page of pictures plus 51½ inches in *Dogs in Canada*, to his show, so tried to make amends to the best of my ability.

Another of Mr. Palmer's grievances is that he alleges I did not give enough publicity to the Canine Breeders' show at the Woodbine in advance, though just what business this is of his I do not know. He suggested that the space taken by Miss Steggall's letter would have been better employed giving publicity to this show. Once more Mr. Palmer jumped to a wrong conclusion—I called at the office twice, I phoned and I wrote in advance, begging for particulars, as the event was being held in aid of the British War Victims' Fund. I was most anxious to give it all the support possible. Editors do not as a rule go out and seek information about a show in this way, and I hold a letter from the Chairman saying, "I cannot forget and overlook your kindness in having called me on numerous occasions and I do not desire that any unfairness should be given to *Dogs in Canada*. I for one know the Editor had the finest interest in a good show". I think if Mr. Palmer understood the homesickness and loneliness and all that we "guests of Canada" have gone through, to say nothing of our financial difficulties, he would be a little kinder and more understanding.

I am only carrying on the editorial duties of *Dogs in Canada* and trying to give you a worth-while paper, till your Editor returns from his Air Force duties, when I can go back to England, taking with me many happy memories of the kindness and appreciation handed out to me so generously by the majority of you sporting Canadian dog fanciers.

And now I claim the woman's privilege

Are Lotteries for Dogs in the Best Interests of the Dog Game?

Dear Editor:

Mr. Palmer has accused me of making untruthful statements in my letter to the Editor titled "Are Lotteries for Dogs in the Best Interests of the Dog Game", published in the September issue of *Dogs in Canada*. I deny that there are any untrue statements in my letter, and further, lotteries, sweepstakes and the like are illegal in the Dominion. The permit number 33954 Mr. Palmer quotes as his authority to hold a raffle is none other than the War Charities Act Permit Number whereby benefits such as Dog Shows, etc., may be held in aid of a specified War Charity and the name of that War Charity used in advertising, soliciting donations, etc., providing at least 75 per cent of the gross receipts are given to that charity. This does not actually legalize lotteries in Canada, where, so far, all attempts to pass the necessary lottery legislation through Parliament have failed.

Mr. Palmer takes exception to my statement that "At times the sponsors agree to purchase the prize for a stipulated sum in case the lucky ticket is held by an unappreciative person, but alas it is not always thus". True in two instances in the Irish Terrier raffle it was stipulated that the dogs would be bought back for \$150.00 each, "but alas it was not always thus" for there were four other dog prizes that no such stipulation was made. I am sure other fanciers like myself received other doggie raffle tickets to dispose of and there was no stipulation stated or implied that cash would be substituted if the dog was not acceptable. The fact that three of the six Irish Terriers were sold by the holders of the "lucky tickets" is proof enough that a dog is not always an acceptable prize. I think it very fortunate that these dogs were bought by people who evidently wanted them.

It was brought to my attention very forcibly last Winter during one of our coldest blizzards, of the folly of raffling dogs. A pure-bred Cocker Spaniel female was won in a raffle at Christmas time. The man who won her thought she would be a good plaything for his small child, but his better half did not care about the puppy with the result that she was running the streets for about a week in sub-zero weather and became frightened and lost. When found she was famished, terrified and half frozen.

This is one of several cases I have come across which accounts for my attitude towards the raffling of dogs—particularly of pure-bred dogs, and it seems there are many others in accord with my views.

Mrs. Robson, like many other Britishers, is a war guest among us through no fault of her own, and is carrying on magnificently under very trying circumstances. She is making of *Dogs in Canada* a magazine that people at long last are willing to pay for and to read. It is taking on an international and broadened aspect and is not run for the aggrandisement of a few as Mr. Palmer evidently would prefer. The readers no doubt will decide just whose opinions may be warranted.

In Great Britain the fanciers there have various ways of raising funds for the War

and for War Charities. One Bulldog alone, Int. Ch. Bosworth Queen, has raised sixty thousand of pounds sterling, not dollars, Mr. Palmer. I read *Dog World* (England) very carefully each week and have yet to see an instance of dogs being raffled.

For Mr. Palmer's information, I might state that I was Secretary for the meetings Miss Veva Robson mentioned and am one of the chief exponents for an all-breed dog show in this city. Unfortunately circumstances do not permit me to assume the full responsibility, but as in the past I am still willing to do my share and more for any club of which I am a member.

Dear Editor:

I have been reading with interest the letters about lotteries in "The Voice of the People". I know nothing about that particular lottery, except what I have read; but I have had an experience, which is something similar to what Miss Steggall says.

In the spring of 1942, the *Scranton Times* conducted the Marbles Tournament for Scranton and Lackawanna County. They wanted to give the sectional winners in the city tournament Cocker Spaniel puppies. The reporter in charge of the tournament asked different breeders where he could get four Cocker puppies. Nobody, he went to, had pups the age that he wanted, but they all told him that they thought I did. That night, he saw my "ad" in his paper, and so decided to call me. I looked at it as the other breeders in and around Scranton did,—that I would get \$100 worth of advertising out of the sale, although others said, "You don't know what sort of homes those dogs will have." Anyway, I sold the pups to the paper, but boarded them until the finals.

The day of the finals, I went along, because I wanted to know who was getting the pups. After it was over, some of the boys wanted to know how much they cost. The reporter said, "They are valuable dogs, and so treat them accordingly". It happened that one of the families, who got these puppies, was on relief, and did not know how they were going to find money to feed the dog. The mother told me that they were going to sell him, as they had no place to keep a valuable dog, and asked me what price they should ask for it. I heard later that they got so attached to him, that they refused \$25; then I heard that they let him run around the neighborhood and as a result the dog had been run over. The others, as far as I know, are well taken care of.

I still get advertising by saying "The mother is the mother (or half-sister) of the *Scranton Times*' puppies", but I will never, again, sell dogs for prizes in a tournament or lottery.

Dear Editor:

This is a letter that I had intended to send to you in answer to one that was published in the September issue of *Dogs in Canada* and one that stands out for strong condemnation. As one who gave a dog to be raffled and also helped with two of the dog shows, where dogs were raffled as prizes, I feel that Miss Steggall needs to be put on the right track and also to point out where she is wrong.

These raffles were not illegal. As permission from official quarters was given to the two show-giving organizations and the gross profits were for the British War Victims' Fund sponsored by *The Evening Telegram* of Toronto, so far the magnificent sum of \$2,204,051.47 has been collected from Sept. 1940 to Nov. 16, 1943, and not one cent of these contributions are deducted for expenses. Every cent is sent to Great Britain to help alleviate the misery and suffering these gallant people have so heroically borne. I am sure there is nothing deplorable in donating dogs for such a grand cause.

I am quite sure the motives of those sponsoring these raffles were only for the good that could be done by any funds raised and certainly not to belittle the qualities of the dogs or jeopardize their future welfare because they are offered for the so-called few cents—the cost of the raffle ticket.

Is Miss Steggall always satisfied with the kind of homes that her dogs have when once they leave her? This is a question I am sure we would all like to know. Does Miss Steggall only value her dogs according to

I do not see any unhuman act in seeing dogs being raffled for such causes. Dogs have always been man's best friend and today they, like man, are called upon to serve in ever widening fields in this sad war-torn world.

Montreal, and in fact, the whole of Quebec, certainly supported the raffle sponsored by The Canine Breeders' & Exhibitors' Dog Show and to them and to all others who bought tickets my sincere thanks. Perhaps if Miss Steggall was nearer to the scene of hostilities she would BOOST and not knock such worthy projects. (Mrs.) Ellen Brown.

Are Some Field Trial Clubs Getting Off on the Wrong Foot?

Dear Editor:

I have read with keen interest your report on field trials, and particularly those of the West. Also I have before me as I write a sheet containing the rules and regulations of such trials as set out by me of our Western Field Trial Clubs.

After giving due consideration to the contents of the above mentioned sheet, it makes many of us wonder if some of our Field Trial Clubs are not getting off on the wrong foot. That is insofar as practical hunting foot is concerned in connection with field dogs.

Stunting and playing to the grandstand is

very interesting if confined to our own back yard. It is no doubt an enjoyable pastime. Unfortunately, such stunting is, in many such trials, termed as manners, and carry considerable weight in point rating, in other words, an artificial rating to a dog that may possess very little field instinct.

As a breeder of Cocker I must confine my remarks strictly to the American Cocker, as I do not care to trespass on the rights of breeders of other Sporting Dogs. Therefore, after discussing the methods or rules as set out for Cockers in many of our Western field trials, with sportsmen whose only interest or amusement is in filling their bag, I am firmly convinced that the field trials for Cockers will get very little support from the vast majority of practical hunters. They want more than manners. The throwing of a pigeon and the retrieving it is not enough. Almost any breed of Terrier enjoys such tricks and is on the job with very little training.

Consequently if our Cocker field trials are to enjoy the support of the gun-toting sportsmen, and which in reality are the final judges, our pigeon methods must be discarded and our Cockers forced to practical methods in the field.

It is also unfortunate to hear the remark—"Can our Cockers be bred up to field work." To such remark my answer is strictly no. It should be remembered that dogs are very much like human beings. Some are more intelligent, more progressive, and show more field instinct than others. He must be born with the instinct to hunt, and such instinct should get due consideration on both sides in mating. Therefore, there is no necessity to attempt the breeding of dogs that have no ambition to hunt. There are many of our bench champions that would have made a greater showing in the field had the opportunity prevailed, and only through the mating of the dual purpose Cocker can we ever expect to get anywhere in the future with our Cockers as field dogs.

It has always been discouraging to me to have sincere and conscientious dog lovers with high priced and exceptionally well trained field Cockers, insofar as field manners are concerned, come to our kennels and when taken out in the wide open spaces, their field Cocker ceased to exist so far as practical field work was concerned. They had the training but lacked the instinct in too many cases.

I also believe that we should greatly appreciate the new point rating for Cockers as set out by the A.S.C. which adds an extra rating of twelve points for gait and other amendments with a view to bring about a more sporting dog type for our American type Cocker.

Yes, we have a vest pocket field dog second to none insofar as ring necks and hunts are concerned, providing we show a little discretion and common sense in the mating of our American type Cockers that show practical field instinct.

This loss of dignity, however, did not prevent her carrying on with the good work. She stood to attention during the playing of the National Anthem, and this symbol of the British Empire won all hearts.

COCKER PROBLEMS—CANADA AND U.S.A.

By W. A. Price

These are days of momentous interest to Cocker Breeders in Canada.

As readers of this magazine are no doubt aware, a Special Committee of the American Spaniel Club has for several months been considering the revision of the present Standard for Cocker Spaniels, and as a result of their labours a Revised Standard has been submitted to and approved by the American Kennel Club.

WEIGHT: Not under 22 nor over 28 pounds. Weight under or in excess of these limits shall be severely penalized. Puppies are exempt from the minimum limitation.

They also approved of four classes to go into the Sporting Group which are as follows: Blacks, Reds, Parti-Colors and English. They transferred the Black and Tans from the Parti-Color class to "any other solid color other than black". The American Spaniel Club arrived at this decision after carefully reviewing the statistical aspects of the case, based upon A.K.C. Stud Book registrations in 1942 for the months of March, June, September and December, which show that registrations of Cocker Spaniels (including English type) totalled 10,119 during these four months. Of this number there were:

Blacks	4,581
Solid colors other than black	3,561
Parti-colors	1,812
Black and tans	165

Of the Cockers given as registered in the four stud book numbers from which this information was obtained:

Blacks represented about	45%
Solid colors other than black, about	35%
Parti-colors, including black and tans about	20%

The wording of the American Standard has been changed somewhat and no doubt will be printed in one of the American magazines for the perusal and convenience of the Cocker breeders. Also the scale of points was changed to read as follows:

Spaniel Club, submitted some interesting data on this subject, including the score card sent out to all members as a questionnaire. It would appear that there was quite a diversity of opinion as to the disqualification clause governing the weights of Cockers in the proposed revised Standard.

We are all aware of the popularity of the American Cocker in the U.S.A. and we know there are some Cockers over there better than those in Canada, but it would appear at times as if buyers overlooked the fact that wherever Cockers are bred, there will always be poor ones; and we see dogs imported which are every bit as bad as our worst and not nearly as good as our best. Time was when American breeders came here for their stock, therefore, Canadian breeders would always keep in mind that history could repeat itself in this.

There are now so many young breeders in the field that it may be news to them to know that we went through this problem of weights some years ago. It was at the annual meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club in 1932 that Dog Show Rule No. 38 was amended to require a minimum weight of 23 pounds and a maximum of 28 pounds for Cocker Spaniels, bitches and dogs. In the discussion preceding the adoption of this amendment the prevailing complaint was that a too small type of Cocker was being developed, some cases of 14 pounders being cited as a reason for fixing the minimum weight of 23 pounds. This was afterwards changed to read 22 to 28 pounds and these weights were only to be used as a guide for a serviceable Cocker for bench and field. It

was also at this meeting that a rule was adopted separating the solids and partis into two classes and providing for the award of "Winners" in each class for bitches and dogs.

At the Canadian National Exhibition in 1933 all Cocker Spaniels were placed on the scales and weighed before they were allowed to enter the Show Ring, a procedure which proved to be most unpopular among the exhibitors, and resulted in a strong demonstration of dissatisfaction and the demand for the rescinding of the weight rule at the 1934 annual meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club. It was not, however, until 1936 that the requirement for the actual weighing of Cockers was deleted from the Dog Show Rules. The fact that since 1936 no complaints have been recorded relative to the weights of Cockers, may be taken as evidence that the breeders and exhibitors are satisfied with the existing conditions in Canada.

It is suggested that it might be well for Canadian Breeders to find out why the American Spaniel Club found it necessary to recommend this new rule regarding weights. Was it the tendency to get away from the fine bench type or to breed a dog as useful in the field as the English Cocker, or were American Cockers becoming too "Springerish"—or what was it?

It may be that Canadian breeders might think it advisable to adopt forthwith the American Standard but it would appear, after careful consideration, that it would be wise first to consider the number of registrations of Cockers as to colour before a decision is made. The small number of Reds and Black and Tans that are being shown might produce a few cheap champions. It would also mean having four Cockers in the Sporting Group.

It might be sensible to let the whole matter rest to see how the plan works out in the United States before any change is made.

I would suggest that new breeders of Cockers write and obtain the cloth-bound hand-book published by the Canadian Cocker Spaniel Association, Inc. This may be had, free of charge, by writing to either Mr. Francis Dagger, President, Unionville, Ontario, or Miss A. Elsie Mayhew, Secretary-Treasurer, Markham, Ontario.

This hand-book is really something that should be in every Cocker Kennel in Canada.

He was one of the first litter Mrs. Florsheim bred—a pretty fine achievement to breed a champion at one's first attempt.

Mrs. Florsheim has now acquired another brood bitch who is Rudiki line-bred and plans to breed her and Ch. Rudiki this winter, and she hopes there will be two litters of very choice puppies early in the year.

Mrs. Florsheim extends her Christmas greetings to Canadian dog lovers.

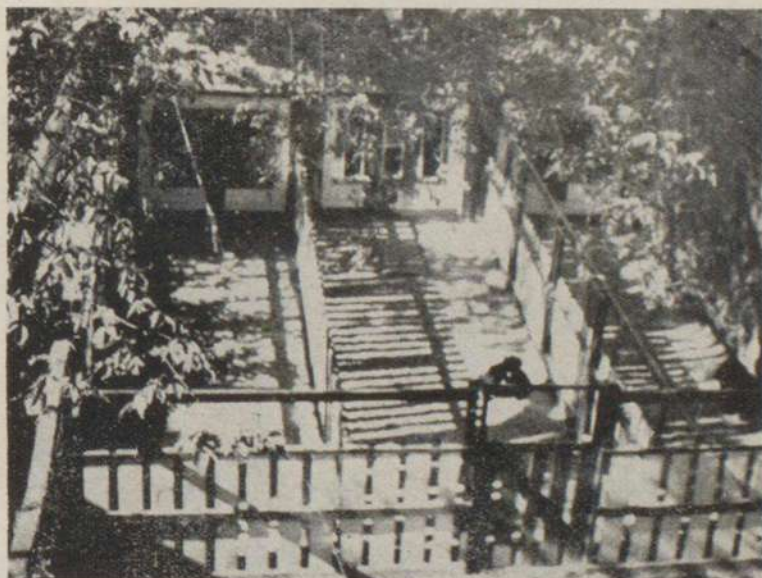
